Lok Sabha to witness rare contest for Speaker's post

NDA government and the INDIA group fail to arrive at a consensus candidate; Opposition parties field Kodikunnil Suresh of the Congress against the ruling front's candidate, Om Birla, for the post

The 18th Lok Sabha is all set to witness a rare contest for the Speaker's post on Wednesday between Om Birla of the BJP and Kodikunnil Suresh of the Congress after the National Democratic Alliance government and the INDIA bloc failed to arrive at a consensus.

On Tuesday, Congress leader K.C. Venugopal and DMK's T.R. Baalu from the Opposition and Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, Home Minister Amit Shah and Health Minister J.P. Nadda had met at Mr. Singh's office in Parliament to evolve a consensus.

However, with both sides sticking to their position, the two Opposition leaders walked out. Mr. Venugopal accused the government of not following the "convention" of an Opposition candidate for the Deputy Speaker's position.

The decision to field Mr. Birla, a third-term BJP MP from Kota, underlined the BJP-led NDA's theme of continuity as he had held the post last term too.

The INDIA bloc's nominee, Mr. Suresh, is an eight-term MP from Kerala and belongs to a Dalit community.

In Independent India, there are only three instances (in 1952, 1967 and 1976) when there was a voting for the Speaker's post. Congress leader Rahul

Sri Lankan Navy man dies in action against Indian fishing boats

A sailor from the Sri Lankan Navy was killed in an operation targeting Indian fishermen and their fishing vessel in the early hours of Tuesday, according to Sri Lankan authorities.

As many as 10 Indian fishermen – seven from Nagapattinam, one from Cuddalore in Tamil Nadu and two from Andhra Pradesh – were arrested on charges of illegal fishing in Sri Lankan waters, off Kankesanthurai, in the Jaffna peninsula. The bottom trawler they used was seized.

Following this, Tamil Nadu Chief Minister M.K. Stalin wrote to Union Minister for External Affairs S. Jaishankar, requesting that he convene the Joint Working Group to secure the release of all the fishermen and their fishing boats

from Lankan custody. He also insisted on measures to be taken to prevent such arrests in the future.

The Sri Lanka Navy said it had conducted a special operation to "chase away Indian poaching trawlers from Sri Lankan waters". While the unit arrested the fishermen and seized the trawler, a sailor from the Navy Special Boat Squadron was critically injured.

Starting Wednesday, the Karnataka Milk Federation (KMF) will sell an additional 50 ml of milk in half and one-litre packets of Nandini and charge ₹2 extra for the same.

While the Opposition condemned the price increase, which follows the petrol and diesel price hike, KMF said it was being done to help farmers as milk procurement had reached record levels this season, and there was "no real hike"; only additional milk was being charged extra. Now, a one-litre packet containing an additional 50 ml of the popular Nandini toned milk will cost ₹44 per litre, and a half-

'Moscow preparing for likely Modi visit'

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Railways to bring down speed of select Vande Bharat, Gatiman Express trains

CHENNAI

The Indian Railways will soon cut down the maximum speed of premium trains, including Vande Bharat and Gatiman Express, from the present 160 kmph to 130 kmph on select routes to ensure safety.

Highly placed railway sources told *The Hindu* on Tuesday that North Central Railway had written to the Railway Board to slow down Train no. 12050/12049 Delhi-Jhansi-Delhi Gatiman Express, 22470/22469 Delhi-Khajuraho-Delhi Vande Bharat Express, 20172/20171 Delhi-Rani Kamalapati-Delhi Vande Bharat Express, and

12002/12001 Delhi-Rani Kamalapati-Delhi Shatabdi Express trains.

Going by the proposal that was "desired to ensure safety", the speed of Gatiman and Vande Bharat Express trains will be reduced from 160 kmph to

130 kmph while that of Shatabdi Express will be cut down from 150 kmph to 130 kmph. This will result in an increase in running time by 25-30 minutes and lead to changes in the timings of at least 10 super-fast express trains on these

routes, the sources said.

Asked if the reduction in speed was due to the increasing number of accidents across the country, since the order was issued within a week of the Kanchanjunga Express accident, a senior railway official said the failure of Train Protection & Warning System (TPWS) on the Delhi-Agra-Jhansi routes was the reason the premium trains were being slowed down.

A Northern Railway proposal to dispense with TPWS or reduce speed of trains to 130 kmph was pending with the Board since November 6, 2023.

There have been 2,539 fatal electrical accidents in Karnataka in the last five years (between 2019-20 and 2023-24), according to the Electrical Inspectorate's data.

Apart from this, there have been 1,070 non-fatal electrical accidents, 2,534 fatal accidents pertaining to animals and 3,420 fire accidents (induced by electrical issues) in the last five years. However, the number of fatal and non-fatal electrical accidents was the lowest in 2023-24.

While there were 538 fatal accidents and 201 non-fatal accidents in

2022-23, the number came down to 473 and 169 respectively in 2023-24. A senior official from the Energy Department attributed the dip in the numbers to increased public awareness.

"We have created a lot of awareness among the public through street plays, media advertisements and even at the school level by organising painting and essay competitions around the theme of electrical safety," the official said.

Electrical Safety Week

In an effort to reduce these numbers further, the Electrical Inspectorate will observe 'National Electrical Safety

Week-2024' from June 26 to July 2. Chief Minister Siddaramaiah will kick-start the week on June 26, followed by a walkathon from Vidhana Soudha to K.R. Circle.

"We observe this every year to reduce electrical accidents as per Central Electricity Authority regulations 2023. The number of fire accidents especially is even more than fatal accidents, and these mostly occur in North Karnataka region," said T. N. Appachu, Chief Electrical Inspector.

He said both farmers and electricity supply companies (escoms) were at fault for these accidents. "50% of these accidents occur in the vicinity of su-

garcanne fields as lines are drawn over the fields, and they sag a lot. When sugarcane touch these wires, they snap and result in electrocution. More awareness is needed in these regards," Mr. Appachu said.

Electrical accidents also occur more in Low Tension installations rather than in High Tension installations. "In HT installations, there are designated personnel to look after electrical safety. However, in LT installations (domestic), especially in high-rise apartments, there is minimal regard for electrical safety. The Safety Week aims to create awareness among such consumers too," Mr. Appachu said.

Woman stabbed to death by male friend who later tries to end his life

BENGALURU

A 35-year-old woman was stabbed to death on Monday allegedly by her male friend at a house in Hosakote, who later tried to die by suicide on Tuesday. The deceased was identified as Hemavathy, a native of Andhra Pradesh.

According to the police, she was working as an attendant at a fuel station and was living in a rented house in Hosakote for the past four months. The accused, Venu, said to be her male friend, used to visit her frequently.

On Monday, he visited the house and had a heated argument with Hemavathy over a trivial row and stabbed her repeatedly be-

fore fleeing from the spot, said the police.

The murder came to light when neighbours noticed Hemavathy lying in a pool of blood and alerted the police. The Hosakote police rushed to the spot and shifted the body.

Meanwhile, Venu attempted to die by suicide by consuming poison after reaching his hometown Chintamani. Passers-by found him unconscious and shifted him to the Chickballapur district hospital where he is being treated. The police have registered a case of murder and waiting for Venu's recovery to ascertain the cause of murder.



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Authorities mull over fine for public urination in Cubbon Park

People usually go to Cubbon Park for their morning and evening walks and for picnics to enjoy the greenery. But many are irked by the unwelcome sight of public urination, even by some regular visitors.

Following demands for action, the Horticulture Department has now decided to impose a penalty of ₹100 on anyone caught urinating in public in the park.

"There are some regular walkers who relieve themselves in the park. There are also some who walk through the park to their workplaces and stop at the same spots to relieve themselves," said Sunitha Kumar, Cubbon Park Conservation Committee.

Demanding action from the Horticulture Department, which maintains Cubbon Park, Smitha Rao, another regular visitor, said: "Natural resources are available for our use and not abuse. If there is abuse, there needs to be action."

The Horticulture Department said that there are five pay-and-use toilets inside Cubbon Park, which are run by the Swachh City Foundation and the Save People Foundation. One is near Balbhavan, and the others are near the UB City entry gate, the K.R. Circle entry gate, behind the band stand, and near the Hudson Circle entry gate.

existing toilets and a lack of proper signage are also some things which need to be looked after by the department to reduce public urination instances.

"A couple of toilets do not open on time. For instance, one near Siddalingaiah Circle does not open until the morning batch of walkers are gone. Moreover, the conditions of the toilets are very bad, and even caregivers do not have proper areas to sit. There are no lady janitors also," Ms. Kumar said.

"They should also put up signages instructing people not to relieve themselves and also the directions for toilets," she added.

The department, although it did not have a penalty system until now, is considering implementing one soon.

"We will ask all our guards to pull up people who relieve themselves in the open and levy a penalty of ₹100. We will also put up signages," said D.S. Ramesh, Director, Horticulture Department.

Earlier, the meet was scheduled to be held in June. But it was postponed owing to the model code of conduct for the Lok Sabha elections. Now, the administration has decided to organise the event in December.

The Chief Minister will request Kannadigas to participate in the conference in large numbers.

A large number of Kannadigas from Karnataka, other States, and abroad are expected to participate in the event.

Dengue: 5,374 cases and five deaths reported in State

Amid a surge in dengue cases in Karnataka, Chief Minister Siddaramaiah on Tuesday directed officials to intensify fever surveillance and take up all necessary precautionary measures to prevent spread of the vector-borne disease.

The Chief Minister, who convened a meeting of officials from the BBMP and the Department of Health and Family Welfare, directed them to conduct special source reduction activities every Friday, by involving urban local bodies and the Rural Development and Panchayat Raj (RDPR) Department.

Cases, deaths

A total of 5,374 cases and five deaths have been reported in the State till June 24. While Bengaluru, Chikkamagaluru, Mysuru, Haveri, Shivamogga, Chitradurga, and Dakshina Kannada districts have reported a majority of the cases, 1,230 have been reported in BBMP limits alone.

While four of the deceased are children, one is a

32-year-old male. While two deaths have been reported from Hassan, one each has been reported from Shivamogga, Dharwad, and Haveri.

Reviewing the situation, the Chief Minister directed the officials to ensure availability of beds, drugs, testing kits, and other required equipment in all government hospitals. "According to the Government of India's guidelines, the dengue case fatality rate (CFR) should not exceed 0.5%. Karnataka's current dengue CFR is 0.09%, which is far less than the prescribed limit," the Chief Minister said.

He also directed the officials to conduct door-to-door surveys and create awareness among the public by roping in Accredited Social Health Activists, nursing students, NSS students, and other volunteers.

Increase testing

Health Minister Dinesh Gundu Rao, who held a meeting with Health officials prior to the Chief Minister's meeting, instructed them to test all those who report with dengue-like symptoms.

Police shoot at habitual offender who tried to escape from custody

The Madhugiri police opened fire and caught a 34-year-old habitual offender, who in a bid to escape from police custody allegedly attacked a constable while being escorted to the station on Tuesday.

The accused identified as Rizwan, a resident of Hindupur, has over 15 cases of chain snatching and robbery and was on the run. He was tracked down and arrested in Hoskote.

While being escorted to the station for inquiry, the accused allegedly requested the police to stop the vehicle near Seeghalli gate to relieve himself.

Considering his request, constable Ramesh escorted

him, but Rizwan allegedly attacked Ramesh with a beer bottle found on the side of the road and tried to escape, the police claimed.

Inspector Hanumantharayappa reportedly warned Rizwan to stop and fired a few rounds in the air as a warning before shooting at his leg. Both the injured Rizwan and constable Ramesh were rushed to a nearby hospital for treatment.

Rizwan along with his associate Chinna was involved in a series of chain-snatching incidents in the area for the past few months and was on the run.

Based on the information he gave, the police have recovered 480 grams of gold valuables and are further investigating the cases against him.

Udupi gang war case: Two accused to be shifted to another prison

In view of the reported assault attempt by two accused persons in the recent Udupi gang war case on district jail superintendent and personnel, the jurisdictional court ordered shifting them to another prison.

Udupi district jail officials said the accused, Mohammed Ashique and Mohammed Saklen, would be shifted to a central jail as directed by the department.

The accused had allegedly attempted to assault the jail personnel on Monday.

They reportedly verbally abused duty jailer S.A. Shirola for frivolous reason.

They also allegedly pushed personnel when being taken away from the jail superintendent's office. It was alleged that Saklen tried to assault the personnel, including Superintendent Siddarama B. Patil, with the wooden chair in his barrack and also with kitchen equipment.

NIMHANS develops yoga module that can reduce opioid dependence

A yoga module developed by the Integrated Centre for Yoga of National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences (NIMHANS) can be used as a low-cost and low-risk adjunct therapy to reduce substance use among Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) patients.

According to the Department of Science and Technology, opioids are natural, semi-synthetic, or synthetic chemicals that interact with opioid receptors in the body and brain and reduce the perception of pain. "Opioid use disorder is a severe substance use disorder. Dependence may be on prescription opioids (drugs such as codeine, tramadol, tapentadol, morphine) often given to ameliorate pain or street opioids (such as heroin, brown sugar)," the department added.

It added that the body becomes used to opioids and it can lead to severe withdrawal symptoms such as watering through eyes and nose, severe body aches, flu-like symptoms, sleeplessness, anxiety, and irritability. With chronic use, it can cause impairment in cognition, sexual dysfunction, severe impairment of social and occupational functions, and adds to the financial burden. In order to find an alternative to opioids for pain control, a study to develop a yoga module to reduce opioid use was carried out by Dr. Hemant Bhargava from Integrated Centre for Yoga, NIMHANS.

The yoga for substance use module developed with support from Science and Technology (SATYAM) programme of DST was tested for feasibility of application through tele-mode and inter-therapist reliability was established.

It was found that yoga increases gamma-aminobutyric acid levels in the brain, as well as oxytocin which contributes in the management of opioid withdrawal symptoms and the attenuation of relapse. It has also been found to be useful in enhancing prefrontal activation, reducing impulsivity, and promoting positive behavioural changes with better self-regulation.

In the initial clinical case study with nine-month follow-up, the module was found suitable for bringing relief to patients suffering from opioid dependence. Subsequently, a randomised controlled trial was performed with 60 subjects divided into two groups. One group performed yoga in addition to standard therapy, while another group took up exercise in addition to standard therapy.

After the 12 weeks of intervention, it was observed that subjects in the yoga group were 2.68 times more likely to show negative urine screening for opioids than the exercise group.

Commercial operations on the 3.7-km Green Line extension of Namma Metro from Nagasandra to Madavara in north Bengaluru are unlikely to begin before the end of September, as testing of various equipment and infrastructure is pending, according to Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCL) officials. Construction began in 2017, but work has been delayed. After missing multiple deadlines, commercial operations were expected to start by the end of July this year. Now, that seems unlikely.

A BMRCL official said, "Work on the track has been completed. The line will undergo testing over the next two months. We expect to commence operations by the end of September. Following trial runs and an inspection by the Commissioner of Metro Rail Safety, the line will be opened for revenue services."

Construction of the fully elevated northern extension of Green Line from Nagasandra, spanning three kilometres, commenced in 2017.

Although it was scheduled for completion by mid-2019, the project faced setbacks owing to delays in land acquisition, resulting in missing multiple deadlines.

The delay in the metro project on this section is attributed to the slow process of land acquisition from NICE and the effects of the covid pandemic. The elevated route from Nagasandra to Madavara will have three stations - Manjunathnagar, Chikkabidarakallu, and Madavara. The segment offers a link to Bangalore International Exhibition Centre (BIEC) on Tumakuru Road, a major exhibition venue in the city.

In January 2021, the BMRCL opened the southern extension of Green Line, running from Yelachenahalli to Silk Institute on Kanakapura Road. When the line is further extended to Madavara (BIEC), the entire Green Line will span 33 kilometres.

People living in Manjunathnagar, Chikkabidarakallu,

Madavara, Tumakuru Road, Anchepalya, and Jindal Nagar are eagerly anticipating the opening of this section, as they currently need to travel more than five kilometres to get to Nagasandra metro station.

Arun Kumar, a resident of Madavara said, "I am employed in the Rajaji Nagar Industrial Town. Commencement of the metro service would make it much easier for me to travel directly to Rajaji Nagar. At present, I depend on buses or my own two-wheeler to reach Nagasandra where I board the metro. Given the heavy traffic on Tumakuru Road, covering this 5-kilometre distance takes a minimum of 30 minutes."

Lavanya Rao, a student residing in Manjunathnagar, said, "My college is located in Malleswaram. I rely on BMTC feeder buses to get home from Nagasandra metro station. Extending the metro to Manjunathnagar would greatly benefit people like me."

BMRCL submits detailed project report for 37-km Hebbal-Sarjapur metro line

Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCL) has submitted the detailed project report (DPR) for the 37-km Hebbal-Sarjapur corridor to the State government for approval.

In July 2023, the State Budget included a proposal to construct a new metro line between Hebbal and Sarjapur, passing through Agara, Koramanga, and Dairy Circle, at an estimated cost of ₹28,405 crore.

A senior BMRCL official said that the DPR has been sent to the State government. Once approved, it will be forwarded to the Central government for final approval.

"The proposed metro line will cover several areas in the central business district. Approximately 16.8 km of the route, from Koramanga-

la to Hebbal, will be underground. It will pass through key locations, such as Bellandur, Agara, St. John's Hospital, NIMHANS, Central College, Cunningham Road, and Mehri Circle," an official said.

"The section from Sarjapur to Koramanga 3rd Block will have 15 elevated stations. From Koramanga 2nd Block to Veterinary College, the line will go underground, and will include

11 stations. There may be some changes to the DPR before it receives approval from the State government," the official added.

Meanwhile, Namma Metro Phase 3 project was approved by the Public Investment Board (PIB) of the Union government recently. Under this plan, 44.65 km of new metro line will be added to the network by 2028 at a cost of ₹15,611 crore. The proposed line

will connect Hebbal to J.P. Nagar via Goraguntepalya, Magadi Road, Mysuru Road, and Kanakapura Road along the Outer Ring Road, covering a distance of 32.15 km. Additionally, a line connecting Hosahalli and Kadabagere via Magadi Road, spanning 12.5 km, has been approved.

A BMRCL official said that the PIB has cleared the DPR and approval is awaited from the Union Cabinet.

Push to promote Mysuru as a MICE destination

The tourist arrival in Mysuru which hit an all time record of over 4 million during 2023-24, has witnessed a surge during the first few months of 2024-25.

Over a million tourists have already visited Mysuru between April and June 20 so far and the momentum that built the record footfall that was witnessed in 2023-24, seems to be continuing.

Given the positive trend, stakeholders want the government to promote Mysuru as a destination for Meetings, In-

centives, Conferences and Exhibitions (MICE).

As per the statistics from the Mysuru Palace Board, more than 2.4 lakh tourists have visited the city so far till June 20 while 5.32 lakh tourists

had visited Mysuru in May 2024 despite the prevailing high temperature.

Similarly, during the elections and the peak of summer in April, the city received over 2.92 lakh tourists and over 1 mil-

lion people have visited the city.

At the current rate of tourist inflow, the 4 million arrivals will likely be the new benchmark for Mysuru. The previous peak tourist inflow was in 2017-18 when 3.86 million tourists visited Mysuru. But it has taken more than 15 years for the city to reach the 4 million mark from the 3 million as statistic available from 2012 onwards indicate. During 2012-13 the tourist arrival was pegged at 3.3 million and it has been a slow but a steady increase since then.

After reaching a high

of 3.8 million in 2017-18, there was a decrease in footfall during 2018-19 and 2019-20. The sector went into a tailspin in 2020-21 owing to the COVID-19 pandemic when the tourist arrivals were only 7.08 lakh. But since then Mysuru tourism has bounced back and this year's figure till June 20 seems to be higher than average.

C. Narayana Gowda representing the hospitality sector said that the average occupancy rate in hotels in the city has surged to 50 per cent during weekdays and it is 100 per cent during weekends.

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

Poor inflows: CWMA asks Karnataka and T.N. to conserve water

It has decided to review the hydrological situation in its next meeting scheduled on July 26

Adopting a cautious approach in the wake of deficient inflows, the Cauvery Water Management Authority (CWMA) has directed both Karnataka and Tamil Nadu to conserve water in all reservoirs of the Cauvery basin, for drinking water purpose and environmental flows for the sustenance of flora and fauna.

The CWMA, which met in New Delhi on Tuesday, has decided to review the hydrological situation in its next meeting scheduled on July 26, according to a communique from the Karnataka Water Resources Department.

State's submission

Earlier, Karnataka submitted that the cumulative inflows into all its four reservoirs in the Cauvery basin so far, since the beginning of the present water year (from June 1 to 24), was only 7.307 tmcft as against the 30-year average for this period which was 24.448 tmcft. The present inflows accounted for a dismal 29.887% of the 30-year average figures, it maintained.

At the same time, Tamil Nadu had utilised 35.565

tmcft of water from Mettur, Bhavani, and Amaravathy reservoirs from February 1 to May 31, despite the Cauvery Water Disputes' Tribunal not permitting it to take up any perennial crops, Karnataka contended.

It also said that despite the prevalence of 70.113% distress condition in all the four Cauvery basin reservoirs of Karnataka, Tamil Nadu had released a huge quantum of water into the river from its reservoirs amounting to 3.97 tmcft till the beginning of the water year.

On the contrary, Karnataka had not released water into its canals to con-

serve water in its reservoirs for the purpose of drinking, it said.

Karnataka appealed to the CWMA to take a considered decision with respect to the quantum of release of water from its reservoirs after watching the evolving situation till the end of July and taking stock of the hydrological scenario.

Behaviour of monsoon

Karnataka said it will consider the release of water according to the behaviour of the southwest monsoon and inflows to its reservoirs.

On its part, Tamil Nadu

demanding that Karnataka should be directed to ensure the release of 5.367 tmcft of water in terms of flows at Biligundlu measuring gauge, to make up the shortfall as on June 24 and the flows for the remaining period of June.

It also sought that Karnataka should release 31.24 tmcft of water for July as prescribed by the CWDIT and modified by the Supreme Court.

After hearing both States, the CWMA directed them to conserve water and decided to take stock of the hydrological situation after a month, stated the communique.

Another sex abuse case registered against Suraj

The Holenarsipur Rural police registered a second case of sex abuse against Suraj Revanna, JD(S) MLC, accusing him of sexually abusing a man, on Tuesday. A resident of Holenarsipur taluk, who was until recently identified as a close associate of the JD(S) legislator, filed the complaint with the police.

During pandemic

The complainant alleged that he was sexually abused by the accused three years ago, during the pandemic. The police registered it under Sections 377 (unnatural offences), 342 (wrongful confinement) and 506 (criminal intimidation) of the Indian Penal Code.

In the first case, a youth from Arkalgud taluk alleged that the MLC sexually abused him and threatened him with murder at his farmhouse in Gannikada, Hassan district, on June 16. The case was registered on June 22.

Following this, the State government handed over the case to the Criminal Investigation Department (CID). Now, the second FIR is also expected to be handed over to the CID for further investigation.

Role reversal

Interestingly, the complainant of the second case was also an accused in the

first case filed against Dr. Suraj. He was accused of threatening the complainant in the first case with murder if he complained to the police against his leader, Dr. Suraj.

Not only that, the complainant in the second case filed a case with Holenarsipur Town police alleging that two people, including the alleged victim in the first case, were 'blackmailing' the JD(S) legislator on June 21.

Later, he was absconding. However, within a couple of days, he switched sides. In his complaint, he stated that he was sexually harassed by the legislator. Besides this, he also alleged that Dr. Suraj forced him to file a case against the youth from Arkalgud accusing him of blackmailing the legislator.

Fresh FIR filed against Prajwal

The Special Investigation Team (SIT) has registered a fresh case against ex-MP Prajwal Revanna for allegedly recording an explicit clip of a woman, while she was on a video call with him, without her knowledge. The SIT was granted four-day police custody of Mr. Prajwal by the Special Court of Magistrate for criminal cases against former and present MPs and MLAs on Tuesday.

Preetham Gowda, former Hassan BJP MLA, has also been named as an accused in the case, along with his two associates, Sharath and Kiran, for allegedly leaking the video.

While Mr. Preetham Gowda had faced political allegations over the same and several of his associates searched by the SIT, this is the first time he has been named as an accused in connection with the explicit video leak.

The accused have been booked under Sections 354 (outraging the modesty of a woman), 354C (Voyeurism) and various sections of the Information Technology Act, 2000.

When she sought help

Sources said that the fresh FIR was registered on Tuesday based on a complaint by a woman to the SIT. The woman alleged that she had met Mr. Prajwal in Hassan, seeking his help in securing a seat for her daughter at a private school.

She alleged the MP took her number, called her repeatedly, and forced her to undress on a video call. She further alleged that Mr. Prajwal had recorded the video without her knowledge, which was leaked along with other explicit content on April 22, when several pen drives with the explicit content were distributed in Hassan, days ahead of the April 26 polls.

Probing a case registered over the leak of the videos, based on a complaint by an associate of Mr. Prajwal, the SIT arrested Likhith Gowda and Chetan, when they allegedly tried to destroy electronic devices used to copy and leak the videos.

The SIT had searched premises linked to several others, including Sharath and Kiran, now named in the FIR as accused.

All the four are known associates of Mr. Preetham Gowda.

CNNL to examine complaints of water contamination in Cauvery

Responding positively to a demand for prevention of river Cauvery's contamination from the discharge of untreated industrial effluents and waste, Deputy Chief Minister D.K. Shivakumar has directed Cauvery Neeravari Nigam Limited (CNNL) officials to conduct a spot inspection while Minister for Forests and Environment Eshwar Khandre has sought a report from the officials of the concerned departments within two weeks.

Mr. Shivakumar, in his direction to the Managing Director of CNNL, said the officials should discuss with local bodies of cities and towns along the river

the measures they have taken to prevent contamination of the river water before submitting a report on their inspection.

Mr. Khandre, meanwhile, has directed the Principal Secretary of the Department of Forests and Environment to take the complaint of contamination

of Cauvery water seriously and constitute a committee of experts in co-ordination with other departments concerned on priority.

He has sought a detailed report by the committee in two weeks.

Minister for Large and Medium Industries M.B. Patil too has directed the Principal Secretary of Department of Industries and Commerce to look into the complaint of release of untreated industrial effluents and waste into Cauvery river.


Letter from MLC

Nandini milk packet to cost ₹2 more from today

With the additional 50 ml, Santruption milk by KMF at ₹57 a litre is the costliest from the KMF stable, while double-toned milk at ₹43 will be the cheapest. Despite the price increase, milk in Karnataka remains cheaper compared to the neighbouring States.

KMF Chairman Bhima Naik's announcement on Tuesday came as a surprise. The second largest milk federation in the country hiked the price of milk by ₹3 per litre in July 2023, while the farmers demanded a ₹5 hike per litre. He added that the actual cost for 50 ml would be around ₹2.10, and the Federation would incur a loss of 10 paise per sachet.

Price increased to celebrate anniversary of Emergency: BJP

Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly R. Ashok on Tuesday said the Congress government had resorted to increasing the milk price to "celebrate the anniversary of the enforcing of the Emergency on the country".

In a social media post, Mr. Ashok pointed out that it was the second time that the milk prices had gone up during the 13-month rule of the Congress. He recalled that the milk prices had been increased by ₹3 a litre in August 2023.

He accused the government of rubbing salt into the wounds of people who were already affected by

the hike in prices of petrol and diesel as well as vegetables.

'Revenge on citizens'
BJP State president B.Y. Vijayendra alleged that the Congress had lost the moral authority to continue in power. He declared that the BJP would launch a struggle against the Congress till it stepped down from power.

"Soon after the Lok Sabha election results, there was a call from Congress MLAs to roll back the guarantees to avenge their loss. Finally, this is how the Congress government is exacting revenge on the poor citizens for voting against them," Mr. Vijayendra alleged.

CM: No increase in price of milk, only additional cost for extra quantity

Average procurement by the Karnataka Milk Federation is up by about 15% when compared with the corresponding period last year

Good monsoon and increased procurement price being passed on to dairy farmers have increased the average procurement of milk by the Karnataka Milk Federation (KMF) by about 15% when compared with the corresponding period last year.

While the average procurement of milk in Karnataka was around 90 lakh litres daily last year, it has increased to 99 lakh litres this year, Chief Minister Siddaramaiah pointed out in a statement on Tuesday in which he justified the additional 50 ml milk being supplied in Nandini packets at an additional cost of ₹2 saying that it was to protect the interests of the dairy farmers. The new prices were announced by the KMF on Tuesday.

Farmers' interests
"At no point, the village-level dairy societies should refuse to procure the milk brought by the farmer and increased quantity in milk packets is to protect the farmers' interests. There has been no increase in the price of milk. But the additional cost is for the additional quantity of milk," the Chief Minister clarified.

He said the KMF was already converting 30 lakh

litres of milk into skimmed milk powder and producing about 250 tonnes daily. "The production is commensurate with the demand," Mr. Siddaramaiah said.

Profitable

The Chief Minister said that when the Congress government came to power in May 2023, an average 72 lakh litres of milk was being procured. "After the retail milk price increased by ₹3 a litre and the amount was passed on to farmers, dairy farming became profitable to farmers. Along with that, availability of green fodder due to good rainfall has resulted in the KMF's procurement reaching almost one crore litre a day," he said. The KMF has decided to pass on the additional milk to the consumer without adding much burden.

'No distress sale'

One other reason for milk procurement increasing in Karnataka since last year, despite drought prevailing in the State, has been attributed to a decrease in the distress sale of cattle. An official of the KMF recently said though the cattle sales had continued, it was more or less stabilised after the price hike. Cattle sales, especially in the Old Mysore region, had been attributed to high input cost and low returns.

Many consumers unhappy with KMF decision

Many consumers on Tuesday expressed unhappiness over the Karnataka Milk Federation's (KMF) decision to charge extra for the additional milk it is going to provide in each packet, as they said it would entail them shelling out more money daily.

The KMF and the State government have denied there has been a price hike and claimed it was only a rationalisation, as the KMF will give 50 ml extra in every packet of Nandini milk and the price would be proportionally increased

by ₹2. "We had not asked them to give us extra milk as for years we have been happy with the regular quantity. After a price hike in 2023, why should the government impose an extra expenditure on us in this way? At a time when the

prices of all commodities, including fuel, vegetables and even foodgrains, are going up, what was the need for this unasked-for arrangement?" questioned Srinivas V., a private employee from Banashankari here.

For smaller, nuclear families, the extra quantity of milk might go unused. "We are a family of two people and even half-litre milk is sometimes more for us. Milk is not something you can store for a long time. So, what is the point of paying an extra of almost ₹60 to ₹70 a month and it not being useful in any way?" said Vidya Ravi,

a senior citizen from Attur Layout. Hoteliers on the other hand said this would not count as a price hike for them as they get extra milk. "Nandini provides the best quality milk at the lowest price in the country. The hotel industry is one of their biggest customers. While we do not understand why the price and quantity of milk has been increased, we believe the milk price has not been hiked. Hence, we will take a call on whether to increase prices (at hotels) or not after further discussion," said P.C. Rao, president of the Bruhat Bengaluru Hoteliers' Association.

Govt. announces fresh guidelines for transfer of its staff

The Karnataka government on Tuesday came out with fresh guidelines for the transfer of its employees and said the total transfers should not exceed 6%.

The Ministers of the departments concerned have been authorised to issue transfer orders of employees belonging to the categories of 'A', 'B', 'C', and 'D' during the general transfer period from June 25 to July 9.

Criminal cases

It said employees facing departmental inquiries, pending criminal cases or serious allegations should be posted to non-executive posts to prevent their influence during the probe and to ensure the impartial nature of the investigation. Such employees should not be posted to postings they demand, the guidelines stated. It said employees facing criminal cases and probes should not be posted to sensitive and executive posts.

Minimum service

Employees recruited to the categories 'A' and 'B' should complete a minimum of two years of service in one location to be eligible for transfer to another location. The minimum years of service at one location for employees of the 'C' and 'D' categories has been fixed at four and seven years, respectively.

Employees recruited to the departments in the Hyderabad Karnataka region (Kalyana Karnataka) should put in 10 years of service before they are transferred outside the region.

No executive posts to employees facing criminal cases, inquiries, say guidelines

However, minimum service at one place/city/location can be extended or reduced in the case of employees retiring in less than two years, employees having technical expertise for specific projects, and employees involved in implementing the flagship programmes.

In cases of husband and wife being government employees, if one employee gets transferred, then the other person can also be transferred to the same location if the vacancy exists, to ensure postings for the couple at one place/city. The guidelines issued by the Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms (DPAR) have barred the transfer of employees if they are office-bearers of the State Government Employees' Association. This would allow them to discharge their service to the association without any disruption.

Medical cases

In the case of children of employees suffering from chronic diseases and receiving treatment, then such employees can furnish required medical documents to continue in service at the same place.

In cases where employees who have been transferred have not reported to duty seeking leave on medical grounds, then such persons should furnish medical certificates and the appropriate authority can sanction leave, the guidelines stated.

State gets investment offer of \$6.2 billion from Europe

Karnataka has received investment offers to the tune of \$6.2 billion from various corporates and business conglomerates in Europe, said Priyank Kharge, Minister for IT, Biotechnology, and Science and Technology, here on Tuesday.

The Minister led a business exploratory delegation to London, France, Germany, Switzerland, and other places in the EU and met up with top officials of various enterprises.

"We met top decision-makers in many companies and we received investment offers of \$6.2 billion as an immediate outcome of our business exploratory tours. We hope a majority of them convert into actual business on the ground," Mr. Kharge said while addressing a media conference

here. Responding to a reporter's query about the number of jobs these projects might create, the Minister

said, "The proposed GCCs alone will create 35,000 to 40,000 jobs in the State." Mr. Kharge said Karnataka had embarked on a "hyper growth" phase.

The delegation also visited California and Massachusetts in the U.S. and participated in the 'BIO International Convention 2024' held in San Diego, attended by 18,500 industry leaders globally.

"Our objective was to

highlight our infrastructure and policy landscape to biotechnology companies and industry bodies in the U.S., and also to explore future global expansion plans of electronic and biotech firms in the country," he said.

For collaborations

Sharath Bache Gowda, Chairman of KEONICS, who was also part of the delegation, said high-level meetings were conducted with Salk Institute, Kyoto University, Biocom California, and the University of Pennsylvania Biotechnology Centre to explore collaborations in health tech, agri tech, and in the upcoming Bio-Bank and Anti-Venon Research Development Centre.

'PMO forcing MNCs to invest in Gujarat'

A hackathon to address city's traffic woes

The Bengaluru Mobility Challenge hackathon is open to all residents of India. It will consist of two phases, each of which will focus on different aspects of urban mobility management

In terms of congestion, Bengaluru is one of the worst cities in India," says Dr. Raghuram Krishnapuram, a senior scientist at the Centre of Data for Public Good (CDPG), Foundation for Science Innovation and Development (FSID), in the Indian Institute of Science (IISc).

That traffic is as ubiquitous to the city as its pleasant weather, start-up ecosystem and green spaces is nothing new. In 2022, according to the TomTom Traffic Index, Bengaluru was ranked the world's second-most congested city, only beaten by London for this dubious position. And while this has improved - Bengaluru dropped to 6th on this list in 2024 - it continues to be one of the country's most congested cities, something any Bengalurean will attest to.

To address the problem, CDPG and the Bengaluru Traffic Police (BTP) have come together to organise a hackathon called The Bengaluru Mobility Challenge. The hackathon aims to provide innovative solutions to the city's traffic woes using AI and geospatial technologies. "There is a huge potential to make a difference to Bangalore," says Krishnapuram.

Data-driven solutions

FSID, previously called SID (Society for Innovation and Development), is IISc's incubation centre, harnessing the scientific knowledge available at IISc to help society and industry. Among the initiatives that were seeded here was the India Urban Data Exchange (IUDX). The open-source platform was born out of the need to facilitate data exchange between various city departments, government agencies, citizens and the private sector, and to eventually help cities use this data to address complex urban challenges.

On November 24, 2023, when CDPG was created within FSID, IUDX became part of the new centre. Krishnapuram spells out the rationale behind CDPG: "The idea is that cities in India can leverage the data that they have to do impactful things." "You can derive a lot of insights from the data and enable an entire ecosystem of start-ups that can use that data to build useful applications that will benefit society," he adds.

Krishnapuram explains the mechanics behind how data could be used for public welfare using an example from Tripura's capital, Agartala, which has partnered with IUDX. In late 2022, video data from various intersections in the city was collected to help

monitor and regulate traffic. "For example, if there are a lot of vehicles accumulating in one direction, you can increase the duration of the green light, etc.," he says, adding that since the roads are all interconnected, a lot of coordination is needed to ensure that traffic flows smoothly.

Although this particular traffic project did not go beyond the pilot stage, many more such projects are underway. Already, the platform has been installed in nearly 50 Indian cities and is being leveraged for various purposes. In Surat, for instance, IUDX is being used to monitor the bus transit system while in Chennai it is helping the city keep an eye on water levels in its reservoirs and predict floods. "It is also

being used to set up green corridors and solid waste disposal schedules... those kinds of things," he says.

The origin of the hackathon

At a symposium to mark the launch of CDPG back in November 2023, one of the speakers M.N. Anucheth, the Joint Commissioner of Police, Traffic, Bengaluru City, spoke about the traffic situation in the city and urged the city's entrepreneurs to help address the problem. "So, we thought that maybe this would be a good problem to work on," recalls Krishnapuram.

This led to the conceptualisation of The Bengaluru Mobility Challenge, which was announced earlier this month. The participants will rely on camera

data provided by BTP. "Instead of just using the BTP cameras which are limited in number, we are leveraging the Safe City cameras to look at how many vehicles are passing in large parts of the city," he says. If one can do AI-based analytics, this data can be used to model the city traffic, he adds. "Bangalore is a large city but it does not have a traffic model. No one knows the commuting patterns of people right now."

Krishnapuram believes that insights from the data can help city planning and decision-making, whether it is about expanding the public transport system, designing alternative routes, deciding which roads should be one-way or putting in a metro line. "If you have this informa-

tion, you can do a lot of things that make it easier for people to commute."

The hackathon, open to all residents of India, will consist of two phases, each of which will focus on different aspects of urban mobility management. The first phase will involve using data from Safe City cameras installed around IISc to predict vehicle counts and generate traffic patterns. Understanding these patterns can help predict traffic, which in turn can help police take action, he says. "This could help them regulate the traffic differently. For instance, close certain roads to divert the traffic."

In Phase Two, on the other hand, participants will re-identify vehicles across different network

locations and estimate origin-destination flows. This will help understand the behaviour of motorists in the city. Krishnapuram recognises that this is not an easy task given the number of vehicles that are similar to each other. However, he hopes that the data from this phase will help them test their hypotheses about driving behaviours.

Teams registering for the hackathon can have up to five members and choose to participate in either or both phases. "People don't have to participate in the first phase to participate in the second phase," he says. Alternatively, if a team wants to stop after the first phase, it can do so, but it needs to make its code public, putting it up in open source.

"People that are participating in Phase Two, can make use of those results if they want to. But if they are continuing in Phase Two, they don't have to do this."

Feasibility and beyond

If the challenge is successful, they hope to scale it up to the entire city, but currently, the focus is on the feasibility aspect, he says. "We want to see if this data is useful...if you can do something with it, using AI and machine learning." Existing AI algorithms for traffic developed using data from other countries, don't necessarily work in Indian traffic, which he describes as "a different beast that is completely chaotic". For instance, algorithms that do vehicle counts fail in India because we have rickshaws and bullock carts on the road, merrily trundling along buses, cars and motorbikes. "They are not recognised and end up not being counted. That is a challenge," he says. Krishnapuram believes that traffic solutions specific to Indian conditions could emerge out of this hackathon. "When you open the problem to so many people, everyone comes up with different ideas," he says.

Also, since the solutions are open source, he hopes that potential solutions that may emerge from the hackathon could well be replicated for the benefit of the entire city or even the country. "Traffic is a huge problem in India, and we have to find sustainable solutions," he says.

Beyond traffic issues

And yes, using data meaningfully to address civic issues doesn't just stop with traffic issues. "Traffic and transportation is one area, pollution and flooding are other problems. We are hoping that hackathons can help create awareness and good solutions."

Lake restoration project

Kennametal India Limited, together with Planet Sutra, a sustainability implementation partner, held an event on Tuesday to mark the completion of the Harokethanahalli lake restoration project at Bengaluru, India. The project spans nearly 18 acres of land.

Situated amidst agricultural land, commercial orchards and private farmhouses, and yet away from the public water supply system, the main source of water in the region is groundwater that is extracted through deeply dug borewells for consumption. Further, the hard rocky strata and steep slopes make it challenging for rainwater to percolate into aquifer zones and its runoff rapidly erodes the fertile soil.

According to a release, this initiative is expected to restore the quality of water of the lake and free it from garbage, effluents, and other pollutants. It should also raise the groundwater table by eight meters, benefiting up to 5,000 people living in and around the lake area.

HIV positive patient gets a new lease of life with successful renal transplant

A 38-year-old person from Bengaluru, who has been living with HIV for over five years, got a new lease of life following a renal transplant at a private hospital in the city.

The patient - Mahesh (name changed) - was diagnosed with Diabetes Mellitus ten years ago. In 2022, he successfully completed treatment for Pulmonary Kochs. Over the past year, he developed chronic kidney disease and hypertension, necessitating hemodialysis since January 2024.

Following his HIV-positive status, he was put on antiretroviral treatment (ART). However, multiple hospitals had previously rejected him for renal transplantation.

Comprehensive workshop

He then visited SPARSH hospitals where he underwent a comprehensive workshop for kidney transplantation. His father-in-law was

identified as a suitable donor due to blood group compatibility. After ruling out opportunistic infections and confirming a CD4 count above 500, the doctors optimised his medication regimen to manage potential drug interactions. The transplant was performed with strict universal precautions, ensuring the safety of both patient and staff.

A team of doctors

comprising Harsha Kumar H.N., Sunil R., Avinash T.S., Shashank M.S., and John Paul were involved in achieving this successful outcome. They emphasised the challenges of kidney transplantation in HIV-positive patients, including heightened risks of infection and rejection. However, with meticulous planning and advanced surgical skills, these risks were effectively managed. "Our skilled team

executed the procedure precisely, resulting in excellent graft function. He was discharged on the eighth postoperative day. This case highlights the commitment to providing advanced medical care and overcoming the challenges associated with complex health conditions," said Dr. Kumar, Senior Consultant - Nephrology and Transplant Physician at the hospital.

"Performing a kidney transplant on an HIV-positive patient requires careful consideration and precise execution to manage the increased risk of infections and complications, HIV-positive patients on hemodialysis typically have a poor prognosis. However, the availability of highly active antiretroviral therapy (HAART), is a treatment regimen typically comprising a combination of three or more antiretroviral drugs, has extended their lifespan," the doctor said.

Stating that many HIV patients develop nephropathy and end-stage renal disease, necessitating hemodialysis, Dr. Kumar said: "Now, with ART offering minimal drug interactions, HIV is no longer a risk factor for kidney transplants. The successful surgery showcases that HIV-positive patients can now be considered for renal transplantation with significantly improved survival prospects."

Advancements in treatment

Dr. Avinash, Consultant Urologist and Renal Transplant Surgeon at the hospital said that the case highlighted the advancements in HIV treatment and the importance of a multidisciplinary approach. "Our ability to manage drug interactions between antiretroviral and immunosuppressive therapies was crucial in ensuring the success of the transplant," he added.

Measures to Meet Power Shortage in Karnataka

Bangalore, June 25: The State Electricity Board will resort to disconnection of power supply to an industrial unit subjected to 60 per cent power cut (which came into force from June 24) not on daily basis but only when that unit exceeded its weekly allocation of power.

Although the Board will be taking readings daily, it will not cut the power supply if the unit exceeded its quota on any particular date; in other words, the weekly readings only will come into effect for all practical purposes.

This has been accepted by the Electricity Board at a meeting of the representatives of the public and the private sectors held here today to assess the impact of the power cut and to find out means to tide over the difficulty.

Karnataka Council Poll: Cong. Loses All Four Seats

Bangalore, June 25: The Congress in Karnataka suffered a setback having lost all four seats in the fourth biennial elections from the Teachers and Graduates constituencies to the 63-member Legislative Council. The elections were held on Sunday.

The Congress (O), which had suffered a reverse in the recent byelection to the State Assembly from the Gangavathi Constituency, won two seats, Jan Sangh and an independent supported by the Jan Sangh the other two seats.

The Congress (O) retained the North Kanara Graduates Constituency seat with Mr. B.K. Guddadinni, former MP, defeating his nearest rival, Mr. S.T.Patil (Cong) by over 1,100 votes.

Drag is an artistic performance that traditionally involves men dressing up as or impersonating women using extravagant costumes, makeup, music and dance. Drag culture has significantly influenced mainstream entertainment, fashion, and social activism, by challenging societal norms and advocating for acceptance and visibility of LGBTQ+ identities.

While the increasing popularity of drag in Indian cities reflects the growing acceptance of new artistic forms, stigma and misconceptions still persist.

Glad drags

Though the drag culture in India is commonly believed to have been borrowed from the West, examples of similar practices in our country abound. Speaking to *The Hindu*, Bengaluru-based Alex Mathew, popularly known as Maya The Drag Queen, explained that the custom originated during the early days of theatre, specifically in Shakespearean times when women were not allowed to perform on stage and "effeminate men had to perform women's roles".

"This system continues in traditional Indian art forms to this day and is seen in *Kathakali*, *Theyyam*, *Yakshagana* and other dance recitals," says Alex.

Recalling his first stage experience as a woman, Alex said, "I had dressed up as Nagavalli (a character from the Malayalam movie *Manichitrathazhu*) for a fancy dress competition. The intention was not to win a prize; I just wanted to express my femininity." Now, having been part of Bengaluru's drag scene for



Preen queens spill the beans

The world of drag in the city has largely been left unexplored. Three of Bengaluru's queens talk about their lives and journey

about a decade, Alex says he faced challenges in being recognised in the city's theatre space due to stereotypes about his femininity and for having a "Malayali accent".

Bengaluru's drag culture is unique due to its inclusivity, diversity and crowd. Having debuted at Humming Tree, a pub in Indiranagar, Alex says, "Bangalore has been very open to outsiders as well as new experiences."

Despite the city's incredible line-up of drag artists, there seems to be a dearth of venues and sponsors for drag performances. Queen Shivangi, who has been a drag performer for the last five years says, "Drag isn't widely re-

cognised here and only a couple of venues sponsor drag artistes. We are constantly seeking other venues that will give us opportunities to showcase our talent. In contrast, Mumbai and Delhi offer us numerous performance spaces."

"This disparity is also evident in how drag is marketed. Despite Bangalore's substantial pool of drag talent, opportunities are scarce," Shivangi, also known as Shivam Kumar, adds.

Delhi and Mumbai have dedicated marketing efforts promoting drag shows regularly from Thursday through Sunday across town. However, in Bengaluru,



shows are only slated on Saturday and Wednesday.

Misunderstandings galore

The world of drag comes with its share of misconceptions and stereotypes, which some of the drag queens who spoke to *The Hindu* wanted to address. "I started a decade ago, and people believe that drag has a sexual connotation," says Alex. Other wrong notions are that drag performers are cross-

dressers, transgenders and sex workers, which need not always be the case. "My drag persona is only confined to the stage. It is my stage persona," says drag queen Dark Fantasy, also known as Dinesh.

"Drag is an artistic platform where we can showcase themes, portray diverse characters, tell stories, sing and entertain. It is also a means of earning a living," says Queen Shivangi. "That is a significant aspect of drag culture – the opportunity to both

express creatively and financially support ourselves through our art," she adds.

Drag shows are now being performed in school, university and corporate spaces, which proves that it is a versatile art form with different subcultures. One memorable instance, Shivangi shares, was at Mango Tree, where she performed at a child-friendly event. "For my performance, I took on the role of Barbie. For me, drag is about celebrating and expressing who you are," she adds.

Shivangi says her mission extends beyond the glittering stage lights – it is a crusade to educate people of all ages about the beauty and significance of drag culture.

Creativity to the fore

"One Halloween, I was given a show opportunity, and I've always admired Medusa," Shivangi shares. "She has been my role model for a while now – a once beautiful lady cursed into becoming a hideous creature, yet her inner beauty remained unchanged."

The process of embodying Medusa was a labour of love and determination. "Designing Medusa's outfit was a challenge," Shivangi recounts with a hint of pride. "I crafted a crown from scratch, using glue and newspaper since I lacked proper materials. I attached artificial snakes to emulate Medusa's serpentine hair," she continues, describing the meticulous effort that went into every detail.

"The silicone snakes were surprisingly heavy, but I was committed to authenticity. The entire

crown weighed four and a half kilograms and it was very uncomfortable during the hour and a half that I had to don it."

Yet, that discomfort paled in comparison to the exhilaration of bringing Medusa to life on stage, she says. "As drag artistes often do, I faced the challenge of presenting the character convincingly," Shivangi says. Her dedication paid off in applause and admiration. "I managed to perform successfully, and received praise from the audience – the ultimate reward for any artiste," she says.

Dare to drag

Some drag artistes extend financial support to others in the community, having weathered their storms in the past. "By earning through their art, we contribute to educating and supporting others within the LGBTQ+ community," Shivangi explains, adding that she has two drag daughters who are talented dancers.

When these young artistes expressed an interest in joining the drag world, they turned to Queen Shivangi for guidance, seeing her as a maternal figure. "I've taken on the role of educating them," Shivangi says, describing how she imparts essential skills from makeup techniques to stage etiquette.

Other drag artistes in Bengaluru go even further, establishing educational centres to mentor LGBTQ+ youth in the nuances of drag. Centres such as the Keshavsuri Foundation and Queer Awaam, not only provide artistic guidance but also crucial life skills and financial stability strategies, ensuring a supportive environment for growth and success of community members.

Alex sums it up best saying, "Drag is about choosing to use all your colour crayons."

EATING OUT

Over the years the restaurant scene in Bengaluru has evolved keeping pace with its ever-changing diverse crowd. Now a weekend gateway to Mangaluru for a spicy *ghee roast* or a Goan vacay for an authentic Goan *chorizo* can be relished in the city itself.

Ouzo by Fire, Indiranagar a new entrant in the city's culinary scene is a gastronomic ride to the hidden treasures of Saraswat cooking celebrating the Portuguese culinary influence in Goa, and the Catholic heritage of Mangalore.

Spread across two floors, the interiors are an eclectic mix of modern and Portuguese-style Goan elements, creating a welcoming space one that feels like being in a Goan riera.

While the first floor is a more formal dining space, the top floor has been kept modern chic with glass window panes, white-washed walls and an open bar counter.

The menu is thoughtfully curated and gives a peak into both Goan and Mangalorean cuisines. An extensive glossary not only helps one to navigate through the menu but also serves as an educational trip into Konkani culinary linguistics. For instance, *kodi* – a Konkani word for curry, *vindaloo* – a traditional Goan Mangalorean curry made with vinegar, chilis and garlic, *nustya* – Konkani for fish.

We started our meal with prawn devil *ajillo*



packed with *chorizo* (goan pork sausage). The prawn cooked in garlic and paprika sauce was spicy with slight hint of tanginess from the sausage.

We then tried pan-fried turmeric seer fish with raw mango chutney, a must-try if you are an ardent fish lover.

Moving on we tried their prawn ghee roast, a Mangalorean classic where prawns are sauteed in ghee with a blend of whole spices and a rich yoghurt sauce. If you are a vegetarian, the paneer ghee roast is equally delightful and features a similar flavour.

Goan cuisine seems incomplete without trying Goan breads, we munched

It is challenging to write about a reticent soul and a modest one at that. "I don't think there is anything special in what I have done; there are far greater artists than me," says MR Deshmukh.


"Besides, I feel my paintings convey whatever I want to say. Painting is a language in which form and colour speak to viewers. There is not much I can add to that."

And yes, that is true; Deshmukh's body of work speaks for itself. At 80, the artist from Kolhapur, is exhibiting as many as 30 of his works in Bengaluru – almost all of which were executed over the past two years, an impressive feat in itself.

Vibrant, yet muted, patches of colour bring to mind once-remembered memories or scenes from long-forgotten travels. Vivid Impressions hosts both landscapes and figures in

its collection. While some of the landscapes show glimpses of India as seen from a railway carriage, some are of quiet avenues, perhaps as seen by someone sitting in a cafe.

Still others are of women captured in various everyday scenes – sewing, at rest, with an infant, toiling in the fields, catching up with each other, balancing

a load on their heads – the quintessential Indian woman. Most fascinating of all, at least for me, were the canvases with little birds on or outside a window sill, the kind you see in dreams of childhood where the grass is a bright green and the wide open skies are full of sunshine.

Inspired by beauty, whether in Nature or of the

feminine, Deshmukh's artistic journey began in Satara, Maharashtra, his birthplace. "I spent my schooldays wandering between the Krishna and Koyana rivers, and later came to Kolhapur for my college education. Memories of the natural beauty I revelled in during those days are reflected in my work to a great extent."

Deshmukh says while Nature inspires everyone, he was also blessed to be influenced by the treasures

housed in the Shri Bhavani Museum in Satara, which he often frequented.

The museum founded in 1938 by Shri Bhawanrao Pantapratidhi, the last ruler of Aundh, has a wonderful collection of Indian and Western masters, which left a deep impression on the artist as a young man.

Deshmukh says he honed his "artistic language by visiting museums and galleries, reading books, and learning in art school – much like how human communication is refined by meeting different people and attending social gatherings."

Mentored by master painter and sculptor Ravindra Mistry, Deshmukh who studied art at Kalaniketan Mahavidyalay in Kolhapur, favours oils on paper and canvas,

Vivid Impressions by MR Deshmukh is presented by *Artenblu* and will be on display at *MKF Museum of Art* till June 29, 2024.

Udhayanidhi Stalin gets bail in Sanatana Dharma remark case

Tamil Nadu Minister for Youth Welfare and Sports Development Udhayanidhi Stalin appeared before a Bengaluru court on Tuesday in connection with a case registered against him for his alleged derogatory remarks on *Sanatana Dharma* and was granted conditional bail.

Activist V. Paramesha accused Mr. Udhayanidhi of making remarks against *Sanatana Dharma* in Chennai in 2023, compar-

ing it to dengue and malaria, calling for its eradication.

Mr. Stalin was charged under Sections 153A (Promoting enmity between different groups), 298 (Uttering words, etc., with deliberate intent to wound religious feelings) and 500 (Punishment for defamation) of the Indian Penal Code. Amidst tight security, Mr. Udhayanidhi appeared before the special court, which granted him bail with a surety of ₹1 lakh. The next hearing has been posted for August 8.

User fee at Kerala's capital city airport up by 50% from July 1

AERA says the fee for embarking domestic passengers will be ₹770 and ₹330 for disembarking; international passengers will have to pay twice the tariff levied on domestic travellers each year

Flying out of the Adani-controlled Thiruvananthapuram airport will get costlier from July 1 as the user development fee (UDF) levied on passengers as part of air tickets will go up by 50% from ₹506 to ₹770 for domestic travellers for a year and further raised every year. Landing charges for aircraft have been jacked up three-fold by the Airport Economic Regulatory Authority (AERA) only for Thiruvananthapuram airport.

The revised levies are part of the tariff order issued by the AERA on June 21 for a period of five years from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2027, and will be effective from July 1. This is the first revision for the airport since its privatisation. The Thiruvananthapuram

Kerala International Airport Ltd (TKIAL) is owned by Adani Airport Holdings Limited (AAHL), incorporated in 2019 as a 100% subsidiary of Adani Enterprises Limited, that controls eight airports.

International passenger In its order, the AERA said the applicable UDF for embarking domestic passengers from July 1 to March 31, 2025, will be ₹770 and ₹330 for disembarking pas-


sengers. From April 1, 2025, to March 31, 2026, domestic travellers on flights departing from the airport will have to pay ₹840, while those landing at the airport will have to pay ₹360. In the subsequent financial year, the fee for domestic travellers will be raised to ₹910 and ₹390, respectively. International passengers will have to pay twice the tariff levied on domestic travellers each year.

The landing charges for aircraft have been raised three-fold for the first year from ₹309 to ₹890 per metric tonne (MT) of aircraft weight. This will increase by 4.6 times and 5.5 times for the subsequent financial years with a levy of ₹1,400 per MT and ₹1,650 per MT. The regulator has rejected the airport's projection for non-aeronautical revenue that is used to cross-subsidise passenger costs and raised it four-fold to ₹392 crore as opposed to ₹102 crore proposed by the airport.

In its defence, the airport operator has told the regulator that it has framed a procurement policy to avoid subjectivity and improve transparency in decision making and followed the process relating to procurement of goods and services as required in the concession agreement signed with the AAI.

Jagan urges A.P. Assembly Speaker to recognise him as LoP

YSR Congress Party (YSRCP) president Y.S. Jagan Mohan Reddy on Tuesday wrote a letter to Andhra Pradesh Legislative Assembly Speaker Ch. Ayyanna Patrudu, urging the latter to recognise him as the Leader of Opposition (LoP) in the House.

Going by the precedents in the Lok Sabha, Delhi Assembly and the Assembly of undivided Andhra Pradesh, the LoP status should be given to the YSRCP leader.

The LoP post was given to a leader of the Opposition party though its numerical strength was less when compared to the total strength of the House,

the YSRCP chief said. Mr. Reddy said that there were discussions in the public domain that the YSRCP would not be entitled to have the LoP post because it did not have 10% members of the total strength of the House.

"The Rules of Procedure and Conduct of Business in the Andhra Pradesh Legislative Assembly notified

under Article 208 of the Constitution do not prescribe any such mandatory

percentage of seats for a leader of a party to be recognised as the LoP. Nor has there been any convention on the insistence of the 10% strength on the floor of the House for the Opposition parties," said Mr. Reddy.

Meanwhile, Minister for Tribal Welfare Gummidi Sandhya Rani said Mr. Reddy does not have a suffi-

cient number of MLAs to recognise him as the LoP and "he will be considered as an MLA as per the rules".

Referring to the letter sent by Mr. Reddy, the Minister said, "Mr. Reddy got only 11 MLAs, which falls short of the required 10% of the total 175 members in the House to consider him as the LoP."

Call for consensus

Parliament should give room for extended debates and disagreements

Prime Minister Narendra Modi has pledged to govern by consensus even as the 18th Lok Sabha began its first session. The ruling National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and the Opposition INDIA bloc have both reiterated their rhetoric on protecting the Constitution, which was one of the central themes of the recent campaign during the 2024 general election. While both sides say they seek consensus, and are loyal to the Constitution, a demonstration of any convergence between them on any key question of governance or politics, unfortunately, remains elusive. The first session was in fact marked by mutual hostility that carried over from the campaign. The NDA and the INDIA bloc sparred over the selection of the *pro tem* Speaker and now appear set for a face-off over the Speaker's post. The Opposition has expressed willingness to support the NDA's candidate in return for the post of Deputy Speaker. In the past, the Deputy Speaker's post has mostly gone to a member of the Opposition. In the 16th Lok Sabha, the post went to the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam; and in the 17th Lok Sabha, the post remained vacant for its entire term, unprecedented in the history of Indian Parliament. The BJP remains non-committal on supporting an Opposition candidate for Deputy Speaker.

Mr. Modi's call for consensus and parliamentary debates can be a reassuring sign of a healthy democracy, but only if that statement is translated into tangible action. Union Minister Rajnath Singh, who has emerged as the government's key interlocutor, has reached out to Opposition leaders, and such interactions should become frequent. Consensus may be unachievable in many instances, and may not even be necessary in some cases. By demonstrating a commitment to sharing power within the ruling alliance and with the Opposition, Mr. Modi could expand his political authority and legitimacy. Beyond the limited tactical question of the stability of the government, in which the BJP is shy of a majority by 32 seats, the building of coalitions should be treated as a cornerstone of India's progress and prosperity. The first session of the new Lok Sabha should set the tone for extended debates, more room for disagreements and the pursuit of common ground across parties. The proceedings of the House and of Committees fell short on these counts during the last two terms of the Lok Sabha. As the leader of the ruling coalition, the BJP should demonstrate a renewed commitment to the norms and substance of Parliament and the Opposition should respond constructively.

Free man

Assange deserves his freedom, but his conviction is a setback for free speech

Julian Assange did what journalists do in free societies. He published troves of secret documents exposing the conduct of America's wars in Afghanistan and Iraq and of its diplomacy. And for that, he was denied his freedom for more than 14 years. The hounding of Mr. Assange is a rare modern story of western democracies across the Atlantic, which take pride in their freedoms, working hand in hand to punish a journalist, publisher and whistle-blower. The WikiLeaks founder was first arrested in Britain in 2010 on a European warrant over sex crime allegations reported in Sweden – those charges were later dropped. While on bail, he took asylum in the Ecuador embassy in London, where he was holed up until 2019. He was kicked out of the embassy, and Britain rearrested him and put him in the high-security Belmarsh prison. After five years of life in jail, where he was largely confined to a solitary cell, the U.S. entered into a plea deal with Mr. Assange, that would set him free. The 52-year-old will plead guilty in the espionage case before a U.S. federal judge in Saipan, the capital of the Northern Mariana Islands, a U.S. Commonwealth territory in the western Pacific. According to U.S. and British media, Mr. Assange is expected to be sentenced for about five years, the time he has already served in Britain. He will then go to Australia, his native country.

While Mr. Assange's release, which brings his years-long ordeal to an end and is a reprieve for those who have been fighting for him, is welcome news, the road towards this day was not smooth. The way he is being released still raises concerns. The classified documents WikiLeaks published were handed to Mr. Assange by Chelsea Manning, a U.S. military analyst. Ms. Manning was sentenced to 35 years in prison after being convicted of violating the Espionage Act. U.S. President Barack Obama commuted her sentence, allowing her to go free in 2017, but Mr. Assange remained unfree. The Trump Justice Department indicted him in 2019 on 18 counts. And the Biden administration continued to push for his extradition, which he fought doggedly. Last year, Australia's Labor Prime Minister Anthony Albanese urged the U.S. to conclude the case, while lawmakers there passed a resolution this year calling for Mr. Assange to be allowed to return home. In recent years, the case has also become a public relations disaster for Joe Biden's Democratic administration. So when Mr. Assange agreed to plead guilty, all sides found a deal to conclude the case that would get the U.S. a conviction which it had been seeking and Mr. Assange his freedom. Yet, the fact that Mr. Assange would be convicted for publishing state secrets is a setback for free speech. And the pursuit of a whistle-blower for over 14 years would remain a blot on western democracies, especially the U.K. and the U.S., forever.

Agony still in Manipur, a year later

The high-level security meet on Manipur convened by the Union Home Minister, Amit Shah, in New Delhi on June 17, 2024, was loudly conspicuous by its exclusion of the Manipur Chief Minister, N. Biren Singh. It also threw light on the way the Centre has been handling the violent ethnic clashes in Manipur between two of its major communities, the Meitei and Kuki-Zo tribes. There seem to be no signs of respite even after a year of bloodletting. It seems to confirm the long-held suspicion that there has been undeclared President's Rule in the State, with the Manipur government having been placed in virtual animated suspension.

Those invited for the meeting included Indian Army Chief Manoj Pande, Army Chief-designate Lieutenant General Upendra Dwivedi, Union Home Secretary Ajay Kumar Bhalla and Intelligence Bureau director Tapan Kumar Deka. From the State were the Director General of Police Manipur, Rajiv Singh, and the Security Adviser, Kuldeip Singh – both brought in from outside the State and appointed to these posts in the wake of the outbreak of violence on May 3, 2023. As a media columnist pointed, also conspicuously absent were officers from Manipur's stakeholder communities.

Considering that this meeting had quickly followed another one Mr. Shah had had in New Delhi with the Manipur Governor, Anusuiya Uikey, speculations were rife that this was a prelude to a formal invocation of Article 365 to impose a spell of President's Rule in the State. This anticipation, however, proved premature, as it is now clear that the meeting merely chalked out a strategy to contain the violence so that a dialogue process between the two warring communities can be initiated.

The messaging about the State government

Not long after the ethnic violence broke out, it had become clear that the State government was no longer in charge. First, there was a viral news that Article 355 had been imposed in the State, passing on the State government's responsibility of law-and-order upkeep to the Centre. This was later officially denied. Still, from the patterns of security deployments and operations henceforth, it was more than apparent that the State government had been almost sidelined. For instance, Mr. Biren Singh was unceremoniously removed from the customary chairmanship of the unified command of the different security establishments in the State by an order of the Governor on May 31, 2023. Only his power to summon meetings of this body was retained.

It was probably unintentional, but in noisy

cross-questioning in the Lok Sabha on August 9, 2023, during the no-confidence motion faced by the then National Democratic Alliance government, Mr. Shah when asked why the Manipur Chief Minister had still not been removed, again gave a glimpse of 'this unofficial Central rule'. In a Freudian slip, he said that there was no need for this as the Chief Minister was "cooperating" with the Centre.

Earlier, when Mr. Shah made his first trip to Manipur on May 29, 2023, after a fortnight of full punctuating the outbreak of mayhem in the State, violence again exploded in several places along the foothills. Mr. Shah made another declaration. There was to be a buffer zone along the foothills where the Imphal valley meets the surrounding hills. And, the hills were to be looked after by central forces while the State police were for the valley.

This may have been well-intentioned, but it proved to be ill-conceived. Probably, the assumption was that separating the warring communities would freeze the feud, and that normalcy would return. But when the conflict dragged on longer than anticipated, several unanticipated consequences became obvious. For one, the Meiteis, now confined in the valley, began to suspect the central forces, especially the Assam Rifles, of siding with the Kuki-Zos in the hills. And, conversely, the Kuki-Zos began viewing the State police as partisan to the Meiteis. This is despite the fact that the Assam Rifles has several Meitei officers and troopers, just as the Manipur police constabularies draw their recruits from the many communities in the State. These forces may just have been doing their brief, but amidst the dangerous and hateful passions, they ended up being coloured with communal hues.

The drift

The wisdom in the cliched adage that peace is not merely the absence of violence seems to have been completely missed. The absence of violence does give a semblance of normalcy, but when no efforts are made alongside to identify the underlying causes of discord and put them to rest, a single spark – intentional or accidental – can cause an inferno. This has been the pattern of clashes in Manipur's year of mayhem so far.

Today, the number of central and State forces in Manipur is estimated to be about 70,000 personnel. Yet, the outlook of unofficial President's Rule in Manipur has been to manage and moderate the feud, so as to keep the damage minimal and not resolve it. It is bewildering to wonder why no move has been made yet to clamp down on both sides of the fence, using proportionate and legitimate force, to establish

India needs the anchor of a national security strategy

The new National Democratic Alliance government faces some thorny old problems in national security. It will have to make decisions – or else continue to defer them – on everything from whether to build another aircraft carrier, to the process of implementing theaterisation, to managing strategic relations with the United States and competition with China. How will the coalition government, with competing demands on its resources and attention, make those decisions?

Its best option is to step back and consider national security holistically, from first principles. It should not consider this reform or that relationship in a piecemeal, haphazard way; that would risk wasting scarce resources and undermining national goals. It should, instead, commit to a new rubric for making these decisions – it should commit to writing a National Security Strategy (NSS).

Most powerful states publish some form of national security strategy. India does not. Consequently, its capability investment decisions are made by haggling between the military services. Plans and priorities get stuck in well-worn grooves, and are never systematically re-evaluated. Grand strategic vision becomes concentrated in the hands of a few individuals at the apex of government, where it gets hidden behind closed doors, or crowded out by other political whims.

Many strategic risks

India cannot afford to be so reactive. The world is throwing up a slew of strategic risks, from climate change to pandemics, which require decades of coordinated policy effort to address. China alone represents an unprecedented array of interconnected challenges, from an explosive naval build-up, to geoeconomic clout in South Asia, to leverage in global supply chains. And even distant conflicts, from Ukraine to Gaza, are revealing new technologies and tactics of war that will invariably spread to India's neighbourhood.

India needs a regular process to make sense of this tumult and plan for it.

A blueprint for expanding power

A regular and well-crafted NSS would give India five critical benefits that it currently lacks. First and logically foremost, it would force the government to undertake a comprehensive strategic assessment – a review of the country's threats and opportunities, and a stocktake of global security trends. Such a periodic review would force New Delhi to spotlight evolving challenges, such as the growth of the Chinese navy, even though it does not pose an urgent and lethal threat today. In the absence of an NSS, long-term threats will be neglected until they pose an immediate and grave threat – when they will be much harder to manage.

Second, an NSS would provide a coherent framework for long-term planning. Strategic competition requires intense work in peacetime, to conceptualise how best to secure India's expanding interests and deter its adversaries, and then to develop the requisite military capabilities and international partnerships. An NSS, done rigorously, would give the government an overarching strategic blueprint to adjudicate, for example, between the Indian Navy demanding a new aircraft carrier, or the Indian Army seeking to raise a new infantry division. In the absence of such a process, scarce resources may get wasted on vanity projects with comparatively little strategic value, and the military services left scrambling to fill capability gaps with emergency procurements.

Third, an NSS would provide an instrument for signalling to friend and foe alike. It would help to clarify India's strategic intent – declaring that, for example, India takes seriously its role as a net security provider in the Indian Ocean, so that it will counter armed coercion against other, smaller countries.

Equally valuable, an NSS would also clarify India's policy for its partners, highlighting areas

of converging interests, or explaining the limits on cooperation – to help mitigate instances of mismatched expectations.

Fourth, an NSS would create a mechanism to force various arms of the government to synchronise their efforts. Within the military, an NSS would give the Integrated Defence Staff and future joint organisations a clearer top-down mandate to better align the work of the Indian Army, Indian Air Force, and Indian Navy. Beyond the military, an NSS would provide common goals and plans so that various national security agencies, including the Ministries of Defence, External Affairs, and Home Affairs, and the intelligence agencies, could better coordinate daily at the working level, rather than episodically at the Cabinet level.

Some national security strategies are better than others. A fully effective strategy should be a public document issued with the imprimatur of the Prime Minister, because its purpose is to synchronise efforts widely across government, and credibly signal the government's political intent throughout the country and the world. A strong NSS would not automatically resolve conflicts between various arms of the government, but it should at least identify trade-offs and opportunity costs, so that political leaders can make rational decisions for long-term growth. In that way, an NSS would offer the intellectual scaffolding that is absolutely necessary for India to become one of the world's leading powers.

The ground reality

The latest and officially confirmed body count in Manipur's tragic conflict is 225, of whom, 115 are Kuki-Zos, 102 are Meiteis and eight are from other communities. The picture is not very different when it comes to the numbers affected in displacement as well, for there has been mutual ethnic cleansing on either side of the newly-created conflict buffer. A year after the outbreak of violence, even the idea of victim and perpetrator, so readily lapped up by many, has become blurred.

With so many lives and properties having been lost already, asking people who have suffered these losses to come to terms with their losses and move on, especially when it involves loved ones, is never going to be easy. But there is no other way than for those who have suffered to see their trauma being shared by their adversaries. And in the acknowledgment of this shared suffering, find the empathy bond and, ultimately, common redemption in tragedy.

Finally, an NSS would introduce a novel accountability tool, to ensure that the bureaucracy adheres to the political leadership's intent, and that the government's policies are as transparent as possible to Parliament and the people. The citizens of India have a legitimate need to know how their government is planning to safeguard their national security, and how well it is performing.

Preventing another NEET fiasco

During the National Eligibility Cum Entrance Test (NEET) this year, scores and ranks were inflated. As a consequence, many candidates may not get admission to their desired college as predicted based on previous years' scores. Coaching and admission counselling centres, typically run by business tycoons, have realised that clients, the NEET aspirants, have failed to secure preferred seats despite their advice. However, despite this fiasco, the industry has found a way to enhance their brand value through media and social media coverage. The owners of this trillion-rupee industry, along with the 23 lakh NEET aspirants this year, are up in arms. Their hypothesis is that mapping scores to ranks cannot vary very widely from previous years. In this conundrum, various allegations of cheating and paper leakage, amongst others, have been raised. Despite numerous crackdowns and investigations, paper leakage in medical admission exams remains a persistent issue.

No room for weak links
Since its inception, NEET has emerged as the largest exam in the 'One Exam, One Nation' model because of the number of candidates taking the exam, the number of languages the exam is conducted in, and the diversity of various other factors. The quality of education and the college fees payable are critical factors that vary widely. A seat in a top government college with good quality education could cost a few lakhs, whereas a seat in a private college could cost a few crores. Moreover, parents are willing to go beyond their means to secure higher ranks for their children in these competitive exams, as the family's reputation is considered to hinge on this.

Thus, the stakes in NEET are incredibly high, making it vulnerable to irregularities, accidental or intentional. Therefore, we need strong

governance in the form of foolproof and complete Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) and their compliance. There cannot be any weak link in the chain of operations from setting question papers to conducting the exam to admissions.

However, there are many weak links, as seen from the distribution of the wrong question paper at some centres, for example. Reportedly, some centres distributed the back-up question paper instead of the primary paper. How were both sets – the primary and the secondary/back-up question papers – accessed almost simultaneously? Were they accessed from banks' strongrooms or another reserve? How was the back-up question paper set taken from the banks' strongrooms without any emergency circumstances or protocols? There are several unanswered questions about the authorisation and attitude of the officials concerned. This seemingly inconsequential event is actually of enormous consequence and could give us an idea of how the exam was conducted this year.

This one error led to a cascade of errors. A wrong question paper was distributed, subsequently taken back along with the Optical Mark Recognition (OMR) sheet, thus creating panic among the candidates. The correct question paper was then distributed, and no additional time was given for the time lost. Then, exceptionally huge grace marks were awarded for the time lost, which was later scrapped due to a public outcry.

Each of the above demonstrates the need for critical SOPs for complete governance of the exam, which includes several stakeholders such as those who set the question paper, translators, reviewers, the printing press, officials at examination centers, banks' strongrooms, and invigilators. Any loose links in this chain have the potential for malpractices. Only proper investigation may reveal any substantial wrongdoing.

Despite all the above pitfalls, it

is commendable that the National Testing Agency (NTA) voluntarily disclosed most of the information, as per Section 4 of the Right to Information (RTI) Act, 2005. Since the declaration of NEET 2024, the NTA has disclosed the most relevant information through its press releases. In addition, the NTA has followed SOPs for disclosure of answer keys, collecting feedback about wrong questions and answer keys, disclosure of the individual OMR sheet, and self-evaluation of one's score, which seem to have worked with no issues at all.

The way forward

It is on record that these SOPs were developed and directed through a decade-long (2006-2015) protracted legal battle by the author of this article in the Supreme Court and High Courts to ensure transparency and develop well-defined rational SOPs for admissions to the prestigious Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs). In one such judgment, the Supreme Court observed in 2011, "In fact the action taken by the appellants in challenging the procedure for JEE 2006, their attempts to bring in transparency in the procedure by various RTI applications, and the debate generated by the several views of experts during the course of the writ proceedings, have helped in making the merit ranking process more transparent and accurate."

However, this alone is not enough for NEET. The NTA should devise SOPs to get stabilised cut-offs, as done by the IITs, avoid inflated scores and ranks, and achieve a long-tail distribution. It should work to replace ad-hocism with well-defined, sound, and secure SOPs. It should follow a professional war-room culture to facilitate quick and sound decision-making during the entire process. As the Supreme Court said in 2011, "The selection process requires to be upgraded and fine-tuned year after year with periodic changes... so that the selection process and examination remain relevant and meaningful."

The persistent problem of toxic liquor

The State government does not seem to have learned lessons from the past

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The hooch tragedy on June 18 at Kallakurichi in Tamil Nadu, which has claimed 59 lives so far, has caused major embarrassment to the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK)-led front, which has been celebrating its superlative performance in the Lok Sabha elections.

This is the second such tragedy in the last two years in the State. Just last year, 22 people died and 45 were hospitalised in Viluppuram and Chengalpattu districts after consuming toxic alcohol. This time, the death toll is much higher. So is the number of people who have been hospitalised (more than 150). Ironically, the government had informed the Assembly in 2023, before the deaths occurred, that there had been "no hooch tragedies in the State" in the last 14 years due to its "zero tolerance" policy towards blending units. Significantly, during 10 of those 14 years in question, the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (AIADMK), now the principal Opposition party in the Assembly, was in power.

As was the case in 2023, action has been taken against police and other officials this time too. More than half a dozen people have been arrested so far. The victims predominantly belonged to Scheduled Castes and other vulnerable groups in society. Apart from announcing a solatium of ₹10 lakh each to the families of the deceased and ₹50,000 for those undergoing treatment, Chief Minister M.K. Stalin has ordered the constitution of a one-man commission headed by Justice B. Gokuldas, a former High Court judge, to con-

duct an inquiry into the incident. The government has also offered to support the education of children in the villages affected by the tragedy. This is a change in approach by the DMK: in 1996, when people died after drinking contaminated liquor in Pudukottai, Chief Minister M. Karunanidhi, Mr. Stalin's father, ruled out compensation to the victims and their families arguing that it could be construed as encouragement for people following the wrong path.

Methanol has been cited as the cause of many such incidents, at least since 1990. When it was found to be the main reason for hooch tragedies in 2002, the liquid chemical was brought within the ambit of the Tamil Nadu Prohibition Act, 1937. Yet, it was once again cited as the cause of the 2023 incident, too.

The residents of Kallakurichi knew well that spurious liquor was being sold and consumed. It is hard to believe that the government was completely unaware of the prevalence and spread of the problem. It is said that products sold through the Tamil Nadu State Marketing Corporation (TASMAC) are priced higher than illicit liquor, which is why people prefer the latter. It is not yet known whether the Intelligence Wing of the police tipped the authorities of the likelihood of the May 2023 episode recurring. Leading a demonstration in Kallakurichi

on June 24, AIADMK general secretary Edappadi K. Palaniswami claimed that his fellow legislator from the area, M. Senthilkumar, had not only tried to move a calling attention motion in the Assembly last year on this issue, but even alerted the police officer concerned, a few days before the tragedy occurred at Kallakurichi.

Data of the last three decades show that hooch tragedies have invariably occurred in north Tamil Nadu. In other words, they have taken place within a radius of 200-250 km from Chennai, the capital of the State. It is also pertinent to note that in the last 10 years or so, other southern States have not reported any comparable incident of this nature. On June 21, Mr. Stalin informed the Assembly that the methanol used at Kallakurichi to produce the hooch was brought from Pudukcherry.

While the whole incident requires deeper scrutiny, the Opposition has demanded that the Chief Minister resign and the case be transferred to the Central Bureau of Investigation. While hearing a petition filed by the AIADMK, the Madras High Court wondered whether any lessons had been learned from the previous incidents and any preventive action taken to avert them. The founder of the Naam Tamilar Katchi, Seeman, argued that instead of using the taxpayers' money, the government should have made bootleggers pay the compensation.

The State government does not seem to have learned lessons from the past. Meanwhile, the Opposition parties, which performed disastrously in the Lok Sabha elections because of division within their ranks, continue to operate in silos to highlight the government's failure on the Kallakurichi incident.

Lack of focus, not finance, behind sluggish Kavach deployment

Under 2% of the Indian Railways' yearly capital expenditure is enough to implement Kavach across all engines and tracks in 10 years

The railway accident on June 17 involving the Seal-dah-bound Kanchenjunga Express and a goods train in Darjeeling, West Bengal, has once brought focus to the absence of 'Kavach', India's Automatic Train Protection (ATP) system. Ten people died in the incident. On average, 80 people are killed annually in train collisions in India (Chart 1).

Railways Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw reviewed the progress of an advanced version of the ATP Kavach 4.0 a week after the accident. He directed the installation to be taken up in "mission mode". Data show that availability of funds is not the worry for implementing Kavach; the issue lies with the pace at which it is being deployed.

Kavach can warn loco pilots if the train is at risk of overshooting the signal at red. It also has the capability of automatically applying the brakes if the loco pilot fails to reduce the speed below a certain limit. The three systems needed to implement Kavach are Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) tags placed in the tracks; the engine setup with RFID readers, a computer, and brake interface equipment; and radio towers installed at railway stations. The cost of installing Kavach in the tracks, including station equipment, is ₹50 lakh per kilometre. It costs ₹70 lakh to fit the equipment in one engine.

The route length of the Indian Railways is approximately 68,000 km. The cost of equipping Kavach on this route is about ₹34,000 crore (68,000 km X ₹50 lakh). There are about 15,200 diesel and electric engines in the Railways network. The cost of equipping the total fleet is ₹10,640 crore

(15,200 engines X ₹70 lakh). In total, it costs about ₹45,000 crore to implement the system across all the tracks and in all the engines. Given that the job will require skilled labour, specially designed equipment, and traffic diversion during implementation, assuming a 10-year window for deployment would mean that the yearly cost would be ₹4,500 crore.

The capital expenditure budget of the Railways increased substantially in the past few years to peak at ₹2,52,000 crore in FY25 (Chart 2). Even assuming that there is no increase in this amount in the next 10 years, the yearly cost of deploying Kavach is still less than 2% of the capital expenditure every year (₹4,500 crore/₹2,52,000 crore). This shows that covering the entire Railways network with Kavach would require only a small fraction of the Railways' budget.

The current rate of progress of installation of Kavach is sluggish. Field trials on passenger trains started in February 2016. Three firms were approved to supply the equipment in 2018-19. Kavach was adopted as the national ATP system in July 2020. As Chart 3 shows, until February this year, of the 68,000 km of route length (Rkm), Kavach has only been installed on 1,465 Rkm (close to 2% of the total). Of a total of about 15,200 diesel and electric locos, only 139 are equipped with Kavach (less than 1% of the total).

Even if we were to assume that the government did this in one year instead of four years (2020 to 2024), it would take another 46 years to deploy this system across all route km (68,000/1,465) and at least a hundred years to install Kavach in all engines (15,200/139) at the current pace. To be able to complete the installation of Kavach in 10 years, the pace will have to be increased to 6,800 Rkm/year for the tracks and 1,500 locos/year. Table 4 lists the calculations.

Chart 1: Number of people killed annually in train collisions in India




Chart 2: The deployment of Kavach annually in route kilometres (Rkm)




Chart 2: The Indian Railways' capital expenditure budget increased substantially in the past few years to peak at ₹2,52,000 crore in FY25



FIFTY YEARS AGO JUNE 26, 1974

Sikkim ruler in Delhi for talks on new Constitution

New Delhi, June 25: The Chogyal of Sikkim arrived here to-night for discussion with the Government of India on the new Constitution for the Himalayan Kingdom. The Chogyal left Gangtok early this morning with some senior officials in the wake of the State-wide protest, launched by the supporters of the Sikkim Congress against his reluctance to give assent to the new Constitution Bill.

The draft Constitution sought to usher in a democratic set-up which implied considerable curtailment of the Chogyal's powers and position. The Sikkim ruler is reported to have felt that some of the provisions went against the Indo-Sikkimese Treaty of 1950.

The Chogyal is expected to put forward his case in detail when he meets the Prime Minister and the External Affairs Minister here tomorrow.

From the observations he made to pressmen soon after his arrival here it was clear that he had strong reservations on the draft Constitution. He contended that the Assembly had not yet passed the resolution containing its recommendations on the Bill, he added. He also denied that during his last visit to Delhi he had indicated his consent to the clauses in the draft Constitution. According to him, he had told the Indian authorities that he would study the draft and convey his comments to the Prime Minister.

The Sikkim Ruler denied that he was holding back from signing the draft Constitution Bill. Asked about the delay in giving his assent to it, he replied that the Bill went before the Assembly on June 20 for consideration and its recommendations had now come to him in the form of a resolution. "It has not been discussed as a Bill yet. These recommendations are receiving my consideration. It will take a little time as you will appreciate that it is a constitutional matter," he added.

LS to witness rare contest for Speaker post

Union Ministers Piyush Goyal of the BJP and Lalan Singh of the Janata Dal (United) accused the Opposition of resorting to "pressure politics" by putting precondition.

The decision to field Mr. Suresh had also exposed the fault lines within the INDIA bloc as Trinamool Congress leader Abhishek Banerjee had accused the Congress of taking a unilateral decision without consulting them. Almost immediately, the Congress's top leadership reached out to Trinamool and managed to secure their backing for the Opposition candidate.

"It is not about winning or losing but about a convention that the Speaker will be of ruling party and the Deputy Speaker from the Opposition," Mr. Suresh told *The Hindu*.

"Now we are recognised as the Opposition and the Deputy Speaker post is our right," the INDIA bloc's nominee added.

Sri Lankan sailor dies in action on fishing boats

The sailor died of injuries at the Teaching Hospital in Jaffna.

The Sri Lankan Navy said it "frequently encounters aggressive manoeuvres by Indian trawlers" that often result in injuries to naval personnel and damage to Navy's ships and craft.

The arrested fishermen were taken to the Kankesanthurai naval base, sources in Tamil Nadu said.

This is the third incident of the arrest of Tamil Nadu fishermen by the Sri Lankan Navy this month.

The Sri Lankan Navy's account of the mid-sea confrontation is a reflection of an enduring fisheries conflict in the Palk Strait that severely impacts daily waged fisherfolk in northern Sri Lanka and Tamil Nadu, without any durable solution at sight. (With inputs from Dennis S Jesudasan in Chennai)

Delhi HC stays bail granted to Kejriwal

"The [trial court] Vacation Judge while passing the Impugned Order did not appropriately appreciate the material/documents submitted on record and pleas taken by ED," the High Court said.

"Accordingly the application [ED's] is allowed. The operation of the impugned order is stayed," Justice Kumar ruled.

AAP said it would challenge the order in the SC. Special judge Niyay Bindu of Delhi's Rouse Avenue Court on June 20 ordered the release of Mr. Kejriwal on a bail bond of ₹1 lakh. She pointed out that the federal agency had failed to procure any direct evidence linking him to the proceeds of the crime. However, the ED moved the HC the next day, alleging that the ruling was "perverse" and based on irrelevant facts.

Railways to bring down speed of select trains

Yet, the North Central Railway came up with another proposal on June 25, 2024, to slow down the speed of the trains to 130 kmph.

As repair or maintenance of TPWS was not possible, according to a report of the Divisional Railway Manager, the Railway Board was requested to downgrade the premium trains to be operated "at a much safer speed of 130 kmph", the sources said.

Since two zonal railways had given in writing the need to slow down the premium trains citing safety as the reason, the Railway Board would have no other option but to approve, the sources said.

Asked if the speed of Vande Bharat Express being operated on other routes across the country would also be reduced, another railway officer said the semi-high-speed trains were running only at 130 kmph on almost all the routes except along a few stretches in the Delhi-Kanpur sector where the track was fit for 160 kmph.

'Moscow preparing for likely visit by Modi'

The Russian agency said that preparations were being made for Mr. Modi's visit in "early July". The External Affairs Ministry declined to comment, and no confirmation of Mr. Ushakov's statement was made by the government. Mr. Modi is also due to visit Russia in October as Mr. Putin plans to host the extended 10-member BRICS Summit in Kazan. The plans for a bilateral meeting with Mr. Putin are significant as Mr. Modi decided last week to cancel plans to travel to the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Council meeting to be held in Astana, Kazakhstan on July 3 and 4.

Mr. Putin, Chinese President Xi Jinping, Pakistan PM Shehbaz Sharif, and leaders of Iran and Central Asian states are due to attend.

On Tuesday, Mr. Modi is understood to have conveyed to Kazakh President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev that he would not be able to attend the SCO Summit, where India has been a full member since 2017.

Two more arrested in Arang mob 'lynching' case

Two more people were arrested on Tuesday in connection with the death of three cattle transporters from Uttar Pradesh in Arang earlier this month.

With this, the total number of arrests in the case – the victims' families have alleged an act of mob lynching – is now four. The police are yet to shed light on the events that led to the killings on June 7.

The two men arrested on Tuesday are Mahasamund residents Navin Singh Thakur, and Mayank Sharma. Thakur works as a driver while the latter is a goods transporter, the police said.

The police arrested two others identified as Harsh Mishra and Raja Agarwal on June 22 and 23, respectively.

On June 7, Saddam Qureshi, 23, and his cousins Guddu Khan, 35, and Chand Miya Khan, 23, were waylaid while transporting cattle from Chhattisgarh's Mahasamund to the State capital. They were attacked by a mob on the Mahanadi river bridge in Arang.

Atishi taken to hospital, ends fast for water supply

Aam Aadmi Party Rajya Sabha member Sanjay Singh said the Minister ended her fast after she was hospitalised.

The senior AAP leader was admitted to LNJP Hospital around 3.45 a.m., Mr. Singh said.

He added all MPs of the party would write to Prime Minister Narendra Modi to provide Delhi with its rightful share of water from Haryana. The issue will also be raised by the AAP and its political allies in Parliament, he added.

Cost of future wars is enormous, resources should be optimised: Chief of Defence Staff

Saying that the cost of future wars would be "enormous", Chief of Defence Staff General Anil Chauhan on Tuesday stressed the need to optimise resources and manpower and bring in efficiencies to afford weapons and systems of the future.

Before talks of fusion between civil and military resources, there should be fusion within the Army, the Navy, and the Air Force, General Chauhan said.

"We have taken that up (service integration) and at last count, we had almost 170-odd initiatives where the three Services can

work together in an integrated manner. In these processes, we will be able to optimise time, resources, processes, infrastructure and manpower," General Chauhan said at the Air Force capstone seminar which marked the culmination of the third Warfare & Aerospace Strategy Program (WASP) course.

Strategic programme
WASP is a strategic education programme of 15 weeks that was started in 2022 to provide participants with a deep understanding of geopolitics, grand strategy and comprehensive national power, and is conducted by the IAF along with the College

of Air Warfare and Centre for Air Power Studies.

General Chauhan said that after integration within the three Services, the logical step would be to take the approach forward to other Services. For instance, the Navy and Coast Guard can get the inventories and maintenance, re-

pair and overhaul together. "We can also involve the Central Armed Police Forces into whatever logistics and infrastructure (need to be) created," he said.

Alternate ways

He added that there are "hundreds of things where we can actually help the government to reduce costs". "Because the cost of future wars is enormous, weapon systems and platforms are going to be very costly," he said.

Noting that civil aviation is expanding, General Chauhan asked if it could have a military payoff. "We need to think on alternative ways of doing things. It has to be very practical

and time bound," he said.

Addressing the seminar, IAF chief Air Chief Marshal V. R. Chaudhari said WASP has refined the definition of scholar warriors.

"A scholar warrior is a military professional who combines intellectual acumen with combat prowess in today's increasingly complex and dynamic security environment," he said.

Talking of India's strategic culture, the Air Force chief said it is shaped by historical experiences and the ever-evolving geopolitical environment. "It emphasises strategic autonomy, caution and a strong focus on territorial integrity," he said.

Former BJD Minister lets his dogs loose on journalist

Ahead of roll-out of the new criminal laws, Union Home Ministry tests eSakhsya App

Days ahead of the implementation of the three criminal laws, the Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) is testing eSakhsya (e-evidence), a mobile-phone application to help police record scene of crime, search and seizure in a criminal case and upload the file on the cloud-based platform. The police official will have to upload a selfie after the procedure is complete. Each recording could be maximum four minutes long and several such files could be uploaded for each First Information Report (FIR), according to the details shared with State police departments.

The Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) that replaces the Indian Penal Code, 1860; the Bharatiya Sakhsya (BS) which replaces the Indian Evidence Act, 1872; and the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) that replaces the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1898

The mobile application will be available to all police stations to download and register

are all set to come into force from July 1.

Conviction rate

The BNSS mandates compulsory audiovisual recording of search and seizure in each criminal case and mandatory forensic examination in all cases where an offence attracts punishment of seven years or more. Procuring hardware and cloud space is an expensive affair and many States do not have enough resources, said an official, adding that it will also help uniformity in investigations, thereby increasing the conviction rate.

The mobile application developed by the National Informatics Centre (NIC) will be available to all police stations which register and download the app.

A senior government of-

icial said the app was under final stages of trial and the police were given two options. "If there is connectivity issue, the police can record the crime scene on their own device such as personal mobile phones and generate a hash value, come back to the police station and upload the file. The other method is they can directly upload through eSakhsya for which good Internet speed is required," explained the official.

Another police officer cautioned that the sanctity of the chain of evidence submission will have to be adhered to, else, it could benefit an accused.

"Many accused escape the clutches of law due to procedural infirmities. The new laws make everything digital; if there is slightest of issue in procuring digital evidence, it could lead to criminals walking free. Forensic evidence is not always challenged on the grounds of quality but on the chain of command," said the officer.

Urban Affairs Ministry to revamp affordable housing scheme

Release minor held in Pune car crash case: Bombay HC

The Bombay High Court on Tuesday ordered the release of a 17-year-old accused in the Pune luxury car accident case that killed two young IT professionals. The court declared the remand order illegal and set it aside.

A Division Bench of Justice Bharati Dangre and Justice Manjusha Deshpande pronounced the order on Tuesday after reserving it on June 21. Passing the order, the Bench observed that the custody order passed by the Juvenile Justice Board (JJB) was illegal and issued without jurisdiction, and allowed a *habeas corpus* writ petition filed by the paternal aunt of the accused who filed the plea seeking his release from the observation home.

The Bench said, "We order his release. The Child in Conflict with Law/minor (CCL) shall be in the care and custody of the petitioner [paternal aunt]." The court also observed that though the accident was unfortunate, the boy could not be kept in an observation home.

VHP leader's murder: NIA offers ₹10 lakh for leads

A total of 262 members took oath on Monday, *pro-tem* speaker Bhadrachari Mahtab said as the House assembled in the morning. Among those who could not be present were Congress MP Shashi Tharoor, Shatrughan Sinha and Deepak Adhikari of the Trinamool, Afzal Ansari of the

Samajwadi Party and Independents Rashid Engineer and Amritpal Singh.

'Red Constitution'

Mr. Gandhi, who took oath as MP for Rae Bareilly in Uttar Pradesh, said "Jai Hind, Jai Samvidhan" (hail India, hail Constitution) as he held aloft a copy of the red Constitution book.

Several Opposition MPs took oath while holding a copy of the Constitution.

Chhatrapal Singh Gangwar, BJP MP for Bareilly, elicited protests from the Opposition ranks for mak-

ing a majoritarian comment after taking oath.

A reference to a West Asian region by Mr. Owaisi also triggered an uproar. Reacting to his comments, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju told presspersons outside the House: "Is it appropriate for any member to raise a slogan praising another country? We will see the rules".

Independent MP from Purnea in Bihar, Pappu Yadav took oath wearing a shirt with "RE-NEET" written on it.

As Manipur MPs Angomcha Bimol Akoijam and Alfred Kan-Ngam Arthur, were called for taking oath, Opposition members shouted "Manipur, Manipur".

When Ms. Moitra, who had been expelled from the 17th Lok Sabha, walked up to take oath, her party MPs were heard shouting, "Look how she has come back. The ethics committee has lost, Mahua Moitra has won".

Rahul Gandhi to be Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha

Rahul Gandhi will be the Leader of the Opposition (LoP) in the Lok Sabha, the Congress announced on Tuesday.

The announcement was made after a meeting of the floor leaders of the Indian National Developmental, Inclusive Alliance (INDIA) grouping at Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge's official residence.

The decision came on a day when Mr. Gandhi took oath as an MP for the fifth consecutive term. This is the first constitutional position that Mr. Gandhi would be holding in his 20-year-old political career.

As LoP, Mr. Gandhi is likely to open the debate on the Motion of Thanks to the President for her address to the joint session of Parliament when the Lok Sabha takes it up later this week or next week.

The LoP, enjoying the rank of a Cabinet Minister, is also on the selection panel for key official appointments such as Election Commissioner, Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) Director, Central Vigilance Commissioner and National Human Rights Commission chief.

'Letter sent to Mahtab' "Congress Parliamentary Party chairperson [Sonia

Gandhi] has already sent a letter to *pro tem* Speaker Bhadrachari Mahtab, informing him that Rahul Gandhi will be the Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha," party general secretary (organisation) K.C. Venugopal told presspersons.

"As Congress president, I am confident that a leader who has traversed the length and breadth of the country from Kanniyaku-

mar to Kashmir, and from Manipur to Maharashtra shall raise the voice of the people - especially the marginalised and the poor," party chief Mallikarjun Kharge said in a post on X (formerly Twitter).

'Voice of people'

"We are confident that as LoP, Rahul ji will be a bold voice for the common people of India and ensure that the NDA government is held firmly accountable at all times," Mr. Venugopal added in a post on X.

The Congress was unable to secure the official post of Leader of the Opposition 2014 and 2019 as the party did not have the minimum required 10% strength in the 543-member Lok Sabha.

However, with 99 MPs, the party is now entitled to the post, and therefore, the Congress Working Committee (CWC) had urged Mr. Gandhi to take over the responsibility.

Bail petitions should not be adjourned indefinitely: SC

The Supreme Court on Tuesday made it loud and clear that courts should not indefinitely adjourn bail applications, while hearing a plea filed by former Delhi Minister Saatyender Jain.

Mr. Jain was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate on allegations of money laundering in May 2022. Appearing before a Bench led by Justice Manoj Misra, senior advocate A.M. Singhvi, for the AAP leader, said the Delhi High Court had adjourned his bail plea for six weeks.

"It goes without saying that bail prayers are not to be indefinitely adjourned and therefore, we hope and trust that the High Court shall take its own call in the matter," the Supreme Court observed in an order.

The court recorded this observation on its order after Mr. Singhvi urged that the High Court decide the bail plea on July 9, the date of hearing fixed by it.

Congress curbed rights during Emergency, has no right to speak for Constitution: PM

The 49th anniversary of the imposition of the Emergency became the springboard from which Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched a sharp attack on the Congress, saying the Opposition party had in the past "trampled over the Constitution".

The Congress has been accusing the Bharatiya Janata Party of subverting the Constitution. He said the "dark days" following the imposition of the Emergency on June 25, 1975, which led to the jailing of political activists and suspension of civil liberties, were a reminder of how the Congress "subverted basic freedoms and trampled over the Constitution which every Indian respects greatly".

"Those who imposed the Emergency have no

right to profess their love for our Constitution," Mr. Modi said in a series of posts on the social media platform X (formerly Twitter).

"These are the same people who have imposed Article 356 (President's Rule in a State) on innumerable occasions, got a Bill to destroy press freedom, des-

troyed federalism and violated every aspect of the Constitution," he posted.

"The mindset which led to the imposition of the Emergency is very much alive among the same party which imposed it. They hide their disdain for the Constitution through their tokenism but the people of India have seen through

their antics and that is why they have rejected them time and again," he said.

The then Congress government had disregarded every democratic principle and turned the nation into a jail, "Just to cling on to power," Mr. Modi said.

"Socially regressive policies were unleashed to target the weakest sections," he said.

'Voices suppressed'

The BJP marked the occasion with party president and Union Minister J.P. Nadda speaking to workers at the party headquarters here, saying the Congress's decision to impose the Emergency "had shaken the very pillars of democracy".

"During this period, those who today claim to be guardians of Indian democracy left no effort to suppress voices raised in defence of constitutional

values," Mr. Nadda said.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah recalled former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi's words in Parliament on the subject of Emergency.

"The *yuvraj* of the Congress [a reference to party leader Rahul Gandhi] has forgotten that his grandmother imposed the Emergency and his father, Mr. Rajiv Gandhi, on July 23, 1985, said in the Lok Sabha, taking much pride in this horrific episode: 'There is nothing wrong with an Emergency if any Prime Minister of this country who feels that an Emergency is necessary, under these circumstances and does not apply the Emergency, he is not fit to be the Prime Minister of this country.' This very act of taking pride in a dictatorial act shows that nothing else is dear to the Congress other than the family and power," Mr. Shah posted on X.

Prime Minister raking up past to hide his failures, says Congress president

Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge on Tuesday said Prime Minister Narendra Modi kept raking up the past to hide his failures. The remarks came as Mr. Modi and BJP leaders attacked the party for the Emergency in 1975.

Referring to the Prime Minister's stress on consensus, he pointed out the instances when the Modi government took decisions unilaterally.

"Modiji, the country is looking forward to the future but you keep scratching the past to hide your failures. In the past 10 years, you made 140 crore Indians realise what 'undeclared Emergency' is, which caused a deep trauma to democracy and the

Constitution," Mr. Kharge said in a post on X. "Breaking parties, toppling elected governments through the backdoor, misuse of agencies like ED, CBI, IT against 95 per cent of Opposition leaders, putting Chief Ministers in jail, and using the official machinery before elections and disturbing the level playing field, is this not undeclared Emergency," he asked.

"Modiji talks of consensus and cooperation but his actions are just the opposite," he said. He asked whether there was consensus when 146 Opposition MPs were suspended from

Parliament and three new laws were brought to change the Code of Criminal Procedure, Indian Penal Code and Indian Evidence Act.

"Where was the consensus when statues of stalwarts like Chhatrapati Shivaji, Mahatma Gandhi and Babasaheb Ambedkar were relocated within Parliament complex without even asking the Opposition. Where was this consensus when three new farm laws were forced on 15 crore farmer families and they had to sit on the roads for months together," Mr. Kharge added.

"The BJP has disregarded democracy and Constitution while the Congress has always stood by democracy and the Constitution and will continue to do so," he said.

From the first Lok Sabha to the 18th, a snapshot of Speaker elections

The hard-fought, polarised election continues to inform the first session of the Lok Sabha with the election to the Speaker's post being contested by two candidates, Om Birla of the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) who was the Speaker in the 17th Lok Sabha, and K. Suresh, eight-term MP from the Congress.

This is, however, not the first instance that the Speaker's post has seen a contest, with at least three previous occasions witnessing voting on the floor of the House, while in two other instances, the Opposition parties put up a candidate but the Speaker's election was held on the basis of a voice vote.

According to Ravindra Garimella, former Joint Secretary (Legislation), Lok Sabha Secretariat, the first time an election for the Speaker's post took place was in the first Lok Sabha

of 1952, when G.V. Mavalankar defeated Shantaram More.

Then again, in 1967, Neelam Sanjeeva Reddy of the Congress won against Tenneti Viswanathan, whose candidature was supported by former Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, then an MP.

And finally, in 1976, during the Emergency, in the fifth Lok Sabha, Baliram Bhagat was elected Speaker against a competing claim by Jagannath Rao Joshi of the Jana Sangh.

"In 1976, the election of Baliram Bhagat was necessitated by the fact that the previous Speaker had been made a Cabinet Minister in the then Congress government," Mr. Garimella said.

There were two other instances when competing candidates were put up, in the 10th and 12th Lok Sabha, respectively, but since the government's candidates were elected via a voice vote, other motions were considered lapsed.

These instances shine light on the fact that des-

pite the vicissitudes of coalition politics, it has been a while since voting has taken place in a contest to elect the Speaker.

The BJP, reduced to 240 MPs in the 2024 Lok Sabha election, and at the head of a coalition government, is keen to demonstrate its dominance of the House and the stability of its coalition.

The effort, say sources in the party, is to register a comprehensive number backing their candidate, over and above the NDA's numbers, for which four YSRCP MPs have also pledged their support to the NDA.

Minister for Parliamentary Affairs Kiren Rijiju stressed that the Lok Sabha Speaker was above party lines and it was a desirable aim that his or her election to the post should be unanimous and without rancour.

For the Opposition, contesting would be an opportunity to demonstrate the consolidation of the anti-NDA bloc.

Government officer driving in inebriated state kills three

A woman and two of her nieces were killed and her daughter was injured after an Additional Block Development Officer ran them over with his car in Tehri Garhwal of Uttarakhand on Tuesday. The accused was in an inebriated state when caught by the public, after the accident. The video of the accident, making rounds on social media, shows Reena Negi, 34, walking on the roadside along with the children when a speeding car, on the wrong side, hits them. One of the children was flung into the air in the collision, while the other violently hit the ground. The sound of the collision and cries for help by the woman prompted the local people to rush to the spot and rescue the injured.

NEET-UG case: Maharashtra police detain 2 'sub-agents'

The Maharashtra Police have detained two "sub-agents" who were allegedly working under the "direction" of one of the arrested zilla parishad teachers involved in the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test-Undergraduate (NEET-UG) question paper leak case, informed sources said on Tuesday.

The two persons have been detained from Beed district, and they were reportedly in touch with Jalil Pathan, who was arrested on Sunday and will be in police custody till July 2. The other zilla parishad teacher involved in the case, Sanjay Jadhav, was on Tuesday produced before a local court where he was sent to police custody till July 2.

The accused teachers were said to have taken advance payment of ₹50,000, while the remaining amount – said to be in lakhs – was to be given by the candidate after they "passed" the test. After candidates paid the advance, their admit cards were given to Irrana Kongalwar from Nanded. A case was registered against four at the Shivajinagar police station in Latur on Sunday night.

NTA reform panel to elicit views of parents, students

Revised NEET-PG date will be announced next week, says President of the National Board of Examinations in Medical Sciences; CBI seals NTA office in New Delhi and curtails outsider entry

A day after convening the first meeting of the National Testing Agency reform committee, K. Radhakrishnan, head of the panel and former ISRO Chairman, said on Tuesday that its first priority was to elicit from students and parents across the country their concerns and suggestions regarding the recent instances of exam paper leak that had compromised the NTA's integrity.

"We are going to engage with them as far as possible in person or through electronic media, and in the next fortnight, we will like to consolidate this," he said in a statement.

"The next priority for us is to build quickly a robust system for starting the tests. We are also looking at the future – to develop in this country a robust tamper-proof system, a system with zero error, and a system which will lessen difficulty and stress for the students with adequate flexibility built into it."

A day after taking over all police cases pertaining to the National Eligibility-

Cum-Entrance Test (NEET) undergraduate paper leak across States, the Central Bureau of Investigation sealed off the first floor of the NTA office in NSIC-MDBP building here, and covered the premises with white cloth to prevent any public view of the offices. The office is under heavy security with multiple checkpoints, and movement of people has been severely curtailed.

New date

Setting aside rumours on social media that NEET-PG, 2024, which is conducted by the National Board of Examinations in Medical Sciences, has been indefinitely

delayed, Board president Abhijit Sheth said the revised date would be announced next week.

Dr. Sheth said the integrity of the test had never been in doubt. "For the past seven years, we have conducted it successfully but in view of the recent events, what has happened is, there are a lot of concerns about the test in student community," he said.

He said the government had decided to make sure that sanctity, safety and security of the tests must be maintained so they had decided to review the standard operating procedures and protocols.

CBI to seek remand of accused in NEET case

The Central Bureau of Investigation will soon seek remand of the 18 accused in the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test paper leak case for interrogation.

Thirteen of the accused from Patna and five from Jharkhand are now in judicial custody. They have been named by the Economic Offences Wing (EOU) of the Bihar Police which was investigating the case before the CBI took over on Monday.

"The hearing of the bail plea of the 13 accused and the anticipatory bail plea of the main accused Sanjeev Mukhiya will be held in the Special CBI Court on July 15. We will submit the case transfer order letter in the CBI court today [Tuesday]," Uday Shankar Singh, public prosecutor, said.

Earlier, hearing the bail petitions, Additional District Judge Rajendra Kumar Singh asked the accused to approach the Special CBI Court as the case was now being investigated by the Central agency.

The CBI team had discussions with Additional Director-General of Police, EOU, Nayyar Hasnain Khan and Senior Superintendent of Police, Patna, Rajiv Mishra.

Jal Shakti Ministry conceives 'new project' to fix water deficit in Jal Jeevan Mission

Union Jal Shakti Minister C.R. Patil said at a public event on Monday that the government was conceiving a "new project" to ensure that rural households which were provided taps under the ambitious Jal Jeevan Mission but had not yet been able to get water, would soon be provided potable water.

"In some places, we have not been able to fully accomplish the Prime Minister's target," Mr. Patil said at a workshop organised for officers in the Ministry. "Some people say in just that we have taps but no water. We are in the process of setting up a new project, where in a time-bound manner, we shall ensure that households

with taps and no water, and those without taps are all covered," he added.

The ₹3.6-lakh-crore Jal Jeevan Mission was implemented after Prime Minister Narendra Modi promised from the ramparts of the Red Fort in 2019 to provide potable tap water to every rural household in India.

As of June 25, the scheme had encompassed

77% of its target household, officials from the Ministry said at an event on Monday.

Overall, 15 crore households out of a targeted 19 crore have been provided with tap water connections. However, as *The Hindu* has earlier pointed out, there is a difference between a household getting a tap connection and the daily quota of 55 litres per person day of water being provided.

To measure households that have been provided water connections, the water supply departments of the States or Union Territories aggregate the numbers provided by districts of the households, anganwadi or schools in their respective administrative units who have been provided tap water connections.

Pak. delegation inspect Ratle power project on Chenab river in J&K

A five-member Pakistan delegation and neutral experts of the World Bank toured the Ratle power project, a run-of-the-river hydroelectric power project in the Chenab Valley, on Tuesday.

The delegation, which is on the second day of its visit to Kishtwar, visited the 850-MW Ratle project on the Chenab river at Drabshalla village and inspected several units of the project. The inspection by the 40-odd member team, including delegates from India, was kept away from the media gaze.

Pakistan has been raising technical objections in different forums, including the Permanent Indus Commission, since 2006 regarding power projects in

J&K and even demanded an arbitration by different international forums, which was rejected by India.

Pakal Dul project

Official sources said the Pakistani delegation is likely to inspect the 1,000-megawatt Pakal Dul hydroelectric project being built on the Marusudar river, which emerges from the Marwah Valley before joining the Chenab river.

Pakistan also raised its objection over the Kishanganga project in Kashmir valley in 2006. Officials are tight-lipped on whether the delegates will be given access to the power project set up over the Kishanganga river in north Kashmir's Bandipora district.

The delegation will be in Jammu and Kashmir till June 28.

Defence Ministry signs 350th contract under iDEX for 'miniaturised satellite'



The 350th contract under the Innovations for Defence Excellence (iDEX), the flagship initiative of the Defence Ministry, was signed with SpacePixxel Technologies for the design and development of a "miniaturised satellite capable of carrying electro-optical, infrared, synthetic aperture radar, and hyperspectral payloads up to 150 kg", the Defence Ministry announced on Tuesday.

This challenge is being led by the Indian Air Force.

Pros of the satellite

"This 350th iDEX contract enables innovation in space electronics, wherein many payloads earlier deployed on dedicated large satellites are now being mi-

niaturised," the Ministry said.

The modular small satellite will integrate multiple miniaturised payloads as per requirement, providing advantages such as faster and economical deployment, ease of manufacturing, scalability, adaptability, and less environmental impact, it stated.

The contract was ex-

changed between Anurag Bajpai, Additional Secretary (Defence Production) & CEO, Defence Innovation Organisation (DIO), and Awais Ahmed Nadeem Alduri, founder and CEO of the SpacePixxel Technologies.

SpacePixxel has been actively working to build and launch high-resolution hyperspectral imaging satellites to provide detailed earth observation data, the statement said.

Established by the DIO under the Department of Defence Production, iDEX has launched 11 editions of the Defence India Start-up Challenge and recently unveiled the Acing Development of Innovative Technologies with iDEX (ADITT) scheme to promote innovations in critical and strategic defence technologies.

India kicks off \$11.5 billion telecom spectrum auction

India has offered telecom spectrum worth about ₹962.38 billion (\$11.53 billion) for auction on Tuesday, even as analysts expect lacklustre participation from players as they shore up their existing spectrum. A total of 10 GHz of radiowaves is up for sale in this auction, ranging between 800 MHz to 26 GHz. The government derives a big chunk of its revenue from spectrum auctions, which award telecom companies rights over airwaves for a particular period. **REUTERS**

iD Fresh Food announces expansion to 11 cities

iD Fresh Food, a Bengaluru-based food products company, on Tuesday, announced its pan-India expansion into 11 new cities, including tier 2 and tier 3 markets, across six states. Clocking in 25% year-on-year growth, the company said it was eyeing a revenue of ₹700 crore in FY2024-25. "As we prepare for international expansion and IPO journey, our aim is to become the market leader in these regions within the next 12 to 18 months," said Global CEO and co-founder P.C. Musthafa.

TI Clean Mobility completes fund raising for EV verticals

TI Clean Mobility Pvt. Ltd. (TICMPL) said it had raised the targeted fund of ₹3,000 crore from Tube Investments of India Ltd. (TII) and other investors to fund multiple verticals of electric vehicles. On Tuesday, the Murugappa group firm said in a filing it allotted 1,60,00,000 Series A2 compulsorily convertible preference shares to South Asia Growth Invest III LLC, amounting to ₹160 crore. TICMPL is currently focused on creating EV-native commercial vehicle platforms.

India's external debt rises \$39.7 bn YoY to \$663.8 bn: RBI data

India's external debt at the end of March 2024 was at \$663.8 billion, an increase of \$39.7 billion from its level at end-March 2023.

The external debt-to-GDP ratio declined to 18.7% at end-March 2024 from 19.0% at end-March 2023, according to data released by RBI on Tuesday.

Valuation effect due to the appreciation of the U.S. dollar vis-à-vis the Indian rupee and other major currencies such as yen, euro and SDR amounted to \$8.7 billion. U.S. dollar-denominated debt remained the largest component of India's external debt, with a share of 53.8% at end-

Loans remained the largest component of external debt (33.4%), followed by currency and deposits (23.3%)

March 2024, followed by debt denominated in the Indian rupee (31.5%), yen (5.8%), SDR (5.4%), and euro (2.8%). Outstanding debt of both government and non-government sectors increased at end-March 2024 over the year earlier level.

Loans remained the largest component of external debt at 33.4%, followed by currency and deposits (23.3%), trade credit and advances (17.9%) and debt securities (17.3%).

'India's coal use overtook N. America and Europe'

For the first time, India's coal consumption surpassed that of North America and Europe combined in the calendar year 2023, Energy Institute and KPMG said in a report titled '2024 Statistical Review of World Energy'.

Fossil fuel use accelerated in India and many African nations, outpacing the growth of renewables, the organisations observed.

Anish De, Global Head, Energy, KPMG said, "Globally, energy demand was up 2% and emissions exceeded 40 Gt CO2 for the first time."

'Water stress can hurt credit profile'

Moody's says India among those most vulnerable to water management risks; country has the poorest access to basic services, including water, among G-20 economies, the rating major flags; warns of implications to sovereign credit strength

Moody's Ratings on Tuesday warned that India's growing water shortage and increasingly frequent climate change-driven natural disasters, amid a rise in consumption and rapid economic growth, could negatively impact the country's sovereign credit strength.

Currently rated Baa3 stable, which as per Moody's denotes the lowest investment grade rating, India is susceptible to increasing water stress,

cerbate volatility in India's growth and undermine the economy's ability to withstand shocks given that more than 40% of the country's workforce is employed in agriculture," Moody's said in a note on environmental risks for India, identifying coal-fired power generation and steel production as the industrial sectors most vulnerable to water stress.

Moody's stressed that India is one of the sovereigns most vulnerable to risks associated with water management and has the poor-

est access to basic services, including water, among G-20 economies.

India's fast economic growth, accompanied by rapid industrialisation and urbanisation, is reducing water availability in the most populous country.

Average annual water availability per capita is likely to drop to 1,367 cubic meters by 2031 from an already-low 1,486 cubic meters in 2021, Moody's said. A level below 1,700 cubic meters indicates water stress, with 1,000 cubic meters the threshold for water scarcity, as per the Water Resources Ministry.

K-shaped recovery fuelling similar trend in inflation: HSBC

NEW DELHI

An uneven K-shaped recovery in economic growth is also fuelling a similar trajectory for inflation dynamics, with food and rural price rise outpacing the inflation in other goods and services, and that faced by urban consumers, respectively, HSBC researchers said on Tuesday.

There has been much debate over India's post-pandemic recovery being driven by demand for higher-end goods and services. Apart from the dichotomy

between rural and urban inflation, and food prices compared with other goods, HSBC pointed to goods inflation being higher than that for services.

"Perhaps inflation and growth dynamics were never meant to differ," HSBC's chief economist for India and Indonesia Pranjul Bhandari wrote. "The same shocks that are driving the variance in growth, like the pandemic and climate change, hurting some groups more than others, are also likely driving the variance in prices," Ms. Bhandari added.

'India must focus on reducing inflation to 4%'

Reserve Bank of India Governor Shaktikanta Das said on Tuesday that India needs a clear and unambiguous focus to lower inflation to its 4% goal.

Retail inflation eased to 4.75% in May, from 4.83% in April.

"When dealing with the challenge of inflation, a single wrong move can distract you, throw you off track and coming back on track would be far more costly and will [take] much more time," Mr. Das said in a speech.

FinMin must raise RoDTEP outlay: FIEO

Focus on fiscal austerity must not come in the way of ensuring zero rating for exports, the FIEO urged the Finance Ministry, signalling the need to raise outlay for Remission of Duties, Taxes on Export Products (RoDTEP) scheme.

In a pre-Budget consultation chaired by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, Federation of Indian Exporters' Organisations (FIEO) President Ashwani Kumar said zero rating of exports is an "avowed policy" of the government and should not be limited due to budgetary constraints.



Zero rating of exports means no local taxes are added to export goods. The RoDTEP scheme is aimed at refunding duties incurred in production or export process to the exporter. RoDTEP has a budget of ₹15,070 crore for 2024-25. The FM also held consultations on education, skilling and employment with domain experts.

Cotton consumption second highest in 10 years, says Ministry

COIMBATORE

Cotton consumption by the textile industry in the current marketing season (October 2023 to September 2024) is one of the highest this decade, said a press release from the Ministry of Textiles.

The third meeting of the Committee on Cotton Production and Consumption for this season was held on Monday. Roop Rashi, Textile Commissioner, said this year will be the second-highest consumption in 10 years with demand of about 307 lakh bales, including 103 lakh bales from the MSME textile units.

Cotton production this season is expected to be



325.22 lakh bales, imports 12 lakh bales, and exports 28 lakh bales. The season is likely to end with 47.38 lakh bales as closing stock.

Industry stakeholders said current Indian cotton prices are higher than those internationally and are unlikely to rise further, and textile mills are operating at 75-80% capacity.

Start drafting ultra-Orthodox into Army, says Israeli court

Israel's Supreme Court on Tuesday ruled unanimously that the military must begin drafting ultra-Orthodox men for compulsory service, a landmark decision that could lead to the collapse of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's governing coalition as Israel continues to wage war in Gaza.

The historic ruling effectively puts an end to a decades-old system that granted ultra-Orthodox men broad exemptions from military service while maintaining mandatory enlistment for the country's secular Jewish majority. The arrangement, deemed discriminatory by critics, has created a deep chasm in Israel's Jewish majority over who should shoulder the burden of protecting the country.

In its ruling, the court found that the state was carrying out "invalid selective enforcement, which represents a serious violation of the rule of law, and the principle according to which all individuals are equal before the law."

It did not say how many ultra-Orthodox should be drafted, but the military has said it is capable of enlisting 3,000 this year. Politically powerful ultra-Orthodox parties, key partners in Mr. Netanyahu's governing coalition, oppose any change in the current system. If the exemptions are ended, they could bolt the coalition, causing the government to collapse and likely leading to new elections at a time when its popularity has dropped.

Five shot dead as protesters breach Kenya's parliament

As demonstrators enter parliament complex, fire erupts and police begin shooting, injuring 31; lawmakers were debating a contentious Bill featuring tax hike proposals that citizens opposed

Five persons were shot dead and 31 wounded on Tuesday during protests in Kenya over proposed tax hikes, as crowds opposed to proposed tax hikes breached barricades to enter the parliamentary complex where a fire erupted.

The rallies, led by the youth, began last week, and caught the government off guard, with President William Ruto saying over the weekend he was ready to talk to the protesters.

But tensions escalated sharply on Tuesday afternoon, as crowds began to

throw stones at police and push back against barricades, making their way towards the parliament complex, which was sealed off by police in full riot gear.

Police fired at crowds

massing outside the parliament building, where lawmakers had been debating a contentious Bill featuring tax hike proposals.

Shortly before, Irungu Houghton, the executive

director of Amnesty International Kenya, said "human rights observers are now reporting the increasing use of live bullets by the National Police Service in the capital of Nairobi".

Anger over a cost-of-living crisis spiralled into nationwide rallies last week, with demonstrators calling for the Finance Bill to be scrapped.

Despite a heavy police presence, thousands of protesters had earlier marched through Nairobi's business district, pushing back against barricades as they headed towards parliament. Police in full riot gear were firing tear gas and rubber bullets into the crowd.

Julian Assange set to plead guilty to an Espionage Act charge and then walk free

A plane with WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange departed Bangkok after refuelling on Tuesday and he is on the way to Saipan to enter a plea deal with the U.S. government that will free him and resolve the legal case over the publication of a trove of classified documents.

The chartered flight from London that Mr. Assange's wife, Stella, confirmed was carrying her husband left Don Mueang International Airport, according to the FlightRadar24 plane tracking app. The official WikiLeaks account on X said Mr. Assange was heading toward Saipan, the capital of the

Department in a letter filed in court.

Mr. Assange is expected to return to his home country of Australia after his plea and sentencing.

The plea deal brings an abrupt conclusion to a criminal case of international intrigue and to the U.S. government's yearslong pursuit of a publisher whose hugely popular secret-sharing website made him a cause célèbre among many press freedom advocates who said he acted as a journalist to expose U.S. military wrongdoing.

Stella Assange told the BBC from Australia that it had been "touch and go" over the past 72 hours whether the deal would go ahead but she felt "elated" at the news.

ICC issues arrest warrants for Russian Army chief, ex-Minister

The International Criminal Court on Tuesday said it had issued arrest warrants for Russia's Army chief and former Defence Minister over strikes on Ukrainian infrastructure that constituted alleged war crimes.

The ICC warrants are the latest in a series of actions by the court over the Ukraine war, including an arrest warrant for Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The warrants concerned the Chief of the General Staff Valery Gerasimov, and former Defence

Minister Sergei Shoigu and Sergei Shoigu are accused of directing attacks at civilian targets

Minister Sergei Shoigu.

The pair is accused of the war crimes of directing attacks at civilian targets and causing excessive incidental harm to civilians, as well as the crime against humanity of "inhumane acts" in Ukraine.

ICC judges said there were "reasonable grounds to believe that the two suspects bear responsibility

for missile strikes carried out by the Russian armed forces against the Ukrainian electric infrastructure from at least 10 October 2022 until at least 9 March 2023." The court said these strikes were "directed against civilian objects" and even when targets could be considered military, civilian damage "would have been clearly excessive to the anticipated military advantage".

Ukraine hailed the "important" decision, with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy saying Kyiv hoped to see the pair "behind bars".

Chinese probe returns to Earth with first samples from far side of the moon

China's Chang'e 6 probe returned to earth with rock and soil samples from the little-explored far side of the moon in a global first.

"I now declare that the Chang'e 6 Lunar Exploration Mission achieved complete success," Zhang Kejian, Director of the China National Space Administration, said after the landing.

Chinese scientists anticipate the returned samples will include 2.5 million-year-old volcanic rock and other material that scientists hope will answer

questions about geographic differences on the moon's two sides.

The near side is what is seen from Earth, and the

far side faces outer space. The far side is also known to have mountains and impact craters, contrasting with the relatively flat ex-

panses visible on the near side of the moon.

High hopes

The probe had landed in the moon's South Pole-Aitken Basin, an impact crater created more than 4 billion years ago. The samples scientists are expecting will likely come from different layers of the basin, which will bear traces of the different geological events. While past U.S. and Soviet missions have collected samples from the moon's near side, the Chinese mission was the first that has collected samples from the far side.

Brazil frustrated by Costa Rica, Colombia starts well

A lacklustre Brazil launched its Copa America campaign with a dour 0-0 draw against Costa Rica on Monday as James Rodriguez inspired Colombia to a 2-1 win over Paraguay.

Brazil, chasing a 10th Copa America crown, dominated possession and territory in the Group D game at the SoFi Stadium in Los Angeles but struggled to break down a resolute Costa Rica.

The Brazilians thought they had taken the lead in the 30th minute after Marquinho tapped in at the back post after a flick on by Rodrygo following a free-kick by Raphinha.

But after an agonising

VAR delay, the goal was chalked off for a fractional offside decision as Costa Rica escaped.

That was as good as it got for Brazil, which laboured to break down Costa Rica's defence for the remainder of the game, registering just three shots on target despite enjoying 73.5 percent possession.

Colombia finished the day top of Group D after collecting all three points in its deserved win over Paraguay at Houston.

Rodriguez shines

Rodriguez, whose club career has languished in the decade since he rose to prominence with a dazzling performance at the 2014 World Cup, created both of Colombia's goals.

The 32-year-old midfielder, who has played just a handful of minutes for Bra-

zilian club Sao Paulo in the two months leading into the Copa America, set up the opening goal for Colombia in the 32nd minute.

After finding space on the left, Rodriguez flighted a pinpoint cross to the far post to pick out Daniel Munoz, who beat Paraguay goalkeeper Rodrigo Morinigo with a firm downward header to make it 1-0.

Ten minutes later Colombia doubled its lead and again it was a goal engineered by the trusty left boot of Rodriguez.

This time the goal arrived from the opposite flank, with Rodriguez swinging in a wicked free-kick that was glanced in by Crystal Palace midfielder Jefferson Lerma.

The results: Brazil 0 drew with Costa Rica 0; Colombia 2 (Munoz 32, Lerma 42) bt Paraguay 1 (Enciso 69).

In the process, Rashid's maverick team knocked out 2021 champion Australia after having humbled it in its previous Super 8 match. The Afghans will face the South Africans in the semifinal on June 27.

Slow progress

Opting to bat after winning the toss, Afghanistan's batting stumbled to a below-par 115 for five as the bowlers bowled 66 dot balls.

Rishad Hossain, three for 26, led the charge while for Afghanistan, opener Rahmanullah Gurbaz hit a painstaking 43 off 55 balls. The match was eventually truncated to 19-overs-a-side due to frequent rain interruptions and Bangladesh was given a revised target on 114.

Afghanistan produced a gritty bowling performance, spearheaded by Rashid (four for 23) and Naveen-ul-Haq (four for 26).

Litton Das (54 not out) was the lone warrior for Bangladesh in the game that also featured some questionable delaying tactics by the Afghans when they were ahead on DLS par score.

While Gurbaz and Ibrahim Zadran forged a crucial 59-run stand with the bat, Fazalhaq Farooqi and Naveen picked up wickets upfront.

Farooqi sent Tanzid Hasan (0) packing in the second over followed by Naveen-ul-Haq in which he claimed the scalps of Najmul Hossain Shanto (5) and Shakib Al Hasan (0).

Rashid then picked up two wickets off his consecutive overs. The skipper went on to snare two wickets off consecutive balls, to also become the fastest to 150 T20 wickets, going past

Gulbadin Naib dramatically falling on his back, clutching his thigh after Afghanistan coach Jonathan Trott signalled his players to slow things down in the match against Bangladesh caused both amusement and annoyance.

Naib, who was fielding in the slip cordon, complained of cramps during the 12th over bowled by spinner Noor Ahmad, after Trott was seen on camera asking his players to slow down as Bangladesh had fallen behind on the Duckworth-Lewis par score in the rainy encounter.

"The coach sends a message out to say slow it down, and the first slip just dives on the ground need-

lessly. That is unacceptable," said Simon Doull while commenting.

Pommie Mbangwa quipped: "Oscar, Emmy?" Former New Zealand cricketer Ian Smith said: "I've a dodgy knee for the last 6 months, I am gonna see Gulbadin Naib's doctor straight after the game. He's the eighth wonder of the world right now."

"Kabi khushi kabi gham main huta hai (It happens sometimes when you are happy or when you are sad). Hamstring," Naib later said in a post on X.

Naib was soon back on the field and took a crucial wicket in the 15th over. He seemed fitter than ever as he took part in the team's post-match victory lap around the ground.

ion of 15 to 20 runs is beneficial for a bowler. It provides the extra freedom to aim for wickets."

Arshdeep also credited Jasprit Bumrah for creating pressure from one end, which ultimately led to the batters making mistakes. "A lot of credit goes to Jasprit because he concedes just three or four runs per over. As a result, the batters come hard at me, and when they do, I simply try to bowl my best ball. So, many of my wickets are due to Jasprit's efforts."

Warner bows out after Australia's WC exit

David Warner's 15-year international career came to an anti-climactic end on Tuesday as Australia was dumped out of the T20 World Cup in excruciating fashion.

The 37-year-old opening batter Warner had always said the World Cup in the United States and Caribbean would be his farewell to international cricket. Warner stood tall at the top of the Australian order ever since his international debut in January 2009.

He hangs up his pads as arguably Australia's greatest three-format player. He is the country's leading run-scorer in T20 cricket with 3,277 from 110 games.

Warner exited a glittering 112-Test career in January after plundering 8,786 runs at an average of 44.60, with a strike rate of 70.19.

His ODI exploits were equally impressive, crunching 6,932 runs from 161 matches.

Austria tops a rollicking Group D as France finishes second; Zaccagni bails Italy out, Croatia all but out

Marcel Sabitzer lashed home to earn Austria a thrilling 3-2 win against the Netherlands on Tuesday and send his team through top of Euro 2024 Group D, ahead of tournament favourites France and the third-place Dutch.

All three nations are through to the last 16 but Ralf Rangnick's intense Austria side showed why some consider it dark horses to win the tournament for the first time on a rollicking afternoon in Berlin. Donyell Malen's own goal sent Austria ahead but Cody Gakpo pulled the Dutch level early in the second half.

Romano Schmid headed home for Austria with

Memphis Depay pegging it back once more, before Sabitzer settled the frantic, end-to-end tussle.

Drawn encounter

In Dortmund, Kylian Mbappe scored a penalty on his return after breaking his nose but Robert Lewandowski's reply meant France and Poland drew 1-1.

On Monday, Mattia Zaccagni kept Italy's title defence alive with an incredible late equaliser in the holder's thrilling 1-1 draw

with Croatia, as Spain completed a perfect group stage and showed Albania the door.

The Azzurri will play Switzerland in the next round thanks to Zaccagni, who came on with nine minutes remaining and curled in his leveller in the eighth minute of stoppage time following a brilliant burst and pass from defender Riccardo Calafiori.

Spalletti's team finish Group B in second place on four points, five behind winner Spain which beat

Albania 1-0 thanks to a neat Ferran Torres finish in the 13th minute in Dusseldorf.

Croatia meanwhile is all but out due to Zaccagni's late equaliser just as it looked as if Luka Modric was once again going to be the hero for his country.

Oldest goalscorer

Modric defied his advancing years by firing Croatia into the lead nine minutes after the break and becoming the oldest goalscorer in Euros history. Modric made up for

Donnarumma pushing away his penalty just moments before, but his goal wasn't enough and on two points third-placed Croatia is almost certain not to go through.

Belgium and Ukraine know a win will be enough to guarantee their place in the pre-quarterfinals.

Any team in Group E can still finish in any position from first to last in the standings. It is the only group where each team has won a game and lost a game in the first two rounds. One of Romania and Slovakia will be in the pre-quarterfinals, and a draw will advance both.

If so, Romania will be in the top two because of a superior goal difference to Slovakia, which would be third, and among the four



best third-place teams advancing.

Portugal is already qualified for the knockouts and can sign off from Group F in style with a third win when it plays newcomer Georgia on Wednesday.

Chance at qualifying

A draw might give Georgia a chance at qualifying, depending on results elsewhere, but it's likely to need a shock win.

On its major tournament debut, Georgia has won praise for its battling



style and nearly beat the Czech Republic in its second game if not for a last-second miss.

Beating Portugal would be a huge upset and guarantee Georgia a spot in the pre-quarterfinals.

Georgia will know before kickoff if a draw will potentially be enough to qualify as one of the four best third-place teams, or if only a win will do.

If Georgia draws, it would still require the Czech Republic to lose against Turkey, though.

I feel I am on the right path to the Paris Olympics, says Sreeja

Novak Djokovic says he will only play at Wimbledon if he is fit enough to "fight for the title" but his recovery from knee surgery is going well.

The seven-time champion at the All England Club was forced to withdraw ahead of his French Open quarterfinal against Casper Ruud earlier this month after tearing the medial meniscus in his right knee.

His chances of competing at Wimbledon, which starts on July 1, initially looked bleak but he has made rapid progress and had a two-hour training session at Wimbledon's Aorangi Park on Monday.

The 37-year-old Serbian World No. 2 says he will make a decision before Friday's draw. "I didn't come

here to play a few rounds," he told the BBC.

"If I know I can play close to my maximum or at maximum, then I'll play. If not, then I'll give somebody else a chance to play.

"I really will only play if I know I am in a state which is good enough to go far in the tournament and fight for the title, so that's the condition.

"Rehab is going in the right direction every single day, a few percent better and better. That's what's giving me hope and encouragement to keep going.

"I'm taking things gradually. I'm not pushing myself yet 100%, but I'm hoping that's going to come in the next few days."

Djokovic, who has won 24 Grand Slams, has reached the Wimbledon final for the past five years, losing a thrilling five-setter last year to Carlos Alcaraz.

No matter what happens now, this is Afghanistan's World Cup

In the recent past, Afghanistan have become the second favourite team of cricket fans (assuming their respective countries are the first) in international tournaments. If you asked them before the start of the T20 World Cup, "If not your country, which team would you like to see win?", most would have answered, "Afghanistan" (at other times, and for different reasons, New Zealand or Sri Lanka have been second favourites).

And this is not just because of Afghanistan's recent history of war and terror and human disasters –

which are reason enough – but for the brand of joyful cricket and unexpected narratives they bring to the field of play too. And for the sheer spirit and togetherness in the team which now has some world class performers.

Thrill of participation

This support is in no way patronising, nor does it come from a position of superiority. There has always been, in this team, the palpable thrill of participation, and the augury of great possibilities, all communicated to the viewers unselfconsciously. Now they have two bowlers in the world's Top 10 and a batter in the Top 15 as they prepare to take on South Africa in the semifinal of a World Cup. It is the most romantic cricket story of our times.

The three other semi-

finalists are the only teams in the top 10 that Afghanistan have not beaten yet. But that hardly matters. This World Cup is already theirs in a bigger sense.

"Cricket is the only source of happiness back home," skipper Rashid Khan has said. Afghanistan's cricket is a source of happiness the world over. But there's more. Cricket spells hope for a country that has suffered for decades, giving the players a sense of purpose and the satisfaction of achievement.

On the other hand, the growth of cricket among Afghans has showed the significance of sport and its ability to mean something beyond itself. Afghanistan and cricket have been good for each other, both have gained from the relationship. Significantly, Afghan-

istan beat Bangladesh the old-fashioned way, by claiming ten wickets. They didn't need any help from a rain washout or the rules or the apparently dodgy cramps from a player. This means there will be no mental asterisks against their qualification, for they certainly deserve to be in the semifinals. They beat Australia and New Zealand at the World Cup. They have three of the five most successful bowlers and two of the three most successful batters in the tournament.

But statistics are merely reference points for future researchers. These say nothing of the excitement, the decisions under pressure or how close to the edge either team came.

When Naveen-ul Haq came on to bowl what turned out to be the final over, there was consterna-

tion that Afghanistan might have got it wrong. Shouldn't Fazalhaq Farooqi, the leading wicket-taker of the tournament and a left arm seamer, be the one to bowl it? If the match went into the 19th over, surely it would be the end for Afghanistan?

It needed some magic, perhaps two wickets in two deliveries so opening batter Litton Das would be left stranded at the non-striker's end. Naveen-ul Haq provided the magic. Two wickets off successive deliveries. Then he took off, arms outstretched, and in danger of achieving lift-off. It was magnificent, a startling reminder of why some people play a sport, other people write about it, and how one hour of crowded glory is worth an age without a name!

Mohammad Nabi, a few

months short of his 40th birthday, was less demonstrative than the bowler. He had seen it all while taking Afghanistan from the World Cricket League division 5 to the semifinals of a World Cup. It was his century against a touring MCC that suggested Afghanistan might be a future Test candidate. Much like C.K. Nayudu's century against the MCC hastened India's entry into the big league.

Nabi has played 127 of Afghanistan's 137 T20 internationals – his book, when he writes it, will have some of the most fascinating human stories you can hope to read anywhere.

But all that's for the future. For the moment, it is celebration time. For Afghanistan, and for the rest of the world (barring perhaps Australia and Bangladesh).

A standing ovation, a man-of-the-match award and a record.

But Croatia star Luka Modric was in no mood to celebrate, regardless of the accolades, after what could have been his last appearance at a major tournament.

Modric scored against Italy on Monday to become the oldest goal-scorer ever at a European Championship.

Ultimately it wasn't enough to ensure his team stays in the competition. Mattia Zaccagni scored in the eighth minute of stoppage time for Italy to draw 1-1 and advance to the knockout stage.

Croatia needs an improbable series of other results going its way to remain at Euro 2024.

Modric, who is 38 years and 289 days old, claimed the opening goal on a rebound in the 55th minute, within a minute of having a penalty saved by Italy goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma.

The previous record was held by Ivica Vastic, who was 38 years, 257 days old when he scored for Austria against Poland at Euro 2008.

Modric received standing ovations from fans when he went off in the 80th, and he was applaud-

ed again when he showed up for the post-game news conference.

One Italian journalist started by telling Modric he was one of the most magnificent players he had ever seen. He said he had no question to ask, just a request for him never to retire from playing.

Genuinely moved

Modric seemed genuinely moved by the kind words.

"I'd also like to keep playing forever but there probably will come a time when I'll have to hang up my boots," he replied. "I'll keep playing. I'll continue, so I'm not sure when, we'll see."

Modric earlier this month extended his contract by another year at Real Madrid, where he has amassed an impressive haul of trophies since join-

ing from Tottenham in 2012, including another Champions League and Spanish league title last season.

Modric has played 178 games for Croatia since making his debut at age 20 under Zlatko Kranjcar in 2006. The 2018 Ballon d'Or winner is playing in his fifth European Championship. His goal against Italy took his tally to four goals in 16 games at the tournament.

But Modric has enjoyed greater success with the national team at the World Cup, leading Croatia to the final in 2018, and third place in 2022.

The draw against Italy on Monday, and the manner in which it came with the last kick of the game, means Croatia is almost certain to be eliminated in the next days.

"It was very stressful. We kept fighting like lions right to the end. But football is cruel," Modric said. "That's part and parcel of football. Sometimes it brings a lot of happiness, but sometimes it makes you very sad as well."

Very difficult

"Losing like this is very difficult. It's hard to find words to describe how my teammates and probably the fans feel as well. Of course, we need to bounce back," Modric, who is the team captain, took comfort from the performance.

"We gave everything for Croatia, and this is how Croatia presents itself, regardless of the cruelty of this result. We deserved more, but it's football," he said. "We can be proud of how we represented Croatia."

Vihari to continue for Andhra after assurance from ruling party

India's top shot putter Tajiinderpal Singh Toor is coping with an ankle pain and he will miss the National Inter-State Athletics Championships, the final qualifying event for the upcoming Paris Olympics, beginning in Panchkula on Thursday.

Toor, an Asian record holder till a few days back, is set to qualify for the Paris Games through World ranking quota. He is the reigning Asian champion as well as Asian Games gold medalist. "I am cur-

rently having slight ankle pain and my doctor told me not to throw for three-four weeks," said Toor without specifying when the pain began.

It will have to be seen how the Athletics Federation of India (AFI) deals with Toor's latest problem as the officials are tight-lipped as of now.

The men's shot put events in the Paris Olympics will be held on August 2 (qualifying round) and August 3 (final).

Last month, AFI president Adille Sumariwalla had made it clear that except for Olympic cham-

pion javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra, it will be mandatory for all the other athletes to participate in the National inter-State championships (June 27-30) to get selected for the Paris Olympics.

What the rules say

AFI rules state that all the athletes will have to participate in the National inter-State championships if they have to get selected for major multi-sport events like the Olympics, unless the federation gives an exemption on the request of particular athletes or their coaches.

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Chokers to diamond pendants: how South Africa has turned the tide

If there is one country that deserves the rub of the green going its way, it is the Rainbow Nation; the Proteas have historically found themselves on the wrong side of humdingers, but in the ongoing T20 WC, Markram's men have managed to hold their nerve in tense encounters and remain unbeaten

Beware! Supporting South Africa is not for the faint-hearted! The Proteas, who have the unenviable tag of 'chokers' in world cricket, have made a happy habit of snatching victory from the jaws of defeat in the 20-over extravaganza in the Americas – an experience as gripping as watching a *House of the Dragon* episode with a cliffhanger finish.

Things could have gone horribly wrong for Aiden Markram's men on multiple occasions. However, they weathered the storm and sailed into the semifinals unbeaten. Whether they go two steps further to win the whole thing remains to be seen. But the fact that South Africa has players it can depend upon to show up in crucial moments will instil confidence in the ranks.

Remember it all too well

South Africa's tryst with nail-biting finishes in the 2024 T20 World Cup started against the Netherlands. After an easy win against Sri Lanka, at least compared to the other humdingers that were to follow, the Proteas faced their bogey team in multi-national tournaments. They used up six wickets and 113 deliveries while chasing down the Netherlands' 103 – granted it was not a modest target on the dicey New York track. They were, at one stage, reeling at 12 for four but a calm and collected David Miller, ably supported by Tristan Stubbs' efforts, guided them home.

"The game of cricket makes it a bit tricky. We are moving forward as a squad. Sometimes the victories are going to be convincing. To squeeze a win out from that (12 for four) situation is good for the team environment," skipper Markram said after the game.

While it was a narrow four-wicket win against the Men in Orange, their next assignment saw the Proteas pull off a four-run victory over Bangladesh. After deciding to bat, their top-order once again failed to make a mark and put together 113 to defend. However, the bowlers were accurate (none went for more than 27) as the team clinched a win with some luck going its way.

As fate would have it

In the 17th over of Bangladesh's chase, Mahmudullah was adjudged lbw by the umpire. The batter went for a review which proved that the ball was missing the stumps. Mahmudullah extended his stay at the crease but lost out on the four leg-byes he would have otherwise got for the ball going for a boundary after hitting his pads as the umpire's original verdict had already deemed the delivery dead. According to the Playing Conditions, despite the umpire's verdict being overturned, Bangladesh did not get those crucial four runs which ended up being the victory margin for South Africa.

Nonetheless, if there is one team that deserves the rub of the green going its way thanks to a cricket law, it is South Africa. Remember the 1992 World Cup semifinal against England? The heavens opened up when Kepler Wessels' side needed 22 off 13 and the target was readjusted (according to the laws then) to 21 from one ball and South Africa had to bow out of its first World Cup unceremoniously.

Back to 2024, the Proteas' next challenge was against a spirited Nepal side which did its best to hunt down the target of 116 and fell agonisingly short. From requiring just 18 runs from as many balls with seven wickets in hand, it was a safe bet to say that Nepal would get across the line. However, Tabraiz Shamsi, Anrich Nortje and Ottneil Baartman delivered what was asked of them and restricted Nepal to 114 for seven – a one-run victory for South Africa.

This was the closest win for the Proteas in this mega event which saw a final-ball drama break Nepal fans' hearts. With two runs needed off the last delivery, Gulsan Jha ran for a bye and would have thought that he was safe after wicketkeeper Quinton de Kock's throw hit his back and deflected. However, as luck would have it, the ball went directly to a vigilant Heinrich Klaasen who flicked the ball onto the stumps. Jha, who slowed down after the ball made contact with him, was late in getting to the crease and failed to take the game to a Super Over.

Coming in clutch

Following a streak of pulsating results, the Proteas were hoped for an easy win against co-host USA in their first Super 8 fixture. However, Andries Gous – a South Africa-born cricketer – took the co-host



close to chasing a target of 195 with his unbeaten 47-ball 80. Before Kagiso Rabada's exceptional two-run penultimate over reeled things back, South Africa fans would have got flashbacks of the 2015 ODI World Cup semifinal knock by Grant Elliott – also a South Africa native – to take New Zealand into the summit clash. It wasn't to be in Antigua and the Proteas prevailed by 18 runs.

A crackerjack

After five consecutive victories in the tournament, the wagon moved to St. Lucia for South Africa to face the defending champion England. And, surprise, surprise... this was also a crackerjack of a contest. The pendulum swung in the windy Gros Islet as both teams had the chance to win it easily.

Jos Buttler's men were chasing South Africa's 163 and were in trouble at 61 for four after 10.2 overs. Then, Liam Livingstone and Harry Brook cut it down to 46 off 24 to make it anybody's game. The duo punished the next over, laden with full tosses from Baartman, and cut down the target to 25 off 18. The game was in England's grasp, but Rabada, Marco Jansen and Nortje had other ideas and turned the contest on its head. Markram's stupendous catch running backwards to dismiss a dangerous Brook off Nortje's final over was crucial in the side's seven-run victory.

Do-or-die clash

South Africa's most important, and latest, victory came in a do-or-die Super 8 clash against the West Indies. The two-time champion tightened the screws on South Africa's run chase, which at one stage was in cruise control with 46 runs needed off 55 balls with seven wickets in hand. However, Rovman Powell's men – playing for a last-four spot themselves – made a match of it thanks to a disciplined bowling effort and brought the equation to nine off seven. Then, a marvellous drive through extra-cover from Rabada and a maximum down the ground by the 6'8" towering Jansen, who stood tall in the nervy chase with an unbeaten 14-ball 21,



turned the tide and sealed South Africa's semifinal berth.

"I'm sweating. Quite nervy at the end. That's been the theme of our tournament – us finding a way to win as a team, no matter what the situation is. Our supporters would probably like bigger wins. But things like this keep us in check," Shamsi said after the three-wicket victory.

Yes, the scenario could have been different for South Africa. Mahmudullah

could have been given not out by the umpire, and Jha could have not hesitated and reached the crease to force a tie-breaker. But, take nothing away from the performances its players have put up and the belief that they have shown to win games of cricket so far. A semifinal clash against Rashid Khan's Afghanistan awaits Markram's men. Given their remarkable journey so far, the Proteas will fancy themselves to go all the way and break their World Cup drought.

Brains that don't see in greyscale first over-rely on colours

Project Prakash is a U.S.-based initiative by IIT Delhi, Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital in New Delhi, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. It treats and rehabilitates blind children in India. In a new study, these children have helped researchers shed light on how the brain learns to see

The world has many colours and being able to see them is a great source of joy. But a newborn baby mostly sees the world in black and white. The photosensitive cone cells in the child's eyes don't mature until they're around four months old. In this time, the brain uses other visual cues to make sense of the world.

In May, a team of Indian and U.S. researchers reported in the journal *Science* that this delay in developing colour vision is actually important for overall vision development.

"We are able to explain why normal visual development happens the way it does," study co-lead Dr. Priti Gupta, a cognitive neuroscientist, told *The Hindu*.

Dr. Gupta leads the research team in India for 'Project Prakash', a U.S.-based initiative of IIT Delhi, Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital in New Delhi, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Project Prakash treats and rehabilitates blind children in India. These children helped the researchers shed light on how the brain learns to see.

Importance of colour vision

Humans don't need colour vision to recognise objects but colours can provide adaptation and survival advantages, Dr. Gupta said.

"If you look at food, you can recognise it without colour. But if something has gone bad, then you need to see the colour of that thing to understand."

Yet there is more to colour vision than meets the eye.

"They're very mesmerised by colours," Dr. Gupta said of the children at Project Prakash. They often described objects around them with their colour. "Their reliance on colours is a little more than what normal children have." This observation gave the researchers an idea: "to show them some things without colour".

They brought together a group of visually impaired children and young adults between eight and 26 years of age and asked them to identify objects in images – a tree, a bus, chicken, a stack of books, etc. – first in greyscale and then in colour. In another test, they asked the group to determine which of two discs presented to them had a lighter hue while the researchers adjusted the colour.

The children could recognise colour images and discs quite well – even those who were barely two days out of eye surgery. But they had a tough time recognising black and white images.

Children without any visual impairment had trouble neither with

colour nor greyscale images, on the other hand.

The researchers realised the issue wasn't the colour vision of the visually impaired children. Instead, it was the abnormal way in which their vision had developed: to rely too much on colour.

Mimicking visual development

Normally, a child first understands the world in greyscale. But the first time the children at Project Prakash experienced normal vision, their eyes had developed enough to see colours as well, so they skipped the greyscale phase. Their brain processed black and white images differently as a result.

To understand the effects of this issue, the researchers needed a proxy to the brain that they could tweak to learn in response to different visual stimuli. They set up a deep convolutional neural network (CNN) – a computer program that processes information the way neurons in the brain's visual cortex do. Engineers have previously used deep CNNs in image recognition software.

"They are not perfect models. But they are the best models people have at this point of time," Dr. Gupta said.

They trained four CNNs, one each on colour and greyscale images in a particular order: grey-grey, colour-colour, colour-grey, grey-colour.

They found the grey-CNN recognised

both greyscale and colour images better than any of the other models.

The colour-colour model – which most mimicked visual development among Project Prakash's children – fared worse at identifying greyscale images.

The researchers attributed this to the colour-colour model's overreliance on colour cues when examining images because its training data was composed solely of colour images.

The grey-colour model had learnt enough cues from the greyscale images and was thus better able to recognise colour images.

These findings suggest why the children too performed poorly in colour tests. "They already start out with very clear vision as compared to a normal, developing baby," Dr. Gupta said.

It's fascinating that the brain develops object recognition and colour perception

at different times, study co-author Dr. Suma Ganesh and Project Prakash's clinical lead said.

Optimising visual development

Dr. Ganesh is an eye surgeon, paediatric ophthalmologist, and medical director at Dr. Shroff's Charity Eye Hospital in New Delhi.

"We never thought that if one [perception] is removed, it has a lot of impact on the other," she said.

It's unclear whether this particular study would bring about any rehabilitation benefits though.

"At the moment, I wouldn't say we have done anything much on the rehabilitation side," Dr. Gupta said.

"But all of this knowledge that's coming to us will eventually be used for better treatments."

But she added that there are ideas that can help. For example, children could also be made to experience a room deprived of colour, simulating a black and white or a greyscale environment, for a few hours at a time.

"Maybe that helps to fine-tune their cells to actually generalise better," she said. However, she admitted there could be ethical concerns about such "tests" and that their efficacy would have to be checked with animal models first.



QUESTION CORNER

Death by oxygen deprivation

Q. How does potassium cyanide cause sudden death?
A: Potassium cyanide when consumed causes death by gradually arresting the

supply of oxygen to our body's cells by forming complexes with haemoglobin and cytochrome (a protein which helps in the respiration of cells), depriving them of their capacity to transport or exchange oxygen.

Normally, oxygen is carried to different parts of the body from the lungs by the blood using haemoglobin – the iron-containing, oxygen-carrying molecule of the red blood cells. Haemoglobin is made up of a globular protein and four heme groups. The iron (in ferrous state) present in these heme complexes can bond to either an oxygen molecule or a water molecule or exchange one for the other without much difficulty. It is because of this ability that haemoglobin is able to pick up oxygen from the lungs, carry it to the cells, and bring water in return.

Cells respire oxygen with the help of myoglobin (haemoglobin-like proteins present in the cells) and cytochrome, which carries electrons. Specific forms of cytochrome and haemoglobin also cause sudden death when poisoned by cyanide.

When potassium cyanide is consumed, it splits into a potassium

ion and a cyanide ion. The cyanide ion has a greater affinity for the ferrous iron than. As a result it occupies the site meant for oxygen in haemoglobin. This process is irreversible and prevents the transfer of oxygen.

One form of cytochrome, designated cytochrome-a, also binds with the cyanide ion and stabilises the iron to such an extent that it does not take part in the electron transfer to the cell. This prevents oxygen intake by the cell.

The symptoms of cyanide poisoning are giddiness, headache, and bluish tinge of the skin. If not treated immediately, unconsciousness and death will follow.

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Analysing Maharashtra's water crisis

Why do different regions of Maharashtra experience varied levels of water stress? Why is sugarcane production not suited for regions with less rainfall? What is meant by the rain-shadow effect? How can supply-side solutions help the situation?

The story so far:

After the deficient monsoon last year, the Maharashtra government declared many parts of the State to be drought-hit. The impact of the deficiency manifested across the region this summer as wells ran dry and officials brought tankers to provide drinking water and water for irrigation. This situation is in sharp contrast with the State's coastal areas, where rainfall has often been in excess, leading to severe flooding. Marathwada's predicament is shaped by its location, topography, soil type, agricultural practices, and crop choices.

What is the rain-shadow effect?

Marathwada lies in the rain-shadow region of the Western Ghats. When moist winds from the Arabian Sea encounter these mountains, they rise and cool, causing heavy rainfall (2,000-4,000 mm) on the western side. But by the time these winds cross the Ghats and descend into Western Maharashtra and Marathwada, they lose most of their moisture, leaving Marathwada much drier (600-800 mm).


A 2016 study by IIT Gandhinagar researchers said climate change is worsening the situation in central Maharashtra. The region has experienced an increasing trend in drought severity and frequency of late. As a result, Marathwada and North Karnataka have emerged as the second driest regions in India after Rajasthan.

How does this affect crops?

Marathwada's agricultural practices are not well suited to its low rainfall. A major contributor to the region's water crisis is sugarcane cultivation. Sugarcane requires 1,500-2,500 mm of water in its growing season. While pulses and millets require four or five irrigations across their crop

life, sugarcane needs to be irrigated almost every day. The area under sugarcane increased steadily between the 1950s and the 2000s, plateauing in the last decade. Today, the crop occupies 4% of the total cropped area in the region and consumes 61% of the irrigation water. As a result, the average river outflow in the upper Bhima basin has almost halved. Long-standing government support for sugarcane pricing and sales has expanded sugarcane irrigation, restricting the irrigation of more nutritious crops. Since December 2023, the government has been promoting sugarcane-juice-based ethanol production, which may be unwise for this water-starved area: 82% of the sugar grown in Maharashtra comes from low-rainfall areas. The Maharashtra Water and Irrigation Commission in 1999 recommended that sugarcane should be banned in areas that receive less than 1,000 mm of rainfall a year, yet production has increased.

How do soil, topography matter?

Marathwada has predominantly clayey black soil, locally called "regur". It is

fertile and retains moisture well. However, it has a low infiltration rate: when it rains, the water is either logged or runs off, but doesn't percolate down to recharge groundwater. To capture this high run-off, Maharashtra has been building many dams – such that it is today the State with the most large dams in the country (1,845). The soil also has low hydraulic conductivity and holds on to the water for a long time after rains. WELL Labs' work in the region has found that farmers face crop loss as a result.

Even within Marathwada, water scarcity is not uniform. The area has parallel tributaries of the Godavari and the Krishna flowing southeast. Each tributary flows in the valley and is separated by a gently sloping hill. The valleys have perennial groundwater while the uplands have seasonal groundwater. This is because groundwater slowly moves underground from upland areas to the valleys. The wells in upland areas dry up a few months after the monsoons, and is where the water scarcity is most acute. They are at a natural disadvantage and deserve special support.

Can Marathwada be water-resilient?

Supply-side solutions are about making the most of available resources. They include classical watershed management work (such as building water-conserving structures like contour trenches, earthen bunds, gully plugs, etc.). Second, rainwater that runs off agricultural fields carries the very soil that doesn't allow the water to percolate. So many of these structures accumulate silt. Funds under the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme could be used to design silt-trapping mechanisms and organise training programmes for farmers on periodic desilting.

In a low-rainfall region, managing water demand includes practising water-efficient irrigation, cultivating drought-resistant crops, and diversifying livelihoods. Marathwada must also shift to other high-value, low-water-using crops, while sugarcane production must move to Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, and West Bengal.

Will the Agnipath scheme be revamped?

Will the formation of a new government lead to a more detailed discussion on the recruitment of soldiers as Agniveers? How have the NDA allies reacted? What is the government's stance?

The story so far:

The recruitment of soldiers into the armed forces as Agniveers under the Agnipath scheme has been a major issue in the recent general election. After the election results, NDA allies, the Janata Dal (United) and Lok Janshakti Party (Ram Vilas), raised the issue of Agnipath and called for a discussion on it. The government is open to changes and discussions are on, officials in the know said.

What is the Agnipath scheme?

The Agnipath scheme for recruitment of soldiers, sailors and airmen into the three services was announced on June 14, 2022 doing away with the earlier process of permanent recruitment. Under the new scheme, Agniveers are recruited for four years on the completion of which, up to 25% would be selected into the regular ranks on a permanent basis. The age

bracket for new recruits was fixed at 17 and a half to 21 years of age and till 2026 the overall intake has been capped at 1.75 lakh. Subsequently, the Army is inducting 40,000 Agniveers per year and the Navy and Air Force are recruiting around 3,000 Agniveers each. Agniveers during their tenure can get class 12 certificates or a Bachelor's degree in addition to other skill certificates and when leaving after four years will get a lumpsum amount but are not eligible for pension. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh had termed it a transformative initiative and a win-win situation for all.

The government has stated that the Agnipath scheme would bring down the average age of the armed forces from 32 to 26 years in line with the age profile of major armies worldwide. And that when Agniveers return to society, they will contribute to nation-building.

What are the concerns?

One of the biggest concerns for the armed

forces, especially the Army, is the accentuating shortage of personnel in the 'below the officer's rank' cadres. There was no recruitment during the COVID-19 period for over two and half years which created a deficiency. For context, around 60,000 soldiers retire from the Army every year, while 40,000 are being recruited every year. So effectively the shortage is adding on year by year. Additionally, the low conversion rate of 25% from Agniveers to regular soldiers is going to further accentuate the shortfall. Given the short duration of four years, the training schedules have also been compressed accordingly.

With the huge demand for recruitment into the Army in some parts of the country, the scheme became a political issue as well as a campaign issue during the election. The country was rocked by violent protests when the scheme was announced. Several parties have demanded that it either be scrapped or the concerns addressed.

There is anger among "certain sections" on the Agnipath scheme, said JD(U) leader K.C. Tyagi amidst talks within the NDA on government formation. "The Agnipath scheme should be reviewed clause by clause," he said.

What is the current status?

As reported by *The Hindu* earlier, as the Agnipath scheme completes two years of implementation, the Department of Military Affairs (DMA) in the Defence Ministry headed by the Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) has sought feedback from the forces on the scheme. This, officials said, is in line with the regular practice in the armed forces of reviewing any major scheme introduced or any weapon platform inducted to make required changes based on a detailed assessment.

Broadly, recommendation for enhancing intake numbers, increasing the permanent recruitment from 25% to at least 50% are among the suggestions. Also, there is a proposal to increase the age limit for entry through the technical route from 21 to 23 years to attract enough technically qualified individuals. This is not a new proposal but also existed in the recruitment process earlier.

Defence officials have stated that Navy and Air Force have compiled the feedback to be sent to the DMA. However, the Army is still in the process of compilation and will take some more time, multiple officials confirmed. The DMA will compile all the recommendations and send it to the Defence Ministry.

WikiLeaks: the enemy of the deep state

WikiLeaks' fortunes have been inextricably tied with the travails of its co-founder Julian Assange, who after a decade-long legal battle with the U.S. has finally been let free

“Julian Assange is free,” WikiLeaks announced in a statement on X. “He left Belmarsh maximum security prison [in the U.K.] on the morning of 24 June, after having spent 1901 days there”, it further read. The co-founder of the whistleblowing website, WikiLeaks, has agreed to plead guilty to one count of conspiracy to obtain and disclose classified U.S. national defence documents, thus ending his long battle against extradition to the U.S. He was flown out of the U.K. to attend the court hearing at Saipan, a U.S. Pacific territory, after which he will return to Australia.

Mr. Assange is wanted in the U.S. for criminal charges, including breaking the Espionage Act for WikiLeaks' actions of leaking thousands of secret U.S. files in 2010. He was looking at a punishment ranging up to 175 years in prison for violations of the Espionage Act.

Mr. Assange's journey to freedom wasn't easy, and he had come dangerously close to extradition. On June 17, 2022, then U.K. Home Secretary Priti Patel had signed an extradition order for Mr. Assange to the U.S. (which he was able to later appeal). On the same day, the Assange Defense Committee, a U.S.-based coalition of media rights and human rights groups, released a statement through its co-chairs, which include the renowned linguist and public intellectual Noam Chomsky and former U.S. military analyst and whistleblower Daniel Ellsberg, that said the decision “was a sad day for western democracy”. It added: “U.S. government argues that its venerated Constitution does not protect journalism the government dislikes and that publishing truthful information in public interest is a subversive, criminal act. This argument is a threat not only to journalism, but to democracy itself.”

These were strong words in favour of a man who has been held in the U.K.'s Belmarsh prison ever since the Ecuador Embassy revoked his asylum and citizenship after he stayed for seven years on its premises in London. Mr. Assange initially underwent imprisonment for bail violations during his stay in the Ecuador Embassy and got a reprieve from a U.K. district judge, Vanessa Baraitser, in January 2021, when she ruled that he could not be extradited to the U.S. because of concerns about his mental health and the possibility of suicide in a U.S. prison with strict incarceration conditions.

U.S. prosecutors later filed an appeal, and the British High Court, this time in December 2021, ruled in favour of the U.S. following the Joe Biden administration's assurances on the terms of Mr. Assange's possible incarceration – that it would not hold him at the highest security prison facility (ADX Florence in Colorado, which houses terrorists, drug traffickers, and high-profile criminals) and that if he were convicted, he could serve his sentence in his native Australia if he requested it. Mr. Assange moved the British Supreme Court against the verdict, but on March 14, the Court refused permission to appeal.

Mr. Assange's travails have mirrored those of the WikiLeaks organisation itself.

In February 2022, on WikiLeaks' website, the submission system for files (by whistleblowers, ‘hacktivists’, etc.) and its email server went completely offline, months after the organisation's secure chat services had stopped working in October 2021. This was no surprise.

The organisation has been inevitably linked to its co-founder, who still remains a director. Ever since his incarceration, the release of whistleblower documents have only been few and far between and much less in consequence compared to what the organisation managed to achieve between 2010 and 2019.

Origins and impact

WikiLeaks' journey began in 2006 when the website was first established and its domain name registered by Mr. Assange. While initially the website began as a disclosure portal on the lines of the Wikipedia model, with anonymous submissions being put up and edited by volunteers, it soon became a repository of anonymously sourced material. News and classified information could be uploaded on it using the anonymity software Tor, which protects the uploader's identity from being eavesdropped on any network and even by WikiLeaks itself.

Internal dissension and wrangling between WikiLeaks employees had resulted in problems with the submission system, which resulted in its suspension in 2010, but WikiLeaks relaunched the site in 2015.

One of the earliest revelations by Wikileaks was on how the U.S. government had been deploying practices at the Guantanamo Bay facility holding terror suspects, that were in violation of the Geneva Convention protocols.

Some of the most consequential leaks during the period when the site's

anonymised submission system still remained active included the millions of classified files from the U.S. Defence Department on the Iraq and the Afghan invasions, besides lakhs of State Department communiques – both were released by former U.S. soldier Chelsea (then Bradley) Manning. These leaks began with a 39-minute video released on April 5, 2010 that showed gun-sight footage of two U.S. AH-64 Apache helicopters in action during the Iraqi insurgency against the U.S. occupation in 2007. The video showed the helicopter crew firing indiscriminately and killing civilians and two Reuters war correspondents. For nearly three years, Reuters had sought access to this video via the U.S. Freedom of Information Act, but had failed.

WikiLeaks promptly released the war logs, which were published by a host of media organisations and exposed human rights abuses by occupation forces, besides the increased fatality counts in Iraq. The war logs' release was followed by the publication of several news stories, including by *The Hindu*, based on thousands of leaked diplomatic cables that were also released by Ms. Manning, leading to significant public exposure of the ways, lifestyles and attitudes of the elite in various countries.

The WikiLeaks model – using cryptographic tools to protect sources and allowing for anonymous “leaks” of sensitive information (that could also be in public interest) to be published – suddenly brought forth a new model of extensive investigative journalism into areas that were relatively shielded from the public eye, such as the functioning of the deep state in democratic societies and the operation of power agencies in autocracies.

While initially the cables were released to five newspapers that undertook the exercise of redacting sensitive information before reporting on them and published them over a year from late 2010 to 2011, the leak of the encryption key of the full cache of files (of what was then termed “Cablegate”), resulted in the release of unredacted material, an action that was condemned by many media outlets.

The lack of an anonymised submission system between 2010 and 2015 did not deter it from publishing other files that were obtained from other hackers such as the Stratfor email leaks. Later, WikiLeaks also published then presidential candidate (and former Secretary of State) Hillary Clinton's aide John Podesta's emails before the 2016 presidential elections. This action invited severe critique of WikiLeaks from activists and media personnel, who likened these leaks to an effort to intervene in the 2016 elections with Mr. Assange having been quoted as saying he wanted to “harm” Hillary Clinton's chances of winning the presidency and accusing WikiLeaks of obtaining this information from Russian intelligence agency hackers, something Wikileaks denied.

Later, it emerged that someone from WikiLeaks had conversed with Clinton's presidential opponent, Donald Trump's son, Donald Trump Jr., seeking to promote the leaks and even asking for favours for Mr. Assange in Twitter DM conversations.

Probe in the U.S.

Wikileaks' releases, meanwhile, resulted in reprisals from the U.S. government. The Barack Obama administration began investigation of the Manning leaks, and Ms. Manning was convicted by court martial in July 2013 for violating the Espionage Act and underwent rigorous imprisonment before her sentence was commuted in January 2017 by the President. However, the administration concluded that it would not pursue criminal charges against Mr. Assange and WikiLeaks. The U.S. Justice Department under former President Donald Trump, however, charged Mr. Assange with collaborating in a conspiracy with Ms. Manning to crack a password on a Defense Department network to publish classified documents and communications on WikiLeaks in a sealed indictment in April 2017. These charges were unsealed in 2019.

Later, the Trump administration further charged Mr. Assange with violating the Espionage Act of 1917 – he was indicted on 17 new charges related to the Act at the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia. In June 2020, the charges were further expanded for conspiracy with hacker groups. The Biden administration had made no attempt to reverse these charges. Until now.

In April, Mr. Biden said that he was considering a request from Australia to drop its prosecution of Mr. Assange, indicating a change in policy. And now the U.S. with the plea deal has agreed to drop all other charges, except one, against the whistleblower.

Mr. Assange's legal case sets a precedent for the future of investigative journalism of the kind that WikiLeaks represents and also serves as a litmus test for free expression laws that allow for unhindered journalism in countries like the U.S.. While the organisation is now a shell of what it was a decade ago, its ability to harness the act of whistleblowing to shine a light on the inner workings of those in power transformed investigative journalism, even as its decisions to intervene in the U.S. polity complicated its legacy.

Know your English

“What is the meaning of ‘save’ in the following sentence? ‘In our country, save for some big cities, boys and girls cannot mingle freely.’ (N. Ulaganathan, Madras)”

“It means ‘with the exception of’. What the writer means is that in our country boys and girls cannot mix freely except in some big cities. Here are some examples:

I know nothing about Sailaja save that she's Hari's wife.

No one saw the gruesome accident, save Balagopal.

In these two sentences, the word ‘save’ is used as a synonym for ‘except’. This use of ‘save’ is normally found in formal writing. You hardly ever use the word in the sense of ‘except’ in conversation. If you do, you are likely to be thought of as a snob. What would your friend think if you told him, “Listen Vasu. I'd like to help you save I have no money. I'm broke!” In fact, some grammarians disapprove the use of ‘save’ even in writing. They feel that ‘save’ is old fashioned.”

“Can we say ‘thank you ever so much’? (V. R. Moorthi, Thiruvananthapuram)”

“Yes, we can. But this expression is not used very often. “Thank you ever so much” cannot be used with everybody. One has to be careful with the use of this expression. It should be used only with the people you are very, very intimate with – relatives, and close friends.

Thank you ever so much for the wonderful pair of earrings, Aunt.

That was a wonderful meal, Usha.

Thank you ever so much.

This expression is normally used when someone has done or given something for which you are very, very grateful. The more common ways of thanking people are: ‘thanks’, ‘thank you’, ‘many thanks’, ‘thank you very much’, ‘thanks a lot’, ‘thanks a million’, and ‘thanks awfully’. ‘Thanks a lot’, ‘thanks a million’ and ‘thanks awfully’ should not be used in formal situations; they are colloquial expressions. But don't say ‘thank you a lot’ and ‘thank you a million’.

“Go down with (V. Kulkarni, Nagpur).”

“You ‘go down with’ an illness.

Her son has gone down with dysentery.

For a couple of days, she was feeling awfully tired and finally went down with a flu.

“‘Drop round’ in ‘She dropped round last evening’. (S. S. Bhatnagar, New Delhi)”

“‘Drop round’ means to visit someone without giving notice, without any appointment.

She dropped round on her way back from office.

“Drop in’ and ‘drop by’ also mean the same as ‘drop round’. ‘Drop in’ and ‘drop by’ are more frequently used.
