New cabbie shot dead

Immig car service driver slain in B'klyn after 2 weeks on job

Slain cab driver Naveed Afzal began working for a Brooklyn car service to support his family a mere two weeks before a gunman shot him in the face, his roommate told the Daily News.

"All his money went to his family," said 62-year-old Mohammad Rundjawa. "That's why he started [driving] ... two weeks before this happened."

Afzal, 52, pulled up outside a Lincoln Place apartment building near Underhill Ave. in Crown Heights to pick up a fare at around 10 p.m. on June 21, cops said.

When he arrived, two men got into his back seat and a struggle ensued, ending with one of the men shooting Afzal in the face, according to police.

Medics rushed the victim to New York Presbyterian-Hospital Brooklyn Methodist, where he died three days later, cops said.

Afzal came to the U.S. in early 2022 with a plan to work for Lyft and Uber to support his wife, son and three daughters still living in Pakistan, according to Rundjawa, who drives for Uber and said he and Afzal were neighbors in Pakistan before becoming roommates in Brooklyn.

The hardworking immigrant father

got a gig at a Red Hook pizza shop while he waited for Lyft and Uber to approve his applications, but the ride-share apps placed him on a monthslong waiting list, according to Rundjawa.

"They say, 'We have too many drivers,'" said Rundjawa. "He was waiting for five months. They were not responsive."

With his three daughters already in university and his son about to graduate high school, Afzal couldn't afford to wait on the ride-share apps and instead started driving for Junior Express Car Service, which unlike Uber and Lyft accepts cash for fares — leaving drivers vulnerable to thieves, Rundjawa said.

"Uber is safe — this is different," said Rundjawa. "Car service people take the cash. The robber people, they know, if you're a Lyft driver you don't have cash."

Would-be crooks have been known to prey on car service drivers, according to N.Y. Federation of Taxi Drivers President Fernando Mateo, who in April announced a \$7,500 cash reward for information leading to the arrest of robbers wanted in any of the nine robberies targeting car service drivers that month.

"We need to put a stop to this," Mateo told the Daily News in April. "We need to make sure that drivers are safe."

Mateo said that whoever requested the



ride that led to Afzal's death noted in the order that they would pay cash — a tactic used by thieves to ensure they get a driver worth robbing, said Mateo.

"You can order a vehicle and say you're going to pay cash," said Mateo. "So when you get there they know you have cash on you and they try to rob you."

The taxi advocate believes it's possible Afzal was gunned down by his own fare.

"We don't know if Naveed, who is a very religious man, refused to give up his earnings and so they shot him in the head," said Mateo, "and they left him for dead."

Afzal's funeral was held Tuesday at the Makki Masjid Muslim Community Center

in Ditmas Park, Brooklyn, where representatives from the NYPD and Pakistani Embassy joined hundreds of mourners in paying their respects, according to Rundjawa.

"There were a lot of people," said Rundjawa. "He was a very good man."

Also in attendance were scores of fellow cab drivers who prayed in solidarity for the murdered cabbie despite having never met Afzal, according to Faheem Mian, the manager of Al-Rayaan Muslim Funeral Services.

"There were so many cab drivers," said Mian. "They don't even know him, but they came for his last prayers."

The Al-Rayaan funeral home underwrote the costs of both Afzal's funeral and sending his body back to his family in Pakistan, where it was scheduled to arrive early Friday morning, according to Rundjawa and Mian.

"When these kinds of things happen and the person has no family, we take care of the funeral just to be kind," said Mian.

"I believe in karma," said Mian. "What goes around comes around. Do the good things, and the good things come back [to] you."

Messages left seeking comment from Junior Express Car Service were not returned.

RAGE AT DWI DRIVER

Suspect 'destroyed 4 families,' says ma-in-law of cop killed in L.I. crash

The accused drunken driver who killed NYPD Officer Emilia Rennhack and three others at a Long Island nail salon should "rot in hell," the officer's mother-in-law told the Daily News.

"He was drunk midafternoon, 64 years old, drunk and I hope he rots in hell," said Holly Rennhack, whose NYPD detective son was married to Rennhack. "He took four people's lives away. He's destroyed four families, and there's many people injured. He's just ruined so many lives."

Rennhack, who was off-duty, was getting her nails done for an upcoming wedding when Steven Schwally plowed his 2020 Chevy Traverse through the front window of the salon about 4:30 p.m. on

Friday, Suffolk County police said.

Two other women, Yan Xu, 41, and Meizi Zhang, 50, both from Flushing, Queens, and a man, Jiancai Chen, 37, of Bayside, Queens, died in the crash. Nine more people, including a 12-year-old girl, also suffered injuries.

Schwally, who was hospitalized, survived the crash and was initially charged with driving while intoxicated. The Dix Hills, L.I., resident was speeding through the parking lot before he slammed into the store and was semiconscious when his SUV finally came to a stop at the rear of the salon, cops and fire officials said.

He awaits arraignment, and a spokeswoman for Suffolk District Attorney Ray Tierney said as a rule her office doesn't publicly speculate on whether suspects could face upgraded or additional charges.

Rennhack joined the NYPD in 2018

and married Detective Carl Rennhack less than a year ago. The couple lived in Deer Park, not far from where she died.

"She was wonderful," Holly Rennhack said. "I couldn't say anything but what a wonderful, truly kind, caring [person she was]. She joined the police force to help people."

Rennhack, who was one of three siblings, grew up on a farm in Poland and came to the U.S. to make a better life, her mother-in-law said. Her parents live in Queens.

"She was a hardworking girl, very smart, very pretty. Extremely pretty. Just a wonderful, wonderful, wonderful, caring person. I couldn't say enough about her. ... She lives in my house. I lived with her. We're truly heartbroken. We're truly, truly heartbroken."

In her six years as a police officer, Rennhack made a remarkable 68 felony

arrests and 95 misdemeanor arrests. She also met the love of her life, dating Carl for nearly three years before they tied the knot in September at Giorgio's of Baiting Hollow, also in Suffolk County.

The two worked together at the 102nd Precinct in Richmond Hill, Queens, her mother-in-law said.

"He's dealing with it, but he's devastated. Totally devastated. They were only married last September," Holly Rennhack said of her son.

"She was a very, very hardworking girl. I think she did have a lot of arrests. I think she was Cop of the Month not long ago and honored for that. I think more than once maybe," the heartbroken mother-in-law said. "She's going to be sorely missed. Sorely, sorely missed. People always say what a great person, but she truly, truly was. I felt so lucky to have her as a daughter-in-law."



COMMISH LETS COP'S

Officer said she had shot, then said she didn't, but was allowed to keep

A Brooklyn cop who admitted to submitting a phony COVID vaccine card and then lying about it was allowed to keep her job by NYPD Commissioner Edward Caban despite a Police Department review recommending she be fired.

Internal NYPD documents obtained Friday by the Daily News show that instead of having her employment terminated, Police Officer Kimberly Lucas was docked 85 vacation days and hit with a yearlong probationary period — thanks in large part to the intercession of Caban.

"This shocks the conscience. They're

basically letting a fraudster stay on the job," said an outraged fellow cop, who noted that the circumstances around the case effectively disqualify Lucas from testifying under oath. "She can never testify in court again."

Caban's lenience in the Lucas matter isn't the first time the commissioner has let bad behavior slide.

As first reported in The News earlier this year, Caban declined to discipline a high-ranking deputy chief who wrenched a female protester's hair and shoved her face into the ground. Since becoming commissioner last July, he's blocked disciplinary cases involving 54 officers from going to

trial, the news outlet ProPublica reported.

Some cops who've landed in hot water also later saw their fortunes improve — like Lt. Brandi Sanchez, who was placed on modified duty in 2020 after being caught having drunken sex in a bathroom with fellow cop Sgt. Lambros Gavalas. According to a police source, despite that, Sanchez got a plum gig about a year ago working for First Deputy Commissioner Tania Kinsella.

Lucas, who's worked out of Brooklyn's 70th Precinct for nearly 10 years, was facing termination for her COVID-related misdeeds.

Other cops who told the truth about their refusal to take the vaccine after it

was mandated were fired as a result. The so-called vaccine mandate prompted the Police Benevolent Association to sue the city — a case it won in September 2022. As a result, a judge ordered the department to reinstate officers who were fired for refusing the mandate.

But Lucas' case was different from those in that she claimed she'd been vaccinated. As part of her departmental trial, Lucas testified that she went to get a vaccine in 2021 after speaking with a commanding officer about whether she'd comply with the city mandate requiring all municipal employees be vaccinated for COVID.

At an urgent care facility in Brooklyn, a

job; furious fellow Finest says, They're turning a blind eye to 'fraudster'

receptionist inquired whether she wanted a vaccine while "smirking," which Lucas correctly interpreted to mean that "she was going to be given a vaccine card without receiving the COVID-19 vaccine," internal NYPD records show.

Lucas pursued that phony vaccine card path after the receptionist gave her a phone number to contact to obtain it. Records show that she ultimately did just that on Staten Island and later uploaded the fake card to the NYPD's Centralized Personnel Resource system.

Later that year, in December 2021, the department's Internal Affairs Bureau began a review of the situation and requested that

Lucas bring her proof of vaccination to her interview.

During the sitdown, she gave a "second fraudulent card to the IAB investigators" after losing the first one and lied to them, saying that she "was given the COVID-19 vaccine shot and then waited in the lobby for 15 minutes to ensure that there were no side effects."

About a year later, in a second official interview that took place in October 2022, she confessed to the falsehood. During that interview and in trial testimony, she said she feared the vaccine because her mother suffered a stroke within two days of getting it and that she couldn't afford to lose her

job because she's the sole supporter of her child.

Taking all of that into consideration, Anne Stone, an NYPD assistant deputy commissioner of trials, determined in October that Lucas should be terminated, but allowed to "file for vested-interest retirement."

Caban overruled her in May, though.

While writing that he agreed with Stone's findings that Lucas lied, he noted that Lucas "had fulfilled nine years of exemplary service in the rank of police officer." Caban ultimately concluded Lucas should only be docked 85 vacation days and hit with a year of "dismissal probation,"

which allows her to retain her full salary during that time.


A spokesman for the NYPD declined to elaborate more on what went into Caban's decision-making process.

PBA President Patrick Hendry suggested that his move was justified.

"The NYPD's disciplinary matrix does not limit the police commissioner to a 'one-size-fits-all' set of penalties," Hendry said. "He is still granted the discretion to go beyond the recommended penalties to make a fair final determination based on a police officer's past record and other considerations. That is what occurred in this case."

Teen's kin ID 1 of 2 bodies found near where boys vanished in surf

Police found two bodies in the waters off the Rockaways, and the devastated family of swimmer Elyjha Chandler identified one of them as their 16-year-old loved one.

The grim discoveries came eight days after Elyjha and Christian Perkins, 17, vanished in the water off Jacob Riis Park on June 21.

Cops found one body off Beach 114th St. and the Ocean Promenade about 9 p.m. Saturday; a second body was found about 2 miles from Jacob Riis Park at 10:45 a.m. Sunday, police said.

An NYPD spokesman said the bodies were both males, but provided no

information about their age or identity, or how long they were in the water.

On Sunday, Elyjha's father, Urshell Chandler, and other family gathered along the Queens beach as police investigated.

He told the Daily News Elyjha's body was found Saturday night, and that he got word about 2 a.m. Sunday.

"I'm just coming back from the precinct, and they confirmed they found his body," he said.

"I feel relieved but still sad," he added. "We got some closure in this with finding the body, now we can make proper funeral arrangements."

According to the heartbroken dad, "Someone was walking with their dog, and they found his body washed up."

A relative of Perkins told the News on Sunday police had not yet confirmed if the second body belonged to their

loved one, and declined to comment any further.

Elyjha, who was a junior at Wingate High School in Brooklyn and set to graduate next year, loved playing basketball, his father said.

But the dad and an older sister, Kiola Chandler, pushed back on claims Elyjha and Christian were on the beach after-hours, and said no lifeguards were present even before the park's official 6 p.m. closing. "We have videos — there was no lifeguards there, my brother was in the water way before 6 o'clock," Kiola Chandler said.

"A third little boy that was in the water with Elijah and Christian, he was able to survive because he held on to a rock."

That youngster couldn't find a lifeguard to help, she charged, insisting the boys were pulled in by a rip tide shortly before 6 p.m.

Even after closing, the park was crowded with beachgoers, she insisted.

Teenagers often hit the beach in the Rockaways in the summer, and, the father said, it seems every year tragedy strikes.

"It's a hot day, I would like for the city to extend their lifeguards at least an hour more so," he said.

Kiola Chandler added: "They need to extend it, especially on hot, hot summer days. You know children [are] going to come ... people are going to come, and they're going to stay for a long time."

In June 2022, a 16-year-old girl died after she was overpowered by a rip tide off Rockaway Beach. And last July, two teens died just a few weeks apart — a 14-year-old boy drowned in the waters off Beach 75th St. on July 2, and a 19-year-old college student was swept away off Jacob Riis Park on July 28.

Registered China rep rejects status, doesn't tell feds about

Two of Mayor Adams' top advisers met in spring 2022 with a businessman who had months earlier registered as an agent for China's government, but the executive didn't disclose the sitdown to U.S. authorities, a reporting lapse that could raise legal concerns, the Daily News has learned.

Robin Mui, CEO of Sing Tao, a Chinese-owned media organization with offices in New York, said in a recent interview he didn't inform the feds of his April 18, 2022, meeting with Adams advisers Ingrid Lewis-Martin and Winnie Greco because he doesn't agree with the U.S. Justice Department's determination that he's a Chinese agent.

"I don't disclose any meetings. I am a newspaperman, and I meet a lot of

people," said Mui. Despite his contention, Mui has been registered as a Chinese government agent since 2021, federal records show.

Steve Roberts, an expert on the federal Foreign Agents Registration Act (FARA), which imposes disclosure obligations on foreign agents, said it's a "big gamble" for Mui to be "openly defiant" of the Justice Department's reporting requirements in such a way. Even if Mui disagrees with the department's determination that he's an agent, the feds consider him one and thereby expect him under the FARA law to disclose any formal meetings he holds with U.S. public officials, Roberts said.

"The Justice Department does not care if you see the statute a different way. To not report activity even though you know there's an obligation would seem to fall under the 'knowing and willful'

definition," Roberts said, referring to a section in the law that says foreign agents who knowingly omit "a material fact" from their disclosures can face a \$10,000 fine and prison.

The meeting took place at Sing Tao's office on Lafayette St. in SoHo, according to Lewis-Martin's detailed daily schedules obtained by The News via a Freedom of Information Law request.

Mui, who's an Adams campaign donor, described the confab as a "friendly gathering" and said he couldn't recall specific issues they discussed.

Adams spokeswoman Kayla Mamelak said Greco and Lewis-Martin met with Mui to talk about ethnic media engagement between Adams' administration and Sing Tao, but wouldn't say whether they knew he was a foreign agent before their sitdown.

The Justice Department's FARA unit didn't return a request for comment.

Revelations about the Mui meet come after FBI agents raided Greco's two Bronx homes in February as part of a federal investigation.

Sources familiar with the matter confirmed to The News last week the probe is scrutinizing trips Greco and Adams took to China that were partially paid by China's Communist government. The investigation is reportedly also looking into Greco's role in hosting fundraisers for Adams' 2021 campaign that drew contributions that have sparked straw donor concerns.

Greco didn't return a request for comment on word that the feds are looking at her trips to China with the mayor.

Adams spokesman Fabien Levy said the trips, which the mayor went on while

meeting with top mayoral advisers Greco and Lewis-Martin

Brooklyn borough president, were cleared by the city Conflicts of Interest Board.

The Brooklyn U.S. attorney's office, which is leading the Greco probe, declined to comment on the Mui meeting.

Neither Greco nor anyone else in the mayor's orbit have been accused of wrongdoing by the feds.

Before joining Adams' administration as his Asian community liaison, Greco was a consultant for New York-based influence groups that receive funding from China's regime.

Greco, who along with Lewis-Martin is one of Adams' longest-serving advisers, returned to work at City Hall in May after going on paid sick leave following the FBI raids.

At the time of his sitdown with Lewis-Martin and Greco, Mui had been a registered Chinese agent for nearly eight

months.

The Justice Department ordered Mui and Sing Tao to register in August 2021 after determining the company's U.S. operations constitute foreign government influence activity. The U.S. government's determination that Sing Tao's a foreign agent came after the daughter of a billionaire member of the Chinese Communist Party's political arm bought a majority stake in the company in the summer of 2021.

Mui has other connections to Adams' orbit. Between 2015 and 2016, Mui gave \$1,250 to Adams' Brooklyn borough president campaign. He also gave another \$3,000 to his nascent mayoral bid in 2019, \$1,000 of which was returned due to contribution limits, city records show.

Mui also surfaced in the headlines this spring when Newsweek reported he

and Greco are the organizers of the city's Asian-American heritage parade, which first took place in Manhattan in spring 2022 after Adams granted it status as an annual event. Several Chinese-Americans who are critical of China's government told the outlet they were barred from participating in the parade due to their political views.

After authorizing the parade, Adams marched in it in both 2022 and 2023 alongside Huang Ping, China's consul general in New York.

The Greco investigation is among several law enforcement inquiries touching on Adams' inner circle.

The Manhattan U.S. attorney's office is separately investigating allegations that Turkey's government funneled illegal money into Adams' 2021 campaign. As part of that probe, FBI agents last

November seized Adams' cell phones and raided the homes of two longtime aides.

Adams hasn't been accused of wrongdoing in that investigation, either.

Among the episodes the feds are scrutinizing in the Turkey probe is Adams' role in helping resolve building safety issues at the Turkish Consulate in Manhattan that threatened to delay the building's opening in summer 2021. Adams, who was at the time the Democratic mayoral nominee, has confirmed he helped Turkish Consul General Reyhan Özgür, but argues there was nothing untoward about that.

Lewis-Martin's schedule entries show she met for dinner with Özgür on July 7, 2022, at the Turkish Consulate on First Ave. Mamelak declined to say what they talked about, but said it's common for Lewis-Martin to meet with consul generals.

Budget OK at last minute

Council passes \$112B plan; Adams ripped for his cuts that were KOd

With just hours left on the deadline clock, the City Council voted Sunday to approve a \$112.4 billion budget that restores almost all of the cuts proposed by Mayor Adams and adds about \$1 billion to what he proposed in April.

The budget vote, which is legally required to be completed by June 30, came after months of bitter negotiations between the mayor and the Council, with a final tally of 46 for and 3 against.

On Friday, Adams and the Council struck a deal that makes whole the city’s public library system budget, reversing \$58 million in cuts and enabling it to resume seven-day-a-week service. Some of Adams’ cuts forced the library system to close dozens of branches on Sundays.

The city will allocate an additional \$2 billion in spending on affordable and public housing, a development first reported in the Daily News, and will restore \$20 million to early childhood programs,

including provisions to more rationally fund the city’s pre-K and 3-K initiatives moving forward.

“Reports of New York City’s demise have been greatly exaggerated,” Council Finance Committee Chairman Justin Brannan (D-Brooklyn) told reporters Sunday.

In the runup to the budget deal, which was hammered out Friday, Council Speaker Adrienne Adams (D-Queens) held rallies and applied public pressure to restore the cuts.

Even after the deal, though, the mayor took heat for holding fast on his cuts for so long. The Council insisted that its projections showed most of the cuts, including the library cutbacks, weren’t necessary in the end.

Several Council members blasted the mayor before making their votes.

“By forcing New Yorkers to fight and scrounge for the bare minimums, he continues to show his inability to properly manage the city,” Councilwoman Sandy Nurse (D-Brooklyn) said before her “aye”

vote.

On Sunday, the speaker announced the pending vote to cheers and fanfare, but added, “We have to shift from the focus on restoring to one of strengthening programs and services that we know New Yorkers need and deserve.”

Since last year, Mayor Adams argued the cuts were needed to offset the city’s heavy spending on housing and caring for newly arrived migrants. On Sunday, he lauded the passage of a “collaborative budget” even as the city still faces major issues.

“Despite facing unprecedented challenges — including a \$7.1 billion budget gap, a \$4.9 billion international humanitarian crisis, and hundreds of millions of short-term stimulus dollars used to fund crucial long-term programs — we still passed a collaborative budget that addresses the three things that cost New Yorkers the most: housing, child care and health care,” the mayor said.

The no votes included New York City Democratic Socialists members Tiffany

Caban of Queens and Alexa Aviles and Shahana Hanif of Brooklyn, who called the spending plan “Eric Adams’ Austerity Budget,” and criticized him for keeping the NYPD’s \$11 billion-plus budget “completely untouched.”

“Despite our city’s nearly \$4 billion surplus, the FY25 budget is a patchwork of partial restorations paired with hundreds of millions in new and returning cuts to vital city agencies and services including parks, early childhood education and CUNY,” the trio said in a statement in advance of Sunday’s vote.

Caban criticized the NYPD’s “ever-bloated budget,” and said, “This no vote will certainly not grow my popularity with the powers that be, but my constituents did not put me in this room to be a rubber stamp for another Eric Adams budget.”

Still, the mayor won plaudits from Councilwoman Vickie Paladino (R-Queens), who chided the budget’s critics. “The select few here that can never be satisfied will push us deeper and deeper into debt if they have their way,” she said.

Family blames confusing construction signs for fatal FDR Drive hit-and-run

The grieving family of a woman killed by a hit-and-run driver on the FDR Drive believes confusing construction signs led her into oncoming traffic instead of a pedestrian pathway.

Mary Rowell, 31, was with friends and family in East River Park near Houston St. around 12:15 a.m. on Saturday when she decided to leave.

"She was walking [and] they doing construction over there," Denise Rowell, the victim's cousin, told the Daily News. "She went to go where we came in at."

Navigating the construction zone in the dark, Mary Rowell followed a sign she thought would land her on a sidewalk toward Houston St. Instead, she wound up in the northbound lanes of the roadway, according to the cousin.

A passing dark-colored sedan slammed into Rowell and kept on going, police said.

At the same time, Denise Rowell was heading to her nearby apartment when

she spotted fire trucks.

"I'm like, what happened over here?" the woman recalled. "Then I see the ambulance and then the crowd started getting bigger. I said, 'Mary went that way.' I didn't see her come back."

The worried cousin walked back toward the FDR Drive, where she spotted Mary Rowell.

"They was pumping her chest," Denise Rowell recalled. "And I was telling the police, that's my cousin."

Medics rushed Mary Rowell to Bellevue Hospital, but she could not be saved.

Meanwhile, the victim's brother, after a week away, arrived back home to the East Harlem apartment he shared with her.

"She left, she cleaned up, and she had some ribs," said Cleveland Rowell. "I could tell I just missed her because it was in the refrigerator, but it still was hot"

Though he had not yet been notified of his sister's death, the man recalled an eerie feeling in the apartment that night.

"I had a ringing in my ear that day," said Cleveland Rowell. "It was so many signs. I definitely remember the ringing and I didn't know what it was."



Hours after the horrific crash, he was awoken by his sister's boyfriend banging on the apartment door.

"I finally open the door and he said, 'It's bad. Your sister gone,'" Cleveland Rowell recounted, adding: "I'm doing horrible, I'm not going to lie."

On Sunday, friends and family gathered outside the Rowell siblings' apartment building, where a memorial was set up in Mary Rowell's honor.

"She got that kind heart where she would give you anything she had if you

asked for it," her distraught brother said. "There are not too many people like that in the world."

Mary Rowell, originally from Brooklyn, was a mother to a 3-year-old daughter.

"She asks for her mom," Denise Rowell said of the little girl. "She wants her mom. She asks for her mom all day today."

Family members on Sunday remembered Mary Rowell a selfless, kindhearted woman who loved her family.

"She was just that kindhearted person ... she's just still giving her last," said Cleveland Rowell. "If she had it, she will make sure you got it."

The family believes had there been better barricades and signage at the construction area, the young mom would still be alive.

"It's dangerous," said Denise Rowell. "It's completely open over there."

Police are still searching for the hit-and-run driver.

"Just turn yourself in," said the victim's sister Lorie Rowell. "You hit her, you left her out there like she was nothing"

"You left her in the street like she was an animal," the heartbroken sister added.

Cops misidentify gun, kill boy

Upstate teen's weapon 'ultimately fires only pellets or BBs'

Body cam video of an upstate Utica police officer fatally shooting a 13-year-old boy was released Saturday night by authorities.

Officers believed the teen, identified as Nyah Mway, was carrying a handgun as he sprinted away from police. Body cam video showed the teen holding the supposed weapon.

However, after Officer Patrick Husnay killed Nyah Mway, investigators discovered the teen was only carrying a pellet gun.

Cops described the gun as "a realistic-appearing firearm with Glock markings, signatures, detachable magazine and serial numbers." But, they noted, "Ultimately it fires only pellets or BBs."

Several officers stopped Nyah Mway and an unidentified teen on Friday night in Utica, about 80 miles west of Albany. Cops claimed the teens were stopped in connection with an armed robbery investigation.

As officers move to search the teens for weapons, Nyah Mway took off running,

video shows. Officer Bryce Patterson followed close behind and spotted the teen carrying the replica weapon.

"Gun! He's got a gun!" Patterson shouted to his colleagues, seconds before tackling Nyah Mway to the ground.

Husnay was the second officer to reach the subdued teen. He fired a single gunshot, which fatally wounded Nyah Mway.

State Attorney General Letitia James and the Utica Police Department will both investigate the shooting. Husnay, Patterson and a third officer, Andrew Citriniti, were placed on paid leave following the deadly incident.

Nyah Mway, who was in the eighth grade at a local middle school, was a refugee from Myanmar, according to local media. He was a member of the Karen ethnic minority, a group that has been oppressed by Myanmar's ruling military junta following a 2021 coup.

"I want to offer my heartfelt condolences to the family of the deceased party during this difficult time," Utica Police Chief Mark Williams said.

"This is a tragic and traumatic incident for all involved."

Pro-Palestinian activists busted at Pride March

Pro-Palestinian demonstrators climbed over barricades, tossed fake blood and held up the city's Pride parade Sunday.

About a dozen protesters descended on the annual march as it approached Christopher St. and Waverly Place in Greenwich Village around 2:45 p.m.

They protesters splattered red paint on the route and on a Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck inside the barricades, photos show.

The protesters sat in the roadway and refused to let the parade continue as they held signs declaring, "No queer liberation without Palestinian liberation" and "Palestine will be free."

The demonstration erupted about a half block from the historic Stonewall Inn, a landmark and symbol of queer activism and liberation, as well as the end of the parade route.

Police took 10 people into custody and issued seven of them criminal summonses, cops said.

Three others — a 21-year-old woman and two 35-year-old men — were arrested and charges against them were pending Sunday night, police added.

Sunday marked the city's 54th annual Pride March.

Ultra-Orthodox protest in Jerusalem vs. order to enlist in military turns violent

JERUSALEM — Thousands of Jewish ultra-Orthodox men clashed with Israeli police in central Jerusalem on Sunday during a protest against a Supreme Court order for them to begin enlisting for military service.

The landmark decision last week ordering the government to begin drafting ultra-Orthodox men could lead to the collapse of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's governing coalition as Israel wages war in Gaza.

Tens of thousands of men rallied in an

ultra-Orthodox neighborhood to protest the order. But after nightfall, the crowd made its way toward central Jerusalem and turned violent.

Israeli police said protesters threw rocks and attacked the car of an ultra-Orthodox cabinet minister, pelting it with stones. Water cannons filled with skunk-scented water and police mounted on horses were used to disperse the crowd. But the demonstration was still not under control late Sunday.

Military service is compulsory for most Jewish men and women in Israel. But politically powerful ultra-Orthodox parties

have won exemptions for their followers to skip military service and instead study in religious seminaries.

The longstanding arrangement has bred resentment among the broader public, a sentiment that has grown stronger during the eight-month war against Hamas. More than 600 soldiers have been killed in fighting, and tens of thousands of reservists have been activated, upending careers, businesses and lives.

Ultra-Orthodox parties and their followers say forcing their men to serve in the army will destroy their generations-old way of life. Earlier Sunday, thousands of

men crowded a square and joined in mass prayers.

Many held signs criticizing the government, with one saying "not even one male" should be drafted.

The ultra-Orthodox parties are key members of Netanyahu's governing coalition and could potentially force new elections if they decide to leave the government in protest.

Party leaders have not said whether they will leave the government. Doing so could be risky, with Netanyahu's coalition's popularity lagging since the Oct. 7 Hamas attack that sparked the war.

'Quiet Place' tops Costner Western at box office

"A Quiet Place: Day One" is making noise at the box office. The prequel earned an estimated \$53 million in its first weekend in North American theaters, according to studio estimates Sunday.

It's both a franchise best and significantly more than expected. Going into the weekend, prerelease tracking had "Day One" pegged for a \$40 million debut, but audiences were clearly more enthusiastic to see the action-horror starring Lupita Nyong'o and Joseph Quinn and released by Paramount. The same could not be said

for Kevin Costner's "Horizon: An American Saga-Chapter 1," which opened to \$11 million.

The "Quiet Place" victory wasn't quite enough to snag the coveted first place spot on the charts, though. That honor again went to Disney and Pixar's juggernaut "Inside Out 2," which added an estimated \$57.4 million in its third weekend in theaters, and crossed \$1 billion globally.

There's a distant possibility that the places will shift when actuals are released Monday. But either way it's good news for movie theaters in a summer season that's finally heating up but still running far behind last

May 2021). John Krasinski, who wrote and directed the first two, continued serving as a producer.

Playing on 3,708 screens in the U.S. and Canada, nearly 40% of its domestic earnings came from "premium screens" including IMAX and other large formats. It entered the marketplace with mostly positive reviews (84% on Rotten Tomatoes); Audiences gave it a B+ CinemaScore and four out of five stars on PostTrak.

The start for "Horizon," meanwhile, was sluggish. Though older audiences, the ones most likely to support a Western epic, don't typically rush out to see films on opening weekend the way people often do for horrors and superheroes, the road ahead will not be easy: Reviews have not been great and it got an underwhelming B- CinemaScore.

The stakes are also a little different for "Horizon," a \$100 million production that Costner financed on his own and partnered with Warner Bros. to distribute. It opened in 3,334 locations. A decades-old passion project, he mortgaged property in Santa Barbara, Calif. to finance it and exited "Yellowstone" to see it through. In a bold, unconventional strategy, "Chapter 2" arrives in theaters later this summer, on Aug. 16. He also has plans for two more movies.

A quick glance at the top 10 shows that audiences are largely favoring franchises and "known commodities" over originals. "Bad Boys: Ride or Die" was right behind "Horizon" on the charts, and it's been in theaters for four weeks already.

"Inside Out 2" continues to be a box office phenomenon, the likes of which the industry hasn't seen since "Barbie" almost a year ago. In just three weeks of release, it's earned nearly \$470 million in North America and \$545.5 million internationally, bringing its global total to \$1.01 billion. The sequel is the only 2024 release to cross the billion dollar mark and it did it in just 19 days, a record for an animated film.

"A Quiet Place: Day One," directed by Michael Sarnoski and rated PG-13, is also fast approaching an important threshold out of the gates. Including the \$45.5 million from international showings in 59 markets, the \$67 million production has already made \$98.5 million.

In a rare feat for a third film, it opened higher than both "A Quiet Place" (\$50.2 million opening in April 2018) and "A Quiet Place: Part II" (\$47.5 million opening in

Right-wing National Rally surges to big lead over centrists in France election

PARIS — The far-right National Rally leaped into a strong lead Sunday in France's first round of legislative elections, polling agencies projected, bringing the party closer to being able to form a government in round two and dealing a major slap to centrist President Emmanuel Macron and his risky decision to call the surprise ballot.

When he dissolved the National Assembly on June 9, after a stinging defeat at the hands of the National Rally in French voting for the European Parliament, Macron gambled that the anti-immigration party with historical links to antisemitism wouldn't repeat that success when France's own fate was in the balance.

But it didn't work out that way. With French polling agencies projecting that the National Rally and its allies got about one-third of the national vote on Sunday, Macron's prime minister warned that France could end up with its first far-right government since World War II if voters don't come

together to thwart that scenario in round two next Sunday.

"The extreme right is at the doors of power," Prime Minister Gabriel Attal said. He twice described National Rally policy pledges as "disastrous" and said that in the second-round ballot, "not one vote should go to the National Rally."

French polling agencies' projections put Macron's grouping of centrist parties a distant third in the first-round ballot, behind both the National Rally and a new left-wing coalition of parties that joined forces to keep it from winning power.

Winning a parliamentary majority would enable National Rally leader Marine Le Pen to install her 28-year-old protege, Jordan Bardella, as prime minister and would crown her yearslong rebranding effort to make her party less repellent to mainstream voters. She inherited the party, then called the National Front, from her father, Jean-Marie Le Pen, who has multiple convictions for racist and antisemitic hate speech.

Still, the National Rally isn't there yet. With another torrid week of campaigning

to come before the decisive final voting next Sunday, the election's ultimate outcome remains uncertain.

Only the second round will make clear whether Le Pen's party and its allies get the absolute majority they would need to comfortably form a government and then start to implement their promises to dismantle many of Macron's key policies and foreign policy platforms. That would include stopping French deliveries of long-range missiles to Ukraine in the war against Russia's full-scale invasion. The National Rally has historical ties to Russia.

The far right's more confrontational approach to the European Union, its plans to roll back Macron's pension reforms and National Rally promises to boost voters' spending power without clearly detailing how it would pay for the pledge could also spook European financial markets.

Some polling agency projections indicated that in the best-case scenario for the far right, the National Rally and its allies could collectively clear the bar of 289 seats needed for a secure majority in the 577-seat National

Assembly.

But, depending on how the second round shakes out, the far right could also fall short and leave no single bloc with a clear majority, polling agencies projected. Predictions are difficult because of the two-round voting system.

Already on Sunday night, the far-right's rivals were working on arrangements to pull some of their candidates out of the race in round two, in an effort to concentrate votes against the National Rally.

Turnout was at least 66%, according to polling estimates, which would make it the highest for a first-round legislative election in 27 years.

Many French voters are frustrated with inflation and other economic concerns, as well as Macron's leadership, seen as arrogant and out-of-touch with their lives. The National Rally party has tapped that discontent, notably via online platforms such as TikTok.

Foremost for many voters were the rising cost of living and immigration, which the National Rally campaigned heavily on. The campaign was marred by rising hate speech.

A shot at better health

The U.S. surgeon general is charged with monitoring the public health of the nation. In an advisory issued last week, Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy identified a threat we've long discussed on these pages: gun violence. Murthy pointed out that guns have for a few years been the leading cause of death for children and adolescents in the United States, outpacing even motor vehicles. Tens of thousands of people are killed every year.

The surgeon general also honed in on an impact often ignored in conversations around guns, which is the heavy toll extending beyond violence itself. You don't need to have directly experienced U.S. gun violence for this violence to have colored your life, as you sit in a movie theater and eyeball the exits or consider picking shoes you can run in as you head to a concert or a parade.

In the grand scale of U.S. K-12 and post-secondary education, school shootings are rare, yet there's hardly a student of any age who hasn't wondered if it'll be their turn next, or spent the days after an active-shooter drill unable to focus on their schoolwork.

This is all a choice that we've made, not all at once but over time, as gun manufacturers moved from selling weapons as tools to representations of independence and masculinity, with guns once reserved for military use modified slightly to be sold hand-over-fist to civilian consumers.

It's a choice made by right-wing politicians who have decided that no amount of carnage will dislodge their desire to use gun fanaticism as a political pressure point and pressure groups like the NRA, which has at this point abandoned support for

even the mildest gun restrictions. And it's a choice made by judges, including those on the Supreme Court, who have conjured up an individual right to firearms that was not really set forth in the Constitution and chipped away at democratically-enacted limitations.

The advisory by itself cannot change public perceptions or policy, but it does bring the weight of the nation's top health official down solidly on one side, which cannot as easily be dismissed as pure politics. These types of advisories have moved the needle on all sorts of other issues that were once considered matters of significant public controversy and have since been all but settled, from the danger of cigarettes to the benefits of seat belts.

Still, for maximum effect, we need significant political will followed by concrete action. This action shouldn't just be reactive to the next big headline-grabbing public tragedy, as sadly likely as the next one is to come soon. It must come from a place of making an affirmative case that it is in the best interests of all — including responsible gun owners and law enforcement — for much more concrete regulation of firearms.

Despite its various missteps on this issue, the Supreme Court at least left the door open for lawmakers to keep guns out of the hands of clearly dangerous people with its recent ruling upholding a federal law blocking sales to people convicted of domestic violence. Let's have more of that, more bans on guns in certain sensitive areas, more red flag processes, more time limits and background checks, fewer guns in fewer hands. It's a matter of public health, after all.

Balancing the books

It's July 1, the start of the second half of the calendar year and the third quarter for businesses. And for almost every state government, today is the beginning of fiscal year 2025.

New Jersey finalized their 2025 budget on Friday, when Gov. Phil Murphy signed the \$56.7 billion spending plan. We are glad that the long-struggling NJTransit will for the first time have a dedicated revenue source in the form of a corporate transit fee that will bring in \$1 billion (although having it sunset in five years doesn't seem to make much sense.)

Beyond Jersey, 45 other states also use today for their budgets. Three states begin their fiscal years later on: Texas uses Sept. 1, while Alabama and Michigan match what Congress and the feds have with Oct. 1.

So that's 49, with one missing.

Yes, the lucky winner is New York State, which goes three months earlier than everyone else with an April 1 deadline. For some reason a Republican governor and Legislature in 1943 shifted to that date from July 1. After 81 years, it's time to go back to July 1. They definitely could use the extra three months.

New York City wisely uses the July 1 standard. And the mayor and the City Council do a much better job of handling their budget responsibility than the state Legislature, which has far more power. They finished their \$112.4 billion budget yesterday. One quibble we have is the annual drama on library funding. The mayor always proposes a cut, which the Council always restores. It is a real waste of time and effort.

Take the train to the plane

Starting today, with summer travel season underway, the price of the train to the plane is changing. The Port Authority's AirTrain JFK is cutting its fare in half, from \$8.50 to \$4.25, until Labor Day to encourage passengers to avoid the airport's roadways which are seeing lots of construction. Thank you, Gov. Hochul, on behalf of New Yorkers and visitors using the rail link.

The PA's AirTrain Newark is keeping its \$8.50 fare, but NJTransit fares climb 15% today. We support the fare hike, and the new dedicated revenue from a corporate transit fee for NJT. Poor service due to Amtrak's failure to maintain the infrastructure (which we will have much to say shortly) is no reason to withhold money from NJT. So thank you to Gov. Phil Murphy for both the fare increase and the new funding source.

But there remains one more thing to fix.

Since the Newark monorail opened on Oct. 21, 2001, NJT has imposed only on passengers to and from Manhattan's Penn Station an additional fee beyond the published carriage rates. It began at \$2, then rose to \$4. We started complaining in 2008 and in 2010 it was reduced to 25 cents, but wrongly remains. And today, instead of eliminating the surcharge, it grows to 30 cents.

The AirTrain Newark fares equals the normal fare to the nearest station, North Elizabeth, plus the AirTrain's \$8.50. The Manhattan/North Elizabeth fare is now \$8.30, adding \$8.50 equals \$16.80, but NJT charges \$17.10 for the airport. Hochul and Murphy should end this unfair fare hitting people traveling to New York.

His fingers crooked, knotted, twisted. Probably painful. His body bent from decades of travels as a vaudevillian. As the bookings faded, he began teaching.

For a kid, I was pretty efficient when it came to sleight-of-hand. What was this tired old magician going to show me? Sensing my skepticism, Jack picked up a prop ball which vanished then reappeared then changed color ... suddenly there were two, was it three, in this hand ... except .. no, in the other hand.

His fingers had untangled. His profile straightened. He relaxed in a way that relieved me from thinking about age, mine or his. Always confident, Jack had spent a lifetime perfecting his moves and his patter. Even during his last few years, he didn't worry audiences, make them wonder if he was going to slip up, embarrass himself. Didn't make people nervous.

Now, I'm the old guy. Little bit disheveled, but with an act that still kills. My forte is private parties, kid shows, club meetings, assembly programs. My phone keeps ringing. Sixty-five plus years of appearances. One day that is going to end.

Sometimes when I arrive at a gig, the folks who have hired me sight unseen based on my reputation, realize they've booked a relic. I do what Jack did back when. I pick up a ball or a coin and impress, put them at ease. It's going to be OK. My

career, and about President Biden's career, though it's pretty nifty linking the two. All the funny stuff I used to do standing up, I now do sitting down. I've accommodated. I've modified, but realize I can only make so many adjustments before twisting myself into a pretzel.

The phone rings and a lady wants a performance on the same day as another booking. Small private party. Not much of a drive if I add her show to my day. When I was younger, I'd sometimes appear at two or three kid's parties on a busy Saturday or Sunday. But now, I am hesitating. Should I take the second show? Will I have enough energy? Is my voice going to hold up, my mind remain sharp enough to play off the crowd?

Each gig has become a test. A "can I still do it?" event. One day, I'm going to forget my lines. Find that my fingers cannot quite manage the necessary maneuvering. Make the audience nervous.

The time is going to come when my act will be a little less. Less mysterious. Less funny. Less interesting. I monitor myself. I love what I do and consider bringing laughter to a damaged world a kind of service I get to provide. I'm proud of my career. But, the way I see it, I'm a fading enigma, and the prospect of giving up the spotlight is a painful inevitability.

Obviously, presidents aren't magicians, unless you are thinking of Donald Trump with his sleight-of-facts routine. Houdini was only 52 when he died. A stubborn man refusing to face reality, he'd tried to ignore the effects of a ruptured appendix. Joe Biden doesn't seem to be suffering from an acute ailment, but rather from the cumulative wear and tear brought on by devoting his life to public service. Both gentlemen were/are in need of intervention.



When an insurrectionist was on the high court


Pasadena, Calif.: Samuel Alito is not the first sitting Supreme Court justice to support an insurrection. Justice John A. Campbell (photo), who was appointed by President Franklin Pierce in 1853, actively worked with the secessionist states until 1861, when he resigned from the court and joined the Confederacy as assistant secretary of war.

Campbell, who was from Alabama, was selected by Pierce in an effort to appease the Southern states, who were afraid that the court would lean toward abolition of slavery. Their effort apparently succeeded, since Campbell joined in the majority decision in the 1857 Dred Scott case, which ruled that Blacks were not citizens and that the federal government could not regulate slavery in the new territories.

Campbell also served as an intermediary between representatives of the secessionist states at the beginning of the war, attempting to secure an audience with Abraham Lincoln for them and providing intelligence to the Confederates, including Jefferson Davis himself, about Lincoln's decisions regarding the secession.

At the end of the war, Campbell was arrested on suspicion of being part of the plot to assassinate Lincoln. He was held in federal detention for five months, but was never formally charged and was released after two of his former Supreme Court colleagues intervened on his behalf.

Campbell finally returned to his law practice but continued to lobby on behalf of the Southern resistance, including an effort to halt President Ulysses S. Grant's efforts to suppress the Ku Klux Klan and other insurrectionist groups in Louisiana. *Hoyt Hilsman*

Hurricane Beryl strengthens into earliest Category 4 storm on record in the Atlantic

Hurricane Beryl became the earliest Category 4 storm ever recorded in the Atlantic Ocean as it steamed toward several Caribbean islands on Sunday.

Beryl was expected to strike Barbados, Grenada, St. Lucia and St. Vincent and the Grenadines beginning Monday morning, according to the National Hurricane Center. All four nations were under hurricane warnings, along with the island of Tobago.

"This is a very dangerous situation," the NHC said Sunday. "Potentially catastrophic hurricane-force winds, a life-threatening storm surge and damaging waves are expected when Beryl passes over portions of the Windward Islands."

Prior to Sunday, the earliest recorded

Category 4 hurricane in the Atlantic Ocean was Hurricane Dennis on July 8, 2005.

Beryl is also expected to be the first major hurricane to strike the Windward Islands since Hurricane Ivan in 2004, which reached the chain as a Category 3 storm and caused devastation across Grenada. Beryl's sustained winds reached 130 mph when it was upgraded to Category 4 status on Sunday morning.

"Beryl is an extremely dangerous and rare hurricane for this time of year in this area," hurricane expert Michael Lowry told The Associated Press.

After striking the islands, Beryl is expected to gradually weaken and move toward Jamaica through the week, though the storm is predicted to maintain hurricane strength when it eventually reaches Mexico.

Fear Kan. ma, 2 kids forced to go to Mexico

A missing Kansas mother and her two young daughters may have been "coerced" into a trip to Mexico, authorities said.

Martha Unger, 23, was last seen Friday leaving her home in rural Haskell County with her two girls — Madilynn Grace Unger, 2, and Haylie Faith Unger, 1, police said.

The mom may have been "coerced to travel to Mexico to a religious rehabilitation facility," the Kansas Bureau of Investigation (KBI)

wrote late Friday in a Facebook post.

The family of three may be traveling with Corney and Elizabeth Klaasen, police said. The Klaasens, both in their 50s, "may be driving a white-and-black Chevy Blazer bearing a Mexico tag," according to the KBI.

However, Unger was last seen driving her own vehicle, a 2015 white Ford Explorer with Kansas license plate 301RJY, cops said.

Canadian airline strike kayos 800 flights

More than 800 flights on WestJet, Canada's second-largest airline, were canceled over the weekend as nearly 700 mechanics went on strike.

The strike began Friday, shocking the company and would-be passengers who planned travel during a three-day weekend that includes Canada Day on Monday. Tens of thousands of people were stranded.

The airline also preemptively canceled 66 flights scheduled for Monday.

The Aircraft Mechanics Fraternal Association had announced plans for the strike ahead of time, after 97% of its members rejected a proposed deal in May.

"We regret the disruption this will cause but WestJet is unwilling to negotiate an agreement that would have avoided this unfortunate situation," the union said in a statement.

WestJet attempted to stop the strike by reaching out to the Canadian labor minister, who issued an order for binding arbitration.

However, the order did not prevent aircraft engineers and technicians at WestJet from going on strike, which they did Friday night.

WestJet slammed the striking workers, calling the move unprecedented and blaming "a rogue U.S. union that's trying to make inroads into Canada and taking some practices in here that are very, very unusual," the CBC reported. The Aircraft Mechanics Fraternal Association is based in Aurora, Colo.

According to the union, on Sunday the sides remained "separated by a first-year economic difference of approximately 7%, less than \$8 million."

WestJet led all airlines worldwide with 77% of its flights canceled Sunday and 54% canceled Saturday, according to flight tracking website FlightAware.

right side of his face, cops said. He also cut his right arm. EMS rushed the victim to Bellevue Hospital, where he was treated.

The slasher, who was wearing an orange jacket, jumped on a Brooklyn-bound A train and disappeared, cops said.

No arrests have been made. It was not immediately clear if the two knew each other or what they were arguing about.



With all starters back, Liberty powers past struggling Atlanta

The Astros moved over .500 for the first time this season, beating the Mets, 10-5, on Sunday for their ninth win in 10 games as Jake Meyers hit a tiebreaking single in a five-run 11th inning.

"I never lost faith in this group," Astros manager Joe Espada said. "I know that we were down, but we were not out, and I'm not surprised that we are where we are at."

Jose Altuve was ejected in the seventh after he threw his bat and helmet when umpires called him out on what appeared to be a foul ball.

"I understand the guy behind the plate didn't see it because the catcher's there," Altuve said. "But you have another three guys – first, second and third. I felt like it was kind of obvious. That's why I was so mad."

Brandon Nimmo hit his 100th career homer for the Mets, a tying two-run drive in the seventh off Bryan Abreu.

With just a few thousand fans left at Citi Field after a 2-hour, 47-minute rain delay in the middle of the ninth, Chas McCormick put the Astros ahead, 5-4, with an RBI single in the 10th off Adam Ottavino.

Nimmo responded with a tying double starting the bottom half against Tayler Scott (4-2), who stranded the potential winning run at third when Mark Vientos grounded out.

Matt Festa (0-1), a Staten Island native from St. Joseph by the Sea High School, made his Mets debut and first big-league appearance this season and gave up all five runs in the bottom half. Meyers hit a run-scoring single, Joey Loperfido followed with a two-run single and Trey Cabbage added a two-run double.

Houston (42-41) opened the season 7-19 and was 12-24 before play on May 9. The Astros took two of three from the Mets and finished 17-8 in June.

"It was a goal to get to .500 before the All-Star break," Meyers said.

The Mets reached the halfway point at 40-41, rebounding after dropping to 24-35 in early June. The

Mets have been outscored 29-9 in extra innings this season, going 3-8 in those games.

Nimmo cited the turning point as a team meeting on May 29 after the Dodgers completed a three-game sweep that left the Mets at 22-33.

"It's been a tale of two seasons, even in this first half," he said. "You've seen a team that has played really, really good baseball since that team meeting and I think given us a real good argument for going for it and trying to make the playoffs."

Mets starter Luis Severino allowed four runs and eight hits in seven innings. Houston's Shawn Dubin, starting a bullpen game, pitched 3 1/3 hitless innings with three walks.

Jon Singleton put Houston ahead in the second with his sixth home run of the season and first since May 21. Yainer Diaz hit an RBI single in a two-run fifth that included Meyers' run-scoring groundout, and Altuve blooped an RBI single in the sixth for a 4-0 lead.

Held hitless for five innings, the Mets cut the gap in the sixth against Seth Martinez on Vientos' two-out, two-run double over leaping third baseman Alex Bregman.

Nimmo tied the score in the seventh with his 13th homer this season, a two-run drive off Bryan Abreu.

The Mets optioned right-hander Tylor Megill and left-hander Danny Young to Triple-A Syracuse, and selected the contracts of lefty Tyler Jay and Festa from their top farm team. Outfielder Duke Ellis was designated for assignment and lefty Brooks Raley (elbow inflammation) was transferred to the 60-day IL.

Closer Edwin Diaz served the fifth game of a 10-game suspension for using prohibited grip substances. The Met bullpen was thin a day after wasting a 6-1 lead in a 9-6 loss.

"We saw it yesterday. We saw it today," manager Carlos Mendoza said. "We knew at some point we were going to be facing some type of adversity here."

Diaz pitched batting practice against players from the Class A Brooklyn Cyclones. Barring rain-outs, he can return July 6.

Soto jumps back into Yank lineup

After some delay and a change of mind, Juan Soto returned to the Yankees' lineup for Sunday's series finale against the Blue Jays.

Aaron Boone initially held the slugger out after waiting to release his batting order, as Soto is dealing with a bruised right hand. He was scratched from Saturday's game after suffering the injury in Friday's game. However, the Yankees included Soto in a revised, last-minute Sunday lineup after he went through his pregame routine.

X-rays on Soto's hand came back clean on Saturday, but the right fielder had some swelling. On Sunday, Soto said he felt better. However, he added that he may get an MRI or a CT scan during the Yankees' off day today, according to MLB.com's Bryan Hoch. That was before his addition to the lineup. He went 1-3 with two walks, an RBI and a run scored Sunday



"The one thing I don't want him doing is compromising his swing," Boone said, per Hoch. "If it's something where he's just feeling some soreness, we'll certainly wait on that. We know how important he is to our lineup."

Soto hurt his hand on Friday when J.D. Davis hit into what looked to be an inning-ending double play in the fourth. Aaron Judge, coming from first, got into a rundown on the play. That allowed Soto to score from third, but he forcefully slammed his right, unpadded hand into the ground as he pulled off an evasive slide at the plate.

Soto did not exit that game, but he did not feel comfortable swinging a bat before Saturday's contest.

Soto has been enjoying his first season with the Yankees, hitting .302/.434/.570 with 20 home runs and 60 RBI prior to Sunday's game.

ANOTHER BULLPEN MOVE

The Yankees kept reshuffling their bullpen Sunday morning, designating Phil Bickford for assignment. The righty had pitched poorly over five major-league games, recording a 14.40 ERA following a strong stretch at Triple-A.

Josh Maciejewski replaced Bickford on the roster. The lefty has a 5.35 ERA over 16 games between Double-A and Triple-A this season. Maciejewski also threw a scoreless inning for the Yankees earlier in the year.

In addition, the Bombers transferred JT Brubaker's rehab assignment (Tommy John surgery) from the Florida Complex League to Double-A Somerset.

Cole looks strong again as Judge continues to blast away in rout of Blue Jays

After lacking velocity and struggling with walks and the long ball his last time out, Gerrit Cole looked like himself against the Blue Jays on Sunday.

The reigning Cy Young winner, making his third start

of the season, completed five innings for the first time in the Yankees' 8-1, series-splitting

win over Toronto. Cole, still building up after being sidelined by elbow inflammation, also threw a season-high 90

pitches while limiting the Jays

to three hits, one earned run, one walk and six strikeouts.

Toronto's lone run off Cole came on a Justin Turner RBI single in the third inning.

Cole's fastball lacked life after the first inning of his second outing, which came against the Mets.

Afterward, he and Aaron Boone said the pitcher made an intentional choice to dial things back after hitting 97 and 98 mph in the first inning.

On Sunday, Cole's heater maxed out at 97.6 mph and averaged 95.8.

He averaged 95.4 mph against the Mets, but Sunday's performance did not feature a

precipitous drop-off after the first inning.

Cole's final pitch clocked in at 96.5 mph, resulting in a looking strikeout for Spencer Horwitz.

While Cole delivered the best start of his young season, Aaron Judge got the Yankees on the board with a homer in the first inning.

The two-run shot gave the All-Star 31 homers for the season, putting him halfway toward his American League record before July began.

When Judge totaled 62 home runs in 2022, he had 31 after 86 games. Sunday marked Judge's 83rd game of the 2024 campaign.

While Judge, who now has 82

RBI, continued his dominance at the plate, DJ LeMahieu and Gleyber Torres kept showing encouraging signs.

LeMahieu knocked an RBI single in the second and an RBI double in the fifth. Torres, meanwhile, picked up his third straight multi-hit game since a two-game benching.

Juan Soto, a late addition to

the lineup after the Yankees deliberated how to handle his bruised right hand, forced a run in with a walk in the second.


Trent Grisham ripped a two-run double in the fifth, while Ben Rice added an RBI double in the sixth.

While the Yankees notched a four-game split in Toronto, they will return to the Bronx

without a series win in their last five tries.

They will look to end that drought against fourth-place Cincinnati, which will visit the Stadium following today's off day.

Luis Gil is scheduled to start the series-opener on Tuesday. Graham Ashcraft will start for Cincinnati.

Stewart fastest to 5K in history

Liberty coach Sandy Brondello waited eight minutes for Breanna Stewart's remarkable feat to be mentioned during Sunday's postgame media availability.

And that was just too long.

On Sunday, Stewart reached 5,000 points faster than any player in WNBA history. The reigning MVP did it in just 242 games, notching the mark in a win over the Atlanta Dream at Barclays Center. And her coach made sure to let everyone know about the accomplishment after fielding question that didn't pertain to the scoring record.

"I just want to make sure you guys all knew that in case you didn't," Brondello said.

Stewart was asked about it before heading out of Barclays Center.

"I think it's a cool honor for sure," Stewart said about surpassing Mercury star Diana Taurasi, who scored 5,000 points in 243 games. "When you're able to pass someone like (Taurasi) who's really paving the way with scoring and all of that, it's an incredible honor and something I'll definitely text her about."

Taurasi reached the 5,000 point-mark in her 2013 WNBA season with the Mercury, just one year before Brondello landed in Phoenix as coach and eventually won the title.

Stewart bested the future Hall-of-Famer's mark with a fadeaway jumper at the 8:10 mark of the second quarter. That bucket contributed to her team-high 22 points en route to the Liberty's 16th win of the season.

"But all in all, I wouldn't be able to be here and do all the things without my teammates and (I'm) really appreciating them for continually setting me up to get to this point," said Stewart, who spent seven years with the Seattle Storm before joining the Liberty in 2023.

"But we're trying to do more than just get accolades."

LIBERTY SHAKES OFF DREAM JUST IN TIME

It's been almost a month since Liberty coach Sandy Brondello got to deploy her regular starters for a game. With Courtney Vandersloot returning to the starting unit for the first time since June 4, the Libs should've been on track to pummel a struggling Atlanta Dream.

It took nearly two quarters, however, for the players to look like the unit that propelled the Liberty to the top of the Eastern Conference standings. But they eventually pulled out an 81-75 victory over the Dream Sunday at Barclays Center.

"It was good to have the whole team back," Brondello said. Her team was still without reserve big Nyara Sabally due to a back injury.

"We got a little bit more depth back on the bench now."

The home team overcame a slow start and went on a 25-4 run between the end of the second quarter into the third en route to its 16th win of the season.

"I think we were more disruptive defensively," said Breanna Stewart who scored a team-high 22 points while logging two steals and a block. She credited Vandersloot's defense on bigger opponent's like Tina Charles and Cheyenne Parker-Tyus throughout the stretch. At times, the Liberty switched to a zone defense, which led to Vandersloot

dealing with bigger opponents down low.

"And that led to us getting out in transition offensively," Stewart added. "Just kind of getting downhill and whether it was drive and kick or finish, I think that was big for us."

For the first minutes of the game, the Liberty looked like a team that was just assembled pregame. There were missed defensive assignments and the high-powered offense looked lackluster. The Liberty scored just 13 points in the first quarter.

To make matters worse, Stewart started the game 1-for-8 and Sabrina Ionescu, who had been on a recent hot streak, mustered just three shots going into half-time as she slid back to the shooting guard position in Vandersloot's return.

Dream reserve guard Maya Caldwell, who entered Sunday averaging seven points per game, poured in eight points in the first quarter. The Dream entered halftime up 11, but quickly found itself trailing following the Liberty's run. Stewart's pullup trey with 3:52 remaining in the third capped the monster run and extended the lead to seven.

Stewart continued to stuff the stat sheet with 12 rebounds. Betnijah Laney-Hamilton helped spark the run and finished with 18 points, six assists and five boards.

Ionescu, however, saw her torrid streak end as she slid back into the two-guard role. The star guard had recorded four straight games (including Tuesday's Commissioner's Cup Game loss) with at least 23 points

before Sunday's contest. That ended, with her finishing with 10 points and four assists on 3-of-17 shooting. She later revealed — equipped with tea in her hand — that she played under the weather.

And in her return to the starting lineup, Vandersloot continued her playmaking, dishing seven assists while scoring seven points.

The Liberty offense reached its peak this season with Ionescu starting as the lead ball-handler, but Brondello went back with Vandersloot Sunday.

A trend that could continue, though, is Ionescu finishing games as the lead guard with Vandersloot on the bench, which happened in Sunday's win.

After Vandersloot spent time away from the team due to personal reasons following the June 4 win against the Chicago Sky, Ionescu as the main ball-handler logged five games with at least 20 points in nine total matchups. She also recorded at least 15 points and five assists in seven games during that stretch, including her 31-point, nine-assist performance against the Los Angeles Sparks on June 20.

"It definitely changes. But I think it changes for the better in terms of giving me the opportunity to play off ball a little bit more," Ionescu said about the change in guard roles. The Oregon product said her playing off ball allows the team to have more spacing on offense due to her deep sharpshooting.

"So for me, it changes a little bit, but I don't think it changes what I'm able to do and what I'm able to do for this team."

Old guard, new guard

Clark's Fever gets best of Taurasi's Mercury

PHOENIX — Caitlin Clark scored 15 points, with 12 assists and nine rebounds and the Indiana Fever rallied for an 88-82 victory over the Phoenix Mercury on Sunday.

Clark was just 4 of 14 from the field, and 2 of 10 from 3-point range. But she made a pair of free throws with 19.9 seconds to play to put the Fever up three. Indiana had trailed by as many as 15 in the first half.

Kelsey Mitchell's basket with 35 seconds to play gave Indiana the lead for good. She made two free throws with 12.9 seconds to go to seal it.

Aliyah Boston notched 17 points and eight rebounds and NaLyssa Smith 12 points and 15 rebounds for the Fever, which closed out June 7-4 after going 1-8 in May. Temi Fagbenle scored 10 points for Indiana.

Brittney Griner scored 24 points, Diana Taurasi 19 and

Natasha Cloud 15 for Phoenix.

Kahleah Copper, who entered Sunday third in the WNBA at 22.7 points per game, scored just seven points on 3-of-15 shooting before fouling out in the final seconds, but had most of the responsibility of guarding Clark.

It was the first on-court meeting between Taurasi and Clark. Taurasi, 42, is the WNBA's all-time leading scorer and is in her 20th WNBA

season. She was a student at Connecticut when Clark was born. The Fever rookie said before the game Taurasi was one of her idols going back to when she first learned about the WNBA.

When Clark was drafted No. 1 overall after a career at Iowa that saw her lead the Hawkeyes to back-to-back NCAA Championship games, Taurasi said, "Reality is coming," when asked about Clark entering the league. Later Taurasi said that she meant that it would be a difficult transition to pro basketball.

The Mercury jumped to an 8-0 lead and led 49-38 at halftime, with Griner and Taurasi each scoring 13 points. The Fever went on a 17-0 run to lead by as many as 10 points in the third quarter, but Phoenix closed with 67-64 at the end of the period.

There were two skirmishes during the first half, both during dead-ball situations. Griner was assessed a technical foul while the teams were lining up for a free throw in the first quarter, and the second one occurred after a foul had been called and the teams got into it while huddling near each other under the Indiana basket.

Two players from each team were given technicals — Fagbenle and Erica Wheeler for the Fever, and Copper and Cloud for the Mercury.

In the final minute of the half, Smith was charged with a flagrant-1 foul against Taurasi. Cloud later received a flagrant-1 for a foul against Katie Lou Samuelson, who made both free throws to cut the deficit to 78-77 with 2:17 remaining.

LET THE REIGN BEGIN

Panthers fans won't allow massive storm to stop their Cup parade

FORT LAUDERDALE — They waited 30 years. It was going to take more than a massive thunderstorm to deter the Florida Panthers from this party.

Not even a torrential downpour — so bad that flood warnings were issued in the area — accompanied by a huge lightning storm could stop the Panthers' Stanley Cup celebration on Sunday, one that the franchise had waited forever to have. With tens of thousands of fans estimated in attendance, the team arrived on double-decker buses that took a beachfront route before stopping

on the sand for a rally where the trophy was hoisted yet again.

Carter Verhaeghe was the player who got to bring the Cup onto the stage, Queen's "We Are The Champions" blared and nobody minded how soaked they were, nobody minded that it was still raining. The Panthers were champs, after three decades of waiting. The title was won last Monday night, Florida beating Edmonton, 2-1 in Game 7 of the Stanley Cup finals.

"It's incredible," said goaltender Sergei Bobrovsky, who hopped off the bus with the Cup at one point and decided to walk it down the road for a

bit as fans who lined the parade route — some since Saturday night — roared. "I never thought this many people would come out to support us. For us to share this moment with the fans, it's unbelievable."

The parade and the rally capped a first few days of celebration that included the following items, among others, going into the Stanley Cup at various times: beer, champagne, apple juice, no fewer than three human beings — all children of players — and a steaming dish of pasta topped with freshly grated cheese, a dinner that Panthers legend Roberto Luongo proudly enjoyed.

"I can't put this into words," Panthers captain Aleksander Barkov said as he surveyed the parade scene.

Panthers owner Vincent Viola danced on the stage as his wife, Theresa, captured the scenes on her phone. Matthew Tkachuk hopped off the route at one point to visit his favorite bar, Elbo Room, which just happened to be adjacent to the buses' path. Players, one by one, all got their moment to hoist the Cup on stage. There was a campaign T-shirt some players wore — Maurice Zito 2024, a nod to coach Paul Maurice and president of hockey operations

Bill Zito, who masterminded the Cup run. Other fans had a similar shirt — Barkov Tkachuk 2024, a nod to Florida's stars.

And as if the crowd needed more encouragement, a shirtless Panthers forward Nick Cousins ran over to the fans at one point, chugged a beer in celebration and punched the air.

"It feels like a culmination of your life's effort, everything you've ever worked for," defenseman Aaron Ekblad said. "When you get that trophy over your head, it's a beautiful feeling. And it's the pinnacle of hockey. It's everything you could possibly imagine."

Lightning strikes 1st with Guentzel

The Lightning got a head start on free agency by acquiring the rights to high-scoring winger Jake Guentzel on Sunday.

The Lightning sent a 2025 third-round draft pick to the Hurricanes. The move allows the Lightning to sign Guentzel before he hits the open market today.

He is coming off scoring 30 goals this past season for the Hurricanes and Penguins, his fourth time reaching that mark in an eight-year career that has included him getting to 40 twice. Guentzel, who turns 30 in October, won the Stanley Cup with Pittsburgh in 2017 and is nearly a point-a-game playoff performer in the NHL.

That means everything to the Lightning, who won it all back to back in 2020 and '21, reached the finals in '22 and want to keep their contending window open as long as possible. To do so, general manager Julien BriseBois and his staff plotted to shift resources from a strong left side on defense to the forward group.

This is all part of that process. Trading defenseman Mikhail Sergachev to Utah and depth forward Tanner Jeannot to Los Angeles on

Saturday cleared more than \$11 million in salary-cap space over the next two seasons.

"We have this cap space (and) we can allocate it in different ways by either getting volume or quality," BriseBois said Saturday. "Now is that one player getting most of that cap space? Is it two players splitting it up? Three players splitting it up? It's too early to tell at this point."

Guentzel should take up a nice chunk of it, with some left over for the Lightning to sign another free agent, while also signing cornerstone defenseman Victor Hedman to a long-term contract extension.

Where that money will not be going, at least not right away, is toward re-signing Steven Stamkos, the longtime captain and face of the franchise who is expected to test free agency. BriseBois and Stamkos' agent, Don Meehan, confirmed Saturday their stances on reaching an agreement on a new contract had not changed.

"Steven's earned the right to test free agency," BriseBois said. "I didn't go to him last season to get a deal done. I did go to him quickly after this season, and I was taking a risk by doing that that we may end up here, and now here we are."

Harden re-signs for reported two years, \$70M

Paul George is leaving the Clippers, his now-former team announced Sunday night, with all signs pointing to the nine-time All-Star perhaps returning to the Eastern Conference and joining the 76ers.

George could command more than \$200 million over four years if his next contract is for max value.

“Paul has informed us that he is signing his next contract with another team,” the Clippers said in a release Sunday night.

The team added, “We negotiated for months with Paul and his representative on a contract that would make sense for both sides, and we were left far apart. The gap was significant. We understand and respect Paul’s decision to look elsewhere for his next contract.”

George had a \$48.8 million option for this coming season but did not exercise it, entering free agency – which opened Sunday night – instead. It was believed there was a chance that George and the

Clippers could have still gotten something done, but the team made clear that those hopes are gone.

“We will miss Paul,” the Clippers said.

At 34, George is still elite – averaging 22.6 points this past season, the ninth consecutive season in which he has averaged at least 20 points per game.

Meanwhile, James Harden is staying with the Clippers on a two-year contract that includes a player option, a person with knowledge of that decision told The Associated Press earlier Sunday.

Harden’s deal – which could be worth up to \$70 million if he opts into 2025-26 – was agreed upon in principle before free agency technically started, said the person who spoke to AP on condition of anonymity because neither Harden nor the Clippers had announced the agreement.

Harden, a 10-time NBA All-Star, averaged 16.6 points and 8.5 assists last season for the Clippers, who will move into their new Intuit Dome home when this coming season starts.

Elsewhere, veteran guard Chris Paul is going to team up with rookie of the year Victor Wembanyama in San Antonio on a one-year deal, a person with knowledge of that agreement said.

Paul was waived earlier Sunday by the Warriors, who would have had to pay him \$30 million for the coming season otherwise. ESPN reported the Spurs will pay Paul around \$11 million. The 39-year-old Paul averaged 9.2 points and 6.8 assists in 58 games with the Warriors last season.

And Kentavious Caldwell-Pope is going to bring his championship experience to the Magic, a team that made a big jump this past season and now is trying to become an even stronger contender in the East.

Caldwell-Pope – a two-time champion guard – was finalizing a three-year, \$66 million deal with the Magic, a person with knowledge of the decision said. The person spoke on condition of anonymity to AP because the deal cannot be finalized until the league’s offseason moratorium is lifted

on July 6.

It’s a big get for the rising Magic, who won 47 games – their most in 13 years – and got back to the playoffs this past season. Caldwell-Pope was part of title-winning teams with the Lakers in 2020 and the Nuggets in 2023. He averaged 10.1 points for the Nuggets this past season while shooting nearly 41% from 3-point range.

In other moves Sunday:

- Kevin Love was completing a new two-year contract with the Heat worth about \$8 million, a person with knowledge of that deal told AP, the move coming one day after he did not opt into what would have been a \$4 million contract for this coming season with the club. Love had said repeatedly last season that he has no intentions of leaving Miami.

- Andre Drummond agreed to a two-year contract worth about \$10 million (the second year as an option) to join the 76ers, a team that he appeared in 49 games for during the 2021-22 season. Drummond spent the last two seasons in Chicago – he averaged 8.4 points and 9.0 rebounds this past season in only 17 minutes per game – and would be valuable insurance alongside Joel Embiid in the 76ers’ big-man rotation. “I’m in the mood for a Philly cheesesteak,” Drummond posted on social media.

- Obi Toppin is being rewarded nicely for his strong first season with Indiana. A person with knowledge of the agreement said he and the Pacers were finalizing a four-year deal worth nearly \$60 million. Toppin averaged a career-best 10.3 points last season, his first with Indiana after three years with the Knicks.

- Promising wing Max Christie is returning to the Lakers with a four-year, \$32 million contract, a person with knowledge of the deal told AP. The 21-year-old Christie averaged 3.8 points, 2.0 rebounds and 0.8 assists during his first two NBA seasons.

The Pistons have agreed to a four-year contract with coach J.B. Bickerstaff with a team option for a fifth season, a person familiar with the situation told The Associated Press on Sunday.

The Cavaliers fired Bickerstaff in May after they lost to Boston in the Eastern Conference semifinals despite winning 99 games over two years.

The Pistons fired coach Monty Williams one season into a six-year, \$78.5 million contract after they recorded the NBA's worst record for a second straight year. They also fired general manager Troy Weaver after they won 23% of their games in his four seasons.

Pistons president of basketball operations Trajan Langdon has been busy trying to turn around a three-time NBA-championship winning franchise that has fallen on hard times.

The 45-year-old Bickerstaff, who twice finished among the top five in NBA Coach of the Year voting, was 170-159 in four-plus seasons in Cleveland. He notched six victories in the playoffs. He took over when John Beilein, a former Michigan coach, walked away from the Cavs during the 2019-20 season.

Bickerstaff also was promoted to replace fired coaches in Houston and Memphis, going 37-34 with the Rockets in the 2015-16 season and winning 48 games with the Grizzlies during most of the 2017-18 and all of the following season.

VINGEGAARD, POGACAR PULL AHEAD

Them two again. It took only two days into the Tour de France to show that Tadej Pogacar and Jonas Vingegaard are in a class of their own.

Pogacar attacked from the chasing peloton up the second ascent of the short but brutally steep San Luca climb in the second stage of the Tour on Sunday and only Vingegaard was able to follow him.

By the top of the climb, Pogacar and Vingegaard had opened up a 40-second gap ahead of the other contenders.

The move meant that Pogacar took the leader's yellow jersey from Stage 1 winner Romain Bardet. Primož Roglic, another expected overall contender, dropped 21 seconds behind.

Breakaway rider Kevin Vauquelin made it two French wins

in two days by winning the hilly stage with an attack of his own up San Luca to follow up countryman



Bardet's success.

Pogacar won the Tour in 2020 and 2021 then finished second behind Vingegaard the last two years.

Pogacar is aiming for the rare Giro d'Italia-Tour double after dominating the Italian Grand Tour last month. Vingegaard hadn't raced since a big crash in April left him with a broken collarbone and ribs, plus a collapsed lung.

"I can be very happy," Vingegaard said, "that I was able to follow Tadej on the second time of San Luca, because this is probably one of the stages we feared the most. We actually expected

me to lose time – because of the preparation.

WEAH BAN EXTENDED

The suspension of American winger Tim Weah was extended to two games by South American soccer's governing body for punching Panama's Roderick Miller during their Copa American group stage match Thursday.

Weah received a red card in the 18th minute of the United States' 2-1 loss, resulting in an automatic one-game suspension. The Confederation of South American Football said Sunday that Weah been suspended for a second game and fined \$3,000 by a judge of its disciplinary commission. The money is to be deducted from the U.S. Soccer Federation's payment from CONMEBOL for television, participation and/or prize money.

CONMEBOL said the

discipline is not subject to appeal.

Weah will miss the United States' group stage finale tonight against Uruguay at Kansas City, and a Copa America quarterfinal should the Americans advance.

The 23-year-old is a son of 1995 FIFA Player of the Year George Weah, who in January finished a four-year term as Liberia's president.

BREWER EXCALATORS FIXED

The escalators at American Family Field were operating again on Sunday following an overnight inspection after a malfunction caused 11 people to be injured at the Brewers-Cubs game one day earlier.

"All of the escalators in the ballpark were thoroughly inspected overnight by our service provider and were declared safe for use today," Tyler Barnes, the senior vice president of communications and affiliate operations for the Brewers, said in a statement. "Escalators are inspected regularly as part of our service agreement and preventative maintenance is performed as scheduled."

Barnes also said the Brewers were reaching out to those injured "to check on their condition and express our best wishes for a complete and speedy recovery."

The Brewers announced Saturday that five people were treated at the stadium and six others went to area hospitals with non-life-threatening injuries.

Andy still on Wimbledon fence

Not sure about tourney status after surgery

WIMBLEDON — Two-time Wimbledon champion Andy Murray said Sunday “it’s impossible” to know yet whether he will be able to compete at the grass-court Grand Slam tournament, even if he is “feeling better every day” as he recovers from surgery to remove a cyst from his spine.

The 37-year-old Murray is scheduled to play in the first-round of singles at the All England Club on Tuesday.

He and his older brother, Jamie, were given a wild-card invitation for doubles, too, and that event starts later in the week.

The Scot underwent back surgery on June 22 after stopping during a match a few days earlier at Queen’s Club. He said the cyst was compressing a nerve and making his right leg numb and difficult to use, and he figured before the operation it was “highly likely” he would miss Wimbledon.

“It’s been a tough 10 days,” he said.

Murray played a practice set Sunday.

“It went pretty well, but I still don’t have 100% feeling and sensation in my leg,” he said.

Murray plans to undergo medical tests today — the first day of Wimbledon — and play another practice set, and then probably will make a decision in the evening.

Murray owns a total of three major championships: He won the U.S. Open in 2012, and Wimbledon in 2013 and 2016.

His 2013 title made him the first British man to win the singles trophy at the All England Club in 77 years.

He also is the only player with two consecutive tennis gold medals in singles at the Olympics.

He won at London in 2012 — when the sport’s Summer Games matches were held at the All England Club — and at Rio de Janeiro in 2016.

Murray underwent a pair of hip operations in 2018 and 2019.

While he thought he would need to retire after the second surgery, in which he received a metal hip implant, Murray eventually returned to action.

He has since been hampered by various health issues, including torn ligaments in his left ankle at the Miami Open in March.

Murray lost in the first round of the French Open in May.

He is not the only 37-year-old with multiple Wimbledon championships on his record who is dealing with recovery from recent surgery: Novak Djokovic, who won seven of his 24 Grand Slam titles at the All England Club, had a procedure to repair a torn meniscus in his right knee less than a month ago after getting hurt at the French Open.

Djokovic said Saturday he feels well enough to compete at Wimbledon — and perhaps even contend for another trophy.


