

‘This stormwater drain will be misused for sewage discharge’

Greater Chennai Corporation is carrying out stormwater drain construction at Kamatchi Ammal Third Street (Ward 33, Zone 3 - Madhavaram) in Ponnamman Medu. But this street lacks an underground sewage drain and sewage overflow is a recurrent problem here. Because, the size of the septic tanks in most of the apartments is relatively small. In other words, it is not proportionate to the number of houses and unable to contain the sewage. This causes sewage overflow in this street. Hence, construction of an underground sewage drain (by CWMSSB) should have been a priority. Not GCC's stormwater drain. Now, sewage will be discharged into stormwater drain paving the way for the pollution of waterbodies.

Residents seek changes at 'median opening' on GNT Road

They see the need for a traffic signal and zebra crossing

VGP Santhosh Nagar Residents Welfare Association and Federation of Madhavaram Resident Welfare Associations have sought a traffic signal with zebra-crossing at a "median opening" at GNT Road near Ganapathi Thottam in Madhavaram. This median opening is hardly wide; it consists of many narrow openings.

"GNT Road is a wide highway with vehicles coming at a good speed. Earlier, the median was open for a length of 45 metres. It allowed motorists coming from Ganapathi Thottam lane and also from the opposite Thattankulam Road to cross GNT Road. But citing safety reasons this opening in the median was closed around four years ago. However, this closed median is marked by small narrow openings created to facilitate the movement of pedestrians and motorcyclists. These narrow openings are proving to be dangerous. Many accidents including fatal ones have occurred at this spot. The association has been taking up this issue with the State Highways, Greater Chennai Traffic Police, Greater Chennai Corporation and to elected representatives since 2017. But our efforts were to no avail," says D. Govindaraj, the secretary of VGP Santhosh Nagar Residents Welfare Association.

In the case of four-wheeler users, the closing of the median has forced them to take U-turns at nearby junc-

tions which they find time-consuming and results in greater fuel expenditure.

"Four-wheelers can't use the nar-

row openings to cross the road. They have to take a U turn at Madhavaram junction near the truck terminal or at Moolakadai junction.

During peak hours, with heavy traffic congestion, it is quite trying," says D. Neelakannan, the federation's president.

Last month, the Welfare of the Differently-Abled Persons Department issued a circular to 19 universities in Tamil Nadu reminding them that they have to reserve five per cent of the seats in higher education for persons with benchmark disabilities. And that was a momentous development for those working towards an inclusive education system, especially for V. Padma, mother of a differently-abled son.

Last academic year, 20-year-old E. Sachin's dream of joining the Tamil Nadu Physical Education and Sports University for a bachelor's programme got quashed after the institution denied him a seat saying he did not meet the physical requirements demanded by the course. A promising basketball player and swimmer, Sachin, who is on the spectrum, later relocated from Chennai to Tiruchirapalli to pursue a course in sports education from an arts and science college.

His mother Padma was determined to know why Sachin was rejected despite having all the required documents.

"I first registered a complaint with the State Commission for the Welfare of the Differently-Abled, which acts as a magistrate for any complaints brought to them, against the Sports University," says Padma.

The Sports University denied admission to Sachin as they were following a 2015 Government Order that states that the candidate must be medically fit and free from any deformities to take up the course in physical education.

"Actually the University had not changed its admission guidelines based on the RPWD Act, 2016. In the process, the University has been rejecting students citing the old GO," says Padma.

For this parent who was helping her son realise his dream, taking on

A mother's cry for justice

a university meant doing lot of groundwork. Filing an RTI plea, doing rigorous follow-ups and studying various judgements helped build up the case. She took help from special parents. "I knew I could not fight it alone, so I met dis-

ability activists, support group members to understand if the reason for denying admission was justified," Padma says much of the hearing happened virtually.

Besides filing the case, Padma met up with the secretary to the

Points to be considered

- A person with benchmark disabilities shall be given an upper age relaxation of five years for admission in institutions of higher education.
- Educational institutions must ensure 'reasonable accommodations' according to the individual's requirement.
- Candidates with at least 40% disability shall be allowed to apply irrespective of the type of disability. Courses shall not be restricted unreasonably. The core course module, barrier associated with a particular type of disability and the reasonable accommodation can be used as the criteria for

inclusion/exclusion.

- The functional requirements for reservation in employment is sitting, standing, bending, lifting, seeing and hearing. All these requirements may not be necessary for studying in a course. Hence, the institution may arrive at the functional requirements for each course and furnish them in the admission prospectus.
- If any institution has already issued prospectus that is not in line with the RPWD Act 2016 that institution may consider issuing addendum.

Welfare of the Differently-Abled Persons Department and also the sports minister Udhayanidhi Stalin.

Never mind Sachin did not get to study in the Sports University but the family is happy with the outcome of the case. "I am glad the verdict came before the start of the new academic year as many other deserving children are sure to benefit from this circular reminding universities about their responsibility," says Padma.

She adds: "My fight was against the Tamil Nadu Sports University but S. Nagarajan, former secretary, Welfare of the Differently-Abled Persons Department, went a step ahead. The circular signed by him asks the 19 universities to implement the RPWD Act in letter and spirit. The circular gives enough clarity and a lot of reasonable accommodations that universities have to provide to those with disabilities."

Suitability analysis

Senior officials with the Welfare of

the Differently-Abled Persons Department agree that this is the first time such a detailed circular was issued to various state-run universities to amend its prospectus and it was triggered by a complaint raised by Padma. A study was done to see how other universities were implementing reservation for persons with disabilities.

"We did a suitability analysis by calling HODs of various departments. They were given the syllabus book and asked to come up with 'abilities' for various courses. For instance, students with any disabilities can be allowed for a computer science course. The speech and hearing impaired would find an aeronautical programme challenging," says P. Balaji, legal consultant.

The Department plans to resend the circular before the end of December and also monitor institutions. Says Balaji, "The government is ready to look at any feedback coming from the parent community."

examination and recently got the letter stating that he is selected for "appointment by direct recruit-

ment" to the post of assistant in the School Education Department.

Abilash has come a long way

since his kindergarten days when he was diagnosed with Attention Deficit Hyperactive Disorder and autism. At age five, he was enrolled into Maruti Seva School for Special Education in Kolathur and given a separate curriculum one that included speech therapy, basic education and behaviour skills.

"His IQ was 62 when he joined us and thanks to an individualised programme, the score went to 86 in a year," says S. Ramalingam, director of the special school that has been mentoring Abilash since then.

Despite challenges, the boy went on to study in a regular school and later complete BA in English and MBA with good scores. Abilash was not good in mathematics but his reading skills were very good and his well-wishers encouraged him. He translates and grasps topics in English fast. He would often visit the library at British Council and Connemara Library to pick up

books. His mother, V. Shanthi, says Abilash has an extraordinary memory that helped him in his studies. "In college, we appointed a teacher to help him after classes with accounts. Abilash is hard-working and for the last two years he has been solely preparing for various competitive examinations," says Shanthi, a resident of GKM Colony.

"With the right method and regular assessment one can help those with disabilities to shine and Abilash has proved that. He has cleared TNPSC Group 2 in the first attempt under the Specific Learning Disability quota," says Ramalingam, whose wife Visalakshmi has also been a great source of support.

Ask Abilash what reforms he would like to bring in the education department, he replies that more activity-oriented learning is needed for the holistic development of students.



Baya weavers 'own' palm tree in Ottiyambakkam again

There was a sneaking fear they had deserted their 'old home', but the birds have quelled it, as proved by the new nests on the tree

Everything about baya weavers has to do with detail and care. The choice of a partner by an individual bird and the choice of a nesting tree collectively by the group are never made flippantly. Baya weavers are finicky about location (a tree 'teetering' on the edge of a waterbody and providing in-built protection against predators) and finickier still about supportive infrastructure. They value quick access to nesting material. They end to shack up for the night in the reeds, their much preferred roosting environment. They seek grassy patches for grass seeds to feed on. A palm tree in Ottiyambakkam

opposite a gated community (Jones Cassia) had planted its feet in just the kind of environment described above. Access to nesting material and food and roosting sites has the assurance of a gilt-edged security. One just has to look around to realise it. A water channel is near-by. Despite the march of "civilisation", Nature still has a degree of unfettered run in these parts. And unsurprisingly, the baya weavers "owned" the palm tree, and their nests, in use or out of use, would be hanging from the fronds much like decorative baubles from a

Christmas tree. But a few months ago, the palm tree was divested of baya weaver nests and one could not help wonder if the birds had checked out of the location due to environmental stressors. One was proved pleasantly wrong when the nests reappeared, the baya weavers responding to the SW monsoon in customary fashion. Like many other avian species, the baya weavers synchronise the breeding schedule with the monsoons, south-west and north-east.

With nests – the majority of them at the early and middle stages of weaving – hanging once again, and the sight of male baya weavers developing these nests in an air of hope and expectation, the tree has come alive once again.

Vacant land near Korattur railway station is unkempt



A parcel of land near the main entrance of Korattur railway station is overrun with vegetation, and all kinds of waste.

Perishable waste including vegetables and fruits are quite conspicuous as they are discarded in huge quantities. This decomposition of organic waste makes the place smelly. Auto-rickshaw drivers near the railway station say this is the handiwork of vendors coming from suburban areas to sell agricultural produce in the city.

They misuse this vacant land to dump rotten produce and this is a common sight here. Conservancy workers have told them time and again to make use of the bins but they pay no heed to it, say auto-rickshaw drivers.

They also suggested that the authorities concerned should take stringent measures to curb this practice and install a board cautioning the public from dumping waste here.

Citizens forum raises safety concern at Tiruvallur railway station

Citing safety reasons, Thiruvallur Town Consumer Protection Association, a citizens forum, has made a representation to the Railway Manager - Chennai Division, Southern Railway seeking reduction of the speed of the trains entering the island platform two and three.

Platform two handles express trains, goods trains and suburban - fast local and three suburban trains and occasionally express trains.

The representation dated June 27 highlights the narrowing of the space at the platform on account of footpath construction (carried out under Amrit Bharat Station Scheme) and therefore commuters are pushed to the edge of the platform near the railway track.

“The construction occupies close to a 100 metre-length of the island platform. Commuters are pushed to the platform edge crossing the yellow line raising the risk of an accident. As the platform handles suburban trains also, it is crowded during rush hour. It should be noted Four Vande Bharat trains pass through the platform in addition to other express trains. Hence, we want Southern Railway to impose speed restrictions on trains as they enter the platform. Besides, we want a “caution order” to be passed. Because, a deadline committed in a “caution order” for completion of the work will be viewed seriously than the deadline committed in a contract. We are seeking a caution order because work that began a month ago moves at tardy pace,” says Y Jayapaulraj, the Association’s secretary.
