



## Imran wants his cell probed after 'solitary' claim disputed by government

- Deputy attorney general submits report on facilities available to ex-PM in prison
- SC reserves judgement in NAB amendments case; takes issue with NAB claim of recovering \$10bn in Reko Diq case
- Judge asks politicians to fix accountability law rather than asking courts to intervene

**ISLAMABAD:** After the federal government furnished 'pertinent evidence' to challenge PTI leader Imran Khan's claim of solitary confinement in Adiala jail, the former prime minister asked the Supreme Court to order an inspection of his jail cell.

Chief Justice of Pakistan Qazi Faez Isa, however, observed that court may assign a judicial officer to conduct a discreet check, but did not propose any date.

On Thursday, the five-judge Supreme Court also reserved its ruling on the federal government's interlocutory appeal against the Sept 15 majority judgment that ruled amendments to the National Accountability Ordinance (NAO) illegal.

At the flag-end of the proceedings, Attorney General of the Pakistan (AGP) Maroof Usman Aslam told the Supreme Court that the federal government had furnished a report with photographs of Imran Khan's jail cell. The report contained details of

visitors from Sept 2023 until May 30, 2024, saying during his period Imran Khan met his family members, lawyers and politicians.

If the court deems it necessary, it may appoint a judicial officer in the form of a commission to verify the facts as submitted before the court, the report submitted in view of the statement made by Imran Khan at the last hearing on May 30 regarding his living conditions said.

The facilities available to Imran Khan in jail include an LED screen, room cooler, study table and chair, an exclusive corridor for a walk twice a day, a separate kitchen with a menu decided by him, books, an exercise video, and a stretching belt for fitness, as per the report.

Imran 'guaranteed' by SC remarks

Dressed in a turquoise shirt, Imran Khan attended the proceedings for about 30 minutes from jail via video link and complained about the remarks made by the Supreme Court.

## Govt lays 'controversial' ordinances before NA

- Parliamentary nod sought for NAB tweak to increase remand period to 40 days, hiring of retired judges for election tribunals
- Law minister opposes judicial probe into wheat scandal; says it's the job of executive, parliament

**ISLAMABAD:** As it faces challenges to the recently promulgated ordinances about the accountability law and the elections, the federal government on Thursday tabled the Election (Amendment) Ordinance 2024 and National Accountability (Amendment) Ordinance 2024 through supplementary agenda while the PTI described the laws 'politically motivated'.

The NAB law increases the remand period from 14 days to 40 days; whereas the election law allows the government to appoint retired judges to the election tribunals, a move already challenged in the Islamabad and Lahore High Courts.

Even before Law Minister Asim Naqvi laid before the house the ordinances, PTI-backed Sindh Assembly Chief Whip Asmer Dogar, while speaking on a point of public importance, criticized the NAB ordinance.

He recalled that in April 2023 the PDM government reduced the period of physical

remand from 30 days to 14 days but now the period has been increased to 40 days because the government was afraid of Imran Khan.

Speaking about the changes to the election law, he said in 2013 a committee on electoral reforms decided that retired judges would not be appointed to election tribunals. The law minister said that the Elections Act 2017 had a provision for

retired judges, which had been restored through the recent ordinance.

He said the decision was made because high courts were 'overburdened' with 82,000 cases and could not spare judges. He noted that ordinances were promulgated when the National Assembly was not in session, adding that the ordinances have become properties of the house and will be

## Pakistan elected to UNSC for historic eighth term

**UNITED NATIONS:** Pakistan was elected to the UN Security Council on Thursday, securing a nonpermanent seat for a historic eighth term with an overwhelming 182 out of 190 votes.

There were a total of 190 votes cast, abstained, and chose voted against Pakistan. The required two-thirds majority to get elected was 124, and Pakistan received 182 votes.

Since it was a second ballot, it was clear who voted against Pakistan, but some UN diplomats named India, Israel, and Armenia as the countries that opposed Pakistan. Pakistan will now represent the Asia-Pacific group on the UN Security Council for the next two years — from 2025 to 2026.

Only 10 out of the 15 members of the council are elected, with no election for the five veto-wielding permanent members — Britain, China, France, Russia, and the United States.

Seats on the council are allocated to regional

## 40 injured as Chaman protests take violent turn

**QUETTA:** At least 40 people, including 17 security officials, were injured in Chaman on Thursday amid escalating tensions as protesters, incited by the arrest of their leaders of a sit-in, launched attacks on government buildings and installations, demanding immediate release.

The unrest spread across the border town, with protesters staging rallies and demonstrating, effectively shutting down the city.

The arrested leaders were part of a month-long sit-in in Chaman against the government's decision to only

allow those with valid passports and visas to cross the Chaman border crossing. Before, Pakistanis and Afghans would cross the border open showing their respective identity cards.

Officials said clashes started when the protesters tried to block major roads, including the national highway linking Quetta with Kunduz, disrupting traffic with barricades with sticks.

However, the local administration, along with security forces, including police, levies and personnel of Frontier Corps, lobbed tear gas shells to disperse the mob and restored traffic by removing barricades from the highway.

During their march, the protesters also staged a demonstration in front of the Deputy Commissioner Office complex and looted stores at the building and locally closed all shops at Mall Road and other business centers. They also beat some shopkeepers with sticks.

According to local officials, the demonstrators also disrupted communication systems and attempted to cut power supplies to the Frontier Corps (FC) base.

They looted stores at the FC headquarters in Chaman, prompting the security officials deployed in the area to fire blank shots and lob near

# Govt gives tentative plan to present budget on 12th

NA speaker forms three interim committees to get approval for pending bills.

ISLAMABAD: The federal government on Thursday announced a tentative plan to present the country's budget for the next fiscal year on June 12 as National Assembly Speaker Ayaz Sardar, using his special powers, "appointed" three standing committees on an interim basis after approval of pending bills.

According to an official announcement by the National Assembly Secretariat, the speaker appointed these standing committees using his powers under Rule 215 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the National Assembly, 2007.

The committees, comprising only five members, mostly from the treasury benches, also held their meetings on Thursday and approved various bills that had been laid before the National Assembly during its recent session.

It was due to lack of understanding and some differences that the government and the opposition have so far failed to agree on the composition and the chairmanship of the committees, even more than three months after the election of Shehbaz Sharif as the prime minister.

Under the rules, the committees are required to be formed within 30 days after the prime minister's election.

#### Budget session plan

The announcement regarding the formation of the interim committees came after the speaker presided over a committee meeting of the parliamentary leaders to discuss the schedule of the budget session that has already begun on Thursday.

According to an official announcement, the members of the treasury and the opposition members agreed that soon after presentation of the budget, the NA would go on a week-long recess due to Eid ul Azha.

A general debate on the budget would start on June 10 which would continue till 24th. The members will take part in the debate and voting on motions on June 26 and 27 whereas the budget will be passed on June 28.

The announcement says that this plan is not final and there can be changes in it according to the situation.

The meeting was attended by Deputy Speaker Syed Chuliam Mustafa Shah,

Law Minister Asim Naseer Tariq, Dr Tariq Faizal Chaudhary and Haseebur Rehman of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N), Syed Nasheed Qamar and Iqbal Jakhrazi of the Pakistani Peoples Party (PPP), Aamir Dogar and Ali Mohammad Khan of the Saini Ittehad Council (SIC), Aamir Ali of the Muttahida Qaumi Movement (MQM), Noor Alam Khan and Shafiqah Akhter of the Jamiat Ulema-i-Islam (JUI-F) and Khalid Magri of the Balochistan Awami Party (BAP).

According to sources, the critical National Economic Council (NEC) meeting, essential for reviewing the current year's macroeconomic situation and development programmes and approving the next year's economic and development agenda, has yet to be scheduled and the government has yet to constitute the National Economic Council.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Finance Minister Muhammad Aslamengroh are currently on a visit to China and thus unavailable to lead key consultations until Saturday which could be the first available date for an NEC meeting, provided the relevant documentation with provinces, the prime minister and the president are circulated through electronic means for constituting and notifying the NEC.

Standing committees

Meanwhile, due to a delay in the process of the formation of the standing committees and amid criticism by the members from the treasury as well as the opposition, the speaker formed the committee on information and broadcasting, maritime affairs and communications, but only to approve some bills based on the already promulgated ordinances which were laid before the assembly by the government amid opposition's criticism.

The meeting of the standing committee on information and broadcasting was presided over by PPP's Syed Nasheed Qamar whereas PML-N's Bilal Aslam Kiyani and MQM's Aamir Haq presided over the meetings of the committee on maritime affairs and communications, respectively.

These chairmen later attended the meetings of the other two committees as members with JUI-F's Noor Alam Khan and Aamir Sajid of the Balochistan-Pakistan Party.

The bills passed by these committees were the Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 2023, the Pakistan National Shipping Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 2023, the Pakistan Postal Services Management Board (Amendment) Bill, 2023, and the National Highway Authority (Amendment) Bill, 2023.

## LHC orders police to recover PTI activist's brothers

Azhar Mushwani's father claims his family is being 'politically victimised'

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court on Thursday directed the Punjab inspector general of police to recover two brothers of PTI social media head Asif Asrar Masud who allegedly picked up by law enforcement agencies.

Justice Syed Shahzad Ali Rizvi gave the order

while hearing a petition filed by Qasim Rafiqul Rehman, the father of the alleged abducted men — Zahoorul Hassan and Maheen Hassan.

A counsel for the petitioner alleged that the sons of his client were in illegal custody of the law enforcement agencies.

The judge later ordered the lawyer why the petitioner did not file an application with the police. The lawyer said both siblings were also previously detained for 100 days and then released.

The petitioner was also picked up, he said, adding that the petitioner and his family were being targeted for their messages about the arrests.

Political victimisation:

When Justice Rizvi asked the counsel who had detained the petitioner's sons for 100 days, the lawyer said the authorities did not disclose this and the two individuals were later released.

The judge later ordered the Punjab IGP and the Counter-Terrorism Department (CTD) to recover the individuals and produce them before the court on Friday.

IG Punjab Dr Usman Ansar and Additional IG CTD Punjab Waheed Sial didn't immediately respond to the text messages about the arrests.

LAHORE: An anti-terrorism court on Thursday granted post arrest bail to seven activists of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) in a May 9 case of attack on Lahore Corps Commander's House, commonly known as Jinnah House.

Judge Khalid Arshad allowed the bail petition and directed

each suspect to furnish a security bond of Rs 100,000.

The suspects were Talha Misbah, Moina Tahir, Muzammil Arif, Asif Asrar Abbasi, Usman Khan, Zubair Gorai and Javed.

Separately, Judge Khalid Arshad resumed the jail trial of the Jinnah House attack case in the ECP Lahore jail.

The judge directed the prosecution to distribute copies of the

charge sheet to furnish a summary among 266 suspects on June 13.

Among the prominent accused, PTI-Punjab President Dr Yasir Hussain, former governor Omar Sharif Chishti, Senator Ejaz Chaudhry and former provincial minister Mian Mahmood Rashed are already in jail.

Several other suspects including fashion designer Khadija Shah, former MMA fighter Samiul, social media activists Tareeqa Raja and Ayesha Ali Bhutto have been released on bail.

Searser Road police registered the case against leaders and workers of PTI for attacking and vandalising the Jinnah House during the protests of May 9 last year against the arrest of former prime minister Imran Khan.

regarding the ban on live-streaming of his case.

He said it had taken him to learn that the Supreme Court while rejecting the live-streaming of the case had stated something as if he was some kind of an "irresponsible and dangerous character who will abuse the occasion for point scoring or grandstanding".

On June 1, the court ruled that live-streaming was in exclusive domain but exercised with caution to avoid apprehension of exploitation, misuse of facility for obnoxious personal purposes and to prevent the possibility of grandstanding while the nation watches.

In response to the co-PM's remarks, the CJF, however, observed that the judges were not here to explain themselves and asked Mr Khan not to stray on grounds, which were already irrelevant and ultimately

came to the court in appeal.

Justice Aameruddin Khan also observed that the issue of live-streaming had already been decided.

Speaking during the hearing, Imran Khan was of the view that the NAB chairman should be appointed by the Supreme Court to prevent abuse of power and added that amendments in the NAB law meant to serve "certain leaders".

#### Abuse of NAB law

Justice Javed Khan observed that there was no denying the fact that NAB had always been biased against the elected representatives but the remedy to rectify this misuse did not lie with the courts but with the political leaders. "Tomorrow you can come to parliament and make a good amendment law," Justice Mansukhlal observed. Imran Khan said NAB "always listens to the

third camp" — a purported reference to the establishment.

Referring to the impact of the amendments in the NAB law, he requested NAB recover Rs 10 billion from year 2000 to 2017, which jumped to Rs 20 billion from 2017 to 2021. He also argued that foreign exchange which was being deposited because the hard earned money was being misappropriated by the elites to the foreign lands.

He also cited a 2021 study by the IIS which revealed how elites of the developing world had parked \$7 trillion in the West through money laundering.

The CJF wondered if money laundering was a crime, then why did the former premier introduce an amendment to retain such corruption cases? At this, Mr Khan explained that the amnesty scheme was introduced to "legitimize" the black money.

The CJF, pointing towards

Senator Farooq Naik and PTI's Faisal Javed, asked them to sit together in parliament to solve the crisis.

The court also took cognizance to the NAB report, in which it showed the recovery of \$10 billion in the hand of Rehmat Dog and asked the NAB additional prosecutor general (APG) whether this statement was "factual or dishonest".

The court even warned of contempt notice for claiming to recover \$10 billion, wondering if NAB had the authority to misleading the court.

He then asked the NAB APG not to afford the court in future and ordered the NAB chairman and the prosecutor general to furnish a fresh report regarding the break down of the NAB budget for the last 10 years, as well as its annual budget.

Earlier, senior counsel Khurram Harris also concluded his arguments.

## ECP to challenge high court order to appoint more tribunals in Punjab: CEC

Raja wonders if ECP's role is that of a mere post office; PML-N Islamabad MNAs express no confidence in appellate body

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) will challenge Lahore High Court's (LHC) order to notify six more election tribunals to hear poll disputes in Punjab, the electoral watchdog's chief said on Tuesday.

According to the lawyer, the tribunal was informed in writing that the ECP had notified the writing notifications.

"Despite that, the election tribunal issued time-barred petitions for hearing and sent notices to all parties to submit a reply," he noted.

After the law, election tribunals, comprising high court judges, are constituted after the final result is notified and losing candidates could file petitions within 45 days after the notification of election results.

The lawyer added the tribunal had even issued notices to the ECP and wondered if it was unprofessional to do so.

The ECP's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa member, Rameezullah Khan, also asked if the tribunal could issue directions to the body that created it. In response, the lawyer said the tribunal can't give directions to the ECP.

The PML-N lawmaker's counsel said they were given "a last chance" in the absence of any evidence and alleged the tribunal was "not working as per procedure".

"We fear that the election tribunal will not give us justice," the lawyer added. He continued that the petitions were to be submitted in the election tribunal latest by April 16, but were submitted on April 15.

He accused the tribunal of not working impartially and accused it of committing "serious mistakes".

The petitions should have been dismissed for being filed after the 45-day deadline had elapsed, the

counsel contended.

The lawyer for Mr Naseem, the winning candidate from NA-48, also accused the tribunal of violating trial procedures. He claimed that the tribunal acted as the high court itself, for which it had no mandate.

The tribunal was "not conducting a fair trial", the lawyer argued, adding that the list of witnesses was sought after the framing of issues. He sought the case to be transferred to another tribunal, and if none was available, a fresh one should be constituted.

PML-N MNA Tariq Faiz Chaudhry's lawyer also expressed confidence in the tribunal, arguing the entire proceedings of the tribunal were "illegal". "We are not being given a fair trial, and we don't expect justice from it," he said.

The lawyer for PTI-backed candidate Muhammad Ali Bokhari, who was the losing candidate in NA-48, said the tribunal was comprised of a high court judge, and the applicant had alleged bias against the court.

"Applause Raja Khurram Nawaz has submitted their application to delay the proceedings," he claimed.

Naqeeb Shehryar Naqeeb, the lawyer for PTI-backed candidate Shoaib Shahzad, cited a 2014 verdict of the Supreme Court stating that apparent partiality in court decisions is not bias. He said the Elections Act clearly stated that the tribunal should dispose of election petitions within six months.

During the hearing, Mr Shahzad urged the bench to adjourn the hearing till Monday, as the ECP decision to hear the case had been challenged.

The ECP contended that the bench would hold the hearing if a stay order had been issued.

Three burn to death after bus collides with motorcycle near Uthal

KHUZDAH: At least three people were burnt to death and 12 were injured in a collision between a passenger coach and a motorcycle near Uthal, Liaquat, early on Thursday morning.

Officials said the coach carrying 28 passengers, including women and children, was en route to Quetta from Karachi when the tragic incident occurred.

The vehicle collided with the motorcycle, which was reportedly transporting tourists en route to Rawalpindi area between Bala and Uthal on the Quetta-Karachi national highway.

At least 10 passengers survived their fiery jump off the coach, but three, including the motorcycle, were burnt to death.

The 12 injured also included women and children.

Locally SSP Nasheed Alam said the fire was brought under control in the wee hours of Thursday and all injured were shifted to the district hospital and later to Karachi for treatment.

SSP Alam also told Dawn.com that while the cause of the fire could not be ascertained,眼见为实 attributed the accident to speeding and reckless driving.

Balochistan Chief Minister Karim Raig expressed grief over the accident and ordered an investigation into the cause of the accident.

"Rescue operations began immediately, and seven of the injured passengers were taken to the hospital," read a statement posted on the official X account of the government of Balochistan.

"The accident, which was caused by recklessness and led to a loss of life."

Rescuers cut struggled into Pakistan in often transported from Balochistan's border areas on vehicles, including motorbikes, cars and buses.

The movement of oil-pipe grime risks for vehicles and passengers and has also resulted in major catastrophes.

In January 2019, 27 people were killed when a bus collided with a truck loaded with oil drums and caught fire near Lambe Cross.





## Addressing contempt

**T**HE judiciary should have long ago redrawn the line that separates acceptable and unacceptable criticism. It is becoming quite believed that matters have gone too far. As the Supreme Court proceeds in its contempt case against Senator Fawad Viwela and MNA Murtaza Kamal, 24 television channels have been issued show-cause notices for airing problematic remarks made by the two lawmakers, ostensibly in violation of broadcast regulations. Some weeks ago, Messrs Viwela and Kamal had, on separate occasions, made several insinuations regarding the judiciary. Their remarks were aired live by many news channels, prompting concerns over what, prima facie, seemed to be an open attack on senior judges. The incident prompted the SC to take notice and summon the two lawmakers for an explanation.

While Mr Kamal subsequently arranged an apology, Mr Viwela has not appeared remorseful. It may be recalled that Mr Viwela doubled down on his stance some two weeks ago in a speech he made in the Senate, in which, protected by House privileges, he said he stood by every word uttered in his press conference. Another senator also seized the occasion to level his own condemnations against the judiciary. Separately, a bill was presented to the National Assembly secretariat seeking a ban on individuals with dual nationality from serving in the judiciary, ostensibly to target a justice of the Islamabad High Court. Given the context in which these developments took place, the SC had to take a forceful stand. It must now take this case to its logical conclusion. The TV channels that have been put on notice must explain themselves and commit to following broadcast regulations, while errant lawmakers must pay a price for their ad hominem attacks. It has been noticed that, in recent years, prominent individuals have taken to assailing the judiciary whenever rulings have gone against them. This has slowly given rise to a culture normalising contempt. It is imperative that this culture be dismantled and the boundaries of acceptable criticism defined once again.

Lastly, it is encouraging to note that the judiciary, while demonstrating more strictness on the matter of contempt, is taking a measured approach to rectifying the problem. Pema, which had earlier issued a blanket ban on the coverage of court proceedings in its "over-cautious" response to the court's concerns, has been admonished for an illogical order. The apex court has warned it against "scratching hurdles in the way of court proceedings" and promised action if it did not comply. Separately, the IHC chief justice has also reaffirmed the media's right to report fairly on ongoing proceedings. Pema should now withdraw its order forthwith and let the media do its job. Its strange dictat has caused enough trouble for reporters merely covering their beat.

## Averting disaster

**P**AKISTAN stands on the precipice of yet another potential flood disaster. According to the National Disaster Management Authority, the country is likely to experience 40-60pc more rainfall than usual during the coming monsoon season. This excess precipitation, coupled with melting glaciers and a westerly weather system, are said to have the potential to trigger flooding reminiscent of the devastating 2014 floods which claimed 347 lives. The abnormal rains are expected to begin on July 25 and persist into August, threatening to inundate northern Punjab and its eastern rivers — Ravi, Jhelum, and Chenab. Additionally, flash floods are anticipated in the northern regions due to four forecasted Glacial Lake Outburst Flood events. These floods, while expected to be less severe than the catastrophic floods in 2010 and 2022, still pose a substantial threat. The 2010 floods affected over 20m people, causing nearly 2,000 deaths and significant infrastructure damage. Similarly, the 2022 deluge resulted in 1,676 fatalities, injuries to 12,867 individuals, and affected 33m people, decimating over 4m acres of crops and 1m livestock. These events underscore the impact of climate-induced disasters on Pakistan's population and economy. As things stand, we can ill afford another one of such magnitude.

With the anticipated floods less than two months away, we must prepare by briskly implementing several key measures. To begin with, the government should expedite the reinforcement of embankments and drainage systems in vulnerable areas to prevent overflow and waterlogging. In addition, conducting public awareness campaigns is essential to educate communities on emergency procedures and evacuation routes. Moreover, pre-positioning relief supplies, such as food, water, medical kits, and temporary shelters, in strategic locations will ensure rapid distribution during crises. Strengthening early warning systems to provide timely and accurate flood forecasts will enable proactive evacuations. It is commendable that the NDMA has endeavoured to get ahead of the situation. It conducted multi-hazard simulation drills focused on improving coordination among provincial disaster management agencies and showcased mock responses to simulated scenarios. By learning from past experiences — the most recent calamity was less than two years ago — Pakistan can better protect its citizens and minimise the devastating effects of natural disasters. The time to act is now, before the rains hit and history repeats itself.

## Overzealous state

**I**NSTEAD of addressing the core issues that fuel discontent amongst the citizenry, the state prefers to go after those who highlight and criticise its deficiencies. This is borne out by the case of Kashmiri poet Ahmed Farhad Shah. Mr Shah was reportedly picked up from his Islamabad home on May 15 and "surfaced" two weeks later in an Azad Kashmir village after the Islamabad High Court was approached to seek his whereabouts. The poet remains in detention, denied bail, and faces a slew of charges, including in the Anti-Terrorism Act. His apparent "crime" is the fact that he published material linked to the antigovernment protests that had rocked AJK last month, with prosecutors alleging Mr Shah "incited hatred". His counsel have argued that the poet was in Islamabad at the time of the alleged offence in Muzaffarabad.

Ahmed Farhad Shah is not the first critical voice to be detained for simply voicing an opinion. Over the decades, countless poets, writers, journalists and political activists have been hauled up under similarly onerous charges. Terrorism charges are an extreme overreaction to publishing a poem or a critical social media post. Moreover, the way in which the poet was apprehended, and later "surfaced", speaks of the dubious methods the state employs against dissenters, while circumventing due process. Instead of hunting down dissenting voices, and accusing them of spreading violence, the government does little about those sectarian and communal groups whose actual bread and butter revolves around promoting hatred. The state should consider dropping the extreme charges levelled against Mr Shah and let him return to his family. Sadly, instead of honestly confronting the economic and other issues that are fuelling discontent in AJK, Gilgit-Baltistan, Balochistan and elsewhere, the state prefers to deal with the symptoms and not the cause of the malaise. After decades of applying failed prescriptions, it is time for a new approach to alleviate popular concerns.

## No country for the young

Our fear of young people and their potential makes us want to control them.

A STUDENT is expelled for bringing a subah to the university hostel and playing it. A university in Lahore expels two students when they embrace each other after one of them proposed to the other publicly. Both students got harassed and picked up by every so-called responsible university across the country. Policing what students wear, especially females, is common on many campuses. Women are told they cannot wear jeans or rights, etc. Some universities even have rules on how close men and women can come when they are talking to each other. Student unions continue to be illegal.

What are young people supposed to do? How are they supposed to get ready for life after university if we are not going to allow them to talk to each other, interact with each other, be responsible for what they wear? They are over 18 and adults by all definitions, and have confidence in themselves and their choices? It is okay for these young people to get married and have children and to vote once they turn 18, but it is not okay for them to talk to the other gender or decide how much distance to keep from others or what to wear?

As soon as it comes to women's dress, people ask: are you saying we should allow people to wear whatever they want? What if someone comes to university wearing clad or in very revealing clothes? But have we seen a lot of women walking around on Pakistani campuses dressed like this? Pakistan already has decency laws. They should apply to campuses as well. Why should there be separate laws for university campuses?

It is not about clothes, poetry or music. It is about policing. It is about the fact that we do not trust young people and we are afraid of young people. And by we, I mean we as a collective — especially the élites and people who have power and privilege. Of all constitutions, it is the

young who have the potential to shake existing power structures. But that can only happen if the youth are organised, if they have spaces to reflect on what they stand for, what they want and how they wish to go about achieving it. The power holders are a group of country boys.

Pakistan is a young country. The 2017 population census showed that 40-51 per cent of our population was under 15 years of age, and another 15.39pc between 15 and 24 years. Almost 60pc of the population, therefore, was under 24 years of age. This country should be for young people; it should work to ensure that the youth, the future of this country, get every opportunity to develop. But our fear of young people and their potential makes us want to control them.

Dr Asif Majid and I were the lead authors of the 2017 UNDP *National Human Development Report for Pakistan*, which was on youth. As part of the data collection for the report, and among other things, we also did a nationally representative youth perception survey. Some of the facts that came up in the survey were very revealing. For instance, 94pc of the surveyed youth said they had no access to a library, 95pc had never been to a cinema, 94pc had never been to watch a sports event, 40pc said they played sports infrequently, and 85pc said they had no access to the internet. I saw a report on youth survey conducted recently by the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics and the numbers quoted there, in terms of youth having access to entertainment and other healthy activities, were very similar.

But the rhetoric in the country is that youth development is a national priority, as we want to benefit from the " dividends" of this demographic goldmine — is, a high number of youth. We want

them to get technical education so that they can be gainfully employed and can be exported as labour to other countries if possible. We want them to be computer literate so that we can increase our software and IT-based exports. We want them to be entrepreneurs and risk-takers so that they can be job creators rather than job-seekers. But we are not willing to give them space for debate and discussion. We do not want to empower them, allow them the freedom to think and act, and we definitely do not want them to be "political". With the voting age at 18 years, we want them to vote but we do not want them to be political, or politically aware, and we definitely do not want them to take part in political or question the political settlements/arrangements in the country.

This is in the case of the problems. We cannot have the spirit of risk-taking and inquiry in entrepreneurship and/or business and not in other areas. If the youths are going to be empowered to be the vanguard of business, entrepreneurship and the computer sciences, they have to have the same opportunities in other areas as well. They will have to have a say in the political, social and economic developments in the country. They will need to be in political parties, they will need to be in assemblies, they will need to be members of all sorts of governance forums. To do all of the above, they will need to develop their confidence in their own abilities and thinking. We will need to create the space for young people to do that. If we are not willing to give them space, it is hard to expect that we will have a leadership in the future — in all walks of life — that is different to the disastrous one we have today. ■

## Can courts fix the climate crisis?

THE realities of climate change that seven-year-old Rabia Ali had warned us of eight years ago have hit home. Take, for example, the latest heatwave which thousands are experiencing across Pakistan. "It's like sitting in a sauna," says Nasir Janjua, a resident of Jacobabad, Sindh, where temperatures have reached up to 53 degrees Celsius.

In 2010, Ali had taken the government of Pakistan to court for violating her fundamental "right to life" by missing out on Tharparkar and polluting the air and the water she flourished and consumed. She reminded the state of its legal obligation towards its citizens, warning that its apathy towards climate change could become an existential threat in times to come.

A year before, Asghar Leghari, a lawyer, had also charged the state with violating his fundamental right to life due to its inaction in respect of its climate change adaptation targets which, he warned, impacted the country's water, food and energy security. It was the year when Pakistan, along with almost every nation in the world, signed the Paris Agreement, promising to limit any rise in global average temperatures to well below 2°C — in fact, a maximum of 1.5°C — above pre-industrial levels. Leghari recalled the court's historic ruling to be "affirmative" and thus quite significant, after it set up a climate commission to oversee the working of the environment department.

The right to a clean environment may not already be mentioned in Pakistan's Constitution, but the courts have interpreted the Constitution to include it as a fundamental right. In the "Shelkar vs Wadia" case in 1994, Justice Salma Akhter explained that the right to "live" does not only mean "the negative or animal life or mere existence from conception to death". Life, as he saw it, should "include all such amenities and facilities which a person born in a free country is entitled to enjoy with dignity, legally and constitutionally".

Although there is much awareness as well as acceptance about climate change since 2015, bringing about a systemic change has yet to happen. Perhaps we need to change the way we are looking at the phenomenon; perhaps it should be given a human face. That is what the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan is calling for —

bringing climate change out of the fields of science and environment and examining it through the lens of climate justice.

The year 2024 started with a skewed and alarming weather phenomena for Pakistan. Clouds on the heels of a scorching December in 2023, the new year began with some snow, but it was too little, too late. In the plains, the winter season began with a pall of dense smog. Then April received above-average rainfall, making it the wettest month since 1961, resulting in over 140 fatalities in KP and Balochistan, not to mention damage to homes and schools.

And now the country is reeling from extreme heat. That is not all. Climatologists say soaring temperatures may lead to glacial melt with

the danger of glacial lake outburst floods and flash floods.

So far, these climate disasters have failed to move the government to pass over the plethora of climate policy documents it has crafted over the years and find solutions from it. Imran Khan, a climate expert, calls for a "people first" approach when policymaking happens. "Without involving and engaging with the communities for whom the policies are made, these strategies will remain nice-looking glossy documents with little bearing on the welfare of folks who truly need it," he points out.

Reporting on the loss of life, property and infrastructure during the several climate crisis — floods, landslides, torrential rainfall, smog, melting glaciers, wildfires and deforestation — the country grappled with the annual State of the Human Rights report for 2023, put the government in the dock and brought attention to the inadequate assistance, delayed reconstruction

and lack of preparedness for climate-induced disasters on the part of the state.

One way of holding the government accountable is to sue it to court, like Ali and Leghari did. Both brought human rights into the climate change equation.

To be fair, Pakistan is not alone. The story is the same across the globe. Ecological lawyer David Boyd, the outgoing UN special rapporteur on human rights and the environment, believes that a game-changing strategy of slapping the state with a slew of court cases will make the state legally obligated to regulate businesses to respect climate, environment and human rights.

But Leghari warns that taking the state to court is no substitute for the "robust policy-making" that climate expert Khalid referred to earlier. "Courts can be a good tool," he says, but only if litigating is done strategically for it to have an impact.

Due to lack of subject matter expertise in the judiciary, in Pakistan at least, courts may come up with a "whimsical and not very thoughtful prescriptive", which, although given in good faith, may end up having a negative impact on the larger scheme of things. However, if it is business as usual — inaction on the part of the government and justice denied — it will only exacerbate the climate crisis.

Thus, the ongoing climate change conference organised by the Law and Justice Commission of Pakistan to be held on June 8, 2024, in Islamabad could not have come at a more opportune time. Renowned speakers like Dr Farzana Hassan and Justice Munawar Ali Shah, Ayesha A. Malik and Javed Hasan will feature at the event. The legal fraternity will deliberate on the climate-related challenges Pakistan is grappling with in different sectors, including agriculture, water, energy, etc., while considering the governance challenges that go with them, and play a part in remedying and holding the state accountable for its obligation to its people and to the planet. At the same time, it is only fair to the state that the people be made responsible for protecting, conserving and restoring the Earth. ■

## Humility vs conceit

In the very beginning of the second chapter of the Quran (Surah al-Baqara), God describes two kinds of people with two kinds of minds. The first five verses tell us that the Holy Book is a guidance for the ones who believe in the unseen (ghayr), they believe in what the Prophet (PBUH) has brought and what the earlier prophets preached. Moreover, they spend what they have been blessed with, and believe in the afterlife. In describing these attributes, the verses stress a humble approach towards accepting God's guidance and to show an attitude of submission towards what one does not know.

On the other hand, right after those verses, the Quran tells us about those who adamantly refuse to submit and mislead others. To those individuals, the divine scripture proclaims, it makes no difference whether they are warned or not. The Quran says that God has sealed their hearts, eyes and ears, and for them it is punishment. It implies that this attitude itself invites punishment, because the refusal to see, hear, and reflect obviously blocks the grace of God from entering the heart. The Quran says God does not like those who are arrogant and wrongdoing (4:36).

In life, we face many kinds of people, some who are very humble, even seeking the truth. They find themselves in the first group mentioned above. Their quest or search makes them humble and receptive to learning. They, in simple terms, have a more open mind. This connects them with many others who might be seeking similar answers to their questions, thus becoming co-travelers with other seekers.

On the other hand, there are those who claim to know too much, too early; they feel full of knowledge and wisdom. Such people claim to have more answers than questions. Their knowledge (or ignorance?) makes them arrogant, assuming that they have found the final answers to all the perennial questions of life and death. Their attitude, then, makes them condescending towards others, and least willing to listen to alternative perspectives.

These people, then, tend to create a "ghair" around themselves in which they live and function. They tend to forget that when we open our mouth to describe others, we only describe ourselves, showing the limits of our own knowledge and understanding.

Let us find some more relevant verses from the Quran that portray or partially humble versus arrogant people.

There are many verses that portray the behavior of humble people, how their hearts are soft and softened when they look at the miracles of God in the form of

verses (apart in Quranic language). There is also admonition in the Quran for those whose hearts are soft, and when verses are recited to them, their hearts "soften", leading to prostration with humility: "Only those believe in Our Signs, "Verily, when verses are recited to them, fall down in prostration, and celebrate the praises of their Lord, but are they never put up with pride?" (2:152).

Still another verse cautions, "And to Allah prostrate all that is in the heavens and all that is in the earth, of the live moving creatures and the angels, and they are not proud!" (62:45).

Talking about their humility, the Quran says, "... When the verses of the Most Beneficent (Allah) were recited and recited unto them, they fell prostrating down prostrating and weeping" (19:58). Their hearts are so softened that they come to know when the beautiful verses of the majestic Quran are recited to them. They are led to this state because their hearts are wide open to the glory and majesty of God's creation in the world in the forms of miraculous creation.

On the other hand, various verses of the Quran portray arrogant people's hearts as stones, or even worse. In a particular verse, talking about hardened hearts, it describes them as "... like a rock and even worse in hardness.

For among rocks there are some from which rivers gush forth..." (2:274). Their hearts are hardened so much that they are unable to yield anything good. Thus, if one wants to check if we are humble or arrogant, we must check ourselves against the descriptions of these verses.

Very often knowledge itself gives a lot of pride to people, who then boast and make claims of having absolute truths. This very knowledge hardens their hearts and they go on challenging others, believing they have the absolute truth, leading to arrogance. What needs to be remembered is that knowledge has many dimensions and it is interpreted from many angles. It is only through dialogue, discussion and bringing new angles to old truths that we tend to learn new ways of interpreting the old truths. These interpretations depend on how many branches of science we know. The more we know, the better informed we are. ■

## Budgeting chaos

"STABILISATION" is the favorite word of mainstream economists. The IMF loves it, and has recently hinted that Pakistan's economy has "stabilised" enough for it to dole out another three-year bailout close to \$6 billion that our finance部长 have been craving.

I cannot understand what has been stabilised, except if a slight dip in inflation from over 30 per cent to something like 20% is a sign of major progress. The economy is still mired in an endemic balance-of-payments crisis, which stacks up all foreign exchange reserves to regularly pay off the interest on our \$135bn external debt burden. And what in "stabilisation" about taking on even more debt from the IMF, Gaff and other "friends" via the fantasmic SBIC, and an increasingly hollowed-out CPEC?

None of these basic facts about Pakistan's political economy will be acknowledged during the upcoming budget announcement, scheduled for June 12. The largely meaningless exercise is being presided by chauvinists engaged in an intense civil conflict and bureaucrats do their own bidding. They'll get their act together in time for the budget performance and bally about some numbers, but it doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that nothing is about to change.

Blue-collar working and white-collar salaried classes will be burdened with even more regressive taxes, while public spending on anything other than yet more big infrastructure will decrease again. There will be no honest figures circulated about matters that actually affect the mass of the working people — unemployment, the huge shortage of affordable housing in metropolitan Pakistan, and the multi-pronged deprivation of the almost 40 million landless people in the rural areas.

Finance Minister Mohammad Aslam said recently that "Gone is Pakistan's economy does not require too many policy prescriptions; that established strategic objectives simply need to be executed." Among other things, the finance minister has been very going-ahead privatising all public assets, and inviting investors to develop roads, pillars, exploration mineral and other resources. He did not mention real estate, because that is a sector in which investors and developers broadly enjoy windfall profits.

Pakistanis of all kinds and donors are on the same page about these strategic objectives. In fact, they've been saying more or less the same thing for decades in the name of "stabilisation". What's remarkable is that there is little critique of these now-banal, straitjacket policies. I think it is a damning indictment of many purportedly independent voices that they continue to accede to

such tired refrain.

In much of the Western world, the mantra of liberalising trade and finance while unashamedly privatising public assets has given way to talk of state-led industrial policy — the US is even explicitly enacting protectionism vis-à-vis China. But in Pakistan, the "agents" are unable to think beyond standard neoliberal speak.

It is no wonder that real estate moguls like Malik Riaz become powerful billionaires who cannot be named. Such figures, as recent events show, deeply embroiled in the palace intrigues that constitute our establishment-centric political order. Which brings me to the role of the establishment in our crisis-ridden economy: will any of our "agents" summon the courage to talk about the defense budget or hidden subsidies over the next few days?

We do require new policy proposals, Minister Sajid. Most of all, we need to talk about the redistribution of wealth. Our is a country where a small ruling class — including a khaki bourgeoisie — owns the vast majority of land, industrial and financial capital. This class is content to continue milking itself, while the IMF and other donors are happy to allow such concentration so long as they get their interest payments back in the name of "stabilisation".

If the status quo remains intact, more and more of our rapidly expanding young, working population will seek out livelihoods, business and other basic needs in what is passed off as the "informal" economy. If our ministers, donors and other experts had a finger on the pulse of the people, they would spend more time thinking about this than playing with macroeconomic numbers and budgeting chaos; not least because it is also in the "informal" economy that the ruling class makes billions, undercutting the working poor in Charsadda, Tariq and so many other places. But our policy debate should rather live in the pretend world of "stabilisation". ■

### No agreement yet

[It] will be remembered that the major first step, a ceasefire accepted by the two Governments, was achieved on January 1, 1949." — News agency

## Power sector woes

MANY are seen these days wondering if there is a solution to the country's power conundrum which is miring up the economy. Surprisingly, however, similar one-sided contracts with independent power producers (IPPs) were repeated in the 2000s. This was done mindlessly as if nonprofessionals were dealing with them. Relevant experts were not involved in the exercise.

The Power Wing of Wapda was dismantled into several generation and distribution companies on the advice of the World Bank to improve efficiency, but it proved otherwise. Above all, there has been no accountability and corruption in rampant. There is no quick fix to correct the power problems. Undoubtedly, we have to live with the follies of the policymakers.

## Ticking time bombs

IT is not surprising that the economic woes of Pakistan have driven many towards using liquified petroleum gas (LPG) as a relatively inexpensive fuel alternative. In such a scenario, implementing mandatory safety checks, similar to those outlined in the Mineral and Industrial Safety Rules 2010, is a key first step. Furthermore, public awareness campaigns are needed to educate the people about proper handling of LPG cylinders.

In essence, this is not just about saving money on fuel. It is about safeguarding lives. We cannot afford to turn a blind eye to this persistently growing threat. The future of our people, especially our children, depends on immediate and effective action. Undoubtedly, the lack of proper regulatory oversight is exacerbating the issue, putting lives at risk.

The current dire situation demands immediate government intervention. Implementing thorough inspection protocols and mandatory cylinder replacement may prevent tragedies. Ensuring that LPG cylinders are safe and drivers are held accountable will be fundamental to any such intervention.

## SCCI chief wants 'Tajir Dost Scheme' enforced for 20 years

Bureau Report

PESHAWAR: Sarhad Chamber of Commerce and Industry president Riaz Ishaq on Thursday called for the approval of the Federal Board of Revenue's Tajir Dost tax scheme by parliament for the next 20 years.

He also said the government should promise not to impose new taxes on businesspersons after the implementation of the scheme.

"There is a need for promoting close liaison and coordination between chambers, the business community, and tax authorities to take joint measures for amicable resolution of the traders' issues," Mr Ishaq told businesspersons during the visit of Peshawar Regional Tax Office chief commissioner Zafar Iqbal to the SCCI premises here.

Mr Ishaq was accompanied by chief coordinator for Tajir Dost Scheme Nasim Mr. RTO Peshawar commissioner Dr Syed Farooq Janil, and additional commissioners Aslam Dheewa.

The meeting was also attended by SCCI vice-president Easat Khan Afridi; former presidents Haji Mohammad Afzal, Zahidullah Sherwan and Sherzad Billoo; former senior vice-presidents Ziaul Haq Sarhadi and Imran Khan Mohmand; executive members Jayed Ahdkar, Hamza Ibrahim Butt, Mohammed Ismail Soh, Kausar Amin, Nadeem Riaz, Saeed Gul, Ishfaq Mohammad, Bachti Zaman, Atif Sharzaie, Malik Khalid Farooq Ihsanullah, and Attaul Ahmad, traders, importers, and exporters.

The RTO chief commissioner and other officials briefed participants about the salient features, importance, and benefits of the Tajir Dost Scheme and said the initiative was meant to broaden the tax net.

The SCCI president said reforms were required to simplify the taxation system and bring the tax rate to a single digit.

He also said traders should be facilitated under a one-window operation.

Mr Ishaq said Pakistan annually paid Rs 8 billion on head of debt servicing for internal and external loans, while the same amount was generated through various taxes, which was insufficient for the country's progress.

He called for the broadening of the tax base without imposing new taxes on taxpayers.

The SCCI chief said the business community wanted to see Pakistan join the ranks of developed nations, but for that purpose, authorities should adopt policies that were favourable and friendly to business, trade, and industry.

## PHC reserves judgement over plea against postponement of Senate polls in KP

Petitioner Azam Swati wants decision of ECP declared illegal

PESHAWAR: Peshawar High Court on Thursday reserved its judgement over a petition challenging the decision of Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to task Senate polls in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa until the swearing-in of the provincial assembly failed to comply with the high court's orders to administer oaths to the lawmakers elected on reserved seats for women and non-Muslims.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Muhammad Attique Shah and Justice Shaukat Ahmed heard arguments advanced by lawyers appearing for petitioner Azam Khan Swati and ECP.

Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf leader and former senator Azam Swati had challenged the ECP's March 28 orders about the possible postponement of Senate polls in the province. He had requested the court to order ECP to hold Senate polls in the province on April 2 as scheduled.

The petition was filed on March 30 before the ECP's April 2 order for post-

ponement of Senate polls in the interest of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa until the administration of certain MPAs elected on reserved seats.

On March 28, ECP, in response to the application of opposition free奔走 MPA-elects, declared that if the speaker of the provincial assembly failed to comply with the high court's orders to administer oaths to the lawmakers elected on reserved seats for women and non-Muslims,

Petitioner's counsel Ali Zamani argued that Senate polls were conducted across the country, but ECP postponed the same in KP in light of the high court's order for the provincial assembly speaker to administer oaths to the members elected on reserved seats. He said that the order of ECP was illegal and unconstitutional.

He said that ECP didn't have the power to postpone Senate elections in the province when they were held in other parts of the country. He stated that the petitioner was a contesting candidate, but he was neither heard by ECP nor was he issued any notice for it.

The counsel said that during previous

hearings the court had asked ECP to submit schedule of the polls to the court.

Lawyer for ECP Mohsin Kamran Siddiqui said that the court had not asked for the schedule rather it had sought a report from the commission. He stated that he had submitted a report on behalf of ECP to the court.

When the bench inquired from him about latest situation in the matter, he said that Supreme Court of Pakistan had adjourned to June 24 hearing of the cases related to non-validation of reserved seats to Senate elected Council (SEC) and allotting the same to other political parties.

He stated that the apex court had ordered that it would conduct day-day hearing in these cases.

He said that one of the cases pending before ECP was about the PHC's decision to dismiss the plea of SIC against the ECP's March 1 order to deny that party seats reserved for women and non-Muslims.

He said that the court had issued a stay order in that case.

The other case, he said, pertained to ECP's order for KP Assembly speaker to administer oaths to those opposition members and to allow and facilitate

their voting in Senate elections. He stated that in case the apex court decided to allot those seats to SEC, it would benefit the party in the polls.

Justice Shaukat inquired from petitioner's counsel as to why court was not informed to these members on the order of high court. The counsel replied that the assembly was not in session, therefore, court couldn't be informed to them.

When the bench again inquired as to why its order was not implemented, the counsel said that the petitioner was a contesting candidate in Senate polls and provincial government could give a reply to it.

The bench wondered if Senate polls were conducted and the apex court upheld the judgment of the high court about administering oath to the members, then what would happen.

The petitioner's counsel stated that on the same analogy what would be the status of polls conducted if the apex court decided the matter in favor of SEC. He wondered whether results of polls in other provinces would be reversed then.

Advocate Syed Ihsan Shah appeared for Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz and opposed the petition.

## MTRA starts registration of people for organ donation

Speakers say lack of awareness hampers treatment of patients requiring human organs

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority on Thursday launched registration of people wanting to donate their organs to save lives of others and calls by experts that lack of awareness has been hampering treatment of patients requiring human organs.

In Pakistan, the number of renal transplants is about 1,800 against the need of 10,000. There is huge deficit of demand and supply, which can be bridged through scaling up awareness regarding organs

donation," Prof Asif Malik, the chairman of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority (MTRA), said.

Speaking at a ceremony held here to mark World Transplant Day at Khyber Girls Medical College, he said that they launched a portal where the people could donate their organs that could be used for saving the lives of needy patients.

Lack of donation culture has led to buying of organs from people. It is illegal and entails complications. Donation of organs as per law is a source of healthiness for both donors and recipients," he said.

Prof Malik, a former transplant surgeon at Institute of Kidney Diseases (IKD), said that they had authorised 13 hospitals for organ transplant including renal and eye where people could undergo procedures in the safest manner by

professional surgeons.

"Recently, we organised 'transplant games' wherein about 100 patients, who had recovered after transplant, took part and enjoyed," he added.

Dr Attar Rehman, also a former transplant surgeon at IKD, said they were starting 'deceased donor scheme' to retrieve kidneys of the people with dead brain and transplant the same to patients with damaged urinary organs.

"Similarly, we are also considering launching pair donation in which families can exchange kidneys to match recipients to resolve the issue of mismatchability of both," he added.

Prof Samailah Jan, the director of Pakistan Institute of Contemporary Ophthalmology (PICO) at Hayatabad Medical Complex, painted a grim picture of organ donations in the country and said that they had to wait for donations from

the USA and other countries to carry out corneal transplants.

There are 3,700 patients awaiting their transplants at PICO only and we urge people to start donating corneas so as to help restore the sight of the people blinded by cataracts and other incidents. We are way behind from Nepal, Iran, Sri Lanka and India where people are in the habit of organ donation," he said.

Prof Qibla Ayaz, the former chairman of Council of Islamic Ideology, said that they had forwarded recommendations to government after in-depth research that organ donation was allowed in Islam.

"We need to establish an endowment fund to strengthen transplantation in the province," he added.

Khyber Medical University Vice-chancellor Prof Ziaul Haq, KGMU Dean Prof Zafar Aman, HMC Prof medical director Shahzad Akbar Khan,

deputy director of FIA Saeedullah Khan and others also spoke on the occasion.

Slides were also displayed by students to send a message that donation was legal and people must donate organs.

Health Minister Syed Qasim Ali Shah said that doctors in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were capable to carry out transplants and other latest procedures in the field of medical sciences.

He stressed the need for preventive measures to put brakes on diabetes and other ailments.

He said that government was providing free health services to people on Sehat Card Plus as per vision of PTI founder Imran Khan. He claimed it was not possible even in developed countries where people paid premium to get health insurance.

"In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, all people get evidence treatment services," he added.

## FBR to miss FY24 target by Rs175bn 'due to stay orders'

Govt plans to raise tax rates and withdraw exemptions

**ISLAMABAD:** The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has estimated a shortfall of Rs175 billion in the current fiscal year (2023-24) as the superior courts have suspended the implementation of new measures announced by the government to tax the rich.

"We have informed Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif about the amount stuck due to decisions by superior courts," a tax official told Dawn on Thursday.

The courts stayed collection of super tax and windfall income tax.

According to the official, since 90 per cent of the cases pending in courts pertain to large taxpayers, including banks and multinational corporations, tax will be collected easily from them during the last 10 days of this month.

Assistance has been sought from the Attorney General for Pakistan in the matter, he added.

In the last budget, the government imposed new tax measures on wealthy taxpayers earning more than Rs400m.

"We have requested the prime minister to resolve these cases before June 30," the official said, adding that otherwise the revenue collection target of Rs9,415 billion for the current fiscal year would be missed by a large margin.

The Supreme Court directed wealthier taxpayers to deposit 50pc of the super tax in February this year. As a result, the shortfall is now expected to be under Rs200bn, according to the official.

In FIMFY24, the FBR collected Rs1,722bn against a target of Rs8,162bn. The FBR will need to raise Rs1,25bn this month to meet its FY24 budgetary target of Rs9,415.

The June target was projected at Rs1,780b, but it now adds up to Rs2,060b due to the backlog from previous months.

The Finance Division, FBR, and the IMF have differing revenue collection targets for 2024-25. All three have different projections based on their calculation, the official said.

According to him, there is a disagreement regarding taxation measures for the coming budget. The impact in

money terms of those differences range from Rs60bn to Rs180b.

In an effort to generate more revenue, the government plans to increase the current tax rates and eliminate sales tax exemptions, a politically sensitive matter.

According to FBR estimates, autonomous revenue collection based on GDP growth and inflation will be around Rs1,550b in FY25.

In addition, the federal government will review the revenue measures in consultation with the IMF for the next fiscal year.

During the recent IMF technical meetings, the FBR revenue target was projected to be between Rs1,240b and Rs1,260b, based on expenditure projections.

However, the finance division's initial estimate for FY25 is Rs1,300b.

Contrary to these two projections, FBR has projected that revenue collection will be Rs1,610 for 2024-25. However, the final revenue collection target will be determined by the finance division, the official said.

According to the official, the actual tax target would be set when the government releases numbers for inflation and GDP growth.

The government will need to boost imports in the next fiscal year as well.

The IMF has asked the government to match the salary slab to the incomes of pensioners. However, no final decision has been taken so far.

The FBR has asked FBR to collect taxes from traders and wholesalers, who are currently not contributing to tax collection.

The IMF focus is on sales and income taxes, particularly withholding taxes. Currently, the sales tax exemption exceeds Rs1,200.

The government will face a difficult decision to revoke exemptions for food, international agreements, and pharmaceutical products. A few items, such as insecticides and solar panels, may be subject to sales tax.

At the same time, the government is expected to raise existing withholding tax rates and introducing new ones, such as revising the tax on cash withdrawals from banks.

Furthermore, the finance ministry is considering imposing a tax on the import of exempted raw materials while increasing tax rates on the existing ones.

## 'Shun protectionist approach for economic stability'

**LAHORE:** Pakistan needs to shift from protectionism to an economy-centric approach for the sake of stability and recovery, says Prof Dr Hassan Mahmood Din Qadri.

"Economic recovery is impossible without minimizing energy areas for local and foreign investment and without shedding the protectionist approach," the deputy chairman of Mardhiyah University's board of governors said in a pre-budget seminar on Thursday.

He said that the international striking and approach of open economic trade should be adopted so that local and foreign investors can confidently invest in the areas of their choice.

Economist Dr Ammarullah, Service Vice-President of Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry Zafar Mahmood, Dr Muhammad Tayyab and Dr Khurram Shahzad also expressed their views at the seminar.

"Many areas closed to local and foreign investors. The state needs to take bold decisions in view of the huge financial restructuring the country. Otherwise, the crisis will deepen with each passing day," Dr Qadri warned.

Despite its reservations about the Tax Reforms Commission and Asset Declaration Scheme, challenges like a complete tax system, red tape, resistance to change because of widespread corruption, and infrastructure deficiencies are hindering substantial progress, he said. He added that external factors like IMF programmes have also influenced policy directions, often recommending austerity measures and structural adjustments.

The economist suggested taking onboard stakeholders for effective changes in the tax structure, cutting the number of tax payments, a fair distribution of taxes across sectors, and bringing retail, real estate and services sectors onto the tax net.

He suggested a shift towards a direct taxation system, phasing out subsidies to nonproductive sectors, targeting support for the have-nots, repealing the minimum turnover tax and instead introducing basic rate directly, removing discretionary tax exemptions granted to state-owned entities, and curtailing the discretionary power of taxmen.

Dr Qadri also proposed elevating the CNT exemption limit from Rs10 million to Rs30 million to incentivize smaller enterprises to formalize their operations.

## First cherry shipment sent to China

**ISLAMABAD:** Pakistan exported its first batch of fresh cherries to China using a reefer container and projected a total quantity of 200 tonnes by the end of this month.

An official announcement from the Trade Development Authority of Pakistan (TDAP) said the first consignment arrived, followed by 12 tonnes, beginning Monday and lasting until June 30.

The country's success in exporting the fruit is due to the glycoside agreement signed between China and Pakistan in 2022, under which Beijing granted Islamabad market access for fresh cherries.

China imports most of its cherries from Chile, with an annual demand of around 250,000 tonnes valued at \$3 billion.

Approximately 5,000 tonnes of cherries are produced in Gilgit-

Baltistan per annum. These cherries are mostly sold at low prices in local markets. The protocol with China has allowed the growers to seize the Chinese market's demand.

To implement the protocol, the TDAP and Department of Plant Protection (DPP) assisted eligible orchard owners in registering with the General Administration of Chinese Customs (GACC). Pakistan Horticulture Development & Export Company (PHEDEC) also conducted cherry product development activities to educate farmers on producing sweetened varieties like black and French cherries.

With these efforts, more than 500 cherry orchards and a cold storage and packing house at Rahim Yar Khan are registered with GACC. The approval of the cherry orchards and the processing facility led to the expedition to export fresh cherries to China. The National Logistic Cell (NLC) has provided the required reefer containers.

The Export Development Fund (EDF) meets the logistic cost of cherry export.

TDAP Chief Executive Zahoor Motivala said that growers will be major beneficiaries of the export of cherries. He said that TDAP and PHEDEC are trying to ensure growers get maximum benefits by exploring the huge Chinese market. He also noted that the protocol on cherries was signed in November 2022, and within one year, we have not only registered more than 500 cherry orchards with GACC but also PHEDEC has built growers' facilities.

PHEDEC chief executive Athar Hussain Khokhar said that by producing the required varieties of cherries, the country can capture a large chunk of the \$10 billion Chinese cherry market.

"Proximity and growing demand for the fruit in the Chinese market is a major competitive advantage to GR growers," he added.

## Index falls below 74,000 on dismal outlook

**KARACHI:** Amid growing uncertainty about the economic outlook ahead of the budget unveiled, which has been delayed to June 12, the bourses spell continued at the stock market for the fourth consecutive session on Thursday, dragging the benchmark index below the 74,000 level.

Ahsan Mehmood of Arif Habib Corporation stated that stocks closed lower due to concerns about economic uncertainty. Investor expectations for a cautious MPC monetary policy and subdued growth impacted investor sentiment.

He said reports of likely hard conditions in the new IMF programme, such as a hike in power tariffs and fresh taxation measures in the budget 2024-25, contributed to the bearish close.

In its market report, Topsis Securities Ltd noted that equities started the session positively. However, the index could

not sustain the 74,000 level due to a selling spree triggered by concerns that the government may raise taxes on dividends, capital gains and interest income in the upcoming budget.

Key contributors to the decline included Fauja Engineering Company, OMCDC, Marti Petroleum, MCB Bank and PSL, which collectively subtracted 136 points from the index. However, Bashir Alitalah Systems Ltd, Lucky Cement, Engro

Corporation and Miller Tractor attracted some buying interest, adding 65 points.

As a result, the benchmark index hit an intraday high of 74,391.13 and a low of 73,768.40. However, the KSE 100 index settled at 73,862.93 points after shedding 156.51 points or 0.49pc on a day-on-day basis.

However, the overall trading volume edged up by 1.4pc to 352.71 million shares. However, the traded value tumbled 24.87pc to Rs12.87bn day-on-day. Stocks contributing significantly to the traded volume included WorldCall Telecom (17.63m shares), Kohinoor Spinning (14.53m shares), Diversi Motors (13.69m shares), Fauji Cement (13.23m shares) and Ghani Global (13.12m shares).

The shares registering the most significant increases in their share prices in absolute terms were Hallmark Company (Rs14,988), Sapphire Textiles (Rs13,261), Phillips Morris (Rs12,281), Hatta Ltd (Rs7,291) and Data Ages Ltd (Rs6,191). The companies registering the major decreases in their share prices in absolute terms were Sanger Engineering Works Ltd (Rs2,721), Service Ltd (Rs2,521), Nasheed Pak (Rs38,323), Exide Pakistan (Rs32,111) and Rathan Marine Products Company Ltd (Rs2,261).

Foreign investors turned net sellers as they offloaded shares worth \$10.65m.

## SBP's reserves rise, banks' fall by \$116m

**KARACHI:** The State Bank of Pakistan's (SBP) foreign exchange reserves have remained around \$9 billion since the IMF's \$1.1 billion arrived in April, reflecting no other inflows.

The central bank reported on Thursday that its reserves increased by a meagre \$26 million to \$9,109m during the week ended May 24 without mentioning the source of this inflow.

However, the reserves of the commercial banks fell by \$116m to \$5.1bn during the week, bringing the country's total down by \$100m to \$94.2bn.

Admittedly, sources in the financial circle revealed that Pakistan is facing a daunting challenge. The country is expected to pay up to \$10bn in debt servicing till July 31, which is more than the SBP's overall forex holding. This dire situation underscores the country's urgent need for immediate assistance to bolster its reserves.

Earlier, there were widespread reports in the media about a potential loan package from the IMF in July. While sources have indicated the possibility, it is important to note that the amount required is significantly larger than the current reserves, which could pose a challenge for the country.

However, it was also observed that the financial experts were hopeful for yet another infusion of Chinese loans. Pakistan owes about \$50m to China. The prime minister, finance minister and foreign minister are in China just before the budget. Speculations about the follow-up of loans were stronger due to the visit.

## China's probe moves moon samples to spacecraft

BEIJING: China's Chang'e-5 probe transferred samples collected from the moon's far side to a spacecraft in lunar orbit on Thursday, state news agency Xinhua reported.

After receiving the samples, the uncrewed spacecraft will fly back to Earth, with an expected landing in China's Inner Mongolia region on June 25. If successful, China will be the first country to ever return lunar material from the side of the moon that permanently faces away from Earth.

The Chang'e-5 probe took off from the moon's far side on Tuesday, after spending two days on the surface digging up samples. While on the moon, the probe unfurled a Chinese flag made of fabric, a material that is abundant on the lunar surface.

The mission has been a source of national pride in China. The probe's launch last month drew thousands of tourists to the southern island province of Hainan and its every subsequent move, from landing on the moon's far side to the return journey to Earth, has been a viral item on Chinese social media.

The successful transfer on Thursday of the previous samples, which scientists hope can reveal more about the origins of the solar system, also comes as the United States expresses growing concerns about the advances in China's lunar and space exploration programmes.

Acknowledging the Chang'e-5 mission on Wednesday, US chief Bill Nelson congratulated China, but asked it to be more open about its space activities. Nelson has repeatedly warned that the United States is in a "space race" with China to go back to the moon and that China would claim any natural resources it found there as its own.

Responding to Nelson's comments, Chinese Foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said on Thursday that the Chang'e-5 probe's successful sampling on, and departure from, the moon's far side represented historic steps that "marked a peaceful use of outer space" and that many countries praised the mission.

Mao criticized the Wolf Amendment, a law passed by the US Congress in 2013 that banned NASA from collaborating with "China or any Chinese-owned company unless such activities are specifically authorized".—Reuters

## Himalayan blizzard kills nine Indian trekkers

NEW DELHI: At least nine Indian trekkers died in the Himalayas after getting trapped during a blizzard, authorities said on Thursday, as rescue teams searched their bodies and five survivors are safely.

The Indian Air Force shared footage on Thursday that showed rescue teams working near a helicopter in the snow-covered mountains.

The group of climbers from the southern state of Karnataka were hit by heavy snowfall in the remote mountains of Uttarakhand state in north India, said Krishna Praty Gossala, a top

Karnataka minister. "Snow intensified into blizzard. By 8pm, 2 trekkers succumbed to bad weather. Snow and wind made movement impossible. Visibility dropped to nil. They huddled together for the night on the route. Some more succumbed in the night," Gossala wrote in a social media post on Wednesday.

A guide with the group alerted rescuers about the situation on Tuesday evening after trekking for a while to find mobile network connectivity, and teams reached the spot early on Wednesday, the minister added.—Reuters

## Rights body urges Biden to halt arms supply to Israel

WASHINGTON: A civil rights organisation urged President Joe Biden on Thursday to "definitively" halt all weapons deliveries to Israel and pressure the US ally to end its bombardment of the Gaza Strip, sending a reminder that his support for Israel could hurt him among Black voters in November's election.

The call by the National Association for the Advancement of Coloured People (NAACP) was a rare instance of an influential body taking a position on US foreign policy towards a country without a significant Black population. It appeared likely to deepen the Democrat president's electorate challenges as he tries to back a largely abroad and temper travel among his supporters at home. The NAACP urged Biden to return the Israeli prisoners and called upon Israel to "completely" reverse its policy of "seemingly an offensive strategy that is aligned with international and humanitarian laws".

The NAACP calls on President Biden to draw the red line and indefinitely end the shipment of all weapons and artillery to the state

of Israel and other states that supply weapons to Hamas and other terrorist organisations. It is imperative that the violence that has claimed so many civilian lives, immediately stop," the organisation said in a statement.

The NAACP statement represents the latest warning sign that Biden may pay a price at the ballot box among Black voters on Nov 5 for his staunch support of Israel.

Black voters have long been a loyal Democratic constituency, and they played a significant role in Biden's victory in 2020 when he beat Republican Donald Trump, whom he faced again this year. Biden is often lauded for enthusiasm for Biden among Black voters.

Earlier this year, a group of more than 1,000 Black pastors called on Biden to secure a ceasefire in the crisis. A poll by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in March found that 59 per cent of Black Americans believe US military aid to Israel should only be used for self-defence and in accordance with human rights standards.

Biden's re-election campaign is not as concerned that Black voters will shift toward Trump as they are that too many of them may sit out the election due to lack of enthusiasm, campaign officials say.

After growing domestic pressure and international outrage, Biden passed a shipment of боевые танки (battle tanks) last month to avoid their possible use in Israel's assault on the Gaza city of Rafah. But the pause was limited, and the US remains the top supplier of military aid to Israel.

Biden said last week Israel had proposed a fresh Gaza ceasefire in exchange for the release of prisoners. He called on Hamas to agree to the new offer, saying it was the best way to end the conflict.

### Model leadership

In an interview, NAACP President Derrick Johnson said the US needs to show moral leadership and stop sending weapons to Israel because of civilian deaths.

Johnson said the NAACP's decision to speak out was driven in part by young Black Americans horrified by the images of dead Palestinian civilians on their smart phones.

"It's raising a lot of questions around why our tax dollars are being used to harm civilians," Johnson said.

Democrats are deeply divided over Biden's handling of both the Gaza crisis and the US campaign against it, a Bloomberg/Gallup poll found.—Reuters

## Boeing's Starliner safely docks with space station

WASHINGTON: Boeing's new Starliner capsule and an uncrewed two-member NASA crew safely docked with the International Space Station on Thursday, meeting a key test in proving the vessel's flightworthiness and sharpening Boeing's competition with Elon Musk's.

## US couple hooks safe stuffed with \$100,000, in ruined notes

NEW YORK: Two modern day treasure hunters in the United States appeared to strike gold when they discovered a safe stuffed with \$100,000 in cash — but there was a catch. The notes were ruined.

Barbara Agustini and Jason Karr, both in their 40s, have been propelled to celebrity status beyond their modest fishing community after making the discovery in a New York pond over the weekend.

"It's surreal, I thought it was a joke until I saw it with my eyes," said Barbara Agustini.

Though not the pair's first time discovering a safe, it was their first one containing more than random odds and ends, although because the safe was not airtight many of the notes were wet or mild-mould.

Fearing the money could be linked to crime, the couple went to the New York police, noting they "didn't want to have a problem on our hands".

But police washed their hands of the cash.

"As a general matter, found property valued at ten dollars or more is required to be reported to, and deposited with, the police," a police spokesman said.

"In this instance, the value and authenticity of the alleged currency could not be determined due to the severely disintegrated condition of the property."—AFP

### Soldier sentenced?

A former Ukrainian soldier, who sent the location of sensitive military targets to Russia, has been sentenced to five years in jail, according to Ukrainian prosecutors.

Ukraine has detained thousands of people on suspicion of collaborating with Russian

troops, since the war began in February 2022. Many of those who have been detained belong to the east and south of the country.

Prosecutors in the northeast Kharkiv region said that the man (whom they did not name), allegedly contacted a "representative of the Russian Federal Security Service (FSB)" using the Signal messaging app.

He then went on to send the FSB "the positions of soldiers and military equipment" in the Kharkiv region and southern Mykolaiv region, they added.

"The enemy needed this information to conduct targeted air strikes on Ukrainian defenders," the prosecutor alleges. The man "was detained near the frontline town of Krasnaya and 'fully admitted his guilt'", they added.—AFP

## Dutch kick off EU vote with all eyes on far right

BRUSSELS: The Netherlands on Thursday kicked-off a marathon four-day European Union election, in an early test of predictions the far right is headed for big gains in the bloc's parliament. Geert Wilders' far-right Freedom Party (PVV) is riding high and projected to claim up to nine European Parliament seats — after failing to win any five years ago.

"We want less immigration, we want to strengthen our asylum rules and policies," Wilders, whose party is in a Dutch coalition government after a surprise election win last year, said after voting. His call has resonated with voters like Simeon Nieuwenhuys, a 48-year-old government worker.

"I want the EU to change," she said after casting her ballot for the PVV. "I think we're too open. We should be more critical as to who we let in because it

costs a lot of money." Surveys suggesting the far right could grab a quarter of the EU parliament's 730 seats have rattled the main groupings. The conservative European People's Party (EPP) and the leftist Socialists and Democrats. Current European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen, seeking a second term, has opened the door to the EPP working with the far right to ensure legislation is passed.

Von der Leyen, a polyglot former German defence minister, has been courting Italian premier Giorgia Meloni, who heads the post-fascist Brothers of Italy party.

EPP leaders, including Meloni, will decide after the election who should helm the commission. Their choice needs the backing of a simple majority in the European Parliament.—AFP

## Israeli soldier killed, nine injured in Hezbollah strike

JERUSALEM: The Israeli military said on Thursday a soldier had been killed in a drone strike launched by Hezbollah, the latest fatality in months of border clashes.

Staff Sergeant Refael Kassaderi, 29, was killed in a Hezbollah drone attack that struck the northern Israeli town of Metulla.

"It had a devastating result, of course, of a soldier killed," Larmer said.

The *Haaretz* newspaper reported that the attack also left nine troops wounded, one of them seriously. Larmer said that "Hezbollah... has for

the last eight months been escalating almost every day their attacks against Israel" and "trying to generate Israel's defensive mechanisms".

The latest fatality takes the toll to at least 15 soldiers and 11 civilians killed in Israel's north, according to the ministry, since the clashes with Hezbollah, a Hamas ally, began on October 7.

In Lebanon, the cross-border violence has killed at least 455 people, mostly fighters but including 88 civilians, according to a tally.

According to the Israeli military, 645 soldiers have been killed during and since the October 7 raid, including 294 in its campaign against Hamas in the Palestinian territory.—AFP

## Extreme summer heatwave peaks in western US

LOS ANGELES: An extreme early-summer heatwave peaked on Thursday across much of the western United States, where record-breaking temperatures were scorching to cope with the sudden sharp rise in temperatures.

Las Vegas was baking in 111 degrees Fahrenheit (44 degrees Celsius) heat, while in the Death Valley desert the mercury was expected to shoot past 120°, due to an oppressive high-pressure weather system smothering the region.

"Widespread high and low temperature records are likely to be tied or broken between California, Nevada and Arizona today," said the National Weather Service, in a bulletin. Experts warn the unusually soaring temperatures could signal the start of a brutal summer.

Dangerously hot temperatures in Las Vegas have been running 10-15 degrees above average, and an excessive heat advisory was extended into Saturday. Cooling stations have been opened in the desert grottoes, and some events including a farmers' market have been forced to move indoors to escape the heatwave.

"One of the things with it being so hot so quickly is we really haven't had an opportunity to acclimate to it," said Chris Sengenbach, senior director of Community Ambassadors, told Las Vegas-based ABC affiliate KSNV-TV.

"Locals just aren't used to it, even though they may have grown up here, spending every summer out here, their bodies haven't acclimated to that," California's Central Valley — a sprawling region, known mainly for its vast agricultural — was also "of particular concern" on Thursday, federal officials said.

"Little to no overnight relief from the heat will affect those without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration," said the NWS.

While temperatures should cool slightly in coming days, the heatwave is expected to expand north into Oregon and Washington on Friday and Saturday. But densely populated coastal areas including Los Angeles appear to have been spared the worst of the heat.

A blanket of cool air from the Pacific Ocean — known locally as "June gloom" — restricted temperatures in the nation's second-largest city to a balmy 73° Thursday.

**Warmer to come:**

The ridge of high pressure has moved in from Mexico, which has been writhing under a punishing heatwave. Late last month Mexico City — which sits 7,350 feet (2,240 meters) above sea level and has traditionally enjoyed a temperate climate — logged its highest ever temperatures.

Officials say dozens of people have died in repeated heatwaves that have scorched the country, with hundreds of others sickened. Experts say there could be worse to come.

This year is on course to be "the warmest year in history," Francisco Estrada, coordinator of the Climate Change Research Program at the National Autonomous University of Mexico, has warned.—AFP

## As ties thaw with Saudi Arabia, thousands of Syrians fly for Hajj

DAMASCUS: For the first time in more than a decade, thousands of Syrians are travelling directly from government-held parts of Syria to Saudi Arabia for Hajj, a signal of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad's gradual reintegration into the Arab world.

After Syria's conflict erupted in 2011, Saudi

Arabs cut ties with Assad and Saudi figures opposed to him — including by granting Syria's opposition thousands of visas to be distributed among Syrian pilgrims in Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Turkey.

But Syria's recently established ties with Assad last year and in May appointed its first envoy to Syria

## Over 100 killed as rebels attack village in Sudan

UN warns internal displacement figures could top 10m within days

**PORT SUDAN:** A Sudanese pro-democracy activists' committee on Thursday reported "more than 100" dead in a single day when paramilitary forces attacked a village, as the UN warned of mass displacement and starvation.

The Rapid Support Forces (RSF), which have been at war with the regular army since April 2023, on Wednesday attacked the central village of Wad al-Nour in eastern state "in two waves" with heavy artillery, the Madani Resistance Committee said.

It reported on Wednesday that the feared paramilitaries had "invaded the village", causing dozens of casualties and widespread displacement.

The attack "claimed the lives of more than 100 martyrs" and "injured hundreds" said the committee, one of hundreds of similar grassroots groups across Sudan, adding that it reached the toll via "initial communication with village residents".

The UN resident coordinator for Sudan, Clemencia Nkemba-Salama, said she was "shocked by reports of violent attacks and a high number of casualties" in the village.

She called for an investigation and for "those responsible to be held accountable".

"Human tragedy has become a hallmark of life in Sudan. We can no longer impinge to become another one," she added.

On social media, the committee shared footage of what it said was a "mass grave" in the public square, showing rows of white shrouds laid

out in a courtyard.

In a little over a year, the war has killed tens of thousands of people, including up to 15,000 in a single West Darfur town.

**Toll unclear:**

However, the war's overall death toll remains unclear, with some estimates of up to 150,000, according to a special envoy for Sudan Tom潘尼。The RSF has repeatedly besieged and attacked entire villages across the country, and has been notorious for widespread looting as well as sexual and ethnic violence.

In a statement, the RSF said it had attacked three army camps in the Wad al-Nour area, and clashed with its crews "outside the city".

The resistance committee called the RSF's statements an "attempt to normalize the people of Wad al-Nour and label them a legitimate target".

It also said the villagers had "called for help from the armed forces, which did not respond". The militia has not issued an official comment, but Sudan's ruling sovereign council, under army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, called Wednesday's attack a "barbaric massacre of defenceless civilians".

The army has come under repeated criticism from Sudanese civilians for "abandoning" them and resorting in the face of RSF offensives, particularly in al-Jazirah and the western Darfur region.

Both the army and the RSF — commanded by Bashir's former deputy Mohamed Hamdan Daglo — have been accused of war crimes, including targeting civilians, indiscriminately shelling residential areas and looting or obstructing humanitarian aid.

**War crime?**

The Emergency Lawyers, a pro-democracy group of volunteers who

document the war's atrocities, said on Thursday the attack on Wad al-Nour was a "war crime" and called on the international community to "exert pressure" on both sides to abide by international law.

The UN migration agency warned on Thursday that internal displacement figures in Sudan could "top 10 million" within days.

Since the war began, more than seven million people have fled their homes for other parts of Sudan, adding to 2.8 million already displaced from previous conflicts in the war-torn country of 48 million inhabitants.

"The world's worst internal displacement crisis continues to escalate, with looming famine and disease adding to the havoc wrought by conflict," the International Organization for Migration said in a statement.

Across Sudan, 70 per cent of those displaced "are now trying to survive in places that are at risk of famine", it added. The UN says 18 million people in Sudan are acutely hungry, with 3.6 million children severely malnourished.

Widespread hunger has haunted the country for months, while agencies say a lack of data has prevented the official declaration of a famine.

If the current humanitarian situation continues, 2.5 million people could die of hunger by the end of September, according to a recent estimate by the Chiangmai Institute, a Dutch think tank. That figure is "about 15 percent of the population in Darfur and Kordofan", the country's two western and southern regions which have seen some of the worst fighting, the institute said.

The UN has accessed both sides of "systematic obstructions and deliberate denial" of humanitarian access.—AFP

## Yemen clashes kill 18 fighters in fresh flare-up

**DUBAI:** At least 18 combatants have been killed in clashes between Yemeni government forces and Houthi rebels in the country's northwest, two military officials said on Thursday.

The clashes on Wednesday were triggered by a Houthi attack on a frontline area between government-controlled parts of Lahj governorate and Houthi-held parts of Taiz province, said Mohammed al-Naqib, a spokesman for the Southern Transitional Council, a separatist group allied with the government.

The attack came despite a lull in fighting that has largely held since the expiry of a six-month truce brokered by the United Nations in April 2022. Yemeni government forces succeeded in repelling the attack, but five soldiers were martyred and others wounded.

Naqib said:

A Houthi military official in Taiz said that 13 rebels, including a senior commander, were also killed in the fighting. Yemen's internationally-recognised government condemned the Houthi offensive as a "treacherous attack".

In a statement on social media platform X on Wednesday, Information Minister Muammar al-Khuri said the counterattack by Yemeni government forces "repelled Yemeni forces (Houthi) militiamen members", without specifying a toll.

While hostilities have remained low, sporadic fighting has occasionally flared in parts of the country. In April, a surprise Houthi attack killed 13 fighters loyal to the Yemeni government in Lahij province.—AFP

**Amnesty urges FIFA to assess human rights risks before awarding World Cups**

ZURICH: FIFA and countries bidding to host the 2030 and 2034 World Cups should agree to binding commitments and legal reforms to prevent human rights violations connected to the tournament, Amnesty International said on Wednesday.

In October, football's world governing body awarded the 2030 World Cup to Morocco, Spain and Portugal, while Saudi Arabia is the host bidder for the 2034 edition, with Amnesty saying there are "serious human rights risks" that must be addressed.

"FIFA should ensure a rigorous and transparent bidding process, based on meaningful stakeholder participation, including genuinely independent human rights risk assessments and comprehensive human rights strategies," human rights organization Amnesty said.

"FIFA should not award the rights to host the World Cup until such agreements are made, and until it is clear that human rights violations can and will be prevented, mitigated and remedied."

Amnesty said the commitments must prevent human rights violations in relation to "labour rights, discrimination, housing, freedom of expression, policing and privacy" before finalising a decision to approve any bid.

FIFA had included human rights standards as part of the bidding requirements for the two World Cups, but Amnesty fears single bids for each tournament undercut their leverage to ensure there are no violations.

FIFA had set a July deadline for the submission of bids for the 2034 World Cup, which will be evaluated later this year while the hosts will be officially appointed in the fourth quarter of 2026.

Amnesty said accident rates at construction projects in Spain and Portugal are above EU levels, while discrimination in stadiums in Spain is an issue as they highlighted the racism suffered by Real Madrid forward Vinicius Jr.

They also said Morocco and Portugal must increase the number of labour inspectors by over 50% to meet International Labour Organisation (ILO) benchmarks.

Amnesty said they have shared their report with FIFA. Reuters has contacted FIFA and the football associations of the countries bidding for the World Cup for comment.

Amnesty said the risks associated with hosting the 2034 tournament in Saudi Arabia are of "different magnitude and severity" than will test FIFA's commitment to human rights policies.

Amnesty researcher Dina Ahmed said that although they were allowed to do research on migrant workers in Qatar, which hosted the 2022 World Cup, leading to several reforms, they have not had any access in Saudi Arabia.

"It is extremely difficult to do research from the outside," she told reporters.

Reuters has contacted the Saudi Ministry of Sport for comment.—Reuters

## Saudis break through defensive Pakistan to advance in World Cup qualifying

ISLAMABAD: For most parts of the game, Pakistan were camped in their own half, looking to keep out Saudi Arabia. But Roberto Soriano's side found a way, breaking down the hosts' defense three times for a 3-0 victory here at the Jinnah Stadium to advance into the third round of Asia's 2026 World Cup qualifiers.

Forces Al-Burakani scored twice, both his goals coming in the first half, before Mousab Al-Jawary added a third to leave Pakistan without a point in Group 'H' heading into their last game against Thailand next week. Saudi Arabia, meanwhile, top the group with 13 points from five games ahead of their clash against Jordan.

The top two in each of the nine qualification groups advance to the next phase in the quest for one of Asia's eight guaranteed berths at the 48-team World Cup in Mexico, the United States and Canada.

Pakistan had vowed they had worked on improving their confidence and Stephen Constantine's men showed good composure in the early stages despite the Saudis having plenty of the ball.

They kept the visitors out until Al-Burakani got the open in the 24th. A cross from Mousab Al-Jawary on the left found its way to Sultan Al-Ghamdi, who headed it into the box and Al-Burakani scored with a brilliant piece of skill. The 24-year-old Al-Ahli striker took a touch with his right foot to turn it up

and then swivelled to send a rifling shot with his left past goalkeeper Youssouf Bass.

It was a matter of time till the Saudis got their second and it arrived 14 minutes later with Al-Ghamdi the creator. The wing-back's cross sliced every Pakistani defender, landing perfectly for Al-Sheraki to nod it in.

The second half continued in the same way and the Saudis got their third in the 62nd to end the match as a contest. Al-Sheraki (below) on the right found a willing runner in Al-Jawary to collect his square pass and the midfielder's first-time shot from an acute angle found the back of the net.

### SOUTH KOREA PROGRESS

Saudi Arabia joined South Korea in qualifying for the final round of qualifying after their fellow Asian heavyweights trounced hosts Singapore 7-0 with Park Sung-Germain's Lee Kang-in and Tottenham Hotspur's Son Heung-min both scoring twice.

The win moved the Koreans onto 13 points from five games and guaranteed them first place in Group 'E' with one match remaining.

Lee gave the Koreans the lead in Singapore with a diving shot into the roof of Hassam Surya's goal in the ninth minute before Jon Miskayn's header doubled the advantage 11 minutes later.

Caps in Sun scored twice after the interval, with one a solo effort for Lee while Lee Jun-bo and

Song Sung-chun were also on target, in interim coach Kim Do-hwan's first game in charge.

Next up for South's side on June 11 is a home game in Seoul against China, who need a point to clinch the second qualifying place after Croatia Dragović's 1-1 draw at home to Thailand despite Petar Stanković's first-half penalty miss in Shenyang.

South Korean coach Park Jungsik had put the Thais ahead with a 20th-minute header before nationalized Brazilian Petar Stanković fired over the bar in 51st minute.

But substitute Petar Stanković swept his effort past substitute goalkeeper Namkoong Ansan with 11 minutes left as China stayed in second place, three points ahead of Thailand with one game remaining.

Korea would have guaranteed their progress from Group 'E' with a win against already qualified Iraq.

But they slumped to a 2-0 defeat in Jakarta, finishing the game with 10 men after Jordi Amat was red carded as Iraq made it five wins out of five.

Vietnam lie one point behind Indonesia in the fight for the second qualifying spot after a thrilling 3-2 win over the Philippines.

Korean legend thought he had secured a draw for the Philippines when he made it 2-2 in the 89th minute in Hanoi.

But in the 90th minute of added time Pham Tuan Hai bagged the winner to keep his side's hopes alive of making the final round of qualifying.

Vietnam travel to Iraq while Indonesia host the Philippines in their final group games on Tuesday.

### CHETTEH DROPS OUT

In Kolkata, India legend Sania Mirza fought back tears as he made his 153rd and final appearance for his country.

Thousands cheered an emotional Chetketi as he was given a guard of honour on leaving the pitch, bringing to a close an international career which put him among the world's all-time leading winners.

Nearly 25,000 fans in Kolkata came to see their captain in an India shirt for the last time in a 0-0 draw against Kuwait on a remarkable tourney in a country where football comes a distant second to cricket in popularity.

The 38-year-old scored 94 matches over nearly two decades for India, behind only Cristiana Ribeiro, Iran's retired Ali Dashti and Leontine Meijer in the all-time international winners' list.

Already-qualified Japan maintained their unbroken record in Group 'B' as Keiji Obara scored twice in a 2-0 win in Yangon over Myanmar while Oman boosted their chances in Group D with a 3-0 victory over Tahiti.

Australia also remained perfect in the fight for the second qualifying spot after a thrilling 3-2 win over the Philippines.

## Late penalty hands Tunisia victory as Africa's World Cup qualifiers resume

CAPI TOWN: Tunisia needed a late penalty to beat Equatorial Guinea 1-0 and move to the top of the standings in their World Cup qualifying group as Africa's preliminaries for the 2026 finals resumes on Wednesday.

Mohamed Ali Ben Youssef struck the 85th-minute sparkler to deny Equatorial Guinea a deserved point as they looked to cling off the FIFA sanctions that stripped them of the six points from their opening two qualifiers in November.

French lower-league forward Yannick Bahoua struck in the third half in Oujda as the third-placed Central Africans edged Chad 1-0 in Group 'C'.

Khalid Narey gave fourth-placed Togo a 63-minute lead over South Sudan in Group 'B', but South Sudan levelled through a Roger Abeson own goal soon after to force a 1-1 draw in Lomé.—Agencies

METZ: France settled to a comfortable 3-0 win over Luxembourg in a pre-Euro 2024 friendly in Metz on Wednesday as striker Kylian Mbappe sealed the win after deviating a header from Jonathan Haye's cross.

Forward Karim Benzema put France in front just before the break, heading in from a precise Mbappe pass, before Jonathan Haye's threecross strike from outside the box doubled the advantage in the 70th minute.

Mbappe added a third 15 minutes later with a low, first-time shot from near the pen-

alty spot for his 47th goal for Les Bleus.

The 25-year-old, who finalised his widely anticipated move to Real Madrid on Monday, has now been involved in 80 goals for France in 78 games.

"Mbappe is a formidable leader ever since he's been with us," said manager Didier Deschamps.

"He did a good job today... his head and body weren't used to playing very much these past couple of weeks, so some juice was missing... but he decided he wants to win everything, it's gotten way

better for him. He has been a good example all week."

The World Cup runner-up had Luxembourg pinned back inside their own half for large chunks of the opening 45 minutes but the visitors' determined defence held firm to thwart their efforts.

Ranked 87th, Luxembourg relied on what could have been their first-ever major tournament with a 2-0 loss to Georgia in their Euro 2024 qualification playoff semi-final.

## Swiatek, Paolini set up Paris final showdown

PARIS: Iga Swiatek moved closer to a third successive French Open title by dismantling American third seed Coco Gauff on Thursday and she will play Jacqueline Paolini in the final after the Italian's shock victory.

Four-time Grand Slam champion Swiatek's 6-2, 6-4 semi-final win was her 11th victory in 12 meetings with Gauff, but the 23-year-old Pole had to endure tough moments in the second set before sealing her longest winning streak on clay.

"I was pretty intense and putting pressure on Coco," Swiatek said. "Most of the things overall my game worked today, so I'm proud of myself."

Paolini joined her in the final by defeating Roman 17-year-old Maria Andreescu 6-1, 6-3 in another Saturday's golden Roland Garros, with Jessica Pegula also through to the semi-finals.

The 12th seed had never gone beyond the second round of a major before the start of this year, winning a total of four matches in 16 Grand Slams before advancing to the fourth round of the Australian Open in January.

Now she is one win away from the title at Roland Garros as she tries to emulate compatriot Francesca Schiavone, who won the 2010 French Open.

"I know I think a little bit later than other players, to dream or the most important thing in sport and in life," said Paolini. "I'm happy I could dream this moment, I don't know what to say, I'm so emotional."

Andreescu became the youngest Grand Slam semi-finalist in 27 years with a shock victory over second seed Aryna Sabalenka in the last eight.

But her bid to be crowned the youngest major champion since Martina Hingis at the 1997 US Open was cut short as Andreescu appeared overawed by the occasion, losing the court in tears after an arm-twisting display.

Gauff will rise to number two in the rankings behind Swiatek but the loss to the Pole, who also lost twice in the 2022 final and last year's quarters, was a bitter pill to swallow for the 20-year-old.

"I think she's progressing a lot," Swiatek said of the US Open champion. "Last year's US Open showed she's tough. At this age, it's obvious she's going to just grow, it's nice to see her handling everything well around her, because it's not easy. I'm sure we'll have plenty more intense matches at the highest level."

In Wednesday's night session, Alexander Zverev reached his fourth consecutive semifinal in Paris by seeing off Australian 11th seed Alex de Minaur 6-4, 7-6, 7-5, 6-4.

The German fourth-seed, still bidding for his maiden Grand Slam title, will meet Italy's Camila Giorgi, the 2022 and 2023 runner-up, on Friday for a place in the final after the Norwegian was handed a walkover following Novak Djokovic's withdrawal with a knee injury.

Slow court conditions took some of the bite out of Zverev's powerful serve, forcing the German to win extended rallies against his speedy opponent.

A key moment came in the second-set tiebreak when Zverev fell behind 4-0 and the crowd rallied around the Australian.

"I stayed calm," Zverev told reporters. "I know that the conditions today are extremely difficult to hit winners. I know that it has to go the long way sometimes, and that's what I did in the tiebreak. The serve today didn't play such a big role as it did maybe the other days just because it was very, very slow."

Even so, 27, in playing under the shadow of an ongoing trial in Berlin over allegations of sexual harassment.

Djokovic had been due to face Raoul in a repeat of last year's final, but the 24-time Grand Slam champion's title defence was abruptly ended by the knee injury he suffered during his dramatic last-16 victory over Francisco Cerundolo.

## 'Sindh govt building 2.1m houses for flood-hit people'

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Shah has said that his government has started the reconstruction of 2.1 million houses to rehabilitate more than 12.6 million flood-affected people, which exceeds the population of 154 countries.

"We are also supporting water, sanitation, and hygiene interventions. A funding of Rs2.9 billion has been secured to construct over 264,200 houses with safe sanitation facilities."

This is said while talking to journalists after reviewing the progress of reconstruction of the houses at the Sindh Peoples Housing for Flood Affected (SPHFA) office on Tipu Sultan Road on Thursday.

Provincial ministers Sharjeel Mehmood, Nasir Shah, Makhdoom Md. Waheed and DG SPHFA Khalid Shahzad were present on the occasion.

The chief minister said that Rs250bn was required for the construction of 2.1 million houses which his government, with the support of donor agencies, had secured Rs400bn and the shortfall of Rs100bn would be met through foreign funding and federal government support.

Masud Ali Shah said that the initiative aimed at implementing a sustainable rehabilitation strategy after 2.1m houses were damaged by the floods of 2022, affecting 12.6m people. A total of 82 per cent of the affected houses were now rehoused.

Mr Shah said that the initiative was driven by the vision of PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto.

Zardari who, being the foreign minister, successfully mobilised funds at Geneva Conference in January 2023 and the Donors Conference in Sindh on February 8, 2023.

The CM said 525,000 houses were currently under construction and over 100,000 houses had already been completed.

"At the project's inception, we received financial assistance from the World Bank amounting to \$500 million, supplemented by \$227 million from the Sindh government. To date, we have secured around 70 per cent of the necessary funding for the project's successful completion, with additional support currently in the pipeline from the Islamic Development Bank and the Asian Development Bank," he said.

He added that by the end of next year, the government would complete construction between 1.2 and 1.5m houses.

"When we talk about the reconstruction of 2.1m new houses, we are talking about the rehabilitation of more than 12.6m flood-affected population, which exceeds the population of 154 countries."

Mr Shah said that the positive impacts of this comprehensive housing reconstruction program were evident through the "beneficiaries" as well as, as they were rebuilding multi-hazard-resistant houses themselves.

He added that the government employed the latest and most transparent technique of Management Information Systems, ensuring that grants for housing reconstruction were transferred directly into the beneficiaries' bank accounts.

## Govt's battle to save city from flooding begins amid excessive rain forecast

- Gears up for monsoon with comprehensive plan
- 586 drains, 310 choking points to be cleaned across Karachi

KARACHI: To deal with more than "normal rainfall" which expected this morning, the city administration came together on Thursday and decided in a meeting to clean 586-drains and clear over 310 choking points across Karachi.

According to Meteorological department and National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), the heavy downpour would mainly affect the southern parts of Sindh.

After the advisory and warning issued by the National Emergency Operation Centre (NEOC), Met office and the NDMA, the city administration held a meeting with Sindh Chief Secretary Syed Asif Hyder Shah to discuss the arrangements for the upcoming monsoon rains, wherein he sought details of prepara-

tions done so far and discussed ways for effective operation of the departments concerned during the rains.

The meeting was attended by key officials, including Karachi Mayor Mumtaz Wahab, Commissioner Karachi Syed Hassan Shehzadi, Secretary Local Government Syed Khalid Hyder Shah, Secretary Rehabilitation Waqar Shamshad, officials from the Water Board, Pakistan Navy, representatives of the Corporation Board, all district deputy commissioners, and municipal commissioners, K-Electric, DG Meteor 1122 among others.

A statement issued after the meeting said that a contingency plan for Karachi division was also presented in light of the expected monsoon rains. The chief secretary highlighted that during current year, higher than normal rainfall was anticipated but assured that the Sindh government will support the KMC and other departments wherever necessary.

Mr Shah emphasised the crucial role of K-Electric in ensuring a continuous power supply for water drainage operations during the rains. He called for special arrangements by K-Electric to prevent any loss of life due to electrical issues. Additionally, he discussed all town collectors to ensure proper drainage of water

## Sarim remanded to FIA in child trafficking case

FIR says suspects concealed facts regarding adoption of babies

KARACHI: A judicial magistrate on Thursday bailed over rights activist Sarim Barney to Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) for two days in a case pertaining to "child trafficking by way of illegal adoption" on the complaint of USF authorities.

The investigation officer (IO) of the FIA, Bilal Ahmed, produced Mr Barney before judicial Magistrate (East) Khawar Zia, seeking his physical remand.

The IO informed the court that the suspect needed to be interrogated "thoroughly" and that it was necessary to recover "forensic records pertaining to the adoption/guardianship of children" who had been adopted by families abroad.

The IO further stated that the bank

accounts of Mr Barney and his trust required to be scrutinised.

Additionally, he pleaded that remaining suspects needed to be traced, arrested, and arrested.

On the other hand, Mr Barney's legal team, including advocates Aamir Warrach, Atiq Hussain, and Nasra Dahir, requested judicial custody for their client, stating that their client was ready to provide all necessary documents and that his office was available to cooperate with the IO.

Additionally, Advocate Warrach also asked the court to dismiss the case under Section 43 of the criminal procedure code. The legal team also submitted a bail application, which is set to be heard on Saturday.

Earlier in March, the FIA received a letter "illegal adoption by NGO" from the US Department of State Diplomatic Security Service.

The letter alleged that the man was "misleading courts and changing children's names".

The letter stated: "It appears in the case of three baby girls were relinquished by biological parents with a con-

sent to hand over any interested family for an adoption, whereas court proceedings show that all three children were abandoned at the gate of Sarim Barney Welfare Trust Ltd., despite of all efforts biological parents were not traced, or anyone claimed for the children."

The US department referred the matter to the FIA for further investigation.

Responding to the allegations, Mr Barney told the court: "Please the one who informed the US authorities that the child was abandoned. However, if there is an issue with the child being mentioned as an orphan in a document, it might have been a typo error made by a member of our team or an advocate."

After hearing the IO and the defense counsels, the court remanded Mr Barney in physical custody for two days, observing that the IO's submissions appeared "geriatric and convincing".

According to the FIR, an inquiry concluded that Sarim Barney and his associate Basirat Ali Khan, Hussaini Naq, and others colluded to provide false information, make misdeclarations, and conceal facts. Before the Honourable Family Courts District East Karachi under the

guise of illegal adoption/guardianship of these baby girls using fraudulent documents.

It stated that the statements by the accusers that "the three baby girls in question were orphans and found from outside the gate of Ms Sarim Barney Trust and it tried level best to find their parents but no person came forward for claiming them" was contrary to the facts, adding that these baby girls in question dropped by their biological parents to the trust was also contrary to the facts.

The case was registered against Mr Barney, Basirat Ali, Hussaini Naq under Sections 420 (cheating and dishonesty, including delivery of property), 428 (forgery for purpose of cheating), 421 (using as genuine a forged document), 107 (Offences of the Pakistan Penal Code related with Sections 3 (trafficking in persons, 4 (deceitful circumstances) and 5 (abduction and criminal conspiracy) of the Prevention of Trafficking in Persons Act, 2018).

It also stated that the role of others will be determined after the investigation.

## Another 'robber' lynched, accomplice beaten by mob

KARACHI: A suspected robber was lynched while another injured by an angry mob in New Karachi Industrial Area on early Thursday morning, police said.

Ana SHO Mohamed Nawaz Qadri said two suspects allegedly snatched five cell phones from citizens within the remit of the Shab Colony police station.

When they attempted to loot some young men sitting near Faizang-i-Azam Masjid in Sector B-G, the victims put up resistance and the area people also joined them.

The people overpowered both the suspects and subjected them to severe beating and hit them with cemented blocks and other blunt instruments.

As a result, one suspect, identified as 30-year-old Shehy, was killed while his accomplice Farman Ashraf, 27, was arrested with severe injuries.

The body and the injured were taken to the Abbottabad Hospital for medico-legal formalities.

The police claimed to have recovered five snatched cell phones, one motorcycle and weapons from their possession.

The SHO said five robbery victims had also approached the police and identified the killed and injured suspect.

Earlier on Wednesday a suspected robber was also lynched by an angry mob in Iftab Town in the morning.

### Woman found buried in house

A young woman was found dead and buried inside the courtyard of a house in Bin Qasim Town on Thursday, police said.

They added that the deceased woman, identified as 25-year-old Sajna Mayl, was "brutally" tortured before being killed and buried inside a house in Ali Mohammad Brohi Goth.

Ana SHO Inayatullah Mamnun said that after receiving information from the neighbours, the police rushed to the spot and exhumed the body from the ground.

Her husband, Nawab Ali Chanda, and other family members had fled the house, the SHO said, adding that the woman appeared to have died two days ago.

The corpse was taken to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre for medico-legal formalities.

SHO Mamnun said the victim's father, Mushtaq Ali Brohi, had told the police on phone from Khanpur that he suspected that his son-in-law Nawab and other family members had killed his daughter over some "family dispute".

He also told the police that he would get an FIR registered against the nominated suspect on Friday.

According to a notification, the governor, in exercise of his powers conferred upon him under Clause (a) of Article 108 of the Constitution of Pakistan, summoned the provincial assembly to meet on Friday (June 7) at 3pm at the Sindh Assembly building in Karachi. — APP

## Another LPG cylinder blast leaves seven injured in Matiari

**Death toll in Paretabad tragedy rises to 26**

**HYDERABAD:** While no fewer than six scores of families along with hundreds of other Hyderabad residents have been in a state of mourning since May 30 when a huge loss of life was caused by a cylinder blast and resultant fire in the Paretabad area, another incident of same kind on Thursday left at least seven people injured near Bhuland, located in the neighbouring district of Matiari.

The death toll in the Paretabad tragedy continued to rise over the last week and with a 13-year-old boy, Ajmal, son of Mohammad Ali, succumbing to his severe burn injuries on Thursday.

Since Tuesday evening, seven of around 60 victims, most of them children, died during treatment in Karimia, taking the death toll to 26. The six others were identified as Ahsan Ahmed, 65, son of Jalaluddin, Hasnun, 12, son of Muhammad Shaukat, Mohammad Ramza alias Ahmed Ramza, 14, Haaris, 2, son of Asif Ali, Maloom, 8, daughter of Hafiz Ali, Kiran, 5, daughter of Zaeem, and Ahsan, 15, son of Hussain.

On Thursday, only a week

after the Paretabad tragedy, seven people received burn injuries when a cylinder exploded and caused a big fire in an LPG outlet near Bhuland in Matiari district.

The fire destroyed the outlet and the adjacent auto-mechanic shop.

The injured were rushed to the Liaqat University Hospital where doctors said Allah Baloch, 65, Dildar, 36, and Mohammad Sabir, 40, had suffered 30pc burns and their condition was critical. Nader Ali, 25, and Rameel, 20, were under treatment with Haider Iqbal whereas Waheed, 50, and Abd Hussain, 26, had received 20pc and 20pc burns, respectively, they added. Nader Ali and Abd Hussain are brothers.

Allah Baloch, Dildar and Rameel were shifted to LHC's intensive care unit (ICU).

The injured included some rich shopkeepers from Hyderabad and Bhuland. They had gone to Bhuland together in one truckload to get their cylinders filled.

Local journalists reported that fire tenders could reach the burning outlet at Bhuland about after a delay of two hours.

Mariak IDC Yusuf Shabir said that some people were seen doing the LPG business at unauthorised spots, including the rear side of their houses, due to the ongoing crackdown on illegal LPG outlets.

High-velocity winds, coupled with thunderstorms and rains, swept through Shahdad, Nawabshah, Farowar, Dadu and Jamshoro districts leaving at least three people dead and a trail of destruction on Thursday evening.

In a similar incident, a man, identified as Raji, lost his life when strong winds pulled down a wall and the debris fell on him along Hassanabadi road in the Old Nawabshah area.

Many people injured in the weather-related incidents were taken to the Peoples' Medical University Hospital for treatment.

## Sindh continues to be most unsafe place for journalists: report

**KARACHI:** Representatives of journalism unions and press clubs from across Sindh have called upon authorities to take urgent action for the safety of journalists and freedom of expression in the province, which continues to be one of the most worrisome places with regard to journalistic safety in Pakistan.

They were speaking at the launch of a special report titled "Journalism in the Shadow of Violence" released by the Freedom Network at the Koraishi Press Club on Thursday.

The Network's executive director Iqbal Khatri said the report pointed out that Sindh continued to remain one of the most worrisome regions with regard to safety of journalists in the country, even though the province

had a special law for combating impunity in crimes against media persons.

There were 184 incidents of violence against journalists in Sindh between 2018 and 2023, including killings of 10 journalists, he said quoting the report.

He shared details of the report, which pointed out growing influence of journalists, their low-income backgrounds, lack of enforcement of labour laws in the media industry and lack of digital safety skills, making them vulnerable to threats and forcing them to take such risks.

"When you challenge the system, it often triggers reactions," the report quoted a senior police officer as saying. The report recommends that the Sindh Bar Council and journalistic unions should collaborate to offer legal support to journalists.

The report also calls for making the Sindh Commission for the Protection of Journalists and other Media Practitioners fully functional by setting up its regional offices across the province.

Pakistan Journalists Safety Committee's Sindh chapter president Amir Lance said that attack on journalists in the province had been on an increasing rise. "The issue is that the state is not supporting journalists," he said.

Senior journalist Maheen Abbasi said that media owners should also be held accountable for the safety of their workers.

Khan Muhammed, president of the Khanpur Press Club, Ismail Basar, president of Sardar Press Club, and Sajid Khurram, president of Hyderabad Press Club, said that future attacks on journalists would continue until the perpetrators were brought to justice. The event was organised by the Sindh chapter of the PJSC.







## Police practice to 'seal' FIRs comes under scrutiny

IGP to seek opinion from legal department; court order barring this practice goes missing from legal branch

ISLAMABAD: Police chief Ali Naaz Saevi will seek an opinion from the general department of the Islamabad police over the practice of "sealing" FIRs which had been termed against fundamental rights by a local court a few days ago.

The court order issued in 2019, however, has gone missing from the legal branch of the capital police and despite efforts over the past three days following the order of the IGP, the officials failed to find the judgement.

The police chief issued these directions on June 3 in a meeting on the issue that was attended by the police officers and officials from the legal branch.

Since the order could not be found, a decision on whether or not to continue

this practice would be made after consultation with the legal branch in light of the contents of the judgement.

PIPO Taseer Jawad confirmed that during the meeting the IGP asked about the court order from the legal branch, but it was not available. "It will...be found as staff is looking for it," he assured. He further said the meeting decided to restrict access to those FIRs which may cause a law and order situation.

### No law to seal FIRs

During the meeting, the IGP asked officials which law empowered the police to seal FIRs. The participants of the meeting said there was no law to this effect. IGP Riaz, who served in Lahore as DCO Operations before coming to the capital, also asked the Punjab prosecution department and received the same response.

"If there is no law then why are the FIRs sealed," asked the IGP. He was informed that the FIRs were sealed on the orders of the Operations Division. The officials in the meeting justified that only those FIRs were sealed which could cause a "law and order situation".

The officials further said the FIRs were sealed only for the public, including the accused, but were sent to the investigating officers, legal branch, and magistrate per the legal procedure.

However, investigation and other legal procedures, including arrests, are suspended till the directives of the senior officer," they said, adding that in response the IGP showed reservations asking if the FIR was being shared with the IO, the legal branch and the magistrate that defeated the purpose of keeping it under wraps.

Sources, however, told Dawn that the police chief was allegedly misled as the sealed FIRs were not sent to anyone. Not only is the FIR sealed but the relevant initial report registered in 'Bazzarwala' (likely slay) is also sealed.

However, it seems the practice of sealing FIRs is a misinterpretation of Section 132 of the Criminal Procedure Code. This section empowers the SRO to suspend investigations in case of suspicious handwriting. According to officials, at present the FIRs are sealed only on the verbal orders of senior officers, a deliberate attempt to keep their contents secret to

blame those nominated in them.

### Court order

Last month, the police sealed six FIRs. Out of the six cases, three were registered at the Karachi Company police station, two at the Secretariat police station and one at the Industrial Area police station. Except for one robbery case in which 18 citizens were robbed, all FIRs were registered against the PTI leaders. The foreigners were robbed in I-8 Marghaz on May 25.

The practice of sealing FIR, though in vogue, brings it in stark contrast to an order of the judicial magistrate, Ramez Maghal Rahim, in June 2019 when he directed the capital police not to seal any FIR as it was against the fundamental rights of the suspects as well as the complainants.

The court also ruled that withholding the copy of an FIR was against the fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution. The order was issued in response to a plea by then PPP Senator Mustafa Nasir Khokhar who approached the court seeking direction to the police to provide him with a copy of the FIR registered against him at the Marghaz police station.

On the first date of the hearing on May 2, the tribunal issued notices to the ECP, returning candidates and the returning officers and directed them to file original Forms 45 and Form 46. On the next date of hearing on May 20, the ECP and some of the respondents appeared and

the tribunal directed them to file their replies and the original Form 45/Forms 46.

According to the petitioners, PML-N candidates filed applications under section 145(1) of the Elections Act 2017 for summary dismissal of the petition on the ground that the same was time-barred. ## 78 electric buses to ply on six routes in Rawalpindi by Jan

RAWALPINDI: Punjab Minister for Transport Qidal Akbar Khan on Thursday said that 78 electric buses will ply on six routes in Rawalpindi by January next, with three additional routes to be proposed by National and Provincial Assembly members.

He said that the garrison city would see a significant increase in public transportation, with 2000 buses expected to be operational in the next two years. He stated this during his visit Rawalpindi on the directives of Punjab Chief Minister Murray Naseeb to address traffic issues in the city.

At a meeting of the Commissioner Office Rawalpindi, Transport Secretary Rawalpindi, Rashed Ali and metro bus project officials briefed the minister on the current state of transportation in Rawalpindi.

The minister highlighted the success of the metro bus project, which was built eight to nine years ago, saying it was neglected by the previous government. Despite its popularity, the metro bus has turned out to be popular, as over 150,000 passengers daily travel in Rawalpindi and one million across Punjab, he added.

He said that if there had been no metro buses today, the condition of the roads would have been worsened due to huge traffic.

He further said that Punjab chief minister added 32 new solid hospitals in the health care system in 100 days where over 30,000 people get free treatment daily.

He said the government was bringing packages for farmers and they will be able to get fertilizer without interest.

He said actions are being taken against complaints of harassment of women. He said 20,000 students will be given motorbikes without interest and e-bikes will be given in two years installments, he added.

The minister said 7,500 gals have applied for e-bikes and we are planning that all of them get bikes. He said a project named Mannmukhi Deenak has been launched under which marriage certificates, e-registration, B-forms and vehicle bills will reach the doorsteps of people.

## Minister wants revised Naan, Roti prices implemented

RAWALPINDI: Punjab Food Minister Bilal Yasin on Thursday directed the Pindi administration to ensure 100 percent implementation of the newly fixed prices of Roti and Naan.

He said that all arrangements regarding security and law and order should be finalised before the start of Muharram. He got all the stakeholders into confidence to maintain the peace and order situation in the city.

He expressed these views while presiding over a meeting regarding implementation of Roti and Naan prices and arrangements in connection with Muharram in the Commissioner's Office Rawalpindi.

Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, Senior Superintendent of Police Operations Kamran Asghar were present in the meeting while Deputy Commissioners of Jhelum, Chakwal and Attock participated in the meeting through video link.

During the meeting, Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema said that in May, Rs10 million fines were imposed on violators of price list fixed by district administration while taking action against the wholesalers also.

Provincial Food Minister Ghulam Bilal Yasin directed the Deputy Commissioners to focus on Roti and Naan prices.

He asked the police magistrates to review the prices of bread and essential items on a daily basis and indiscriminate action should be taken against the violators.

He said that the government would not allow anyone to rob people's pockets.

## IHC removes objections on pleas against amendments to election law

"At the same time, I also express my gratitude to the Indian authorities for sending him back alive," he said. Mr Hussain, who was suffering from hypertension, got exhausted by the unaided trekking through the forests, he was taking rest, after being given his medication.

# AJK prime minister invites citizens' input for development, promises swift action

MUZAFFARABAD: Asad Javeed and Kashmiri AJK Prime Minister Chaudhry Awwad Ali on Thursday invited the state's indigenous citizens to share their views for the development of the liberated territory and the well-being of its inhabitants, assuring that his government would promptly act on any sensible proposals received.

Expressing his views on former governor Raaja Farooq Haider's adjournment motion on the floor of the Legislative Assembly, PM Haider asserted that all decisions in his government were made in consultation with the coalition partners.

"I have full faith in the consultation process," he said. "All decisions in my government are taken collaboratively because I believe no one is perfect. We must enhance democratic attitudes and reject bigotry, regionalism, and politics of hatred."

Earlier, Mr Haider highlighted the need to reflect on the events during the long march of the Joint Action Committee (JAC), warning that the repercussions of the recent eight-day movement could emerge in the next two or three years and might prove fatal.

"This is not a victory for anyone but a path to destruction," said Mr Haider, who is a senior PML-N leader. "As a political worker, it's my duty to point out these issues. They may hurt others on social media, but I will continue to tell a simple truth."

The prime minister noted that [coalition] members from the PML-N and PPP had been involved in negotiations with JAC from the beginning, demonstrating his commitment to involving coalition partners in decision-making.

He emphasized his belief in action over hollow announcements and pledged to ensure the implementation of his commitments. He asserted

that those challenging the state would be dealt with strictly and political issues would be addressed through political means.

Expressing his commitment to maintaining financial discipline, Mr Haider assured that taxpayers' money would be spent solely on the welfare of the masses, with development funds allocated on the basis of the needs of the areas concerned.

"It is the government's primary responsibility to bring significant improvements in sectors like infrastructure, health, education, and tourism, while also addressing the disparities of the people," he said. "As regards strengthening of the system, it is a collective responsibility of all segments of society."

Without mincing words, the AJK premier stated that while the government must meet legitimate public demands, no one would be allowed to challenge

the government's authority or paralyze the system. "Miscreants cannot be tolerated under the cover of demands for cheap electricity and flour. Such actions will be handled with an iron hand."

He also reiterated that the Kashmiris' eternal relationship with Pakistan and their ideology of accession to Pakistan would be further strengthened with strong conviction.

Mr Haider made it clear that nobody was indispensable and that his future was in his hands.

Later, Speaker Chaudhry Basit Akbar adjourned the session until June 13.

## IHRA told to disclose inquiry report about hospital

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Information Commission (PIC) has ordered the health regulatory body to make public an inquiry report about the alleged negligence and mistreatment of doctors at a private hospital, which purportedly led to the death of a 26-year-old man.

The directive was issued after the Islamabad Healthcare Regulatory Authority (IHRA) withheld information, citing confidentiality under the Right of Access to Information Act 2017.

Zahoor Ahmed, a resident of Gujrat Khan, filed a complaint with IHRA in July 2021, asserting the hospital's doctors of negligence resulting in his son's death.

A citizen's license holder filed a request to the IHRA on February 14, 2024, seeking the status of the

inquiry and a copy of the report.

Umair's request was denied by the public body, leading him to appeal to the PIC. After receiving the appeal, the commission issued notice to the IHRA.

The IHRA, represented by a law officer, maintained that the information was confidential and exempted from disclosure under section 7(h) of the Right of Access to Information Act 2017, which pertained to personal treatment records.

However, the commission disagreed with the exemption claim. Citing section 5 of the Right of Access to Information Act 2017, the commission said inquiry and investigative reports, once finalized, must be proactively published by public bodies.

The commission asserted that the inquiry into the death of Mr Ahmed's son should be made accessible to ensure transparency and accountability.

The commission's ruling, available with DAWN, emphasized the importance of handling matters related to public health and safety with utmost care and diligence.

Recognizing the case's significance, the commission ordered the chief executive officer of the IHRA to provide certified copies of the inquiry report to both the applicant and the commission within 10 days.

The next hearing is scheduled for June 16 to review the compliance and implementation of the order.

In pertinent to mention that the "Right of Access to Information Act" was enacted in October 2017. Though under the law PIC had to be established in six months, the PML-N government did not take any step in that regard. However, the PTI government notified the PIC on November 2, 2024. Currently, Shaukat Ahmed Siddiqui is the chief information commissioner.

## Punjab Assembly standing committees to have suo motu powers

Punjabi, Seraiki among indigenous languages to be allowed in PA

**LAHORE:** In a landslide move, a special committee of the Punjab Assembly has passed amendments to the assembly's rules of business, empowering the standing committees to take suo motu actions in their respective areas.

The MPAs have been demanding the government pass the 14th House (2022-08) of the provincial assembly and successive governments have been dragging their feet after making only promises to the effect,

The Special Committee-II, headed by Speaker Malik Muhammad Ahmad Khan, held its maiden meeting on

Thursday and considered proposed amendments aimed at reforming the assembly's operational procedures and strengthening governance, specifically with regards to the Rules of Procedure of the Provincial Assembly of Punjab, 1997.

Taking inspiration from the National Assembly, the Senate as well as other legislatures around the world, the panel passed the amendments aimed at "enhancing the legislative process, making it efficient, transparent, and accountable".

A significant amendment in granting suo motu powers to the standing committees, allowing them to independently examine matters without needing prior approval from the speaker. This change is intended to enhance the committee's effectiveness and responsiveness, making the legislature more democratic.

The committee also suggested including indigenous languages, like Punjabi, Seraiki, Pothohari and Mewati, as the

languages of the house proceedings alongside Urdu and English. Earlier, a member had to seek special permission from the chair to speak in a language other than Urdu or English. The participants in the panel saw this move as a step towards decolonisation and to reflect and respect linguistic diversity of Punjab's population, promoting inclusivity within legislative discussions.

The body also proposed a code of conduct for the legislators designed to uphold ethical standards, integrity, and accountability among members, thereby enhancing the assembly's credibility.

It decided to designate the existing Business Advisory Committee as the "Committee on Ethics" responsible for reviewing and ensuring implementation of the code, establishing its procedural rules, and undertaking additional functions as assigned by the speaker.

The committee also considered measures to ensure and encourage public

access to the assembly by accepting public petitions, either in hard or soft copy, on any issue and report to the house all of collecting evidence as well as suggested remedial measures. The committee has also been allowed to make their proceedings public if there is demand.

Another major proposal under review was mandating that resolutions unanimously adopted by the house be binding on the cabinet. This ensures that such policies are implemented as part of the cabinet's collective responsibility, reinforcing the assembly's legislative authority.

Speaker Khan said that standing committees played a crucial role in the functioning of the parliamentary system of government, ensuring a system of checks and balances, and their establishment is a shared responsibility of all political parties.

The meeting commended Advocate

## Plea against amends to NAB law admitted for hearing

**LAHORE:** The Lahore High Court (LHC) on Thursday admitted for registrar a petition challenging four amendments made to the National Accountability (Amendment) Act, 2022 through an ordinance and issued notices to the federal government.

The petitioner's counsel, Asif Siddique, argued that certain provisions of the NAA had been amended through an ordinance without fulfilling the requisite criteria as there was no emergency situation for issuance of such an ordinance.

He said since the parliament was operational, the amendment to the law was just a way to prevent PTI founder Imran Khan. The lawyer said that issuance of the ordinance by the acting president spoke volumes about the fact that it was politically motivated. He asked the court to set aside

the impugned ordinance.

Deputy Attorney General Tahir Mahmood Khokhar argued that although the new amendments were not under challenge before the Supreme Court but the question relating to the period of remained of an accused arrested under the 1999 ordinance can directly subjective before the apex court. He said any decision by the apex court would have a direct bearing upon the amendment to Section 24 of the amendment Act, 2022; therefore, the high court could not conduct parallel proceedings.

The law officer further argued that the powers of the acting president to issue an ordinance could not be questioned, especially when the president was out of the country.

Justice Shaukat Ali Khan observed that the contentions made by both sides needed consideration. The judge directed the respondents to submit replies after summer vacation on Sept 17.

## Lesco starts hours-long loadshedding

**LAHORE:** In recent days, the Lahore Electric Supply Company (Lesco) has started observing hours-long power outages in various parts of Lahore and adjoining districts on the pretext of remodelling system.

On the other hand, many localities have also been facing power disruptions due to sudden faults developing in the LESCO electricity boards, Dainik Baan learnt.

"In the ongoing heat wave, we have been facing hour-long power shutdowns from morning to

noon, off and on. This is being done at least for the last two years. Upon contact, we are always told by Lesco that it is being done to improve system infrastructure or upgrade the system," says Ahmad, a resident of Johar Town while talking to Dainik.

Besides, sometimes, we are also witnessing power disruption due to tripping or overloading of the system," he adds, requesting the authorities concerned to take notice of the situation.

Speaking to Dainik, Ishaq, a resident of Battagram, says the services related to power supply in their area, perhaps, the worst in the entire Lahore,

as the residents have been facing loadshedding for almost five to eight hours daily.

"When we lodge complaints, the officials tell them on the loadshedding is being observed due to power theft in Battagram and other areas falling within service jurisdiction of high-loss feeders."

Ishaq criticises the govt's excuse for treating power thieves and bill payers equally and urged the Lesco officers to ensure uninterrupted electricity to all such citizens as are paying their bills regularly. "It is sin for Bill

## 'Land grabbing' by housing society

## Police arrest media person for covering protest

**LAHORE:** Police allegedly tortured and arrested a news channel anchorperson for covering the protest of residents against the owner of a private housing society in Sunder area here on Thursday.

Sources say that scores of residents of the Thense Park View housing scheme had gathered with the complainants, including land grabbers and supporters of electricity supply to them by the society management.

The protesters alleged that three persons have been killed over land grabbing by the housing society management. The owner of the housing society is a retired policeman.

The sources say that a news channel

anchorperson, Mian Imran Arshad, reached the site along with his team, including cameras, to cover the protest.

Eye-witnesses say that the police deployed on the spot suddenly fired fire against the protesters, thrashed many of them and took some of them into custody.

They say as the anchorman started covering the protest for his TV programme, the police personnel attacked him and his team, subjecting them to torture.

Some journalists alleged that the police misused their authority on the orders of the circle ASPs Aamir Khan and Kamal Masih to teach a lesson to the media persons for exposing the 'police brutality' against peaceful protesters.

also surfaced on social media, showing armed policemen thrashing a boy on the rooftop of a building for recording the torture session with his mobile phone. The footage also showed the policemen snatching the boy's mobile phone and taking him into custody. Similarly, some other video clips showed the police beating the protesters with clubs.

The eyewitnesses say the police labelled the anchorman into a van and took him to police station for further action.

The arrest of the working journalist sparked resentment among the media community which declared it a case of harassment of media persons.

Some journalists later reached the police station to extend support to Mian Imran and strongly condemned the

police action.

They regretted that incidents of violence against journalists continued to rise during the tenure of the PMEN government in Punjab.

Following the incident, Lahore Operations SSP Taseer Iqbal and other senior police officers reached the police station, where they held negotiations with senior journalists present there.

The SSP told Dainik the matter has been resolved and the police have returned the camera and other belongings of the journalists seized during the action.

To a question, he said the incident was caused because of a 'misunderstanding' between the police and the journalists, admitting that the way police 'arrested' the anchorman was 'not reasonable'.

## Education CEO removed for sending incomplete data

**TOBA TEK SINGH:** The Punjab School Education secretary has directed Toba District Education Authority CEO Tahir Mansoor to immediately report to the provincial secretary.

In his order, the secretary accused the CEO of furnishing incomplete information to the Punjab Assembly regarding a question about the data of department in Toba district.

He has been placed at the disposal of the provincial office.

Sources said local PML-N MPA Arjmand Ali Javed had sent a question to the education minister about the missing facilities in the educational institutions of the district. The MPA later complained that incomplete and wrong data had been sent by the CEO.

**SALES TAX:** Imposition of sales tax on poultry feed will deprive public of the cheap source of protein, says FCCI acting president Dr Seagul Ashraf in a statement on Thursday.

He urged the government to avoid sales tax on food and food related items in the federal budget. He said apparently the government was trying to collect maximum revenue by taxing even essential food items.

## Man attempts suicide after killing his wife

**LAHORE:** A man allegedly jumped from the rooftop of his house to commit suicide after killing his wife over a petty domestic issue in Gidchalabadi area here on Thursday.

A police official said the suspect, Zohail, and his wife Komal were not enjoying good relations due to petty family issues, and financial crunch they were facing.

He said Zohail was said to be an addict and used to sell household items to buy drugs.

On Thursday, the couple exchanged hot words leading to a brawl. In a fit of anger, Zohail attacked his wife with a knife and allegedly killed her on the spot and later jumped from the rooftop of his house.

He was rushed to hospital with multiple injuries, including bone fractures.

The police shifted the body of the woman to the city morgue and lodged a case against the suspected killer.

## Three killed, six injured by rivals in an ambush

**MIANWALLI:** Unidentified armed suspects on Thursday morning ambushed a van near Kaloo Shear on Mianwali-Bahawal Road, killing three people on the spot and injuring six others, including two women.

Reports said the Mianwali-bound van was nearing Kaloo Shear village when the assailants opened indiscriminate fire, killing three men and injuring six passengers.

Risque 1522 shifted the deceased and the injured to the Hatchet THQ Hospital.

According to a police press release, the incident resulted from an old enmity between the Naik Khel and Kalo tribes of Mandi Bahauddin.

Police sources said personnel raided the houses of the alleged culprits, arresting six armed men and conducting further raids on the hideouts of the remaining suspects.

KP Dr Usman Ameri has directed the Swat Police Range RPO and the Mianwali DPO to submit a report and ensure the arrest of all suspects.

## Court reserves judgement on plea against postponement of Senate polls in KP

Petitioner Azam Swati wants decision of ECP declared illegal

PESHAWAR: Peshawar High Court on Thursday reserved its judgment over a petition challenging the decision of Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to postpone Senate polls in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa to each of opposition members elected on reserved seats for men and non-Muslims.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Mohammad Attique Shah and Justice Shaukat Ahmed heard arguments advanced by lawyers appearing for petitioner Azam Khan Swati and ECP.

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa leader and former senator Azam Swati had challenged the ECP's March 28 orders about the possible postponement of Senate polls in the province. He had requested the court to order ECP to hold Senate polls in the province on April 2 as scheduled.

## SCCI chief wants 'Tajir Dost scheme' enforced for 20 years

PESHAWAR: Sarhad Chamber of Commerce and Industry president Ishaq Ishaq on Thursday called for the approval of the Federal Board of Revenue's Tajir Dost tax scheme by parliament for the next 20 years.

He also said the government should promise not to impose new taxes on businesses after the implementation of the scheme.

"There is a need for promoting clean liaison and coordination between chambers, the business community, and tax

The petition was filed on March 30 before the ECP's April 2 order for postponement of Senate polls to the extent of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa until the administration of oath to MPAs elected on reserved seats.

On March 28, ECP, in response to the application of opposition's five women MPAs-elect, declared that if the speaker of the provincial assembly failed to comply with the high court's orders to administer oath to the lawmakers elected on reserved seats, it would postpone Senate elections in the province until the swearing-in of the applicants. ECP put up the polls afterwards.

Petitioner's counsel Ali Zaman argued that Senate polls were conducted across the country, but ECP postponed the same in KP in light of the high court's orders for the provincial assembly speaker to administer oath to those members elected on reserved seats. He said that the order of ECP was illegal and unconstitutional.

He said that ECP didn't have the power to postpone Senate elections in the province where they were held in other parts of the country. He stated that the petitioner was a contesting candidate, but he was neither heard by ECP

nor was he issued any notice for it.

The counsel said that during previous hearing the court had asked ECP to submit schedule of the polls to the court.

Lawyer for ECP, Mohsin Kamran Siddiqui said that the court had not asked for the schedule rather it had sought a report from the commission. He stated that he had submitted a report to ECP to the court.

When the bench inquired from him about latest situation in the matter, he said that Supreme Court of Pakistan had adjourned on June 24 hearing of the cases related to non-implementation of reserved seats to Senate Election Council (SEC) and adjourning the same to other political parties.

He stated that the apex court had ordered that it would conduct day-to-day hearing on these cases. He said that one of the cases pending before SC was about the PEC's decision to dismiss the plea of SEC against the ECP's March 1 order to deny that party non-represented for women and non-Muslims. He said that the court had issued a stay order in that case.

The other case, he said, pertained to PEC's order for KP Assembly speaker to administer oath to those opposition members and to allow and facilitate their voting in Senate elections. He stated that in case the apex court decided to allot these seats to SC, it would harm the party in the polls.

Judge Shakil inspired from petitioner's counsel as to why oath was not administered to those members on the order of high court. The counsel replied that the assembly was not in session, therefore, oath couldn't be administered to them.

## MTRA starts registration of people for organ donation

Speakers say lack of awareness hampers treatment of patients requiring human organs

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority on Thursday launched registration of people wanting to donate their organs to save lives of others until cells by experts that lack of awareness has been hampering treatment of patients requiring human organs.

"In Pakistan, the number of renal transplants is about 1,800 against the need of 30,000. There is huge deficit of demand and supply, which can be bridged through scaling up awareness regarding organ donation," Prof Asif Madni, the chairman of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority (MTRA), said.

Speaking at a ceremony held here to mark World Transplant Day at Khyber Girls Medical College, he said that they launched a portal where the people could donate their organs that could be used for saving the lives of needy patients.

"Lack of donation culture has led to buying of organs from people. It is illegal and entails complications. Donation of organs as per law is a

waste of healthiness for both donors and recipients," he said.

Prof Malik, a former transplant surgeon at Institute of Kidney Diseases (IKD), said that they had authorized 13 hospitals for organ transplant including renal and eye where people could undergo procedures in the safest manner by professional surgeons.

"Recently, we organized 'transplant games' wherein about 100 patients, who had recovered after transplants, took part and enjoyed," he added.

Dr Attaur Rehman, also a former transplant surgeon at IKD, said they were starting "deceased donor scheme" to retrieve kidneys of the people with dead brain and transplant the same to patients with damaged

urinary organs. "Similarly, we are also considering launching pair donation in which families can exchange kidneys to match recipients to resolve the issue of mismatch of both," he added.

Prof Saeedullah Jan, the director of Pakistan Institute of Community Ophthalmology (PICO) at Hayatabad Medical Complex, painted a grim picture of organ donations in the country and said that they had to wait for donations from the USA and other countries to carry out normal transplants.

"There are 1,200 patients awaiting their transplants at PICO only and we urge people to start donating corneas so as to help restore the sight of the people blinded by cylinder blinks and other incidents

We are way behind from Nepal, Iran, Sri Lanka and India where people are in the habit of organ donation," he said.

Prof Qibla Awan, the former chairman of Council of Islamic Ideology, said that they had forwarded recommendations to government after in-depth research that organ donation was allowed in Islam. "We need to establish an endowment fund to strengthen transplantation in the province," he added.

Khyber Medical University Vice chancellor Prof Ziauddin Haq, KMC Dean Prof Zahid Ansari, HMC Prof medical director Shehzad Akbar Khan, deputy director of FIA Saeedullah Khan and others also spoke on the occasion.

Slides were also displayed by au-

thorities to send a message that donation was legal and people must donate organs.

Health Minister Syed Qasim Ali Shah said that doctors in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were capable to carry out transplants and other latest procedures in the field of medical sciences. He stressed the need for preventive measures for gut bleeds or abscesses and other ailments.

He said that government was providing free health services to people on Naya Card Plus as per vision of PTI founder Imran Khan. He claimed it was not possible even in developed countries where people paid premium to get health insurance. "In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, all people get similar treatment services," he added.

## Displaced Kukikhels start returning to Tirah valley

KHYBER: The displaced families of Kukikhel tribe started returning to their homes in Tirah valley after repeated protests and demonstrations.

Some 50 families left Jamrud late on Wednesday while another batch of similar number of families belonging to Manayakhal sub-tribe of Kukikhel started their return journey to Pake Dara on Thursday.

A Kukikhel elder, Malik Nasir Ahmed, told Dawn that though the returning families were not provided with sufficient assistance except for a tent, a mattress and some kitchen items, the returning families arranged transport for their return journey from their own limited resources.

He accused the government departments concerned of ignoring their repeated requests and appeals for a comprehensive package on the pattern of the rest of IDPs from other tribal districts in recent past.

He said most of the homes in the Kukikhel areas of Tirah valley were unsuitable for living as these houses were either damaged in military operations or had collapsed during snowy and rainy season during a decade of displacement of the local tribesmen.

Members of some of the returning families said that it was very difficult for them to accommodate one whole family in just one tent while none of them were provided food, which was essential for their survival for at least three months.

The remaining Kukikhel families' exact numbers could not be ascertained as they had not registered themselves with the erstwhile Fata Disaster Management Authority back in 2012 when they left their homes.

## Two friends shot dead by rivals in Swabi

SWABI: Two friends were shot dead in Kala village while separately an senior citizen drowned in Gohail canal here on Thursday.

Mohammed Ibrahim, brother of one of the deceased Mohammed Asim, told police that he was at home when his got the information that his brother and a relative, Iftikhar Ali, were killed by unknown persons in Kala mountainous area.

He claimed that both were shot dead by Muazzam Khan and his two other unidentified accomplices. He said before the incident, they were invited to the spot on mobile phone where they were killed under a well-planned strategy.

The cause of the incident was stated to be a one-and-a-half-month old feud in which Mohammed Asim was injured in firing by Muazzam Khan. Mohammed Ibrahim claimed that Muazzam took the extreme step as he was expecting a revenge attack from Asim.

Police have registered an FIR and started investigation.

Meanwhile, Gul Mohammed, 80, drowned in Gohail canal on Thursday when he was bathing on its bank but slipped into deep water, Rescue 1122 officials said. Sezgi Shah, a rescue official, told Dawn that soon after receiving information they reached the canal, recovered the body and handed it over to the family.

Also in the day, dead bodies of two youngsters, who had drowned in the Indus River four days back, were recovered in Hund area by local divers on Thursday.

The bodies of two youngsters, Zamir Ahmad, 17, and Mohammed Tayyab, 16, were handed over to their families for burial. They were hailing from Garmanara village. — Correspondent

## No headway in talks over Malakand student's death

## UoM students boycott annual exam, lock depts

LAWER, DIB: The Adenai Qasmi Jirga elders and the Students' Jirga members representing students of the University of Malakand, on Thursday made no headway in talks over student Masa Khan's death in a road accident after their demands were accepted.

The students boycotted their annual exams, locked all deans' rooms, and staged a sit-in on campus, where they offered Parcha for Masa.

The Students' Jirga, led by Masa Khan, reiterated the demands for the dismissal of Vice-Chancellor Prof Rashid Ahmad, Pro-VC Dr Arshad

Rohman, Prorector Dr Janis Khan, chief proctor Dr Arif and hotel workers Hafiz Khan over the incident.

They met the Adenai Qasmi Jirga elders in Chakdara and informed them of their demands before meeting the university's administration.

The students announced that the protest would continue until their demands were accepted.

Masa Khan, a student of the UoM's journalism and mass communication department, was killed in a road accident on May 20 after his alleged migration from the hotel at night for playing cards.

Adenai Qasmi Jirga elders, including Khurshid Ali and Arfan Khan of the PPP, Syed Sultanzai Yar Bacha of the Jamiat-e-Ulema, Hajj General Head of the JUI-F, Fakhar Zaman of the PTE, and others, first met the UoM administration at the

Chakdara Fishing Hot and informed it about the students' demands.

The talks lasted three hours. The university's administration agreed to accept all student demands related to it.

Jirga leaders Syed Sultanzai Yar and Khurshid Ali later confirmed the development during a media talk in the presence of Vice-Chancellor Prof Rashid Ahmad, the Adenai AAC, and representatives of teachers.

They said the university's administration had agreed to accept the students' demands, while those related to the provincial government and the governor would be taken with the relevant quarters.

The elders later met members of the Students' Jirga, who demanded the sacking of the pro-VC, provost, chief proctor, and hotel workers and said they

wouldn't call off protests until the demands were met.

The Adenai elders asked them to wait to end the protest and sit the annual exam.

Meanwhile, a delegation of the university teachers' association led by Dr Samina Rohman met members of the Students' Jirga and agreed to their demands.

DUMDULSHAH: The district administration on Thursday demolished several illegal buildings, shops, and kiosks on the roadside during its anti-environmental crack-down.

The action was taken on the orders of the Supreme Court, according to officials.

They said the TMA-owned shops

near the Timergara bus stand, a food godown in the main city, and the boundary wall of the district headquarters hospital in Timergara would also be pulled down.

Deputy commissioner Wasil Khan told reporters that ahead of the crackdown, the administration issued notices to the encroachers for the removal of illegal structures.

# Mahmood accuses govt of scrapping Malakand's Rs18bn uplift projects

PTI-P leader says both federal, KP govt not taking province's issues seriously

PESHAWAR: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf Parliamentarians (PTI-P) chairman and former provincial chief minister Muhammad Khan on Thursday alleged that the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government had scrapped Rs18 billion development projects for Malakand division, including Swat district, from the budget.

The provincial government has meted out a "stepmotherly" treatment towards Malakand division by scrapping Rs18 billion development projects in 2024-25, Mr Mahmood, a native of Swat district, told a party meeting here.

The meeting was attended by

PTI-P leaders and office-bearers from across the province.

Mr Mahmood also criticised the federal government's decision to abandon the Public Sector Development Programme projects approved by the last Pakistani Tehreek-e-Insaf government for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and said the same amounted to discriminating against the province.

"The centre has dropped our province's 51 PSDP projects, including Phase II of the Swat Motorway. This is an anti-peoples decision that has come due to the ruling party's perspectives," he said.

The PTI-P leader urged Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif to restore the province's development funds.

"Islamabad KP Chief Minister Ali Amro Khan Gondalur to restore Malakand Division's development projects," he said.

Mr Mahmood said the party asked the federal government to give Khyber Pakhtunkhwa its share in development funds.

He said the province was suffering

due to the sparring between the federal and provincial governments.

"Neither the federal government nor the provincial government is taking the province's issues seriously," he said.

The PTI-P leader said that after getting the people's mandate in the February 8 general elections, both the federal and provincial governments were trampling on the people's mandate.

He said KP, which had badly suffered due to terrorism, floods, and other natural disasters, was being neglected by the centre.

"This situation is affecting the development of our province," he said.

Mr Mahmood asked the members of the members of the National Assembly from the province to raise their voices to protect the interests of the residents.

He said that the PTI-P had street power and had delivered during its rule in the province.

"We have the experience and can play our due role in addressing perso-

nal's issues," he said.

The PTI-P leader complained that both election winners and losers alleged poll rigging.

"In these circumstances, neither the current system nor the federal and provincial governments can deliver the goods," he said.

Tanawali Aman Action Committee chairman Usair Khatri of Jelha said reporters that the use of harmful chemicals for blasting poses grave health risks.

Accompanied by a group of residents, he and his committee were working to stop the illegal mineral excavation in Oghi and Darbandi tribal areas.

Mr Khatri alleged mineral theft and criticised authorities for failing to crack down on it.

He said the mineral department's teams recently intercepted many trucks loaded with granite on the Karakoram Highway and arrested smugglers, but still more coordinated efforts were needed to check mineral smuggling.

The committee chief said a joint committee should be formed to protect granite and other natural resources in the area.

He said Jelha Kharta and neighbouring villages had recorded a high incidence of skin and other health problems due to the use of harmful chemicals for mine blasting.

"Though the large-scale illegal mining is depleting water resources, neither the district administration nor the mineral department have bothered to protect our health," he said.


