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Govt gives tentative plan to present budget on 12th

NA speaker forms three interim committees to get approval for pending bills

ISLAMABAD: The federal government on Thursday announced a tentative plan to present the country's budget for the next fiscal year on June 12 as National Assembly Speaker Ayaz Sadiq, using his special powers, "appointed" three standing committees on an interim basis to get approval of pending bills.

According to an official announcement by the National Assembly Secretariat, the speaker appointed these standing committees using his powers under Rule 215 of the Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the National Assembly, 2007.

The committees, comprising only five members, mostly from the treasury benches, also held their meetings on Thursday and approved various bills that had been laid before the National Assembly during its recent session.

It was due to lack of understanding and some differences that the government and the opposition have so far failed to agree on the composition and the chairmanship of the committees, even more than three months after the election of Shehbaz Sharif as the prime minister.

Under the rules, the committees are required to be formed within 30 days after the prime minister's election.

Budget session plan

The announcement regarding the formation of the interim committees came after the speaker presided over a consultative meeting of the parliamentary leaders to discuss the schedule of the budget session that has already begun on Thursday.

According to an official announcement, the members of the treasury and the opposition members agreed that soon after presentation of the budget, the NA would go on a week-long recess due to Eid-ul-Azha.

A general debate on the budget would start on June 20 which would continue till 24th. The members will take part in the debate and voting on cut motions on June 26 and 27 whereas the budget will be passed on June 28.

The announcement says that this plan is not final and there can be changes in it according to the situation. The meeting was attended by Deputy Speaker Syed Ghulam Mustafa Shah,

Law Minister Anwar Nasir Tarar, Dr Tariq Fazal Chaudhry and Hakeem Rehman of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N), Syed Naveed Qasim and Ijaz Jakhani of the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP), Asim Durrani and Ali Muhammad Khan of the Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC), Amir Hani of the Muttahida Qasmi Movement (MQM), Noor Alam Khan and Shabir Akhtar of the Jamiat Ulama-i-Islam (JUI-F) and Khalid Magesi of the Balochistan Awami Party (BAP).

According to sources, the critical National Economic Council (NEC) meeting, essential for reviewing the current year's macroeconomic situation and development programme and approving the next year's economic and development agenda, has yet to be scheduled and the government has yet to constitute the National Economic Council.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Finance Minister Muhammad Asim Durrani are currently on a visit to China and thus unavailable to lead key consultations until Saturday which could be the first available date for an NEC meeting, provided the relevant documentation with provinces, the prime minister and the president are circulated through electronic means for constituting and notifying the NEC.

Standing committees

Meanwhile, due to a delay in the process of the formation of the standing committees and amid criticism by the members from the treasury as well as the opposition, the speaker formed the committees on information and broadcasting, maritime affairs and communications, but only to approve some bills based on the already promulgated ordinances which were laid before the assembly by the government amid opposition's criticism.

The meeting of the standing committee on information and broadcasting was presided over by PPP's Syed Naveed Qasim whereas PML-N's Bilal Akhtar Kiyani and MQM's Amir Hani presided over the meetings of the committees on maritime affairs and communications, respectively.

These chairmen later attended the meetings of the other two committees as members with JUI-F's Noor Alam Khan and Ayesha Sajid of the Ittehad-i-Pakistan Party.

The bills passed by these committees were the Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 2023, the Pakistan National Shipping Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 2023, the Pakistan Postal Services Management Board (Amendment) Bill, 2023 and the National Highway Authority (Amendment) Bill, 2023.

LHC orders police to recover PTI activist's brothers

Azhar Mashwani's father claims his family is being 'politically victimised'

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court on Thursday directed the Punjab Inspector General of Police to recover two brothers of PTI social media head Azhar Mashwani, allegedly picked up by law enforcement agencies.

Justice Syed Shahid Ali Rizvi gave the order

while hearing a petition filed by Qazi Habibullah Rehman, the father of the alleged abducted man — Zahoorul Hassan and Mashwani Hassan.

A counsel for the petitioner alleged that the sons of his client were in illegal custody of the law enforcement agencies.

The judge asked the lawyer why the petitioner did not first file an application with the police. The lawyer said both siblings were also previously detained for 150 days and then released.

The petitioner was also picked up, he said, adding that the petitioner and his family were being targeted for

political victimisation.

When Justice Rizvi asked the counsel who had detained the petitioner's sons for 150 days, the lawyer said the authorities did not disclose this and the two individuals were later released.

The judge later ordered the Punjab IGP and the Counter-Terrorism Department (CTED) to recover the individuals and produce them before the court on Friday (today).

IC Punjab Dr Usman Anwar and Additional IC CTD Punjab Wassim Sial said they immediately respond to the text messages about the arrests.

ECP to challenge high court order to appoint more tribunals in Punjab: CEC

Raja wonders if ECP's role is that of a mere post office; PML-N Islamabad MNAs express no confidence in appellate body

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) will challenge Lahore High Court's (LHC) order to notify six more election tribunals to hear poll disputes in Punjab, the electoral watchdog's chief said on Tuesday.

Chief Election Commissioner Sikandar Sultan Raja made these remarks on Thursday while hearing a set of applications filed by all three MNAs from Islamabad — belonging to the ruling PML-N — to transfer their cases out of the Islamabad tribunal.

"Why does the law empower the ECP to appoint election tribunals? Is it the role of a mere post office?" the CEC said while referring to the LHC's verdict to appoint six of its judges to election tribunals.

LHC's Justice Shahid Karim, who passed the order, also asked the ECP to ensure implementation within one week.

Islamabad MNAs petitions

The CEC headed a four-member bench which heard the appeals filed by Azhar Aslam Khan, Tariq Fazal Chaudhry and Raja Khuram Nawaz seeking a transfer of their cases to any election tribunal outside of Islamabad.

The counsel for Mr Khan, who

won the election from NA-48, read out an order issued by the Islamabad election tribunal, claiming the first verdict, to collect Forms 45 and 47, was given in the absence of the candidate.

According to the lawyer, the tribunal was informed in writing that the ECP had notified the winning candidates.

"Despite that, the election tribunal fixed time-barred positions for hearing and sent notices to all parties to submit a reply," he noted.

As per the law, election tribunals, comprising high court judges, are constituted after the final result is notified and losing candidates could file petitions within 45 days after the notification of election results.

The lawyer added the tribunal had even issued notices to the ECP and wondered if it was empowered to do so.

The ECP's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa members, Hameedullah Khan, also asked if the tribunal could issue directions to the body that created it. In response, the lawyer said the tribunal can't give directions to the ECP.

The PML-N lawmaker's counsel said they were given "a last chance" in the absence of any evidence and alleged the tribunal was "not working as per procedure".

"We fear that the election tribunal will not give us justice," the lawyer added. He continued that the petitions were to be submitted in the election tribunal later by April 10, but were submitted on April 15. He accused the tribunal of not working impartially and accused it of committing "serious mistakes".

The petitions should have been dismissed for being filed after the 45-day deadline had elapsed, the

counsel contended.

The lawyer for Mr Nawaz, the winning candidate from NA-48, also accused the tribunal of violating trial procedures. He claimed that the tribunal acted as the high court itself, for which it had no mandate.

The tribunal was "not conducting a fair trial", the lawyer argued, adding that the list of witnesses was sought after the framing of issues. He sought the case to be transferred to another tribunal, and if none was available, a fresh one should be constituted.

PML-N MNA Tariq Fazal Chaudhry's lawyer also expressed no confidence in the tribunal, arguing the entire proceedings of the tribunal were "illegal". "We are not being given a fair trial, and we don't expect justice from it," he said.

The lawyer for PTI-backed candidate Muhammad Ali Bakhsh, who was the losing candidate in NA-48, said the tribunal was comprised of a high court judge, and the applicant had alleged bias against the court.

"Applicant Raja Khuram Nawaz has submitted this application to delay the proceedings," he claimed. Sajid Shabiryan Sani, the lawyer for PTI-backed candidate Shahid Shabir, cited a 2014 verdict of the Supreme Court stating that apparent partiality in court decisions is not bias. He said the Elections Act clearly stated that the tribunal should dispose of election petitions within six months.

During the hearing, Mr Shabir urged the bench to adjourn the hearing till Monday, as the ECP decision to hear the case had been challenged.

The CEC contended that the bench would hold the hearing if a stay order had been issued.

ATC grants bail to seven PTI activists in corps commander's house attack case

LAHORE: An antiterrorism court on Thursday granted post-arrest bail to seven activists of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) in a May 9 case of attack on Lahore Corps Commander's House, commonly known as Jinnah House.

Judge Khalid Arshad allowed the bail petitions and directed

each suspect to furnish a surety bond of Rs300,000.

The suspects were Talha Mustafa, Mirza Talib, Mahmood Ahmad, Arhar Abbas, Umar Khan, Zubair Gulzar and Javed.

Separately, Judge Khalid Arshad resumed the jail trial of the Jinnah House attack case in the Kot Lakhpat jail.

The judge directed the prosecution to distribute copies of the

challan (investigation report) among 266 suspects on June 13.

Among the prominent suspects, PTI Punjab President Dr Yousaf Hashid, former governor Omar Sarfraz Chishti, Senator Ejaz Chaudhry and former provincial minister Mian Mahmood Rashed are already in jail.

Several other suspects including fashion designer Khadija

Shah, former MNA Roshan Jamil, social media activists Tayyaba Raja and Aysha Ali Bhatta have been released on bail.

Senior Road police registered the case against leaders and workers of PTI for attacking and vandalising the Jinnah House during the protests of May 9 last year against the arrest of former prime minister Imran Khan.

regarding the ban on live-streaming of this case. He said it had pointed him to learn that the Supreme Court while rejecting the live-streaming of the case had stated something as if he was some kind of an "irresponsible and dangerous character who will abuse the occasion for post scoring or grandstanding".

On June 1, the court ruled that live-streaming was its exclusive domain but expressed with caution to avoid apprehensions of exploitation, misuse of facility for ulterior or personal purposes and to prevent the possibility of grandstanding while the nation watches.

In response to the co-PM's remarks, the CJJ, however, observed that the judges were not here to explain themselves and asked Mr Khan not to stray on grounds, which were already sub-judice and ultimately

come to the court in appeal. Justice Aminullah Khan also observed that the issue of live-streaming had already been decided.

Speaking during the hearing, Imran Khan was of the view that the NAB chairman should be appointed by the Supreme Court to prevent abuse of power and added that amendments in the NAB law must to save "certain leaders".

Abuse of NAB law

Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail observed that there was no denying the fact that NAB had always been abused against the elected representatives but the remedy to rectify this misuse did not lie with the courts but with the political leaders. "Tomorrow you can come to parliament and make a good accountability law," Justice Mandokhail observed. Imran Khan said NAB "always listens to the

third umpire" — a purported reference to the judiciary.

Referring to the impact of the amendments in the NAB law, he registered NAB recovered Rs255 billion from year 2000 to 2017, which jumped to Rs425 billion from 2017 to 2023. But it dipped to a mere Rs300,000 in 2023, Mr Khan said, registering he was convicted in three cases within five days.

"The reason for less recovery was due to the pendency of the NAB case in the Supreme Court," Justice Mandokhail observed. He claimed that jail always "restores" the politicians. To rectify NAB is not the job of the court but parliament, he said.

Justice Athar Minallah also observed that NAB amendments do not mean that corruption cases have come to an end and further references will be forwarded to relevant courts on admissible under relevant laws.

During the hearing, the PTI founder did concede that his party should come to parliament but "we boycotted in view of the conspiracies hatched" against them.

He said the biggest challenge the country was facing was the lack of foreign exchange which was depleting because the hard-earned money was being transferred by the elites to the foreign lands.

He also cited a 2021 study by the UN which revealed how elites of the developing world had parked \$7 trillion in the West through money laundering.

The CJJ wondered if money laundering was a crime, then why did the former premier introduce amnesty schemes in the country when he was in power? At this, Mr Khan explained that the amnesty scheme was introduced to "legitimise" the black money. The CJJ, pointing towards

Senator Farooq Nadeem and PTI's Faraz Javed, asked them to sit together in parliament to solve the crisis.

The court also took exception to the NAB report, in which it showed the recovery of \$10 billion in the hand of Rishi Dey and asked the NAB additional prosecutor general (APG) whether this statement was "biased or dishonest".

The court even warned of contempt notice for claiming to recover \$10 billion, wondering if NAB had the audacity to mislead the court.

He also asked the NAB APG not to attend the court in future and ordered the NAB chairman and the prosecutor general to furnish a fresh report regarding the breakdown of the NAB budget for the last 10 years, as well as its annual budget.

Earlier, senior counsel Khuram Raza Ahmed also concluded his arguments.

India returns 82-year-old villager who strayed across LoC

MUZAFFARABAD: An 82-year-old villager from Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK), who had inadvertently strayed into the Indian-occupied territory of the disputed Himalayan region on Tuesday, was repatriated by the Indian authorities via the Tattara-Chakani da Bagh crossing point along the Line of Control (LoC) on Thursday.

Muhammad Hussain had left his home in the Baital sector of Poonch district to join his wife who was grazing cattle there. However, the octogenarian villager, suffering from some

mental ailments for about four years, went astray and set foot on India-occupied territory, where he was apprehended by an army patrol.

The family and government officials in AJK came to know about his ordeal on Wednesday after the Indian media ran stories about an "intruder."

Waleed Anwar, assistant commissioner of Hajira, of which Baital sector is a part, told Dawn that Indian authorities were reached by their Pakistani counterparts the same day for his repatriation in accordance with an understanding between the two sides about inadvertent crossers.

Mr Anwar said the repatriation took place at about 4pm through the Tattara-Chakani da Bagh, which was one of three active crossing points at the LoC before India militarily suspended the intra-Kashmir travel and trade, shortly before snatching the special status of occupied Jammu and Kashmir in August 2019.

Wearing a new black kurta and white shalwar gifted by the Indian authorities along with a box of sweets, Mr Hussain was greeted first by his son, Muhammad Rashed, upon entering the liberated territory through an iron gate that marks the divide between the two sides.

His nephew, Liaqat Hussain, cousin, Muhammad Akhtar and numerous jubilant fellow villagers were also present on the occasion in addition to the concerned civil and military officials.

"There is an atmosphere of jubilation not only in our home but also in the entire village on his safe return because in some similar cases in the past, people have met tragedy at the LoC," Liaqat Hussain told Dawn by telephone from Gulshan Colony in Baital sector.

Presumably, the 42-year-old countryman was referring to the shooting of AJK residents by the Indian army while they

were either collecting herbs, cutting fodder or grazing cattle close to the unmarked dividing line.

"We are grateful to our armed forces and our civil administration for their role in his early return," he said.

"At the same time, I also express my gratitude to the Indian authorities for sending him back alive." He said Mr Hussain, who also suffered from hypertension, felt exhausted by the unpleasant trekking through the forests, he was taking rest, after being given his medication.

"But people are constantly visiting us to extend felicitations."

AJK prime minister invites citizens' input for development, promises swift action

MUZAFFARABAD: Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) Prime Minister Chaudhry Anwarul Haq on Thursday invited the state's/ragious citizens to share their views for the development of the liberated territory and the well-being of its inhabitants, assuring that his government would promptly act on any noble proposals received.

Expressing his views on former premier Raja Farooq Haider's adjournment motion on the floor of the Legislative Assembly, PM Haq asserted that all decisions in his government were made in consultation with the coalition partners.

"I have full faith in the constitution process," he said. "All decisions in my government are taken collaboratively because I believe no one is perfect. We must embrace democratic attitudes and reject bigotry, superstitions, and politics of hatred."

Earlier, Mr Haider highlighted the need to reflect on the events during the long march of the Joint Action Committee (JAC), warning that the repercussions of the recent rights movement could emerge in the next two or three years and might prove harmful.

"This is not a victory for anyone but a path to destruction," said Mr

Haider, who is a senior PMJ-N leader. "As a political worker, it's my duty to point out these issues. They may hurt anyone at me on social media, but I will continue to call a spade a spade."

The prime minister noted that [redacted] members from the PMJ-N and PPP had been involved in negotiations with JAC from the beginning, demonstrating his commitment to involving coalition partners in decision-making.

He emphasized his belief in action over hollow announcements and pledged to ensure the implementation of his commitments. He asserted that those challenging the state would be dealt with strictly and political issues would be addressed through political means.

Expressing his commitment to maintaining financial discipline, Mr Haq assured that taxpayers' money would be spent solely on the welfare of the masses, with development funds allocated on the basis of the needs of the areas concerned.

"It is the government's primary responsibility to bring significant improvements in sectors like infrastructure, health, education, and tourism, while also addressing the deprivations of the people," he said.

"As regards strengthening of the system, it is a collective responsibility of all segments of society."

Without mincing words, the AJK premier stated that while the government must meet legitimate public demands, no one would be allowed to challenge the government's authority or paralyze the system. "Mischievous cannot be tolerated under the cover of [demands for cheap] electricity and flour. Such actions will be handled with an iron hand."

He also reiterated that the Kashmiris' eternal relationship with Pakistan and their ideology of accession to Pakistan would be further strengthened with strong conviction.

Mr Haq made it clear that nobody was indispensable and that his tenure in office depended on the confidence of the majority in the Legislative Assembly. "As long as I enjoy the confidence of the majority, I will remain in this office. Otherwise, someone else will replace me."

Other speakers on the motion included PMJ-N regional president Shah Ghulam Qadir, former president and PPP leader Niaz Ahmad Khan, and cabinet members Faisal Murtaza Bhattora, Mian Abdul Wahid, Abdul Majid Khan, and Nabila Ayub.

Later, Speaker Chaudhry Latif Akbar adjourned the session until June 13.

IHC removes objections on pleas against amendments to election law

Petitions filed by three runner-up NA candidates will be taken up today

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Thursday removed administrative objections on petitions filed against the recent amendments to the Elections Act 2017 and the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP)'s jurisdiction to entertain applications seeking the transfer of petitions related to three constituencies of the federal capital.

IHC Chief Justice Anwar Farooq took up the petitions and heard the arguments of the counsel against the objections raised by the registrar office.

The petitions were filed by PTI-backed independent candidates from NA-46, NA-47 and NA-48.

The registrar office had raised the objections that the petitioners could not challenge the provisions of Elections Act and the presidential ordinance.

Muhammad Shoaib Shaban, Muhammad Ali Bakhsh and Amir Maghal have challenged the view of Section 151 of the Elections Act 2017 and the Elections (Amendment) Ordinance 2024 promulgated on May 27, 2024.

Section 151 of the Elections Act empowered the ECP to "transfer a petition from one tribunal to another."

Whereas, the presidential ordinance promulgated on May 27 amended Section 140 of the Act and allowed for retired judges to be appointed as election tribunals and that too without the consultation of the chief justice.

The counsel for the petitioners pointed out that the view of Elections Act, the ordinance and the proceeding before the ECP could have been challenged in a single petition.

Justice Farooq

removed the objections and remarked that the court would hear detailed arguments on the petitions after the registrar office would number them accordingly. The court would hear the petitions on Friday today.

The identical petitions contended that as per Forms 45 and 46, the PTI's runner-up could have won the elections with heavy margin but, due to manipulation in the results they had been defeated.

The petitioners stated that following the notification of the election tribunal for Islamabad, the

runner-up filed an election petition in the tribunal appointed under Section 140 of the Elections Act 2017.

On the first date of the hearing on May 2, the tribunal issued notices to the ECP, returned candidates and the returning officers and directed them to file original Forms 45 and 46. On the next date of hearing i.e. May 20, the ECP and some of the respondents appeared and the tribunal directed them to file their replies and the original Form-45/ Form-46.

According to the petition, PTI-N candidates

filed applications under section 145(1) of the Elections Act 2017 for summary dismissal of the petition on the ground that the same was time-barred.

The tribunal after hearing preliminary arguments issued notice to the petitioner with a direction to file reply by giving an advance copy to the other side, and adjourned the case to May 5 for arguments.

The returned candidates of the PTI-N filed applications against the presiding judge of the tribunal, Justice Tariq Mahmood Jhangir, in the ECP.

Addressing contempt

THE judiciary should have long ago redrawn the line that separates acceptable and unacceptable criticism. It is realising quite belatedly that matters have gone too far. As the Supreme Court proceeds in its contempt case against Senator Faisal Vawda and MNA Mustafa Kamal, 34 television channels have been issued show-cause notices for airing problematic remarks made by the two lawmakers, ostensibly in violation of broadcast regulations. Some weeks ago, Messrs Vawda and Kamal had, on separate occasions, made several intemperate remarks regarding the judiciary. Their remarks were aired live by many news channels, prompting concerns over what, prima facie, seemed to be an open attack on senior judges. The incident prompted the SC to take notice and summon the two lawmakers for an explanation.

While Mr Kamal subsequently attempted an apology, Mr Vawda has not appeared remorseful. It may be recalled that Mr Vawda doubled down on his stance some two weeks ago in a speech he made in the Senate, in which, protected by House privileges, he said he stood by every word uttered in his press conference. Another senator also seized the occasion to level his own condemnations against the judiciary. Separately, a bill was presented to the National Assembly seeking a bar on individuals with dual nationality from serving in the judiciary, ostensibly to target a justice of the Islamabad High Court. Given the context in which these developments took place, the SC had to take a forceful stand. It must now take this case to its logical conclusion. The TV channels that have been put on notice must explain themselves and commit to following broadcast regulations, while errant lawmakers must pay a price for their ad hominem attacks. It has been noticed that, in recent years, prominent individuals have taken to assailing the judiciary whenever rulings have gone against them. This has slowly given rise to a culture normalising contempt. It is imperative that this culture be dismantled and the boundaries of acceptable criticism defined once again.

Lastly, it is encouraging to note that the judiciary, while demonstrating more strictness on the matter of contempt, is taking a measured approach to rectifying the problem. Pemra, which had earlier issued a blanket ban on the coverage of court proceedings in its 'over-zealous' response to the court's concerns, has been admonished for an illogical order. The apex court has warned it against 'creating hurdles in the way of court proceedings' and promised action if it did not comply. Separately, the IBC, chief justice has also reaffirmed the media's right to report fairly on ongoing proceedings. Pemra should now withdraw its order forthwith and let the media do its job. Its strange diktat has caused enough trouble for reporters merely covering their beat.

Averting disaster

PAKISTAN stands on the precipice of yet another potential flood disaster. According to the National Disaster Management Authority, the country is likely to experience 40-60pc more rainfall than usual during the coming monsoon season. This excess precipitation, coupled with melting glaciers and a westerly weather system, are said to have the potential to trigger flooding reminiscent of the devastating 2014 floods which claimed 367 lives. The abnormal rains are expected to begin on July 25 and persist into August, threatening to inundate northern Punjab and its eastern rivers — Ravi, Jhelum, and Chenab. Additionally, flash floods are anticipated in the northern regions due to four forecasted Glacial Lake Outburst Flood events. These floods, while expected to be less severe than the catastrophic floods in 2010 and 2022, still pose a substantial threat. The 2010 floods affected over 20m people, causing nearly 2,000 deaths and significant infrastructure damage. Similarly, the 2022 deluge resulted in 1,696 fatalities, injuries to 12,897 individuals, and affected 33m people, decimating over 4m acres of crops and 1m livestock. These events underscore the impact of climate-induced disasters on Pakistan's population and economy. As things stand, we can ill afford another one of such magnitude.

With the anticipated floods less than two months away, we must prepare by briskly implementing several key measures. To begin with, the government should expedite the reinforcement of embankments and drainage systems in vulnerable areas to prevent overflow and waterlogging. In addition, conducting public awareness campaigns is essential to educate communities on emergency procedures and evacuation routes. Moreover, pre-positioning relief supplies, such as food, water, medical kits, and temporary shelters, in strategic locations will ensure rapid distribution during crises. Strengthening early warning systems to provide timely and accurate flood forecasts will enable proactive evacuations. It is commendable that the NDMA has endeavoured to get ahead of the situation. It conducted multi-hazard simulation drills focused on improving coordination among provincial disaster management agencies and showcased mock responses to simulated scenarios. By learning from past experiences — the most recent calamity was less than two years ago — Pakistan can better protect its citizens and minimise the devastating effects of natural disasters. The time to act is now, before the rains hit and history repeats itself.

Overzealous state

INSTEAD of addressing the core issues that fuel discontent amongst the citizenry, the state prefers to go after those who highlight and criticise its deficiencies. This is borne out by the case of Kashmiri poet Ahmed Farhad Shah. Mr Shah was reportedly picked up from his Islamabad home on May 15 and 'surfaced' two weeks later in an Aard Kashmir village after the Islamabad High Court was approached to seek his whereabouts. The poet remains in detentions, denied bail, and faces a slew of charges, including in the Anti-Terrorism Act. His apparent 'crime' is the fact that he published material linked to the antigovernment protests that had rocked AJK last month, with prosecutors alleging Mr Shah 'incited hatred'. His counsel have argued that the poet was in Islamabad at the time of the alleged offence in Muzaffargarh.

Ahmed Farhad Shah is not the first critical voice to be detained for simply voicing an opinion. Over the decades, countless poets, writers, journalists and political activists have been hauled up under similarly onerous charges. Terrorism charges are an extreme overreaction to publishing a poem or a critical social media post. Moreover, the way in which the poet was apprehended, and later 'surfaced', speaks of the dubious methods the state employs against dissidents, while circumventing due process. Instead of hunting down dissenting voices, and accusing them of spreading violence, the government does little about those sectarian and communal groups whose actual bread and butter revolves around promoting hatred. The state should consider dropping the extreme charges levelled against Mr Shah and let him return to his family. Sadly, instead of honestly confronting the economic and other issues that are fueling discontent in AJK, Gilgit-Baltistan, Balochistan and elsewhere, the state prefers to deal with the symptoms and not the cause of the malaise. After decades of applying failed prescriptions, it is time for a new approach to alluviate popular concerns.

No country for the young

Our fear of young people and their potential makes us want to control them.

A STUDENT is expelled for bringing a *rabab* to the university hostel and playing it. A university in Lahore expels two students when they embrace each other after one of them proposed to the other publicly. Baloch students get harassed and picked up every so often from various universities across the country. Policing what students wear, especially females, is common on many campuses. Women are told they cannot wear jeans or tight, etc. Some universities even have rules on how close men and women can come when they are talking to each other. Student unions continue to be illegal.

What are young people supposed to do? How are they supposed to get ready for life after university if we are not going to allow them to talk to each other, interact with each other, be responsible for what they wear (they are over 18 and adults by all definitions), and have confidence in themselves and their choices? It is okay for these young people to get married and have children and to vote once they turn 18, but it is not okay for them to talk to the other gender or decide how much distance to keep from others or what to wear?

As soon as it comes to women's dress, people ask: are you saying we should allow people to wear whatever they want? What if someone comes to university scantily clad or in very revealing clothes? But have we seen a lot of women walking around on Pakistani campuses dressed like this? Pakistan already has decency laws. They should apply to campuses as well. Why should there be separate laws for university campuses?

It is not about clothes, poetry or music. It is about policing. It is about the fact that we do not trust young people and we are afraid of young people. And by we, I mean we as a collective — especially the elites and people who have power and privilege. Of all constituencies, it is the

young who have the potential to shake existing power structures. But that can only happen if the youth are organised, if they have spaces to reflect on what they stand for, what they want and how they wish to go about achieving it. The power holders are afraid of exactly this.

Pakistan is a young country. The 2017 population census showed that 40.51 per cent of our population was under 15 years of age, and another 19.19pc between 15 and 24 years. Almost 60pc of the population, therefore, was under 24 years of age. This country should be for young people; it should work to ensure that the youth, the future of this country, get every opportunity to develop. But our fear of young people and their potential makes us want to control them.

Dr Adil Najam and I were the lead authors of the 2017 UNDP *National Human Development Report* for Pakistan, which was on youth. As part of the data collection for the report, and among other things, we also did a nationally representative youth perception survey. Some of the facts that came up in the survey were very revealing. For instance, 94pc of the surveyed youth said they had no access to a library, 93pc said they had no access to sports facilities, 92pc had never heard a live music concert, 92pc had never been to a cinema, 94pc had never been to watch a sports event, 40pc said they played sports infrequently, and 85pc said they had no access to the internet. I saw a report on a youth survey conducted recently by the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics and the numbers quoted there, in terms of youth having access to entertainment and other healthy activities, were very similar.

But the rhetoric in the country is that youth development is a national priority, as we want to benefit from the 'dividend' of this demographic goldmine — ie, a high number of youth. We want

them to get technical education so that they can be gainfully employed and can be exported as labour to other countries if possible. We want them to be computer literate so that we can increase our software and IT-based exports. We want them to be entrepreneurs and risk takers so that they can be job creators rather than job seekers. But we are not willing to give them space for debate and discussion. We do not want to empower them, allow them the freedom to think and act, and we definitely do not want them to be 'political'. With the voting age at 18 years, we want them to vote but we do not want them to be political, or politically aware, and we definitely do not want them to take part in politics or question the political settlements/arrangements in the country.

This is the crux of the problem. We cannot have the spirit of risk-taking and inquiry in entrepreneurship and/or business and not in other areas. If the youth are going to be empowered to be the vanguard of business, entrepreneurship and the computer sciences, they have to have the same opportunities in other areas as well. They will have to have a say in the political, social and economic developments in the country. They will need to be in political parties, they will need to be in assemblies, they will need to be members of all sorts of governance fora. To do all of the above, they will need to develop their confidence in their own abilities and thinking. We will need to create the space for young people to do that. If we are not willing to give them space, it is hard to expect that we will have a leadership in the future — in all walks of life — that is different to the disastrous one we have today. ■

Can courts fix the climate crisis?

THE realities of climate change that seven-year-old Rabia Ali had warned us of eight years ago have hit home. Take, for example, the latest heatwaves, which thousands are experiencing across Pakistan. "It's like sitting in a furnace," says Nasir Jumeja, a resident of Jacobabad, Sindh, where temperatures have reached up to 51 degrees Celsius.

Back in 2016, Ali had taken the government of Pakistan to court for violating her fundamental 'right to life' by mining coal in Tharparkar and polluting the air and the water she breathed and consumed. She reminded the state of its legal obligation towards its citizens, warning that its apathy towards climate change could become an existential threat in times to come.

A year before, Asghar Leghari, a lawyer, had also charged the state with violating his fundamental right to life due to its inaction in meeting its climate change adaptation targets which, he warned, impacted the country's water, food and energy security. It was the year when Pakistan, along with almost every nation in the world, signed the Paris Agreement, promising to limit any rise in global average temperatures to well below 2°C — in fact, a maximum of 1.5°C — above pre-industrial levels. Leghari recalled the court's historic ruling to be "affirmative" and thus quite significant, after it set up a climate commission to oversee the working of the state departments.

The right to a clean environment may not expressly be mentioned in Pakistan's Constitution, but the courts have interpreted the Constitution to include it as a fundamental right. In the 'Shehla Zia vs Wapda' case in 1994, Justice Saleem Akhtar explained that the right to 'live' does not only mean "the vegetative or animal life or mere existence from conception to death". Life, as he saw it, should "include all such amenities and facilities which a person born in a free country is entitled to enjoy with dignity, legally and constitutionally".

Although there is much awareness as well as acceptance about climate change since 2015, bringing about a systemic change has yet to happen. Perhaps we need to change the way we are looking at the phenomenon; perhaps it should be given a human face. That is what the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan is calling for —

bringing climate change out of the folds of science and environment and examining it through the lens of climate justice.

The year 2024 started with a skewed and alarming weather phenomenon for Pakistan. Close on the heels of a snowless December in 2023, the new year began with some snow, but it was too little, too late. In the plains, the winter season began with a pall of doom soon. Then April received above average rainfall, making it the wettest month since 1961, resulting in over 140 fatalities in KP and Balochistan, not to mention damage to homes and schools.

And now the country is reeling from extreme heat. That is not all. Climatologists say soaring temperatures may lead to glacial melt with

and lack of preparedness for climate-induced disasters on the part of the state.

Due to lack of holding the government accountable to make it to court, 160c Ali and Leghari did. Both brought human rights into the climate change equation.

To be fair, Pakistan is not alone. The story is the same across the globe. Ecological lawyer David Boyd, the outgoing UN special rapporteur on human rights and the environment, believes this game-changing strategy of slapping the state with a slew of court cases will make the state legally obligated to regulate businesses to respect climate, environment and human rights. But Leghari warns that taking the state to court is no substitute for the 'robust policymaking' that climate expert Khaliq referred to earlier. "Courts can be a good tool," he says, but only if litigation is done strategically for it to have an impact.

Due to lack of subject matter expertise in the judiciary, in Pakistan at least, courts may come up with a "whimsical, and not very thought-through prescription", which, although given in good faith, may end up having a negative impact on the larger scheme of things. However, if it is business as usual — inaction on the part of the government and justice denied — it will only exacerbate the climate crisis.

Thus, the upcoming climate change conference organised by the Law and Justice Commission of Pakistan (to be held on June 8, 2024, in Islamabad) could not have come at a more opportune time. Inestimable speakers like Dr Farver Hassan and Justice Mansoor Ali Shah, Ayeshah A. Malik and Javed Hassan will feature at the event. The legal fraternity will deliberate on the climate-related challenges Pakistan is grappling with in different sectors, including agriculture, water, energy, etc, while considering the governance challenges that go with them, and play a part in reminding and holding the state accountable for its obligation to its people and to the planet. At the same time, it is only fair to the state that the people be made responsible for protecting, conserving and restoring the Earth. ■

Humility vs conceit

IN the very beginning of the second chapter of the Quran (Surah al-Baqara), God describes two kinds of people with two kinds of mindsets. The first five verses tell us that the Holy Book is a guidance for the pious who believe in the unseen (ghaybi) they believe in what the Prophet (PBUH) has brought and what the earlier prophets preached. Moreover, they spend what they have been blessed with, and believe in the afterlife. In describing these attributes, the verses stress a humble approach towards accepting God's guidance and to show an attitude of submission towards what one does not know.

On the other hand, right after these verses, the Quran tells us about those who adamantly refuse to submit and mislead believers. To these individuals, the divine scripture proclaims, it makes no difference once whether they are warned or not. The Quran says that God has sealed their hearts, eyes and ears, and for them is punishment. It implies that this attitude itself invites punishment, because the refusal to see, hear, and reflect obviously blocks the grace of God from entering the heart. The Quran says God does not like those who are arrogant and vainglorious (4:34).

In life, we face many kinds of people, some who are very humble, ever seeking the truth. They find themselves in the first group mentioned above. Their quest or search makes them humble and receptive to learning. They, in simple terms, have a more open mind. This connects them with many others who might be seeking similar answers to their questions, thus becoming co-travellers with other seekers.

On the other hand, there are those who claim to know too much, too early, they feel 'buff' of knowledge and wisdom. Such people claim to have more answers than questions. Their knowledge (or ignorance) makes them arrogant, assuming that they have found the final answers to all the perennial questions of life and death. Their attitude, then, makes them condescending towards others, and less willing to listen to alternative perspectives.

These people, then, tend to create a 'ghetto' around themselves in which they live and function. They tend to forget that when we open our mouth to describe others, we only describe ourselves, showing the limits of our own knowledge and understanding.

Let us find some more relevant verses from the Quran that portray or personally humble versus arrogant people.

There are many verses that portray the behaviour of humble people, how their hearts are soft and softened when they look at the miracles of God in the form of

verses (ajaz in Quranic language). There is also admiration in the Quran for those whose hearts are soft, and when verses are recited to them, their hearts 'melt', leading to prostration with humility: "Only those believe in Our Signs, 'who, when verses are recited to them fall down in prostration, and celebrate the praises of their Lord, nor are they (ever) puffed up with pride'" (12:15).

Still another verse exclaims, "And to Allah prostrate all that is in the heavens and all that is in the earth, of the live moving creatures and the angels, and they are not proud" (16:49).

Talking about their humility, the Quran says, "... When the verses of the Most Gracious (Allah) were (or are) recited unto them, they fell (or fell) down prostrating and weeping" (19:58). Their hearts are so softened that they come to learn when the beautiful verses of the majestic Quran are recited to them. They are led to this state because their hearts are wide open to the glory and majesty of God's miracles in the world in the form of miraculous creation.

On the other hand, various verses of the Quran portray arrogant people's hearts as stones, or even worse. In a particular verse, talking about hardened hearts, it describes them as "... like a rock and even worse in hardness."

For among rocks there are some from which rivers gush forth. ... (2:74). Their hearts are hardened so much that they are unable to shed anything good. Thus, if one wants to check if we are humble or arrogant, we must check ourselves against the descriptions of these verses.

Very often knowledge itself gives a lot of pride to people, who then boast and make claims of having absolute truths. This very knowledge hardens their heart and they go on challenging others, believing they have the absolute truth, leading to arrogance. What needs to be remembered is that knowledge has many dimensions and it is interpreted from many angles. It is only through dialogue, discussion and bringing new angles to old truths that we tend to learn new ways of interpreting the old truths. These interpretations depend on how many branches of science we know. The more we know, the better informed we are. ■

Budgeting chaos

'STABILISATION' is the favourite word of mainstream economists. The IMF loves it, and has recently hinted that Pakistan's economy has 'stabilised' enough for it to dole out another three-year bailout close to the \$6 billion that our finance chiefs have been craving.

Let me understand what has been stabilised, except if a slight dip in inflation from over 30 per cent to something like 20pc is a sign of major progress. The economy is still mired in an endemic balance-of-payments crisis, which stacks up all foreign exchange reserves to regularly pay off the interest on our \$135bn external debt burden. And what is 'stabilising' about taking on even more debt from the IMF, Gulf emirs and other 'friends' via the fantastical SIFC, and an increasingly hollowed-out CPIC?

None of these basic facts about Pakistan's political economy will be acknowledged during the upcoming budget announcement, scheduled for June 12. The largely meaningless exercise is being preceded by chaos as ministers engage in an inter-office conflict and bureaucrats do their own bidding. They'll get their act together in time for the budget performance and barely about some numbers. But it doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that nothing is about to change.

Blue-collar working and white-collar salaried classes will be burdened with even more regressive taxes, while public spending on anything other than yet more big infrastructure will decrease again. There will be no honest figures circulated about matters that actually affect the mass of the working people — underemployment, the huge shortage of affordable housing in metropolitan Pakistan, and the multi-pronged deprivation of the almost 40 million landless people in the rural areas.

Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb said recently that fixing Pakistan's economy does not require too many policy prescriptions, that established strategic objectives simply need to be executed. Among other things, the economic minister has been very quiet about privatising all public assets, and inviting investors to develop (read: pillage) once-polluted mineral and other resources. He need not mention real estate, because that is a sector in which investors and developers already enjoy windfall profits.

Pakistan's officials and donors are on the same page about these strategic objectives. In fact, they've been saying more or less the same thing for decades in the name of 'stabilisation'. What's remarkable is that there is so little critique of these neoliberal, straitjacket policies. I think it is a damning indictment of many purportedly independent voices that they continue to accede to

such tired refrain.

In much of the Western world, the mantra of liberalising trade and finance while unabashedly privatising public assets has given way to talk of state-led industrial policy — the US is even explicitly engaging in protectionism vis-à-vis China. But in Pakistan, the 'experts' are unable to think beyond standard neoliberal speak.

It is no wonder that real estate moguls like Malik Raza become powerful benefactors who cannot be named. Such figures are, as recent events show, deeply embedded in the palace intrigues that constitute our establishment-centric political order. Which brings me to the role of the establishment in our crisis-ridden economy with any of our 'experts' summon the courage to talk about the defence budget or hidden subsidies over the next few days?

We do require new policy proposals, Minister Sahib. Most of all, we need to talk about the redistribution of wealth. Our is a country where a small ruling class — including a khaki bourgeoisie — owns the vast majority of land, industrial and financial capital.

This class is content to continue enriching itself, while the IMF and other donors are happy to allow such continuity so long as they get their interest payments back in the name of 'stabilisation'.

The ruling class and its foreign patrons are also intent on pillaging nature and destroying local ecologies in the name of 'development', which equates to future generations of working people being left with an even bigger debt burden and more frequent climate breakdown events to contend with.

If the status quo remains intact, more and more of our rapidly expanding young, working population will seek out livelihoods, housing and other basic needs in what is passed off as the 'informal' economy. If our ministers, donors and other experts had a finger on the pulse of the people, they would spend more time thinking about this than playing with macroeconomic numbers and budgeting chaos; not least because it is also in the 'informal' economy that the ruling class makes billions, siphoning the working poor in Chaman, Taffan and so many other spaces. But our policy debate would rather live in the pretence work of 'stabilisation'. ■

No agreement yet

SRIHAR: The Governments of India and Pakistan have not acceded to the UNCIP's request for unreserved acceptance of the truce terms presented by the Commission on April 28, says an official statement made by the Commission's headquarters here today (June 4). The Commission said that at present it was studying the replies of the two Governments in detail and would decide on its plan for the future after the consideration of all relevant factors. The UNCIP statement says: "Since June 1, when the replies were first made known, the Commission has been giving its undivided attention to the situation in the light of these replies. The Commission notes that the gap between the Indian point of view and that of Pakistan on certain issues has so far not appreciably narrowed."

"This gap relates mainly to the disposition and withdrawal of troops from the State in such a way as to prepare the ground for the holding of a plebiscite to which both Governments committed. [It will be remembered that the major first step, a ceasefire accepted by the two Governments, was achieved on January 1, 1949." — News agencies

The young deserve to have a chance



THIS is with reference to the report "Increase in retirement age to be across board" (May 8), and subsequent discussion on various social media platforms on the subject. A proposal to extend the retirement age by five years has been under discussion, and the justification being given is that the life expectancy has improved, and the government wants to take advantage of the experienced hands.

Scientists, intellectuals, thinkers and philosophers, after a lot of brainstorming and research over a long period of time, developed a sort of consensus regarding human output parameters associated with age. For instance, the right school age is determined to be six years, prime age is considered between 18 and 30 years, the degeneration commences at 35 years, and faculties start waning at 60 years.

In the West, the retirement age in recent years has been upped to 65 years, because the population growth is less than one per cent, and, in some cases, it is even in the negative. These countries are having problems looking after the aging population. In Pakistan, however, that is not the case, with the annual population growth hovering around 1pc.

I could not help but feel a sense of sheer injustice. My father was facing a system that seemed indifferent to his various contributions. There is surely a need for a more transparent and merit-based selection process that truly recognises and rewards the deserving candidates.

The mere presence of a 'selection' process was not just an administrative flaw, but also a significant injustice that needs to be addressed urgently. Meritocracy should never be allowed to over-shadow merit, and true progress requires both integrity and courage.

Power sector woes

MANY are seen these days wondering if there is a solution to the country's power conundrum which is eating up the economy. The straightforward answer is, 'No'. Relevant experts were not involved in the exercise.

The Power wing of Wapda was dismantled into several generation and distribution companies on the advice of the World Bank to improve efficiency, but it proved otherwise. Above all, there has been no accountability and corruption in rampant. There is no quick fix to correct the power problems. Unfortunately, we have to live with the failures of the policymakers.

Ticking time bombs

IT is not surprising that the economic woes of Pakistan have driven many towards using liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) as a relatively inexpensive fuel alternative. This is particularly true of public transport vehicles. This shift, while understandable, presents a grave danger as the safety of these gas cylinders has remained largely unchecked.

As such, these unregulated cylinders, often transported in close proximity to schoolchildren as well as commuters, have become ticking time bombs. Besides, LPG cylinders in public transport, especially school vans, often lack proper maintenance and inspection. Reports indicate a disturbing trend of accidents and fatalities due to cylinder explosions.

In such a scenario, implementing mandatory safety checks, similar to those outlined in the Mineral and Industrial Classes Safety Rules 2010, is a key first step. Furthermore, public awareness campaigns are needed to educate the people about proper handling of LPG cylinders.

In essence, this is not just about saving money on fuel. It is about safeguarding lives. We cannot afford to turn a blind eye to this persistently growing threat. The future of our people, especially our children, depends on immediate and effective action. Unfortunately, the lack of proper regulatory oversight is exacerbating the issue, putting lives at risk.

The current dire situation demands immediate government intervention. Implementing thorough inspection protocols and mandatory cylinder replacements may prevent tragedies. Ensuring that LPG cylinders are safe, and drivers are held accountable will be fundamental in any such intervention.

SCCI chief wants 'Tajir Dost Scheme' enforced for 20 years

PESHAWAR: Sarhad Chamber of Commerce and Industry president Faisal Ishaq on Thursday called for the approval of the Federal Board of Revenue's Tajir Dost tax scheme by parliament for the next 20 years.

He also said the government should promise not to impose new taxes on businesspersons after the implementation of the scheme.

"There is a need for promoting close liaison and coordination between chambers, the business community, and tax authorities to take joint measures for amicable resolution of the traders' issues," Mr Ishaq told businesspersons during the visit of Peshawar Regional Tax Office chief commissioner Zahir Iqbal to the SCCI premises here.

Mr Iqbal was accompanied by chief coordinator for Tajir Dost Scheme Naseem Mir, RTO Peshawar commissioner Dr Syed Farooq Jamil, and additional commissioner Ahsan Dildash.

The meeting was also attended by SCCI vice president Ejaz Khan Afridi, former presidents Haji Mohammad Akmal, Zahidullah Sherwani and Shabbaz Blosur, former senior vice-presidents Ziaul Haq Sarfraz and Imran Khan Mohiuddin, executive members Javed Akhtar, Hamza Ibrahim Butt, Mohammed Ismail Safi, Kashif Arif, Nadeem Rasool, Saadul Qazi, Ishaq Mohammad, Bakht Zaman, Asif Shaukat, Malik Khaleel Farooq, Ihsanullah, and Abbas Ahmad, traders, importers, and exporters.

The RTO chief commissioner and other officials briefed participants about the salient features, importance, and benefits of the Tajir Dost Scheme and said the initiative was meant to broaden the tax net.

The SCCI president and reforms were required to simplify the taxation system and bring the tax rate to a single digit.

He also said traders should be facilitated under a one-window operation.

Mr Ishaq said Pakistan annually paid \$60 billion on head of debt servicing for internal and external loans, while the same amount was generated through various taxes, which was insufficient for the country's progress.

He called for the broadening of the tax base without imposing new taxes on taxpayers.

The SCCI chief said the business community wanted to see Pakistan join the ranks of developed nations, but for that purpose, authorities should adopt policies that were favourable and friendly to business, trade, and industry.

PHC reserves judgement over plea against postponement of Senate polls in KP

Petitioner Azam Swati wants decision of ECP declared illegal

PESHAWAR: Peshawar High Court on Thursday reserved its judgement over a petition challenging the decision of Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to link Senate polls in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa to oath of opposition members elected on reserved seats for women and non-Muslims.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Muhammad Atiqul Haq and Justice Shaukat Ahmad heard arguments advanced by lawyers appearing for petitioner Azam Khan Swati and ECP.

Pakistan Tehreek-i-Inquilab leader and former senator Azam Swati had challenged the ECP's March 28 orders about the possible postponement of Senate polls in the province. He had requested the court to order ECP to hold Senate polls in the province on April 2 as scheduled.

The petition was filed on March 30 before the ECP's April 2 order for post-

ponement of Senate polls to the extent of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa until the administration of oath to MPAAs elected on reserved seats.

On March 28, ECP, in response to the applications of opposition's five women MPAAs-elect, declared that if the speaker of the provincial assembly failed to comply with the high court's orders to administer oath to the lawmakers elected on reserved seats, it would postpone Senate elections in the province until the swearing-in of the applicants. ECP put up the polls afterwards.

Petitioner's counsel Ali Zaman argued that Senate polls were conducted across the country, but ECP postponed the same in KP in light of the high court's orders for the provincial assembly speaker to administer oath to the members elected on reserved seats. He said that the order of ECP was illegal and unconstitutional.

He said that ECP didn't have the power to postpone Senate elections in the province when they were held in other parts of the country. He stated that the petitioner was a contesting candidate, but he was neither heard by ECP nor was he issued any notice for it. The counsel said that during previ-

ous hearing the court had asked ECP to submit schedule of the polls to the court.

Lawyer for ECP Mohsin Kamran Siddiqui said that the court had not asked for the schedule rather it had sought a report from the commission. He stated that he had submitted a report on behalf of ECP to the court.

When the bench inquired from him about latest situation in the matter, he said that Supreme Court of Pakistan had adjourned to June 24 hearing of the cases related to non-allocation of reserved seats to Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) and allotting the same to other political parties.

He stated that the apex court had ordered that it would conduct day-after-day hearing in these cases.

He said that one of the cases pending before SC was about the PNC's decision to dismiss the plea of SIC against the ECP's March 1 order to deny that party seats reserved for women and non-Muslims.

He said that the court had issued a stay order on that case.

The other case, he said, pertained to PNC's orders for KP Assembly speaker to administer oath to those opposition members and to allow and facilitate

their voting in Senate elections. He stated that in case the apex court decided to allot these seats to SIC, it would benefit the party in the polls.

Justice Shaukat inquired from petitioner's counsel as to why oath was not administered to those members on the order of high court. The counsel replied that the assembly was not in session, therefore, oath couldn't be administered to them.

When the bench again inquired as to why its order was not implemented, the counsel said that the petitioner was a contesting candidate in Senate polls and provincial government could give a reply to it.

The bench wondered that if Senate polls were conducted and the apex court upheld the judgement of the high court about administering oath to the members, then what would happen.

The petitioner's counsel stated that on the same analogy what would be the status of polls conducted if the apex court decided the matter in favour of SIC. He wondered whether results of polls in other provinces would be reversed then.

Advocate Syed Hameed Shah appeared for Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz and opposed the petition.

MTRA starts registration of people for organ donation

Speakers say lack of awareness hampers treatment of patients requiring human organs

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority on Thursday launched registration of people wanting to donate their organs to save lives of others amid calls by experts that lack of awareness has been hampering treatment of patients requiring human organs.

"In Pakistan, the number of renal transplants is about 1,800 against the need of 10,000. There is huge deficit of demand and supply, which can be bridged through scaling up awareness regarding organs

donation," Prof Asif Malik, the chairman of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Regulatory Authority (MTRA), said.

Speaking at a ceremony held here to mark World Transplant Day at Khyber Girls Medical College, he said that they launched a portal where the people could donate their organs that could be used for saving the lives of needy patients.

"Lack of donation culture has led to buying of organs from people. It is illegal and entails complications. Donation of organs as per law is a source of healthiness for both donors and recipients," he said.

Prof Malik, a former transplant surgeon at Institute of Kidney Diseases (IKD), said that they had authorised 13 hospitals for organs transplant including renal and eye where people could undergo procedures in the safest manner by

professional surgeons. "Recently, we organised 'transplant games' wherein about 100 patients, who had recovered after transplants, took part and enjoyed," he added.

Dr Attam Rehman, also a former transplant surgeon at IKD, said they were starting 'doomed donors scheme' to retrieve kidneys of the people with dead brain and transplant the same to patients with damaged urinary organs. "Similarly, we are also considering launching pair donation in which families can exchange kidneys to match recipients to resolve the issue of match-ability of both," he added.

Prof Samadullah Jan, the director of Pakistan Institute of Community Ophthalmology (PICO) at Hayatabad Medical Complex, painted a grim picture of organ donations in the country and said that they had to wait for donations from

the USA and other countries to carry out corneal transplants.

"There are 3,700 patients awaiting their transplants at PICO only and we urge people to start donating organs so as to help restore the eyesight of the people blinded by cataract, glaucoma and other incidents. We are way behind from Nepal, Iran, Sri Lanka and India where people are in the habit of organ donation," he said.

Prof Qidra Ayaz, the former chairman of Council of Islamic Bioethics, said that they had forwarded recommendations to government after in-depth research that organ donation was allowed in Islam.

"We need to establish an endowment fund to strengthen transplantation in the province," he added.

Khyber Medical University Vice-chancellor Prof Ziaul Haq, KGHMC Dean Prof Zahid Aman, HMC Prof medical director Shehzad Akhtar Khan,

deputy director of FIA Saadullah Khan and others also spoke on the occasion.

Stays were also displayed by students to send a message that donation was legal and people must donate organs.

Health Minister Syed Qasim Ali Shah said that doctors in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were capable to carry out transplants and other latest procedures in the field of medical sciences.

He stressed the need for preventive measures to put brakes on diabetes and other ailments.

He said that government was providing free health services to people on Sehat Card Plus as per vision of PTI founder Imran Khan. He claimed it was not possible even in developed countries where people paid premium to get health insurance.

"In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, all people get cashless treatment services," he added.

Displaced Kukikhels start returning to Tirah

KHAYBER: The displaced families of Kukikhel tribe started returning to their homes in Tirah valley after reported protests and demonstrations.

Some 50 families left Jambul late on Wednesday while another bunch of similar number of families belonging to Manjakhel sub-tribe of Kukikhel started their return journey to Pak Darra on Thursday.

A Kukikhel elder, Malik Naseer Ahmad, told Dawn that though the returning families were not provided with sufficient assistance except for a tent, a mattress and some kitchen items, the returning families arranged transport for their return journey from their own limited resources.

He accused the government departments concerned of ignoring their repeated requests and appeals for a comprehensive package on the pattern of the rest of IDPs from other tribal districts in recent past.

He said most of the houses in the Kukikhel areas of Tirah valley were unsuitable for living as these houses were either damaged in military operations or had collapsed during snow and rainy season during a decade

of displacement of the local tribesmen.

Members of some of the returning families said that it was very difficult for them to accommodate one whole family in just one tent while some of them were provided food, which was essential for their survival for at least three months.

The remaining Kukikhel families' exact number could not be ascertained as they had not registered themselves with the erstwhile Para Disaster Management Authority back in 2012 when they left their homes.—Correspondent

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FBR to miss FY24 target by Rs175bn 'due to stay orders'

Govt plans to raise tax rates and withdraw exemptions

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has estimated a short-fall of Rs175 billion in the current fiscal year (2023-24) as the superior courts have suspended the implementation of new measures announced by the government to tax the rich.

"We have informed Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif about the amount stuck due to decisions by superior courts," a tax official told Dawn on Thursday.

The courts stayed collection of super tax and windfall income tax. According to the official, since 90 per cent of the cases pending in courts pertain to large taxpayers, including banks and multinational corporations, tax will be collected easily from them during the last 10 days of this month. Assistance has been sought from the Attorney General for Pakistan in this matter, he added.

In the last budget, the government imposed new tax measures on wealthy taxpayers totalling more than Rs400bn.

"We have requested the prime minister to resolve these cases before June 20," the official said, adding that otherwise the revenue collection target of Rs9.415 trillion for the current fiscal year would be missed by a large margin.

The Supreme Court directed wealthy taxpayers to deposit 50pc of the super tax in February this year. As a result, the shortfall is now expected to be under Rs200bn, according to the tax official.

In HMFY24, the FBR collected Rs8.122tr against a target of Rs8.162tr. The FBR will need to raise Rs1.25tr this month to meet the FY24 budgetary target of Rs9.415tr.

The June target was projected at Rs1.178tr, but it now adds up to Rs2.5tr due to the backlog from previous months.

The Finance Division, FBR, and the IMF have differing revenue collection targets for 2024-25. All three have different projections based on their calculation, the official said.

According to him, there is a disagreement regarding taxation measures for the coming budget. The impact in

money terms of these differences range from Rs500bn to Rs1.8tr.

In an effort to generate more revenue, the government plans to increase the current tax rates and eliminate sales tax exemptions, a politically sensitive matter.

According to FBR estimates, autonomous revenue collection (based on GDP growth and inflation) will be around Rs11.5tr in FY25.

In addition, the federal government will review the revenue measures in consultation with the IMF for the next fiscal year.

During the recent IMF technical meetings, the FBR revenue target was projected to be between Rs12.4tr and Rs12.6tr, based on expenditure projections.

However, the finance division's initial estimate for FY25 is Rs13 trillion.

Contrary to these two projections, FBR has projected that revenue collection will be Rs12tr for 2024-25. However, the final revenue collection target will be determined by the finance division, the official said.

According to the official, the actual tax target would be set when the government releases measures for inflation and GDP growth.

The government will need to boost imports in the next fiscal year as well. The IMF has asked the government to match the salary slab to the income of pensioners. However, no final decision has been taken so far.

The Fund has asked FBR to collect taxes from traders and wholesalers, who are currently not contributing to tax collection.

The IMF focus is on sales and income taxes, particularly withholding taxes. Currently, the sales tax exemption exceeds Rs1.2tr.

The government will face a difficult decision to revoke exemptions for food, international products, and pharmaceutical products. A few items, such as insecticides and solar panels, may be subject to sales tax.

At the same time, the government is expected to raise existing withholding tax rates and introducing new ones, such as levying the tax on cash withdrawals from banks.

Furthermore, the finance ministry is considering imposing a tax on the import of exempted raw materials while increasing tax rates on the existing ones.

Rs3.33 per unit hike for April notified

ISLAMABAD: The National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (Nepra) on Thursday notified Rs3.33 per unit additional fixed cost against consumption in April to enable on-Wapda distribution companies (Disco) to raise another Rs29 billion in June as the government confirmed on record a minor impact of solar net metering on electricity sales.

Nepa has reviewed and assessed a National Average Uniform increase of Rs3.33/kWh in the applicable tariff for on-Disco on account of variations in the fuel charges for April 2024, said an order issued by the regulator.

The net tariff increase due to FCA's impact would be about Rs6 per unit because of its partial offset to the quarterly tariff adjustment (QTA) to follow later.

The "adjustment of Rs3.33/kWh shall apply to all the consumer categories except Electric Vehicle Charging Stations (EVCS) and lifeline consumers. The adjustment will be shown separately in the June bills based on units consumed in April," said Nepa's notification.

In its determination, the regulator also placed on record that the Central Power Purchasing Agency (CPPA) had "included 200 GWh (gigawatt hours) for the net metering units procured during April based on information provided by PTTC, which works out to be just 1.15pc of the total 8,440GWh in the national grid. In March, the CPPA claimed a 54.7 GWh contribution from solar net metering, accounting for only 0.7 pc of the total grid supply of 7,736 GWh.

This indicated that the narrative against the homeowners of solar net

metering was being pushed to cover up certain other efficiency-related matters in the power network. Consumption in April was almost 10pc lower than the same month last year, mainly because of lower temperatures, changed consumption patterns due to the economic slowdown, and consumers shifting to alternate sources.

Nepa quoted the CEO of CPPA as saying there was lower generation from hydro and local coal than the generation assumed in the reference tariff. He said there was not much variation in actual fuel prices vis-à-vis reference values; however, certain fuels like RLNG were utilized in higher quantities than the reference values because of system requirements and contractual obligations.

CPPA told the public hearing that "orders for procurement of RLNG were already placed due to the anticipated increase in demand in April, and in case of non-utilisation of the ordered quantity, the power sector would have to bear the financial burden". The financial impact of the high use of RLNG was reported as Rs52bn in April against Rs75bn total fuel cost.

Regarding the low utilisation of Thar coal power plants, CPPA informed that the overall utilisation of these plants remained around 50pc during April, keeping in view the system stability and demand pattern. Regarding the curtailment of Thar-based plants, NEDC responded that due to weather conditions, the demand remained low.

This increase in FCA is on top of about 50pc increase in annual base tariff and another 10pc hike under two quarterly tariff adjustments to be paid by consumers at the rate of Rs4.65 per unit.

'Shun protectionist approach for economic stability'

LAHORE: Pakistan needs to shift from protectionist to an economy-centric approach for the sake of stability and recovery, says Prof Dr Humain Mahood-Din Qadri.

"Economic recovery is impossible without minimising trade barriers for local and foreign investment and without shedding the protectionist approach," the deputy chairman of Minhaj University's board of governors told a pre-budget seminar on Thursday.

He said that the international thinking and approach of open-economic trade should be adopted so that local and foreign investors can confidently invest in the sector of their choice.

Economist Dr Amrullah, Service Vice-President of Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry Zafar Mahmood, Dr Muhammad Tahir and Dr Khuram Shabbir also expressed their views at the seminar.

"Many areas closed to local and foreign investors. The state needs to take bold decisions in view of the huge financial crisis facing the country. Otherwise, the crisis will deepen with each passing day," Dr Qadri warned.

Despite initiatives like the Tax Reforms Commission and Asset Declaration Scheme, challenges like a complex tax system, red tape, resistance to change because of widespread corruption, and infrastructure deficiencies are hindering substantial progress, he said. He added that external factors like IMF programmes have also influenced policy directions, often necessitating austerity measures and structural adjustments.

The economist suggested taking on-board stakeholders for effective changes in the tax structure, cutting the number of tax payments, a fair distribution of taxes across sectors, and bringing retail, real estate and services sectors into the tax net.

He suggested a shift towards a direct taxation system, targeting support for the hawala sector, repealing the minimum turnover tax and instead evaluating business profits directly, removing discretionary tax exemptions granted to certain data regions, and curbing the discretionary power of tax men.

Dr Qadri also proposed elevating the GST exemption limit from Rs10 million to Rs30 million to incentivise smaller enterprises to formalise their operations.

First cherry shipment sent to China

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan exported its first batch of fresh cherries to China using a reefer container and projected a total quantity of 200 tonnes by the end of this month.

An official announcement from the Trade Development Authority of Pakistan (TDAP) said the first cargo was six tonnes, followed by 12 tonnes, beginning Monday and lasting until June 30.

The country's success in exporting the fruit is due to the phyto-sanitary agreement signed between China and Pakistan in 2022, under which Beijing granted Islamabad market access for fresh cherries.

China imports most of its cherries from Chile, with an annual demand of around 350,000 tonnes valued at \$3 billion.

Approximately 5,000 tonnes of cherries are produced in Gilgit-

Baltistan per season. These cherries are mostly sold at low prices in local markets. The protocol with China has allowed the growers to meet the Chinese market's demand.

To implement the protocol, the TDAP and Department of Plant Protection (DPP) assisted eligible orchard owners in registering with the General Administration of Chinese Customs (GACC). Pakistan Horticulture Development & Export Company (PHDEC) also conducted cherry product development activities to educate farmers on producing renowned varieties like black and French cherries.

With these efforts, more than 500 cherry orchards and a cold storage and packing house at Rahim Akmal are registered with GACC. The approval of the cherry orchards and the processing facility led to the expedition to export fresh cherries to China.

The National Logistic Cell (NLC) has provided the required reefer containers.

The Export Development Fund (EDF) meets the logistic cost of cherry export.

TDAP Chief Executive Zubair Motiwala has said that growers will be a major beneficiary of the export of cherries. He said that TDAP and PHDEC are trying to ensure growers get maximum benefits by exploring the huge Chinese market. He also noted that the protocol on cherries was signed in November 2022, and within one year, we have not only registered more than 500 cherry orchards with GACC but also PHDEC has built growers' capacity.

PHDEC chief executive Athar Hussain Khokhar has said that by producing the required varieties of cherries, the country can capture a large chunk of the \$3bn Chinese cherry market.

"Proximity and growing demand for the fruit in the Chinese market are a major competitive advantage to GB growers," he added.

SBP's reserves rise, banks' fall by \$116m

KARACHI: The State Bank of Pakistan's (SBP) foreign exchange reserves have remained around \$9 billion since the IMF's \$1.1 billion arrival in April, reflecting no other inflows.

The central bank reported on Thursday that its reserves increased by a meagre \$55 million to \$9.105bn during the week ended May 31 without mentioning the source of this inflow.

However, the reserves of the commercial banks fell by \$116m to \$5.1bn during the week, bringing the country's total down by \$100m to \$14.2bn.

Alarmingly, sources in the financial circle revealed that Pakistan is facing a daunting challenge. The country is expected to pay up to \$10bn in debt servicing till July 31, which is more than the SBP's overall forex holding. This dire situation underscores the country's urgent need for immediate assistance to bolster its reserves.

Earlier, there were widespread reports in the media about a potential loan package from the IMF in July. While sources have indicated the possibility, it's important to note that the amount required is significantly larger than the current reserves, which could pose a challenge for the country.

However, it was also observed that the financial experts were hopeful for yet another rollover of Chinese loans. Pakistan owes about \$24bn to China. The prime minister, finance minister and foreign minister are in China just before the budget. Speculations about the rollover of loans were stronger due to the visit.

Talks continuing virtually: IMF

Ellevest, a fintech based in London and Dubai, has secured \$5 million in financing to expand further into South Asia. The company has raised a total of \$30m in equity and debt from investors.

JanCash, a leading mobile wallet and digital financial services platform has surpassed 11 million active app users. Overall, JanCash hosts 44 million registered users, with more than 30pc female customers, 17m monthly active users, 300,000 merchants and over 245,000 agents across Pakistan.

Index falls below 74,000 on dismal outlook

KARACHI: Amid growing uncertainty about the economic outlook ahead of the budget unveiling, which has been delayed to June 12, the bazaar index continued at the stock market for the fourth consecutive session on Thursday, dragging the benchmark index below the 74,000 level.

Ahsan Mehmood of Arif Habib Corporation stated that stocks closed lower due to concerns about economic uncertainty.

Investor expectations for a cautious SBP monetary policy and subdued growth impacted investor sentiment.

He said reports of likely harsh conditions in the new IMF programme, such as a hike in power tariffs and fresh taxation measures in the budget 2024-25, contributed to the bearish close.

In its market report, Tiptoe Securities Ltd noted that equities started the session positively. However, the index could

not sustain the 74,000 level due to a selling spree triggered by concerns that the government may raise taxes on dividends, capital gains and interest income in the upcoming budget.

value tumbled 14.57pc to Rs12.87bn day-on-day.

Stocks contributing significantly to the traded volume included WorldCall Telecom (17.60m shares), Kohinoor Spinning (14.85m shares), Dewan Motors (13.89m shares), Fauji Cement (12.07m shares) and Qatar Global (11.12m shares).

The shares registering the most significant increases in their share prices in absolute terms were Rafhan Company (Rs18.98), Sapphire Textile (Rs11.26), Philp Morris (Rs9.28), Hafa Ltd (Rs7.29) and Data Agri Ltd (Rs6.18).

The companies registering the major declines in their share prices in absolute terms were Sagar Engineering Works Ltd (Rs22.72), Service Ind (Rs45.50), Hoechst Pak (Rs38.33), Exide Pakistan (Rs32.11) and Rafhan Motors Products Company Ltd (Rs27.26).

Foreign investors turned net sellers as they offloaded shares worth \$9.69m.

China's probe moves moon samples to spacecraft

BEIJING: China's Chang'e-6 probe transferred samples it collected from the moon's far side to a spacecraft in lunar orbit on Thursday, state news agency Xinhua reported.

After receiving the samples, the uncrewed spacecraft will fly back to Earth, with an expected landing in China's Inner Mongolia region on June 25. If successful, China will be the first country to ever return lunar matter from the side of the moon that permanently faces away from Earth.

The Chang'e-6 probe took off from the moon's far side on Tuesday, after spending two days on the surface digging up samples. While on the moon, the probe unfurled a Chinese flag made of bauxite, a material that is abundant on the lunar surface.

The mission has been a source of national pride in China. The probe's launch last month drew thousands of tourists to the southern island province of Hainan and its every subsequent move, from landing on the moon's far side to the return journey to Earth, has been a viral item on Chinese social media.

The successful transfer on Thursday of the precious samples, which scientists hope can reveal more about the origins of the solar system, also comes as the United States expresses growing concerns about the advances in China's lunar and space exploration programmes.

Asked about the Chang'e-6 mission on Wednesday, NASA chief Bill Nelson congratulated China, but asked it to be more open about its space activities. Nelson has repeatedly warned that the United States is in a "space race" with China to go back to the moon and that China would claim any water resources it found there as its own.

Responding to Nelson's comments, Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said on Thursday that the Chang'e-6 probe's successful sampling on, and departure from, the moon's far side represented historic steps for "markedly peaceful use of outer space" and that many countries praised the mission.

Mao criticised the Wolf Amendment, a law passed by the US Congress in 2011 that banned NASA from collaboration with "China or any Chinese-owned company unless such activities are specifically authorised". —Reuters

Himalayan blizzard kills nine Indian trekkers

NEW DELHI: At least nine Indian trekkers died in the Himalayas after getting trapped during a blizzard, authorities said on Thursday, as rescue teams airlifted their bodies and five survivors to safety. The Indian Air Force shared footage on Thursday that showed rescue teams working near a helicopter in the snow-covered mountains.

The group of climbers from the southern state of Karnataka were hit by heavy snowfall in the remote mountains of Uttarakhand state in north India, said Krishna Byte Gowda, a top

Karnataka minister. "Snow intensified into blizzards. By 4pm, 2 trekkers succumbed to bad weather. Snow and wind made movement impossible. Visibility dropped to nil. They huddled together for the night on the rocks. Some were succumbed in the night," Gowda wrote in a social media post on Wednesday.

A guide with the group alerted rescuers about the situation on Tuesday evening after trekking for a while to find mobile network connectivity, and teams reached the spot early on Wednesday, the minister added. —Reuters

Rights body urges Biden to halt arms supply to Israel

WASHINGTON: A civil rights organisation urged President Joe Biden on Thursday to "indefinitely" halt all weapons deliveries to Israel and pressure the US ally to end its bombardment of the Gaza Strip, sending a reminder that his support for Israel could hurt him among Black voters in November's election.

The call by the National Association for the Advancement of Coloured People (NAACP) was a rare instance of an influential body taking a position on US foreign policy towards a country without a significant Black population. It appeared likely to deepen the Democrat president's election-year challenges as he tries to back a key ally abroad and temper ire among his supporters at home.

The NAACP urged Hamas to return the Israeli prisoners and called upon Israel to "commit to an offensive strategy that is aligned with international and humanitarian laws". The NAACP, which has advocated for racial justice and rights for Black Americans, said the US must use its influence with Israel to bring a permanent ceasefire to Gaza.

"The NAACP calls on President Biden to draw the red line and indefinitely and the shipment of all weapons and artillery to the state

of Israel and other states that supply weapons to Hamas and other terrorist organisations. It is imperative that the violence that has claimed so many civilian lives, immediately stop," the organisation said in a statement.

The NAACP stance represents the latest warning sign that Biden may pay a price at the ballot box among Black voters on Nov 5 for his staunch support of Israel.

Black voters have long been a loyal Democratic constituency, and they played a significant role in Biden's victory in 2020 when he bested Republican Donald Trump, whom he faces again this year. But polls show a lack of enthusiasm for Biden among Black voters.

Earlier this year, a group of more than 1,000 Black pastors called on Biden to secure a ceasefire in the crisis. A poll by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in March found that 59 per cent of Black Americans believe US military aid to Israel should only be used for self-defence and in accordance with human rights standards.

Biden's re-election campaign is not as concerned that Black voters will shift toward Trump as they are that too many of them may sit out the election due to lack of enthusiasm, campaign officials say.

After growing domestic pressure and international outrage, Biden paused a shipment of bombs last month to avoid their possible use in Israel's assault on the Gaza city of Rafah. But the pause was limited, and the US remains the top supplier of military aid to Israel.

Biden said last week Israel had proposed a fresh Gaza ceasefire in exchange for the release of prisoners. He called on Hamas to agree to the new offer, saying it was the best way to end the conflict.

Moral leadership

In an interview, NAACP President Derrick Johnson said the US needs to show moral leadership and stop sending weapons to Israel because of civilian deaths.

Johnson said the NAACP's decision to speak out was driven in part by young Black Americans horrified by the images of dead Palestinian civilians on their smart phones.

"It's raising a lot of questions around why our tax dollars are being used to harm civilians," Johnson said.

Democrats are deeply divided over Biden's handling of both the Gaza crisis and the US campus protests against it, a Reuters/Ipsos poll found. —Reuters

Boeing's Starliner safely docks with space station

WASHINGTON: Boeing's new Starliner capsule and an inaugural two-member NASA crew safely docked with the International Space Station on Thursday, marking a key test in proving the vessel's flight-worthiness and sharpening Boeing's competition with Elon Musk's.

The rendezvous was achieved despite an earlier loss of several gold-plated control jet thrusters, some of them due to a helium propellant leak, which NASA and Boeing said should not compromise the mission.

The CST-100 Starliner, with veteran astronauts Barry "Butch" Wilmore and Sunita "Suni" Williams aboard, arrived at the orbiting platform after a flight of nearly 27 hours following its launch from Cape Canaveral Space Force Station in Florida.

The reusable, gondola-shaped capsule, dubbed "Calypso" by its crew, was lofted into space on Wednesday atop an Atlas V rocket furnished and flown by Boeing-Lockheed.

Martin's United Launch Alliance joint venture.

It automatically docked with the ISS while both were orbiting some 400 km over the southern Indian Ocean at 17:34 GMT, as the two vehicles soared around the globe in tandem at about 28,160 km per hour.

The spacecraft's final approach to the ISS and docking, following a brief interval when Wilmore manually controlled the capsule, was shown on a NASA webcam.

"Nice to be attached to the big city in the sky," Wilmore radioed to mission control in Houston shortly after docking.

Once securely coupled to the space laboratory with a series of 12 hooks, Wilmore and Williams must conduct a series of standard procedures, such as checking for airlock leaks and practising the passage between the capsule and the ISS, before opening the entry hatches.

That process was expected to take about two hours. —Reuters

US couple hooks safe stuffed with \$100,000, in ruined notes

NEW YORK: Two modern-day treasure hunters in the United States appeared to strike gold when they uncovered a safe stuffed with \$100,000 in cash — but there was a catch. The notes were ruined.

Barbara Agostini and James Kane, both in their 40s, have been propelled to celebrity status beyond their modest Midstate community after making the discovery in a New York pond over the weekend.

"It's surreal, I thought it was a joke until I saw it with my eyes," said Barbara Agostini.

Though not the pair's first time discovering a safe, it was their first one containing more than random odds and ends, although because the safe was not airtight many of the notes were wet or moldy.

Fearing the money could be linked to crime, the couple went to the New York police, saying they "didn't want to have a problem on our hands".

But police washed their hands of the cash. "As a general matter, found property valued at ten dollars or more is required to be reported to, and deposited with, the police," a police spokesman said.

"In this instance, the value and authenticity of the alleged currency could not be determined due to the severely damaged condition of the property." —AP

Acclaimed Ukrainian writer Sergiy Zhadan joins military

A former soldier sentenced to five years in jail on charge of colluding with Moscow

KYIV: In a move that sent shockwaves internally, one of Ukraine's most celebrated writers and poets, Sergiy Zhadan, announced on Thursday that he had joined the military. The armed forces of Ukraine are seeking to "bolster their ranks", after more than two years of conflict.

The 49-year-old novelist and poet, whose books have been widely translated, posted a picture showing him in camouflage and kneeling in

front of an automatic rifle. "I joined the ranks of the 13th Brigade of the National Guard of Ukraine, Charlie. I am undergoing training. I serve the people of Ukraine," he stated on social media.

His announcement comes at a time when the Ukrainian military has been working to replenish its ranks, specifically after Kyiv introduced "new mobilisation legislation", designed to help lift army numbers.

Zhadan, studied in the Kharkiv region where Russian forces recently launched a ground offensive and has "close connections" with the brigade that mainly operates in the eastern border territory.

Despite Kharkiv coming under intense fire from Russian troops, Zhadan remained put

when it seemed the city 'could be seized by Russian forces', during the first months of the war.

In 2022, Zhadan told reporters before a rush in Kyiv, that the Kremlin's decision to invade meant "those outside the country must pick a side". "People must clearly position themselves: either you support the aggressor, or you support Ukraine".

'Soldier sentenced'

A former Ukrainian soldier, who sent the location of sensitive military targets to Russia, has been sentenced to five years in jail, according to Ukrainian prosecutors.

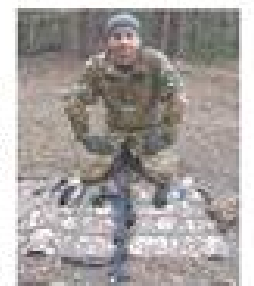
Ukraine has detained "thousands of people" on "suspicion of collaborating with Russian

troops", since the war began in February 2022. Many of those who have been detained belong to the east and south of the country.

Prosecutors in the northern Kharkiv region said that the man (whose they did not name), allegedly contacted a "representative of the Russian Federal Security Service (FSB)" using the Signal messaging app.

He then went on to send the "FSB" the "positions of soldiers and military equipment" in the Kharkiv region and southern Mykolaiv region, they added.

"The enemy needed this information to conduct targeted air strikes on Ukrainian defenders," the prosecutors allege. The man was detained near the frontline town of Kopylovsk and "fully admitted his guilt", they added. —AP

Dutch kick off EU vote with all eyes on far right

BRUSSELS: The Netherlands on Thursday kicked off a marathon four-day European Union election, in an early test of preferences the far right is headed for big gains in the bloc's parliament. Geert Wilders' far-right Freedom Party (PVV) is riding high and projected to claim up to nine European Parliament seats — after failing to win any five years ago.

"We want less immigration, we want to tighten up asylum rules and policies," Wilders, whose party is in a Dutch coalition government after a surprise election win last year, said after voting. His call has resonated with voters like Simone Niemeijer, a 48-year-old government worker.

"I want the EU to change," she said after casting her ballot for the PVV. "I think we're too open. We should be more critical as to who we let in because it

costs a lot of money." Surveys suggesting the far right could grab a quarter of the EU parliament's 512 seats have rattled its main groupings, the conservative European People's Party (EPP) and the leftist Socialists and Democrats. Current European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen, seeking a second term, has opened the door to her EPP working with the far right to ensure legislation is passed.

Von der Leyen, a polychrome former German defence minister, has been courted by Italian premier Giorgia Meloni, who heads the post-fascist Brothers of Italy party.

EU leaders, including Meloni, will decide after the elections who should head the commission. Their choice needs the backing of a simple majority in the European Parliament. —AP

Israeli soldier killed, nine injured in Hezbollah strike

JERUSALEM: The Israeli military said on Thursday a soldier had been killed in a drone strike launched by Hezbollah, the latest fatality in months of border clashes.

Staff Sergeant Refael Kauders "fell fighting in the north" on Wednesday, the military said on its website.

In a briefing to reporters, military spokesman Lieutenant Colonel Peter Lerner said Kauders, 35, was killed in a Hezbollah drone attack that struck the northern Israeli town of Hatzor.

"It had a devastating result, of course, of a soldier killed," Lerner said. The Times of Israel newspaper reported that the attack also left nine troops wounded, one of them seriously.

Lerner said that "Hezbollah... have for

the last eight months been escalating almost every day their attacks against Israel" and "trying to penetrate Israel's defensive mechanisms".

The latest fatality takes the toll to at least 15 soldiers and 11 civilians killed in Israel's north, according to the military, since the clashes with Hezbollah, a Hamas ally, began on October 7.

In Lebanon, the cross-border violence has killed at least 455 people, mostly fighters but including 88 civilians, according to a tally.

According to the Israeli military, 645 soldiers have been killed during and since the October 7 raid, including 294 in its campaign against Hamas in the Palestinian territory. —AFP

Over 100 killed as rebels attack village in Sudan

UN warns internal displacement figures could top 10m within days

PORT SUDAN: A Sudanese pro-democracy activists' committee on Thursday reported "more than 100" dead in a single day when paramilitary forces attacked a village, as the UN warned of mass displacement and starvation.

The Rapid Support Forces (RSF), which have been at war with the regular army since April 2023, on Wednesday attacked the central village of Wadi al-Nuara in al-Jazira state "in two waves" with heavy artillery, the Madani Resistance Committee said.

It reported on Wednesday that the feared paramilitaries had "breached the village", causing dozens of casualties and widespread displacement.

The attack "claimed the lives of more than 104 martyrs" and "injured hundreds" said the committee, one of hundreds of similar grassroots groups across Sudan, adding that it reached the toll via "initial communication with village residents".

The UN resident coordinator for Sudan, Clementine Nkurunzira-Salami, said she was "shocked by reports of violent attacks and a high number of casualties" in the village.

She called for an investigation and for "those responsible to be held accountable".

"Human tragedy has become a hallmark of life in Sudan. We cannot allow impunity to become another one," she added.

On social media, the committee shared footage of what it said was a "mass grave" in the public square, showing rows of white shrouds laid

out in a courtyard.

In a little over a year, the war has killed tens of thousands of people, including up to 15,000 in a single West Darfur town.

Toll too low

However, the war's overall death toll remains unclear, with some estimates of up to 150,000, according to UN special envoy for Sudan Tom Perrillo. The RSF has repeatedly besieged and attacked entire villages across the country, and has been notorious for widespread looting as well as sexual and ethnic violence.

In a statement, the RSF said it had attacked three army camps in the Wadi al-Nuara area, and clashed with its enemy "outside the city".

The resistance committee called the RSF's statement an "expected" attempt to "criminalise the people of Wadi al-Nuara and label them a legitimate target".

It also said the villagers had "called for help from the armed forces, which did not respond". The military has not issued an official comment, but Sudan's ruling sovereignty council, under army chief Abdel Fattah el-Burhan, called Wednesday's attack a "human massacre of defenceless civilians".

The army has come under repeated criticism from Sudanese civilians for "abandoning" them and retreating in the face of RSF offensives, particularly in al-Jazira and the western Darfur region.

Both the army and the RSF — commanded by Bashir's former deputy Mohamed Hamdan Haghi — have been accused of war crimes, including targeting civilians, indiscriminately shelling residential areas and looting or obstructing humanitarian aid.

'War crime'

The Emergency Lawyers, a pro-democracy group of volunteers who

document the war's atrocities, said on Thursday the attack on Wadi al-Nuara was a "war crime" and called on the international community to "exert pressure" on both sides to abide by international law.

The UN migration agency warned on Thursday that internal displacement figures in Sudan could "top 10 million" within days.

Since the war began, more than seven million people have fled their homes for other parts of Sudan, adding to 2.8 million already displaced from previous conflicts in the war-torn country of 48 million inhabitants.

"The world's worst internal displacement crisis continues to escalate, with looming famine and disease adding to the havoc wrought by conflict," the International Organization for Migration said in a statement.

Across Sudan, 70 per cent of those displaced "are now trying to survive in places that are at risk of famine", it added. The UN says 18 million people in Sudan are acutely hungry, with 3.6 million children acutely malnourished.

Widespread hunger has haunted the country for months, while aid agencies say a lack of data has prevented the official declaration of a famine.

If the current humanitarian situation continues, 2.5 million people could die of hunger by the end of September, according to recent estimates by the Clingendael Institute, a Dutch think tank. That figure is "about 15 percent of the population in Darfur and Kordofan", the country's vast western and southern regions which have seen some of the worst fighting, the institute said.

The UN has accused both sides of "systematic destructions and deliberate denial" of humanitarian access. —AFP

Yemen clashes kill 18 fighters in fresh flare-up

DUBAI: At least 18 combatants have been killed in battles between Yemeni government forces and Houthis rebels in the country's northwest, two military officials said on Thursday.

The clashes on Wednesday were triggered by a Houthi attack on a frontline area between government-controlled parts of Lahij province and Houthi-run parts of Taiz province, said Mohammed al-Naqbi, a spokesperson for the Southern Transitional Council, a separatist group allied with the government.

The attack came despite a lull in fighting that has largely held since the expiry of a six-month truce brokered by the United Nations in April 2023. Yemeni government "forces succeeded in repelling the attack, but five soldiers were martyred and others wounded",

Naqbi said.

A Houthi military official in Taiz said that 13 rebels, including a senior commander, were also killed in the fighting. Yemen's internationally-recognised government condemned the Houthi offensive as a "treacherous attack".

In a statement on social media platform X on Wednesday, Information Minister Muhammad al-Eryani said the counterattack by Yemeni government forces "inflicted heavy losses on (Houthi) militia members", without specifying a toll.

While hostilities have remained low, sporadic fighting has occasionally flared in parts of the country. In April, a surprise Houthi attack killed 11 fighters loyal to the Yemeni government in Lahij province. —AFP

Russian nuclear sub to dock in Havana next week

HAVANA: A Russian nuclear-powered submarine — which will not be carrying nuclear weapons — will visit Havana next week, Cuba's communist authorities said on Thursday.

The nuclear submarine Kuznetsov and three other Russian naval vessels, including the missile frigate Admiral Gorchkov, an oil tanker and a salvage tug, will dock in the Cuban capital from June 12-15, Cuba's Ministry of the Revolutionary Armed Forces said in a statement.

"None of the vessels is carrying nuclear weapons, so their stopover in our country does not represent a threat to the region," the ministry said.

The annual deployment of the Russian military is close to the United States — particularly the

powerful submarine — comes amid major tensions over the war in Ukraine, where the Western-backed government is fighting a Russian invasion.

Cuban President Miguel Diaz-Canel met with Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin last month for the annual May 9 military parade on Red Square outside the Kremlin.

During the Cold War, Cuba was an important ally for the Soviet Union. The deployment of Soviet nuclear missile sites on the island triggered the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962, when Washington and Moscow came close to war.

Relations between Russia and Cuba have become closer since a 2023 meeting between Diaz-Canel and Putin. —AFP

UN condemns mass public flogging in Afghanistan

KABUL: The United Nations on Wednesday condemned a mass flogging of dozens of people in Afghanistan, and called on the Taliban authorities to end the practice.

About 60 people were publicly lashed in the northern Saripal province on Tuesday, the United Nations mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA) reported.

"UNAMA reiterates its condemnation of corporal punishment and calls for respect for international human rights obligations," the mission said in a statement posted on X.

Since their return to power in August 2021, the Taliban authorities have reintroduced an extreme interpretation of law.

Crimes have included public executions and corporal punishments, mainly flogging.

The latter is mostly employed for crimes including theft, adultery and alcohol consumption. —AFP

SpaceX's megarocket nails ocean splashdown

BOCA CHICA: SpaceX's massive Starship rocket achieved its first ever splashdown during a test flight on Thursday, in a major milestone for the prototype system that may one day send humans to Mars.

Scraps of fiery debris came flying off the spaceship as it descended over the Indian Ocean north-west of Australia, dramatic video from an onboard camera showed, but it ultimately held together and survived atmospheric reentry.

"Despite loss of many tiles and a damaged flap, Starship made it all the way to a soft landing in the ocean," SpaceX CEO Elon Musk wrote on X. "Today was a great day for humanity's future as a spacefaring civilisation!" he added.

The most powerful rocket ever built blasted off from the company's Starbase in Boca Chica, Texas, at 7:50am (1250 GMT), before soaring to space and coasting halfway across the globe, for a journey that lasted around an hour and five minutes. With its fully reusable design, Starship is essential to fulfilling Musk's ambitious vision of colonizing the Red Planet and making

landmark an interplanetary species. Nine months after the company's first test flight, a modified version of the rocket will take astronauts down to the surface of the Moon under the Artemis programme later this decade.

Three previous test flights had ended in Starship's destruction, all part of what the company says is an acceptable cost in its rapid trial-and-error approach to development. "The payload for these flight tests is data," SpaceX said on X, a mantra repeated by the company's team throughout the flight.

During the last test in March, the spaceship managed to fly for 49 minutes before it was lost as it careened into the atmosphere at around 25,000 kilometres per hour (nearly 17,000 mph). Since then, SpaceX made several software and hardware upgrades. Around seven minutes after liftoff, the first stage booster, called Super Heavy, succeeded in an upright splashdown in the Gulf of Mexico, to massive applause from engineers at mission control in Hawthorne, California. —AFP

As ties thaw with Saudi Arabia, thousands of Syrians fly for Haj

DAMASCUS: For the first time in more than a decade, thousands of Syrians are travelling directly from government-held parts of Syria to Saudi Arabia for Haj, a signal of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad's gradual reintegration into the Arab fold.

After Syria's conflict erupted in 2011, Saudi

Arabia cut ties with Assad and backed figures opposed to him — including by granting Syria's opposition thousands of visas to be distributed among Syrian pilgrims in Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Turkey.

But Riyadh recently lifted ties with Assad last year and in May appointed its first envoy to Syria

since the rift.

Direct flights also resumed, allowing pilgrims to head straight from Damascus to Jeddah to perform the Haj. "I'm extremely happy. I still can't believe that I will participate in Haj," Barbara Dimashigya, an 84-year-old resident of Damascus, said.

While some Syrians liv-

ing in government-held areas had been able to attend the Haj in past years by taking flights with baybars, such long trips had proved too strenuous for many elderly people.

Huda Abu Shua'ar said she had felt a "big joy" when she heard direct flights had restarted. She had carefully prepared her bag, including a sheet of paper with a long list of prayers that her relatives had asked her to make on their behalf in the holy city of Makkah.

At least 7,000 Syrians have already flown to Makkah since the flights resumed, Bashar Mansour, the director-general of the Syrian Civil Aviation authority, said. "Our equipment and airports are safe, our airports are good, and our planes are good," Mansour said.

Damascus International Airport has been hit by suspected Israeli air strikes repeatedly in recent years, part of Israel's campaign against Syrian installations used by Tehran for weapons transfers. —Reuters

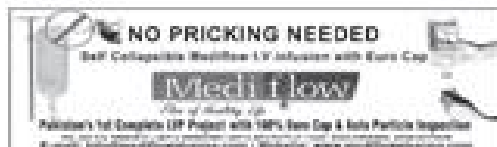

Left rejected, right put in fetters by Indian voters

- Critics believe PM punished for 'misusing' religion
- CPI-M fails to grab a single seat from W. Bengal, again

NEW DELHI: As the morning of independent MPs from a pool of 17 interested on Thursday to become Prime Minister Narendra Modi's fragile coalition ahead of his likely meeting to on Sunday, a cursory survey of the poll results revealed the voters' rejection of the left while putting the right in a bad mood.

The CPI(M) couldn't win a seat for the second consecutive time in West Bengal although it produced a ray of hope in BJP ruled Rajasthan by getting a seat there.

In Kerala, where it runs a state government, its tally of MPs dropped to just one, embarrassing the name as the first time BJP winner from the state's Thiruvananthapuram constituency. Even the Indian Union Muslim League got two, one more than the communists, while the Congress took the day with 14.

Anxiety over the destination of the Left Democratic Front (LDF) is expected to be the main issue when the CPI(M) meets in the state capital to re-join. The Hindu quoted LDF insiders as not being entirely optimistic about the ruling front's prospects in the local body elections in 2025 and beyond.

Their concerns add weight to the potential challenges the LDF may face, including in the Assembly by-elections for the seats vacated by a Congress and a CPI(M) MLA who has been elected to the Lok Sabha. The Congress-led United Democratic Front's (UDF) domination in 100 Assembly constituencies and BJP-led National Democratic Alliance's leads in 11 has unsettled the LDF, the Hindu said.

While the BJP is breathing better in Kerala and a clutch of states where it has formed governments this week, its core looks out of joint. On the face of it, it looks cheerful though.

Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is expected to attend Mr Modi's oath ceremony, and top leaders of Sri Lanka, Bhutan, Nepal and Mauritius are also likely to be present.

But there were reports of strained relations within the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), whose MPs were required to formally elect Mr Modi as their leader before he could secure the support, which he did, of the National Democratic

Alliance members. The deputy chief minister of Maharashtra Devendra Fadnis resigned on Wednesday claiming responsibility for the debacle in the state.

But this was being seen as a ploy to force Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath to also accept responsibility for the poor show in his state where the BJP suffered the heaviest losses. Mr Adityanath is said to be looking in a rueful mood over the loss of the state's 31 seats. It is widely claimed that upper caste Thakurs of his ilk didn't show any enthusiasm for the BJP candidates this time around.

Mr Adityanath would be hoping that the two critical secular allies critical for Mr Modi's survival would not allow Mr Modi to remain home minister.

The accusations over the UP setback have been flying thick and fast, possibly contributing to Mr Modi's rush to secure the NDA's support even before the party MPs meet.

In a terse message to Hindutva supporters, and against the communal speeches made by Mr Modi, the voters trust the rightwing campaign with the only way they know. They elected a secular MP from the constituency in Rajasthan where Mr Modi had called Muslims infiltrators and thieves. Apparently, a legal case is being framed too over the abusive speeches.

Even more telling in this vein was the victory of the opposition in Ayodhya from where Mr Modi launched his election campaign by hurriedly inaugurating a half-built temple to Lord Ram. To make it worse for Mr Modi, the BJP was routed in all the districts abutting on Ayodhya, prompting his critics to claim that he was being punished for misusing Ram's name.

Two BJP leaders Mr Modi is said to be wary of are seen as potential challengers for his job. They are cabinet minister Nitin Gadkari and former Madhya Pradesh chief minister Shivraj Singh Chaudhary, who won by a landslide of over 800,000 votes. To rub home the point for Hindutva, the only leader to spot age him in a face-to-face content was a Muslim candidate for the Congress from Amnaw who won with a lead of 11,50,000 votes. The meeting of independent voters, meanwhile, had another purpose to prevent them from swelling the opposition's numbers.

Kangana slapped by airport security woman

NEW DELHI: Actress Kangana Ranaut, BJP's newly elected MP, was slapped by a female security guard at the Chandigarh airport on Thursday.

The actress-turned-politician was travelling to New Delhi days after her Lok Sabha election win from Himachal Pradesh's Mandi constituency.

The CISP constable, identified as Rubinder Kaur, has been suspended. An FIR is being registered against her, reports said. A complaint has also been given by the CISP to the local police.

CNN-News18 reported that after the security check, Kangana was going to the boarding gate where she was slapped by the security woman.

While it remains unclear what provoked the CISP guard to attack the newly-elected MP, it seems she was upset with some of Kangana's previous statements about the farmers' protest in India.

Kaur said that Kangana gave a bad statement about Punjab women during the farmers' agitation against their farm laws. —Correspondent

PM vows to follow Chinese development model

Israeli strike on UN school in Gaza leaves 40 dead

- UN says attacking, targeting its buildings against international law
- US, other states call on Tel Aviv, Hamas to swiftly finalise truce deal
- Ceasefire talks in Doha show no sign of breakthrough

CAIRO: Israel hit a Gaza school on Thursday with what it described as a targeted airstrike on up to 30 Hamas fighters inside, and a Hamas official said 40 people, including women and children, were killed as they sheltered in the UN site.

Video footage showed Palestinians hauling away bodies after the attack, which took place at a sensitive moment in mediated talks on a ceasefire that would involve releasing prisoners held by Hamas and some of the Palestinian held in Israeli jails.

The United States issued a joint statement with other countries on Thursday calling on Israel and Hamas to make whatever compromise were necessary to finalise a deal after eight months of war in the Gaza Strip.

Israel's military said its fighter jets had carried out a "precise strike" and circulated satellite photos highlighting two parts of a building where it said the fighters were based. "We're very confident in the intelligence," military spokesperson Lt Col Peter Lerner said, accusing Hamas and Islamic Jihad fighters of deliberately using UN facilities as operational bases.

He said 20-30 fighters were located in the compound, and many of them had been killed, but had no precise details as intelligence assessments were being carried out.

As people at the school cleared rubble from bloodstained classrooms, survivor Huda Abu Dhaheer described waking up to the sound of rockets. "People's remains were scattered inside the yard and outside. The gas canister exploded," she told Reuters.

"My nephew was martyred (killed), he lost his leg and arm, he was a 19-year-old ... This woman's leg got a fragment in it, her son died from his mouth and leg, her mother-in-law sustained three injuries."

The school, run by the UN Palestinian refugee agency (UNRWA), was sheltering 6,000 displaced people at the time, UNRWA chief Philippe Lazaretti said.

"At least 35 people were killed and many more injured," he wrote on X. "Claims that armed groups may have been inside the shelter are shocking. We are however unable to verify these claims. Attacking, targeting or using UN buildings for military purposes are

in blatant disregard of international humanitarian law."

Thawabta said a medical source said 40 had been killed, including 14 children and nine women.

Ceasefire efforts

Israel announced a new military campaign in central Gaza on Wednesday as it battles fighters relying on hit-and-run tactics. It says there will be no back-to-back fighting during the ceasefire talks, which have intensified since UN President Joe Biden outlined a proposal.

"At this decisive moment, we call on the leaders of Israel as well as Hamas to make whatever final compromise are necessary to close this deal," said the statement issued by the White House jointly with Argentina, Austria, Brazil, Britain, Canada and others.

Hamas seeks a permanent end to the war, Israel says it must destroy the group first.

CIA director William Burns met senior officials from mediators Qatar and Egypt on Wednesday in Doha to discuss the ceasefire plan. Two Egyptian security sources said talks continued on Thursday but had shown no sign of breakthrough.

Biden has repeatedly declared that ceasefires were close over the past several months, but there has been only one, lasting three, in November. —Reuters

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Spain joins S. Africa's case against Israel at ICJ

MADRID: Spain said on Thursday it would join South Africa's case at the UN's top court in which Pretoria has accused Israel of "genocide" in the Gaza Strip.

This statement came a week after Spain, along with Ireland and Norway, recognised the state of Palestine, sparking fury from Israel.

"Our sole goal is to put an end to the war and to advance on the road of applying the two-state solution", Foreign Minister Jose Manuel Abureto told journalists.

Abureto, asked if he felt Israel's actions in Gaza amounted to genocide, said it was up to the court to decide. "At the moment we see a large-scale war that does not distinguish between civilian and military targets in Gaza, as well as the enormous risk of regional spillover," he added.

Several Latin American nations, including Colombia and Mexico, have already joined South Africa's proceedings before the court.

Until now, however, no European country has taken that step. Ireland has also indicated it plans to join the case. —AFP

Zilhaj moon sighted in Saudi Arabia, Eid on June 16

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia's Supreme Court has announced the sighting of Zilhaj moon with the last month of the Islamic calendar starting today (Friday).

Eidul Adha will be observed on June 16. The rituals of Hajj will commence on June 14 with the Day of Arafat on June 15.

Pakistan's Central Board of Islamic Affairs will meet on Friday to sight the moon, AFP reported.

This meeting will take place at the Pakistan Meteorological Department building in Karachi, with simultaneous oral meetings in the provincial capitals and Islamabad. —Agencies

WHO confirms first fatal human case of H5N2 bird flu

GENEVA: A person died of bird flu in Mexico in the first confirmed case of a human infected with the H5N2 variant, the World Health Organisation said on Wednesday.

The 59-year-old, who died on April 24 after developing fever, shortness of breath, diarrhoea and nausea, had "no history of exposure to poultry or other animals" and "multiple underlying medical conditions", the WHO said in a statement.

The resident of the State of Mexico was hospitalised in Mexico City and died the same day, the statement said. It was the "first laboratory-confirmed human case of infection with an influenza A(H5N2) virus reported globally", the WHO added.

Mexican health authorities reported the confirmed case to the UN health body on May 23 after conducting laboratory tests.

The source of exposure to the virus was unknown, the WHO said, although cases of H5N2 have been reported in poultry in Mexico.

Mexico's health ministry said in a statement that the person who died was "a 59-year-old man with a history of chronic kidney disease, type 2 diabetes, (and) long-standing systemic arterial hypertension".

"There is no risk of contagion for the population," the statement said, adding that "all samples from identified contacts (of the patient) have been negative".

Authorities are monitoring farms near the victim's home and have established a permanent monitoring system to detect other cases in wildlife in the area, the statement added. —AFP

Amnesty urges FIFA to assess human rights risks before awarding World Cups

ZURICH: FIFA and countries bidding to host the 2030 and 2034 World Cups should agree to binding commitments and legal reforms to prevent human rights violations connected to the tournament, Amnesty International said on Wednesday.

In October, football's world governing body awarded the 2030 World Cup to Morocco, Spain and Portugal while Saudi Arabia is the lone bidder for the 2034 edition, with Amnesty saying there are "serious human rights" risks that must be addressed.

"FIFA should ensure a rigorous and transparent bidding process, based on meaningful stakeholder participation, including genuinely independent human rights risk assessments and comprehensive human rights strategies," human rights organisation Amnesty said.

"FIFA should be prepared to amend the rights to host the World Cup until such agreements are made, and until it is clear that human rights violations can and will be prevented, mitigated and remedied."

Amnesty said the commitments must prevent human rights violations in relation to "labour rights, discrimination, housing, freedom of expression, policing and privacy" before finalising a decision to approve any bid.

FIFA had included human rights standards as part of the bidding requirements for the two World Cups, but Amnesty fears single bids for each tournament undermine their leverage to ensure there are no violations.

FIFA had set a July deadline for the submission of bids for the 2034 World Cup, which will be evaluated later this year while the hosts will be officially appointed in the fourth quarter of 2024.

Amnesty said accident rates at construction projects in Saudi Arabia and Portugal are above EU levels, while discrimination in stadiums in Saudi is an issue as they highlighted the racism suffered by Real Madrid forward Vinicius Jr.

They also said Morocco and Portugal must increase the number of labour inspectors by over 50% to meet International Labour Organisation (ILO) benchmarks.

Amnesty said they have shared their report with FIFA. Reuters has contacted FIFA and the football associations of the countries bidding for the World Cup for comment.

Amnesty said the risks associated with hosting the 2034 tournament in Saudi Arabia are of a "different magnitude and severity" than past FIFA's commitment to its human rights policies.

Amnesty researcher Dana Ahmed said that although they were allowed to do research on migrant workers in Qatar, which hosted the 2022 World Cup, leading to several reforms, they have not had any access in Saudi Arabia.

"It is extremely difficult to do research from the outside," she told reporters.

Reuters has contacted the Saudi Ministry of Sport for comment.—Reuters

Saudis break through defensive Pakistan to advance in World Cup qualifying

ISLAMABAD: For most parts of the game, Pakistan were camped in their own half, looking to keep out Saudi Arabia. But Roberto Mancini's side found a way, breaking down the hosts' defence three times for a 3-0 victory here at the Jeddah Stadium to advance into the third round of Asia's 2026 World Cup qualifiers with a game to spare.

Foras Al-Buraikan scored twice, both his goals coming in the first half, before Musab Al-Juwier added a third to leave Pakistan without a point in Group 'F' heading into their last game against Tajikistan next week. Saudi Arabia, meanwhile, top the group with 13 points from five games ahead of their clash against Jordan.

The top two in each of the nine qualification groups advance to the next phase in the quest for one of Asia's eight guaranteed berths at the 48-team World Cup in Mexico, the United States and Canada.

Pakistan had vowed they had worked on improving their conduct and Stephen Constantine's men showed good composure in the early stages despite the Saudis having plenty of the ball.

They kept the visitors out until Al-Buraikan got the opener in the 26th. A cross from Motasab Al-Harbi on the left found its way to Salim Al-Ghamdi, who headed it into the box and Al-Buraikan scored with a brilliant piece of skill. The 24-year-old Al-Harbi struck a touch with his right foot to set it up

and then switched to send a rifling shot with his left past goalkeeper Younis Bhatt.

It was a matter of time till the Saudis got their second and it arrived 14 minutes later with Al-Ghamdi the creator. The wing-back's cross struck every Pakistani defender, landing perfectly for Al-Buraikan to nod it in.

The second half continued in the same way and the Saudis got their third in the 67th to end the match as a contest. Abdulrahman Ghareeb on the right found a willing runner in Al-Juwier to collect his square pass and the midfielder's first-time shot from an acute angle found the back of the net.

SOUTH KOREA PROGRESS

Saudi Arabia joined South Korea in qualifying for the final round of qualifying after their fellow Asian heavyweights overcame hosts Singapore 2-0 with Paris St Germain's Lee Kang-in and Tottenham Hotspur's Son Heung-min both scoring twice.

The win moved the Koreans onto 13 points from five games and guaranteed them first place in Group 'C' with one match remaining.

Lee gave the Koreans the lead in Singapore with a rising shot into the roof of Hassan Sunny's goal in the ninth minute before Son Heung-min's header doubled the advantage 11 minutes later.

Captain Son scored twice after the interval, either side of a second for Lee while Lee Jun-ho and

Hwang Hee-chan were also on target in interim coach Kim Do-han's first game in charge.

Next up for Korea's side on June 11 is a home game in Seoul against China, who need a point to clinch the second qualifying place after Branko Ivankovic's side drew 1-1 at home to Thailand despite裴 南硕's first half penalty miss in Shenyang.

Sopachok Sarachut had put the Thais ahead with a 20th minute header before naturalised Brazilian裴 南硕 fired over the bar in 51st minute.

But debutant Behram Abdrakhmanov swept his effort past substitute goalkeeper Narumon Anon with 11 minutes left as China stayed in second place, three points ahead of Thailand with one game remaining.

Indonesia would have guaranteed their progress from Group 'F' with a win against already qualified Iraq.

But they slumped to a 2-0 defeat in Jakarta, finishing the game with 10 men after Jordi Amat was red carded as Iraq made it five wins out of five.

Vietnam lie one point behind Indonesia in the fight for the second qualifying spot after a thrilling 3-2 win over the Philippines.

Kevin Ingreso thought he had secured a draw for the Philippines when he made it 2-2 in the 98th minute in Hanoi.

But in the fifth minute of added time Pham Tuan Hai bagged the winner to keep his side's hopes alive of making the final round of qualifying.

Vietnam travel to Iraq while Indonesia host the Philippines in their final group games on Tuesday.

CHHITRI DROPS OUT

In Kolkata, India legend Sanli Chhetri fought back tears as he made his 151st and final appearance for his country.

Thousands cheered an emotional Chhetri as he was given a guard of honour on leaving the pitch, bringing to a close an international career which put him among the world's all-time leading scorers.

Nearly 55,000 fans in Kolkata came to see their captain in an India shirt for the last time in a 0-0 draw against Korea — a remarkable record in a country where football is a distant second to cricket in popularity.

The 39-year-old scored 94 goals over nearly two decades for India, behind only Cristiano Ronaldo, Iran's retired Ali Daei and Lionel Messi in the all-time international scorers' list.

Already-qualified Japan made their unblemished record in Group 'B' as Koki Ogawa scored twice in a 5-0 win in Yangon over Myanmar while Oman boosted their chances in Group 'D' with a 3-0 victory over Taiwan.

Australia also remained perfect with a 2-0 win in Dhaka against Bangladesh in Group 'I' and Mehdi Taremi scored a hat-trick in Iran's 4-2 success against hosts Hong Kong in Group 'E'.—Agencies

Swiatek, Paolini set up Paris final showdown

PARIS: Iga Swiatek moved closer to a third consecutive French Open title by dismantling American third seed Coco Gauff on Thursday and she will play Jasmine Paolini in the final after the Italian dethroned Maria Andreescu.

Four-time Grand Slam champion Swiatek's 6-2, 6-4 semi-final win was her 11th victory in 12 meetings with Gauff, but the 23-year-old Pole had to endure tough moments in the second set before matching her longest winning streak on clay.

"I was pretty intense and putting pressure on Coco," Swiatek said. "Most of the things overall in my game worked today, so I'm proud of myself."

Paolini joined her in the final by defeating Russian 17-year-old Maria Andreescu 6-1, 6-1 to continue Italy's golden Roland Garros, with Janikl Sinner also through to the men's semi-finals.

The 1.2th seed had never gone beyond the second round of a major before the start of this year, winning a total of four matches in 16 Grand Slams before advancing to the fourth round of the Australian Open in January.

Now she is one win away from the title at Roland Garros as she tries to emulate compatriot Francesca Schiavone, who won the 2010 French Open.

"I focused I think a little bit later than other players, to dream is the most important thing in sport and in life," said Paolini. "I'm happy I could dream this moment. I don't know what to say, I'm so emotional."

Andreescu had become the youngest Grand Slam semi-finalist in 27 years with a shock victory over second seed Aryna Sabalenka in the last night.

But her bid to be crowned the youngest major champion since Martina Hingis at the 1997 US Open was cut short as Andreescu appeared overcast by the occasion, leaving the court in tears after an error-strewn display.

Gauff will rise to number two in the rankings behind Swiatek but the loss to the Pole, who also lost her in the 2022 final and last year's quarters, was a bitter pill to swallow for the 20-year-old.

"I think she's progressing a lot," Swiatek said of the US Open champion. "Last year's US Open showed she's tough. At this age, it's obvious she's going to just grow. It's nice to see her handling everything well around her, because it's not easy. I'm sure we'll have plenty more intense matches at the highest level."

In Wednesday's night session, Alexander Zverev reached his fourth consecutive semi-final in Paris by seeing off Australian 11th seed Alex de Minaur 6-4, 7-6, 7-5, 6-4.

The German fourth seed, still bidding for his maiden Grand Slam title, will next face Casper Ruud, the 2022 and 2023 runner-up, on Friday for a place in the final after the Norwegian was handed a walkover following Novak Djokovic's withdrawal with a knee injury.

Slow court conditions took some of the bite out of Zverev's powerful serve, forcing the German to win extended rallies against his speedy opponent.

A key moment came on the second set break when Zverev fell behind 4-0 and the crowd rallied around the Australian.

"I stayed calm," Zverev told reporters. "I know that the conditions today are extremely difficult to his winners. I know that it has to go the long way sometimes, and that's what I did in the tiebreak. The serve today didn't play such a big role as it did maybe the other days just because it was very, very close."

Zverev, 27, is playing under the shadow of an ongoing trial in Berlin over allegations of assaulting an acquaintance.

Djokovic had been due to face Ruud in a repeat of last year's final, but the 24-time Grand Slam champion's title defence was abruptly ended by the knee injury he suffered during his dramatic last-55 victory over Francisco Cerundolo.

The injury ended the Serb's quest to win a record-extending 25th Grand Slam trophy and will result in him losing his top ranking to Italian Jannik Sinner on Monday.

Djokovic confirmed on Thursday he had undergone an operation on his right knee and that a "week wait", but gave no timeframe for his return, putting his participation at Wimbledon and the Paris Olympics in doubt.

Djokovic made no mention of whether he would be fit to take part at Wimbledon which begins on July 1 but added that he was going to his best to be healthy and fit to return to the court as soon as possible.

Sinner goes up against Carlos Alcaraz in Friday's other men's semi-final. There will be a first-time French Open men's champion for the first time since 2016 on Sunday, with Ruud the only man left in the draw who has previously reached the final.—Agencies

LAHORE: Pakistan's senior team defeated Vietnam 3-2 in the quarter-final of the AVC Challenger Volleyball Cup in Bahrain.

According to the information released by the Pakistan Volleyball Federation on Thursday, Pakistan won the match 19-25, 25-23, 25-21, 21-25, 15-12.

In the semi-final, Pakistan will face either Korea or Bahrain on Saturday.

Meanwhile, Pakistan's junior team lost to Iran 3-2 at the CAVA U-18 Volleyball Championship in Tashkent. Iran won 25-23, 25-13, 23-25, 21-25, 8-15.—Sports Reporter

Mbappe on target as France grab friendly win

METZ: France strided to a comfortable 3-0 win over Luxembourg in a pre-Euro 2024 friendly as striker Kylian Mbappe sealed the win after delivering two assists.

Forward Randal Kolo Muani put France in front just before the break, heading in from a precise Mbappe pass, before Jonathan Clauss's thunderous strike from outside the box doubled the advantage in the 70th minute.

Mbappe added a third 15 minutes later with a low, first-time shot from near the pen-

alty spot for his 47th goal for Les Bleus.

The 25-year-old, who finished his widely anticipated move to Real Madrid on Monday, has now been involved in 80 goals for France in 78 games.

"(Mbappe) is a formidable leader ever since he's been with us," said manager Didier Deschamps.

"He did a good job today... his head and body weren't used to playing very much these past couple of weeks, so some joint was missing... but he decided he wants to win everything, it's gotten way

better for him. He has been a good example all week."

The World Cup runner-up had Luxembourg pinned back inside their own half for large chunks of the opening 45 minutes but the visitors' disciplined defence held firm to thwart their efforts.

Ranked 87th, Luxembourg missed out on what could have been their first ever major tournament with a 2-0 loss to Georgia in their Euro 2024 qualification playoff semi-final.

Goalkeeper Anthony Moris denied Mbappe from close range before the half-hour

mark until Kolo Muani found a way in two minutes before halftime.

Little changed after the break as France, who are among the favourites to win Euro 2024, continued to dominate and substitute defender Clauss increased their lead from another Mbappe assist before the striker wrapped up the scoring.

Forward Bradley Barcola, who set up Mbappe, made his France debut when he replaced Marcus Thuram in the 81st minute.

"It's a source of pride, I was

really looking forward to this match to show what I can do," said the 21-year-old.

"I'm happy, I made an assist and we won 3-0. No pressure, it's a friendly match, (but) I gave everything."

France play Canada on Sunday in Bordeaux in their last warm-up match before Euro 2024 starts on June 14.

France, who were knocked out of Euro 2020 in the last 16 on penalties by Switzerland, face Austria on June 17 before playing the Netherlands on June 21 and Poland four days later.—Reuters



Stoinis shines as Australia cruise past Oman in opener

BRIDGETOWN: Marcus Stoinis shone with bat and ball as Australia launched their bid for a grand slam of major cricket titles with a 35-run victory over Oman at the Kensington Oval on Wednesday.

Stoinis smashed a game-changing 67 not out off just 36 balls to power Australia to 161-5 and then took three wickets for 10 runs as Oman were restricted to 125-9 in reply at Kensington Oval.

"It was a nice start," player of the match Stoinis said afterwards. "Maybe a few deliveries for us but we're better for it, and nice that we got the win."

"And nice that I got to spend some time in the middle and have a bit of a bowl," Stoinis hammered six sixes and two fours during a smothering batting performance that led Australia's recovery after they had slumped to 50-3

earlier in the innings.

David Warner helped provide some stability with a half century as Australia eventually got going after captain Mitchell Marsh and Glenn Maxwell fell off successive balls in opener Mohsin Khan in the 11th over.

After a steady couple of overs, Stoinis went on the attack, dominating a 102-run four-wicket partnership which effectively wrestled the initiative away from the Omanis.

Warner, in his final tournament before international retirement, compiled 56 off 51 balls, including six fours and one six, before falling in the penultimate over.

Warner's innings propelled him beyond former captain Aaron Finch as Australia's top run-getter in T20 Internationals with a tally of 3,155.

Four of Stoinis' six sixes came

while came in the 15th over of the innings, bowled by Mohsin, and triggered such a pace of acceleration that the 2021 champions were able to move their double their total over the last six overs of the innings.

"Davey (Warner) and I talked about tactics before that over," Stoinis added in explaining the sudden batting onslaught. "And then you know how it is when you get the first couple of balls away for boundaries, you just think you might as well try to turn it into a big over." Reuben van Niekerk in a thrilling wicket over broke in their opening game on Sunday, Oman had seemed in the mood for a fight with the early dismissal of Travis Head followed by the Marsh Maxwell double blow.

However, Australia's competitive know-how saw them through that tricky period as they made a

winning start to their campaign to become the first nation to hold all three global cricket titles — Test, One Day and T20 — simultaneously.

Mitchell Starc, who left the field before the end of his spell with cramps, made his trademark early strike in defence of Australia's total and finished with two wickets, as did fellow pace Nathan Ellis and leg-spinner Adam Zampa.

Oman captain Ayub Khan mourned while took encouragement from the performance of Oman's bowlers after a solid start.

"Playing against a top side today was a great experience, especially following on from the Super Over last game," Khan said. "They played really well, but credit goes to our bowlers. Our bowlers can do really well on turning tracks." —AFP

'Pakistan's team hotel changed after Mohsin's intervention'

KARACHI: Pakistan's team hotel in Dallas was changed after the country's cricket board's chairman Mohsin Naqvi's intervention over the long distance between the accommodation and the Grand Prairie Stadium — the sport's match venue and practice facility in the US.

According to sources, Mohsin contacted the International Cricket Council (ICC) and expressed his dissatisfaction with the hotel arrangements for the Pakistan team. His efforts convinced the event organizers to change the team's hotel, sources added.

The initial hotel where the team was supposed to stay was a 30-minute drive from the stadium, while the new hotel is only a five-minute drive away.

Sources further revealed that Mohsin warned the ICC that he would not allow his team to endure long travel distances for any T20 World Cup matches, including the matches on June 9 and June 11 in New York.

The PCB chief made it clear to the ICC that if the Pakistan team's hotel was not changed, he would relocate the team to a better and more convenient location at the board's expense.

Sources added that Mohsin stressed to the ICC that the national cricket team is his responsibility, and he will ensure the players' comfort at all costs.

Reports suggest that the Indian cricket team is staying just 10 minutes away from the Naqas County International Cricket Stadium in New York, while other teams' hotels are more than an hour away.

South Africa and Sri Lanka have already expressed concerns about the facilities provided during their stay in the city.

The Baber Aslam-led unit are scheduled to play arch-rivals India on June 9 and Canada on June 11, with their final first-round match against Ireland on June 16 in Landstuhl, Florida.

NEW YORK: Set at a street cricket set-up in New York patiently gave Dale Steyn pointers on how to bowl, not knowing they were giving tips to a fearsome South Africa fast bowler who took nearly 700 international wickets.

Steyn, who played across all formats of the game in a career spanning 15 years before retiring in 2019, decided to travel to New York, one of the best venues for the current T20 World Cup.

"Keep in mind to not bend your elbow. It's a swinging motion going forward... and if you want you can do a little skip," he said.

ICC admits NY pitches not up to the mark

NEW YORK: The

pitchers used in the T20 World Cup matches played in New York have not been up to standard and ground staff are working on remedying them for the rest of the tournament, the International Cricket Council (ICC) said on Thursday.

The temporary Naqas County International Cricket Stadium has hosted two games so far, both of which were low-scoring encounters due to the nature of the drop-in pitch which has made batting extremely difficult due to the movement and bounce.

Fans expecting a run-fest were left disappointed when Sri Lanka were bowled out for 77 — their lowest ever score — against South Africa while India bowled out Ireland for 96 in Wednesday's one-sided contest.

"T20 live and the ICC recognise that the pitches used so far at the Naqas County International Cricket Stadium have not played as consistently as we would have all wanted," the ICC said in a statement. "The world

class grounds team have been working hard since the conclusion of yesterday's game to remedy the situation and deliver the best possible surfaces for the remaining matches."

The stadium is set to host six more matches, including Sunday's blockbuster game between arch-rivals India and Pakistan.

India's batting coach Vikram Rautwar described it as a "challenging wicket" having also played a warm-up match at the venue.

"It is what it is. We need to find a way to deal with it and I think we have enough skills in the team and enough experience in the team to deal with it," he said.

Ireland coach Heinrich Malan said the surface didn't live up to expectations after pundits slammed it as "dangerous."

India won the Group W game by eight wickets after they bowled Ireland out for just 96.

"When you play the game you need a really good surface or as good as surfaces you can get and unfortunately what we've seen over the last couple

games just doesn't necessarily live up to that. So hopefully, over the next day or so it can hopefully flatten out a little bit and we can see some good cricket come Friday," he said.

"I think we just want to see good cricket, don't we? It's the pinnacle of our event and it doesn't have to be 200 play all the time, it just needs to be an equal contest and I think if you look at today it is definable where that was," said Malan.

Andy Flower, the former Zimbabwe player and ex-England team director, told ESPNcricinfo that he felt the surface was not up to scratch.

"I've got to say that it is not a good surface to play an international match on. It's bordering on dangerous," said Flower.

"You saw the ball bouncing from a length both ways, so skidding low occasionally but in the main bouncing was really high and striking people on the thumb, on the glove, on the helmet and making life very, very difficult for any batsman," he added. —Agencies

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Uganda claim first-ever T20 World Cup victory with win over PNG

GEORGETOWN: Uganda claimed their first ever T20 World Cup win with a three-wicket victory over Papua New Guinea at Providence Stadium on Wednesday in a low-scoring but tense encounter.

The African side bowled out PNG for 77 and after struggling at 26-5 in reply reached the target in 18.2 overs with Hassan Ali Shah top-scoring with 33.

Shah put on a crucial sixth wicket partnership of 35 with James Mwangi (13) which effectively won the game for the underdog debutants.

But PNG will rue the moment that Shah, on night, was dropped by Charles Annet, who misjudged a red-airly single catch.

The Pacific Islanders had their work cut out trying to defend with a low total but were also undone in part by some loose bowling, conceding 15 wickets.

After that let-off, Shah played a disciplined and focused innings until, with just three needed to win, he skied a catch to John Karika at third man.

The Ugandans celebrated their victory with dancing on the edge of the field as the team, which beat out more established cricketing nations Zimbabwe to reach the tournament, picked up their first points.

"That's a pretty special win for us. You know, first win at the World Cup," said Uganda skipper Brian Masaba. "It doesn't get more special than this. I'm super proud of this group of guys. I mean, they've put in the work, they've put in such a shift. And to get a win for their country at the World Cup is very, very special," he added.

Masaba had won the toss and put Papua New Guinea in to bat and was rewarded when Alphonso Ramarangi removed PNG captain Assad Vala

with the second ball of the innings, trapping him low in what was a wicket maiden opening over.

Now fast tried to drive James Mwangi but was snuffed up by Roger Mwakasa who did well to get back and make the catch from mid-off.

They then went in similar fashion as his attempted drive off Cotran Kyawwa became a simple catch for Mwakasa at mid-on to leave his side struggling at 19-3 in the fourth over.

Logic Sikas looked confident making 12 off 17 balls before an ill-timed attempt to make a second run ended in a run-out and when Charles Annet was bowled by Frank Nsubuga it was damage limitation time.

But only Hari Hari (15) and Kirpin Doraga (12) were able to make double figures as the Pacific Islanders were bowled out with five balls left of their allotted 20 overs. —AFP

Cricket is a niche sport that is gaining interest in the United States, who are playing in and co-hosting the T20 World Cup for the first time. They beat neighbours Canada in their first group game. —Reuters

'Sindh govt building 2.1m houses for flood-hit people'

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah has said that his government has started the reconstruction of 2.1 million houses to rehabilitate more than 12.6 million flood-affected people, which exceeds the population of 154 countries.

"We are also supporting water, sanitation, and hygiene interventions. A funding of Rs39 billion has been secured to construct 264,250 houses with safe sanitation facilities."

This he said while talking to journalists after reviewing the progress of the reconstruction of the houses on the Sindh Peoples Housing for Flood Affected (SPHFA) office on Tipu Sultan Road on Thursday.

Provincial ministers Sharjeel Memon, Nasir Shah, Malikuloom Malik, and DG SPHFA Khalid Shakh were present on the occasion.

The chief minister said that Rs250bn was required for the reconstruction of 2.1m houses against which his government, with the support of donor agencies, had secured Rs440bn and the shortfall of Rs100bn would be met through foreign funding and federal government support.

Murad Ali Shah said that the initiative aimed at implementing a sustainable rehabilitation strategy after 2.1m houses were damaged by the floods of 2022, affecting 12.6m people. A total of 85 per cent of the affected houses were mud-brick houses.

Mr Shah said that the initiative was driven by the vision of PPP Chairman Bilawal Bhutto-

Zardari who, being the foreign minister, successfully mobilised funds at Geneva Conference in January 2023 and the Donors' Conference in Sindh on February 8, 2023.

The CM said 525,000 houses were currently under construction and over 100,000 houses had already been completed.

"At the project's inception, we received financial assistance from the World Bank amounting to \$500 million, supplemented by \$227 million from the Sindh government. To date, we have secured around 70 per cent of the necessary funding for the project's successful completion, with additional support currently in the pipeline from the Islamic Development Bank and the Asian Development Bank," he said.

He added that by the end of next year, the government would complete between 1.2 and 1.5m houses.

"When we talk about the reconstruction of 2.1m new houses, we are talking about the rehabilitation of more than 12.6m flood-affected population, which exceeds the population of 154 countries."

Mr Shah said that the positive impacts of this comprehensive housing reconstruction program were evident through the beneficiaries' self-reliance, as they were rebuilding multi-hazard-resistant houses themselves.

He added that the program employed the latest and most transparent technology/Management Systems, ensuring that grants for housing reconstruction were transferred directly into the beneficiaries' bank accounts.

Govt's battle to save city from flooding begins amid excessive rain forecast

- Gears up for monsoon with comprehensive plan
- 586 drains, 310 choking points to be cleaned across Karachi

KARACHI: To deal with more than "normal rainfall" which is expected this monsoon, the city administration came together on Thursday and decided in a meeting to clean 586 drains and clear over 310 choking points across Karachi.

According to Meteorological department and National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), the heavy downpour would mainly affect the southern parts of Sindh.

After the advisory and warning issued by the National Emergency Operation Centre (NEOC), Met office and the NDMA, the city administration held a meeting with Sindh Chief Secretary Syed Asif Hyder Shah to discuss the arrangements for the upcoming monsoon rains, wherein he sought details of prepara-

tions done so far and discussed ways for effective operation of the departments concerned during the rains.

The meeting was attended by key officials, including Karachi Mayor Mustafa Wahab, Commissioner Karachi Syed Hassan Naqvi, Secretary Local Government Syed Khalid Hyder Shah, Secretary Rehabilitation Waseem Shamsud, officials from the Water Board, Pakistan Navy, representatives of the Cantonment Boards, all district deputy commissioners, and municipal commissioners, K-Electric, DG Revenue 1122 among others.

A statement issued after the meeting said that a contingency plan for Karachi Division was also presented in light of the expected monsoon rains. The chief secretary highlighted that during current year, higher than normal rainfall was anticipated but assured that the Sindh government will support the KMC and other departments wherever necessary.

Mr Shah emphasised the crucial role of K-Electric in ensuring a continuous power supply for water drainage operations during the rains. He called for special arrangements by K-Electric to prevent any loss of life due to electrical issues. Additionally, he directed all town chairmen to ensure proper drainage of water

Sarim remanded to FIA in child trafficking case

FIR says suspects concealed facts regarding adoption of babies

KARACHI: A judicial magistrate on Thursday handed over rights activist Sarim Barney to Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) for two days in a case pertaining to "child trafficking by way of illegal adoption" on the complaint of 18 authorities.

The investigation officer (IO) of the FIA, Bilal Ahmed, produced Mr Barney before Judicial Magistrate (East) Khaleq ul Zaman, seeking his physical removal. The IO informed the court that the suspect needed to be interrogated "thoroughly" and that it was necessary to recover "crucial records pertaining to the adoption/guardianship of children" who had been adopted by families abroad.

The IO further stated that the bank

accounts of Mr Barney and his trust needed to be scrutinised. Additionally, he pleaded that remaining suspects needed to be traced, arrested, and arrested.

On the other hand, Mr Barney's legal team, including advocates Asim Warraich, Aijaz Hussain, and Nanas Dabir, requested judicial custody for their client, stating that their client was ready to provide all necessary documents and that his office was available to cooperate with the IO.

Additionally, Advocate Warraich also asked the court to dismiss the case under Section 16 of the criminal procedure code. The legal team also submitted a bail application, which is set to be heard on Saturday.

Earlier in March, the FIA received a letter "illegal adoption by NGO" from the US Department of State Diplomatic Security Service.

The letter alleged that the trust was "misleading courts and changing children's names".

The letter stated: "It appears in the case of three baby girls were relinquished by biological parents with a con-

sent to hand over any interested family for an adoption, whereas court proceedings show that all three children were abandoned at the gate of Sarim Barney Welfare Trust Ltd., despite of all efforts biological parents were not traced, or anyone claimed for the children."

The US department referred the matter to the FIA for further investigation.

Responding to the allegations, Mr Barney told the court: "I was the one who informed the US authorities that the child was abandoned. However, if there is an issue with the child being mentioned as an orphan in a document, it might have been a typo error made by a member of our team or an advocate."

After hearing the IO and the defence counsel, the court remanded Mr Barney in physical custody for two days, observing that the IO's submission appeared "genuine and convincing".

According to the FIR, an inquiry concluded that Sarim Barney and his associates Basal Ali Khan, Humaira Naz, and others colluded to provide false information, make misstatements, and conceal facts before the Honorable Family Courts District East Karachi under the

guise of illegal adoption/guardianship of three baby girls using fraudulent documents.

It stated that the statement by the suspects that "the three baby girls in question were orphans and found from outside the gate of Mr Sarim Barney Trust and it tried level best to find their parents but no person came forward for claiming them" was contrary to the facts, adding that these baby girls in question dropped by their biological parents to the trust was also contrary to the facts.

The case was registered against Mr Barney, Basal Ali, Humaira Naz under Sections 420 (cheating and dishonestly, inducing delivery of property), 468 (cheating for purpose of cheating), 471 (Using as genuine a forged document), 109 (abatement) of the Pakistan Penal Code read with Sections 1 (trafficking in persons), 4 (aggravating circumstances) and 5 (abatement and criminal conspiracy) of the Prevention of Trafficking in Persons Act, 2018.

It also stated that the role of others will be determined after the investigation.

Another 'robber' lynched, accomplice beaten by mob

KARACHI: A suspected robber was lynched while another injured by an angry mob in New Karachi Industrial Area on early Thursday morning, police said.

Area SHO Mohammed Nawaz Gondal said two suspects allegedly snatched five cell phones from citizens within the remit of the Bilal Colony police station.

When they attempted to loot some young men sitting near Farooq-Azam Masjid in Sector-S-G, the victims put up resistance and the area people also joined them.

The people overpowered both the suspects and subjected them to severe beating and hit them with cemented blocks and other blunt instruments.

As a result, one suspect, identified as 30-year-old Sherry, was killed while his accomplice Farman Ashraf, 27, was arrested with severe injuries.

The body and the injured were taken to the Abbasi Shaheed Hospital for medico-legal formalities.

The police claimed to have recovered five snatched cell phones, one motorcycle and weapons from their possession.

The SHO said five robbery victims had also approached the police and identified the killed and injured suspect.

Earlier on Wednesday a suspected robber was also lynched by an angry mob in Ishaad Town in the morning.

Woman found buried in house

A young woman was found dead and buried inside the courtyard of a house in Bin Qasim Town on Thursday, police said.

They added that the deceased woman, identified as 25-year-old Sajna Mayt, was brutally tortured before being killed and buried inside a house in Ali Mohammed Brohi Goth.

Area SHO Inayatullah Marwat said that after receiving information from the neighbours, the police rushed to the spot and exhumed the body from the ground.

Her husband, Nawab Ali Chaudhri, and other family members had fled the house, the SHO said, adding that the woman appeared to have died two days ago.

The corpse was taken to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre for medico-legal formalities.

SHO Marwat said the victim's father, Mashtooq Ali Brohi, had told the police on phone from Khairpur that he suspected that his son-in-law Nawab and other family members had killed his daughter over some "family dispute".

He also told the police that he would get an FIR registered against the nominated suspects on Friday.

According to a notification, the governor, in exercise of his powers conferred upon him under Clause (a) of Article 109 of the Constitution of Pakistan, summoned the provincial assembly to meet on Friday (June 7) at 3pm at the Sindh Assembly building in Karachi. — APP

Police practice to 'seal' FIRs comes under scrutiny

IGP to seek opinion from legal department; court order barring this practice goes missing from legal branch

ISLAMABAD: Police chief Ali Nasir Khan will seek an opinion from the prosecution department of the Islamabad police over the practice of "sealing" FIRs which had been termed against fundamental rights by a local court a few years ago.

The court order issued in 2015, however, has gone missing from the legal branch of the capital police and despite efforts over the past three days following the order of the IGP, the officials failed to find the judgement.

The police chief issued these directives on June 3 in a meeting on the issue that was attended by the police officers and officials from the legal branch.

Since the order could not be found, a decision on whether or not to continue

this practice would be made after consultations with the legal branch in light of the contents of the judgement.

PRO Tasi Jawad confirmed that during the meeting the IGP asked about the court order from the legal branch, but it was not available. "It will, as found as still is looking for it," he assured. He further said the meeting decided to restrict access to those FIRs which may cause a law and order situation.

'No law to seal FIRs'

During the meeting, the IGP asked officials which law empowered the police to seal FIRs. The participants of the meeting said there was no law to this effect. IGP Riaz, who served in Lahore as DGO Operations before coming to the capital, also asked the Punjab prosecution department and received the same response.

"If there is no law then why are the FIRs sealed," asked the IGP. He was informed that the FIRs were sealed on the orders of the Operations Division. The officials at the meeting justified that only those FIRs were sealed which could cause a "law and order situation".

The officials further said the FIRs were sealed only for the public, including the accused, but were sent to the investigating officers, legal branch, and magistrates per the legal procedure.

"However, investigation and other legal procedures, including arrests, are suspended till the directives of the senior officers," they said, adding that in response the IGP showed reservations asking if the FIR was being shared with the ID, the legal branch and the magistrates then that defeated the purpose of keeping it under wraps.

However, however, said Khan that the police chief was allegedly misled as the sealed FIRs were not sent to anyone. Not only is the FIR sealed but the relevant initial report registered in 'Roznamcha' (daily diary) is also sealed, they claimed.

However, it seems the practice of sealing FIRs is a misinterpretation of Section 157-2 of the Criminal Procedure Code. This section empowers the SHO to suspend investigations in case of suspicion but only after informing the magistrate in writing. According to officials, at present the FIRs are sealed only on the verbal orders of senior officers, a deliberate attempt to keep their contents secret to

blindsides those nominated in them.

Court order

Last month, the police sealed six FIRs. Out of the six cases, three were registered at the Karachi Company police station, two at the Secretariat police station and one at the Industrial Area police station. Except for one robbery case in which 18 citizens were robbed, all FIRs were registered against the PTI leaders. The foreigners were robbed in 18 Markas on May 25.

The practice of sealing FIRs, though in vogue, brings in stark contrast to an order of the judicial magistrate, Kase Mujahid Rahim, in June 2019 when he directed the capital police not to seal any FIR as it was against the fundamental rights of the subjects as well as the complainants.

The court also ruled that withholding the copy of an FIR was against the fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution. The order was issued in response to a plea by then-PTP Senator Mustafa Nawaz Khokhar who approached the court seeking direction to the police to provide him with a copy of the FIR registered against him at the Margalla police station.

78 electric buses to ply on six routes in Rawalpindi by Jan

RAWALPINDI: Punjab Minister for Transport Bilal Akbar Khan on Thursday said that 78 electric buses will ply on six routes in Rawalpindi by January next, with three additional routes will be proposed by National and Provincial Assembly members.

He said that the gemstone city would see a significant increase in public transportation, with 200 buses expected to be operational in the next two years. He stated this during his visit Rawalpindi on the directives of Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz to address traffic issues in the city.

At a meeting at the Commissioner Office Rawalpindi, Transport Secretary Rawalpindi Rashid Ali and metro bus project officials briefed the minister on the current state of transportation in Rawalpindi.

The minister highlighted the success of the metro bus project, which was built eight to nine years ago, saying it was neglected by the previous government. Despite propaganda, the metro bus has turned out to be popular, as over 150,000 passengers daily travel in Rawalpindi and one million across Punjab, he added.

He said that if there had been no metro buses today, the condition of the roads would have been worsened due to huge traffic.

He further said that Punjab chief minister added 32 new fold hospitals in the health care system in 100 days where over 30,000 people get free treatment daily.

He said the government was bringing packages for farmers and they will be able to get fertilizer without interest.

He said actions are being taken against complaints of harassment of women. He said 20,000 students will be given motorbikes without interest and e-bikes will be given in two years instalments, he added.

The minister said 7,500 gifts have applied for e-bikes and we are planning that all of them get bikes. He said a project named Maryam ke Dastak has been launched under which marriage certificates, e-registration, B forms and vehicle files will reach the doorsteps of people.

Minister wants revised Naan, Roti prices implemented

RAWALPINDI: Punjab Food Minister Bilal Yasin on Thursday directed the Pindi administration to ensure 100 percent implementation of the newly fixed prices of Roti and Naan.

He said that all arrangements regarding security and law and order should be finalised before the start of Muharram. He got all the stakeholders into confidence to maintain the peace and order situation in the city.

He expressed these views while presiding over a meeting regarding implementation of Roti and Naan prices and arrangements in connection with Muharram in the Commissioner's Office Rawalpindi.

Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, Senior Superintendent of Police Operations Kamran Asghar were present in the meeting while Deputy Commissioners of Jhelum, Chakwal and Attock participated in the meeting through video link.

During the meeting, Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema said that in May, Rs10 million fines were imposed on violators of price list fixed by district administration while taking action against the wholesalers also.

Provincial Food Minister Punjab Bilal Yasin directed the Deputy Commissioners to focus on Roti and Naan prices.

He asked the price magistrates to review the prices of bread and essential items on a daily basis and indiscriminate action should be taken against the violation.

He said that the government would not allow anyone to rob people's pockets.

IHC removes objections on pleas against amendments to election law

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Thursday removed administrative objections on petitions filed against the recent amendments to the Elections Act 2017 and the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP)'s jurisdiction to entertain applications seeking the transfer of petitions related to three constituencies of the federal capital.

IHC Chief Justice Ameer Farooq took up the petitions and heard the arguments of the counsel against the objections raised by the registrar office.

The petitions were filed by PTI

backed independent candidates from NA-46, NA-47 and NA-48.

The registrar office had raised the objections that the petitioners could not challenge the provisions of Elections Act and the presidential ordinance.

Muhammad Shoaib Shabeen, Muhammad Ali Bukhari and Amir Maghal have challenged the view of Section 151 of the Elections Act 2017 and the Elections (Amendment) Ordinance 2024 promulgated on May 27, 2024.

Section 151 of the Elections Act empowered the ECP to "transfer a petition from one tribunal to another".

Whereas, the presidential ordinance promulgated in May

27 amended Section 140 of the Act and allowed for retired judges to be appointed as election tribunals and that too with out the consultation of the chief justice.

The counsel for the petitioners are pointed out that the view of Elections Act, the ordinance and the proceeding before the ECP could have been challenged in a single petition.

Justice Farooq removed the objections and remarked that the court would hear detailed arguments on the petition after the registrar office would number them accordingly. The court would hear the petitions on Friday (today).

The identical petitions ven-

ded that as per Form 45, the PTI's contest-up could have won the elections with heavy margin but, due to manipulation in the results they had been defeated.

The petitioners stated that following the notification of the election tribunal for Islamabad, the runner-up filed an election petition in the tribunal appointed under Section 140 of the Elections Act 2017.

On the first date of the hearing on May 2, the tribunal issued notices to the ECP, returned candidates and the returning officers and directed them to file original Form 45 and Form 46. On the next date of hearing i.e. May 20, the ECP and some of the respondents appeared and

the tribunal directed them to file their replies and the original Form 45/Form 46.

According to the petitioners, PM-N candidates filed applications under section 145(1) of the Elections Act 2017 for summary dismissal of the petition on the ground that the same was time-barred. The tribunal after hearing preliminary arguments issued notice to the petitioner with a direction to file reply by giving an advance copy to the other side, and adjourned the case to May 5 for arguments.

India returns 82-year-old villager who strayed across LoC

MUZAFFARABAD: An 82-year-old villager from Anad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK), who had inadvertently strayed into the Indian-occupied territory of the disputed Himalayan region on Tuesday, was repatriated by the Indian authorities via the Tattinote-Chakani da Bagh crossing point along the Line of Control (LoC) on Thursday.

Munir Hussain had left his home in the Batal sector of Poonch district to join his wife who was grazing cattle there. However, the septagenarian villager, suffering from some

mental ailments for about four years, went astray and got lost on India occupied territory, where he was apprehended by an army patrol.

The family and government officials in AJK came to know about his ordeal on Wednesday after the Indian media ran stories about an "intruder".

Waleed Ameer, assistant commissioner of Hajira, of which Batal sector is a part, told Dawn that Indian authorities were reached by their Pakistani counterparts the same day for his repatriation in accordance with an understanding between the two sides about inadvertent cross-

Mr Ameer said the repatriation took place at about 4pm through the Tattinote-Chakani da Bagh, which was one of three active crossing points at the LoC before India unilaterally suspended the intra-Kashmir travel and trade, shortly before occupying the Indian Kashmir in August 2019.

Wearing a new black kurta and white shawl gifted by the Indian authorities along with a box of sweets, Mr Hussain was greeted first by his son, Mohammad Rashid, upon entering the liberated territory through an iron gate that marks the divide between the two sides.

His nephew, Liaqat Hussain, cousin Mohammad Akbar and numerous other villagers were also present on the occasion in addition to the concerned civil and military officials.

"There is an atmosphere of jubilation not only in our home but also in the entire village on his safe return because in some similar cases in the past, people have met tragedies at the LoC," Liaqat Hussain told Dawn by telephone from Gulshan Colony in Batal sector.

Presumably, the 42-year-old countryman was referring to the shooting of AJK residents by the Indian army while they

were either collecting herbs, cutting fodder or grazing cattle close to the unmarked dividing line.

"We are grateful to our armed forces and our civil administration for their role in his early return," he said.

"At the same time, I also express my gratitude to the Indian authorities for sending him back alive," he said. Mr Hussain, who also suffered from hypertension, felt exhausted by the unpleasant trekking through the forests, he was taking rest, after being given his medication.

"But people are constantly visiting us to extend felicitations."

Ex-senator denied bail in Ch Adnan murder case

Judge approves pre-arrest bail of other suspects

RAWALPINDI: Additional Sessions Judge Sahail Nisar on Thursday ordered the immediate arrest of former PML-N lawmaker Chaudhary Tanveer in a murder case while extending the pre-arrest bail of other suspects.

Chaudhary Tanveer along with MNA Basial Chaudhary, Changer Khan, and Osama Chaudhary had been nominated in an FIR regarding the murder of independent candidate Chaudhary Adnan earlier this year.

During the hearing in which the judge ordered the arrest of the PML-N leader after the cancellation of his bail plea, a heavy contingent of police was deployed on the premises of the district courts.

However, the judge extended the pre-arrest bail of Danishal Ch, Changer Khan, and Osama Chaudhary against surety bonds worth Rs 200,000 each. The decision had been reserved earlier this week and postponed twice by the judge before it was announced on Thursday.

Ch Adnan gained down Chaudhary Muhammad Adnan, 48, an independent candidate in the 16th election, was killed by unidentified motorcycle riders outside the Police Lines Headquarters in early February this year. The murder occurred in the Civil Lines area, which has already been declared as the 'red zone' in the garrison city. After the registration of the FIR by Chaudhary Nadim Iqbal, brother-in-law of the deceased, the police launched an investigation to arrest the culprits.

According to the complainant, his brother-in-law Chaudhary Adnan was on his way to his residence in Jhanda Chidi in a black SUV with his aides, after negotiating a land issue at a housing society office. His vehicle was also accompanied by another car.

When the vehicles stopped at the traffic light near Jinnah Park, two unidentified persons wearing 'black war kumars' came close to the driving seat of Ch Adnan's vehicle and started firing at him.

The FIR said that Adnan was hit in the neck, face, and other body parts while the assailants sped off on their motorcycle, which was parked across the road. Chaudhary Adnan lost his life while being shifted to the Rawalpindi District Hospital by the emergency service staff of Rescue 1122.

A day after the murder of ex-MPA, the Civil Lines police booked Chaudhary Tanveer, Danishal Chaudhary, and Changer Khan for their alleged involvement in the killing of the ex-lawmaker.

According to the FIR, "Chaudhary Adnan had a political rivalry with... Chaudhary Tanveer Khan, Chaudhary Changer Khan, Danishal Chaudhary, and Osama Tanveer" and that Ch Adnan often used say that "if any harm was done to him, these people would be responsible".

RDA issues notice to Bahria Town over 'violation' of LOP

RAWALPINDI: Rawalpindi Development Authority (RDA) has issued notice to Bahria Town for encroachments, plotting/encroachment and circulating low-clearance violation of approved layout plan (LOP) in Phase VIII of the town.

It also issued notices to the owners of two illegal housing schemes namely Zak City located in moosa Harroli, Gujjar Khan and Hoon Farm House located in moosa Adhwal Tehsil, Rawalpindi for starting development work and marketing without the approval from RDA.

According to a press release, RDA Director General Kinza Mariam said RDA has issued notice to the owner of Bahria Town Phase VIII and two illegal housing schemes. She said that the illegal housing schemes are encouraging general public to buy plots fraudulently and stealing their life earned deposits.

She said that it had been directed Director Metropolitan Planning and Traffic Engineering branch to take action against illegal advertisements and marketing and register FIRs against owners of illegal housing schemes.

Moreover, she said that the sponsors of illegal housing schemes have been warned to stop the marketing of their unapproved illegal housing scheme immediately and should contact RDA for getting NOC / approval of the scheme as per law, otherwise, strict legal action will be taken against them.

She said that the general public is requested in their interest to avoid making any kind of investment in illegal and unauthorized housing schemes.

She said that the public was also advised to check from RDA website www.rda.gov.pk before investing in housing schemes.

She said that the owners and sponsors of illegal housing schemes are misleading the public through advertisements. In this regard, the Planning Wing RDA has also requested the Cyber Crime Wing, FIA to take legal action against the illegal and misleading advertisements of illegal housing schemes to prevent the public from falling in their traps.

She said the above-mentioned offences committed by the owners of illegal housing schemes and also cognizable under rule 37 of Punjab Development Authorities Private Housing Schemes Rules, 2021. Legal action will be taken against them.

'Say no to plastic' drive launched

TANIL: The district administration of Attock observed Thursday as World Environment Day to mark the beginning of the 'Say no to plastic' campaign across the district.

The Punjab government has announced a ban on plastic bags across the province from June 5.

The walk started at Committee Chowk and concluded at Feroze Chowk. The participants were carrying placards inscribed with environment-friendly slogans, including "No to plastic bags", "Chaudhron ki hali", "Plastic bags are enemies of the environment and put the trash in dustbin". Pamphlets regarding government ban on sale and use of plastic bags were also distributed among traders, shopkeepers and the general public.

Later, additional deputy commissioner general Arsal Saeed briefed the media about the campaign regarding the ban on the use of plastic bags. He said Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz had approved the ban on the use of plastic bags from June 5. He called for the need to involve the youth to support the campaign, saying plastic bags, oxides and pollution were a matter of concern for all members of society.

Mr Saeed added that the district administration had implemented a zero-tolerance policy to ensure the ban on plastic shoppers and other items.

Responding to a question, he said that the alternative products for plastic-like cloth bags and other degradable plastic would be introduced in the city before persuading the citizens and the district administration was holding meetings with traders and other stakeholders in this regard.

Mechanisms urged to counter opponents of CPEC

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and China need to work closely to deter opponents' plan to sabotage China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) - a prime target of international actors who are against the development of both countries.

Under such a situation, Islamabad and Beijing should develop cooperation mechanisms at four levels - military, intelligence, police and narrative building.

This was stated by political economist and Asian Institute of International Research and Development (AIIRD) chief executive officer Shaukat Ahmed Ramay.

According to a statement, Mr Ramay said security had become a major issue in recent times, therefore, the military, security and intelligence agencies of both countries should devise joint operational mechanisms and implementation plans. "The military, security and intelligence coalition should focus on the international dimensions of threats and risks. It should jointly map the opponents, potential threats, actors of threats and fake friends and then based on this mapping launch joint operations to counter them," he said.

Mr Ramay said the opponents of CPEC had unleashed fifth-generation warfare on the main project and started targeting it in a very systematic and sophisticated way.

"First they resorted to a narrative warfare by dubbing CPEC a debt trap, another Nam Lush Company and an attempt to capture Pakistani resources," he added.

"When this propaganda failed, the CPEC opponents

launched hot warfare tactics by targeting Chinese nationals in Pakistan and attempted to create a wedge between both nations. It is part of a grand strategy to check China's powerful rise by creating a web of chaos in its surroundings, but Pakistan has proved to be a stumbling block in achieving the goal," he said, adding that every effort was therefore being made to demolish Pakistan, suggesting ways to counter the narrative propaganda, but said Pakistan and China should set up solid platforms and rely on facts and data to counter the fifth-generation warfare.

"This is extremely important because opponents and enemies are actively building fake narratives to damage CPEC and bilateral relations between both countries," he said. On the economic front, he said Pakistan's tax system was complex and companies found it difficult to run their businesses smoothly. Besides, registering a company and getting an electricity connection or construction permit was a tedious process, he added.

Against this backdrop, he said the decision of Pakistan's civil and military leadership to change the business environment positively and set up the Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC) was welcoming. However, in order to improve its efficiency, the council should be made a powerful body that decided on its own and served as a one-stop for all services.

Mr Ramay said to strengthen cooperation and exploit the full potential of CPEC, Pakistan should learn from the Chinese system of economy, people-centric governance and the balanced role of state-owned enterprises as well as the private sector.

Punjab Assembly standing committees to have suo motu powers

Punjabi, Seraiki among indigenous languages to be allowed in PA

LAHORE: In a landslide move, a special committee of the Punjab Assembly has passed amendments to the assembly's rules of business, empowering the standing committees to take suo motu actions in their respective areas.

The MFAs have been demanding the powers since the 14th house (2012-09) of the provincial assembly and successive governments have been dragging their feet after making only promises to the effect.

The Special Committee-II, headed by Speaker Malik Muhammad Ahmad Khan, held its maiden meeting on

Thursday and considered proposed amendments aimed at reforming the assembly's operational procedures and strengthening governance, specifically with regards to the Rules of Procedure of the Provincial Assembly of Punjab, 1997.

Taking inspiration from the National Assembly, the Senate as well as other legislatures around the world, the panel passed the amendments aimed at "enhancing the legislative process, making it efficient, transparent, and accountable".

A significant amendment is granting suo motu powers to the standing committees, allowing them to independently examine matters without needing prior approval from the speaker.

This change is intended to enhance the committees' effectiveness and responsiveness, making the legislature more democratic.

The committee also suggested including indigenous languages, like Punjabi, Seraiki, Potohari and Meewati, as the

languages of the house proceedings alongside Urdu and English. Earlier, a member had to seek special permission from the chair to speak in a language other than Urdu or English. The participants in the panel saw this move as a step towards decolonisation and to reflect and respect linguistic diversity of Punjab's population, promoting inclusivity within legislative discussions.

The body also proposed a code of conduct for the legislators designed to uphold ethical standards, integrity, and accountability among members, thereby enhancing the assembly's credibility.

It decided to designate the existing Business Advisory Committee as the 'Committee on Ethics' responsible for reviewing and ensuring implementation of the code, establishing its procedural rules, and undertaking additional functions as assigned by the speaker.

The committee also considered measures to ensure and encourage public

access to the assembly by accepting public petitions, either in hard or soft copy, on any issue and report to the house after collecting evidence as well as suggest remedial measures. The committees have also been allowed to make their proceedings public if they deemed fit.

Another major proposal under review was mandating that resolutions unanimously adopted by the house be binding on the cabinet. This ensures that such resolutions are implemented as part of the cabinet's collective responsibility, reinforcing the assembly's legislative authority.

Speaker Khan said that standing committees played a crucial role in the functioning of the parliamentary system of government, ensuring a system of checks and balances, and their establishment is a shared responsibility of all political parties.

The meeting commenced Advocate

Plea against amends to NAB law admitted for hearing

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court (LHC) on Thursday admitted for regular hearing a petition challenging fresh amendments made to the National Accountability (Amendment) Act, 2022 through an ordinance and issued notice to the federal government.

The petitioner's counsel, Ashar Siddique, argued that certain provisions of the NAB law had been amended through an ordinance without fulfilling the requisite criteria as there was no emergent situation for issuance of such an ordinance.

He said since the parliament was operational, the amendment to the law was just a way to pressure PTI founder Imran Khan. The lawyer said that issuance of the ordinance by the acting president spoke volumes about the fact that it was politically motivated. He asked the court to set aside

the impugned ordinance.

Deputy Attorney General Tahir Mahmood Khokhar argued that although the new amendments were not under challenge before the Supreme Court but the question relating to the period of removal of an accused arrested under the 1979 ordinance was directly subjudice before the apex court. He said any decision by the apex court would have a direct bearing upon the amendment to Section 24 of the amendments Act, 2022; therefore, the high court could not conduct parallel proceedings.

The law officer further argued that the powers of the acting president to issue an ordinance could not be questioned, especially when the president was out of the country.

Justice Shujaat Ali Khan observed that the contentions made by both sides needed consideration. The judge directed the respondents to submit replies after summer vacations on Sept 17.

Lesco starts hours-long loadshedding

LAHORE: In recent days, the Lahore Electric Supply Company (Lesco) has started observing hours-long power outages in various parts of Lahore and adjoining districts on the pretext of removing system constraints.

On the other hand, many localities have also been facing power disruptions due to sudden faults developing in the 11kV electricity feeders, Dawn has learnt.

"In the ongoing heat wave, we have been facing hours-long power shutdowns from morning to

noon, off and on. This is being done at least for the last two years. Upon contact, we are always told by Lesco that all is being done to remove system constraints or upgrade the system," says Ahmad, a resident of Johar Town while talking to Dawn. "Besides, sometimes, we are also witnessing power disruption due to tripping or overloading of the system," he adds, requesting the authorities concerned to take notice of the situation.

Speaking to Dawn, Ikram, a resident of Batapur, says the services related to power supply in their area are, perhaps, the worst in the entire Lahore,

as the residents have been facing loadshedding for almost five to eight hours daily.

"When we lodge complaints, the officials tell them on the loadshedding is being observed due to power theft in Batapur and other areas falling within service jurisdiction of high-loss feeders."

Ikram criticises the government for treating power thieves and bill payers equally and urged the Lesco officers to ensure uninterrupted electricity to all such citizens as are paying their bills regularly. "Is it sin for bill

LAHORE: Police allegedly tortured and 'arrested' a news channel anchor person for covering the protest of residents against the owner of a private housing society in Sander area here on Thursday.

Sources say that scores of residents of the Theme Park View housing scheme had gathered with the complaints, including land grabbing and suspension of electricity supply to them by the society management despite charging the fees.

The protesters alleged that three persons have been killed over land grabbing by the housing society management. The owner of the housing society is a retired policeman.

The sources say that a news channel

anchorperson, Mian Imran Arshad, reached the site along with his team, including cameramen, to cover the protest.

Eyewitnesses say that the police deployed on the spot suddenly used force against the protesters, thrashed many of them and took some of them into custody.

They say as the anchorperson started covering the protest for his TV programme, the police personnel attacked him and his team, subjecting them to torture.

Some journalists alleged that the police misused their authority on the orders of the circle ASPs Amir Khan and Kamal Mashaq to teach a lesson to the media persons for exposing the 'police brutality' against peaceful protesters.

Some video clips of the police torture

also surfaced on social media, showing armed policemen thrashing a boy on the rooftop of a building for recording the torture scenes with his mobile phone. The footage also showed the policemen marching like the boy's mobile phone and taking him into custody. Similarly, some other video clips showed the police beating the protesters with clubs.

The eyewitnesses say the police hauled the anchorperson into a van and took him to police station for further action.

The arrest of the working journalist sparked resentment among the media community which declared it a case of harassment of media persons.

Some journalists later reached the police station to extend support to Mian Imran and strongly condemned the

police action.

They regretted that incidents of violence against journalists continued to rise during the tenure of the PMEN government in Punjab.

Following the incident, Lahore Operations SSP Tawar Iqbal and other senior police officers reached the police station, where they held negotiations with senior journalists present there.

The SSP told Dawn the matter has been resolved and the police have returned the cameras and other belongings of the journalists seized during the action.

To a question, he said the incident was caused because of a 'misunderstanding' between the police and the journalists, admitting that the way police 'arrested' the anchorperson was 'not reasonable'.

Education CEO removed for sending incomplete data

TOBA TEK SINGH: The Punjab School Education secretary has directed Toba District Education Authority CEO Tahir Mansoor to immediately report to the provincial secretariat.

In his order, the secretary accused the CEO of furnishing incomplete information to the Punjab Assembly regarding a question about the data of department in Toba district. He has been placed at the disposal of the provincial office.

Sources said local PMU-N MPA Arif Ali Javed had sent a question to the education minister about the missing facilities in the educational institutions of the district. The MPA later complained that incomplete and wrong data had been sent by the CEO.

SALES TAX: Imposition of sales tax on poultry feed will deprive public of the cheap source of protein, says FCCI acting president Dr. Sagat Arshad in a statement on Thursday.

He urged the government to avoid sales tax on food and food related items in the federal budget. He said apparently the government was trying to collect maximum revenue by taxing even essential food items.

Man attempts suicide after killing his wife

LAHORE: A man allegedly jumped from the rooftop of his house to commit suicide after killing his wife over a petty domestic issue in Ghaziabad area here on Thursday.

A police official said the suspect, Zohail, and his wife Komal were not enjoying good relations due to petty family issues, and financial crunch they were facing.

He said Zohail was said to be an addict and used to sell household items to buy drugs.

On Thursday, the couple exchanged hot words leading to a brawl. In a fit of anger, Zohail attacked his wife with a knife and allegedly killed her on the spot and later jumped from the rooftop of his house.

He was rushed to hospital with multiple injuries, including bone fractures.

The police shifted the body of the woman to the city morgue and lodged a case against the suspected killer.

Three killed, six injured by rivals in an ambush

MIANWALI: Unidentified armed suspects on Thursday morning ambushed a van near Kaloor Sherif on Mianwali-Banna Road, killing three people on the spot and injuring six others, including two women.

Reports said the Mianwali-bound van was carrying Kaloor Sherif village when the assailants opened indiscriminate fire, killing three men and injuring six passengers. Flacque 1122 shifted the deceased and the injured to the nearby THQ Hospital.

The local police reached the spot and a team, led by Mianwali DPO Mousalish Khan, started an investigation.

According to a police press release, the incident resulted from an old enmity between the Naik Khail and Kalo tribes of Mandakhal.

Police sources said personnel raided the houses of the alleged culprits, arresting six armed men and conducting further raids on the hideouts of the remaining suspects.

ICSP Dr Usman Anwar has directed the Sargodha Range HPO and the Mianwali DPO to submit a report and ensure the arrest of all suspects. — Correspondent

PTI's Aliya Hamza arrested again

SARGODHA: Gujranwala police arrested PTI ex-MNA Aliya Hamza when she came out of the Sargodha jail after getting bail in three cases registered by Mianwali police.

She had been confined to Sargodha jail since April 2, 2024, as she was framed in four cases registered with Kenar Musharraf Police Station in connection with May 9 violence by PTI workers.

Aliya was not nominated at the time of registration of the FIR.

Meanwhile, PTI activist Sanam Javed was produced before an ATC in Gujranwala on Thursday in a May 9 case. The court granted her four-day physical remand to police which had sought 30-day remand.

Court reserves judgement on plea against postponement of Senate polls in KP

Petitioner Azam Swati wants decision of ECP declared illegal

PESHAWAR: Peshawar High Court on Thursday reserved its judgement over a petition challenging the decision of Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to link Senate polls in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa to oath of opposition members elected on reserved seats for women and non-Muslims.

A bench consisting of Justice Syed Muhammad Atiqul Haq and Justice Shaukat Ahmad heard arguments advanced by lawyers appearing for petitioner Azam Khan Swati and ECP.

Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf leader and former senator Azam Swati had challenged the ECP's March 28 orders about the possible postponement of Senate polls in the province. He had requested the court to order ECP to hold Senate polls in the province on April 2 as scheduled.

The petition was filed on March 30 before the ECP's April 2 order for postponement of Senate polls to the extent of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa until the administration of oath to MPAs elected on reserved seats.

On March 28, ECP, in response to the applications of opposition's five women MPAs-elect, declared that if the speaker of the provincial assembly failed to comply with the high court's orders to administer oath to the lawmakers elected on reserved seats, it would postpone Senate elections in the province until the swearing-in of the applicants. ECP put up the polls afterwards.

Petitioner's counsel Ali Zaman argued that Senate polls were conducted across the country, but ECP postponed the same in KP in light of the high court's orders for the provincial assembly speaker to administer oath to the members elected on reserved seats. He said that the order of ECP was illegal and unconstitutional.

He said that ECP didn't have the power to postpone Senate elections in the province when they were held in other parts of the country. He stated that the petitioner was a contesting candidate, but he was neither heard by ECP

nor was he issued any notice for it.

The counsel said that during previous hearing the court had asked ECP to submit schedule of the polls to the court.

Lawyer for ECP, Mohsin Kamran Siddiqui said that the court had not asked for the schedule rather it had sought a report from the commission. He stated that he had submitted a report on behalf of ECP to the court.

When the bench inquired from him about latest situation in the matter, he said that Supreme Court of Pakistan had adjourned to June 24 hearing of the cases related to non-allocation of reserved seats to Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC) against the ECP's March 1 order to deny that party seats reserved for women and non-Muslims. He said that the court had issued a stay order in that case.

He stated that the apex court had ordered that it would conduct day-to-day hearing in those cases. He said that one of the cases pending before SC was about the PNC's decision to dismiss the plea of SIC against the ECP's March 1 order to deny that party seats reserved for women and non-Muslims. He said that the court had issued a stay order in that case.

The other case, he said, pertained to PNC's orders for KP Assembly speaker to administer oath to those opposition members and to allow and facilitate

their voting in Senate elections. He stated that in case the apex court decided to allot these seats to SIC, it would benefit the party in the polls.

Justice Shaukat inquired from petitioner's counsel as to why oath was not administered to those members on the order of high court. The counsel replied that the assembly was not in session, therefore, oath couldn't be administered to them.

When the bench again inquired as to why its order was not implemented, the counsel said that the petitioner was a contesting candidate in Senate polls and provincial government could give a reply to it.

The bench wondered that if Senate polls were conducted and the apex court upheld the judgement of the high court about administering oath to the members, then what would happen.

The petitioner's counsel stated that on the same analogy what would be the status of polls conducted if the apex court decided the matter in favour of SIC. He wondered whether results of polls in other provinces would be reversed then.

Advocate Syed Hameed Shah appeared for Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz and opposed the petition.

Displaced Kukikhels start returning to Tirah valley

KHAYBER: The displaced families of Kukikhel tribe started returning to their homes in Tirah valley after repeated protests and demonstrations.

Some 50 families left Jammud tale on Wednesday while another batch of similar number of families belonging to Maniyakhel sub-tribe of Kukikhel started their return journey to Pak Dams on Thursday.

A Kukikhel elder, Malik Nasser Ahmad, told Dawn that though the returning families were not provided with sufficient assistance except for a tent, a mattress and some kitchen items, the returning families arranged transport for their return journey from their own limited resources.

He accused the government departments concerned of ignoring their repeated requests and appeals for a comprehensive package on the pattern of the rest of IDPs from other tribal districts in recent past.

He said most of the homes in the Kukikhel areas of Tirah valley were unsuitable for living as these houses were either damaged in military operations or had collapsed during snowy and rainy season during a decade of displacement of the local tribesmen.

Members of some of the returning families said that it was very difficult for them to accommodate one whole family in just one tent while none of them were provided food, which was essential for their survival for at least three months.

The remaining Kukikhel families' exact number could not be ascertained as they had not registered themselves with the erstwhile Fata Disaster Management Authority back in 2012 when they left their homes.

Two friends shot dead by rivals in Swabi

SWABI: Two friends were shot dead in Kala village while separately an senior citizen drowned in Gohat canal here on Thursday.

Mohammad Ibrahim, brother of one of the deceased Mohammad Asim, told police that he was at home when he got the information that his brother and a relative, Ishfaq Ali, were killed by unknown persons in Kala mountainous area.

He claimed that both were shot dead by Muzamil Khan and his two other unidentified accomplices. He said before the incident, they were invited to the spot on mobile phone where they were killed under a well-planned strategy.

The cause of the incident was stated to be a one-and-a-half-month old feud in which Mohammad Asim was injured in firing by Muzamil Khan. Mohammad Ibrahim claimed that Muzamil took the extreme step as he was expecting a revenge attack from Asim.

Police have registered an FIR and started investigation.

Meanwhile, Gul Mohammad, 80, drowned in Gohat canal on Thursday when he was bathing on its bank but slipped into deep water. Rescue 1122 officials said, Saqib Shah, a rescue official, told Dawn that soon after receiving information they reached the canal, recovered the body and handed it over to the family.

Also in the day, dead bodies of two youngsters, who had drowned in the Indus River four days back, were recovered in Hurd area by local divers on Thursday.

The bodies of two youngsters, Zameer Ahmad, 17, and Mohammad Tayyab, 16, were handed over to their families for burial. They were hailing from Garimana village. — Correspondents

SCCI chief wants 'Tajir Dost scheme' enforced for 20 years

PESHAWAR: Sarfraz Chaudhry, President of Peshawar Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PCCI) on Thursday called for the approval of the Federal Board of Revenue's Tajir Dost tax scheme by parliament for the next 20 years.

He also said the government should promise not to impose new taxes on businessmen after the implementation of the scheme.

"There is a need for promoting close liaison and coordination between chambers, the business community, and tax

authorities to take joint measures for amicable resolution of the traders' issues," Mr Ishaq said businessmen during the visit of Peshawar Regional Tax Office chief commissioner Zafar Iqbal to the SCCI premises here.

Mr Iqbal was accompanied by chief coordinator for Tajir Dost Scheme Nazam Mir, RTO Peshawar commissioner Dr Syed Farooq Jamil, and additional commissioner Aisha Dilshad.

The meeting was also attended by SCCI vice president Ejaz Khan Afridi, former presi-

dent Haji Muhammad Afzal, Zahidullah Shirsani and Sherbaz Bilour, former senior vice-presidents. Ziaul Haq Sarfraz and Imran Khan Mohammad, executive members Javed Akhtar, Hassan Ibrahim Bani, Muhammad Imad Rafi, Rashid Amin, Nadeem Rauf, Nadeem Gul, Ishfaq Mohammad, Rukhsar Zaman, Amir Shaukat, Malik Khalid Farooq, Hussainullah, and Adnan Ahmad, traders, importers, and exporters.

The RTO chief commissioner and other officials briefed participants about the salient features, importance, and benefits of the Tajir Dost Scheme and said the initiative was meant to broaden the taxnet.

The SCCI president said reforms were required to simplify the taxation system and bring the tax rate to a single digit.

He also said traders should be facilitated under a one-window operation.

Mr Ishaq said Pakistan annual-

ly paid Rs6 trillion on arrears of debt servicing for internal and external loans, while the same amount was generated through various taxes, which was insufficient for the country's progress.

He called for the broadening of the tax base without imposing new taxes on taxpayers.

The SCCI chief said the business community wanted to see Pakistan join the ranks of developed nations, but for that purpose, authorities should adopt policies that were favourable and friendly to business, trade, and industry. — Bureau Report

MTRA starts registration of people for organ donation

Speakers say lack of awareness hampers treatment of patients requiring human organs

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Medical Transplantation Authority on Thursday launched registration of people wanting to donate their organs to save lives of others amid calls by experts that lack of awareness has been hampering treatment of patients requiring human organs.

Speaking at a ceremony held here to mark World Transplant Day at Khyber Girls Medical College, he said that they launched a portal where the people could donate their organs that could be used for saving the lives of needy patients.

"Lack of donation culture has led to buying of organs from people. It is illegal and entails complications. Donation of organs as per law is a

source of healthiness for both donors and recipients," he said.

Prof Malik, a former transplant surgeon at Institute of Kidney Diseases (IKD), said that they had authorized 11 hospitals for organ transplant including renal and eye where people could undergo procedures in the safest manner by professional surgeons.

"Recently, we organised 'transplant games' wherein about 100 patients, who had recovered after transplants, took part and enjoyed," he added.

Dr Atiqur Rehman, also a former transplant surgeon at IKD, said they were starting 'deceased donors scheme' to retrieve kidneys of the people with dead brain and transplant the same to patients with dam-

aged urinary organs. "Similarly, we are also considering launching post-mortem in which families can exchange kidneys to match recipients to resolve the issue of matchability of both," he added.

Prof Sanaullah Jan, the director of Pakistan Institute of Community Ophthalmology (PICO) at Hayatabad Medical Complex, painted a grim picture of organ donations in the country and said that they had to wait for donations from the USA and other countries to carry out corneal transplants.

"There are 1,200 patients awaiting their transplants at PICO only and we urge people to start donating corneas so as to help restore the eyesight of the people blinded by cataracts, glaucoma and other incidents.

We are way behind from Nepal, Iran, Sri Lanka and India where people are in the habit of organ donation," he said.

Prof Qasim Anwar, the former chairman of Council of Islamic Ideology, said that they had forwarded recommendations to government after in-depth research that organ donation was allowed in Islam. "We need to establish an endowment fund to strengthen transplantation in the province," he added.

Khyber Medical University Vice-chancellor Prof Ziaul Haq, KPMC Dean Prof Zahid Aman, HMC Prof medical director Shaukat Akbar Khan, deputy director of FIA Saeedullah Khan and others also spoke on the occasion.

Skits were also displayed by stu-

dents to send a message that donation was legal and people must donate organs.

Health Minister Syed Qasim Ali Shah said that doctors in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were capable to carry out transplants and other latest procedures in the field of medical sciences. He stressed the need for preventive measures to put brakes on diabetes and other ailments.

He said that government was providing free health services to people on Sehat Card Plus as per vision of PTI founder Imran Khan. He claimed it was not possible even in developed countries where people paid premiums to get health insurance. "In Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, all people get cashless treatment services," he added.
