

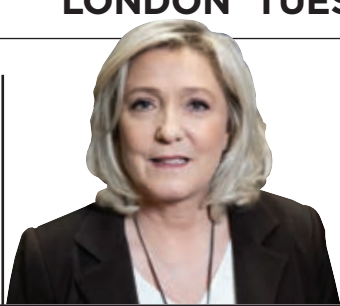

Neet-UG re-test result out, rank list of 1,563 candidates revised

New Delhi: The National Testing Agency (NTA) on Monday announced the results for the re-test of the medical entrance exam Neet-UG. The re-test was conducted for a total of 1,563 candidates who were earlier awarded grace marks to compensate for the loss of time as the exam on May 5 started late at six centres. Meanwhile, the students who have been staging a sit-in at the Jantar Mantar have called for a march towards the Parliament on Tuesday to press their demands. For the retest conducted at seven centres on June 23 following a Supreme Court order, 48 per cent of the 1,563 candidates did not appear. The NTA said that 813 of the 1,563 candidates appeared for the retest while the others opted for the marks without the grace marks.

The Lok Sabha on Monday witnessed a fiery face-off between the Opposition and the Treasury benches during Rahul Gandhi's hard-hitting maiden speech as the Leader of the Opposition. Speaking during the motion of thanks on the President's address, Mr Gandhi targeted the government, raising issues of the Agniveer recruitment scheme, inflation, the Neet paper leak, violence in Manipur and the farmers' grievances, forcing the Treasury benches to constantly clarify and counter. But an unrelenting Rahul Gandhi hammered issues one after the other in his speech of close to two hours that saw several interruptions from the Treasury benches and interjections by Union Cabinet ministers. Mr Gandhi accused the BJP of doing the "politics of hatred" in the name of Hindutva and displayed

Modi likely to address NDA MPs in Parl today

Prime Minister Narendra Modi is likely to address the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) parliamentary party meeting on Tuesday, in what will be his first speech to the

MPs of the ruling alliance during the first session of Parliament since he assumed office for a third term.

Though Mr Modi in the past has addressed the NDA MPs on a few occasions, especially when he was elected as their leader ahead of all his three terms, he generally speaks at the meetings of BJP MPs during the parliamentary sessions.

This development assumes significance as the BJP, for the first time since 2014, has lost a majority in the Lok Sabha in the recently-held polls and depends on its allies for the government's continuation.

5-month jail & fine for Patkar in defamation case by Saxena

A Delhi court on Monday sentenced activist Medha Patkar to five-month simple imprisonment in a 23-year-old case of defamation filed against her by Delhi lieutenant-governor V.K. Saxena when he headed an NGO in Gujarat.

Metropolitan magistrate Raghav Sharma also imposed a fine of ₹10 lakhs on Ms Patkar.

The court sentenced Ms Patkar after considering the evidence before it and the fact that the case went on for over two decades. However, the court suspended the sentence for one month to enable her to file an appeal against the order.

Rejecting her prayer to release her on probation, the judge said: "Considering the facts... (damages, age and ailment (of the accused), I am not inclined to give excessive punishment." The offence entailed a maximum punishment of simple imprisonment of up to two years or a fine or both.

4 of a family killed in accident in Gurgaon

Gurgaon: Four persons, including three women, of a family were killed on the spot while two others were seriously injured in a road accident on the KMP Expressway on Monday afternoon, said the police. Hailing from Sikar in Rajasthan, the family was returning from Garh Ganga after the last rites of a family member when their Ertiga car rammed into a canter, they added. According to the police, the incident took place near Farukhnagar exit toll on the KMP Expressway at around 2.00 pm on Monday, leaving the car badly damaged. The deceased were identified as Brijesh Kaushik (52), his wife Sunita (48), his mother Kamla Devi (74) and his brother's wife Kiran Kaushik (46), residents of Neemka Thana Hasampur in the Sikar district of Rajasthan. The injured were identified as Himanshu (24) and Aakanshu (20), sons of Rakesh Kaushik, deceased Brijesh Kaushik's brother, said police. — *PTI*

Cong: Govt's aid for rain victims too low

New Delhi: Delhi Congress chief Devender Yadav on Monday said that the city government should expedite payment of enhanced compensation of ₹1 crore to the families of 11 people, including children, who have died during the recent monsoon downpour. The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government on Sunday announced a compensation of ₹10 lakhs each for the families of those who were killed in incidents of drowning after record rains on Friday. The compensation amount announced by the Delhi government is too low, and the amount should be increased to at least Rs one crore per family, as had been done in the case of Covid-19 pandemic deaths while on duty, Yadav said in a statement. Delhi water minister Atishi, who sat on a meaningless dharna demanding more water when the whole of Delhi was thirsting for potable water, should take strong steps to prevent such deaths, Mr Yadav alleged.

Delhi couple feared drowned in Rishikesh

Dehradun: A couple from Delhi were feared to have drowned in Ganga at Muni Ki Reti near Rishikesh on Monday, police said. State Disaster Response Force divers have launched a search operation in the river but the couple has not been found yet, police said. According to police, the couple went to Neem Beach around 1 pm to bathe in the Ganga. They disappeared in the waves after going a considerable distance in the river, police said quoting eyewitnesses. The man has been identified as Lovepreet (26), a resident of Sudarshan Park in West Delhi, and the woman as Neha Thakur (22) from Karol Bagh. — *PTI*

IMD PLANS 3 MORE RADARS IN DELHI-NCR

Delhi-NCR will get three more Doppler radars in the next two to three years, along with a flood warning model, additional automatic weather stations and rain gauges to improve weather forecasts, IMD chief Mrutyunjay Mohapatra said on Monday. According to Mr Mohapatra, the rains that brought Delhi to its knees last week were not a result of a cloudburst but "it was close". "(Predicting) this kind of very confined activity, both in spatial and temporal terms, is a challenge not only in India but also throughout the world. Prediction becomes easier when you have a large-scale synoptic system," Mr Mohapatra said. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has undertaken a project to augment its observational and forecasting capability in Delhi-NCR, similar to what it did in Kolkata, Mumbai, and Chennai. It is also working on a flood warning system for the national capital, he said. He said, "Three radars of varying radius will be installed in the region in two to three years in addition to the three existing ones." The three functional radars are located at Palam, Ayanagar, and Mausam Bhavan.

The court sentenced Ms Patkar after considering the evidence before it and the fact that the case went on for over two decades. However, the court suspended the sentence for one month to enable Ms Patkar to file an appeal against the order.

Rejecting her prayer to release her on the condition of probation, the

Patkar's statements calling Mr Saxena a "coward" and alleging his involvement in hawala transactions were not only defamatory per se but also crafted to incite negative perceptions about him.

Also, the accusation that the complainant was "mortgaging" the people of Gujarat and their

resources to foreign interests was a direct attack on his integrity and public service, it had said.

The arguments on sentencing were completed on May 30, following which the judgment on the quantum of sentence was reserved on June 7.

Ms Patkar and Mr Saxena have been locked in a legal tussle since 2000 after she filed a suit against him for publishing advertisements against her and the Narmada Bachao Andolan (NBA).

Mr Saxena, who then headed an Ahmedabad-based NGO named "Council for Civil Liberties," had also filed two cases against Ms Patkar in 2001 for making derogatory remarks against him on a TV channel and issuing a defamatory press statement.

Students call for march towards Parl today to press for demands

SC to hear plea on OMR sheet manipulation after 2 weeks

New Delhi, July 1: The Supreme Court on Monday posted for hearing after two weeks a plea alleging OMR sheet manipulation in the controversy-ridden Neet-UG, 2024. The plea came up for hearing before a vacation bench of Justice C.T. Ravikumar and Justice Manoj Misra.

The counsel appearing for the petitioner, who had taken the medical entrance exam, alleged that his OMR sheet was swapped.

The bench told the counsel that the petitioner was seeking per-

mission to appear in the retest that was held on June 23.

"The exam (retest) is over on June 23," the bench said.

The petitioner's counsel said several other petitions alleging irregularities and also seeking cancellation of Neet-UG, 2024, were pending before the apex court.

The bench initially said it would list the plea for hearing next week.

"If you are fortunate, then you will have some order in the other matter," it said. — *PTI*

Jantar Mantar here against the irregularities in NTA-held examinations—Neet-UG, PG, and UGC NET—have called for a march towards the Parliament on Tuesday to press their demands. The indefinite sit-in strike of the protesting students entered the sixth day on Monday.

Scores of students under the banner "India against NTA" gathered at the protest site to continue their agitation against alleged rigging in the said

examinations, which started last week on Wednesday. The students called off their protest for the day after holding a demonstration and reiterated their demands, which included banning the NTA and Union education minister Dharmendra Pradhan's resignation. The students also demanded a re-examination of Neet-UG for all and the reinstating of the old university-specific entrance exam system.

justice would be delivered up to the level of the Supreme Court in all cases within three years of the registration of an FIR under the new criminal laws, he expressed hope of a reduction of crime in future as 90 per cent conviction was expected under the new laws. Rejecting the criticism that the three new criminal laws — Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) and the Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam (BSA) — were draconian and repressive, Mr Shah said the criticism was aimed at misleading people. "These laws were

passed after debates in both Houses and scrutinised by a parliamentary standing committee," he said, adding that most of the suggestions given by the Opposition members in the panel were accepted "except those with political colour".

"The new laws brought in a modern justice system, incorporating provisions such as Zero FIR, online registration of police complaints, summonses through electronic modes such as SMS and mandatory videography of crime scenes for all heinous crimes," he said.

Mr Shah said the first case under the new laws was about a motorcycle theft registered in Madhya

Pradesh's Gwalior at 10 minutes past midnight.

He also said the police dismissed the case filed against a street vendor for selling water and tobacco products from a cart that allegedly obstructed a public way in central Delhi's Kamala Market after an investigation. The new laws would give priority to providing justice, unlike the colonial-era laws that gave primacy to penal action, and made reporting of crimes even easier by recognising e-FIR, Zero FIR and electronic or digital evidence, Mr Shah noted.

According to the new laws, judgments in criminal cases had to come within 45 days of comple-

tion of the trial whereas the charges must be framed within 60 days of the first hearing, the home minister said. The new laws promote a justice-centric approach by providing community service for minor crimes, he added.

He said that provisions have been made for community service for minor crimes. He said a new chapter on crimes against women and children was added, buying and selling of any child made a heinous crime and a provision for death sentence or life imprisonment for gangrape of a minor included organised crime, acts of terrorism and mob lynching had been defined, sedition

was replaced with treason and video recording of all search and seizures made mandatory.

A new provision has been added in cases of having physical relations after giving false promise of marriage and statement of rape victims will be recorded by a woman police officer in presence of her guardian, he said.

Mr Shah also made it clear that the BNS, the provision of maximum 15-day police custody like the erstwhile IPC and dispelled confusion that the remand period has been extended. He also said that confusion was being created that the time period has been increased for police remand.

Cops book vendor under new laws; Shah says case dismissed

Soon after the three new criminal laws — Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS), and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam (BSA) — came into force on Monday, the Delhi police began registering FIRs under the newly implemented criminal laws.

The first FIR which caught the media's eyes was lodged in the Central Delhi district in the wee hours of Monday under Section 285 of the BNS against a street vendor for allegedly obstructing a public way in Central Delhi's Kamla Market area.

However, hours later, Union home minister Amit Shah clarified that the cops used the provision to review it and dismissed the case.

Mr Shah said Delhi's case was not the first FIR registered in the country. He said the first case under the new laws was about a motorcycle theft registered in Madhya Pradesh's Gwalior at 10 minutes past midnight.

He also said the Delhi police "dismissed" the case filed against the street vendor after an investigation.

"By using the provisions of review, the police has dismissed this case," he told the media. Meanwhile, Delhi police chief Sanjay Arora said the force has started regis-

tering FIRs under the three new laws. However, the National Hawker Federation slammed the first FIR and termed it "targeting the underprivileged" and a "misuse of power."

The Delhi police sources said that they will initiate the process of cancelling the FIR registered against the street vendor selling water and tobacco products from a cart that allegedly obstructed a public way.

The police will have to inform the court for formally cancelling the FIR, the sources said.

The FIR was registered under Section 285 of the BNS which states that "whoever, by doing any act, or by omitting to take order with any property in his possession or under his charge, causes danger, obstruction or injury to any person in any public way or public line of navi-

gation, shall be punished with fine which may extend to ₹5,000."

The police said 23-year-old Pankaj Kumar, a native of Patna, was found selling water, bidi, and cigarettes from a cart under a foot overbridge near the New Delhi railway station around 12.15 am.

The FIR, a copy of which is with this newspaper, stated that a patrol officer asked Mr Kumar to move his makeshift cart away from the path as it was hindering people's movement.

The officer also asked four-five passersby to become witnesses but they refused, the FIR stated.

After Mr Kumar ignored the officer's instructions, a case was registered at 1.30 am. He used the e-Pramaan app to record the seizures made, the FIR further stated.

Opp. creating constitutional crisis in Delhi, says Bansuri

Engineer Rashid gets NIA's nod to take oath as MP

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Monday gave its consent to jailed Kashmir leader Sheikh Abdul Rashid, also known as Engineer Rashid, for him to take oath as an MP on July 5. Additional Sessions Judge Chanderjit Singh will on Tuesday pass an order on the interim bail plea of Mr Rashid, who is lodged in Tihar Jail in a 2017 terror funding case.

Mr Rashid won the Lok Sabha polls as an Independent candidate from the Baramulla constituency in Jammu and Kashmir by a margin of over 2 lakh votes against his nearest rival, National Conference leader Omar Abdullah.

32-year-old man stabbed to death in Delhi's Shahdara

A 32-year-old man was allegedly stabbed to death near the railway tracks in the Nathu Colony area of Delhi's Shahdara, the police said on Monday.

The victim is yet to be identified, they said. A senior officer said the police

received a call around 8.15 pm about the stabbing incident close to the Nathu Colony flyover.

"Initial inquiry suggests that the man was stabbed to death by unidentified people. There were multiple stab injuries on his body. We also found ₹3,000 in his pocket," said DCP Surendra Chaudhary.

Edu secy to withdraw order on transfer of teachers: Atishi

New Delhi, July 1: Delhi education minister Atishi has instructed the education secretary to immediately withdraw the recent mandatory transfer orders for teachers who have served in the same school for over 10 years, a statement said on Monday.

According to the official statement, the directive follows the issuance of compulsory transfer orders by the Directorate of Education (DoE) without the minister's approval, prompting backlash from the teaching community.

The teachers expressed widespread anger and frustration over the DoE's decision. A delegation met Atishi on Monday to submit a memorandum of their grievances.

Ms Atishi emphasised the "detrimental impact" such transfers could have on the unique teacher-student relationships that are built on years of trust.

She underscored the importance of maintaining stable educational environ-

"There is a unique relationship between a teacher and their student which is built on years of trust; in such a situation, such transfer orders are harmful to the education system," she stated.

Ms Atishi reiterated the government's commitment to strengthening the education system, asserting that teachers are the cornerstone of any school system.

"We have worked tirelessly to strengthen the education system of Delhi. Teachers are the most important part of any school system, and the Delhi government's effort is to constantly work to increase the capacity and confidence of teachers and not do anything that hurts their dignity," she said. — *PTI*

The person sitting in the Chair does not have a remote control or a switch for the microphones," Mr Birla said. He also said the members of all political parties

have representation on the panel of chairpersons who preside over in the absence of the Speaker.

Mr Gandhi also claimed that whenever he spoke the word Ayodhya his mics were switched off. He also asked the Speaker why the Sansad TV cameras do not focus on him.

Earlier in the day, Mr Birla also took strong

objection to members casting aspersions on the Chair by alleging that when they rise to speak in the House, their microphones are turned off by the presiding officers.

"This is a matter of the dignity of the Chair. At least those who occupy the Chair should not raise such objections. K. Suresh also occupies the Chair. Does the Chair have control of the mic," the Speaker said, addressing the Congress veteran.

Rebutting the charge in Rajya Sabha also, Chairman Jagdeep Dhankhar said, "I take strong exception to the statement by Pramod Tiwari. Nobody can switch off the mic. It's a fallacy being spread by few to diminish the institution."

New Delhi, July 1: With the three new criminal laws coming into effect, the Congress on Monday accused the government of getting them "forcibly" passed in Parliament after suspending 146 MPs and asserted that going forward, the INDIA bloc will not allow such "bulldozer justice" to prevail in the country's parliamentary system.

Three new criminal laws came into effect in the country on Monday, bringing far-reaching changes in India's criminal justice system.

The Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), Bharatiya Nagarik

Sanhita (BNSS) and the Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam (BSA) take into account some of the current social realities and modern-day crimes.

The new laws replaced the erstwhile British-era Indian Penal Code (IPC), Code of Criminal Procedure or Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) and the Indian Evidence Act (IEA), respectively.

In a post in Hindi on X, the Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge said, "After the political and moral shock in the elections, Modi ji and the BJP are pretending to respect the Constitution, but the truth is that the three laws

of the criminal justice system, which are being implemented from today, were passed forcibly after suspension of 146 MPs."

Over 43% of forest camps in Kaziranga park submerged

As a significant portion of wildlife habitat is now submerged, scores of animals have started crossing the National Highway 715

Floodwaters have submerged a total of 101 forest camps, of which six have been vacated, across Kaziranga National Park and Tiger Reserve, a flood report said. — PTI

4 Naxals involved in attack on CRPF held

Sukma: Nine Naxalites, including four allegedly involved in blowing up a mini-truck with an IED resulting in the death of two CRPF CoBRA personnel last month, were arrested from two places in Chhattisgarh's Sukma district, the police said on Monday. The four involved in the blast incident were apprehended on Sunday from the forests between Timmapuram and Tekalgudam villages. Kunjam Rama (35), Barse Bichchem (40) are members of DAKMS (Dandakaranya Adivasi Kisan Majdoor Sangthan), which is a frontal wing of the Maoists, while Kunajim Joga (22) and Kunjam Bheema (21) are militia members, he said. The four were allegedly part of the Naxal group that blew up a truck carrying rations for security personnel near Timmapuram village, killing constable Shailendra (29) and driver Vishnu R (35) of CoBRA's 201st battalion on June 23. — PTI

India, Pak exchange list of prisoners

New Delhi: In a customary practice, India and Pakistan exchanged, through diplomatic channels simultaneously in New Delhi and Islamabad, the lists of civilian prisoners and fishermen in each other's custody on Monday. India reported having 366 civilian prisoners and 86 fishermen in its custody, who are Pakistani or are believed to be Pakistani. Meanwhile, Pakistan stated that it has 43 civilian prisoners and 211 fishermen in its custody, who are Indian or are believed to be Indian. New Delhi also asked Islamabad to expedite the release and repatriation of 185 Indian fishermen and civilian prisoners who have completed their sentence. In addition, Pakistan has been asked to provide immediate consular access to the 47 civilian prisoners and fishermen in Pakistan's custody.

Kerala, WB top in species discoveries

Kolkata: Kerala and West Bengal are the top two states in the number of discoveries of new animal species last year, the Zoological Survey of India (ZSI) said in a report. The highest number of 101 discoveries were reported from Kerala, while West Bengal recorded 72. Tamil Nadu became the third state on the list with 64 discoveries last year, according to the ZSI report released on Sunday. "ZSI scientists have found 641 faunal species in 2023 in the country and the information was updated in the latest records," ZSI director Dhriti Banerjee said. The mission of the Kolkata-headquartered 109-year-old organisation is to trace all faunal species, she said. "This is imperative to save the bio-diversity of our system," Ms Banerjee said. — PTI

MP mulls more teeth to cattle smuggling law

The Madhya Pradesh government is seriously contemplating to make the anti-cow slaughter and cattle smuggling laws more stringent. The issue was discussed by the state cabinet which met here on Monday minutes before the Budget session of the Assembly commenced, official sources told this newspaper. Madhya Pradesh has one of the most stringent anti-cow slaughter and cattle smuggling laws in the country, with penalties including up to seven years of imprisonment and mandatory confiscation of vehicles used in cattle smuggling. Sources said that the state government is con-

sidering making the laws more stringent by increasing the penalties. Chief minister Mohan Yadav has earlier said that his government would not compromise on protection of cows and would take strong action against cattle smuggling and cow slaughter. The state Cabinet on Monday cleared the proposal to rename the post of vice-chancellor (Kulpati) of universities to “Kulguru”. The CM who chaired the meeting said that the move was aimed at establishing a link with “sanskriti (culture)” and “guru parampara” (tradition). Taking to X, the chief minister's office said that all university vice-chancellors in Madhya Pradesh will now be referred to as Kulgurus.

NCP (SP) MLA Jitendra Awhad started the discussion on the calling attention motion moved by MLAs from all parties regarding the Ghatkopar hoarding tragedy. Referring to the suspension of Government Railway Police commissioner Quaiser Khalid for giving permission to the

illegal hoarding on the railway land, Mr. Awhad asked why the police officer was singled out and demanded action against Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) officers who allowed the hoarding to come up. Minister Samant informed the House that the concerned BMC officers had raised objection over the said hoarding several times, but the GRP overlooked it. After that BJP legislator Ram Kadam alleged that Bhavesh Bhinde, director of Ego Media Private

Limited, which had erected the structure, had links with Mr Thackeray. Another BJP legislator Nitesh Rane alleged that Bhinde was a “sleeping partner” of Shiv Sena (UBT) MLA Sunil Raut. Mr Raut, who was present in the house, in turn alleged that Bhinde was connected to a former Lok Sabha representative of the BJP. “If it is proven that I have any connection with Bhinde, I will resign. If it is not proven, those making allegations against me should resign.”

Aap Hindu ho hi nahi (You are not Hindus),” said Mr Gandhi, pointing towards BJP MPs, leading to an uproar from them. The ministers demanded an apology from Mr Gandhi for targeting the Hindu religion. Prime Minister Narendra Modi immediately got up to say that calling the whole Hindu society violent was a serious matter. Mr Shah sought the Congress leader's apology to the House and the country for hurting the feelings of crores of people who take pride in identifying themselves as Hindus. However, Mr Gandhi did not stop. “You are not true Hindus. The BJP doesn't represent Hindus. Narendra Modi is not

the entire Hindu samaj, RSS is not the entire Hindu samaj. You are not the custodians of Hinduism,” continued Mr Gandhi, amid thumping of tables by the Opposition. Later, his sister Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, who watched him speak from visitors' gallery along with their mother, Rajya Sabha MP Sonia Gandhi, said: “He (Rahul) cannot insult Hindus. He said it very clearly. He talked about the BJP, he talked about BJP leaders.” Hitting back, Mr Shah mentioned the Emergency and the 1984 anti-Sikhs riots, saying he has no right to talk about non-violence when the Congress had spread “terror” in the country. The Opposition countered him by mentioning the violence in Godhra (Gujarat) and Manipur. Taunting the BJP, Mr Gandhi said he was happy that the saffron party was now talking about the Constitution, given the fact that in the last ten years there has been a full-scale systematic attack on the Constitution and its principles. He added millions have resisted the ideology of the BJP and the attack on the Constitution and alleged that all those

who resisted were crushed, jailed, threatened and attacked. “Not only the Opposition but anyone who resisted the concentration of power and wealth, be it minorities, Dalits, were crushed, jailed, threatened. I myself faced relentless attacks. There were 20-plus cases (against me), (my) house was taken away. I faced 55 hours of interrogation (by ED),” Mr Gandhi said. Despite these challenges, he said he feels proud of the collective effort to protect the Constitution. “It feels nice that BJP people are now repeating ‘Jai Samvidhan’ after me,” he said. In a rare move by any MP, Mr Gandhi displayed photographs of Lord Shiva followed by symbols of Islam and photos of Guru Nanak, Jesus Christ, the Buddha and Mahavir to convey that all religions spread love and tolerance and not hatred and violence. Speaker Om Birla tried to stop Mr Gandhi from showing the photographs “saying people worship them”. But the LoP did not stop. At one point he placed all the photographs on the table of the Speaker, but then Mr Gandhi had many more of their copies with him. He

pulled them out one after another to make his point. Mr Gandhi made sarcastic comments on the PM, saying that he has a “direct connection with God” and that “he is not biological”, as claimed by Mr Modi in media interviews during the elections. “PM said Gandhi is dead and a movie revived him”, said Mr Gandhi, while continuing his attack. Rahul Gandhi also did not spare Speaker Om Birla and had a verbal exchange with him on switching off the mikes and not showing him on camera while he was speaking. Mr Gandhi remarked that he saw Mr Birla bow down before the PM. “I noticed something. When I shook your hand, you stood straight and shook my hand. When Modi ji shook your hand, you bowed down and shook his hand,” he said. Mr Birla said that he was keeping the tradition of bowing to elders. “The Prime Minister is the Leader of House. My culture and traditions say, in personal as well as public life, and on this seat, I should bow to those who are elders and those who are equal should be treated equally, that is what I have learnt,” Mr Birla said.

BJP demands Rahul apology

Mr Gandhi's first speech as LoP, Union minister S. Jaishankar said: “This is now the Leader of the Opposition. Who attacks Hindus while professing brotherhood to all. Who disparages the Indian Army's bravery, while expressing concern for their welfare. Who tears up Cabinet decisions, while preaching respect for the Constitution. Welcome to the politics of the Congress Party.” Accusing the Congress leader of insulting crores of Hindus, home minister Amit Shah, in a post on X, said Mr Gandhi insulted “crores of Hindus” by saying that “Hindus commit violence, lie and spread hatred” and demanded an apology from him. Union ministers Ashwini Vaishnaw and Kiren Rijiju, while addressing the media, accused Mr Gandhi of denigrating the responsible position of the LoP with his “extremely irresponsible” speech in the Lok Sabha. Mr Rijiju said the BJP had challenged many of the claims made by the Congress leader in his speech and had sought action from the Speaker. He will have to substantiate or tender an apology, the parliamentary affairs minister said. Rejecting Mr Gandhi's allegations on the Agnipath scheme and compensation for the residents of Ayodhya during development projects there, Mr Vaishnaw said over Rs 1,253 crores in compensation was given to local shopkeepers and others, and they were helped in relocation.

has said other than by citing news reports. The Chair, however, did not accept the arguments and expunged the remarks made by Mr Kharge from the record. Mr Kharge insisted that he was only seeking to highlight the divisive nature of the speeches delivered by the PM. Leader of the House and BJP president J.P. Nadda too objected to the remarks by Mr Kharge. He said the Congress leader had no knowledge about the RSS and whatever Mr Kharge was saying about the organisation was regrettable. Mr Kharge said there was no vision or direction in the

President's address to Parliament. He attacked the ruling party for only offering slogans and not doing development work. He claimed there was no mention of the poor, Dalits and minorities in the President's address. Mr Kharge said while the Opposition talks about the plight of the common man, Mr Modi only does “Mann Ki Baat”, the PM's monthly radio programme. Mr Kharge pointed out that Prime Minister Modi has not visited strife-torn Manipur. He also appealed to the Rajya Sabha Chairman to put back the statues of Mahatma Gandhi and B.R. Ambedkar back in their original locations. The Congress chief also

mentioned the massive Neet row in his reply, claiming the government initially denied any paper leak. He added the government later clarified and accepted that irregularities took place. “This election witnessed that a major issue was protecting the Constitution. The BJP said it will amend the Constitution. But the elections proved issues keep coming and going but the Constitution will thrive, democracy will survive, elections will keep happening and we will also be here,” Mr Kharge said. “The common people supported the Opposition in this fight. They took a major step towards protecting the Constitution,” he added.

Kejriwal moves HC over CBI arrest

the trial court refused to declare his arrest illegal, as sought by the defence counsel, saying “the timing may be circumspect but it is not the clear criterion for declaring an arrest illegal”. The trial court said: “Investigation is the prerogative of the investigating agency, however, there are certain safeguards provided in the law and at this stage, on the material on record, it cannot be said that the arrest is illegal. The agency, however, should not be overzealous.”

In its remand application before the trial court, the CBI had claimed Mr Kejriwal “did not cooperate” during the custodial interrogation. “He also evaded questions regarding the transfer and utilisation of ill-gotten money to the tune of ₹44.54 crores for the Goa elections by his party during 2021-22,” the CBI claimed, adding Mr Kejriwal was “deliberately and intentionally evading the just and relevant questions related to the case.” The CBI also said the Delhi CM is a prominent politician and a “very influential per-

son” and that he could influence the witnesses or tamper with the evidence in the case. The agency sought 14-day judicial custody for Mr Kejriwal, saying it was required “in the interest of the investigation and justice”. Thereafter, when the matter was listed on June 29, special judge Sunena Sharma allowed the CBI plea and remanded Mr Kejriwal to judicial custody till July 12. Mr Kejriwal was first arrested on March 21 by the ED in the excise policy matter.

Uphold rule of law as mob lynching, hate crimes rise

India woke up to a new legal regime on July 1 that will cover the administration of criminal justice in its entirety, consigning the Raj-era laws to history in the backdrop of Prime Minister Narendra Modi calling the last general elections as the sign of Indian people's unwavering faith in the country's Constitution and democratic process. The newfound optimism about the Constitution and the new set of laws notwithstanding, a series of events in the preceding weeks have dealt a body blow to the idea of the rule of law in the country, if the reports about mob lynching and moral policing across the country offer a clue.

The latest bout started in the last week of May in Gujarat when a man was lynched for ferrying buffaloes in Gujarat. It was followed by the more gruesome one in which two cattle transporters from Uttar Pradesh were killed, and a third was critically injured on June 7 in Raipur in Chhattisgarh. Two weeks later, a 30-year-old man was killed in Aligarh on suspicion that he was an armed robber. Houses of 11 people who kept beef were demolished at government's behest saying they were built on government land in Mandla district of Madhya Pradesh. Clashes erupted over the alleged transportation of cows for slaughter ahead of the Bakrid festival on June 15 in Medak in Telangana. Similar incidents were reported from Odisha and Himachal Pradesh.

If these were hate crimes, and the victims of murderous attacks were Muslims, the reports that have emanated from West Bengal are reflective of a breakdown of rule of law in the state. While one person was killed by a lynch mob on suspicion of theft in Jhargram district last week, more than a dozen cases of mob attack were reported from various parts of the state. And the most worrisome among them was the surfacing of a video of a man, allegedly a leader of the ruling Trinamul Congress, assaulting a couple for their 'illicit relationship' in Uttar Dinajpur district. The lynching of a transgender in Telangana in February this year alleging him to be a child lifter was reflective of the liberties people take with transgender people in our country for long.

Cow vigilante groups that would chase people who make a living by trading in cattle sprouted with unprecedented frequency after the Narendra Modi government came to power in 2014. Several instances followed, forcing the Prime Minister to warn people against taking law into their hands. Mr Modi's words were disregarded not only by the lynch mobs; a member of his council of ministers received and even garlanded a gang at his home when its members were released from jail on bail.

India cannot afford a repeat of the same sequence of criminal acts anymore. This nation, as Mr Modi reiterated, is bound to its Constitution. It is the job of the governments at the centre and in states to ensure that the people, irrespective of their caste, creed or religion, enjoy the fundamental rights including the right to life the statute book guarantees.

The government claims that the intent of the new set of criminal laws is to ensure justice though even well-meaning people fear it would substantially deplete people's right vis a vis the state. A government which swears by the Constitution and the law must ensure that the law-breakers are dealt with the strongest possible way and that the arms of the state must protect the innocent citizens.

Biden dilemma for Democrats

The race to the White House is quite unlike the proverbial one between the hare and the tortoise. This contest between two candidates aged 82 and 78 seeking a second term has all the contours of a spoon and lime race between grandparents at a school fete.

It was supposed to be a close-run race between two occupants of the White House — incumbent Joe Biden and his predecessor Donald Trump, that is until the great American reality show of a presidential debate came along, up to which point Mr Biden had reasons to be optimistic of holding off the maverick former president.

Mr Biden's halting show in the televised debate, charitably described as a fiasco, has put the Democrats on the horns of a dilemma. Do they now ask their candidate to step down so they may choose a more dynamic leader and speaker who can relate to the young and the uncommitted voters whose votes may ultimately swing the polls?

Sticking to his powerful seat like a limpet to a rock, Mr Biden is unwilling to even contemplate giving up on the race to The Oval office, even as his family urges him on to look beyond the 'blip on the campaign radar', which is what the President's faithful are calling his disastrous debate performance.

It is not as if the challenger Mr Trump came away smelling of roses from the debate even if he carried off his regular bluster in a stronger voice, but laced with the usual dose of innuendo, fake facts and delusions. But that is the crux of the debate now — do the Americans choose a President who was incomprehensible and shows the signs of aging visibly or another who might not accept the verdict even were he to be beaten fair and square at the very polls in which he is a candidate?

And yet, for all the fuss that the American people and media make of the debate and their possible effect on the poll outcome, the real tiebreakers are the voters of the 7 swing states who usually decide whether a Democrat or a Republican goes to the White House.

Rethink Speaker's role: Can we look outside the system?

Addressing the Assam Assembly last year, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla, who was recently elected to a second term, said: "Democracy is based on debates and dialogue. But continuous disruption of debates in the House and lack of decorum is a matter of concern. While it is natural for the treasury and Opposition benches to disagree, dissidence should not lead to an impasse."

After flagging the issue, he should have introspected on the role of the Speakers in our system, and his own role. Legislatures and Parliaments, while meant to be self-governing, are still in dire need of governing. In India and elsewhere, these elected institutions zealously guard their independence against the other branches of the government. However, since the Speaker too is a directly elected member of the House, he or she is a creature of our politics and political system. How the office conducts itself depends on the individual, but sadly in our system the political chief executives tend to overawe this office and more often the Speaker ends up more as a mere servitor of the political grandees.

Of course, a Speaker can well be assertive and choose to do the right thing, even if it incurs the disapproval of the political masters. But that has seldom happened in India. Increasingly, the presiding officers are the instrumentality by which governments control elected legislatures and even subvert mandates and majorities, by suspending members to reduce the Opposition's numbers. The system of a neutralised Speaker has largely worked in the House of Commons, but not so in the Lok Sabha. Here the Speaker has become a mere political minion serv-

ing the convenience of the masters.

The Speaker of Britain's House of Commons presides over its debates, determining which members may speak, for maintaining order during the debate, and may punish members who break the rules of the House. We recently saw how the Speaker of the House of Commons, Sir Lindsay Hoyle, brought a disruptive Prime Minister Boris Johnson to order by telling him: "You might be the Prime Minister of Great Britain, but I am the master of this House and I order you to sit down!"

Unlike the presiding officers of legislatures in many other countries, the British Speaker remains strictly non-partisan, and renounces all affiliation with his or her former political party when taking office as well as when leaving office. Customarily, the House of Commons re-elects Speakers who desire to continue in office for more than one term. On the other hand, the Speaker of the US House of Representatives is an active and partisan leadership position, and the incumbent actively works to set the majority party's legislative agenda. Unfortunately, in India, what was meant to be a replication of the British system has actually ended up like the American system. But there is one big difference. In the US, the whip does not control the legislatures.

Democracy isn't just about an elected Parliament and periodic elections. Democracy is pointless without debate and discussion. Democracy is a system of government by compromises and accommodation. That is why it's called a reconciliatory system, where the myriad aspirations of individuals, groups, regions and nations are sought to be reconciled towards the common good. It is hence a

government by discussion and debate, for the method of making choices is by common consent and acceptance.

A prime prerequisite for democratic functioning is institutional order and coherence. Nothing much needs be said as to how dysfunctional our Parliament and legislatures have now become. The blight has been a long time in the making and they have now become forums more for political vaudeville than thoughtful consideration of the nation's many problems.

The first Lok Sabha worked for almost 4,000 hours while the 16th Lok Sabha functioned for just 1,615 hours. Dr Jessica Seddon, a senior fellow at IIT Madras' Centre for Technology and Policy, recently wrote a perceptive paper titled "The Limits of Control in Parliament", in which she examined the institutional arrangements that preclude intelligent and patient discussion of vital matters in either House of Parliament. Dr Seddon writes:

"Parliamentary process is currently stacked against constructive debate. It awards the government substantial control over what comes up for discussion, limits the avenues for alternatives to be articulated and seriously considered, and more or less precludes coalitions that cut across government and Opposition lines. In doing so, it also effectively absolves the Opposition from any responsibility to highlight specific problems, propose new solutions and build issue-based coalitions around common interests. If delay, disruption and shouts of 'no' are the only feasible forms of public dissent, it's hard to ask people to hold their rep-

resentatives accountable for more."

The evolution of our politics into a non-ideological political competition has seen the demise of discussion and debate within Parliament. The expansion of 24x7 television news channels and their vacuous talk shows aimed at garnering TRPs rather than spreading light has only accelerated this process.

Parliament still meets and passes bills and enacts laws, but most of this is done without the debate and discussion that they require and which we expect. Even the Union Budget is barely discussed. Many a time Parliament even functions without a quorum.

This convention of having a Speaker from within the political system needs to be re-examined. We might be better served by having legislatures presided over by an eminent and commonly trusted individual, perhaps like a retired Chief Justice, who might bring a more enlightened view of right and wrong to the office?

Then there is the Anti-Defection Act that seriously limits free discussion by muzzling inner-party discussion and expression of dissent. This law disrespects the essential reality that Members of Parliament or the state legislatures are the representatives of the people. That they are members of a political party is only incidental. The elected members are intended to represent and protect the interests of the people who elect them, and not that of a handful of leaders. It makes them subservient to the whip on the pain of expulsion.

This tyranny of the whip has turned our MPs virtually into marionettes that are forced to act according to the wishes of their party's leadership. Most party leaderships are now vested within families and clans, and the leadership is usually hereditary or extra-institutional. So where do we go from here? And where will we discuss and debate just that?

If India claims US report is 'biased', why not counter it, not just criticise?

On Friday, June 28, India's external affairs ministry put out a strong statement against a report from the United States state department on religious freedom in India. Our statement said that "as in the past, the report is deeply biased, lacks understanding of India's social fabric and is visibly driven by vote bank considerations and a prescriptive outlook. We therefore reject it".

Our statement further went on to attack the primary report on which the US state department was basing its observations. We said that this primary report was "a mix of imputations, misrepresentations, selective usage of facts, reliance on biased sources and a one-sided projection of issues".

There are a couple of hundred words added to this which talk about our laws and our sovereignty, but sadly do not address the specific accusations that the US state department has made. What were these?

America's secretary of state Antony Blinken said these two things: "In India, for example, Christian communities reported that the local police aided mobs that disrupted worship services over accusations of conversion activities or stood by while mobs attacked them and then arrested the victims on conversion charges." He added: "In India, we see a concerning increase in anti-conversion laws, hate speech, demolitions of homes and places of worship for members of minority faith communities."

This is a fact. We cannot both be proud of the BJP's bulldozer culture and disown it. It would

have been appropriate for us to have addressed these things specifically, but we chose not to. Instead, we ended our statement with the words that "in 2023, India has officially taken up numerous cases in the US of hate crimes, racial attacks on Indian nationals and other minorities, vandalism and targeting of places of worship, violence and mistreatment by law enforcement authorities". We will come to this later, but first let us understand what this US report is that has India upset.

It is an annual report put out by the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom (USCIRF). It claims to be an independent and bipartisan (meaning comprising both Democratic and Republican members) US federal (or central) government entity.

For the last five years, every year, it has been recommending sanctions against Indian leaders and institutions. Each year, the US federal government, first under Donald Trump and then under Joe Biden, has been avoiding imposing sanctions.

If readers remember the US visa ban on Narendra Modi (then chief minister of Gujarat) 20 years ago, it was because he was put on the USCIRF sanctions list and the then President (George W. Bush) had enforced the sanctions against Mr Modi for the Gujarat pogrom.

Their 2020 report says: "India took a sharp downward turn in 2019. The national government used its strengthened parliamentary majority to institute national-level policies

violating religious freedom across India, especially for Muslims." Our external affairs minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar's response was to say that the USCIRF was "biased and its tendentious comments against India are not new".

Last year, after India for the fourth year running made it to the list of nations persecuting minorities, our foreign ministry said the report was "biased and inaccurate" and reflected a "severe lack of understanding of India and its constitutional framework, its plurality and its democratic ethos".

This is inaccurate. I have engaged with the USCIRF and find them to be extremely knowledgeable about India.

See this note by one of the USCIRF commissioners, Johnnie Moore, in the 2021 report. He writes: "I love India. I have floated early in the morning down the Ganges in Varanasi, walked every alley in Old Delhi, stood in awe of the architecture in Agra, sipped tea next to the Dalai Lama's temple in Dharamsala, circled the shrine in Aimer, and looked in awe at the Golden Temple. All along the way, I have met Christian brothers and sisters who serve the poor selflessly, often in difficult circumstances. Of all the countries in the world, India should not be a country of particular concern. It is the world's largest democracy and it is governed by a pristine Constitution. It is diversity personified and its religious life has been its greatest historic blessing. Yet, India does seem to be at a crossroads. Its democracy -- still

young and freewheeling -- is creating through the ballot box difficult challenges for itself. The answer, of course, is for India's institutions to draw upon their rich history to protect their values. India must always resist allowing political and inter-communal conflict to exacerbate by religious tensions. India's government and people have everything to gain and absolutely nothing to lose from preserving social harmony and protecting the rights of everyone. India can. India must."

These are the people whose views we are dismissing and calling biased. Even if we are to assume that the USCIRF is biased as Mr Jaishankar and the external affairs ministry claim, this is not relevant. What they say is relevant. Is it true that Indian minorities are being persecuted by law and policy under the BJP? The answer is obvious to anyone who opens a newspaper and switches on their television set.

Our response threatening to take up violations in the United States against their minorities is welcome. As a democracy which says it respects human rights, it is our obligation to point out flaws in other nations, especially in our friends. However, this should be a deep exercise, such as the one the USCIRF conducts, and not as a throwaway statement in angry response to well-founded and accurate accusations against us.

CAR DRIVES INTO CROWD, KILLS 9 NEAR SEOUL HALL

Seoul, July 1: A car hit pedestrians near Seoul city hall, killing nine people and injuring at least four, South Korean media reports said, citing police and fire officials. A police official told Reuters officers were investigating at the scene, and declined to give further information. YTN TV reported that the vehicle rammed into pedestrians standing on the crosswalk after hitting two other cars. A police officer was administering CPR to a person on the ground at the site of the accident, according to a video provided by a witness to *Reuters*.

NORWAY LIMITS PVT ISLAND SALE FEARING CHINA

Copenhagen, July 1: Norway said on Monday it had demanded the owner of a private property on the Arctic Svalbard islands obtain the government's consent before selling the property, over concerns national security interests could be jeopardised through a sale. The company AS Kulspids, which owns Soere Fagerjord in Svalbard, must obtain consent from the ministry of trade, industry and fisheries before negotiating a sale of the property, the Norwegian government said in a statement.

ALBANIA'S WORLD FAMOUS AUTHOR KADARE NO MORE

Tirana, July 1: Albanians mourned Ismail Kadare, their "greatest cultural monument", Monday after the acclaimed novelist -- tipped several times for the Nobel literature prize -- died of a heart attack at a Tirana hospital aged 88. Prime Minister Edi Rama led the tributes with the president of neighbouring Kosovo Vjosa Osmani hailing Kadare's "remarkable contribution to Albanian and world literature". Through the epic sweep of novels like "Broken April" and "The General of the Dead Army", the writer used metaphor and quiet sarcasm to chronicle the grotesque fate of his country and its people.

MAURITANIA PREZ RE-ELECTED COMFORTABLY

Nouakchott, July 1: Mauritania's incumbent President Mohamed Ould Cheikh El Ghazouani has comfortably won re-election at the helm of the vast desert nation, seen as a rock of relative stability in Africa's volatile Sahel region.

The former army chief won just over 56 percent of the vote, the Independent National Electoral Commission said Monday, giving him a second five-year term during which Mauritania is set to become a gas producer. Dozens of supporters massed outside Ghazouani's campaign headquarters in the capital Nouakchott after the final provisional results.

NEPAL BUDDHA GETS 10-YR JAIL FOR CHILD SEX

Kathmandu, July 1: A Nepali court on Monday sentenced a man whose followers believe him to be a reincarnation of Buddha to 10 years in prison for child sexual abuse. Ram Bahadur Bomjan, known as "Buddha boy" by his devotees, became famous as a teenager after followers said he could meditate motionless for months without water, food or sleep. He was convicted of child sexual abuse last week by the court in Nepal's southern town of Sarlahi.

BIGGEST POLITICAL PARTY IN FIJI DEREGISTERED

Suva, July 1: The largest political party in Fiji was deregistered on Monday, less than two months after its former leader and ex-prime minister Frank Bainimarama was jailed for perverting the course of justice. Opposition party FijiFirst held the most seats in the country's 55-member parliament, but was turfed out of power in 2022 by a three-way coalition. Since its election defeat, the party has been thrown into disarray. Bainimarama was jailed earlier this year after a court found he used his political clout to smother a police probe.

Trump has immunity for official, not pvt acts: SC

Throws out decision to reject Trump bid to shield himself

Washington, July 1: The US Supreme Court for the first time on Monday recognised that ex-presidents have immunity from prosecution for certain actions taken in office, as it threw out a judicial decision rejecting Donald Trump's bid to shield himself from criminal charges involving his efforts to undo his 2020 election loss.

The court ruled 6-3 that while former presidents enjoy immunity for actions they take within their constitutional authority, they do not for actions taken in a private capacity. The ruling marked the first time since the nation's 18th century founding that the Supreme Court has declared that former presidents may be shielded from criminal charges in any instance.

Chief Justice John Roberts announced the landmark ruling on behalf of the court's six-justice conservative majority. The court's three liberal justices dissented.

The decision came in Trump's appeal of a lower court ruling rejecting his immunity claim. The court decided the case on the last day of its term.

Trump is the Republican candidate challenging Democratic President Joe Biden in the November 5 US election in a rematch from four years ago. The court's slow handling of the blockbuster case already had helped Trump by making it unlikely that any trial on these charges

Hurricane Beryl gets stronger in Caribbean

Port of Spain, July 1: Hurricane Beryl strengthened as it churned toward the Caribbean's Windward Islands on Monday, according to officials, threatening devastating flooding and storm surges as life-threatening high winds picked up speed. People in a broad swathe of the Eastern Caribbean boarded up shops, stocked up on food and filled their cars with fuel as the storm approached. "Beryl is expected to remain an extremely dangerous major hurricane when it reaches the Windward Islands this morning," the US National Hurricane Centre said in its latest advisory, urging residents to heed any evacuation orders or other preparedness guidance from officials.

Beryl's rapid rise marks an unusually fierce and early start to this year's Atlantic hurricane season — the earliest Category 4 storm on record, according to NHC data. The prime minister of St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Ralph Gonsalves, said he was expecting a natural disaster that could continue for days. In the capital of Kingstown, conditions around the main harbor worsened on Monday morning, with some damage to building roofs reported, caused by intensifying winds.

At Category 4 strength on the Saffir-Simpson five-point scale, Beryl is packing maximum sustained wind speeds of 209 kmph, with some higher gusts, and is located about 145 km south-southeast of St. Vincent. It is moving west-northwest at a speed of 32 kmph and is forecast to cross many of the central Caribbean's most populated islands through Wednesday as it barrels toward the Gulf of Mexico, the NHC added.

The core of the hurricane will likely bring "potentially catastrophic wind damage" as it moves through parts of the Windward Islands, with St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Grenada, most at risk, the centre said. Hurricane warnings were in effect for Barbados, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Grenada and Tobago. A tropical storm warning was issued for Martinique, Trinidad and St. Lucia, with storm watches issued. — Reuters

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GREECE PM WARNS OF TOUGH SUMMER AFTER FIRES

Athens, July 1: Firefighters were racing to tackle wildfires that broke out on the eastern Aegean islands of Chios and Kos Monday, as Greece's prime minister warned of a dangerous summer ahead and said the public's help was essential in limiting the impact of wildfires.

Emergency services issued evacuation orders for those in the Metohi area of western Chios, urging them to head to a nearby beach. Further to the south, the fire department said 20 firefighters, a helicopter and volunteers were tackling a brush fire. — AFP

French far-right leads in first round of elections

Paris, July 1: France's National Rally surged into the lead in the first round of legislative elections, according to results released early Monday, bringing the far-right party to the brink of power and dealing a major blow to President Emmanuel Macron's centrists in an election that could set the country, and Europe, on a starkly different course.

The results confirmed polling that showed the party with a history of racism and xenophobia and once shunned by the mainstream is no longer taboo, confined to the fringes of French politics. There remains another torrid week of campaigning before the decisive final voting Sunday, and whether the National Rally will be able to win an outright majority and form France's first far-right government since World War II remains uncertain.

Marked by high turnout of nearly 68 per cent that reflected the high stakes, voters handed the Marine Le Pen's National Rally a strong lead, with about 33 per cent of the vote.

The number includes the votes from a group of conservative candidates of The Republicans party

Australian visa fees for global students doubled

Melbourne, July 1: Australia has more than doubled the cost of student visa fees for international students from \$710 to \$1,600, a move which will impact lakhs of Indians planning to study in this country.

The move has triggered outrage from student representatives who say that the price hike will drive potential students to competitors, ABC News reported on Monday.

From July 1, the international student visa fee has risen to USD 1,600 from USD 710. The federal gov-

ernment said the additional revenue will help fund initiatives in education including cuts to graduate debt, financial support for apprentices, and the ongoing implementation of its migration strategy, the report said.

"International education is an incredibly important national asset and we need to ensure its integrity and quality," Minister for Education Jason Clare said in a statement.

According to the Indian High Commission in

Canberra, the number of Indian students enrolled for studying in Australia is estimated at around 1,20,277 as of August 2023, making Indian students the second largest cohort of foreign students in Australia.

Meanwhile, Yeganeh Soltanpour, the national president of the Council of International Students Australia, slammed the decision, noting the fee increase, combined with high deposit costs, places extra strain on international students, the ABC report said. — PTI

Israel tanks advance after missile strikes

Gaza Strip, July 1: The Palestinian militant group Islamic Jihad fired a barrage of rockets into Israel on Monday as fighting raged in Gaza and Israeli tanks advanced deeper in parts of the enclave, residents and officials said.

The armed wing of Islamic Jihad, an Iranian-backed ally of Hamas, said its fighters fired rockets towards several Israeli communities near the fence with Gaza in response to "the crimes of the Zionist enemy against our Palestinian people".

The volley of about 20 rockets caused no casualties, the Israeli military said. But the attack showed militants still possess rocket capabilities almost nine months into an offensive that Israel says is aimed at neutralising threats against it.

Residents of several neighbourhoods in eastern Khan Younis, which is in southern Gaza, said they had received audio messages from Israeli phone numbers ordering them to leave their

CHEMICALS TO MAKE DRUGS FROM CHINA HELD

Rome, July 1: Italian authorities announced Monday the seizure of more than six tonnes of chemicals from China allegedly intended to produce illegal drugs, including ecstasy, worth more than \$678 million.

Italy's financial police said two shipments contained enough so-called "drug precursors" to produce more than 63 million MDMA pills, the synthetic drug known as ecstasy, which police said was enough to "flood" Europe. — AFP

CHINA DEPLOYS 2ND AIRCRAFT CARRIER IN SCS

Beijing, July 1: China has deployed its second aircraft carrier 'Shandong' which was spotted patrolling waters off the Philippine coast as Manila stepped up efforts to assert its claims over a shoal in the disputed South China Sea firmly opposing Beijing's counter-claims. Shandong, an aircraft carrier, was seen patrolling the waters. — PTI

EU accuses Meta of breaking digital rules

Brussels, July 1: The EU accused Facebook owner Meta on Monday of breaching the bloc's digital rules, paving the way for potential fines worth billions of euros.

The charges against the US tech titan follow a finding last week against Apple that marked the first time Brussels had levelled formal accusations under the EU's Digital Markets Act (DMA).

The latest case focuses on Meta's new ad-free subscription model for Facebook and Instagram, which has sparked multi-

ple complaints over privacy concerns.

Meta's "pay or consent" system means users have to pay to avoid data collection, or agree to share their data with Facebook and Instagram to keep using the platforms for free. The European Commission said it informed Meta of its "preliminary view" that the model the company launched last year "fails to comply" with the DMA.

"This binary choice forces users to consent to the combination of their personal data and fails to

provide them a less personalised but equivalent version of Meta's social networks," the EU's powerful antitrust regulator said

in a statement. The findings come after the commission kickstarted a probe into Meta in March under the DMA,

which forces the world's biggest tech companies to comply with EU rules designed to give European users more choice online.

Meta insisted its model "complies with the DMA". "We look forward to further constructive dialogue with the European Commission to bring this investigation to a close," a Meta spokesperson said.

Meta can now reply to the findings and avoid a fine if it changes the model to address the EU's concerns. If the commission's view is confirmed however, it can slap fines

of up to 10 percent of Meta's total global turnover under the DMA. This can rise to up to 20 per cent for repeat offenders. Meta's total revenue last year stood at around \$135 billion. The EU also has the right to break up firms, but only as a last resort.

Under the DMA, the EU labels Meta and other companies, including Apple, as "gatekeepers" and prevents them forcing users in the bloc to consent to have access to a service or certain functionalities. — AFP

Passenger vehicle sales rise 3.6% to 3.4L units in June

MICHAEL GONSALVES PUNE, JULY 1

Passenger vehicle (PV) wholesales grew 3.6 per cent to 3.4 lakh units in June, primarily driven by new launches and robust demand for SUVs amidst heatwave across the country last month.

Automakers had dispatched 3.28 lakh passenger vehicles to dealers in June last year.

In the January-June period, the PV sales also rose 7.6 per cent to 21.68 lakh, compared to 20.15 lakh units during the same period in 2023.

“Compared to June 2023, this year saw a growth of only 12,000 vehicles. This increase has come from the launch of new models,” Partho Banerjee, senior executive officer, marketing and sales at Maruti Suzuki India said.

PV wholesales at Maruti increased by 3 per cent year-on-year to 1.37 lakh units in June, compared to 1.33 lakh units during the same month in 2023.

Sales, however, at Hyundai were flat at 50,103 units last month. “SUVs have contributed strongly, accounting for 66 per cent of our domestic sales. The new Hyundai Creta has been a key driver for domestic H1 sales with 91,348 units sold,” said Tarun Garg, COO, Hyundai Motor India.

Sales at Tata Motors also dipped 8 per cent to 43,624 units in June.

“The passenger vehicle industry saw a decline in retails in May and June, influenced by the general elections and heat waves across the country. Tata

Motors wholesales of 1.38 lakh cars and SUVs in Q1 FY25 remained flat compared to Q1 FY24,” said Shailesh Chandra, MD, Tata Motors Passenger Vehicles and Tata Passenger Electric Mobility.

Sales at Mahindra jumped 23 per cent at 40,022 units, compared to 32,588 units in June 2023.

“We sold a total of 40,022 SUVs in June, which has been a momentous month, as we rolled out the 2,00,000th XUV700,” said Veejay Nakra, president, automotive division, M&M.

Sales at Toyota Kirloskar Motor went up a record 40 per cent year-on-year to 27,474 units last month.

Kia sales also soared 9.8 per cent to 21,300 units last month, compared to the 19,391 units sold in June 2023.

While sales at Honda Cars stood at 4,804 units, JSW MG Motor retailed 4,644 units in June.

Mfg. rebounds on high demand

Firms increase hiring at fastest pace in over 19 years: Survey

MADHUSUDAN SAHOO NEW DELHI, JULY 1

India's manufacturing activity in June witnessed a rebound, thanks to strong demand leading to the fastest rate of hiring in more than 19 years, a private survey showed on Monday.

The seasonally adjusted HSBC India manufacturing purchasing managers' Index or PMI increased from 57.5 in May to 58.3 in June, indicating a sharper improvement in business conditions. In PMI parlance, a print above 50 means expansion, while a score below 50 denotes contraction.

June data showed that the stronger expansion in sales at manufacturers in India was largely due to

buoyant underlying demand, higher export volumes and successful advertising.

As a consequence of ongoing increases in new order intakes, firms stepped up recruitment. The rate of job creation was sharp and the strongest seen since data collection started in March 2005.

Maitreyi Das, global economist at HSBC, said that the Indian manufacturing sector ended the June quarter on a stronger footing.

“The headline manufacturing PMI rose by 0.8 percentage points to 58.3 in June, supported by increased new orders and output. Consequently, firms increased their hiring at the fastest pace in

over 19 years and input-buying activity also rose during the month,” Das said.

On the price front, Das further said that input costs moderated slightly in June, but remained at elevated levels.

“Manufacturers were able to pass on higher costs to customers, as demand remained robust, resulting in improved

margin. While the overall outlook for the manufacturing sector remains positive, the future output index receded to a three-month low, albeit it remains above the historical average,” Das added.

However the survey said that staff expenses reportedly intensified in June, which coupled with rising material and transportation costs caused another

overall increase in operating expenses.

“Manufacturers in India were able to share additional cost burdens with their clients amid conducive demand conditions. Selling charges were raised to the greatest extent in over two years,” it said.

“Meanwhile, new export orders increased substantially in June. Companies attributed higher inflows of new work from overseas to better demand from Asia, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Europe and the US. The outlook for the manufacturing sector remained positive, with nearly 29 per cent of panellists expecting output growth over the coming year,” the survey noted.

Demand for consumer goods to rebound on rural growth

SANGEETHA G CHENNAI, JULY 1

Consumer companies are likely to see a recovery in volume growth in FY25 as private consumption picks up with better rural growth. The overall consumption growth in FY24 was mostly price-led and inflationary.

In nine months of FY24 results of large consumer players showed nil to lower single-digit volume growth. This was partly due to subdued rural growth, which is more volume focused.

India Ratings expects overall volumes to recover gradually in FY25, led by the rural segment as the staples pack is more rural market focused and the weakness in real wage



growth may still be fresh in consumer's mindset.

Consumption growth had plummeted to 4 per cent in FY24 against 6.8 per cent in FY23.

A rise in private consumption is likely in FY25, led by a volume-led recovery in rural demand.

While growth rates would remain polarised with premium products and services showing higher growth rates than the value segment, the growth disparity would moderate

in FY25.

After a weak FY24, the recovery in rural demand in FY25 would be led by the expectations of a normal monsoon and moderating inflation, which would support volume growth in the staples categories like food, home care and personal care.

Over FY20-FY23, the discretionary segment has outperformed the staples category, as discretionary is more urban focused. These include consumer durables, jewellery, paints and quick service restaurants.

Segments such as quick service restaurants and jewellery have shown robust growth backed by store expansion and strong underlying demand trends.



RBI TO EASE CROSS-BORDER PAYMENTS

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Monday said that it has joined with the Bank for International Settlements (BIS) and central banks of four Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) countries to collaborate on project Nexus - a platform to facilitate instantaneous cross border retail payments.

Nexus, conceptualised by the innovation hub of the BIS, aims to connect the FPSs of four Asean countries (Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, and Thailand); and India, who would be the founding members and first mover countries of this platform.

“The central bank has been collaborating bilaterally with various countries, tries to link India's fast payments system (FPS) – the unified payments interface (UPI), with their respective FPSs for cross-border person to person and person to merchant payments,” the RBI said.

Markets hit new levels, m-cap at ₹443 lakh cr

Market benchmarks Sensex and Nifty-50 gained over half per cent to close at new highs on heavy buying by domestic institutional investors.

Broader markets also rallied which led to BSE's market capitalisation stood at over ₹443.05 lakh crore (\$5.31 trillion).

BSE mid-cap index gained 1.11 per cent while BSE small-cap index gained 1.58 per cent.

Domestic institutions were net buyers of equities worth ₹3,917.43 crore while foreign portfolio investors were net sellers by ₹426.03 crore.

“The month of July commenced on a positive note, dismissing any overly stretched parameters. The sustained uptrend is driven by sectoral rotation, broader participation, and a notable absence of challenges and pessimism on a global scale,” said Osho Krishan, senior analyst - Technical & Derivative Research, Angel One.

IT stocks were in focus



and the BSE IT index clocked a maximum gain of 1.84 per cent. Tier II IT firms registered even bigger gains. Telecom index also gained 1.03 per cent, followed by consumer durables (0.88 per cent).

“Quality companies are getting disproportionate flows while fund managers are forced to allocate capital even at elevated valuations. However, we are extremely bullish as we expect buoyancy in tax collections, stability in policy environment, new expected private capex, increased efficiency of PSU to name a few but perhaps most importantly, as soon as allocation to Indian government bonds due to inclusion in the JPM GBI index will bring in flows to bond markets, but also bring flows to the equity market to maintain bond vs equity allocation in global portfolios,” said Abhishek Banerjee, smallcase Manager and Founder, Lotusdew, a wealth management firm.

Mercedes-Benz to unveil new models

Sindelfingen, Germany, July 1: Mercedes-Benz is gearing up to unveil a slew of new models after its first generation of battery cars fell short.

The product offensive over the next two to three years will also see the S-Class maker pivot to spending more on its lucrative lineup of fuel-burning vehicles. Top-level buyers in particular keep reaching for our high-tech combustion engine cars, chief executive officer Ola Kallenius said.

“We need flexibility for longer, until deep into the 2030s,” Kallenius said,

keeping intact the company's goal of being carbon-neutral by 2039. “We remain committed to offering electric versions of the entire lineup this decade but we have to ensure our combustion-

engine cars remain competitive.”

The premium carmaker has pared back plans on electrification after demand slowed. But Mercedes is also trailing rivals like BMW AG after

its EV lineup put off buyers with high prices and design missteps. Battery vehicle sales fell 9 per cent during the first quarter to 50,500 units while its Munich-based competitor surged to 82,700 vehicles.

The EQS, available since 2021 and billed as one of the most significant launches in decades, in particular has fallen short, drawing unflattering comparisons to a jelly-bean amid low sales.

The \$117,100 sedan's sloping roof to maximise aerodynamics cramped many of the chauffeur-driven customers, espe-

cially among buyers in China, who missed status-symbol details like Mercedes' characteristic three-pointed star on the hood.

Next year will kick off the next generation of vehicles built on new underpinnings, starting with the entry-level CLA coupe and later the GLB SUV. During a preview of the upcoming suite of cars in Sindelfingen, Kallenius was keen to demonstrate sufficient roominess in even the smaller models, squeezing his tall frame into the back seats.

TEAM INDIA REMAIN STRANDED IN BARBADOS DUE TO HURRICANE

Bridgetown (Barbados), July 1: The victorious Indian cricket team remains stranded in Barbados after a Category 4 hurricane hit the Caribbean islands here in the wee hours of Monday, delaying its departure back home by at least another day.

The Rohit Sharma-led side has stayed put in a five-star hotel since its triumph over South Africa in the T20 World Cup final here on Saturday.

As per the forecast, life-threatening winds and storm lashed Barbados and nearby islands on Monday. The country,

with a population of close to three lakh, has been in a lockdown since Sunday evening.

The main international airport is shut until further notice with water and electricity supply also getting disrupted.

"Like you people, we are also stuck here. First we need to see how to get the players and everyone out of here safely and then we will think about the felicitation upon arrival in India," said BCCI secretary Jay Shah, who got here ahead of the big final.

The squad, along with top BCCI officials includ-

ing Jay Shah, was supposed to leave for India via a charter flight on Monday but it was not possible due to the closure of the airport. The BCCI is also trying to get the travelling Indian media out of the hurricane-hit region.

"There was a charter flight we were trying for Monday but the airport is shut so that option is gone. We are in touch with multiple charter operators but it all depends on the airport operations. As per the current state of affairs, no plane can land or take off." — PTI

India down gritty Proteas in one-off Test

CHENNAI, JULY 1

India women clinched their third consecutive Test victory on Monday, but only after a gruelling toil against a spirited South Africa at the M.A. Chidambaram Stadium.

The 10-wicket victory helped India equal the longest winning run in women's Test history, a record shared with their own hat-trick between 2006 and 2014 and Australia's three such streaks.

Harmanpreet Kaur & Co, fresh off their dominance in the ODI series against the same opponents in

Bengaluru, had continued their ascendancy early in the Test. However, the Proteas women scripted a story of extraordinary determination post-lunch on Day 2. India's first innings total of 603/6 declared seemed insurmountable, leaving many to believe the visitors would struggle to avoid the follow-on. They defied expectations.

Beginning the final day at 232 for two, South Africa managed to post a total of 373, making India sweat for 154 overs in their second innings. India chased down the target of 37 in 9.2 overs, but the South Africans, with limited red-

ball exposure, deserved credit for making it a real contest.

Skipper Laura Wolvaardt and one-drop Sune Luus spearheaded the revival with splendid centuries, while Nadine de Klerk's resolute batting

kept the contest alive until the final session. Indian bowlers faced a tough challenge, particularly in the morning session, where 30 overs yielded 70 runs and three wickets. The afternoon session saw a more subdued performance from South Africa, scoring 34 runs in 29 overs with de Klerk playing a graver's role.

The red-soil pitch at Chennai, known for being slow and low, added to the challenge, making it a true test of character for both teams.

Off-spinner Sneha Sharma, who added two more wickets to her first-innings haul of eight, became only

the second Indian to achieve a 10-wicket match haul, following in the footsteps of the legendary Jhulan Goswami.

India's skipper, Harmanpreet Kaur, who equalled Mithali Raj's record as India's most successful women's Test captain with three wins, praised her team's perseverance.

"We had to work hard for it. It was not easy to field for so many overs. Hats off to our bowlers, especially our spinners.

"They kept bowling and had that belief that they could take those wickets to win the game," Harmanpreet said.

England avoid shock as Spain ease into quarter

Cologne (Germany), July 1: England escaped an embarrassing exit from Euro 2024 on Sunday as they came from behind to beat Slovakia in extra time and reach the quarterfinals, while Spain defeated surprise packages Georgia 4-1 to set up a mouthwatering quarterfinal showdown with hosts Germany.

A Jude Bellingham overhead kick deep in injury time and a Harry Kane strike early in extra time allowed England to beat Slovakia 2-1 in their last-16 tie in Gelsenkirchen.

It was very nearly another ignominious exit for England that would have rivalled their defeat by Iceland at the same stage of Euro 2016.

They fell behind to Ivan Schranz's 25th-minute

goal for Slovakia and were on their way out of the competition as a Phil Foden equaliser was disallowed for offside.

But Bellingham's moment of inspiration five minutes into stoppage time at the end of the game saved Gareth Southgate's side, as the Real Madrid man acrobatically turned home Marc Guehi's flick-on from a throw-in.

Slovakia's resistance was broken, and England got what proved to be the winner a minute into the extra period.

Substitute Ivan Toney headed Eberechi Eze's mishit shot back across goal for Kane to power home his second goal of

the tournament. That set up a quarterfinal meeting with Switzerland on Saturday in Dusseldorf.

GEORGIA GIVE SPAIN SCARE

There was also a scare for Spain in the late game in Cologne, as they fell behind against Georgia when Robin Le Normand put through his own net in the 18th minute.

It was the eighth own goal scored at this year's competition and the first time Spain had conceded at all after they registered three clean sheets during the group phase.

However, Spain had beaten Willy Sagnol's Georgia side twice in qualifying, winning 7-1 away and 3-1 at home, and their class ultimately told on a rainy night. — AFP

Alcaraz starts title defence with win

London, July 1: Carlos Alcaraz defeated 269th-ranked qualifier Mark Lajal at the start of his Wimbledon title defence on Monday as Andy Murray decided whether or not to call a halt to his All England Club singles career.

As action got under way, Australian Open champion Aryna Sabalenka was heading home after withdrawing from the tournament with a shoulder injury.

Two-time Wimbledon semi-finalist Sabalenka, ranked third in the world, is one of eight players to have pulled out since the draw was made.

Alcaraz, still only 21, is chasing his fourth Grand Slam title and hopes to become just the sixth man after Rod Laver, Bjorn Borg, Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic to win the French Open and Wimbledon back-to-back.

Opening the Centre Court programme, the Spanish star recovered from a break down in each of the first two sets to see off the dreadlocked Lajal 7-6 (7/3), 7-5, 6-2.

"He played a really good match, he obviously surprised me a little bit because I didn't have the chance to see him play a lot," said Alcaraz.

Russian fifth seed Daniil Medvedev reached the second round and admitted he was happy not to be playing on the All England Club's famed Centre Court.

Medvedev, a semi-finalist last year, hit 16 aces in his 6-3, 6-4, 6-2 win over

ANAND CLINCHES LEON MASTERS FOR 10TH TIME

Leon (Spain), July 1: Five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand proved his mettle once again and defeated Spaniard Jaime Santos Latasa 3-1 in the finals to win the Leon Masters for a 10th time here.

The 54-year-old Anand, who lived in Spain for many years before shifting his base back to Chennai, proved yet again that this was one of his favourite hunting grounds. It was in 1996, or 28 years back, that Anand won his first title here.

The format featured four players with his compatriot Arjun Erigaise, the world number four, as the fourth seed and Bulgarian Veselin Topalov being the other

two players in the tournament. Each round featured four games of 20 minutes each with a 10-second increment after every move.

Arjun had lost to Santos Latasa in the second semifinals by a score of 1.5-2.5 which was considered a sensational victory for the latter given the vast difference in the ratings.

Earlier in the first semifinal, the legendary duel between Topalov and Anand had ended in favour of the Indian who won the third game before drawing the remaining three.

Though the scoreline suggests otherwise, Anand conceded that it was not so easy. — PTI

GUKESH WON'T CHALLENGE CHINA'S LIREN ON HOME TURF

New Delhi, July 1: India's efforts to secure a home World Championships match for D. Gukesh came to nought with Singapore pipping Delhi and Chennai to claim hosting rights for the premier chess contest which will pit the youngest Challenger in the history against defending champion Ding Liren from China.

The Tamil Nadu government and All India Chess Federation (AICF) had submitted separate bids to FIDE, the world chess body.

The match, which will offer a prize money of \$2.5 million, will be held between November 20 and December 15 this year.

"After reviewing the bids and inspecting all potential host cities for their venues, amenities, event programs, and opportunities, the International Chess Federation has selected Singapore as the host of the World Championship Match," FIDE said in a release. — PTI
