NYPD monitor tracking stop-and-frisk abuses has cost \$36 million — with no end in sight

The NYPD monitor, in place more than a decade after a federal judge said officers abused the stop-and-frisk tactic, violating the constitutional rights of minorities, has cost taxpayers \$36 million — with no sign that oversight of the nation's biggest police force is close to being over.

"Ten years is too long for the NYPD to come into compliance," the monitor, Mylan Denerstein, said in a statement. "As the NYPD is well aware, and our many public reports demonstrate unequivocally, the city, while working toward compliance, still has a long way to go."

The NYPD said it appreciates the monitor's efforts and that officers "work tirelessly, every day, to keep people safe and to police fairly."

The monitor was ordered in August 2013 by Manhattan Federal Judge Shira

Scheindlin, who ruled in a landmark stop-and-frisk trial that stop, question and frisk, as practiced by the NYPD, was tantamount to "indirect racial profiling."

Since then, the monitor has produced 20 reports analyzing efforts by police to improve their compliance rate, including when it questions suspected trespassers in housing projects and private apartment buildings. The monitor's team reviews stop data, as well as video from police body-worn cameras, and analyzes how police supervisors hold officers accountable.

Through February of this year, according to the city Law Department, the cost of having an NYPD monitor was \$36,060,025.75. That averages out to more than \$3 million a year, but given the size of the NYPD — 33,700 officers — other cities are spending more on similar efforts.

In Newark, the monitor there is tasked with tracking reforms to improve how cops stop people and to cut down on the use of

excessive force by a force of a little more than 1,000 officers. It is costing about half of what New York is spending, about \$1.5 million a year.

For the Oakland, Calif., Police Department, which has about 720 officers, a monitor has been in place for more than 20 years and last year cost taxpayers about \$942,000.

The \$36 million in New York includes \$15,278,899.85 paid to the two monitors — Denerstein took over in January 2022 after the death of the first monitor, Peter Zimroth — and their teams.

A total of \$10,248,728.25 in fees and expenses has been paid to lawyers for the plaintiffs in the three class action suits that made up the landmark stop-and-frisk trial.

Another \$6,173,363.36 paid for studies and analyses ordered by the court, followed by \$4,336,409.29 to get feedback from neighborhoods most affected by wrongful stops and to pay for a community liaison. The remainder, \$22,625, paid for city experts.

The NYPD has long disputed — even before the trial — the idea that it engages in racial profiling, saying its officers usually stop people based on descriptions of suspects provided by victims and witnesses.

But Jonathan Moore, one of the lead trial lawyers in the case, said the biggest problem involves self-initiated stops, typically done by cops in specialty units.

The body-worn camera videos that he and other plaintiff lawyers have viewed shows, he said, that too many officers are still making unlawful stops.

"They see folks walking down the street, they jump out and they sometimes search with no reasonable suspicion to do it," Moore said. "They don't come up with anything and they get in the car and they drive away, many times not documenting it, and even when they document it you can see in the body-worn camera videos that they're not complying with the Constitution."

In a report last June, the monitor noted



that it looked at 124 self-initiated stops conducted by officers from the Neighborhood Safety Teams, tasked with getting guns off the streets, and found that only 85 stops, 69%, were based on reasonable suspicion, a

tally described as "not an acceptable rate of compliance."

The NYPD could not say what percentage of its overall stops are self-initiated.

Still, a mayoral spokeswoman said, "our administration has made great strides working with the monitor and her team and remains committed to working with them to ensure that the NYPD is policing constitutionally and fairly."

But the City Council said the monitor has "consistently raised concerns about persistent disparities."

And Christopher Dunn, legal director for the New York Civil Liberties Union, said no one should expect the monitor to ask anytime soon that Manhattan Federal Judge Analisa Torres, now overseeing the monitor, end the oversight.

"That cannot happen until the NYPD achieves compliance with the court orders," Dunn said. "And it simply has not done that yet. That is where responsibility lies."

Israel says it seeks 'governing alternative' to Hamas in Gaza

JERUSALEM — Israel is looking into an alternative local governing body for Gaza, the defense minister said Sunday, proposing a future beyond Hamas but giving no idea who those challengers might be.

Defense Minister Yoav Gallant's comments came at a time of new uncertainty in the eight-month war. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is under growing pressure from many Israelis to accept a new ceasefire deal proposed by President Biden, while far-right allies threaten to collapse his government if he does.

Gallant, part of Israel's three-member War Cabinet who recently urged the government to have a detailed postwar plan for Gaza, said in a briefing that "we seek

a governing alternative to Hamas. The framework for this includes isolating areas, removing Hamas operatives in these areas and bringing in other forces that will enable the formation of a governing alternative."

That will achieve Israel's goals of removing Hamas' military and governing authority in Gaza and returning home the remaining hostages taken in the Oct. 7 Hamas attack that sparked the war, Gallant said.

He stressed that "we will not accept the rule of Hamas at any stage in any process aimed at ending the war."

In response to questions, an Israeli defense official told The Associated Press that Gallant hopes to enable isolated, Hamas-free areas in Gaza to become "hubs of local government" and identify forces that

can enable a longer-term formation of a government.

Israel is looking for "local nonhostile actors," the official said, adding that Gallant believes that "Palestinians should be governing Palestinians." Israel would facilitate surges of aid to the areas, and the local forces would be responsible for distributing it to strengthen their authority.

But that approach is challenging and has failed before, one expert said.

"I haven't heard of any local players that are brave enough to present themselves as an alternative to Hamas," said Michael Milshtein, an Israeli analyst of Palestinian affairs at Tel Aviv University and a former military intelligence officer.

Milshtein said Gallant's "wishful thinking" would amount to a suicidal

mission for any local leader. Hamas has threatened anyone cooperating with Israel's government.

"Although Hamas suffered severe damage over the past eight months, their impact on the public is still very strong," he said.

Milshtein noted that Israel has tried this approach in the past. In the 1970s and '80s, Israel tried to establish "village leagues," empowering local Palestinian leaders.

"They were considered in the eyes of Palestinians as collaborators, and it ended in a very tragic manner," he said. Unless Israel maintains a constant presence in Gaza, any "alternative forces" will be too fragile, he added.

Netanyahu has said Israel will maintain security control over Gaza but delegate

civilian administration to local Palestinians unaffiliated with Hamas or the Western-backed Palestinian Authority, which governs parts of the occupied West Bank. He has ruled out a path to Palestinian statehood.

Top ally the U.S. has proposed that a reformed Palestinian Authority would govern Gaza with the assistance of Arab and Muslim nations.

The Hamas attack Oct. 7 in southern Israel killed around 1,200 people – mostly civilians – and abducted about 250. About 100 hostages remain in Gaza, along with the bodies of around 30 more.

More than 36,430 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza by Israel's offensive, according to Gaza's Health Ministry.

Its count doesn't differentiate between

civilians and combatants. Israel blames Hamas for civilian deaths, accusing it of operating from dense residential areas.

At least five people including a young girl were killed Sunday in a strike on a street in Zawayda, central Gaza, according to Palestinian health officials and Associated Press journalists at al-Aqsa Martyrs hospital who counted the bodies.

The United States continued to press Israel on the ceasefire proposal outlined by Biden, who said Friday it's time for the war to end.

Many of Gaza's 2.3 million people have been displaced and shelter with few supplies, large parts of the territory have been destroyed and the United Nations has warned of "full-blown" famine.

The deal's first phase would last six

weeks and include a "full and complete ceasefire," a withdrawal of Israeli forces from all densely populated areas of Gaza and the release of a number of hostages, including women, older people and the wounded, in exchange for the release of hundreds of Palestinian prisoners.

Biden acknowledged that moving into the next phase of the deal would require more negotiations.

"This was an Israeli proposal. We have every expectation that if Hamas agrees to the proposal – as was transmitted to them, an Israeli proposal – then Israel would say yes," White House national security communications adviser John Kirby told ABC.

Also Sunday, officials from Egypt, Israel and the U.S. ended a meeting in

Cairo without any apparent agreement to reopen the crucial Rafah crossing into Gaza, which has been closed since Israel took over the Palestinian side of it in early May, Egypt's state-run television channel Al-Qahera News reported.

Israel's military continues to press into Rafah, Gaza's southernmost city, in search of what's been described as Hamas' last stronghold even as the militants regroup elsewhere in the territory.

Citing an unnamed official, Al-Qahera News said Egypt affirmed that Israel must withdraw its forces from the Palestinian side of the crossing before it can reopen.

The report said Egypt accused Israel of blocking the delivery of badly needed humanitarian aid to Gaza, which Israel denies.

'I didn't mean to do it!'

Cousin, 11, pleas as teen rolled out of B'klyn apt. with fatal gunshot

Sunday morning brought tragedy to a NYCHA development in a Brooklyn neighborhood where residents were already on edge amid a sharp increase in gun violence.

A 14-year-old boy was fatally shot in the chest in his fifth-floor apartment on Osborn St. near Pitkin Ave. in the Howard Houses in Brownsville — which has seen its murder rate triple this year — around 10:25 a.m.

Medics took the wounded teen to Brookdale University Hospital, but he could not be saved. His name was not immediately released.

Police were investigating the

possibility the boy and a cousin were playing with a gun when it went off, according to cop sources.

There were no immediate arrests.

The victim's 11-year-old cousin was seen exclaiming, "I didn't mean to do it," as the 14-year-old was taken on a stretcher out of the building, said a neighbor.

"They were playing with guns. I know they were playing with guns," said the neighbor, who gave her name as Janice.

Another neighbor whose son was friends with the victim described him as a "sweet, innocent boy."

"[He was] never in trouble," said the woman, who identified herself as Tonya. "My son, he plays with him a lot. They're always on the basketball court. He was quiet. I don't know what happened."

The neighbor, who lives on the

same floor as the victim's family, was making breakfast when she heard a commotion and peeked out her front door.

"Then I looked out the window and saw all the police cars arriving outside," Tonya told the Daily News. "I thought they were talking with someone else."

A third neighbor, who didn't give her name, said the boy had dreams of playing in the NBA.

"That was his spot, all the time right there," she said, gesturing to a basketball court in front of the building. "He had too much goals in life."

On that same court later Sunday, a group of boys mourned their friend, whom they described as a playmaker.

"When they said a 14-year-old died, I said, who did we lose today?" said 12-year-old Kahiem Maddox. "There have been a lot

of deaths."

The incident came just steps away from the spot on Osborn St. where 30-year-old Lamont Russell was fatally gunned down on May 18.

Russell, in turn, was accused of shooting a man at that same corner in 2019. Russell was shot alongside a 28-year-old man who survived his injuries.

Less than a week before Russell's death, on May 12, 24-year-old Maurice Boodie was fatally shot in the chest and right leg — about a mile from where Russell and the latest teen victim were shot dead.

Boodie was standing outside his building when he was gunned down, which was about a block from the scene of a grisly 2022 double homicide.

Brownsville's 73rd Precinct has seen a deadly uptick in violence,

with 12 homicides this year through May 26 compared to just four in the time period last year.

As of last week, there were 23 shooting incidents with 27 victims in the neighborhood so far this year. In 2023 during the same week, there had been 14 incidents with 15 victims.

Citywide, murders are down 15% and shootings across the five boroughs are down 16%, according to NYPD data released May 26.

"To me, it's kind of feeling like the crack era of the 80s, except now, it's guns," said Janice. "I don't know where they're getting them. It's like an epidemic."

Tonya said she does not allow her son to walk by himself outside.

"He is only allowed to go to the basketball court and besides that, the laundromat. That's it," she asserted.

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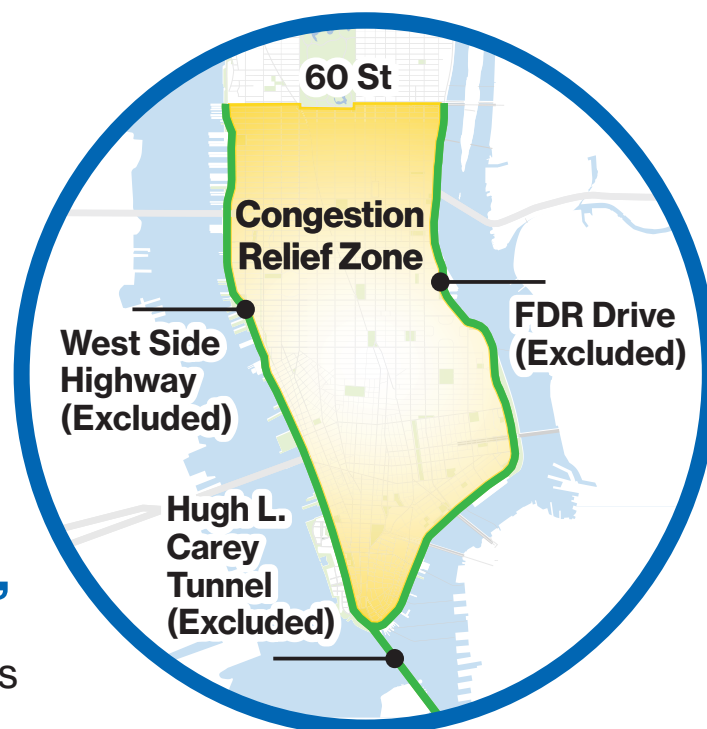
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Drunk passenger gets 6 months for attack on Delta flight attendant

A drunken Delta passenger will spend six months in federal prison for turning a trip from Tel Aviv to Kennedy Airport into a 12-hour flight from hell because the crew cut off his booze.

Shachar Bivas, 44, of Long Island, started a midair melee with a flight attendant last year, punching him, pushing him and ripping his uniform, according to court filings.

On Thursday, Brooklyn Federal Judge Dora Irizarry sentenced him to six months behind bars and a \$9,500 fine. He has to surrender by Aug. 2.

Bivas took Delta Airlines Flight 235 from Tel Aviv to JFK at 11:55 p.m. last May 31. Just after takeoff, he asked for, and received, a vodka drink, according to court filings.

The crew member who served him noticed he was visibly drunk and told the flight crew to cut him off — and Bivas didn't take it well, prosecutors said.

He got up, approached a second flight attendant and asked for another drink, stating that his father had recently died and he was upset about it, according to the feds.

The flight attendant offered him a coffee, instead, and asked him to return to his seat, which he did.

But Bivas was undeterred. He got up again and asked the crew member for a drink and a cigarette, then slammed his fist into a refrigerator next to the flight attendant's head, according to the feds.

As the plane flew over Europe, Bivas got up again while the flight attendant he'd been bothering was chatting with another passenger, the feds said.

He shoved the passenger aside and demanded a drink, then grabbed the flight attendant, pushing him, punching him and ripping his uniform, according to filings. Another attendant intervened and restrained Bivas.

The assaulted attendant then ran to the front of the plane and asked the captains to make an emergency landing, but they declined — instead pulling one of the pilots from his duties monitoring air traffic communications to handle the ruckus.

One of plane's captains, Michael Glenister, described the distraction in a letter to the judge: "I would equate this situation to driving a car in an unfamiliar area at night with kids screaming in the back seat, versus doing the same with someone else in the passenger seat taking care of the kids and reading street signs for you."

The plane's flight attendants had to keep Bivas in the back of the plane for the rest of the trip, and though he apologized, he also broke a mirror in the plane's bathroom, according to court filings.

"The defendant injured [the flight attendant] and prevented him from performing his flight attendant duties, such as ensuring the safety of the 275-plus passengers traveling together in an enclosed space, from which there was no escape, more than 30,000 feet above the earth," Assistant U.S. Attorney David Berman wrote in an April 3 sentencing memo.

Bivas was indicted last August and pleaded guilty in December to interference with a flight attendant. Federal guidelines suggested a zero-to-six month term, though the charge against him carries a maximum 20-year sentence. Irizarry went with the high end of the guideline suggestion.

In an interview with the Daily News on Sunday, Bivas railed against the sentence, calling it excessive and accusing the judge, without offering any proof, of being "antisemitic."

"I don't think that it was fair at all. I think that she was being antisemitic," he said. "She was attacking me from the beginning. She didn't listen to anything I said. ... The fact that she knew that I was Jewish might affect her decision. Anything that I said she didn't accept."

He said that Irizarry shut down his explanation that he was in a state of emotional distress because his father had just died of lung cancer and he was returning home from Israel after being present for his dad's final hours.

"She wouldn't even listen. She wouldn't accept that. She started to say, 'No, don't use that,'" he said.

"Not that I'm saying I was right. I was wrong. But it was an emotional burst because of what happened to my father and there was alcohol involved," Bivas told The News.

At one point, Bivas said, he asked to be switched from group psychiatric counseling with "a group of people that committed serious crimes and are about to go to prison" to one-on-one counseling prior to sentencing.

When asked why he believed the judge discriminated against him, Bivas said, "She kind of declared that I think myself more than other people. ... She's telling me that I'm better than other people. ... In the previous court appearance that we had, she called me condescending."

REMEMBRANCE FILLS THE SKIES OF NORMANDY

D-Day veterans and those grateful to them begin week of ceremonies

CARENTAN-LES-MARAIS, France — Parachutists jumping from World War II-era planes Sunday hurled themselves into now-peaceful Normandy skies where war once raged, heralding a week of ceremonies for the fast-disappearing generation of Allied troops who fought from D-Day beaches 80 years ago to Adolf Hitler's fall, helping free Europe of his tyranny.

All along the Normandy coastline — where then-young soldiers from across the United States, Britain, Canada and other Allied nations waded ashore through hails of fire on five beaches on June 6, 1944 — French officials, grateful Normandy survivors and other admirers are saying "merci" but also goodbye.

The ever-dwindling number of veterans in their late 90s and older who are coming back to remember fallen friends and their history-changing exploits are the last.

Watching the southern England coastline recede Sunday through the windows of one of three C-47 transport aircraft that flew him and other jumpers across

the English Channel to their Normandy drop zone was like time-traveling back to D-Day for Neil Hamsler, 63, a former British Army paratrooper.

"I thought that would have been the last view of England some of those lads of 1944 had," he said. While theirs was a day-time jump Sunday, unlike for Allied airborne troops who jumped at night early on D-Day, and "no one's firing at us," Hamsler said: "It really brought it home, the poignancy."

Part of the purpose of fireworks shows, parachute jumps, solemn commemorations and ceremonies that world leaders will attend this week is to pass the baton of remembrance to the current generations seeing war again in Europe, in Ukraine. President Biden, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy and British royals are among the VIPs that France is expecting for events.

Looping around one after another, the C-47s dropped strings of jumpers — 70 in all, dressed in

World War II-style uniforms.

A huge crowd many thousands strong cheered, having been regaled as they waited by tunes from Glenn Miller and Edith Piaf. Some of the loudest applause was for a startled deer that pounced from undergrowth as jumpers landed across the drop zone.

Sunday's jumpers were from an international civilian team of parachutists, many of them former soldiers.

The only woman was Dawna Bennett, 61, who felt history's force as she exited her plane into the Normandy skies.

"It's the same doorway and it's the same countryside from 80 years ago, and it's like, 'Oh my God, I'm so thankful I'm not doing this at midnight'" she said. "They keep saying it's the greatest generation, and I truly believe that."

Dozens of World War II veterans are converging on France to revisit old memories, make new ones and hammer home a message that survivors of D-Day and the ensuing Battle of Normandy, and of other WWII theaters, have repeated time and time again — that war is hell.



'Don't know why,' witness sez after 1 slain, 24 shot at party

One person was killed and 24 others wounded in a shooting at an outdoor birthday party in Akron, Ohio, early Sunday morning.

The deceased victim was identified only as a 27-year-old man. At least two of the other victims were in critical condition, the Akron Beacon Journal reported. The other victims suffered non-life-threatening wounds.

"This morning, our city is reeling after the devastation of senseless violence," Akron Mayor Shammus Malik and Akron Police Chief Brian Harding said in a joint statement. "With more than two dozen victims, the pain and trauma reverberates across all of Akron today as we search for answers."

No suspects have been arrested or publicly identified, but cops said they believe it was a targeted incident and that there was no further threat to the public. Investigators have not said how many people opened fire.

Gunshots erupted just after midnight in the city's East Akron neighborhood, police said. A large

group of people had gathered on a street for a birthday party.

"We're outside, enjoying ourselves, and the next thing you know, we're running for our lives," witness Joyoux Payne told local CBS affiliate WOIO. "That fast. A lot of people out there but there wasn't no drama, no commotion, no fighting. Nothing. I don't know why."

Investigators recovered a gun and several dozen bullet casings from the scene, according to the Beacon Journal.

"We will bring those responsible to justice and we need the help of our community to do that," Malik and Harding said. "For those who have information about this horrific shooting — we need you to speak up in order to prevent further violence and retaliation."

The violence in Akron was not the only shooting in the region early Sunday morning. About 110 miles away in the Pittsburgh suburb of Penn Hills, two people were killed and seven others wounded in a shooting at a bar. Cops said multiple people opened fire in that shooting but no arrests have been made.

2 are killed and 7 wounded in suburban Pittsburgh bar fight

Two people were killed and seven others wounded in a shooting at a bar in the east Pittsburgh suburb of Penn Hills early Sunday morning, police said.

One man and one woman were pronounced dead at the scene at Ballers Hookah Lounge and Cigar Bar, according to Allegheny County police.

Seven other people — four men and three women — were wounded in the shooting about 7 miles east of downtown Pittsburgh, local CBS affiliate KDKA reported. One of those victims was in critical condition, while the rest suffered non-life-threatening injuries, police said.

No suspects had been arrested or publicly identified.

The Allegheny County Police Department responded to the scene about 3 a.m. following reports of a shooting.

Investigators determined "an altercation took place inside the bar and multiple individuals opened fire."

Some of the seven wounded victims were transported to local

hospitals by emergency vehicles, while others arrived on their own, cops said.

"There were people all in the streets screaming," a neighbor told the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette. "I thought they were fighting at first, and then I kept looking and realized something was quite wrong."

Police said the initial information was only preliminary, and details of the investigation could change in the coming days.

The Penn Hills shooting was not the only violence in the region early Sunday morning. On a street in Akron, Ohio, one person was killed and 24 wounded in another mass shooting.

There have now been 189 mass shootings in the U.S. in 2024, according to the Gun Violence Archive. The archive classifies any shooting in which at least four victims are shot as a mass shooting.

The deadliest incident of the year occurred in January in Joliet, Ill., when 23-year-old Romeo Nance fatally shot eight people in three separate locations. Nance escaped the crime scenes, but he died by suicide one day later in Texas as police closed in.

Former Midtown home of Leonard Bernstein lists for \$7.45M

Oscar-winning actress Jessica Chastain has put her historic Midtown home on the market for \$7.45 million, replete with chandeliers, soaring ceilings and five fireplaces.

The four-bedroom, 3½-bathroom apartment, once home to conductor Leonard Bernstein, was listed for sale last month with Sotheby's.

The lavish digs are located in The Osborne on W. 57th St., a landmark building located across the street from Carnegie Hall and two blocks from Central Park.

Built in 1885, the building has housed other big names in the arts including writer Fran Lebowitz and actress Lynn Redgrave.

"When I found out about all the other artists and actors who have lived here, I was in love," Chastain once gushed to Architectural Digest.

The luxe fourth-floor space is adorned with Gilded Age details and Tiffany glass. The listing boasts of the "sun-drenched" living room's 14-foot ceilings, mahogany

paneling and elaborately carved doorways and windows. There is a parlor, dining room, library, laundry room and five wood-burning fireplaces.

Chastain acquired the property in 2015, per city records. She renovated it with her husband, Gian Luca Passi de Preposulo, an Italian fashion executive and count.

"On those rare occasions when Jessica and Gian Luca are able to push pause, they can light a fire and relax," designer Jesse Carrier told Architectural Digest in 2017.

"From room to room there's a warm, welcoming glow that's meant to signify homecoming."

Chastain originally hails from California, but she has been a New Yorker for more than 20 years.

In 2003 she graduated from The Juilliard School, which awarded her an honorary doctorate on May 23.

She has performed in films including "A Doll's House," "The Help," "Zero Dark Thirty" and "Molly's Game."

In 2022 she won the Academy Award for Best Actress for "The Eyes of Tammy Faye."

Stonewall honored among street signs being sold by DOT

For those who want to own a piece of New York City but can't afford, say, a decommissioned Staten Island Ferry, the city's Transportation Department is offering a sign. Fifty of them.

DOT is putting a limited-edition run of 50 replica Christopher St./Stonewall Place street signs up for sale Monday, in time for Pride Month.

The signs, which are intended to honor the stretch of Christopher St. where the Stonewall Riots began in 1969, will cost \$75 through CityStore.

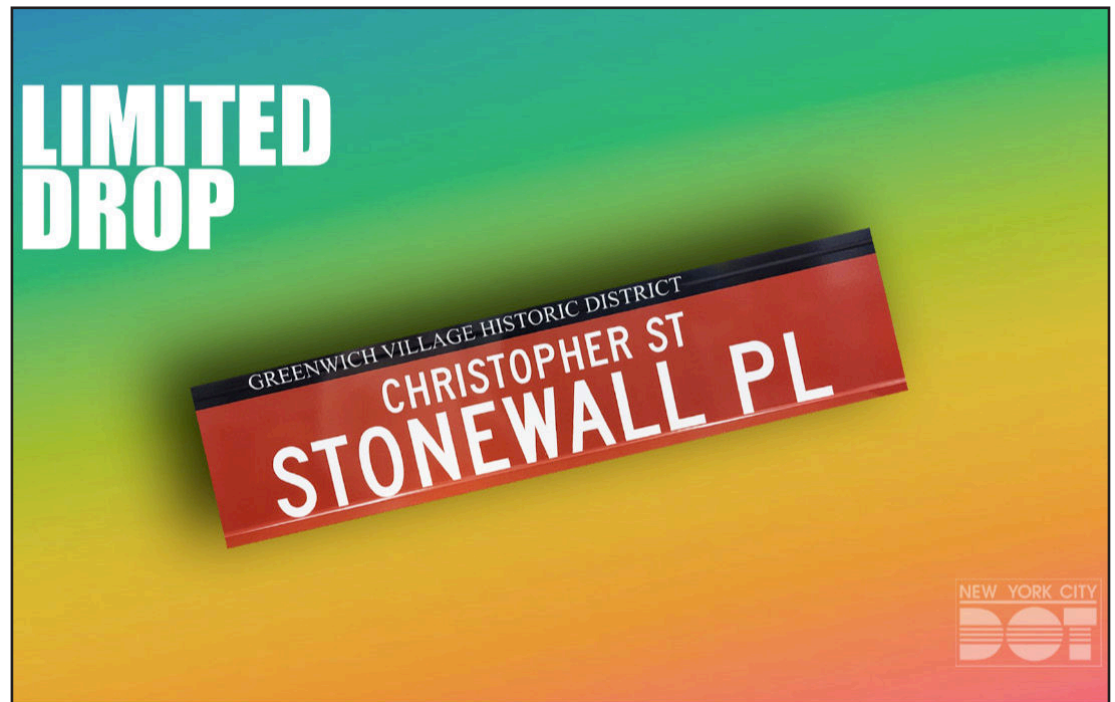
The city already sells a small number of replica street signs including markers for Wall St., Broadway and the Bronx's Grand Concourse.

A DOT spokesman told the Daily News that the department's limited edition Christopher St. signs are intended as the first in a run of "sign drops."

"Our monthly sign drops will allow all who love New York City to celebrate the people, places and special occasions that make this the greatest city in the world," Transportation Commissioner Ydanis Rodríguez said in a statement.

Proceeds from the signs will go to the city's general fund, same as city surplus sales.

The replica signage is made in the DOT's sign shop in Maspeth, Queens, to the same specifications as those mounted to signposts across the city, with one exception: Unlike signs on city street corners, the replicas are one-sided.



Honorary street sign replica for sale Monday as part of the Department of Transportation's "sign drop."

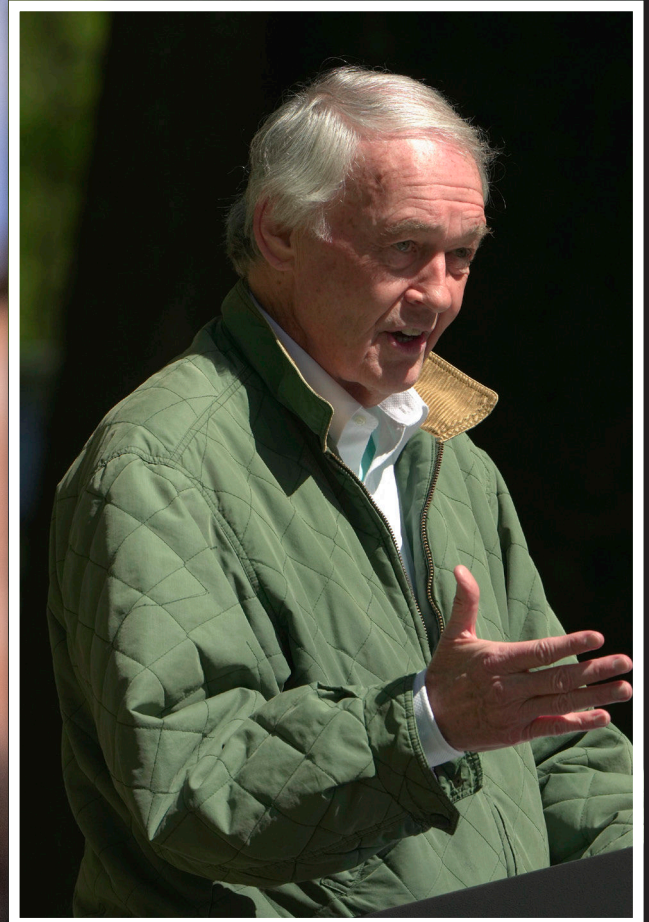

Sen. contraception test

Chuck: Pols will have to show where they stand on access

The Senate will vote Wednesday on whether to approve the Right to Contraception Act as a way to safeguard women's access to birth control and also to show voters where their senators stand on the issue, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer said Sunday.

The New York Democrat noted that June marks two years since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned the Roe v. Wade decision that guaranteed women the constitutional right to an abortion. He said nothing short of legally codifying a person's fundamental right to birth control will stop the conservative-leaning Supreme Court from continuing to chip away at women's health care.

"Now more than ever, and as we approach the two-year anniversary of the Supreme Court's dismantling of Roe v.

Wade, contraception is a critical piece of protecting women's reproductive freedoms, standing as nothing short of a vital lifeline for millions of Americans across the country," Schumer said in a statement.

"The American people have a right to know where their elected officials stand."

He vowed that he and fellow Senate Democrats would "fight to protect access to contraception and other reproductive freedoms that are essential safeguards for millions of women to control their own lives, their futures and their bodies."

The legislation, introduced by Sen. Ed Markey (D-Mass.), is designed "to protect a person's ability to access contraceptives and to engage in contraception, and to protect a health care provider's ability to provide contraceptives, contraception, and information related to contraception." It covers everything from oral contraceptives

to condoms.

While some Republicans have said there is no need for such a bill because the right to contraception and family planning are not being challenged, the bill's supporters claim that the Supreme Court's failure to protect abortion rights and in vitro fertilization are clear signs that the conservative-majority justices are coming for the rest of it.

"It's a slow creep to a very bad situation in terms of rights," Schumer spokesman Angelo Roefaro told the Daily News.

That is underscored by the fact that many right-wing and extremist officials in politics and the judicial system have called for a Supreme Court reckoning on contraception, Schumer said. Moreover, he said, states are already restricting public funding for contraceptive products and services.

Legislation to protect contraception

rights has been blocked or shot down in Virginia, Missouri, Arizona, Tennessee and Idaho, among other states.

Presumptive GOP presidential nominee Donald Trump implied last month that contraception is on the policy table, although he walked his statements back later on.

"I have been clear we will not stand for these attacks, and we will fight to preserve reproductive freedoms," Schumer said, adding that Democrats "remain absolutely committed to doing everything we can to protect women, families, reproductive freedom."

The vote will be a litmus test and a source of information for voters heading into this fall's election. The measure passed, 228 to 195 in the House of Representatives in 2022, when it was under Democratic control.

Rupert Murdoch, 93, marries for fifth time

Nonagenarian right-wing media mogul Rupert Murdoch married Elena Zhukova over the weekend in California.

Murdoch, 93, has now been married five times.

Zhukova, 67, celebrated her second marriage. The couple tied the knot Saturday at Murdoch's estate in Los Angeles' Bel Air neighborhood.

The wedding was first reported by Fox and News Corp. outlets that are owned by the Murdoch family. Last year, Murdoch handed control of both companies to his son Lachlan Murdoch.

Rupert Murdoch and Zhukova met in summer 2023, reportedly at a party hosted by Murdoch's third wife, Wendi Deng. They announced their engagement in March.

Zhukova, a retired molecular biologist, was previously married to Russian billionaire Alexander Zhukov. Their daughter, Dasha, used to be married to oligarch Roman Abramovich.

In 2022, Murdoch separated from his fourth wife, actress and model Jerry Hall. The two had wed in 2016 at a church in London. In March 2023, Murdoch announced an engagement to Ann Lesley Smith, but they called things off just a few weeks later.

Murdoch was first married in 1956 to Australian flight attendant Patricia Booker. They divorced in 1967, and Murdoch remarried later that year to Anna Maria Torv. Their union lasted for 32 years, until a divorce in 1999.

Murdoch and Deng married in 1999 and separated in 2013 but remained friends.

His tumultuous love life aside, Murdoch significantly influenced media worldwide with his collection of mostly right-wing outlets. Prominent Murdoch-owned properties include Fox News, The Wall Street Journal and the New York Post, which is known for gleefully attacking liberals in local and federal government.

2 women lead polls of Sunday election, marred by some violence

Voting was held Sunday in Mexico's 2024 presidential election. For the first time in the country's history, two women led the polls: Claudia Sheinbaum, the former mayor of Mexico City, and Xóchitl Gálvez, an opposition senator and tech entrepreneur.

Many Mexican voters say violence is top among their electoral worries, but it's also spurred democratic concerns.

Cartels and other criminal groups have used elections — particularly local elections — as an opportunity to make power grabs. The National Electoral Institute said it had to cancel plans for 170 polling places, mostly in Chiapas and Michoacan and mostly because of security problems.

While voting appeared peaceful, if time-consuming, at most of Mexico's approximately 170,000 polling places, there were isolated incidents of violence Sunday after a bloody campaign process.

In the central state of Puebla, four armed assailants tried to burst into a school where voting booths were installed to steal ballots. State police said arrests had been made.



And Queretaro's governor said that assailants had tried to burn ballots at four polling places. A video posted on social media showed two masked men escaping on a motorcycle after one attack.

Last week, unidentified gunmen opened fire a couple of blocks away from a mayoral candidate's final campaign rally in

western Cotija, Michoacan.

Meanwhile, candidates have been picked off, at least 28 political contenders slain this year, according to human rights organization Data Civica.

Sheinbaum has been the clear front-runner in her bid to replace outgoing President Andrés Manuel López Obrador. She is the chosen candidate for Morena, the

party he created.

Despite running Mexico City, one of the biggest cities in the Western Hemisphere, Sheinbaum has struggled to construct her own image. While she has pitched herself as being a continuation of her political ally, she has a more reserved character and may turn out to be more progressive than López Obrador.

She has had to walk a fine line in her campaign — embracing López Obrador's support and not critiquing him on less popular fronts, like his security policy.

The campaign left many wondering whether she can escape the shadow of the larger-than-life incumbent.

Gálvez is the opposition candidate in Mexico's presidential elections.

She sold snacks in a small town in central Mexico as a girl to help her family and rose to national politics with a biography that could help take her to the heights of power. She speaks more candidly — similar to López Obrador — than her competitor and her story of humble origins helped her make a splash when she entered the race.

Gálvez is a fierce critic of the outgoing president and doesn't shy away from verbal sparring. She represents a coalition of parties that have had little historically to unite them other than their recent opposition to López Obrador.

But Gálvez hasn't been able to ignite as much fervor as her supporters hoped, and she has trailed Sheinbaum in polls.

A guide to current Broadway shows by *Daily News* theater critic Chris Jones:

& Juliet: A savvy jukebox musical from London offering a feminist reworking of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" with added bits and songs made famous by Pink, Britney and Kesha, et al. This nonstop party-empowerment show is derivative, over-confident and fun. *Stephen Sondheim Theatre, 124 W. 43rd St.*

A Beautiful Noise: The Neil Diamond Musical: Wanna be transported back to when you swayed to "Song Sung Blue," seduced to "Red, Red Wine," sniffled to "Love On the Rocks" or were stirred by "Play Me," before you actually got played in life? Then this biographical jukebox tribute to the gravel-voiced singer-songwriter is your show. But if the idea of a "Sweet Caroline" audience singalong sounds hellish, move on down the list. *Broadhurst Theatre, 235 W. 44th St.*

Aladdin: Disney's "Aladdin" is a bit too frenetic, gag-heavy and overly anxious to please — but it has settled in as an entertaining family attraction featuring a diverse cast, a fun genie whose antics will always remain a tribute to Robin Williams, and the requisite magic carpet ride against a backdrop of the glittering lights of a utopian Arabian night. *New Amsterdam Theatre, 214 W. 42nd St.*

Appropriate: Not since Steppenwolf Theatre Company's "August: Osage County" has Broadway seen such a blistering display of ensemble acting as in director Lila Neugebauer's ruthless and riveting production of "Appropriate." Branden Jacobs-Jenkins' ironically titled play about a combative, wounded and self-loathing family who rip each other into little pieces over their dead patriarch's legacies. Sarah Paulson, the lead performer, is on fire all night long. *Belasco Theatre, 111 W. 44th St.*

Back to the Future: The Musical. Closer to a thrill-park ride than a traditional musical, this frenetic new spectacle from London showcases a flying DeLorean car essentially re-creating the role played, years ago, by the helicopter in "Miss Saigon." The show is attracting a family and tourist audience, and Roger Bart at peak eccentricity is fun to watch. But unlike the film, the show makes you feel very little. *Winter Garden Theatre, 1634 Broadway.*

The Book of Mormon: A relic of an era when satirists had more guts, Trey Parker and Matt Stone's show lampoons the LDS religion with the same sharp edge familiar from "South Park." Go enjoy a wicked musical from before America lost so much of its sense of humor. *Eugene O'Neill Theatre, 230 W. 49th St.*

Cabaret at the Kit Kat Club: An epic disappointment and a money-grabbing misfire, this revival of a musical theater masterpiece is overpriced, under-erotized and, for the most part, poorly sung. It's an example of the immersive theater craze taken too far and with the wrong show to boot. Eddie Redmayne, emcee of this unfortunate shebang, comes off a creepy human jack-in-the-box. Spend your money elsewhere on Broadway. *August Wilson Theatre, 245 W. 52nd St.*

Chicago: This long-lived show celebrating real-life killers of prohibition-era Chicago has been pulling in Broadway suckers since 1996. The real stars here are John Kander and Fred Ebb, who penned a score that drips with melodic aspiration and lyrical cynicism, and Bob Fosse, whose erotically muscular choreography is the perfect match. *Ambassador Theatre, 219 W. 49th St.*

The Great Gatsby: This is what many people think of when they ponder a big Broadway night out: a familiar yet glamorous title from the Jazz Age, a star tenor in the titular role, songs of passion, obsession and resolve set to string-heavy orchestrations, and a massive Art Deco set cascading off the stage, which has the décor to match. The show is dull and emotionally inert but it's the best dressed crowd on Broadway. *Broadway Theatre, 1681 Broadway.*

Hadestown: A dystopian 2019 musical rooted in the 2010 concept album by Anaïs Mitchell and updates and retells the classic myth of Orpheus and Eurydice via a compellingly theatrical blend of steampunk, "Westworld" and self-aware Bourbon St. sensuality. It's a thrillingly alarmist show, albeit potentially jarring to those who prefer warmer or more traditional musicals. Mitchell's music variously evokes gospel, blues, blue collar work-song and the ravings of a rabid cult. *Walter Kerr Theatre, 219 W. 48th St.*

Hamilton: Still a tough and expensive ticket, this Lin-Manuel Miranda global cultural phenomenon employs a young, diverse cast to tell the story of Alexander Hamilton, the Founding Father with the long-term berth on the ten-spot, but also a scrappy immigrant who wrote like he was running out of time. The music is eclectic and often gorgeous, the emotional intensity still capable of blowing all else away. *Richard Rodgers Theatre, 226 W. 46th St.*

Harry Potter and the Cursed Child: An epic commitment requiring two tickets and six hours has now been reduced to a more manageable single show. We purists lament the change, which cut much of the subtlety and fun in the text but left all the spectacular theatrical effects. Even in this version, though, Harry Potter fans leave fully satiated. *Lyric Theatre, 214 W. 43rd St.*

The Heart of Rock and Roll: This modestly scaled and warm-hearted jukebox tribute to Huey Lewis and the News might prove to be one of the sleeper hits of the season thanks to an inestimably witty book with plenty of hard laughs, a suite of winning lead performances under director Gordon Greenberg and another tour de force suite of choreography from Lorin Latarro, who sure has shaken up Broadway this season. It's a blue-collar "Mamma Mia!" *James Earl Jones Theatre, 138 W. 48th St.*

Hell's Kitchen: The songs of Alicia Keys are well suited to a jukebox musical. The burst of energy that flows from hits like "Girl on Fire" are dynamic blasts in a show drawing from Keys' own origin story as a kid growing up in the federally subsidized artists' haven of Manhattan Plaza in Hell's Kitchen. No surprises here and you have to love Keys' music. Lots of warm sentiment and affection for a creative Gotham childhood. *Shubert*

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Theatre, 225 W. 44th St.

Illinoise: A late entry to the season, “Illinoise” is not a traditional musical; it is Justin Peck’s wordless choreographic response to the Sufjan Stevens album, as played live. If you remember Twyla Tharp’s “Movin’ Out,” a response to the music of Billy Joel, or can imagine “A Chorus Line” in the cornfields of the Prairie State, you’ll have a sense of what transpires here. It’s not for all tastes but very beautiful nonetheless. *St. James Theater, 246 W. 44th St.*

The Lion King: Julie Taymor’s masterful work is 25 years old but still as fresh as a Serengeti morning. This Disney family attraction features stunning puppets, visual tableaux, Elton John songs, African music. It’s deservedly the most successful musical of its era. *Minskoff Theatre, 200 W. 45th St.*

MJ The Musical: This homage to the King of Pop is set during the creative process for Michael Jackson’s “Dangerous” world tour. Although there is little mention of the MJ controversies (the estate prefers it that way), “MJ” offers the chance to hear a slew of iconic MJ hits and experience his choreographic soul through the simpatico-but-original ideas of Christopher Wheeldon. *Neil Simon Theatre, 250 W. 52nd St.*

Mary Jane: Amy Herzog’s beautiful play is at its core a study of the extraordinary lengths to which a mother will go to care for her child. But the takeaway goes beyond even that realization. You leave with a near-crushing awareness of the unfairness of life. Rachel McAdams is fabulous in the lead role: She deglamorizes herself without letting that undermine the formidable optimism of this mom. *Samuel J. Friedman Theatre, 261 W. 47th St.*

Merrily We Roll Along: Broadway never saw a better triple-act than Jonathan Groff, Lindsay Mendez and Daniel Radcliffe, the triumphant triumvirate at the heart of the gorgeous new revival of from the famed British musical theater star Maria Friedman. What a delight they are to watch as life kicks their ever-hopeful characters in the teeth. Life severely batters these old pals in this brilliant, backward-moving musical about showbiz types by Stephen Sondheim and George Furth, as based on an old Kaufman and Hart play. It’s a near-perfect production. *Hudson Theatre, 141 W. 44th St.*

Mother Play: Paula Vogel has created a deeply personal play about life with her late mom, who surely would have been delighted to be portrayed by no less than Jessica Lange, an actress who turns her into a boozy but sympathetic hybrid of Mama Rose in “Gypsy,” Joan Crawford in “Mommie Dearest” and Tennessee Williams’ Amanda Wingfield. The play is esoteric but the performances from Lange, Jim Parsons and Celia Kennan-Bolger are superb. *Hayes Theatre, 220 W. 44th St.*

Moulin Rouge the Musical!: A decadent translation of Baz Luhrmann’s 2001 movie musical and an intense, anachronistic extravaganza that stuffs cuts of pop anthems (70 songs! 161 composers!) inside a letter-box of gorgeous retro-red velvet. This is date-night pastiche with a unifying playlist,



and an omnisexual dip into a sensual ocean with nervous fellow travelers. *Al Hirschfeld Theatre, 302 W. 45th St.*

The Notebook: This weepy new musical based on the 1996 Nicholas Sparks novel and the hit 2004 movie has a gorgeous suite of songs from Ingrid Michaelson, landing somewhere between Duncan Sheik, Jeanine Tesori and Sara Bareilles. The populist show is not for romantic cynics, as you might expect; it is a strikingly artful and minimalist telling of love across generations. *Gerald Schoenfeld Theatre, 236 W. 45th St.*

The Outsiders: The beloved YA author S.E. Hinton famously penned “The Outsiders” after watching two rival gangs explode at her own Will Rogers School in Tulsa, Okla. The resultant musical needed greater expansion of character, a gentler, simpler touch, a better sense of authentic teenage angst and a deeper focus on the heart. But many love this story and will enjoy the talents here and the fresh roots/country score by the Austin-based Jamestown Revival. *Jacobs Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

Patriots: Vladimir Putin gets “The Crown” treatment in Peter Morgan’s juicy play about the rise of one of the world’s nastiest despots. This gripping show comes with a terrifying performance from Will Keen as a Richard III type as it offers an amped-up history of Russia from the era of bumbling Boris Yeltsin to the present. The central question: How did Putin happen? *Ethel Barrymore Theatre 243 W. 47th St.*

SIX: The Musical: Just 90 minutes, this small-cast original pop musical is centered on the six wives of Henry VIII who bond in a post-death sisterhood and compete for who actually had the worst time with their bearded pig. Audiences generally ignore the relatively thin gruel and have an empowering blast. *Lena Horne Theatre, 256 W. 47th St.*

Stereophonic: A fabulous, three-hour dissection of ego, insecurity and the messy, messed-up gorgeousness of the creative process, David Adjmi’s “Stereophonic” is about an up-and-coming British rock band on the brink of superstardom making a studio album in California between the summers of 1976 and 1977. What a brilliant piece of must-see Broadway. It’s Chekhovian, babe. *Golden Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

Suffs: With Hillary Clinton as a producer and a weighty topic like the history of U.S. women’s suffrage leading up to the 1920 ratification of the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution, Shaina Taub’s new Broadway musical “Suffs” certainly suggested more of a moralistic gathering than a complex evening suffused with surprise. But in the end, “Suffs” does what all of the best Broadway musicals do: it humanizes and empowers, and it entertains and moves an audience. Taub’s enormous talent is the biggest single reason. *Music Box Theatre, 239 W. 45th St.*

The Who’s Tommy: Pete Townshend’s prescient 1969 rock opera, a horrifying if ultimately transcendent howl of anger and anguish at the

damage wrought on the boomer generation by their war-scarred parents, has returned to Broadway in a new, born-in-Chicago production from Des McAnuff that will sock you right in the gut. The Who leader’s epic 1967 achievement now returns as a loud boomer coda, an emancipatory rock banquet and a reminder that dads really have improved. *Nederlander Theatre, 208 W. 41st St.*

Uncle Vanya: Filled with sad-sack characters living lives of soul-sucking boredom, Anton Chekhov’s “Uncle Vanya” ain’t ever a walk in the park to produce or, for that matter, to watch. Still, the new Lincoln Center production from the typically reliable director Lila Neugebauer is so disconnected and alienating that I spent most of the production wondering how on Earth such a collection of famous, talented actors — Steve Carell, Alfred Molina, Anika Noni Rose, Jayne Houdyshell, Alison Pill, for goodness sake— had mostly failed to cohere. *Lincoln Center Theatre, 150 W. 65th St.*

Wicked: Now more than 20 years old, “Wicked” is one of Broadway’s best loved attractions. It’s a prequel to “The Wizard of Oz” and focused on the intense friendship between two witches, one good, one maybe better. The Winnie Holzman book is a witty tour de force and Steven Schwartz came up with a bevy of emotional numbers, including “Defying Gravity,” one of the great Act 1 closers of all time. *Gershwin Theatre, 222 W. 51st St.*

Bragging rights

As the dust settles in the aftermath of Donald Trump's felony conviction, some appreciation is in order. Like many, we were skeptical of the Stormy Daniels case when it was announced by Manhattan District Attorney Alvin Bragg.

We've found plenty to hit Bragg over during his tenure. His Day One memo on prosecutorial discretion featured some head-scratchers like a provision that seemed to treat armed robberies as misdemeanors if the assailant's weapon did not "create a genuine risk of physical harm."

His overly cautious approach let the first Trump case — involving the former president's shady and fraudulent business practices running his real estate operation — slip away, fortunately to be somewhat saved in the form of civil action by state Attorney General Tish James.

When Bragg brought this case, the first of Trump's criminal indictments, we were glad that finally there would be some accountability, but we were among those who wondered if it was really that strong of a case, and if it might end up being counterproductive.

We were too skittish — as it turned out, the case was strong, and it took an exhaustively selected jury almost no time at all to reach a guilty verdict. It ended up being the only criminal case that has moved ahead in time to be resolved before the election, with the Georgia and two federal cases idling for various reasons.

Bragg was right, and his prosecutors carefully laid out the evidence and made their case. We have him to thank that, months in advance of the election, the matter is resolved. This was his job as a prosecutor, but it's also a service to the country that took real courage, especially in light of harassment from Trump acolytes like Rep. Jim Jordan and Trump's own frequent dark warnings about plans to go after foes if he makes it back to the White House.

The voters will decide on Trump's candidacy, Bragg's resoluteness helps ensure that he won't; the political repercussions of the verdict will remain to be seen, but there's a good chance that Trump will be electorally hurt by the collapse of the illusion of being untouchable.

Principles trumped

One measure of a person's principles is their consistency, and it comes as no surprise that many leading Republican politicians fail this test when it comes to the significance of Donald Trump's conviction.

People like Speaker of the House Mike Johnson, who before last Thursday would have said that convicted felons get what's coming to them and that we have to trust in the guilt determined by prosecutors, judges and juries are now suddenly fierce critics of the criminal justice system.

A felony determination means nothing, they say, and really a prosecutor should have even more clear-cut evidence before bringing a case to trial. The judge was too biased, the jury drawn from too homogenous a pool of people, the trial too quick, and on and on.

That wasn't the situation here, as Trump had excellent defense lawyers and was allowed to do things

that a typical defendant would never have gotten away with. However, the jury found that the evidence was overwhelming against him.

But more important than pols like Johnson and other GOPers angling to be Trump's VP pick, are the 74 million Americans who voted for Trump four years ago, including 3,251,997 New Yorkers. While those who wear MAGA hats and attend Trump rallies will follow their leader anywhere, there are millions of more reasonable folks that the conviction should give them pause.

Those Americans must understand that Trump was found guilty, not because his political opponents have schemed against him, or he's being made an example out of or any other convoluted conspiracy, because he committed crimes, and got caught committing them.

Trump was judged by a jury of his peers and found to be a felon. Is this who you want to be your champion?

Crime and punishment

After conviction comes sentencing, but any time behind bars will be unlikely for Donald Trump. It's not because his attempt to hide his tawdry tryst with Stormy Daniels in the weeks before the 2016 election wasn't important — it was, and the subterfuge may have been crucial to his subsequent victory — it is because the minor level felonies he was found guilty of don't warrant incarceration.

The probation officer who will assess the 78-year-old first time offender, convicted of a non-violent, class E felony, will have to meet with the defendant and conduct interviews with the defendant's family, friends and coworkers.

All of which will be factored into the probation officer's pre-sentencing report, along with the defendant's employment history. The defense counsel can submit to the court their pre-sentencing motions by June 13, and prosecutors from the Manhattan district attorney's office must reply by June 27.

At the July 11 hearing, Acting Manhattan state Supreme Court Justice Juan Merchan, having weighed all the considerations from probation and the opposing teams of lawyers, will hand down the sentence.

Someone fitting that description of a 78-year-old

first time offender, convicted of falsifying business records in the first degree would generally not be locked up. That his name is Donald Trump and he used to be the president of the United States and may well again hold that position, does not matter.

Equal justice under law are four simple words that means everyone should be treated equally.

While some would relish Trump behind bars running for the White House, like Eugene V. Debs did in 1920, the law can't be bent to satisfy that desire (of course, Trump might gain politically from being detained, that shouldn't be a factor either in the judge's sentencing decision.) Incarceration would not serve any purpose, but his conviction has held him to account and public now knows his status as a felon.

What would another 78-year-old first time offender get? Almost certainly, probation and a fine and no jail time.

As for District Attorney Alvin Bragg, he ran in 2021 saying that fewer people should be imprisoned for their crimes, while making exceptions for political corruption. In this matter, Trump did not abuse public office or taxpayer funds.

We are not defenders of Trump by any means, but we do defend consistency in the rule of law.

New York State's parole needs reform

The walk to the visiting room from my dormitory took little time, but it was part of a much longer journey. When I entered the visiting room, there were about 25 incarcerated people waiting to go to the clinic area for their parole hearings. I gave my pass to the prison guard on his post and sat down next to another incarcerated person I'll call Fred.

This was Fred's third parole appearance, meaning he had already served his minimum sentence and the parole board declined to release him at two prior interviews. We talked about how the parole board often denied our release based on the one thing we can never change — our conviction — without fair consideration for all we had done to improve ourselves.

Rehabilitative programs, good disciplinary records, letters of support from prison staff and college degrees meant little or nothing to them. I knew the hearing was just a formality.

We talked about our plans if released while we waited to be called. Fred had a job and a family waiting for him. I did, too, and I planned to mentor at-risk young people through a nonprofit I was connected to. The prison guard called my name and I gave him my prison identification card, hung my coat on the coat rack, and took a seat. I struggled to calm my nerves. People went into their hearings and returned looking crushed. They were so deep in thought, they forgot their coats as they left. It was cold outside. I watched as they returned to retrieve their coats.

Finally, it was my turn. It seemed like déjà vu. Two years prior, I appeared at my first parole hearing in the same room. As I sat down, the commissioners asked me to confirm my name and prison identification number. Next, they asked whether I wanted to talk about my manslaughter conviction.

The commissioners explained that I did not have to speak about the facts of my case because I asserted my innocence at trial. I did not have anything to hide so I chose to talk about it. I told the commissioners I had no involvement in the crime. I felt a negative aura from this group of commissioners, so I did not waste my breath by going into depth.

At the end of my hearing, I said I did not have any reason to lie to them. I did not commit the crime, but I did do all I could in prison to make a better life for myself and others.

I told the commissioners I knew they would deny me parole

for asserting my innocence, no matter how much I had demonstrated my moral character in the years since the trial. I said I could do something positive in society if released. The hearing lasted less than five minutes. In that time, they decided to saddle me with another two years in prison.

I saw the parole board six times before finally getting released after serving 18 years and nine months in prison, a full eight years beyond my minimum sentence.

My indignation for the unjust parole process in New York State is justified by my accomplishments since I was released on parole 13 years ago. I completed all the goals I had set for myself and shared with parole commissioners at each of my appearances. I graduated from college. I've maintained a good job as a paralegal case handler at the Legal Aid Society. I use my free time to mentor young people.

When you're in prison, the state seeks to deprive you of power, with the goal of depriving you of your personhood. That is why I am especially proud that, in my workplace, I'm building collective power as an active delegate for my union, 1199SEIU. We use our power to advocate for decent working conditions, and for a slate of policy changes so that all New Yorkers can thrive.

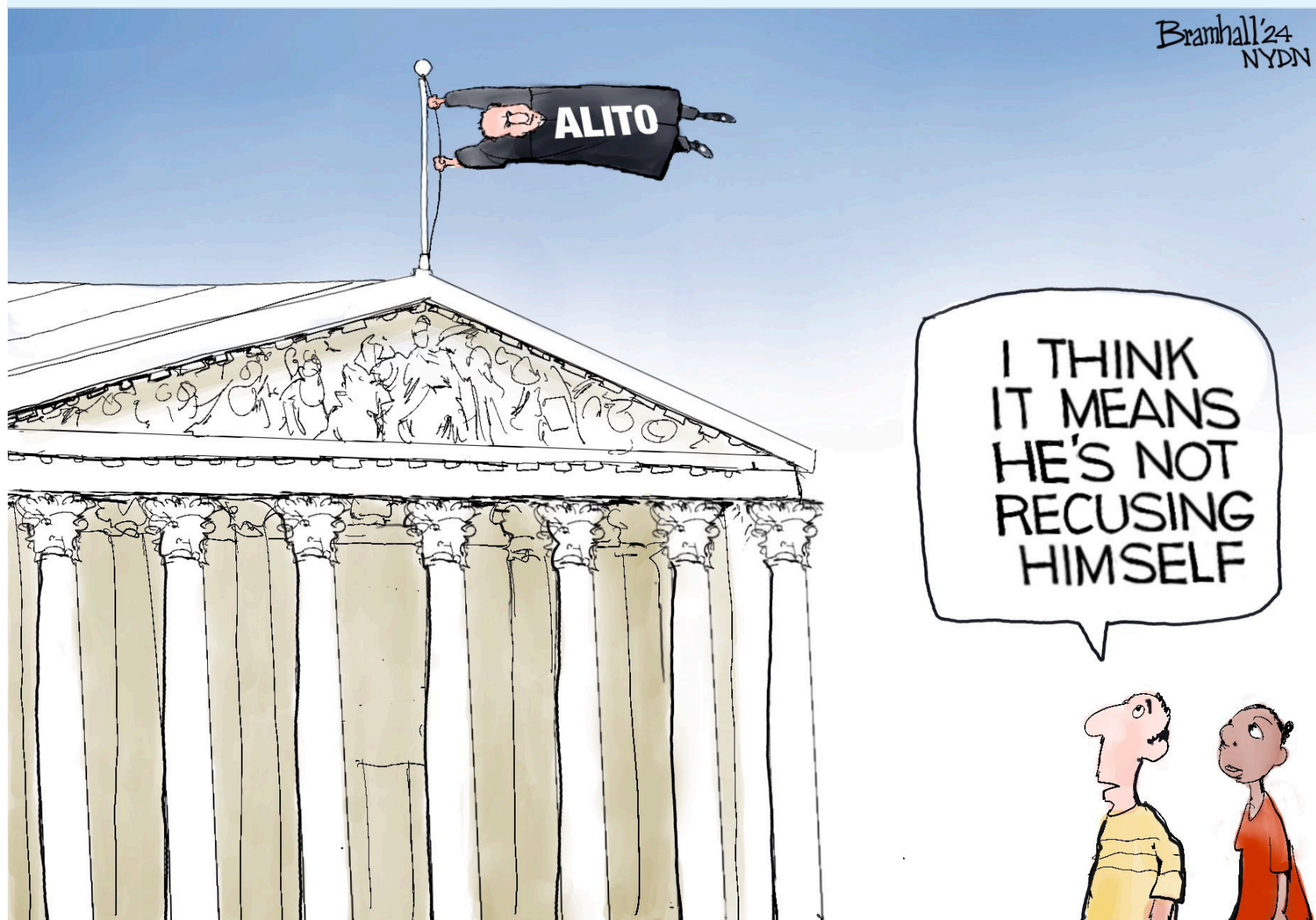
Topping the list for me: my union and I support the Fair & Timely Parole and Elder Parole bills. These bills would reform the parole process to reunite families, bring home credible messengers, violence interrupters, and more, and enable the state to reinvest half a billion dollars per year in what works to end cycles of violence: housing, health care for mind and body, healing for crime survivors, and more.

These bills are backed by public defense organizations like my employer and district attorneys alike.

I want my community to be safe from crime and mass incarceration and I'm proud to be working alongside hundreds of thousands of fellow 1199 members to get us there. It's up to Gov. Hochul and the Legislature to act, and if they do the right thing, working families across the state will have their backs.

NYC's schools must not add to orange, smoky air

This week marks one year since orange, smoky skies from Canadian wildfires enveloped New York City, when for days we breathed in the worst air quality in the world. In a flash, our climate crisis became visible and visceral — an apocalyptic, amber haze attacking our health.

It was a terrifying moment for New Yorkers, adults and children alike. We were advised to stay inside to avoid inhaling toxic ash particles harmful to our lungs. Our public schools should have been safe havens for our communities, but the mayor forced them to close. Three months later, we weathered record flooding that affected schools citywide.

Climate change is not slowing down. As New Yorkers, public school graduates, and climate advocates, we know our city is only as strong and resilient as its schools. Our future depends on the education we give New Yorkers, the working conditions we deliver for educators and staff, and the environment we provide for learning. That's why we need Green, Healthy Schools.

One year later, we're heading into a far-above-average storm season, and Canadian wildfire smoke is once again drifting into the U.S. But our public schools still fail to be safe, healthy learning and

work environments.

Our aging schools run on polluting fossil fuels, and in many cases, especially in disadvantaged communities, they haven't been updated since we were kids. Poor ventilation promotes illness, school basements are susceptible to flooding in increasingly frequent and severe rains, and hot, stuffy classrooms are proven to hinder children's learning.

Buildings account for 70% of NYC greenhouse gas emissions, and schools — one-quarter of city-owned buildings — are the most impactful target for the climate transformation we desperately need. Our landmark climate law, Local Law 97, should be keeping us on track to clean up our dirty buildings and slow our worsening climate crisis, but the city is not on pace.

While we lag behind these mandates, our children remain vulnerable. As do the teachers who come to school early and stay late, the cafeteria workers laboring in front of gas stoves, and janitorial staff working in the basements with decades-old, oil-burning boilers.

These 1,400 3K-12 buildings aren't just

unprepared for the future climate crisis; they are unfit for the present.

At ALIGN, we fight for workers' right to health and safety on the job, and a just transition to clean energy. That includes for the teachers and workers who keep our schools running smoothly. And Climate Families NYC brings together kids, parents, and caregivers to strive for a cleaner, greener future, because it's our children's future at stake.

We have a solution: Green, Healthy Schools.

Greening our schools is a win-win-win. By electrifying our public school buildings, the city can save millions on energy costs. By upgrading our ancient infrastructure, we can create thousands of green, union jobs and create healthier working conditions for school workers. By improving ventilation, we can reduce the spread of illness and remove triggers for asthma attacks while delivering clean air, no matter what color the sky is. And by prioritizing upgrades in frontline communities, we can start to repair decades of disinvestment.

Mayor Adams already committed to electrify 100 NYC public schools by 2030, but much of his plan remains unfunded.

We have delivered 500 letters from parents and students to the mayor asking

for a \$600 million down payment in this year's budget to electrify and upgrade 500 schools by 2030 and achieve zero-emissions as a school district by 2040. This will move us towards Green, Healthy Schools citywide.

How will we pay for it? The better question is, what is the cost of inaction? Hurricane Sandy cost the city \$19 billion in damages. Last year's smoky skies had untold costs to our mental and physical health. And we know that if we don't transition away from fossil fuels, our climate emergencies and their costs will only grow more severe. But if we think proactively, we can protect our city, save money long-term on energy and disaster repairs, and build the jobs of the future.

The mayor made a commitment to clean up our polluting buildings. This is a way to make it happen while keeping our schools safe. Mayor Adams: you must invest in our city's present and future by making our schools clean, resilient learning environments before it's too late.

The cat's meow: 'Garfield' atop the box office

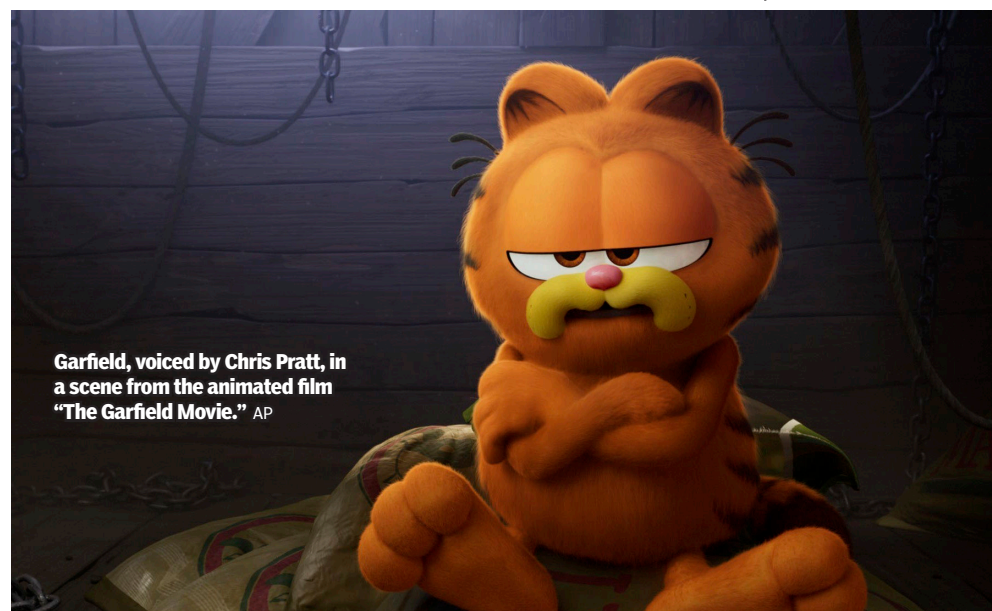

It was a quiet weekend at North American movie theaters, dominated once again by Sony's "The Garfield Movie," Warner Bros' "Furiosa: A Mad Max Saga" and a slew of holdovers. Flipping the script from their Memorial Day weekend openings, the animated orange cat crept ahead of the wasteland warrior in their second outing.

"The Garfield Movie" earned a chart-topping \$14 million in ticket sales while "Furiosa" settled into third place in a close race with "IF," according to studio estimates Sunday. Both "IF" and "Furiosa" are estimated to have earned \$10.8 million, with "IF" getting the slight edge.

"Garfield" fell only 42% in its second weekend in North America. It also topped the global box office adding \$27 million from international territories, bringing its running worldwide to \$152.2 million. The animated pic featuring the voice of Chris Pratt will essentially have the market to itself until "Inside Out 2" arrives June 14.

"Furiosa," meanwhile, fell 59% from its first weekend, adding just under \$10.8 million from 3,864 locations in the U.S. and Canada. That puts its running domestic

total at \$49.7 million and its global sum at \$114.4 million against a \$168 million production budget.

There were several new releases that opened on more than 1,000 screens this weekend: Sony/Crunchyroll's anime "Haikyu!! The Dumpster Battle"; IFC's horror "In a Violent Nature"; Roadside Attractions' Diane Keaton-Alfre Woodard-Kathy Bates comedy "Summer Camp," and Bleecker Street's father-son

drama "Ezra." None managed to crack the top five, however.

Disney also released the well-reviewed "Young Woman and the Sea," starring Daisy Ridley as the first woman to swim the English Channel, but did not report its ticket sales. Likewise, Richard Linklater's "Hit Man" is currently playing in select theaters around the country before it moves to streaming next week, but Netflix does not release

box office numbers.

"IF," John Krasinski's imaginary friends fantasy starring Ryan Reynolds and Cailey Fleming, has now made more than \$80.4 million domestically and \$138 million worldwide.

Disney/20th Century Studios' "Kingdom of the Planet of the Apes" landed in fourth place in its fourth weekend with \$8.8 million. It has now made \$140 million domestically and \$337.1 million

globally.

And the Ryan Gosling and Emily Blunt action-comedy "The Fall Guy," which is currently available to purchase at home, rounded out the top five with \$4.2 million, bringing its domestic total to \$80.3 million. Globally, the Universal release has made \$157.9 million.

"Haikyu!! The Dumpster Battle," based on the Japanese high school volleyball series, made an estimated \$3.5 million from 1,119 locations.

The slasher "In a Violent Nature" opened to \$2.2 million from 1,426 locations (a massive release for IFC Films and Shudder). And, "Ezra," about a standup comedian (Bobby Cannavale) and his autistic son, earned \$1.2 million from 1,320 screens.

The 2024 box office is struggling compared with both last year (down 23.9%) and pre-pandemic standards (down 42.2% from 2019 and 46.4% from 2018), according to data from Comscore.

On this weekend last year, "Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse" opened to \$120.7 million, while "The Little Mermaid" was still pulling in more than \$41.4 million in its second weekend. This year has yet to have any film open to more than \$100 million domestically.

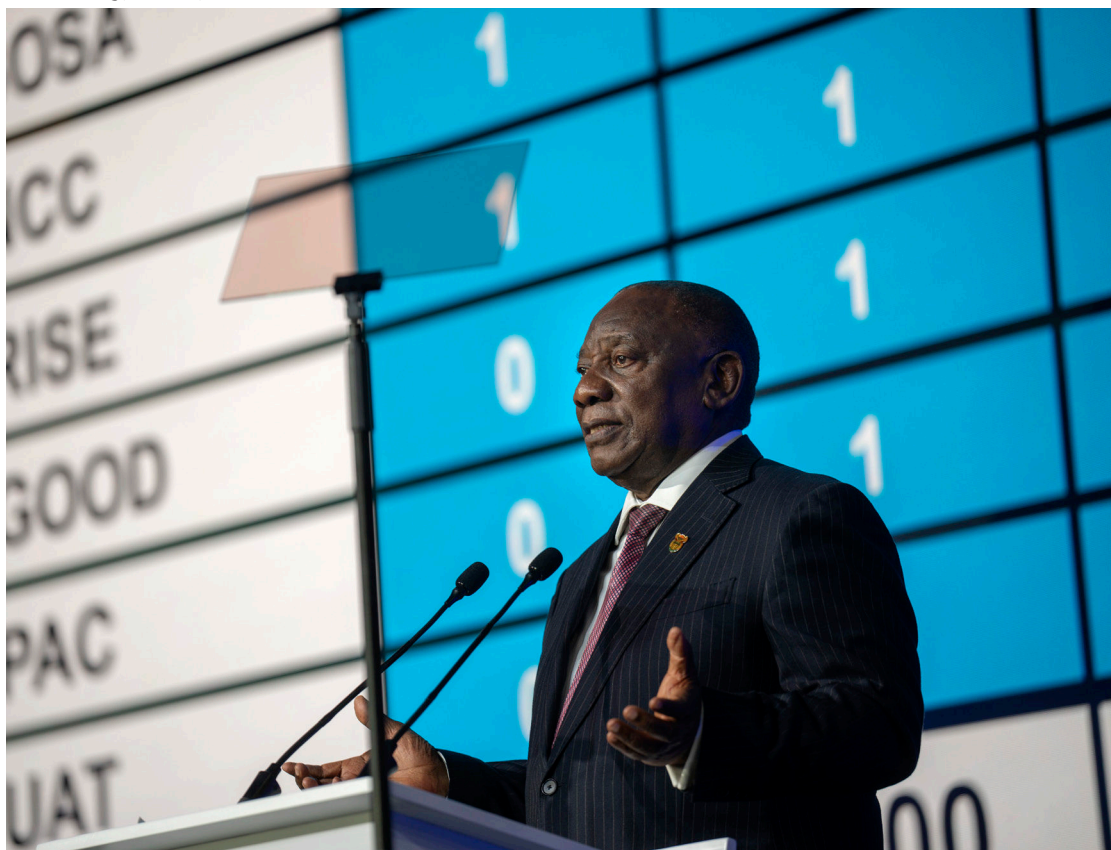
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South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, chastened after his ANC party for the first time did not receive enough votes to secure a majority in Parliament in Sunday's election, calls for formation of a coalition government. AP

South Africa prez urges unity talks after election

JOHANNESBURG — South Africa announced its final election results Sunday that confirmed no party won a majority, leading to the start of unprecedented coalition talks to find a way forward for Africa's most advanced economy.

President Cyril Ramaphosa immediately called in a speech for parties to overcome their differences and find "common ground" to form the first national coalition government in the country's young democracy.

Ramaphosa's African National Congress party had already lost its 30-year majority after more than 99% of votes were counted by Saturday and showed it could not surpass 50%. The ANC received 40.18% of the votes in last week's election in the final count, the largest share.

Without a majority it will need to agree on a coalition with another party or parties for the first time to co-govern and reelect Ramaphosa for a second term. National elections decide how many seats each party gets in Parliament and lawmakers elect the president later.

"Our people have spoken," Ramaphosa said. "Whether we like it or not, they have spoken. We have heard the voices of our people, and we must respect their choices and their wishes. The people of South Africa expect

their leaders to work together to meet their needs. This is a time for all of us to put South Africa first."

The ANC was the party of Nelson Mandela and freed South Africa from the apartheid system of white minority rule in 1994. It had governed with a comfortable majority since then.

This election saw an unprecedented slump in its support, with voters seen to be deserting the party due to its failure to solve widespread poverty and high unemployment levels, as well as problems with the delivery of basic government services to many in a nation of 62 million.

The ANC had said earlier Sunday that it was starting its negotiations with all major parties. More than 50 took part in the election, and at least eight had significant shares of the vote.

ANC Secretary General Fikile Mbalula said the party was open to all negotiations, even with the main opposition Democratic Alliance, which has led the chorus of criticism of the ANC for years but is viewed by many analysts as the most stable coalition option for South Africa.

The DA won the second-most votes with around 21.81%, and the two parties would hold a majority together and be able to govern. DA leader John Steenhuisen said his party also was initiating talks with parties.

The ANC won 159 seats in the 400-seat Parliament, down from the 230 it won in the last election. The DA

increased slightly to 87 seats.

There is some time pressure for coalition talks to progress and for the uncertainty to be minimized given South Africa's new Parliament needs to sit for the first time and elect a president within 14 days of the election results being declared.

Ramaphosa is seeking a second and final term, and Mbalula said his position as leader of the ANC was not in question despite the election result. Mbalula said the ANC would not consider the demands by the MK Party of former President Jacob Zuma that Ramaphosa step down as a condition for talks.

South Africa is a leading voice for its continent and the developing world on the global stage and is due to take over the presidency of the Group of 20 rich and developing nations late this year. It's the only African nation in that group.

"Everyone is looking to see if South Africa can weather the storm and come out the other side," political analyst Oscar van Heerden said on the eNCA news network.

Amid many coalition options, the ANC could also join with MK and the far-left Economic Freedom Fighters, although they have been cast as partners that would make investors uneasy. Both have pledged to nationalize parts of South Africa's economy, including its gold and platinum mines, among the world's biggest producers.

E-bike rider dies crashing into double-parked truck in Washington Heights

A 38-year-old e-bike rider died after crashing into a double-parked tractor trailer in Washington Heights, police said Sunday.

Jose Luis Zamora Rodriguez was riding east on W. 181st St. when he hit the rear liftgate of a 2019 Volvo tractor trailer left unattended by its driver near Fort Washington Ave. about 3:55 p.m. on Saturday, police said.

Medics rushed Zamora Rodriguez to Harlem Hospital, but he could not be saved. He lived in the

Bronx, according to cops.

Police have made no arrests and are still investigating the crash.

The city Department of Transportation launched an e-bike safety campaign in March, after a particularly deadly year for riders.

More than three times as many people died while riding e-bikes in 2003 than died on traditional, pedal-powered bicycles, according to city data, with 23 people killed on e-bikes and seven on traditional cycles. Seven were so-called "solo collisions," where a rider loses control or crashes into a stationary object.

Pedestrian crossing street in Brooklyn fatally struck by SUV

Mets hope Smith can help revive struggling bullpen

The Mets' beleaguered bullpen received a little relief Sunday with the activation of Drew Smith, who missed more than a month with right shoulder inflammation.

Smith rejoined a relief corps that looks much different than it did before he went on the injured list on April 27.

A brutal May for closer Edwin Diaz ended with the two-time All-Star going on the 15-day IL with a right shoulder impingement.

Trusted left-hander Brooks Raley is out for the season after undergoing elbow surgery.

Jorge López was designated for assignment last week after he tossed his glove into the stands during an ejection, then raised eyebrows with a profanity-filled postgame media address.

Even with Smith's return, the bullpen includes only three active relievers who made the Opening Day roster. Adam Ottavino and Jake Diekmann are the others.

The Mets sent down Josh Walker to make room for Smith.

"Every year, teams are going to go through it," manager Carlos Mendoza said before Sunday's series finale against the Diamondbacks. "You talk about depth from the beginning, and we got tested out of the gate. Here we are, continuing to get tested. Guys will step up. The bullpen will continue to evolve."

The revolving door of relievers, coupled with late-inning ineffectiveness, repeatedly presented challenges for the Mets, whose 3.92 bullpen ERA ranks 16th among the 30 MLB teams.

Diaz posted a 8.68 ERA in May and blew four of his five save opportunities in the month, including three consecutively before going on the IL.

Reed Garrett, meanwhile, was tagged for nine runs (eight earned) over his five relief appearances from May 22-31, though he pitched a scoreless seventh with three strikeouts Sunday.

Smith, who recorded a 2.70 ERA over 10 innings before his injury, adds a dependable option. While Mendoza declined to say whether the Mets would use Smith on back-to-back days coming off of the injury, he acknowledged the team will be cautious with the right-hander.

"We have to be careful here and really make sure that we put him in situations where we're not putting him at risk," Mendoza said Sunday. "We feel comfortable where he's at physically, but he's a big part of that bullpen. Obviously, we missed him the last few weeks and it's good to have him back."

The Mets have also received a boost from Adrian Houser, who struggled to a 8.55 ERA in seven starts but has found success as a reliever, recording a 1.80 ERA over 10 innings in the role.

Mendoza said Houser, who has thrown multiple innings in each of his four relief appearances, likely won't pitch on back-to-back days.

MOVING ON FROM MAY

The Mets are eager to leave May in the past.

They slumped to a 9-19 record in the month and won consecutive games on only two occasions. They

never recorded more than two victories in a row.

"It's been hard," Mendoza said Sunday. "We haven't been getting results. The last month was difficult. We lost a few games where we fought until the end. ... They'll continue to fight. They'll continue to work and we'll get through it, but (it's) not a secret it's been hard for us these past three, four weeks."

LOU GEHRIG DAY

The Mets and Diamondbacks took part Sunday in MLB's Lou Gehrig Day, which aims to honor the Yankee great and raise awareness about ALS, the disease that took his life.

Gehrig became the Yankees' starting first baseman on June 2, 1925, and he died on June 2, 1941.

This is the fourth year in a row MLB has celebrated Lou Gehrig Day on June 2.

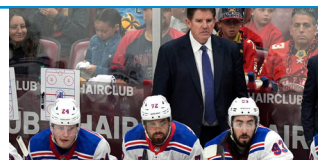
The Mets and Diamondbacks both wore patches featuring Gehrig's No. 4. During his pregame press conference, Mendoza mentioned Sarah Langs, an MLB writer and stat maven who is battling ALS.

"Thinking about her on a day like today," Mendoza said, "and just continuing to create that awareness to fight against this disease."

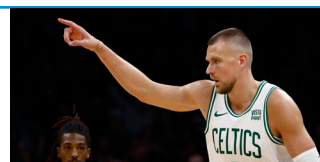

The Mets’ whirlwind home stand ended on a low note.

Yet another late-inning bullpen collapse doomed the Mets in their 5-4 loss to the Diamondbacks at Citi Field on Sunday, robbing them of their first series victory in nearly a month.

With the Mets leading, 4-3, in the top of the ninth inning, reliever Jake Diekmann surrendered a leadoff double to pinch-hitter Gabriel Moreno and a go-ahead two-run home run to Ketel Marte.

The blown save was the Mets’ 11th in 24 opportunities this season.

With the loss, the Mets split their four-game series with the Diamondbacks and finished 3-7 on a roller-coaster home stand that included the high of Darryl Strawberry’s number retirement but also made headlines with the Jorge López controversy.

“Not good,” manager Carlos Mendoza said, summing up the home stand. “We’ve got to play better, especially here at home in front of our fan base. We’ve just got to turn the page.”

Starter Jose Quintana allowed three runs in four laborious innings, requiring Mendoza to seek 15 outs from a banged-up bullpen. The Mets remain without closer Edwin Diaz, who blew four saves in May — including three consecutively — before going on the injured list with a shoulder impingement.

Dedniel Núñez, Danny Young, Reed Garrett and Adam Ottavino totaled four scoreless innings Sunday before Diekmann’s blown save.

“I don’t think I’m executing well enough in certain situations,” Diekmann said. “The homer, if (that pitch is) two more inches in, it might be a swing and miss. It might be a double down the line, but they (would) only score one, so it’s different.”

The home run was the second of the afternoon by Marte, who also struck a leadoff blast on Quintana’s third pitch of the game. Lourdes Gurriel Jr. added another solo homer five pitches later.

The Mets overcame an early 3-0 deficit with a two-out, four-run rally against Arizona starter Brandon Pfaadt in the third inning. Brandon Nimmo’s two-run triple tied the game and J.D. Martinez’s RBI triple a batter later

put the Mets up, 4-3.

That score held up until the ninth inning, when Mendoza turned to the left-handed Diekmann rather than stick with righty Adam Ottavino, who threw nine pitches in a 1-2-3 eighth inning.

“I decided to go with a clean inning there, knowing that they were going to pinch-hit and that at some point we were going to run into a matchup that we didn’t want,” Mendoza said. “It didn’t work.”

Before the game, the Mets activated reliever Drew Smith, who has a 2.70 ERA this season but missed more than a month with shoulder soreness. Mendoza said afterward that Smith was available only in an emergency situation Sunday after completing his rehab assignment on Friday.

The Mets won the first two games of the series on Thursday and Friday, marking their first consecutive victories since May 6-7 in St. Louis. They have not won a series since that rain-shortened two-game set against the Cardinals.

The Mets began their 10-game home stand by losing two of three to the Giants, then got swept by the Dodgers. Wednesday’s loss to Los Angeles was overshadowed by López, who got ejected from that game for arguing a checked-swing call and, on his way to the dugout, tossed his glove into the stands.

López then raised eyebrows with a profanity-filled postgame media address, after which a debate arose as to whether López called himself the “worst teammate” or the Mets the worst team in the league. López was born in Puerto Rico, and English is not his first language.

The Mets later designated López for assignment, with Mendoza saying the pitcher’s behavior did not live up to the organization’s standards. In an Instagram apology, López said he had called himself the “worst teammate” and did not intend to disparage the Mets.

Wednesday also saw Francisco Lindor call a team meeting, hoping to snap a skid in which the Mets lost eight of nine.

A highlight of the home stand, meanwhile, came Saturday, when the Mets retired Strawberry’s No. 18 during a pregame ceremony. Strawberry, who starred on the 1986 World Series team, survived a massive heart attack in March.

Judge puts on show for fans back home

Going deep isn't easy at Oracle Park. You wouldn't know from watching Aaron Judge, though.

With the Yankees in San Francisco for a three-game set against the Giants, the slugger crushed three homers in the first two games of the series. The third, belted off Giants ace Logan Webb in a 7-3 Yankees win Saturday, traveled 464 feet to left field.

"That was a big fella home run, my goodness. The power that this guy has — it's rare," Giants broadcaster Mike Krukow said of the two-run, first-inning bomb. "That



is deep in the stands in left center. I don't know if we've ever seen one go up there."

Judge's Friday homers weren't cheap shots, either. He sent balls 394 feet to left and 426 feet to straightaway center. The major-league home run leader, fresh off a torrid month of May, now has 21 jacks this season.

Judge's most recent home runs have come in his backyard, as the Linden, California native grew up a Giants fan and was courted by the team as a free agent a few years ago.

It's easy to see why the Giants were seriously interested, since not even their ballpark can contain Judge's pop.

Oracle Park is considered one of the hardest stadiums to hit in with a Park Factor of 96 since 2022, according to Baseball Savant. That ranks 27th in the majors.

Prior to Saturday, only 42 long-balls had been hit in San Francisco this season. Oddly enough, that was tied with Colorado's Coors Field — generally considered MLB's friendliest venues to hitters — for the fewest homers hit in a stadium this year.

Last season, Oracle ranked 27th in homers. In 2022, it ranked 28th.

Since 2005, 27 stadiums have produced more home runs than the Giants' home, which has gone through a few name changes. The year before that, Barry Bonds, the all-time home run king, crushed 45 dingers.

A Giants hitter hasn't hit at least 30 homers in a season since.

"Barry and a lot of those guys back in the day made it look pretty small at times," Judge said of Oracle on Friday, per MLB.com. And now, he has, too.

POTEET IMPRESSES AGAIN

While Judge mashed again Saturday, Cody Poteet delivered another impressive performance in his second start of the season.

The right-hander, promoted from Triple-A following Clarke Schmidt's lat injury, held the Giants to three runs (2 earned) over five innings. He also totaled three hits, one walk and six strikeouts.

Poteet dazzled in his Yankees debut on April 13, holding the Guardians to one run over six frames. Just a spot starter that day, Poteet has a chance to stick in the rotation this time around with Schmidt injured and Gerrit Cole still a few rehab starts away from being activated.

STANTON SMASH

Judge wasn't the only Yankee slugger to homer on Saturday, as Giancarlo Stanton hit his 14th home run of the season in the eighth inning. The two-run homer traveled 358 feet at exactly 100 mph.

For comparison, Judge's 464-foot missile traveled at 115.7 mph.

The Yankees also hit two triples in the game, which came courtesy of Juan Soto and Alex Verdugo. Judge, Verdugo and Stanton all notched two RBI.

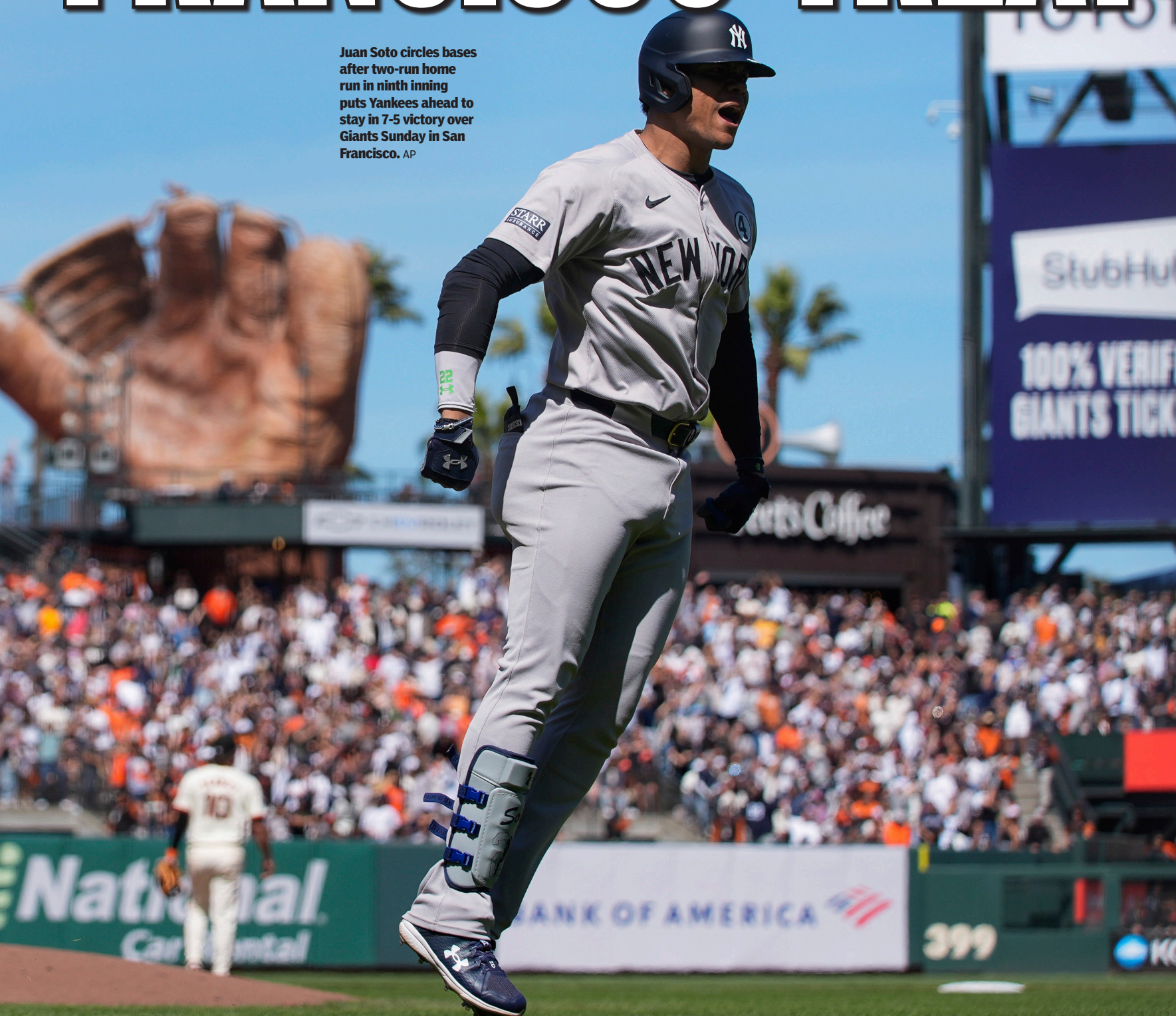
Cole has said he hasn't felt any pain in his elbow since he started throwing.

However, the Yankees just lost Clarke Schmidt to a lat injury. He was shut down for 4-6 weeks. Cody Poteet took Schmidt's spot in the rotation on Saturday.

Soto's go-ahead heroics, as a ground-rule double from Giancarlo Stanton gave the Yankees another run in the ninth. It also gave Stanton 1,500 hits for his career.

Volpe started the dramatic rally with an RBI triple shortly after the Giants failed to turn a double play with Jose Trevino running.

The Yankees took an early lead when Soto hit a 430-foot solo bomb off of Blake Snell in the first inning. The 2023 National League Cy Young winner,

an oft-rumored Yankees target as his free agency lingered into spring training, entered the game with a 10.42 ERA. Snell ultimately allowed three earned runs over 4.2 innings before leaving with a tight left groin.

Alex Verdugo produced the other two runs with a double off of Erik Miller, who inherited a bases-loaded situation from Snell. That fifth-inning two-bagger tied the game, 3-3, but Dennis Santana surrendered a two-run single to Heliot Ramos

in the sixth.

Earlier in the game, Nestor Cortes struggled, starting with an RBI single from Casey Schmitt in the second inning. Ramos hit a solo homer in the third before Schmitt followed with a long ball of his own with the bases empty.

All in all, Cortes totaled 4.1 innings, seven hits, three earned runs, zero walks, seven strikeouts and 95 pitches.

The road hasn't been kind to the southpaw this season. Cortes

entered Sunday's start with a 6.16 ERA away from Yankee Stadium. He has a 1.12 ERA at home, and a 3.46 ERA overall.

Despite Cortes' outing, the Yankees still ended their successful westward journey with a win thanks to Soto, who ended the game with a .322 average, the best in the American League.

"We've been playing great baseball," Soto said. "Really happy to come over here and keep doing what we've been

doing since day one."

Now 42-19, the American League East-leading Yankees are off today. They'll start a home stand against the Twins on Tuesday before the first-place Dodgers visit the Bronx on Friday.

Luis Gil, Carlos Rodón and Marcus Stroman are scheduled to pitch against the Twins. Bailey Ober, Chris Paddack and Pablo López are lined up for Minnesota.

Amid lat woes, Clarke turns to old pal Sevy

Shortly after a right lat strain interrupted his breakout season, Yankee starter Clarke Schmidt sought advice from former teammate Luis Severino.

Now in his first season with the Mets, Severino dealt with lat strains throughout his Yankee tenure, missing time in 2019, 2022 and 2023 with different grades of the injury.

"He texted me in the morning that day when everything happened," Severino told the Daily News on Sunday at Citi Field.

"I said, 'It's always good to get a second opinion from somebody else, just to see the different perspectives of everybody.' He told me he was going to do it."

Schmidt said last week that he felt off during his last start, a five-inning outing in San Diego on May 26. The right-hander underwent an MRI and met with renowned orthopedic surgeon Dr.

Neal ElAttrache in Los Angeles.

The 28-year-old Schmidt is not expected to resume throwing for four to six weeks, and then will need to build his pitch count back up from there.

Treatment options for lat strains include a cortisone shot or a platelet-rich plasma injection, Severino said.

"I (told Schmidt), 'If you're gonna be out two months, I think it would be better to do a PRP shot, because it's gonna help you heal and take care of the problem.' I think the cortisone shot hides the problem," said Severino, who spent 2015-23 with the Yankees.

"He's having a great year. He can be out for two months and then he'll be back. They'll be in the playoffs anyway, so I think it's better to take care of the situation now, and then for the rest of his career, he won't have the same problem."

Severino, 30, sat out much of the 2019 season with a Grade

2 lat strain, then missed two months apiece with lower-grade strains in 2022 and at the beginning of last season.

Now in his second season as a full-time MLB starter, Schmidt boasts a 2.52 ERA through 60.2 innings and had begun to pitch deeper into games, with a career-high eight innings on May 16 against the Twins.

His success, along with the emergence of hard-throwing rookie Luis Gil (7-1, 1.99 ERA), helped the Yankees endure the absence of ace Gerrit Cole (elbow inflammation) over the season's first two months.

"It's unbelievable," Severino said of Schmidt's performance. "Every time I look at the scoreboard, it's like Clarke went seven (innings). He went six. He went eight against Minnesota. I was watching that game. I follow him and Luis Gil pretty closely, two guys that I really admire. Great teammates that I just want the best for."

Whether injured Celtics center **Kristaps Porzingis** will be ready in time for the start of the NBA Finals this week is still to be determined.

But signs are pointing to him being able to return to the court sooner rather than later during Boston's matchup with the Mavericks.

The 7-footer hasn't appeared in a game since straining his left calf in Game 4 of Boston's first-round play-off series against Miami on April 29.

But 4-1 victories over the Heat and Cleveland in the second round, followed by a 4-0 sweep of Indiana in the Eastern Conference finals, have given the Latvian extended recovery time.

Celtics coach **Joe Mazzulla** has refrained from making predictions on when he expects Porzingis to be available. But he was clear that his team is better with Porzingis in the lineup, despite compiling a 9-1 record without him this postseason.

"When KP is at his best, he's been tremendous for us and we expect that from him and we know he'll give that to us," Mazzulla said.

Porzingis last spoke publicly on May 4, saying of the injury, "It's something, it's not nothing," and adding that it would take "a little bit of time" to recover from.

His official status since then has been day to day as he slowly began rehabbing for a chance to face the Mavericks team he played for from 2019-22.

Porzingis took to social media this week to provide his most significant update, posting on the X

platform, "I'll be back in the lineup very soon. See you in the finals."

RED STORM OUSTED

Dakota Jordan batted 5 for 5, scored three times and drove in four runs and **Mississippi State** advanced to the championship of the Charlottesville Regional by beating **St. John's**, 13-5, on Sunday.

The Bulldogs advance to play Virginia in the regional finals.

Jordan entered the regional weekend just 1-for-22 batting. He started Friday night's game — also against St. John's — going 0 for 4. But since delivering a three-run homer in the bottom of the 10th for a 5-2 win, the first-round, major-league draft prospect has gone 8 for 11.

Mississippi State built leads of 4-0 after three innings and, 6-2 after four before the Red Storm got within a pair after scoring two runs in the bottom of the fifth. The Bulldogs got the runs back in their half of the sixth.

MAKHACHEV RUNS UFC STREAK TO 14

Overcoming one of the sport's accomplished veterans and a crowd that was against him from the start, Makhachev ran his record to 26-1 and said afterward he may move up in weight for another

challenge.

"This is my dream," Makhachev said.

There's certainly not much left for the Russian at 155 pounds, where he defended his title for the third time and showed again why he is ranked as the pound-for-pound best in UFC.

Poirier (30-9) fell short in his third attempt for the undisputed title, all three ending by submission. At 35, he is considering retirement.

MARADONA AUCTION POSTPONED

The auction of a trophy awarded to the late **Diego Maradona** that was planned this week has been postponed, French auction house Aguttes said on Sunday amid a judicial investigation looking into the possible resale of stolen goods.

Maradona's heirs this week failed to stop the auction of the Golden Ball trophy he received for being the best player at the 1986

World Cup after starting an urgent judicial motion. A French court ruled the auction could go ahead but the lawyer for Maradona's heirs lodged an appeal.

"Maradona has always aroused passions, and this continues despite the recent court ruling on Thursday, which we welcome and which dismissed the heirs' request for a ban on the sale," **Maximilien Aguttes** said in a statement. "Our mission is to organize the auction in the best possible conditions, both for our seller and for the buyers. This litigious climate and these uncertainties do not allow connoisseurs to approach this acquisition calmly, and our role as a trusted third party can no longer be properly fulfilled."

O'S MATEO HIT BY BAT

Baltimore infielder **Jorge Mateo** left Sunday's game against Tampa Bay and entered concussion protocol after he was hit by a bat as teammate **Cedric Mullins** loosened up.

Both players were in the area around the on-deck circle when Mullins, who was batting one spot ahead of Mateo, appeared to catch Mateo in the back of the helmet while lowering his bat behind him.

"I was getting loose looking at the pitcher, and I did kind of like a circle stretch, just pretty normal stuff," Mullins said. "He was right behind me — didn't even see him."

Mullins said he saw Mateo in the clubhouse kitchen and he seemed OK.

A day later, WNBA upgrades foul on Clark as coaches rip play

Indiana Fever guard Caitlin Clark taking an away-from-the-ball foul from Chicago's Chennedy Carter has dominated conversations around the WNBA. And the discussions continued Sunday with the league making an adjustment to the original call.

The league upgraded Carter's foul on Clark in the third quarter of Saturday's Fever-Sky to a Flagrant 1 on Sunday. Carter will not be fined.

Fever coach Christie Sides deemed the play "unacceptable" after Saturday's home win over

the Sky. And moments before Sunday's matchup against the Liberty, she felt the same way about Carter's foul.

"This league is awesome. It's a physical league. We get after it," she said Sunday. "But that was a non-basketball play. That needed to be called in that moment."

The incident occurred when Carter gave a shoulder to Clark that sent the No. 1 overall selection to the floor with 15.1 seconds remaining in the third. The play was initially ruled a common foul after a brief official review. No players were assessed a technical foul.

Carter declined to comment on

the play during Saturday's post-game presser.

On Sunday, Clark said the physical play reminds her of her early days at Iowa when opposing players would try take advantage of her "frail" body.

"I was pretty frail," she said before Sunday's Commissioner's Cup game against the Liberty. "I still am pretty frail, but I feel like I added quite a bit of muscle over my college career and that was probably the tactic early on in my college career, too. Just be really physical with her because she's not really as strong as everybody else."

The "non-basketball" play is

one that isn't new to the Fever, per Sides. She mentioned players zeroing in on Aliyah Boston, the franchise's No. 1 overall pick last season, during the 2023 season.

"We kind of went through this last year with (Boston)," Sides said Sunday. "New rookies, number one picks, players want to show that they're vets in this league and they want to make it hard on these rookies. That's just how it goes."

"We sent video in last year. We were making our complaints to try to figure out (how) to help AB. Same this year with Caitlin."

Liberty coach Sandy Brondello also disapproved of the play before

facing off against Clark and the Fever on Sunday.

"That foul that was probably inappropriate. That's not what we do," Brondello said. "I think every team is playing physical. Our games been all physical. You're playing basketball. Stay within the rules of basketball and we're in good shape."

"Caitlin... she's a fabulous player, so she's gonna get a lot of attention naturally. I think she's handled herself brilliantly, to be quite honest. It's tough for a young kid, but she's got skills and she's gonna be an amazing pro player."

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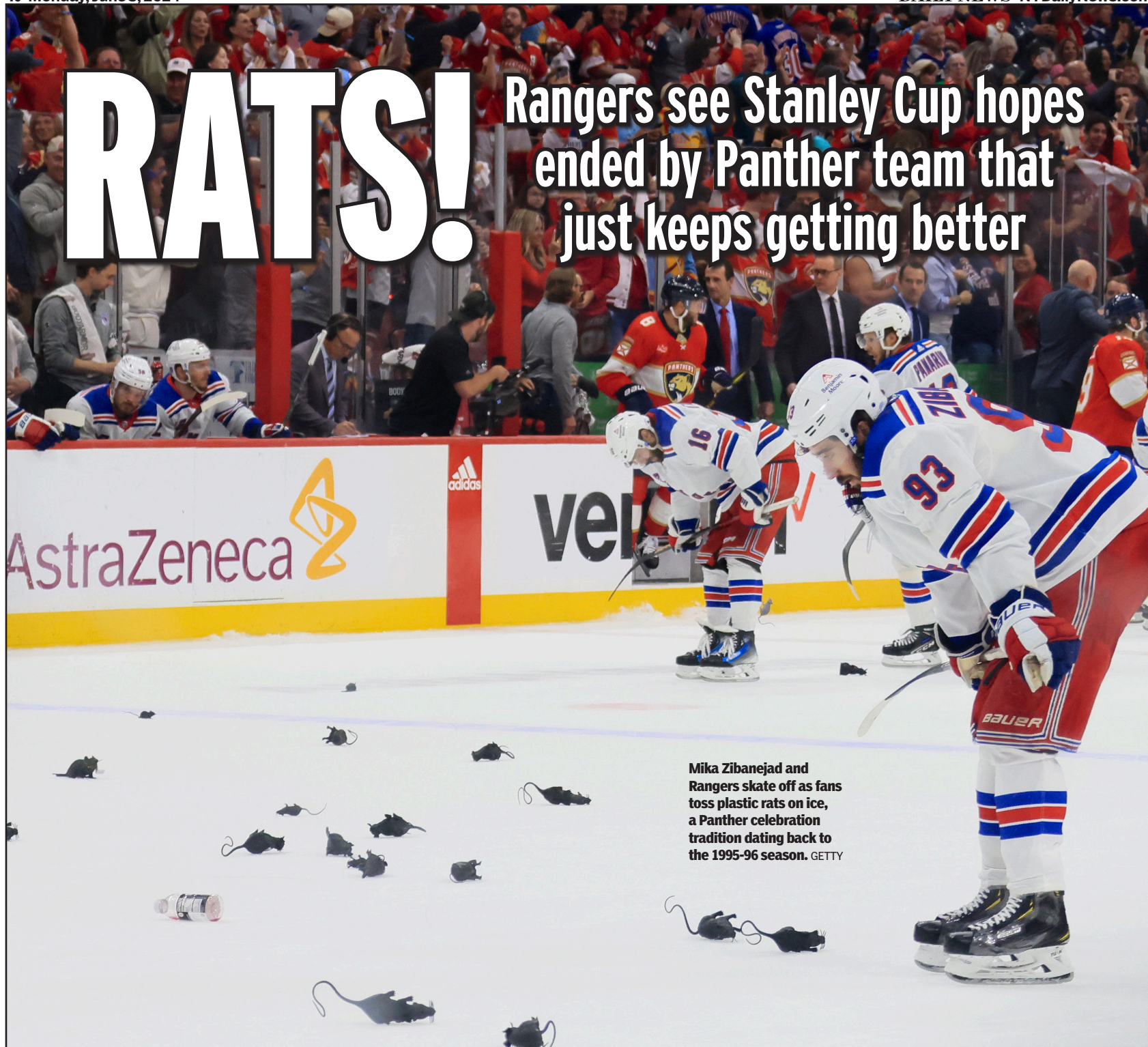

SUNRISE, Fla. — The 2023 Stanley Cup finals had just ended, the Vegas Golden Knights were celebrating their championship and a heartbroken bunch of Florida Panthers were taking off their skates for the final time that season.

In that moment, standing in the locker room, Aaron Ekblad made a vow.

“We’ll find a way to come back next year,” the veteran defenseman said.

Look, it’s not exactly uncommon for some semblance of that to be said by the team that gets a championship shot and falls short. But these Panthers actually delivered on that promise — a rarity in hockey. Florida is back in the finals, becoming just the second team in the last 40 years to lose in hockey’s title round one season and return the following season.

The Panthers won their second consecutive Eastern Conference title on Saturday night, topping the Rangers, 2-1, to win that series in six games. The most recent team to lose the Cup final one season and return the next was Pittsburgh, the Sidney Crosby-led team that lost to Detroit in 2008 and beat the Red Wings in 2009. Before that, it was 1983 and 1984, when Edmonton lost to the Islanders one year and then topped them in five games the next for Wayne Gretzky’s first Cup.

“Just a lot of motivation, dedication, commitment,” Panthers forward Matthew Tkachuk said. “The right pieces were added. Some great pieces added. Just one mindset: to do whatever you can to get back to it. And I thought the guys that were here last year have done an unbelievable job, coming back for the start of camp with this on their minds. So, we are not done yet.”

Game 1 of the finals is Saturday.

If Florida plays Edmonton, the Panthers will host the opener, and if Florida plays Dallas it’ll be the Stars with home-ice advantage.

Florida’s top 10 scorers from last season all remain with the Panthers, and big moves were made after the loss to Vegas as well. Florida added a trio of defensemen — Oliver Ekman-Larsson, former Panthers player Dmitry Kulikov and Niko Mikkola, all of whom played big roles throughout the season. Kevin Stenlund was added to bolster the forward corps, and Cup winner Vladimir Tarasenko came to Florida in a late-season trade. Tarasenko scored the series-clinching goal against the Rangers.

“If you make it to the final, I don’t know how many teams actually get better the next year because you’re usually paying a bunch of guys because they got to the final and the salary cap changes and you’re going to lose some guys,” Panthers coach

Paul Maurice said. “Our hockey team got better from last year to this year. We had good men last year and I still love that year and I’ll love that year separately and differently than any other year that I’ve coached. But we got better.”

The scenario — losing in the title round one year, going that far again the next — is seen far more regularly in other major sports than in the NHL.

In the NBA, the runner-up one year has made the finals the next season 26 times in 77 years, winning 14.

Baseball has seen the World Series loser return to the next Fall Classic on 29 occasions in the last 120 years. Three of those — Kansas City in 2014 and 2015, the Dodgers in 2017 and 2018, and Houston in 2021 and 2022 — coming in the last decade.

In the NFL, the Super Bowl loser has played in the next Super Bowl eight times, going 3-5. The last time it

happened: New England, which lost Super Bowl LII to Philadelphia and won the next year against the Rams.

It has happened 21 other times in the NHL, but in fairness, most of those instances were in a very different NHL. When the Rangers did it in 1932 and 1933, there were nine teams. When St. Louis did it in 1969 and 1970, there were 12 teams. In the more than half-century that has followed, it’s happened only four times in the NHL: Boston lost in back-to-back finals in 1977 and 1978, then Edmonton, then Pittsburgh and now Florida gets its chance.

“I think it just comes down to our heart and our will,” Panthers forward Sam Bennett said. “We want it bad, and it’s one thing to say you want it, but to actually go out there and prove that every single night with how hard you’re going to work is a different story. We want it bad.”

Late night in Paris

After 3 a.m. Djokovic finish, women's matches zip by

PARIS — After the French Open marathon came the sprints.

Defending champion Iga Swiatek swept into the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in just 40 minutes, a crushing 6-0, 6-0 win against Anastasia Potapova.

U.S. Open champion Coco Gauff took only 60 minutes to rout unseeded Italian Elisabetta Cocciaretto, 6-1, 6-2.

The 20-year-old American looked set for an even quicker victory when she led, 5-0, but Cocciaretto fought back, getting a hearty cheer from the crowd after winning the next game.

Swiatek won 48-10 in points without even facing a game point against her. The match ended when Potapova hit a forehand into the net on the first match point.

"I was just really focused and in the zone," Swiatek said. "It went pretty quickly, pretty weird."

Their match started at 11 a.m. on Court Philippe Chatrier.

That was just eight hours after men's defending champion Novak Djokovic finished his five-set, 4 ½-hour marathon against Lorenzo

Musetti at just after 3 a.m. in the latest finish in tournament history.

Swiatek said late finishes don't just end with the match and are not healthy.

"Usually it takes us, like, four hours to even chill, and you need to do recovery, media. It's not like the work ends when the match point," she said. "I was always one of the players that said that we should start a little bit earlier."

Gauff thinks the issue needs addressing.

"It's a complicated thing," she said. "But I definitely think for the health and safety of the players it would be in the sport's best interest to try to avoid those matches finishing, or starting, after a certain time."

Gauff says there's also a fine balance to be struck.

"Obviously I don't want to complain too much about it because we are very blessed and privileged to be playing for a lot of money. There's people working real jobs under worse conditions for less money and just trying to get by," she said. "It's just tough for me knowing where some of my family come from and where things

are, and I think about the people hearing this. Yes, if I was a person working, I would be upset to hear, you know, players complain."

Potapova attributed her crushing defeat to the constant rain delays in recent days sapping her energy.

"Unfortunately in the last couple of days I started feeling not well, eating not well. Last night I did not get an hour of sleep. It's very tough to be honest. Especially when you want to play good you have to try to keep everything inside," she said. "But unfortunately if you keep it inside it doesn't go away, it just keeps growing. The stress inside my body kept growing and unfortunately today was the day when it exploded."

Saturday didn't help much.

"Yesterday I spent all day on site because I had doubles. We came at 9:00 (a.m.) and at 7:00 p.m. it got (postponed). I spent all day here without hitting a ball," she said. "That's not the preparation for the fourth round of a grand slam against the world number one."

Swiatek remains on course for her third consecutive French Open title and fourth overall.

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
