DOZENS of pro-Palestinian campaigners have been elected as councillors as the war in Gaza hit town halls across Britain.

More than 40 councillors were elected in England after makBy Martin Beckford and Ryan Hooper

ing the conflict part of their campaign, analysis of Thursday's vote suggests.

Some wore rosettes in the colours of the Palestinian flag while others dedicated their victories to the people of Gaza. One shouted: 'We will raise the voice of Palestine. Allahu Akbar!' In at least 12 town halls, they defeated Labour candidates, prompting opposition leader Sir Keir Starmer to pledge to win back the trust of voters alienated over his stance on the issue.

His comments led one pressure group, The Muslim Vote, to issue

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## Borrowers may have to wait until summer for a cut in interest rates

BORROWERS may have to wait longer to see interest rates come down as Bank of England chiefs look set to hold out for stronger signs that the cost-of-living crisis has abated.

The Bank's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) will announce its latest decision for interest rates on Thursday.

Economists expect them to be kept at the current level of 5.25 per cent, which it has been held at since August last year. It means borrowers could have to wait longer before pressure starts to ease.

At the last meeting in March, just one member of the MPC, Swati Dhingra, voted for rates to be cut by 0.25 percentage points, but the remaining eight members voted for no change.

Interest rates are used as a tool to help bring down inflation, which has fallen sharply from the highs of 2022.

The rate of Consumer Prices Index

inflation fell to 3.2 per cent in March. But experts suggested two key economic indicators for the Bank of England - pay growth and services sector inflation - remain high.

Average wages continued to increase faster than inflation last month.

Economists at HSBC believe the first rate cut may come in June.

The Bank of England will shed more light on its economic predictions and the path of interest rates when it publishes the latest Monetary Policy Report alongside its decision on Thursday.

Meanwhile, the US Federal Reserve said on Wednesday that it was keeping its key interest rate at the same level and noted a 'lack of further progress' towards lowering inflation.

THE country's tax burden is set to rise to an 80-year high of 37.1 per cent by 2028, analysis suggests.

Despite a slight drop in 2024 to 36 per cent, taxpayers will face an increased burden every year from now, according to the Tax-Payers' Alliance.

sonal tax thresholds, the nation's tax burden is rising and will hit a high not seen since 1948 in four years, the tax campaigners warned.

They say the current government will be the biggest tax-raiser in history - with a rise of 3.3 per cent since 2019 with the next largest being Harold Wilson's Labour government in the late 1960s.

John O'Connell, chief executive of the TaxPayers' Alliance, said: 'The economy is set to hit yet another grim record by the end of the decade, even if the projected fall in spending represents a glimmer of hope. An 80-year high tax burden will mean more misery for hard-pressed taxpayers and businesses, suffocating the economy for many years to come.

'Ministers need to ensure the recent fall isn't simply a one-off by bringing in a serious package of tax cuts and simplification.'

Mr Sunak has come under fire for suggesting workers will enjoy a £900 tax cut due to the new National Insurance rates, as it fails to take into account the impact of the freezes to the thresholds at which NI and income tax are paid.

The Institute for Fiscal

Studies (IFS) has suggested that once the impact of all tax changes are taken into account, the average worker will be £340 better off next year, but those earning below £26,000 will be worse off.

A Treasury spokesman said: 'The huge cost of supporting people and firms during the pandemic and Putin's energy crisis obviously has to be paid for. But now the economy has started to turn a corner we have been able to cut tax.

'We want to end the unfairness of the double tax on work - which is why we're going to keep cutting National Insurance... until it's gone.'

The Prime Minister and Chancellor Jeremy Hunt have been more cautious in their

attitude to slashing taxes since Mr Sunak entered No 10, with the pair initially focusing on bringing down inflation.

After last month's tax cut came into effect, Mr Sunak said: 'We have now cut National Insurance by £900 because it's unfair that workers pay double tax on their income.

'We need to make it much simpler and much fairer and we are going to continue cutting this tax until it's gone.'

The Chancellor has hinted that he plans to pledge further tax cuts before the next election - though it is understood that he may decide to put such policies in the next Conservative manifesto rather than holding another fiscal event in the autumn.

## Rwanda 'can't guarantee migrant numbers'

THE Rwandan government has admitted it cannot guarantee how many migrants it will take under Rishi Sunak's flagship deportation scheme.

Spokesman Yolande Makolo said it was a 'misconception' that the country was only ready to take an initial 200.

## As John Cleese's Fawlty Towers play packs out West End theatre...

UST behind me in row K, a man is watching a football match on his mobile phone. 'Shocking free kick,' he murmurs to his luckless date.

If Basil Fawlty were here, and in so many ways he absolutely is, he would surely have something to say about this.

He might want to give the bloke a damn good thrashing with the branch of a tree. He might dismiss him as the kind of uncultured riff-raff who believes a Waldorf salad to be the height of civilisation.

He might just want to destroy the dolt with the power of his curdled invective. 'Have you seen the people in the Apollo Theatre? They've never even sat on chairs before,' he might screech.

Yet that would be neither fair nor true. Five minutes before Fawlty Towers: The Play begins, my neighbour must be the only punter in this West End theatre who is not totally Fawlty-focused; who is not completely bedazzled by the prospect of a fresh chiffonade of Basil being sprinkled upon the bland pizza of popular culture. Outside on Shaftesbury Avenue

earlier, the queue for returns was three deep.

The House Full signs were up by 7pm and, since then, the theatre bar has been doing a roaring trade in Fawlty Towers-themed cocktails, named after the famous sitcom's beloved characters.

Bizarrely, The Major is alcoholfree, The Basil is Bacardi-based (please, Basil would never drink anything so déclassé as white rum) and the bestseller is The Sybil, a mixture of gin, rhubarb lemonade and lemon, which

sounds about right.

For Fawlty-deprived fans, this is a theatrical moment to drink deep and savour. John Cleese himself has adapted the iconic 1970s television series he co-wrote with his then-wife Connie Booth into this production, melding three of his favourite episodes — The Hotel Inspectors, The Germans and Communication Problems — into one 90-minute play.

Famous scenes now nearly 50 years old have been blitzed into this big, lucrative Fawlty smoothie, topped off with a slight, frothy new ending — no doubt to be gulped down by the cult of uncritical fans who just want to laugh at Manuel all over again.

PART of me does wonder, what is the point? But the point seems to be to relish another opportunity to revel in the magnificence of a certain kind of Englishman, a hero shrouded in his tweeds and Faragist prejudices and terrible fear of his wife, Sybil.

And also to marvel at a global cultural phenomenon that sprung from the modest parameters of a 22-bedroom seaside hotel and a run of only two television series and 12 episodes. It took Cleese and Booth six weeks to write each episode and, after they had finished, they were never inclined to go back. Why meddle with perfection, they thought. And perhaps they were right.

Yet here we are, inside a London theatre, looking at a lovingly familiar scene. Stage left, the light is pooling through a bay window as the sun rises on

another Torquay morning. Stage right, there is the reception desk with its cubbyholes and telephones, its coat stand and key hooks. From the barometer on the hall wall to the dado rail and the flock wallpaper, from the double swing doors that lead from the dining room to the kitchen, we know exactly where we are and what to expect.

Such is the power of the show's popularity that from the moment the new Basil Fawlty (Adam Jackson-Smith) walks on stage, the audience start laughing. They laugh before he has even said a word. They laugh when they see Manuel (Hemi Yeroham, in an unconvincing wig) bumbling into his latest calamity. They laugh at the chainsaw laugh of Sybil (Anna-Jane Casey).

They laugh when Polly (Victoria

Fox) tries to guess the name of Basil's winning horse. They laugh when The Major (Paul Nicholas) gets his gun to kill a rat.

There is an absolute eruption of hilarity every time Manuel utters his famous catchphrase: 'I know nothing.' And the audience even laugh when the infamous moose head first makes its appearance on stage. In this new Fawlty Towers terrain, nothing but absolutely nothing has changed. The moose still even has a 'touch of mange about it,' but the audience don't seem to mind.

Perhaps that is because Fawlty Towers represents something so much more in the national consciousness than a mere comedy television series. It is also an entire cultural world; a testament to human failure, the kind of British affair that plumbs the depths of embarrassment and salutes our globally unsurpassable love of wince and the deluded loser.

From Dad's Army (Captain Mainwaring) to Rising Damp (Mr Rigsby) to Only Fools And Horses (Del Boy) to The Office (David Brent), there is no character we love more than the small man trying to act big. Fawlty Towers was also blessed by a cast rich with superb slapstick and physical comedy talents, not least Cleese himself.

'Basil is universal,' he wrote in a recent essay. 'His Englishness is to do with trying to remain calm and not managing to do so... What makes him such a deeply loved character is that people have sympathy for him, they can see that he is trapped.'

Despite the threat of cancel

culture and what Cleese calls 'too much change' in the world of television, fans will be delighted to hear that Basil still calls people cretins, he still goose-steps in front of his German guests and still relishes the fact that Sybil has an ingrowing toenail 'machete-ing its way through the nerve'.

He even still shouts at a deaf old lady having trouble with her hearing aid, which was the only part of the evening I found cruel — although back in the day I thought it was hilarious, which probably says more about me than it does about Basil.

HE hope is that Fawlty Towers, after bringing laughter and pleasure to generations, will reinvigorate new audiences via the collective experience of seeing it in the theatre. If there is a downside, it is that the play only emphasises how utterly brilliant the original performances were, from the lead roles to incomparable smaller turns by the likes of Bernard Cribbins, Joan Sanderson and Robin Ellis.

Yet gag by gag, quip by quip, we find ourselves back in 1970s Torquay, still deep in thwart, sarcasm, class wars, silly foreigners, snobbery and the war with Germany. When Cleese and Booth first wrote their peerless scripts back in 1975, the war had ended only 30 years previously—now, of course, we are nearly 50 years further on

further on.

Times have changed. We have evolved. Do British audiences still find the Germans funny?

Well, of course we bloody do. Just

please don't mention the war.

## Britain downplayed 'gobsmacking' Covid lab leak information

US shared intelligence that pointed finger at China

THE UK Government downplayed the 'high likelihood' that Covid-19 emerged from a lab leak in China because of resistance from scientific advisers, it

was claimed yesterday. US officials shared their views on the origin of the virus in a call with other members of the Five Eyes intelligence alliance – the UK, Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

But the 'lab leak' theory was downplayed in Britain because of resistance from government scientists who favoured the idea that Covid 'jumped the species barrier' from animals to humans, according to US sources.

Taking part in the January 2021 phone call were Mike Pompeo, Donald Trump's secretary of state, and the UK's then foreign secretary Dominic Raab and their counterparts.

The call - previously reported by The Mail on Sunday - was 'open', meaning unencrypted, in the hope the Chinese government would intercept the call, it is claimed.

The allegations, made by unnamed officials speaking in The Sunday Telegraph yesterday, are likely to increase calls to open the Covid Inquiry to the question of where the virus originated.

One US source who worked on the intelligence said: 'We saw several pieces of information and thought they were gobsmacking.

'They obviously pointed to the high likelihood that this was

indeed a lab leak.'

An intelligence dossier revealed the Chinese military worked with the Wuhan Institute of Virology in the years leading up to the pandemic, and some lab researchers fell sick shortly before the virus was first recorded nearby.

Other revelations showed Chinese scientists carried out 'gain of function' research, whereby a

virus is genetically manipulated to show different behaviour, such as becoming more infectious, or to become infectious against different species.

The UK Government, including Boris Johnson, initially rejected the claim that Covid had been created by scientists, saying in June 2021: 'The advice that we have had is that it doesn't look as though this disease of zoonotic origin came from a lab.'

Two former officials said the evidence was not taken seriously because ministers saw lab leak claims as a 'radioactive American

political issue' that was discredited by public disagreement between government scientists and Mr Trump.

One official said: 'Once the thing became fundamentally political, the ability to pursue it internationally really just collapsed because no one else was interested in touching it.

'I think [Five Eyes] were kind of annoyed by the way the issue had become treated in US politics.'

The two sources cited by The Sunday Telegraph both separately named Sir Jeremy Farrar, then a member of the Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies, as a key opponent of the lab leak theory in the UK Government.

Sir Jeremy and 26 other scientists rejected the lab leak theory in February 2020, signing a statement which said: 'We stand together to condemn conspiracy theories suggesting that Covid-19 does not have a natural origin.'

While many scientific experts

say an animal-to-human interaction is the most likely cause of the first infection, some figures, most notably Michael Gove, say the virus was 'man-made'.

Mr Gove told the Covid Inquiry in November there was a 'significant body of judgement that believes that the virus itself was man-made – and that presents its own set of challenges'.

Both the FBI and US Department of Energy have said they believe a lab leak is the most likely cause of the disease. UK ministers are facing calls to widen the Covid Inquiry to include an investigation into the origins.

A UK Government spokesman said: 'There are questions that need to be answered about the origin of Covid-19, not least so we can ensure we are better prepared for future pandemics. The UK supports the World Health Organisation in its study of the origins. It is important China and other countries co-operate fully.'

It is not a compensation scheme but is intended to 'ease the present and future burdens of those suffering from severe vaccine damage, and their families'. Victims and families are still entitled to sue for compensation.

Financing the scheme has risen from £600,000 in 2021-22 to £16.1million in 2023-24. Its one-off £120,000 payment has not risen in line with inflation since 2007. Minister Esther McVey is understood to be among those calling for reforms to the scheme.

Last week, drugs firm Astra-Zeneca admitted in court papers that its Covid vaccine can cause a rare side-effect. It is facing claims that the jab caused death and serious injury in 75 cases.

Charlet Crichton, from charity UKCVFamily, which supports those suffering from Covid vaccine side-effects, told The Sunday Telegraph: 'Ministers say you can use the £120,000 payment to fund litigation - but you can't, because vaccine damage cases are long, drawn out and costly.'

A Department of Health spokesman said: 'We have already scaled up and modernised the VDPS to allow cases to be processed more quickly, including by digitising the application process and increasing the number of administration staff.'

## Sleep easy... weekend lie-ins can keep you happy

THERE'S nothing like enjoying a long lie-in at the weekend after a busy week. Now experts have found that it's not only relaxing but may have health gains as those who get 'catch-up sleep' are less

likely to suffer symptoms of depression. Researchers analysed data on nearly 8,000 people who completed an assessment of depressive symptoms and answered questions about their sleep.

They discovered that nearly half got catch-up sleep by spending longer in bed at the weekends.

Overall those who slept one or two hours longer at weekends were up to 46 per cent less likely to show signs of depressive symptoms. These can include

persistent feelings of sadness and a lack of interest in once-enjoyable activities.

Analysis revealed that the benefit of weekend lie-ins on these symptoms were mainly present in those who slept six hours or less on weekdays.


The link also appeared to be stronger in men and those under 65, said a report in the Journal of Affective Disorders.

The academics from Central South

University in Hunan, China, concluded: 'Weekend catch-up sleep of zero to two hours was related to decreased odds of depressive symptoms.'

However previous studies have indicated that weekend lie-ins can increase the risk of diabetes, heart disease and obesity. Experts found that those who slept later at weekends ate less healthily and their gut health was impacted.

A CON artist used her dead daughter as 'bait' to swindle seven people out of nearly half-a-million pounds, the son of one of the victims has revealed.

Susan Goose, 63, manipulated Jennifer Esler into bankrolling a bogus legal battle for an inheritance from a man she claimed had sexually abused her daughter Chloe, who died in a car crash.

Grandmother-of-six Mrs Esler, 71, handed over money for eight years – losing her house, business and marriage in the process.

Goose was jailed last month for six years after admitting fraud by false representation between 2011 and 2024 against five victims. Two other fraud offences were taken into consideration.

Mrs Esler has now told the Mail: 'It will take me a long time to recover from this, if ever.'

Her son Daniel Lingwood, 27, added: '[The sentence] is not enough. She'll be back out and she'll be doing the same thing. She's ruined lives and destroyed families.' Goose groomed victims

needed money for a civil case over an inheritance. She took £440,000 from them, Norwich Crown Court heard, although the actual figure is believed to be higher.

Police discovered that she blew £130,000 after making 2,600 payments to gambling websites.

mother lost £252,000 in total although the figure cited in court was about £149,000.

Goose gained Mrs Esler's trust by paying her son's rent when he moved into the annexe of her fivebedroom family home in Sheringham, Norfolk, in 2015.

She then confided in Mrs Esler, a

mother-of-four, about how she had lost her own daughter.

Goose later produced a letter which stated that she was locked in a legal battle for a £40,000 inheritance but needed £2,000 to fund it.

Mr Lingwood, a management accountant, explained: 'Then she upped the ante saying the inheritance was going to end up near enough to £10million.

'The story went from an inheritance, to [saying] the guy she was inheriting from had sexually abused her daughter. [That] this guy "felt bad" for what he did.

'She was using her daughter as bait. This was the same with everyone. In court, I heard this from four people. Sometimes she was chasing the money from the person who had caused her daughter's death.'

Chloe Goose, 14, died in 2006 after a car driven by a 19-year-old man crashed into a shop in Hethersett, near Norwich.

Mr Lingwood and his stepfather

had no idea what was happening to Mrs Esler until it was suddenly announced in late 2017 that the family home had got to be sold because she had defaulted on loans she had taken out to fund the payments to Goose.

Mrs Esler's relationship with her partner collapsed amid the financial strain and in July she suffered a mini stroke from the stress and worry.

She lost her thriving crab dressing business and, a year later, was living in a tiny flat, relying on food banks to eat.

Explaining why his mother kept paying, Mr Lingwood said: 'She had the option of cutting her losses or continuing to pay in the hope she'd get her money back.'

Mr Lingwood voiced his concerns to police who investigated the claims and Goose was arrested on January 5 this year.

Following the court case, Detective Constable Dave Block said: 'The longevity and extent of her ruthlessness is staggering.'

## Now diesel drivers face a £250 fee... just to park!

DIESEL car drivers are being charged as much as £250 more per year to park near their homes.

Analysis found that on-street parking permits are more expensive for diesel vehicles in

several parts of the country. Eighteen of London's 32 boroughs have introduced a parking surcharge for diesel cars.

Hackney is the most expensive area in the capital, with diesel car drivers charged an extra £250 for on-street parking.

This is followed by Islington, which charges an additional £220, and Merton, which charges £150 in extra permit fees.

Outside of London, Brighton and Hove City Council has excluded diesel cars from its cheapest permits, meaning drivers can pay up to £62.05 more. Diesel car drivers are also hit

with extra parking costs in Edinburgh and Bath.

Luke Bosdet, of the AA, said the extra charges were 'simply a council cash grab'. He added that permits should be used to 'regulate on-street parking for the benefit of residents, not as a tool to demonise car choice'.

A Hackney Council spokesman said it introduced a diesel surcharge in 2015 to combat the 'public health crisis' from 'London's toxic air'.

Darren Rodwell, for the Local Government Association, said diesel surcharges - revealed by the Press Association news agency - were 'a matter for each council'.

## Tehran's latest weapon? Rap!

IRAN is using rap music to promote hardline Islamist values as a dissident singer faces the death penalty.

Dozens of Iranian rappers have been arrested since the early 2000s, and last month Toomaj Salehi was sentenced to die over charges linked to a period of nationwide unrest.

Salehi, 33, was arrested in 2022 after releasing songs criticising the Iranian regime.

Now the Islamic Republic is commissioning musicians to 'influence young people', it has been reported. One exiled Iranian hip-hop singer, Ghogha, told website France 24 that rappers are singing pro-government lyrics, posing with politicians, and earning up to £8,000 a month in streaming revenue.

He urged viewers to 'support the right of indigenous people to fight back'. He also accused Israel of trying to 'erase the legitimacy of

the native population'.
The Leeds Beckett University graduate, who is the director of his own accountancy firm, started his TikTok account just before the war

in Gaza began and has since then frequently posted his ramblings on the subject.

After his election victory in the Gipton and Harehills seat with 3,070 votes, he claimed people were 'fed up' of being 'let down' by the Labour council.

In 2009 Mr Ali founded My Family Garden, which is a plot of land growing a variety of organic produce from the UK and Bangladesh.

He said his mission was to keep alive traditional growing techniques that have been passed down to him. His YouTube channel has 53,000 subscribers.

Mr Ali is also a qualified mufti, which is a Muslim legal expert who is empowered to give rulings on religious matters.

## The Palestine sympathisers riding wave of support for wartorn Gaza

**CANDIDATES** across northern Britain were elected to councils after expressing support for the Palestinian cause.

KALEEL KHAN, who campaigned as a pro-Palestinian independent candidate in the **Thameside Council elections** in Greater Manchester defeated long-serving Labour incumbent Dave McNally.

His campaign website reads: 'The Labour Party's failure to declare the Israeli actions in Gaza a potential genocide is a disgrace.' It was one of two seats Labour lost to an independent. Law graduate AISHA KOUSER was one of eight independent candidates to win a seat on Oldham Council also in Greater Manchester.

Ms Kouser was among several candidates to express her support for Palestine while running for election and she included the red, white, green and black flag on her campaign material.

She won more than double the votes of her nearest rival - the Labour candidate - after describing herself as a 'voice for Palestine' in the run-up to the election. Meanwhile, the Palestinian flag was also used

by a group of prospective councillors standing as BLACK-**BURN INDEPENDENTS.** Seven of the nine were elected to Blackburn with Darwen Council. On their website, the group said they were motivated by the 'perceived lack of adequate attention and support from both the Labour and Conservative parties'.

They added: '[We] aspire to bring a fresh perspective to the political arena, advocating for justice, and addressing the gaps left by mainstream politics regarding the Palestinian cause.'

Lancashire, pro-Palestinian independents won five of the 12 seats up for grabs. There was a similar surge in Bradford, where nine of the 30 seats went to independents. Seven of the candidates either criticised Labour directly for its Gaza stance, or made pro-Palestinian statements.

Mothin Ali, a Green Party candidate in Leeds, said he would 'raise

the voice of Palestine - Allahu Akbar!' during his victory speech, although Palestine did not feature on his party profile page.

Tory peer Lord Jackson of Peterborough said the Greens 'will rue the day it admitted these deranged zealots into their party for cheap opportunistic short-term reasons'.

In the West Midlands mayoral election, pro-Palestine independent Akhmed Yakoob came third with 69,621 votes.

Before the count there had been an anonymous briefing to the BBC condemned by Labour HQ – that the party would lose the contest as a result of the 'Middle East not West Midlands', and that Hamas were 'real villains'.

Sir Keir told Sky News: 'I say directly to those who may have

voted Labour in the past, but felt on this occasion they couldn't, that across the West Midlands we are a proud and diverse community. I have heard you. I have listened.

'And I am determined to meet your concerns and to gain your respect and trust again in the future.'

## 'T WAS the moment that defined the local elections, though you won't have seen it on the BBC. Mothin Ali, newly elected to Leeds City Council, punched his fist in the air and, to the delight of his supporters, yelled: 'We will raise the voice of Gaza, we will raise the voice of Palestine. ## 'Identity politics does not work in an open society'

Starmer falling short of an overall majority — a very different picture from recent opinion polls and constituency surveys, which predict Labour winning by more than 100 seats.

But what is happening goes way beyond party politics. We are seeing something that has for a long time been almost unknown in mainland Britain, namely sectarian voting.

Until now, we have been good at assimilating settlers. Greek and Turkish Cypriots have lived alongside one another in the same North London streets, leaving their quarrels at the door. Likewise Turks and Kurds, Serbs and Croats.

This unremarked and rather beautiful fact is most striking when we consider the story of most Britons of South Asian heritage.

The partition of India in 1947 was accompanied by indescribable violence. People were tortured, mutilated, raped, burned

alive, blinded with chilli powder, boiled in cauldrons, hacked

to pieces. Bands of 'goondas' (ruffians) slaughtered patients in their hospital beds, children in their classrooms, worshippers in their mosques, temples and gurdwaras. Trains would arrive from across the new border with blood seep-

ing from every aperture. I read several eye-witness accounts of the atrocities some years ago, and can barely bring myself to think about, let alone write about, what happened.

But here is the extraordinary thing. Migrants to the UK came disproportionately from the provinces most affected by

the violence — above all Punjab. The children of victims and perpetrators made a decision to live alongside one another as good neighbours. Muslim, Sikh or Hindu: no one wanted to dredge up the bad times.

What has changed? How is it that communities that were willing to put aside enmities that affected their own families are now agitated about fighting in a place thousands of miles from either their ancestral or their current homes?

There have been two malign developments. First, there has been what I can only call an Arabisation of Islam. Most firstgeneration Muslims in Britain were from the Sufi tradition that emphasises personal piety.

But from the late 1970s, a different and increasingly fundamental form of Islam gained ground. And today this is more popular among younger Muslims than their elders.

The bigger change is in how we think of ourselves as a nation. When the first settlers came from Punjab, Gujarat, Kashmir and Bengal, Britain's prevailing ethic was individualism. All citizens were responsible for their own actions. People were not answerable for what their ancestors had done.

That ethic is much more unusual than is sometimes realised.

India and Pakistan never properly got over the trauma of partition. They went on to fight repeated wars, and their border is the most militarised on Earth. In a way, that is more understandable.

But in Britain, our moral code, like our legal system, emphasised personal autonomy. Vendetta, carrying your quarrel against your enemy's family, is the default setting of a tribal species like ours. Britain was unusual in making it unthinkable.

Until now. The claim of identity politics is that we are all defined by our group, whether on grounds of race, gender or sexual identity. Starting around 2015, a phenomenon that sociologists call the 'Great Awokening' gathered pace. Instead of being taught that they were equal citizens, students were told that they needed to be aware of where their group slotted into an imagined pyramid of oppression.

The danger of woke is not that it is nonsense, but that it is perilously seductive. We evolved in kin-groups, and are easily stirred

up against supposed outsiders. It is Britain's historic value of common citizenship that requires patient education, both of new arrivals and the young.

In a society where people are now categorised, not on the basis of their behaviour, but by whether an ancestor owned or worked on a Caribbean plantation, is it any wonder that tribalism is making a comeback?

The war in Gaza is the immediate focus point, but this could be

just the beginning.

Notice, for example, the only parts of London where Sadiq Khan lost votes compared to last time in 2021: Brent and Harrow (where many British Hindus live) and Ealing and Hillingdon (many Sikhs). Grateful as I am for Conservative votes, I'd much rather not have sectarianism of any kind.

For one thing, it does no favours to the communities concerned. If the main parties stop competing for your vote, you lose influence. For another, it encourages

complacency. In my 21 years in the European Parliament, the worst examples of corruption I saw were in parties representing a national minority, where voters felt they had to vote for 'their' team on religious or linguistic grounds. We see something similar in Northern Ireland.

But the biggest problem is that identity politics is not compatible with an open society. We can't live together in a free democracy if two babies born on the same day come into the world with a set of pre-existing grievances.

What can be done? For one thing, the mainstream parties must work harder to engage with voters as individuals rather than pitching for bloc votes via community leaders.

There ought to be a long-term opportunity here for the Tories. British Muslims are more likely than the general population to be self-employed, to be owneroccupiers and to identify with the UK as a whole rather than with any of the constituent nations. Theirs is the only great religion founded by a businessman, and its precepts emphasise the sanctity of property.

In Muslim-majority countries, the more religious parties tend, accordingly, to be more market-oriented. But here, because of the 'Great Awokening', everything is seen through the prism of race and oppression.

Changing that perception is ultimately a job for teachers. British children should leave school identifying primarily as citizens of this country, and with a measure of pride in our achievements, from stamping out the slave trade to defeating Nazism.

Simply to state the problem is to realise how deep-rooted it is. But if we don't tackle it, our democracy will break apart.

## Rishi warns of a disaster for Britain if SNP prop up Keir

KEIR Starmer has not yet 'sealed the deal' to win the general election, Rishi Sunak believes, after experts said Britain was on course for a hung Parliament.

A Cabinet ally of the Prime Minister yesterday insisted it was still 'all to play for', despite the Conservatives losing almost 500 councillors, a Red Wall by-election and all but one mayoral race last week.

Senior Tories have seized on a projection of the local election results by respected pollsters, which found that Labour is falling short of the lead it needs to secure a majority, and believe the gap will narrow as Opposition leader Sir Keir comes under further scrutiny.

Downing Street also hopes that by the time of the general election voters will feel better off thanks to tax cuts and an improving economy, while deportation flights to Rwanda will help deliver the crucial pledge to stop the boats.

Last night Mr Sunak told The Times: 'These results suggest we are heading for a

hung Parliament with Labour as the largest party. Keir Starmer propped up in Downing Street by the SNP, Liberal Democrats and the Greens would be a disaster for Britain. The country doesn't need more political horse trading, but action.'

But the PM faces buffeting from both sides of the party over how to respond to the dire local elections, despite rebels abandoning a plot to replace him as leader.

Defeated West Midlands mayor Andy Street warned against a drift to the Right that would alienate mainstream voters while former home secretary Suella Braverman urged the PM to be more radical on tax cuts and legal migration to win back Tory sup-

porters who are 'on strike'. ## Reform 'handed the West Mids mayoralty to Labour'

**WAVERING Conservative voters** who opted for Reform in the West Midlands mayoral election handed the seat to Labour, Tories said yesterday.

Reform candidate Elaine Williams picked up 34,471 votes in a contest which saw Andy Street ousted by Labour's Richard Parker by just 1,508 ballots.

Ministers and backbenchers lamented the insurgent Reform party for splitting the vote.

Transport Secretary Mark Harper told Sky News: 'Any Conservative who chooses to vote Reform just gets more Labour people elected... the opposite of what those people want to see.'

There's certainly evidence to support this view. In Blackpool South, where there was a lone by-election, Labour enjoyed a massive 26-point swing from the Tories, who were nearly pushed into third place by Reform UK.

And although Ben Houchen was re-elected as Tees Valley mayor, the Conservatives were vanquished by Labour in every other mayoral contest, even if the margin of victory was wafer-thin in the West Midlands.

Overall, the Tories lost 473 councillors, and ended up with a slightly lower tally than the Liberal Democrats. Remember, though, that these local elections covered only parts of England.

So, yes, it was a dreadful performance, and almost as bad as the most pessimistic predictions.

But if one digs down into the numbers, the picture is somewhat less gloomy for the Tories, and distinctly less bracing for Sir Keir Starmer.

Labour's share of the vote was 34 per cent, while the Conservatives' was 27 per cent. Extrapolating Thursday's results is dangerous because turnout was much lower than at a general election, while local issues played a bigger role. Not only much of England but all of Wales and Scotland were excluded.

Labour's showing implies a small majority or hung parliament in the forthcoming nationwide election, rather than the kind of landslide achieved by Tony Blair in 1997. New Labour then won just over 43 per cent of the vote - almost 10 percentage points more than in Thursday's elections.

Labour's performance put them only 7 percentage points ahead of the Tories, whereas recent polls have been showing leads of 20 percentage points or more.

The fact is that Sir Keir Starmer hasn't sealed the deal with voters. Labour is being damaged by the defection of some Muslims because of its principled stand on Gaza. More than that, some people evidently remain uncertain about what Sir Keir, the master of U-turns, actually stands for.

Am I clutching at straws? I don't think so. My suggestion is not that the Tories merely have to apply a touch on the tiller to pull off a stunning victory in an election very likely to take place in October or November. I certainly don't think that.

But I do think the result could be much closer than many observers are predicting, if only the Tories get their act together, start showing some discipline, and go on producing popular policies.

The prerequisite of a Conservative recovery, without which everything else will be a waste of time, is to rally around Rishi Sunak. He's obviously not a perfect Prime Minister but he's the only one the

Tories have got, and they had better get used to that.

If reports of Conservative rebels sheathing their daggers are true, there's a chance that the party will present a united front to voters. This means that the Suella Bravermans and Robert Jenricks of this world must stop writing critical articles or making provocative statements telling Mr Sunak what he must do.

Voters aren't stupid. They know that when leading Tories say that they support Rishi, but he really must get on and do A, B, and C, they are speaking with forked tongues.

Whether the Tories can reestablish order, given their propensity for fratricide, may be reasonably doubted. I believe there's a possibility that they will do so, because the alternative is political oblivion. They must realise that the smallest grumble about Rishi will be taken up and amplified by the anti-Tory media.

S FAR as policies are concerned, Mr Sunak has admittedly often been slow to act, but he does tend to get there in the end. Another tax cut a couple of months before the election might persuade voters that the Conservatives, unlike Labour, really do believe in lower taxes.

Someone – and the Chancellor, Jeremy Hunt, may be too lightweight for this task – must sit on the large, self-satisfied specimen of humanity that is the Governor of the Bank of England, and tell him that now is the time to start cutting interest rates.

Some illegal migrants may be put on aeroplanes to Rwanda in July, which would mark a kind of resolution to a painful saga. Just as important are the next batch of immigration figures. A sharp decline in the number of visas

being handed out suggests that the Government is finally gripping this issue.

Uncontrolled immigration will be of the greatest concern to voters over the next few years. Labour has produced no convincing policies to restrict either legal or illegal arrivals. Here is a clear opportunity for the Tories.

Slow though he has sometimes been in getting to the starting line, Rishi can persuade voters that he's more to be trusted on defence (where Labour has refused to match the Government's pledge to increase spending to 2.5 per cent of GDP) and welfare reform.

Having lost the West Midlands mayoral contest by a whisker, Andy Street warned the Tories not to 'drift' to the Right. If he means that they should shun popular and necessary policies on tax, immigration, defence and welfare, he's absolutely wrong.

In a way, the greatest danger to the Conservatives is not Labour but Reform UK, which won 17 per cent of the vote in Blackpool South. As it fielded candidates only in a sixth of wards in the local elections, it caused limited damage to the Tories.

Most of Reform UK's prospective voters are probably disgruntled Conservatives. If they can be persuaded that Rishi & Co have finally got the message, many of them could be won back at the general election.

The past can't be undone. The parties at No10 during the pandemic, the messy defenestration of Boris Johnson, the lunacies of Liz Truss - all these have left a stain on the Tories, and made many people question their probity and competence.

But the die isn't cast. Look at the share of the vote on Thursday. The Conservative Party can avoid a wipeout - so long as it doesn't try to wipe out Rishi.

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## Tears at vigil for sword victim Daniel

**HUNDREDS** of mourners yesterday gathered at an emotional vigil for Daniel Anjorin who was killed in last week's sword attack.

More than 300 people gathered by Hainault Underground Station, north-east London, in memory of the 14-year-old who was stabbed to death nearby.

Marcus Arduini Monzo, 36, appeared in court last week accused of being behind the 22-minute rampage that left Daniel dead and four others injured. He will appear at the Old Bailey tomorrow.

Mourners were in tears yesterday during a moment of silence for the schoolboy. Although his family were not at the vigil, heartbroken loved ones joined in with a rendition of Bill Withers' 1972 song Lean On Me.

Harris, a 17-year-old boy who asked for his surname to remain anonymous, told the crowd: 'He was a kid that was not in any type

of trouble. I'm not just saying that. He never did anything wrong. He focused on school, he got good grades, he [went] to church.

'His family are appreciating all your support. They've noticed everything you guys are doing... On their behalf, thanks to all of you.'

On Saturday Arsenal paid tribute to Daniel, who supported the team, with a round of applause during their game against Bournemouth.

His family later released a statement in memory of their 'most

loved and amazing son'. The statement, released through the Metropolitan Police, said: 'It is difficult for us at this time to process what has happened to him and that he will never come home.

'Daniel had left the house for school and then he was gone. Our children have lost their loving and precious brother and we have lost the most loved and amazing son.'

The family sent their 'best wishes' to the other victims and thanked the community for their support.

## Spacey show WILL air despite fightback

A DOCUMENTARY featuring fresh allegations against Kevin Spacey will air tonight - despite an astonishing backlash from the embattled actor.

Channel 4's Spacey Unmasked includes the testimonies of ten men who accuse the fallen Hollywood star of unwanted sexual behaviours spanning almost 40 years.

The actor, 64, was acquitted of nine sexual offences in a case involving four men at Southwark Crown Court last year. He also won a US civil lawsuit in 2022 after being accused of an unwanted sexual advance.

The two-part documentary, which concludes tomorrow, is understood to feature claims from new complainants, including three British men, who were not involved in previous legal proceedings. But Spacey has said he will 'no longer be speechless' in a slew of vehement denials.

In an interview with former GB News presenter Dan Wootton, which was posted on X, he said: 'I take full responsibility for my past behaviour and my actions. But I cannot and will not take responsibility or apologise to anyone who's made up stuff about me or exaggerated stories.'

## 'Macron had to beg Britain'

France has had to bolster its much-vaunted 'Parade' kit with systems said to include RAF tech and manpower.

While the French armed forces insisted to the Mail there was 'not any support requested' from the UK, the Ministry of Defence has confirmed it has offered 'equipment and personnel'.

And France's satirical newspaper Le Canard Enchaine has said President Emmanuel Macron had to 'beg' Britain, and

mocked his government for the 'humiliation supreme'.

The Parade system won the French defence procurement agency's tender to develop an anti-drone system in 2022 at a cost of €350 million.

It can detect threats, and jam and immobilise them. It can also allow police drones to capture devices with nets and shoot down drones directly - though this is a last resort, as debris can kill or injure those on the ground.

'It's annoying that this is coming out publicly but, unfortunately, contrary to the official

line, things aren't really working as we'd like,' a senior security source told the AFP news agency last month. Le Canard reports that the French Air Force is 'threatening to send back the six Parade systems it received without paying for them'.

The opening ceremony will be along the Seine, rather than at the Stade de France, but the river is vulnerable to drone attacks and snipers, officials fear.

An MoD spokesman said: 'We are working across Whitehall departments on providing UK support to the security operation

planned in other French cities, including Bordeaux and Lyon.

# One year on, a low-key Coronation anniversary for the King

But will he meet Harry this week?

POMP and pageantry reigned at his Coronation one year ago. But, after a whirlwind 12 months, it's understandable King Charles would prefer much less fanfare this time around.

The King will celebrate the first anniversary of his Coronation today in low-key style with close friends at Windsor.

Even his wife, Queen Camilla, is unlikely to be present as she is with her own family at her private Wiltshire home, Ray Mill House.

It is understood that His Majesty wishes to mark the day 'in his mother's mould' with very little fuss, as his accession is so intrinsically bound with the sad loss of Queen Elizabeth.

But it is still unknown whether he will meet with his youngest son, Prince Harry, when he flies into London this week.

Buckingham Palace will acknowledge the anniversary on social media, while there will be military salutes in London.

The King's Troop Royal Horse Artillery will fire a 41-gun royal salute with 71 horses, pulling six First World War-era 13-pounder field guns.

Over at the Tower of London, the Honourable Artillery Company regiment will fire a 62-gun royal salute. There will be further tributes in Edinburgh, Cardiff, York and Hillsborough in Northern Ireland.

But there will be little in the way of family 'celebrations', particularly from the King himself, who will more than likely

simply enjoy a private dinner.

Charles will return to London tomorrow, having been given doctors' permission to undertake more public engagements again while he continues cancer treatment. It was claimed at the week-

end that Prince William is concerned that his father is taking on too much.

Prince Harry is likely to fly into the capital tomorrow ahead of a service at St Paul's Cathedral to mark the tenth anniversary of his Invictus Games on Wednesday afternoon. However, the Mail

understands that reports he plans to use the trip to meet with his father again are a little premature, with nothing in the diary yet.

Buckingham Palace has repeatedly declined to comment, determined not to inflame public discourse around the issue. But it is known that the King has a hugely busy week ahead of him.

Yesterday he was out and about in Gloucestershire where he attended church.

He has official meetings on Wednesday morning followed by his expected appearance at the first Buckingham Palace garden party of the season.

Straight afterwards he will meet with the Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, and hold his weekly Privy Council meeting.

The Mail also understands that the King has a yet-to-be announced public engagement on Thursday after which he will retire, most likely to Windsor, to continue his recovery.

It is possible that a meeting could still be scheduled, particularly if Harry personally asks to meet his father. But, as it stands, it is difficult to see the pair meeting at all – and, if they are able, any meeting will be brief.

The pair last met in February when Harry flew to London after the King announced he had been diagnosed with an undisclosed form of cancer.

Charles, who was about to leave London for Sandringham, kept his helicopter waiting but their meeting at Clarence House lasted barely half an hour.

Harry later told Good Morning America that he hoped his father's illness could 'reunify' the family.

However Prince William has no plans to meet with his estranged brother and will be at Windsor undertaking an investiture before heading off to the West Country for more official duties. He has been particularly upset by Harry's behaviour after facing criticism in his memoir, Spare.

Queen Camilla was not present when he met the King last time and it is unlikely she will be around this week either.

It comes as a Mail on Sunday poll showed King Charles receiving a major vote of confidence with the majority of Britons believing he is doing a good job.

A landmark poll to mark the first anniversary of his Coronation shows a strong increase in support for the monarch in the last 12 months.

Some 60 per cent of those polled believe the UK should keep the monarchy, with just 28 per cent preferring a republic.

## Duke's crumbling mansion risks royal row

WITH its peeling paint and cracked brickwork, it seems a far cry from a royal residence.

But this is Prince Andrew's home in Windsor, in an image that risks reigniting his row with King Charles over the repair bill.

The Mail revealed last year that the King wants to evict Andrew from Royal Lodge and move him to a more modest property.

Sources said His Majesty has made clear he is unwilling to pay indefinitely for his brother to be guarded around the clock at the 19th-century, Grade II-listed

property, which has a pool and 90 acres of land. The security bill alone is estimated to be costing Charles more than £3million a year.

The disgraced duke, who has no apparent income, is said to be unable to meet the £400,000-a-year upkeep of the property.

But he has refused to leave the Queen Mother's 30-room former home.

It was reported in October that he did a deal to stay at the lodge, where he lives

with his ex-wife Sarah Ferguson, if he kept up repairs. A source told the Sunday Mirror: 'The Duke of York has a clear responsibility for the upkeep of the Royal Lodge estate, which is certainly not happening.

'The state of the residence will be of great concern to the King after everything that has gone on and been discussed in regards to the house. Prince Andrew was told he must take charge of the necessary renovations or he will have no cause to stay.'

Buckingham Palace and the Crown Estate declined to comment.

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## Surge of anti-Semitism in UK is among the highest in Europe

BRITAIN has seen the fourth-highest rise in anti-Semitic incidents in Europe since the October 7 Hamas attacks, 'staggering' figures have revealed.

Amid rising concern about US-style pro-Palestine protests at UK universities, a disBy James Tozer

turbing international league table yesterday showed hate crimes aimed at Jewish people leapt from 1,662 to 4,103 last year – up 146 per cent.

In Europe, only France, Switzerland and Bulgaria recorded a higher rate of increase  prompting campaigners to warn that Britain was 'succumbing to a racist mob'.

Disturbingly, the UK also witnessed 58 per cent more assaults on Jewish people between October 7 and the end of 2023 than the US, despite having just one twentieth as many Jews.

The alarming figures come as

universities were accused of deserting Jewish students over pro-Palestinian protests sweeping the country.

On Saturday, Edward Isaacs, president of the Union of Jewish Students, said that campus bosses had not been 'allies' to his members and were not making them feel 'included'.

Figures compiled in an annual report on anti-Semitism by Tel Aviv University and the respected Anti-Defamation League found a sharp increase in incidents since October 7 last year in a string of countries.

Subsequent analysis by the Daily Mail found that the percentage rise in the UK was only topped by France – home to Europe's biggest Jewish population and where there was a 284 per cent increase in anti-Semitic incidents – Switzerland and Bulgaria.

Outside Europe, recorded incidents in Australia – home to 118,200 Jews – rocketed by 737 per cent, from 79 in October and November 2022 to 662 in the same

period 12 months later. A spokesman for the Campaign Against Antisemitism said yesterday: 'These staggering figures are the latest confirmation of the surging anti-Semitism that we are seeing across all areas of British life since the October 7 Hamas attack.

'As this report shows, this is not a problem unique to Britain, but Britain is not faring well, and every country must act to protect its Jewish community.

'This is not the tolerant Britain that we cherish: it is a Britain succumbing to a racist mob.'

Highlighting how incidents were on the rise globally even before October 7, the report's authors warned the Hamas terror outrage had 'helped spread a fire that was already out of control'.

Professor Uriya Shavit, head of the Centre for the Study of Contemporary European Jewry, cautioned that 'if current trends

## Tell police of hate speech on campus, says minister

UNIVERSITY bosses must alert the police if there is 'illegal hate speech' or extremism during campus protests, the Education Secretary has said.

Gillian Keegan warned vicechancellors of 'alarming levels of division and violence' at universities in the US where pro-Palestine activists have clashed with counter-protesters.

Protests have spread to British universities, with students setting up tents.

University officials have been summoned to Downing Street this week to discuss the issue.

In a letter, Mrs Keegan tells them: 'I know a great deal of work is already under way to plan emergency responses to any escalation of protests... enabling students of all faiths to complete their studies without fear of intimidation or discrimination... Where there is evidence of possible criminality, including illegal hate speech or supporting a proscribed terrorist organisation such as Hamas, it is crucial that you contact the police.'

## Gloomy farmers say wet weather is the last straw

FARMERS' confidence in their outlook has collapsed to an all-time low with more than four-fifths in England and Wales saying they have been negatively affected by months of wet weather.

All areas of farming expect to see decreased production in the next year, a poll by the National Farmers' Union (NFU) found.

The survey revealed 65 per cent of farmers said their profits are declining or their business may not survive. Tom Bradshaw, NFU president, said extreme weather was part of 'the perfect storm' along with other problems such as increased costs and inflation.

Experts have warned that lower yields from key crops could lead to higher food prices.

Mrs Griffiths, 81, was walking her patterdale terrier Oscar in Regent's Park when she was struck by the cyclist, suffering head injuries. Only days before, she had told her son: 'Those bloody cyclists are getting worse, you know.'

Mr Griffiths, 52, told the Mail: 'The law has to change to make everyone

equal', adding that it was 'fundamentally wrong' that to have died within 30 days wrong because it has been as a nursery teacher and cyclists do not have to of the crash. adhere to speed limits.

Police and prosecutors felt there was no charge which applied to Mrs Griffiths' case and were unable proceed against Mr Fitzgerald a director at finance firm Credit Suisse. Speed limits do not apply to cyclists. The limit in Regent's Park is 20mph and Mr Fitzgerald was cycling at 29mph on the day of the crash.

have got a two-tier system on the roads. Anyone driving a motor vehicle has to adhere to the speed limits and cyclists are exempt.

'That is fundamentally

## Perils of pandering to sectarian politics

FROM his profile on the Green Party website, Mothin Ali comes across as a most agreeable soul. An accountant by profession, he volunteers for charity, loves horticulture, and is passionate about 'community wellbeing'.

On being elected to Leeds City Council, however, he presented an angrier and far more sinister face. As supporters unfurled a Palestinian flag behind him, he launched into a rant about Labour's failure to back a Gaza ceasefire.

'We will not be silenced,' he said. 'We will raise the voice of Gaza. We will raise the voice of Palestine. Allahu Akbar (God is great).'

Quite what Leeds city council is supposed to do about the war in Gaza, or why it should have any part in the role of a local councillor, was unclear, but Mr Ali's election was not some eccentric one-off.

In a raft of northern wards with large Muslim communities, Labour was forced out by a loose affiliation of independent and Green candidates united more by a loathing of Israel than any concerns about local transport or bin collection.

In some areas Labour's vote fell by up to 40 per cent, giving Sir Keir Starmer a serious electoral headache. He says he wants to 'win back the trust' of pro-Palestinians, but how far will he go to do it?

As we have seen from the swastikas brandished at marches across the country, anti-Zionism and anti-Semitism often go hand in hand. So, would the Labour leader be prepared to turn a blind eye to bigotry for short-term political gain?

And if he did support a permanent Israeli ceasefire, what would the zealots demand next? Recognition of Hamas? An embargo

on trade with Israel?

The Labour leader has a sorry record of flip-flopping on major issues. If he is to retain any moral credibility, he must stand firm on this one.

Pandering to sectarianism would be an affront to democracy and a betrayal of British Jews. It would also torpedo his claim to have purged Labour of anti-Semitism.

## Time for Tory unity

DESPITE their drubbing in the local polls, there may yet be a narrow path to Tory recovery before the general election.

Labour's vote was down on last year and psephologists believe they are not yet certain of a Westminster majority. Also the turnout was pitifully low, as disenchanted Conservatives stayed at home.

Rishi Sunak's overriding mission is to coax them back into the fold. He's already taking the fight to Sir Keir on tax, immigration and identity politics. He must double down on those and the many other issues where Labour is weak.

Above all, Tory MPs must show unity and self-belief. There isn't much time to turn things around. But with hard work and a sense of common purpose, it can be done.

## King's testing year

IN the year since his coronation, King Charles has had much to deal with. The illness of the Princess of Wales, the continuing Harry and Meghan saga and, of course, his own cancer treatment.

Thankfully he's now well enough to come back to work. Charles has been a steady hand on the royal tiller since the death of his beloved mother, as demonstrated by a Mail on Sunday poll at the weekend showing strong support for both him and the institution he heads.

To the chagrin of republicans everywhere, the monarchy appears to be safe in his hands for the foreseeable future.

# If Labour fight this dirty when they are miles in front, imagine how low they'll sink if the polls narrow

O prizes for guessing the most compelling political message delivered in last week's council elections.

Unfortunately, it was also a lie.

This was an image of the Prime Minister, next to his signature, accompanied by the words: 'Do you think working people deserve a retirement? Rishi Sunak doesn't. Want to keep your pension? Don't risk it with Rishi Sunak. Vote Labour.'

And many millions did (though for plenty of other reasons, besides).

This cruel fiction was justified by Labour on the grounds that the Chancellor, Jeremy Hunt, said the Conservatives have a long-term plan to remove the tax known as National Insurance. And many people imagine that the money raised by this goes directly and solely to provide the state pension.

In fact, as Alex Brummer pointed out in the Mail: 'The cash raised on payroll from employers and employees goes straight into the Exchequer; it is just another form of income tax, imposed exclusively on workers. In the UK there is no tradition of ring-fenced taxes.'

Moreover, according to the Office for Budget Responsibility, £138 billion will be spent on the state pension this year, over three times more than the total raised by National Insurance contributions.

## Revulsion

Keir Starmer and his team understand all this, which is why I described their claim as a lie — defined as a false statement known to be untrue by the person saying it.

The best that can be said is that this deliberately dishonest social media campaign was less lurid than the 'attack ad' Labour put out during the local election campaign last year. That used exactly the same image of Rishi Sunak, with his signature, next to the words: 'Do you think adults convicted of sexually assaulting children should go to prison? Rishi Sunak doesn't.'

This attempt to portray Sunak as the paedophiles' pal was based on the numbers of such offenders who did not serve jail-time since 2010 (when the Conservatives have been in office).

In fact, Sunak was not even an MP for part of that period and, as it happens, Sir Keir Starmer, as the former Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP), was on the sentencing council for a number of those years.

The former Labour Home Secretary Lord (David) Blunkett was one of a number of the party's most experienced figures to express their revulsion. Blunkett said he had been left 'close to despair' by what he termed the 'deeply offensive' advertisements. But as the Sunday Times noted at the time: 'Labour strategists are cock-a-hoop with how the adverts have landed. The first [of these ads put out on Twitter]



has received 20.8 million views, making it arguably the most successful Labour attack in recent memory.'

Starmer is a man who, by all accounts, behaves with decency and kindness in his personal life. But he is also a football fanatic, and applies to politics the ethics of professional football — which is that the dirtiest of tricks can be excused if it brings victory to your side. But if the other side does the same, that is outrageous and unacceptable.

And it seems the Labour leader is still furious at the way, during a Commons debate in February 2022, the then Prime Minister Boris Johnson said that, as DPP, Starmer had spent the majority of his time 'prosecuting journalists and not prosecuting Jimmy Savile, as far as I can make out'. In fact, Starmer, while head of the DPP, was not involved in the (non) charging decisions in 2009 over Savile, though later he apologised for the organisation's 'shortcomings'.

One result of Johnson's jibe across the despatch box was that Starmer, by his own account, encountered 'people calling me a paedophile protector in the street'. But the then Chancellor, Rishi Sunak, explicitly distanced himself from Johnson's remark, telling a press conference the same day: 'I wouldn't have said it.'

## Calculated

Johnson himself later told broadcasters: 'Let's be absolutely clear, I'm not talking about the Leader of the Opposition's personal record when he was DPP. I totally understand that he had nothing to do personally with those decisions.'

By contrast, Labour's claims that Sunak 'doesn't think adults convicted of sexually assaulting children should go to prison' were part of a coldly calculated strategy, not blurted out once in the heat of a parliamentary debate: and Starmer's team, unlike Johnson, have never suggested the slightest contrition.

Sunak himself is not completely averse to dishing it out. For example, when raising the fact that, in his career as 'a lefty lawyer' (to quote the PM), Starmer had represented the Islamic group Hizb ut-Tahrir, which the Government has since proscribed as a terrorist organisation. And when in an interview with Piers Morgan, he was asked if he was saying that Starmer is a 'terrorist sympathiser', the PM refused to deny it: 'The facts speak for themselves. These things speak to people's values.'

But what are Starmer's values, politically? Since being elected Labour leader on a platform which might be described as 'Corbynism without Corbyn', he has consistently discarded all the policies he had promised he would pursue if in government.

Nationalising the big six energy companies, dropped. Abandoning private sector 'outsourcing' by the NHS, dropped. Abolishing university tuition fees, dropped. Increasing income tax for the highest earners, dropped. Scrapping the Conservatives 'heinous' two-child benefit cap, dropped. The taxpayer-funded £28 billion 'Green growth' plan, dropped.

Next? Well, as the Rwanda scheme for deporting illegally trafficked migrants, which Starmer said he would scrap, seems actually to have some deterrent value, the Labour-supporting New Statesman reports that the party might now retain it.

## **Schism**

The point is this: the more Starmer scraps all the Left-wing pledges which radically differed from the programme of the Conservative government, the more Labour relies on making things up to suggest a gulf in values which no longer exists at the level of real policies.

And by claiming that the evil Tories are about to cancel the state pension, Labour can create an imaginary schism in which they are still on the side of the working man (or woman) in a way the Conservatives aren't.

It is not coincidental that the last time Labour tried this tactic was during the 1997 general election, under Tony Blair, who, as the then Conservative PM John Major wistfully put it, had left him feeling as though he had gone swimming in the River Thames, left his clothes on the bank, and found that Blair was wearing them.

In the final weeks of that campaign, too, Labour claimed the Conservatives would 'abolish the state pension'. An outraged Major declared: 'I'd leave politics rather than abolish the

state pension'.

Then, as now, Labour perpetuated this lie when miles ahead in the opinion polls. And then, as now, you'd think that it was only necessary to keep reminding the public about the division and decay within a Conservative Party that had turned to devouring itself, for Labour to achieve victory. It raises the question: if Labour fights this dirty when more than 20 points ahead in the opinion polls, how will it behave if things get squeaky?

IN NEW YORK

T WAS probably just as well that lorry driver Larry Walters didn't tell the authorities about his travel plans. After all, aviation officials tend to take a dim view of unlicensed pilots soaring thousands of feet upwards into the path of passenger jets while sit-ting in a garden chair suspended from 42 helium balloons.

And so, having taken off from his fiancee's tiny back garden in the Los Angeles suburb of San Pedro one morning in July 1982, he rapidly

disappeared from sight.

Lawnchair Larry, as he became known, was next spotted by airline pilots at 16,500ft (more than three miles up) preparing to shoot his weather balloons with an air pistol so he could descend gradually to the ground. Or at least that was the plan.

The 33-year-old Vietnam War veteran had longed to become an air force pilot but could not because of his poor eyesight. However, after seeing a weather balloon hanging from a military surplus store when he was 13, he got an idea of how he could find another way to fly.

The enterprising or — depending on your point of view — utterly insane Walters had hoped to reach the Mojave Desert 250 miles to the north-east of LA but 'only' travelled 20 miles before landing in Long Beach, hitting power lines and causing a blackout.

Now, the magnificent pilot and his terrifying flying machine are being celebrated in a new musical, 42 Balloons, that has opened at The Lowry theatre in Salford, Greater Manchester. Producer Andy Barnes calls the musical 'a

His mother, he admitted, was less charitable and 'thought maybe I was possessed by the devil, or perhaps post-Vietnam stress syndrome. She wanted me to see a psychiatrist.'

IS unorthodox vessel consisted of an aluminium outdoor chair purchased from a department store for \$109, 13 plastic gallon jugs of water for ballast, a parachute, a lifejacket, an altimeter, a Timex watch, a two-way radio, two litres of Coke, two torches as headlights, an air pistol, sandwiches, a road map of California, a compass and the 42 weather balloons, each 7ft in diameter and with a volume of 33 cubic feet.

He didn't bother with a safety belt as the chair was tilted back 10 degrees so he didn't think he'd

be tipped out of it.

His fiancee, Carol Van Deusen, financed most of the operation and suggested he launch from her back garden, as there was a hospital just down the road.

The pair, helped by a few friends — the other members of what Walters grandly called his 'ground crew' — inflated the balloons overnight and told suspicious police officers who inquired about

> miles,' he told air traffic control. Numb with cold and struggling to breathe, Walters realised it was time to come down. He had calculated he would need to shoot seven balloons to ensure a controlled descent to the ground, and — having popped them — put the gun in his lap while he read the altimeter.

> The chair lurched forward in a gust of wind and the air pistol was knocked into the ether. To his horror, the craft started ascending again. Walters considered using his parachute but he'd only done a single jump and he wasn't remotely confident.

> A subsequent official hearing was told he would have been carried to 50,000ft and turned as he put it — 'into a Popsicle'.

But providence intervened. Walters began to hear the hiss of slowly-escaping gas - the balloons were starting to leak helium and he was descending again. At around 13,000 ft, he turned on his CB radio to speak to an operator at an emergency rescue unit. 'Did

you say you have a cluster of 35 touched down unharmed about balloons?' asked the operator, his voice rising in shock. 'Just tell Carol that I love her and I'm doing fine,' answered Walters.

As the chair descended, its dangling cables became entangled in a power line. Mercifully, the non-conducting plastic tethers spared Walters from being electrocuted, although the Long Beach neighbourhood had a 20-minute power blackout.

By bizarre coincidence, Walters scraped across the roof of an offduty airline pilot, who was stunned into silence as he observed the event lying by his swimming pool. Lawnchair Larry

45 minutes after he had taken off and was arrested by police.

'We know he broke some part of the Federal Aviation Act and, as soon as we decide which part it is, some type of charge will be filed,' said a safety official. He was fined \$4,000 — later reduced to \$1,500 - for offences including operating a 'civil aircraft for which there is no airworthiness certificate' and entering an airport traffic area without communicating with the control tower.

Walters became a national celebrity and was paid to appear

in adverts for Timex watches but fought against the mockery that came his way. 'I call it American ingenuity,' he boasted to sceptical chat show host David Letterman. 'I had confidence in myself and the craft. I really knew what I was doing.'

However, his moment in the spotlight was short-lived. Having left his lorry-driving job, he struggled to make money as a motivational speaker. After breaking up with his girlfriend after 15 years, he never married or had children.

Tragically, in 1993, Walters, who had complained of how his life had felt empty, hiked

to his favourite spot in a forest and shot himself.

For most people, his flight must have served as a night-marish warning to the curious. For a few, however, it has been — just like the name of his craft — inspirational.

Although Walters wasn't the first to try taking to the sky with helium balloons, he was the first to hit anything like the altitude he did. Apart from featuring in the 2009 animated Pixar film Up, cluster ballooning is now an extreme sport.

In 2007, an Oregon petrolstation proprietor 'flew' 240 miles in a lawn chair powered by balloons. In 2010, American Jonathan Trappe

crossed the English Channel suspended by balloons. However, in 1992 a Japanese adventurer headed off over the Pacific and was never seen again. A Brazilian priest who went up in 2008 strapped to 1,000 helium balloons drowned in the Atlantic.

Stunt magician David Blaine reached 24,900ft in 2020 but he had oxygen, satellite positioning, remote control ballast and balloon-popping miniature explosives. So not a patch on the man whose flying chair is preserved in the National Air and Space Museum in Washington DC.

'It was no death wish,' Walters said. 'But you couldn't pay me to do it again.'

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## Farewell Yosser... Trailblazer Bernard Hill dies aged 79

FOR millions of TV viewers, the desperate plea of 'gissa job' instantly brings back memories of the trailblazing Boys from the Blackstuff – and the fearsome character Yosser Hughes.

It was a role that for many defined the industrial decline of the early 1980s - and set Bernard Hill, who has

died aged 79, off on a stellar career.

Hill, who went on to land major roles in Titanic and Lord of the Rings, first played the manic job-seeking Yosser in Alan Bleasdale's TV play The Black Stuff about a gang of Liverpudlians trying to make a living in hard times.

The sequel series won plaudits and brought Hill to the attention of Hollywood, later playing Captain Edward Smith in the 1997 Oscar-winning Titanic and the embattled King Theoden in the Lord of the Rings trilogy.

But it was as Yosser Hughes that Hill, a father of one, captured the imagination and had the phrase 'gissa job' echoing in the nation's playgrounds.

One episode even saw him telling his lookalike, then Liverpool midfielder Graeme Souness (playing himself):

## 'A thoroughly decent guy'

'You look like me. Magnum, as well.' Last night, the Mail Sport columnist called Hill a 'fabulous actor' and a 'thoroughly decent guy', adding: 'He was very generous with his time and offered all the help we needed.'

Hill's death yesterday morning came just hours before he was due to return to TV in Martin Freeman drama The Responder, on BBC One last night.

Lindsay Salt, director of BBC Drama, said: 'Bernard blazed a trail across the screen, and his long-lasting career filled with iconic and remarkable roles is a testament to his incredible talent. From Boys from the Blackstuff, to Wolf Hall, The Responder, and many more, we feel truly honoured to have worked with Bernard at the BBC. Our thoughts are with his loved ones at this sad time.'

Actress and musician Barbara Dickson, who starred with him in a 1974 musical based on the Beatles called John, Paul, George, Ringo... and Bert,

was among those paying tribute, describing him as a 'marvellous actor'. Alongside a snap of them together,

she wrote: 'It was a privilege to have crossed paths with him. RIP Benny x.' Born in Blackley, Manchester, into a family of coal miners, Hill attended

acting school with The History Boys star Richard Griffiths, before moving into television. After bit parts in Hard Labour and I, Claudius, he got his Blackstuff big break in 1982.

The series won a Bafta for best drama in 1983 and was listed as the seventh best TV show ever made on a British Film Institute list in 2000.

James Cameron's 1997 blockbuster Titanic marked the start of a late career renaissance for Hill, who was then picked by Lord of the Rings director Peter Jackson to play King Theoden. Hollywood kept calling, with Hill appearing in Halle Berry horror Gothika and tennis-themed romantic comedy Wimbledon. The actor lived in Suffolk and is survived by his wife Marianna and their son Gabriel.

NEW restaurants, shopping centres and offices must be built with separate toilets for men and women under laws announced today.

Updated regulations mean newly-constructed public buildings across England will have to include single-sex facilities from later this year.

Ministers hope the change will end the spread of 'gender-neutral' bathrooms that women have to share with men using urinals or cubicles.

It is the latest in a series of moves by the Government aimed at protecting the rights of women and girls, including stopping transgender patients being allowed on female wards in NHS hospitals. Schools have also been told they must provide separate loos for boys and girls.

Last night women and equalities minister Kemi Badenoch said: 'These regulations will guide

organisations to design unisex and single-sex toilets, ending the rise of so-called "gender-neutral" mixed sex toilet spaces, which deny privacy and dignity to both men and women.

'Today's announcement will also create better provision for women so that our particular biological, health and sanitary needs are met.

'This is following our work last week limiting the use of mixedsex wards in the NHS and demonstrates how this government is committed to ensuring single-sex spaces are protected for all.'

Housing minister Lee Rowley said: 'We know all members of society value safety, privacy and dignity, and this new legislation will help ensure the right facilities are in place for everyone.

'It is vital that new buildings, particularly in public spaces, are serving the community with right

toilet provision.' The new building regulations will be published in the next few weeks and will come into force later this year.

They will stipulate that 'nondomestic buildings' in England must provide separate single-sex toilets for women and men.

If there is not space for separate facilities then developers will be allowed to build self-contained 'universal' toilets; fully enclosed rooms with washbasins for individual use.

The rules will apply to new

buildings or those that are undergoing a major change of use, with the exception of prison cells, care homes, nurseries and schools.

The changes were first proposed by ministers in July 2022 and then put out to consultation.

The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities said that 81 per cent of those who responded 'agreed with the intention for separate single-sex toilet facilities'.

HEN Britain's biggest private house — a megamansion called Witanhurst, on Highgate Hill in North London — went on the market in 2008, it was close to a ruin.

The roof was riddled with leaks, the floorboards were warped and cornices embellished with gold leaf were blighted by mould.

Given that this 90,000 sqft property had a total of 65 rooms (including 25 bedrooms) and a ballroom 70ft long and 20ft high, with an elaborate ceiling that takes six months to paint, it amounted to the country's ultimate doer-upper.

The enormity of the task ahead put off a string of would-be buyers, until one with the vision to see past the devastation — and pockets deep enough to fund the process — stumped up the £50 million asking price.

His name was Andrey Guriev. Over the next decade or so, the Russian fertiliser billionaire

Russian fertiliser billionaire presided over a massive renovation, which — at its peak — involved an army of decorators, plumbers, carpenters and landscape gardeners burning through £2 million a week.

The old service wing was demolished and replaced with a three-storey villa called the Orangery, and five-and-a-half acres of ornamental gardens were landscaped.

But the most ambitious element of the project was the construction of what is reputed to be the biggest basement ever constructed in London. At more than 40,000 sqft, it houses a swimming pool, a sauna, massage rooms, a gym, a cinema, staff quarters and

parking spaces for 25 cars.

But Guriev, 64, had precious little time to enjoy his British dacha. In 2022, shortly after Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, he was sanctioned by the West and issued with a travel ban thanks to his status as a crony of Vladimir Putin.

And now he faces the possibility of losing Witanhurst altogether.

In April, a case listed as Gorbachev v Guriev got under way at London's Commercial Court. Alexander Gorbachev (no relation to the late Soviet leader), a former director of Guriev's company PhosAgro, is suing him for £2.7 billion: the 25 per cent stake in PhosAgro that he claims

he is entitled to, plus the value of the dividends he has missed out on since the company was floated in 2011.

In the normal course of events, the two men would be exchanging cold stares on a daily basis in Court 19 at the Rolls Building, a modern, purpose-built courthouse in the heart of London.

But thanks to his travel ban, Guriev is unable to appear in London. The presiding judge, His Honour Mark Pelling — accompanied by the warring legal teams — is, therefore, in the United Arab Emirates to take his evidence over four days, from tomorrow, on neutral territory at the Dubai International Financial Centre Courts.

It's a sign of how attached Guriev is to his vast London home that he is cooperating with the process at all. After all, the oligarch — who is worth an estimated £7.5 billion — could quite easily ignore the British courts and refuse to pay any penalty they judged him to be liable for.

In that case, however, his foreign assets could be seized, and they include Witanhurst — acquired via an offshore company called Safran Holdings, registered in the British

Virgin Islands. The property is now valued at more than £300 million.

Not a bad capital appreciation for a property that was built in 1913 by the Liberal MP and soap magnate Sir Arthur Crosfield on an 11-acre plot for £1 million (£96 million in today's money). Witanhurst means 'Parliament on the hill' in Old English.

In addition to a glass rotunda, it has 365 windows — one for each day of the year.

Sadly, Sir Arthur did not have long to enjoy the charms of this great edifice. He lost a fortune in a failed Greek mining venture and died shortly afterwards on a train journey through southern France, after falling out of the window of a sleeping car.

While Witanhurst is the jewel in the crown of Guriev's Western assets, others that may have caught 62-year-old Alexander Gorbachev's eye are a £7 million 'triplex apartment' overlooking the Thames and a 267ft superyacht called Alfa Nero that lies abandoned in Antigua.

If he is to wrest these from his former colleague's grasp, he must first persuade Judge Pelling that he is, indeed, the rightful owner of a quarter share in PhosAgro.

Unfortunately for him, however, his case — in the absence of a formal contract — relies on proving that they had a *verbal* agreement, reached during a series of meetings in 2005 at locations including a London pub and a sauna.


Such an arrangement was not unusual when the two men first went into business together in the mid-1990s.

In those days, when President Boris Yeltsin sold off hundreds of billions of pounds' worth of state assets in a series of sweetheart deals with unscrupulous opportunists, Russia was known as 'the Wild East' and many deals were done on little more than a handshake.

In the course of researching my biography of Chelsea FC's former owner Roman Abramovich 20 years ago, I discovered that, when he and his business partner Boris Berezovsky acquired the oil giant Sibneft, they did so with nothing in writing to say how the shares were to be divided.

It later emerged that while Berezovsky saw himself as a 50-50 partner, Abramovich considered him to be nothing more than a top-level Kremlin fixer, whom he had showered with gifts, such as yachts and real estate, and paid 'more than \$2.5 billion'.

Their dispute spilled over into

the British courts in 2012 when, after the biggest private litigation battle in British history, a judge threw out Berezovsky's claim that the two had an 'oral agreement' that they were equal partners.

Like Boris and Roman, Gorbachev and Guriev were something of an odd couple from the start. While Gorbachev was gregarious and personable, Guriev was an introvert who had married his childhood sweetheart and, at one point, lived in the same modest apartment building as his driver.

Gorbachev's troubles date from the moment Putin turned against Russia's richest man, the oil oligarch Mikhail Khodorkovsky, who was a 50 per cent shareholder in PhosAgro.

In 2003, Khodorkovsky was arrested, charged with fraud and ended up in a prison camp near the Chinese border. Gorbachev, fearful of being targeted by association, fled for London.

For years, Guriev kept Gorbachev happy by making payments to an offshore company opened in his name.

But when PhosAgro was floated on the London Stock Exchange in 2011, Gorbachev found, to his consternation, that his name was not on the list of shareholders.

When Guriev tried to fob him off by offering to buy him out for \$30 million, Gorbachev angrily refused the offer.

The current action dates back to October 2018, when Gorbachev had Guriev served with legal papers while the latter was shopping on Berkeley Street in Mayfair. A video of the incident appears to show bodyguards attempting to shield Guriev from the process server, and the papers were eventually given to one of his assistants.

Guriev argued that this meant he had not been properly served. But at a court hearing in Manchester in 2019, a judge ruled that the assistant was an appropriate proxy and proceedings continued.

Gorbachev is not the first disgruntled PhosAgro employee to seek satisfaction via the British

courts. Igor Sychev, a tax lawyer, says the company promised him a substantial bonus amounting to 1 per cent of the company's worth after he negotiated a massive tax discount with the Russian authorities, but Guriev failed to pay up.

When he embarked on legal action, however, Sychev claims he became the subject of 'assassination attempts' by Putin cronies, and his enemies 'bribed his lawyers' and 'threatened to murder his wife and children'.

'The oligarchs repeatedly

threatened to kill me, demanding that I drop this lawsuit,' he told MailOnline early last year. Sychevialso claimed his car was

Sychev also claimed his car was sabotaged three times in an attempt to kill him.

'The cars were new and expensive Jeeps and in the first case everything happened quickly at high speed on the highway,'

he said.

'According to the woman driving behind me, she saw that sparks of fire suddenly flew out from under the wheels of my car, and immediately after that the front wheel with the accompanying iron

fasteners came off.

'This huge wheel flew at this woman's car and she miraculously dodged it.

'My car crashed into a truck moving parallel and turned into a pile of scrap metal that cannot be restored. I survived thanks to the airbags.



Biographical details are sketchy, but he is believed to have grown up in Lobnya, a town near Moscow, where he was a teenage martial arts champion — a passion he shared with the judo-loving Putin.

Guriev and his wife Evgenia went to

the same school and are reported to live in a mansion in Forest, a gated community on the outskirts of Moscow, in an area popular with oligarchs

Unlike her low-profile husband,
Evgenia is said to have a taste for the

luxury cars, including two Rolls-Royces
that once belonged to Elton John.

But it is their daughter-in-law Valeria who appears to have embraced the trappings of wealth with the most gusto.

Images on social media showed her sitting astride a motorcycle in a short black skirt, swigging champagne from the bottle on a yacht and posing with a revolver strapped to her bare leg.

revolver strapped to her bare leg.

According to The New Yorker magazine, she also documented trips to the Bolshoi opera house in Moscow, Monte Carlo nightclub Twiga and the Michelin-starred restaurant Per Se in New York.

However, she turned her accounts private a few years ago after she became the subject of an online pile-on over her Instagram slogan worthy of Marie Antoinette: 'I'm too pretty to work.'

The same cannot be said of her plump, balding husband Andrey Guriev Jr, who stepped down as CEO of PhosAgro in 2022.

The Gorbachev v Guriev case is scheduled to last for six weeks and so, by the middle of June, Gorbachev will know whether he is destined to be one of life's embittered also-rans or the proud owner of the biggest private house in Britain.



## Hamas aid crossing attack leaves peace hopes in tatters

A HAMAS attack on an aid crossing that killed Israeli troops was last night branded proof that the terror group is using Palestinians as 'human shields', dashing hopes for an end to the violence in Gaza.

The escalation came as the latest round of ceasefire talks were 'near to collapse', with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu flatly ruling out any end to the war.

It follows US President Joe Biden reportedly putting a shipment of ammunition bound for Israel on hold amid university campus protests against his support for the country.

Ten rockets were launched

from close to civilian shelters in southern Gaza towards the Kerem Shalom crossing yesterday – killing three soldiers and injuring 11, the Israeli military said.



Ms Smith, whose many roles include starring in TV drama Cilla, admitted the part had


forced her to confront her own demons after suffering a highly publicised breakdown while performing in Funny Girl in the West End in 2016.

## SAS officer broke ranks to report Afghan 'war crimes'

A HIGH-RANKING Army officer told police the SAS was committing war crimes by murdering prisoners in Afghanistan, it emerged yesterday.

Known only as N1466, the officer risked reprisals against his family when he claimed 'cancer had infected' one SAS unit. He said the crimes were so serious, the entire regiment needed a 'complete overhaul'.

Between 2009 and 2013, he was responsible for all SAS overseas operations – meaning he focused on British military activity in Afghanistan. According to a Sun-

day Times investigation, the officer tipped police off about a safe which held evidence from an SAS soldier detailing allegations of murder.

The officer's actions resulted in a massive inquiry, with 6,000 classified documents being disclosed by the Ministry of Defence.

They include witness accounts from serving soldiers, emails to No 10 warning of the crisis, as well as police investigators' diaries.

Foreign Secretary David Cameron was prime minister when the allegations came to light. Detectives from the Royal Military Police kept diaries alleging a cover-up.

In their notes, investigators said

weapons were allegedly planted on the bodies of the deceased and a raft of top-secret computer files relating to the SAS were deleted.

Tory MP Johnny Mercer, then a defence minister, wrote in emails that he believed the SAS was guilty of wrongdoing during the war.

But a civil servant toned down Mr Mercer's email, arguing that 'bland is best'.

The inquiry was eventually shut down – but subsequent stories by The Sunday Times and the BBC put pressure on the Government to open up a fresh inquiry.

This is called the Independent Inquiry relating to Afghanistan and documents released from this revealed the decision by N1466 to make his claims.

In the raft of emails, letters and documents released, a lieutenant colonel wrote: 'I find it quite incredible the amount of Bs [Afghan males, Bravos] that [the SAS unit] send back into a building who then decide to get weapons/grenades and engage the [SAS unit] knowing that it will achieve nothing.'

In certain emails relating to a raid, commanders stopped calling victims EKIA (enemy killed in action) and changed it to EJK (extra-judicial killings).

The Ministry of Defence said: 'The MoD is fully committed to supporting the inquiry. It is not appropriate for us to comment on allegations which may be within the scope of the statutory inquiry.'



S THE monster who was responsible for creating the Gestapo and building the first Nazi concentration camps, Hermann Goering was one of Hitler's most ruthless henchmen.

Yet nothing could have prepared a team of amateur archaeologists for what they were about to find in the basement of his former home in the Wolf's Lair — the Nazis' headquarters in what is now north-

eastern Poland.

Set in dense forest, with barbed wire, guard towers and minefields all around, the once-impregnable complex of some 200 houses, bunkers and other buildings was where Hitler and senior Nazis planned the barbarities of the Holocaust and military campaigns such as Operation Barbarossa, their invasion of the Soviet Union.

They destroyed much of the base before fleeing the Red Army in

January 1945 and today the mossy ruins are a tourist attraction drawing more than 200,000 visitors a year — among them a Gdansk-based team of German and Polish history buffs.

For years the archeological researchers have been unearthing ordinary items such as crockery and tools. But this month they revealed how, back in February, they entered the ruins of Goering's once-imposing brick home and noticed a concrete ledge which had at one time supported a wooden floor. While digging for the nails which might have held it together, they found a human skull.

They called the police, who disinterred five skeletons in all among them the tiny skull of a newborn baby, nestling between an adult's shin-bones. Thought to have been a family — three adults, a teenager and the baby all had been buried naked. They were also missing their hands and feet.

Yet even that was not the most chilling detail. Scattered around the bodies were so-called 'thunderstones' - the bulletshaped fossils of extinct squid-like creatures called belemnoids.

In ancient times, it was believed that the Gods hurled these down from the heavens during thunderstorms and they became revered as talismans, divinely appointed means of securing victories in battle and other good fortune.

According to traditional Germanic belief, keeping thunderstones at home could even protect against lightning.

KTAVIAN Bartoszewski, one of the team who discovered the remains, suggests that the bodies may have been placed in the foundations to ensure the success and prosperity of those who lived in the building.

'Goering and other Nazis believed in the occult, so perhaps these people were sacrificed,' he said. 'A find like this gives you goosebumps.'

While an investigation continues into who the victims were - and how and when they were killed the theory that they might have been offered up in some kind of sadistic black magic ritual is not as far-fetched as it might seem. After all, the Nazis were obsessed

In this, they took their lead from Hitler himself. Among the most heavily annotated books in the Fuhrer's personal library was Magic: History, Theory, Practice, penned by Ernst Schertel, an eccentric sadomasochist and nudist.

with all things supernatural.

In his signed copy of the 1924 volume, Hitler underlined sentences such as 'Satan is the fertilising, destroying-constructing warrior' and 'he who does not carry demonic seeds within him

will never give birth to a new world'. Hitler was also a firm believer in 'world ice theory', a bizarre explanation of the origins of life which had come to an Austrian engineer in a dream at the turn of the century.

This suggested that the universe was created when moons made of ice crashed into each other, eventually resulting in biological mutations which produced races of both superhumans and

monstrous humanoids — the latter, in Hitler's mind, being the Jews and anyone else who did not fit in with his crazed ideas of Aryan superiority.

While this sounds like the stuff of comic books, Hitler took it so seriously that by the mid-1930s it had taken hold as the uniquely German alternative to Einstein's theory of relativity — the writings of the Nobel Prizewinning physicist being among the many Jewish works that went up in flames

during the Nazi book burnings of 1933.

In the huge intellectual gap left by this wanton destruction, it mattered not whether there was scientific proof behind a particular idea. All that counted was whether it might be twisted to support Nazi ideology, as with the special Witch Division set up by SS chief Heinrich Himmler in 1935.

Himmler was convinced that witches had really existed in eastern Europe, and the job of the division's 17 employees was to scour through thousands of execution records and prove that these 'wise women' of 'pure German blood' had been hunted to death by a Jewish-Catholic conspiracy.

Claiming at a conference in Stuttgart in 1938 that some 500,000 such 'witches' had been burned 'after terrible torments', Himmler amassed a 13,000-volume library on the occult — the most complete collection of books on witchcraft ever compiled.

Had Germany not lost the war, he would have housed it in Wewelsburg Castle, a forbidding Renaissance fortress 300 miles west of Berlin. After Himmler

acquired the lease in 1934, he used met in a shadowy, candlelit crypt Germany win the war that he even slave labour from a nearby concentration camp to convert it into a grotesque Nazi Hogwarts — a place of supposedly mystical power where future leaders of the SS would be indoctrinated in his mishmash of crackpot beliefs.

In Himmler's mind, the SS was an elite organisation in the tradition of King Arthur and the 12 Knights of the Round Table.

In all this arrant nonsense he was encouraged by his 'personal astrologer' Wilhelm Wulff, who quickly learned to give only those readings which would please Himmler, telling him that he was 'positive and forceful' and had doubtless been 'a lord or knight from remote times'.

The Fuhrer was also known to be interested in astrology.

As early as 1923 he had taken heed of an earlier prediction that a man with his birth date would sweep to power, although his attempt to overthrow the German

Hall Putsch in Munich later that year ended in imprisonment.

E SUBSEQUENTLY retained the services of Karl Krafft, a Swiss astrologer who had warned of 'dark powers' at work in November 1939. Hitler ignored the warning and attended an anniversary celebration of the putsch in the beer hall – leaving just before a bomb exploded, killing seven people. Among his supporters in the original putsch was Rudolf Hess who went on to

piloted himself to Britain in a stolen fighter plane in 1941, apparently to broker a peace deal.

The timing of his flight was decided with his astrologer Ernst Schulte Strathaus, who advised him that a rare alignment of planets and celestial bodies would make the night of May 10 an auspicious time to fly.

It proved anything but, with Hess being arrested after running out of fuel and being forced to bail out over a Scottish farm.

Denouncing him as a traitor, a furious Hitler believed that other senior Nazis might be similarly persuaded that the heavenly

their defection, so he immediately ordered a mass arrest of German astrologers, fortune-tellers and other occultists. Hess's astrologer would spend the rest of the war in a concentration camp.

Yet, despite this crackdown, the Nazi regime continued to place extraordinary reliance on practitioners of the dark arts and dowsing — the practice of using forked rods or pendulums to divine for hidden substances such as water or minerals — in particular.

German Navy that this might be down to the use of radar and sonar, along with more sophisticated code-breaking.

Instead, they listened to a U-boat captain named Hans Roeder who was a dowser in his spare time and suggested that the enemy must be using such unconventional methods to detect German ships.

He was given permission to set up a special 'institute' to do the same. At its headquarters in Berlin, a large map of the Atlantic was spread out and a pendulum, made of a metal cube attached to a short string, was swung above a model battleship as it was moved around.

As American historian Eric Kurlander explains in his book Hitler's Monsters: A Supernatural History Of The Third Reich, if the pendulum 'reacted' at any point, that was seen as a sign that there was a battleship at the real location.

'Day after day dowsers were forced by the SS to stand with their arms stretched out across the nautical charts just in case the pendulum made the slightest movement,' wrote Kurlander.

'In order to increase their likelihood of making predictions there were a number of clairvoyants constantly in a trance.'

OMPARED to this pseudoscientific bilge, the reverence of propaganda chief Joseph Goebbels for the prophecies of the 16th-century French seer Nostradamus seems almost sensible.

Goebbels' diary for November 23, 1939, nearly three months into the war, reports that he went early to bed and 'spent a long time reading. Nostradamus's prophecies. Very interesting for those of us today. Hopefully the daring commentary is right. Then England will have nothing to laugh about.

'I tell [Hitler] about the prophecies. Given the times we're in, they're astounding. The Fuhrer is very interested.'

By the end of the war, Goebbels was more interested in horoscopes. Hiding in the Berlin bunker in the final days before the city fell to the Red Army, he sent for copies of Hitler's birth chart and pointed out to the Fuhrer that although it showed both the outbreak of war and their current disastrous situation, it also claimed an inevitable victory for the Nazis and peace by August 1945.

According to Goebbels, it was all just a matter of waiting for planetary change — yet another example of the deluded beliefs which convinced the Nazis that unseen forces were on their side, but which also, thankfully, helped lose them the war.

It remains to be seen whether the unfortunate family whose skeletons were recently unearthed at the Wolf's Lair were the victims of some ghoulish sacrifice, or whether their demise had a more prosaic cause.

But whatever the truth, they offer a chilling new glimpse into the Nazis' characteristic mix of pseudo-science with profound, inhuman evil.

A MURDER victim's family have told of their fury after discovering her killer was an illegal immigrant who should have been deported 20 years ago. Zimbabwe-born Obert Moyo, 46,

had been able to stay in this country despite three previous attacks

on women.

He was jailed for life last week with a minimum term of 27 years for stabbing his former partner Perseverance Ncube, 35, through the heart with a foot-long meat skewer in front of her children aged ten and 12.

As he was sentenced, it emerged that jealous Moyo had overstayed on his visa in the early 2000s and went on to commit crimes against women prior to the murder in Salford.

She added: 'I was very angry and upset because all of this tragedy could have been avoided if people had done

their jobs properly. 'We all felt very let down by the Home Office and the people who should have made sure he was deported.'

Ms Chiriseri, who is taking care of the children, said: 'I am reeling over everything that has happened.

'I am trying to move on from the whole situation but I still have to process and under-

stand what happened. 'I still feel very angry. It was a short-term relationship and it cost my sister her life.'

The murder trial at Man-The victim was working at a chester Crown Court heard Moyo failed to tell his probation officer as part of his licence conditions that he had started a new relationship with Ms Ncube, a single mother with jobs as a childminder and a bookkeeper.

Moyo forced his way into Ms Ncube's home on November

10 last year and attacked her in her bedroom before chasing her into the street and stabbing her.

Detective Sergeant Fiona Manning said: 'Percy's family deserves answers as to why this man... was allowed to remain in this country illegally. Had Moyo been deported, Percy's children would still have a mother.'

A Home Office spokesman said: 'The Government is doing everything possible to reduce legal challenges and to increase the numbers of foreign national offenders being removed.'

## Police quiz six ex-neighbours in Rayner 'two homes' probe

ANGELA Rayner faces renewed pressure after it emerged six of her former neighbours have been questioned by police in the 'two homes' probe.

One resident has even said they are prepared to give evidence in court contradicting the account of the Labour deputy leader.

Ms Rayner maintains that an ex-council house she sold for a £48,500 profit in 2015 was her 'principal property'.

But neighbours say she was actually living at her husband's house a mile away.

Police are now investigating potential breaches of electoral law, a failure to pay capital gains tax and whether a single-occupancy

council tax discount was falsely claimed by Ms Rayner.

She claims legal advice she received exonerates her from any wrongdoing, and has said that if the police find she has broken the law she will stand down as Sir Keir Starmer's number two.

Several of her former neighbours in Stockport, Greater Manchester, have now been spoken to by officers, The Mail on Sunday

revealed yesterday.

Among them is Chris Hinett, who recalls Ms Rayner telling him she was the landlady of the excouncil house in Vicarage Road, which is at the centre of the probe, after he intervened when another neighbour's son kicked a football through a window of the house.

'She told me she was the landlady of the house and her brother

lived there, and he wasn't strong enough to deal with the likes of us,' the 64-year-old said.

'I have given a statement to the police, and I said to them I am happy to say in court that she told me she was the landlady.

'If she says she lived at Vicarage Road, I am saying she is a liar.'

His intervention comes after Sylvia Hampson, 83, who still lives next-door to Ms Rayner's then husband Mark's former house in Lowndes Lane, said the Labour frontbencher is 'a f\*\*\*ing liar' if she was saying she hadn't lived there with him.


Mrs Hampson has been interviewed twice by police who have also spoken to her son and another pensioner who has lived opposite her on Lowndes Lane for more than 20 years.

A Labour spokesman said: 'Angela has been clear that she will co-operate with any investigation.

'We remain confident that she has complied with the rules. 'It's now appropriate to let the police do their work.'



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

The hotel we were staying in had organised an Easter egg hunt for the excited junior guests, and watching the delight on one little girl's face caused a familiar, terrible cascade of emotion. A torrent of grief and regret, which I struggled to hide.

voked it. She was seven, as I discovered when she told the receptionist while we waited to check in behind her family.

The same age my daughter would be now — had I not had the termination which ended my chance of ever having a child.

Plenty of women terminate accidental pregnancies, of course, and either go

on to regret it or never give it a second thought. But this was no accident. The pregnancy I ended happened as a result of IVF.

What's more — and worse I suppose if that were possible — is that I blame my husband for it all. It is his fault I will never have a child like that lovely little girl. How did I get myself into this situation in my life, where I am married to a man who I both love with all my heart and resent to the point of fury?

Alex and I are both 47 and met at university. We spent our 20s and early

30s working abroad, producing documentaries, and, at that point, both wanted a family. During half-hearted discussions, we agreed that we'd start one in our mid-30s and so, after my 36th birthday, we started trying.

Logically I knew I'd left it quite late. I'd read the statistics about fertility falling off a cliff after 35 but I didn't dwell on them, naively assuming they didn't apply to women like me. Yet, after a year of trying, we still hadn't

conceived. After appointments with various specialists, we were given perhaps the worst verdict of all: 'Unexplained infertility.'

Doctors suggested we dial down the stress by reducing our working hours, increase our time relaxing together, and keep on trying.

For the next three years we did, and planned our work and social lives almost exclusively around my fertile window each month. But still, nothing happened.

The obvious answer was to try IVF. We weren't eligible on the NHS where we live, and the prospect of success for a woman my age was pretty bleak, too. But Alex was so keen for us to

keep trying that he even suggested we draw up names. 'The body conceives what the mind believes', was his theory.

Yet another blood test showed that the quality of my eggs had nosedived. If we carried on trying naturally then each month I had less than 5 per cent chance of falling pregnant and, even if we tried IVF using my eggs, that number was pushed up to just 9 per cent.

Using a donor was, statistically, the more successful option, and our chances were suddenly between 30-34 per cent.

As my 40th birthday approached and with my periods still arriving each month like clockwork, I

ditch idea with Alex: using a donor with egg his sperm.

I had looked into this and discovered that, in Ukraine, the process was fairly speedy compared to other countries. Obviously this was ously this was before the war,

was still one of the largest in Europe.

Unlike the UK, there were no waiting lists for eggs and the laws ensured the donor remained anonymous. Plus it was far cheaper than other countries just £4,000, including flights, accommodation and medical treatment. I emailed Alex the clinic details and held my breath for his response.

Over a series of evenings, we then talked it through — over FaceTime because he was work-

ing away.

To my mind, it shouldn't have come as a surprise to him: we'd touched on it in the past as a plan B and now I wanted us to make it a reality. I had been mulling it over for months and I assumed he had, too.

Still, without speaking in the flesh, we settled on starting this new plan when he returned to London in a month's time.

Full of excitement, I began making arrangements.

Over the next three months we flew out to the fertility clinic on two different occasions — first for Alex to leave a sperm sample, then a second time once the embryo was ready to be transferred into my body.

I was very groggy during and after the embryo transfer, and Alex never left my side. He was so loving, organising a taxi to take us back to the hotel. Everything seemed okay, but it was all such a blur that I didn't even think to ask how he was feeling about it all. At the clinic the attention was squarely on me —

not him. Two weeks later I took a test and, marvellously, it was positive. I was over the moon, but when I told Alex he seemed oddly withdrawn. I put it down to him working long hours and carried on getting excited, planning who to tell first.

At our eight-week private scan, the sonographer picked up the little heartbeat and I burst into tears of joy, while Alex looked on. The expression on his face was not one of unbridled joy. He seemed shell-shocked.

Outside the clinic, I lightheartedly touched on how laidback he was. He looked at me and said quietly: 'You know, I'm not sure I'll bond with a baby that isn't actually ours.'

I was speechless.

We drove home in silence. It was as the front door closed that Alex gave it to me with both barrels. He accused me of pushing him into the whole 'exercise' without talking it through properly.

That night he slept in the spare room while I lay awake distraught. I'd genuinely assumed we were on the same page.

Surely he'd fall in love with our child once he or she was born? For the next few days I was battling terrible morning sick-

hoping he'd calm down. But, five days after the scan, as I was curled on the sofa watch-

ness so I avoided broaching it,

ing TV, Alex came home from broached a last- work and said we needed to talk.

Now my world came crashing down around my ears. The idea that the egg donor could be 'anyone' made his skin crawl, he said. He felt that he didn't know anything about the egg donor to whom he was about to be linked

when Ukraine's fertility 'industry' forever. While we knew basic medical history, that was it.

Alex was concerned that if she had lied about her medical background, how would the clinic know? How did we know she wasn't being exploited in some way? We'd have no idea of our child's heritage.

He asked how my parents would feel if we didn't tell them the truth saying: 'They'll be looking for a family likeness and they won't find one.' As far as he was concerned, the whole thing had been a terrible mistake.

His parting shot was that he wasn't sure he could stay in our marriage if 'you' go ahead.

Had we had the fertility treatment at home, we'd have been encouraged to have counselling first, which would have mitigated this.

Deep down I blamed myself for rushing headlong into becoming a mother at any cost.

But why on earth did he not say anything beforehand? He was there the very moment I had the embryo transferred.

The logical part of me tried to reconcile myself with the idea that he'd push these thoughts aside when we were parents. But, in my heart, I knew Alex. It would be an argument he'd bring up time and again if we went through with it.

While I wanted to be a mum, more than that I didn't want to live the rest of my life without him. I knew perfectly well we'd be over if I carried on.

The prospect of bringing up a child on my own seemed bleak. How would I do it? I've seen so

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many friends struggle as lone parents, hand on heart I couldn't knowingly do that to myself or my future child.

And then there was the most dreaded thought: what if Alex left me for someone else and had children with her? It was as though a gun were being held to my head.

A week later I told him I'd decided to have a termination and the look of relief on his face as he opened his arms to give me a hug said it all. Inside I felt a mixture of profound anger and sadness. And yet I knew it was the right decision — for him.

I can't remember the day I had the procedure — it was so painful my brain seems to have wiped it from my memory — but I told Alex not to accompany me. I needed to do it alone. The guilt I experienced that day was enough without him being there, too.

I'm painting Alex out to be a demon, yet he is a kind and generous husband in many ways.

He is one of life's good guys; he makes me laugh, whatever the weather he does the last dog walk, he gets along better with my father than I do. He just could not reconcile himself to becoming a father this way.

Afterwards I took a week off work and went to stay with my mum in Spain. I cried on and off throughout. Mum thought it was because we were struggling to start a family — I didn't tell her the truth. When I returned home, we sent off the paperwork formally requesting the clinic destroy the two frozen embryos we still had in storage there. And that was it.

I didn't know it at the time, because I clung to the remote possibility we would still get pregnant naturally, but that had been my last chance to become a parent.

Today, seven years on, sadly I take some comfort in knowing I'm not the only one to have felt pressure to terminate because the ramifications of introducing an anonymous donor into their lives hadn't been thoroughly discussed. One woman, who is now a

friend, had her donor egg termination when her other half decided to end their relationship. She found herself 12 weeks pregnant and it was too much pressure for him.

Just like me, she can recount those awful milestones: the bombshell conversation with her other half, the day she emailed the clinic asking them to destroy the embryos, her due date.

She and I have bonded over our misery and I'd say she's had it harder than me because her ex went on to start a family with a much younger woman.

As for me, you may wonder how I am possibly still with Alex?

Surely the whole episode doomed our relationship? But no, we are still together. Many times I have been a heart-

beat away from walking out on

him. On the anniversary of my due date, which I remember every year, I feel it all over again and hate what he has done to me. But, as strange as it sounds, I don't want to leave him and the life we have created. In part it's a

lack of bravery, but also because in some ways I understand why he did what he did. Becoming a father wasn't the be-all and endall for Alex, whereas becoming a mother felt that way to me.

Oddly, what I find harder to deal with, is his reticence around the whole sorry subject.

The truth is, we have barely talked about it. The first time I tried, he picked up his jacket, clipped on the dog's lead and walked out telling me he'd be back when I'd 'calmed down'.

Back then he was still open to the idea of being a father, but only if it happened naturally. Well, it didn't, and that ship has now

sailed because I'm firmly in perimenopause. Miracle babies might happen in books and films, but

they are less apparent in real life. To the outside world, our life is an enviable one. We go on exotic holidays, we have our beloved dog, we still both have successful careers. To anyone looking at our relationship, we must seem very close. I know he sees my sadness, but he won't ever acknowledge it — he has just erased that part of our life.

But papering over those feelings hasn't worked for me.

I never found out the sex of the embryo I so briefly carried, but I felt she was a girl — and seeing children of about the age she'd be, like that seven-year-old on the Easter egg hunt, still feels like a knife to the heart.

I recognise I must carry some of the blame. I wanted us to become parents so much, I had no qualms about any of the issues that troubled Alex. He wrestled with it, but in the end was not prepared to have a child 'with' a donor. I have come to accept this.

While the fertility industry in this country and others continues to seduce women like me with the promise of holding our 'own' baby, for some men, like Alex, if they can't be a father the natural way, then they don't want to be one at all. I only wish I had found that

## HOW TO DRESS LIKE A GROWN

First Rishi Sunak wore Adidas Samba trainers thereby ruining them for the many fashion con-scious Samba wearers, including the new editor of Vogue, Chioma Nnadi. Sir Keir Starmer and Nigel Farage were also photographed in Adidas Gazelles; and then came news the most coveted trainer is by New Balance for Miu Miu and costs £780, if there were any left, which there aren't.

Everywhere I've been in the past few weeks people are (only half-jokingly) asking which brand they should be wearing, having never given trainer style a thought.

It's now clear that the old assumption — trainers are not suitable for fifty-somethings — is out of date and you can wear trainers at any age, and not just if you're expecting to kick a football (Starmer's excuse). And suddenly trainer owners everywhere are waking up to their potential: the power to turn the fashion dial right up or to give the everyday a spritz of style.

Trainers are now without doubt the neatest, easiest, most costeffective and practical way of keeping in the fashion loop. So here's everything you need to know (at the time of going to press, things move fast in trainer world) to help you make your choice...

■ TRAINERS count as smart casual footwear... if they are a) clean, and b) some combination of leather and suede, or the vegan equivalent (no technical fabric if you want to wear them to the office).

The reason Sambas (£90, arket. com) became so popular is because they come in white with black/navy stripes, stone suede detailing and a slim gum sole. They're smart casual with a capital S, and look like they're made to be worn with tailoring rather than track pants.

By the way, the woman interviewing Sunak on Sambageddon day

was wearing white New Balance trainers with a grey N and a platform sole, still smartish, but more casual and minus the fashion points you get with the style of the moment. Worth noting: imitations work, but there's nothing quite like the real thing when it comes to trainers.

- IF YOU'RE a disillusioned Sambas wearer, the new cool and smart trainer on the block, Onitsuka Tiger's Mexico 66 SD (£195) onitsukatiger.com) with the distinctive swooping side stripes, is already the number one choice of fashion editors. Get them in white with blue and red stripes and you've got this year's white trainer, plus.
- THE plain white and pretty trainers moment has officially passed. Vejas, with the V in coloured leather, no longer cut the mustard, notwithstanding its eco credentials.

Now, the trainers of the moment are retro, old-school and suede — the kind seen on campus in the 1970s — in

vintage colour combinations. The Adidas for Gucci trainers in colourways like burgundy and turquoise kicked off this trend a couple of years ago and now it's flying: another retro design from Adidas, the SL72 (£79.99, office.co.uk) has a thicker white sole, looks fractionally more like a running shoe than regular Gazelles, and comes in 12 colour combinations, including my favourite maroon, almost yellow and brown.

Adidas Handball Spezials (£89.99, office.co.uk) are similarly colourful and covetable.

Otherwise, for anyone disinclined to wear a trainer that dads feel comfortable in (plenty of men are wearing Spezials), the new hot style on the block is Nike's Cortez vintage suede (£131, farfetch. com) in preppy colours such as green with a turquoise flash on the heel.

Beige suede and cream trainers are popular too, including New Balance's RC42 style (£89.99, office.co.

uk), and you get a lot more sole with New Balance.

- IF YOU'RE looking for a fashion forward trainer, flatter retro running styles are streaking ahead. But with trainers, it's about finding the one that suits your needs, and if you need more support or height, then Marks & Spencer's version — it does a 'side detail' style in stone, green, white and navy (£35, marksandspencer.com) — is a good alternative.
- FOR feverish fashion followers, designer collaborations with trainer brands are the new It Bags. The ones currently making the fashion crowd drool include Adidas and Wales Bonner, and the New Balance and Miu Miu collection. Miu Miu's 530 SL flat style in cinnamon brown with orange laces sold out instantly, but there are plenty of imitators. Fans might easily make do with Adidas Gazelles in burnt orange and brown (£89.99, office.co.uk).

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## HOWTOEAT 30 PLAIS A WEEK

Will you take up Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall's healthy challenge?

TOVETOP dishes are the perfect goto meal when stomachs are rumbling.

They provide a great opportunity to enhance your diet with as many plants as possible, aided by everyday ingredients you can often find in your fridge, store cupboard or spice rack.

The wonderful thing about this style of cooking is that your pan is 'open', so you can fling ingredients in as you go and smell and stir as you cook, tasting a spoonful now and then to get a really good sense of what you are creating.

In the last day of this series from my new book, I am sharing some of my best-loved recipes to show you that putting 30 different plants on your plate every week is easier than you might think — even adding them to puddings!

By plants, I means fruit and vegetables, but also nuts, seeds, grains, herbs and spices.

A diet rich in plants has been shown to have some incredible health benefits, such as improving your gut health and energy levels, and with these easy recipes, I will show you it is an easy win.

show you it is an easy win.

A favourite recipe is green beans with chickpeas and olives.

This bubbling and flavourful dish is fantastic served as a starter or as part of a mezze spread, with a dollop of yoghurt and a lemon wedge on the side. It is also fantastic as a side to lamb, fish or roast chicken.

It's easy to make plants the main event — see my recipe for black bean, corn and tomato soup, on the next page.

But plants can also be the celebrated co-stars to your meat dishes, instead of playing the mere extras to limelight-hogging animal proteins.

ONE are the days of 'meat and two veg'; instead, meat and five, six or seven veg are winning much deserved plaudits.

Plants also pair well in meaty dishes — such as the nuts, herbs and spices that make my rustic on-the-bone chicken korma really sing, all while counting towards your 30-plants-a-week tally.

A vital factor when putting dishes such as this together is being more selective with the meat you're eating.

Eating less meat of better quality is good for us, good for the animals that provide the meat and better for the planet, too. A higher-welfare

chicken or shoulder of lamb will cost more, but with these tasty recipes to hand, you'll be making it go further.

It's also good to know that sweet treats don't have to be 'bad for you'. When they're full of plants, they can make a positive contribution to your daily nutrition.

If you dial down the sugar

and mix it with whole foods such as nuts, fruits, seeds and wholegrain flours, you create dishes rich in plant proteins and fibre.

Take my nutty, seedy frangipane tart: it uses a little sugar but also has lots of almonds, pumpkin and poppy seeds.

And you'll see that the

hob-nobby, half-wholemeal shortcrust pastry has had a multi-plant upgrade, too.

Trust me, soon you will be filling your kitchen with delicious smells to get everyone's mouths watering. All the while hitting — perhaps even exceeding — that 30-plants-a-week target. Enjoy!

## Braised green beans with chickpeas and olives

THIS is lovely eaten soon after cooking, but arguably even better the next day. So make the dish in advance and store in the fridge for a day or two, removing it an hour or so before serving to bring to room temperature.

## SERVES 4 AS A SIDE OR STARTER OR 2 AS A MAIN

- Oil or fat for cooking
- 1 large onion, finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, finely sliced
- 1 tbsp tomato puree
- 1 tsp paprika
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- A pinch of dried chilli flakes
- 2 x 400g tins peeled plum tomatoes
   200g groop (Franch) boars, trimmed
- 300g green (French) beans, trimmed
- 400g tin chickpeas, drained and rinsed
   100g pitted black olives, like Kalamata
- Sea salt and black pepper

## TO SERVE

- 4-5 tbsp natural yoghurt and/or 50g feta
- A handful of parsley, mint or basil (or a mix), leaves picked and roughly chopped
- A pinch of dried chilli flakes (optional)
   Lemon wedges

HEAT a splash of oil or knob of fat in a flameproof casserole dish or large saucepan over a medium heat. Add the onion with a pinch of salt and fry gently for at least 15 minutes, until very soft, golden and slightly caramelised the more time you give the onion the better, as long as you don't burn it! Use a little more oil during cooking, if needed. Add the garlic, tomato puree, ground spices and chilli flakes. Cook, stirring, for a couple of minutes, taking care not to burn the garlic. Add the tinned tomatoes, crushing them as they go in and picking out any stalky ends or bits of skin. Add a splash of water to the empty tins to get the last of the juice; add this too. Bring to a simmer and cook for about 15 minutes until the tomato sauce is reduced and thickened. Add the green beans, chickpeas and olives and season, then simmer for a further 25 minutes until the beans are tender. Serve warm or at room temperature with yoghurt, herbs, chilli flakes, if using, and lemon wedges.

## Rustic on-the-bone chicken korma

THIS is a gorgeous, creamy, nutty chicken curry, with lots of lovely spices that make it really sing.

## SERVES 5-6

- 1 large free-range chicken (about 1.8 kg), jointed (or 6 thighs and 6 drumsticks)
- 2 tsp cumin seeds
- 2 tsp coriander seeds
- 5 cardamom pods, bashed and seeds extracted
- Oil or fat for cooking
- 1 onion, sliced
- 3cm piece of fresh ginger, coarsely grated
- 3cm piece of fresh turmeric, grated, or 1 tsp ground
- 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped
   2 tsp garam masala (or a mild
- curry powder)1 tsp dried chilli flakes
- 400g tin peeled plum tomatoes
- 400g tin coconut milk
- 50g ground almonds
   Sea salt and black no
- Sea salt and black pepper

## TO FINISH (OPTIONAL)

- A handful of coriander leaves, chopped
- Brown rice (cook according to packet instructions)

TAKE the chicken out of the fridge 30-45 minutes before cooking to bring it to room temperature. Preheat the oven to 170c/150c fan/gas 3. Toast the cumin, coriander and cardamom seeds in a large heavy-based pan for 3-4 minutes

until fragrant and starting to crackle. Tip the seeds out on to a plate and leave to cool for a minute, then grind to a coarse powder using a pestle and mortar. Set aside. In a little oil, brown the chicken in 2 or 3 batches, skin side down, turning occasionally until nicely browned. Remove and place in a deep ovenproof dish or tray. Repeat to colour the rest of the chicken pieces. Set aside. Now add a little more oil or fat to the pan, followed by the onion, ginger, turmeric, garlic, crushed toasted spices, garam masala (or curry powder) and chilli flakes. Sweat for 15-20 minutes over a medium-low heat, stirring regularly, until the onions are very soft but not brown. Add the tinned tomatoes, crushing them as they go in (and picking out any stalky ends or bits of skin). Turn up the heat and cook for a few minutes, stirring occasionally to reduce and thicken the sauce. Add the coconut milk, ground almonds and salt and pepper, to taste. Give it a good stir and gently bring to a simmer. Pour the creamy tomato mixture over the chicken in the roasting dish or tray. Mix well to ensure the chicken is well coated and then cook in the oven for 20 minutes. Take out the dish and turn the chicken pieces, then return to the oven for 10 minutes. Serve the curry scattered with chopped coriander leaves if you have some to hand, and with brown rice on the side.

## Lamb and barley cabbage parcels

THESE parcels are inspired by Eastern European flavours. I've used the larger outer leaves to wrap the parcels. The tender inner leaves can be used to make a kraut slaw to serve on the side.

## **SERVES 4**

- 1 large Savoy cabbage
- Oil or fat for cooking
- 300g lamb mince
- 1 onion, finely sliced
   1 carrot, scrubbed or peeled
- and fairly finely chopped
   1 celery stick, thinly sliced
- 2 garlic cloves, finely sliced or grated
- ½ tsp dried chilli flakes
   50g pearl barley (or spelt)
- 400g tin peeled plum tomatoes
- A glass of white wine
- 400ml vegetable or lamb stock
- A bunch of dill, roughly chopped, or parsley, leaves picked and finely chopped
   Sea salt and black pepper

FIRST prepare the Savoy cabbage. Remove and discard any very tough or damaged dark outer green leaves. Then carefully remove 12-14 large, bright green leaves for the parcels. Place the leaves, spine side up, on a large board and use a potato peeler to shave down the stalk (to make them more pliable for wrapping); don't worry if they rip a little. Immerse the whole cabbage leaves, a few at a time, in a large pan of simmering salted water for 2 minutes, then drain and refresh in cold water; drain well and set aside. To make the filling, place a large,

wide ovenproof pan over a medium heat and add a little oil or fat. When hot, add the lamb mince and some salt and pepper and brown for 5-10 minutes,

using a wooden spoon to break up the meat as it fries. If the lamb releases a lot of fat, pour this off. Remove the meat from the pan with a slotted spoon and set aside on a plate. Now add the onion, carrot and celery to the pan and saute over a mediumlow heat for about 10 minutes, until softened and lightly coloured. Add the garlic and chilli flakes, stir and cook for another minute or so. Add the barley (or spelt) and tinned tomatoes, crushing them as they go in. Stir well, increase the heat and cook for 5 minutes, to reduce the liquor until rich and saucy. Return the browned mince to the pan and pour in the wine and stock. Season with salt and a few twists of pepper, stir well and bring back to a gentle simmer. Cook for 20 minutes or so, until the grain starts to swell and become tender. Remove from the heat and stir through the dill or parsley. Set a colander over a bowl, tip the lamb filling into the colander and let the liquor drip through for 5 minutes. Keep this liquor. Preheat the oven to 200c/180c fan/gas 6. To make each parcel, lay a cabbage leaf on a board and place a heaped tablespoon of the lamb filling in the centre. Fold both ends of the cabbage leaf over and fold the sides over the filling, creating a tightly packed parcel. Place the parcel back in the pan, with the fold underneath to help secure it. Repeat to make the rest of the parcels. Ideally, they should fit snugly in the pan in a single layer. Pour the strained liquor on top. Put the pan in the oven and bake the parcels for 25-30 minutes until they are golden. Serve 2 or 3 parcels per person, with any remaining juices spooned over and a pile of kraut slaw, made from inner leaves.





A HEARTY but zingy tomato soup with crunchy corn and punchy lightly pickled red onions.

## **SERVES 4**

finely sliced

- 1 small red onion,
- Finely grated zest and juice of 1 lime
- Oil or fat for cooking
- 2 red onions,
- 3 garlic cloves,finely chopped
- 1-2 medium-hot green chillies, such as jalapeno, deseeded and finely chopped
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 4 tbsp tomato puree
- A handful of coriander stalks (keep leaves for later)
- 400g ripe tomatoes, cored, deseeded and finely chopped, or a 400g tin peeled plum tomatoes
- 400g tin black beans or

## Braised black bean, corn and tomato soup

blackeyed beans, drained and rinsed

- 700ml vegetable stock
- 2 corn-on-the-cob,
- 400g frozen sweetcorn
   150g frozen peas (optional)
- Juice of 1 lime
- Sea salt and black pepper
- Pickled red onion

## TO FINISH (OPTIONAL)

- A handful of coriander leaves, chopped
- 4-6 tbsp soured cream or Greek-style yoghurt
- 1 ripe avocado, peeled, stoned and chunkily diced
- A squeeze of lime or lemon juice

FIRST, prepare the pickled red onion. Put the sliced onion

into a bowl with the lime zest and juice and a pinch of salt. Scrunch it all together then set aside to pickle while you make the soup. Heat a little oil or fat in a saucepan over a medium-low heat, then add the onions and saute for 6-8 minutes or until softened and lightly coloured. Add the garlic, green chilli, cumin and tomato puree and cook, stirring, for a minute or two. Toss in the chopped coriander stalks. Now add the tomatoes (if using tinned tomatoes, crush them as they go in, picking out any stalky ends or bits of skin). Tip the black beans into the pan, pour in the stock and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil

and simmer gently for 15-20 minutes until the tomatoes have broken down. Meanwhile, if using fresh corn, slice the kernels off the cobs. Add the corn kernels (fresh or frozen) to the pan, plus the peas, if using, and simmer for 5 minutes more. Remove from the heat and add the lime juice, then taste to check the seasoning and adjust if necessary. Ladle the soup into warmed bowls and top with a sprinkling of pickled red onion. Finish with a scattering of chopped coriander leaves, plus a little soured cream or yoghurt, avocado and a squeeze of lime or lemon juice if you like.

## Layered gratin of greens

THIS lovely vegan dish is a delicious layering of creamy greens, cabbage and spuds, with a crispy nutty topping.

## **SERVES 4**

- 100g cashew nuts
- A little olive or rapeseed oil
- 350ml hot vegetable stock
- 1 tsp English mustard
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil or butter
- 1 large onion, halved and sliced
   1 large leek (about 300g),
- trimmed and cut into 5mm rounds
   3 garlic cloves, finely grated
- 250g spinach, coarse stalks removed, roughly shredded
- 1 Savoy or January King cabbage
   600a flour unstate as such as
- 600g floury potatoes, such as Desiree or Maris Piper, scrubbed
- Sea salt and black pepper

## **FOR THE TOPPING**

- 30g buckwheat groats
- 30g walnuts or hazelnuts, roughly bashed
- 1 tbsp olive or rapeseed oil
- A few sprigs of rosemary, leaves picked, or 10 sage leaves, chopped

SOAK the cashew nuts in cold water for 3 hours. Lightly oil a shallow oven dish (at least 1.5 litre capacity). Drain the soaked cashews, put them into a blender with the hot stock and mustard and blitz to a smooth, creamy liquid. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Heat the oil or butter in a large

frying pan over a medium-low heat and add the onion and leek with a pinch of salt. Cover the pan and sweat the veg for 5 minutes or until they soften, then remove the lid and cook for a further 15 minutes or until they are very soft and golden. Add the garlic and cook for 2 minutes, then stir in the spinach and leave it to wilt for 2-4 minutes. Pour in the cashew cream and stir to combine: this creamy mix of alliums and greens is one layer. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 190c/fan 170c/gas 5. Separate the cabbage leaves, keeping them whole. Bring a large pan of water to the boil. Blanch the cabbage leaves in batches, simmering them for just 2 minutes, then drain and refresh in cold water. Next, thinly slice the potatoes into 3mm thick rounds. Arrange an overlapping layer of potatoes in your oven dish, then a thin layer of the creamy cashew greens, followed by an overlapping layer of cabbage leaves. Season well with salt and pepper. Repeat these layers then top with a third layer of potatoes. Trickle a little olive or rapeseed oil over the surface then cover with foil and bake for 35-40 minutes. Now, mix the topping ingredients in a bowl. Scatter over the surface. Return to the oven for 10-15

minutes, until browned and crispy.

## Hob-nobby shortcrust pastry

THIS pastry is a great all-rounder. The oats, poppy or flax seeds give it a lovely hob-nobby texture. Just leave out the sugar for savoury recipes.

## MAKES ENOUGH TO LINE A 24CM TART TIN

120g fine plain wholemeal flour

 100g plain white flour, plus extra to dust

50g porridge oats

20g golden caster sugar (omit for a savoury tart)

 30g poppy seeds or ground flax seeds (optional)

A pinch of salt

 125g chilled butter, diced or coarsely grated

1 medium egg, beaten

COMBINE the two flours, oats, sugar, poppy or flax seeds if using, and the salt in a large bowl, or the bowl of a food processor. Add the butter and

either rub in with your fingertips, or pulse in the processor, until the mixture resembles fine crumbs. Add the beaten egg, gradually either to the bowl, working it in with a table knife, or trickling it into the processor with the motor running. Add a little cold water too, just enough to bring the pastry together into large clumps; don't overwork it. Tip the pastry on to a floured surface and use your hands to bring it together, then knead it briefly into a ball. Flatten it into a thick disc, then wrap and chill it in the fridge for at least 30 minutes, ideally 1-2 hours, before using.



## Maple and nut butter flapjacks

THIS is my plantiest flapjack yet. The mix of dried fruit, nuts and seeds can be varied as you like, and it's pretty much the more types the merrier.

## **MAKES 10-12**

200g porridge oats

 100g seeds, such as sunflower or pumpkin (or a mix)

 1 tsp caraway or fennel seeds (optional)

 50g dried apricots (unsulphured), or dried apple or pear, chopped

50g sultanas or raisins

 50g nuts, such as hazelnuts, walnuts, almonds or macadamias, roughly chopped

150g organic peanut butter or other nut butter

30g soft light brown sugar

 3-4 tbsp coconut or olive oil (or melted unsalted butter)

2 tbsp maple syrup (or honey)

PREHEAT the oven to 200c/180c fan/ gas 6. Line a 20cm square oven tin with baking paper. Mix the oats, seeds, spice seeds if using, dried fruit and chopped nuts together in a large bowl. Put the nut butter, sugar, 3 tbsp oil (or butter) and maple syrup (or honey) into a saucepan, place over a low heat and stir gently until everything is melted and well blended. Pour on to the oat mixture and stir well to combine. If the mixture doesn't quite come together, mix in another 1 tbsp oil (or melted butter). Tip the flapjack mixture into the prepared tin, spread out and press down with the back of a spoon into an even layer. Bake in the oven for 20-25 minutes until lightly golden (and a little darker at the edges). Remove from the oven and leave to cool in the tin. Once cooled, cut the flapjack sheet into 10 or 12 slices. These will keep in an airtight container for a week.

   80g golden caster sugar
- 3 medium eggs (at room temperature), beaten
- 2 tbsp plain flour
- 30g poppy seeds
- 25g extra pumpkin seeds or flaked almonds for topping the tart

## TO FINISH (OPTIONAL)

- Fresh berries or cherries
- A dollop of yoghurt or creme fraîche

PREHEAT the oven to 180c/160c fan/ gas 4. Roll out the hob-knobby shortcrust pastry on a floured surface, as thinly as you can, turning it once or twice and dusting with a little more flour.

## Frangipane tart

Use it to line a 24cm round loosebased fluted tart tin, pressing the pastry into the corners and trimming the excess. Place the tin on a baking tray. Prick the pastry base in a few places with a fork. Line with baking paper, then add a layer of baking beans or dried beans or rice. Bake in the oven for 15 minutes, then remove the paper and beans and return the pastry case to the oven for 5-10 minutes. until it looks dry and cooked and is just starting to colour. Leave the pastry case to cool a little. For the filling, tip the nuts and pumpkin/sunflower seeds on to a large baking sheet, spread them out and toast in the oven for 8-10 minutes, until fragrant and starting to turn golden, stirring once halfway through to ensure even colouring. Take out the tray and lower the oven setting to 170c/ 150c fan/gas 3. Tip the toasted nuts and seeds into a bowl and leave to cool for at least 10 minutes. Once cooled, transfer to a food processor and blitz until the mix is the texture of ground almonds.

Using a free-standing mixer, or an electric hand whisk and bowl, beat the softened butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Now whisk in the beaten egg, a little at time, adding a shake of flour with each addition. Once half of the egg is incorporated, stop the mixer and scrape down the sides of the bowl with a spatula, then continue. Finally, mix in the blitzed nutty seed mixture and the poppy seeds, until just incorporated. Spoon the frangipane into the baked tart case, spreading it evenly. Sprinkle a few whole pumpkin seeds or flaked almonds evenly over the surface and bake for 30 minutes. Turn the oven setting up to 200c/180c fan/ gas 6 and cook for another 10-15 minutes until the frangipane is firm and golden brown on top. Leave to cool on a wire rack for at least 15 minutes before removing from the tin. Serve at room temperature, cut into slices, with fresh berries or cherries, plus a dollop of yoghurt or crème fraîche, if you are using it.

# As Emily In Paris heads to Rome, a native offers some waspish advice Ditch those white trainers, don't order pasta as a main course and never drink Aperol spritz

HEAR you're taking time out from irritating the French and have popped over from Paris to Rome. Well, take it from someone who knows: don't assume it will be all *la dolce* vita and pizzas.

HEN I heard you were heading to Rome, Emily, my heart sank. I sat through your TV series at my home in Languedoc, watching through my fingers as you mangled the French language, wore appalling clothes and assumed every man you met was trying to have sex with you. That last one is a lot more likely in Italy, incidentally.

I can only hope you have become a little less gauche and that you've now ditched your beastly beret and Breton stripes, because they will go down just as badly with the Romans as they did with the Parisians. Let me give you some tips that will save you from your

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# THE MIND DOCTOR Let NHS psychiatrist Max Pemberton transform your life

# We need more female doctors in the NHS... but there is a downside

OES the sex of your doctor matter? In general, I'd say it shouldn't really make a difference, although there are some times, for example during intimate examinations, when it could be a consideration.

Having said that, I was fascinated by the results of a study carried out by UCLA and published in the journal Annals Of Internal Medicine, which found the death rate for female patients treated by women doctors was lower compared with those treated by male physicians.

The researchers who conducted the study were at a loss to explain their results, although they suggested it might be down to male doctors underestimating the severity of a female

patient's illness. I would tend to agree: there's no obvious biological explanation for this difference between the sexes, so the answer must b e a psychological one, based in the unconscious bias o f male doctors.

Previous research has certainly shown that male medics underestimate their female patients' pain levels, gastrointestinal and cardiovascular symptoms and stroke risk, so it seems a reasonable conclusion.

It's also possible that some women feel more comfortable describing their symptoms to a woman doctor, which in turn means they may receive more appropriate care, tailored to their needs.

Thank goodness, then, that more women are coming into the medical profession — and the days of them being considered 'unsuitable' and lacking the necessary mental and physical stamina for the job are over.

This used to be particularly true for women who wanted children.

When I was at medical school I remember an old female professor of mine telling me that she was one of only three



was deeply frowned upon. Those who did make it to be doctors must have been tough as old boots to survive in such a hostile, sexist world.

How times have changed! When I was at medical school, 25 years ago, mine was the first year there was an equal split between the sexes. Some medical schools now have 80 per cent female students, which is an astonishing shift.

Of course, it's a good thing that more women are entering the

medical profession, but should we not consider what this means for the landscape of our health care in the future?

At the moment, just over half of registered doctors are men. As more and more women enter the profession, we may well see an increase in doctors working part-time.

Thirty-eight per cent of female consultants work part-time compared to five per cent of male consultant physicians. Two-thirds of GPs are women with a large proportion opting for less than full-time work.

SHOULD see corresponding increase in the number of places at medical school to account for this, but we don't.

While the number of medical school places has slightly increased in recent years, this is only to allow for increased need in personnel on the current model, not to allow for more of the workforce working part-time in the future.

This problem is not unique to the UK — the U.S., Canada, across Europe and Japan have seen shifts in the numbers of women entering the medical

profession, have struggled to plan for part-time workers and so they have had problems with a shortage of doctors. The problem is already affecting both hospitals and primary care.

Thank goodness we have moved on from those awful, sexist days of yore where women doctors were a minority and ostracised in the profession especially if women experience better results with female doctors.

But we must we account for the shift in gender balance and the increase of part-time working that this brings — by attracting more students and doctors or we face a medical workforce disaster.

I've seen the truth behind Baby Reindeer

HAVE you seen Baby Reindeer on Netflix? I was hooked.

The drama is an autobiographical story written by Richard Gadd (who plays the lead, Donny), detailing his experiences of being stalked as a man in his 20s. Featuring Jessica Gunning, who gives a compelling performance as the stalker, Martha, it is gripping and unexpectedly funny.

As someone wno nas worked with a number of victims of stalking, as well as people who have been stalkers, I found it offered a nuanced and perspicacious view of the complex psychology of how this situation can develop, as well as portraying the ambiguity and uncertainty the victim feels. It also gives a well-rounded and heartbreaking insight into how an obsession starts through misreading signs.

It's one of the most powerful and accurate portrayals of the utter devastation and long-term effect stalking can have on a victim I've seen.

ALMOST half of all patients never or rarely see the same GP, according to a poll for the Liberal Democrats, which starkly underlines a serious shift in medicine.

We've moved away from doctors knowing their patients and building up trust over the years. Increasingly, a visit to your GP means sitting in front of someone who barely glances up from their keyboard, reciting a list of symptoms, then walking away clutching a prescription.

This dreadful experience flies in the face of evidence that shows the extraordinary value of a proper doctor-patient relationship. One thing I treasure about being a doctor is getting to know my patients — particularly in mental health. Some of my patients have trusted me with things they've shared with no other human being. This has enabled me better to help them.



IGHT months ago, the mood in my therapy room shifted considerably. Clients who had been suffering from very low self-esteem were suddenly bounding in, filled with a new-found enthusiasm for life.

The reason was obvious and needed none of my diagnostic skills. They had all lost a considerable amount of weight using Ozempic, and after years of struggling with poor body image they finally had the figure they always wanted. A few confidently predicted they wouldn't be needing me for much longer.

Then just as quickly as they hit this euphoric mental high, they came crashing down again. And I wasn't in the slightest bit surprised.

Within a few months, the same clients had lost their glow. They were back in my therapy

room looking lower than ever and a new condition was now top of my treatment list one I christened 'Ozempic sadness'. These clients had swapped one set of problems for another, just like those I was treating ten years ago who had bariatric surgery when that was the weight loss trend *du jour*.

They're confused about why they look better, but feel worse. As a therapist the answer was obvious. Because their overeating wasn't the problem. It was just a symptom of something deeper that was yet to be addressed.

From working with these clients, I've been able to identify five of the most consistent

causes of 'Ozempic sadness' and the best ways to tackle them. Of course, this emotional turmoil can strike people who are struggling with any kind of weight loss — it could even play a part in the vicious regain cycle so many yo-yo dieters experience.

So if you find you keep sabotaging yourself every time you lose a few pounds or are stricken by a low mood now you're newly slim, read on to discover how you can tackle your problems — and really enjoy your new body.

#### How to handle the pain when comfort eating stops

OVER-EATING is never about being greedy or eating too much, or being lazy. It's always about one thing. You can find your trigger by asking yourself this one question: what am I trying to bury with food?

Then, consider: how does it serve you, focusing so much of your brain energy and time on what you've just eaten, or what you'll eat next? What would you have to address if you weren't over-thinking about food? If you were being very honest about your thoughts and feelings.

One lady I treat, in her sixties, found that taking Ozempic got rid of her appetite, so she would sit in her armchair for hours at night, overthinking all the things that could go wrong in her life. These dark, catastrophic thoughts were just getting bigger and bigger, now that she didn't have the distraction of food to occupy her mind.

For people like her — who have car doors filled with sweets, or desk drawers stuffed with biscuits — comfort eating has always been a crutch. They enjoy the sensation of food in their mouths; the crispiness, the crunch, the pleasure they get from each bite. Ozempic turns that off like a light switch, and it leaves a huge void.

Comfort eating always masks turmoil. For some it's the bullying they went through at school. For others, it's the fear of a big birthday — typically 40, 50 or 60 — and feeling like they aren't where they want to be in life.

One of my clients was sent away to boarding school at eight and has never dealt with the impact of feeling rejected by his family. Even if you think it's 'just' a matter of a few extra biscuits or helpings, it rarely is.

How to tackle it: You need to 'break state', get up, move around, and take three breaths in and out. If you still feel tempted to eat, call a friend; by the time you've done these things, the urge will often have passed.

#### Opening the door to past trauma

FOR some clients the euphoria of fitting into that much-loved dress simply cannot outshine the sadness they now feel at not experiencing the joy of freely eating. In some cases, food was their only pleasure — and now it's gone.

Worse still, the gap that food leaves creates an open door for buried trauma to emerge. A lot of the time the problems run back to childhood.

In the worst cases, it can be sexual abuse, or the anxiety of living in a chaotic household perhaps because of an alcoholic parent. Food is the one substance available to everyone from childhood, and so they use it when things are hard, and continue doing so throughout their lives.

For one client whose partner died five years ago, taking Ozempic made it suddenly feel as though the agony of their loss was yesterday. The sadness was unbearable. Others feel themselves focusing on the profound grief at having never resolved a conflict before a loved one died.

Their method of self-soothing, of swallowing down uncomfortable emotions, has gone now because they can't use food. But they're not equipped to self-soothe in other ways.

That pushes many to switch their addiction. If food can't give them the

happiness they crave, they'll frequently start drinking more. Another client I see has begun compulsively shopping to fill the gap that not over-eating has left. It's all about searching for a dopamine or serotonin (the 'happy hormones') hit from another activity.

This problem is more pronounced among women. We have so much more emotional investment in our food, and feel under more pressure to look good than men do. Men aren't as emotionally complicated.

When clients come to me saying weight loss has made them feel emotionally empty, we have to identify what started those feelings. Unless you've pinpointed it, resolved it and then let it go, you'll live with the unprocessed trauma forever.

How to tackle it: If the trauma is of a particularly serious nature, you're going to have to seek professional help. Memories buried alive don't die: if there's something that you know you haven't addressed, you must do so with a therapist or counsellor, or you won't be able to move forward.

#### Family jealousy at the new you

LOSING a large amount of weight can totally change the family dynamic, particularly if everyone in the family is overweight. You can be seen as breaking the mould.

Before, everyone ate the same food, shared the same lifestyle and was in the same position. They understood each other - now, one person is outside all of that and has rejected the old norm. Some people will see this as a criticism of them.

One woman I treat told me her family said she has betrayed them by becoming a normal size for the first time. I explore this in my new book, The Getting Of Resilience From The Inside Out, which unpicks family dynamics and early life experiences that can lead to self-sabotaging behaviour, including compulsive over-eating.

This problem is most pronounced among mothers and sisters, and some of the fallouts are severe. I treated a mother and two daughters, of whom the eldest girl was on Ozempic.

Her mum and sister couldn't understand why she was pulling away from them and fracturing their relationship. But losing weight had changed her identity. She couldn't face being surrounded by her unhealthy family while on this new path. Their lifestyles had become too different.

There is also jealousy, particularly among sisters when one can afford Ozempic (many of my clients pay around £240 per monthly jab) and the other can't.


How to tackle it: Protect yourself, and set boundaries. Some family members aren't good for us, and if your relatives aren't being supportive, and are pushing you off track, see and speak to them less. Family should make you feel good, not depleted.

#### **Questioning your** relationship

FOR many larger women, their partners are their feeders, just as when one partner gives up alcohol, and the other pushes them to 'just' have a glass of wine. It's hard to maintain boundaries when you're being undermined by a romantic partner.

People often feel left out of the new journey their other half is on, and they're also fearful. They wonder, if my wife loses weight, will she stray? Will she be more attractive to other people? Anyone who loses a vast amount of weight has a significantly higher divorce rate because you become a different person.

It's never just about your size. If your partner hasn't changed in any way, you may start to question how much you still have in common.



# Most of us think losing weight is the key to happiness. But here a psychotherapist reveals why looking better can make you feel worse...



# The five surprising reasons so many women are suffering 'OZEMPIC SADNESS'

Losing weight, especially if you have never succeeded before, also feels precarious.

Clients often tell me they don't want to go home to a partner who's ordering another takeaway. They want to be around people who are doing yoga and eating salads. If you're not getting that at home, you may look for it somewhere else.

Without the distraction of food, you may begin to ask yourself why aren't my husband and I having sex any more? Why doesn't he come near me? Why don't I want to go near him? Once these questions are exposed, they cannot be ignored.

How to tackle it: Stay committed to your goal. Come up with a short phrase or mantra — such as, 'I love you, but I need to do this for me'; or 'I know this makes you uncomfortable, but it's my choice.'

Repeat it every time they try and push you, and they'll stop.

### Friends become frenemies

IF SOMEONE in a friendship group has something the others want, it can cause a serious rift. I see this with women who start getting Botox and fillers when their friends can't afford it, and weight loss jabs are creating that same wedge between them.

Taking Ozempic marks a change of lifestyle and priorities. This can have a serious effect on women's social lives, too. With no appetite or desire to drink (a side-effect reported by some who take the drug), women simply stop going out with friends, because those situations are too hard to navigate.

When your entire friendship group is laughing at your glass of

soda water, it can feel like they're judging you, and vice versa. By the time it's nine o'clock and they start repeating all of their same stories it really stops feeling fun.

But reducing your social life can trigger serious loneliness. One of the drivers of over-eating and wanting to lose weight for many people is loneliness, so Ozempic may just be returning you to the source of your problem.

Like my clients on antidepressants, the medication ultimately has a numbing effect. Yes, it can get rid of the worst symptoms (in this case over-eating), but it also gets rid of the happiest feelings too. It makes their life feel very grey. That, plus the loss of social life, can be incredibly hard to deal with.

Some experts say Ozempic is a lifetime drug, and that once you start injecting it, you'll have to do

so forever. My question is, why shouldn't you be able to maintain that weight loss without it? If you can't — and studies suggest weight gain for those that come off it is high — it's because you never processed any of the reasons why you became overweight in the first place. I can guarantee those reasons were never about a lack of willpower or being greedy. In fact, they were never about food.

How to tackle it: Friends are for a life or a season, and sometimes you outgrow them. If yours don't want to be there for you in this slimmer period of your life, maybe that friendship has run its course and it's time to find new ones?

Leighton's advice to his celebrity fans, such as Adele, Kate Moss, Joan Collins, Cindy Crawford and assorted Spice Girls, includes 'sandwiching' colour between a base and a top coat.

HE former is akin to doublesided sticky tape; the latter must be reapplied every couple of days to extend your manicure for an extra week or so. Apply two thin, even coats of colour rather than one dense layer, and 'cap your tips'. 'The first chips start at the tips, so seal with your polish and top coat,' says Leighton.


He also advises regular nail 'facials', saying: 'My mantra is to treat your talons as you would your complexion - hence my focus on skin care for nails.

to conjure with your nails, adding: 'Flattering and elegant, balanced between pointed and rounded, it elongates your fingers.'

If your nails are too short to achieve this, she recommends going for the 'squoval', a

soft-cornered square, back from its 1990s and 2000s heyday.

For a one-stop shop restorer/fashionably shimmering look, Nails Inc's Gimme Strength (£9, boots.com) is the winner. Rich in vegan collagen, it is powered by high levels of active oils to revive ravaged talons in three weeks. It acts as a nail highlighter, too. I'm addicted. Use it on its own, or as a base.

As for hues, Nails Inc boasts juicy peaches by way of its Apricot Crush four-piece set (£22, nailsinc.com), as well as plenty of pale,

moody blues. Plant Power Vegan Nail Polish in Sky's My Limit (£9) is a duckegg tone to suit warm skins, while NailPure Nail Polish in Regents Place (£15) is a celestial sky shade for cooler ones. # Final performance that shows Hill's powerful presence was undimmed

take his final curtain. Bernard Hill, an actor of unmatched power, and celebrated by two generations for vastly different roles, died yesterday—hours before his final performance aired.

As fraught copper Chris Carson answered a call to a burgled house in The Responder, those who (like me) have been fans of Hill since the 1980s took one look at the geezer in the battered armchair with the walking frame and

chorused: 'Gissa job!'

He might have been better known to the under-50s as the heroic King Theoden in The Lord Of The Rings. But at the start of the Thatcher years, Hill was Britain's best-known actor — the face of the recession — playing Yosser Hughes, a Scouse tarmaclayer who loses his job, in Boys From The Blackstuff.

Yosser was unemployable but desperate to work. His catch-phrases — 'Gissa job!' and 'I can do that!' — became national slogans.

Hill, who was 79, worked little

His reunion with the son he hadn't seen for years was also the most foul-mouthed scene of a very sweary episode. I counted more than 80 F-words in the hour, which might be the highest ratio since Peter Capaldi's turn as a spin doctor in The Thick Of It.

When Hill, playing a miserable old git called Tom, protested that he always loved his son, patrol car driver Chris (Martin Freeman) exploded: 'Bleep off! Don't bleeping say that! You bleeping loved us? I remember you putting my bleeping head through a door just because I spilt your bleeping baccy on the kitchen lino, old bleeping bleep. Bleeping love? Bleep!'

illegal activity come so thick and fast that viewers need a criminal mind to understand all the implications.

When rookie cop Rachel (Adelayo Adedayo) spins off the road and crashes into a hedge, her partner Eric (Ian Puleston-Davies) reacts with stunned gratitude: 'You just bought me a new conservatory.'

He's talking about compensation for fake whiplash injuries.

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

My late husband was a detective inspector in the Met and an authorised shot.

As a young PC, he was awarded a Queen's Commendation for his part in disarming a man who was waving a loaded gun about. He was dedicated to the job.

After 28 years' service, he died suddenly of a heart attack in 1989 at the age of 46, and looking back it seems obvious that the stresses of policing took their toll on him.

How much worse is the situation we find our country in now.

We are quick to criticise officers who may face terrifying threats, but slow to say thank you.





#### TODAY'S RECIPE: Lettuce wraps with sweet satay dip

#### Quick healthy lunch. Serves 2. Ingredients

Little Gem lettuces, outer leaves only, or loose-leaf lettuce

1 cooked chicken breast, chopped 1 carrot, grated

1/4 cucumber, sliced 2 radishes, thinly sliced

Handful of coriander or mint leaves

For the dip: 2 tbsp peanut or almond butter

1 tbsp sweet chilli sauce

½ tsp soy sauce 1 lime, ½ juiced, ½ cut into wedges

#### Method

1 For the dip, combine the peanut butter, chilli sauce, soy sauce and lime juice in a bowl, loosening with a splash of cold water if needed, so it's a drizzling consistency.

2 Lay a couple of lettuce leaves on a plate and pile a little chicken and some of the veg on each piece. Scatter over the coriander or mint leaves, and squeeze over some lime juice. Drizzle over some of the satay dip, then roll the lettuce around the filling. Serve with the remaining satay on the side for dipping, if you like, and the lime wedges for squeezing over.



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
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

# Almost beyond redemption

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SK a fund manager investing in UK shares what is his or her biggest problem and the answer you are likely to get is: redemption.

City Editor: Alex Brummer

The investment gurus are not seeking absolution for their sins, financial or otherwise. They are, however, pointing to a crisis of confidence in the UK stock market.

Redemption is the technical term for investors pulling their money out of a fund.

Over the past months and years, redemptions by small savers from funds that invest in UK shares have been taking place on a worrying scale.

March was the 32nd month in a row where there were net withdrawals from UK equity funds by British private investors, according to the Investment Association.

Savers took out more than £13.5bn in 2023, which was the worst year on record, on top of £12bn the year before.

The exodus is terrible for the UK stock market and the wider economy. This level

of redemptions means fund managers don't have the cash on hand to invest in up-and-coming British companies.

In open-ended funds, they are having to dip into resources to give savers their money back.

In order to buy into a new and potentially profitable opportunity, they would have to sell an existing holding.

If an opportunistic bidder comes along with a lowball offer for a UK company, fund managers are under pressure to accept, because they need the cash.

Instead of backing British companies,

small investors here are supporting foreign corporations, particularly in the US.

It happened on a grand – in both senses of the word – scale at Coutts.

The posh private bank used by the Royal Family has switched more than £2bn of its clients' money out of the London stock market and put it overseas. Unpatriotic, maybe, but it is hard to blame anyone, given the respective returns.

There is no great mystery as to the attractions of the US market.

Savers everywhere want to buy into the Magnificent Seven tech stocks: Amazon, Alphabet, Nvidia, Tesla, Meta, Microsoft and Apple.

HE movement of money across the Atlantic is gathering pace.

The amount invested in US equity funds in the latest quarter is more than double the £625m that sloshed in during the final three months of 2023.

As broker AJ Bell puts it, the UK funds industry 'is going through a dark age'.

More than £50bn has been withdrawn

from the UK by small savers in the past two years, which is a shocker.

The various reforms put forward by the Government have gone nowhere.

The Great British Isa is a good idea in principle but unlikely in itself to turn the tide.

Bold moves are needed such as the scrapping of Stamp Duty on share purchases.

Another smart measure would be to raise the minimum contributions on auto-enrolment pensions. These stand at 3pc of qualifying earnings for an employee and 5pc for the employer, which is nowhere near adequate and should be doubled. That would provide investment capital and give people a better chance of a decent retirement.

Labour is attempting to exploit the loss of credibility the Tories suffered in the financial world in the Truss-Kwarteng interlude.

The party has gone so far as to state in its plan for financial services that it will 'unashamedly champion' the sector as 'one of the UK's greatest assets'.

We shall see, but someone needs to.

A FORMER business minister has urged officials to roll out the red carpet to convince Unilever to list its ice cream arm in London.

Ministers and London Stock Exchange bosses should take an 'activist approach' to ensure the UK doesn't miss out to Amsterdam or New York, Tory MP Greg Clark told the Daily Mail.

Six years ago, Clark was part of a charm offensive that persuaded the Magnum and Ben & Jerry's maker not to move its headquarters from London to Rotterdam.

The company was forced to back down after a public backlash from shareholders.

Now, the consumer goods giant is holding talks with three exchanges over a potential float of its £15bn ice cream arm.

Clark, who was business minister from 2016 to 2019, said: 'It was an important vote of confidence in the UK when Unilever chose London as its headquarters. At the time, the Government and the LSE were persuasive in communicating to shareholders and to the Board the advantages of a London listing. I hope that they are taking a similarly activist approach with this opportunity.'

A float in the US or Netherlands would be a kick in the teeth to the embattled City as it already det faces a wave of departing firms.

London is the home of Unilever's listing and the birthplace of Wall's, which started in an Acton factory in 1922. So far UK offi-

cials have not spared many details over how they plan to make the case for London.

But Unilever boss Hein Schumacher has confirmed there has been 'regular updates with people in [UK] government'. But

the Dutch government is confident it is a frontrunner due to commitments from Unilever in 2020 after it opted for the UK as its official base.

Last month Schumacher said he would look 'at all the options', and 'dedicated project teams are progressing the work at pace'.

A decision will be taken over

the next 18 months.

There are also fears a private equity predator will snap up the business.

# Royal Mail jobs safe in my hands, says Czech Sphinx

THE billionaire bidding for the Royal Mail has insisted he would not slash any jobs if he succeeds.

Daniel Kretinsky is preparing to table a new takeover offer ahead of a May 15 deadline.

The company, which was privatised in 2013, is struggling with heavy losses and missed delivery targets. But Kretinsky, known as the Czech Sphinx, has privately made assurances that there would be no compulsory redundancies as part of his plans.

He has also promised not to split up parent company International Distributions Services.

The reassurances come after the Communication Workers Union (CWU) wrote to Business Secretary Kemi Badenoch over its concerns that the bid 'could present a number of threats to both the workforce and the company'.

Last month Royal Mail rejected an 'opportunistic' £3.2bn bid - or 320p per share - from Kretinsky.

Shares are trading at a low price, closing at 275p on Friday.

LONDON'S junior market has seen its liquidity plunge as investors turn to the US.

Companies on the Alternative Investment Market (AIM) have suffered from a 15.4pc fall in the average value of the daily trading of their shares.

cerns about the UK stock market as firms continue to be snapped up by foreign predators or choose listings overseas. Average liquidity fell to £248,990 for the year to February - down from £294,300, according to accountancy firm UHY Hacker Young. It said the decrease was partly fuelled by British investors trading in stocks listed elsewhere - like tech stocks such as Nvidia.

Colin Wright, at UHY Hacker Young, said: 'Whilst AIM remains a key trading platform, the drop in its liquidity shows that more needs to be done to help keep UK stock markets as attractive trading and investing venues.'

A stream of companies have given up their listings on AIM, falling by 70 to 738 at the end of March. Just one firm has joined while ten listed last year. In 2007 there were 1,700 companies.



### De Sousa breaks his duck in the Guineas

THE resurrection of Silvestre De Sousa's career was complete when the 43-year-old landed his first Classic by winning the 1,000 Guineas on 28-1 shot Elmalka yesterday. The three-time champion jockey only returned to racing in March after a 10-month ban for breaching Hong Kong's strict anti-betting rules. The last-to-first win on Roger Varian-trained Elmalka, who was only running for the third time, had a touch of fortune for De Sousa. James Doyle was in the saddle when the filly was third in the Fred Darling Stakes at Newbury last month but his No 1 retainer with Wathnan Racing meant he was in France yesterday. Brazilian De Sousa said: 'I have been trying to win a Classic for so long, it is an amazing feeling to get one. I am picking up the leftover rides and working hard behind the scenes. 'I just want my opportunity back. I love British racing. It is my home. It is where I started out and where I want to finish one day.' Elmalka was taken off her feet in the early stages but ate up the ground in the final furlong as she clawed back the eventual third Ramatuelle, who paid the price for hitting the front too early under Aurelien Lemaitre. Notable Speech, a 16-1 shot, beat Rosallion by a convincing lengthand-a-half on Saturday to land the 2,000 Guineas. Favourite City Of Troy flopped and finished ninth.

# We worry someone is going to drive their car off the M1'

# Exhausted players hit out at relentless schedule

HREE-QUARTERS of England's male professional cricket stars fear for their safety when travelling home late after matches, with the players' union urging the ECB to come up with a less congested fixture list to avoid a 'disaster' at the wheel.

The revelation comes after the Professional Cricketers' Birmingham Bears, play a Association canvassed opinion from the 18 first-class counties, with 81 per cent of players arguing the schedule 'causes physical concerns' and 76 per cent worried about 'unsafe travel'.

The domestic calendar, said a PCA statement, was 'not fit for purpose'. Former Test captain Joe Root said: 'The creation of minimum standards to protect travel windows and player

welfare is non-negotiable.' Amid evidence of cricketers almost falling asleep at the wheel and one player driving half a dozen team-mates around in a minivan, the main area of concern is the T20 Blast, with 2024 seeing 52 instances of teams playing matches on successive days.

Warwickshire, for instance, who take part in the tournament as floodlit game at Chester-le-Street on May 31, then have to drive 200 miles south for a game the next day at Edgbaston.

'Back-to-back games have gone up considerably and are only looked at through a commercial lens,' said Daryl Mitchell, the PCA chief operating officer. 'There needs to be balance. Over 10 per cent of our membership accessed our mental health

services last year. The relentless schedule is a factor. There are reports of players who have got off the team bus, driven home and forgotten how they got there.

'Our CEO, Rob Lynch, is worried about getting a call in the early hours when someone has driven off the M1. It scares us.'

The PCA also believe a bigger gap between games will raise standards.

Root said: 'You're trying to find a way of getting county cricket as close as you can to the international game.

'There's a large number of players who don't think the schedule is conducive to high-level performance. If we can make players safer and the output a higher quality, English cricket is going to be winning.'

An ECB spokesman said: 'The players have an important voice in discussions around this and we are committed to working with them and first-class counties.

YREN WILSON shone in the Crucible spotlight and is more than halfway to winning a maiden World Snooker Championship title after a commanding first day against underdog Jak Jones.

Wilson won the first seven frames and compiled four century breaks on his way to a 10-4 lead last night as he imposed his will on the jaded Welshman.

Jones — who labelled rivals who criticise his perceived slow style of play as 'pathetic' — fought back from 7-0 down, reducing the arrears to five frames to give the crowd at least hope of play in today's final session.

As he has done all tournament, Wilson looked comfortable from the start and shone in the big moments as he played a dangerous opponent on his own terms. His 129

break was the first in the opening frame of a final since Stephen Hendry's 136 against Jimmy White in 1993.

Runs of 52, 66, 62, 84, 125 and 90 followed as the world No 12 sped into a 7-0 lead.

It matched the start made by John Parrott in the 1991 final, on the way to winning his only world title with 18-11 win over White.

Wilson's start was so special it had only been bettered by Steve Davis. In 1985, the sixtime world champion led Dennis Taylor 8-0, only to lose 18-17 on the final black.

For Jones, a 200-1 pre-tournament outsider and the world No 44, he initially melted under the heat in his first ranking tournament final. His plight was not helped by playing a well-rested man in the

form of his life. While Kettering-based Wilson reached the final after beating David Gilbert on Saturday afternoon, Jones was forced to scrap through a 12-hour tussle with Stuart Bingham in his 17-12 semi-final victory.

Jones, who has only scored two centuries on his run to the final, failed to compile big breaks against Bingham and could not disrupt the metronomic Wilson's rhythm.

The relief was palpable when he won his first frame with a 65 break at the end of the first session and celebrated with a smile and a fist pump.

And while thoughts turned to Parrott and his record 18-3 final defeat by Davis in 1989, Jones began the evening session in gutsy fashion, with a 75 break reducing arrears.

Cwmbran-born Jones then took his third frame in a row to make it 7-3, but Wilson stopped the run with a nerveless 125 to restore his five-frame lead and then extended it in a

vital frame before the midsession interval.

In his only other appearance in the Sheffield showpiece, Wilson trailed Ronnie O'Sullivan 6-2 in the opening session four years ago and went on to lose 18-8.

Wilson, 32, learned from that painful defeat. He blamed a poor night's sleep and consuming too much beer and pizza the evening before.

This time he was the one on the front foot, producing an array of top quality, high-scoring snooker, frequently winning frames with one visit.

The pattern of the first session was never likely to be repeated, but Wilson showed his class and mettle to keep Jones's resurgence at bay, splitting the session 2-2.

But the Nando's-loving Welshman showed his spice after the mid-session interval, winning a crucial frame after a rare Wilson miss with the rest to make it 9-4.

Wilson responded with another rapid century the 122 was his fourth of the final — to keep the pressure on as his dreams of a first world title began to loom on the horizon. While 30-year-old Jones is

not short of fighting qualities, surely it is too much to ask for another famous Monday night finish in this storied old theatre.



Walker made contact with the head of Dupont. The home crowd called for blood. Walker saw yellow not red, but the colour of the card was immaterial as it stemmed Quins' momentum just when it was at its peak. The impact was terminal.

First-half breakdown problems and line-out issues were also costly, and Toulouse march on to face Leinster in Tottenham in the

O WONDER Northampton were so deflated at the end. That was their shot. That was when the stars aligned for the Saints and it may be some time before that happens again.

#### STARS SET TO SLUM IT IN STANDS **AFTER EUROS SQUAD EXPANSION**

THE increase in squad sizes at the Euros from 23 to 26 may see players going straight from the stands on to the pitch. In a move authorised by Gareth Southgate, nations will now be able to name as many as 15 substitutes. However, it is understood that the benches at Germany's grounds have been made on the assumption that there would be 12 subs — and there is not enough time to bring in bigger ones. It means some stars may have to sit near the punters, with additional seating already being planned. Nations have also been informed by UEFA that dressing rooms will be prepared on the assumption that squads will consist of 23 players, so they may well feel a little cramped.

THE PREMIER LEAGUE have written to clubs ahead of the conclusion of the season to warn them to be on guard against the prospect of pitch invasions. The League have shared a document entitled 'Pitch Protection Good Practice Guidance' which sets out the dos and don'ts at a time when fans of many clubs traditionally storm the field of play. Clubs have been told to monitor social media in real time during games as fans have previously orchestrated invasions online. Sprint stewards, whose introduction was revealed by Mail Sport, have been instructed to face the pitch at all times so they can race to intercept any encroachers. Clubs have also been reminded to ensure they have the

tools necessary to deal with any protesters who try to

attach themselves to goalposts.

AGENDA readers may recall that Manchester City faced the prospect of a final-day clash with a Barry Manilow concert at the new Co-op Live arena, which has been built in the shadows of the Etihad Stadium. However, one, rare positive from the utter debacle that has seen the music venue's opening repeatedly put back, is that officials may no longer need to worry. The veteran crooner says he has a 'back-up plan' — namely a date at the nearby AO Arena should the shambles remain unfixed by May 19. Take That and rapper A Boogie Wit Da Hoodie have already switched to the AO Arena after a variety of issues at the £356million new-build, a joint venture between Americans Oak View Group, City and One Direction star Harry Styles.

THE one-time 'Kingmaker in Sport', Sheik Ahmad al Sabah, is to be suspended from membership of the International Olympic Committee for 15 years following his conviction in Swiss courts for fraud and deception. An IOC letter seen by Reuters confirms the decision, which has been made over ethics breaches. The development represents a huge fall from grace for the powerful Kuwaiti, who only eight years ago was being tipped as a future IOC or FIFA president.

However, if IOC president Thomas Bach thinks this will be the end of Ahmad's political manipulation in world sport, he is very much mistaken. Ahmad will now be able to operate in the shadows with nothing to lose.

IT was interesting to see Sky Sports take the feed direct from Lancashire for their County Championship clash with Kent at Old Trafford. It is understood that the broadcaster struck a deal with the county, whereby they would use the footage and provide their own commentators and graphics. Agenda understands Lancs have not been paid for providing the feed but are free to use the final product on their YouTube channel. Given the extra leeway afforded to counties by the ECB, some see this as a potential avenue to generate revenue at a time when certain areas of domestic cricket are rarely televised.

THE BBC, who often champion their Northern credentials following their move to Salford, have organised a breakfast with journalists, director general Tim Davie and chief content officer Charlotte Moore to mark the launch of what they have termed 'the BBC's Summer of Sport 2024'.

Davie, Moore and on-screen presenters will preview the broadcaster's coverage of Wimbledon, the Euros and the Olympics at the shindig on Wednesday. The venue? Shaftesbury Avenue, central London.

It is a personal list. Forgive me.

#### **20 NIGEL MANSELL**

WAS there a more tenacious driver? Or were many more loved by the British public?

He seemed to spend his life travelling uphill, the nearly man who wore his heart on his sleeve. His tyre cruelly blew in the Adelaide decider in 1986 and then he was beaten to the title by Nelson Piquet in 1987, before finally triumphing in 1992 at the age of 39, abetted by a brilliant Adrian Newey-designed Williams.

At Ferrari, he was *Il Leone*. The defining image of his glory years was the crowds that spilled on to the tarmac at Silverstone to hail him: Mansell-mania in action.

#### **19 MARIO ANDRETTI**

HIS achievements on either side of the Atlantic were extraordinary. By the time he came to Europe, he was already the winner of the Indianapolis and Daytona 500s.

A man of charm and courtesy, but no little competitiveness, he was an emblem of the American dream. Born near Trieste early in World War Two, he spent seven years in a dispersed people's camp, making it to the USA in 1955. Superbly versatile, he won the 1978 world title with Lotus.

#### **18 NELSON PIQUET**

A MASTER at getting a team to work around him, he excelled under Bernie Ecclestone's leadership at Brabham, where he won two of his three world titles in collaboration with legendary chief designer Gordon Murray.

He moved to Williams, where he used his intelligence to get the better of Mansell, and called the Briton a blockhead with an ugly wife. The squabbling fell just short of fisticuffs.

#### **17 SIR JACK BRABHAM**

A RETICENT, sometimes truculent, character yet a royal of Australian sport.

Grandson of a cockney greengrocer who emigrated to Australia in 1885, Brabham remains the only man ever to win the world title for a team bearing his name. He was 40 at the time, claiming the third of his championships.

He died in 2014, the last champion from the 1950s to go.

#### **16 NICO ROSBERG**

HE will always be the man who beat Lewis Hamilton to the title in the same machinery. Never as gifted as his erstwhile friend, the cerebral German screwed himself to his task in 2016, having been clobbered by his Mercedes teammate for years. Who else would have shown the same powers

of resilience? He even stopped cycling in the summer break to lose one kilogram in leg muscle and credited his pole at Japan, by a hundredth of a second, to this.

He retired immediately after taking the championship, knowing a repeat was beyond him.

#### **15 JAMES HUNT**

THE great playboy once inspired a queue of BA stewardesses to form outside his bedroom door. Showing immense bravery he won the 1976 world championship driving on through blinding fantails of rain in Fuji in his title decider with Niki Lauda.

For a too-brief period, before his lifestyle distracted him, Hunt was the best on the grid. He died too young, 45 of a heart attack, taking with him a cavalier spirit but leaving behind an indelible mark.

#### **14 SEBASTIAN VETTEL**

A BRILLIANT front-runner. His glory days came at Red Bull, with his four titles in consecutive years from 2010. The blown diffuser era, the car sucked to the ground, best suited him. He made good use of it and Ferrari came calling with £50million a year.

Alas, his time in Italy did not deliver the prize he wanted. He might have won the title in quick red cars in 2017 and, more so, in

2018, but it seemed Hamilton may have got inside his head.

#### **13 GRAHAM HILL**

ONLY man to win the Triple Crown — Monaco, Le Mans and the Indianapolis 500.

A charismatic figure with his neatly trimmed moustache, he was one of the most well-known figures of the Swinging Sixties.

He won two titles and was 'Mr Monaco' for his five wins there. Some considered him overbearing. Stewart, however, told me he was the fairest man he ever met.

#### **12 NIKI LAUDA**

A HERO of sport, recognisable by the scars he suffered in the fire at the Nurburgring in 1976. So disfigured was he that skin was taken off his thigh to rebuild his face. Six weeks later he returned at Monza, his wounds weeping as he pulled on his balaclava.

A three-time world champion, he understood that success depended not only on his skills as a driver, but in making the team tick for him. Later, a decisive executive chairman of Mercedes during Hamilton's glory years. He died aged 70 of lung failure, a fighter finally consumed by the fire.

#### **11 ALBERTO ASCARI**

LIT the fire of Italian motorsport after World War Two. Ferrari's first world champion, in 1952, and again in 1953, many reckoned him faster than even Juan Manuel Fangio. Ascari crashed into the Monaco harbour in 1955 fighting for the lead and died a week later at Monza. Fangio said: 'I've lost my greatest opponent.'

#### **10 FERNANDO ALONSO**

DOES Alonso ever have an off day? He barely has an off session. He is unerringly consistent and enduringly brilliant.

He goes on at Aston Martin to his mid-40s, shifting perceptions of the possible in the modern era. Two world titles badly undersell him, and to think the last came nearly 20 years ago. One memory is his 2017 Indianapolis 500 debut. He drove like a god, all the American drivers looking up in awe. I

am convinced he would have won, but for his Honda engine blowing. A Dick Dastardly, he only has

near-misses to show for a championship-barren time at Ferrari.

### But what a racer. 9 JIM CLARK

MANY devoted fans of 'Jimmy', the modest Borders farmer, would rate him highest on any list.

His death at Hockenheim in an F2 race in 1968 rocked the foundations of the sport, for, like Ayrton Senna a generation later, he had seemed invulnerable, and so blisteringly fast his peers were cowed. His win in Belgium in 1963 in pouring rain stands compari-

son with anything in the annals.
Through an eight-mile course
past farmhouses, walls, pylons
and trees, he lapped the field.

#### 8 SIR JACKIE STEWART

AN extraordinary figure in the history of motor racing. In an age when death might be a corner away and drivers' faces were studies of terror as they prepared to race, Stewart shut this out and kept his head while all around him lost theirs. 'Mind management,' he called it.

He fought with typical doggedness for safety improvements, saying that if he let the matter rest he would have been a more popular champion, but perhaps a dead one. Later a grand prix winner as owner of his eponymous team, he is now an elder statesman. Who else could say the late Queen was guest of honour at his 80th birthday party?

#### **7 ALAIN PROST**

TO watch The Professor, as he was called, sashay from corner to corner with minimal steering input was to witness serene driving at the most rarefied level.

Stewart esteemed Prost as better than Senna, for being less brutal at the wheel and for driving within himself rather than on the edge. Ecclestone rated him the finest driver he ever saw until Max Verstappen came along.

He was denied his fourth title when Senna rammed into him in Suzuka in 1991, but was not to be denied while driving for Williams in 1993, aged 38.

6 SIR STIRLING MOSS
A NATIONAL treasure, and the

most famous sportsman in the world before Muhammad Ali started playing to global TV audiences. Never a world champion but he would have been had his abiding sense of sportsmanship not precluded it, when he campaigned for Mike Hawthorn to be

reinstated in Portugal in 1958.

The appeal was successful, and Hawthorn became the first Briton

to win the title. By a single point from Moss. What worth had titles after that? Would one have made him Hawthorn's equal? Ha. Or

two, twice as good? Laughable.
After Fangio's retirement in 1958 and his own career-ending shunt in 1962, Moss was the best F1 exponent in the world, as well as the best all-round driver full stop. He remained a byword for a certain English style all his long life.

#### **5 MAX VERSTAPPEN**

UNQUESTIONABLY the greatest driver of today. Yes, his Red Bull is dominant but so have

other cars been, yet nobody has made the advantage count so emphatically. Why did nobody else ever win 10 successive races?

He was born with the right genes: his mother Sophie Kumpen was a star karter; his father Jos has F1 pedigree. He was then reared by Jos's school-of-hardknocks, learning the nuts and bolts of karting. He is the perfect fusion of nature and nurture.

#### **4 MICHAEL SCHUMACHER**

SO good, he nearly killed the sport. After titles at Benetton, he drove Ferrari to their first championship for 21 years, the first of his five successively in red. A Maranello hero for ever.

He was loved by his team down to the last mechanic, despite a reputation for Teutonic cold. He fought his brother Ralf to win the 2003 San Marino Grand Prix only hours after their mother died.

Lightning quick, mould-breakingly fit, he gave no quarter. He could take this too far, famously punting Damon Hill and Jacques Villeneuve in title deciders.

And parking his car in Monaco in 2006 to scupper Alonso's final qualifying lap was a dark art.

#### 3 AYRTON SENNA

A FIGURE of myth, a legend augmented by his untimely death at Imola 30 years ago this month.

Many acclaim him as the greatest of all time, for there was his aura as well as his ability.

That combination, and a rivalry with Prost that defined both their careers, caused his home city of Sao Paulo to turn up in their millions to line the streets for his last earthly journey. Fiercely competitive, he conjured feats of brilliance that defied logic. His opening lap in the wet at Donington in 1993, from fifth to first, was mesmeric. Has there ever been a better lap?

Perhaps his in qualifying in Monaco in 1988, when he said he drove it as if not conscious.

#### **2 SIR LEWIS HAMILTON**

IF he had never driven in Formula One again after his debut season he would still rank impossibly high in any imaginary pantheon.

The opening seconds of his career in Melbourne were a harbinger of the wonders that were to come, as he passed Alonso, his world champion McLaren team-mate. He was on his way to his first of nine podiums in a row.

His showpiece victory came in the wet at Silverstone in 2008, when he finished one minute ahead, like an amphibian.

That he never made a professional foul is greatly to his credit.

Hamilton is a trailblazer and statistically the greatest of them

statistically the greatest of them all. A crowning title at Ferrari would make him so, if Verstappen doesn't press his own claims.

#### **1 JUAN MANUEL FANGIO**

THE Argentine has won more plaudits for the brilliance of his driving than anyone. Even Hamilton calls him the 'OG' — the Original Gangster. Stewart is sure he was the best and Moss considered him beyond comparison.

A five-time world champion in a record four teams, he has another testament to his greatness that will surely never be eclipsed: he won 24 times, almost modest by modern standards, but did so in just 51 grands prix. That is a 47 per cent strike rate. He remained feted all his life, a dignified figure elevated to the status of a man with no racing equal.

# Keane slams Erling's angry reaction to being subbed

ROY KEANE returned fire yesterday in his war of words with Erling Haaland, calling the Manchester City striker a 'spoilt brat'.
The former Manchester United captain

slammed Haaland for his angry reaction to being substituted against Wolves on Saturday, after the Norwegian was taken off having scored four goals.

Keane, speaking on Sky Sports, said: 'We saw Haaland brought off, not too happy, behaving like a spoilt brat. When asked if it was OK for Haaland to be annoyed at being substituted, Keane continued: 'No, no. No, it's not.'

In March, Keane — who had several runins with Haaland's father Alf-Inge during his playing days — described the Norwegian's general play as that of a League Two striker, which led to Haaland hitting back following City's win over Wolves. Haaland's response was short and to the point as he said: 'I don't really care that much about that man, so that's all right.'

Keane had previously said: 'The level of his general play is so poor. In front of goal he's the best in the world, but his general play for such a player... it is poor. He has to improve that. He's almost like a League Two player.'

United hope Carrington overhaul will cut injuries

MANCHESTER UNITED plan to carry out a major overhaul of Carrington this summer as Sir Jim Ratcliffe and his Ineos team attempt to transform the club's fortunes.

Mail Sport understands that substantial works are planned at the training ground, with the marginal gains fingerprints of sporting director Sir Dave Brailsford clear to see. At the centre of the multi-millionpound redevelopment will be a new 'pre-activation and player performance' zone. United have suffered with injuries for some time and the hope is that the new warm-up area will help lower the risk of players picking up knocks. The plans will also see a huge increase in the amount of natural light that pours into the building thanks to a series of giant new windows around the exterior, along with more modern, openplan office spaces. Such is the focus on providing an

optimum environment for the first team, the club's laundry operation will move to a new extension at a nearby building to ensure the attention within the walls is purely on football.

While officials have kept tight-lipped on costs, the budget for the project is thought to be in the multiple millions as Ratcliffe and his team use the off-season to accelerate change.

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

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#### O SALAH'S return to centre stage was welcome and the Egyptian King didn't let anyone down with a goal and two assists in a thrilling penultimate game at Anfield for Jurgen Klopp.

But having led 4-0 against shambolic opposition displaying the worst aspects of Ange-ball, it was Liverpool who then suffered late jitters by conceding twice and becoming anxious about the mother of all comebacks. The conclusion at full time was that both sets of entertainers have huge vulnerabilities that need to be fixed.

Nothing is yet mathematically certain but all the evidence was presented why Liverpool will not be this season's Premier League champions and Tottenham will not be in the Champions League.

Even so, the sight of Salah in full flow, determined to help give Klopp a deserving farewell, was the main takeaway for the thousands who created a fantastic atmosphere on the Kop. There was a sadness in seeing the two Liverpool titans at each other's throats a week ago at West Ham. Neither man deserves their relationship issues to overshadow the closing of a glorious era, and they won't.

Klopp had the maturity to reinstate Salah to his starting line-up. The player justified the decision from the opening minute, giving Spurs left back Emerson Royal the most torrid of his 100 Premier League appearances. It was almost merciful when Ange Postecoglou removed the defender on 61 minutes.

Spurs certainly showed character in the final half-hour but that doesn't gloss over the way in which they had earlier capitulated to a fourth consecutive defeat — their worst run since 2004. The obsession with playing out from the back, even when their defenders looked uncomfortable and Liverpool pressed like demons, got them into

repeated trouble. Goalkeeper Guglielmo Vicario remonstrated with his defenders after conceding a second goal on the stroke of halftime. Worse was to come when Cristian Romero MO SALAH'S nine

and Emerson clashed at the interval with the Argentine hard-man grabbing his teammate before Vicario separated them.

That 'clear the air' approach didn't have any immediate benefits.

Spurs allowed Liverpool to quickly score twice more and it was only the later arrival of Richarlison that genuinely altered the match flow.

'A hugely disappointing outcome. There probably is a lack of confidence,' conceded Postecoglou. His verdict on the public friction between his players? 'They care, there is absolutely nothing wrong with that.'

Klopp acknowledged his side's inconsistency within the 90 minutes. 'We were outstanding until we were not good,' he said.

Spurs had learned in the dressing room before kick-off of Aston Villa's defeat at Brighton but any hope it would give them a morale boost in their top-four race proved bogus. Instead, it was Liverpool inspired by Salah's presence.

Social media had blamed the player for his spat with Klopp but Anfield was clearly keen to move on and gave Salah's name an extra-loud cheer when it was read out before kick-off. He didn't take

doesn't have a mentality problem, despite blowing the opportunity to make a late push for fourth place after Aston Villa's defeat at Brighton had left the door open.



week for Aston Villa, with a shock home defeat by Olympiacos wounding their Europa Conference League bid and then this tired loss denting their hopes of qualifying for the Champions League.

Joao Pedro's late goal was the difference in the scoreline, but the difference in performances was stark, with Roberto De Zerbi's side fully deserving of victory.

The goal, scored on the rebound after Robin Olsen saved Pedro's initial effort from the penalty spot, was the first Brighton have managed since Danny Welbeck's strike at Anfield on March 31. This was their first win in seven games.

For Villa, victory would have all but assured their return to elite European competition for the first time in 42 years. But their place remains in doubt, although Tottenham's continued decline is helping the cause.

Boss Unai Emery made two changes to the team that lost 4-2 to the Greeks in their semi-final first leg, with Pau Torres and Diego Carlos returning to the starting line-up.

'We need fresh players,' said Emery, despite refusing to use injury or fatigue as an excuse for the performance. 'Against Arsenal a few weeks ago it was the same, more or less, and we won.'

Emery was still without injured keeper Emi Martinez so Olsen again deputised as the manager admitted 'it's not easy to replace the best goalkeeper in the world'.

Olsen, though, was Villa's best performer as they looked like that first leg defeat had taken it out of them.

It was Brighton, in particular Simon Adingra, who were the better performers. He had the game's first shot, cutting in off the left and shooting tamely at Olsen. Five minutes later, Adingra had a more powerful effort which Olsen beat away.

There were handfuls of empty seats at the normally full Amex, reflective perhaps of the Seagulls taking just two points from their last 18 available, a run which has seen their season peter out.

They again came close to taking the lead when Welbeck connected with Billy Gilmour's corner with his shoulder and the ball looped narrowly over.

The most entertaining sight of the half was Emery's gesturing as he relentlessly paced his technical area. He left the fourth official in no doubt about his thoughts on a challenge on Leon Bailey and also offered him his sweater in protest at Ollie Watkins not getting a freekick for a pull on his shirt.

Villa were dealt a blow when Morgan Rogers was forced off with an injury after 25 minutes, necessitating a reshuffle with Matty Cash on to replace him.

Watkins, or any Villa forward in fact, saw little of the ball in the first half, but the England striker



did have one beautiful touch to take him away from Lewis Dunk and into the Brighton penalty area before being dispossessed.

It was a game of few chances, but Brighton had a flurry of them just before the break.

First, Welbeck played in Adingra who collided with Olsen as the keeper raced from his line to gather the ball. Then the Ivory Coast winger latched on to a cross from Pedro, but failed to make a firm connection at the far post.

Adingra also picked out Pascal Gross, who looked to have got round Olsen before the keeper recovered well to save his shot.

Villa had more purpose after the break, but were again indebted to Olsen as he denied Pedro at point-blank range after Adingra had come infield from his left-wing berth to wreak havoc.

The chances were stacking up

and another came and went as substitute Julio Enciso fired over when well placed after John McGinn missed his clearance.

The Amex erupted when Gross touched in Igor Julio's cross at the near post, but it was disallowed after a lengthy VAR check for offside.

Then, 11 minutes from time, the same situation played out at the other end. Bailey blocked Adingra's attempted pass and the ball fell straight to McGinn, who slotted it in before VAR stood up the on-field decision of offside.

With the game into its final 10 minutes, Welbeck went close with a looping header from Enciso's cross before referee Robert Jones pointed to the spot after Ezri Konsa clipped Adingra's heels following a one-two with Pedro.

Pedro stepped up and saw his effort brilliantly saved by Olsen to

his right, but he reacted quickly to head in the rebound.

'We are suffering in the last two months, we are losing too many games and we have to accept it,' said De Zerbi, who conceded Villa had not been at their best.

'Since October we are playing without seven, eight, sometimes 10 players. We didn't show an amazing game in terms of quality, but we showed a big attitude.'

ROBERTO DE ZERBI admitted Brighton did not beat 'the true Aston Villa' after his side ended a miserable run with their first win in seven games. Joao Pedro's late goal, scoring from the rebound after his penalty had been saved by the excellent Robin Olsen, proved the difference, but the Seagulls were the better side throughout.

'To be honest, Villa were not themselves, maybe a little tired,' said the Italian. 'They are playing in the Europa Conference League and they have a lot of injuries. 'I am proud because we played a great game against one of the best teams in the Premier League. 'Playing against Unai Emery's teams is very tough. We played well, we deserved to win, we

could have scored more goals. I think Olsen was the best player for Villa.'

There is clearly a great deal of mutual admiration between De Zerbi and Emery and a symmetry in the narrative of their seasons. Both have thrown themselves full throttle into league and European

campaigns and suffered a string of injuries as a result.

While the best Brighton can now hope for is a top-half finish, a first-ever qualification for the Champions League remains in sight for Villa. 'Maybe, perhaps, but it's not an excuse for us,' said Emery when De

Zerbi's assessment of his team's fatigue was put to him.

> 'We lost and we didn't deserve more. We competed and we tried to stop them.

'They created more chances than us and they were dangerous. We needed the goalkeeper and he was here. Robin Olsen was fantastic.'

Emery now faces a trip to Greece on Thursday where they trail Olympiacos 4-2 after the first leg of their Europa Conference League semi-final.

'The most important thing now is rest,' he added. 'Thursday is more difficult for us against Olympiacos, but we will be there. We must try to recover players.'



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# We made it easy for Blues to run riot, rages Moyes

DAVID MOYES questioned his West Ham players' mental toughness after conceding five goals in consecutive away matches.

The Hammers, who were also thrashed 5-2 at Crystal Palace last month, folded meekly at Stamford Bridge and were 3-0 down by half-time.

'It's happened several times this season, which I've certainly not enjoyed,' said Moyes. 'Players not in their positions, running out of position, opening up too easily.

'We were lacking toughness, leadership, mental toughness. We've now had two away games where we've conceded five. 'The manager will always take the responsibility because that's what you do in this job, you have to prepare them and get them right, set them up. Somewhere along the line the players have to take responsibility for doing their jobs, being hard to play against, being aggressive and competitive. I question if we were all that in the first half.' Chelsea boss Mauricio Pochettino, meanwhile, hailed his 'intelligent' players for learning from past mistakes.

Pochettino was particularly pleased by the Blues' fourth goal, which saw Noni Madueke unselfishly set up team-mate Nicolas Jackson for a tap-in.

Madeuke and Jackson were involved in a heated row during Chelsea's 6-0 victory over Everton last month, with both players attempting to

take a penalty instead of designated taker Cole Palmer. Both were heavily criticised for their antics but Pochettino insisted yesterday's performance showed his young team has matured.

'The assist from Noni to Jackson, that showed that we learn, that we are smart,' Pochettino said. 'The situation with the penalty against Everton, we received many criticisms but a young team always needs to make mistakes to improve. We are able to improve because we are smart and intelligent people. I think today was a great (example) of how the group is starting to feel between them.


'This process always takes time. You never know if it's going to take one month, six months or a year. The most important thing is that they start to set the principles and feel and live like a group of players that are creating links to compete.

'That is the reality. I am so pleased because we (the staff) are part of this process, helping them to grow and be more mature and improve all aspects.

'It's only the first step, a massive step, but it is a step that we wanted to reach. From there, we can evolve in all the other aspects. 'Without principles, without things that we're starting to show, it's impossible to evolve other aspects.'

# Whisper it, but Chelsea

FTER so much incoherent mumbling, Chelsea are finally beginning to make a little sense.

Not enough to trust them, but sufficient for Mauricio Pochettino to articulate a strong case for continued employment beyond this summer.

As ever, any talk of revivals ought to be weighed against the calamities that have followed each of their new dawns in this strangest of campaigns. But there is also no doubt that Pochettino has orchestrated a reasonable upturn, with victory over Tottenham now followed by this exuberant demolition of another London rival.

In what was their fourth win in seven league games, Chelsea were excellent. There was no ambiguity around that and no suggestion either that this was a one-man effort. Unlike a number of their RIATH AL-SAMARRAI at Stamford Bridge







high points this season, Cole Palmer wasn't the sole agent of destruction.

Sure, he was brilliant, which extends further than his latest goal — the 21st of his wondrous campaign to go with nine assists — but here he had company. Here, the load was shared. Here, the quality rotated and sparkled. Whisper it

and then forget it, because less than a fortnight ago they were walloped 5-0 by Arsenal, but here they looked like a fine team.

Conor Gallagher was naturally among the best of them. Anyone within that boardroom who sees pure profit in his performances ought to be drummed out of west London — he is pure class and indispensable, a master of winning the ball back and one of the safest pairs of boots when they have it. His goal was extremely well taken.

Then you had Noni Madueke, delivering arguably his best showing of the season. He annihilated Emerson in the battle up Chelsea's right flank, which saw a scruffy goal scored and an unselfish assist provided for Nicolas Jackson, whose own season is mirroring that of his club.

This former lightning rod for Pochettino's difficulties impressed against Spurs and got two in this mauling, which increased the

momentum of Chelsea's belated push for European qualification.

Now this is the tricky part — how do you contextualise a hiding when the victim is so awfully poor as the side served up by David Moyes at Stamford Bridge? They were rotten. Spineless. Gutless.

For what he has brought to West Ham, we might fairly say that his tenure deserved a more spirited end, if these do indeed prove to be his final weeks at the club. In that conversation, he was let down by this performance. Shamed by the indifference of it. If Julen Lopetegui was watching, he might well have incurred a few reservations about the character of a squad that could draw with Liverpool and roll over so softly next time out.

This battering could be foretold almost immediately. Not necessarily through glaring opportunities but in the ease with which Chelsea regained possession and then retained it. West Ham's complicity in all that cannot be overstated—their midfield was dismally willing to be ransacked.

Inside four minutes we saw Moises Caicedo charging 30 yards or more unchallenged through the middle of the pitch.

Such freedoms presumably weren't in the plan, though in this case the move broke down on the edge of West Ham's area when Jackson fumbled his touch.

A moment later, Emerson was dragged out of position at left back and surrendered space for Gallagher to play a quick free-kick up the line to Jackson. Cutting in from the right, he went for the snapshot to the near post and Alphonse Areola saved, but those two warnings illustrated what each manager was working with.

The pay-off came just shy of the quarter-hour mark, though there was a degree of fortune in it for Chelsea, with Jackson meeting a cross from Madueke and crashing his volley against Kurt Zouma's thigh. The ball could have gone anywhere but it chose Palmer and the inevitable followed — a lovely, precise hit to the corner.

For the briefest of moments, West Ham summoned some resilience, with Jarrod Bowen heading against the bar almost immediately after the restart, but it was a shortlived fight. Both Jackson and Madueke were able to surge unimpeded through Moyes's midfield towards threatening outcomes before the second strike arrived in the 30th minute.

As with the first goal, there was some good fortune, and once more the luck went against Zouma. This time he blocked a Madueke volley and it was Gallagher who lashed in the loose ball.

Sensing a capitulation, Chelsea pushed for more and found it via Madueke. He had been left free by Tomas Soucek when Mykhailo Mudryk's corner passed overhead and was in the right spot to nudge over the line after Thiago Silva rerouted it back the other way. Watching a replay on his monitor, Moyes had a look of disgust carved into his face — set-piece errors always sting him more.

Both Gallagher and Bowen hit the opposing bars towards the end of the half, before Chelsea got the second going with another slap for their visitors. Better put, West Ham tripped themselves up.


Full marks to Trevoh Chalobah for the 50-yard through-ball that Madueke kindly squared for Jackson to tap in, but Emerson's tracking of the English winger off

the initial pass was shambolic. Jackson's second carried a higher tariff of difficulty, but he nailed the one-on-one with Areola after a ball up the middle from Caicedo.

Naturally, it started with a West Ham gaffe when Soucek mis-controlled, but Moyes was beyond gesticulating at this point. If there was any relief for him, it is that most of West Ham's fans had already gone home.



WITH Moyes set to depart West Ham this summer, one fan in the away end sacrificed a bedsheet to show his appreciation. 'Moysie,' read the banner. 'Thank you. Three years in Europe. Champions!' Though this is turning into a disastrous farewell tour, you hope that appreciation will be replicated in their last home game at the London Stadium against Luton this Saturday.

WHILE technical director Tim Steidten is no longer welcome in the West Ham changing room, Mauricio Pochettino is happy for owners Behdad Eghbali and Todd Boehly to pop in after a match. The only rule is they are not allowed to deliver unsolicited speeches to the group without Pochettino's permission, given the fallout from when Boehly branded their season 'embarrassing' after a home defeat by Brighton in April 2023.

NOT the greatest return to Chelsea for Kurt Zouma, inadvertently setting up Cole Palmer and Conor Gallagher for their goals when he tried to put in tackles.

GOOD news for Pochettino — after being unable to name a single senior outfielder on their substitutes' bench against Tottenham, Chelsea had Christopher Nkunku, Levi Colwill, Malo Gusto, Raheem Sterling and Axel Disasi back as options for this clash.

Nuno signed a two-and-ahalf-year deal and is the highest-paid manager in the history of the club, but his position will be reviewed at the end of the season. Whoever is in charge may have to manage a weakened squad. As Forest try to

stay within the spending rules limits, star defender Murillo is likely to be sold and they may listen to offers for Morgan Gibbs-White.

There will definitely be an overhaul of the playing squad at Sheffield United. Having led the Blades to the Premier League in 2019, Chris Wilder knows what it takes to escape the Championship but doubts the mentality of some of his current players. There are a few gems, and midfielder **Gustavo Hamer will surely** have offers to stay in the top division, but most of the Blades squad are of Championship standard.

# Gunners left to pray

■ EARLY nine months have passed since Mikel Arteta made that bizarre argument

regarding his goalkeepers.
They are interchangeable, just like any other position, was the rationale given after David Raya had usurped Aaron Ramsdale for Arsenal's 1-0 victory over Everton in September.

It was put to him that it was a highly unusual strategy. 'That's strange?' he asked in reply. 'Why? Why not? We have all the qualities in another goalkeeper to do something when something is happening and you want to change momentum. Do it.'

Sure enough, those words now seem like they were misleading, a smokescreen. Or maybe Raya has just been so good that the thought of rotation has gone out of Arteta's mind.

Because 15 clean sheets later, Raya has secured the Golden Glove — the award for the most clean sheets kept by a keeper in a

Raya is not perfect but Arteta has stuck with him. The Spanish goalkeeper can make mistakes, he can be vulnerable. Last weekend against Tottenham he passed the ball straight to Spurs' Cristian Romero, who scored, leaving Arsenal to navigate what became a nervous last half-hour.

Or there was Mykhailo Mudryk's goal for Chelsea in October when Raya was caught off his line, or his display against Luton in December when he made two

gaffes — Ross Barkley's tame effort crept under him and he flapped at a cross which allowed Elijah Adebayo to head the ball home. But Raya has bounced back each time, with the added pressure of knowing Ramsdale is raring to go if given the chance.

City slip up either next Saturday at Fulham or at Spurs the following week before they host West Ham on the final day.

'It's a huge success for the team in this league to achieve that with a few games to go still,' Arteta added. 'It gives us a

huge foundation to be closer to winning trophies. The contribution from everybody, including David obviously, it's really good.

While Raya does have vulnerabilities, his strengths outweigh them. His handling of crosses is one of them. He has collected the highest percentage of crosses swung into the penalty area in the league. He is only six feet tall but what he lacks in height, Raya makes up for in athleticism and anticipation.

Often prior to the cross arriving he is already way off his line to collect the ball before it reaches an attacker. His method is laced with jeopardy but gives Raya the chance to utilise his other main strength: ball distribution.

A number of times this season, the 28-year-old has collected a cross and launched it forward with a monstrous throw or pin-point kick downfield to set Bukayo Saka or Leandro Trossard free down the flanks — leaving the opposition scurrying back in panic.

Ramsdale will in all likelihood move on in the summer. He knows that rotation will never happen. And Arsenal will make Raya's loan move from Brentford permanent with a handshake — presumably with the Spaniard wearing that new Golden Glove.

VINCENT KOMPANY spoke defiantly about taking Burnley's fate to the final game of the season but in reality their relegation could be sealed in the next 48 hours.

The result of Nottingham Forest's appeal against their four-point deduction for breaching the Premier League's spending rules is due tomorrow and if successful they could get two points back. That would mean the Clarets already five points adrift of 17th-placed Forest with two games to play — are doomed before their trip to Tottenham on Saturday. But Kompany will not allow that prospect to distract his focus before a game that he describes as the 'final'. Even if Forest don't get any points back, Burnley will go down if they fail to beat Spurs — regardless of the outcome in their last fixture against Forest at Turf Moor. After

a chastening home defeat by Newcastle, Kompany said: 'We have to look at Spurs as the final game of the season now. If we win and the other teams around us lose then all of a sudden we get the "bonus" of a last game against Forest and we have a different discussion. That's how we have to look at it.' The defeat summed up Burnley's season. If they had capitalised on a flying start it might have been different. Jacob Bruun Larsen had an early chance saved by Martin Dubravka while Lorenz Assignon had legitimate appeals for a penalty rejected by referee Anthony Taylor after he had been bundled over by Bruno Guimaraes. But once Callum

Wilson put Newcastle ahead from their first attack in the 19th minute, Eddie Howe's Europa League-chasing team took control. Sean Longstaff and Guimaraes produced clinical finishes to give them a 3-0 lead at the break. And, moments after seeing his penalty saved by Arijanet Muric, Alexander Isak made amends by scoring the fourth to become the first Newcastle player since Alan Shearer in 2003-04 to notch 20 Premier League goals in a season. By the time Dara O'Shea scored an 86th-minute consolation, many Burnley fans had left for home, already resigned to a quick return to the Championship next season. Kompany's job is safe, however. Burnley's American owners have long since made it clear he will be given the chance to bring a young and inexperienced squad back up.



WILL FERRELL is the latest celebrity to invest in Leeds United with the Hollywood actor purchasing a stake in 49ers Enterprises, who bought the club last summer.

Ferrell, best-known for his roles in Anchorman, Elf and Zoolander, joins fellow actor Russell Crowe, swimmer Michael Phelps and golfers Jordan Spieth and Justin Thomas as a minority investor at Elland Road. The 56-year-old will not be involved in decision-making at Leeds, with the day-to-day running still in the hands of the San Francisco-based ownership group. 49ers Enterprises is the strategic arm of the NFL team San Francisco 49ers.

Ferrell is also a part-owner of MLS side Los Angeles FC. Last year, he attended a game at Wrexham, who are co-owned by actors Ryan Reynolds and Rob McElhenney and a few days later, he was at Anfield for the Merseyside derby.

It has been a season of contrasting fortunes for celebrity investors, with Wrexham going up to League One but Birmingham, backed by NFL legend Tom Brady, relegated from the Championship. Leeds finished third in the Championship and will face Norwich in the first leg of the play-off semi-finals on Sunday as they bid to return to the Premier League.




ANCHESTER United were dealt yet another injury blow yesterday after Harry Maguire suffered a muscle injury in training and was ruled out for about three weeks.

Meanwhile, United will look to sell Jadon Sancho this summer following face-to-face talks with the outcast in Germany.

Ten Hag revealed that a delegation - believed to be chief transfer negotiator Matt Hargreaves and former football director John Murtough - met with Sancho during his loan spell at Borussia Dortmund.

Ten Hag said last week that Sancho's improved form in Germany 'shows he represents a high value for United'. As well as helping to raise the player's price tag, it is understood that Dortmund's progress to the brink of the Champions League final has also triggered significant bonuses in his loan deal.

'We are close in that process,' said Ten Hag, who hasn't had any direct contact with Sancho. 'We had a visit with him and we'll keep going with this process. We'll continually be in contact and communicate with him.'

It's still possible the situation could change, particularly if Ten Hag is sacked, but United are looking to recoup as much as possible of the £73million fee paid to Dortmund in 2021, when they signed the former Manchester City player on five-year deal worth £250,000 a week.

# Bromley complete amazing journey from Britain's worst team to Wembley glory boys

ROMLEY were once so bad they inspired a feature film. It was based on a delightful book by Dave Roberts called The Bromley Boys: The True Story of Supporting the Worst Team in Britain.

Published in 2008, the story revolves around the campaign of 1969-70, when they were relegated from the Isthmian League and the simple charms of following a club generally mired in misery, flirting with extinction as crowds dipped under a hundred, while growing up.

Yesterday, Bromley beat Solihull Moors on penalties in front of more than 23,000 at Wembley Stadium to secure promotion from the National League and next season they will compete in the EFL for the first time in their 132-year history.

'Bromley will bring the freshness of a club with a burning desire to kick on,' said manager Andy Woodman. 'There's a stadium taking shape and plans in place. Work will start on the pitch. I think it will be refreshing.

'You can see the crowd, what it means to them. I'm delighted for everybody connected to the club. It will be a massive lift for the town. We've had some tough days and more than anything it's a relief to get out of this league.'

Bromley is London's biggest borough in terms of area with a population of 335,000, so there is no reason why they should not

YOUR right-hand opponent deals and, at Love All, opens 1♠. What would you bid?

READERS have asked for some guiding rules about interference bids, so this week I will deal with at least a part of this vast subject.

The first thing to remember is that it is only the opening bidder who has to have in the region of 13 points — an intervening bidder can bid on significantly less. Also, it is important to make the right bid, to describe your hand to your partner as accurately as possible. On the hand above, you have a good quality 13 points (14 if you count tens) and would certainly open — best would be one (weak) No Trump. But over an opening bid, there is nothing sensible you can bid. You have no biddable suit except opener's spades; you are not strong enough for an intervening No Trump; and you can't double, as partner would understand this as being for take-out. One of the hardest bids in bridge to learn is No Bid — use it now.
