A NURSE was conned out BY JOHN DINGWALL of £62,000 by an online fraudster pretending to be controversial Strictly star Giovanni Pernice.

The healthcare worker, who asked to be known only as Cecee to protect her identity, took her mum to see the dancer in Inverness in March last year.

She went on to leave a comment on his Facebook page after the

The 44-year-old, from Inverness, was stunned to get a reply and – after believing a series of online claims – was tricked into paying out £1500 a week to the conman.

Later, when she refused to continue to meet his demands, she was blackmailed.

Cecee has now decided to tell her story for the first time as a pounds worth of vouchers, every

warning to others. She said: "I have spent £62,000 since this started last year.

"It happened after I made a comment on his fan page. I got a response within 15 minutes and we began chatting about Strictly. Then he asked me about myself."

As the scam unfolded, Čecee was taken in.

She said: "It was generally a little bit cheeky, asking if I wanted to pay for their lunch and I was like, No, you're a celebrity, I'm sure vou've got plenty of people to pay for your lunch'.

Then he asked me to buy him an Amazon voucher for some charity. So I did it. I bought the voucher and sent it.

week, until this February. Then he said that since my mum loved dancing, he could get me a pass to use for us to go to Strictly for £3200.

"I knew that didn't sound right. I said I wasn't going to pay that or transfer any money.

"He said, 'Oh, it's fine. You can buy these vouchers called Steam Vouchers, which is what I did."

But alarm bells rang when the passes didn't arrive.

Cecee, who was already separated from her husband, said: "When I questioned the person, I got a lot of threatening messages.

"He made really vile comments about me and said he would contact my husband and the doctors that I work with to let them know what I was up to.

"So when he was nice about stuff, he was really nice, completely love-bombing me all the time then it turned to absolute hatred."

Cecee said the ordeal has crushed her confidence and taken its toll on her health after she lost three stone.

She added: "I just don't know who I am as a woman any more. It sounds pathetic but sometimes I miss the conversation with this person, even though they've been so horrible.

"In the messages, he said that he wanted me to be with him forever, that he wanted to marry me, that I was the perfect woman for him and that he'd never met a woman like me.

'When I read these things back, it's like, 'Gosh, what an idiot'.

"I was quite a confident woman but when he trolled me, telling me that I'm ugly, I'm not good enough and that I'm nothing, it

BoE freezes interest at 5.25% high

THE Bank of England froze interest rates at a 16-year high of 5.25 per cent yesterday.

Two members of the Bank's Monetary Policy Committee voted to cut rates.

The decision was expected, with the election two weeks away and wage growth still high.

Inflation returned to the Bank's two per cent target for the first time in nearly three years this week.

But the Bank is keen for a further slowdown in core inflation and prices in the service sector.

Governor Andrew Bailey said: "It's good news that inflation has returned to our two per cent target.

We need to be sure inflation will stay low and that's why we've held rates at 5.25 per cent."

More Sunak chaos over poll betting

RISHI Sunak last night came under growing pressure to cut ties with Tories being investigated over betting scandal claims.

And the PM's General Election preparations were plunged into further chaos after it was revealed his campaign chief Tony Lee quit as officials look into the allegation.

It also emerged yesterday that a flurry of bets was placed on the poll being called for July 4 in the week before Sunak named the date.

Laura Saunders, Lee's wife, became the second Tory candidate to face a Gambling Commission probe over election betting

Sunak's parliamentary aide Craig Williams last week admitted he too was being investigated.

A member of the PM's protection team was arrested and suspended "on suspicion of misconduct in public office" for allegedly betting on the date of the poll.

Labour leader Keir Starmer said: "It's astonishing we're in this place.

"However many people have already been identified as potentially involved in this.

"I'm hearing the news that there may be more.

"Rishi Sunak just needs to take action, he needs to account for exactly who knew what."

In a letter to the PM, Labour campaign co-ordinator Pat McFadden pointed out as only the police officer has been suspended it "looks as though there is one rule for members of the Tory Party, and another rule for everyone else".

He added: "I urge you to take immediate action against all those implicated.

bosses HOLYROOD investigating claims staffers for SNP MSPs used the taxpayerfunded postage system for the General Election.

A probe has been launched into allegations stamps paid for by the public were passed to SNP candidates.

Holyrood expenses and postage are for parliamentary business, not party political purposes.

However, leaked messages from an SNP "office manager chat" show a conversation on postage.

One staffer wrote: "Guys, the new stamps. Can they be traced?"

A n o t h e r responded: "Like who purchased them and what they're being used for?

A third pitched in: "I asked [name of non-SNP staffer] in the mailroom and he said no."

The first individual in the group chat wrote: "Can they be traced back to who purchased them?" A fourth piped up: Not aware that they can."

A staffer for a senior MSP wrote: "If they can then a few people may be up in front of the corporate body."

The corporate body is the parliament's governing board.

Parliament rules say postage must be used "only for parliamentary duties and not be used for any other purpose, including party political purposes".

Each MSP can claim up to £5500

each financial year for postage and stationery.

The individual who raised the alarm complained by email to Presiding Officer Alison Iohnstone.

In it they said they were anonymously sharing a screenshot "from

the SNP office managers WhatsApp group chat due to my concerns that several MSPs are using stamps paid for by Scottish Parliament expenses to pass to UK Parliament election candidates for campaign activities such as sending target letters to hard to reach addresses".

They added: "I'm concerned about this open discussion involving several members' offices."

The Scottish Parliament confirmed to the Record that it is investigating. A spokesperson said: "We take the

use of publicly-funded resources very seriously. Officials are investigating the matter to establish whether there has resources."

Lib Dem MSP Willie Rennie said: These messages suggest major misbehaviour on the part of SNP staff.

While these are currently only allegations, it is crucial for public trust and transparency that an impartial investigation is conducted by parliamentary authorities.

"This will ensure that any potential misconduct is addressed appropriately and that the integrity of our political system is upheld."

Political parties and candidates target voters with mail during elections but they pay for the material and postage themselves.

A spokesperson for the SNP Holyrood group said: "The parliamentary rules are crystal clear that materials, including stamps, can only be used for parliamentary purposes such as representing constituents and campaigning on their behalf.

These exchanges, whilst obviously light-hearted, are being investigated, as is appropriate, and we would expect the offices of MSPs of all parties to cooperate with the Parliamentary Corporate Body."

The SNP has had financial problems amid an ongoing police probe into donations. They have struggled to raise large donations in recent years, with most income taken from membership fees, public money or from wills.

The most recently available figures show the party made a loss of more than £800,000 last year.

But it was reported last week that the SNP's general election fund has been boosted by almost £128,000 left in a man's will.



NEW figures "destroy" Tory arguments against Labour's manifesto pledge to introduce VAT on private

Edinburgh Council said it has 12,805 spare places amid Conservative claims the tax policy could lead to an exodus and state schools being overrun.

Labour leader Keir Starmer has said 20 per cent VAT will be added to school fees if he wins power.

The revenues will be used to hire new teachers for comprehensives, with Holyrood landing an extra £150million.

But critics of the policy claim the tax will be unaffordable to parents on modest means who go private.

In Edinburgh alone, 25 per cent of pupils are educated at private schools. However, City of Edinburgh Council figures show state school roll capacity at 65,948 pupils, with the numbers set to attend in August at 53,143, falling to 52,881 in 2025. It works out at 12,805 and 13,067 spare places in state schools for the next two years.

There is space for another 8671 primary school pupils in August and 4134 at secondary school. The council said none of its 23 secondaries is oversubscribed for either the 2024 or 2025 projected intake.

Of its 91 primaries, one is currently over capacity.

A Scottish Labour source said the figures

"destroyed" the Conservatives' arguments against the VAT policy.

And Pam Duncan-Glancy, Labour's education spokeswoman, said: "Labour's plans to scrap tax breaks for private schools will deliver a sorely needed boost to our education system."

SNP leader John Swinney told the Record he is "sympathetic" to Labour's plan, adding: "I understand where they are coming from."

But the Lib Dems oppose the VAT plan, with Christine Jardine calling it "ill-considered".

Ahead of the event, where he will be joined by Scottish leader Anas Sarwar, Starmer said: "At this election, Scotland can turn the page on an era of economic turmoil under the Tories and the SNP.

"Our changed Labour Party can deliver economic stability, unlock wealth creation and create high-quality jobs in the industries of the future.

"Scotland deserves leadership that matches the ambition of the people."

Swinney's strategy on indy suffers TV grilling

JOHN Swinney last night refused to say what will happen to independence if the SNP does not win a majority of seats at the general election.

The Nationalists have said winning a majority of constituencies would give "democratic effect" to independence talks.

But the SNP leader would not say on BBC's Question Time that his party taking less than half the seats would mean that Scotland had rejected independence.

He was repeatedly asked but refused to properly address the question.

Opinion polls have suggested that the SNP could lose dozens of seats to Labour and end up in second place.

Presenter Fiona Bruce asked the First Minister if he would take a majority of non-SNP MPs as "a democratic decision that you shouldn't be pursuing independence".

He refused to address the question and said: "What I want to make sure is that the legitimate decisions of the people in Scotland in the election in 2021, when a Scottish Parliament was elected with a majority of members favouring independence and a referendum, that that can actually be respected by the United Kingdom."

When it was put to him that not winning a majority of seats would be the public giving him a "red light" over independence, he again refused to answer.

He said: "I want people in Scotland to confidently vote for the SNP to make sure we can turn that manifesto into a reality."

When pushed later on what getting less than half of seats would mean, he refused to properly address the question.

Swinney said: "What I want to do during the election campaign is to encourage people to vote for the SNP to enable us

Bruce then asked him if he would finally answer the question. Swinney replied: "What I'm saying is I want people to vote for the SNP..."

Bruce then cut him off and moved to the next question.

Swinney was speaking in a BBC Question time General Election special.

The programme also featured Lib Dem leader Ed Davey, Labour leader Keir Starmer and Conservative Prime Minister Rishi Sunak.

Swinney also admitted the SNP had to "rebuild trust" with the people.

It comes after Peter Murrell, the party's former chief executive and ex-first minister Nicola Sturgeon's husband, was charged with embezzlement of the party's finances.

Sturgeon and former treasurer Colin Beattie were also arrested and released without charge as part of the probe.

Swinney said: "We've had a very tough time as a party in the last couple of years."

He added: "It has been a turbulent time and I would be the first to accept that.

"My party's asked me to lead it through this election campaign and beyond the 2026 parliamentary elections to do two things.

"First of all, to rebuild trust between the electorate and the SNP and secondly to provide the direction that's necessary in the Scottish Government to change people's lives."

SCOTLAND'S housing emergency is the "defining issue of our times", John Swinney has been warned.

A coalition of charities and housing groups has today shared an open letter calling on the Scottish Government to take action to cut the number of children stuck in temporary accommodation.

Organisations including Shelter Scotland and the Scottish Federation of Housing Associations (SFHA) said they recognised SNP ministers had already set out "ambitious" strategies to reduce homelessness.

But they warned the plans had been "fatally undermined" by spending cuts at Holyrood and Westminster and a lack of political will to fund a shift away from crisis intervention and towards prevention-based work.

It comes after eight councils in Scotland – including Glasgow and Edinburgh have so far declared a housing emergency Ministers have a as they are unable to meet demand.

Around 10,000 show us what they children are living with their families in temporary residences, such as B&Bs and hotels, due to the lack of social housing available nationwide.

The open letter to Swinney said the coalition had "no confidence" existing plans can deliver results unless the First Minister is willing to invest political capital in changing course.

The organisations believe the number of children in temporary accommodation could be reduced by as much as a quarter by the end of the year if the supply of new social homes is "urgently increased".

They also want existing homelessness services to be "fully funded".

Shelter Scotland director Alison Watson said: "The First Minister has made clear he wants to eradicate child poverty, so it's vital the Scottish Government prioritises action which reduces the untold harm caused by the housing emergency to the 10,000 children trapped in temporary accommodation.

"Having declared a housing emergency, ministers now have a responsibility to show us what they're going to do differently in tackling it. Things can't just continue as before - we need to see a new approach."

SFHA chief executive Sally Thomas accommodation said: "The Scottish Government urgently

 $needs \, to \, increase \, the \, supply \, of \, new \, social$ homes. This can only start by fully reversing successive hammer-blow cuts to the affordable homes programme and showing an iron-clad commitment to publicly funding social homes.

"Scotland's housing emergency is the defining issue of our times. We're simply asking you to not let Scotland down."

Chris Birt, of the Joseph Rowntree Foundation, said: "Child poverty cannot be eradicated while so many children in Scotland don't have a place to call home.

"Fundamentally, our homes must be the foundation from which we can explore our potential and feel safe."

Jane Wood, Homes for Scotland chief executive, said: "Significant challenges, particularly the planning and wider consenting system, continue

to impact the deliverability of the high quality, energy efficient and sustainable homes Scotland needs.

With a new

leadership in place, this is an ideal opportunity for the Scottish Government to undertake a positive policy reset." The Scottish Government faced a

backlash earlier this year after it voted through a £196million cut to its affordable housing budget.

Housing Minister Paul McLennan said: We know the number of children in temporary accommodation is too high and that lengthy stays in temporary accommodation are not good for the wellbeing of families.

"£80million of funding will enable social landlords to secure larger family houses where needed, helping households with children find a permanent home.

'We are consulting with Cosla to determine how best to allocate additional support to local authorities with the greatest temporary challenges.

Swinney sorry for patients in corridors

JOHN Swinney has apologised "unreservedly" for patients being treated in hospital corridors.

At First Minister's Questions yesterday, Scottish Labour leader Anas Sarwar raised a recent report

which found overcrowding in Scotland's hospitals had led to more than half of A&Es caring for patients who were not in wards or rooms.

The Royal College of Emergency Medicine report also estimated 1000 deaths have occurred because of delayed treatment so far this year.

Sarwar said: "Imagine you or one of your loved ones lying on a trolley for hours. No privacy, no dignity. Just pain and distress.

"After 17 years of

this SNP government, why has corridor care become so commonplace?"

Swinney apologised but said the "challenges" facing the NHS were driven by the aftermath of Covid and the shortage of social care packages for patients leaving hospital, due to a shortage of staff in the walks of Previt

in the wake of Brexit.
Swinney added: "The issues we are wrestling with are significant and acute and the government and our health boards are focussed on addressing that.

"Let me say to Mr Sarwar that if anybody is treated in the fashion that he has recounted - and I have seen media reports this morning of a particular case at the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital - that I apologise unreservedly to anybody who has that experience.

"And I assure members of the

public and their families that the government is doing all that it possibly can to address that."

The Glasgow Times had reported how an 80-year-old man was put in a hospital storage room, where he remained for hours, after suffering a stroke.

Sarwar hit back, saying it was the same old story from the SNP, adding: "Nothing actually changes in terms of people's lived experiences.

"Let's be clear - long waits cost lives. The Royal College of Emergency Medicine has warned that for every 72 patients who wait over eight hours in A&E, there will be one excess death.

"That's a death that could be avoided if the patient had been treated on time.

"That means so far this year more than 1000 Scots have died who could have been saved had they been treated on time."

Swinney repeated that the "increase in demand after Covid" and the lack of staff were the

causes of the problem.
The SNP leader then attacked
Sarwar's pledge from the Scottish
Labour manifesto launch, where
he committed to avoid raising
taxes if he becomes first minister
after the 2026 Holyrood election.

Swinney said: "The consequences of his stance will be to reduce public expenditure.

"So, it is quite simply beyond credibility to come here and ask me to invest more money in the NHS, to tackle the issues that Mr Sarwar is concerned about, when he wants to cut public expenditure and any prospective UK government will also be cutting public expenditure."

Reverse terrible cuts to housing

THE housing crisis which Scotland is facing is certainly one of the defining issues of our times.

Eight Scottish councils – including our two biggest cities – have so far declared a housing emergency.

These local authorities have not been able to meet demands for affordable accommodation. Far too many children are living in B&Bs and hotels rather than a permanent home of their own.

At the same time, rents are rocketing, particularly in Glasgow and Edinburgh. This puts more and more people at risk of homelessness.

It all stems from a severe lack of social accommodation. The Scottish Government acknowledged there is a problem when it declared a nationwide housing emergency last month.

But this has been completely undermined by the terrible decision to slash the housebuilding budget in December.

They are saying one thing but doing another at the same time. We back the charities which have called on the Scottish Government to take action to reduce the number of children stuck in temporary accommodation.

John Swinney said he wanted to eradicate child poverty when he became First Minister and he has put it at the heart of the general election campaign.

So he must take action to reduce the untold harm that the housing emergency has had on our children. He and his ministers have a responsibility to Scotland's young people.

Scotland's young people.

They should start by fully reversing the awful cuts to the housebuilding programme and pledge to publicly fund social homes.

If the Scottish Government does not do this it will be letting our children down.

"Work continues to identify the root cause."

Firms admit health and safety breaches

A SHERIFF has fined two firms more than £350,000 after a lorry driver was crushed to death under concrete

Conor Morgan, 45, had been delivering the material to a building site in Blantyre, Lanarkshire.

An investigation found no one had been expecting him at the site due to an administrative error which

At Hamilton Sheriff Court, Conor's Newrybased employer Re-Gen Waste and Edinburgh's Avant Homes Ltd admitted breaching health and safety

Avant pled guilty to failing to ensure there was a safe system of work at the site while Re-Gen accepted it failed to make risk assessments for drivers delivering goods to sites not under its control.

Sheriff John Hamilton KC fined Avant £333,000 and Re-Gen £23,000.

He said: "The failure was an extremely important, albeit administrative, matter to be processed correctly and the failure to do so meant responsibility for the site was with Avant.

"Failure to do so cannot, in my opinion, be described as minor, it was a major and significant error made by the company and the error led to a significant risk of serious harm."

He branded Re-Gen's failure a "completely technical" breach of health and safety laws.

Shockwaves help hearts regenerate

FAKER'S HUSBAND NO5 RELIVES ORDEAL

A NOTORIOUS bigamist wife forced one of her husbands into a psychiatric unit after convincing doctors he was mentally ill.

Sick fantasist Lisa Davies targeted 47-year-old Mike Hughes soon after she'd snared husband number four, care assistant Neil Annis.

Last week we revealed how Davies, 43, had falsely claimed to be a GP, critical care doctor and senior nurse in Northern Ireland, England and Wales.

She claimed also to be an ICU paediatric nurse in Belfast while lying that her own daughter, who is alive and well, died 13 years ago after a head-on collision with a lorry.

She has used more than 20 aliases and two dates of birth to trick unwitting men.

Another of her victims, Scots bus driver Peter Knight, spoke out last week to warn other men to avoid her clutches.

He married Davies, 43, at Gretna Green last July after he fell for false claims that she was a doctor.

But the marriage was exposed as a sham when Peter, 63, from St Andrews, learned she had a previous conviction



for bigamy. The mum-of-five
– known to Peter as Alisa – had
also gone off with another man
for a non-binding marriage
ceremony in Bali 18 days
after she and Peter
first met in September

Peter received a text on their wedding day from the family of her fifth husband warning him about Davies

shady HUBBY No4 Neil Annis history. Speaking about his mental health unit nightmare, Mike Hughes, who was her most recent victim, said: "It was terrifying. This period of my life was the most frightening I ever experienced.

^{*}I feel ashamed and embarrassed to this day about it, and how I ended up in there.

"I was locked in a room, I was checked by staff to ensure I was not a danger to myself and I was drug tested and interviewed repeatedly.

*I was in a secure mental hospital trying to convince the staff I wasn't mad. I feel lucky to have gotten out of there. I was taken there by Lisa and I later found out that while I was locked up, she was starting another relationship."

Mike's release from the secure hospital culminated in the end of the couple's relationship and instead of going back home to rebuild his life, he moved in with an aunt while Davies stayed in his rented property.

Unknown to Mike at the time, Davies had already made contact online with senior care assistant Neil Annis, who knew nothing of her past and would become husband No4. Police are now investigating Davies over her life of fantasy. Over the years she has used more than 20 aliases, two dates of birth and has had three weddings at Gretna Green.

She told her last three husbands she was a GP as well as other senior medical roles.

The General Medical Council and the South Eastern NHS Trust in Northern Ireland, where she briefly worked in a non-medical role, have confirmed she is not and has never been a doctor or licensed medic.

The GMC said: "If an individual is giving the impression they hold registration or a licence with us, when they don't, or there is evidence they are carrying out a privileged activity while unlicensed, then this is a criminal offence in the UK and should be reported to the police."

Lisa Jane Davies was born in South Wales in 1981 and has worked as a care assistant, fast food server and office worker.

She is currently living in Belfast but on social media claims to be "Alisa Ali" and "living in Dubai".

She has now been reported to the PSNI and Police Scotland, Northern Ireland's Health Trusts and the HSCNI by her sixth husband Peter over the false GP claims.

In response to the claims presented to her, she said: "These accusations are untrue."

Blood disease Cases up 760% in last 20 years Miracle drug approved in Scotland SUFFERERS of a blood disease whose numbers are soaring are being helped by a miracle drug. There were 48 cases of sickle cell drug voxeloror on the NHS, which it is showed will be for a huge improvement of the state of the s

There were 48 cases of sickle cell disease in Scotland in 2005 but the most recent figures show numbers have risen to 413 - a rise of 760 per cent in less than 20 years.

The Scottish Medicines Consortium has now approved the use of the new

drug voxelotor on the NHS, which it is hoped will bring huge improvements to the lives of sufferers.

Sickle cell disease causes sufferers' red blood cells to be shaped like sickles or crescent moons, making it harder to carry oyxgen around the body.

The cells also become rigid and sticky, which can slow or block blood flow.

It leaves sufferers with chronic anaemia and episodes of crippling pain called crises, which can be life-threatening. In hospital they are given

strong painkillers such as morphine to control the pain, intravenous therapy and antibiotics. Some need regular blood transfusions.

The inherited disease originally affected those of African descent but it has now been found in all races.

Daniella Williams, 24, whose parents are Nigerian, described the pain as "stabbing yourself with a fork, then someone drags it up and down while someone jabs you with a knife covered in poison and the poison spreads".

She added: "During a

crisis we are dying every single time. If a blood clot travels to our brains or our hearts, we die.

You have it from birth until you die. It could be the thing that kills you."

The Sickle Cell Society said voxelotor transformed the way people living with the condition were able to live their lives, bringing improvements in physical and mental health.

Its chief executive, John James, said the SMC decision had brought "a great deal of hope to people with sickle cell in Scotland".

Daniella, who is on a NatWest apprenticeship scheme, said: "I'm overwhelmed with relief and joy the drug is in Scotland.

"For people like me, living with sickle cell, it brings hope of a better quality of life and less time spent in acute pain in a hospital bed."



And consumer tests found some were better than many more expensive brands.

Which? found Lidl's Cien Sun Spray SPF30, costing £3.29 for 200ml, "triumphed" in the testing and did an "all-round excellent job" of protecting skin.

And Aldi's Lacura SPF30 Sun Lotion, costing just £2.49 for 200ml, also passed internationally recognised SPF and UVA tests.

But pricier products from Calypso and Bondi Sands did not match the claimed levels of sun protection.

Natalie Hitchins, head of home products and services at consumer champion Which?, said: "It is incredibly concerning that

some big brands failed our tests and did not offer the level of sun protection claimed on the packaging.

"However, it is great to see cheaper top-quality sunscreen options available on the high street and in supermarkets.

Among big supermarket brands, Which? said Asda's Protect Moisturising Sun Lotion SPF30 High, at £2.80 for 200ml, failed to provide

Asda said it had the product retested and it passed, adding: "We do not recognise the test results Which? has published."

Calypso Šun said: "All products are carefully and independently tested, and have passed EU standards and regulations."

Bondi Sands did not respond to a request from Which? for comment.



Attack made writing 'hard' for Rushdie

AUTHOR Sir Salman Rushdie has said the impact of a knife attack has made it physically and mentally harder to write.

Rushdie, 77, was stabbed multiple times and suffered severe and life-changing injuries in New York in 2022, leaving him blind in one eye and unable to use one of his hands.

The Satanic Verses writer survived an assassination attempt in 1989 after a fatwa calling for his death was issued by Iranian leader Ayatollah Khomeini in the same year.

Speaking to BBC Radio 4's This Cultural Life, he said that when writing he "hopes it will not get in the way of what I want to do next", and added that injuries to his eye and hand had made "everything harder".

DECLINE Capercaillie

PUTTING down food near capercaillie eggs to draw away predators could help save it from extinction, says a study. BY PAUL CARGILL

It is believed there are only about 500 of the ground-nesting birds left in the wild in the UK and $its\,decline\,has\,been\,partly\,blamed$ on predators such as pine marten eating their eggs and chicks.

Researchers seeking a non-lethal way to stop predators from targeting capercaillie, which itself is also protected, placed artificial

Experts feed up predators in bid to save capercaillie

nests filled with chicken eggs in the Cairngorms then left deer meat near half of them to see if this would discourage them from foraging further.

The study showed putting meat put down near nests with eggs increased their survival chances by 83 per cent, showing this could prove vital in saving the species.

Scotland and RSPB Scotland have already begun to deploy the tactic in bird breeding areas.

Jack Bamber, from Aberdeen University, who led the research, said: "Our study provides a timely solution for a conservation emergency, with implications for any place capercaillie call home."

Richard Mason, site manager

Bodies such as Forestry and Land at RSPB Scotland Abernethy, said: 'Capercaillie are struggling in Scotland and we need innovative solutions to be developed and implemented quickly for their

populations to recover.
"We hope that, alongside habitat restoration and other work, diversionary feeding helps to secure a future for capercaillie in Scotland."

Deliberate blazes leave fire service stretched

FIRE crews dealt with more BY SARAH WARD than 40 deliberate fires every day last summer, figures show.

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) warned of a "needless drain on resources" if the pattern repeats itself this summer.

Between June 1 and August 31 last year, 3904 deliberate fires were recorded in Scotland averaging 43 daily. Of those,

694 involved a casualty or a rescue, or needed five or more appliances to attend.

Assistant chief officer David Lockhart, SFRS's director of prevention, protection and preparedness, said: "Deliberate firesetting is not only reckless and dangerous but can divert SFRS resources away from genuine emergencies."

The service works closely


with Police Scotland and Fearless, a dedicated youth service of the charity Crimestoppers, to identify those responsible.

HOSE drooping blue eyes, the grin that could go from playful to menacing in a flicker, and that silky baritone voice made him a Hollywood great.

Actor Donald Sutherland leaves a legacy of nearly 200 films and TV shows following his death yesterday aged 88.

He passed away in Miami, Florida, after a short illness.

Long considered among the best never to have been nominated for an Academy Award, Sutherland loved to work and had a career that stretched over six decades.

Son Kiefer broke the news online, saying: "With a heavy heart, I tell you that my father has passed away.

"I personally think one of the most important actors in the history of film. "Never daunted by a role, good, bad or BY CHRISTOPHER BUCKTIN

ugly. He loved what he did and did what he loved, one can never ask for more than that. A life well lived."

Sutherland worked regularly up until his death. "I love to work. I passionately love to work," he said in 1998.

"I love to feel my hand fit into the glove of some other character. I feel a huge freedom – time stops for me.

Tm not as crazy as I used to be but I'm still a little crazy."

His range was as tall as his 6ft 4in frame, equally comfortable as a zany oddball, icy tyrant or bereaved father.

Sutherland recalled that while growing up in Canada, he once asked his mother if he was good-looking, only to be told: "No, but your face has a lot of character."

He recounted how he was rejected for a role by a producer saying: "This part



calls for a guy-next-door type. You don't look like you've lived next door to anyone."

Born in Saint John, a fishing village in New Brunswick, he was one of four children to his mathematician mother Dorothy and salesman dad Frederick.

He survived a series of childhood diseases, including infantile paralysis, rheumatoid fever and spinal meningitis before attending Victoria University, an affiliated college of the University of Toronto, where he studied engineering but switched to drama.

His love of acting began in a Nova Scotia movie theatre but his film aspirations seemed too lofty, so he tried his luck in theatre instead.

"It's not that theatre was my first love. My first love was just to be an

actor," he later said. "I was kind of dumb and cowish, and I didn't think movies were something I could ever be part of. I don't know why I presumed that the theatre would be. It was more ordinary, I suppose."

He headed to the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art in 1956 but he dropped out because he disliked its psychological approach to acting.

He broke through in Hollywood with a small role in the 1967 World War II classic The Dirty Dozen.

"I was a glorified extra," he said.
"They hired legitimate actors to play
the bottom six of the dozen.

"You with the big ears – you do it!" he recalled the director, Robert Aldrich, yelling at him after he replaced an actor. "He didn't even know my name," Sutherland said. His

breakthrough came in 1970 with Robert Altman's satirical war film, M.A.S.H., where he portrayed sceptic surgeon Captain "Hawkeye" Pierce.

Sutherland identified with its antiwar message. Outspoken against the Vietnam War, he founded Free Theatre Associates with Jane Fonda in 1971.

fter then playing neurotic platoon commander Oddball in Kelly's Heroes, the roles catapulted him to fame.

Sutherland put in a powerhouse performance as a detective in Klute in 1971 opposite Fonda's call girl. Two years later, in Don't Look Now, the actor delivered a haunting performance that remains one of the most critically acclaimed of his career.

His portrayal of the John Baxter in

the supernatural thriller is cited as a masterclass in subtle, understated acting. From the dystopian sci-fi classic Invasion of the Body Snatchers in 1978 to his comedic turn in Animal House, he defied typecasting.

Other memorable roles in major films include playing a grieving father in Robert Redford's Ordinary People in 1981.

More lately, his role as ruthless President Snow in The Hunger Games introduced him to younger fans.

He was bestowed with an honorary Oscar in 2017. He also had an Emmy and two Golden Globes.

But the dearth of accolades didn't trouble him.

Among the tributes that poured in, director Ron Howard said: "One of the most intelligent, interesting

and engrossing film actors of all time."

Dame Helen Mirren said: "Donald Sutherland was one of the smartest actors I ever worked with."

Beyond his acting, Sutherland was devoted to his family. He married his first wife, Lois Hardwick, in 1959, but they split and he wed Shirley Douglas in 1966. They had twins Rachel, a production manager, and actor Kiefer.

Sutherland then married Francine Racette in 1972 and they had three sons, Roeg, Rossif, and Angus.

He was also an advocate for causes such as environmental conservation, human rights and healthcare reform.

Despite his star status, Sutherland remained a man known for his humility, warmth and wit as much as that prodigious, effortless talent.

I Am: Celine Dion

THE Voice is back. Not fully - Celine Dion is still battling the debilitating effects of Stiff Person Disease. But this is the soundtrack to her new documentary, and a statement of intent.

Celine has vowed to return to live performances later this year for the first time since March 2020.

This compilation packs in the huge emotional power ballads that made the French-Canadian singer a 1990s superstar and more recently a Vegas fixture.

Hits like Because You Loved Me and My Heart Will Go On forever associated with 1997's Titanic movie - have extra poignancy now.

Celine lost her husband and her brother in 2016, and was



then forced to stop singing live by her rare neurological disorder.

Last year's moving piano ballad Love Again was part of the healing process.

She sings, "The sun will rise again, the storms subside again/ This is not the end, and you will love again."

This 20-song album ranges from her 1993 cover of Jennifer Rush's The Power Of Love - her first US chart-topper - to upbeat belters like River Deep Mountain High where the sheer potency of that unmistakable voice shines through.


There are four French numbers, including her sublime 1995 signature tune, Pour Que Tu M'Aimes Encore, and the more recent J'Irai Ou Tu Iras, a Meatloaf-lite rocker.

There are also seven original instrumental tracks, composed for the doc by cellist Redi Hasa.

Dion has had an incredible career. A professional singer at 14, she has sold more than 250million albums since her 1981 French language debut - 60m of them in 1997 and 98 alone.

For a time, it became fashionable to dismiss Celine as humourless - she isn't - and somehow naff. These songs remind you of her remarkable talent.

Tragic but triumphant, The Voice will go on.



Moby Always Centered At Night

THE world's best-loved techno-pop vegan is in a downbeat mood on his 22nd album. The tracks are lush but snoozy and largely forgettable. Highs include Where Is Your Pride? with late dub-poet Benjamin Zephaniah reciting lyrics over a breakbeat, the clubby Should Sleep, and the morosely soulful Transit featuring Gaidaa.

KENTUCKY-born Carly ups the stakes with a confident fourth album packed with personality. She co-wrote all but one of the 14 tracks, ranging from the feisty Heels Over Head to bluegrass ballads. Country Music Made Me Do It is a tongue-in-cheek hymn to going off the rails. Classy, catchy country pop soused in moonshine.



King & Country Unsung Hero

THE Aussie-born US brothers took their name from an English battle cry and chalked up platinum sales. This guest-studded soundtrack from their new biopic refreshes 90s songs. 

THE BIKERIDERS

nspired by photojournalist Danny Lyon's 1968 book dedicated to the camaraderie of the Chicago Outlaws Motorcycle Club, The Bikeriders lights a slow-burning fuse on doomed romance and lawlessness at a pivotal moment in American history.

The Vietnam War casts a long shadow over writer-director Jeff Nichols' wistful drama, which is framed as a series of interviews in 1965 and 1973 between Lvon (Mike Faist) and a straight-talking young woman named Kathy (Jodie Comer), who gatecrashes a testosterone-soaked fraternity on two wheels founded by truck driver Johnny (Tom Hardy). She falls in love with biker Benny (Austin Butler) and they

marry five weeks into their courtship. Alas, love is no match for the siren song of a revved motorcycle engine.

Comer vividly embodies her chatterbox with an unfaltering, melodic accent that imbues her narration with warmth and humour. On-screen chemistry with Oscar-nominated Elvis star Butler smoulders and Hardy leverages his imposing physicality to dominate scenes as the motorcycle club founder who insists that challenges to his

I AM: CELINE DION

IN December 2022, award-winning singer Celine Dion posted a video on her Instagram account revealing she had been diagnosed with a rare neurological disorder, stiff person syndrome (SPS), which causes her muscles to spasm. Dion cancelled the remaining dates of her



world tour to concentrate on her health and caring for twin sons Nelson and Eddy.

In the face of this life-altering illness, Dion allows cameras to document the unvarnished and deeply unsettling truth about SPS, which affects around one in a million people.

Academy Award-nominated director Irene Taylor captures deeply distressing footage of a seizure that escalates from a spasm in one foot to crisis point with Dion issuing guttural screams of pain from inside her rigid body as medical staff rush to her aid.

'If I can't run, I'll walk. If I can't walk, I'll crawl. But I won't stop," tearfully proclaims Dion, who is advised that sound and stress are two key triggers of her condition. Home video footage and rare photographs bookmark childhood reminiscences and Dion's humour shines through during a visit to a warehouse where she stores old costumes ("When a girl loves her shoes, she makes them fit!"). She walks tall and defiant in Taylor's heartbreaking documentary.



THE EXORCISM

Cert 15 ** In cinemas now

AT the beginning of The Exorcism, Russell Crowe's lapsed Catholic sits in a confessional booth and pleads forgiveness for his sins, which include "climbing inside a bottle for a couple of years" when he should have been caring for his

His poorly written character might also consider atonement for the unholy mess of Joshua John Miller's disjointed horror, a half-baked film-within-a-film conceit that unleashes pure evil on the set of an ill-advised remake of The Exorcist, codenamed The Georgetown Project, which a bullying director (Adam Goldberg) loftily describes as "a psychological drama wrapped in the skin of a horror".

Aside from a couple of efficient jump scares, spine-tingling thrills are conspicuous by their absence. The plot careens off the rails in the final 20 minutes and flickers of discomfort are extinguished and replaced with bewilderment and frustration.

A thorny subplot concerning historic sexual abuse at the hands of Catholic priests is mishandled and the LGBTQ+ love story feels like an afterthought to loosely tether two female protagonists.

When it comes to editors Gardner Gould and Matthew Woolley performing a modern-day miracle and conjuring coherence from the escalating madness, alas those prayers go unanswered. Heaven help us all.

SOMETHING IN THE WATER

Cert **15** In cinemas now

IT has not been safe to go into the water since 1975 when director Steven Spielberg terrorised the fictional New England island of Amity with a flesh-hungry, great white shark.

Jaws concealed its titular terror by necessity because the mechanical prop sharks malfunctioned on location in the Atlantic Ocean.

The digitally rendered predator in Something In The Water is also absent for prolonged periods, forcing two-dimensional characters to tread water as director Hayley Easton Street merrily sets sail with a leaky script.

Dialogue capsizes from the moment a stricken bride-to-be loudly narrates her dire predicament ("You brought us to shark-infested waters the day before my wedding?") when she should be dreaming of tiger prawns and sea bass, not becoming fish food herself.

When a shark fin does surface here. it telegraphs the unhurried demise of the next protagonist without a compelling backstory.

A burst of Reach by S Club 7 provides heavy-handed foreshadowing. "We've got to all stick together/Good friends are there for each other..." harmonise the pop outfit.

NATWEST has struck a deal to buy most of Sainsbury's Bank.

NatWest take on about £1.4billion of unsecured personal loans, £1.1billion of credit card balances, and about £2.6billion of customer deposits.

As a result, NatWest expects to acquire around one million customer accounts.

Sainsbury's announced in January that it was winding down its banking division to focus on its retail business, nearly 27 years after it launched.

In February, Barclays agreed a £600million deal to buy most of Tesco Bank. Both stores were among retailers that made a push into financial services in the 1990s, initially through tie-ups with long established banks.

The NatWest sale is expected to complete in the first half of next year.

Sainsbury's said there

customers' terms and conditions, adding they

"do not need to take any action".

The sale does not include the Sainsbury's Banks' commission income businesses, such as insurance, cash points and travel money.

Simon Roberts, Sainsbury's boss, said: 'Today's news means we will focus all our time and resources going forward on growing our core retail business.

Paul Thwaite, NatWest Group chief executive, said it had "a strong track record of successful integration, and we are focused on ensuring a smooth transition for customers".

William Woods, analyst at Bernstein, said: "We believe this is a good outcome for Sainsbury's after a long sale period where it struggled to find a buyer.

SHARES in polling giant YouGov crashed more than 46 per cent yesterday after it issued a profit warning.

The company, founded by former Tory chancellor Nadhim Zahawi, said it has seen "lower sales bookings than anticipated" since releasing its half-year figures.

As a result, it now expects profits for the year to the end of July to be between £41million and £44million, down from £48.3million in 2023.

The tough trading comes despite pollsters being kept busy during the General Election.

Troutstanding day

I HELPED my friend move house across the water this week, well across the Erskine Bridge and into **Dunbartonshire.**

Pastures new mean fresh waters though and, in exchange for lifting couches and boxes, I got a guest pass on to his new club water plus a few beers to celebrate.

It's a fair hike up the hill but even if you just take the rods for a walk up and around it's a tranquil place to be.

Tucked away in the hills high above the town, brown trout only, views for miles and rarely fished you'd be hard pushed to find a nicer setting especially when there's enough breeze to put a ripple on the water and keep the midgies at bay.

The tactic is meant to be the usual tradition pulling patterns, bushy wets on the top dropper slim profile or winged wet on the second dropper and point. Bibio, Silver Invicta and Black Pennel is pretty much my go to switching up as and when with Zulus, Pearly variations and the

This evening though they weren't interested in chasing, only a couple of little wild fish were hitting the wake pattern but there were clearly bigger fish rising across the dam.

Rather than covering ground and blind casting we moved around, switching up to more small stillwater technique using dries like Klinkhammer Daddy, Shuttlecock Buzzer and Bubble Caddis to target rising fish.

As the sun set, the wind dropped and it was clear they were hunting further out, sipping at hatching insects and splashing rises at terrestrials that had been blown on to the water.

Insect repellent applied, leaders thoroughly degreased and a few good fish caught before it got too dark to tie knots.

There's something very satisfying about tracking fish as they rise, working out where they're patrolling and pre-empting by casting in the direction they're swimming rather than landing where they've been. It's all too easy to focus on the ripples of the last rise or land your line right over the back of the fish, lines splashing about or even throwing a shadow over trout spooks them into thinking there's predators about.

You'll notice the rise dies down around you and starts just a bit away but if you're not carefully casting or wading it's like trying to get to the end of a rainbow.

I love little waters like these, there are lots of them dotted around the country controlled by local angling associations.

You'll probably never catch a monster in there but there's a sense of community and ownership plus work parties, competitions and maybe a summer barbeque to get

Draper





HARRY KANE says it's time for England to keep calm and carry on after boring their way to a drab draw with Denmark.

The Three Lions skipper gave Gareth Southgate's team a perfect start with the opener in Frankfurt inside 18 minutes.

But just like they did in their Group C opener with Serbia, the Auld Enemy failed to build on that opening as they dropped their early tempo.

The lack of English intensity served only to invite the Danes to have a go and Morten Hjulmand didn't need to be asked twice, rifling a 30-yard peach in off the post.

From there, England tried to raise the energy levels but in reality it was all bark and no bite as Kasper Hiulmand's team claimed a deserved point.

Kane knows there is bound to be another hysterical reaction down south to his team's tepid start — but he's vowed to keep things in perspective ahead of Tuesday's final group clash with Ślovenia in Cologne.

He said: "There's no easy games in tournament football. That's showing. There's levels we can reach and we can be better both win and without the ball, no question.

But the sign of a good team is that when you're not at your best you find a way to get results, which is what we've done in the last two games.

'We're top of the group and all but qualified, which is the No.1 objective. We know we can improve and I know there will probably be lots of noise and a bit of disappointment - but we experienced that in the last Euros when we drew with

"I don't think it's just when we score. We are starting games well but when teams are dropping players deeper, maybe we're struggling to work out how to get the pressure on and who should be going to press.

'Credit to Denmark, they're a really good side who reached the semis in the last Euros. They caused us some threats but now it's time to look at where we can improve."

England stopper Kyle Walker backed his skipper and said: "It's tournament football, this is a good Denmark team. We are top of the group, so let's try and take the positive from this.

'We conceded a great strike from outside the box. Sometimes, you have to take your hat off to good goals."

Danish striker Andreas Skov Olsen said: "We played a very good game. We had great energy.

"I think we were on top of them for most of the game. Generally, we came up with an energy they couldn't match. We won our duels and had the chances to win it.

"Everybody did amazing today. It was a little bit needed for us, and we have been looking for this performance for quite a long time."





GARETH SOUTHGATE told his nation to blame him after England players were jeered by the fans following another insipid Euro display.

The Three Lions remain two points clear at the top of Group C, but they were lucky to escape with a draw after being outplayed and outfought by a Danish team that were $disappointed \, that \, they \, couldn \dot{'}t$ force a famous win.

Harry Kane gave England a dream start when he fired home in the 18th minute.

It was the Bayern Munich man's 13th tournament goal - a record for an Englishman.

But the captain was at fault in the 39th minute when his poor clearance led to Morten Hjulmand blasting Denmark level from 30 yards.

'To achieve extraordinary things, you have to go through some difficult moments. Today was a difficult moment without a doubt, towards the end of the game especially. We have to stay calm inside the group and find good solutions to improve it."



a 5-1 whipping, Scotland were panned by the critics and dismissed ås no-hopers.

That all changed in Cologne on Wednesday night when Gilmour and McGregor were reunited for the 1-1 draw with Switzerland which has breathed new life into Clarke's hopes of mounting a historic run into the knockout stages.

Put it this way, nobody is pointing and laughing at this side any more, not now that Jack and Victor are back together. And no one is happier about that than McGregor.

The Celtic skipper beamed: "Billy was excellent. When he comes in he takes the ball and gets us playing.

"I like playing beside him because he will take the ball and will start to connect the

game. At this level you need to have the ball, you can't just defend for 90 minutes. It's important that when you get it, you retain it.

Full credit to the players because it was a difficult day on Friday and we have bounced back and given ourselves a chance and we arrive into the last game with confidence that we can go through."

At various points throughout Wednesday night's match and particularly towards the end of the first half - McGregor and Gilmour assumed almost total control.

That's why Clarke's decision to make Gilmour sit the first one out is still difficult to unpack, even though the manager said it was always part of his masterplan to pick up four points from the last two games in Group A.

McGregor, though, might take some convincing.

He said: "In European football you have to have the ball. Other teams look after the ball so well and you come to the game and there is big energy, everyone is running, running, running.

"You need to be calm, have the ball and also take a rest with it as well.

'You can't just be flat out for 90 minutes chasing the ball because the teams at this level are too good.

Sometimes you need to breathe with the ball and put a few passes together. That got us to half-time and obviously we came out in the second half refreshed and with a bit more energy and we started to take

the game to them. Overall it was a much better performance and I think we can get even better than that as well.

"It was much more like the Scotland team we have been and how we qualified. Everyone left the pitch with no regrets. On a different night we could maybe have nicked it.

KYPRIOS, the 11-10 favourite, defied odds of "millions to one" to pull off Mission Impossible in the Gold Cup.

Two years ago, the Aidan O'Brientrained son of Galileo captured Royal Ascot's signature race to herald a ruthless domination of the stayers' division.

But the following spring Ballydoyle announced Kyprios would miss his Gold Cup defence as an infection to a fetlock joint threatened not just to end the horse's racing career — but his life.

The chestnut returned to the track with two seconds in the second half of the campaign, but a gladiatorial rival Trawlerman on a blazing Royal heath confirmed the six-year-old back to the peak of his powers.

"At one point, it didn't look like he was going to live," recounted O'Brien, registering a record ninth Gold Cup success.

"He got an infection in his joint, and it got into the joint capsule. Usually what happens is they lose the movement in the joint – and, for a while, he did.

"But it came back. Then it was getting him to stand, and then to walk, then to trot, then teaching him how to canter again, because he had

o move all his body in different ways gain.

"No horse has ever been X-rayed, scanned more in their life than him."

O'Brien reflected: "It was millions to one. It was really impossible for him to come back from what he came back from.

"Then, when he came back into training, it was every day, every day – was it moving? Was it changing? Was it getting better?

"It was unbelievable but he always had the most incredible mind. That was always his power, probably, his mind."

Kyprios had begun his 2024

campaign with victories at Navan and Leopardstown before his bid to become the third horse in the Gold Cup's 217-year history – after Anticipation (1816 & 1819) and Kayf Tara (1998 & 2000) – to get his title

Ryan Moore sent his mount to tackle the pacemaking Trawlerman with two furlongs of the two-and-a-half-mile challenge to run.

The leader fought back tenaciously but had to concede defeat as Kyprios forged to a one-length supremacy with a further five back to the runnerup's John and Thady Gosden stablemate, Sweet William.

Moore had no doubt his partner

RYAN MOORE broke Frankie Dettori's record of Royal Ascot victories aboard Ribblesdale Stakes heroine Port Fairy – and then declared: "Frankie's always been the best."

Moore began Wednesday level with his legendary friend and rival, now based in America after leaving Britain to continue his career in California, on the 81-winner mark at the glittering fixture.

But the 40-year-old became Royal Ascot's most prolific jockey as the Aidan O'Brien-saddled 12-1 shot defied Lava Stream to lift the Group 2 fillies' test by a neck.

"I remember Frankie when I was a kid, riding for my grandad at Brighton,' said Moore. "He's alwavs been the best in my eyes.

"And the only reason I've had that amount of winners is I've ridden for the two most successful trainers in the history of Ascot – Aidan and Sir Michael Stoute.

"It's all about the horses -I'm just lucky to be riding them." added the jockey, later triumphant aboard Kyprios in the Gold Cup.

"I wouldn't have even given it a thought. Every day, it's on to the next one.

Dettori (above) was on hand to cheer Going The **Distance**, carrying the colours of his friend Marc Chan, home in the King George V Handicap.

He put that debut to the best possible use when decisively defeating Painite at Nottingham.

The colt relished tackling six furlongs when thrashing Lake Forest in a Group 2 at Newmarket. However, he blew his chance by pulling too hard in the Group 1 Prix Morny at Deauville.

The three-year-old repeated that feat when a remote last of nine in the Middle Park back at HQ.

The speedster was much more professional when caning Adaay In Devon on his comeback here.

That was a red-hot Group 3 so the star can continue his revival on the expected fast conditions



TURKEY led for a total of six minutes in their five matches at Euro 2008 - and still came within seconds of reaching the final.

And their victory against Croatia in the last eight was among the most extraordinary in the tournament's history.

Turkey had reached the knockout stage by scoring a stoppage-time winner against Switzerland before striker Nihat Kahveci netted in the 87th and 89th minutes against the Czech Republic to turn defeat and elimination into a ridiculous 3-2 win.

But Fatih Terim's side were to surpass those victories for drama in the heartstopping quarter-final.

Slaven Bilic's Croatia, who had knocked England out in qualifying, dominated the match with Luka Modric outstanding. But they could not score the opening goal until the final minute of extra-time when Ivan Klasnic headed in a Modric cross.

seemingly taking them to the semis.

Turkey coach Terim later said: "After Croatia scored, I saw players lying on the pitch and I told Arda Turan to get the ball out of the goal and start again. I wasn't giving up. There is something special about this team.'

Semih Senturk then lashed a left-footed shot into the top corner with the last kick of extra-time to cap a crazy 60 seconds. But the Turks were not finished.

Turkey faced Germany in the semi-finals with only 14 players available because of injuries and suspensions. Another shock seemed possible when Semih equalised four minutes from time to make it 2-2.

But in another incredible finale, the tables were turned on the Turks as Philipp Lahm scored an 89th-minute winner.

SERBIA fought to keep their Euros dream alive in Munich - hours after threatening to quit the tournament altogether.

Luka Jovic snatched a last-gasp 96th-minute equaliser to salvage a point against Slovenia as stone-faced gaffer Dragan Stojkovic hailed his team's spirit.

Stojkovic issued a battle cry and said: "First of all, Serbs do not die so easily. We do not give up and will not give up.

"We believed all the way until the end and

the result came as a reward for believing."

Earlier in the day, the Serbian FA released a statement condemning UEFA's failure to punish Albania and Croatia supporters for anti-Serb chants in Hamburg.

They claim both sets of fans were singing: "Kill, kill, kill the Serb" during the second half of Wednesday's pulsating 2-2 thriller.

Tensions between the countries are still high after the Balkan war in the 1990s, which saw the break-up of the former Yugoslavia and the establishment of Kosovo, which has a population of 1.8million Albanians.

Serbia's general secretary Jovan Surbatovic said: "What happened is scandalous and we will ask UEFA for sanctions, even if it means not continuing the competition."

Boss Stojkovic refused to be drawn on the saga, claiming he wasn't aware of the statement.

He added: "Please, ask me something about the game. It's not my intention to talk about this, it's not important.

"Honestly speaking I didn't read anything. Believe it or not but I didn't."

During the game, Serbia had been left to rue so many scoring opportunities when Slovenia took the lead on 69 minutes.

Timi Max Elsnik, who fired against the woodwork in the first half, sent a dangerous ball flying across the face of goal for right-back Zan Karnicnik to turn home.

But Serbia continued to create chances at will. Mitrovic and Juventus striker Dusan Vlahovic couldn't buy a goal despite hitting a combined 58 for their respective clubs this season.

Mitrovic had nodded one wide of the mark at the back post before Jan Oblak made two top stops either side of half-time to deny the ex-Fulham frontman.
