

4 of Hinduja family get Swiss jail terms for exploiting staff

Geneva: A Swiss court on Friday handed jail sentences to four members of the wealthy Hinduja family, branding them "selfish" for exploiting Indian staff at their Geneva mansion. The Hindujas were acquitted of human trafficking, but convicted on other charges in a stunning verdict for the family, whose fortune is estimated at \$47 billion. Prakash Hinduja and his wife Kamal Hinduja each got four years and six months, while their son Ajay and his wife Namrata received four-year terms, the presiding judge in Geneva ruled. — AFP Full report on Page 6





Hours before his anticipated release from Tihar jail, the Delhi high court on Friday accorded an interim stay over the trial court order granting regular bail to chief minister Kejriwal in the liquor policy case.



Man tries to extort doc for money, held

New Delhi: A 32-year-old man has been arrested for an alleged extortion attempt on a doctor who runs a private clinic in the Janakpuri area here, the police said on Friday. During the interrogation, the accused, Ashok Kumar, told the police that he was in urgent need of money to purchase a new flat in Delhi and therefore planned to extort money from the doctor, they added. According to the police, Kumar delivered an extortion letter in the doctor's clinic. He threatened to kill the doctor if he failed to meet his demand and named jailed Haryana gangster Manoj Baba in the letter to create terror to yield the extortion money. "On June 3, a man who was wearing a mask had delivered a letter in the clinic of a doctor in Janakpuri. The man threatened the doctor to kill him if he failed to meet the extortion demand. He also named the jailed Haryana-based gangster Manoj Baba in the letter,' deputy commissioner of police Manoj C. said. Following the incident, an FIR was registered and the case was handed over to the special cell, the DCP said.

Gangsters grilled in Burger King killing

New Delhi: Jailed gangsters Neeraj Bawana and Naveen Dabas alias Bali were interrogated by the Delhi Police's Special Cell in connection with the murder of a man at a food outlet in Rajouri Garden, officials said on Friday Bawana and Bali are the associates of fugitive Spainbased gangster Himanshu Bhau. They took responsibility for the killing in a social media post, saying his gang had avenged the killing of Bawana's cousin Shakti Singh in October 2020. On Tuesday, Aman Joon, 26, was killed when he was seated with a woman inside a Burger King outlet in Rajouri Garden's J Block. It is believed that Joon had given a tip-off to gangster Ashok Pradhan about Shakti Singh. The post had mentioned the names of gangsters Naveen Dabas alias Bali, Neeraj Bawana, Kala Kharampur, and Neeraj Faridpur. The killings will con-

New Delhi: The National Capital Regional transport corporation (NCRTC) is making significant strides in renewable energy adoption by installing solar power infrastructure along the Delhi-Ghaziabad-Meerut RRTS Corridor, officials said on Friday. Amid persisting water crisis in the national capital. Heatwave: Death toll now 143. actual numbers could be high

The prolonged heatwave sweeping large parts of the country has claimed lives, with 143 recorded deaths and 41,789 people suffering from suspected heatstroke between March 1 and June 20 this year, health ministry sources said on Friday. However, the heatwave toll is expected to be higher than this as the data compiled under the national heat-related illness and death surveillance by the National Centre for Disease Disease Control (NCDC) does not have updated submissions from states.

Several health facilities are also yet to upload data on number of heatwave casualties.

After befriending, 2 men rob woman at home, arrested

The Delhi police has arrested two men for befriending women on dating apps and allegedly robbing them at their homes.

The police identified the accused as Vijay Kumar Kamal (28) and Rahul (35), residents of Mohan Garden area in Delhi, they said. The matter came to light on May 31 when a 35-year-old woman filed a complaint that a man, who introduced himself as Jatin on a dat-ing app, robbed her in her house, deputy commissioner of police (Dwarka) Ankit Singh said.

The victim told the police that she and Jatin (alias Vijay Kumar Kamai) used to talk over messages before he and Rahul visited her house on May 30. They tied her hands, tapped her mouth and assaulted her, Mr Singh said.

"Both robbed her gold ornaments, mobile phone, and ₹5.000 cash and fled. After receiving the complaint, an FIR was lodged at Dabri police station and an investigation was initiated," the DCP said.

During the investigation, the police examined the CCTV footage and identified the accused. They found that the accused reached the victim's residence in a Creta car with a fake number plate, the DCP added. 'When we were searching for the call details of the accused, we came across another fact that the mobile phone which the accused was using was stolen from another woman in Rohini, who was also robbed in the same manner. liquor brands, he added. "As the government agency will buy and supply liquor directly from the manufacturers, consumers will not be restricted to buy liquor as per preferences of the license holders", press release said.

At the Cabinet meeting, the CM said that there were large scale irregularities in the previous system causing immense financial losses to the state and emphasised a clean and transparent business environment. By taking control of the distribution process, we aim to streamline operations, reduce costs for enhance consumer satisfaction", he added.

The move comes after widespread complaints of corruption, spurious and illegal liquor sales and revenue losses amounting to crores of rupees under the previous government, the press release said.

Defer implementing new criminal laws, Mamata tells Modi

New Delhi, June 21: West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to defer the implementation of the three "hurriedly passed" criminal laws that are set to be rolled out on July 1, saying it would enable Parliament to review them afresh.

In a letter to the PM, she expressed "grave concern" over the impending implementation of the three laws — Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNA), Bharatiya Sakhsya Act (BSA) and Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) 2023.

She noted that the three bills were passed in Lok Sabha at a time when 146 MPs had been suspended. 'The outgoing government of yours had passed these three critical bills unilaterally, and with absolutely no debate. That day, almost 100 members of the Lok Sabha had been suspended and a total 146 MPs of the both Houses were thrown out Parliament,"

Baneriee said. The Bills were passed in an authoritarian manner in that dark hour of democracy. Matter deserves review now," she added. "I urge your esteemed office now to consider at least a deferment of the implementa-

The deaths have been due to natural causes, chronic illnesses, and old age. Six people died on the Day of Arafat and 4 were accident-related deaths. "Three archaeological remains were found dur-ing excavation by ASI in the north-east side of the complex on Thursday. They were found barely five feet from the sanctum sanctorum of the Bhojshala temple",

findings found in the ASIprotected monument complex included one granite idol of Lord Krishna measuring 1.5 ft long and 0.5ft wide, one idol of a pair of Yakshas (Hindu mythological characters) measuring around one feet and a piece of a pillar, Mr Sharma, coordinator of Bhojshala Mukti Yagna,

As per him, the idol of Krishna was in the perfect shape while one of the two Yakshas carved on a hematite stone was found to be damaged. "ASI has taken in its possession the three remains

for preservation", he added. As per Mr Sharma, on June nine, more than 79 "archaeo-logical remains" includ-ing idols of Hindu gods such as Ganesh, Bhairavnath, Mahisasurmardhan Hanuman and Brahma were recovered during the survey of the complex

NIA charges 5, including 2 foreigners, in fraud case

Tightening its noose further around the human trafficking and cyber fraud syndicates operating within and outside the country, the National Investigation Agency on Friday chargesheeted five accused, including two foreign nationals, in a case having international linkages in human trafficking and forced cyber fraud case.

Two of the chargesheet-ed accused, Jerry Jacob and Godfrey Alvares, are under arrest and three others, Sunny Gonsalves, as well as foreign nationals Niu Niu & Elvis Du, are still absconding. The chargesheet filed before Special Court, Mumbai, has exposed the involvement of several foreign nationals in the case, in which the agency is continuing with its investigations.

As per NIA investigations, the accused were targeting Indian youth who were proficient in computers and English language, and coercing them into working in fraudulent call centres on tourist visa for pecuniary gains. The victims were being recruited, transported and transferred from India to the Golden Triangle SEZ in Lao People's Democratic Republic country via Thailand. Upon arrival, the victims were trained in the use of Facebook, Telegram, basics of Cryptocurrency, and handling Apps created by the scam company.

Doubts on exam integrity dampen dismal job scene

r Narendra Modi, who is now into his third term as the nation's Prime Minister, often reminds his fellow citizens as well as world leaders about the demographic dividend India is about to ■harvest in the near future. He has statistics on his side — more than half of India's population is aged below 30, that is, about 70 crore people are ready to be in the service of the nation, awaiting their turn. This is an advantage no other country can claim as its own.
But that's only one side of the story.
The other, darker, side is that India is passing through a time when

unemployment is at its peak in terms of absolute numbers.

While politicians bandy about figures proclaiming fast growth of the economy, economists are worried about growth in joblessness and surging numbers of the educated unemployed. Surveys had predicted that unemployment would be one of the key issues in the last general election, and the results did stop the BJP from bagging a comfortable majority.

It is in this context that the news reports — of irregularities in competitive examinations conducted — explode in the face of the nation. It was in

nor does glib talk replace jobs. Instead of using its youth to create growth, it is making survival a challenge for it.

February this year the Uttar Pradesh government was forced to cancel the recruitment examination for police constables for which 43 lakh appeared. This was after allegations that the question papers were available for a price, ranging from ₹50,000 to ₹2 lakh.

The leak of question papers of the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance test (Neet-UG) conducted for admissions into undergraduate medical courses is an event of a scale that is unheard of. So much so that even a shocked Supreme Court had to comment that the integrity of the examination has been compromised. The gravity of the situation can be gauged only when we consider the fact that it was intro-

duced in 2013 to do away with ad hoc mechanisms and arbitrariness in medial admissions and introduce transparency instead.

The cancelling of the National Eligibility Test (NET) for junior research fellowship and teacher qualification has now followed the Neet-UG fiasco. The government continues to be in denial mode saying there is no systemic issue with the National Testing Agency and no proof of wrongdoing yet. However, reports have started appearing from various parts of the

country that there is an active market selling question papers.

The consistent failure on the part of the government, which gloats about its demographic dividend, to uphold transparency in the conduct of key examinations for which lakhs of hardworking youth apply is unsettling and difficult to stomach. The government must realise that grandstanding does not offer an alternative to transparency nor does glib talk replace jobs. Instead of using the mass of young people as an opportunity to fuel the nation's growth, it is making its very survival a challenge for it. This

is unconscionable.

It will be wrong for those in power to assume that the youth will be content with its pontificating. What if they are heading towards "a rude awakening if the nation returns to business as usual" as Martin Luther King Jr

Fresh twist in Kejriwal drama There is no immunity from arrest for the chief minister of a state.

However, once Arvind Kejriwal was granted regular bail by the trial court which had placed him in judicial custody in the first place, it would have stood to reason that he be enlarged while being answerable to the proceedings relating to the money laundering charges against him and his party. The drama over Arvind Kejriwal, who defied summons from the Enforcement Directorate for months on end, appears to be endless. He alone was able to secure interim bail on the grounds that he had to canvass for votes in the general election. It is another matter that the public displayed no sympathy for his predicament in his home base of Delhi and voted against his party and its alliance partner in the Lok Sabha polls.

It would appear the trial court judge had reams to say of the way the case is being handled by the prosecutors and yet the ED, on a mission to keep the likes of Keiriwal and former Delhi deputy CM Manish Sisodia in jail for as long as possible, approached the Delhi high court to hold the bail in abeyance.

The ends of justice would be served best were this case to be taken to its logical and just conclusion and the perpetrators of high financial crimes and graft be brought to book, that is if they are guilty. If proved innocent — the onus of such stringent laws as PMLA and PCA is on the defendant to prove his innocence — they are free to continue to operate as the people's representatives.

Instead of pursuing a speedy legal route to prosecution, the government and its Central investigating agencies seem bent on using the process as punishment and keep those charged incarcerated for long periods of time. Considering the speed of the justice delivery system in India, its delays should not be used to punish those charged. Let them be at liberty until their case

A long history of arrests points to political motivation more than actual prosecution of those in power who do, however, use liquor licences as a convenient vehicle for funds, both official revenue for the government and illegal gratification for parties and individuals. This is a national embarrassment. The point is whether or not Mr Kejriwal is directly guilty of raising funds through

India's scorching heat divide rising, act now tably, whoever can afford As the number of days of heat steadily rise,

t took a thief in Uttar Pradesh to expose India's scorching heat divide. On an intensely hot day in early June, a man broke into a locked house in Lucknow's Indiranagar neighbourhood, rum-maged through the premis-es, and picked up valuables. Then, he spotted an air-conditioner. He switched it on, found a snug cushion, lay down, and fell asleep. When the police arrived, the thief was napping. The story gen-erated much mirth in

India's scalding summer. No one is laughing any more. Especially in Delhi/NCR and the vast swathes of the country reeling under a prolonged heatwave. Temperatures are rising above 46 degrees across much of north India, including in UP, Uttarakhand, Bihar and Jharkhand. At least 50 people have died in the current heatwave in the Delhi region, over 50 in UP and Odisha and at least 22 in heat is not unique to India. In the time of climate change, clearly, erratic, and extreme weather are the new norms. Heat stress is affecting people across the

world. But what needs to be sledgehammered is that in many countries, including India, policy response to extreme heat must factor in equity. Extreme heat affects us all, but not equally. That India is a deeply unequal country is no secret. But prolonged heatwaves, including the current one, brutally expose India's deep social, cultural, and economic fault lines.

The Heatwave Havoc report, a new study by Greenpeace India and National Hawkers' Federation, throws up valuable insights on how extreme heat impacts street vendors in Delhi, focusing on risks to health, livelihood challenges and adaptation strategies. According to the report, 49.27 per cent of street vendor respondents

experienced a loss of income during heatwaves, with 80.08 per cent of them acknowledging a dip in the number of customers. 50.86 per cent of interviewees also said they face higher financial burdens due to addi-tional household expenses with an average extra expenditure of Rs 4,896.52 during months of extreme

Extreme heat inflames gender inequalities in health and income, according to recent research by US-based Adrienne Arsht-Rockefeller Foundation Resilience Centre (Arsht-Rock) in three countries — India, Nigeria, and the United States — examining current and projected condi-

tions by 2050. 'Women lose 19 per cent of their paid working hours to heat, costing the Indian economy 0.8 per cent of its GDP, or roughly \$67 billion annually," says the report.

As the number of days of

heat steadily

there can be no real sustainable solution unless we acknowledge this emerging thermal divide between those who can afford or have access to air-conditioned environments and can live and work there a major part of the day, and those who cannot, and must necessarily deal with intense heat for long stretches or risk reduced earnings. The latter make up the bulk of India's informal sector — the mainstay of the Indian economy. Most construction workers, farmers, street vendors, delivery boys, domestic helpers and many others do not have the option of working from home; many live in homes that are not air-cooled. This does not take away from the deep discomfort that everyone, rich and poor, are grappling with. But the degree matters. Sometimes it is a matter of life and death.

The intensity of the heat has renewed discussions on many critical issues, such as accurate data on heatand those who cannot related deaths. Many experts feel the official tally is an underestimate though India now has official guidelines which specifically state that a death must be considered heat-related, even if the patient has preexisting health conditions which are aggravated by

extreme temperatures. But guidelines are only a starting point. There are many issues which are part of the Indian reality and which must be addressed, alongside the structural problems in classifying heat-related deaths. For example, medical doctors must be trained across the country to diagnose the impact of extreme heat on the body, as Aditya Valiathan Pillai, a fellow at Sustainable Futures

One way to deal with the situation is to track all-cause mortality during stretches of heatwaves with available data from the past to understand the excess mortality that may have been contributed by intense heat, as Pillai and other scholars suggest. This was done in the case of the May 2010 heat wave in Ahmedabad, which revealed 1,344 excess deaths and led to India's first heat action plan (HAP) in 2013. Since then, many Indian states and cities have come up with their own HAPs. But HAPs are quite often under-funded and not

enforced. In the short term, inevi

Organisation report. There are plenty of fore-casts about the impact of extreme heat on the Indian economy but what is also required, says Pillai, is the granular, hyper-local picture which includes local scientific assessment of localised resear which tells you what heat is doing to a specific area in every way. This also means awareness about extreme heat must percolate down to the local administration.

Vulnerability ments must not only factor in terrain or geography but also the sectors, occupations, and population groups most affected by and extreme heat, adds Pillai.

India's heat strategy must tackle core issues like how India's cities are designed. how much greenery is maintained, how society is organised. Who lives, who dies and who falls sick will depend greatly on who has access to regular supply of electricity, to cooling devices and clean water in the coming years. These aren't abstract issues any more.

U.S. BAN ON GUNS TO DOMESTIC ABUSERS UPHELD

Washington, June 21: The US Supreme Court on Friday upheld a federal law prohibiting domestic abusers from possessing a firearm, the latest legal ruling in the country's fierce battle over gun rights. It was the first gun case to come before the court — where conservatives hold a 6-3 majority — since a major decision issued in 2022 loosening gun

restrictions.
"When an individual has been found to pose a credible threat...that individual may be temporarily disarmed," Chief Justice John Roberts wrote.

MALAYSIAN BEACHES HIT BY S'PORE OIL SPILL

Kuala Lumpur, June 21: An oil spill off Singapore has spread beaches in southern Malaysia, a government official said on Friday, with clean-up operations underway.

Around 25 people were involved in the clean-up of two beaches spanning one kilometre (0.6 miles) in southern Johor state, local government official Ling Tian Soon said.

"Work began today and we hope to complete the task tomorrow. From our observation, marine life or fishermen activities have not been affected," he said.

TOP GERMAN MIN. IN CHINA TO END

Frankfurt, June 21: any's vice chancellor Robert Habeck will arrive in Beijing on Friday on a last-ditch mission to avoid a damaging trade war with China after the EU threatened to slap additional tariffs on electric cars.

If a compromise is not reached between Brussels and Beijing, European Commission will impose extra tariffs of up to 38 per cent on Chinese electric vehicles it says have benefitted from unfair subsidies. The higher tariffs would be imposed provisionally, before becoming definitive in November.

INDIAN DUMPED TO DIE ON ROAD AFTER MISHAP

London/Rome, June 21: A 31year-old Indian casual worker in Italy has died tragically after he was dumped on the road without medical assistance by his employer after his arm was severed by heavy farm machinery, an incident that has shocked the country.

Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni said Satnam Singh, one of thousands of Indian immigrants who work the fields in the country, was the victim of "inhuman acts" "These are inhumane acts that do not belong to the Italian people. I hope this barbarity will be punished harshly," she said.

FARM FIRE IN S-E TURKEY LEAVES AT LEAST 11 DEAD

Ankara, June 21: A fire that apparently started in crop stubble spread through settlements in southeast Turkey overnight, killing 11 people and leaving dozens of others requiring medical treatment,

requiring meaners officials said on Friday. Greece, In neighboring Greece, authorities evacuated several villages south of Athens and in southern Peloponnese

region because of wildfires. The blaze in Turkey broke out in an area between the provinces of Diyarbakir and Mardin. Fanned by winds, it moved quickly through the villages of Koksalan, Yazcicegi and Bagacik.



New orders push June job creation to 18-month high

MADHUSUDAN SAHOO NEW DELHI, JUNE 21

Indian businesses, both in the manufacturing and services sectors, expanded at a faster pace in the month of June than the previous month.

Besides, there was a substantial upturn in aggregate employment amid robust expansions in total new order intakes and international sales as price pressures receded in the month. The job creation was at its strongest pace in over 18 years, a private survey showed on Friday.

According to the survey carried out by the global banker HSBC Flash India PMI, the headline flash Purchasing composite Managers' Index or PMI figure rose to 60.9 in June, compared to a downward revised figure of 60.5 in May, while India services sector PMI rose to 60.4 in June from 60.2 in May and manufacturing PMI 62.1

in June from 61.1 in May. "The composite flash PMI ticked up in June, supported by rises in both the manufacturing and service sectors, with the former recording a faster pace of growth. New orders gained growth momentum for both sectors, with a faster upturn among manufacturers. Meanwhile, new export orders slowed slightly in June, although the rate of expansion was the second fastest since the beginning of the series," said Maitreyi Das, global economist at HSBC

New Delhi, June 21: Pension fund regulatory and development authority (PFRDA) chairman Deepak Mohanty on Friday said the regulator would introduce new life cycle fund options by September for NPS (nongovernment) subscribers.

The tapering age will be increased to 45 years from the existing 35 years and some more changes will be adopted to provide greater exposure to equity markets, Mohanty said.

The new scheme would

be effective in the next quarter, maybe in August and September, he said.

Currently, there are three life cycle fund options named LC 75, LC 50 and LC 25, which are also known as aggressive auto choice, moderate auto choice and conservative auto choice, respectively. Life cycle fund provides

an option of investment to subscribers and allocation of equity and debt depends on the option chosen by them.

There are different investment choices (auto/active) for tier I and tier II NPS accounts.

With regard to Atal Pension Yojana (APY), Mohanty said, 1.24 crore new subscribers were added in FY24 with 52 per cent of them being women. Since its incep-tion 6.6 crore subscribers have been added under APY, he said -PTI

Alexa may get Al power, users to pay \$5 a month

Amazon is planning a major revamp of decade-old money-losing Alexa service to include a conversational generative Al with two tiers of service and has considered a monthly fee of around \$5 to access the superior version, according to people with direct knowledge of the company's plans.

Known internally as "Banyan," a reference to the sprawling ficus trees, the project would represent the first major overhaul of the voice assistant since it was introduced in 2014 along with the Echo line of speakers. Amazon has dubbed the new voice assistant "Remarkable Alexa," the people said.

Amazon has pushed workers towards a deadline of August to prepare the newest version of Alexa, three of the people said, noting that CEO Andy Jassy has taken a personal interest in seeing Alexa reinvigorated. In an April letter to shareholders, Jassy promised a "more intelligent and capable Alexa," without providing additional details.

The company's plans for Alexa including pricing and release dates could be altered or cancelled depending on the progress of Project Banyan, the people cautioned.



"We have already integrated generative AI into different components of Alexa, and are working hard on implementation at scale - in the over half a billion ambient, Alexaenabled devices already in homes around the world to enable even more proactive, personal, and trusted assistance for our customers," said an Amazon spokeswoman in a statement.

The service - which provides spoken answers to user queries, like the local weather, and can serve as a hub to control home appliances - was a pet project of Amazon foun-der Jeff Bezos who envisioned a technology that could emulate the fictional voice computer portrayed on television's Star Trek series. For Amazon, keeping up

with rivals in generative AI is critical as Google, Microsoft and OpenAI have garnered more atten-— Reuters

SOONER AIFF PREZ LEAVES, BETTER IT IS FOR INDIAN FOOTBALL: STIMAC

New Delhi, June 21: Ousted India football coach Igor Stimac on Friday launcheď a stinging attack on AIFF president Kalyan Chaubey, saying the sooner he leaves the post, the better it would be for the future of football in the country where the globally-loved sport is not growing at all.

Stimac was on Monday sacked as head coach following the team's failure to reach the third round of the FIFA World Cup Qualifiers. A day later, the Croat threatened to file a lawsuit against the AIFF in the FIFA Tribunal if his outstanding dues were not cleared in 10

During a lengthy online press conference on Friday, Stimac said Indian football is "imprisoned" and blamed Chaubey for most of the problems besetting the game. He also said that he "fed up of the lies and unfulfilled promises" during his tenure.

"The sooner Kalyan Chaubey leaves AIFF, the better it is for Indian football," Stimac said.

"Kalyan only cares about being popular — recent media meets shows that. You say he is a politician, no one knows him even in Kolkata. We need someone strong, influential and with backing to lead Indian football. Kalyan's priority is to get photographed with famous players instead of thinking about the wellbeing of Indian

"Football is the most popular sport in the world, but India is the only place where football is not growing," he added.

Stimac was appointed as the head coach following the departure of his predecessor Stephen Constantine in March 2019. A few days after India suffered a defeat against Qatar in the final second round match of World Cup Qualifiers earlier this month, the AIFF sacked

Spain beat Italy to reach Euro knockouts

Gelsenkirchen, (Germany), June 21: Spain secured a spot in the knockout stages of Euro 2024 with a 1-0 victory over Italy in their heavyweight clash on Thursday, after England struggled to show their credentials in a 1-1 draw with Denmark.

Three-time Spain got the better of reigning champions Italy at the Arena AufSchalke in Gelsenkirchen as Riccardo Calafiori bundled the ball into his own net 10 minutes after halftime to decide the encounter.

A second win in as many matches for Spain is enough for them to secure top spot in Group 'B' with a game to spare, meaning they already know they will play their last-16 tie in Cologne on June 30 against one of the best third-place finishers. Italy, meanwhile, are not
