'Silent time'

Mommies everywhere are putting solo escapes at the top of their wish lists, too.

"I've had the Mother's Day breakfasts in bed that come with a lot of screaming and chaos in the house," said the comedian and lifestyle influencer. 'Best of both worlds'

In fact, an April survey of 2,000 mothers across the US revealed that "a chore-free day," "a spa day," "alone time" and "a weekend getaway" were high-ranking requests this year.

Thea Gallagher, a clinical associate professor of psychiatry at NYU Langone Health, told The Post a mom's day off may be what the doctor ordered.

"Mom burnout can happen when women become exhausted by the massive amounts of physical, mental, emotional and logistical effort that it takes to be a parent," she explained.

A May study from the Ohio State University College of Nursing found that mental overload affects over 57% of parents, and can ignite stress, anxiety and depression.

Gallagher encourages gals to indulge in as much self-care as possible — especially during their special celebration.

"If Mother's Day is about honoring the mother, then she needs some time to escape her mothering duties," she said. "When we recharge, we have more to give to our kids, jobs, partners and friends. We can't pour into others from an empty cup."

Sharkey agrees. After her 24-hour hiatus, she reunited with her family feeling refreshed.

"I had the best of both worlds. I got to sleep in, do the things that make me happy and get some rest," she said. "Then, the next day, I met up with my husband and daughter for some family time."

NY probes att'y 'judge chat' boast

yer — whose license was once suspended for telling a tenant to "commit suicide" — has sparked a state investigation after he claimed to have given the judge in Donald Trump's civil fraud trial unsolicited advice.

Adam Leitman Bailey — whose law license was suspended for four months in 2019 over the caught-on-tape tirade — claimed to NBC New York that he spoke with Manhattan Supreme Court Justice Arthur Engoron about the case three weeks before the judge issued his \$455 million ruling against Trump in February.

"I actually had the ability to speak to him three weeks ago," Bailey told the outlet in a Feb. 16 interview. "I saw him in the corner [at the courthouse] and I told my client, 'I need to go.' And I walked over and we started talking ... I wanted him to know what I think and why ... I really want him to get it right."

The conversation sparked a probe by the New York judicial watchdog organization, the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, a source told NBC New York.

A judge can't "initiate, permit or consider" communications about cases outside the presence of all parties in the matter.

Bailey said he told Engoron his view of the case's fraud statute: that it can't be used to take a major company, such as the Trump Organization, out of business.

Al Baker, a state courts spokesman, denied to NBC that Engoron and Bailey spoke about the case: "The decision Justice Engoron issued February 16 was his alone, ⊕ was deeply considered, and was wholly uninfluenced by this indi-vidual."

Don's lawyers charge porn

A defiant Stormy Daniels batted back claims by Donald Trump's lawyers Thursday that she made up her story about a tryst with the ex-president because she was after a payday.

Jurors in Trump's Manhattan hush-money trial tried to keep a poker face during the fiery crossexamination, looking back and forth at the defense attorney and the former porn star trading blows as if watching a tennis match.

"You made all this up, right?" Trump lawyer Susan Necheles asked bluntly at one point.

"No," Daniels shot back.

"Your story has completely changed, hasn't it?" Necheles asked later, raising her voice.

"No!" Daniels replied.

Trump, 77, sat up straight in rapt attention during the fervid back-and-forth, in which his defense lawyer claimed that Daniels' porn career making "phony stories about sex" made her story about sleeping with Trump in 2006 less believable.

"Wow," Daniels, 45, responded, and then paused. "That's not how I would put it. The sex in the films is very much real, just like what happened to me in that room.

'If that story was untrue, l would have written it to be a lot better," Daniels added - having earlier testified that the sex was emotionless and didn't last long.

Pressure for payout

Jurors also heard a juicy phone conversation capturing Daniels' attorney claiming his porn star client wanted money "more than anything.'

Lawyer Keith Davidson was heard telling Michael Cohen that Daniels "wanted this money more than you can ever imagine" as he put pressure on Trump's former "fixer" to pay her in exchange for keeping

quiet about her story that she had a tryst with the ex-president.

"I remember hearing her on the phone saying, 'You — f--king Keith Davidson — you better settle this goddamn story,' " Davidson could be heard telling Cohen on the expletive-laden recording.

The April 4, 2018, phone call between the attorneys featured multiple expletives, with Davidson claiming Daniels was yelling and screaming at him while calling him a "p--sy," all to put pressure on him for a good deal.

He added that Daniels allegedly said that if Trump lost the election, "we lose all f--king leverage" and "this case is worth zero."

Daniels denied Davidson's claims as she testified against Trump for a second day in Manhattan Supreme Court.

'Sounds like a threat'

"No I did not, actually, I never yelled at Keith Davidson," she said during questioning by Trump's attorneys. "It sounds like a threat from Keith Davidson."

She told jurors that she didn't care about money, but rather just wanted "to get the truth out" about her alleged extramarital affair with Trump.

"I was asking to sell my story to publications to get the truth out," she insisted. "We were running out of time."

Trump is on trial for allegedly trying to cover up a \$130,000 payout Cohen made to Daniels in the lead-up to the 2016 presidential election to keep her from going public about her claims.

Daniels was noticeably calmer and more composed than her first stint on the stand Tuesday, where she spoke a mile a minute and gestured wildly while describing in graphic detail her "brief" sexual encounter with Trump in the "missionary position" all while he wasn't wearing a condom.

Necheles continued tense questioning Thursday implying that Daniels had, in fact, extorted Trump for the payment.

The porn star, wearing a black hooded robe over a forest green dress, gave a cheeky response when she was quizzed about profiting from selling merch based on Trump's legal woes — including "Saint of Indictments" devotional candles featuring Daniels' image that went for \$40.

The jury was also shown other items like a "#TeamStormy" T-shirt and a \$30 "Political Power: Stormy Daniels" comic book.

'Not unlike Mr. Trump'

When Necheles characterized Daniels' e-commerce operation as "shilling," the adult film star snapped back that Trump does the same. "Not unlike Mr. Trump," she replied.

Daniels admitted to profiting from a strip club tour called Make America Horny Again, but insisted that she "hated" that name.

"I did not name that tour, and I fought it tooth and nail," she proclaimed to jurors.

Necheles tried to get Daniels to admit she "made all this up," bringing up several apparent inconsistencies in her account from prior media interviews. For instance, she spent 20 minutes grilling Daniels about whether she received dinner as promised from Trump that night.

The attorney confronted Daniels with a 2011 interview with InTouch magazine in which she said they talked "over dinner." Daniels — describing herself as "food-motivated" — has denied that food was served and explained Thursday that though she met Trump "for dinner," and "it was dinnertime, I maintain that I didn't see any food."

Daniels left the stand in the early afternoon, with Judge Juan Merchan later hearing arguments from Trump's side about tossing the case over her testimony — which he denied.

Rent is cheap at the Queens Museum.

The cultural institution has been recording the personal stories of misty-eyed guests who pay as little as \$100 to "rent" a tiny piece of property on its "Panorama of the City of New York" — a 9,335square-foot, to-scale model of the Big Apple.

Hundreds of so-called deeds to tiny buildings have been doled out through the museum's Adopt-A-Building program, allowing New Yorkers to commemorate special moments in their lives or those of their loved ones. Those include a woman who bought a miniature of the home where her mom grew up in the 1930s and a couple who honored their anniversary with a "deed" to their first apartment as a married pair.

"People get really vulnerable

and intimate with this immediately when you ask them about it," Lynn Maliszewski, the assistant director of collections and archives, told The Post during an interview at the museum Thursday.

The Queens Museum has for more than a decade been collecting tales from visitors of their lifechanging memories in the city that never sleeps - but expanded the project last summer into the digital realm.

A "digital mapping system" stands on the walkway surrounding the panorama, just above Staten Island, inviting wistful visitors to drop a pin on their special location and share a memory for free — while looking down at the miniature city.

"Walking down 86th Street with my BFF in high school in 2009. We would go shopping and get the buffet that's near Marshalls. I will cherish those memories dearly,"

Elaine C wrote alongside her Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, pin.

Near Fifth Avenue, Jared recalled "having a day out in Central Park. Just coming out of the pandemic. It was a special moment to be around loved ones and breathing fresh air."

Interactive screen

Because the interactive screen is so available to the public, it has plenty of silly entries likely punched in by teenagers, which Maliszewski said reflects "how we experience the city."

"People who grow up here, people who come here for school, people who come here after school — everyone does or doesn't realize at some point that we're all connected and all impacting one another here just by way of how many of us exist here," she contemplated.

The idea to document the thousands — if not millions — of stories whispered among guests came easily to museum staff.

Approximately 80% of museum visitors come to set their eyes on the tiny behemoth, according to a 2021 survey. The visitors are a mixed bag of locals and tourists from across the globe - but nearly all have the same reaction upon seeing the world's largest architectural model, which was conceived as an attraction for the 1964-65 World's Fair.

"Even if you were to find your apartment, it is a rectangle that is a color, you will not see your stoop, you will not see how many floors it even is — but it's still like you need to find it," Maliszewski said. "Everyone has that impulse to point out: 'I worked there when I was 21' and 'That's like the first restaurant I went to after college."

Council blast on NYPD's trash talk

grilled the NYPD Thursday over "dangerous, unethical, unprofessional" social media posts by top officials - including a post calling a councilwoman's criticism "garbage" — as well as \$168 million in unplanned overtime.

The heated proceedings played out after the city Department of Investigation this week confirmed it had opened a probe into posts by department brass at the request of Council Speaker Adrienne Adams and The Legal Aid Society.

These posts can often convey inaccurate or misleading information and could potentially incite threats of violence," said Adams, no relation to Mayor Adams.

"This conduct is dangerous, unethical, unprofessional because included in the department's mission is to preserve peace, protect the people and reduce fear at the preliminary budget."

The posts in question include NYPD Chief of Patrol John Chell's controversial jab at Queens Council-woman Tiffany Caban calling her online criticism of the department "garbage."

Adams also took the department to task over the NYPD overtime tab to cover protests and migrants. As of March, the department spent about \$788 million in overtime during the 2024 fiscal year — almost \$271 million over budget, she said.

"Repeated overspending beyond the allocated budget raises concerns about agency and fiscal management and accurate budgeting," Adams said. Aneeta Bhole and Jorge Fitz-Gibbon

NEW GUT CHECK ON Friday, CANCER **Early-test innovation**

Swish your way to early cancer detection?

Researchers at Rutgers University believe a simple oral rinse may be key to the early detection of gastric cancer, also known as stomach cancer.

In a study scheduled for presentation at Digestive Disease Week later this month, the research team suggests oral bacteria alone could serve as biomarkers for gastric-cancer risk.

Dr. Shruthi Reddy Perati, author and general surgery resident at Rutgers, reports: "We see that the oral microbiome and the stomach microbiome are connected, and knowing what bugs are in your mouth tells us what the stomach environment is like. That has a huge implication that could lead to some practice-changing tests and guidelines."

The fourth-leading cause of cancer deaths worldwide, gastric cancer is notoriously hard to detect in its early stages and frequently misidentified.

According to Moffitt Cancer Center, "As the cancer progresses, the symptoms that do appear can be misdiagnosed as normal gastrointestinal issues. As a result, stomach cancer can go undetected for years before the symptoms become concerning enough to warrant diagnostic testing."

Recent research suggests that single people are at a higher risk of developing stomach cancer.

Perati imparts, "No formal screening guidelines for gastric cancer are available in the United States, and more than half of patients with gastric cancer receive a diagnosis when the cancer is already at an advanced stage.'

Microbe probe

Perati and the team of researchers analyzed bacteria samples from the mouths of patients scheduled for an endoscopy. Of this test group, 30 were known to have gastric cancer, 30 had premalignant gastric conditions and 38 were healthy controls.

The Rutgers team found significant differences between the oral microbes of the healthy group and those belonging to the cancerous and precancerous patients. Additionally, researchers found little difference between the bacteria samples of the cancerous and precancerous patients, indicating that changes in the microbiome may occur as soon as the stomach environment develops preconditions for cancer.

"Even with a small cohort, we were able to see some stark differences and believe the findings are very promising," Perati said.

NYE machete fiend jailed

An admitted jihadist wannabe who attacked three NYPD cops with a foot-long machete in Times Square on New Year's Eve in 2022 was sentenced to 27 years in prison on Thursday.

Trevor Bickford was handed down the sentence by Judge Kevin Castel in Manhattan federal court after pleading guilty in January to slashing three cops in a lone-wolf attack during the annual celebration in the Crossroads of the World, according to prosecutors

with the Manhattan US Attornev's Office. As part of the sentence, the 20-year-old Maine native will be on lifetime supervision once he's freed. Bickford had faced up to 120 years behind bars if the judge doled out maximum consecutive sentences on all six counts he pleaded guilty to. Bickford, then 19, traveled from his Maine home to New York with a machete and a twisted plan to kill as many people as possible in the name of Islamic jihad. Priscilla DeGregory

Joe lays out delusional account of

The White House rarely allows President Biden to sit down for interviews, and Wednesday's chat with CNN's Erin Burnett shows why. In a brief 17 minutes, Biden told 15 lies — nearly a lie a minute.

From whoppers about the economy to prevarications on Israel, Biden spun a Fantasyland of a presidency that voters know is false. Here's a rundown:

LIE 1: "I've created over 15 million jobs since I've been president."

Biden's favorite falsehood, told over and over and over again no matter how many fact-checks call him out. He took office at the tail end of a pandemic that blew a hole in the economy, when lock-down policies wholeheartedly endorsed by Democrats took people out of the office and onto COVID stimulus checks.

He "created" nothing. After the introduction of the vaccine, people returned to the workforce.

If anything, Biden's policies slowed the recovery — it took until July 2022 for the economy to regain all the jobs lost due to the pandemic.

LIE 2: "Other than Herbert Hoover, [Donald Trump] is the only president who has lost more jobs than he created."

The corollary lie. Trump didn't "lose" jobs; he was president during a global pandemic. And liberals were thrilled to put people on government checks and shut down the world during COVID. They cannot argue that the job market would have been any different in 2020 under a Democrat.

LIE 3: "Look at what he says he's going to do if he gets elected. Says he's going to do away with what I've done on Medicare, reducing the price of Medicare."

There's no basis for this, as



Trump has said he "will never do anything that will hurt or jeopardize Social Security or Medicare." Further, Trump pursued the exact same executive orders to lower prescription drug prices as did Biden.

LIE 4: "You know we have 1,000 billionaires in America. Know what their average federal tax is? 8.3%."

Factcheck.org notes that, "The top 0.1% of earners, with more than \$4.4 million in expanded cash income, pay an average rate of 25.1% in federal income and payroll taxes."

LIE 5: "We've already turned it around [on the economy]."

Burnett quoted some tough figures on the economy, noting that the cost of buying a home had doubled, and "Real income when you account for inflation is actually down since you took office."

Biden's response? Denial.

LIE 6: "The polling data has been wrong all along."



Every survey that says people are upset about the economy? Every poll that puts Biden's approval rating at historic lows?

Are all of them, from dozens of different sources, wrong?

LIE 7: "There's corporate greed going out there. And it's got to be dealt with."

Labor costs increased 4.2% between 2023 and 2024. They increased 5.1% from 2021 to 2022. The cost of everything, from supplies, to shipping, to rent, to

taxes, have gone up. Why?

Because of the huge amount of government money injected into the system, minimum-wage increases by California and other states, and pent-up demand by consumers.

How is Biden going to "deal with it?" Tell companies they can't raise prices to avoid losing money?

LIE 8: "[Inflation] was 9% when I came to office."

This is the lie of the night.

Biden continues to pretend that the US was in terrible shape when he took office, when it was already on the rebound — thanks to Trump's Warp Speed project that vaccinated people quickly against COVID.

Inflation was a measly 1.4% in January 2021. Then Biden went on a drunken sailor spending spree, and inflation skyrocketed.

LIE 9: "They have the money to spend. It angers them and angers me that they have to spend more."

They have the money to spend? According to Bankrate, 76% of adults making less than \$50,000 a year are living paycheck-to-paycheck, an increase from 71% the year before that. Biden need only watch the nightly news to see people cutting back on groceries, gas — even trips to McDonald's — because their spending power has decreased.

LIE 10: "Civilians have been killed in Gaza as a consequence of those bombs, and other ways in which they go after population centers."

It's libel to suggest that Israel is and saying "democracy is at stake" if you lose? Give us a break.

deliberating targeting population centers. Hamas embeds itself among the civilian population, creating bases inside hospitals and digging tunnels under residential apartments.

Israel has been warning the people of Rafah for more than a week to move to a safe zone outside of the

They do not "go after" population centers, they work hard to minimize deaths while stopping the terrorists who kidnapped, raped and murdered Israeli civilians.

LIE 11: "We're not walking away from Israel's security. We're walking away from Israel's ability to wage war in those areas."

But defeating Hamas is integral to Israel's security.

How does Biden suggest Israel win the war if it leaves the last stronghold of the terrorist group untouched?

Except Biden voted in favor of invading Iraq. So Biden may regret that decision today but it made sense to him back them.


LIE 13: "You can't only love your country when vou win."

Rioting charges against 211 illegal migrants caught on video by The Post pushing past Texas troops and attempting to break into the US on March 21 have all been dismissed — based on a tech-

El Paso County Judge Ruben Morales dismissed the cases at a hearing Wednesday, saying he "hands [are] tied" after the state did not provide a required transfer order, a simple document, to move the matter from district to county court.

"If I don't have jurisdiction, there's nothing I can do on these cases [except dismiss them]," he said during the hearing.

The move is a huge blow for county District Attorney Bill Hicks, who had been pursuing the cases. At a press conference

strongly . . . the procedure was appropriate and proper.

"We feel Judge Morales' order is an improper order. We have the intention of appealing."

El Paso County Assistant District Attorney Kyle Lasley had argued that Morales' court oversaw misdemeanor cases and that he did have jurisdiction.

However, Public Defender Kelli Childress claimed "processes were ignored" when transferring the cases, and Morales sided with her. Hicks clarified the migrants - zor-wire fences and assaulted National Guard troops, with one having his knee stomped in the melee would be released to federal custody with Customs and Border

The migrants were all arrested by Texas authorities on riot-related charges after the rush at an area known as Gate 36, as seen in the shocking footage captured by The Post.

The riot charges carried a maximum penalty of 180 days in jail and up to a \$2,000 fine.

The migrants were mostly adult males who outnumbered the guardsmen, who had been trying to place them into groups so they could be taken into CBP custody.

Nine migrants were later singled out as the "ringleaders" of the stampede and eight of them are in custody facing additional felony charges, which are being heard separately from the riot charges.

Of course, none of this means Fiona Harvey told me the truth.

I found her to be intelligent, quick-thinking and combative.

And on a human level, I felt sorry for her that she's been publicly dragged through the mincer like this.

Her general behavior, on and off camera, with me and my team didn't give any of us cause for concern about either her potential danger or her mental state, though it should be said that stalkers can be very convincing in their ability to hide their real personalities or obsessive intent.

But there were moments in the interview where my suspicious alarm bells rang loud, especially when she suddenly said, "Even if the email thing was true, the rest is not." The "email thing" is the 41,000 emails she's said to have sent Gadd.

Obsessive for certain

And if that bit is true, then it would suggest she was very obsessively pursuing contact with him.

I also found it very strange that she admitted to having up to six email addresses and four mobile phones she "used for different people."

That's not normal.

She also made a series of emphatic blanket denials about how long she knew Gadd, and how much contact she had with him, that are provably false.

The claim that she only sent him one letter, when he says he has 105, seems especially disin-

On balance, I'd say Fiona Harvey lied to me quite a lot in the interview and if her threatened legal action against Netflix and Gadd goes ahead, I suspect it will quickly emerge she did send all the emails, messages and letters

But that doesn't mean she can't be a victim here, too.

Gadd, by his own admission, is a very damaged guy who took a lot of drugs, enthusiastically pursued a chaotic lurid sex life and did lead on Harvey in a way that may have fueled her obsession. He's also been accused of propositioning trans actresses whom he was lining up for work.

Frankly, it's all a mess.

But if Richard Gadd feels entitled to make millions airing his side of the story, and make very serious allegations about Fiona Harvey in the process, then she is surely entitled to respond and defend herself?

As for who is exploiting whom, I'll leave that to the court of public opinion to decide.

'State of LEFT GROWS Palestine'

Several Ivy League schools, including Harvard University, have accepted millions of dollars in donations from foundations and donors located in the "State of Palestine," often to fund the education of Palestinian students at American colleges, according to a new report.

The elite schools took \$10 million from 2017 to 2023 from entities within the "State of Palestine," according to the analysis by OpenTheBooks, a Republican-owned nonprofit dedicated to revealing government spending.

Brown University, Harvard University and non-Ivy Indiana University of Pennsylvania are among the schools to accept funding from donors located in the nation that technically doesn't exist, at least by UN standards.

The "State of Palestine" is not a recognized entity by the UN or the US though some 140 countries do officially recognize it.

Brown University in February 2020 received a \$643,000 gift from a foundation located within the "State of Palestine" to create a professorship in Palestinian Studies as part of the college's Middle East Studies program, according to federal disclosures reviewed by OpenTheBooks.

Though the financial filing does not disclose the donor's name, Brown previously said the money was gifted by the Munib and Angela Masri Foundation based in the West Bank.

Nine different donors including multiple Brown alumni and the foundation came together to fund

the Mahmoud Darwish Professorship in Palestinian Studies, according to a 2020 press release.

Meanwhile, Harvard took in \$1.6 million from donors within the "State of Palestine" and the Indiana University of Pennsylvania received \$6.4 million from entities within the "State of Palestine" and another \$900,000 from a donor from "Palestinian Territory, Occupied," according to the review of the financial disclosure documents.

The donors are not identified in the filings. Harvard previously said that monies it received from Palestinian donors in 2017. 2018 and 2019 did not come from the Palestinian Authority, though it would not disclose the donor names in a 2020 news report.

Foreign students

Most of the money helped pay for Palestinian students from the occupied territories to receive an education at US universities, according to the filings.

They were often reported as "payment of tui-tion and fees for students from Palestine. Funds are also utilized to pay for educational-related penses incurred by the university for these students through their enrollment in this program," the documents state, according to Open the Books.

Indiana University of Pennsylvania received at least \$2.3 million from the West Bank-based Arab American University to cover tuition and other expenses for Palestinian students, according to the same 2020 report.

Members of the left-wing "Squad" of House members openly celebrated President Biden's vow to stop providing weapons to Israel if it invades Rafah.

"Protesting is working. Keep fighting for a #CeasefireNow," tweeted Bronx and Westchester Rep. Jamaal Bowman, who has been an outspoken supporter of anti-Israel protesters at Columbia University and elsewhere.

Bronx and Queens Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez also celebrated Biden telling CNN "I'm not supplying the weapons" for an offensive on Hamas' final major stronghold in Gaza.

"Biden has not 'lost his mind.' He is upholding the word of the US," Ocasio-Cortez wrote on X after Biden confirmed that he's withholding shipments of 1,800 2,000-pound bombs and 1,700 500-pound bombs, and that he is considering a pause on artillery shells.

"There are 1.3 million people in Rafah. You do not need to slaughter them to go after Hamas. Biden stated the US red line was Rafah. It would make us weaker & the world less safe to let Bibi [Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu], or anyone, cross it," she wrote.

Brooklyn Rep. Nydia Velazquez posted on X: "An invasion of Rafah would exacerbate the humanitarian crisis in Gaza and endanger the lives of the over 1 million Palestinians that have sought refuge there. [Biden] is right to make this decision.'


South Bronx Rep. Ritchie Torres was one of the few dissenters in the Gotham delegation.

"As the leader of the free world, America cannot claim that its commitment to Israel is 'iron-clad' and then proceed to withhold aid from Israel," Torres wrote. "The mixed messaging makes a mockery of our credibility as an ally. No one will take our word seriously.'

Nassau County and Queens Rep. Tom Suozzi issued an equivocating statement on X that read: "I urge the Biden administration to resolve any differences with our ally Israel regarding arms shipments immediately.'

Rep. Grace Meng of Queens released a similar statement late Thursday, saying: "Israel and the Biden administration must get back on the same page so the hostages can be brought home and Hamas can be defeated. Together, we must continue working to protect civilians despite Hamas' efforts to the contrary.'



It was not immediately clear where Reps. Yvette Clarke of

Brooklyn and Adriano Espaillat of The Bronx and Manhattan stood on the matter.

New York City's sole Republican member of Congress, Staten Island Rep. Nicole Malliotakis, denounced Biden's pivot.

"In an overwhelmingly bipartisan vote, Congress authorized sending aid to our dear ally Israel, and it's not up to President Biden under what conditions that aid is sent," Malliotakis said. "He needs to stop playing poli-

tics and appeasing the radicals in his party who are siding with Iran and Hamas."

Long Island Republican Reps. Anthony D'Esposito, Andrew Garbarino and Nick LaLota also slammed Biden, as did Republican Rep. Mike Lawler, whose district includes part of the Hudson Valley.

Garbarino said Biden "is emboldening Hamas while undermining Israel as it seeks the release of the hostages."

"Biden's decision, driven by political motives to placate his disenchanted progressive base and secure electoral votes in Michigan, is in stark contradiction to his previous commitments of support for Israel, particularly following the terrorist attacks on October 7th," LaLota added.

"This is a complete betrayal," Lawler said. "President Biden has fully abdicated his responsibility as commander-in-chief and the United States' role as Israel's closest ally with his outrageous decision.'

"This is war, [Biden]. Grow a backbone," tweeted D'Esposito, who followed up with a Thursday letter to the president that read, in part: "I look forward to you reversing course."

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY), who has advocated heavy US military aid to Israel while also sharply criticizing Netanyahu, also did not immediately comment, nor did Democratic Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand.

Negotiations between Israel and Hamas for a hostage deal have been put on hold as the fighting in Rafah appears to have expanded on the ground, officials said.

The terror group's delegation in Cairo has mostly stepped away from the negotiating table following IDF advances in Rafah, southern Gaza's most populous city, sources familiar with the talks told Politico.

Rafah puts deal in limbo

Hamas is allegedly still willing to continue the talks, with US mediators in Qatar working to keep the negotiations going with the Jewish state.

The terror group's stance comes as Israel's own negotiation team departed from Cairo without setting a date for their return. The Times of Israel reports.

While the US and world leaders have stressed the importance of keeping the negotiation channels open between Hamas and Israel, the hope for a cease-fire deal has taken a hit following Israel's incursion into Rafah, which houses more than 1 million refugees.

Israeli tanks seized control of the Rafah Crossing on Tuesday, with armored vehicles and troops engaging in skirmishes with Hamas terrorists in the city outskirts as thousands of Palestinians attempted to flee the city.

While Israeli and US officials said the operation was limited to the areas surrounding the city, satellite images of the city suggest the IDF has advanced more than a mile inside the enclave in Gaza.

The images of Rafah, taken by Planet Labs following the IDF's mobilization, show several buildings and roads past the border bulldozed, with tracks from armored vehicles visible on the ground.

The IDF, however, maintains that it is conducting a "precise counterterrorism operation." Ronny Reves

A teenage anti-Israel protester who vandalized a World War I memorial in Central Park earlier this week was arrested Thursday - after his father turned him over to the cops, according to the NYPD and police sources.

The 16-year-old boy was charged with criminal mischief in the third degree, a felony, and making graffiti, which is a misdemeanor, for allegedly defacing the 107th Infantry Memorial during an unruly demonstration on Monday night.

The teen, who routinely attends rallies organized by the anti-Israel group Within Our Lifetime, only landed in custody after his dad turned him in, the sources said.

NYPD Deputy Commissioner Kaz Daughtry on Thursday posted a blurred photo to X of the teen in handcuffs sitting on a

bench in a police station.

"The despicable vandalism we saw earlier this week on the WWI Memorial will not be ignored, and will not go unpunished," Daughtry tweeted as he announced one of the culprits' arrest.

"This isn't simply juvenile hijinks — it's an act of desecration that undermines the freedoms our heroes fought and died for," he added.

'These people are nuts'

Sources said the youngster attends Tottenville HS and has no prior arrests.

The war memorial was defaced with graffiti reading "Gaza" in large red letters during Monday's anarchy near the corner of Fifth Avenue and East 67th Street.

Another protester torched an American flag in front of the bronzed memorial depicting seven World War I foot soldiers in battle. Several others were seen climb-

ing on top of the infantrymen and waving Palestinian flags. The desecration of the memo-

rial outraged New Yorkers who visited the site Tuesday to see the damage themselves.

"These people are just nuts and violent," Michael Skol, who has lived in the tony Manhattan neighborhood for 25 years, had told The Post.

"Burning the flag is anti-American. It's stupid," he added. "It definitively doesn't help Palestinians or the peace process. These are people who are not in the tradition of believing America is a good place. It's disgusting.'

Enraged locals argued that the throngs of pro-Palestinian protesters were hurting their cause with their mindless destruction.

"It's horrible to treat a World War I memorial the way they did. It breaks your heart," said Ron Zucher, 50.

"In this country, you have a right to voice your opinion, but not destroy memorials that pay tribute to heroes who died for our country.

"You gotta have some decency," Zucher added. "The protesters are not helping their own cause destroying monuments and burning the flag."

A clean-up crew Tuesday scrubbed off the "Gaza" and "Free Palestine" graffiti left behind at the memorial using power washers and a biodegradable chemical cleaning agent.

Anarchists on Monday night also vandalized the Civil War Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman monument in the nearby Grand Army Plaza on 59th Street.

"I understand that there will be lots of speculation about my decision," Pollack said in her resignation statement released Thursday. "So let me be as clear as I can: This decision is mine and mine alone."

Cornell provost Michael Kotlikoff will serve as interim president.

Among on-campus controversies, a Cornell engineering student was charged with threatening to kill Jews at the university in October.

Also troubling, a Cornell history professor, Russell Rickford, described Hamas' Oct. 7 terrorist attack on Israel as "exhilarating" and "energizing."

HAT a difference a day makes.
On Tuesday President Biden was speaking at the Holocaust Memorial Museum commemoration at the Capitol in Washington. There he drew a direct comparison between the events of the Holocaust and the attacks on Israel of Oct. 7.

That is not my comparison. It was President Biden's.

Talking about the phrase "Never Again," he said: "Here we are not 75 years later but just seven and a half months later, and people are already forgetting. Foreign policy bungled

But I see no reason why a superpower should be affected in its alliances by a few screaming, entitled know-nothings at a small number of over-privileged campuses. Most of these people are paid agitators anyway.

Yet the pressure seems to have got to Biden. How else to explain his decision to hold up arms supplies to Israel just hours after giving that speech on Tuesday? On Thursday evening the war cabinet in Israel was meeting to discuss the next stage of the war. And presumably also to work out what to do if the country's chief ally abandons Israel now.

One of the people in the room stepped out to speak to me yesterday evening. I asked the Israeli official what they thought about the idea that their country of 10 million people had now been left to fight alone against the forces of terrorism. The reply: "It seems that the leader of the free world is the prime minister of a 10 million person country."

What an indictment of the situation that Biden has led America to.

At the beginning of his term in office, Biden performed his famously bungled withdrawal from Afghanistan. After two decades and thousands of lost American lives, Afghanistan was effectively back to where it was 20 years earlier. While the Taliban took back Afghanistan, it was as if America and her allies had never been there.

The schools shut again, the Taliban dealt with their enemies and all the blood and treasure was for nothing. At this point, Biden reminded the world that America is not always the worst enemy.

Now in withdrawing supplies to its principal ally in the Middle East, Biden is at risk of showing that America is also not the best friend.

Political calculations

How to explain this disconnect? Between the warm and strong words that Biden utters and the betraying stance he is now taking?

Only that he has bowed to domestic political pressure here in America.

Who knows what effect that will have in November. Perhaps the pro-Hamas lobby in a couple of states will be pleased to have some of their way. Perhaps they will be jubilant, "forgive" Biden for the months in which he was a strong ally of Israel, and vote for him anyway. Or perhaps they will stay at

home. Or vote for someone else.

In any case, what a price to pay in international leadership for such a small, sordid domestic political pressure.

There will be serious consequences from this.

Because for months, Biden has stressed — rightly — that the fight Israel is engaged in is a fight the whole civilized world is engaged in. For months he said that he would be unwavering in his support for America's ally. And for months he has reassured Israelis — as he did again this week — that he would not forget the horrors of Oct. 7 or the Israelis and Americans still in Hamas captivity.

And now we have this. A decision to cut Israel off just before the point at which it can win.

In Afghanistan, Biden piled defeat upon defeat. With Israel, it looks like he wants to steal defeat from the jaws of victory.

So it is Israel alone. As Biden has sworn it would not be.

Actions speak louder than words.



ANDY BOKS A S5M WIN Big ethics ruling

Former Gov. Andrew Cuomo scored another win Thursday in his efforts to unravel the state's new ethics commission as part of an ongoing spat over his pandemicera book deal.

A mid-level appellate court

upheld a lower court judge's decision to scrap the Commission on Ethics and Lobbying in Government (COELIG), which had ordered Cuomo (inset) to fork over proceeds from his

pandemic era memoir.

"The Legislature, though well-intentioned in its actions, violated the bedrock principles of separation of powers," the five-judge panel wrote in its unanimous ruling.

The ex-governor, who stepped down in 2021 amid a wave of sexual harassment and ethics accusations that he denies, cheered the ruling.

"This has been a three-year exercise to bend the law to fit the political will of those in charge and hopefully after this second — and unanimous — court decision, this partisan and baseless prosecution will finally end," a Cuomo spokesperson said in a statement.

"As we've said from the very beginning, no one is above the law nor the [C]onstitution," he added.

The decision means Cuomo will still get to hold onto the \$5 million in profits from his book deal.

The decision could also likely be the end for the short-lived ethics panel, which was created in 2021 to replace the

Joint Commission on Public Ethics (JCOPE).

Its predecessor was widely criticized for lacking independence given that most of its appointees were beholden to the governor.

"We respectfully disagree with the result reached by the court and are reviewing all

options, including, if appropriate, recommending interim legislation," COELIG Chairman Frederick Davie and Executive Director Sanford Berland wrote in a joint statement.

They added that the panel will try to appeal the decision, though that first requires permission of the appellate court given that its ruling was unanimous. The state attorney general's office is reviewing the decision.

Targeted lawsuit

Cuomo first filed his lawsuit last year, in part seeking to unravel COELIG's effort to force him to turn over proceeds from his pandemic-era memoir, "American Crisis: Leadership Lessons from the COVID-19 Pandemic."

The courts sided with Cuomo's argument that the process for appointing members of COELIG unfairly removes checks and balances from the executive branch.

"It usurps the Governor's power to ensure the faithful execution of the applicable ethics laws," the judges wrote.

Good government groups, which filed an amicus brief defending COELIG, called for the state's highest court to overturn the decision.





Thousands of demonstrators filled the streets of a Swedish coastal city Thursday to protest Israel's participation in the Eurovision Song Contest — which almost didn't happen until the Jewish state removed references to the Oct. 7 Hamas attack in its entry.

Up to 12,000 people — including Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg converged near the contest venue in Malmo, where singers from more than 50 countries are battling.

The protesters waved Palestinian flags, wore keffiyeh scarves, deployed green, black and red smoke bombs and chanted, "From river to sea, Palestine will be free" and "Israel is a terror state" as cops watched from rooftops, streets and helicopters.

Eurovision organizers rejected calls to expel Israel from the competition — arguing they try to keep the competition nonpolitical.

"We should have told Israel either 'Stay away,' or maybe even say, why don't we invite a Palestinian music group to participate? That would be fair," said protester Anders Trolle-Schultz.

Organizers had barred Israel's initial song submission for breaking its rules on killed 1,200 Israelis.


But Israel's President Isaac Herzog called on the songwriter to make changes so that the Jewish state could compete, according to the BBC. The ballad is now called "Hurricane."

Hunter Biden hung out with Sean Penn in Malibu, Calif. Wednesday - a day before a federal court rejected the first son's appeal of three gun charges, clearing the way for him to stand trial in his home state of Delaware beginning June 3.

The Philadelphia-based US Third Circuit Court of Appeals on Thursday dismissed Hunter's bid to consider having the case thrown out, citing a lack of jurisdiction.

"This appeal is DISMISSED because the defendant has not shown the District Court's orders are appealable before final judgment," stated Judges Patty Shwartz, Cindy Chung and D. Brooks Smith.

Delaware US District Judge Marvellen Noreika filed a scheduling order following the appellate court's ruling for a three- to six-day jury trial on the three gun felonies.

Bid to knot 'Harv overturn' loophole

NY pols stand up for vics

Harvey Weinstein is causing a retake on sex-crimes laws in Albany.

Lawmakers are racing to update trial procedures for accused perverts after New York's highest court last month threw out the disgraced movie mogul's 2020 sex conviction on a technicality.

A group of legislators joined with some of Weinstein's courtroom accusers Thursday to tout legislation that would close the loophole and allow victims to speak out freely at trials.

"When there are multiple victims of sexual assault, their voices should be heard together and collectively," said Tarale Wulff, one of the alleged victims of Weinstein's sexual misconduct who testified at his trial, even though Weinstein wasn't actually charged with attacking her.

"Sexual assault survivors who come forward are rarely the only victims of their accusers."

'Molineux' nix

The Court of Appeals ruled 4-3 last month that it was unfair to allow alleged victims like Wulff known legally as Molineux witnesses — to testify in sex trials because their claims weren't actually part of the criminal complaint.

The ruling gutted the use of Molineux witnesses in the state. But legislators said witnesses' testimony is crucial in prosecuting sex crimes and vowed to pass legislation bringing them back.

"In sexual assault cases, which typically rely on the testimony of the survivor, it is essential," said Assemblywoman Amy Paulin (D-Westchester), one of the bill's sponsors in her chamber.

Paulin spoke alongside Wulff and fellow Weinstein Molineux accuser Ambra Gutierrez.

State Sen. Michael Gianaris (D-Queens) said he was sponsoring the Senate version of the bill legalizing the use of Molineux witnesses.

"Very often, cases rely on the testimony of two people with conflicting accounts and therefore we think this justifies an exception to show a pattern of behavior ... So we are introducing this legislation, hopefully, we get it passed before the session adjourns in a month," he said.

'Negative light'

Judge Jenny Rivera, who wrote the majority opinion, argued that the Molineux testimony served to paint Weinstein in a negative light to the jury.

Rivera was joined by lefty Chief Judge Rowan Wilson in the opinion. Weinstein is now being held at Rikers Island and facing the prospect of a second trial.

The bill in response to the Weinstein ruling would implement language almost mirroring federal guidelines on evidence, bringing New York in line with more than a dozen other states.

Lawmakers have been scrambling to make a legislative fix a

since the Weinstein ruling.
"I'm glad that the new legislation by Senator Gianaris and Assembly Member Paulin will allow more survivors of sexual abuse to come forward and help keep creeps like Harvey Weinstein from using their power and influence to prey on victims," Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Brad Hoylman-Sigal (D-Manhattan) told The Post.

Disgraced movie mogul Harvey Weinstein was wheeled into a Queens

courtroom Thursday morn-ing for a brief appearance before a judge — just days after he was transferred back to Rikers Island from a cushy private room at Bellevue Hospital.

The 72-year-old — whose 2020 New York sex-crimes conviction was overturned last month — wore a blue suit with an American flag pin on the left lapel as Judge Joanne Watters quickly sent him back to jail to await further pro-

Don camp bullish on 2 'big blues' Donald Trump's presidential

campaign is bullish about its prospects in solid-blue Minnesota and Virginia against President Biden despite losing both states by wide margins in 2020.

"States like [Arizona], [Nevada], [Georgia] and [North Carolina], based on public polling averages, are clearly slipping out of Biden's reach," a Trump campaign official told The Post this week.

"States that should be safe Biden states like [Minnesota] and [Virginia] are now falling into play."

Virginia was once a solid Republican state, voting for the GOP candidate in every presidential election but one between 1952 and 2004. However, the commonwealth has fallen into the Democratic column in every election since — a period coinciding with the growth of northern Virginia's left-leaning suburbs of Washington, DC.

Minnesota is an even tougher ask for Trump, with the state having voted Republican just three times since Democrat Franklin D. Roosevelt won his first term in

One source close to the Republican National Committee poured cold water on the Trump campaign's optimism. "Even Ronald Reagan couldn't carry Minnesota. That state is fool's gold for a Republican presidential candidate," the source, granted anonymity to speak candidly, told The Post.

Meanwhile, Biden's re-election campaign has talked a big game about inroads in Florida and North Carolina — states that went for Trump in 2020 and are expected to Diana Glebova do so again.

Coulter: I won't vote for 'Indian'

Conservative commentator Ann Coulter recently told former Republican presidential candidate Vivek Ramaswamy that she would not back him for the GOP nomination because "you're an Indian."
"I agreed with many, many

things you said ... when you were running for president, but I still would not have voted for you, because you're an Indian," Coulter, 62, said in a podcast that Ramaswamy released Wednesday.

"There is a core national identity that is the identity of the WASP.... We've never had a president who didn't have at least partial English ancestry," she said, adding she'd vote for any of Ramaswamy's children if they married one of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Diana Glebova

Qns. teen stabbed 'by friend'

The teenager stabbed to death outside a Queens subway station Wednesday was killed by a friend with whom she had a tragic dispute, acquaintances and relatives told The Post.

Sara Rivera, 17, was allegedly drinking with pals in a park near the 46th Street station in Sunnyside around 9:30 p.m. when she got into the fatal dispute with a 15year-old acquaintance.

"She told me that they were drinking and she was seeing [the suspect] getting very mad and angry," Rivera's friend, 16-year-old Yanira Leon, told The Post Thursday. "Nobody really knows what happened after that."

Police said that Rivera was stabbed in the neck during the fight and was rushed to Elmhurst Hospital, where she was later pronounced dead.

It is unclear what sparked the dispute.

Rivera and her accused killer were both students at Queens Technical HS.

These crooks are real sick puppies.

Thieves in Connecticut have been stealing dogs and altering the pups' appearance by dyeing and shaving their fur so owners and cops won't be able to sniff them out, according to a missing pet group.

During a four-day period in mid-April, at least three pooches were found with new looks — including one with a bizarre purple coat, volunteers at CT Dog Gone Recovery told The Post.

"They're purposely disguising them so they can keep the dog or sell it for profit," said volunteer Donna

Russo, who worked on a case involving a missing French bulldog. "It's heartbreaking enough to lose your dog and then owners have to search for a pet with an entirely different appearance.'

The makeovers make it easier for thieves to resell expensive breeds and harder

for owners to find their missing pets via descriptions on flyers and social media, pet advocates said.

Marcus, a shy beige and brown 8-year-old Shih Tzu mix, had been dyed dark violet when his owner got him back in New Haven April 24.

"His owner got a call from a woman who said she had his dog. He went to get it back, and it was purple. He was shocked," said Melanie Heltke, a CT Dog Gone Recovery volunteer.

Mocho, a 3-year-old Frenchie, was found with her tan patches dyed black on April 21 after going missing for more than a month in the Hartford area.

"He looked totally differ-

ent," said Russo. "If I saw pictures of him, I would have said, 'Oh, it's not the same dog. He doesn't have same coloring."

The wildly trendy breed

can fetch up to \$3,000 per pet and has been linked to a

slew of recent dog-nappings.
A second missing Shih
Tzu, a 5-year-old with fluffy hair, was found shaven in the Bridgeport area on April 22.

On its Facebook page, CT Dog Gone Recovery warned dogs' looks had been "changed by adding patches, eyebrows and alterations using dies and trimming." Its advocates say owners should microchip their pets and never leave them outside alone.

BLM sues anti-Israel 'nonprofit' over \$33M

A progressive nonprofit that has been shelling out cash to anti-Israel protest groups is being sued by Black Lives Matter Global Network Foundation for fraud and withholding more than \$33 million in donations, a bombshell lawsuit claims.

The Tides Foundation, which has managed hundreds of millions in donations for progressive groups since it was founded in 1976, has "refused to honor its promises and continues to commandeer BLMGNF's donations," according to the 285-page lawsuit filed in California Superior Court, Los Angeles County, on Monday.

Instead, Tides doled out an undisclosed sum of donations to a radical BLM breakaway group run by anti-police activist Melina Abdullah - who lost a "frivolous" lawsuit against BLMGNF - according to court papers and an attorney for BLMGNF.

Tides, a Los Angeles- and San Francisco-based nonprofit, acts as a fiscal sponsor — essentially, a clearinghouse that collects donations for groups that may not have 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status.

In addition to BLMGNF headed by Shalomyah Bowers and other BLM groups, it manages donations for pro-Palestinian groups that have supported anti-Israel protests across the nation.

The Soros connection

Billionaire George Soros and son Alex Soros have funneled nearly \$14 million from their Open Society Foundations to Tides, which sponsors activist groups including the pro-Palestinian Adalah Justice Project and others fueling campus protests.

"Tides has engaged in deceptive business practices and has operated in a quasi-banking capacity without appropriate regulatory oversight of licenses," the BLMGNF lawsuit says. "Tides operates with a level of autonomy and minimal regulatory scrutiny that is starkly at odds with the regulatory framework imposed on traditional financial

According to the lawsuit, Tides has more than \$1.4 billion in assets and allegedly acts as a bank only without banking regulations.

BLMGNF, the national organization of the civil rights movement founded in 2017, took in tens of millions in donations after the death of George Floyd in 2020.


At the time, the group did not have tax-exempt status from the IRS, and approached Tides to help it manage the flood of cash.

In the meantime, it managed donations in a "collective-action fund" that would be accessible to

BLMGNF, according to the lawsuit. BLMGNF ended its relationship with Tides in 2022, and Tides has refused to hand over the cash, totaling some \$33 million, the com-

Instead, Tides, which takes between 3% and 9% of the donations it processes, has sent part of the funds to other BLM groups without the permission BLMGNF, the lawsuit says.

On June 9, 2022, a Tides official

said Tides had transferred \$7.4 million from the collective fund back to BLMGNF.

Instead, it sent part of the cash — \$4.75 million — to an unaffiliated BLM chapter in Oklahoma City, the lawsuit says.

"It is unclear why such a large amount would have been granted to a single city's BLM chapter," the lawsuit says.

In a statement to The Post Wednesday, a spokeswoman for Tides called the allegations in the complaint "completely false."

Resources in the Black Lives Matter [collective-action fund] were never intended to be granted to large, well-funded national organizations like Black Lives Matter Global Network Foundation, and were always intended to be granted to local Black Lives Matter chapters," the Tides statement says. "BLM-GNF's lawsuit seeks to circumvent the intent of the Fund's donors and deprive grassroots Black Lives Matter chapters critical resources, for its own benefit."

While Tides' website mentions that it offers "grant management," an attorney for BLMGNF said in a statement to The Post that Tides was not authorized to dole out donations earmarked for BLMGNF to offshoot groups or local chapters.

Tides said it had granted \$12.6 million from the support fund to groups including BLM Grassroots, a breakaway group helmed by activist Abdullah.

She tried to collect \$10 million from BLMGNF in a "frivolous lawsuit" for her breakaway BLM Grassroots. Abdullah — who is running as independent presidential candidate Cornel West's running mate — lost the lawsuit last year and was ordered to pay more than \$700,000 in BLMGNF legal fees and costs.

'Rightful ownership'

An attorney for BLMGNF cited a June ruling by a Los Angeles Superior Court judge who dismissed BLM Grassroots' claims to any of BLMGNF's donations.

"This lawsuit against the Tides Foundation is not just about financial discrepancies but the principle of rightful ownership and transparency that should govern partnerships in social-justice funding," attorney Byron McLain said Wednesday.

In a statement to The Post, BLMGNF said it "never expected to become victims of ... unscrupulous business practices" in social-justice philanthropy.

"There is an expectation for Black Lives Matter to challenge systems, break barriers and uphold the truth, no matter how un-comfortable," the statement said. "Today, that extends into nonprofit operations as we call out Tides Foundation and other socalled 'fiscal sponsors' who exploit their role."

BLMGNF has had its own issues with finances, after raking in \$90 million in donations for 2020 alone. Patrisse Cullors, the group's co-founder, then went on a multimillion-dollar home-buying spree, purchasing two abodes in Los Angeles and a property in the Atlanta suburbs with an airplane hangar and runway, as first revealed by The Post.

Cullors denied that she used donations to buy the properties.

She resigned from BLMGNF a month later, in May 2021.

Cullors also signed off on a \$6 million LA mansion, to be used as an office for BLMGNF, and an \$8 million property in Toronto for the group's Canadian chapter.



Mom rips GI gal pal

The mother of the US soldier in custody in Russia is convinced her son "was lured" there by his girlfriend.

Staff Sgt. Gordon D. Black, 34, was arrested in the Pacific port city of Vladivostok on May 2.

He remains in custody on charges of "theft of personal property."

"I think she convinced him to come there," Melody Jones told NBC News of her son's girlfriend, Aleksandra Vashchuk.

Black reportedly traveled to Vladivostok on his own after wrapping up a tour of duty as an Army trainer in South Korea on April 10.

He was supposed to leave the foreign base and go directly to his next station in Texas, Army spokeswoman Cynthia Smith told The Post Tuesday.

"He wanted to see her for the last time before going home, and so he went there," Jones insisted of her son's motivation for traveling to a country where multiple Americans — including Wall Street Journal reporter Evan Gershkovich — are held against their will.

"I told him not to go. I was more worried about him going to Russia than I was when he was in Iraq and Afghanistan."

Black — in the middle of a divorce from his wife back in the

States — met Vashchuk "at a bar where she was working," Jones told NBC.

"They've been together, on and off, for about a year and a half. I've never met her in person, but I've spoken to her over Messenger," the worried mom added.

"My motherly instincts told me something was wrong with her."

Unearthed videos from Vashchuk's TikTok account showed Black saying he empathized with Russia in the Ukraine war and disavowing NATO.

"I think NATO is pretty aggressive," Black said in one video. "Honestly, I understand Russia's position. Obviously, they want to defend their country."

Pulled off a plane

When he landed in Vladivostok, however, the 16-year Army vet was pulled off the plane and arrested for supposedly stealing property from a person identified as "Citizen T," NBC reported. He is expected to be held for at least two months.

Jones said she has not heard from any officials since an initial call from the State Department that he was detained.

As the family waits for more information, Jones worries about her son's 6-year-old daughter.

"She misses her daddy," Jones told NBC.

Unrepentant killer dad jailed

The New Hampshire dad who brutally beat his 5-year-old daughter Harmony Montgomery to death was given 45 years to life in prison after he refused to reveal where her body was in exchange for a lighter sentence.

Adam Montgomery, 34, who was found guilty of murdering Harmony, remained silent in

court Thursday despite a surprise offer from prosecutors to reduce his sentence by as much as 21 years, WMUR reports.

He stuffed his daughter's body in a tote bag, a cooler and the freezer at the restaurant where he worked, before disposing of it in an unknown location, prosecutors said. Ronny Reyes

Israel embargo: bad politics, disastrous policy

N Tuesday, President Biden declared, "Never forget." On Wednesday, he forgot. On purpose.

In remembrance of the Holocaust, Biden solemnly proclaimed, "Never again, simply translated, means never forget.'

Actually, it means never again will a genocide of the Jews be allowed. But Biden's interpretation is convenient, since he endangered the Jewish state the very next day by threatening to cut off deliveries to Israel of offensive weapons if it entered Rafah to finish off Hamas.

This will go down as one of the worst American betrayals of a close ally in recent memory.

After Hamas' savage attack on Israel on Oct. 7, Biden declared, "The United States stands with Israel. We will not ever fail to have their back." He immediately supplied Israel with weapons and visited the Jewish state.

But the White House determined that to win reelection the president needed to cater to pro-Hamas, anti-Israel, anti-American Arab-Americans in Michigan and to young Americans with similar views.

The Biden administration then pressed for a Palestinian state. which is anath-

ema to Israelis post-Oct. 7.

It increasingly criticized Israel over Gaza, opposed letting it fin-ish off Hamas' last battalions in Rafah and pressed for a lasting cease-fire even without Hamas' release of hostages. Biden's arms embargo against Israel doubles down on this approach.

Hamas' survival would be a huge victory for it and its Iranian and Qatari backers, and a big defeat for Israel and its American partner, with Israeli deterrence and security further undermined. It also would condemn both Palestinian and Israeli civilians to indefinite suffering and unending cycles of conflict.

Politically, this approach has also proved lousy. If Biden had backed letting Israel destroy Hamas months ago, perhaps the recent antisemitic, anti-Israel, anti-American university encampments might not have sprung up.

Those vile, raucous protests have hurt Biden politically and his embargo announcement will only further embolden pro-

testers, who'll see it as a victory.

By now, the White House could have brokered a Saudi-Israel normalization deal, which would have been a boon to Biden's reelection. As it is, he now has the lowest approval rating of any president in 75 years at this point in his presidency. In contrast, Democratic Sen. John Fetterman,

in the swing state of Pennsylvania, has unequivocally supported Israel and has seen his popularity rise.

Policy-wise, Biden's pressure on Israel has been a disaster. By delaying Rafah, it has made Saudi-Israel normalization nearly impossible this year, given the US electoral calendar and Saudi opposition to it until Gaza is relatively quiet. It has hardened Hamas' terms for release of the hostages and a cease-fire deal.

The new arms embargo against Israel, which involves precisionguided munitions (PGMs), also makes it more likely Israeli air strikes will cause more collateral damage among Arabs. Coupled with Biden's inexplicable recent unfreezing of billions in Iranian assets, the weapons ban reveals significant daylight between America and Israel, emboldening not just Hamas but also Hezbollah and Iran, making a major Middle East war far more likely – precisely what the Biden team sought to avoid.

Biden's warnings and deployment of naval assets to the areas after Oct. 7 might have helped convince Hezbollah not to launch

its own devastating assault.

And it was with the assistance of US jets that Israel blunted Iran's unprecedented barrage of over 300 drones and missiles. But Iran now will believe it no longer has to fear America siding with and coming to Israel's aid.

Israel has used the PGMs Biden's withholding to destroy Hezbollah infrastructure and kill Hezbollah and Iranian fighters, which has helped deter Tehran and Hezbollah from unleashing even greater destruction.

Instead of banning them, the United States should pre-position a large amount of these weapons in Israel, precisely because knowing that Israel has ready access to a stockpile of PGMs would help deter Hezbollah and Iran from provoking a war.

Moreover, this embargo shatters US credibility with friends and foes. If the United States can withhold weapons from Israel, one of its closest partners and to whose security the president has repeatedly made an "ironclad" commitment — and do so, no less, while it fights a defensive war against an adversary bent on its destruction — then which ally won't it betray?

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has made clear: "If Israel is forced to stand alone. Israel will stand alone." For the sake of its deterrence and security, Israel will have to do just that and destroy Hamas in Rafah.

Joe's Disastrous Delusions

ur biggest question about President Biden's nonstop lies in his CNN interview is this: Does he *know* he's painting an alternate reality, or does he *believe* it? Either way, he's talking himself into a clear loss come November — and a larger Mideast crisis in the meantime.

Neither answer is great: He has a pretty sad view of Americans' intelligence if he thinks *anyone* is taken in by, for example, his claim that inflation was 9% when he took office — when it actually was just 1.4% then. It hit the 9% mark on *his* watch, in June 2022, after he'd spent months denying it was a problem.

But his way of dealing with the unpleasant truth may be to talk *himself* out of believing it. After all, just a month ago he told a vaguer version of this lie, "We have dramatically reduced inflation from 9% down to close to 3%. We're in a situation where we're better situated than we were when we took office where we — inflation was skyrocketing."

As we've said before: Biden's been a liar his whole career; it just never mattered nearly as much when he was one senator (and with a safe seat), or vice president. So some of this is just that he's too old to change his fibbin' ways, even though it *does* show so badly now.

B ut along with the lies comes a pretty clear confusion: His staff regularly have to walk back his policy declarations, such as his repeated claims that the United States is fully committed to defending Taiwan if mainland China attacks.

His words on CNN on Israel may fall

somewhere in that confused zone: He seemed to suggest that the IDF's actions so far are OK because "they haven't gone into population centers"; last month National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan was suggesting a surgical approach to Rafah would be OK.

Yet the munitions the White House has already put on hold include precision bombs, which are surely important to any surgical approach. Meanwhile, Team Biden still says it supports Israel taking out Hamas' last intact battalions, which absolutely requires entering those "population centers" somehow.

n short, it's not just the president who's delusional, but the entire administration.

Plainly the bubble Biden & Co. live in has them convinced (falsely) that anti-Israel sentiment is so strong that they'll lose the election if they support the IDF as it does the necessary.

So they've set ever-crazier limits on what IDF moves they'll accept, to the point that a war that should've ended weeks ago still drags on (even though they're also upset about the risk of famine etc., which the longer war worsens).

Worst of all, since Israel *must* go into Rafah and finish off Hamas, they're setting up a visible Washington-Jerusalem rupture that's all too likely to encourage others to attack Israel: If US weapons stop flowing, Hezbollah at least could seize the moment.

In short, Biden isn't *just* betraying Israel for purely (misguided!) political reasons, he's risking a much wider Mideast war just so he can tell himself it's not his fault.

When it surfaced, Bowman pretended he'd somehow moved on (he was in his 30s when he wrote it). And now that his YouTube shenanigans have come to light, he's falling back on similarly obvious, clumsy lies.

"I don't know what you're talking about, I don't know these accounts, and I haven't watched any of these videos," he claimed — despite his campaign not denying the page was his and the fact that he was creating playlists as recently as April.

Bowman's gotten a pass from his fellow Dems and most of the media so far, so there's a sad, real chance this bull will fly.

He's a lot worse than Biden

IX months before Election Day, speculation is rampant about the impact of Robert F. Kennedy Jr.

Polling at 12% nationally and on the ballot of the critical battleground of Michigan, the Democrat-turned-independent has built a unique coalition that extends beyond those drawn to his famous last name.

Kennedy's tough talk on the southern border, willingness to stand up to the medical-industrial

state and focus on fitness and personal health have earned him unlikely admirers on the right. Recent polling shows nearly half, 48%, of all Republi-

cans view him favorably, compared to 43% of independents and 35% of Democrats.

But make no mistake: On energy — one of the core issues that has defined the Biden presidency from its outset — Kennedy is an extremist. His policies would go even further than Joe Biden's, even though the president's have weakened our security, slammed middle-class families' budgets and set our nation backward.

A quick check of the tape reveals startling similarities between the two. Biden declared climate change, the "only existential threat humanity faces." Kennedy labels global warming "the biggest crisis we face globally." Biden vowed to "end fossil fuel." Kennedy has bemoaned "our longtime deadly addiction to coal and oil."

Kennedy would ban exports of liquefied natural gas. He has praised the Green New Deal, the brainchild of Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez. He once denigrated those dubious of some climate warnings as "traitors."

In the aftermath of the 9/11 attacks, RFK Jr. actually denounced the environmental impact of hog producers as a "greater threat to the United States

and US democracy than Osama bin Laden and his terrorist network." Comments that egregious would have tanked most politicians, but US politics in the presocial-media age were very different than today.

Kennedy rose to prominence as an attorney for the National Resources Defense Council, one of the nation's best-funded environmental activist groups — and one that's faced criticism for its coziness with the Chinese Communist Party.

These facts matter. Biden has used the power of the presidency

to wage war on the energy industry. During his first days in office, with a simple stroke of his pen, he canceled the Keystone XL pipeline and halted oil and gas leasing on federal lands.

His signature legislative "accomplishment" during the first half of his first term was the sweeping climate-oriented Build Back Better plan that eventually morphed into the "slimmed down" Inflation Reduction Act — which included \$369 billion of green giveaways while doing little to tame inflation.

His administration has targeted gas cars, gas stoves and even dishwashers in pursuit of the green agenda. Biden's Environmental Protection Agency recently issued a rule that will effectively force coal plans to shut down.

The results have not been pretty: The national average price of a gallon of gas this week costs \$3.65, compared to \$1.84 at this point in May 2020. That's a 98% spike, and we're still weeks away from Memorial Day and the peak summer driving season that brings even

higher prices.

Of course, four years ago, the nation was in the throes of the COV-ID-19 pandemic, whose sweeping stay-at-home mandates drove demand down. Kennedy heralded the environmental benefits of lock-down orders that destroyed our economy for reducing "lethal air pollution + associated #mortality."

He may oppose mandated vaccines, but Kennedy would gladly lock down the nation if he thought it would fix the climate.

To be sure, Kennedy's charisma, authenticity and personality ensures he will remain at the center of the conversation. His ubiquitous media presence and willingness to talk to different audiences have served him well.

Voters are free to cast their ballots for whomever they want, but they should do with all the facts: Undoing the damage of the Biden presidency begins by reversing his misguided war on energy, which has made the world unsafe and life in America very expensive.

On this most critical issue, Kennedy would take America even further in the wrong direction, away from energy dominance and more reliant on China, compromising our very economic and national security.

The green agenda Biden embraced would become a permanent chokehold under Kennedy. Those on the left *and* right should fear that.

Don't Buy Crackpot Ukraine Talk

ARON Maté, a leftist Canadian who writes for the fringe conspiracy-theory website Grayzone, has recently become a favorite source for the far-right fringe of the MAGA universe, the fringe that prefers to "Make America Guilty Again." Don't buy it.

Maté just produced a long-read article on Ukraine for RealClearPolitics. Because of RCP's credibility, his error-riddled "investigation" into the origins of the war in Ukraine is gaining a readership, even in congressional circles. Indeed, Maté's polemic is full of distortions.

His central claim: The Russia-Ukraine war is the spawn of intervention by the Obama-Biden administration, which supported and directed a coup in 2014 by Ukraine's "far-right" — a claim that echoes the most persistent theme of Russia's propaganda machine.

The truth: As anyone in Kyiv during those turbulent months (as I was) knows, the Maidan protests of 2013-2014 were led and directed by democratic, pro-European politicians and supported by the mass protests of hundreds of thousands of ordinary middle-class citizens from Kyiv and around the country.

Fringe far-right groups were present at

the Maidan, but their ranks numbered in the hundreds.

Eighty protesters and 12 militia men were killed during a government assault on the Maidan Square on Feb. 20, 2014, killings Maté claims were orchestrated by the farright.

While several far-right protesters were lightly armed, and there's some evidence of snipers shooting at both sides, it is highly likely that the mass killings were a provoca-

tion orchestrated by Russia's security services and their Ukrainian minions, who had significantly infiltrated far-right Ukrainian groups over the years. As the violence and mayhem

escalated, Russian Federal Security Bureau officials headed by Gen. Sergei Beseda were in Kyiv officially to "secure [Russian] diplomatic facilities" but in reality to offer support to Ukraine's state security and police forces.

Top Putin aide Vladyslav Surkov was also in Kyiv to press then-President Viktor Yanukovych to crush the protesters.

On Feb. 20, the day of the mass killings, Ukraine's three main opposition parties called for "talks with the regime" to prevent further bloodshed.

The next day, Yanukovych negotiated with the opposition on de-escalation and declared a national day of mourning.

Late that night, however, Yanukovych abruptly fled the capital, as all evidence of a police and security presence disappeared.

Notably, a medal issued by the Russian Ministry of Defense "for the return of Crimea" bears the date of the operation as beginning on Feb. 20.

The timing reveals that Russia ditched

Yanukovych while he was in office to annex Crimea and initiate a long-planned takeover Ukraine's East and South by force in a violent "Russian Spring."

Contrary to what Maté writes, what occurred was hardly a far-right coup. Instead, on Feb. 22, a constitutional majority of Ukraine's deputies — 328 lawmakers out of the 450-seat parliament — voted to remove Yanukovych for abandoning his office.

On the eve of new elections, President Vladimir Putin vowed to "respect the choice of the Ukrainian people."

Maté's distortions are hardly surprising. His main source is Andriy Telizhenko.

After Volodymyr Zelensky was elected, Telizhenko bragged that he would have a major role in the new government. When that pipedream failed to materialize, Telizhenko turned on Zelensky.

Maté clearly knows little of Ukraine's history since its independence in 1991, and he denies Ukrainians agency by suggesting they're the tools of the United States.

My three decades of engagement with Ukraine's government, business and NGO sectors have taught me one big thing: Ukrainians alone are determining and shaping their democratic destiny — something they have shown in numerous mass movements and in their fierce resistance to Russian aggression.

Yet Maté' is right on one thing: Ukraine is the victim of massive outside intervention — only it's one orchestrated by Russia and its imperialist leaders.

There is only one person to blame for the war: Vladimir Putin, a man Aaron Maté and far too many MAGA politicians are attempting to whitewash and justify.

How sad that this transparent whitewashing has been given a platform by as credible a source as RealClearPolitics.

WORKED TO DEATH MAY Colleagues rage at passing of BoA banker, 35

The death of a Bank of America associate last week has ignited a firestorm on Wall Street as some bankers slam the toxic work culture they feel contributed to his death - including reported complaints about 100-hour workweeks.

Leo Lukenas III, a former Army Green Beret who was part of the bank's Financial Institutions Group, died of "acute coronary artery thrombus" at age 35 May 2, according to a Reuters report. He leaves behind a wife and two young children.

His death came after he allegedly had been working some 100 hours a week for several weeks in a row on a \$2 billion merger that was completed April 30 — three days before his tragic death.

Much of the outcry on social-media site Reddit from purported bank staffers has been directed at Lukenas' boss, Gary Howe, co-head of the financial-institutions group. Howe took down his LinkedIn page during the last few days.

Some employees have reportedly messaged each other about a possible walkout in an effort to bargain for better working conditions, according to popular financial website and chat board Wall Street Oasis.

List of worker demands

One post from an anonymous banker highlighted a list of demands for employees' welfare that generated more than 450 comments in response.

The demands include "proactive policies" that cap work schedules at an average of 80 hours over a sevenday period and that employees get at least one weekend off per month. It also called for an investigation into

Lukenas' death.

So far, workers have remained at their desks — in part because they fear retribution for raising concerns about the toxic culture, sources said.

A Bank of America spokesperson reached by The Post did not comment about a possible walkout or the accusations of retribution.

The rep said the bank has no plans to take any action against Howe or to investigate complaints that its junior bankers are forced to put in 100-hour weeks.

"We are very saddened by the loss of our teammate. We continue to focus on doing whatever we can to support the family and our team, especially those who worked closely with him," the BoA spokesperson told The Post.

Howe did not reply to multiple requests for comment.

Lukenas, who lived in Brooklyn, had been a Green Beret for more than a decade — from 2013 until he joined the bank as a full-time employee last July — according to his LinkedIn page. He posted news about the \$2 billion deal between UMB Financial and Heartland Financial on LinkedIn days before his death.

Lukenas' dedication to his job is why some on Wall Street are quick to link his passing to a culture they believe values wealth over well-being.

While there is no direct evidence to suggest his work had anything to do with his death, numerous studies have linked acute stress to thrombosis.

Lukenas was a member of 51 Vets, a nonprofit dedicated to connecting transitioning and transitioned veterans from elite military communities with leading businesses, according to its website.

A fundraiser for his family launched by 51 Vets had already raised more than \$250,000 as of Thursday, including \$10,000 from hedge-fund titan Bill Ackman.







'Quit' out of luck at most new gigs

Workers who switched jobs during the pandemicera Great Resignation were less satisfied than those who stuck with their employer last year — a major reversal from the previous year, according to a survey.

The poll by the Confer-

ence Board found that 65% of workers who stayed put in 2023 were satisfied compared to 59% for those who sought out greener pastures. The nonprofit think tank and businessmembership organization surveyed 1,500 to 2,000

working adults in the US

In 2022, the same survey found two-thirds of those who switched jobs following the pandemic were satisfied, compared with 62% for those who did not change jobs. "It seems the grass wasn't always greener on

the other side for some folks," said Travis Lindemoen, founder and CEO of the AI-powered recruiting firm Enjoy Mondays, told The Post. Those who switched found that "the company culture was a total mismatch or the workload ended up being way more than advertised." "It seems like those who stayed put at their old jobs might have benefited from a sense of stability and familiarity, especially as things got a little shaky in the broader economy," he said. Heat on FDIC chair to resign

Martin Gruenberg, the chair of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, is facing an influx of calls to resign after a blistering, 234-page report released Tuesday revealed widespread sexual harassment and other misconduct plaguing the federal banking regulator.

The damning report, which was released by law firm Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton and was prompted by a Wall Street Journal

investigation in November, did not find that Gruenberg (right) alone was responsible for the FDIC's toxic workplace.

However, "we do recognize that, as a number of FDIC employees put it in talking about Chairman Gruenberg, culture 'starts at the top,' " the report said.


Cleary Gottlieb also documented several instances in which Gruenberg — who's served as FDIC chair since 2023, but has been a leader at

the agency since joining its board in 2005 - lashed out at subordinates, "particularly when being delivered bad news or conveyed views with which he disagrees."

If Gruenberg caves in and does actually resign, there could be significant ramifications for banks across the country, CNN reported.

The FDIC did not respond to a request for comment.

Elon brain-chip blip

1st implant loses effectiveness in paralyzed man

Elon Musk's brain-chip startup Neuralink suffered an unexpected problem in its first-ever human implant as the device began to detach from the patient's skull — reducing the amount of data it could capture, the company revealed.

Neuralink's computer interface, known as a BCI, was implanted into 29-year-old patient Noland Arbaugh's brain in January.

The chip is designed to help patients with paralysis control external technology using only their mind, and Arbaugh — who is paralyzed from the shoulders down due to a diving accident eight years ago - is participating in Neuralink's six-year trial to test the device's safety.

Just last month, Neuralink livestreamed a nineminute video of Arbaugh showing how the BCI technology works.

Setback

Neuralink's chip contains

thinner than a strand of human hair — that are programmed to gather data about the brain's neural activity and movement intention and send that data to

the thoughts into action.

However, in the weeks since the astounding video, "a number of threads retracted from [Arbaugh's] brain, resulting in a net decrease in the number of effective electrodes," Neuralink said in a blog post Wednesday reported on by The Wall Street Journal.

As a result, Neuralink was not able to measure how effectively its system of electrodes and threads was performing.

"In response to this change, we modified the recording algorithm to be more sensitive to neural population signals, improved the techniques to translate these signals into cursor movements, and enhanced the user interface," Neuralink added, insisting that the refinement will enhance the accuracy of Arbaugh's ability to control the cursor's bits per second (BPS).

BPS is "the standard measure for speed and accuracy," it said.

"These refinements produced a rapid and sustained improvement in BPS that has now superseded Noland's initial performance," Neuralink said.

Sam Ash, a 100-year-old music instrument retailer with a longtime and legendary Manhattan presence. filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy late Wednesday, saying it intended to close all of its 42 stores in the US.

Sam Ash had difficulty paying landlords and vendors in April, causing the company to be locked out of one of its stores, according to court filings. Reuters

A financial executive was convicted Thursday of enabling his boss and others to make over \$22 million illegally by trading off his tips ahead of the public announcement that an acquisition firm was taking former President Donald Trump's media company public.

An agitated Bruce Garelick dropped his head and repeatedly wiped his face with his hands after a jury convicted him of all charges

in Manhattan federal court.

Garelick, who had testified in his defense, was convicted of tipping others in 2021 to news that the special purpose acquisition company, Digital World Acquisition Corp., was merging with Trump Media & Technology Group. Garelick sat on DWAC's board.

His co-defendants pleaded guilty before trial. Garelick, who is free on bail, will be sentenced Sept. 12. AP

Warner loss at \$966M

Warner Bros. Discovery posted a quarterly loss of \$966 million that was larger than expected as advertising sales slumped at its cable TV unit and the studio segment contended with the fallout of last year's Hollywood strikes and poor demand for a "Suicide Squad" game.

Ad revenue at the company's networks segment, which includes CNN and the Discovery Channel, fell 11% in the first quarter.

The streaming unit remained a bright spot for Warner, adding 2 million subscribers.

CEO David Zaslav said the company "was hopeful" it would reach an agreement with the NBA to keep the league on Max and TNT, which has held those rights for almost four decades.

That helped shares climb 3% as NBA rights are considered central to driving streaming growth and retaining cable customers.

Art-crush ad called tone-deaf

Apple CEO Tim Cook was lambasted for green-lighting an ad for the company's revamped iPad that showed instruments such as a piano, guitar and trumpet crushed by a giant hydraulic press.

The 60-second spot, titled "Crush!," also included items such as an arcade game, turntable and even a sculpted bust getting slowly compacted — all set to Sonny & Cher's "All I Ever Need Is You" — to tout the slimness of its upgraded iPad Pro.

"Meet the new iPad Pro: the thinnest product we've ever created, the most advanced display we've ever produced, with the incredible power of the M4 chip. Just imagine all the things it'll be used to create," Cook tweeted alongside the video.

Social media users, however, turned apoplectic, calling the ad "tone-deaf" for its lack of respect for the creative process and arguing it was another sign of Big Tech's desire to take over society.

"The destruction of the human experience. Courtesy of Silicon Valley," actor Hugh Grant wrote on X about the commercial.

Another user slammed Cook for sullying the legacy of Apple founder Steve Jobs, who famously approved the company's groundbreaking "1984" commercial, aired during that year's Super Bowl.

"Steve Jobs would have never approved this ad," wrote Ian Harber.

"Truly, what is wrong with you," added actress Justine Bateman.

X user @usaotoday wrote the video "lacks any response for creative equipment and mocks the creators," a post that generated more than 24,000 likes.

Epic Games programmer Kiaran Ritchie said "the symbolism of indiscriminately crushing beautiful creative tools is an interesting choice."

"Who needs human life and everything that makes it worth living? Dive into this digital simulacrum and give us your soul. Sincerely, Apple," added "Men in

Black" screenwriter Ed Solomon.

Apple didn't respond to a request for comment.

The video surfaced as Apple attempts to drum up excitement about its iPad lineup, which is in the midst of a lengthy sales slump.

In the second quarter, revenue for the iPad segment of Apple's business fell 17% to \$5.6 billion, which missed analysts' estimate of \$5.91 billion.

The 11-inch version of the device starts at \$999, while a larger 13-inch version starts at \$1,299. Both are about \$200 more expensive than the previous model.

Labor pains: Jobless filings hit high

Initial filings for unemployment benefits in the US climbed to their highest level since August 2023 — a sign that the robust American labor market is cooling.

Initial jobless claims increased by 22,000 to 231,000 in the week ended May 4, according to Labor Department data released Thursday — blowing past

Bloomberg economists' expectations of 212,000.

The four-week moving average, which helps smooth out weekly volatility in numbers, increased to 215,000 — up 4,750 from the previous week and the highest since February.

Until this week, first-time applications hadn't topped the narrow 200,000-to-

222,000 range in the past three months, according to Bloomberg.

The latest reading, however, indicates that the number of layoffs across US employers ticked higher.

The latest jobless claims data come after last month's jobs report came in weaker than expected, adding just 175,000 new roles in April

short of the 240,000 analysts were expecting and renewing hopes for an interest rate cut from the Fed.

A month earlier, March had experienced an impressive 303,000 gains.

Before adjustment for seasonal influences, initial applications rose by nearly 20,000, to 209,324, which the Labor Department said

was because of a jump in jobless claims in New York, where upwards of 10,000 claims contributed to more than half of the latest hike.

Claims also picked up in California, where many hourly workers were cut after the state implemented a \$20 minimum wage rule for fast-food workers on April 1. Shannon Thaler

Even in a loss, Aaron Judge did something memorable.

With the ball jumping out of Yankee Stadium on Thursday, Judge hit the third-longest homer of his career, a 473foot shot to left-center off Houston's Ryan Pressly in the bottom of the eighth.

The homer got the Yankees to within a run, but it wasn't enough in a 4-3 loss. Still, it got Aaron Boone's attention.

"Not a lot of people go to that place," Boone said of the shot that landed next to the bleachers in left-center.

Judge has also hit home runs of 496 feet and 495 feet — and the one that went 496 feet came against the Blue Jays, and off current teammate Marcus Stroman.

"He's special," Stroman said of Judge. "And he's not even hot yet."

If he isn't, he's getting close.

Judge is now tied with Juan Soto for the team lead with nine homers and has three in his past four games, as well as six in his last 15.

Judge said he hadn't looked at a replay of his latest blast and was more concerned about getting the Yankees a run closer in the game.

But his performance on the six-game homestand: 10for-22, with four doubles, three homers, four walks and AARON JUDGE seven RBIs, is reason to be optimistic that Judge has found his form.

The Yankees also added some minor league bullpen depth Thursday, when

they claimed right-hander **Colby White** off waivers from the Rays. They assigned the 25-year-old to Double-A Somerset.

White had been designated for assignment by Tampa Bay. He came back from Tommy John surgery last season, but had been terrible with Triple-A Durham in seven appearances this year.

➤ Boone is among those paying attention to the playoff runs by the Knicks and Rangers.

"It's been great, certainly, for New York," Boone said. "You can feel that buzz. It is awesome."

He's among those who have noticed when the Rangers' highlights are shown on the scoreboard at the Stadium.

'When they throw the Rangers up there, you know a goal's coming, Boone said. "[Wednesday] night on the bench, I said the Knicks must not be winning because I haven't seen a highlight all night."

A bat boy in the dugout told Boone that the Knicks were, in fact, down by 10 points at the time before they rallied.

"You can feel the energy and excitement around what the Knicks and Rangers are doing," Boone said. "I hope the Rangers and Knicks can play for at least another month."

➤ Trent Grisham was an under-theradar addition to the Soto trade during the offseason, but more than a month into the season, the extra outfielder has barely touched the field.

It's a good problem for Boone to have, since it means Soto, Judge and Alex Verdugo have been healthy, as well as Giancarlo Stanton at DH.

But it's also made it hard for Boone to give Grisham any playing time. And when Grisham has played, he hasn't had much success.

He has just two hits and five walks in 34 plate appearances, and a large chunk of those came when Verdugo missed time on the paternity list.

Boone said he expected Grisham to get into one or two games in the upcoming series at Tampa Bay, which isn't surprising considering Judge will likely be out of center field for at least one game on the unforgiving turf of Tropicana Field.

And the Yankees are hoping to get more production.

"There will be those opportunities [for Grisham to play more]," Boone said. "But as we've gone through this stretch where guys are healthy and have had strong performances, it's been a little more challenging."

Mets still talking through rotation crunch

The Mets will roll with Jose Quintana, Christian Scott and Luis Severino, in that order, in the series at Citi Field that begins Friday against the Braves.

The team is "having discussions" how to proceed after that, manager Carlos Mendoza said Wednesday.

At the moment, the Mets have five starters in a rotation that does not include Adrian Houser, who was skipped the last turn through and replaced by Scott.

But the Mets have left open the possibility of a six-man rotation — and likely will have one when Kodai Senga is ready to return, probably in June — which means they will have a decision to make by Wednesday.

After this weekend's series, the Mets would be in line to pitch Sean Manaea and Jose Butto on Monday and Tuesday, respectively, in a home set against the Phillies. By the time the series shifts to Philadelphia on Wednesday, they would have several options: They could reinsert Houser; bring Quintana back on four days' rest; or bring up another starter, such as Joey Lucchesi, who last pitched Wednesday with Triple-A Syracuse.

In the short sample size of two games, Quintana has allowed nine earned runs in 7 $^{2}/_{3}$ innings (10.57 ERA) when pitching on four days' rest this season. The 35-year-old has posted a 3.76 ERA in five starts with at least five days of rest.

Houser, a veteran who has

acknowledged he is in the worst funk of his career, pitched to an 8.16 ERA in six starts before he was at least temporarily demoted from the rotation. The righty has been available out of the bullpen since Monday, but the Mets have not needed him yet, which means he has not pitched since May 2.

"There'll be innings for him," Mendoza said, though when or in what role those innings will come remains unclear.

Lucchesi, who is the lone non-rehabbing starter at Syracuse who is on the 40-man roster, has been strong in Triple-A this season and owns a 2.58 ERA through seven starts.

At least at the moment, Tylor Megill would not appear to be an option. The rehabbing righty pitched four scoreless innings with Syracuse on Tuesday and is expected to continue to lengthen out in Triple-A on Sunday. Megill is a bit further ahead than David Peterson, who also has pitched well in his rehab assignment and could be activated as soon as May 27.

Of course injuries can change the equation in a hurry, but the Mets have plenty of decisions to make with their rotation in the coming weeks, beginning with Wednesday's starter.

"We'll see where we're at," Mendoza said. "Whether we want to go six-man this next round. There's a lot of factors that we need to consider — off days, bullpen and things like that."

But I'm worried about the Knicks heading on the road on a short turnaround. Injuries are mounting. They're already without Mitchell Robinson, Bojan Bogdanovic and Julius Randle, and OG Anunoby and Brunson suffered injuries in Game 2.

The Knicks could be running with a six-man rotation in Friday's Game 3, or they'll have to give heavier minutes to players like Jericho Sims or Alec Burks. Running a short rotation on short rest is not ideal against the uptempo Pacers, who run at the fastest pace in the playoffs (102 possessions per game).

With home-court advantage flipped to Indiana and monster depth concerns barreling down on New York, I think the Pacers will bounce back in Game 3 with a double-digit win.

It is the penultimate Matchweek of the 2023-24 Premier League season and we've still got plenty of drama to sort out. Arsenal will go into the weekend with a one-point lead over Manchester City at the top of the table, but the Cityzens have a game in hand on the Gunners and thus are a -360 favorite to win their fourth straight title.

The relegation battle is also still in the balance as Burnley (24 points), Luton Town (26 points) and Nottingham Forest (29 points) are scrapping for the final spot in the Premier League next season. Burnley and Forest play one another on the final day of the campaign, so a win for the Clarets and a loss for Forest this weekend could set up quite the spectacle next weekend.

Let's jump into a handful of bets that have value in Matchweek 37:

Luton Town at West Ham, Saturday, 10 a.m. ET

This one has the potential to look more like a basketball game, with the teams going up and down the field trading scoring chances, than a high-stakes soccer match.

It became clear early on in the season that Luton Town's defensive flaws meant it would need to score its way to safety, so the Hatters essentially threw caution into the wind and adopted a playing style that would give them the best chance to do just that.

And while Luton has managed to post a decent offensive output (relative to its expectations), it still owns a -29 goal difference (49 for, 78 against) and a -33.6 expected goal differential.

Those numbers are ugly, but the good news is that Luton Town taking on a West Ham defense that is just as leaky

The Hammers have conceded 70 goals (17th-most) and 68.9 xG (18th) this campaign and have shown no signs of improving down the stretch, which makes sense since they have nothing to play for and it's been announced that manager David Moyes will leave the club at the end of the season.

With West Ham already on the beach, I'll back Luton Town (+290 at BetMGM) in a must-win match.

Arsenal at Manchester United, Sunday. 11:30 a.m. ET

While Arsenal is a much better team and has everything to play for in this match, this price is on its way to getting out of hand.

Manchester United has been an outright mess this season and it will almost certainly cost manager Erik ten Hag his job, but the Red Devils have shown up in a couple of big spots already.

ManU was given very little chance of getting a result against Liverpool on two separate occasions over the last couple of months, but the Red Devils defied the odds and got a 2-2 draw and a 4-3 win over the Reds. United also held Liverpool scoreless in a nil-nil draw right before Christmas.

Recently things have been a lot uglier for United, and the Red Devils are coming off an embarrassing 4-0 defeat to Crystal Palace, but that result shouldn't really shock anyone. It's just how the season has gone for this team.

There are some injury concerns for United with Bruno Fernandes and Marcus Rashford questionable, but there's still enough attacking talent in this side with Alejandro Garnacho, Rasmus Hojlund and Mason Mount to ask some questions of a terrific Arsenal defense.

So while United isn't likely to win this match and has injury concerns to contend with, getting a team with this much talent at +600 at DraftKings (and this number should rise by kickoff) at home is worth a sprinkle.

going at them in the fourth, and they still came up with loose balls. They came up with the offensive rebounds. They made shots. So, look, their execution has been very good in those situations.

"But look, everything's on the table going forward. It has to be at this point. And we'll look closely at everything.'

It remains to be seen whether Carlisle changes that in Friday's Game 3 in Indianapolis.

McConnell got pulled with 7:10 left with the Pacers trailing, 105-103. Brunson promptly took Nembhard off the dribble for a reverse layup 18 seconds later. And on the Knicks' very next possession, Brunson drilled a step-back 3-pointer with 6:18 remaining and Nembhard guarding him.

Brunson scored 11 of his 29 points in the final 6:52, most of them coming against Nembhard who has gotten eviscerated by the Knicks star in the series.

Indiana also missed McConnell's steady hand at the point down the stretch. He had 10 points, 12 assists and finished plus-10 in nearly 23 minutes of action. But the day after, Pacers fans are asking why he didn't log closer to 30 minutes.

"Rick is a Hall of Fame coach

and has been doing this for a long time, so the rotations that he plays, we trust that they're the right ones, and I fully support him," McConnell said. "Whenever my number is called, I'll be ready, [even] if that means I have to be over on the bench supporting my team."

That said, the Pacers' offense couldn't keep up without the veteran's steady hand of scoring and

The Pacers have outscored the Knicks by 19 points with McConnell on the court in the series but have been outscored by 32 when he sits.

And he shockingly sat the final 7:10 when Brunson blew it open. Slowing him was a task Nembhard couldn't handle, but the pesky McConnell relished.

"I mean, he's a marquee player in this league," McConnell said. "And playing in Madison Square Garden, picking him up 94 feet, what greater challenge is there?"

Canadian police say they are searching for former Jets defensive back Darryl "Buster" Skrine after he missed a court date relating to bank fraud allegations that were levied last year.

Skrine was arrested last August and accused of committing over \$100,000 in bank fraud in an alleged scheme where he would open new bank accounts with fraudulent check deposits and withdraw money from the ac-

The Durham Regional Police service announced Wednesday that Skrine missed a court date on May 6 and that his GPS monitoring device "has since gone offline." Skrine had been granted bail from the Saskatchewan Correctional Centre on April 24.

When he was originally detained, police said "there is reason to believe the same male has been committing similar offences across Ca-

Skrine played college football at Chattanooga and was selected in the fifth round of the 2011 draft by the Browns.

In 2015, he signed a fouryear deal with the Jets worth \$25 million. He appeared in 59 games for the Jets over those four years, including 48 starts.

He then played two seasons for the Bears, and had stints for both the Titans and the 49ers in the 2021 NFL season.

Through the first six weeks of the season, the Mets have lost five straight, won six straight, taken road series from the Dodgers and Braves and been swept by the Rays.

The gauntlet begins Friday, when the Mets begin a threegame series at home against a Braves team that in some ways has started slowly - Matt Olson is hitting .200; Ronald Acuña Jr. is batting just .261 with two home runs; Michael Harris II owns a .671 OPS — and yet is still averaging the fourth-most runs in baseball, partly because Marcell Ozuna entered play as the majors' home run leader.

The Mets already took two of three from the powerhouse in Atlanta last month, when they beat up on Friday starter Charlie Morton and since-demoted Allan Winans. The Braves' rotation has settled in and been good enough for the club to own the third-best record in the National League.

MLB's best record belongs to the Phillies (26-12), who fell in the NLCS last year and returned roughly the same roster. Their rotation has been both excellent and deep, and a step forward from Alec Bohm and more dominance from Bryce Harper has carried the offense.

The Mets will see the Phillies for the first time this season Monday to start a four-game series that is split between Queens and Philadelphia.

"We know they're good teams, but we're a good team, too," manager Carlos Mendoza said this week. "We'll be up for the challenge, guys will be ready to go. They'll be excited, and it'll be fun."

There are signs that a middleof-the-pack Mets offense could get going. McNeil, who is coming off a down season and who did not show much hope in April, is coming off a three-hit game that raised his average to .248. Pete Alonso, who had been in a 1-for-29 funk that earned him a rare day out of the starting lineup, blasted a homer and a double Tuesday that brought his OPS from .710 to .742. Francisco Lindor, Brandon Nimmo and Brett Baty are similarly trending upward.

But through the first month and a half, when one aspect of the Mets emerges another has dipped. Will the bullpen, the largest strength of the club so far, continue to excel under heavy usage? Will Mendoza push the right buttons with an in-flux rotation that might extend to six starters and now holds rookie Christian Scott?

There are plenty of questions around a middling Mets club.

This week, the Mets could begin providing some answers.

"You want to beat them they're at the top of our division right now," McNeil said of the Braves and Phillies. "They're playing really good baseball.

"I think you have the same motivation [as any game]. But at the same time, those games really matter, I think, a little bit more."



This was different. This was unexpected. This was the rare occasion when a Yankees starting pitcher didn't have it and dug an early hole for his teammates.


"Just got to be better, can't let up three runs in the first," Marcus Stro-man said. "Feel like I don't give my team a chance when I do that."

Entering the homestand's finale, Yankee starting pitchers had boasted a 3.39 cumulative ERA, the eighth-lowest in the league. They were one of three teams to have a starter go at least four innings in every outing, with the Orioles and Nationals the others. They had allowed three earned runs or fewer in 31 starts.

But Thursday, Stroman struggled early, touched up for three first-inning runs on a pair of long home runs to Yordan Alvarez and Jon Singleton, and was fortunate to give up just four runs over his $5^{\frac{1}{2}/3}$ innings of work in a 4-3 loss to the Astros.

"Those pitches were essentially middle-middle, and they didn't have the action on them that I wanted," Stroman said, referring to the homers. "Look to be better next

"Just can't put us in a hole, 3-0, can't do that."



It ended an otherwise terrific homestand on a sour note, capping a 5-1 stretch against the Tigers and Astros. As the Yankees sit at 25-14 through 39 games, the starting rotation has been a major bright spot. There were questions about this group, particularly since staff ace Gerrit Cole is expected to miss the first half of the season.

Nestor Cortes and Carlos Rodon were coming off shaky seasons. Luis Gil, recovering from Tommy John surgery, didn't even pitch in the big leagues last year. Clarke Schmidt was unproven, and Stroman was new. All have performed very well — particularly the 25-year-old Gil, boasting a staff-leading 2.92 ERA with 45 strikeouts in 37 innings pitched. All five have an ERA of 3.80 or lower. The group has also given the Yankees length. They are fourth in innings pitched among starters and have struck out the third most, with 219 in 213 innings.

"The opportunity to win a game," manager Aaron Boone said of what he has liked the most about his starting rotation. "I don't recall a game where we were just out of it in the middle innings — maybe the Baltimore game a little when we were down four or five runs. But by and large — whether it's been four innings, five innings, six innings, seven innings, eight innings, whatever a starting pitcher has given us we've been in the game 99 percent of the time.

"It starts on the bump and it starts with that $gu\bar{y}$ that kicks off the game for you. They set you up to give you a chance to be successful, and that's been a common theme at the start of the season."

It wasn't on Thursday. It's not a coincidence that the Yankees lost for the first time in a week.

Verlander: No Amazin' plan for Houston

The Yankees opened Thursday in a virtual tie atop the AL East with the Orioles, and their most recent fiercest rivals, the Astros, were in the basement of the AL West.

But Justin Verlander — who saw the Mets' disappointment firsthand last season, when the team with giant expectations and an even bigger payroll fell far short of expectations and traded away its stars like Verlander and Max Scherzer — said he doesn't expect the same fate in

"You can look at the track record with the same group of guys here," Verlander said of the Astros' run of success, which includes trips to the ALCS every year since 2017. "The Mets didn't have that track record. They were good the year before [in 2022], but not for seven years in a row. If you're looking for a reason to be more hopeful than last year, that's one thing I could point towards. If anyone can do it, we can."

The Astros, though, have looked nothing like the team that's dominated the American League for much of the past decade — other than the fact that Jose Altuve is still putting up good numbers and is the player Yankees fans love to hate as one of the last remaining members of the scandal-scarred 2017 World Series-winning team.

Among the issues is the pitching staff, which entered Thursday's 4-3 win over the Yankees in the series finale in The Bronx with the thirdworst ERA in the majors, the second-worst WHIP and the worst WAR, according to FanGraphs.

They've dealt with an underperforming bullpen, an injury-stricken rotation, and even Verlander was smacked around Tuesday — giving up seven runs and three homers in one of his ugliest performances in

Despite the bad month, Verlander said he's not looking to go through a repeat of last year's trade deadline, when he was shipped to Houston.

"We're upbeat in here and have the belief we're gonna turn it around," Verlander said. "We had the same attitude last year [with the Mets]. That didn't change until Steve [Cohen] decided we were going in a different direction. That stuff is above my pay grade, and I didn't start to pay attention to all that last year until the dominoes started falling."

And he's also aware the Yankees appear to be a more fearsome foe than they were in 2023.

"Look, baseball is better when the Yankees are playing well," he said. "It's no secret how great an addition [Juan] Soto is, and with him and [Aaron] Judge, you have two of the best hitters in baseball together, and that's tough to navigate.'

fore the first TV timeout. With a few extras tossed in.

Did all of that insufferability actually help Knight at all? Did Kent Benson or Mike Woodson or Damon Bailey or Calbert Che-

aney ever get a key call, late, against Purdue or Illinois or Ohio State? Proba-

So was Carlisle's weird rant just a way to stack the odds that sometime Friday night — when the Knicks and Pacers play Game 3 of this Eastern Conference semifinal at what promises to be a jacked-up Gainbridge Fieldhouse — and it's say, tied at 110 late, that Tyrese Haliburton or Pascal Siakam will get the benefit of the doubt on a whistle?

Well ... let's hope that's what the plan

Because while you can't properly justify any of Knight's antics across the years, at least they were funny, even if the humor was just watching a bombastic bully implode from a safe distance away from the detonation. Carlisle whining about small markets?

Question: How are the two Los Angeles teams doing in the playoffs?

How about Chicago? Has anyone heard from Brooklyn lately?

Oh: and two of the NBA's hottest teams reside in Oklahoma City (pop: 694,000), which was 5-0 in the playoffs heading into Thursday night, and Minneapolis, a terrific city that will never be confused with Paris or London as a cosmopolitan capital, which is 6-0.

Carlisle mentioned 29 instances in Game 1 when the Pacers could've filed a complaint to the league. Somehow in Game 2 he found 49 more (in a 48-minute game) and this time the Pacers officially did send every one to the league office. This is hilarious on two levels:

1. There is now a 1,000 percent chance Tom Thibodeau is going to spend an extra hour or two with the Game 2 tape, just so he can find 50 instances of calls he believe went against the Knicks.

And between the dearth of championship banners and the fact that the Knicks have been in 18 lotteries since and have never, not once, moved up even one spot in the draft in any of them? The only way to come up with a worse conspiracy is if Jack Tripper had masterminded the Lufthansa Heist.

Although at least that would've been funny.

Pacers unearth 78 allegedly bad calls to submit to NBA

INDIANAPOLIS — The Pacers are done biting their tongues about the officiating. Now they want to take a bite out of the refs.

The Pacers submitted to the NBA what they feel were 78 blown calls from their Game 1 and 2 losses to the Knicks. hoping to get "a fair shot" in Friday's Game 3 and beyond.

But in truth, Indiana coach Rick Carlisle had already vowed to do as much after Wednesday's 130-121 loss, during a postgame diatribe accusing — among other things — refereeing bias against smallmarket teams and questionable play by Josh Hart.

Carlisle — who could be fined for his strategic-butblunt critique of the officiating - said the Pacers had picked out 29 incorrect or non-calls that disadvantaged them in their Game 1 loss, but opted not to submit them. But after 49 more in Game 2, they uploaded the clips overnight to the NBA.

The news was first reported by ESPN and confirmed by

"I can promise you that we're going to submit these [overnight]. New York can get ready; they'll see 'em too. I'm always talking to our guys about not making it about the officials, but we deserve a fair shot," Carlisle said after getting two technicals and ejected in the final minute after the refs reversed a double-dribble call against Isaiah Hartenstein.

This coming in the wake of the officials blowing a kickedball call against the Pacers in

Scours told The Post before series that officiating would be a huge key. That has proven true.

"Small-market teams deserve an equal shot," Carlisle said. "They deserve a fair shot no matter where they're playing."

Carlisle was particularly incensed over a play that occurred with five minutes left in the third when Hart pushed Tyrese Haliburton in the back with both hands, and was not called for a foul. The Pacers star has been dealing with back soreness and was questionable entering the series.

"The whole world knows that Haliburton's got a bad back, and Hart comes up and shoves him in the back," said Carlisle, adding referee J.B. DeRosa was "looking right at [it]. There's no whistle. That was shocking.'

Carlisle's comments were likely a mix of backing his players, boiled-over anger and a championship coach tactically working the refs as the series heads back to Indiana for Games 3 and 4.

"We love Rick showing that type of energy on the court," T.J. McConnell said. "Unfortunate that he got ejected. But that's not the feeling that we have in the locker room. We're not going to sit here and blame officials. We've got to be better; it's just that simple."

E'RE about to discover whether there are limits to the Knicks' magic, mantras and elbow grease.

They're whittled to the Villanova bones after OG Anunoby joined the infirmary line, officially ruled out for Game 3 in Indy with a strained hamstring, and unlikely to play in Game 4, according to ESPN.

Even if Jalen Brunson plays (he's "questionable" with a sore foot on the injury report), Tom Thibodeau's squad will have exactly one of his season-opening starting five available Friday: Brunson.

The rest are either injured (Julius Randle, Mitchell Robinson) or shipped off (Quentin Grimes, RJ Barrett). The top players Leon Rose acquired through in-season trades are now also injured (Anunoby, Bojan Bogdanovic).

It's an incredible dwindling of

the roster and, aside from Brunson, Anunoby might be the most significant absence. There's also no word on how long he'll be side-

lined, and hamstring strains tend to linger — especially the kind that sent Anunoby immediately to the locker room after clutching the back of his leg. There's a reason the Knicks accumulated a 26-5 record with him in the lineup.

OG is the defensive equalizer. And he looked like he blew a

But if you're counting the Knicks out because another player isn't available, you're not paying attention.

There's a belief and confidence, hardened by months of operating understaffed and doubted, they bring to the

Down 10 late in the third quarter? Meh. That game will go down to the wire.

cenzo, Isaiah Hartenstein, Miles McBride or Precious Achiuwa.

They've all done it over the last six months.

For every team I've ever covered, "next man up" is a cliche that sounds nice until Kadeem Allen, Ron Baker or Maurice Ndour is getting extended minutes. Then "next man up" becomes a "rebuilding season"

ever loses. They just don't get enough calls.

The Knicks were also guilty of whining about the Game 3 officiating in Philadelphia, but then they gutted out two more wins in a series many predicted them to lose despite being the higher seed.

Now they're heading to Gainbridge Fieldhouse with a 2-0 series lead as 7.5-point underdogs for Game 3, according to BetMGM.

All because of injuries. In the 1997 conference semis, with Thibodeau on the sideline as an assistant coach, the Knicks were depleted for another reason. Five of their players — and virtually all the best ones — were suspended because of a fight with the Heat. The circumstances, as many Knicks fans want to forget, were unfair. Most of the suspensions were thrown at players for merely taking a step off the bench, not getting involved in the

The Knicks, as result, changed their slogan during that Heat series. It went from "12 men, one mission" to "Eight men, one mission." And it didn't work. The Knicks lost three straight and the series.

fight.

Brunson's Knicks can relate to the numbers, at least, even if the depletion is about injuries, not suspensions. They're down to seven players who've logged any meaningful playoff time this year, and they can only stretch it to eight by incorporating Alec Burks.

It's a daunting task, but the Knicks, particularly those of the Villanova tree, have done this before.

Tom Thibodeau never has been averse to employing a tightened rotation, and that approach could be tested even further with OG Anunoby unable to play Friday in Game 3 against the Pacers.

With Anunoby ruled out for Game 3— and unlikely to play in Game 4, according to ESPN— after suffering a hamstring injury in the third quarter of Wednesday's win at the Garden, Thibodeau will be without four regulars— with Julius Randle, Mitchell Robinson and Bojan Bogdanovic also out for the playoffs.

Jalen Brunson also has been listed as questionable with a sore right foot, but he played the entire second half in Game 2.

Here are a few of the options for Thibodeau with Anunoby unable to play:

Start Precious Achiuwa: This appears to be the most likely solution, as the 6-foot-8 Achiuwa made 18 starts among 49 appearances for the Knicks while the trio of starting frontline players were out during the second half of the regular season. The Bronx native was used for a playoff-high 28 minutes in Game 2.

More minutes for Miles: Miles McBride has scored just seven points and totaled 40 minutes over the past three games (13.3 mpg) after averaging nearly double that figure (26.2) over five appearances to open the playoffs. The thirdyear guard has proven capable of thriving with a heavy workload with a 48-minute com-

plete game against the Nets on March 23 and 47-minute effort with Brunson suffering an opening-minute injury March 3 in Cleveland.

Dust off Burks or Sims: Veteran guard Alec Burks made a brief 44-second cameo in the second quarter of Game 2, his first action of the postseason after shooting 30.7 percent from the floor after he was acquired from the Pistons in February. Jericho Sims has not gotten off the bench in the playoffs at all, but it's conceivable he could see time as a switchable defen-

sive big man for a few minutes in each half, especially if foul trouble arises.

The joy of six: Would you really put it past Thibodeau to trim down to a six-man rotation featuring five starters — Brunson, Donte DiVincenzo, Josh Hart, Isaiah Hartenstein and Achiuwa — with McBride off the bench? But that would leave the Knicks awfully small when either of the latter two big men are off the floor, with DiVincenzo having to shift to small forward.

No change for 48-minute man Hart

OG Anunoby will join Julius Randle and Mitchell Robinson out of the lineup again for Friday's Game 3, a scenario that forced Josh Hart into the starting lineup in the first place in late January.

But to Hart, Anunoby's absence going forward after leaving the Knicks' Game 2 win over the Pacers in the third quarter with a hamstring issue does not greatly alter his role as the second-round series shifts to Indianapolis.

"I'm playing 48 [minutes] anyways, dog. Ain't s--t change," Hart said after Wednesday's comeback win at the Garden.

Indeed, Hart now has gone the distance in four of the Knicks' first eight postseason games, including a

53-minute effort in an overtime loss to the 76ers in the first round.

He also became the first NBA player with back-to-back complete games since Jimmy Butler of the Bulls played every minute in three straight playoff contests in 2013 — twice against the Nets and once against the Heat.

The common denominator there is that both players were coached at the time by Tom Thibodeau.

"Thibs always asks me if I need [a break], and I always tell him no," Hart said. "As a competitor, you want to play, you want to play every second. So that's something that I want to do."

The 29-year-old Hart has positively thrived despite the heavy workload, averaging 18.0 points, 12.8 rebounds and 5.3 assists in 46.8 minutes per game in

the Knicks' 6-2 start to the playoffs entering Game 3 against the Pacers.

With Jalen Brunson (foot) missing the final 16 minutes of the first half and Anunoby sitting out the final 15 of the second half with their respective injuries Wednesday, Hart finished with a 19-15-7 stat line in those categories in Game 2 while hitting 8 of 12 shots from the field.


"Honestly, [it's] just rest, recovery, and then, my Lord works in mysterious ways. That's all I've got to say," Hart said. "[Wednesday] I felt like I didn't have it at all. ... But He allows you to walk and not faint. I felt like I didn't have it, but like I said, he works in mysterious ways."

what is believed the fourth concussion of his career. It was as if Chytil jumped onto a speeding Acela in full flight.

And, man, does Laviolette deserve a lot of credit for this. The coach switched the lineup after

Chytil was on left wing on the third line

with Alexander Wennberg in the middle and Kaapo Kakko on the right, while Will Cuylle moved to the fourth line with Barclay Goodrow and Jimmy Vesey. The Blueshirts were able to get the fourth line on with fair regularity once the game became a five-on-five battle rather than a special teams showcase for the Rangers.

"I just love this team, I love these players, I love everybody in the organization," said Chytil, the 20th overall selection of the 2017 draft who made his debut as an 18-year-old under Alain Vigneault. "In one moment, I thought I want to be back, and I did everything for that, and here we are today."

Chytil had one shot on five attempts. He tied for third on the team with — wait for it — two hits. He took as good as he gave, and he gloried in it.

"Never felt better when somebody hit me or I hit somebody," Chytil said through a wide grin. "I even got a stick to the face at one point and I was like, 'Yeah, give me more.'"

"We gave up that shorty [to Kreider] and I thought we just kind of got away from what we were trying to do. That kind of took the life out of the group. That's three games in a row. Same story. That's what changed the game."

It's defined the series.

The Rangers have owned the Hurricanes not only on their own power plays but on penalty kills as well.

Carolina scored five goals in 15 power plays in their 4-1 series victory over the Islanders, but entered Thursday night's game 0-for-10 in the first two games against the Rangers' penalty kill.

The Hurricanes, one of the best powerplay producers in the regular season, were 0-for-5 in Game 3, making them 0-for-15 in the series.

The Rangers, meanwhile, have scored three short-handed goals this postseason and allowed only two power-play goals. That makes them plus-one short-handed in seven postseason games, which is utterly unheard of.

'We had a great start and the power play took the life right out of us," Brind'Amour said in a TV interview between the second and third periods. "They took advantage of it. They have some high skill out there.'

Laf' no longer a punch line

ALEIGH, N.C. — There was a time when Alexis Lafreniere had nowhere to hide.

Now he's become overlooked and even underrated.

The expectations that came with Lafreniere being drafted No. 1 overall in 2020, the Rangers first No. 1 overall pick since the universal draft originated in 1970, were heavy.

That made Lafreniere a lightning rod of sorts for Rangers fans who expected greatness commensurate with where he was selected in the draft.

The 91 points Lafreniere produced in his first three seasons were not sufficient in the

eyes of those fans who expected and wanted more.

But that narrative is changing before our

That change was evident during the regular season, with Lafreniere producing career highs

And it's been even more evident in these playoffs, with Lafreniere delivering a massive goal and an assist in the Rangers' 3-2 overtime win over the Hurricanes in

in goals (28), assists (29) and points (57).

Game 3 of their second-round playoff series Thursday night at PNC Arena.

This comes two days after Lafreniere scored two goals in the Rangers' 4-3 double-overtime win over the Hurricanes in Game 2 Tuesday at the Garden. That makes three goals in the past two games for him.

Lafreniere is affecting the Rangers' biggest games now.

He scored a goal at 6:25 of the third period to give the Rangers a 2-1 lead Thursday.

And, after the Canes sent the game to overtime with a six-on-five goal at 18:24 of the third, Lafreniere assisted on Artemi Panarin's game-winner 1:43 into overtime for the win and a commanding 3-0 series lead for the Rangers, who can close out the Canes on Saturday night at PNC with a win.

Lafreniere has three goals and six assists for nine points in seven postseason games.

Even those numbers, along with his careerbest regular-season production, don't jump off the pages when you factor in the linemates he plays with — Panarin and Vincent Trocheck.

Panarin led the Rangers with 49 goals and 120 points in the regular season and the doeverything Trocheck is arguably the team's most important two-way player.

Don't sleep on Lafreniere, though.

"There's always a lot of pressure on these

young guys to come in and have an impact right away, but the way he's been working and the way he's believed in himself and worked [up] his confidence, it's been amazing," Mika Zibanejad said. "With him and Tro, Bread [Panarin] has been great chemistry. They've been playing big-time hockey for us.

"Laffy's a stud. We're happy to have him." So, too, is Rangers coach Peter Laviolette, under whom Lafreniere has flourished with the best season of his career.

"It was a huge goal," Laviolette said of Lafreniere's go-ahead strike in the third period. "He didn't have a lot of time to get that puck off in the slot, and it was a heck of a shot. That

line has been good, and obviously had a huge impact in the game tonight."

Who would have thought a couple years that Lafreniere would be having a huge impact in a Rangers' Stanley Cup run?

Not based on his production in his first three seasons.

"To speak specifically about Laf, I can't speak to the past," Laviolette said. "I can only speak to the last six months. He's been pretty much set in stone with a couple players. That line has been very productive for us and he's part of that.

"He's playing with some good players. He's playing with Artemi, who's proven to be one of the top players in the league, and Troch is a workhorse in the middle that does an awful lot of things.

"But you can't discount what Laf does as well with his skill level and the way he's grown throughout the course of this year. He just gets more confident and confident as the season grows and the playoffs grow."

Chris Kreider, who scored the team's first goal, a majestic shorthanded tally in the second period, was sitting next to Lafreniere in the team's postgame media interviews and I asked him what he's seen with Lafreniere raising the level of his game in these playoffs.

"Ulf Samuelsson [a former Ranger player and assistant coach] told our team a while ago that you don't raise your game in the playoffs, you lean on your habits, and [Lafreniere] has got unbelievable habits for a young guy," Kreider said. "The way he shows up at the rink, the way he works at his craft. ... He wants to get better, he wants to have an impact, he wants to win.

"Unbelievable player and we're just incredibly happy to have him."

RALEIGH, N.C. — It's been 16 years since any NHL team has done it.

And it's been — you guessed it — 30 years since the last Rangers team did it.

It's nothing new for this Blueshirts team, which churned out its seventh consecutive victory of the playoffs with a 3-2 win in overtime over the Hurricanes in

CANES

Game 3 Thursday night at RANGERS 3 PNC Arena, where the home team will now have to fight to keep its season alive and

avoid getting swept in a playoff round for a second straight year.

One game after the other, the Rangers have chewed through this postseason so far.

It was Artemi Panarin who showed teeth this time around in overtime, scoring 1:43 into the extra period by chipping a backhanded pass from Vincent Trocheck between his legs and in before extending just one leg — perhaps higher than he ever has – in his signature celebratory kick.

"Bread spoke up in the locker room and then spoke up on the ice," Trocheck quipped after putting up two assists in the victory, extending his point streak to seven straight

This was a win that required heart from a team whose heart was in it from the beginning for a special reason.

As goalie Igor Shesterkin led the Rangers out for warm-ups, there, right behind him, was Filip Chytil.

The Czech center stepped onto the ice under the white hues of the arena lights to compete in his first game since suffering what was believed to be the fourth documented concussion of his seven-year NHL

"Never felt better when somebody hit me or I hit somebody," Chytil said with a smile that never left his face for his entire postgame interview. "I even got a stick to the face at one point and I was like, 'Yeah, give me more.'"

The highly anticipated breakout season of Alexis Lafreniere also continued in this one.

After coming up big in the previous game, the 2020 first overall pick, once considered a

bust, snapped his third goal in two contests past Carolina goalie Pyotr Kochetkov who relieved Frederik Andersen of his duties — to break a 1-1 tie in third period and give the Rangers their first lead of the night.

The fans clad in red seeped into the red stadium chairs, but they soared right up again once Andrei Svechnikov netted the equalizer during a six-on-five advantage with 1:36 left in regulation.

"I'll be honest I was really confident, just in the way we were playing the game," Rangers head coach Peter Lavio-

lette said. "It was tough the way that that ended, but it shouldn't be a reflection of how you kind of got better as the game went on. That was the message going back out there [for OT]. This is a resilient group and they've been in these situations before.'

After getting outworked in the first period, the Rangers played a much more competitive middle frame and managed to knot the score at one-all going into the second inter-

Laviolette wanted his team to do a better job of staying out of the penalty box, but the Rangers found themselves shorthanded three times in the second period. Special teams, however, continue to swing in the Rangers favor in a major way.

The Blueshirts' offensive-minded penalty killers capitalized for the third time this postseason.

Mika Zibanejad made a nifty one-touch play to get the puck out of the Rangers' zone and race up ice before dishing to a streaking Chris Kreider, who backhanded the feed five-hole on Kochetkov to even the score up

That gave the Rangers' fans in attendance some gusto, as they started a hearty "Let's Go Rangers!" chant.

"I think we did a good job with our pressure," said Kreider, who scored his third shorthanded goal of the postseason. "On the other hand, I thought they did a good job with their pressure, too. I think there's some things we'd like to do a little bit better on our power play to take advantage of some of our chances."

Shields, who is also an executive producer on the movie, felt "it was important to show what kind of a mom [Lana] was and where she




