The contender



FIRST THINGS FIRST

NEWBIE **JANKI BODIWALA**, WHO MADE HER PRESENCE FELT WITH SHAITAAN, TALKS ABOUT HER BOLLYWOOD SOJOURN WITH **TANZIM PARDIWALLA**

reat storytelling and performances have always existed in regional cinema, beyond the mainstream. These stories often inspire adaptations and remakes. It's rare to see a key cast member being retained in the remake. This happened for Janki Bodiwala, who got her first break in Krishnadev Yagnik's Gujarati-language film Chhello Divas. She then went on to appear in Yagnik's supernatural thriller film Vash. Little did she know that she would also bag a role in its Hindi-language remake. Shaitaan, starring big names like Ajay Devgn, Jyothika, and R Madhavan, became her Bollywood debut. But it took a while for the bubbly actress to wrap her head around

the fact that she would be reprsing her role. "They approached me and I later found out that Ajay Devgn was playing the father, Jyothika was my mother and R Madhavan was the villain." Describing her initial reaction, the actress laughs, "I was completely numb. I couldn't say anything because I think I didn't even believe them. But I was jumping with joy inside."

f you thought

Shaitaan was eerie,
you're not prepared
for Vash, which
according to Janki
was a darker film that
took a while to find its
audience. "When Vash
was released, it was a

very experimental film because it had a very dark concept. The Gujarati audience is more attracted to comedies. So Vash was a risk. The film gained attention slowly through word of mouth. People started telling each other that there was an unexpected Gujarati film in theatres."

Janki was studying dentistry before she caught the acting bug. It was during a break that she heard about auditions for *Chhello Divas*. She says, "My father knew some people and he encouraged me to try out for a role. I did it and they simply said we can go ahead with this girl. It was a shocker for me." Looking back

fondly on her debut film, where she was learning on the job, she says, "I was extremely blessed that the cast and crew of my first film were the sweetest, nicest people. They were all trained actors. It was the director's first film. The crew was working with me for the very first time but they didn't make me feel like an outsider for not having a theatre background."

Working on Shaitaan didn't just prove to be a masterclass in acting, it was also a lesson on stardom and humility. "Ajay is a kind person. He's so sweet and caring. I still remember we were shooting in London and it was very cold. He had a heater around his area on the set. The actor who plays my younger brother and I had just stepped out. He saw that there were no heaters around us. And he immediately called someone and asked them to put heaters around us to keep us warm. That's something he doesn't need to do because that isn't his job. But he did it and I saw



how caring he is for his co-stars, no matter how junior."

Watching Ajay, Jyothika and Madhavan perform left her in awe. "They didn't just know their own lines, they also knew their co-stars' lines. They were all so prepared, not just with the lines but also with the emotions. They really saw the film's broader vision. Just watching them, I learnt that you really need to do your homework before you come on set. Of course, the director will guide you, but you do your bit. Even after doing so many films, if they can do their homework then you also have to be on your toes when you're working with them," she reveals.

Shaitaan was also her first brush with fame and what it means to be recognised as an actor with Mumbai's paparazzi culture. "I attended the trailer launch of Shaitaan. That was the first time I saw the paparazzi. It was wild. The Q&A that happened there was the first promotional thing I did for the film. It felt very nice. At the screening as well, it was fun with people talking to you and coming up to you."

With conviction in her voice, Janki reveals that she isn't too caught up in the glitz and glamour of Bollywood. "I would love to work across many genres. In fact, after Shaitaan, I did another Gujarati film that's going to be out soon. It doesn't matter if it's Gujarati, Hindi or any other language. I just want to do a good film," she concludes.



her journey to resonate
with everyone. I believe
every girl has a Phool
inside her. We often doubt
our potential, but like
Phool, we can achieve
anything we set our

Meeting Aamir Khan was a dream come true for Nitanshi. "It was such a fan moment. Aamir sir is amazing in every way - his conversation, his performance, his respect for everyone. He took care of me and the team beautifully. He told me, 'Always choose films that touch your heart and

Transforming into Phool required dedication. "I tanned my skin for three months to achieve Phool's authentic look. Kiran ma'am and I worked tirelessly on dialogues and did numerous workshops. Sometimes, I doubted myself, but Kiran ma'am always believed in me. Seeing her smile after a good shot made everything worthwhile."

Nitanshi has her eyes set on future collaborations. "I adore Kangana Ranaut's films like *Queen* and *Manikarnika* and dream of working with Shah Rukh Khan, Kartik Aryan, and Madhuri Dixit. I'm a big fan of period films and hope to work with directors like Sanjay Leela Bhansali and Imtiaz Ali. Experimenting with different genres excites


me." Beyond acting, Nitanshi is passionate about dancing and singing. "I love to perform and spread love. That's what I've learned and what I strive to do." 


ACE MAKEUP ARTIST **ADRIAN JACOBS** SURE KNOWS HOW TO UP THE GLAM QUOTIENT, FINDS **TANISHA BHATTACHARYA**



Adrian Jacobs is a renowned makeup artist whose exceptional talent has made him a sought-after name in the Indian film industry. With nearly a decade of experience working with top actresses like Kriti Sanon, Aishwarya Rai Bachchan, Sara Ali Khan, and Tamannaah Bhatia, Adrian's artistry extends beyond films to include advertisements and high-profile events. Known for his ability to enhance natural features and his versatility in adapting to different personalities and styles, Adrian's work reflects his deep understanding of beauty and his commitment to his craft. From the demanding sets of Baahubali to the glamour of editorial shoots, Adrian continues to inspire with his innovative techniques and passion for makeup artistry.











You've been Kriti Sanon's go-to makeup artist - how did the journey begin?

I met Kriti at a time when I had just come back from filming Baahubali and had been busy for a long time. I remember I got a call to fill in for someone for Kriti, and that's when we got offered Bareilly Ki Barfi. We didn't know each other at all, and one thing led to another. We were very quiet during the first half of the film's schedule. It was on the 15th or 16th day that we broke the ice, and the rest is history. We've just connected and become best friends. Even

after the film, we continued working together. Then we started doing work on other formats, be it advertisements or events. It's been almost a decade of us working together now.

There are a lot of peachy

a favourite. You're right about that. Her face always has a pink tone with less foundation. I use a half pump, half squeeze of foundation on a day-to-day basis, and that's been our thing for the longest time now.

Tell us a little about what you've learnt about how to play with different glam looks based on the personality of the star you're working with.

I've learned that if you're a makeup

artist in the Indian film industry, you cater to different personalities, moods, and faces and you can't be restricted. There are many people with many opinions around you. When you're working your magic on a star, you need to have your focus right. Once you're good at something, you slowly start building that up with your artist and creating a vibe between the two of you. That's

happened to me
with Aishwarya
Rai Bachchan, Kriti
Sanon, Sara Ali
Khan, Parineeti
Chopra back in
the day, and Amy
Jackson. The artist
has to believe in you.

To have worked with Aishwarya Rai Bachchan, who's called the most beautiful woman in the world, what was the experience of Fanney Khan like?

Aishwarya Rai
truly is the most
beautiful woman in
the world. Fanney
Khan came to me at
a tender time, but I
had already worked
with her before. I've
been with her for
10-12 years now. She
gives a lot of comfort
when she likes you

and believes in your craft. She's open to listening, and that gives you a lot of confidence.

What's your process like to curate a beauty look for the celebrity you're working with?

My idea of my work is to enhance the features that the person already has. I want to know the mood of the day, what we are shooting, and the story behind it. I take inputs from editors, directors, technicians, cameramen, and all the artists. Every artist comes with a different mood, mind space, and ideology of makeup. I do very different work between Aishwarya, Kriti, and Sara. I've done Baahubali with Tamannaah. They are so different from each other. That's how I work in general, comforting them with my craft but also understanding their requirements.

We do take a big part of the character into promotions because we're trying to sell the film itself. For example, in Panipat, Kriti is an Indian historical character. So obviously her promotional looks were very traditional. While you won't go too modern, you will be true to the character. But having said that, it's always a change because there's always a designer on set who's very different. It's a different person,


and when you're promoting, there is a different stylist. There has to be a balance between all the ideas.

Take us back to the Baahubali journey - a fictional historical saga. How's the research and prep for something so big and different from commercial cinema? Baahubali has been one of the most fulfilling but tiring experiences. SS Rajamouli is sharp, particular, and very kind. He challenges and intimidates you

because he's trying to get the best out of you. But he's also trying to get the best out of what is good for the film and the character. He gets so deep into the character that he wants you to do the same. We shot in all kinds of weather, and we were shooting for 16 hours in a day for the main song. Tamannaah's face was eventually looking oily, and there was nothing you could do; they were tricky times. Tamannaah

is extremely fair, and he was clear about making her look like a certain tribe. She lives in the forest, and that was difficult for me because she's so fair that eventually, after every 30 minutes, the dark tone would turn fair again. Her natural colour would take over because of the heat, the rain, or just sweat. It was difficult but very fulfilling.

Are there any films or genres that inspired you to get more experimental with your makeup game? I'm not someone who gets easily inspired. Maybe one person, rather than a film,

Mickey Contractor, is someone who set the bar. I feel inspired by his work because nobody does clean makeup better than him. His work in Cocktail with Deepika is unparalleled. I usually don't like looking at someone else's work and replicating it. I may just look at it, but I always have a mindset of my own and want to create my own.

Do celebs like Sara Ali Khan or Kriti offer suggestions for the kind of makeup looks you're planning for them? They want to know what's going on before we start.

We'll have a little chat for 10-15 minutes before we begin the makeup. When Kriti's hair is getting done, and there is a different colour palette for that day, she will discuss what's going on. Kriti is never overbearing. She makes you believe that you're great, but she'll give inputs and be particular at the same time. I get along well with Sara's mother. So there are times when we'll click a picture, and if I think it's good work, I'll send it to Sara's mum. I get a lot of satisfaction from talking to her mum and her approval

more than Sara's. Sometimes Sara can get edgy, and we do mad work together.

Which format do you enjoy the most - films, editorial, or promotions?

All three are so different. Promotions are super hectic; you don't even know which city you're in. There are so many looks, sometimes three in a day. There's so much happening on the day the film releases because it's from two weeks ago. Actors are so stressed about how the film is going to do. They want to look good because that's the only time they're

getting away from the film character. I love films because you set your place in the beginning, and then you're set for 40-50 days. Outdoors excite me because I'm meeting so many people. Editorial for me is about coming on board to create something that you don't even think exists. And for me, it is particularly because it takes the other side, which is very deeply rooted. Here's your opportunity to get away from beauty and go all out and do things that are different. I love soft makeup. Editorial is all about being experimental.





HOW DID A BOY FROM GWALIOR SHIMMY INTO THE HEARTS OF SHOWBIZ? WITHOUT GODFATHERS AND CONNECTIONS, JUST HOW DID HE PROVE THAT HE HAD WHAT IT TAKES? OF COURSE, HE RUFFLED LOADS OF FEATHERS IN SHOWBIZ, BUT THIS BIOTECH ENGINEERING GRADUATE SLALOMED TO THE TOP OF HIS GAME. WHAT MAKES KARTIK ARYAN TICK, YOU MAY ASK? Is it the X factor, his ability to romance women on screen, or just his sheer charm? He's got it made. From his monologue in the misogynistic Pyaar Ka Punchnama to his easy-breezy act in Bhool Bhulaiyaa, Aaryan has struck a chord. Is it his small-town believability in films like Satyaprem ki Katha and Luka Chuppi or his roving eye act in Pati Patni Aur Woh? Aaryan is your Everyman, and that makes identification easy. He's not overwhelming you with ideology; he's not consumed by being a fashion icon. He plays it straight. A certain believability in his performances has hit pay dirt. He's the quintessential nice guy, everyone will tell you. The characters speak for themselves. It's this Everyman quality that he channels in his latest outing, Chandu Champion, portraying Murlikant Petkar, India's first Paralympic Gold medalist. You watch frames of the reel, and he's morphed into the skin of Petkar as Chandu Champion. All of which adds up to the right time to meet him for a chat fest. Juhu, on a sultry summer mid-morning has an array of sounds-from cars zigzagging through the bylanes to contractors hard at work, birds twittering while busy bees dig up and repair roads. Here's a transcript of a conversation with the man of the moment, Kartik Aaryan.





WHAT HAVE YOU GIVEN TO CHANDU CHAMPION AND WHAT HAS THE FILM GIVEN TO YOU?

Chandu Champion has given me a lot. When Kabir (Khan) sir first approached me, neither of us knew it would lead to this role. But when he narrated the story of Murlikant Petkar, I was captivated. It felt unique and important. So, despite not knowing the challenges ahead, I eagerly agreed to be part of it, knowing it would be fulfilling.

THE FILM IS INSPIRED BY MURLIKANT PETKAR; HOW DID HIS STORY IMPACT YOU?

Playing such a character instils a belief in invincibility, where

willpower and hard work are paramount. Like Petkar, the determination to achieve becomes paramount. I mirrored Brad Pitt's physique from Fight Club as my goal, embodying the power of manifestation. The journey took dedication, but when I matched the envisioned physique, the fulfilment was unmatched. It's about cultivating a 'Champion's Mentality', feeling like a superhero in every endeavour. The relentless pursuit of excellence became my mantra, earning me the nickname 'machine' from my team as I dedicatedly pursued swimming,

gymming, boxing, and a predictable soup for dinner every night.

WHAT WAS THE ADVICE THAT MURLIKANT PETKAR GAVE YOU WHEN YOU SPOKE TO HIM?

When I met him, he was full of energy. He always used to come wearing a blazer, which had all his medals on it. I met his children and his grandchildren as well. I remember we had met right after I completed my swimming session, and he was really, really happy about how his story was being moulded by Kabir sr. He told me that I was doing a specific swimming stroke exactly like him. That was

journey, this is the toughest role of my career, and I don't think I am ever going to do a role tougher than this. It was about mental strength more than physical strength.

CAN YOU RECALL AN INCIDENT WHERE YOUR MENTAL STRENGTH WAS TESTED?

Our aim was to reach
12 per cent body fat; when
I checked it for the first
time, it was 41 per cent,
which is obese. It was
mind over matter from
that day onwards.

DON'T YOU FEEL HUNGRY ON A DIET?

The thing is we are all so used to having junk that it becomes normal for us. To



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the biggest thing for me and it stayed with me. Because we did not have any video of him. He's a happy man.

WHAT ARE THE THREE LESSONS YOU HAVE LEARNED FROM CHANDU CHAMPION, AND WHAT HAS IT GIVEN YOU?

This film has given me
a new life. I no longer
feel dependent on the
box office, reviews, or
validation. It made me
disconnect from the
industry and its ways. It
made me stronger mentally
and made me a more
positive person. It just
generated a lot of warm
and positive energy in me.
Lastly, it taught me to be
fearless. Because it has
been such an inspirational

have biscuits, snacks, and other unhealthy things. At one point, I used to have five rotis, and now I can't even have two. I feel full on days I have two. It's all about replacing unhealthy options with healthier ones and training your body. Now I can't even imagine overfeeding myself; it just makes me very uncomfortable. This way your stomach will also feel better, you'll feel lighter.

DID KABIR KHAN'S FITNESS RUB OFF ON YOU?

He is genuinely so fit and kind of an inspiration as well. He's the right person to be around for this kind of film. The way he follows his diet, the way he goes to

the gym, rigorously works out, and doesn't even take a day off—no matter how busy he is, wherever he is shooting or how tired he is-I have seen that myself, and that's the reason I got inspired by him. Apart from that, when we met two years back, I realised that I had never been offered a film in which I had to be bare-chested for the most part of it. Kabir sir made sure that the best teams would come to train me. My swimming coach, Virdhawal Khade, is an Olympian. My boxing trainer was Tridev Pandey. For the first time ever, I was exposed to physiotherapy. I come from a family of doctors, but I never went to a physiotherapist before I met Vaibhav. Amidst all this, I was thinking in my head, 'I'll make the body anyway, what's the big fuss around it.' But, that's when I realised I had gained a lot of fat for Freddy.

HOW DID YOU MANAGE TO PUT ON SO MUCH WEIGHT?

Simply by indulging in eating. I allowed myself to eat whatever I desired, particularly sweets, as I have a strong inclination towards them. Incorporating something sweet after meals became a habitual ritual for me, making it challenging to break. Consequently, I experienced withdrawal symptoms when I made the decision to cut out sugar completely, recognizing it as my adversary. This meant bidding farewell to a variety of treats like chocolates, ras malai, and cold coffee, which are commonly enjoyed by many. Initially, it

was tough, and I even succumbed to temptations and cheated on my diet. However, after about 15 days, I gradually began to appreciate the absence of sugar in my diet. I realised that I didn't need a sweet fix after every meal and that consuming sugar was detrimental to my health and well-being. This realisation wasn't just for the sake of a film role; it became a personal conviction that indulging in sugar was detrimental to my own body. Over time, my mindset shifted, and I abstained from sugar entirely for a year and a half. There was

from grated cauliflower. It wasn't rice, but it provided fibre and eliminated carbs. making meals like tofu and Cauli Rice conducive to weight management. I embraced a diet rich in salads, beans, lentils, and paneer. Adhering to a routine where I prioritised eight hours of sleep became paramount. Cutting out sugar not only aided in weight management but also improved my quality of sleep. Although daunting at first, I gradually found enjoyment in this lifestyle shift. Initially, I fretted over how to adjust my sleep schedule and bid

BESIDES THE DIETARY ADJUSTMENTS, HOW CHALLENGING WAS THE PHYSICAL TRAINING?

Swimming and boxing really pushed me. Despite being an amateur swimmer, my skills were limited to casual splashing around in the pool; I had no professional technique. However, Kabir sir ensured we had top-notch professionals alongside for scenes; for swimming sequences, we had Olympic swimmers. He emphasised, 'You need to be the best swimmer on screen,' so I trained with that goal in mind. Likewise, for boxing scenes, the boxers were

a memorable moment captured on film when, after completing the movie, Kabir Khan offered me Ras Malai, marking the first time in over a year and a half that I had consumed sugar. However, even then, I found myself disliking the experience, indicating that my mindset had indeed transformed significantly.

DID YOU TAKE THE HELP OF EXPERTS TO BREAK THE HABIT?


Yes, the nutrition experts stepped in, guiding me on what foods to incorporate and what to steer clear of entirely. I switched to having soup for dinner and replaced rice with Cauli Rice for lunch—a concoction made simply

farewell to sugar, as well as how to achieve my desired physique without resorting to unnatural means like steroids. I firmly believed in avoiding such substances due to their detrimental effects, and my team shared the same stance. Despite the considerable effort required, we remained committed to the natural path, understanding that achieving our goals would demand both time and unwavering patience.

WAS IT MORE DIFFICULT BECAUSE YOU'RE A VEGETARIAN?

Yes, it was, because there were fewer options. I went towards spinach and paneer for protein.

all seasoned pros, with one even fresh from the World Championship. Seeing him in action on screen made me realise I had to match up in just two weeks. This spurred me to refine my skills diligently. Swimming in a film was something I never imagined; I used to fear it immensely and doubted my abilities for a long time. The structured regimen was crucial; I'd wake up at 6:00 am, hit the gym by 7:00 am, return within an hour for my first meal, then head to boxing class. I halted all other projects for a year and a half, a stark contrast to my usual pace of juggling multiple films a year.



WERE YOU FEELING ANNOYED OR ANGERED DURING THAT PERIOD?

Actually, it was quite the opposite. It felt more like a form of meditation to me. Despite many people suggesting that sticking to a strict diet might provoke a different reaction in me, it actually felt meditative. While there were moments of withdrawal where I craved certain foods but couldn't indulge, those passed relatively quickly. My focus was solely on my physical regimen, diving into boxing and swimming lessons. I remember vividly my first swimming class, where Vir bluntly told me I was terrible, leading me to question if my trainers disliked me. Their directness left no room for doubt. At times, I even questioned my ability to portray the role effectively. Ultimately, it all came down to getting into the zone, taking each step methodically. For instance, we had to film at an Olympic Aquatic stadium, with only a onemonth window available in three years. I found myself surrounded by Olympians and seasoned swimmers. While we initially studied footage of athletes like Michael Phelps and Muhammad Ali, Kabir sir insisted I focus solely on mastering the required skills. It became clear he aimed for me to embody the essence of an athlete. In some scenes, I felt completely immersed in the character of Murlikant. reminiscent of my days in school or university, where I absorbed knowledge from every available source.

DEDICATING SO MUCH TO A FILM?

Perhaps due to my background in sports, integrating a diet into my regimen transformed me into the athlete I was striving to be. It was largely a test of mental fortitude. offering valuable insights into life and relationships. I reduced my phone usage, limited social engagements to only essential ones, and prioritised rest, often feeling ready for bed by 10:00 pm. Night shoots became increasingly difficult to endure. prompting questions about their necessity. Every moment became precious when adhering to such a structured routine, with specific time slots allocated for workouts and sleep. Despite the challenges, I experienced a newfound

sense of health and positivity. I felt better than ever before, to the extent that I would have embraced even an adversary if they had crossed my path during that time. This process granted me valuable personal time, a reprieve from the relentless work schedule, allowing me to reconnect with myself.

HAVE YOU EVER ATTENDED THERAPY?

No, I haven't. I've never felt the need for such sessions. It's commonly said to be beneficial for many issues, but perhaps I've been fortunate due to the support of my family and friends.

WHAT'S YOUR PERSPECTIVE ON SOCIAL MEDIA?


Why do contemporary

actors obsess over every piece written about them? It detracts from our purpose. In the past, media, including social media, was more limited. Nowadays, it's pervasive. Personally, I approach social media as part of my work, although it doesn't significantly impact my life. Yet, I do believe it can compromise authenticity.

HOW DOES HAVING AN ACTING CAREER INTERSECT WITH SOCIAL MEDIA?

I don't believe they're inherently linked.
However, it's hard to imagine anyone completely disconnected from social media today. It's an unparalleled tool for staying informed.

COMMENTARY SERIOUSLY?

At times, yes. Other times, no. Nonetheless, as a human, I'm affected by both praise and criticism. There are days when I feel disappointed despite my best efforts if my work isn't acknowledged.

SOME ACTORS AVOID SOCIAL MEDIA ALTOGETHER.

Many who claim to abstain from social media often maintain private accounts. Rejecting publicity can sometimes be a form of publicity itself. It's an integral aspect of our profession.

DO YOU HAVE FRIENDS WITHIN THE INDUSTRY OR OUTSIDE OF IT?

Outside of the industry. They often give me more than just a reality check.

HOW DO YOU HANDLE CRITICISM?

I don't like being ignored.

I thrive on attention,
positive or negative.

Complete silence from the
public would affect me
more deeply.

ARE YOU CONTINUALLY IN SEARCH OF APPROVAL?

Not anymore. Initially, I sought validation for everything, but after spending several years in the industry, I've reached a point where I no longer feel the need for it. I've stopped taking validation so seriously. Now, I only value the validation of the audience. I've mentioned this before, but it's genuinely how I feel. Over the years, I've received a lot of love from the audience, and having them by my side makes me feel empowered.

DO YOU WORRY ABOUT BEING JUDGED?

Yes, if you put it that way,

I do feel concerned about being judged unfairly. However, I've stopped striving to please everyone.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO A 22-YEAR-OLD KARTIK?

I'd tell him to stop seeking validation. That's genuinely what I would say. At that time, I was constantly seeking it, especially since I didn't know anyone in the industry and felt alone. I craved acceptance and opportunities. I believed in my work and worked hard, but now my focus is simply on whether I'm entertaining or not. Initially, there was a lot of self-doubt, and I felt unsure

about where I stood at parties. But now, it doesn't bother me even if I'm standing alone.

DO YOU RECALL A MOMENT WHEN YOU FAILED AN AUDITION?

I used to attend auditions directly without any connections to casting directors. I would find out about auditions happening in Aram Nagar and would take a train to reach the venue. Often, I was turned away without even being given a chance to audition. Securing an audition for a film was rare and felt like hitting the jackpot. There would be long queues, and sometimes, after hours of

waiting, I would be told that I wasn't suitable for the role. Experiences like these left a lasting impact, and I felt disheartened at times. I grew resentful, but eventually, I learned to channel that negativity. I would tell myself that it was their loss.

WHAT'S THE WORST THING THAT HAS BEEN SAID TO YOU?

"Likh ke lelo ye Hindi film ka hero nahi ban sakta" (Take it from me in writing that he can't become a Hindi film hero).

HAVE DIRECTORS EVER
RECONSIDERED WORKING WITH YOU
AFTER INITIALLY DECLINING?

Absolutely! Many have. I view it as a sort of cosmic justice. My approach isn't about confrontation; it's about dedication to my craft. Those around me know I've put in relentless effort, like a well-oiled machine. I don't take breaks, I'm not one for parties, drinking, or smoking. I don't judge those who do, but my only addiction is work. It's as if there's a higher power recognizing my sincerity towards my craft. (Laughs) Perhaps that's why I'm single too. My focus is always on the task at hand.

AT ONE POINT...

(Laughs) Not anymore.

WHAT ARE YOUR ASPIRATIONS?

My goals are everevolving; I constantly set new ones as I gradually accomplish the old ones. I believe in the power of manifestation and superstition, always envisioning success. I've faced challenges that seem unimaginable to many, but for me, it's always been about the work. I have faith that my efforts don't go unnoticed, that there's a higher force recognizing them.

HAS THE ALLURE OF MONEY, LOVE, AND FAME EVER GONE TO YOUR HEAD?

Back in Gwalior, the world of movie stars seemed distant and unreachable. I couldn't even fathom becoming a Hindi film hero. Even now, despite my achievements, the fear of losing it all persists. From my humble beginnings in Gwalior to the present day, there hasn't been a single moment when I've felt completely satisfied or that

I've reached my ultimate destination.

HOW DOES YOUR FAMILY PERCEIVE YOUR FAME? DO THEY THINK YOU'VE CHANGED?

My sister has distanced herself from the industry, but I strive to keep my parents involved in my journey. My mother, especially, has been a constant support, understanding the rigours of my commitments, like when I portrayed Murlikant Petkar. She ensured I maintained a strict routine, even regulating my sleep schedule. I'm fortunate to have such supportive parents and siblings; they're my true anchors in life.

WHAT WAS YOUR EXPERIENCE LIKE GROWING UP IN GWALIOR?

I spent my childhood in Gwalior until I completed my 11th standard there. That's where I attended school and developed a passion for watching films. It was during my 9th standard that I set my heart on becoming an actor. The idea of moving to Mumbai from Gwalior seemed like a distant aspiration at the time. In Gwalior, I lived with my parents and my sister, and life had a distinctly different rhythm there.


WAS IT CHALLENGING TO GAIN YOUR PARENTS' APPROVAL?

EVEN THOUGH THEY WERE DOCTORS, THEY FACED FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES?



HOW DID YOU SUCCEED IN AUDITIONING FOR YOUR FIRST FILM, PYAAR KA PUNCHNAMA?

I discovered the audition notice on Facebook while regularly searching for casting calls online. Despite having an exam scheduled on the same day, I chose to attend the audition instead. This decision reinforced my belief in karma. Had events unfolded differently, I might have pursued a career in engineering. It's not the best example to set, but truthfully, I skipped my exam that day to attend the

audition. Although I failed my exams initially, after the release of *Pyaar Ka Punchnama 2*, I eventually earned my degree by completing all my exams.

HOW DO YOU ADJUST TO DIFFERENT DIRECTORS' STYLES?

I consider myself a director's actor. Each director, from Kabir Khan to Anees Bazmee, brings a unique approach. Kabir sir's meticulous planning is unparalleled, while Anees sir thrives on spontaneity. With Kabir sir, scenes are executed precisely as

scheduled, whereas Anees sir often improvises and explores various options on set. While Kabir sir is known for his detailed planning, Anees sir is more open to experimentation. Thus, it's crucial for me to adapt to their respective methods. I listen attentively to the director's vision and follow their lead. However, if I sense a director needs assistance, I'm not hesitant to offer my input. While I typically avoid conflicts with directors, I'm assertive when it comes to standing

by my convictions. I'm inclined to debate when I strongly believe in something.

WHAT WAS YOUR EXPERIENCE WORKING ALONGSIDE VIDYA BALAN?

Her presence and infectious laughter uplift everyone on set. Her ability to seamlessly transition in and out of character is remarkable. I find myself in awe of her talent whenever we work together. How important is it for an actor to stay relevant?

Being relevant is important for everyone. I think one just has to adapt to the changing times. Look at Mr. Bachchan. He has always been relevant and he inspires younger generations to do the same. God bless him.

So how do you reinvent yourself with each character, each film project?

It really depends... I think it's in the choice of the stories. So many stories are offered to select from them what I like, where I feel happy, at least as a story. And to choose to work with people who you will vibe with. That's very important. Because if you choose to work with people who you don't get along with...if the vibe is not good – because of that at times I have backed off from a project. Because to be on the same set with those people for three months and more and if you are unhappy then that reflects in the film as well.

Sara Ali Khan is in a lot of pain during our interview as she had inadvertently spilled some hot coffee on herself and has to get ice pack treatment at regular intervals. She's wearing a saree, and gamely shows you the burn mark, while laughing at her clumsiness. You marvel at her tenacity, at her ability to make light of her situation. Mention it to her and she blushes and says she's been brought up to face life with fortitude. With a lineage steeped in Bollywood royalty; Sara brings a refreshing blend of tradition and modernity to the silver screen. From seeking wisdom from her iconic grandmother, Sharmila Tagore, to navigating the complexities of diverse film genres, Sara's journey is as dynamic as it is captivating.

In a conversation with your grandmother, Sharmila Tagore, she spoke about how you go to her for advice. Tell us about your bond. My grandmother is my only living grandparent. She is the voice of reason for all of us. And I think that when things get hard, which they did in my life in 2020, a period of time that was not very good for me, my daddy was there for me, all guns blazing. And she's there for my mom and brother. Of course, she's there for my

father as

well. She

connects me to my traditional roots. She is also the voice of modernity.

She also gives me good advice when it comes to boys, films, and social life. She's a champion.

You come from a family of powerful actors. What is the conversation like about cinema when you all get together? The most intriguing aspect is that we all come from different periods of time. As a result, each of our approaches differs. But, most

importantly, we all take the time to express our gratitude to the universe and to one another for the opportunity to work in a profession we enjoy. This is not some 9-5 job. It helps you stay fit, active, expressive, creative, and alive.

What do you think is the perfect movie title to have your entire family in it? (Laughs) To be honest, nothing beats Kabhi Khushi Kabhie Gham. It just sums up everything, and it suits us perfectly well.



How was it like to dabble in two such diverse genres as Murder Mubarak and Ae Watan Mere Watan?

It's moments like this that force you to unlearn everything that you think you know, be totally present in that moment, and surrender to the director's vision. Both Kannan Iyer and Homi Adjania are so astute that they know exactly what they want. They subscribe to different schools of filmmaking. Hence, there's no real scope of overlap or confusion, like even the sound design is different. On the other end, we used to have a running joke because from wearing a white khaki saree in Ae Watan Mere Watan, I went to wearing bikinis in Murder Mubarak. And Homi was like, where do I set the mike, because it's so easy in a saree. Jokes aside, there was no moment where I had to ask which set I was on. In Ae Watan Mere Watan, the world is so different. It's preindependence, death penalty, advent of radio, celibacy, struggle, strife,

protests, Quit India Movement, Ram Manohar Lohia, Gandhiji—these are all larger than life. You can't imagine it, so I think you need to be fully present in that moment. Surrender totally to the director and everything you thought you knew. And just delve in and try to do justice to the sacrifices made not just by Usha Mehta but to the thousands of unknown and unsung freedom fighters. It's because of them that we can sit here and enjoy the privileges of democracy. You have to respect that to bring that sort of gravitas in your performance, as you're representing something crucial, something bigger than yourself.

Was there any particular scene from Ae Watan Mere Watan that you found emotionally taxing?

It was emotionally draining at times. The kind of character that I'm playing in this film is so distinct from anything that I have played before. She embodies so much confidence and self-pride. There's a sense of self-awareness. Usha Mehta was someone else indeed. To have so much courage and conviction at such a young age is so empowering. In the

I found myself. She felt totally relatable. Her inner resolve, her confidence was the film progressed, what she has done, what her sacrifice stood for. We could only mimic her actions and her circumstances and hope that we were getting everything right. One could only imagine the stress the freedom fighters worked under as even doing it for the camera was exhausting and preyed on our nerves.

Tell us a little more about that common thread you felt between Usha Mehta and you.

There's a font of strength, conviction and courage within us that we seldom draw upon. That's what I learnt while essaying her. That

you have to look within you and seek fortitude. Of course, I'm a mere actress and have been brought up in privilege. She was a freedom fighter who lived through the turbulent era of the Quit India Movement and did service for her country. So there's no comparison between us per se. What I can relate to is her do or die spirit. What I've learnt so far in my

career is that you have to raise the bar every time you feel low. You have to give your best every time and be a better actor, a better person, with every offering. Her inner resilience was something I could relate to. And did my utmost to uphold her ideals while essaying her on screen.

Actors find it hard to adapt to a multi-star setup but you did it seamlessly in Murder





Mubarak. How do the dynamics work?

If you're confident about your craft and you are doing the film for the right reason, then there's not much to worry about regarding your screen time or other stars taking away the limelight. I did Murder Mubarak because it's an extremely new, fresh murder mystery. It goes beyond the generic whodunit films. Homi has

created an interesting and exciting world that is different from anything you've seen before. And I've always believed that an actor's real competition is with herself. So, I didn't feel insecure at all doing the film. And as I said before, I trusted my director's vision completely. It all went smoothly and I had a whale of a time on the sets.

You've always had

social media constantly questioning everything you do. There have been a few box office failures too. What have these five years taught you about how to deal with them?

I think you have to have an inner conviction because everybody is going to try to drag you down, especially if you give them the opportunity to. First, just be grateful. Practising gratitude helps because it

could always be worse than it is. Like I just scalded my stomach the day before yesterday. And it could have been my face. So it's always about the way you look at things. Even if I'm being trolled, for instance, I tell myself that at least they're talking about me. Imagine being irrelevant. For an actor, that's death. So always look at it in such a way that you can tell yourself

it could have been worse. And always remind yourself that, ultimately, you are in charge of your life. So if you want to do better, you just have to be there and try harder.

One word of advice for Sara of Kedarnath?


You're the purest you'll ever be. Retain it and never lose out on it. It will take you further than anything that you try, and the journey is worth it.

There are directors who love to tell women's stories and treat their women and heroines with a lot of dignity. Sanjay sir is one of them. He is a director everybody dreams of working with. What he creates is beautiful; it's legacy. But what makes him special is his



vision of women. His female characters, are human beings they are layered and complex. Wherever they come from, whatever profession they are in, he treats them like queens. In his stories, there is self-respect, fire, purpose and agency. He gives women his life and that's how he sees them on screen. People talk a lot about beauty, but I think what makes them memorable is the fire and substance in them.

How did the character of Bibbojaan come about?

Honestly, I just listened to Sanjay sir and surrendered completely to his vision. He is the kind of director who gives us the best and gives the best of himself to us. He created Bibbojaan for me—every layer, every nuance. A lot of people have seen me in a very fragile, delicate space, but he said, "Iss ladki ka jo fire hai, I want the world to see that."

Did you watch old movies like Pakeezah and Mughal-e-Azam to learn the acting style, grace and dialect of the actresses?

Of course, I worked on my diction and my Urdu with Munira ma'am, who was our diction



coach, so we all worked with her. It needed to feel like I had been speaking that way since childhood, not something learnt. I practised Kathak with Kruti Mahesh. Since I was five, I have been doing Bharatanatyam with Leela Samson, so to break that into Kathak and authentic Kathak at that, I needed to work on it. The dancing required a delicate grace because we are

telling stories while dancing. Sanjay sir would catch the nuances, guide me and help me through it.

As an actor,

what have you explored about yourself while playing this character? I realised while playing Bibbojaan that her vulnerability makes her fearless and her fearlessness makes her powerful. Bibbojaan showed me that your physicality has nothing to do with it; everything is about the heart, whether it is love or

Ratnam as well. How are Mani Ratnam and SLB different from each other? I don't think it's right to compare them. Both are legendary directors. Both are people I look at as my gurus. I love them both. So as an actor, I just want to sit in your heart and go home with you, whether it is Hindi, Malayalam, Kannada or Bengali. I come from a very mixed cultural background, so somewhere that balancing act is fun for me and fuels me.

What do fame and popularity mean to you? I don't think like that. I have four

brothers who always keep me grounded and rooted. They don't watch a lot of films, but they watch them for me. In my home, I am the child of the house and it's the same. All my friends are friends I have known since I was 2-3 years old, and I am still very close to them. I feel like I am myself. If people see me as a star or larger than life, I am very blessed.

Where do you

aspire to see yourself in the next five years?

That's a secret. I feel dreams have magic; when they are realised, then you can talk about them. Right now, I am thinking about the present. I don't worry about what I will do in the future. It's the present and living 100 per cent in the present. I am doing Lioness, an Indo-British production, which is the story of two girls. One is a British actress Paige Sandhu and the other is me. I am looking forward to that. It is directed by Kajri Babbar; it's her first film. Other than that, I am reading scripts.

You have worked with director Imtiaz Ali in Rockstar, When can we see you working with him again?

I would love to work with him. I love him as a filmmaker. He tells incredible stories. Rockstar is a special film for me. Even today, when I see my scenes with Ranbir, I feel it. It was the beginning of my journey as an actor. Even today, people like to watch it. But I feel that role was so cut down that at the time, I felt very bad. I wanted to be a heroine in one of Imtiaz Ali's films and live out the full character.



Experiencing success for the first time in life and not really understanding it. Probably doing *Barfi!* was another very big defining moment. Going to an international film festival to see the film on an international level was another defining moment because it changed my life entirely. These moments helped me change who I am as a person and moulded me into the person that I am today.

WHAT ARE THE MISTAKES YOU'LL NEVER COMMIT AS A PROFESSIONAL?

Disrespecting anybody's time.
That's one thing I realised very early on in my life: time is money. There was probably a time in my career when I was young and had no idea what I was doing. I didn't understand any of it and was still like a kid. I didn't understand the seriousness of my job, but once I realised how serious our work is, I developed a respect for it immediately. I will never take it for granted.

WHAT KEEPS YOU GOING AS AN ACTOR?

The love for my job. I just love being an actor. It's the thing that makes me feel most alive. I can be as tired as anybody, but if I am on a set and in front of a camera, doing what I love, playing a character, breathing life into something that a person has taken hours and days to write, it's a beautiful, powerful moment.

WHAT MAKES A WOMAN HIGHLY ATTRACTIVE BESIDES HER LOOKS?



riyamani is an acclaimed Indian actress known for her versatile performances across multiple film industries, including Hindi, Tamil, Telugu and Kannada cinema. She gained widespread recognition for her roles in blockbuster films such as *Chennai Express* and *Jawan*, as well as the critically acclaimed series *The Family Man*. With a career spanning over a decade, Priyamani has consistently demonstrated her commitment to quality and authenticity in her acting, earning her a dedicated fanbase and numerous accolades. Despite the challenges of working in a male-dominated industry, she continues to make her mark with powerful, female-centric roles. Excerpts from an interview with the fiery actress:



You were seen in 2013 in *Chennai Express* and now in *Jawan* and *Maidaan*. Why such a long gap?

I was waiting for something right, something correct to come my way. Just because this is the Hindi industry or Bollywood, I didn't want to jump and say, "Okay, I will do this." I wanted to do something right, something nice. I didn't mind if it took time; I didn't mind waiting. Maybe that's why it took such a long time.

Your performance was very much appreciated in *Article* 370. Was your character Rajeshwari Swaminathan based on an actual individual?

I was representing the PMO. I don't know whether my character Rajeshwari was one person or ten people. Obviously, for security reasons, they will not reveal that. The makers have done so much research. A lot of people loved the fact that something like this really happened, which not

many people knew about. What India went through and our Honourable PM and HM did to see to it that the Article was abrogated. And this was a secretive mission which was successfully carried out. And the best part was generally, if such missions are carried out, there are a lot of chances

for casualties. Not even a single life was lost. It's the actual fact. So, when you hear such a thing, you feel so happy and proud that you were part of such a film which created history and is doing really well now.

Yami and you carried the film on your

shoulders. It is rare to come by such roles. Whom would you give the credit for this - writers or filmmakers?

Definitely, the credit goes to them. If they wanted, they could have done it with male actors. But I think somewhere they felt they wanted to do it with ladies. The character played by Yami was an actual female agent. So, for a female agent, they wanted a female actor.

You are a very natural actor.

I try to make it as convincing and as real as possible, as much as I can. I don't like overdramatisation. From the time I started, I was fortunate enough that whatever movies I did, whichever directors I worked with, their approach has always been very natural and very organic, not very dramatised and not very put-on kind of acting.

Coming from the South, working in Bollywood would be very different for you in terms of working styles?

One thing I can say is the Hindi industry is a little quieter than the South. If you go in the South, you will have 15,000 people screaming on a set. There is noise for sure. Here, each department has its own walkies. Most of the movies I have done here are all sync sound. Bahut kam dubbing hain yahan pe. Whereas the South is predominantly all dubbing.

You have done *Chennai Express* with Shah

Rukh, then you did Jawan. Has he changed over the years or is he the same person?

I think he has become sweeter than what he was. What I love about him is the respect that he gives. And he never forgets you. Even if he saw you 10-15 years ago, he'll say, "Aap kaise ho beta." Whatever. The way he eases you into the atmosphere, aapko aisa lagega hi nahi ki, you met him 10 years back. He will just casually get you into the conversation and then you'll just go with the flow. He is very humble, down-to-earth and very sweet. Unka jo woh natural charisma and charm hain, just blows you over, and I don't think there is anybody who can hate that man.

How was it working with Ajay Devgn in Maidaan?


Ajay sir is a brilliant costar. He is a very effortless actor. He is quite jovial. I like how he gets into the character and the way he delivers his dialogues. In *Maidaan*, in many scenes, he doesn't have to say much and I am the one who's talking. He is only giving expressions and just smiling. But his expressions, the light in

his eyes speak volumes, so that itself was more than enough. Basically, he is also a director's actor.

Shah Rukh and Ajay

Shah Rukh and Ajay both are superstars in the industry. Do you feel the superstar vibe when you work with them?

Not at all. They made me feel so comfortable on the set, so I didn't feel that I was working





with such big superstars, especially Shah Rukh, because Jawan was my second film with him. So with sir, it was like a picnic. We were talking, laughing, joking; we had get-togethers, we had dinners together, we used to have jam sessions, we used to sing. In Maidaan, the mahol was a little more serious because we had to finish the shoot on time and there were very

emotional scenes with Ajay sir.

Tell us about your experience working with Manoj Bajpayee in The Family Man.

I can't wait to get back to work with Manoj sir. Yes, he is a brilliant actor and co-star. I could have never asked for a better Srikant Tiwari. Whatever he brings to Srikant, what I've seen, it's so organic, so natural, and half the lines you've seen are improvised; they're not scripted. So when he improvises, we also have to improvise; we always have to be on our toes when we are working with an actor like Manoj Bajpayee. Because he does one thing in rehearsal and another in a take, so you always have to be very alert. He's too good.

Any other actors you want to work with?

I'd love to work with Ayushmann Khurrana. He is a brilliant actor. He chooses the right scripts, and the right scripts come to him. Like in *Andhadhun*, he underplayed that character. He did *Article* a lull period where I was just sitting at home for a bit and not getting movies, or I didn't take them up because I wasn't convinced enough about the project. Then after Chennai Express, I got a lot of offers. I was working a lot in the South. Then again, after The Family Man, I think it took a rise. If you ask me, I am quite happy where I am, and I am just taking my time. I know they say, make hay while the sun shines. Jo bhi aata hai karo, but I don't want to do that. I'm in no sort of rush.

How tough or easy is it to survive in a male-dominated industry?

It has always been maledominated. Now we

15. It was really good, and he is also one actor who can mould himself for a movie like *Bala* or *Vicky Donor*. He just moulds himself so brilliantly. That's why I would like to work with him.

You have seen ups and downs in your career...

I am still struggling now to get the right scripts and to choose the right ones because I have always believed in quality. Earlier, it was that jo bhi movie karti thi usko release hone main time lagta tha. But after 2006, there was no looking back, so I kept on doing movies back to back. I have done so many movies. Some worked, some didn't. There was

cannot change that. Pahle male-centric films zyada banti thi. Then Seeta Aur Geeta came, Chaalbaaz came, where it was run by females. Then, yes, very few female-centric films came, but now a lot more female-centric films are coming out in the Hindi film industry as well as in the South. The females are also getting an equal opportunity to showcase their talent in femalecentric films. So I think that should continue. It should open up doors also. Because I guess long gone are the days when heroines are cast only to romance the heroes. Other than the romance and the songs, they also have something to contribute.




Beyond DOUMOUNIES

What differences did you notice between the Hindi and Bengali film industry?

Apart from the language, it's pretty similar because the director of the film is a Kolkata-based director Tathagata Mukherjee, and the film *Pariah* has been directed by him as well, which was my last release. So I knew exactly how he would want me to prepare for my Hindi debut Memory X. I knew what was expected of me for the film. We didn't dub for the film, so while shooting the film, I was sure that I had

You seem to have earned the title of a romantic hero amongst the Bengali audience.

I have never had a problem with me getting typecast. I take a lot of pride in it. When the makers or the audience attach a tag to any actor, that means that they have done justice to that genre. That's the reason there is a certain amount of acceptability. And when there is acceptability, it's a success.

Does romance come easy to you onscreen?

I'm a horrible romantic when it comes to my real life. I'm not romantic at all. I'm sure whoever has spent some time with me in my life would agree to it and would vouch for the fact. That Vikram is not romantic. But somehow on screen, the conviction I have, the character and the subject that's given to me, I have to fall in love with the love story. If I believe in it, then it becomes easy for me to be able to convince myself and

automatically that shows on screen.

Which cinematic universe do you see yourself fit in perfectly based on your offscreen personality?

personality? I honestly belong to Farhan Akhtar's world of men. I love my friends to bits. My male friends are my life. I can give my life for them at the same time, I will also ensure that they get into horrible situations because of me and make fun of them. I would like to go out with my friends and have a blast. I will probably get beaten up because of the person that I fall in love with. The closest character that I can think of when it comes to the real-life me is Aamir Khan from Dil Chahta Hai.

Your filmography has a pattern with a minimum of three releases a year.


In the Bengali film industry, we don't have budgets as big as, let's say, Tamil, Telugu, or Hindi film industries. So till the time we can achieve that as an industry, it will become difficult for any actor in Bengali cinema to just do one film in a year. Because, at the end of the day, we all also have expenses to take care of. Considering the amount of money

that we earn from one film. I don't think it is enough for any of the heroes to become financially secure on just what we earn from just one film. Of course, at the same time, if it's only one film in a year, the audience also in today's world tends to lose focus on the actors. For me as an actor, I'm not the guy who would be very visible on social media and I envy the people who are. So to remain relevant in this extremely busy world where the

audience forgets or tends to forget about some film that was released in January or February, I would want to come back around June, July, and August with my second film. So I would like at least two releases every year.

How versatile are the multiple releases that you have coming up? Last year, first I had Shesh Pata which was a different film from Atanu Ghosh. I was playing this guy

who is a recovery agent, a very low middle-class guy, absolutely beaten and bruised by life, who has to work as a recovery agent to just survive, to run his expenses. And there are two different sides to him. Then I did Shohorer Ushnotomo Din E which was one of the biggest hits of Bengali cinema last year - a true-blue love story. Then Pariah became an out-and-out action film. I had to bulk





up and go seven shades darker than what I am. Grow my hair and my beard. The love from the audience has been immense. After this, I have an intense love story. And then the other one is a rom-com with Sohini Sarkar and I love the film. There is *Durgapur* Junction, which is a murder mystery wherein I play a cop and Swastika Mukherjee plays a senior journalist.

You were praised for your role in Shesh Pata, which is said to be an emotionally exhausting film. See for an actor in general, be it Shesh Pata and Pariah Volume 1: Every Street Dog Has a Name, I would discuss both as the latter was extremely emotionally draining. I have grown up in a family of caregivers for dogs. My mother and my sister have

both been doing that for the longest time. I have seen their struggles up close and hence I started connecting to it. Shesh Pata again was extremely challenging emotionally because of the journey that this boy was going through. But at the same time, what keeps me sane while doing emotionally heavy films is the amount of love that I keep getting from my friends and family.

My male friends are my life. I can give my life. I can give my life for them at the same time, I will also ensure that they get into horrible situations because of me and make fun of them

What advice would you give to your younger self? Patience is key in an industry

in an industry like ours, where things, of course, take time. Good things take even more time. When I was comparatively younger, I could not foresee. Now when I look at a crisis, my first way of looking at it is, would this make a difference to me or my life five years down the line? If not, then you don't need to lose your cool about it.

So you've become a lot calmer now.

I've stopped reacting completely. I try to understand where the other person is speaking from and what exactly is his or her point of view as well. I've always been a passionate person. Still am. But when you're extremely passionate about things, you're primarily looking at things from your perspective. With all the passion, you forget that there's a different perspective

that might also be correct. Time and experiences have taught me that my passion is important to me. It will drive me. It will make me do things that a lot of other people would not relate to or are not capable of.

You became such a household name with your work on television. Would you go back to that format now?

I'm grateful to TV. My whole career took shape because of it. The whole platform that was given to me as an actor was primarily because of the love that I was getting from television. I grew up during the '90s. I've watched these big-screen stars on screen and what drives me the most is a theatrical release. If I do a TV show, they will expect me to dedicatedly give at least one year of my life to it, and given the current scenario when the films are doing so well, it won't be possible for me to do that.
