India's gross direct tax collections for FY25 grows 22.19 %

India's gross direct tax collections for financial year 2024-25, (before adjusting for refunds) stands at Rs 5,15,986 crore, registering a growth of 22.19 per cent over the col-lections of Rs 4,22,295 crore made in the corresponding period of FY24.

This gross collection (as on 17.06.2024) includes corporation tax (CIT) at Rs 2,26,280 crore and personal income tax (PIT) including securities transaction tax (STT) at Rs. 2,88,993 crore, provisional figures released by the Ministry of Finance on Tuesday shows. Minor head-wise collection

comprises advance tax of Rs 1,48,823 crore, tax deducted at source of Rs 3,24,787 crore, self-assessment tax of Rs. 28,471 crore, regular assessment tax of Rs 10.920 crore and tax under other minor heads of Rs. 2,985 crore.

The provisional figures of direct tax collections for FY 2024-25 as on 17 June, 2024 show net collections at Rs 4,62,664 crore, compared to Rs 3.82.414 crore in the corresponding period of the preceding financial year, FY 2023-24, representing an increase of 20.99 per cent. The net direct tax collection of Rs 4,62,664 crore includes CIT at Rs 1,80,949 crore (net of refund) and PIT including STT at Rs 2,81,013 crore (net of refund).

The provisional figures of total advance tax collections for FY 2024-25, as on 17 June 2024 stand at Rs 1,48,823 crore, against advance tax collections of Rs 1,16,875 crore for the corresponding period of FY2023-24, showing a growth of 27.34 per cent. The advance tax collection of Rs 1.48.823 crore comprises CIT at Rs1,14,353 crore and PIT at Rs 34,470 crore. Refunds amounting to Rs 53,322 crore have also been issued in the FY 2024-25 till 17 June 2024, which are

Foreign investors flock to Indian markets, pumping in \$1.4 billion

Foreign portfolio investors (FPIs) have made a strong comeback to Indian markets with net investments surpassing USD 1 billion over the past five trading sessions. On June 14 alone, FPIs invested USD 644.61 million, pushing their total investment beyond the 1 billion USD mark. Previously, domestic stock mar-

kets experienced significant volatility during the election period due to persistent selling by foreign inves-tors. On the day election results were announced, the markets faced one of the worst sell-offs by foreign inves tors, driven by the uncertainty of a clear majority for any political party.



However, investor confidence was restored after the formation of the government under the National

million on June 11. However, June 12 saw a notable shift as FPIs sold off USD 285.32 million, resulting in a negative net investment for the day. The trend reversed on June 13 with FPIs investing USD 326.46 million. culminating in a significant buying spree on June 14 with USD 644.61 million invested. Over these five trading sessions, FPIs have collectively invested an impressive USD 1.45 billion. This influx of foreign capital highlights renewed confidence in the Indian market, particularly following the political stabilization brought about by the NDA government.

The return of FPIs is a positive indicator for the Indian economy. suggesting that the political stabil-ity and policy continuity offered by the new government have effectively mitigated uncertainties. In May, FPIs sold equities worth Rs 25,586 crore, indicating a pattern of sustained selling in the cash market. For the year 2024 so far, FPIs have divested equi-ty worth Rs 26,428 crore. A notable trend in FPI activity is the considerable selling through exchanges while simultaneously buying through the primary market route. The market is gradually stabilizing

following the high volatility triggered by the election results, including both exit polls and the actual outcomes.
The upcoming budget will also provide a policy direction for the new nent, with the market expected to adjust accordingly based on the budget announcements.

mid anticipation surrounding the appointment of the Lok Sabha Speaker ahead of the upcommid anticipation ing Parliament Session, sources indicate that a meeting of ministers will convene at Defence Minister Rajnath Singh's residence on Tuesday evening. The purpose of this gathering, scheduled just before the commencement of the first Parliament session post the 2024 general elections on June 24, is to strategize on enhancing floor coordination among National Democratic Alliance (NDA) partners during the session. This session will also witness the election for the crucial Speaker post.

Rajnath Singh has been tasked with the respon-



sibility to facilitate consensus-building among alliance parties as well as opposition groups for the election of the Lok Sabha Speaker. Sources suggest that discussions will re-volve around ensuring smooth proceedings and effective functioning of the lower house of Parliament.

The opposition INDIA bloc is reportedly con-templating fielding a candidate for the Speaker's post, especially if the norm of granting them the Deputy Speaker's post is not adhered to. The election for the posi-tion of Lok Sabha Speaker is slated to take place on

June 26. Currently, the Speaker of the Lower House of Parliament is Om Birla, a Member of Parliament from the Bharativa Ianaelected as the Speaker of the 17th Lok Sabha in June 2019, following a motion moved by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. In the recently concluded Lok Sabha elections, Birla contested from Kota on a BJP ticket and secured the Parliamentary seat with a margin exceeding 41,139

Janata Dal (United), led by Nitish Kumar, has af-firmed its support for the BJP's choice for the Speaker's post. JD(U) and the Telugu Desam Party (TDP) are integral members of the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance and are expected to endorse the candidate nominated by the BJP.

The inaugural session of the 18th Lok Sabha is scheduled to conclude on July 3, primarily for the oath-taking or affirmation of newly elected Droupadi Murmu is slated to address a joint sitting of the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha on

Passenger seeks action against goods train pilots in Kanchenjunga Express crash

Apassenger aboard the junga Express, involved in a tragic accident on June 17 near Jalpaiguri station in North Bengal, has lodged a complaint against the loco pilot and assistant loco pilot of the goods train responsible for the collision. The incident occurred when a goods train reportedly ignored a signal and collided with the Sealdah-bound Kanchanjungha Express at approximately 8:55 am, resulting in a devastating outcome in the Phansidewa

area of Darjeeling district.
The collision tragically claimed the lives of at least 10 individuals and left more than 25 others injured. Chinmoy Majumdar, one of the passengers, recounted in her complaint the sudden jolt felt while the train was



among passengers. She sustained injuries, while several co-passengers suffered severe wounds in the aftermath of the collision. According to Majumdar's

account, upon disembarking from the train, she discovered that the goods train had rammed into the rear of the Kanchenjunga Express, severely damaging parts of both trains, including the engine of the goods train. She attributed the accident to the rush and alleged negligence of the loco pilot and assistant loco pilot.

Dr. Sandeep Kumar Sen-gupta, the Dean of North Bengal Medical College and Hospital, confirmed that the death toll had risen to 10 following the tragic in-cident. He detailed that on the day of the mishap, 37 in-jured individuals were ad-mitted, with two patients in serious condition succumbing to their injuries despite intensive care. Dr. Sengupta emphasized the critical condition of those with multiple organ injuries, highlighting the challenges in their treatment due to their ccident-related trauma.

In response to the incident, Janak Kumar Garg, Chief Commissioner of Railway Safety for Northeast Frontier Railway, an-nounced a statutory inqui-ry into the Kanchenjunga Express tragedy. The in-quiry aims to ascertain the circumstances leading to the collision, which claimed eight lives at the scene and later two more in hospital, while injuring 25 others.

Following extensive restoration efforts, the Kanchan-Sealdah station in Kolkata, early the next day. The completion of restoration work allowed for the resumption of normal operations after the distressing incident.

The collision between the goods train and Kanchen-junga Express has raised significant concerns about railway safety and opera-tional protocols.

India to grow at 7.2 %

food price inflation has remained high, averaging 7.8 per cent in the first five months of the calendar year. According to official forecasts, rainfall during June-September is likely to be above average. This, says Fitch Ratings, should limit the inflationary risks from food price spikes. We expect headline inflation to continue declining to 4.5 per cent by calendar year-end, and average 4.3 per cent in 2025 and 2026, staying slightly above the mid-point of the price of the price

of its target range (4 per cent +/- 2 per cent). The agency also notes that at its latest meeting, the RBI maintained the policy rate at 6.5 per cent and confirmed its hawkish stance of "withdrawal of monetary accommodation" and the need to bring down inflation towards target. It still expects the RBI to cut its policy rate this year, but only once, to $6.25\,\mathrm{per}$ cent.

INDIA'S OILMEAL EXPORTS PLUMMET AMID GLOBAL TRADE CHALLENGES

India's oilmeal exports decline in April 2024, with soybean meal exports rising and mustard meal exports falling tons. This decline in demand

India's oilmeal exports experienced a notable 17% decline in the first two months of the 2024-25 financial year, highlighting broader challenges in the agricultural trade sector. This decline has been primarily attributed to a drop in the export of key products castorseed meal. In May 2024 alone, oilmeal

export volumes were report-ed at 302,280 tons, a sharp decline of 31 per cent from 436.597 tons in May 2023.

One of the main reasons for this decrease is the reduced demand for Indian oilmeals from major importers such as South Korea, Thailand, Vietnam, and Bangladesh.

South Korea imported 166,583 tons of oilmeals, down from 189,705 tons the

previous year. Vietnam's imports saw

a drop from 142,285 tons to just 32,699 tons, while Thailand's intake fell from

Bangladesh imported 139,006 tons, compared to 193,606 tons during the same period last year.

The most notable drop

has been in rapeseed meal exports. Vietnam, which imported 142,285 tons last year, significantly reduced its intake to just 32,699 tons.

Similarly, Thailand's imports of rapeseed meal fell from 152,053 tons to 57,390

for rapeseed meal, a major export commodity, has had a significant impact on overall oilmeal exports.

Another critical factor affecting the oilmeal export market is the government's prohibition on the export of de-oiled rice bran, a key

component in animal fodder. India typically exports be-tween 500,000 to 600,000 tons of de-oiled rice bran to countries such as Vietnam and Thailand.

MILK PRICES SURGE AMID KARACHI'S **ECONOMIC CRISIS AND INFLATION**

The cost of milk in Karachi surged notably after dairy farmers and wholesalers in collaboration with commissioner Karachi

Pakistan is grap-pling with ongoing economic challeng-es as inflation increas-ingly impacts daily life, making essential goods like milk less affordable. The rising cost of living is a major concern, wors ened by energy shortages and fluctuating global commodity prices, which have collectively raised prices for basic necessi-

In Karachi, the country's largest city and economic hub, voices of frustration and concern echo through its bus-tling streets. M. Akhter, a resident grappling with the realities of inflation, highlights the plight of daily wage workers and laborers who bear the brunt of these price increases. "The soaring prices of essentials like milk and Ghee have made it increasingly difficult to sustain our households," he laments, urging the government to prioritize the welfare of its citizens amidst these challenging economic circumstances.

Faizan, echoing similar sentiments, sheds light on the underlying reasons behind the steep rise in milk prices. He explains that dairy farm owners face escalating costs for essentials such as fod-der, high rents, and wa-



ter, compelling them to pass on these expenses to consumers. "It's a cycle of hardship," he observes, emphasizing the need for government intervention to alleviate the burden on ordinary Pakistanis, regardless of political affiliations.

The struggle against

inflation in Pakistan is not merely a matter of economic statistics but a stark reality faced by millions each day. Across the nation, families are forced to rethink their budgets as prices continue to climb unabated, impacting everything from grocery bills to education and healthcare expenses.

Local media reports from Karachi underscore the severity of the situation, particularly re-garding the cost of milk.

Following extensive consultations involving dairy farmers, wholesalers, and government officials, an agreement was reached to raise the price of milk by PKR 20 per litre. This decision, facilitated by Commissioner Karachi after hours of delibera-tion, reflects a necessary

adjustment to offset ris

ing production costs and ensure the sustainability of dairy farming opera-

The agreed-upon increase sets the new price of milk at PKR 220 per litre, marking a significant jump from previous rates. While necessary from an economic standpoint, this adjustment places added strain on already stretched household bud-gets, prompting concerns about affordability and access to nutritious food for vulnerable popula-In response to these

challenges, civic leaders and community advo-cates in Karachi are calling for greater transparency and accountability in price-setting mecha-nisms. They argue that while adjustments may be inevitable due to economic realities, measures must be in place to protect consumers from exploitative practices and ensure fair pricing that reflects both production costs and consumer affordability. Looking ahead, there is a collective hope that sustainable solutions will emerge to address the root causes of inflation and stabilize prices across essential sectors. Former Thai PM Thaksin Shinawatra released on bail amid charges

According to the Bang-kok Post, former Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra has been released on bail of 500,000 baht. This follows his arraignment on charges of lese-majeste and computer crimes related to comments made during a 2015 interview. The Criminal Court granted bail after Thaksin reported to public prosecu-tors on Tuesday morning and attended his arraignment, as confirmed by the Office of the Attorney-General's spokesperson.
Prayut Phetcharakhun,

speaking on behalf of the OAG, stated that the court formally accepted the case at 8:56 am, marking Thaksin as an official defendant. Conditions of his release include surrendering his passport and a prohibition from leaving Thailand without court permission. The decision to grant bail was made under the assurance that Thaksin would not flee, tamper with evi-dence, engage in harmful acts, or obstruct judicial proceedings, as reported

by Bangkok Post.
Last month, the OAG announced its intention to indict Thaksin, who was under parole at the time. The indictment, originally scheduled earlier, was postponed due to Thaksin's reported contraction of Covid-19, rescheduled

Thaksin, aged 74, faces accusations stemming from comments made to the South Korean newspaper Chosun Ilbo in May 2015, alleging support for the

2014 coup by privy councillors, which led to the ousting of his sister Yingluck Shinawatra's government. The initial complaint was filed in 2015 by Gen Udo-mdej Sitabutr, then deputy defence minister under Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha's military administration. The Judge Advocate General's Department, acting

on Gen Udomdei's directive, pursued legal action against Thaksin, culminating in the OAG's filing of charges. The Criminal Court accepted the case in 2015, issuing an arrest warrant as Thaksin remained overseas until his return to Thailand in August of the previous year, according to Bangkok Post.

Authorities allege that Thaksin's statements in the interview violated Section 112 of the Criminal Code, known as the lese-majeste law, in ad-dition to offenses under

Act. The OAG, following police recommendations, opted to press charges encompassing both statutes, according to their spokes-

The charge under the Computer Crimes Act pertains to Thaksin's purported inputting of data into a computer system deemed detrimental to national security. Denying any wrongdoing, Thaksin faces potential pre-trial detention should bail be denied subsequent to the

indictment.

The lese-majeste law carries a maximum prison sentence of up to 15 years for each perceived affront against the monarchy. The legal proceedings against Thaksin underscore ongoing sensitivities and legal rigor concerning expres-sions related to the Thai monarchy, a cornerstone of the nation's legal and

Pakistan Govt prioritizes power over people's plight

According to an edi-torial in Tuesday's Dawn newspaper, Paki-stan's financial planning during its severe economic crisis clearly indicates that the federal government is indifferent to the people's plight. The editorial criticizes the government for prioritizing an easy tenure in power over addressing the country's pressing is-sues. Interestingly, not too long ago, government of-ficials would passionately oppose even a slight in-crease in electricity prices, sparking nationwide pro-tests aimed at forcing the government out of office.

"Oh, how the times have changed. Days after drop-ping tax bombs that will further eviscerate the struggling masses, the au-thorities have announced that not only will they be

taking more money out of the paychecks of salaried individuals, they will also be squeezing whatever is left through significantly jacked-upelectricity bills," the editorial read.

Citing news reports, it said that Nepra (National Electric Power Regula-tory Authority) has hiked the uniform national tariff for the base price of elec-tricity by almost 20 per cent to hand over electricity distribution compa-nies almost half a trillion fiscal year.

The average base tariff for a single unit of electricity, which was Pakistani Rupees (PKR) 27.78 in the outgoing year, will be PKR 35.50 from July 1.

On top of this, various duties, taxes, and sur-charges, as well as fuel and tariff adjustments, will be levied, forcing ordinary citizens to pay

eration and maintenance costs involved in gener-ating electricity, but also for capacity charges that past governments have promised power generation companies, as well as the theft and transmission losses that distribution companies have shown a complete unwillingness to mitigate for many years. The average middle-class

bill-paying customer will be forking out between PKR 65-72 for each unit of electricity they use in a month. Meanwhile, the federal government will present this as an 'achieve-ment' in front of the IMF to ask for even more loans to keep a clearly failing system running for a few years longer, the editorial added. However, at the same time, the govern-ment has announced a PKR 10.69 per unit 'relief'

for the industrial sector to 'make it competitive'. There can probably be no better example of crony capitalism. While the av-erage salaried individual is finding it difficult to meet their ends on a shrinking real wage amidst month after month of unceasing, unchecked inflation, it is the big industries who get a break in the form of cheaper electricity so that they can pad up their profits while paying little back to the country in the form

failing the people seems like an understatement. It is clearly least bothered by their plight. Its financial planning shows that it has no interest in going after those who dodge their dues; it just wants to take the easy route and enjoy the ride for however long it is in power," the Dawn editorial stated.

Taiwan to receive 1,700 TOW 2B anti-tank missiles from US

Focus Taiwan, Taiwan's Defense Minister Wellington Koo announced on Monday that the country will receive all 1,700 TOW 2B anti-tank missiles and 100 launchers purchased from the United States by the end of this year, follow-ing a two-year delay. The update on the timeline was provided during a legisla-tive session in response to inquiries from Democratic Progressive Party lawmaker Wang Ting-yu about the delivery schedule. Originally budgeted at

NTD 11.81 billion (USD 364 million) for procure

2018-2025, Taiwan initially anticipated deliver-ies to begin in 2022 but faced delays. According to Wang, Taiwan has not yet received any missiles as per the original schedule due to failed tests by the US Army.

Minister Koo acknowledged the delays were indeed caused by the weapons' failure to meet required US Army stan-dards initially. However, he assured that all necessary tests have now been successfully passed, ensuring delivery before year-end, as reported by Focus Tai-

Highlighting the signifi-

Koo mentioned the TOW 2B anti-tank missiles and launchers are part of three major arms packages pur-chased from the US, all of

which have encountered significant delays. Among these pack-ages are 66 F-16V fighter jets and AGM-154 air-to-ground missile systems re-nowned for their precision in strikes against surface targets. Koo disclosed that Taiwan anticipates receiv-ing two F-16V prototypes for further flight tests by the fourth quarter of this year, with a request to re-ceive all 66 by the end of 2026.Regarding the AGM-154s, Koo did not specify

or the expected delivery timeline. Describing the capabilities of the TOW 2B missiles, an unnamed military source explained they are designed to target the vulnerable tops of armored vehicles, enhancing Taiwan's defensive capabilities in potential invasion scenarios. During a visit to Taiwan

in May, Michael McCaul, chair of the US House Foreign Affairs Committee, cited approximately USD20 billion worth of pending arms sales to Tai-wan, attributing delays primarily to industry-related issues, Focus Taiwan

MYSTIC POET KABIR

RAJESH TALWAR

s Kabir Jayanti ap-proaches on 22 June this year, it is an opportune time to re-member Sant Kabir, a mystic poet who defies classification. Hindus and Muslim both claim him. It is said that upon his death the two communities both fought for custody of his body, one for burial and the other for burning, but when eventually the shroud was lifted only flowers could be found. Such is the power of Kabir's words, and the wisdom they radiate that his verses also find pride of place in the Guru Granth Sahib the sacred scripture of the Sikhs. Evelyn Underhill who helped translate Kabir's poetry writes how 'it is impossible to say of their author that he is Brahman, or Sufi, Vedantist or Vaishnavite.' According to Kabir himself, she writes, he was 'at once the child of Allah and of Ram.

Many contradictory legends have surfaced con-cerning the life of Kabir. It appears probable that he was born to Muslim par-ents, based on the Arabic origins of his name. Despite being born or raised in a Muslim family he was deeply influenced by a Hindu saint named Ramananda. It is said that he waited for Ramananda to finish his bath at the Gan-ges and when by mistake the learned man's foot fell on Kabir and he uttered the words 'Ram! Ram!' Kabir seized the opportunity to at once declare himself

Kabir's poems were borrowed from various dialects including Khadi boli, Braj, Bhojpuri, and Awadhi. They cover various aspects of life and call for a loving devotion for God. Kabir composed his verses with simple words. Most of his work was concerned with devotion, mysticism, spiritualism and discipline.

Kabir was also a musician and a weaver. It is said that a disciple sought to make him give up his weaving, considering it to be no more than a craftsman's skill but Kabir would not leave the practice consider-ing it to be something that

It is suc a touching and beautiful attitude given the times we live in, in which many so-called spiritual leaders love to pontificate and live in the lap of luxury, but do not have their own separate creative pursuits. Anyone wishing to read

the great mystic in English could do no better than to read 'One Hundred Poems of Kabir,' that has his po-

Kabir literature legacy was promoted by two of his disciples, Bhgods and Dharamdas. Songs of Kabir were collected by Kshitimohan Sen from mendicants across India, these were then translated to English by Rabindranath Tagore. Kabir's legacy continues to be carried forward by the Kabir panth ("Path of Kabir"), a religious community that recognises him as its founder and is one of the Sant Mat sects. This community was founded centuries after Kabir died, in various parts of India, over the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Its members, known as Kabir panthis, are estimated to be around 9.6 million. They are spread over north and central India, as well as dispersed with the Indian diaspora across the world, up from 843,171 in the 1901 census.

There are two temples dedicated to Kabir located in Bena-res. One of them is maintained by Hindus, while the other by Muslims. Both the temples practise similar forms of worship where his songs are sung daily. Other rituals of aarti and distributing prasad are similar to other Hindu temples. The followers of Kabir are vegetarians and abstain from alcohol.

BHAKTI MOVEMENT

The philosophy of Kabir and other sants of the Bhakti movement is the seeking of the Absolute. The notion of this Absolute is nirguna which, writes Vaudeville, is same as "the Upanishadic concept of the Brahman-Atman and the monistic Advaita interpretation of the Administration the ministration and the present of the Vedantic tradition, which denies any distinction between the soul (within a human being) and God, and urges man to recognize within himself his true divine nature". [49] Vaudeville notes that this philosophy of Kabir and other Bhakti sants is self-contradictory, because if God is within, then that would be a call to abolish all external bhakti. This inconsistency in Kabir's teaching may have been differentiating "union with God" from the concept of "merging into God, or Oneness in all beings". Alternatively, states Yaudeville, the saguna premabhakti (tender devotion) may have been prepositioned as the journey towards self-realization of the nirguna Brahman, a universality beyond monotheism. David N. Lorenzen and Adrián Muñoz trace these ideas of God in Kabir's philosophy as nirguna Brahman to those in Adi Shankara's theories on Advaita Vedanta school of Hinduism, albeit with some differences. T

Kabir is at once ancient and at the same time extremely contemporary. No modern-day poet, motivation speaker or management expert could have spoken on the value of time as profoundly as he did.

In one of his most popular dohas he writes as follows

What you have to do tomor-row; do today instead. What you have to do today; do it right away.

Within a second all can be lestroyed What will you do then?

We live in an age with short attention spans, where tweets are limited by the number of characters

they use. This may pose a problem for spiritual gurus given to issuing long sermons, but Kabir was a master of communicating in short rhyming couplets also known as dohas. This begs a further question. Had Kabir been alive today, would he have published his dohas as tweets or on Insta as Rupi Kaur the Indo-Canadian poet did, and would they have similarly gone viral? Accord-ing to marketing experts those aspiring to be social influencers should tweet or make Instagram posts at least once a day, but for Kabir's dohas a discerning audience would have waited for as long as was need-ed, weeks, months even, for it would be a special kind of nectar that a reader would eventually get to sa-vour. Such profound verse would have also immeasur-ably raised the standard of what is these days referred to humorously as What-sApp University. We need a Kabir for our



KARNATAKA HIGH COURT: CONSENSUAL RELATIONSHIP Calcutta High Court Directed Bengal IS NO LICENCE TO ASSAULT A WOMAN

The Karnataka High Court in the case ABC AND State of Karnataka & Anr. observed and has refused to quash charges of assault levelled by a woman against a man with whom she was in a consensual relationship for years

The single judge bench of Justice M Nagaprasanna in the case observed and has stated that, 'Any amount of consensus or a consensual relation-ship between the accused and the complainant will not be come a licence to the accused

to assault a woman.'

The court in the case observed and has partly allowed the petition filed by the accused. The court also quashed the charges of rape on the pretext of marriage and cheating levelled against the accused.

In the present case, the com-plainant and the accused were



in a consensual relationship It has been alleged by the

complainant that petitioner is indulged in sexual activi-ties with her on false promise of marriage and therefore, he has committed offences punishable as stated under section 376, section 417, section 504 and section 506 of the Indian Penal code, IPC, It has also been alleged by her that petitioner beat her leading to injuries depicted in the wound

The petitioner in the plea argued that complainant is ha-

bitual in registering repeated crimes on different men and thus the impugned proceedings needs to be quashed.

The bench observed that the narration in the complaint is the relationship was and all acts during the said period were consensual. The bench also took note of the fact that during the same time, petitioner had alleged identical offences against another ac-cused. The bench stated that if the allegation in the complaint made against Kamalesh Choudhary is juxtaposed to the subject complaint, it be-



Govt To Ensure 1% Reservation For Transgender Persons I

N All Public Employment The Calcutta High Court in the case Mrinal Barik -Versus- The State of West Bengal & Ors observed and has directed the West Ben-gal government to ensure 1% reservation for all transgender persons in public employment in the State, in ac-cordance with the Supreme Court's NALSA guidelines.

The single bench of Justice Rajasekhar Mantha in the case observed and has held that in terms of paragraph 135 (3) in the National Legal Service Authority Vs. Union of India & Ors, the reserva-tion has not yet been made in the State for transgender persons. The court in such circumstances directed the Chief Secretary of the Government of West Bengal to ensure 1% reservation for the category of persons men-



all public employment in the

In the present case, the court was hearing the peti-tion filed by a transgender person who passed the Teachers' Eligibility Test, TET in 2014 and in 2022 but was not called for the counselling process or interview.

The bench headed by Jus-tice Mantha referred to the Supreme Court's judgement in the case NALSA v Union of India, which carved out reservations for transgender persons to protect their rights under Part III of the Constitution.

The court observed that in the NALSA judgement, the court had directed the state and union governments to treat transgender persons as 'socially and education-ally backward' and extend all kinds of benefits to them including reservations in

public employment.
Further, the court noted that while the State had devised its own policy for reservations for transgen-der persons, it had not been made in accordance with the order of the Supreme Court.

The court directed for 1% reservations to be maintained for transgender persons in all public employment in the state and directed the Secretary of the West Bengal Board of Primary Education to arrange for interview and counselling

KARNATAKA HIGH COURT: VICTIM OF PROSECUTED UNDER SECTION 5 IMMORAL TRAFFIC PREVENTION ACT

The High Court also referred to the case Shashikala Devi vs. Central Bank of In-dia & Ors., wherein the Su-preme Court held that in case

Relief For Forging Pattas: Nature And Gravity Of Offence Taken Into Account While Considering Anticipatory Bail

Rajasthan High Court

The Raiasthan High Court in the case Dilip Sharma v State of Rajasthan observed and has denied anticipatory bail to the person charged under five different FIRs for forging 'pattas' that were never actu ally being issued by the Aimer Development Authority and taking lakhs of rupees from complainants for distributing these fabricated pattas and

The bench headed by Justice Anoop Kumar Dhand in the case was hearing an applica-tion filed for grant of anticipa-

tory bail.

The bench observed that the personal liberty of the accused as a relevant factor and at the same time it being the duty of the Court to take into account the nature of the offences in-

volved and the charges levelled against the persons alleged. The counsel appearing for the applicant argued before



the court that for the grant of anticipatory bail which being on the ground that during his period of incarceration entire investigation was done by the

The counsel appearing before the court also stated that filing of repeated FIRs for same allegations amounted to abuse of the process of law.

On the other hand, the ap-

plication filed was countered by the counsel for the com plainant who contended that it had been concluded in the chargesheet that after fabricating the documents, thus, the applicant also destroyed the evidences as well as threatened the material witnesses as well as complainants.

It has also been pointed out by the counsel appearing that during investigation, state ments of two witnesses indicated applicant's involvement in the crime.

Furthermore, the court in the case stated that the reference was also made to the fifth First Information Report, FIR that was launched recently against the petitioner for same nature of allegations.

It has also been argued by the counsel that looking at the gravity of the matter, the applicant should not be granted

The court referred to the case Prasanta Kumar Sarkar wherein the court laid down certain factors to be kept in mind while considering applications for anticipatory bail. Some of the factors included, whether there was any prima facie or reasonable ground to believe that the accused had committed the offence; nature and gravity of the accusation; severity of punishment for the

alleged offence.

The court also referred to the case Nimmagadda Prasad v CBI, wherein the court held that the Court should keep in mind the nature of evidence and accusation while deciding an application for anticipatory bail. The court also observed that many Supreme Court cases have settled that while deciding an anticipatory bail, the court should not make a detailed analysis of evidence but focus on some reasonable grounds that would reveal if the accused had committed the offence or would re the seriousness of the off uld reflect

The court stated that the ob-

Nimmagadda Prasad v CBI, wherein the court has kept in mind that for the purpose of granting bail, the Legislature has used the words 'reason-able grounds for believing' instead of 'the evidence' which means the Court was dealing with the grant of bail can only satisfy it as to whether there is a genuine case against the accused and that the prosecution will be able to produce prima facie evidence in support of the charge. At this stage, it is not expected to have the evidence establishing the guilt of the accused beyond reason-able doubt.

Further, the court held that the allegations raised of forg-ing pattas and distributing these for lakhs of rupees, made in five different FIRS, were serious allegations that required investigation by the investigating agency.

The court while considering the facts and circumstances of the case observed and has rejected the bail application.

Police team attacked preventing illegal slaughter

Maharashtra, confirmed that a police team was assaulted while intervening to stop an il-legal cow slaughter at tempt on Monday morning in Dharanpada, Jawhar. Acting on a tip-off, the team encountered resistance during their operation. Seven individuals have been charged with offences including attempted murder, assault on a public servant, and violations of animal cruelty laws. Three suspects have been arrested, while efforts are underway to apprehend the others involved. Officials reported that the assailants threw stones at the police, and one officer was specifically tar-geted with a sickle during the altercation. paper has retracted its news narked Shiv Sena leader Sanjay Nirupam to the media. Delhi court grants bail in Maharashtra Control of Organised Crime Act case

A Delhi Court has granted bail to an alleged member of an organised crime syndi-cate, who was booked under the stringent Maharashtra Control of Organised Crime Act (MCOCA) and shown absconder before his arrest, with his counsel submitting that the man was regularly supplying water to a chowki under Hari Nagar Police Station during the period he was reported to have been

absconding.

After considering the facts and circumstances, Tis Hazari Court Special Judge Shivali Sharma granted bail to Saurav Bhargav, alias Bhinda. He is alleged to be a member of Salman Tyagi gang, which allegedly runs an organised crime syndi-

cate. The case pertains to Hari Nagar Police Station, An FIR under MCOCA was lodged on August 13, 2019, against Salman Tyagi and



his 22 associates, including Bhinda. Delhi Police filed a supplementary chargesheet on April 24, 2024.

Bhinda was arrested on December 23, 2023, and has sought regular bail under section 439 CrPC.

After considering the ma-terial on record, the Special judge granted bail to the ac-

"I am constrained to hold that there are reasonable grounds to believe that accused Saurav Bhargav is not guilty of offences under MCOCA for which he has been charge-sheeted," the

judge noted. It is also well on record that the accused was not involved in any kind of criminal ac-tivities after 2018, the court said in the order passed on May 24. Defence counsel Deenak

Sharma argued that the ac-cused has been wrongly booked by the Investigation Officer without any sub-stantial evidence regarding him being a member of any crime syndicate. He was never called by the police to join the investigation before his arrest. "In fact, during the period

in which he has been shown nded, he was ularly supplying water at Police Chowki Hari Nagar under the jurisdiction of Police Station Hari Nagar and thus was very well available in Delhi within the knowledge of police officials of PS Hari Nagar. Still, no efforts were made to make him join the investigation, nor any notice was issued to him for this

purpose," Sharma argued.

The bail plea was opposed
by the Additional Public Prosecutor (APP) who submitted that allegations against the accused were serious in nature. He argued that the name of the accused has been specifically men-tioned in the sanction for lodging of the FIR under MCOCA.

The Additional Public Prosecutor argued that the accused is involved in several cases and "extorted money by threatening financers, property dealers and book-
