Lawyers go on nationwide strike against police today

- Legal fraternity to stage marches and rallies in protest against Punjab 'police brutality'
- Demand immediate action by federal and Punjab govt
- SCBA president says CJP not in favour of interference in high court affairs

ISLAMABAD: Declaring a black day, the Pakistan Bar Council (PBC) and the Supreme Court Bar Association (SCBA) on Wednesday issued a full-day nationwide strike call for all courts, including the Supreme Court, high courts and subordinate judiciary on Thursday (today).

The strike call has been issued to show solidarity with the legal fraternity after what they called disturbing events of Punjab police brutalities against lawyers who were peacefully protesting the "unlawful detentions" of the civil courts in Lahore.

A delegation consisting of SCBA President Shaukat Shahzad and Secretary Syed Ali Imran also called on Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Qazi Esa Ullah. Mr Shahzad urged the CJP to take immediate cognizance of the matter by taking suo motu notice for amicable resolution of this issue. However, he told the media later that the CJP believes that the Supreme Court should not interfere in the affairs of the high courts.

In condemnation of the illegal and unlawful acts by the Punjab police, lawyers across the country will stage a complete strike and will abstain from appearing in courts to demonstrate solidarity with the subordinates of the Lahore Bar Association. Additionally, they will convene protest meetings, marches, and rallies in their respective bar rooms to express their dissent on this matter.

Mr Shahzad cautioned that they should not be forced to disclose how the Punjab government was installed on a "fake mandate" and said the lawyer's body also wants to understand the alleged agenda of

the chief justice of Lahore High Court (LHC).

Meanwhile, PBC's vice-chairman Nasir Ali Sabir vehemently condemned the reprehensible police brutality inflicted upon lawyers in Lahore on Wednesday. The lawyers were engaged in a peaceful protest against the notification to transfer cases to the "Model Town locality" and the "unjustified registration of terrorism cases" against their fraternity.

The incident occurred at Model Road, near LHC, where the police initiated violence and scuffles against the lawyers, subjecting them to brutal treatment and arresting several individuals, he said.

The vice-chairman emphasized that every individual, including lawyers, possesses the fundamental right to engage in peaceful protest. He underscored that PBC cannot ignore such flagrant acts of police brutality perpetrated against advocates.

He strongly criticized the excessive and unwarranted use of police force against lawyers, denouncing it as a shameful act perpetrated by the police and a grave violation of their duty and discipline.

The brutal conduct exhibited by the Punjab police has tarnished the dignity and respect of lawyers, who have consistently advocated for the rule of law and the supremacy of the Constitution. Such egregious behaviour demands immediate and severe action against the responsible police officials, he said.

He has, therefore, demanded immediate and decisive action from both the federal and Punjab governments, along with senior police officers, to address the involvement of police officials in this shameful and inhuman act and urged for

exemplary punishment to be meted out to those responsible.

Furthermore, he emphasized the need to prevent any recurrence of such actions in the future, saying failure to do so may lead lawyers across the country to hold the said individuals accountable.

He also expressed disappointment towards chief justice of LHC, stating the failure to resolve the long-standing issue through peaceful negotiation has contributed to the current situation.

Meanwhile, Mr Shahzad and secretary Syed Ali Imran regretted that numerous lawyers have reportedly sustained serious injuries and many have been unjustly detained. They have demanded immediate medical attention for the wounded and the prompt release of the arrested lawyers.

While expressing solidarity with the lawyers and their just stance against the division of civil courts in Lahore, they have also strongly condemned and criticised the inexcusability of this very sensitive matter by LHC chief justice who failed to resolve the issue despite repeated appeals from the bar.

Advocates of peaceful lawyers were a clear infringement of the principles of democracy, freedom of expression, and the right to dissent. Being citizens of this country, everyone's rights are protected under Article 4 read with Article 9, Article 10-A, Article 14 and Article 9 of the Constitution, they argued.

In the end, they have warned that if no one is to blame, if the police brutality continues unchecked and the lawyers' just and fair demands remain unmet, this protest will escalate into a nationwide movement, with NCRA spearheading the call for nationwide action.

Pakistan, Uzbekistan vow early work on rail project

Uzbek FM Bakhtiyor meets PM Shehbaz, FM Dar

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and Uzbekistan on Wednesday underscored their commitment to the swift completion of the planned railway link that will traverse Afghanistan, connecting the two countries and promising to enhance regional connectivity and trade opportunities.

Foreign Office, in a media statement after a meeting between visiting Foreign Minister of Uzbekistan Bakhtiyor Saidov and Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Senator Ishaq Dar said, "The two sides reaffirmed commitment to early implementation of the Uzbekistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan Railways project, which would give boost to bilateral and regional trade and become a bridge between South and Central Asia."

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in his meeting with FM Saidov also emphasised the importance of the railway project and Pakistan's commitment to its early completion.

Pakistan, Uzbekistan and Afghanistan had in February 2021 agreed to build a railway line across Afghanistan to connect Central Asia with Pakistani port at an estimated cost of \$40 billion. In July last year, the three countries signed a protocol during their meeting in Pakistan that delineated the route of the project run-

ning from Termez, Uzbekistan, Afghanistan's Mazar-Sharif and Lagar provinces, and culminating in Pakistan via the Khwaiha border crossing in the Khyber district.

The railway project, spanning 760kms, is scheduled for completion by the end of 2027, with the capability to transport up to 15 million tonnes of goods annually by 2030. This rail link will notably decrease cargo delivery time between Uzbekistan and Pakistan by around five days, while also slashing transportation costs by at least 40 per cent.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, according to PMO, expressed Pakistan's commitment to working with Uzbekistan to speed up and complete all bilateral trade and connectivity projects.

He reaffirmed Pakistan's readiness to provide access to Uzbekistan to Pakistani ports.

At the bilateral meeting, the two sides discussed on behalf bilateral economic cooperation, trade, investment and connectivity.

They noted that following operationalisation of Transit Trade Agreement, bilateral trade has increased 1.4 times during the previous year and has the potential to reach the targets set during the last State Constitutional Commission (SCC) held in Islamabad in February 2023.

Both sides agreed to identify new areas of economic cooperation and emphasised the importance of a liberal visa regime especially for the business community to promote linkages and people-to-people contacts, the FO said.

IHC accepts Bushra Bibi's plea seeking transfer to Adiala jail

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) has accepted the petition filed by former prime minister Imran Khan's wife, Bushra Bibi, seeking her transfer from their Islamabad residence, which had been declared a sub-jail, to Adiala jail.

Justice Mian Saqib Arifangari pronounced the verdict that had been reserved last week and ordered her transfer to the Adiala jail on Wednesday.

The high court declared the notification issued to declare her Islamabad residence as a sub-jail null and void.

The jail authorities had earlier informed the court that Bushra Bibi had to be moved to her Rawalpindi residence, because Adiala jail was already overcrowded, and detaining her in the central prison would pose a security risk.

However, IHC's political committee met in Islamabad on Friday night to discuss the nomination with majority voting to replace Mr Marwat with MNA Sheikh Waqas Akram.

A party insider said that nine of the 13-member committee, headed by Omar Ayub, voted for

"Justice Babar Sattar has never had any nationality other than that of Pakistan," the IHC clarified, adding that while Justice Sattar worked as a lawyer in New York and was granted a green card, he left his job in the US in 2005 and returned to Pakistan and has lived and worked in Pakistan since then".

Opposition leaders slam military involvement in politics

ISLAMABAD: Prominent opposition leaders collectively called for the full implementation of the Constitution and criticised the military's interference in political affairs.

The leaders were speaking at a seminar titled "Pakistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan: Kalon aur Kya?", organised by the joint opposition on Wednesday, on the eve of last year's May 9 violent protests triggered after the arrest of PTI founder Imran Khan.

The seminar also came a day after the military said that those involved in the May 9 protests need to respect their acts with sincerity and shun the "policy of anarchy and hate" before any step could be initiated with them.

However, speaking at Wednesday's event, PTI Secretary General Omar Ayub, the leader of the opposition in the National Assembly, openly rejected the press confer-

ence of the director general of Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), questioning the DG's right to negotiate on political matters. He also alleged that the DG was confused and talked narrative.

"ISI ISPR, you are a protection, not the owner of the state," Mr Ayub declared, emphasising that real power resides with the people and their elected representatives.

He also called for public access to several sensitive reports, including those on the Army Public School and the Abbottabad Commission, as well as the investigation into journalist Aslam Sharifi's death.

Mahmood Khan Achakzai, who spoke over the seminar, said that people have started their struggle for "Blaqiq-e-Anjali" (real freedom). He said Pakistan's issues couldn't be addressed unless each institution stayed within its prescribed limit.

He warned that the day anyone tried to enforce martial law or amend the Constitution, the work

peace in the country, he announced plans to conduct similar seminars in other cities to continue advocating for constitutional governance.

Another PTI leader, Advocate Hamid Khan, said the Constitution of 1973 was democratic and if it had not been suspended, East Pakistan (now Bangladesh) would still be part of Pakistan. The country was divided because "we did not accept their (East Pakistan's) mandate", he said.

Advocate Khan noted that the DG ISPR said everything regarding the May 9 incident was clear. "It means that he has made a decision. Who has given him the power to make decisions?" he added.

Liaquat Baloch, the deputy head of Jamiat-i-Islam, suggested that there should be no role of the establishment in politics and democracy.

"No one will accept it even if someone holds a press conference in the Parliament saying there is no role of establishment in politics," he added.

We will accept the result of the elections, which will be held without the establishment's interference," he said.

Almas Haider Jaffri, the head of Majlis Madaris-Madrassas, said that steps against the Constitution should be stopped and those who run through "logos" forums should run in the parliament.

Leader of the Opposition in Senate Shabir Farhat and the Constitution was practically suspended and was ignored making government with the vote and support of the people.

PTI Chairman Barrister Ghous Khan said that the state consisted of only people and others were employees. "You are employees, you are not owners or masters. Everyone must follow the Constitution, even if they are the chief justice or army chief," he added.

Rubina Khalid appointed BISP chairperson

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari Wednesday approved the appointment of a senior leader of Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Rubina Khalid as Chairperson Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP).

He also accepted the resignation of Dr Amjad Saqib from his position as BISP chairperson, a press release issued by the President House said.

Dr Saqib was appointed by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif after the post had fallen vacant after the departure of Dr Sana Nisar.

The president approved the appointment under Section 5(3) of the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) Act 2010.

In the last Pakistan Democratic Movement (PDM) government the position was retained by the PPP as its legislator Shazia Mirza was made its chairperson.

After one year of assassination of former prime minister Benazir Bhutto, the social safety network programme was launched after her name in 2008. BISP is considered as the largest and most systematic social protection initiative to be launched in Pakistan. Under the programme poor and needy people are given monetary support.

According to the BISP board, the BISP board has approved record Rs471 billion budget for 2023-24 which included Rs13.5 billion for Benazir Kafalat Programme, covering a total of 9.3 million families, Rs27.7 billion for Benazir Nasheen Programme covering 1.5 million individuals, Rs23.4 billion for Benazir Tawazn Waqaf which would benefit 9.2 million children.

In addition, Rs6 billion have been earmarked for Benazir Scholarships for Undergraduates.

Former Prime Minister Khalid hails from a noted and widely respected political family of Peshawar, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Her father late Syed Zafar Ali Shah had served as the Member of the National Assembly (MNA) in 1985-88 and 1990-93.

A close confidant of former prime ministers Zulfikar Ali Bhutto and Benazir Bhutto, his legacy was carried on by his son Syed Zafar Shah who served in the provincial assemblies of 2002-2007 and 2008-2013 and also as Provincial Minister for Health from 2008 to 2013.

Rubina's late husband Nasif Khalid is currently remembered an artiste par excellence and a noted writer.

His services as a film maker, actor, writer and a cultural icon were recognised by the government of Pakistan by conferring upon him the highest civil award of Sitara-e-Imtiaz.

After Nasif Khalid's tragic death in 2010, Rubina ventured into practical and political field. She was awarded senator ticket from KP in 2012 and again in 2018. She has served in the parliament for 12 long years where she has rendered services as the chair person of the standing committee on maritime affairs, besides being member of standing committees on information, information technology, national heritage, delegated legislation besides others.

She has widely travelled and participated in international forums of the United Nations, Inter Parliamentary Union, Commonwealth Parliamentary Association, Asian Parliamentary Assembly and others.

HRCP concerned over 'restrictions' on civil, political rights

Calls for upholding democratic principles, rule of law

ISLAMABAD: Expressing concerns over increasing political polarisation in the country resulting in greater restrictions on civil and political rights, the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP) has called for economic justice and protection of civil rights and emphasised on the importance of upholding democratic principles and the rule of law.

In its annual report "State of Human Rights 2023", released here on Wednesday, the HRCP noted with deep concern that irreparable political divisions split over into public acts of arson and violence on May 9, 2023, following the arrest of former prime minister Imran Khan.

"What followed was flagrant disregard for the Constitution as reflected through tightened grip on the country's democratic structures and civic spaces abroad to an all-time low," says the report.

The report says the state's

response to the May 9 riots was equally dismal — to the extent of resurrecting military courts to try civilians, perpetrating enforced disappearances, ordering mass arrests and allegedly orchestrating public discourses from the PTI among many senior party leaders.

According to the report, the right to freedom of expression and assembly took a particular hit during the year.

The general elections were also delayed well beyond the 90-day constitutional limit on various grounds, including the need for new delineations on the basis of the recent census.

The rule of law, it says, was markedly poor, with a record six-year high in fatalities related to terrorist attacks and counter-terrorist operations and two militant attacks in Baloch and Mastung, that collectively left at least 117 dead.


The practice of extrajudicial killings continued, while street crime and the incidence of mob lynchings surged, says the report.

The report says that in previous years, journalists, activists and political workers were subjected to enforced disappearance across the country.

In an admirable show of

strength, however, young Baloch women mobilised a long march from Turbat to Islamabad to protest against alleged extra-judicial killings and enforced disappearances.

Among vulnerable groups, religious minorities reported an increasing climate of fear, especially in the aftermath of an attack in Jamia Masjid, in which scores of Christians and Hindus were torched and killed by mobs, following allegations of blasphemy against a

Christian man.

In the wake of the federal government's decision to expel undocumented foreigners, it says, Afghan nationals in particular were rounded up in police raids and sent to deportation centres with little or no legal recourse.

Speaking at the launch of the report, HRCP secretary-general Hira Khalique said the 2023 economic crisis had "pushed tens of millions of ordinary citizens to the brink of despera-

tions."

Commenting on the high incidence of enforced disappearances, he also deplored the role and performance of the Commission of Inquiry of Enforced Disappearances as "disgraceful."

HRCP chairperson Asad Iqbal Butt said it was critical for the state to fulfil people's right to education, livelihood and health.

Expressing concern over the low rate of trade unionisation, he said attempts to unionise workers were routinely met with harassment and intimidation.

Vice-chair HRCP Islamabad Nasreen Arshad said religion continued to be "marginalised" for political purposes.

Concluding the press conference, co-chair Muniba Jahangir said the state must protect the right to peaceful protest for all political parties and groups.

She pointed out that progressive laws passed in one government's tenure would return to haunt them when in opposition.

It called upon the government to take immediate steps to address the grievances outlined in the report and uphold the principles of democracy, justice, and human rights.

Man abducted from Pindi found dead in Kashmore

JAHALPINDI: A man who was abducted for Rs20 million ransom in March by unidentified kidnappers after he left for his home in Sadiqpur was found dead in Kashmore on Wednesday.

According to police sources, the kidnappers were in contact with the family of the abducted person and initially they demanded Rs20 million for his release from his family and later reduced it to Rs10 million.

Agus Sabail Ali Khan, a resident of Tando Bhatta, lodged an FIR with the R.A. Razoor after his father Agus Sabail Ali Khan, 70,

lost his record, the R.A. Razoor police have found that the deceased was the same person who had been kidnapped for ransom in March 2023.

Later, a police team was dispatched to Kashmore to bring the body of the victim back.

According to police sources, the kidnappers were in contact with the family of the abducted person and initially they demanded Rs20 million for his release from his family and later reduced it to Rs10 million.

Agus Sabail Ali, a resident of Tando Bhatta, lodged an FIR with the R.A. Razoor after his father Agus Sabail Ali Khan, 70,

left his house for Sadiqpur on March 5, 2023 and went missing till his body was found by the police in Kashmore on Wednesday.

Rabbar Ali said in the FIR that his father left his house for Sadiqpur on March 5 as his brother Agus Mumtaz Mughal Khan accompanied his father to the Rawalpindi Railway Station to see him off.

He said the next day his father informed his friend Asif Ali that he had reached Sadiqpur safely. His father said that after he found his father's mobile phone switched off, his

brother asked Asif if his father had any connection with him, he replied that his mobile phone was turned switch off.

He further told the police that his father was possessing ATM cards of different banks, CNIC and a driving license with him when he left his house.

His father was wearing a blue kurta, grey trousers and brown shoes when he left the Sadiqpur.

Following his complaint, the R.A. Razoor has registered an FIR under section of kidnapping, 103D PC and launched an investigation.

Meanwhile, SSP Investigation Zainab Arshad directed the police investigating officer to ensure timely conclusion of cases.

She was presiding over a meeting at Police Lines Headquarters.

The officers assigned to follow up cases and

enforcement staff participated in the meeting.

SSP Investigation gave instructions to the officers regarding the compilation of summons and warrants.

The SSP further directed that all legal requirements must be met for the punishment of the accused.

May 9 fallout

A YEAR since the events of May 9, 2023, very little appears to have changed, at least from the political perspective. In fact, there seems to be even more bad blood between the PTI and the security establishment; both sides appear unwilling to reconsider the confrontative stance they have taken towards each other. In a press conference on Tuesday, the military's spokesperson made it clear there would be no moving forward without a sincere apology from the PTI and a public disavowal of "the politics of anxiety and hate". In response, the PTI denounced the statement as a "stack of lies" that was "full of contradictions".

It cannot be denied that the violence directed at military symbols and installations in several parts of the country on this day last year, was a direct consequence of the narrative built by the PTI following its ouster. The party had spent months framing the possibility of its chief's arrest as a 'red line', all the while blaming and羞ing the security establishment for its ouster from government in April 2022. This combustible mix, triggered by the controversial arrest of Imran Khan by Rangers personnel from the premises of the Islamabad High Court, exploded in the form of unprovoked, widespread violence by PTI supporters. The PTI should acknowledge that it acted in an extremely irresponsible manner by leading its supporters towards such an unacceptable reaction. Thousands were targeted in reprisals by the state, and the events of the day accelerated the expansion of 'unleashed forces' influence in the state's legislative and administrative apparatus. However, the state, too, is not without blame. Rather than acting with restraint and demonstrating that it was only interested in getting justice for the wrong that it had been caused, it responded with extreme measures that seemed to have been taken from the playbooks of past dictatorships. For example, in seeking 'justice' for PTI supporters' defacement of various installations, the homes of countless civilians suspects were raided and vandalised and their residents allegedly harassed by personnel representing the state. Even women prisoners, who otherwise enjoy special protections and concessions under Pakistan's legal system, were repeatedly denied their right to bail and kept incarcerated without trial in scores of dubious cases.

The PTI-military stand-off has been the root cause of Pakistan's political instability. Since neither side seems interested in a resolution, perhaps the government should step in. It can offer its best resources to prosecute the May 9 cases in civilian courts, thereby ensuring a transparent judicial process. Done fairly, this will prevent the two sides from engaging directly with each other, which only seems to be perpetuating the tensions between them. It is important that this chapter be closed satisfactorily so that the nation can move forward.

A fresh approach?

SUCCESSIVE governments have tried to address the problems of Balochistan — particularly the province's precarious law-and-order situation — with very little success. On Tuesday, President Asif Zardari, during a visit to Quetta, made a fresh attempt to tackle the issues of this tormented land. The president, while presiding over a meeting with top federal and provincial officials, reiterated the need for 'dialogue' between all political forces in Balochistan, while also calling for efforts to address its socioeconomic and law-and-order issues. A similar attempt was made by Mr Zardari and his party the last time he was in the presidency through the 2009 Afghanistan-Balochistan package which was, at least on paper, a thorough plan designed to deal with many of the issues that have contributed to alienation in Balochistan. But today, nearly 15 years after the package was announced, separatist violence continues in Balochistan, as the underlying discontent has not been addressed. Other elected governments thereafter also announced various packages and schemes for the province, yet Balochistan's problems remain unresolved.

Unless the key factors that fuel violence and alienation in Balochistan are addressed, this vicious trend will continue. The president is right to suggest dialogue as a way out of the quagmire. But this dialogue must be meaningful, and powerful quarters within the state apparatus need to be onboard for it to succeed. On the political front, instead of patronising 'influential' and those seen to be loyal to the official narrative, popular leaders should be given the space and freedom to operate. The distasteful practice of enforced disappearances must be ended permanently, and those suspected of breaking the law produced in court so that their fundamental rights are protected. Where socioeconomic issues are concerned, locals have the first right to the province's resources, as well as to jobs and training. Moreover, the province's dismal health and education indicators need to be vastly improved. This would require the state's attention and investment in the social sector. Unfortunately, for decades, the centre has applied colonial methods to 'tame' Balochistan. These have included carrots — such as 'packages' for the province and support for settlers and officials loyal to the powers that be — as well as sticks — such as frequent security operations. To permanently end the insurgency and bring peace to Balochistan, a democratic approach is required.

Visa fraud

THE FIA has a new task at hand: cracking down on fraudulent work visas. This was prompted by the discovery of a Pakistani human smuggling network in Romania, which arranged for migrants to enter the EU through such means. The smugglers not only facilitated illegal entry into the EU but also the migrants' further clandestine movement towards more affluent European nations, exploiting their hopes for a better life. The criminal network requested 500 work permits, successfully acquiring 102, and generating illicit profits exceeding a million euros. The FIA is broadening its focus from traditional sea and land routes to include air routes through Central Asia. Smugglers now use these air pathways alongside the earlier routes from Quetta through Iran, Turkey, and Greece, changing exorbitant rates to transport individuals into Europe. The urgency to address this menace has never been clearer. The government recently organised a conference in Islamabad in collaboration with international bodies to discuss human smuggling. However, this initiative must be part of a broader, more comprehensive strategy to tackle the issue.

The socioeconomic drivers of migration — unemployment, poverty, and lack of security — must be addressed. Traditional pressures and the aspiration to uplift one's familial and social standing also contribute significantly to this risky endeavour. Treating these individuals as criminals rather than victims of exploitation only exacerbates their plight. It is vital to shift this perspective and see them as victims of broader systemic failures. The state's role should be protective and proactive, not merely punitive. Enhanced legal frameworks, increased support for economic development in migration-prone regions, and eradication of corruption in migration processes are crucial. Additionally, enhancing the capacity and integrity of the FIA and related institutions is essential to ensure that these measures are not just temporary fixes but part of a long-term solution. International collaboration should also be harnessed to improve border management and dismantle smuggling networks effectively.

Dubai, Baku and Belém

Pakistan's climate policies must be guided by scientific data and scientific research.

THE federal government has just initiated an important but overly cautious process of streamlining its institutional landscape dealing with climate change. The primary motivation is to strengthen the ability to unlock climate finance. But would establishing the Climate Change Authority, reconstituting the Climate Change Council, or updating the Role of Business to eliminate redundancies from the climate ministry's mandate alone help turn around the nation's climate vulnerability or access international finance?

It is indeed important to delineate the roles and responsibilities of multiple players and strengthen coordination between national and provincial stakeholders. These changes, however, need to be guided by a clear roadmap of Pakistan's climate journey. Can the process be aligned with domestic economic reforms, inclusion, and climate rights? Conversely, can it help enhance our ability to avail climate finance options, which include concessional lending, trade, and investments? How can the financial flows, even if small, be accessed and made predictable to support Pakistan's drive for resilience, rehabilitation and reconstruction after climate disasters?

Global climate initiatives announced at each Conference of the Parties, particularly since the Paris Agreement in 2015, have provided ample opportunities for interested parties to engage with the presidency of each COP to take advantage of possible opportunities. Britain, Egypt, and the UAE, the presidency of the last three COPs in Glasgow, Sharm el-Sheikh, and Dubai, each announced about a dozen initiatives, inviting interested parties to join in. Several of them were backed by ambitious financial mechanisms.

These initiatives, pledges, and side deals are typically voluntary initiatives. They are not always managed or controlled by the secretariat of the climate-change-convention, and hence not necessarily part of the mandate of climate ministries. Probably half of these initiatives united Pakistan's development needs in such sectors as energy, agriculture, health, water, industrial production, urban planning, trade, and foreign direct investment. The ministries and departments mandated to deal with these issues are rarely, if at all, present at COPs or aware of the opportunities.

The climate summit in Dubai, for example, made 11 pledges backed by overall commitments

amounting to \$85 billion. These included disbursing finances for adaptation, tripling renewables, doubling energy efficiency, halting deforestation, assessing frameworks for global climate resilience, developing programmes for a just transition, and an agreement to operationalise the Loss and Damage Fund (LDCF). Except for the last one, Pakistan did not show much appetite for any of the initiatives, even Sultan Jabbar al-Jabbar, the UAE COP chair, visited Pakistan prior to the COP to check Pakistan's pulse for various initiatives and to win support for them.

The initiatives announced in the UAE have set the agenda for global climate action that will inform at least the next two climate summits in Baku this November, and Belém, in December 2025. The COP in Azerbaijan will prioritise mitigation, regional peace, and water issues. The likely focus in Belém will be social development, climate justice, and protecting forests and local communities. The agendas of the two COPs are evidently very closely aligned with Pakistan's development needs. These initiatives are typically linked with the country's economic development, structural reforms under discussion with the IMF and multilateral development banks, and the transformation needed to meet SDG targets. A roadmap adopted now can help avoid the armed purge of goals.

The agenda for Baku will review the implementation of COP28 targets, particularly to advance the Paris Agreement goals. It will strive to finalise the first enhanced transparency framework, establish a new collective quantified goal on finance, scale up targets for climate finance, and finalise the LDC. Baku will also host a series of high-level political meetings to assess barriers to NDC development, regional 'green corridors' for grid-scale storage, and the role of trade in accelerating climate and sustainable development actions.

It would be unrealistic, indeed unfair, to expect the climate ministry to engage with and independently assess these processes, let alone lead the country to access finances from such initiatives. The global climate agenda clearly calls for reforms that go beyond amending the Climate Change Act of 2017 or integrating it with the Environmental Protection Act, 1997, in order to remove inconsistencies. We also need to develop

institutional mechanisms and ways to link global climate negotiations with the priorities set for domestic economic development, rather than target responses every year. This calls for integrating climate considerations in various ministries and departments.

The foregoing can serve as the basis for a four-track climate policy:

First, Pakistan's climate policies must be guided by scientific data and scientific research. The Global Climate Impact Study Centre, Geological Survey, and Pakistan Environment Protection Agency are housed at the climate ministry. They can be mobilised to specifically develop baselines and set standards for climate emissions, biodiversity, and environment. Together with the Bureau of Statistics, they can develop Pakistan's natural resource income accounting, because the income generated from natural resources and ecosystems must be measured. We need to assess the economic value of natural resources and the impact of economic activities on the environment.

Second, Pakistan's climate priorities must be coordinated with the provinces. We must avoid the risk of a competitor relationship with sub-national entities. Any differences, as well as the agenda of the Climate Council, must be cleared by the Council of Common Interests. The Climate Council must be a professional organisation and should not take over the functions of the CCI. The climate ministry should build upon its rich experience of dealing with the provinces on environmental and climate issues.

Third, Pakistan's finance minister must spearhead the drive for climate finance. Since he has greater clout than most other cabinet members, he must inform parliament on all climate finance successes and failures with the development partners and the hosts of the annual COP meetings.

Fourth, Pakistan's policy must be embedded in national, national and provincial policies, public-private partnerships, and private sector investments by the Planning Commission. The latter's historically central position must be avoided to embed climate change in a whole of government effort to link the global climate discourse with Pakistan's development agenda. ■

The net metering dead end

LET'S start with putting a couple of useless misapprehensions to rest. I have had the opportunity of interacting with key decision-makers in the power bureaucracy and they assure me of two things. First, solar panels installed in people's homes are not going to be taxed. Second, the net metering rate at which power utilisation buys electricity back from consumers is not going to be revised downward for those who already have their system up and running. They emphasise that changes are being considered in the net metering regulations of 2015, with a view to reducing the amount people receive for the power their systems pump into the grid, but that those with existing systems will not be impacted.

Let's hope they will keep their word, because branding economists is becoming far too routine for the government of Pakistan. Assuming that they will keep their word with existing customers, there is another problem of a more general but critical nature. The government of Pakistan seems to no longer be able to afford the solar revolution sweeping across the world. This is somewhat striking, since the whole idea of the renewable revolution is to make electricity more affordable and cleaner and many countries have set targets for themselves on how much of their power should come from renewable sources like solar.

For example, in 2010, the world's total installed solar power generation capacity was less than 420 MW, according to Our World in Data. By 2022, this had risen to 1,653 MW. This is one of the fastest rates of growth for a new power source. What is even more striking than these two data points is the slope of the graph along the way, which shows continuous acceleration year after year.

Ground solar has dominated this growth, although some estimates are suggesting that utility-scale solar may start to overtake rooftop in a few years in some critical regions like the European Union. But these trends apart, rooftop solar has dominated this rise, and for most countries, it has been the main driving force in their solar expansion and plans to meet net zero targets.

Here in Pakistan, something has happened that others have experienced too, but they found

innovative solutions rather than trying to suppress the growth of rooftop solar. Pakistan had targeted 1,920 MW of rooftop solar capacity by the year 2025, according to its latest Indicative Generation Capacity Expansion Plan. In reality, we crossed that threshold in 2023, if not sooner. Now they want to apply the brakes, because, according to the power bureaucracy, this rapid growth in rooftop solar is creating costs that have to be passed on to poorer segments of the population, who don't have the luxury (yet) to go to the rooftop solar route because they have single-phase meters and the technology does not yet work with that. Additionally, they have very little roof space they can use for the purpose.

The big problem in Pakistan's power bureaucracy now is that the state insists on setting the

price of electricity manually, using outdated formulas. In large-scale thermal power plants, for example, they still use what is called 'cost plus' pricing, where the regulator actually looks at each cost item in the prospective power plant and decides what their total costs are and how much margin they should be allowed. This is partly because nobody is willing to invest in Pakistan on a large scale if their returns are not guaranteed. And the big reason for that is the government of Pakistan has a lousy reputation when it comes to delivering on its commitments.

Meanwhile, the way in which electricity is produced has evolved and changed rapidly from the time this 'cost plus' pricing formula developed. Back then, we had a few large-scale power plants supply electricity to a single buyer — the government — which transmitted this power to various distribution companies, all state-owned, who then sold it on to a lot of

metered customers.

The solar revolution has changed all that. Now we have what is called 'distributed generation' or 'point of sale consumption', where electricity is produced in a large and growing number of locations, and often consumed there and there. Along with this shift has come a new category of consumers and producers of electricity, called 'prosumers' — people who produce and consume electricity themselves. The old pricing formulas are not going to work in a world of prosumers.

Here is what seems to be going wrong in the power bureaucracy with this move to bring down net metering rates, and perhaps switch to what they call 'gross metering'. For all categories, although it seems the details are still being worked out. What's wrong with all this is that it aims to protect the bureaucracy from the disruptive impact of a new technology that is spreading rapidly around the world, and changing how power sectors are organised.

Imagine, in the early 2000s, if the bureaucracy had moved to protect the Pakistan Telecommunications Corporation from the disruptive impact of mobile phones. Imagine if they made the argument that this new technology was being used by others, who were opting out of the PTC system, leaving the rest to carry the costs of the state-owned telecoms infrastructure. Imagine if the state gave in to their arguments, and moved to banish the new technology out of the market. Where would we be today?

Something similar, perhaps not identical, is happening today with solar and other renewable power generation technology. Power bureaucracies need to adapt to, facilitate and spur on this revolution and increase the speed of its adoption. The key change begins with pricing and then the 'single buyer model', allowing power generators to sell to their customers directly instead of through the state. Instead, they seem more concerned with protecting the financial health of their bureaucracy in the face of this revolution. ■

Unwelcome returns

WITH the presence that philosophers share with out-of-office politicians, a hundred years ago, a leading Indian scholar analysed the combustible demography of India. In 1923, Dr Radhakrishnan wrote in his two-volume survey of Indian Philosophy: "India even today is mostly Hindu." Describing the Vedic Period, which spanned roughly 600 BC to 200 AD, the writer: "The fortunes of the Hindus [therefore] became more and more linked with those of the non-Hindus." Amongst these, he included Buddhists, Jains, Satyians and Vaishnavites — the more or less devout Hindus, of course, had yet to come.

It is a longer name to read, and even more difficult to digest. I chanced on it as a student in the 1960s, but gave up before reaching the end of the second volume. I returned to it recently to seek answers to the Hindu-Muslim experiences at religious convergence since the arrival of Muslims in the subcontinent, and especially since PM Narendra Modi's determination to expand them.

India's traditional hospitality is proven but, it does not extend to religious strangers. Over the centuries, Buddhists have quit India for greater climes. Today, Buddhist monasteries have over 520 million followers, of whom only 8m are left in India (Lord Buddha's birthplace) to follow in his footsteps.

Almost contemporary to Buddhism in Jainism, also founded in India and persecuted by the 24th patriarch, Lord Mahavira (c. 590 BC), equally pacific and non-coercitional, via his Buddhist, Jainism has survived in India. There are between 4m to 5m still living there. A growing number are to be found today in Canada, Europe, and the US, where the practice of prior self-slaughter would appear to have odds with current materialism.

In PM Modi's eyes, the problem in India is not a majority of Hindus, but a fertile market of 200m Muslims (now 15 per cent of its population). Modi's predicament is not a question of putting a genie back into the bottle. His concern is how to remove the green-glass from the self-bottle.

Under PM Nehru, Muslims in India rarely left that they had to choose between their country and their religion. Under his daughter, PM Indira Gandhi, a test of sorts for Indian Muslims came in 1971, when, after her victory in East Pakistan, she was said to have commented: "A thousand of my martyrs have been avenged."

Incidentally, all of the rulers of the Mughal dynasty (below PM Modi regards with antipathy) — except for its founder Babar and his son Humayun — from Akbar to Bahadur Shah Zafar, were born in India. They saw themselves as Indians by birth. Today, they are termed as Muslim foreigners.

During the recent elections in Bangladesh, which brought Sheikh Hasina Wajed back to power, India did not figure as a material issue. Neither in Pakistan, where Nawaz Sharif's earlier bonhomie with PM Modi did not affect the return of his PML-N to power.

In India, though, PM Modi's recent speech during his election campaign could have been dismissed as hot air hyperbole, were it not for their implications for Muslims within India, and for Pakistan and, by extension, other neighbouring countries.

On base ground in Gujarat, Mr Modi addressed four different rallies where he accused the Congress party of harbouring a "dangerous mentality", its malignant being in the "language of the Marathi language". In 2017, he had accused former PM Manmohan Singh of "holding a secret meeting with Pakistani diplomats to conspire against him".

Now his theme is that Pakistan's political leaders "are praying for a Congress victory. Pakistan is now eager to make the prime minister of India".

To an audience in Jorapatti, he added: "If Sardar Patel was not present [in 1948], Jorapatti would have gone to Pakistan. The Congress will create a dangerous situation for the country if it comes to power."

They may give away the Kochi desert claiming no one lives there?

On June 4, everyone in the subcontinent will know who will rule India for the next five years. Mr Modi knows it will be him. The Shias in Pakistan hope so too. They should be given, however, that Mr Modi as an emboldened three-time prime minister may tempt Pakistan by seizing the fragile frontiers lost to occupied Kashmir (India's new "union state") and Pakistan's founding cornerstone, Azad Jammu & Kashmir.

He may also decide to withdraw from the India-Water Treaty, which covers the rivers flowing from the upper riparian to lower Pakistan, touching on the mouth, knowing that an emboldened World Bank would prefer not to arbitrate.

Over the next five years, PM Modi could pressure Indian Muslims to cross Pakistan's eastern borders in Punjab and Sindh as refugees. It happened in 1971, when upon India's partition from East Pakistan crossed into India. PM Modi may be tempted to return the compliment. ■

Grapes of wrath

NOW I would like to live in the dream world of the neoliberal economists, in which markets are left to determine the exchange rate, where prices of wheat are left to market forces, where consumers are indifferent to eating imported or domestically produced wheat, and inputs like fertilisers are freely available at market price, free of the monopolies and boozing that artificially raise prices.

The thoughts of a small farmer?

But the harsh world that confronts us in the Punjab countryside today is very different. For the poor small farmers, who form the vast majority of the province's nearly 5.5 million rural households with holdings of 1.4 acres or less, or for medium-sized farmers, it is becoming clearer by the day that the government has no intention of purchasing wheat at the announced support price of Rs1,600 per 40 kilograms.

For the poor farmer, hope is all but lost as inflation whether brings ruined shareholders, and his wife earns him for not having his harvest which now lies in the open at Rs1,700 — the going market price, which is even less than the current world price. But at this rate, he would make a big loss, he pleads. Yet no one is there to listen.

Unbeknown to the farmer, who was banking on the hope that his bumper crop would finally yield good returns and a livable income, prices were about to exceed the price announced by the government before the harvest. Knowing full well that a bumper crop was expected, the interior government still allowed the import of nearly 3m tonnes of wheat, costing the country over a billion dollars in previous foreign exchange at world prices that were considered lower than the announced price. Rather than face the problems, the new government that took office in late February decided to ignore it. The EOC produced a half-baked plan in which the Punjab government deliberately played no part.

In contrast to the simple, idealistic world of the neoliberal, there is a large body of literature tracing the history of how wheat prices should be determined by the government. The existing system had serious mismanagement and corruption there as well as an unaffordable government subsidy. But on one point it was very clear: the farmer cannot be left to the mercy of the market and middlemen, who will then fix him in the process. If we let wheat price be dictated by global market prices, as postulated by neofathers, such a policy would need to be carefully thought through, especially keeping in mind the wide price fluctuations, in the context of both food security and protecting small farmers from steep price declines.

This is the crux of the matter: Last year, the world price of wheat, given the market-determined exchange rate, was higher than that announced by the government. In the long run, at a highly overvalued exchange rate, the world wheat price was lower. So, before we postulate that domestic wheat prices should follow world prices, we must establish if the exchange rate at which this is determined reflects a real price.

Indeed, even since the 1950s, the Pakistani farmer has paid a huge tribute to finance growth of the economy, especially industry, because agricultural prices have been kept low through overvalued exchange rates and high protection to industry to foster its growth, which changed the terms of trade against agriculture and in favour of an inefficient, uncompetitive industrial sector. And we want to continue this practice?

Now, having acted thoughtlessly to allow prices to be determined by market forces and allowing large imports at world prices, what options does the government have to overcome the current wheat crisis?

First and foremost, to provide some relief to farmers who are still holding on to their harvested wheat, the government should start procuring, on a war footing, at least 3.5m tonnes of wheat at Rs1,600 — the price to which it has committed — and quickly move space to store the crop.

Second, the State Bank must urgently come up with a plan for financial support from commercial banks to advance loans to small farmers at lower-than-market interest rates, so that they can purchase the necessary inputs to prepare and plant their next crop.

Third and most importantly, the government must set in motion a well-thought-out plan for creating a better and more efficient system of wheat procurement. Such a plan should ensure food security and a fair return to farmers, while gradually reducing the role of and cost to the government in fixing minimum support prices, replacing this with a role it can afford to maintain.

For now, let the government make amends for its prostration and bring some relief to anxious farmers. ■

Cement industry should wake up



Bangladesh (\$56 million), Madagascar (\$36 million), and other countries, such as Qatar, South Africa, Mauritius, Togo, and Cameroon (cumulative exports \$56 million).

In the past, Pakistan has exported rather significant volumes of cement, with exports exceeding \$570 million in 2012, \$530 million in 2013, and \$517 million in 2014. However, exports declined to \$345 million in 2015 and went down to \$270 million in 2021. Gradually, Pakistan lost some markets to cheaper sources of supply from Iran, India and China. Bangladesh reinvigorated its cement industry, and has recently entered the export market.

It is imperative for the industry to regain momentum in international markets. Recent developments include receiving orders for the first-ever Pakistani cement shipment to the United Kingdom, securing a substantial order from the United States, and exploring markets in Mexico, France and Germany, indicating promising prospects.

Over the last more than a decade, the total installed capacity of the industry has surged from 47 million tonnes in 2010 to the current 83 million tonnes per year. This capacity has to be optimised.

The inside rot

THE Water and Power Development Authority (Wapda) has been increasing the cost of electricity almost on a monthly basis, citing increased fuel losses and generation cost as the main reasons. The latest increase issued by Wapda is the

which is haemorrhaging state resources at an alarming rate.

The losses incurred by the corruption and collusion of Disco for constraining the losses incurred due to theft. Yes, you have read this right. To shield these losses from the public and those in power, a mechanism and chain of command is in place to keep all paying eyes out and avert.

Consider the case of electrical cable and wire rope manufacturers. Wapda has implemented a rule stipulating that these items must be exclusively sourced from local "approved" manufacturers, effectively granting a green light to a cartel that gobbles orders from Disco, and fixes prices with "mutual consent".

The cost of these cables, as perceived by Disco, is twice that of equivalent imports from China, and in some cases even in comparison with imports from Germany. The cable manufacturers, on the other hand, keep officials of Disco busy to keep the racket going.

Procurement losses attributed to these cable manufacturers stand five times as compared to 1.8% of the cost of electricity. A cursory examination of procurements by Disco over the last five, perhaps even 10 years, comparing the costs from "approved" local suppliers against those available in the open market or from international manufacturers would reveal the staggering scope of corruption.

Wapda officials should stop comparing up a new bogeyman every now and then. Instead, they need to focus inward.

UICN online banking channels has become necessary, if not inevitable, for various payments and money transfers. However, most people take into account the hidden charges or bank fee related to it. The cost and challenges associated with traditional banking channels and mobile wallet are often daunting. Besides, people have also faced a variety of problems in their interbank transfers. All such elements work as impediments in the growth of online banking in the country.

I had never used the Raas platform that was introduced by the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) a while ago. It was only recently that I had the occasion to use it, and found it to be an efficient mode of online transfers. It was instant, reliable and absolutely free of any charges. As I later started to use, the platform is available for mobile banking applications, internet banking and over-the-counter services.

Impressed by the facility, I find it crucial to raise awareness about Raas so that the people may take due benefit. All commercial banks allow customers to create a Raas identity (ID) by linking their preferred International Bank Account

Number (IBAN) with their registered telephone number. Once that has been done, it allows others to make money transfers by only using the cellphone number, taking away the need to remember account details and codes. Transfers can also be made even if the sender does not have a Raas ID.

On the basis of my own journey from ignorance to experience, I believe it is the general lack of awareness that is keeping the overall public away from this facility. SBP should be proactive in this regard.

Two brothers killed over land dispute in Swabi

SWABI: Two brothers were killed over a land dispute in a Topi village here on Wednesday, Revenue FTEZ and police officials said.

A revenue official said a team provided first aid to two men seriously injured and shifted them to the Tehsil Headquarters Hospital, Topi, where they succumbed to injuries.

The deceased were identified as Tayyab Khan, 40, and Jahanzeb Khan, 35.

Sultan Zeb registered an FIR with the police, stating his brothers were trying to stop some labourers from harvesting wheat crop on a disputed land when Shabirullah, Ghulam and Ghaffar, who were also present there, opened fire at his brothers, injuring them critically. Later, they died in hospital.

Meanwhile, the police arrested a man, who had allegedly killed his wife in Jaffar village of Chota Lashot, according to a press release issued by the police.

Mohammed Nabi had gone into hiding after the incident, but the police traced him.

DSP Chota Lashot Nasir Khan said a team visited the accused in a far-flung area and arrested him during a raid. Also in the day, a Peshawar Electric Supply Company official was injured when owner of a house attacked him for removing illegal connections in Yar Hussain village on Wednesday, police officials said.

They said the injured, Khizar Hayat, was shifted to Bacha Khan Medical Complex, Shahzad.

The Yar Hussain police registered an FIR against the accused, Shahzad Khan.

Rickshaws banned from GT Road in Peshawar

Admin also decides to seize old buses, wagons plying along BRT corridor

PESHAWAR: The district administration has banned rickshaws from the Pir Zaroor Bridge-Surya Pal stretch of the Grand Trunk Road here from today (Thursday), insisting the move will ease traffic congestion on the major road thoroughfare in the capital city.

The decision about the ban was made in a meeting chaired by the commissioner of Peshawar division, Riaz Khan Majeed, according to an official statement.

The meeting called to discuss traffic issues in the provincial capital was attended by deputy commissioners Afaq Waseem, SSP traffic Nasir Shah, officials of the Regional Transport Authority and traffic department, and representatives of transport unions.

It also decided that the old buses and wagons plying the roads along the Peshawar-Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) corridor would be impounded and scrapped, while their drivers would be arrested.

The participants also agreed about the seizure of rickshaws that are regis-

tered in other districts but operate in the provincial capital.

They also directed authorities to crack down on the rickshaws whose drivers have photocopied permits and registration papers, while the sealing of rickshaw factories was also ordered.

The meeting decided to ban rickshaw supply from Punjab and order the arrest of suppliers and confiscation of those vehicles.

It said the district administration would launch a 20-day crackdown on illegal rickshaws, buses, and wagons from Thursday noon.

Under the plan, pressure hoses, flashlights, tinted glasses, illegal registration plates, and musical instruments will be removed from vehicles before being destroyed, while legal action will be taken against drivers under the age of 21.

The meeting also decided to impose and scrap the buses, wagons, and rickshaws illegally operating in the provincial capital.

It chalked out a strategy to deal with illegal transport vehicles from the provincial capital and took the representatives of transport unions into confidence about it.

Officials said as the crackdown would continue until May 26, special teams of the police, district administration, and transport and civic departments were formed.

Peshawar SSP traffic Nasir Khan told Dawn that the traffic police had presented the traffic management plan for Peshawar to the district administration for approval and implementation.

He said the traffic police were imposing illegal rickshaws and buses and registering FIRs against their drivers.

"Last month, we [traffic police] registered FIRs against 200 rickshaw drivers and responded 200 illegal buses and rickshaws," he said.

The SSP said that over 100,000 rickshaws and buses operated in the provincial capital, but in the case of their owners, the traffic police lacked spaces to keep such a large number of vehicles.

An official told Dawn, requesting anonymity, that the Peshawar BRT project envisioned the scrapping of old buses plying the provincial capital's roads.

He said that under the bus-project, authorities scrapped around 600 old and rickety buses after making due payments to their owners in two phases.

The official, however, said that transporters later brought in buses from the Punjab province and demanded a phase-out of old buses, but the demand was turned down by authorities.

PHC asks Afghan artists' counsel to examine deportation pleas pending with SC

PESHAWAR: The Peshawar High Court on Wednesday adjourned the hearing into the petitions of several Afghan artists and transgender persons for stopping the federal government from deporting them, insisting they'll be persecuted in the Taliban-ruled Afghanistan.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Mohammad Atiquzz Shah and Justice Syed Arshad Ali directed the counsel for petitioners to examine the pleas filed with the Supreme Court on the matter.

The bench observed that it would be appropriate for the petitioners to file applications with the apex court for checking if the process in the place before the Supreme Court and the high court were identical.

It was hearing two petitions, including the one filed on behalf of 147 musicians and singers by Hashmatullah Ovez, Rafi Haider and Hameed Shahzad, and the other by Ahmed Anwari alias Hosna and Shorbar transgenders persons.

Advocate Munawar Ahmad appeared for the petitioners and said his clients had challenged the decisions of the federal government to forcibly repatriate all unregistered Afghans, including the petitioners.

He said that the high court earlier issued an order stopping the federal government and its law enforcement agencies from harassing his clients and acting against them until further orders.

The lawyer added that the high court also ordered the closing of the two petitions.

The counsel claimed that the takeover of Afghanistan by the Taliban rendered the lives of the local artists and transgender people "very dangerous and miserable," as the government had announced that it wouldn't allow Afghan artists to perform in the country.

He added that like thousands of other Afghans, his clients fled the country along with their families and took shelter in Pakistan.

The lawyer said that the petitioners and their families were registered by the UN refugee agency, which gave them a token number, and their cases were under process.

A deputy attorney general said that identical petitions had already been filed with the Supreme Court.

When the bench asked Mr Munawar whether the same petitioners were parties in the case pending with the apex court, the counsel said that petition was filed by the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan for relief for all unregistered Afghan nationals, whereas the two petitions pending with the high court sought relief for artists and transgender persons only.

The bench wondered whether it wouldn't be appropriate for the petitioners to withdraw their plea and approach the apex court to become parties to the matter pending with it.

The counsel said that he was not sure whether the grants made in that plea were identical to those in the two petitions. He said that if his clients withdraw the two petitions, then the restraining order of the high court would become ineffective and that there were fears that the petitioners would face harassment and forced repatriation.

The chief minister made it clear that wheat procurement would be carried out on the basis of first come, first served basis.

He asked the farmers' community to come forward and play their proactive role in implementing the provincial government's policy amidst ensuring wheat神仓库s procurement in an efficient and transparent manner.

He added it clear that the provincial government had decided to have zero tolerance policy against corruption and bribery in all the departments, adding all possible steps would be taken to ensure transparency in all government matters, including postings and transfers.—Correspondent

PHC asks Afghan artists' counsel to examine deportation pleas pending with SC

Bureau Report

PESHAWAR: The Peshawar High Court on Wednesday adjourned the hearing into the petitions of several Afghan artists and transgender persons for stopping the federal government from deporting them, insisting they'll be persecuted in the Taliban-ruled Afghanistan.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Mohammad Atiquzz Shah and Justice Syed Arshad Ali directed the counsel for petitioners to examine the pleas filed with the Supreme Court on the matter.

The bench observed that it would be appropriate for the petitioners to file applications with the apex court for checking if the process in the place before the Supreme Court and the high court were identical.

It was hearing two petitions, including the one filed on behalf of 147 musicians and singers by Hashmatullah Ovez, Rafi Haider and Hameed Shahzad, and the other by Ahmed Anwari alias Hosna and Shorbar transgenders persons.

Advocate Munawar Ahmad appeared for the petitioners and said his clients had challenged the decisions of the federal government to forcibly repatriate all unregistered Afghans, including the petitioners.

He said that the high court earlier issued an order stopping the federal government and its law enforcement agencies from harassing his clients and acting against them until further orders.

The lawyer added that the high court also ordered the closing of the two petitions.

The counsel claimed that the takeover of Afghanistan by the Taliban rendered the lives of the local artists and transgender people "very dangerous and miserable," as the government had announced that it wouldn't allow Afghan artists to perform in the country.

He added that like thousands of other Afghans, his clients fled the country along with their families and took shelter in Pakistan.

The lawyer said that the petitioners and their families were registered by the UN refugee agency, which gave them a token number, and their cases were under process.

A deputy attorney general said that identical petitions had already been filed with the Supreme Court.

When the bench asked Mr Munawar whether the same petitioners were parties in the case pending with the apex court

Economic crisis deepens amid political instability

Industrialists, analysts lament govt yet to develop long-term growth strategy

KARACHI: Industrialists and analysts expressing growing concern at political protests and what they see as deteriorating economic situation, casting shadows over business activities and economic stability.

The business community, already hit by high inflation and interest rates, fears that political issues overshadow economic priorities.

"A rising tide of unrest and protests against the government has lowered the economy, making it difficult for businesses to operate effectively," one businessman stated anonymously, reflecting the prevalence of backlash for speaking out.

Some traders and industrialists note that persistent political disturbances have dashed hopes for stability after visible economic improvements compared to last year.

"There is no sign of stability in the economy, which reflects rising vulnerability in the economy," said Asim Aslam, an exporter.

"Daily remarks from the Supreme Court and high courts on political and corruption issues leave us in doubt, particularly concerning our future strategies," Mr Aslam said. He emphasized the need for a well-defined economic and political roadmap to attract investment.

A Karachi-based head of research noted that trade and industry were not

clear about the economy's future, and the present government has yet to develop a long-term growth strategy.

He lamented that economic growth, which must be the government's priority, has been put under the shadow of inflation and interest rates. He said the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) has also failed to spur growth or bring down inflation and appears to be overwhelmed by the challenges.

The private sector is working with least participation, which will bring down the growth rate to even lower than two per cent this year. Despite several defaults, Sri Lanka recovered within two to three years and the current inflation is 7.5 per cent. This is not unusual but management," he said.

Some bankers believe that the SBP is managing the exchange rate, and this stability may vanish in one go.

Amid these economic challenges, analysts also noted some positives, such as Saudi investors' interest in major Pakistani assets, which could temper the country's external accounts. However, the borrowing need for \$25 billion for debt servicing next fiscal year and a persistent trade deficit threaten to offset these gains.

"The stable exchange rate is not the benchmark for the economy's growth. It is only a sign that the country can pay back the debts and be able to trade with any country," said Atif Ahmed, a currency dealer in the interbank market.

He noted that the current account deficit has significantly decreased, yet the SBP's foreign exchange reserves are largely borrowed, showing no clear policy on managing external and domestic debts.

WB reaffirms help for development

ISLAMABAD: World Bank Vice-President for South Asia Martin Raiser concluded his three-day visit to Pakistan on Wednesday and reaffirmed the bank's readiness to collaborate with Pakistan in its journey of economic transformation aimed at sustainable development.

"I am pleased to learn about Pakistan's reform plans to boost growth and attract more private investment, leverage digital transformation to improve governance, strengthen climate resilience, and invest in human capital to tackle daunting challenges such as child marriage and learning poverty," said Raiser in a statement issued by World Bank Islamabad office.

On Wednesday, PM Shehbaz witnessed the signing of a joint communiqué signed by World Bank Country Representative Nayyab Hashmi and Secretary of Economic Affairs Dr Kazim Niazi.

PM Shehbaz lauded the World Bank's contribution to Pakistan's development and appreciated the bank's support for building climate-resilient infrastructure to the tune of the 2022 floods in Pakistan.

Appreciating Pakistan's aggressive reform agenda, Mr Raiser said the World Bank is ready to collaborate with Pakistan in its journey of economic transformation aimed at sustainable development.

Both sides agreed to engage in a longer-term, focused partnership under a new Country Partnership Framework with an annual review mechanism to assess progress and ensure results are achieved.

Shell posts Rs314m profit

KARACHI: Shell Pakistan Ltd (SPL) posted a profit after tax (PAT) of Rs314 million during first quarter of 2024 against a loss of Rs4.762 billion in the same period last year.

The oilfield business grew its network with five newly-commissioned sites and refreshed 13 sites. The business added 13 fuelled retail facilities across the network.

Artoil Refinery Ltd (ARL) said that it has started its main crude distillation unit after some improvement in splitting of high-sulfur diesel (HSD).

In a stock filing on Wednesday, ARL said it is closely monitoring the situation with respect to product demand.

Pak-Qatar Family Takafal Ltd achieved a turnover of Rs16.30 billion in 2023.

Six-month deadline extension for upgrade agreements irks refineries

Excessive delays cause about \$4bn loss in last four years

ISLAMABAD: The Petroleum Division has requested the Cabinet Committee on Energy (CCE) to extend the deadline for signing upgrade agreements with five domestic refineries for six months until October this year, but most refiners still want for the delay.

"The government seems to be more focused on attracting foreign investment, which is no doubt important, but it needs to realize that foreign investment flows in only when existing foreign and local investors are attracted to," said Atif Khatai, who is chairman of Oil Companies Advisory Council (OCAC) and chief executive officer of Artoil Refinery Ltd.

He said the deadline for signing upgrade agreements with the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (Ogra) was April 22, 2024. Three refineries — Artoil Refinery Ltd, National Refinery Ltd and

Pakistan Refinery Ltd — gave consent to sign the agreements before the deadline, while two other refineries — Petro and Cengiz — needed more time.

However, the Petroleum Division didn't arrange signing with the willing refineries, nor extended the deadline date in time to accommodate Petro's request," he said, adding that ARI, NRI and PRL plan to invest \$8bn in their upgradations projects. The total investment will increase to \$10bn when Petro and Cengiz join in.

It may be noted that the refining policy had already taken more than four years to develop, causing the country to lose about \$4bn due to these delays.

Interestingly, the Petroleum Division has now moved a memo to the CCE days after the deadline expires, seeking a six-month extension even for those ready to start working immediately on upgradation to Euro5 fuels.

The Petroleum Division said the Pakistan Oil Refining Policy for Upgradation of Existing Brownfield Refineries 2023 was approved by the Federal Cabinet in February to upgrade the existing refineries to produce environment-friendly EuroV fuels and decrease the production of furnace oil.

The policy provided an incremental incentive of 2.5pc on HSD (in addition to the current 2.5pc) and 10pc on petrol in the form of deemed duty for seven years to achieve this objective. The incremental incentive has been deposited in an escrow account maintained by Ogra with the respective refinery for creating up to 27.5pc of the upgrade projects' cost. Ogra is to allow withdrawal of funds from the escrow account by the respective refinery, post financial close of the Upgrade Projects, and against expenditure made for each milestone or the deliverables.

To avoid the said incremental incentive, the refineries were required to execute Upgrade Agreements, open an Escrow Account with Ogra and provide written back guarantee to Ogra within 60 days of notification of the Policy i.e. by April 22, 2024.

The policy required the deemed duty to be cut from 2.5 to 1.5 pc for refineries that do not sign the upgrade agreement by the said deadline.

The petroleum division confirmed that "ARI, NRI and PRL

have informed their readiness to sign the Upgrade Agreements" and requested the Petroleum Division to coordinate the signing ceremony. "However, Petro and Cengiz Pakistan Limited (CPL), jointly contributing more than 50pc of the country's refining output, have yet to finalize the Upgrade Agreements," the Petroleum Division said.

Interestingly, the Petroleum Division also confirmed in the memo that Petro was in the process of updating its feasibility study, after which its board of directors will decide on the planned upgrade. "The said activities may take 5-6 months."

On the other hand, the Petroleum Division also confirmed that "settlement agreement between Cengiz and the Government of Pakistan for payment of about Rs20bn outstanding petroleum levy (payable by Cengiz) was also being negotiated", which also could not be concluded before April 22 deadline.

In case of non-signing by the due date, the deemed duty on HSD will be reduced from 2.5pc to 1.5pc for Petro and Cengiz, making the operation of these refineries extremely challenging".

Axe falls on another senior taxman

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has agreed in principle to suspend another senior taxman, who sought adjournment in a case involving Rs155 million in tax payments, for allegedly demonstrating lack of commitment to resolving tax concerns. Dawn has learnt through reliable sources.

They said FBR Chairman Zahoori Tirmizi forwarded the name of Sabihuddin Abdul Majeed, chief commissioner of Multan Taxpayers Office (MTO), Karachi, to Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif for suspension or removal from his current position.

Mr Majeed will become Inland Revenue Service's (IRS) newest senior officer after Younis Hyder Sharif, chief commissioner IR, Lahore Taxpayers Office, Islamabad, who was suspended with immediate effect for 120 days on April 22 on the same charges of seeking adjournment in a case in the Islamabad High Court.

A senior tax official told Dawn that the competent authority in such cases is the prime minister. "As of today, I can confirm that no notification has been issued [about] suspension of the officer," the official said, however, the notification is expected to be issued on Thursday (today).

According to the source in MTO Karachi, the issue relates to a request for an adjournment in a tax case pending before the Sindh High Court. The adjournment did not indicate that the tax was waived off or that concerned was made not to pursue it.

The source said the FBR would issue a notification suspending the officer for 120 days.

The FBR chairman has transferred more than 20 senior tax officers based on an intelligence report that they fiercely challenged their removal from posts. He also removed the IRS tax policy minister, who was also an official spokesman for the FBR.

The FBR chairman has yet to appoint a spokesperson, and avoided responding to questions sent to him as well as his IRS member operation for comment on the matter. Mr Tirmizi, the IRS member operation and Customs member policy enjoy their own assignments, whereas all other top tax officers have been placed on special duty (OSD).

Based on intelligence information, a drive has been launched to remove senior tax officers from the IRS and Customs departments and make them OSD. However, many officers suspected that a pick-and-choose approach was used throughout the process, as many officers with raised eyebrows continue to hold high-level positions in the field because of their connections with those at the helm.

IRSA has cut short its estimate to 21tpc for early kharif season. —FIR

Kharif crop production prospects improve

ISLAMABAD: The extended and massive rains spell in April, higher-than-usual temperatures and anticipated normal monsoon rainfall have improved kharif crop output prospects.

Taking into consideration the "very promising water situation", the Indian River System Authority (IRSA) on Wednesday decided "to extend the shortages for the early kharif period till June 10, from the initial 20tpc to 21tpc for Punjab and Sindh", said a statement issued by the water regulator.

An official told Dawn that the reservoirs in Sindh — the major catchment area of Tarbela dam — had already risen to 27 degrees centigrade on Wednesday against 17 on the same day last year which meant more rainfall is impeding river flows earlier than normal.

Also, the Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD) has indicated that monsoon rains are expected to be normal this year.

although a final forecast will be made by mid-June.

Moreover, better storage in dams than anticipated earlier had also significantly addressed the operational constraints arising out of Tarbela dam's construction activation at Tarbela dam. At present, the water conservation level at Tarbela stands at 1,467 feet, while operational constraints for T5 could emerge at 1,426 feet.

While reviewing the water situation from April 1 to 30, 2024, it was noted that the actual inflows of 10.35 million acre-feet (MAF) for upstream of Tarbela, surpasses the targeted inflows of 7.035 MAF, showing a 47pc increase. The increased river inflows — more concentrated in the Kabul and Jhelum Basins — were due to the exceptionally-dam-releasing stretch which stretched into April 2024, making the estimated total for March 10pc above normal.

The recent rains added about 3.65 MAF in storages. Accordingly, the storage in Tarbela, Mangla and Chanderi reservoir stood at 4.758 MAF on May 8 (Wednesday), i.e. 48pc above the long-term average.

Therefore, Punjab's approved share of 8.252 MAF has now been increased to 8.266 MAF. Likewise, Sindh's approved share of 5.934 MAF was also increased to 5.948 MAF.

Stocks fall for third day on profit-taking

KARACHI: The stock market was on a losing streak for the third consecutive day as investors indulged in profit-taking on pre-budget uncertainty.

Abbas Mehmood of ARIH Capital Corporation said the market extended overnight losses on pre-budget uncertainty and reports of falling fertilizer and cement sales.

On Friday, the market fell 49 points or 0.5pc to 9,275.57, while on Saturday, it fell 32 points or 0.3pc to 9,243.57.

Topline Securities Ltd said the market's decline was mainly propelled by Derwood Hercules, Engro Fertilizers, MCB Bank, Lucky Cement, and United Bank Ltd, collectively causing a drop of 210 points. On the other hand, Service Industries Ltd, Engro

Combating terrorism is a 'shared interest' with Pakistan: US

WASHINGTON: The United States on Wednesday emphasized its "shared interest" with Pakistan in addressing the critical threat that terrorism poses to the entire region.

At the State Department's daily news briefing, Spokesperson Matthew Miller also focused on the treatment of Afghan refugees in Pakistan and urged Islamabad not to repatriate them due to the dire situation in Afghanistan.

"We remain committed to working with Pakistan to address the shared threat posed by terrorist groups throughout the region," said Miller, commenting on a recent ISPR statement about the involvement of Tarkha-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) in a series of terrorist attacks in the country.

Pakistan has suffered greatly at the hands of terrorists, and "we regret the loss of life and injuries sustained and offer our heartfelt condolences to those affected by these attacks," he added.

Underlining the need to protect Afghan forced to seek refuge in neighbouring states, he emphasized: "We will continue to encourage Afghanistan's neighbours, including Pakistan, to respect the movement advisory, given the dire situation in Afghanistan."

Miller refrained from taking a stance on speculations that former prime minister Imran Khan would be released soon, stating: "We do not take position on these matters. Those matters are for the government of Pakistan to decide."

In his briefing on Tuesday, the spokesperson welcomed diplomatic engagement between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, applauding Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's expected visit to Islamabad later this month.

Asked to comment on the Saudi prince's visit, Matthew Miller said: "Certainly, we always support diplomatic engagements between our partners," adding that he did not have further details about the visit.

BJP deletes X post accused of targeting Muslims

NEW DELHI: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's party on Wednesday deleted a corrosive video posted on social media platform X that was criticised for targeting Muslims during an ongoing national election.

India's election code bars campaigning based on "communal" incitements but the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has frequently invoked the country's main religious divide on the campaign trail.

The video, posted by an official BJP account, featured accusations of opposition politicians scheming to abolish special affirmative action programmes for marginalised Hindu groups and instead distribute them to Muslims.

The election commission wrote to the platform's Indian office on Tuesday saying the "objectionable" post violated India's law. On Wednesday the original post had disappeared from the platform, with a notice saying it had been deleted.

A police complaint filed by the opposition Congress party accused the video of promoting "animosity between different religions". Modi, who is widely expected to win a third term in office when the six-week general election concludes next month, has made similar claims to the video in campaign appearances since last month.—AFP

Germany sees spate of attacks on politicians; minister struck on head

BERLIN: German police on Wednesday arrested a 74-year-old man suspected of hitting a former mayor of Berlin in the head, the latest in a rash of assaults against politicians in Germany.

Chancellor Olaf Scholz blasted the attack against politicians as "outrageous and cowardly", stressing that violence did not belong in a democratic debate.

François Giffey was at a library on Tuesday afternoon when the suspect came up from behind her to hit her in the head and neck with a bag containing hard objects, police said.

Giffey, who is now Berlin state's economy minister and a member of Scholz's Social Democratic Party (SPD), was treated at hospital for light injuries. The detained suspect was previously known to investigators over "state security and homicide", said police, adding that they were investigating the motive of the attack.

Prosecutors were also considering if the man should be sent to psychiatric care because of indications that he might be mentally ill.

According to provisional police figures, 2,700 crimes were committed against politicians in Germany

in 2023, up from 1,886 the previous year. Nevertheless, that was down from the 2,840 recorded in 2021, when the last general elections were held. Giffey said she was feeling well after the initial scare. But she was "concerned and shaken about a growing free wild culture in which people who are engaging politically in our country are increasingly exposed to attacks that are supposedly justified and acceptable."

"We live in a free and democratic country, in which everyone can be free to express his or her opinions," she wrote on X, formerly Twitter. "But there is a clear line -- and that is violence against people," she added.

Berlin's current mayor Kai Wegner said anyone who attacked politicians was "attacking our democracy", as he vowed to strengthen "safer networks for attacks against politicians".

Noradules

Politicians, particularly from Scholz's SPD or coalition partner the Greens, have found themselves under increasing attacks in recent months. Vice Chancellor Robert

Habeck of the Greens was stopped from disembarking from a ferry by a group of protesters earlier this year.

Another prominent Green politician, Karin Goering-Eckardt, was blocked from leaving an event in the state of Brandenburg last week by demonstrators who surrounded her car and started hitting it.

Giffey's assault also came just days after a European member of parliament, Béatrice from the SPD, had to be hospitalised last week after four people attacked her as he put up EU election posters in the eastern city of Dresden. Matthias Fekl, 41, needed an operation for serious injuries suffered in the attack, which Scholz denounced as a threat to democracy. Four suspects, aged between 17 and 28, were being investigated over the incident.

All four were believed to have links to the far-right group known as "Elbländervolke", according to German media. Dresden has been a hotbed for assaults against politicians, with another case reported on Tuesday. A politician, identified by police only as a 47-year-old from the Green party, was threatened and spat on.—AFP

EU to use profits from frozen Russian assets to arm Ukraine

BRUSSELS: EU members states reached agreement on Wednesday on a plan to use billions of euros in profits from frozen Russian central bank assets to arm Ukraine and fund its post-war reconstruction.

Moscow has made a string of battlefield gains in recent months, pressuring its manpower and weapons advantage in Kyiv's besieged critical nerve Western and more than two years into the conflict.

With Washington finally set to deliver on a long-stalled aid package, Kyiv's other major backer the European Union has also been pushing for months to find more funds. Leaders of the 27-nation bloc agreed in March to move ahead with the assets proposal, expected to unlock some three billion euros (\$3.3 billion) a year, leaving details to hammer out the details.

Posting on X, the bloc's Belgian presidency said EU ambassadors had "agreed in principle on measures concerning extraordinary revenues emerging from Russia's illegalized assets".

It said the funds would "serve to support Ukraine's recovery and military defense in the context of the Russian aggression," with a first tranche expected to be freed up in July.

"There could be no stronger symbol and no greater use for that money than to make Ukraine and all of Europe a safer place to live," added EU Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen.

The EU has around 200 billion euros of Russian central bank assets held in the bloc as part of punishing sanctions imposed on Moscow for sending troops into its neighbour in February 2022.—AFP

World's record-breaking temperature streak extends through April

BRUSSELS: The world witnessed the hottest April on record, adding to an 11-month streak in which every month set a (break) temperature record, the European Union's climate change monitoring service stated on Wednesday.

Every single month since June of 2023, has ranked as the planet's hottest on record, as compared to the corresponding month in previous years, the Copernicus Climate Change Service (C3S) said in its monthly bulletin.

Including the month of April, the world's mean temperature was the highest on record for a period of 12 months (1.63 degrees Celsius above the average, in the 1850-1900 pre-industrial period).

Some of the extremes which include months of record breaking surface temperatures, have led scientists to investigate whether human activity has now triggered a tipping point in the climate system.

"I think many scientists have asked the question whether there could be a shift in the climate system" said Judith Lean, C3S Senior Climate Scientist.

Greenhouse gas emissions from burning fossil fuels is the central component of climate change. In recent months, the natural El Niño phenomenon, which warms surface waters in the eastern Pacific Ocean, has also contributed to a rise in temperatures.—Reuters

UN sets sights on clinching 'biopiracy' accord at conference

GENEVA: After talks which spanned over a period of over 20 years, the United Nations is aiming on finalising an international agreement, in order to combat so-called "biopiracy" later this month. Their solution is to enhance transparency with regards to the parenting of "traditional knowledge" surrounding genetic resources.

The World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO) agency that deals with IP and innovation is hopeful of ensuring that such knowledge will be protected from exploitation.

WIPO is comprised of 193 member states and will begin negotiations for an agreement from the 13 to 24 of May, at the agency's headquarters in Geneva. Below is a

summation of the issues at stake, relevant laws and an explanation as to why exactly countries have stalled till now, to move towards an agreement.

What is biopiracy?

Biopiracy is the use of genetic resources, and associated traditional knowledge, without any agreement on the part of those who hold them, and without the holders receiving any tangible benefit. Genetic resources are contained in a variety of organisms, such as medicinal plants, agricultural crops and animal breeds.

These resources are increasingly being utilised in everything ranging from cosmetics to seeds, medicines, biotechnology

and food supplements. Given it is not obligatory to publish the origin of inventions, numerous developing countries are concerned that patents are being granted that either circumvent the rights of indigenous people or are issued for already existing inventions. Such cases often end up in prolonged legal battles.

"This is referred to colloquially as 'biopiracy' according to Wend Wondolak, the director of WIPO's traditional knowledge division. While natural genetic resources themselves cannot be directly protected as intellectual property (as they are not creations of the human mind), inventions developed using them can be more often through a patent, says WIPO.

Inventions based on genetic resources, and the related traditional knowledge used and conserved by indigenous people over generations, may be eligible for protection through the patent system.

What does the draft agreement say?

Patent applicants will be required to disclose the country from which the genetic resources involved in the invention originated, as well as the indigenous people that provided the traditional knowledge.

The goal is to increase the "efficiency, transparency and quality" of the patent system, says the WIPO. This will ensure that the invention is indeed new and that the countries and communities concerned

have consented to the fact. An excess of 30 countries have such disclosure requirements incorporated into their national legislation. The majority of these are developing countries, including China, Brazil, India and South Africa. However, there are European states, too, such as France, Germany and Switzerland. It is important to mention that these procedures may vary and are they always mandatory.

Transparency stands to boost the implementation of the Nagoya Protocol, which stipulates persons providing genetic resources and/or traditional knowledge "should" benefit from the advantages (financial or otherwise), arising from their use.—AFP

What a feet: viral Dutch artist paints 10 pictures at once

VLAARDINGEN: Two paintbrushes between the toes, two in her hands, and fierce concentration applied on her face, Dutch artist Rajacenna van Dam is crafting 10 paintings at the same time.

An enthusiast, as well as a participant, a hyperactive painter and seven other painters have joined forces to paint 100 artworks in one day, presented on 10 easels laid out on a table, upside-down on the floor, and two easels.

It started as a party trick for the early-hired Rajacenna — her artist name — who started a challenge to relieve boredom. But it has since become a profession that has shot her to viral fame, with every paint stroke worked out in advance in her head before setting to work with hands — and feet.

"I work a bit on one canvas, then move to another one, so I'm always dividing my

attention between them," said Rajacenna, who is technically left-handed. "Five years ago, I started painting with both hands, as a bit of a challenge and to go quicker. I then realised I was ambidextrous," the 13-year-old artist said.

Starting out "for fun" and after a few mishaps with sticky tape between her toes, she tried using plasticine to keep the brush between her toes. It was a success and she posted a video of her exploit online, quickly becoming a viral hit. She then founded an NGO to raise awareness about the difference between paintings crafted with her hands and those with her feet.

"I can really see a big difference. It's a lot more precise," she said, performing her skills at a museum in Vlaardingen, her home town in the south of the Netherlands.—AFP

PM vows to get 26m out-of-school children enrolled

ISLAMABAD: Declaring an education emergency in the country, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday vowed to get around 26 million out-of-school children enrolled and promote literacy so that the motherland could regain its lost space and transform it as one of the most educated societies in the world.

"Today, with iron convictions, and the support of provinces, we will handle the challenge of 26m out-of-school children. We will bring them back to school. I declare from this moment an Emergency in Education all over Pakistan. The way we did it in Punjab, we will do it in Pakistan," the prime minister said addressing the National Conference on Education Emergency.

"I will personally supervise the programme and meet all the chief ministers, irrespective of their political affiliations, with a vision to march in unison, expressing the hope that the provinces too would extend their support," the PM said.

The event was attended by federal ministers, parliamentarians, vice-chairmen, diplomats and development partners.

"This is about our children and our future... This is a very challenging task, no doubt. But nations which had faced difficulties and defeat in the past arose from the ashes of defeat. Germany and Japan are the examples. Why can't Pakistan be? I guarantee, if we move in unison to find our space, Pakistan will emerge as one of the most educated societies one day," he added.

The premier said the enrollment of 26m out-of-school children and student growth were major challenges facing Pakistan which required huge financial resources. "But the real challenge is that will we do," he said, recalling Pakistan's manifestation of the commitment to becoming a nuclear power despite international pressures, and eliminating terrorism by sacrificing around 80,000 lives to establish peace in the country.

In his address, Minister for Federal Education and Professional Training Dr Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui said the education sector needed immediate actions and urgent responses as Pakistan stood at the crossroads of destination with no option to lose.

Pakistan's first moon satellite enters its orbit

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's inaugural lunar satellite, SCUBI-Q, has achieved a significant milestone by successfully entering the moon's orbit on Wednesday afternoon, as confirmed by Institute of Space Technology.

SCUBI-Q was successfully deployed in lunar orbit on May 8, at 144pm. According to the Institute of Space Technology, the great development highlights its importance in potentially unlocking large-scale space missions for Pakistan in the future.

"Satellite after deployment is performing as per design specifications. All sub-systems' health data is excellent. The imaging payload is fully functional," IST said, adding, "The next few days will be spent conducting thorough in-orbit testing. Images will be shared after in-orbit testing."

Last Friday, Pakistan became the sixth country to launch its first-ever moon satellite.

Riding on the Chinese rocket Chang'e-4 lunar probe, the SCUBI-Q satellite marked a historic collaboration between Pakistan and China in lunar exploration. The Chinese mission aimed to land on the moon's far side, purportedly hidden from Earth, and subsequently collect and return samples.

The Chinese embassy expressed its enthusiasm for the milestone, highlighting that this marked the first-ever China-Pakistan cooperation on lunar exploration.

According to Dr Khurram Shahzad, head of the department of electrical and computer sciences of the institute, the satellite would play a critical role in deep space missions.

Operating in extreme temperatures as low as minus 180 degrees Celsius, the satellite features a 7kg one-megapixel camera tailored for mission with power constraint. "The surface-level analysis capabilities, transmitting images at a modest 1-kbps, will provide crucial data on crater locations, water, and traces of ice on the moon's surface. These findings, obtained through various techniques, hold promise for global utilization," he said.

As the Chineselander collects rock and soil samples, SCUBI-Q will spend three to six months orbiting the moon, capturing and transmitting images of the moon back to Earth. By May 15, according to the institute, Pakistan's anticipation sharing images captured by the satellite.

The development has come at a time when the number of people applying for passport appears to be growing.

Informed sources said the passport and immigration ministry had capacity to print 20 to 25 thousand passports per day while was receiving around 40 thousand applications each day, leading to a backlog of passports which stands at around 0.8 million.

Taliban-run defence ministry refutes Pakistan military's claim about Bishum attack

FALZABAD: After days of protests against the ongoing operation for clearance of poppy cultivation in Badakhshan, three policemen were killed and five others wounded in a bomb attack on a security convoy on Wednesday.

"The bomb exploded while the convoy of police forces was on its way to destroy poppy cultivation," Taliban Interior Ministry spokesman Abdul Majeed Qazi posted on X, formerly Twitter.

The ministry officials said a sticky improvised explosive device (IED) was attached to a motor cycle that targeted a convoy of police vehicles in Falzabad, the capital of northeastern Badakhshan province, around 1am.

There was no immediate claim of responsibil-

ity for the attack.

An AFP journalist saw Taliban authorities searching houses and detaining dozens of people near the scene. Images posted on social media but not immediately verified by AFP showed a charred motorcycle and a police truck riddled with holes.

Talibans' Arghandab, who did not want to give full name, said he heard a huge explosion and saw that a convoy of Taliban authorities had been hit. "Immediately the security forces cleared the area of people," he said.

The explosion comes days after Taliban ministry officials and residents clashed over the violent clearance of poppy crops in two Badakhshan districts, leaving two dead and sparking rare protests.

Afghanistan was the largest producer of opium before poppy cultivation was banned by the Taliban in a decree in 2022. Farmers have been encouraged to plant different crops, but some compete with the financial draw of the poppy, leading some to continue to discreetly cul-

ture small plots.

The number of bombings and suicide attacks in Afghanistan has fallen since the Taliban ended their insurgency after ousting the US-backed government and returning to power in August 2021.

However, a number of armed groups, including the Islamic State group, remain a threat, with regular reports of explosions that go unconfirmed by authorities.

Talibans reject Afghan's role in Bishum attack.

Separately, the Taliban defense ministry rejected Pakistan's military's claim that Afghans were involved in an attack on Chinese engineers. "Afghans are not involved in such matters," said Mufti Ehsanullah Khanzai, the spokesman for Afghanistan's Taliban-run ministry of national defense.

"Blaming Afghanistan for such incidents is a failed attempt to divert attention from the truth of the matter and we strongly reject it," he added.—Agencies

Olympic champion Hafnaoui to miss Paris Games

TUNIS: Olympic 400m freestyle champion Ahmed Hafnaoui will miss the Paris Games, Africa Aquatics (AA) said on Tuesday.

The continental governing body said on its website the 21-year-old Tunisian had confirmed local media reports that he would not swim at the July 26-Aug 11 Games.

AA's report said Hafnaoui had declined to resume training in the US where he was previously based but did not provide details.

However, Tunisian Olympic Committee president Mohamed Boussayeh said Hafnaoui's participation in Paris has not been fully decided yet, adding that he has suffered an injury that requires him to rest for 45 days.

Boussayeh also said Hafnaoui has many other international obligations ahead of him, calling on sports bars to "change their views of champions and treat them humanely".

"One of our duties as officials is to protect and care for athletes," he said.

Hafnaoui's mother Amira said her son's main focus right now is his recovery.

"Ahmed's absence from the Paris Olympics has not yet been confirmed. Even if he is absent, Ahmed is an Olympic champion and has achieved international recognition despite his young age, and there is still a long way to go before him to achieve that best."

"The priority currently is his physical and mental health," she added.

Hafnaoui had trained in California late last year under former US swim coach Mark Schubert, who runs a distance swimming programme in Orange County.

However, he told reporters at the World Championships in Doha in February that he had returned home to Tunisia, citing a visa issue.

In 2021 at the age of 18, Hafnaoui started the world by winning the 400m freestyle gold from late night at the pandemic-delayed Tokyo Olympics after being the slowest qualifier in the final.

He claimed his 800m and 1,500m freestyle titles at last year's World Championships in Fukuoka and was runner-up in the 400m backstroke at the Asian Games.

However, he failed to reach the final in all three events at the last World Championships in Doha in February.—Reuters

Flying under the radar, Dortmund stun Europe with CL final spot

PARIS: Eleven years after losing 2-1 in German club Bayern Munich in the 2013 Champions League final, Borussia Dortmund have overcome the odds and are heading back to Wembley.

Dortmund's 1-0 win over Paris St Germain in the French capital thanks to a header from Mats Hummels on Tuesday saw the Germans complete a 2-0 aggregate win, becoming the most unlikely Champions League finalists since Tottenham Hotspur in 2019.

In the June 1 final in London, they will face either Bayern again or 14-time champions Real Madrid.

Dortmund came into the season on the back of a bitter Bundesliga title loss on the final matchday of the previous campaign.

And while their league results quickly confirmed Edin Terzic's team did not have the consistency to be a serious title contender this season, it was a different story in Europe.

Dortmund, who lost the tournament in 1997, crossed through their group with only one loss in six matches against PSG, AC Milan and Newcastle United.

"There is always a team that no one has on their radar that reaches the quarter-finals or the semi-finals. We wanted to be the team that will not necessarily be anyone's radar," Terzic said. "That road has been unbelievable."

"Last season, we lost the championship at home on the last matchday, I'm happy that we can now give something back to the fans," Terzic added, remembering how Bayern Munich snatched the Bundesliga title from Dortmund on goal difference.

"Going to the final was a very emotional moment, a beautiful moment. We wished at the last season's last matchday. But today we could just remember back, keep them dreaming and now we'll do everything to bring the trophy back home."

Dortmund did not play the kind of spectacular football that instantly attracts attention but scored key wins at Newcastle and Milan. After losing on the first matchday, Dortmund won five group games without defeat to top the section.

"After the second matchday (falling a lone 0-1 against PSG and a home draw against Milan) almost no one believed in us any more," said captain Emre Can. "We only had one point after two matches but we kept believing in us and that was the most important thing. Keeping two clean sheets in two matches against PSG is no mean feat."

Borussia Dortmund's Marco Reus, who announced on Friday he would leave the

club at the end of the season, said "nobody expected us to make it".

"Tomorrow nobody will ask how we did it. They will just see the same Borussia Dortmund in the final at Wembley," Reus said to Asenso Principe. "Today it was clear that we needed to suffer and that we needed some luck, but what both did was crazy."

Prior to their two 1-0 wins over PSG in the last four, Dortmund had dispatched PSV Eindhoven in the round of 16 and Atlético Madrid in the quarter-finals. A rematch with Bayern remains on the cards.

"We will come up against a very tough opponent, no matter who it is," said Hummels. "Since that second matchday we have kept believing we can hold our own in the Champions League. There is absolutely no reason whatsoever not to believe that we can also win the final."

Dortmund have played a roller-coaster Bundesliga season and are currently in fifth place with two games left.

"That plays no role," Terzic said. "In 2013 when Dortmund were in the Champions League final they were 25 points behind in the league and in 1997 when they won it they were also not doing well. The season had highs and lows but our season is still not finished."

Dortmund took their lead in both semi-finals, with PSG hitting the woodwork six times — including four times on Tuesday.

Despite needing assistance from the goal judge, Dortmund's central defensive pairing of Hummels and Nico Schlotterbeck kept PSG's sole attacker Kylian Mbappe under check.

PSG began the second half well but their flurry was cut short when Hummels headed in a corner on the 59-minute mark.

Borussia's history has a history of breaking French hearts.

At the 2014 World Cup in Brazil, Hummels nodded in the only goal in Germany's 3-0 quarter-final win over France on their way to a fourth crown.

Hummels' contract expires at the end of the season and he has said he will not decide until the summer when he plays next season — or whether he plays on at all.

But while the veteran may join Roma in walking off into the Westfalenstadion, his whereabouts on the first Saturday in June remain clear.

farewell from PSG after their shock win deprived him of playing his last game for the club on Wednesday.

The 2018 World Cup winner will leave PSG after seven years when his contract expires at the end of this season, with Real Madrid his likely next destination.

He had hoped to sign off by leading the Qatar-owned club to Champions League glory for the first time in their history, but missed two good chances at the Parc des Princes.

"I tried to help my team as best as I could but I didn't do enough," Mbappe said. "For the guy who scores goals and is decisive. When things are good, I kick off the line-dash and when they are not, you have to take the shadow. That's not a problem. The third goal who should have scored tonight was me. That's life and we have to move on, rest and the team."

It will be hard for PSG to do that, given how close they were to reaching the final for the second time, four years on from their defeat against Bayern Munich in Lisbon.

That will forever remain as close as Mbappe came to lifting the European Cup with his hometown team, for whom he is their all-time top scorer with 225 goals.

Being knocked out by the team who sit fifth in the Bundesliga looks like a disaster for a club who have invested so much in PSG over the years since the Qatar takeover of 2011.

However, the truth is also that this PSG side was not seriously expected to get this far, despite the presence of Mbappe.

A massive overhaul of the squad was undertaken ahead of this season following the departures of Loris Karius and Neymar, and Luis Enrique was brought in to oversee the new project.

"The objective I set out when I arrived was to compete as well as we could for every trophy," the Spanish coach said on Tuesday. "Tonight I'm proud of my team, of all the players."

PSG won the Ligue 1 title and have the French Cup final to come later this month.

"We weren't efficient, they were efficient, they scored two goals and won both matches. There's lot to take back from this competition," captain Marquinhos told reporters.

"At the start of the season, nobody believed we'd get this far. We've overcome a lot of obstacles, but we can't throw everything away now just because we've been eliminated. We have to remember that this is a new project, with a new coach. There are positive things to take into the next season," —Agencies

Shehla group summons PHF Congress today

LAHORE: While the federal government-appointed reconciliation committee, which was formed to resolve the dispute between two rival groups of the Pakistan Hockey Federation (PHF), is yet to announce its decision to end their tussle, one of the groups headed by Shehla Rana has summoned its Congress meeting in Rawalpindi on Thursday.

The second group headed by Tariq Hussain Rana is in Malaysia presently with the national team, which is competing in the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup.

Rana, Masheed Rana, the head of the reconciliation committee, held detailed meetings with the two groups but the committee's decision on the future is still pending.—Sports Reporter

Murray to return for Geneva Open

LONDON: Britain Andy Murray will make his comeback from injury at this month's Geneva Open after the former world number one was handed a wildcard by the organisers of the French Open tournament on Wednesday.

Murray, who turns 37 later this month, rallied his ankle in the final set of his defeat by Czech Tomas Machac in the Miami Open in March and withdrew from the Monte-Carlo Masters and Madrid Open last month.

The Scot opted not to undergo surgery and will now return to the May 19-25 tournament in Switzerland.

The three-time Grand Slam winner, who had hip resurfacing surgery in 2013, previously said he did not plan to "play much past this summer" but hoped to compete at another Olympics.

Murray had also said he hoped to play at the French Open, which starts at Roland Garros on May 26. Murray has not played in the tournament since 2008.—Reuters

PCB perplexed as Amir still awaits Ireland visa

KARACHI: Pakistan pacer Mohammad Amir is still waiting for his Ireland visa to travel to the country for the three-match Twenty20 International series that commences on Friday.

The 32-year-old, who announced his international retirement in March to make his Pakistan return ahead of this year's T20 World Cup, is part of the national side's 18-member squad for the Ireland series and the four-test-series against England after that.

Amir, however, has been left waiting in Lahore while the remaining members of the Pakistani squad flew to Dublin on Monday. The country's cricket board is in constant touch with its Ireland counterpart.

"We are in regular contact with the Cricket Ireland officials over the matter and they have told us that Amir's visa is still in process," a Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) spokesman told Dawn on Wednesday.

Amir was brought back to the national camp following his decision to make himself available for Pakistan in order to boost the side's prospects of winning the T20 World Cup, which is set to be held in the United States and the Caribbean next month.

Pakistan's matches against Ireland, to be played until May 14 and those against England, scheduled to be held from May 22-30, will serve as the side's final warm-up ahead of the T20 showpiece, which Balbir Amarn's men will kick off with their match against co-hosts US.

Given the importance of the Ireland and England matches, discussions prevail in the PCB's offices over Amir's visa issue, which can potentially cut short the crucial match practice for the bowler, whose only international matches after a gap of four years were four matches in the recent five-match T20I series against New Zealand.

Dawn understands that the PCB remains hopeful that Amir will be granted the visa, but if that does not happen, the pacer will be directly flown to London, where Pakistan will play their first T20 against England.

Amir, who holds temporary residence of the United Kingdom, featured in Ireland's inaugural Test match in 2018. CI has communicated to the PCB that it is in touch with Ireland's department of foreign affairs, which, according to the Irish board, works independently of visa processing.

However, officials in the PCB are perplexed at the situation, having the view that a member cricket board holds the responsibility to ensure visiting team players do not face issues related to visa processing.

Amir, along with the remaining members of the Pakistani contingent, had applied for the visa after the team's fitness camp in the country's military academy in Kakul in March.

CI did not respond to Dawn's inquiry over the issue.

Pakistan come back to edge Canada, face Japan in Azlan Shah Cup final

LIMA: Pakistan and Japan won their respective matches on Wednesday to qualify for the Sultan Azlan Shah Cup final in Ipoh.

Both the teams top the table with 10 points each from four matches. The final will be staged on May 11 at the Azlan Shah Stadium.

Pakistan have registered three wins and a draw while Japan also share the same number of wins plus a draw.

On Wednesday, Pakistan defeated Canada 5-4 while Japan beat hosts Malaysia 2-1.

Malaysia and New Zealand are placed at third and fourth, respectively, with six points each.

South Korea have registered three points and are at five while Canada with no wins, are at bottom in the standings knockout event.

Continuing with their impressive comeback show in the event, Pakistan edged Canada.

The green-shorts, who clawed back from two goals down, to register a well-deserved win, now top the

situation sheet with 10 points under their belt and face New Zealand in their last league match scheduled for Friday.

In earlier matches of the ongoing event, Pakistan worked their way back from 3-0 down against Malaysia before winning 5-4, and the same scenario started against Japan in the 3-1 draw.

Son Davies' field goal in the fifth minute pushed the Canadians, 15th in the world rankings, ahead of Pakistan, 15.

Forward Harrie Botha, with 25 caps under his belt, then added further gloss by scoring the second goal in the 17th minute giving Canada a solid looking 2-0 lead.

But Pakistan, the three-time former Sultan Azlan Shah Cup champions, made a superb comeback with two goals in quick succession a space of two minutes, leaving Canadian goalkeeper Matthew Sammons baffled.

After Riki Mahomed struck back-to-back goals for Pakistan in the 28th and

39th minutes, Arshad Liaqat extended Pakistan's lead to 3-2 (46th), Asifur Wahab Rana made it 4-2 (44th) and Ghulam Ali marked the fifth (51st).

Canada's Son Davies made a field goal in the 45th minute, and Arjeet Buttar scored in another field attempt in the 50th that reduced the deficit to 5-4.

Except for the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics where Pakistan comfortably won 7-1 in a pool match, the record shows the contest between the two nations have always been close. In

the last 14 meetings, Pakistan won 10 times, Canada three times that included claiming a 6-0 whitewash victory over the former world champions in the 2017 Hockey World League semi-finals in London, and drawn once.

Pakistan head coach Rehmat Gillani praised Canada.

"Let me give credit to Canada. They played a good game and gave us a hard time today. We were only able to come back in the second quarter after being 2-0 down. Although we led 5-3,

the pressure was still on us. And we had so many chances to score and even had 11 penalty corners," the Dutch coach said after the match.

"At this moment we have not thought of the last pool match against New Zealand on Friday," he added.

Patrick Dablander, the Canadian coach, said the dedicated performance shown by his players delighted him.

"I thought we started pretty well and were fortunate to get some good chances. It was a tough competition in the second and fourth quarters, as we were under a lot of pressure, but I am happy with the commitment given by the players," Dablander said in his post-match comments.

"It was a good score, but it could have been a little different and in our favour, if the players had kept the game in control and not lost focus against Pakistan. We play Japan on Friday and I hope the team plays well as they did today,"—Agencies

Olympic flame arrives in Marseille amid tight security

MARSEILLE: The Olympic flame reached Marseille, just outside the Old Port, amid tight security on Wednesday, 29 days before the Paris 2024 Games Opening Ceremony.

More than 150,000 people are expected to attend the ceremony after a six-hour parade of the torch-bearers. "Paris 2024 executive director Thierry Belotti who is in charge of ceremonies," Marseille is the ideal spot to create memories."

"It was the obvious choice," Tony Estanguet, the president of the Paris 2024 organizing committee, said of Marseille, which was founded around 600 BC by Greek settlers from Phocaea.

That will be followed by a free rap concert on a floating stage in front of 45,000 spectators.

On Wednesday morning, the tranquility of the port's broad sea was matched only by the glittering of the Mediterranean sun in the background of the

Old Port, making for an ideal day in France's oldest city.

The relay will start on Thursday with former Olympians de Marseille footballers Jean-Pierre Papin, Didier Deschamps and Bastie Rolland, as well as chairman of Alexandre Macia among the torch-bearers.

More than 10,000 people will take part in the torch relay before the flame reaches Paris and is installed near the Louvre, in the Jardin des Tuilleries. Extremely tight security will be a constant feature on the torch route through more than 450 French towns and cities, and passes by dozens of tourist attractions including the Musée Sainte-Chapelle.

Around 200 members of the security forces are set to be positioned permanently around it, including an anti-terror SWAT team and anti-drone operators.

Organisers have promised a

"spectacular" and "joyous" Olympics, with much of the sport set to take place in temporary venues around the City of Light including at the Eiffel Tower and the Invalides.

In the absence of a multi-tiered security zone, the opening ceremony will take place in boats on the river Seine in a radical departure from past Games which have opened in the main stadium.

All of the major infrastructure has been completed with only two new permanent sporting venues built in a bid to reduce the financial cost and carbon emissions of the global extravaganza.

The idea of the torch relay harks back to the ancient Olympics when a sacred flame burned throughout the Games.

The Paris Olympics will run from July 26-August 11, followed by the Paralympics from August 28-September 8.—Agencies

Crawley aiming for white-ball role

LONDON: Zak Crawley is aiming to secure a more regular role in England's white-ball teams after establishing himself in the Test side under skipper Ben Stokes and head coach Brendon McCullum.

Test opener Crawley has averaged over 1,000 runs in 12 matches since the start of 2023, playing with an attacking, aggressive style that has often helped

his team get off to quick starts.

His Test form has led to calls for his inclusion in the white-ball teams, but the 26-year-old was left out of England's squads for last year's 50-over World Cup and the Twenty20 edition next month.

"I've always wanted to be a good white-ball player," Crawley, who has played eight One-day Internationals and no

T20s for England, told the Sky Sports Cricket Podcast.

"I'm trying to add a few other shades to my game, but I feel like I'm quite suited and I've gone well in T20 cricket in the past when I've had a role at it," Crawley said much of his focus had been on Test cricket in recent years.

"It was always my priority for me to play Test cricket," he

said.

Sangakkara backs Samson as India keeper for T20 World Cup

NEW DELHI: Rajasthan Royals captain Sanju Samson has made his case to be India's first-choice wicket-keeper at the T20 World Cup, the team's director of cricket Kumar Sangakkara has said.

Samson has been named in India's 15-member squad as wicket-keeper alongside Delhi Capitals skipper Rohit Sharma, who has also impressed in the Indian Premier League after his return to cricket following a horror car crash.

He smashed 86 off 46 balls on Tuesday but the knock went in vain, with the Capitals winning by 20 runs to home.

Samson has been in prime form with 421 runs in 11 matches and Tuesday's match was his fifth half-century of the season.

Sangakkara played down the Paul vs Sanju Samson debate in the post-match press conference but made his choice clear.

"It's really up to Rohit and Rohit's manager and how they see the combination," Sangakkara told reporters. "But Sanju has made his case, so hopefully he'll have a good run in the World Cup."

Samson has been an established leader of his team, who are all set through to the playoffs with eight wins in 11 matches and is third in the batting table behind Virat Kohli (542) and Ravindra Jadeja (541).

"With Sanju, the biggest thing about this season for him is having a lot of clarity about the way he should bat," former Sri Lanka wicket-keeper Isuru Udana said.

"There are certain stages of the game that he seems to have a bit of an advantage, which we've addressed from past seasons," he added.—AFP

Bangladesh recall Shakib for last two Zimbabwe T20s

DHAKA: Bangladesh recalled all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan and pace-bowler Mustafizur Rahman for the final two Twenty20 internationals of the five-match series against Zimbabwe.

Former captain Shakib has not played T20 since July 2022, and was this year elected as a member of parliament for Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's ruling party.

Shakib has refused to drop the curtain on his cricket career, and his participation in this series suggests the star player may still be in contention for June's Twenty20 World Cup.

Left-arm spinner Mustafizur was rested for the first three matches after returning from the Indian Premier League, where he was the season's joint-high wicket-taker for the Chennai Super Kings.

Former batsman Soumya Sarkar also returned to the side after missing the first three matches due to injury.

Enacted years ago, witness protection law fails to see the light of day

- Passing the buck, govt departments inform SHC that response on draft rules awaited for eight years
- Bench expresses serious resentment against inordinate delay

KARACHI: The Sindh High Court was on Wednesday informed that the provincial home department had been waiting for a response from stakeholders on the draft Sindh Witness Protection Rules for the past eight years.

The home department submitted in its comments filed before a two-judge bench headed by Chief Justice Aspel Ahmed Abbasi that in 2016 it had circulated the

proposed draft rules to various officials and departments but despite the lapse of around eight years their response was still awaited.

The SHC has been expressing serious resentment against the authorities concerned over an inordinate delay to take necessary steps for proper implementation of the witness protection law enacted over a decade ago.

The law and home departments have filed their comments and attempted to shift the blame on others over an inordinate hold-up to enforce the law.

The law department asserted that it had verified the drafted rules in September 2014 and thereafter had no information whether such rules were approved and notified by the home department or otherwise while the home department maintained that proposed rules were circulated to the finance and law departments as well as various other offices in 2016, but their response was still awaited.

A petition was filed last year seeking proper implementation of the Sindh Witness Protection Act, 2013 and at the previous hearing the SHC had ordered

the authorities to take necessary steps for proper implementation of the law and warned that the secretary of the home and law departments would be summoned if the compliance was not made.

When the two-judge bench took up the matter for hearing on Wednesday, the law and home departments filed their comments.

The reply filed on behalf of the law secretary asserted that the law was enacted and notified in June 2013 and being custodian of law, the home department mere drafted rules and the same were certified/verified by the law department in 2016, however their response was still awaited.

After such progress, the law department had no information whether these rules were approved and notified by the home department or otherwise and the administrative department would be in better position to explain the court about further progress, it added.

The home department in its comments countered that witness protection advisory board under the chairmanship of home secretary and witness protection unit had already been notified while an

additional inspector general of police (AIGP) had been requested in 2016 nominate officers for constitution of the committee, but the request had not been received yet.

It also maintained that comments were also called from AIGP of counter terrorism department and secretary/ premier advisory board about procedure to appoint witness protection officers in 2016, however their response was still awaited.

A copy of the draft proposed Sindh Protection Rules, 2016 under Witness Protection Act, 2013 was circulated to the various offices via e-mail, prosecutor general Sindh, AIGP CTB Sindh, law department, finance department and inspector general of police Sindh via home department No. 540/LI-14/03/6/70/2023 dated 20-09-2016. However, the replies are yet not received, it concluded.

After taking the comments on record, the bench adjourned the hearing till May 30.

PTI claims police crackdown ahead of May 9 protests

KARACHI: On the eve of first anniversary of May 9 incidents, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaaf (PTI) on Wednesday accused the Pakistan Peoples Party-led Sindh government of launching a crackdown on the party across the city.

The party said raids were being carried out on workers' houses, their families were being "harassed" and activists were detained, but expressed the resolve that the party would not stop from taking to streets on Thursday (May 10) to exercise its constitutional and democratic right of peaceful protest and demonstration.

In an early-morning video statement, social media update and messages to its workers, the Karachi leadership of the party came up with claims about pre-dawn raids on workers' houses by police and detention of a number of activists and

their family members.

The party alleged that the "barbarism" was carried out on the behalf of the PPP government.

In the video statement shared by the party on different social media platforms, PTI-Karachi president Raaja Aftab said that the police had raided the houses of PTI leaders Sajid Naqvi, Saeed Afridi, Fahim Khan and Shahzadre Jadoon.

"The police harassed their families when they weren't found at home. Even they [the police] established with the women and children of the leaders. In one case, the police detained younger brother of Shahzadre Jadoon and took him away. Our Sialkot Town president was also arrested. It's not policing but fascism on direct orders of PPP government and their leaders Bilawal Bhutto and CM Murad Ali Shah."

He said the government had labelled PTI workers as terrorists and treating them as "anti-state elements" which was a sheer injustice as the workers and supporters of the party were the most patriotic citizens of Pakistan.

The party spokesperson, Faizia Siddiqui, later in the evening said the police though released the Sialkot Town president a few hours after the detention, law-enforcement agency kept raiding the houses of party workers even later in the day.

"We were seeing this constant [police] raids on eve of May 9," she told Dawn. "So the party has advised workers to adopt all precautionary measures."

There tried to contact senior police officials for their version, but there was no response.

No order issued by SC for removal of hawkers: registrar

KARACHI: Terming a report published in Dawn about its recent order "wholly inaccurate and misleading", the Supreme Court of Pakistan has said its April 25 order "does not direct the removal of street hawkers".

A detailed rejoinder sent by the registrar of the apex court was in reference to a column piece, "The CJP and Karachi hawkers", published in the newspaper in its edition of May 6.

While pointing at certain factual inaccuracies in the article, the letter states that what is fundamentally wrong and contrary to the record is to categorise the order of April 25, 2024 as "not dissimilar from the order issued by then-CJP Justice Gulzar Ahmed", which had directed buildings to be demolished. "The order dated 25 April 2024

does not do this," says the SC letter.

In the letter sent to Dawn, the SC registrar has also highlighted certain portions of the April 25 order about "encroachments", "containment" and "tears".

Regarding the issue of "encroachments", the SC order states: "Whilst encroachments by citizens are demolished, it is uniformly noted that encroachments on public roads and pavements are made by those paid out of the public exchequer. Occupants of properties also assume that the government running in front of their property is theirs, to do with it as they please. Governors are also installed thereon. Pavements are for the use of the public; access thereto and use thereof cannot be prevented or restricted."

The order further says: "Everyone, including the provincial and federal governments, and all those under them must abide by the law and cannot encroach upon

public roads and pavements nor can block them which may stop or restrict public use thereof."

According to the order, citizens must not be inconvenienced as "these paid out of the public exchequer serve the people, and not vice versa".

While referring to observations of the additional attorney-general for Pakistan and the advocate general for Sindh regarding the placement of certain barriers for protection against terrorist attacks, the SC order states: "We are mindful of the security concerns and the same can be met by placing the barriers within the premises."

Regarding its implementation, the SC order directs all the provincial governments, as well as the federal government, to clear public roads and pavements of all encroachments from all over the country within three days, "leaving which the same

should be demolished/removed by the relevant authority and the cost incurred thereon shall be recovered from those who breached thereof".

In regard to the buildings in official use, the SC order states: "The amount shall be recovered from the pay of the senior most official in occupancy of the property/building in front of which runs the pavement on which barriers or other restrictions preventing public use thereof are placed."

The SC order also instructs the government to place advertisements in newspapers informing the public of this order, and to ask the Pakistan Electronic Media Regulatory Authority (Pemra) to direct their licensees to broadcast it as a free public service message.

The SC registrar's letter also mentions certain excerpts from the SC order regarding the shipping containers that used by the authorities from time to time for security

purposes, but are left on the roadside or on pavements, and instructed that this practice needs to be stopped.

It also observed that there was a need to fine the roads with trees in order to control pollution and counter effects of climate change.

While referring to the detailed excerpts on the issue of encroachments, the registrar's letter states that the SC order "does not direct the removal of street hawkers", describing the headline of the newspaper article as "wholly inaccurate and misleading".

At the same time, the SC registrar's letter points out that in the newspaper article there were certain factual inaccuracies like the CJP Qazi Fazl Bar's name was misspelled, and that the period when Justice Gulzar Ahmed was the CJP, and the year in which he passed order about Karachi, were incorrect.

and India.


"I have read many books in my life, I can't quote a number here, but I can tell a good book

'Gaza genocide is for land occupation, economic interests'

Experts share their understanding of devastation unleashed by Israel in Palestine

KARACHI: Wearing black armbands, participants in a dialogue on the topic of 'The Palestinian Corporation: Economic Rationalisations and Calls for Social Justice' organised by the Egalitarians, an economics society at the Institute of Business Management (IBM) here on Tuesday, shared a wealth of knowledge and understanding behind the devastation and recent incidents in Gaza.

Former ambassador Ghulam Rasheed Baloch said that it was imperative to witness the ongoing genocide for the last seven months. "We can close our eyes when it becomes too painful to watch but we cannot close our conscience. The place has been made unbearable for Palestinians. It will take them at least 14 years to clean the Gaza Strip," he said.

He also pointed out that the attacks on Gaza had nothing to do with religion. "It has everything to do with imperialist enterprise. It is simply an economic interest of the West to dominate the world through Israel," he said.

Former ambassador Syed Hassan Habib said that the world was on Palestine's side and yet it made no difference. "We are at a position where we have no solution. In this crisis the position taken by Israel is unrealistic."

Economist and writer Dr Shahidul Bhattacharya was of the opinion that cowboy culture was getting mixed with moral order. "If you try to understand the psyche of the Israelis, they want to teach Gaza to make a beautiful new resort there," he said.

"We are looking at a similar situation in Jammu and Kashmir. India is seeking investments for their occupied Kashmir. The idea is to enclose on populations who live in beautiful areas and build tourist resorts there," he added.

Dr Asifur Rasheed, educationist and expert on international relations, also said that the people of Gaza were seen by the West as 'useless' people occupying a piece of valuable land as they need to be removed. "These days you need to

look at countries as markets and their link with countries as facilitation criteria," he said. "Whatever we are seeing happening in Palestine is happening in the name of development. There is the Israeli Ben Gurion canal plan, connecting the Red Sea to the Mediterranean Sea. The place for this plan happens to be right next to northern Gaza," he pointed out.

Senior journalist and analyst Waqasullah Khan said that it was in fact a misconception that the conflict between Israel and Palestine was religious. "Maybe your grandfather lived somewhere but left and have been gone for centuries. Then how can it be your right to go there one day and reclaim the same place, which is now home to someone else, on just this knowledge?

The West has accepted this theory than it is ok to throw out anyone from where your ancestors lived but it is wrong," he said.

"Why isn't Germany give back what they took away from the Jews in Hitler's time?" The German compensation to Israel should have gone to the families of the victims of that time but it goes instead to Israel. This was done to strengthen the Israeli economy, of

course. Europe actually doesn't like Jews. They don't want them back if anything happened to Israel," he added.

Assistant Professor and senior lecturer at IBM Mohammad Zulfiqar and President of the Egalitarians Fatima Aslam also spoke.

Well-known social worker Fahad Baloch said that he had earlier accompanied his late father Abdul Sattar Baloch to Palestine to extend humanitarian help but this time it was just not possible. "Earlier, we used to go there through Egypt. But now even Egypt is not willing to allow us passage or give us visa. Many other Islamic nations are also trying to reach Gaza but are stuck," he said.

The problem is that Egypt is afraid. Egypt, like Turkey and Pakistan, is drowning in International Monetary Fund and World Bank debts. Therefore, they are also afraid of sanctions or demands from these two entities as they won't be able to fulfil their demands that can lead to the collapse of their governments," he added.

"Quite frankly, the Israelis are doing what Hitler was doing to them in his concentration camps. If he was a Rightist/Fascist power then so are the Israeli. They are no different," he said.

Need stressed for thalassaemia screening before marriage

KARACHI: Speakers at a seminar emphasised that would-be couples must undergo thalassaemia screening tests to know whether or not they carry the genes of the severe blood disorder.

The seminar was organised by the Sylhet Blood Bank and Thalassaemia Centre to mark World Thalassaemia Day on Wednesday.

Senior haematologists and health professionals stressed the need of creating mass awareness about thalassaemia to make Pakistan a thalassaemia-free country.

They highlighted that the fatality rate among children with thalassaemia had been on the rise in Pakistan but young people from both genders motivated to

get tested for this blood disorder before marriage would go a long way to reverse this trend.

The participants of the event were informed that a blood bank and treatment facility, being run by the Sylhet International Trust, had been offering free-of-cost thalassaemia screening tests to let young would-be couples from underprivileged families determine before their marriage whether or not they carry the genes of severe blood disorder to protect the health of their coming generation.

Speaking on the occasion, Sylhet Blood Transfusion Authority secretary Dr Dar-e-jane Javid said that the committee should fully support the government's prevention and treatment efforts to overcome the thalassaemia disorder in

Pakistan.

She urged the audience that pre-marital thalassaemia screening testing should be conducted on a compulsory basis. She said the community should fully back the government's drive to implement the laws aimed at prevention of the genetic blood disorders.

She said that mass awareness campaign should be launched to persuade would-be couples to get tested for thalassaemia before their marriage on a compulsory basis.

She said the SHTA had been doing research on various aspects related to blood transfusion and related disorders.

Senior haematologist Dr Ghulam Riazwar informed the audience that the requirement of blood for transfusion services to treat the affected children

had lately decreased at the Sylhet Blood Bank and Thalassaemia Centre. He said that at present 700 children were registered to get treatment services at the centre. In the past, up to 6,000 units of blood were required to treat them in a month, which has now decreased to 5,500 units. He said this observation had indicated that the best treatment and medication services had improved the health of the affected children.

Dr Sarwar said that writing blood donors for the children with thalassaemia had been a major problem for their concerned parents who continued with this struggle on a lifelong basis.

Hematologist Dr Yousaf Jameel said that a bone marrow transplant was a very expensive option to treat thalassaemia and children with thalassaemia and their concerned parents also attended the session.

Sylhet Trust CEO Md. Aslam Riaz said that merely treatment and medication were not enough to combat genetic disorders like thalassaemia as people needed to have proper knowledge about such diseases as an effective means of prevention.

Islamabad police's all-inclusive licence policy rife with complications

Experts say move to issue licences to 'outsiders' violates law; police say otherwise

ISLAMABAD: The decision of the Islamabad Traffic Police (ITP) to dole out driving licences to every citizen irrespective of their residential address stands in stark contrast to relevant laws, as these documents can be only issued to the citizens by the respective licensing authority – separate for each district.

According to law experts, there is a tradition in the police department in each district police headed by the SSP, which is the competent authority to issue licences under Section 7 (Grant of Licences) of the Motor Vehicles Ordinance, 1965.

According to Section 7 of this law, "Any person, who is not disqualified under Section 4 for driving a motor vehicle and who is not for the time being disqualified for holding or obtaining a licence, may apply to the licensing authority having jurisdiction in the area in which he ordinarily resides or carries on business or, if the application is for a licence to drive as a paid employee, in which the employee resides or carries on business for the issue of a licence."

Under this law, the relevant authority can only issue licences to those who either reside or have business in its jurisdiction, experts said, adding that the authority can also issue licences to applicants, whose employer neither resides nor has business in its jurisdiction.

One of the complications which will arise due to the recent decision of the ITP is the postal address supposed to go on the license. It is also unclear which address will be mentioned on the license – permanent or temporary – for applicants residing outside the federal capital. The police spokesperson, however, said that for the time being, the permanent address from the CNIC would be mentioned on the license.

Similarly, there is no centralised authority for the issuance of licenses, which means people can obtain multiple licenses from different district traffic police offices and thus asking applicants to get the license from their district aims to curb this practice.

The issuance of licences to people who do not live in Islamabad will also result in complications in the enforcement of traffic policies because of potential problems with their residential addresses. In 2014, the ITP in collaboration with Pakistan Post started delivering licences to applicants' homes to ensure the implementation of the law, and only the residents of the capital were issued driving licences by the authority. However, the majority of the licences were returned to the ITP headquarters as most of the addresses were 'fake'.

Police officials said that people from other districts, especially Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and northern Punjab, are interested in ITP licences as these are certified by the International Organisation for Standardisation and recognised in 80 countries. Moreover, Pakistani citizens registered with the ITP can drive abroad without the need for an international driving licence for one year.

Proposed to IGP

Police officials told Dawn that the ITP

had sent a proposal to the Inspector General of Police to legalise the interior minister's order, as without the amendment in Section 7 of the Motor Vehicle Ordinance, the traffic police cannot issue licences to outsiders.

Legal experts said that in response to the proposal, the SSP could issue standing orders under Section 12 (power to make rules) of the Police Rules. However, the approval of the "provincial government" was still mandatory.

Lawyer Hafiz Imran Aslam Mirza told Dawn that the Motor Vehicle Ordinance was a "proper law" which could not be amended "on the wish and will". Proper legislation is required for the amendment of the law, he added.

According to Sections 22 and 43 of the ordinance, the government "shall make rules", said Advocate Mirza, adding that the PM and the cabinet were the government, not the IGP or the interior minister. As per the rules, the IGP cannot issue a standing order amending the rules, he added.

The lawyer said the issuing authority in each district could issue licences to citizens in its辖区 in light of their details, such as domicile and relevant records, available with them.

Islamabad police spokesperson Tariq Javed said the interior minister's instructions to the ITP did not violate any law.

The spokesperson said such people will get licences issued by the ITP after the approval of SSP under Section 7 of MVO.

The PPO also confirmed that the SSP

sent a proposal to the IGP to "legalise the instructions" of the minister regarding the issuance of licences to every citizen.

Naqvi asks CDA to focus on development of stalled sectors

ISLAMABAD: The chronic issue of stalled sectors got the attention of Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi on Tuesday, as he directed the Capital Development Authority (CDA) to start development work in these sectors as well as digitise land record within six months.

At present, the CDA has 13 acquired residential sectors and nine of them are stalled with no signs of development.

In addition to these 13 sectors, there are nine other sectors that have not been acquired yet but will be acquired sooner or later as per the civic body's plan.

The CDA, which is supposed to develop areas in the capital, has hardly taken in this area as it could not develop any new sector after D-12, which was completed in 2008. E-12 is the highlight of the stalled sectors. Plans in this sector were sold by the CDA in 1999 and it has not been developed even now, with many who purchased the land having passed away.

In 2008, the CDA launched E-13 sector and sold plots, but people are still waiting to get possession in this sector. However, work in this sector along with E-12 is near completion.

In 2008, the CDA through a land-sharing formula acquired several other sectors—D-13, E-13, F-13, H-16, C-13, C-14, C-15 and C-16. Out of them, development work is in progress only in C-14 and C-15 with no signs of development in other sectors.

As per the city's master plan, sectors H-13, H-15, H-16, H-18, H-14, D-14, D-15, and D-16 are also supposed to be developed by the civic agency.

Officials, however, told Dawn that there was a need to complete development work in sectors that had already been acquired instead of launching new sectors.

In the meeting with the interior minister, the issue of illegal housing societies, slums, and right of way of Islamabad Expressway was discussed.

Source said during the meeting it was discussed that illegal graveyards were being set up on the right of way of this road. The PTI government in 2020 had proposed to ban and a portion of the right of way of this road only to abandon the decision after consulting senior officials.

"The interior minister ordered [the CDA] to start development work in these sectors which were being undeveloped for decades. It is given justice to the people if they are not given possession despite paying all charges," he said, adding that a comprehensive strategy in this regard would be finalised soon.

According to an official boast, Minister Naqvi said that an efficient one-window system would be established in the CDA to facilitate the people. He also asked the CDA to activate an smart mobile application within three

Rubina Khalid appointed BISP chairperson

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari Wednesday approved the appointment of a senior leader of Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Rubina Khalid as Chairman Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP).

He also accepted the resignation of Dr Amjad Soofi from his position as BISP chairperson, a press release issued by the President House said.

Dr Soofi was appointed by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif after the post had fallen vacant after the departure of Dr Sana Nishtar.

The president approved the appointment under Section 5(3) of the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) Act 2010.

In the last Pakistan Democratic Movement (PDM) government this position was retained by the PPP as its legislator Shehzia Mani was made its chairperson.

After one year of assassination of former prime minister Benazir Bhutto, the social safety network programme was launched after her name in 2008. BISP is considered as the largest and most systematic social protection initiative to be launched in Pakistan. Under the programme poor and needy people are given monetary support.

According to the BISP, the BISP board has approved record Rs471 billion budget for 2023-24 which included Rs361.5 billion for Benazir Kafilaan Programme, covering a total of 9.3 million families, Rs32.27 billion for Benazir Nasheen Programme covering 1.5 million individuals, Rs25.4 billion for Benazir Teleemi Waqaf which would benefit 9.2 million children.

In addition, Rs1 billion have been earmarked for Benazir Scholarships for Undergraduates.

Senator Rubina Rauf Khalid hails from a noted and widely respected political family of Peshawar, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. Her father late Syed Zaiar Ali Shah had served as the Member of the National Assembly (MNA) in 1985-86 and 1993-96.

A close confidant of former prime ministers Zulfikar Ali Bhutto and Benazir Bhutto, her legacy was carried out by her son Syed Zahir Shah who served in the provincial assemblies of 2002-2007 and 2008-2013 and also as Provincial Minister for Health from 2008 to 2013.

Rubina's late Husband Rauf Khalid is fervently remembered an artiste per excellence and a noted writer. His services as a film maker, actor, writer and a cultural icon were recognised by the government of Pakistan by conferring upon him the highest civil award of Sitara-i-Imtiaz.

After Rauf Khalid's tragic death in 2010, Rubina ventured into practical and political field. She was awarded senate ticket from KP in 2012 and again in 2018. She has served in the parliament for 12 long years where she has rendered services as the chairperson of the standing committee on maritime affairs, besides being member of standing committees on information, information technology, national heritage, delegated legislation besides others. — Syed Irfan Raza

DC summoned over FIRs filed against tandoor owners

ISLAMABAD: Justice Tariq Mahmood Jahanzeb of Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Wednesday summoned the deputy commissioner on a petition filed by the Naibabis Association against registration of FIRs against tandoor owners for overcharging the price of Roti.


Barrister Umar Iqbal Gillani, counsel for the petitioner, challenged the notification dated April 26 issued by the district magistrate whereby the price of Roti (100 grams) had been fixed at Rs16 and that of Naan (120 grams) at Rs20 under Section 3 of the Price Control and Prevention of Profiteering and Rounding Act, 1977.

Mr Gillani contended before the court that Section 3 of the Price Control and Prevention of Profiteering and Rounding Act, 1977, provided that the federal government was empowered to issue notifications in this regard and for a "fair price". Another mandatory requirement was that the notification shall be given publicity in the official gazette, but the impugned notification was not published in it, he added.

The counsel further contended that there was no justification for fixing the rate of Roti having a weight of 100 grams at Rs16 and the rate of Naan weighing 120 grams at Rs20.

He pointed out that in Punjab and remote areas of the province like Chakwal and Toba Teki, the same rate of Roti had been fixed. It is not possible that in a city like Islamabad, the Naibabis Association could sell Roti at the same rate as fixed by the Punjab government.

The court issued notices to all the relevant authorities and directed the "deputy commissioner... to appear in person on the next date of hearing." Further hearing has been adjourned until May 10. — Makh Ahsan



HRCP concerned over 'restrictions' on civil, political rights

Calls for upholding democratic principles, rule of law

ISLAMABAD: Expressing concerns over increasing political polarisation in the country resulting in greater restrictions on civil and political rights, the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP) has called for economic justice and protection of civil rights and emphasised on the importance of upholding democratic principles and the rule of law.

According to the report, the right to freedom of expression and assembly took a particular hit during the year.

The general elections were also delayed well beyond the 90-day constitutional limit on various grounds, and the need for new delimitations on the basis of the recent census.

The rule of law, it says, was markedly poor, with a record six-year high in fatalities related to terrorist attacks and counter-terrorism operations and two militant attacks in Balochistan and Mastung, that collectively left at least 317 dead.

The practice of extrajudicial killings continued, while street crime and the incidence of mob lynchings surged, says the report.

The report says that as in previous years, journalists, activists and political workers were subjected to enforced disappearances across the

country. An admirable show of strength, however, young Baloch women mobilised a long march from Turbat to Islamabad to protest against alleged extra-judicial killings and enforced disappearances.

Among vulnerable groups, religious minorities reported an increasing climate of fear, especially in the aftermath of an attack in Jaranwala, in which scores of churches and homes were torched and looted by mobs, following allegations

of blasphemy against a Christian man.

In the wake of the federal government's decision to expel undocumented foreigners, it says, Afghan nationals in particular were rounded up in police raids and sent to deportation centres with little or no legal recourse.

Speaking at the launch of the report, HRCP secretary-general Harris Khanique said the 2023 economic crisis had pushed tens of millions of ordinary citizens to the brink

of desperation.

Commenting on the high incidence of enforced disappearances, he also deplored the role and performance of the Commission of Inquiry of Enforced Disappearances as "disastrous".

HRCP chairperson Asad Iqbal Butt said it was critical for the state to fulfill people's rights to education, livelihood and health.

Expressing concern over the low rate of trade unionisation, he said attempts to unionise workers were routinely met with harassment and intimidation.

Vice-chair HRCP Islamabad Nasreen Aslam said religion cannot be "weaponised for political purposes".

Concluding the press conference, co-chair Munizah Jahangir said the state must protect the right to peaceful protest for all political parties and groups. She pointed out that repressive laws passed in the government's tenure would return to haunt them when in opposition.

It called upon the government to take immediate steps to address the grievances outlined in the report and uphold the principles of democracy, justice, and human rights.

Man abducted from Pindi found dead in Kashmore

RAWALPINDI: A man who was abducted for Rs20 million ransom in March by unidentified kidnappers after he left for his home in Sialkot was found dead in Kashmore Katcha area on Wednesday, police said.

After the recovery of Agha Sohail Ali Khan's body, the police recovered from Kashmore Sialkot connected the R.A. Razoor police from his pocket a driver's license bearing the name of Agha Sohail Ali Khan a resident of Tando Bhutta Rawalpindi was found, police said.

After reviewing the police station record, the R.A. Razoor police have found that the deceased was the same person who had been kidnapped for ransom in March 2024. Later, a police team was dispatched to Kashmore to bring the body of the victim back.

According to police sources, the kidnappers were in contact with the family of the abducted person and initially they demanded Rs20 million for his release from his family and later reduced it to Rs10 million.

Ahlu Sabir Ali, a resident of Tando Bhutta, lodged an FIR with the R.A. Razoor after his father Agha Sohail Ali Khan, 70, left his house for Sialkot on March 5, 2024 and went missing till his body was found by the police in Kashmore on Wednesday.

Balvir Ali said in the FIR that his father left his house for Sialkot on March 5 as his brother Agha Mehmood Maqbool Khan accompanied his father to the Rawalpindi Railway Station to see him off.

He said the next day his father informed his friend Ahsan that he had reached Sialkot safely. He further said that after he found his father's mobile phone switched off, his brother asked Ahsan if his father had any conversation with him, he replied that his mobile phone was found switched off.

He further told the police that his father was possessing ATM cards of different banks, CNIC and a driving license with him when he left his house.

His father was wearing a Shalwar Kameez, grey waistcoat and brown shoes when he left for Sialkot. Following his complaint, the R.A. Razoor has registered an FIR under section of kidnapping (365 TPV) and launched an investigation.

Meanwhile, SSP Investigation Zainur Rehman Asfar directed that the police investigating officer to ensure timely completion of cases charter.

She was presiding over a meeting at Police Lines Headquarters.

The officers assigned to follow up cases and enforcement staff participated in the meeting.

SSP Investigation gave instructions to the officers regarding the compliance of summons and warrants.

The SSP further directed that all legal requirements must be met for the punishment of the accused.

Proposal to tax pension rejected

ISLAMABAD: All Pakistan Railways Pensioners' Association has rejected the proposal to tax the pensions of retired government employees and said that for the first time in the history of Pakistan, government plans to bring pensioners into tax net.

In a meeting the members of the association observed that the proposal has been floated by bureaucrats to please the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and warned that if this decision was enforced, the government will be responsible for the reactions of the general public.

The meeting held under the chairperson of the association Mohammad Aslam Butt, also observed that the bureaucrats and technical experts negotiating with the IMF were making pensioners scapegoats of their own incompetence and financial mismanagement.

Mr Butt added that the association demands of the government to control wasteful expenditures to increase income instead of creating hardships for the retired persons.

"The government should ban unauthorised foreign visits, free fuel and vehicle facilities for senior government officials," he added.

He said that all wasted expenditures should be done away with immediately and more money has to be spent on the welfare of people.

The association's general secretary, Aslamzaib Tarelli and other officials announced that the retired government employees should not be at the mercy of ministers and advisers, to afford daily needs.

The only source of income for the retired persons was pension and if the government imposed taxes on pensions only to please the IMF, their lives would be pushed further into financial difficulties.

Think-tank sees national reconciliation key to restoring stability

ISLAMABAD: An Islamabad-based think-tank on Wednesday warned that political instability in Pakistan significantly hinders the risk of unrest, underlining the need for a national reconciliation to restore stability.

Islamabad Policy Institute (IPI) in its report titled 'Mapping the Policy Agenda 2024 – 2025' identified political instability as the foremost challenge facing the country and addressing this critical issue will ultimately pave the way for the much-needed economic reforms and attracting foreign investments.

The think-tank stressed that this process should be all-inclusive and more than just political maneuvering within the assembly or the arsenals.

Faisal Ahmed, head of research at IPI, stated that such a process should recognise and address the concerns of all involved parties so that a common ground that facilitates constructive engagement and dialogue could be found.

Although various political stakeholders have recently suggested dialogue and reconciliation, divergent views on the process—particularly IPI's insistence on negotiating directly with the military and the military's refusal to engage in talks with the main opposition party—have stalled any progress.

In this backdrop, the report suggests that while the dialogue should be largely between the political parties, it should be owned and backed by the military. This it argued would legitimate the process, ensuring broader acceptance among the public

and political entities, and foster trust among political factions, encouraging essential dialogues and cooperation.

"The military, as a significant external stakeholders, has historically played a critical role in the country's politics, and its position and reactions could significantly influence the feasibility and success of any reconciliation efforts," it stressed.

For tackling the economic crisis, it was proposed that the government should push for a comprehensive debt restructuring plan that would relieve financial pressure and spare scarce resources for critical sectors.

"Without decisive action, the risk of following in the footsteps of countries that have suffered under the weight of unsustainable debt in all too well. Restructuring offers a viable alternative, one that requires courage, strategic foresight, and a steadfast commitment to the nation's long-term economic health and sovereignty," the report maintained.

The report proposed that institutions like the IMF should be engaged not just as alternatives to restructuring, but as supportive partners in this endeavor.

The report further recommended reforming the subsidy programmes by eliminating regressive subsidies that benefit the affluent and focusing on targeted cash transfers for the vulnerable. Additionally, it suggested recalibration of government spending, strategic privatizations, and an expansion of the tax base.

On expansion of tax base, it advocated addressing the historical, political, and social dimensions of tax reform to tap into untapped sectors and bolster public trust in government spending, thus creating a more equitable and efficient tax system.

Petroleum sector expert Ziauddin Tayyab recommended significant reforms for the petroleum sector, including its deregulation and a comprehensive overhaul of related policies. He emphasized addressing bureaucratic obstacles within key entities such as the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR), Ministry of Energy, State Bank, and the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority. Tayyab also highlighted the need to resolve issues concerning tax refunds, moreover, the margins of marketing companies, and foreign exchange reserves.

Establishing a framework for investment, he maintained, will attract foreign direct investment and create a competitive environment.

Security analyst Abdul Basit while discussing the security challenges in the report, recommended reworking of the current military landscape, particularly in light of the Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan. He also called for addressing youth radicalisation, targeting the roles of gender in extremist groups, and the impacts of social media and misinformation; resolving the issue of missing persons in Balochistan through political efforts; and actively disrupting evolving alliances and sanctuaries of militant groups. — Staff Reporter

FIA probes alleged corruption, illegal appointments in APP

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) has opened investigations into the alleged illegal appointments and payment of salaries to ghost employees at the state-owned news agency Associated Press of Pakistan (APP).

The APP management had also filed a complaint against some of the employees, alleging that they were involved in releasing payments to 'ghost' employees.

Applications were filed against senior APP officials, with bearing regarding inquiry into 95 illegal appointments held at the anticorruption circle of FIA on Wednesday.

A complaint was filed by Moammar Khokhar, special assistant to the APP, against Managing Director Asim Khichi, accusing him of allegedly appointing around 100 people.

Apart from the FIA, Mr Khokhar also forwarded the complaint to the chairman PM's Inspection Commission as well as information secretary, who is also the APP Board chairman.

The complaint highlighted that not only were the appointments made in the APP during the ten period, but the laid-down procedure such as open advertisements was also not adopted.

He further alleged that most of the persons appointed were either relatives of the MD or belonged to his native area.

ment letters because the list of 100 as claimed by them was fake; they had not even provided the list of 100 persons employed by me to the FIA or any other forum," he said.

On the other hand, responding to a query, Mr Khichi acknowledged that he had made around 42 appointments on contractual basis, claiming that all the persons appointed were already working in the project initiated to establish the agency's social media wing.

"The project was set to expire in June 2023 and those working in the social media wing of APP were told in March 2023 to accept a new appointment letter with reduced salary as their services under the project would expire in the coming months," Mr Khichi said.

He presented documents which included the APP Board's approval that empowered the APP to hire personnel on contractual basis.

getting salaries from APP, did not have appointment letters or personal files with the state agency.

The complaint made to the FIA by the APP management in October 2023 was based on the report of a fact-finding committee on illegal appointments, and it pointed out that Asif Ali Shahid, Manager account APP, Islamabad disbursed salaries to these ghost employees through open

cheques.

The inquiry report highlighted that among these ghost employees was the son of Asif Ali Shahid and the FIA had been requested to help recover the illegal amount paid to these persons.

Responding to the query, a senior FIA official said that after completion of the inquiry, FIA would be lodged against those involved in misuse of power and malpractices.

Wheat crisis starts hitting cotton sowing

LAHORE: The persisting wheat crisis has begun affecting cotton cultivation in the country, ring alarm bells in the textile sector.

Cotton sowing has already been delayed due to unexpected drop in temperatures during the months of February and March, postponing wheat sowing and subsequent harvesting, which spares funds for the next crop.

As wheat has not been sold at the official rates of Rs 3,200 per 40kg, this has shrunk the farmers' power to procure seeds, pesticides, fertilizers and other farm inputs for the next crop.

Due to this factor, most of the farmers have not yet started cotton sowing, causing concern in the textile and garment sectors.

Cotton acreage has already dropped in the coastal cities of Sindh and Punjab's Bahawalnagar, Sialkot and Vehari districts etc. Apparently, the growers in these areas did not sow the crop because of low temperatures earlier in the year. This means that cotton cultivation may remain lower than the official target of harvesting over 10 million bales of white fiber.

Cotton Growers Forum chairman Hussain Haq urges both the federal and provincial authorities to annexe per acre subsidy for wheat growers to enable them to grow cotton by improving their income. Otherwise, he warns, the country will have to import cotton as well as edible oil worth billions of dollars to meet the local shortfall.

SBP promises to rectify Urdu text errors in currency

LAHORE: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) has admitted various mistakes in the Urdu text on currency notes and assured the federal ombudsman of correcting these in the upcoming new banknote series.

The mistakes/complaints were pointed out in a complaint filed by a citizen to the ombudsman.

In his complaint, Shahnaz Hussain Farid, a member of Pakistan Writers Guild, pointed out mistakes in the Urdu text (Bank Dunbar Pakistan, rupee,

Hastil Haq-e-Mustafa per Ade Karay Ga and Islamicati Pakistan ki Zamani se Jar) that while quoting various references and books.

According to the verdict announced by the ombudsman, the complainant alleging that administration on the part of SBP stated that the bank was not ready to correct Urdu text appeared on banknotes. After being disappointed by the SBP, the complainant approached the ombudsman for redressal of his grievance. A copy of complaint was also forwarded to the SBP which, later, submitted that it has

initiated the design work for the issuance of new series of banknotes and it would look into the suggestions and observations made by the complainant while finalising the Urdu text.

Both the parties were heard in detail and record was examined carefully. And during the hearing, the suggestions of the complainant were found validable.

"During investigation of the instant case, the representative of the agency (SBP) informed ombudsman and underlined that the agency would look into the suggestions and observations made by the complainant while pre-

paring the Urdu text on its new banknote series. On the assurance of the agency, the complainant showed satisfaction," reads the verdict.

The agency is advised to submit compliance report within 60 days, it directs the SBP.

On the other hand, in a letter to the complainant, the SBP through its joint director also pledged to take remedial measures in this regard. "At the concerned, the SBP will look into the suggestions/complaints made by you good self while finalising the Urdu text for our new banknote series," the letter states.

Parvez shifted to Kot Lakhpat jail

LAHORE: The government on Wednesday shifted Pakistani Tehrik-i-Talib Pakistan President Chaudhry Parvez Elahi to Kot Lakhpat Jail, Lahore.

Recently, the IHC directed the Interior secretary to decide an application seeking a court decree to declare the residence of former chief minister of Punjab Parvez Elahi as a sub-jail and his subsequent shifting there.

Justice Arbab Mohammed Tahir was hearing a petition filed by Mr Elahi's spouse, who contended that the PTI president could be detained in his residence for health reasons.

A medical board constituted to ascertain his health condition advised that the former CM be kept in Rawalpindi prison, and that he should not travel.

Reacting to PTI-president's shifting to the jail, his wife Geeta Elahi said in statement on Wednesday, "The interior secretary didn't follow Islamabad High Court's order and shifted Parvez Elahi from Islamabad to Lahore's Kot Lakhpat Jail."

"This step of the ministry of interior is against the decision of the IHC. Immediate action should be ensured according to the IHC order," she said.

Earlier, in the terms addressed to the interior secretary and Punjab's additional chief secretary home, Mr Elahi's spouse wrote, in view of his peculiar health condition, injuries, and on humanitarian grounds, my husband, Parvez Elahi, be taken out of jail premises and put under house arrest at Islamabad or Lahore.

The court noted that Mr Elahi is not a convict, and the right to life of an undertrial prisoner, guaranteed by the Constitution, supersedes the obligation of the state to try him for an alleged offence. The court directed the interior secretary to consider the application of the petitioner and pass appropriate orders in the matter falls within his competence; otherwise, the matter will be referred to the appropriate forum within two days. — Staff Reporter

Revisiting Lahore cinema and dismantling language through art

LAHORE: A character, a disdained boy of Sultan Rabi, in the short film and installation, remembers the time when a movie ticket used to cost just Rs5 in Lahore, lamenting that things have changed now.

While the film shows the condition of historical cinemas that are disappearing now, Naseem Banu's song Jidha Dil Tuj Jarey, Jaddi Gal Madi Jave from the 1967 Punjabi film Meri Meri plays in the background.

These scenes are from the video installation, Cinematic Catastrophe, by Samraad Natafia, displayed her body of work, titled "Sorry for inconvenience. But this is a rebellion," exploring the relationship between language, power and resistance and a woman's place in it. She has literally deconstructed the legal terms in dictionaries, defining the role of women in the country. dismantled the pictures, letters and words to highlight their arbitrary and fluid nature," she says.

Samraad has taken words from a law book and invert them to make a piece of art. "That's my rebellion," she declares. She

says that she wants to show that there are more words in a language which can be interpreted and remastered to give a new meaning to them according to your will. Even legal terms and words taken in text in law are misinterpreted and changed according to our own whims, she asserts. Usman Raissi has created his visual representation of Stone wave frequencies with soft oil abstractions. He says his installation is about visual representation of Stone frequencies using different materials. "I prefer to use abstractions as my surface and take soft oil as my medium. By doing so, I invite the audience to delve deeper into realms and beyond the perception of sound," he says. In Raissi's installation, soft oil on the surface creates different patterns as triggered by different frequencies of sound.

"The patterns are different because every frequency creates a separate pattern and energy. Every sound, even the human sound, differs from person to person. So does every note on a musical instrument, as that sound of a Banuri or Sarangi makes different patterns as they have different frequencies," he explains.

The other artists whose works are a part of the exhibition are Nadia Zafar, Farida Hashmi and Hira Coli. The exhibition was inaugurated by NCA Vice Chancellor Marjan Jaffri. It will continue till Friday (tomorrow).

Two women lured with online job ad, 'raped'

BALLAWALPUR: The Vehari city police have booked two men, arresting one of them, for alleged gang rape of two young women, including a university student, after luring them with online job advertisements, making their objectives file videos and blackmailing them.

According to Vehari district police spokesperson, the alleged rape incidents occurred in November 2023, but the two complainants approached the police on Tuesday last as they were being threatened by the suspects that their videos would be uploaded on social media if they lodged a complaint against them.

One of the complainants is a seventh semester university student, whose father had died and she needed a job for meeting her studies' expenditure. The other is the daughter of a private security guard and was looking for a job to contribute to the family's income.

The complainants say that the accused, who are residents of Hayat Colony, Vehari, uploaded an advertisement on social media, offering jobs to young educated women.

The complainants say that when they contacted the suspect on mobile phone,

they were called to a place for an "interview". However, when they reached the place, they suspects subjected them to sexual rape, making video clips of the heinous crime.

The women alleged that the suspects continued to blackmail and exploit the complainants for around six months and also extorted Rs 12,000 from each of them. The suspects would also force the victims to also bring other girls along, so they could rape and blackmail them too, he added. He said the police have registered FIRs (No 42724 and 428624) against the two suspects under sections 376 in, 202-A and 383 of the Pakistan Penal Code, arresting the main suspect. The other suspect has also been traced, he added.

The spokesperson said that the prime suspect is being interrogated as video clips of other victims are yet to recovered from him.

He said that the medical examination of both victims had been conducted and further actions would be taken in the light of its report to be issued by the district hospital or a hospital.

Body parts of missing man found in drain

TOKA TEK SINGH: Parts of the body of a missing young man from Jhang's Shabuwalda locality were found in a drain on Tuesday night.

Sources said deceased Asmer Ali Gujjar went missing on the night of May 1 and Jhang's Kotwali police had registered a first information report on May 4 when his parents failed to find him.

Further investigation led to the arrest of his friend, an 18-year-old Bawali Zabbari.

During interrogation, Zabbari confessed to slaughering Gujjar in his own house located in Malahia Hassan in the night of May 1. He confessed to disposing

of pieces of the body at various locations, with the main parts being dumped in the nullah after being packed in a sack.

Zabbari said he had consummated relationship with Gujjar who had also supported him financially in establishing his Barber shop. Gujjar had borne most of the expenses for Zabbari's marriage, which had taken place a few months back.

Zabbari said Gujjar wanted to develop relations with his wife. As a result, he devised a plan to kill Gujjar. The suspect said he went back to his parents' house, lured Gujjar to his home and killed him. — Correspondent

Schoolteacher held for beating minor student

BALLAWALNAKH: A Potohar Education Foundation (PEF) schoolteacher, who was booked along with the school principal and a female teacher for allegedly beating a pre-primary student and misbehaving with his parents on Tuesday, was arrested on Wednesday.

The PEF registered on the complaint of Zahoor Iqbal of Nasir Colony with B Division police said that 10-year-old Hamza Zafar, a student of Shahzad Public School, returned home from school on May 5 with serious injuries.

The child told his family that teachers Hussain and Fayyaz beat him with sticks. Principal Mohammad Raffi allegedly misbehaved with the parents and removed them from his office when they approached him.

Education Chief Executive Officer Shahzad Iftikhar told DAWN that a departmental inquiry had been initiated into the incident and the teacher had been removed from the school till the inquiry was completed while Fayyaz had been arrested as well. He said that the three-member inquiry committee would complete its task within three days.

She said that corporal punishment

was never allowed in schools.

HEAD CHICKEN: Villagers in Haroosah captured two motorcycle riders for allegedly driving dead poultry and handed them along with dozens of dead chickens over to the Christian Sadar police. They were captured when the motorcycle of the duo slipped on Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the villagers caught the injured youths and handed them over to the police. The people posted videos online in which one injured youth admits that they deliver dead chickens to Shakesh of Christian on a daily basis. The Sadar police said they had arrested two teenage boys on the villagers' complaint.

The police said the Food Department was informed by the police and that a case would be registered after a written complaint by the Food department.

No Food Department official was available for comments.

Rickshaws banned from GT Road in Peshawar

Admin also decides to seize old buses, wagons plying along BRT corridor

PESHAWAR: The district administration has banned rickshaws from the Pir Zakari Bridge-Saray Pul stretch of the Grand Trunk Road here from today (Thursday), insisting the move will ease traffic congestion on the major main thoroughfare in the capital city.

The decision about the ban was made in a meeting chaired by the commissioner of Peshawar division, Riaz Khan Mehsud, according to an official statement.

The meeting called to discuss traffic issues in the provincial capital was attended by deputy commissioners Afzal Wazir, SSP (traffic) Nasar Khan, officials of the Regional Transport Authority and traffic department, and representatives of transporters unions.

It also decided that the old buses and wagons plying the roads along the Peshawar-Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) corridor would be impounded and scrapped, while their drivers would be arrested.

The participants also agreed

about the seizure of rickshaws that are registered in other districts but operate in the provincial capital.

They also directed authorities to crack down on the rickshaws whose drivers have photographed permits and registration papers, while the sealing of rickshaw factories was also ordered.

The meeting decided to ban rickshaw supply from Punjab and order the arrest of suppliers and confiscation of these trishawles.

It said the district administration would launch a 20-day crackdown on illegal rickshaws, buses, and wagons from Thursday (today).

Under the plan, pressure horns, floodlights, tinted glasses, illegal registration plates, and musical instruments will be removed from vehicles before being destroyed, while legal action will be taken against drivers under the age of 21.

The meeting also decided to impose and scrap the buses, wagons, and rickshaws illegally operating in the provincial capital.

It chalked out a strategy to do away with illegal transport vehicles from the provincial capital and took the representatives of transporters unions into confidence about it.

Officials said at the crackdown would continue until May 29, special teams of the police, district administration, and

transport and revenue departments would be formed for its execution.

Peshawar SSP (traffic) Nasar Khan told Dawn that the traffic police had presented the traffic management plan for Peshawar to the district administration for approval and implementation.

He said the traffic police were impounding illegal rickshaws and buses and registering FIRs against their drivers.

"Last month, we [traffic police] registered FIRs against 200 rickshaw drivers and impounded 200 illegal buses and rickshaws," he said.

The SSP said that over 300,000 rickshaws and buses operated in the provincial capital, but in the case of their seizure, the traffic police lacked spaces to keep such a large number of vehicles.

An official told Dawn, requesting anonymity, that the Peshawar BRT project envisioned the scrapping of old buses plying the provincial capital roads.

He said that under the bus project, authorities scrapped around 600 old and rickety buses after making due payment to their owners in two phases.

The official, however, said that transporters later brought in buses from the Punjab province and demanded a phase-out of old buses, but the demand was turned down by authorities.

He said total procurement at the rate of Rs 31,700 per kg would cost Rs 17 billion.

"It will be ensured that farmers are provided with their due rights without any hindrance," he said, adding

Plastic surgeons to launch programme for rehabilitation of burn victims

Raising awareness to reduce burn incidents also part of initiative

PESHAWAR: Pakistan Association of Plastic Surgeons will launch provincial burns prevention programme to put brakes on incidents of burns through public awareness, ensure rehabilitation of victims and help in legislation to protect buildings from fire.

Prof Tahseenullah, the president of Pakistan Association of Plastic Surgeons (PAPS), said that burn incidents had record 15 per cent increase as compared to last year but the silver lining was that 90 per cent of cases were preventable provided public awareness was raised up and legal measures were put in place to reduce such incidents.

He said that an estimated 1.5 million people suffered burn injuries country-wide annually with 10 per cent of them happened to be life-threatening requiring hospitalisation.

Prof Tahseenullah, who is also direc-

tor of the 120-bed Burns and Plastic Surgery Centre, Peshawar, said that the programme was aimed at legislation making installation of smoke-detectors, fire extinguishers, safe electrical wiring and gas fitting in building mandatory to cut down risk of deaths from fire by 50 per cent.

He said that Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Accidents Prevention Authority would be established to ensure architectural design of buildings with fire exit plans, safety of houses, educational institutions and road safety.

"Legislation will also cover prevention of industrial burns, safety of Wapda employees along with training sessions to protect the workers, safe handling of tools and explosive chemicals with availability of personal protective equipment like industrial gloves and masks etc," said Prof Tahseenullah.

He said that about 15 to 20 per cent victims got crippled and underwent multiple surgeries and prolonged rehabilitation. "Of these, 70 per cent are in most productive age group of 15 to 40 years while 80 per cent belong to poor socio-economic strata, mainly due to illiteracy, poverty and low level safety consciousness," he added.

The director said that non-existence of

burn care services at primary and secondary healthcare levels further complicated the situation. "An all plan, we want to set up a central registry to ascertain data, assess burn-related facilities, injuries and disabilities to identify high-risk areas and populations and then take steps," he added.

Prof Tahseenullah said that they would seek support of plastic surgeons, experts in physical medicine and rehabilitation, health education and health promotion to guide, oversee, supervise and evaluate the programme. "We need more trained surgeons and nurses to improve the quality of treatment," he added.

He said that prevention was better than care for which awareness campaigns at the community level, schools and workplaces would be held in addition to utilizing television, radio, social media and community gatherings to disseminate information on burn prevention, first aid and safety measures.

"Integrate burn prevention education into the school curriculum from primary to secondary levels. Resource schools to organize awareness events and competitions on burn prevention," he said.

Two brothers killed over land dispute in Swabi

SWABI: Two brothers were killed over a land dispute in a Topi village here on Wednesday, Rescue 1122 and police officials said.

A rescue official said a team provided first aid to two men seriously injured and shifted them to the Tehsil Headquarters Hospital, Topi, where they succumbed to injuries.

The deceased were identified as Tayyab Khan, 40, and Johangir Khan, 35.

Sutton Zeb registered an FIR with the police, saying his brothers were trying to stop some labourers from harvesting wheat crop on a disputed land when Shereenzada, Gulbad and Ghohzada, who were also present there, opened fire at his brothers, injuring them critically. Later, they died in hospital.

Meanwhile, the police arrested a man, who had allegedly killed his wife in another village of Chota Lashar, according to a press release issued by the police.

Mohammed Nabi had gone into hiding after the incident, but the police traced him.

DSP Chota Lashar Fazal Sher Khan said a team traced the accused in a far-flung area and arrested him during a raid.

Also in the day, a Peshawar Electric Supply Company official was injured when owner of a house attacked him for removing illegal connection in Yar Hussain village on Wednesday, Penco officials said.

They said the injured, Khizar Hayat, was shifted to Bacha Khan Medical Complex, Shahmanzor.

The Yar Hussain police registered an FIR against the accused, Shahid Khan.

Boy accused of rash driving, causing deaths acquitted

PESHAWAR: A court acquitted a 14-year-old boy accused of rash driving resulting in deaths of two persons on Peshawar's University Road a year ago.

An additional sessions judge, Altaf Jan, ruled the prosecution failed to prove its case against the accused, who was charged with unintentional murder of two men near Islamic College Peshawar.

Defence counsel Noorani Muhib Kakakhel argued that a video of the occurrence had gone viral on social media. He contended that prosecution witnesses agreed there was a video of the accident, whereas the same was not brought on record.

He argued there were seven to eight persons shown coming out of the vehicle in question, which the prosecution claimed was driven by the accused, but the forensic of the video was not available with regard to identity of the driver.

Mr Kakakhel stated one of the deceased was coming via the wrong way without a helmet on a motorcycle, who sustained head injuries, which was the cause of his death, whereas the second deceased fell victim to the first accident.

The counsel argued the minor accused was arrested 10 days before he was charged in the case and had been kept in illegal detention.

He argued there was no evidence connecting the accused with the case, hence he be acquitted of the charges. — Bureau Report

FPCCI chief pledges to resolve issues of industrialists

Young man foils college girl's suicide attempt

CHITRAL: A young man saved a college girl from drowning when she jumped into Chitral River from Chorwali Bridge in Jaghori village to end her life here on Wednesday morning.

City police station SIO Munirul Malik told Dawn that the救ed girl from Jaghori village jumped into the river to commit suicide. He said that Munir, a young man from her village, also jumped into the river and saved her life.

He said that the girl was rushed to hospital for first aid. She had sustained injuries and was discharged after initial treatment.

Regarding the immediate reason of her suicide attempt, the police officer said that as per initial inquiry, the girl was depressed over the decision of her parents about her marriage against her will.

He said that no case was

instituted against the girl for her suicide attempt as the relevant section (125) was deleted from Pakistan Penal Code.

Three months earlier, another college girl had jumped into the river from the same point on the bridge but she could not be saved. Reason of her suicide was also stated to be marriage against her will.

Meanwhile, police arrested three pronounced offenders in the border village of Aransh. They were warned by police both in Chitral and Upper Dir in many heluous crimes including murder.

The district police officer, Shikhar Shah, said that the arrested men were identified as Mohammad Ishaq of Lachigram, Durrel and Shiekh Zahid and Khan Tahseen of Zaroor Bagh Danal.

He said that the proclaimed offenders had fled to Khyber province of Afghanistan after committing crimes.

Govt asked to compensate rain victims in Shangla

SHANGLA: Chakwal naib chairman Bokar Aslam Khan on Wednesday alleged that provincial government ignored Shangla despite the fact that it was affected by recent rains that caused massive landslides, collapse of houses and casualties in different areas of the district.

Plastered by members of the naib council, he held a meeting with deputy commissioners and informed him about their grievances, especially about the distribution of food packages among the people affected by rains.

He said that revenue officials claimed that they distributed 540 food packages among deserving families but he did not see anything on the ground. He said that affected

Mr Khan, who is also district general secretary of Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz, said that government should immediately provide funds for rehabilitation and compensation of the people affected by rains.

He said that federal government

Pre-marriage blood test can help prevent thalassaemia in children

Functions, awareness walks mark World Thalassaemia Day

SWAT: Functions and awareness walks were held to mark the World Thalassaemia Day on Wednesday.

Speaking at a function organised in Rahim Yar Khan area of Swat to mark the World Thalassaemia Day, children with thalassaemia expressed gratitude for the rare form of life they received through the generosity of voluntary blood donors.

The SPS College management had invited thalassaemic children to mingle with students.

"The disease could be prevented if both partners undergo a simple thalassaemia test since it is inherited from both parents. We urge couples to prioritise this test before marriage," said Waqar Ali, a thalassaemic fighter.

Another thalassaemic patient, Aman, said they were indebted to those who regularly donated blood to them. "Our heroes and role models extend beyond just blood donors to include those leading the Al-Faqr Foundation, which cares for the

thalassaemic patients in Swat, and blood activists," she said.

The thalassaemic children were greeted with gifts.

Waqar Ali, a blood activist, said individuals with thalassaemia endured significant hardship, particularly when their blood levels dropped. "They experience severe discomfort as their blood depletes. When fresh blood is transfused, they encounter another challenge of iron clotting," he explained.

"Doctors administer medications to alleviate their pain and discomfort."

Waqar emphasised that a simple blood test could prevent its transmission if couples underwent the screening.

He urged students to familiarise themselves with the disease and to disseminate information among their friends and parents.

In Lower Dir, speakers at a function held on Wednesday urged people to donate blood and let the patients suffering from thalassaemia.

The Al-Khidmat Foundation organised the function and an awareness walk on the premises of the District Headquarters Hospital, Timergara, to mark the World Thalassaemia Day.

Doctors, paramedics, thalassaemic patients, relatives, social and political activists were in attendance.

The hospital's medical

superintendent Dr Ali Asghar, ACP district vice-president Haji Mojidullah, its blood society in-charge Mohammad Zeb and others spoke at the function.

The speakers said thalassaemia was a genetic disorder causing decrease in haemoglobin production in the body.

They said thalassaemia was a fatal disease and awareness was needed to prevent it. They said there were 500 registered thalassaemic patients in Lower Dir. They said cousin marriages should be avoided.

The speakers said spouses

should be tested for blood screening before entering into a marriage. They said bone marrow transplant was the only way to get rid of the disease.

Gifts were distributed among thalassaemic patients.

In Kohat, speakers at a function urged parents to carry out blood tests of their children before their marriages to save future generations from blood diseases.

An awareness walk was also held under the auspices of Frontier Blood Bank Foundation and a transfusion centre run by an individual, Ismail Khan.

The walk was led by MPAs Shafiqullah Jan, SP Unier Farooq, leaders of political parties and social organisations, SRO Gangkothri police station Mian Hussain and SRO city Saifullah Khan. Khatkar also participated in the walk.

Speaking on the occasion, Ismail Khan said cancer patients, particularly children aged between 16 and 18 years required fresh blood transfusions weekly and sometimes twice a week depending on their condition. He appealed to people to donate blood generously.

Anti-polio drive in three tehsils of Bajaur from 13th

BAJAURO: The local authorities on Wednesday said an anti-polio campaign would be launched in three tehsils of the Bajaur tribal district from May 13.

Polio campaign in Wazir Mumtaz, Lowi Mumtaz and Nasirabad tehsils was postponed after the murder of a policeman escorting the vaccinators in Mumtaz on April 30.

A decision to this effect was taken at a meeting attended by officials of the district administration, the police and health department. Deputy commissioner Mohammed Arwaq Haq chaired the meeting, according to a statement.

The meeting expressed satisfaction over the law and order for conducting the campaign. However, it was decided that border security would be provided to the polio teams to conduct the five-day activity in a peaceful manner.

Speaking on the occasion, Arwaq Haq asked the district police officer to make strict arrangements for the safety and security of vaccination.

District immunisation officer Dr Faiz Muhammad briefed the meeting about the health department's arrangements for the campaign. He said over 1,30,000 children would be administered anti-polio drops in three tehsils.

The meeting was informed that over 200 policemen would be deployed for security of polio teams in the areas.

JUI-F PROTEST: Jamiyat Ulema-i-Islam-Fazil chapter on Wednesday said scores of workers would participate in the party's public gathering in Peshawar on Thursday (today).

Talking to reporters, JUI-F district chief Masud Aboor Rashed said besides large number of workers, scores of people from different areas of the district would participate in the Peshawar gathering.

He said the workers would leave for Peshawar in the morning on Thursday. He said party chief Masud Farhan Rashed, party's central and provincial leaders would address the gathering.

21 more illegal filling stations sealed in Khyber

KHYBER: The district administration continued its crackdown on illegally established filling stations on Wednesday and sealed 21 more such stations and arrested six persons.

Officials in Bannu and Landi Kotal said that they found at least 21 filling stations operating in different localities without registration and selling unauthorised fuel.

The official reading parties also checked fuel gauge, rates and quality of fuel being sold at these filling stations and arrested six managers for violating Ogra regulations.

Meanwhile, Fata Qazmi Jirga held its protest meeting in Jirga on Wednesday in support of their demand for repeal of 25th Amendment and restoration of the previous status of erstwhile tribal areas.

FQJ leaders termed the merger of former Fata with Khyber Pakhtunkhwa unconstitutional and illegal as it was done in haste and against the genuine aspirations of tribal people.

They said that majority of the tribesmen were not happy with the "forced" merger as it further compounded their miseries and multiplied local disputes.

They said that people of merged districts had never demanded extension of Police Act to their region while revenue system was also forcefully imposed on them.

FQJ leaders demanded of the federal government to reverse the merger plan and let the people of tribal areas live their lives in accordance with their time-tested customs and traditions. — Correspondent
