CAMPAIGNERS ACCUSE GOVERNME

BY RUTH SUTER

CAMPAIGNERS have accused the Scottish Government of failing to halt youth violence after the tragic death of a teenage boy.

Families of victims spoke out after Kory McCrimmon, 16, lost his life on Sunday.

He was injured in a disturbance at Greenfield Park in the east end of Glasgow on Friday and died in hospital two days later.

A boy aged 13 yesterday appeared in court in connection with the tragedy.

He made no plea at a private hearing at Glasgow Sheriff Court to a charge of murder.

The boy, who can't be named for legal reasons, was remanded in custody.

The Record launched its Our Kids... Our Future campaign in February 2023 following a series of shocking attacks involving children across the country.

We have called on the Scottish Government to invest in safe spaces for kids in every community to allow them to be guided and mentored.

Vicky Donald, who has campaigned for change since her daughter Kaylynn, 12, was battered at the back of a school bus in Fife, said she was "sickened" by the latest tragedy.

Vicky, 36, said: "It makes me feel sick to my stomach that a young boy has lost his life.

We have been warning of this for months. In fact, we have been shouting it from the rooftops and it has fallen on deaf ears.

'The Scottish Government has watched the situation with youth violence escalate for months now and they've done nothing.

"It was only a matter of time before something as devastating as this took place.

"I feel for the boy's parents. They'll never watch him grow up, go to university, or start a family of his own.

"I can't imagine how it would feel to lose a child over something that could have been prevented. Why did a child have to die as a result of a complete lack of action?"

Angela Jarvis, whose daughter, Abbie, was beaten unconscious at a skatepark in Glasgow's Drumchapel, called for the government to prioritise funding for youth facilities.

Åbbie, now 14, suffers from PTSD and has been unable to return to school.

Angela, 44, said: "To hear a boy just two years older than Abbie has lost his life is absolutely devastating.

"I couldn't sleep after hearing about Kory's death and I can't imagine what the parents are going through. This child had barely started his life. Why did he have to die? Why isn't the Scottish Government moving on this? It has

Detective Inspector William Downie, senior officer on the case, said: "Our thoughts are very much with Kory's family at what is a very difficult time.

"There were a lot of people in the park at the time and we are asking anyone who has not already spoken to officers to get in touch."

A Scottish Government

spokesperson said: "In general terms, and acknowledging it is of no comfort to the family who have experienced this horrendous loss, there has been a 25 per cent decrease in non-sexual violent crime since 2006-07 with homicide rates, violence-related hospital admissions and knife carrying all reduced.

"Two million pounds will be invested to implement the Violence Prevention Framework for Scotland to help divert people away from violence."

SCOTTISH Labour leader Anas Sarwar has told hapless Douglas Ross he should be "begging for forgiveness" for the damage caused by the Tories. Sarwar blasted the

Scottish Tory leader over Partygate, Covid contracts for cronies and the disastrous Liz Truss budget during a feisty general election TV debate.

He said: "You shouldn't be pleading for votes, you should be begging for forgiveness from the Scottish people."

He also accused SNP leader John Swinney of being the "architect of austerity" during the STV standoff. The war of words took

place during a Scottish leaders debate ahead of next month's election, which also included Scottish Lib Dem leader Alex Cole-Hamilton.

Polls show the SNP in line to lose key seats to Labour on July 4 and the debate was marked by clashes between Sarwar and Swinney.

In one section, Swinney tried to taunt Sarwar by claiming Labour would cut spending by tens of billions of pounds and continue austerity.

Sarwar replied: "Not at all John. Ýou are the architect of austerity in Scotland, particularly around local government.

We have already committed more money to our public services.

"I've already set out how we will get more capital investment." The two also clashed on

Labour's plan for a beefedup windfall tax on oil and gas profits.

Swinney claimed the policy would hit jobs but Sarwar said: "We would do a windfall tax on the oil and gas giants to make sure we're putting more money into people's pockets, to lower their bills, as well as investing in the clean energy of the future.

"And our new deal for working people, will deliver a pay rise for 200,000 Scots who are

now. That's what we would do immediately." Pushed on job losses, he said: "I can understand broken promises from the But let me be really

clear, because it's important for me to give this reassurance. 'There will no cliff edge,

there will be no turning off of the tap, oil and gas will play a significant role for decades to come, and that's not just to protect jobs right now."

Swinney, a hardened SNP slugger, survived the fifteen rounds of attacks by virtue of his experience.

unlikely to go down as a defining moment in the campaign but it confirmed some obvious trends. Sarwar has the momentum with voters. while Swinney is desperately trying to limit his losses to

Police must be able to protect us

SCOTLAND'S national constabulary has struggled from its inception.

The old regional police forces were merged into one in 2013, a time when public services were beginning to feel the strain of Conservative-imposed austerity at Westminster.

The new Police Scotland underwent a drastic round of cost-cutting that saw dozens of police stations closed and support staff roles left unfilled.

Policing had to adapt to the digital age and a new range of increasingly complex online crimes.

It has been a tough decade for frontline officers but most people understand they work hard in a difficult job and routinely put themselves at risk.

The latest survey of rank-and-file officers by the Scottish Police Federation provides a worrying glimpse into the problems they routinely face.

The SPF warns cops are quitting due to a lack of resources and heavy workloads. It believes this could cause serious problems for the recruitment of new officers and keeping experienced cops in jobs.

Many senior officers worked through the Covid years out of a sense of public duty despite being eligible to retire.

Since 2022, many older cops have jumped at the chance to get out, placing a bigger burden on those that remain.

The demands on our police force are increasing at a time when public confidence is sliding.

Policing is Holyrood's responsibility. It's up to the Scottish Government to ensure the service is properly funded.

Oblivion awaits

SO NIGEL Farage has slithered back on to the front line of UK politics.

After a tedious will-he-won't-he routine, Farage said not only is he standing again in Clacton but he's also taking over leadership of Reform UK.

There will be few in Scotland who care about this charlatan's return - the daftie who fooled folk into believing his Brexit fantasy never had much support here.

But there is one good thing about his return to frontline politics - it's the doomsday scenario for Rishi Sunak.

With Labour in the centre ground and a Farage-led Reform hoovering up votes from Brexit true believers, the PM has been brutally outmanoeuvred.



60 more killed including children as Israel expands Rafah offensive

BY CHRIS HUGHES

AT LEAST 60 Palestinians were killed in Gaza over the weekend and yesterday, including three children and a woman, local authorities said.

Meanwhile fierce cross-border fighting between Hezbollah and Israel sent thousands fleeing to underground shelters. Two shepherds died in the fighting in southern Lebanon.

A strike in Gaza's Bureij refugee camp late on Sunday killed four and a second on the Nuseirat camp killed seven.

Prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office has reacted against a three-phase peace deal suggested by the US, which Hamas had responded to positively.

The US plan includes a six-week ceasefire, withdrawal of Israeli troops from Gaza's populated areas and the release of Israeli female, elderly and sick hostages in return for hundreds of Palestinian prisoners. Phase two would lead to the release of all hostages, and Israel would withdraw its forces from Gaza. A permanent ceasefire would be in place. Phase three would involve major

reconstruction beginning in Gaza. Netanyahu's office said it would not agree unless it has destroyed Hamas's military and freed all hostages "before a permanent ceasefire is put in place".

Israel is expanding its offensive in the southern city of Rafah. The invasion has largely cut off the flow of medicine and food to Palestinians, with 37 children dying of malnutrition and 3500 at risk.

Israel said the body of a hostage, Dolev Yehud, 35, was found at Kibbutz Nir Oz near the Gaza border, which Hamas attacked on October 7.

The military also confirmed the deaths of four more hostages, including three who begged for their release.

Amiram Cooper, Yoram Metzger and Haim Peri were all aged 80 or older. The fourth hostage was identified as Brit-Israeli Nadav Popplewell, 51.

Israel said the four men died in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis.

Hamas killed about 1200 in its attack on Israel, and the Israeli offensive has killed more than 36,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza's health ministry.

Former PM Khan wins his appeal over treason case

A PAKISTAN appeals court BY MARTIN FRICKER yesterday acquitted former prime minister Imran Khan of leaking state secrets, his lawyer has said.

Khan was convicted in January of treason and sentenced to 10 years over an incident, popularly known as the cipher case.

He was accused of exposing state secrets by waving a confidential document at a demo. The

government has not made the document public but it is believed to be diplomatic correspondence between the Pakistani ambassador to Washington and the foreign ministry in Islamabad.

Khan claimed the document was proof he was being threatened and that his ousting in a noconfidence vote in April

2022 was a US conspiracy, allegedly executed by the military and the government in Pakistan. US and Pakistani officials

have denied the claim. Despite the ruling, the popular opposition leader will remain behind bars.

The ex-cricketer has been convicted in four cases and awaits other trials, with more than 150 lawsuits filed against him.

SCOTLAND fans in Germany will pay almost a third less for their pints than supporters watching the Euros in UK pubs.

Those following the action on big screens in bars and at UK fan parks can expect to fork out an average of £5.17 for a bevvy, data shows.

This compares to $\pounds 3.58$ for an equivalent pilsner at the tournament – £1.59 cheaper.

Comparison site finder.com, which conducted the study, said: "New research has revealed that Scotland fans travelling to Germany for the Euros this year will pay 31 per cent less for their pints than they do in the UK." It found the biggest savers

will be Switzerland fans who typically pay £6.02 at home.

And Denmark supporters who stream over the border will make a saving of £2.27 per brew.

At the other end of the scale, fans facing the biggest price hikes will be Georgians. Used to paying just £1.63 for a lager, they must cough up an extra £1.95 more than back home.

Those travelling from Hungary will face a pint price hike of £1.90.

Finder.com financial wellness expert Louise Bastock said: "As the Euros come around, many Scotland fans will be looking forward to cheering on their country with a cold pint in

hand. "However, with the average

STORMY Daniels finds it hard to believe crooked Donald Trump can still run for president even if he is jailed, and begs Americans not to vote for him.

The adult-film actress has attacked the businessman's ability to continue his battle for the White House in the November election, calling it a "disgraceful loophole".

Despite Trump being found guilty last week of 34 criminal charges, nothing in the US Constitution forbids him from running. Now Stormy, whose hush-money

payment to stop her revealing details of their alleged affair led to Trump's conviction, has urged Americans to vote for his rival, Joe Biden.

She said: "If Trump is jailed, he cannot vote, but he can still be president.

'Ît is as crazy as the law that prevents you from walking your alligator on a sidewalk on Sundays that still exists in some states. "It's been on the books forever and

it's archaic. Fix it."

Asked about who she will be casting her ballot for on November 5, Stormy, who is a Republican, said she would find it hard to vote for Democrat Biden but would definitely not be backing Trump.

She said: "I would like to encourage everyone to vote.

"I understand not liking either of the candidates... but remember, NOT voting for Biden is the same as

voting FOR Trump. "That's why that is important. How is it that this amazing country that we live in is full of all these amazing people, and yet Trump and Biden are all we have? Like that's it? I just don't understand."

Stormy is unambiguous about who she holds responsible for the political unrest in the States and its 'lack of civility". "It's Trump," she said.

"People have either one extreme view or another.

There is such a small percentage of people in America who are willing to admit that they were wrong, and that is part of the problem with people in general, especially the American public.

"It's 'I'm right, and it's because I said so'. "People just refuse to see the

facts, but even when they are shown the facts, they won't admit that they made a mistake and that they were wrong.

"It is like a cult."

The only three eligibility requirements for a presidential candidate is that they must be a natural-born US citizen, at least 35 years old and have lived in the US for at least 14 years.

Millions of drivers have been hit by the rocketing price of motor insurance over the past two or three years.

Insurers say they are passing on a sharp rise in the cost of claims, driven by a big increase in everything from car parts to secondhand motors.

Many in the industry insist they have been making a loss on motor policies.

But Louise Haigh, the Shadow Transport Secretary, said the Financial Conduct Authority and the Competition and Markets Authority needed to probe the sector.

She said: "Car insurance is a legal requirement and an essential – not a luxury.

"Labour won't sit back and watch while drivers are punished by the out-ofcontrol cost of cover.

We will urgently call in the regulators to crack down on any unfair practices and to come clean on the causes of soaring costs for consumers."

The average quoted price of car insurance leapt by 56.4% in the year to February, Consumer Intelligence found. In February, drivers most commonly

received an annual quote between £500

year to the end of November but still the third-highest annual rise recorded since it began tracking data in 2012.

Some insurers have begun to see a bounceback in profits.

Admiral, the UK's biggest motor insurer, made almost £443million last year, up 23% on the previous 12 months.

in recent history and we faced a cost of living crisis in the UK.

'We maintained pricing discipline and acted ahead of the market to adapt to these trends."

Aviva recently revealed improving profit margins in its UK insurance market.

And motor and home insurer Hastings said profits rose to £32m in the first three months of this year.

The Association of British Insurers said: "The industry is committed to taking action.

"Insurers are facing rising repair costs and other factors outside of their control, with a study from EY estimating for every £1 motor insurers received in premiums in 2023, they paid out £1.14 in claims and operating costs."

Able Seaman Lewis Curl died at St Richard's Hospital in Chichester, Sussex, on May 22.

Å spokeswoman for the Royal Navy said that Lewis was a D-Day veteran who had travelled on a freighter carrying a load of army lorries, transport and fuel which was bombed and sunk off the French coast.

He swam to shore and walked in darkness until he reached safety at a naval base

He was awarded the 1938/45 Medal, the Victory Medal, Atlantic Star and Bar, Burma Star, France and Germany Star, and the Civil Medal.

The majority of the abuse, carried out between 1985 and 2002, was inflicted by Sandra Harper, who forced one child from the age of three to eat her own vomit, poured soap into her mouth, dragged her across a room and hit her on the head. The abuse spanned 16 years.



Biden's son to face gun charge trial


JOE Biden's son has become the first child of a sitting US president to be a criminal defendant after jury selection began in his gun charges case.

Hunter Biden has been accused of lying about his drug use on application forms when he purchased a handgun in 2018.

The 54-year-old could face up to 25 years in prison if convicted of the three federal counts.

He has pled not guilty and argues he is being targeted by the US justice department after Republicans accused him of receiving special treatment.

"He has a routine, going to visit my mum every day and meeting up and socialising with folk. All that has been taken away from him in a matter of minutes."


Graeme has now appealed to neighbours with video doorbells to check their footage from last Wednesday in case it caught something that will bring the heartless thieves to justice.

Campaigner unites people who fell for worldwide scam in group action

A WOMAN who was conned in an international cryptocurrency scam has urged other victims to join a legal action to get their cash back.

My Battle to Take Down otorious OneCoin Cryptoqueen

Jennifer McAdam, whose story is to be turned into a Hollywood movie, lost about £9000 to the OneCoin Ponzi scheme which has defrauded up to £4billion from people around the world. She persuaded family and friends to put in £220,000 before realising the con.

Jennifer, 53, from Glasgow, has campaigned for justice for investors and last year published book Devil's Coin, about her fight against OneCoin boss Ruja Ignatova.

She has instructed top London law firm Mishcon de Reya to represent OneCoin investors. The firm will issue a claim at the High Court and Jennifer called for victims to join the legal action.

She said: "The time for seeking justice and to recoup what was so cruelly and fraudulently stolen from us has come.

"I and so many international OneCoin victims who have already joined the claim refuse to be left as helpless victims. This is our time for justice.

"I encourage anyone who suffered losses to join. It's not only for UK victims, it's an action for the international

OneCoin community. The claim is still open to new members but won't be forever. If anyone is a victim, sign up as soon as you can at onecoinvictims.com."

Those who register will not be asked to pay anything to sign up. Legal costs are being paid for by a litigation funder. Mishcon de Reya said: "We have been

Mishcon de Reya said: We have been instructed to pursue recovery actions on behalf of victims of the OneCoin fraud. We are proud to fight for them."

The group action will allege OneCoin was a fraudulent scheme and many investors were deceived. Jennifer first invested in 2016 after seeing an online presentation. A cryptocurrency expert later contacted her to tell her it was a scam.

Around 70,000 people in the UK are thought to have invested in Bulgariabased OneCoin. Ignatova, known as the "missing cryptoqueen", vanished in 2017 and is on the FBI's 10 Most Wanted list.

The rights to Jennifer's book were snapped up by film studio MGM and Oscar winner Kate Winslet has been tipped to play her.

Jennifer has received death threats since exposing the fraud and was forced to cancel book signings in Scotland.

EVOLUTION A blue shark Snappy move saved sharks 93m yrs ago

SHARKS survived a major ocean temperature spike about 93million years ago by growing longer fins.


The predators of today evolved from stubbier and slower versions during a major episode of global warming, say US scientists.

Huge volumes of lava sent carbon dioxide levels soaring, heating sea surfaces to 28C over a oneor two-million year period. Modern oceans are 20C.

A study of 500 living and fossilised species found sharks responded with elongated pectoral fins.

Phillip Sternes, a biology doctoral student at University of California, Riverside, said: "The fins changed as sharks expanded from the bottom to the open ocean.

Their fins are long and narrow, to minimise the amount of energy needed."



BLACK Lace star Colin Gibb, who enticed the nation to "push pineapple, shake the tree" in 1984 hit Agadoo, has died aged 70, just days before he was due to retire.

His devastated wife Sue Kelly said it was "heartbreaking" to tell fans her "dearest husband" had passed away.

She added: "I love you Colin, we spent 22 years living your Agadoo dream, we were due to retire to Spain on Thursday, you were so happy, so looking forward to our new life, now you're gone. As we used to say, always love you for ever."

Wedding reception staple Agadoo was the pop duo's biggest hit, shifting a million copies to reach No2. The song stayed in the top 75 for 30 weeks.

But the band enjoyed a run of other novelty hits in the 1980s, often centred round cheesy dance routines, including Do the Conga, Superman, Hokey Cokey and Wig-Wam Bam.

And earlier, as a four-piece, they represented the UK at the Eurovision Song Contest in 1979, coming seventh with Mary Ann.

Colin's death on Sunday was confirmed by his former bandmate Dene Michael, who wrote: "So sad to hear the passing of my singing partner with Black Lace. RIP my friend Colin Gibb. God bless. We had some great times together touring the world."

Sue urged mourners to honour her husband's colourful legacy by dressing up in bright outfits similar to the ones Black Lace wore as they led us through their famous dance routines.

She said: "Colin and I talked about our funerals and what we'd want.

"He said his was everyone wearing Agadoo shirts or 's*** shirts' as they were called, to his funeral. So please, everyone welcome, but fulfil his final dream.

"Colin didn't want flowers, he wants any donations to his love of cats. So to a cat charity please.

"Let's honour his wishes, he gave us so many memories. Thank you from his devastated wife Sue x."

EA be your best OOR sleep can make anyone feel exhausted, but the repercussions

Holding tension in your jaw? Lucy **Gornall** finds out why it's important to let it go

MANY of us will be familiar with the pain that comes from tight muscles and joints.

A good stretch or massage can often help alleviate the discomfort. But while your back and legs might be the obvious sore points on your body, it's also worth checking in on your jaw.

In today's busy, high-stress world, it's common to carry tension in the jaw, which can lead to further pains

and problems. Charlotte Mernier, registered osteopath and director of My Osteo London, blames our sedentary lifestyles as well as increased stress and anxiety.

"The majority of people clench or grind their teeth, holding tension in their jaw without even realising it," said Charlotte. "Orthodontic treatments like braces and aligners

can also trigger jaw tensions." You might not be concerned about the health of your jaw, but holding tension there can cause

Temporomandibular Joint Disorders (TMD), affecting the two joints that connect your lower jaw to your skull. "TMD affects one in three, but fewer than 7 per cent of the population seek treatment," said Charlotte.

"The most common symptoms are jaw pains, tension headaches, neck and shoulder tensions and pains, limited mouth opening (less than three fingers width), clicking noise when opening the mouth, eating or

yawning, earaches, tinnitus or a sensation of water in the ear." These can seriously impact daily life, quality of sleep and even

Dally grind

"You may notice symptoms in the morning after clenching your jaw or grinding your teeth during sleep.' Often, dentists will prescribe a

mouthguard to be worn overnight, to avoid this grinding and clenching. Relaxing your jaw is key and there

are simple ways to let go of tension. "First, reduce clenching during the day. Use daily reminders

"

to retrain your brain like an alarm or visual cues," suggested Charlotte.

Practising stressreducing techniques is also important. Regular exercise, time away from technology and even regular breathing exercises will also help.

"Avoid bad oral habits like chewing gum, biting your nails or biting the inside of your cheeks," she added. "When eating, chew slowly on both sides or alternate sides, cut your food into small pieces, avoid hard and crunchy food and prolonged mouth opening,

such as when you eat a burger or

apple." If you smoke, Charlotte says it's best to quit as it can stimulate muscle activity. Sat at a desk all day? "Check your sitting position too and avoid

WORD OF MOUTH Stress can begin in the jaw and cause health problems

for menopausal women might go far beyond that. Research has already shown that sleeping less than the recommended seven to eight hours a night can have an adverse effect on

heart health. But findings from a new US study suggest that, for women going through the menopause, it's not just short sleep duration that can be an issue disturbed, restless sleep can also affect their risk for heart disease and stroke.

The study, led by Columbia University Medical Center in New York City found that women who reported poor sleep quality during menopause were three times more likely to have poor overall cardiovascular health scores.

That means dealing with interrupted sleep should be a priority for women in middle age.

"Studies indicate around 40 to 60 per cent of women experience sleep problems during menopause - most commonly disturbed sleep with lots of interruptions," says Dr Zoe Schaedel, menopause specialist and co-director at Myla Health (mylahealth.co.uk).

"And for some women, who might have been good sleepers before menopause, it's something that can come out of the blue. Typical issues that disturb sleep include night sweats, anxiety and sleep apnoea."

Luckily, there is plenty you can do to improve slumber.

NO TO NIGHT SWEATS

Every evening, our core body temperature needs to drop to help us fall asleep, and it needs to stay low through the night to keep us asleep.

The hormone changes of the menopause make it harder for your brain to regulate your body temperature and can result in hot flushes and night sweats, which can really impact sleep," Dr Zoe says.

"HRT (hormone replacement therapy) can cure the night sweats and can help your sleep in other ways, too. You could also try breathable, cool cotton or moisture-wicking nightwear, sheets and cooling gel mattress toppers. Keep a change of clothing by the bed so you don't wake yourself even more by having to rummage for fresh nightwear."

CHECK FOR SYMPTOMS **OF SLEEP APNOEA**

Sleep apnoea is a condition where the airways of the throat relax and narrow, interrupting normal breathing and disturbing sleep.

"Rates of sleep apnoea double after the menopause, possibly linked to the fact that a drop in hormones, particularly oestrogen, reduces the airway's muscle tone," says Dr Zoe. The menopause transition may also lead to weight gain, which can increase the risk of developing the condition.

"Sleep apnoea is associated with an increased risk of heart disease and stroke," adds Dr Zoe. "But lots of cases in women go undiagnosed, because they can present with more subtle symptoms than men, like loud snoring. Instead things such as morning headaches, nightmares and depression can be



EASE RESTLESS LEGS Restless legs syndrome is a disorder characterised by uncomfortable sensations in the legs when at rest that can only be relieved by movement. The prevalence and severity of symptoms can increase during menopause, possibly due to changes in oestrogen levels, and can stop you from falling asleep and also wake you up through the night.

"Sometimes iron supplements can be helpful. It's always worth having a blood test to check your iron stores if you experience restless legs," says Dr Zoe.

"Daily stretching and moderate exercise can help, consider trying an evening walk. Using temperature will improve symptoms for some people by alternating hot and cold water on the legs. If the symptoms are persistent and are getting in the way of sleep, a number of medications can help, so do discuss with your doctor to find out about options."

KEEP BODY AND MIND ACTIVE A study published in

the international journal Health Promotion Perspectives found that when menopausal women took part in a three-month physical activity programme, walking for between 30 and 45 minutes

walking for between 30 and 45 minutes daily at a moderate to brisk pace, those who rated their sleep problems as severe fell from 28 per cent to 6.5 per cent. Keeping your mind active can also increase your sleep drive, so read books, do puzzles and learn new things.

LET IT GO Research with women going through menopause has found that waking at night and then worrying about how a night of poor sleep is going to affect them the following day can

"There are lots of strategies to try to calm yourself, such as slow, diaphragmatic breathing, cognitive defusion – a process whereby you try to separate from your thoughts to allow you to gain



perspective and not get caught up in unhelpful negative thought cycles.

"Another relaxation strategy which is very helpful is progressive muscle relaxation where you systematically tense and relax the muscles in your body from head to toe."

DON'T CANCEL PLANS It's tempting, after a bad night, to duck out of social events, forgo exercise and stay at home to try to catch up on sleep, but that can be counter-productive.

"Generally speaking I usually suggest continuing with your daily activities regardless of how well you have slept," says Dr Maja.

"By getting on with life we're taking back control and saying that poor sleep doesn't have the power to hijack our

events, but try not to lives. That enables us to reduce the power of insomnia and thereby make it easier to sleep going forwards.

"Cancelling plans to see friends or to exercise or do something which would otherwise be good for our health and wellbeing may also impact negatively on

our mood, which can affect our sleep. "There are limits of course. If somebody has had very little sleep for several days and they're struggling with their cognitive functioning then it might not be helpful to continue with their everyday activities."

SCHEDULE WORRY TIME Menopausal changes in

hormone levels may influence neurotransmitters in the brain responsible for regulating mood, which could explain why women are more susceptible to anxiety at this time.

Feeling anxious can disrupt our sleep and lead to restless nights filled with worry. "To combat this, we need to 'retrain' our bodies and brains to know that nighttime is for rest and daytime is for thinking," says Dr Maja.

"The best way to do it is to put an alarm on your phone for a time during the evening which suits you. It's best to do it not just before you go to bed, perhaps 7pm or 8pm. Then set aside 15 to 20 minutes to write down all concerns and worries that come into your mind. Invite them in.

"Then give yourself time to make any necessary plans or action points you need, but after that, shut your book, put it away and tell yourself, 'Your worry time is over'.

"Then when any worries show up late at night you can tell yourself, 'I have already spent enough time worrying about this today, nighttime is for resting."

MARKING the 80th anniversary of the invasion, this unique series is the story of D-Day, told by those who actually experienced it.

It relives one of the most extraordinary days in the history of modern warfare using powerful eyewitness accounts, many of which have never been heard.

The series features rare audio interviews recorded with D-Day survivors, including Royal Navy Marines James Kelly and Warwick Nield-Siddall, sourced from archives around the world. Young actors, cast to resemble the interviewees at the time of the war, lip-sync the original testimony to recall moments of bravery, fear, chaos and confusion. These memories are

interwoven with fragmented documentary-style dramatic recreation and expert narration.

Together, they tell the story of the fateful Normandy invasion and the bloody battle that followed, in which more than 100,000 people lost their lives.

Once you get used to the style, with young actors fronting the real words, it's a compelling insight into that deadly day.

What makes Jen special? Absolutely nothing. Yet.

With a tongue-in-cheek sense of humour, this has a fantastical element, but also a relatable mundanity.







Graham pedals on Paris BY FRASER WILSON

FIN GRAHAM has been on the fast track to success ever since his mum kicked off at a PE teacher for offering him a head start on school sports day.

The cyclist was born with two club feet and has no calf muscle on his right leg, meaning he has to wear a splint.

But the Scot has never looked for favours in the ferociously competitive world of elite level sport.

After working to the top of British cycling winning two silvers medals on his Paralympics debut in Tokyo three years ago – the 24-year-old is now gunning to go one better in Paris this summer.

Graham is set to be part of Team GB after a stunning rise has seen him claim 13 world medals, including six golds, since being thrust into the spotlight in Japan.

He will most likely go head-tohead with team-mates Jaco van Gass and Ben Watson for the C3 individual pursuit and C1-3 road race titles.

In the pursuit in Tokyo, he lost out to van Gass despite setting a new world record as his mate smashed that by 1.013 seconds moments later.

It's a remarkable tale for the Strathpeffer cyclist but to him a normal one thanks to a mindset forged by mum Dee and dad Drew.

He told **Record Sport**: "I don't know any different. I've been lucky that my parents have provided me with the opportunity to do this. They've always encouraged me.

There was a point in primary school where my PE teacher wanted to give me a head start in a running race. I was well up for that because I'd probably have won!

"But my mum kicked off. She said 'Absolutely not', I shouldn't get any special treatment. Looking back, that makes a difference. There's no reason why I should have got that. I've not found anything I'm unable to do, I've learned to live with it to explore options and get to a Paralympics.

^tI'm coming into these Games a lot more confident, it's been a good couple of years. I'm hoping to continue and turn the silvers into golds in Paris. That'd be the pinnacle?

Graham's dream is being supported by National Lottery funding and he added: "Thousands of athletes on world class programmes are supported by the National Lottery. It helps fund training facilities, the camps, the coaches. It's massive."

FRENCH OPEN

The world No.1 only finished his five-set victory over Lorenzo Musetti at 3.08am local time on Sunday.

And back on Court Philippe-Chatrier at 4pm yesterday, the Serb appeared to be limping to a last-16 defeat against No.23 seed Francisco Cerundolo when he needed treatment on his right knee in the second set.

Djokovic blamed the clay court and told supervisor Wayne McKewen: "I screwed up my knee because I made a quick move. I'm sliding and FROM NEIL MCLEMAN IN PARIS slipping all the time." He pulled up in agony chasing a drop shot in the fourth set and the defending champion seemed set for his earliest exit here since 2009.

The Argentine led by two sets to one and then 4-2 in the fourth - he even had a break point to serve for the match at 5-5.

But after being only five points from defeat, superstar Djokovic somehow shook off his latest injury to win 6-1 5-7 3-6 7-5 6-3 6-3 in four hours and 39 minutes.

It was the longest match of his Boland Garros career and followed the four hours and 29 minutes he needed to beat Musetti. After raising his arms in triumph, the 37-year-old told the crowd: "I need to say a big thank you because like in my last match, this victory is yours.

"The last match I was two sets to one down and in the fourth set you gave me so much energy.

Tonight you did the same. Three or four times I was points away from losing this match. "I don't know how I found

a way to win this match. The only explanation is you." Ďjokovic's victory also broke

two records he had shared with Roger Federer. It was his 370th win in Grand Slam matches to reach

his 59th Slam quarter-final. He

is now just three wins away from a new record of 25 singles titles in the big four.

Alex de Minaur became the first Aussie man to reach the last eight at the French since his mentor Llevton Hewitt in 2004... with the help of his 14-year-old super fan Paul.
