

NYPD recruit, all set to graduate, dies in training

An NYPD recruit died Wednesday during training, police said.

EMS rushed Officer Edgar Ordonez from the scene at Rodmans Neck in the Bronx to Jacobi Medical Center, but he could not be saved.

The recruit, who was in his 30s and would have graduated from the Police Academy on Monday, suffered a medical episode about 11:25 a.m.

Police sources said the heat could have been a factor.

Officers undergo firearms training at Rodmans Neck, though it wasn't immediately clear what the recruit was doing when he collapsed.

Police Commissioner Edward Caban lamented Ordonez's passing.

"Our hearts are heavy as we honor our fallen brother, Probationary Police Officer Edgar Ordonez," Caban posted on X. "We tragically lost Edgar earlier today, just a few days before he was set to graduate and join his fellow


"As we continue to grieve this terrible loss, we will keep Edgar's family, friends, and fellow officers in our thoughts and prayers."

Patrick Hendry, head of the Police Benevolent Association, called Ordonez "a beacon of joy

and positive energy for his fellow recruits."

"He had the drive and determination necessary to become a New York City police officer, and he was just days away from hitting the streets and making a difference in protecting our

city," Hendry said in a statement. "From the moment a police officer is sworn into the Police Academy, they become part of our Blue Family. Now we must focus on being there for his family as they deal with this unimaginable loss."



BALDWIN WAS 'AN ACTOR, ACTING'

Alec's lawyer tells jury he 'committed no crime' and was just doing his job

The first day of Alec Baldwin's manslaughter trial for the 2021 shooting of cinematographer Halyna Hutchins got underway in New Mexico on Wednesday, with the defense telling jurors the actor "committed no crime" in the "unspeakable tragedy."

Baldwin, the star and co-producer of the Western film "Rust," was pointing a gun at Hutchins during a rehearsal at Santa Fe's Bonanza Creek Ranch on Oct. 21, 2021. The gun unexpectedly went off, killing 42-year-old Hutchins and wounding director Joel Souza.

The 66-year-old actor, who's charged with felony involuntary manslaughter, has pleaded not guilty. He maintains his innocence, saying he was not responsible for the live bullet loaded into the prop gun.

His fate now lies in the hands of a jury, all

of whom were selected Tuesday. If convicted, the Hollywood powerhouse could face up to 18 months behind bars.

During his opening statement, Baldwin's defense lawyer told jurors his client hadn't committed any crimes because he was just doing his job.

"He was an actor, acting," attorney Alex Spiro said, adding Baldwin had been told multiple times the firearm was "cold."

Prosecutor Erlinda Johnson, however, accused Baldwin of declining standard safety checks and acting recklessly on that fateful day. "When someone plays make-believe with a real gun in a real-life workplace and while playing make-believe with that gun, violates the cardinal rules of firearm safety, peoples' lives are endangered, and someone could be killed," Johnson told the jurors.

Spiro replied that on the set of a movie, "safety has to happen before the prop is

placed into an actor's hands?"

He added "no one saw [Baldwin] intentionally pull the trigger," but even if he had, "on a movie set, you're allowed to pull that trigger. That doesn't make it a homicide."

He emphasized that ensuring safety was the responsibility of the film's armorer, Hannah Gutierrez-Reed, who has already been convicted of involuntary manslaughter and sentenced to 18 months in prison.

The first witness called to take the stand was Nicholas LeFleur, the first law enforcement officer to arrive at the ranch after the shooting. Jurors saw body camera footage of the scene, in which Baldwin is seen telling LeFleur he "was holding the gun."

LeFleur, who was a deputy at the Santa Fe Sheriff's Department at the time, is also seen telling Baldwin not to speak to other potential witnesses.

When special prosecutor Kari Morrissey

asked LeFleur if he had handled the situation correctly, he said, "Probably not. But it's what happened."

Baldwin's defense tried to establish that neither LeFleur nor the trial's second witness, former Sheriff's Lt. Tim Benavidez, treated the scene properly. Benavidez admitted he did not wear gloves or take careful forensic precautions when collecting the gun in the wake of the shooting.

The courtroom was reportedly filled to capacity Wednesday, with the actor's wife, Hilaria Baldwin; his younger brother Stephen Baldwin, and older sister Elizabeth Keuchler among the friends and family members in attendance.

The jury was sent home shortly before 5 p.m. local time and will reconvene Thursday morning. The trial is expected to conclude July 19.

Cops released surveillance video Wednesday of the masked gunman wanted for shooting a DJ to death at a Fourth of July Queens house party.

The shooter, wearing a ski mask, white T-shirt and black shorts, crept up with gun in hand,

the video shows.

Victim Travanti Rankine, 37, was shot in the chest during a bash at a home on Montauk St. near 119th Road in St. Albans about 5 a.m. last Thursday.

Rankine was outside the party with other celebrants when two guests began arguing and shots were fired, cops said.

He was hit in the right side

and was rushed to Jamaica Hospital, where he died.

Police have not yet determined if Rankine was involved in the fight or was just a bystander.

The gunman ran off.

Rankine, a father of two, worked as an electrician at Carle Place High School on Long Island, but his passion was DJing.

The Jamaican native enjoyed

being a “Sing J” and would bust out raps and rhymes while playing Jamaican reggae tracks.

“I feel weak. I just can’t believe it,” Rankine’s wife, Sasha-Marie, told the Daily News shortly after the killing. “I’m devastated.

“He should still be here. It was not his time,” she continued, weeping.

“I don’t care what nobody

says. There was no reason for him to die. There was no reason for that.”

Cops are asking the public’s help identifying and tracking down the killer.

2 wounded in Midtown subway knife attacks

Two people were wounded in back-to-back knife attacks at two Midtown subway stations, cops said Wednesday.

The mayhem began in the Times Square-42nd St. station when a 31-year-old man got into an argument with four men in their 20s waiting on the A/C/E platform about 11:30 p.m. on Tuesday, cops said.

As the argument heated up, one of the four foes pulled a blade and stabbed the victim in the torso, cops said.

Medics rushed the wounded man to Bellevue Hospital, where he was expected to recover. His attackers were last seen running down the Brooklyn-bound A/C/E platform, cops said. No arrests had been made.

About four hours later, an unhinged man attacked a couple sitting on a bench waiting

for the No. 7 train at the 42nd St.-Bryant Park station, cops said.

The two victims, a 26-year-old woman and 25-year-old man, were waiting for the train when the assailant stormed up to them and began arguing with them without provocation about 3:40 a.m., cops said.

He then started punching the man. When the assailant assaulted the woman, the male victim interceded, continuing the fight with the attacker.

During the struggle, the attacker pulled out a switchblade and slashed the man in the forearm before running out of the station.

Cops caught up with suspect Michael Hernandez near 42nd St. and Seventh Ave. He was taken to an area hospital for a psychological examination and was ultimately charged with assault and weapons possession.

His arraignment in Manhattan Criminal Court was pending Wednesday. His two victims were taken to Bellevue Hospital with minor wounds.

The two attacks come as cops have seen a 6% drop in assaults in the city’s transit system so far this year. As of Sunday, cops had investigated 285 assaults in the subway, 21 fewer than by the same time last year. Cops have also seen an overall 6% drop in crime in the subway system, officials said.

Following several high-profile shootings and random attacks in the subway earlier this year, the NYPD sent nearly 2,000 additional officers underground. About 800 new cops were assigned to transit in March as part of a new initiative to crack down on fare evasion.

Gov. Hochul sent the National Guard into the city’s subway stations to conduct bag checks at major transit hubs.

While transit crime has ebbed, crimes in and around Times Square have seen slight increases.

Early Tuesday, a 55-year-old man was stabbed to death during a clash between tenants in a Times Square supportive housing residence. Suspect Kevin Yong, 38, was arrested at the scene and charged with manslaughter.

By the end of June, cops had investigated three murders in the Times Square area this year, one more than by this time last year. There had also been a 10% jump in assaults, from 238 to 264. There were four shootings, two more than last year, cops said.

The assaults included a bloody brawl on Broadway near W. 46th St. that left one man stabbed on June 27 and an incident where a man was stabbed with a machete during a Times Square turf war among CD vendors at W. 45th St. and Broadway on May 30.

DJ SLAIN IN FOOD SPAT

‘Mr. Cool’ fatally beaten by ex-con who claimed he raided fridge: cops

A beloved DJ known as “Mr. Cool,” fatally beaten in his Bronx home, was attacked for raiding a housemate’s refrigerator, police revealed Tuesday.

The night of the June 23 attack, victim Mark Gocul, 50, showed up at Montefiore Mount Vernon Hospital for help and was quickly transferred to Westchester County Medical Center for further care.

He was able to talk with cops before succumbing to his injuries on July 6.

A fellow tenant in his Furman Ave. home near E. 239th St. in Wakefield attacked him at 7:30 a.m. after accusing him of “touching his s-t,” NYPD Chief

of Detectives Joseph Kenny said.

“DJ Cool apparently took something out of his refrigerator,” Kenny explained.

Gocul and his attacker, identified as Robert Hector, 34, both lived in the two-family home, which was cut down into smaller residential units.

Hector allegedly punched and kicked Gocul multiple times in the face, leaving his victim with head injuries that included several orbital fractures and a brain bleed, police said.

“He was injured so severely at one point he goes into cardiac arrest,” Kenny said. The city medical examiner deemed his death a homicide.

Hector fled the home after the attack and has not been caught by cops.

The suspect has an extensive criminal history and was charged


with attempted murder in 2015 after he assaulted a man with a hammer, Kenny said.

Hector did three stints in prison, most recently in 2020 after he was given a two-year sentence for attempted robbery. His parole ended last year, officials said.

Brokenhearted pals described Gocul as a “staple in the uptown music industry” and “the coolest dude” whose violent end came as a complete shock.

“He was a good person. Never no argument with people, none of that,” one friend, John Clarke, 34, said after his death. “He was a very calm person. He loved his music. He was a good friend. He was a real good friend.”

Stray bullet killed YouTuber

Vic's brother, cops agree he was unintended target in Harlem drive-by

A sports fanatic with more than 33,000 YouTube followers killed in a drive-by shooting was the victim of a stray bullet, police and his brother said Wednesday.

"Someone he was chilling with was being targeted and he was hit with a stray bullet," victim Jeremy "Jeremiah" Cummings' brother Andre said. "He didn't deserve that. My brother's gone, and it's something that me and my family are dealing with. I hope everybody keeps him in their prayers."

After firing the shots that killed 37-year-old Cummings near W. 118th St. and Frederick Douglass Blvd. in Harlem about 1:35 p.m. on July 2, the gunman sped off only to slam into the back of a van at a red light, cops say.

"The van refuses to move, so the car reverses down the street but gets boxed in," NYPD Chief of Detectives Joseph Kenny said, describing the killer's wild escape.

"He abandons the car, runs off on foot, and goes to Lenox Ave. where he robs two teens of their

Citi Bike at gunpoint and flees the scene."

Cummings was "an unintended target," Kenny said. The victim had no criminal history or gang ties.

Surveillance video obtained by the Daily News shows Cummings talking with at least three men next to a black Dodge Charger parked on the corner. As they quarrel, a white Honda sedan slowly drives by, and someone inside fires off shots.

The men scatter, and Cummings, who fell to the ground, starts to crawl around the Charger, a bullet wound in his back. He briefly stands up, staggers to the sidewalk and collapses.

"Prior to this incident the victim is simply standing on the corner with a group of friends, about four to five gentlemen," Kenny said. "Video shows the shooter arrive in a white Honda. He gets to the corner, he slows down, lowers his passenger window. Several shots are fired, striking our victim, causing his demise."

The shooter, identified as 21-year-old Mohamed Sawaneh, 21, has not been caught.

"He has no prior arrest record," Kenny said of Sawaneh, "just a warrant for a 2021 disorderly

conduct summons."

It's not clear why the gunman shot at the group Cummings was standing with, Kenny said.

"We still don't know the motive," he said. "There is some gang activity in the area."

Cummings built a following over the past three years on YouTube as "JermSportsTV," posting pro sports clips and videos from the Madden '24 video game.

Cummings' athletic career began at 7 years old and he later played baseball and basketball at Martin Van Buren High School in Queens, his older brother Andre told the Daily News on Wednesday. Jeremy, despite standing 5-foot-8, was a gifted athlete who excelled at every sport he played.

So good was the young Cummings that he was invited to transfer to Bayside High School, also in Queens, where his cousins NFL players Ronnie, Derrick and Kevin Harmon had blossomed.

But Cummings wanted to stay at Van Buren with his friends, a decision Andre said kept the victim from playing college ball.

"My honest opinion, if he went on to Bayside and played football and had that life, I don't think it would have led him to the

streets," Andre said.

Their mother died when they were young, and they were raised first by their grandmother and then by their mother's sister. After she died, they lived with her husband, their uncle Jessie Harmon, whose three sons starred at Bayside High School and in the NFL.

"Once my uncle realized how athletic Jeremy was he took him under his wing a little bit more," Andre said. "He was teaching Jeremy everything, schemes, everything that comes to baseball and football. I wish he was 6'2" or taller. He would have had a different life."

"He was never gang-related," Andre added. "He was just associated with people in that life. He was never a part of that lifestyle, I guess you could say."

His brother's slaying came out of nowhere. "I'm certainly shocked. It's crazy," Andre said. "I live all the way in Seattle, and it's hard to deal with this and not be able to be home."

"Nobody had any issues with him," he added. "Everybody showed him love up in Harlem."

Cummings had recently moved from a shelter into supportive housing and helped build sidewalk cafes for several local

restaurants like the Fox Harlem. He also helped canvass for local political campaigns and did work in schools.

"He was showing me the different eateries and establishments that he helped erect and helped advertise and things like that," Andre said. "I was very proud of that. That showed there was a point to where if Jeremy were to get old he would have been part of the community in building it."

But where his brother excelled was sports, and his popular YouTube page showed it.

"When it came to his YouTube page, he was very knowledgeable," Andre said. "He knew defensive schemes, kick-return schemes. He was always sports-oriented."

Andre thinks his brother could have been a coach at the high school or college level if things had turned out differently.

"I didn't see my brother as a street guy," Andre said. "I saw him as a smart guy who knew how to stay out of trouble. It's unfortunate how this came about."



SLAY SUSPECT 'PULLED GUN'

Man charged in trash-bag dump of woman flashed weapon: neighbors

In the hours leading up to the arrest of the main suspect in the slaying of Yazmeen Williams, the man twice pulled a gun on people from the neighborhood who confronted him about the gruesome death, according to cops and one of the men he allegedly threatened, who spoke exclusively to the Daily News.

"He pulled it from under the seat like he was sitting on it," Antwone Frazier, 47, said of Chad Irish, who uses a wheelchair.

Irish, 55, was charged with second-degree murder Wednesday for allegedly slaying Williams, 31, whose decomposing corpse was found tossed out next to trash outside a Kips Bay apartment building Friday.

Irish, who was arrested Monday, denied all the allegations against him as he was led out of

the NYPD's 13th Precinct stationhouse in a wheelchair on Wednesday as police continued to search for the gun that killed Williams. The victim was shot in the head at close range.

"I didn't do anything. I haven't the slightest idea what you're talking about. Who is Yazmeen?" Irish told reporters. "They said I did something to somebody. I didn't do anything."

Along with murder, Irish was charged with weapon possession and concealment of a human corpse.

Hours before cops carried Irish on a stretcher out of his building on E. 28th St. near Second Ave. in the Straus Houses as an angry mob swarmed him, Frazier, a former neighbor, spotted him a block away.

"He doesn't ever really come outside," Frazier said of the 9:30 a.m. encounter. "You never come outside, so why you outside now? Things didn't sit right."

When he and a friend approached Irish about Williams' killing, the cornered Irish allegedly

threatened them with a gun.

Frazier said that was the first of two times Irish menaced him with a gun Monday — an allegation Irish denied.

"I didn't flash a gun at anybody," the suspect said Wednesday evening.

Rumors began swirling around the neighborhood when police discovered Williams' body, with locals quickly assuming Irish, who she was living with, had something to do with her death and sparking neighbors to confront him for days, according to Frazier. Their suspicions increased when cops said they had recovered video of a man in an electric wheelchair dragging the corpse down the sidewalk before dumping it.

Irish is capable of walking but often uses a wheelchair to get around, police and neighbors say.

"We heard the guy in the wheelchair had told [a neighbor] that he wheeled that bag over there," Frazier told the Daily News. "A lot of people were approaching him."

Later Monday, Frazier and Irish came face to face again in

Bellevue South Park.

"He just showed up. I said 'Yo, what did you do to that young girl?'" recounted Frazier.

Irish again threatened him with a gun, said Frazier.

Frazier called 911, also reporting the earlier incident, and began to pursue Irish.

"When I gave chase, everybody in the park followed."

Irish pulled out a gun and "menaced" the crowd that began surrounding him, according to police.

"Several people from the neighborhood were quite angry with Mr. Irish over this incident, and they surrounded him and he produced a pistol and menaced them. He then fled the location back to his apartment, where he was placed under arrest by detectives and patrol," NYPD Chief of Detectives Joseph Kenny said Tuesday.

"He's very fast in that wheelchair," said Frazier. "He barreled through people, made it in the elevator and made it upstairs."

As Irish hunkered down in his

apartment, the crowd only grew outside the lobby of the building, as seen in surveillance video obtained by The News. At the same time, police were on their way to the building to take the suspect into custody for dumping Williams' body.

"They said, 'You really helped us,'" Frazier said of the police.

Irish was attacked by the mob — which grew to include members of Williams' family who were tending to the nearby memorial where her body was found — as police and medics carried him out on a stretcher and into a waiting ambulance.

In addition to being charged with concealing Williams' corpse, Irish is charged with two counts of weapon possession and menacing for his confrontations with neighbors Monday, cops said.

Irish, who has an extensive criminal history dating back to 1985, has a twin brother, police sources say, who sometimes uses the suspect's name and date of birth. The twin even served two years in prison for robbery under Irish's name. **With Thomas Tracy**

Menendez defense rests

Att’y raps bribe case vs. N.J. pol as ‘rolling blob of inferences’

Sen. Robert Menendez’s lawyer wrapped up his closing statement on Wednesday, calling prosecutors’ case “shaky and rotten to its core” and attempting to appeal to jurors’ sense of patriotism as he asked a Manhattan Federal Court jury to acquit the New Jersey Democrat.

“They did a lot of work — they don’t have it,” attorney Adam Fee said of the evidence in the case, which includes phone records, video surveillance, search history and GPS records. “They don’t have the proof. They did all that, all that hard work that they’re proud of ... but they have nothing more than a story.”

Menendez has been charged with 18 counts of bribery and obstruction for accepting bribes in exchange for using his influence as head of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations to help New Jersey businessmen and serve foreign governments.

His wife, Nadine Menendez, and the two businessmen, Wael Hana and Fred Daibes, are also defendants, although Nadine’s trial has been postponed.

Fee argued that Menendez’s actions with Egypt were made in the interest of his constituents and said there was “no evidence” the senator ever took a bribe.

“More theories, more rolling blob of shifting and evolving

inferences that you just know is true because there’s devastating evidence,” Fee said in a mocking tone. “Ask yourself when you hear that — where is it? Where is it? Do I trust the story? What about all the stuff you abandoned? What about the stuff you didn’t mention?”

He claimed that Menendez didn’t have influence over an agriculture official, Ted McKinney, who he’s been accused of telling to “stop interfering” with Hana’s halal company, and that he had no knowledge of his wife, Nadine, getting help with her mortgage or car payments.

Fee said that Nadine, who wed the senator in 2020, kept her husband in the dark, attempting to

hide from her husband the “chaos and drama of her life” and present an image “that was a little rosy.”

“That’s the whole point of Instagram, right?” Fee said. “It’s a little bit better than reality.”

Calling the prosecutors “mistaken” and the case “jumbled,” he implored the jury to “resist the temptation to pick the salacious story about a corrupt politician.”

“The United States of America wins when thin cases brought by overzealous prosecutors are rejected when the evidence isn’t there,” he said. “That will be a win for this country.”

Larry Lustberg, Wael Hana’s lawyer, didn’t dispute that his client gave the Menendezes good

bars — but said they were “goodwill gifts” and decried the prosecutors making it seem that “generosity” was “evil.”

He also argued that the \$30,000 Hana paid Nadine was a loan that could have been a gift, but not a bribe.

“Was that a good investment, to pay her \$30,000? Who knows?” he said.

Cesar de Castro, lawyer for real estate developer Fred Daibes, described his client’s “celebrity” status in his hometown of Edgewater, N.J., and his yearslong friendship with Menendez.

“Friends look out for each other,” de Castro said. “You don’t bribe a close friend.”

As Dems waver, ex-speaker ducks Biden's 'all-in' talk, says move can wait till after NATO summit

Former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi on Wednesday urged Democrats to give President Biden more time and space to decide whether to stay in the 2024 White House race, a statement that could be seen as nudging him to reconsider.

Heaping praise on Biden as “beloved,” Pelosi suggested fellow Democrats refrain from discussing Biden’s political future until the end of this week’s pivotal NATO summit that the president is leading.

“We’re all encouraging him to make that decision because time is running short,” Pelosi told Jonathan Lemire of NBC News on the “Morning Joe” program.

“I want him to do whatever he decides to do. And that’s the way it is,” she added. “Whatever he decides we go with.”

Lt. Gov. Antonio Delgado called on

Biden to quit the race to save the nation from former President Donald Trump.

“We should move forward with a nominee capable of reinvigorating and reenergizing Americans who are determined protect our democracy,” said Delgado, whose boss, Gov. Hochul, has so far strongly backed Biden.

Rep. Patrick Ryan (D-N.Y.), who represents a Hudson Valley swing district, also called on Biden to quit the race.

“For the good of our country, for my two young kids, I’m asking Joe Biden to step aside,” Ryan told The New York Times.

Biden will sit down for a 90-minute interview with NBC’s Lester Holt on Monday in Austin, Texas, as he continues to try to show detractors that he has what it takes. The president has insisted he’s not even considering stepping aside after his shaky debate performance raised

questions about his ability to beat Trump.

He wrote a letter to Congress this week saying he had decided to stay in the race and plans to accept the nomination at the Democratic National Convention in mid-August.

Given Biden’s firm stance, most prominent Democratic lawmakers have simply said they support his decision.

House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries (D-Brooklyn) said he backs Biden, and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) repeated three times that “I’m with Joe” on Tuesday as Congress returned from a break.

Pelosi’s remarks have raised some eyebrows because they suggest she doesn’t consider Biden’s decision to stay in the race as settled.

A handful of Democratic lawmakers have openly called on Biden to step aside, as have some public figures on the left.

Actor George Clooney, a longtime Democrat who met with Biden at a recent Hollywood fundraiser, joined the calls for Biden to quit the race in a New York Times opinion piece on Wednesday.

Others have vociferously backed Biden and called for an end to the debate over his future.

Trump has hinted that he hopes Biden stays in the race.

“I hope that he can carry it on,” Trump said Wednesday on Fox News Radio. “I just assume. We planned for him.”

Polls say Trump is the front-runner, especially after the debate. But some analysts warn that it’s way too early to pencil him in to return to power, even if Biden stays in the race.

“With some breaks, Biden can win,” said Larry Sabato, a University of Virginia political scientist. “People say Biden can’t win. No one knows that.”

Clooney latest celeb to give up on prez

Academy Award winner George Clooney has joined a growing list of liberal celebrities publicly telling President Biden it's time to exit stage left and quit the presidential race.

"It's devastating to say it, but the Joe Biden I was with three weeks ago at the fundraiser was not the Joe 'big F-ing deal' Biden of 2010," Clooney wrote in a Wednesday New York Times op-ed. "He wasn't even the Joe Biden of 2020. He was the same man we all witnessed at the debate."

Clooney (photo) was one of the most high-profile personalities to participate in a record-breaking \$30 million fundraiser in Los Angeles last month to support the 46th president's reelection bid.

He wrote in his op-ed that while he considers Biden a friend, he believes the octogenarian is losing "the fight against time."

The backlash against Biden began after the 81-year-old president bombed during a June 27 debate against Donald Trump. The Democratic stalwart showed few signs of mental acuity.


He became confused while answering questions and offered little resistance as his opponent rattled off a steady stream of disinformation during the 90-minute debacle.

Earlier this week, progressive horror novelist Stephen King and left-leaning filmmaker Rob Reiner publicly called for Biden to make room for another Democratic nominee to challenge Trump in November.

According to Clooney, he has privately spoken to lawmakers and governors who agree Biden isn't up for the task of defeating Trump. Biden and his surrogates insist the incumbent is staying in the race and will again defeat the GOP challenger he trounced in the 2020 presidential election.

But despite calling on Biden to bow out of the race, it's unlikely Clooney would support Trump under any circumstances. During a 2020 interview with Howard Stern, the 63-year-old "Michael Clayton" star mocked the former president as a "dumb goofball" desperate to hang out with celebrities and harass cocktail waitresses.

"He used to be *that* guy," Clooney recalled.



Cohen asks Supremes to reopen suit vs. Trump & Barr over 'zip-it' jailing

Michael Cohen asked the Supreme Court on Wednesday to reopen his lawsuit against Donald Trump and his Attorney General William Barr for being jailed in 2020 when he refused not to criticize the then-president.

In his request, the former Trump fixer asked the justices to review the case tossed in January and decide "whether there is any consequence for executives who incarcerate their critics."

Cohen, 57, was about halfway through a three-year sentence for doling out hush money on Trump's behalf and other crimes when the Bureau of Prisons released him to home confinement in May 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. He soon wound up back in a cell at upstate Otisville for 16 days after declining to immediately agree not to mouth off about Trump during his sentence while being outfitted for an ankle monitor.

In July 2020, Manhattan Federal Judge Alvin Hellerstein ordered Cohen's release and remarked that he'd apparently been retaliated against in a way he'd never seen on the bench.

"[He] was presented with a document that had no federal serial number attached to it — that all documents like it have — that had a paragraph with misspellings,

unusual syntax, and punctuation, that said he would not speak, write and would cause his family to not speak or write about anything related to the reasons he was in prison," Cohen's lawyer Jon Dougherty told the Daily News on Wednesday.

When Cohen (photo) asked if he had to agree to it, U.S. marshals said they would check with their superiors, court documents detail. They returned 90 minutes later with an order sending him back to prison. It's not clear who the marshals spoke with in that time.

Cohen filed claims against Trump, Barr and others in December 2021, alleging they conspired to imprison him. He sued them in their personal capacities, which the Supreme Court has allowed in "unusual" circumstances.

Manhattan Federal Judge Lewis Liman dismissed the suit in November 2022, writing that Cohen's release was the appropriate remedy and that he was bound by precedent but believed his jailing demonstrated "profound violence" to his constitutional rights. Liman described it as "nothing short of the use of executive power to lock up the president's political enemies for speaking critically of

him" and said there was nothing to deter it from happening again.

In January, the 2nd Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals affirmed Liman's ruling, which Cohen wants the Supreme Court to reconsider. He needs four justices to agree to its review.

"What could be more 'unusual' than a lawsuit ... that claims the President of the United States' most public and vociferous critic was incarcerated in retaliation for refusing to be silent?" Dougherty said.

"We are supposed to live in a country where everyone can say what they want

about the government without any fear that those words could lead them to a prison cell. ... As it stands right now, that could happen to you, and if it does happen, there is no penalty for the people who put you there."

Trump attorney Alina Habba cited presidential immunity and called Cohen's case "meritless." She referenced a 2022 Supreme Court decision in which the conservative majority blocked a similar suit seeking money from a federal official from proceeding in court and not through Congress. "If this case proceeds forward, I look forward to a decisive victory," Habba said.



Rudy is warned 'don't interrupt' by judge at chaotic bankruptcy hearing

Rudy Giuliani was warned by a judge to keep his mouth shut Wednesday after the ex-mayor interrupted an opposing lawyer at his chaotic bankruptcy hearing.

Judge Sean Lane threatened to push the mute button after Giuliani angrily erupted on speakerphone to yell at a lawyer for two Atlanta election workers who won a \$148 million defamation judgment against him over his campaign of lies.

"Everybody gets a chance to be heard, but you cannot interrupt someone else while they're being heard," the judge chided Giuliani.

The judge told lawyers for Giuliani and his creditors, including election workers Ruby Freeman and Shaye Moss, that he may decide as soon as Friday to pull the plug on Giuliani's entire bankruptcy case.

He cited a lack of "transparency" from the one-time personal lawyer for former President Donald

Trump.

"I'm leaning toward dismissal, frankly, because I'm concerned that the past is prologue and that issues about transparency will continue," said Lane, a bankruptcy judge in Manhattan Federal Court.

If the judge dismisses the bankruptcy case, Freeman and Moss could seek to immediately seize Giuliani's assets, including his multimillion-dollar homes in Manhattan and Florida.

Giuliani's lawyer told the judge he does not object to dismissing the case, even though it was Giuliani himself who filed for bankruptcy protection last December after a jury socked him with the massive judgment.

Without elaborating, he said Giuliani would have a better chance of upending the judgment on appeal if the bankruptcy case were dismissed.

Rachel Strickland, a lawyer for the two election workers, said they agree with dismissing the case because they fear Giuliani is

using the bankruptcy proceedings to "push pause" on his financial woes without making any changes to his lavish lifestyle.

She argued against an alternate plan to appoint a trustee to manage Giuliani's financial affairs, suggesting he would try to funnel cash and assets to entities outside the reach of creditors.

"If the case is dismissed, creditors will be able to hold 'America's mayor' accountable for the harms he's caused," she said.

Giuliani owns an opulent co-op on the Upper East Side that is on the market for \$5.7 million and a condo in Palm Beach, Fla.

Giuliani was found liable for engineering a disinformation campaign that accused Freeman and Moss of rigging votes for President Biden during ballot-counting in the Democratic stronghold of Fulton County, Ga.

Biden narrowly won Georgia, but Trump and Giuliani falsely claim the win was tainted by widespread fraud.

Gangster's Chinatown biz angle

Letter accuses notorious boss guilty in 5 slays of trying to buy into city-owned mall

A notorious Chinatown gangster with convictions for murder and extortion is trying to secretly buy a stake in the city-owned East Broadway Mall in lower Manhattan, according to a letter sent to the city Law Department and currently under review by the Adams administration.

The letter claims the potential investor is Guo Liang Chi — and is the same man who pleaded guilty to five murders three decades ago in connection to his leadership role in the feared Fuk Ching gang. According to news reports from the time, he ordered the murder of an insubordinate gang member, which resulted in the death of two men.

His connection to the business deal in Chinatown remains murky, but the letter — which was obtained by the Daily News — claims that it stems from the mall's current financial difficulties and, in part, from the fallout of a federal investigation involving key Adams aide Winnie Greco, who is connected to several potential investors in the mall.

Chinatown's East Broadway Mall has been in a state of flux since Terry Chan, the mall's current lease operator, declared bankruptcy in 2019 after struggling to pay off his mortgage as the number of businesses in the

building paying rent dwindled.

Amid Chan's bankruptcy proceedings, the Department of Citywide Administrative Services, which manages the city-owned building, has started the lengthy process of transferring the lease over to a new operator, Broadway East Group LLC, an entity composed of investors who, as first reported last year by Documented NY, maintain ties to Greco.

But in a previously unknown wrinkle, most of the BEG investors pulled out of the venture earlier this year, according to the letter sent late last month to the city Law Department by Chan's attorney, Sarah Keenan.

The letter says their exit from the deal came after the FBI raided Greco's Bronx homes in February. The scope of the investigation remains unclear, but reportedly include the feds scrutinizing trips that she and the mayor took to China that were allegedly bankrolled by Beijing's government. Neither Adams nor Greco have been accused of any wrongdoing.

In the old investors' place, a new group of financiers has stepped in to front the cash for the BEG.

Among them is Guo, who's better known to some by his nickname Ah Kay and was the head of Fuk Ching, a notoriously violent Fujianese Chinatown gang, according to the letter from Chan's attorney and news reports from the 1990s and 2000s.

Guo is perhaps best known for his

involvement in the Golden Venture, a boat that smuggled nearly 300 undocumented immigrants to the U.S. from China in the 1990s. After a monthslong journey, the boat ran aground off Rockaway Beach on June 6, 1993, forcing the dozens of immigrants onboard to try to swim ashore. Nearly a dozen men drowned in the waters off Queens.

Guo admitted to his involvement in the tragedy in 1995, as reported in The News at the time.

Prior to that, he was arrested in August 1993 in Hong Kong, extradited to the U.S. a year later and sentenced to prison after pleading guilty to five murders, according to news reports.

His initial 20-year sentence was reduced to 12 years after cutting a cooperation deal with the FBI in which he provided information about others involved in the Golden Venture tragedy.

At the time, Guo was described by one prosecutor as "an incredibly violent man with zero regard for human life." He was known as a "snakehead," a term used to identify Chinese gang members involved in human trafficking.

When asked about Guo's purported involvement in the BEG, Amaris Cockfield, a spokeswoman for Adams, said his administration is "looking into" it.

"Our administration holds ourselves to the highest ethical standards," she said. "As soon as this information was brought to our

attention, we immediately began looking into the concerns raised."

Keenan, the attorney for Chan, the current East Broadway Mall operator, wrote in the letter that Guo is trying to disguise his potential stake in the mall by making it seem as if it's his son who's making the investment.

A business owner at the mall was recently approached by Guo, who brought along his son for the meeting, according to the letter from Keenan.

"His son will be the person who will oversee the project and daily operation of the building," the letter says Guo informed the business owner. "[The business owner] learned that Guo Liang Chi, in order to insure that his background does not jeopardize the deal, is seeking a puppet investor to disguise his involvement, with a promise to reimburse them after closing."

The business owner — who is named in the letter — confirmed Keenan's account of his interaction with Guo to The News on condition that his identity not be disclosed for fear of retribution from Guo.

Guo could not be reached for comment. A man who picked up the phone at the Ansu Funeral Home in Chinatown confirmed that he maintains an ownership stake there, but refused to pass along a message to him.

"I never see this guy," said the man, who declined to provide his own name. "He's very hands-off."



A loser in two courts

Now it's official: Banned NBAer Porter guilty in sports betting scandal

Disgraced NBA player Jontay Porter pleaded guilty Wednesday to federal charges in the sports betting scandal that wrecked his pro basketball career.

Porter, 24, entered into a plea agreement in Brooklyn Federal Court, pleading guilty to a single count of wire fraud conspiracy. The towering former Toronto Raptors center and power forward conspired with a quartet of gamblers to rig two NBA games so he could claw his way out of his betting debts, federal prosecutors said.

His alleged co-conspirators, Long Phi Pham, Mahmud Mollah, Timothy McCormack and Ammar Awawdeh, were charged with conspiracy to commit wire fraud last month.

"I know what I did was wrong and unlawful, and I am deeply sorry for my conduct," Porter said at the Wednesday hearing.

Based on federal sentencing guidelines, Porter could face between 41 and 51 months in prison when he's sentenced Dec. 18, along with hundreds of thousands of dollars in restitution and fines. His lawyer has said in the past he's cooperating with prosecutors, but



it's unclear how that will factor into his ultimate sentence.

At Awawdeh's urging, Porter left two games early for medical reasons, one on Jan. 26, the other on March 20, giving the conspiracy members a heads-up so they could make big bets that he'd underperform in those games, the feds allege.

"If I don't do a special with your terms. Then it's up. And u hate me and if I don't get u 8k by Friday you're coming to Toronto to beat me up," he wrote to Awawdeh in a Telegram message, according to a criminal complaint against the

gamblers.

Though Porter's name does not appear in the criminal complaint against the four suspects that lays out the alleged plot, the specifics in the complaint match up with Porter's fall from grace, and make reference to his lifetime NBA ban.

Porter pulled himself from the Raptors' Jan. 26 game against the L.A. Clippers after playing just four minutes and scoring zero points, three rebounds and an assist, telling team officials he had aggravated an eye injury from a few days earlier. He also left the March 20 game after just three minutes.

Mollah in particular bet big on the March 20 game, placing more than \$100,000 in a series of wagers that would have paid out more than \$1.2 million if the online betting company he used hadn't flagged them as suspicious, the feds allege.

The NBA opened an investigation into Porter after the March 20 game, and on April 4, the player told the suspects in a group message they "might just get hit w a rico," according to court filings.

On April 17, the NBA announced Porter was banned from the league for life because he

"violated league rules by disclosing confidential information to sports bettors, limiting his own participation in one or more games for betting purposes, and betting on NBA games."

He's the second person to be banned since Adam Silver became NBA commissioner in 2014. The first was former Los Angeles Clippers owner Donald Sterling, who was caught on audio making racist comments.

Porter was released on a \$250,000 bond secured by his mother and his wife. He must continue to get treatment for gambling addiction, and cannot contact his alleged co-conspirators as he awaits sentencing, Federal Magistrate Judge James Cho ruled.

Porter left the courthouse through a back exit, and avoided the media gathered outside the front doors of the Cadman Plaza federal building.

His lawyer Jeff Jensen later said that he had nothing to add to his past comments about the case.

In a statement last month, Jensen said Porter was "a good young man with strong faith that will get him through this. He was in over his head due to a gambling addiction," adding that he was undergoing treatment.



MS-13 gangster pleads guilty, admits that he ordered teen girls' slay

A top MS-13 gang member on Long Island admitted his role in eight murders, including ordering the brutal 2016 slayings of two teenage girls as revenge for a high school brawl.

Alexi Saenz, 29 (inset), pleaded guilty to racketeering charges Wednesday in Long Island Federal Court, admitting he authorized the horrifying killings of Kayla Cuevas, 16 (top right), and Nisa Mickens, 15 (top left), in Brentwood, L.I. Charges against his brother Jairo Saenz are still pending.



Alexi Saenz, who faces 40 to 70 years behind bars when he's sentenced on Jan. 31, copped to his involvement in six machete murders, two fatal shootings and several attempted murders over a bloody 12-month stretch in 2016 and 2017. He oversaw several of the killings personally.

The Saenz brothers ordered the teen girls' murders after Kayla and her friends fought with MS-13 members at Brentwood High School a week earlier, federal prosecutors said.

Enrique "Turkey" Portillo, Selvin Chavez and two other juvenile members of the gang's Sailors Locos Salvatruchas Westside

clique piled into a car on Sept. 13, 2016, to hunt for their rivals when they spotted Kayla walking in Brentwood, according to the feds.

Nisa, Kayla's childhood friend, was walking alongside her, and the gang members decided she had to die as well.

They called the Saenz brothers, who gave them the green light, and the gang members poured out of their car and descended on the two teens, wielding baseball bats and a machete.

Nisa's mutilated body was found on the street shortly after, while Kayla's was found behind a nearby house the next day.

"To say that Alexi Saenz's hands are drenched in blood does not begin to describe the multiple killings and extreme mayhem he personally directed and committed in the span of one year in Suffolk County," U.S. Attorney Breon Peace said. "While those murders and violent crimes were intended to further the sordid mission of the MS-13, the defendant has failed miserably."

In 2020, then-U.S. Attorney General William Barr authorized prosecutors to seek the death penalty against the Saenz brothers, but the current attorney general, Merrick Garland, withdrew that authorization in November.

ISRAEL ORDERS EVACUATION OF GAZA CITY IN HAMAS PURSUIT

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza Strip — The Israeli military urged all Palestinians to leave Gaza City and head south Wednesday, pressing ahead with a fresh offensive across the north, south and center of the embattled territory that has killed dozens of people over the past 48 hours.

The stepped-up military activity came as U.S., Egyptian and Qatari mediators met with Israeli officials in the Qatari capital, Doha, for talks seeking a long-elusive ceasefire deal with Gaza's Hamas militant group in exchange for the release of dozens of Israeli hostages it is holding.

Israel says it is pursuing Hamas fighters that are regrouping in various parts of Gaza nine months into the war. But heavy strikes in recent days along the length of the territory also could be aimed at putting more pressure on Hamas in the cease-fire talks.

In a visit Wednesday to central Gaza, Israel's military chief, Lt. Gen. Herzl Halevi, said forces were operating in different ways, in multiple parts of the territory "to carry out a very important mission: pressure. We will continue operating to bring home the hostages."

Israel informed people in Gaza of the evacuation order by dropping leaflets urging "all those in Gaza City" to take two "safe routes" south to the area around the central town of Deir al-Balah. Gaza City, it said, will "remain a dangerous combat zone."

Months ago, Israel ordered residents of northern Gaza, including Gaza City, to flee south, and much of the population left earlier in the war. Large parts of Gaza City and urban areas around it have been flattened or left a shattered landscape by previous Israeli assaults.

The United Nations says about 300,000 Palestinians have remained in the hard-hit north, with the bulk of those said to be in Gaza City.

Most of Gaza's 2.3 million people are crammed into squalid tent camps in central and southern Gaza.

Israeli troops have pushed into parts of Gaza City in recent days, triggering the flight of thousands of

Palestinians trying to escape shelling and airstrikes. This past week, the military ordered Palestinians to evacuate from eastern and central parts of the city.

There was no immediate mass exodus from the city following Wednesday's order. Many Palestinians have concluded that there is no refuge in war-stricken Gaza.

The military, meanwhile, said it wrapped up an operation launched late last month in the Gaza City neighborhood of Shijaiyah, where it killed dozens of militants and destroyed eight underground tunnels.

Wednesday's evacuation order came after a series of deadly strikes over the past two days in other parts of the territory. Israeli bombardment early Wednesday hit four houses in Deir al-Balah and the nearby Nuseirat refugee camp, killing 20 Palestinians.

Among the dead were six children and three women, according to officials at al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital, where the casualties were taken. An Associated Press reporter counted the bodies. The house hit in Deir al-Balah was inside the "humanitarian safe zone" where Israel has told Palestinians to flee for refuge.

The overnight bombardment came hours after Israeli warplanes struck the entrance of a school sheltering displaced families outside the southern city of Khan Younis. The toll from the strike rose to 31 people killed, including eight children, and more than 50 wounded, officials at the nearby Nasser Hospital said Wednesday.

Footage aired by Al Jazeera television showed kids playing soccer in the school's yard when a sudden boom shook the area, prompting shouts of "a strike, a strike!"

The Israeli Army said the airstrike near the school and reports of civilian casualties were under review. It claimed it was targeting a Hamas militant who took part in the Oct. 7 attack on Israel that triggered the war, though it provided no immediate evidence. The military blames civilian deaths on Hamas because the militants fight in dense, urban areas. But the army rarely comments on what it is targeting in individual strikes, which often kill women and

children.

In nine months of bombardment and offensives in Gaza, Israel has killed more than 38,200 people and wounded more than 88,000, according to the territory's Health Ministry, which does not distinguish between combatants and civilians in its count. Nearly the entire population has been driven from their homes. Many have been displaced multiple times.

During the Oct. 7 raid, militants killed 1,200 people in southern Israel, most of them civilians, according to Israeli authorities. The militants took roughly 250 people hostage. About 120 are still in captivity, with about a third said to be dead.


Israel's new ground assault in Gaza's largest city has prompted what the UN called a "dangerously chaotic" exodus of people scattering in multiple directions, unsure where to go. Some have fled to other parts of the north. The new Israeli military leaflets encouraged a mass movement south to the purported "humanitarian zone," promising that people leaving Gaza City on the defined routes would not be stopped at Israeli checkpoints. Many Palestinians fear arrest or humiliation by troops at the checkpoints.

After Israel on Monday called for an evacuation from eastern and central parts of Gaza City, staff at two hospitals — Al-Ahli and the Patients Friends Association Hospital — rushed to move patients and shut down, the United Nations said.

Hospitals in Gaza have often evacuated preemptively at any sign of possible Israeli military action, fearing raids. In the past nine months, Israeli troops have attacked at least eight hospitals, causing the deaths of patients and medical workers along with massive destruction to facilities and equipment. Israel has claimed Hamas uses hospitals for military purposes, though it has provided only limited evidence.

Only 13 of Gaza's 36 hospitals are functioning, and those only partially, according to the United Nations' humanitarian office.

Amid the ongoing violence, international mediators were making a new concerted effort to push through a proposed deal for a ceasefire and release of hostages.



Remnants of Beryl to hit upstate with heavy rain & winds

New York is bracing to get hit by heavy rain and winds this week as the remnants of Hurricane Beryl continue to arc toward the Northeast.

The storm cut a path of destruction through Texas earlier this week as a Category 1 hurricane, killing at least three people and cutting off power to more than 3 million homes and businesses before being downgraded to a tropical depression.

As the fast-moving storm continues along its path through the South and Midwest, it's expected to bring soggy conditions to a number of states, including New York.

Upstate areas are on flood watch. Torrential downpours were forecast starting Wednesday afternoon and into Thursday, with several inches of rain expected to fall in a short amount of time. The Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Albany and Adirondacks areas should see the brunt of the severe weather.

"Severe weather including thunderstorms, strong winds and hail is also possible throughout the state," an alert from the

governor's office read. "In addition to flash flooding, power outages, downed trees and infrastructure damage could occur."

Gov. Hochul warned about the potential inclement weather late Tuesday night.

"New York is no stranger to the devastating effects that storms can have on our communities," Hochul said. "My administration will be closely monitoring the weather impacts and we encourage New Yorkers to remain vigilant and watch the weather forecast closely."

The National Weather Service added that "weak tornadoes" could develop upstate, too.

"It would not be very difficult to get some quick spinups with the showers and thunderstorms that form in the late morning into the evening on Wednesday," according to the weather service.

As Beryl continues its churn into New England and Canada, the worst of the storm should miss New York City and the tristate area. However, the region could experience thunderstorms Thursday and into the weekend, with showers most likely for Friday.

By Sunday, it's expected to be sunny with highs in the mid-80s in the city.

BIG TASTE IN LI'L SRI LANKA

Lakruwana a ferry good reason for journey to Staten Island

If you've been patiently waiting for a Staten Island review, it's your lucky week. You might've thought I forgot about the Forgotten Borough, but my desire to try Sri Lankan eatery Lakruwana was a good enough reason for me to schlep my way over on the free Staten Island Ferry to pay a visit.

Established in 1995 by Sri Lanka-native Jayanatha Wijesinghe, Lakruwana was opened in Tompkinsville, the Staten Island neighborhood affectionately called Little Sri Lanka. Daughter Julia Wijesinghe currently helps run the show. When I entered Lakruwana on a Sunday night, her warm smile was there to greet me in the gold-laden restaurant.

While the area surrounding Lakruwana is fairly neutral, the restaurant's decor lets you know you're about to enter a place that will certainly stimulate the senses. Before even ordering any food, I was won over

by intricately detailed carved walls, giant Buddha statues and even a Ganesha statue.

Lakruwana offers an a la carte menu and an all-you-can-eat buffet from 12:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Although we went to Lakruwana on a Sunday, my friend and I decided to order a few things off of the a la carte menu despite how tempting the buffet was. We split the Kottu roti with chicken and the lamprais with vegetables.

Kottu roti is a chopped roti stir-fry loaded with veggies, scrambled eggs and green chilies, and served with a curry dunking sauce. At Lakruwana, it's adorably shaped into a heart mold. Kottu roti gives stir-fried rice a run for its money, and while I can't speak to how it compares with other kottu roti since it was my first time trying it, the dish was fragrant, slightly spicy, and particularly ideal in the winter, I imagined, especially with that warmly spiced curry on the side.

I was particularly intrigued when the lamprais came out. As you uncover your

Sri Lankan treasure wrapped in a banana leaf, you're greeted with a boiled egg that has some blistering on it thanks to the addition of being fried after boiling. I had never had a fried boiled egg before, but when in Staten Island, there's a first time for everything. Lamprais is made with basmati rice, a fish cutlet, seeni sambol (think caramelized onion chutney), curried cashews, eggplant moju (eggplant in a sweet and sour sauce) and eggs.

The hodgepodge of ingredients makes eating lamprais particularly fun. Each bite leads to a different texture, taste and strike of the senses.

Legend has it that lamprais, which roughly translates to "packet of rice," was introduced to Sri Lanka when Dutch colonizers brought rice and condiments inside a banana leaf from Indonesia. While lamprais was technically introduced to Sri Lanka by the Dutch, Lakruwana reclaims it right on the menu: "The Dutch call it Lampijst, we call it Lamprais. Our recipe is over 300 years old."

After or even before your meal, make sure to swing by the Sri Lankan Arts & Cultural Museum, owned by Julia Wijesinghe. Filled with plenty of Sri Lankan memorabilia, including sculptures, paintings and various other artifacts, your venture out to Lakruwana can make for a fun history lesson about one of the largest Sri Lankan populations outside Sri Lanka itself.

A guide to current Broadway shows by Daily News theater critic Chris Jones:

& Juliet: A savvy jukebox musical from London offering a feminist reworking of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" with added bits and songs made famous by Pink, Britney and Kesha, et al. This nonstop party-empowerment show is derivative, over-confident and fun. *Stephen Sondheim Theatre, 124 W. 43rd St.*

Aladdin: Disney's "Aladdin" is a bit too frenetic, gag-heavy and overly anxious to please — but it has settled in as an entertaining family attraction featuring a diverse cast, a fun genie whose antics will always remain a tribute to Robin Williams, and the requisite magic carpet ride against a backdrop of the glittering lights of a utopian Arabian night. *New Amsterdam Theatre, 214 W. 42nd St.*

Back to the Future: The Musical: Closer to a thrill-park ride than a traditional musical, this frenetic new spectacle from London showcases a flying DeLorean car essentially re-creating the role played, years ago, by the helicopter in "Miss Saigon." The show is attracting a family and tourist audience and Roger Bart at peak eccentricity is fun to watch. But unlike the film, the show makes you feel very little. *Winter Garden Theatre, 1634 Broadway.*

The Book of Mormon: A relic of an era when satirists had more guts, Trey Parker and Matt Stone's show lampoons the LDS religion with the same sharp edge familiar from "South Park." Go enjoy a wicked



musical from before America lost so much of its sense of humor. *Eugene O'Neill Theatre, 230 W. 49th St.*

Cabaret at the Kit Kat Club: An epic disappointment and a money-grabbing misfire, this revival of a musical theater masterpiece is overpriced, under-erotized and, for the most part, poorly sung. It's an example of the immersive theater craze taken too far and with the wrong

show to boot. Eddie Redmayne, Emcee of this unfortunate shebang, comes off a creepy human jack-in-the-box. Spend your money elsewhere on Broadway. *August Wilson Theatre, 245 W. 52nd St.*

Chicago: This long-lived show celebrating real-life killers of prohibition-era Chicago has been pulling in Broadway suckers since 1996. The real stars here are John Kander and Fred Ebb, who penned

a score that drips with melodic aspiration and lyrical cynicism, and Bob Fosse, whose erotically muscular choreography is the perfect match. *Ambassador Theatre, 219 W. 49th St.*

The Great Gatsby: This is what many people think of when they ponder a big Broadway night out: a familiar yet glamorous title from the Jazz Age, a star tenor in the titular role, songs of passion, obsession and resolve set to string-heavy orchestrations, and a massive Art Deco set cascading off the stage, which has the décor to match. The show is dull and emotionally inert, but it's the best dressed crowd on Broadway. *Broadway Theatre, 1681 Broadway.*

Hadestown: A dystopian 2019 musical rooted in the 2010 concept album by Anaïs Mitchell and updates and retells the classic myth of Orpheus and Eurydice via a compellingly theatrical blend of steampunk, "Westworld" and self-aware Bourbon St. sensuality. It's a thrillingly alarmist show, albeit potentially jarring to those who prefer warmer or more traditional musicals. Mitchell's music variously evokes gospel, blues, blue collar work-song and the ravings of a rabid cult. *Walter Kerr Theatre, 219 W. 48th St.*

Hamilton: Still a tough and expensive ticket, this Lin-Manuel Miranda global cultural phenomenon employs a young, diverse cast to tell the story of Alexander Hamilton, the Founding Father with the long-term berth on the ten-spot, but also a scrappy immigrant who wrote like he

was running out of time. The music is eclectic and often gorgeous, the emotional intensity still capable of blowing all else away. *Richard Rodgers Theatre, 226 W. 46th St.*

Harry Potter and the Cursed Child: An epic commitment requiring two tickets and six hours has now been reduced to a more manageable single show. We purists lament the change, which cut much of the subtlety and fun in the text but left all the spectacular theatrical effects. Even in this version, though, Harry Potter fans leave fully satiated. *Lyric Theatre, 214 W. 43rd St.*

Hell's Kitchen: The songs of Alicia Keys are well suited to a jukebox musical. The burst of energy that flows from hits like "Girl on Fire" are dynamic blasts in a show drawing from Keys' own origin story as a kid growing up in the federally subsidized artists' haven of Manhattan Plaza in Hell's Kitchen. No surprises here, and you have to love Keys' music. But lots of warm sentiment and affection for a creative Gotham childhood. *Shubert Theatre, 225 W. 44th St.*

Illinois: A late entry to the season, "Illinois" is not a traditional musical but Justin Peck's wordless choreographic response to the Sufjan Stevens album, as played live. If you remember Twyla Tharp's "Movin' Out," a response to the music of Billy Joel, or can imagine "A Chorus Line" in the cornfields of the Prairie State, you'll have a sense of what transpires here. It's not for all tastes but very beautiful nonetheless. *St. James Theater, 246 W. 44th St.*

The Lion King: Julie Taymor's masterful work is 25 years old but still as fresh as a Serengeti morning. This Disney family attraction features stunning puppets, visual tableaux, Elton John songs, African music. It's deservedly the most successful musical of its era. *Minskoff Theatre, 200 W. 45th St.*

MJ The Musical: This homage to the King of Pop is set during the creative process for Michael Jackson's "Dangerous" world tour. Although there is little mention of the MJ controversies (the estate prefers it that way), "MJ" offers the chance to hear a slew of iconic MJ hits and experience his choreographic soul through the simpatico-but-original ideas of Christopher Wheeldon. *Neil Simon Theatre, 250 W. 52nd St.*

Merrily We Roll Along: Broadway has



possibly never seen a better triple-act than Jonathan Groff, Lindsay Mendez and Daniel Radcliffe, the triumphant triumvirate at the heart of the gorgeous new revival from the famed British musical theater star Maria Friedman. What a delight they are to watch as life kicks their ever-hopeful characters in the teeth. Life severely batters these old pals in this brilliant, backward-moving musical about showbiz types by Stephen Sondheim and George Furth, as based on an old Kaufman and Hart play. It's a near-perfect production. *Hudson Theatre, 141 W. 44th St.*

Moulin Rouge the Musical!: A decadent live translation of Baz Luhrmann's widely beloved 2001 movie musical and an intense, anachronistic extravaganza that stuffs cuts of pop anthems (70 songs! 161 composers!) inside a letter-box of gorgeous retro-red velour. This is date-night pastiche with a unifying communal playlist, and an omnisexual dip into a sensual ocean with nervous fellow travelers. *Al Hirschfeld*



Theatre, 302 W. 45th St.

The Notebook: This weepy new musical based on the 1996 Nicholas Sparks novel and the hit 2004 movie has a gorgeous suite of songs from Ingrid Michaelson, landing somewhere between Duncan Sheik, Jeanine Tesori and Sara Bareilles. The populist show is not for romantic cynics, as you might expect, but this actually is a strikingly artful and minimalist telling of love across generations. *Gerald Schoenfeld Theatre, 236 W. 45th St.*

The Outsiders: The beloved YA author S.E. Hinton famously penned "The Outsiders" after watching two rival gangs explode at her own Will Rogers School in Tulsa. The resultant musical needed greater expansion of character, a gentler, simpler touch, a better sense of authentic teenage angst and a deeper focus on the heart. But many love this story and will enjoy the talents here and the fresh roots/country score by the Austin-based Jamestown Revival. *Jacobs Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

SIX: The Musical: Just 90 minutes, this small-cast original pop musical is centered on the six wives of Henry VIII who bond in a post-death sisterhood and compete for who actually had the worst time with their bearded pig. Audiences generally ignore the relatively thin gruel and have an empowering blast. *Lena Horne Theatre, 256 W. 47th St.*

Stereophonic: A fabulous, three-hour dissection of ego, insecurity and the messy, messed-up gorgeousness of the creative process, David Adjmi's "Stereophonic" is about an up-and-coming British rock band on the brink of superstardom making a studio album in California between the summers of 1976 and 1977. What a brilliant piece of must-see Broadway. It's Chekhovian, babe. *Golden Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

Suffs: With Hillary Rodham Clinton as a producer, an all-female cast of 23 playing historical figures, and the history of women's suffrage as its rather weighty

subject Shaina Taub's new musical "Suffs" seems more like of a gathering of the politically like-minded than a complex evening suffused with surprise. But "Suffs" is a moving, stirring show that does what all the best Broadway musicals do: It humanizes, empowers, entertains and moves an audience. *Music Box theatre, 239 W. 45th St.*

The Who's Tommy: Pete Townshend's prescient 1969 rock opera, a horrifying if ultimately transcendent howl of anger and anguish at the damage wrought on the boomer generation by their war-scarred parents, has returned to Broadway in a new, born-in-Chicago production from Des McAnuff that will sock you right in the gut. Pete Townshend's epic achievement emerges now as a loud boomer coda, an emancipatory rock banquet and a reminder that dads really have improved. *Nederlander Theatre, 208 W. 41st St.*

Water for Elephants: This sentimental new musical based on the 2006 Sara Gruen novel and the 2011 Reese Witherspoon movie has one of the more remarkable ensembles ever seen on Broadway. The hugely talented crew sings, dances and are fully believable as acrobats, aerialists and roustabouts from the tawdry touring circus culture of America in the early 20th century, the setting of a sawdust story wherein an elephant named Rosie busts her trunk through a love triangle. It's formulaic in places but buoyed by a terrific ensemble. *Imperial Theatre, 249 W. 45th St.*

Wicked: Now more than 20 years old, "Wicked" continues to be one of Broadway's best loved attractions. The musical is a prequel to "The Wizard of Oz" that focuses on the intense friendship between two witches, one good, one maybe better. The Winnie Holzman book is a witty tour de force and Steven Schwartz came up with a bevy of emotional numbers, including "Defying Gravity," one of the great Act 1 closers of all time. *Gershwin Theatre 222 W. 51st St.*

Every day a test

Today is the big test for the presidential candidate, a moment of truth that could well determine his future viability as his party's standard bearer in his campaign for a second term and if the public would be willing to vote for him. That was the sentence we had prepared for the sentence Donald Trump was to receive today for his 34 felony convictions, as found unanimously by a jury of a dozen Manhattanites on May 30.

Instead, the exact same situation now applies to Joe Biden, who will be holding a solo press conference today. Rather than have Americans mull over Trump's fine or probation or jail time, we will all be dissecting how Biden handles unscripted questions on live TV and how it will impact our perceptions of the man.

The tables first turned exactly two weeks ago with Biden's disastrous debate showing, with the 81-year-old mumbling and stumbling and fumbling while the 78-year-old made up lies about everything. Still Biden's mentality, not Trump's mendacity, was the focus.

Then, four days later, the tables shifted again, when the U.S. Supreme Court decided that former presidents have some level of immunity from criminal prosecution and Trump's sentence was postponed until September.

Trump was to appear downtown in Courtroom 1530 at 100 Centre St. before Acting Manhattan state Supreme Court Justice Juan Merchan. Now, Courtroom 1530 will be much quieter this morning without Trump and the Secret Service and the assembled press.

While Trump's obstacles have been lowered by the Supreme Court ruling (which further delayed his D.C. criminal trial for trying to overturn his 2020 loss), Biden has been on a desperate tour to salvage

his candidacy. He went on ABC News the next night after the debate. And he did some rallies and gave a speech at the NATO summit, each time another test of his abilities.

This afternoon's press conference is his next hurdle. On Monday night, in a bit of counter programming with the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, Biden will have an interview on NBC News.

Biden's goal is to slow, and then stop, the calls by Democrats for him to drop out. Recall how it was all so different just two weeks ago, the party united behind Biden and Trump facing a jail sentence. That's politics.

This date, July 11, is also notable for it was 220 years today, in 1804, when occurred the Aaron Burr-Alexander Hamilton duel in Weehawken, where the sitting vice president of the United States (Burr) shot and killed the former treasury secretary (Hamilton). There's a fabulous Broadway musical to see if you want more details.

It was VP Burr's opposition to, and rivalry with, President Thomas Jefferson that caused the adoption of the 12th Amendment to have joint tickets with running mates. Burr came in second in 1800 when the loser of the White House race became VP. The 12th Amendment was ratified on June 15, 1804 and Burr offed Hamilton the next month.

The 12th Amendment says that electors shall vote "for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves." The different state requirement might cause a complication for Floridian Trump picking Floridian Marco Rubio. But that's a minor matter compared to having a pre-12th Amendment mess with Biden and Trump serving together.

Rigid truths about garbage

While Mayor Adams didn't invent the trash can, he's made real progress in the war on rats with an official city bin that will be required for all residential properties with 1-9 units as of this November. Bravo!

The 45-gallon bin the mayor unveiled, complete with big wheels and a top that latches and the seal of the city on the side, costs \$53.01; the 35-gallon model will set you back \$45.88. Go ahead and check on Amazon — you won't find high-quality bins for less. And those wouldn't match the recommended green and blue recycling bins, or the brown composting bin. (An editorial for another day is exploring the benefits and costs of plastics recycling as scientists are concluding that the process is almost certainly responsible for rising quantities of microplastic waste in groundwater, and in human beings.)

No, we almost certainly didn't need to pay McKInsey consultants \$4 million to help get us this far, but at least it's nice to know that, unlike other reports commissioned from such firms, this one didn't just wind up in the recycling bin. Recommendations were actually put into action that'll improve the quality of life of New Yorkers, and pretty quickly at that.

Summertime in New York City is marvelous, even with climate change. The pools are great when open and properly staffed, the arts are especially alive, and the five boroughs feel freer all around. But the downsides are real, including gun violence that often spikes when it heats up, and a smell of rotting garbage that seems to follow us around every corner. Before the sanitation strike of 1968, Oscar the Grouch-style cans containing most garbage were

the norm. Those then gave way to bags piled atop one another: easier to toss into the back of a truck, perhaps, but prone to smelling and being far less attractive to humankind and far more attractive to rodentkind.

Over the years, New York City has twisted itself into pretzels considering things like mint-scented bags to repel rats rather than doing the obvious thing, which is making people put their rotting refuse in bins, as other cities and suburbs and pretty much everyone else have been doing for generations.

It's better to play catchup and get teased for it, as Adams and Sanitation Commissioner Jessie Tisch are doing, then not to play catchup at all. As a result, by the end of the year, most of the city's trash will be contained — more out of sight and out of mind of people and rats alike. There's further to go as the city figures out how to put remaining garbage in bins, but we're getting there.

Adams is famous for being Captain Ahab to the city's rats. In 2019, as Brooklyn borough president, he proudly demonstrated a bucket designed to drown the vermin. As the city tries a bunch of different things to reduce their numbers, his obsession seems to be paying off. In the 10 blocks of upper Manhattan where, under a pilot program, trash is in sealed containers rather than sitting on the curb in bags, rat sightings are way down.

We don't need to see rats scurry across our paths on sidewalks and shrug our shoulders. We can change our behavior and reduce their numbers. Even in complicated cities with huge bureaucracies, causes have effects.

Downtown united is helping city kids

One pandemic later, our Wall Street community isn't what it used to be. The traders who once thronged the Financial District have moved uptown. In their place is a new Whole Foods and an influx of families with school-aged children bringing new vibrancy to our neighborhood. They also bring fresh concerns about the challenges facing students in Manhattan School District 1.

Parents are concerned about more than just the "lost generation" of students created by the pandemic. One single mother told us she lacked the money to buy school supplies for her daughter. Another juggled her two jobs to ensure she could pick her son up from school and help him with his math homework. Neither felt their current path was sustainable.

Those parents knew the challenges their families faced outside the classroom were affecting the academic performance of their children. We see that clearly in our local District 1 schools, which two years ago faced lagging test scores, and a lack of resources to address student underperformance.

In partnership with District 1 schools and community organizations across our parish, Trinity Church is rethinking how to best do our part. Over the last two years, we've worked with parents, educators, nonprofit partners, and providers to shape a new framework that considers the whole family, both inside and outside the classroom. Trinity now funds more than \$5 million in programming for school-aged youths and their families, and Lorelei A. Vargas, our chief impact officer, ensures that money is fulfilling local needs.

As we reached the end of the school year last month, the results are undeniable. District 1 improved its performance on standardized tests at an astonishing pace.

We see the district's transformation reflected in the Department of Education's School Quality Snapshot. According to the data, the percentage of students in District 1 schools meeting or exceeding state standards in math and English has been rising rapidly. Schools across District 1 once trailed most other schools in Manhattan. Now they're either matching or exceeding their neighboring districts.

Over the past two school years, District 1 saw a nearly 63% increase in the share of students meeting state standards in math — better than all but one of our five other Manhattan school districts. District 1's per-school average English test performance grew by 33% — the largest in Manhattan. Meanwhile, the number

of third- through eighth-graders reading at state standard levels grew 8.6%, compared to a 2.7% gain citywide during the same period.

To get there, we work with our partners to help individual schools load thousands of backpacks with school- and grade-specific supplies each September. We provide meals, diapers, clothing, cleaning supplies, and other daily needs to our neighbors. And working through community partners like UA3 and Loisaia, we stock local food pantries with groceries that parents can pick up free of charge.

It's also critical to address a student's life outside the classroom. Biobus now brings science enrichment to students through a mobile research lab parked right outside of their schools. Henry Street Settlement's City Trekkers program offers students the chance to experience our city's unparalleled cultural institutions.

We also hear about the emotional strain that comes with managing childcare in New York City. Post-pandemic statistics show an increase in the rates of anxiety and depression among youth and families, and Trinity has committed to investing more than \$1 million towards expanding University Settlement's Families Thriving program, which offers individual and family therapy, crisis prevention and training to develop positive parenting skills.



Families Thriving clinicians help caregivers manage behaviors, strengthen relationships, and work towards peace at home in spaces that are convenient for their clients — whether that's at home, at school, or even at a local park.

These efforts offer a model of family engagement that can serve as a roadmap for other school districts across the city. If we are changing the trajectory for future generations of students in our neighborhood, it is because this is a community that has worked hard to work together.

We have learned firsthand that by caring not just for the student in the classroom but also for the family outside, our children do better. They read better. They do math better. They are happier and more fulfilled people. And in the long run, that won't just improve our test scores — it will help the children in our community grow into educationally nourished adults.

Dems, Republicans, & the death of common sense

Common sense. We all know what it means, but common as it is, definitions and ideas of it have changed over centuries.

Aristotle connected common sense directly to the senses, and the ways in which we use different tastes, colors, feelings, smells and sounds to collectively perceive and categorize things.

Descartes agreed with Aristotle that it linked the mind to the senses, but argued it was a less effective tool of judgment than mathematical and methodical reasoning.

I'm partial to Italian philosopher Giambattista Vico's definition of common sense: "Judgment without reflection, shared by an entire class, an entire people, an entire nation, or the entire human race."

In other words, we can all practice common sense.

Or at least you'd think so, anyway.

But if any of these philosophers were dropped into 2024 America, in the midst of one of the craziest, messiest, most bizarre political elections in our history, they'd be hard-pressed to find common sense in evidence anywhere.

Let's start with the obvious.

The nation watched as a frail, somewhat confused, steeply declining 81-year-old man failed to put coherent sentences together, keep his thoughts on track, and effectively

debate an opponent who, at 78, seemed robust and sprightly by comparison.

Since then, common sense is telling most Americans – the ones who aren't hardened partisans – that Joe Biden is simply too old to be president again. The presidency is a hard job, especially in these trying times of global strife and domestic fragility, and someone who will be 82 at the time of his inauguration probably isn't best situated to do four more years of it.

Common sense also says that Biden isn't just too old, but missing a step. Americans can see, with their own eyes, his gaffes, his stiffness, his seeming bewilderment.

And common sense is telling many Americans, especially those who'd like Biden to defeat former President Donald Trump, that Biden can no longer do that. Why? They can see the polls, almost all of which show Trump widening his lead against Biden.

They can see what plenty of down-ballot Democrats can see all too well, which is that Biden most likely can't beat Trump and might

even drag down House members and senators, too.

Common sense says Democrats should have chosen someone else to lead the party into the future.

And yet, the president and his surrogates are telling Americans that Biden is just fine. "He is as sharp as ever," his press secretary told the media, with a straight face.

He just had a bad cold, they said.

He was jet-lagged, they said.

He had over-prepared, they said.

They also told us the polls are wrong, and Biden is the best person to beat Trump.

But none of these excuses make any sense to most Americans. Because most Americans have common sense.

Over on the right, things are hardly any better. In fact, they may be worse.

Republicans are on the verge of nominating a man for president who lost the White House, the House and the Senate, incited an insurrection, got impeached twice, and is a rapist and convicted felon.

Common sense is telling most Americans – the ones who aren't locked in the cult of MAGA – that Donald Trump is wholly unfit for the job. He's also too old, also missing a step, routinely fumbles his words, can't answer basic questions, and has said and done things that make him morally and physically questionable.

Common sense says that having a convicted felon for president, someone who had an affair with a porn star and then paid her to keep it quiet, would be embarrassing for America.

Common sense says that Republicans should have selected someone who could lead the party into the future.

But Trump and his surrogates have told us with a straight face for nearly 10 years that everything common sense tells us is a weakness is actually Trump's strength. They've told us not to believe anything we hear or see. They've told us Trump's lies are "alternative facts," his peccadillos are his political prowess, his moral failings, his evidence of masculinity.

The gaslighting from both sides is truly impressive, but too many of us have turned off our common sense in order to adhere to each party's obscene and insane purity tests.

Both parties are taking advantage of this, knowing that our common sense is now fragile and fungible, that we've become complacent and convincible, that we are more vulnerable to persuasion than ever before.

But plenty of Americans – not coincidentally those who are disillusioned with our two parties – have not turned off their common sense. They see through the lies and gaslighting, and importantly, they will decide this election. And that should scare both candidates.

Suspected bias attack on woman wearing hijab

A 33-year-old woman wearing a hijab was attacked on a southbound No. 2 train at the W. 125th St. station Tuesday morning in what sources say may have been a bias incident.

"I don't like people like you," the attacker allegedly told the victim, who is Black, according to cops.

The assault happened at 9:43 a.m. when the suspect, described by sources as a male in his 30s, struck the woman in the back of her head, authorities said. It was not immediately clear what was used to hit the victim.

She stayed on the train and reported the incident at the 96th St. station but refused medical attention.

Three incidents of hate crimes against Muslims were

reported last month, according to NYPD stats. Last year saw 26 such incidents, leading to 25 arrests.

Tuesday's attack came on the heels of a violent night on the subway.

Two people were wounded in back-to-back knife attacks at two Midtown subway stations, cops said Wednesday.

Around 11:30 p.m., a 31-year-old man got into an argument with four men on the A/C/E platform in the Times Square-42nd St. station. As the quarrel escalated, one of the men pulled a blade and stabbed the victim in the torso, police said.

At 3:40 a.m., a couple waiting for the No. 7 train was attacked by an unhinged man at the 42nd St.-Bryant Park station, cops said. A man was knifed in that attack.

U.S., Europe say Ukraine on path to join NATO after war

WASHINGTON — Ukraine is on an "irreversible" path to NATO membership, the military alliance said Wednesday in a final agreement from its summit, advancing assurances that Ukraine will be allowed to join the Western coalition but only after its war with Russia ends.

In another boost for Ukraine, the U.S., the Netherlands and Denmark announced Wednesday that the first NATO-provided F-16s were on their way to Ukraine and would be flying this summer following months of work.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy tweeted his appreciation on the effort to strengthen his air force, coming soon after Ukraine saw one of the deadliest strikes of the war.

"Ukraine's future is in NATO," according to the communique from NATO's 32 members, whose leaders are

meeting in Washington this week. "We will continue to support it on its irreversible path to full Euro-Atlantic integration, including NATO membership."

The alliance welcomed Ukraine's democratic, economic and security reforms needed to join and said it would get an invitation "when allies agree and conditions are met."

Earlier, NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg underlined that Ukraine will not join the alliance's ranks immediately. But he insisted that must happen after the war is over to ensure that Russia never attacks Ukraine again.

Zelenskyy, in Washington for the NATO summit, has battled for at least a firm guarantee from NATO that Ukraine can join the military alliance. He has feared his country would otherwise be left to fight a stronger Russia indefinitely.

The U.S. and some other countries

have opposed membership for Ukraine during the conflict with Russia to avoid an escalation of tensions. They also have stressed that Ukraine must take steps to address corruption and as well as other systemic reforms.

Russian President Vladimir Putin has opposed neighboring Ukraine's fight to join the Western alliance, declaring it an encroachment on Russia's security and interests.

President Biden, who later appeared on stage with Stoltenberg, reaffirmed U.S. support for Ukraine but also more broadly the importance of NATO. He reiterated that since he took office, the number of allies spending at least 2% of their Gross Domestic Product on defense has increased from nine to 23 and that the number of battle groups has doubled on NATO's eastern flank.

"We can and will defend every inch of NATO territory, and we will do it together," Biden said.







Stanton could return soon after All-Star break

ST. PETERSBURG – When the Yankees return from the All-Star break, their designated hitter may not be far behind.

Aaron Boone said Giancarlo Stanton could be ready for game action shortly after the Midsummer Classic. It remains to be seen if Stanton will have to play in minor-league games before rejoining the Yankees.

“I think when we come out of the break, we’ll probably be in a position to where he’s at that point,” Boone said Wednesday before the Yankees played the Rays. “And then whether we do rehab games or not remains to be seen, but I do feel like we’ll be getting real close.”

Boone added that Stanton, recovering from a left hamstring strain, has done some running already.

Stanton, who has a long history of lower-body injuries, went on the 10-day injured list on June 23. While the Yankees’ ongoing stretch of poor play began before that, the team has certainly missed the slugger.



Stanton was enjoying a bounce-back season, hitting .246/.302/.492 with 18 homers and 45 RBI.

It’s notable that he may skip a rehab assignment. Last year, the 34-year-old suffered another left hamstring strain and didn’t play in the majors between April 15 and June 2. Stanton had a one-game rehab assignment and spent the rest of the season struggling.

“We’ll consider all that,” Boone said.

“Some of the tools we have at our disposal now change the game a little bit (as far as) how guys are able to get ready and see things, so we’ll try and make the best decision for everyone.”

Once such tool is a high-tech Trajekt pitching machine. The Yankees also don’t need Stanton to play the field, making no rehab games or a short rehab stint more realistic for the designated hitter than other players.

SOTO’S HAND

Juan Soto appeared to be in some pain following a swinging strikeout in the third inning of Tuesday’s loss to the Rays. Soto stayed in the game, but the cut looked uncomfortable.

Boone attributed that to Soto recently bruising his right hand on an evasive slide in Toronto.

“Every now and then he’ll take a swing where it bothers him a little bit,” Boone said Wednesday, but the manager noted that Soto is doing well with the issue.

Boone added that Soto is still getting treatment on his hand and his forearm after experiencing inflammation in the latter a few weeks back.


LINEUP CHANGE

With the Yankees scuffling and Ben Rice scorching hot, Boone moved the rookie from the leadoff spot to the four-hole on Wednesday.

Alex Verdugo, meanwhile, moved to the first spot from the cleanup spot.

“Just shaking it up a little bit,” Boone said, adding that Rice’s recent at-bats make him a good presence behind Aaron Judge right now. Rice hit three homers on Saturday and another in Tuesday’s loss.

ST. PETERSBURG — With the Yankees clinging to a one-run lead in the fifth frame on Wednesday, Aaron Boone turned to Tim Hill.

The Rays had already scored a run in the inning on a fielder's choice off the bat of Yandy Díaz. They proceeded to load the bases, sending Marcus Stroman to the showers with one out, their cleanup hitter up and the game on the line.

Having lost 17 of their last 23 games, the Yankees desperately needed to escape the jam. Hill did exactly that, using his sidearm delivery to fan fellow lefty Josh Lowe on three pitches.

With the second out secured, the 34-year-old clapped his glove before getting Randy Arozarena to line out. Once again, Hill found himself fired up after a sequence that proved pivotal in the Yankees' 2-1, series-tying win.

The Rays had another shot at Hill in the sixth, when singles from Richie Palacios and Jose Siri created another pressure-packed situation. But former Yankee Ben Rortvedt struck out looking after botching two bunt attempts. Luke Weaver then relieved Hill and got an inning-ending double play out of Taylor Walls.

Weaver then worked around two walks in the seventh.

More trouble awaited in the eighth after Tommy Kahnle put two runners on, but Clay Holmes benefited from a pretty running catch from center fielder Trent Grisham before shutting the door in the ninth.

While the Yankees' bullpen has been unreliable this season, the unit picked up Stroman, who only pitched 4.1 innings despite holding Tampa Bay to one earned run. The righty also totaled seven hits, two walks, two strikeouts and 84 pitches.

The Rays went 0-for-10 with runners in scoring position and left 12 on base.

Meanwhile, the Yankee lineup recorded minimal damage against Rays righty Zach Eflin, who threw seven innings. The team's two runs against the starter were provided by Grisham.

The center fielder picked up his first RBI in the second inning when he lofted a flyball to Tropicana Field's short wall in the left-field corner. After missing a home run by inches, Grisham settled for an RBI double as the ball bounced away from Arozarena. Anthony Volpe scored on the play.

Grisham added a sacrifice fly in the fourth after a Díaz throwing error put Gleyber Torres on third.

With their three-game set knotted at one, the Yankees will look for a series win tonight. The Bombers have failed to win in seven straight series.

Nestor Cortes will look to snap that streak when he takes the mound. Shane Baz will make his second start of the season for Tampa.

In great need of relief, Mets welcome Maton

Newly acquired reliever Phil Maton arrived at Citi Field on Wednesday and was immediately available out of the bullpen. The right-hander was acquired on Tuesday in a deal with the Rays for cash considerations.

"It's exciting to come here," said Maton before Wednesday's game against the Nationals. "They went out of their way to acquire me and add me to this team as we make a push for a playoff seed."

The Amazins certainly need help from the right-hander. Entering Wednesday, the bullpen owned a 10.17 ERA in July after allowing five runs in two innings in Tuesday's win over the Nationals.

"Happy to have him, obviously, especially with where we're at," said Carlos Mendoza. "I've seen him from the other side of the dugout, finally he's on my team. He'll be ready to go, I told him the situation where we're at bullpen-wise and this stretch with so many games in a row?"



Mendoza didn't rule out Maton getting the final three outs in certain situations.

The 31-year-old confirmed that he had conversations with the Mets this offseason before he signed a one-year, \$6.5 million contract with the Rays. The veteran owns a 4.58 ERA in 40 games with Tampa Bay this season. However, the 31-year-old was an effective arm in the Astros' bullpen the previous two seasons, posting a 3.42 ERA from 2022-2023 while racking up postseason experience – 18 appearances.

SENGA RECOVERY

Kodai Senga tossed 2.2 scoreless innings tallying 52 pitches on Tuesday night for the Syracuse Mets in his second rehab outing.

The next steps in the 31-year-old's rehab will be determined by his recovery over the next few days. If all goes well, he could make another rehab start Sunday on regular rest, according to Mendoza.

The Mets have an idea of what number – in terms of pitch count – they need Senga to get to before bringing him back into the fold. However, president of baseball operations David Stearns did confirm that the club would go to a six-man rotation once the ace gets back.

ROSTER MOVES

Right-hander Eric Orze has been sent to Triple-A and southpaw Danny Young and Maton joined the club on Wednesday.

Reliever Reed Garrett was also placed on the 15-day injured list with right elbow inflammation.

"After the outing last night he came in complaining about the forearm, elbow area," said Mendoza. "We were waiting to see how he was going to respond and he came in today with pretty much the same. So he's getting an MRI and we'll see what we got."

Garrett allowed three earned runs and registered just two outs in his outing on Tuesday. On the whole, the right-hander has been one of the club's most effective relievers, owning a 3.64 ERA in 26 appearances.

The hits keep on coming for the Mets' bullpen, making the addition of Maton that much more important.

Nationals southpaw Patrick Corbin was cruising entering the bottom of the sixth and was heading toward one of his best starts of the season. But J.D. Martinez got a rally started with a leadoff single, followed by Pete Alonso lining another single to right before Mark Vientos delivered an RBI double off the right-center field wall that knocked Corbin out of the game.

The 34-year-old's final line was

five-plus innings, eight hits, four runs and five strikeouts. Once Dave Martinez called on reliever Derek Lawe to replace Corbin, the Mets were on their way.

Severino's ERA sits at 3.78 on the season.

Amid a rough stretch (10.17 ERA in July entering the night) the Mets bullpen got the job done on Wednesday. Jake Diekman relieved Severino and struck out the only three batters he faced. Danny Young got the first two outs in the eighth and Jose Butto was called on to finish the frame getting Lance Thomas looking.

Tyrone Taylor added an insurance run with an RBI triple in the bottom of the eighth before Butto got the final three outs in the ninth to secure the 6-2 victory.

Carlos Mendoza will turn to southpaw David Peterson this afternoon to complete the sweep. The 28-year-old is coming off of a 4.1 inning, two-run and five-strikeout performance against the Pirates on July 6.

Franco goes from MLB's top prospect to sexual abuse of minor charge

Not long ago, Wander Franco was baseball's top prospect, a generational talent with a future so undeniably bright that the cash-strapped Rays gave him a rare mega-contract just 70 games into his MLB career.

Now, his future is in considerable doubt.

Franco was formally charged in his native Dominican Republic on Tuesday with sexual abuse and sexual exploitation against a minor, nearly a year to the day that an investigation into his alleged relationship with a then-14-year-old girl opened.

On Wednesday, prosecutors said Franco was being charged as well with human trafficking, according to ESPN. Franco faces up to a 20-year prison sentence for that offense.

His U.S. lawyer declined comment Tuesday, telling The Associated Press that Franco had not been formally told of the charges.

The past 12 months have been filled with graphic accusations against the once-budding superstar, whom prosecutors claim paid the minor's mother to consent to what ended up being a four-month relationship.

The teenager's mother was also charged with human trafficking, according to Wednesday's development.

Franco, who turned 23 in March, has not played in an MLB game since Aug. 12, first going on the league's restricted list before being moved that month to an indefinite administrative leave.

On Wednesday, MLB put Franco back on the restricted list, meaning he would no longer receive pay, as he had while on administrative leave.

Although the deadline to press charges expired last Friday, Dominican law allows a judge to issue a 10-day extension, during which prosecutors can finalize their cases. Wednesday marked exactly one year since an initial

complaint against Franco was filed.

The allegations against Franco became public through social media in August. More specifics from the allegations surfaced in January, when prosecutors submitted a 600-page document to a Dominican judge, according to ESPN, which obtained the filing.

The prosecutors' evidence reportedly included claims that Franco had sex with the minor when he was 21; that the minor asserted her mother saw her "as an object to make money"; and that Franco would send helicopters and cars to pick up the minor so she could meet with him.

Toward the end of their alleged relationship, the minor was said to begin seeing someone else.

"I would like you to forget everything you have learned to raise you my way," Franco allegedly wrote

in a WhatsApp message to the girl at the time, according to the document obtained by ESPN.

He also allegedly wrote, "You're just a girl and you don't know how to get along with me, that's why you failed, but I'll give you only one chance, you must be only for me. Don't look at anyone, I know you've been with someone else, but no one will know how to use you the way I want."

In August, the girl shared allegations against Franco on social media before taking down her accounts.


"He used me and as you saw in the messages, he bribed me a lot and they took me out of the school I was in because of him, he has damaged my life and he has not even tried to fix it," she wrote, according to ESPN.

Franco then denied the claims on Instagram Live.

Lauded for his elite bat speed, power to all fields and control of the strike zone, the switch-hitting Franco signed with the Rays as an international amateur for \$3.8 million in 2017 and was 20 years old when he made his MLB debut in 2021.

STARTING OVER

After injury-plagued rookie season, Whitehead ready to become a factor for Nets

For Dariq Whitehead, a former five-star recruit who was named MVP of the McDonald's All-American Game in 2022, last season extracted a heavy toll.

Whitehead's lifelong dream of playing in the NBA came true after the Nets selected him with the 22nd overall pick in last year's draft. But the 19-year-old did not play in summer league last year because of an injury suffered at Duke, appeared in just two regular-season games for the Nets, and spent most of his rookie campaign — when healthy — with G League

affiliate Long Island before he underwent season-ending surgery in late January to address a stress reaction in his left shin.

"I felt it when I first got to the G-League," Whitehead said of the shin injury. "I wanted to fight through it because I've been in that position before and I just got drafted and I came in injured, so I wanted to push through it and see if I could work to overcome that. But eventually we came to a decision with Sean (Marks) and them that the best decision for me was to go get the surgery so that I could start to feel good and get back on pace to being who I was."

Injuries have put Whitehead's

professional aspirations on hold. His toughest battle was between the ears. Having multiple rehabilitation sessions each time he stepped into the Nets' practice facility, for months, while his teammates fought through a grueling season without him.

While few players around the league affect winning in their rookie seasons, Whitehead barely got the opportunity to try. That is what troubled him the most, those feelings of uselessness, helplessness, not the injury itself. But Whitehead said he had an incredible support system around him, and because of them, he never lost confidence in himself.

"I left home when I was 12 years old, 13 years old to go chase this dream," Whitehead said. "So, I knew no matter what it was, I was going to continue to fight and get back to where I needed to be... I put too much time in to just stop and let it all go."

Now healthy, Whitehead will have no restrictions as the Nets begin their slate of Summer League games on Friday in Las Vegas. The Montverde Academy product now has a golden opportunity to prove to Marks, first-year coach Jordi Fernandez, assistant Steve Hetzel and the entire organization that he is still worth the investment.

"At this point we're going to

throw him out there," Marks said. "I mean, he hasn't played in two years on a consistent basis, so I think we have to temper (expectations) a little bit. But at the same time, I know the young man is itching to get out there, play and get back to form. So, that's exciting for us, to see how it goes. And hopefully not only through Summer League, but into the offseason and training camp and so forth."

The Nets are entering a full rebuild and Whitehead can be a major part of it. And while the 6-6 guard is technically a rookie in terms of on-court experience in the NBA, he is already a seasoned veteran when it comes to overcoming

The Liberty improved to 13-0 this season when leading at halftime.

Courtney Vandersloot finished with 11 points and Jonquel Jones pulled down 11 rebounds to go with eight points for the Liberty. Betnijah Laney-Hamilton (knee) did not play.

Bonner led Connecticut (17-5) with 22 points and nine rebounds. Brionna Jones notched 17 points and eight boards, and Tyasha Harris scored 11.

Stewart and Ionescu combined for 20 points in the first quarter to help the Liberty build a 29-19 lead. But the Libs were held to just 10 points in the second quarter, with four points from Stewart and Ionescu, as

their lead was trimmed to 39-38 at the break.

Vandersloot opened and closed a 9-0 run to open the third quarter to rebuild a double-digit lead at 48-38.

Bonner made a long 3-pointer with 3:48 left in the fourth to give Connecticut its first lead, 66-65, since it was 5-4.

In Indianapolis, Ariel Atkins scored 26 points, including a key basket in the final minute, and the Washington Mystics held off the Indiana Fever on Wednesday to spoil Caitlin Clark's 29-point performance.

Washington led, 76-55, after three quarters before Indiana rallied behind 15 fourth-quarter points from Clark.

Clark became the first WNBA player with 29 points, 13 assists, five rebounds, five 3-pointers, five steals and three blocks in a game.

After Clark capped a 14-0 run with a free throw to pull Indiana within 85-82 with 1:05 left, Atkins answered at the other end with an off-balance shot in the lane.

Clark made two more free throws and a jump ball was called with 20.3 seconds left. Indiana forward Aliyah Boston tapped it back, but Atkins grabbed it and fell to the ground before a timeout was called with 16.9.

Julie Vanloo secured an inbounds pass and made two free throws with 16.2 left for a five-point lead to secure it.

Stefanie Dolson and Vanloo each scored 13 points for Washington (6-17). Aaliyah Edwards added 12 points and Myisha Hines-Allen had 10. The Mystics were without Shakira Austin, Brittney Sykes and Karlie Samuelson.

Kelsey Mitchell scored 15 points and NaLyssa Smith added 11 for Indiana (9-14).

Berhalter out as U.S. men's soccer coach

Gregg Berhalter was fired as U.S. men's soccer coach on Wednesday after his team's first-round exit from the Copa America flamed doubts he was the right person to remain in charge for the 2026 World Cup, a person familiar with the decision told The Associated Press.

Berhalter's second term as coach was cut short 10 months after he returned to the bench with high hopes and proclaimed the team's goal was "to change soccer in America forever." The U.S. recorded seven wins, six losses and one draw in his second stint, leaving his overall record at 44 wins, 17 losses and 13 draws.

Sporting director Matt Crocker rehired Berhalter and also will make the recommendation on his replacement. The team next plays in September friendlies against Canada and New Zealand.

Jürgen Klopp, Thierry Henry and Marcelo Bielsa are among those being speculated about as candidates to replace Berhalter, along with Jesse Marsch, Hugo Pérez, Pellegrino Matarazzo, David Wagner, Steve Cherundolo, Jim Curtin, Massimiliano Allegri and Mauricio Pochettino.

Salary could be an issue. Berhalter earned \$2,291,136 in 2022, including \$900,000 in bonuses for the Americans qualifying for the World Cup and reaching the second round. A top-level men's coach could put pressure on the

USSF to increase the salary of newly hired women's coach Emma Hayes.

Just 23 months remain before the World Cup comes to the United States for the second time and the Americans play their opener at Inglewood, California, on June 12, 2026. The only competitive matches with the full player pool before then likely will be in the CONCACAF Nations League.

Berhalter, who turns 51 on Aug. 1, was the first American to coach the national team after playing for the team at a World Cup. He was hired to coach the U.S. in December 2018 after stints with Sweden's Hammarby (2011-13) and Major League Soccer's Columbus Crew (2013-18).

He led the U.S. to titles in the CONCACAF Nations League in 2020, 2023 and 2024 and to another with a B team in the 2021 CONCACAF Gold Cup. His players strongly supported Berhalter, saying he fostered a culture that bound the group.

That support led to Crocker rehiring Berhalter five months after his initial contract expired amid an investigation of a decades-old domestic violence allegation that was brought to the USSF's attention by the Reyna family, which was upset that Berhalter limited Gio Reyna's playing time at the World Cup. A law firm retained by the USSF said there was no legal obstacle to bringing Berhalter back.

His detractors cited lack of success against teams outside the region and struggles on the road against Central American rivals.

adversity.

"I'd say this is the first time in my career, since probably high school, where I'm feeling like I could get out there and be myself again and contribute the way I know I should contribute," Whitehead said. "It's been a lot; it's been a tough road, but I'm built for it."

"I feel like those are good qualities that he has and he's able to come in and just bring guys together with his communication, his character, and that's everything you want in a teammate as well."

THE RATINGS WINNER

Nabers' strip club video overshadows 'Hard Knocks'

None of HBO's behind-the-scenes Giants "Hard Knocks" footage from the spring can compete with a current video of first-round pick Malik Nabers at a Houston strip club.

The only true reality TV in the social media age is what is happening live. Right now. And unfortunately for the Giants, the primary topic about their team in the second week of July is their 20-year-old, first-round pick's presence at an adult entertainment venue.

No one is passing moral judgment on Nabers for "making it rain" by throwing money into the air at a strip club and dancing. But perception is reality in the real world, including in the NFL.

And this is the bottom line: if that Nabers strip club footage had been included in one of HBO's "Hard Knocks" episodes, the Giants — who had final editorial control of the show's content — would have removed it.

It does connect to Tuesday's second episode, though.

Giants college area scout Scott Hamel reviewed Nabers as a prospect this way to the front office during the pre-draft process:

"Malik: highly passionate, highly competitive kid, loves football. He will train hard, plays with a big-time chip on his shoulder. He's a guy that always wanted the most targets. You'll hear about it if he's not getting his targets. We need to get around this kid and see if we can work with him, because there is a lot to the personality."

Assistant GM Brandon Brown acknowledged at the NFL combine in late February: "I just don't know enough about the kid in general. I don't view any of it as a negative. I just want to get around him."

Then Brown added: "But this is the thing: name me a dominant player at that position or the corner position or pass rusher that was a quiet boy. I mean, sh—, like, he gives us something we don't have. My biggest thing (with) him is, whoever the Q(B) is, will they be able to deal with it?"

GM Joe Schoen responded that he already had talked to Daniel Jones about Nabers and Jones "loves him."

Brian Daboll, meanwhile,

told Schoen at the combine: "I watched (film of) that Nabers dude. Dude's a baller."

When Nabers arrived for his interview with the Giants, Daboll asked how he handles not being involved in the offense early in a game.

"How do I handle it? I handle it pretty tough," Nabers said. "Especially during the week, I've been in the offense in the week, putting in the work with the one offense, getting a lot of plays known to be called for me. So if I'm not in those plays and not getting the ball, I'm pretty hard on it."

Daboll responded: "I don't mind that. I want guys that want to get the ball. And I want guys that hate f—ing losing. But you gotta learn how to harness that a little bit. I don't mind the competitive f—in' juice, man. You need some dogs. I want guys that want the ball."

Daboll then made an interesting allusion to his gameday eruptions that led to an off-season exodus on his coaching staff.

"Sometimes you lose it," Daboll said. "I mean, sh—, I lose it, too, as a coach. But you gotta learn how to harness that good."

Schoen then smiled and gave Daboll a one-armed hug, as director of player personnel Tim McDonnell smirked from the back row.

There will be plenty more revealed on "Hard Knocks," surely, about the Giants' scouting process with Nabers.

But for now, here in July, Nabers is still in the honeymoon, first impression stage as the new face of the Giants' franchise. He entered the draft with questions about his maturity and personality. And videoed strip club visits just aren't the kind of attention that benefits him or the Giants, a struggling franchise that is simply trying to get off the mat.

As it is, Instagram user yn-hprimetime — who identifies himself as the musician "Prime-time Hitla" — shared the video over the holiday weekend. It got picked up by the @KayvonOjulari and @NFL_DovKleiman 'X' accounts. And now the top-of-mind topic about the Giants isn't Brian Burns' free agency signing, but

Schoen's intent when he asked the GM: "In your room at night, when you're by yourself, are you like, 'I wouldn't mind if this kid bounced?'"



Musetti goes from 25th seed to semifinal matchup with Djokovic at Wimbledon

LONDON — Lorenzo Musetti reached his first Grand Slam semifinal by eliminating Taylor Fritz, 3-6, 7-6 (5), 6-2, 3-6, 6-1, at Wimbledon on Wednesday and will take on Novak Djokovic next.

The 25th-seeded Musetti, a 22-year-old from Italy, had never been past the third round at the All England Club — or the fourth round at any major tournament — until now.

His victory over the 13th-seeded Fritz was the 37th five-setter at the All England Club this year, the most at any Grand Slam tournament.

Now Musetti will go up against Djokovic with a berth in the final on the line.

It will be Djokovic's

record-tying 13th semifinal at Wimbledon alone — equaling Roger Federer — and 49th Slam semifinal overall, extending a mark he already held. As Musetti pursues his first major championship, Djokovic seeks a 25th, including what would be an eighth at the All England Club.

Djokovic's smooth trip through this year's bracket was made even easier when the man he was supposed to play in the quarterfinals Wednesday, Alex de Minaur, pulled out with a hip injury hours before their match was scheduled to begin.

Playing at a sun-swathed No. 1 Court against Fritz, an American who is one of the sport's biggest servers but fell to 0-4 in major quarterfinals, Musetti managed to accumulate 13 break points and

convert six. The outcome-determining break came on a forehand winner by Musetti that made it 2-0 in the last set; moments later, another break made it 4-0.

Queen Camilla, the wife of King Charles III, was in the stands and joined fans in doing the wave.

There was not a ton of variety exhibited by either player; they were mainly content to trade groundstrokes from the baseline. But Musetti did manage to accrue points with effective drop shots, occasionally following them with successful passing attempts or lobs.

Djokovic underwent knee surgery less than a month before the start of play at the All England Club. But despite limitations on his movement, the 37-year-old Djokovic has dropped only two

sets so far — facing a qualifier in the first round, a wild-card entrant in the second and only one seeded player, No. 15 Holger Rune.

Instead of going up against No. 9 de Minaur on Wednesday, Djokovic gets three full days off before meeting Musetti on Friday. The other men's semifinal will be defending champion Carlos Alcaraz against Daniil Medvedev; they advanced Tuesday.

Djokovic and Musetti have played each other six times. Djokovic has won five of those, including a five-setter at this year's French Open that concluded after 3 a.m. It was in Djokovic's following match in Paris that he tore the meniscus in his right knee.

In the women's quarterfinals Wednesday, 2022 champion Elena Rybakina grabbed nine of the last

11 games to defeat No. 21 Elina Svitolina, 6-3, 6-2, and No. 31 Barbora Krejčíková eliminated No. 13 Jelena Ostapenko, 6-4, 7-6 (4), in a matchup between two past champions at the French Open.

The other women's semifinal on Thursday will be No. 7 Jasmine Paolini of Italy against unseeded Donna Vekic of Croatia.

Kazakhstan's Rybakina ended her win with her seventh ace and improved to 19-2 at Wimbledon in four appearances.

"Definitely, I have an aggressive style of game," Rybakina said. "I have a huge serve, so it's a big advantage."

Her match lasted 1 hour, 1 minute — shorter than the second set alone of Krejčíková against Ostapenko, who at one point ordered her coach to leave the stands.

Yanks hoping DJ, Torres can bounce back

ST. PETERSBURG — With the Yankees struggling and the July 30 trade deadline nearing, Brian Cashman said he's going to be "open-minded to a lot of different things" when it comes to improving his club.

"I'm not going to point out anything specific, but we definitely have areas to improve upon, and we'll do our best to do so," the general manager said on Tuesday.

While the bullpen is an obvious need, the Yankees also have a few concerns in their infield. DJ LeMahieu is by far the biggest.

The third baseman's return from a broken foot, suffered in spring training, has hardly been a positive for the team. LeMahieu, 35, is hitting .206/.295/.234 with three doubles, zero home runs, 11 RBI and a 60 wRC+ over 33 games after going 2-for-4 with two singles in Tuesday's series-opening loss to the Rays.

A two-time batting champ, LeMahieu has five hits in his last three games. However, well-struck balls to the outfield have become notable for him, as he has a 57.1 groundball rate this season. Still, Cashman is holding out hope that LeMahieu can still be a productive player.

"It'd be great to get DJ going again," Cashman said while declining to say if third base is a need. "He looked good in the spring before that injury, and coming out of the gates, knocking the rust out, we're trying to get him going. I know he's trying to get going, too."

Added LeMahieu on Sunday: "It's been frustrating. But just no other thing to do but dig in and keep going, keep competing and doing

everything I can to help this team win."

In addition to poor surface numbers, some of LeMahieu's metrics, including, his average exit velocity, Hard-Hit% and Chase%, haven't left much room for encouragement.

When asked why he's confident LeMahieu can click, Cashman initially said "we'll see" before adding "the back of the baseball card, the history of the player," and injuries over the last few years.

"At some point, hopefully, the version of DJ LeMahieu that we're used to seeing will be back," Cashman said.

Cashman sounded a little more confident in Gleyber Torres' ability to contribute more, something he's started to do lately while battling a nagging groin injury.

Torres is hitting .223/.296/.343 with eight home runs, 34 RBI and an 85 wRC+. After going 1-for-4 with an RBI on Tuesday, he's 9-for-30 (.300) over his last eight games.

Still, Torres is far from his previous All-Star form. Cashman wondered if the second baseman's impending free agency has had an effect while praising the 27-year-old's capabilities.

"It's been a struggle for him," Cashman said. "Sometimes those free-agent walk years can come back and haunt you. I'm not sure if that's the added pressure that might be weighing him down or holding him back or not."

"He's a really talented player. Last year, he was our second-best hitter behind Aaron Judge and our best hitter, obviously, once Judge went down. So you know what caliber player he is. So we're anxiously and hopefully waiting on that because I know he could have a really positive impact on that lineup."

Beeter's season in jeopardy, but Durbin expected to return

ST. PETERSBURG — After a strong spring and a scoreless inning in his major-league debut, Clayton Beeter looked capable of helping the Yankees this season.

However, the club sent the 25-year-old righty to Triple-A immediately after he made his first big-league appearance in the second game of the season. There, Beeter recorded a 2.53 ERA over seven starts before he was shut down with an unspecified right shoulder injury in mid-May.

Now the rest of his season is in jeopardy, Brian Cashman said Tuesday. The general manager added that the Yankees will know more following Beeter's upcoming appointment with Dr. Keith Meister.

Beeter, acquired from the Dodgers for Joey Gallo in 2022, is considered the Yankees' 13th-best prospect by MLB.com. He's battled other injuries and underwent Tommy John surgery.

While Beeter may not pitch again in 2024, Cashman said Caleb Durbin is expected back this season.

The versatile infield prospect has not played since he was hit on the hand/wrist by a pitch on May 23. He's on the 60-day injured list at Triple-A.

Cashman didn't respond when asked to clarify Durbin's specific injury. If he suffered a fracture, as has been assumed, it's unclear how severe or if surgery was required.

When asked about Durbin's status a few weeks ago, a Yankee spokesperson said the team's position is that it doesn't need to provide details on injuries to

players who are not on the 40-man roster.

While Durbin is not on the 40-man or ranked by MLB.com, the 24-year-old is a prospect of interest. A contact hitter who has played all over the diamond, Durbin was hitting .299/.413/.458 with 17 doubles, three home runs, 36 RBI, 20 stolen bases, 30 walks and 21 strikeouts over 47 Triple-A games.

After impressing people throughout the organization in spring training, Durbin is a potential long-term replacement for Gleyber Torres, an impending free agent.

BULLPEN MOVE

The Yankees added an experienced reliever on Wednesday, agreeing to a minor-league deal with former Blue Jays pitcher Tim Mayza.

Mayza, a 32-year-old lefty, has suffered

quite the fall after being downright dominant in 2023. Last year, he recorded a 1.52 ERA over 69 games. This year, however, he logged an 8.03 ERA over 35 games for Toronto.

Plagued by a drop in velocity on his sinker, Mayza was designated for assignment on June 29 and released on July 5, ending a seven-season run with the Jays.

LITTLE NEW ON JASSON

Aaron Boone said Jasson Domínguez is in Tampa at the Yankees' player development complex, but he's not doing "much of anything yet."

"Still got a ways to go there," Boone continued on Tuesday.

Domínguez suffered a significant left oblique strain in mid-June. At the time, Boone said the top prospect wouldn't play in games for eight weeks.

Former Browns quarterback **Bernie Kosar** has been diagnosed with cirrhosis of the liver and Parkinson's disease, according to a story in Cleveland Magazine.

Kosar, 60, is on the list for a liver transplant, though University Hospitals hepatologist Anthony Post told the magazine that Kosar has improved since the year started. At the same time, he warned that liver disease can fluctuate.

Another doctor, Cleveland Clinic chief wellness officer **Michael Roizen**, told the magazine there is a more than 90% chance Kosar will need a new liver.

Kosar said he was also diagnosed with Parkinson's by an independent NFL doctor in February.

The Youngstown, Ohio, native recalled being bothered by liver-related issues for years but brushed them off because he wasn't sure of the source. A diagnosis of cirrhosis 16 months ago confirmed the specificity and severity of his condition.

"My body gave out on me," Kosar told the magazine, recalling an episode last December while attending a Browns home game against the Jets. "I really felt like I wasn't going to make it home from the Jets game. I sucked it up, though, and continued to avoid the doctors until the new year.

"Then I went into the hospital and got a massive blood transfusion. It was like: 'How are you alive? How are you moving? Because your hemoglobin levels are so low.'"

Kosar became sick again while traveling to the Super Bowl in Las Vegas and was hospitalized for several days.

NYC A COMFORT TO RORY

The day after **Rory McIlroy's** crushing collapse in the U.S. Open, the world's second-ranked golfer went to New York City.

McIlroy had already planned the trip in advance of that weekend's Travelers Championship in Cromwell, Conn., which he ended up skipping, and used the Big Apple to help clear his head.

"I went to Manhattan, which was nice," McIlroy said Wednesday of his three-day visit from June 17-19.

"It was nice to sort of blend into the city a little bit. I walked around. I walked the High Line a couple of times. I made a few phone calls. I sort of was alone with my thoughts for a couple of days, which was good."

McIlroy had just squandered a two-stroke lead on the final day of

the U.S. Open at Pinehurst No. 2 in North Carolina, missing short putts on the 16th and 18th holes to allow **Bryson DeChambeau** to pull off an improbable victory.

McIlroy did not address the media afterward, nor had he until Wednesday's press conference ahead of this week's Genesis Scottish Open.

"I can vividly remember starting



to feel a little uncomfortable waiting for my second putt on 16, and the putt on the last, it was a really tricky putt," McIlroy recalled of the U.S. Open. "I was very aware of where Bryson was off the tee, so I knew I had to hit it really soft. If the one back didn't matter, I would have hit it firmer."

Finishing off the U.S. Open would have marked McIlroy's first win at a major in nearly a decade

— a schneid dating back to the PGA Championship in August 2014.

Now 35, McIlroy is one of three golfers to win four majors by age 25 — a list also occupied by Jack Nicklaus and Tiger Woods.


