Outgoing FDNY Fire Commissioner Laura Kavanagh can “hang around” as long as she likes, Mayor Adams said Tuesday, brushing aside allegations that her decision to resign stemmed from a lack of support from his office.

“I told her, ‘You can be commissioner as long as you want in the FDNY, and if you want to still hang around, there’s other roles I need done,’” Adams said at a press conference in City Hall.

Kavanagh announced Saturday she would be stepping down as fire commissioner to embark on her “next professional challenge.”

Yet sources within the department claim her departure comes after nearly three years of butting heads with the department’s staff chiefs, a handful of whom are suing her.

In recent months, Kavanagh had “lost

touch with the membership,” one FDNY source said.

“She was becoming a bit more of a divisive figure,” the source said. “There were a lot more negative stories coming out of the department and that got the attention of the mayor.”

Kavanagh will remain with the department for the next few months to help the city’s new fire commissioner get up to speed.

“When she’s ready to transition to her next role, she’ll come in and say, ‘Eric, I’m ready to transition into my next role,’” Adams said. “If that’s outside the administration or inside the administration, that’s fine with me. She did exactly what I needed for her to do, and I think that she’s a great, great leader. And so it’s up to her.”

Adams hasn’t named a replacement for Kavanagh, but sources close to the decision predict he will pick a man of color for the spot, insiders said.

One person named as a possible successor is Kwame Cooper, who was named the

department’s chief diversity and inclusion officer. Cooper had been offered the job once before, but turned it down, a well-placed source within the FDNY said.

As Adams searches for a replacement, the FDNY unions have put together a wish list of priorities they want the new leader of the country’s largest fire department to focus on.

Bringing back a five-man engine crew and focusing on the rising number of cancer deaths among firefighters have made the top of a short list from the Uniformed Firefighters Association as well as the Uniformed Fire Officers Association.

“We look forward to working with the new commissioner. An agency as dynamic and vital as the FDNY requires strong leadership that adapts to the ever-changing risks we face on the fireground,” James Brosi, president of the Uniformed Fire Officers Association, said, adding that the “next commissioner must immediately prioritize the plague of lithium-ion battery fires.”

Eric: Exiting FDNY boss a 'great, great leader,' & can stay if she wants



FDNY officials said Kavanagh was on the front lines of the fight against lithium-ion battery fires. She reconfigured department resources and personnel to inform the public about their dangers and encouraged e-bike owners to charge their batteries outside. At the same time, she had the fire marshals ramp up inspections of e-bike shops and lobbied both City Hall and then Congress to ban the sale of batteries not certified by Underwriters Laboratories or other testing labs.

As a result, injuries and deaths related to lithium-ion batteries have dropped considerably this year, FDNY officials said.

As of Monday, 52 people were injured and one person died from fires due to exploding lithium-ion battery packs. This time last year, 85 people had been injured and 13 people died, the FDNY said.

The number of fires remained roughly the same at around 120, but the FDNY noted that the number of fires inside homes or buildings dropped this year, while the

number of lithium-ion batteries to occur outside have increased.

"This indicates that people are hearing our safety messaging and changing their behaviors," an FDNY spokeswoman said, adding that more and more people are now keeping their e-bikes and scooters outside their homes.

The Uniformed Firefighters Association hopes the new commissioner lobbies to bring back "the fifth firefighter on NYC engine companies in order to reduce response times."

"By having increased staffing you can lower response times," Andrew Ansbro, the president of the Uniformed Firefighters Association, said. "They will also have no choice but to take a strong stance on reversing [former] Mayor [Mike] Bloomberg's decision to close firehouses which over time has resulted in increased response times, due to the loss of resources."

The city had agreed to return the fifth firefighter to the engine companies in 2018, but the extra member was pulled again to make

up sick leave numbers and other personnel issues.

In March 2023, a half-dozen experienced FDNY brass filed an ageism lawsuit against Kavanagh and the city, claiming they were harassed, maligned and ultimately demoted because they seemed too old in Kavanagh's eyes. Each plaintiff was between 54 and 62 years old when the complaint was filed in March 2023.

The department rebutted the claims, arguing that, as of February, the average age of an FDNY staff chief was 57 years old. A deputy chief, which would replace the staff chiefs, was just 56 – a year younger.

Adams admitted that breaking in as the first female commissioner at the FDNY was never going to be easy.

"When you're taking leadership positions like she did, these institutions are tough. She went into an institution that historically didn't even have women in there," he said. "We are breaking barriers, and when you break barriers, there's a lot of discomfort."

Adams adviser in probe still at work on elex

Brianna Suggs, whose Brooklyn home was raided last November by the FBI as part of an investigation into donations linked to Turkey, is still working for Mayor Adams' political campaign despite not appearing in recent filings.

Adams confirmed Suggs' continued employment with the 2025 campaign on Tuesday during his weekly press conference when asked why the latest filings with the city's Campaign Finance Board show Suggs hasn't been paid by the campaign over the past 2½ months.

"The amount of paperwork that the CFB requires for a campaign to do is unbelievable. The amount of skill that you need, the amount of training, the amount of documentation – and I must have a team that can do that," Adams said. "She's knowledgeable on it, and I'm happy that she's able to do that administrative part of the campaign for the administration."

The homes of both Suggs and Adams' adviser Rana Abbasova were searched on Nov. 2 as part of a federal investigation into whether Adams' 2021 campaign conspired with the Turkish government and a Brooklyn construction firm to funnel foreign cash into the campaign's coffers via straw donors.

As part of that probe, the FBI seized the mayor's phones and electronic devices, and, as of last month, a grand jury was reviewing evidence in the matter. The mayor has not been accused of any wrongdoing.

The city's political class has been abuzz for months about whether the probe will result in any criminal charges.

During Adams' 2021 run for City Hall, Suggs proved to be a formidable fundraiser for him. She has claimed credit for raising \$18.4 million for Adams' 2021 campaign and for raking in at least \$900,000 for his 2025 bid.

For those efforts she's been paid well. According to the most recent filing with the Campaign Finance Board, her consulting firm, Suggs Solutions, has received \$40,000 from Adams' campaign since January. Since the beginning of 2022, her firm has earned more than \$322,000 in fees from the campaign, CFB records show.

MENENDEZ GUILTY IN

Convicted on all counts, powerful N.J. pol makes history as

Sen. Robert Menendez was found guilty Tuesday of more than a dozen felonies alleging he sold his influence to a trio of New Jersey businessmen and the Egyptian government in exchange for stacks of cash and bricks of gold — a stunning verdict making him the first sitting senator to be convicted of conspiring to act as a foreign agent.

Jurors took around 13 hours to reach their verdict — guilty on all 18 counts — in the two-month corruption trial at Manhattan Federal Court, determining the embattled New Jersey Democrat accepted almost half a million dollars in cash, \$150,000 worth of gold bars, a luxury convertible, flashy watches and Formula 1 tickets in exchange for abusing his position as chairman of the powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The panel found Menendez's co-defendants Wael Hana guilty of all his six charges and Fred Daibes guilty of all seven of his charges.

Menendez leaned forward, chin in hand, on the defense table in front of him as the jury foreman read the verdict out loud in the 23rd-floor courtroom. After the last count was read, Menendez exhaled and threw himself back in his chair. Moments later, he clasped his hands in front of his face as if he was praying.

"I have never violated my public oath," he said minutes after his verdict was announced. "I have never been anything but a patriot of my country and for my country.

"The decision put forth by the jury today will put at risk every member of the United States Senate in terms of what they think a foreign agent would be," he continued.

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) called Tuesday on Menendez to resign, and New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy renewed his call for the now-convicted felon to step down.

Menendez did not respond to questions about a resignation.

"We were surprised and disappointed by the jury's verdict," Adam Fee, Menendez's lawyer said. "We disagree with it and today, as we have since day one, believe in Bob's innocence. There are grave appellate problems with this case and with this verdict and we're going to pursue all appellate avenues aggressively."

Lawyers for Hana and Daibes also said they plan on appealing their clients' verdicts. "I don't think that the jury carefully considered the evidence or the arguments of counsel, and we're confident that at the end of the day, Mr. Hana at least will be totally vindicated," said Lawrence Lustberg, Hana's lawyer.

In its sprawling case, the Manhattan U.S. attorney's office detailed how Menendez "put his power up for sale" from 2018 to 2023, accepting gifts in exchange for coercing state and federal prosecutors in New Jersey to get his friends off the hook



in their criminal cases, providing privileged information to associates in Cairo, pressuring officials in the U.S. government to help Hana maintain a monopoly over halal meat imports from Egypt and working to advance Qatari business interests.

Manhattan U.S. Attorney Damian Williams applauded the prosecution team's work on Tuesday, calling out Menendez's "shocking levels of corruption."

"This wasn't politics as usual," Williams said. "This was politics for profit. And now that the jury has convicted Bob Menendez, his years of selling his office to the highest bidder has finally come to an end."

Menendez's wife, Nadine Menendez, was also charged in the case. On Monday, Manhattan Federal Judge Sidney Stein postponed her trial indefinitely. She was originally set to be tried with her husband and the co-defendants, but her trial had been pushed back to give her time to recover from breast cancer.

Another of the senator's co-defendants, Jose Uribe, pleaded guilty before the trial and testified as a witness for the government.

Following his September 2023 indictment, the influential lawmaker stepped down from his role as head of the Senate

Foreign Relations Committee. However, he refused to relinquish his seat in the Senate despite calls from top Democrats, including New Jersey's Murphy. He announced last month that he would run for reelection as an independent.


This trial was his second on corruption charges, with his first in 2017 ending in a hung jury. "To those who were digging my political grave so they could jump into my seat, I know who you are and I won't forget you," Menendez said in 2017.

Menendez was reelected for a six-year term in 2018 — the same time prosecutors allege he started accepting thousands of

dollars in bribes from the three businessmen.

The Manhattan case against Menendez came after federal agents, during a 2022 raid on the senator's Englewood Cliffs, N.J., home, discovered more than \$480,000 in cash stuffed in closets, jacket pockets and old boots, along with the gold bars, jurors heard during the trial.

Menendez vehemently maintained his innocence, with his defense team claiming the cash and gold bars were not bribe proceeds. His attorney, Fee, sought to portray the government's case as thin, describing it as "shaky and rotten to its core."

"The United States of America wins

when thin cases brought by overzealous prosecutors are rejected when the evidence isn't there," Fee said. "That will be a win for this country."

Lawyers for the scandal-plagued Democrat blamed his wife, alleging she deceived him about her poor financial situation and the help she sought from the businessmen.

During his summation, Assistant U.S. Attorney Paul Monteleoni pushed back on that idea, telling jurors, "You don't get to be chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee by being clueless."

Sentencing has been set for Oct. 29.

Fellow Dems called for resignation, but he sez he's innocent & won't go

New Jersey Sen. Robert Menendez declined Tuesday to resign from the Senate after his conviction on federal bribery and corruption charges, raising major questions about what will happen to his seat, which is likely to stay in Democratic hands.

Menendez, 70, who proclaimed his innocence and vowed to appeal the jury's decision, did not respond to shouted questions at a news conference outside a lower Manhattan courthouse after the verdict.

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer called on Menendez, a fellow Democrat, to immediately resign, a call that was joined by Sen. Cory Booker (D-N.J.).

"Menendez must now do what is right for his constituents, the Senate, and our country, and resign," Schumer tweeted after the verdict.

If Menendez, a three-term senator who led the powerful Foreign Relations Committee, refuses to resign, he could be expelled by a two-thirds majority of the Senate.

New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy said that if the Menendez seat becomes vacant for any reason, he would quickly appoint someone to fill the position until January, when the winner of the November general election would take the post.

"I will ... ensure the people of New Jersey have the representation they deserve," said Murphy, who also called on Menendez to resign immediately. The governor did not name any potential placeholder for the seat.

Democrats control the Senate with

a 51-to-49 edge, a tally that includes Menendez and several independents who side with Democrats. The guilty verdict would likely make it even less likely that Menendez would run for reelection as an independent. He has filed paperwork for such a run but has until mid-August to withdraw.

He faces a sentencing hearing in late October, just days before Election Day.

Rep. Andy Kim, a central Jersey Democrat, won the Democratic primary for the seat in a walkover after Menendez did not run for the nomination.

Kim had been expected to face a tough fight against New Jersey first lady Tammy Murphy, but she pulled the plug on her campaign after a series of missteps. Kim, a self-styled reformist, won a major victory when a federal judge tossed out New Jersey's so-called "county line" ballot system, which gave enormous power to party bosses in primaries.

Given New Jersey's deep-blue lean, Kim was already favored to beat Republican Curtis Bashaw, a Cape May hotelier, and grab Menendez's seat in the November general election.

Some Democratic insiders fretted that a Menendez independent run could siphon some votes away from Kim in Democratic strongholds like Menendez's home base of Hudson County.

The guilty verdict may remove a possible obstacle to Kim's making history as the first U.S. senator of Korean descent.

"The only course of action for [Menendez] is to resign his seat immediately," Kim tweeted. "The people of New Jersey deserve better."

NYPD probes if death of Bronx boy, 5, tied to something he ingested

Police are investigating if the 5-year-old boy found dead in his Bronx apartment ingested something that lead to his demise, according to cops sources.

Deneil Timberlake was foaming at the mouth when officers and medics responded to his apartment on Bassford Ave. near E. 182nd St. in Belmont just before 3:40 a.m. on Sunday, police and sources said.

He was unconscious and unresponsive when medics rushed him to St. Barnabas Hospital, where Deneil was pronounced dead.

The city medical examiner performed an autopsy that was inconclusive and required further study, according to a spokesman.

Deneil did not have any signs of bruising or trauma, and police are investigating if he may have swallowed something that sickened him, sources said.

A neighbor told the Daily News on Monday that he was jolted awake by screams just before first responders arrived at the building.

“It was like a hurt cry,” said the neighbor, who asked not to be named. “It was a man’s voice. He screamed and then he started crying. It sounded like he was calling 911.”

Deneil’s parents are cooperating with the investigation, according to sources.

Tale of swimmer rescued 2 miles out at sea far from a shore thing

A 34-year-old swimmer rescued by fishermen 2 miles off the New Jersey shore claims he was swept away in Queens 10 hours earlier, New Jersey police said Tuesday.

But this whale of a tale has led to more questions than answers, law enforcement sources said.

The swimmer, who identified himself as Pete Ordane and said he lived in New York City, was found bobbing in the waves 2 miles from the Sandy Hook shoreline about 9 a.m. on Monday.

A fisherman and his son found the man struggling against the waves and brought him onboard, then took him to the Monmouth Cove Marina in Port Monmouth, where he was given a clean bill of health.

At first, Ordane said that he went into the waters off Breezy Point on the Rockaway peninsula in Queens and was pulled by the tide toward New Jersey. But he changed his story at least once, claiming he was swimming off Staten Island, according to the

sources.

Investigators couldn’t confirm where Ordane actually went into the water or at what time, the sources said.

Ordane claimed he was treading water overnight for 10 hours before he was found by the fisherman – but showed no signs of being exhausted or out of breath, cops said.

Ordane declined to be driven back to New York City by police, sources said. Officers provided him with a fresh set of clothes and some food before he made his way to a local train station. He was spotted there acting in an emotionally disturbed manner and taken to a local hospital for psychiatric evaluation, the sources said.

“The Middletown police commend the commercial fisherman and his son, who reside in the Port Monmouth section of Middletown and wish to remain anonymous, for taking such valiant actions and undoubtedly saving Ordane’s life,” a police spokesman said.

Feds: Neo-Nazi terror fiend planned to give poison to minority kids

Planning:

- Buy poison materials, clothes and chocolate candies anonymously using delivery services or paying with cash at store, which haven't been withdrawn from your bank account
- Create fake job with fake number, alternative phone. (Needed Santa's in NYC). Send workers stuff required for job, equipment and carry out some part by yourself.
- if doing by yourself, stick sweater to gloves by duct tapes, same for socks and leggings inside Santa uniform, use white Santa gloves and bag full of candies. Big beard, makeup, glasses, shave unekscesarry body hair and put fake white eyebrows.

A neo-Nazi leader nicknamed "Commander Butcher" tried to set off a bizarre plot to dress as Santa and hand out poison candy to minority children in New York City on New Year's Eve, the feds allege.

Michail Chkhikvishvili, 20, a leader in the Russian and Ukrainian "Maniac Murder Cult" hate group, pitched his killer Santa plot to a prospective recruit last fall, not realizing he was actually chatting with an undercover FBI agent, according to federal prosecutors.

The white nationalist also pitched murder, bombing and arson plots to the undercover agent, sending Molotov cocktail recipes and other strategies for mass destruction, according to the feds.

In one Nov. 2 missive (above), he offered point-by-point instructions on how to get away with the Santa poison plot, including the tip, "after giving around poisoned candies to many racial minorities and traitors, just go to taxi, pay to go somewhere, where you will have alternative clothes."

Chkhikvishvili, a Georgian national who has spent time in Brooklyn living

with his grandmother, was arrested in Moldova on July 6. He was indicted in Brooklyn Federal Court of conspiracy to solicit violent felonies, distributing bomb-making instructions and other offenses, prosecutors announced Tuesday.

The feds say the suspect's group, which goes by the initials MKY, "adheres to a neo-Nazi accelerationist ideology and promotes violence and violent acts against racial minorities, the Jewish community and other groups it deems 'undesirables,'" according to a criminal complaint.

"His goal was to spread hatred, fear and destruction by encouraging bombings, arson and even poisoning children, for the purpose of harming racial minorities, the Jewish community and homeless individuals," Brooklyn U.S. Attorney Breon Peace said Tuesday.

Federal investigators learned that the suspect authored a manifesto called the "Haters Handbook" under the nom de plume "Commander Butcher" after interviewing his ex-girlfriend, whom they were looking into for a series of neo-Nazi social media posts.

"I can proudly say I've murdered for white race and willing to bring more of chaos in this rotten world," the manifesto

reads, according to the complaint.

The suspect's group uses encrypted internet channels and group chats to send violent videos and distribute the Haters Handbook, the feds allege.

The undercover FBI agent started chatting with him last September on those encrypted channels, after posing as a prospective MKY member, the complaint says. "Well yes we ask people for brutal beating, arson/explosion or murder vids on camera," Chkhikvishvili allegedly wrote, adding that "[p]oisoning and arson are best options for murder," according to the feds.

He had high hopes for the Santa scheme, describing it as "a bigger action than Breivik without getting caught" — likely a reference to Anders Behring Breivik, a neo-Nazi who killed 77 people in a 2011 bombing and mass shooting spree in Norway, the feds say.

"Once you do poison attack, I'll do message against US government," he wrote in November, repeatedly asking for status updates through January, the feds allege. He suggested that if the undercover misses New Year's Eve the attack could happen on "some Jewish holiday" at "Jewish schools full of kids. ... Dead Jewish

kids," according to the complaint.

The feds say Chkhikvishvili also communicated with another neo-Nazi leader in 2022 and 2023, the head of the Feuerkrieg Division, who pleaded guilty in September to making death threats against a Brooklyn journalist who wrote about the hate group.

"Mky is only group so far that done so many kills," Chkhikvishvili told the other hate leader.

He also bragged about trying to kill a Jewish patient at a Brooklyn rehab center where he worked, boasting, "I'm working in rehab center privately in Jewish family // I get paid to torture dying jew // I think I almost killed him today actually // If he dies soon that's killstrike on me," the feds allege.

Investigators determined he worked for an Orthodox Jewish family in July 2022. "The family member had been sick for some time and died in or about August or September 2022. The government does not allege in this complaint that Chkhikvishvili was responsible for his death," the complaint reads.

State looks to update funding formula for local school districts

New York State could soon overhaul how it allocates education funding to each school district.

Researchers kicked off a process Tuesday to rework the state's primary school aid formula, with five public hearings scheduled over the next month in New York City and statewide. The funding stream, known as Foundation Aid, directs \$24.9 billion of the \$35.9 billion state education package this year to local schools — but is facing mounting criticism that it's outdated and inequitable.

"[Foundation Aid] is often opaque and difficult to understand," said Robert Megna, president of the Rockefeller Institute of Government, SUNY's policy research arm conducting the study. "In other ways, the formulation is also very out of date, using data from early in the current century."

"We are tasked with making recommendations to update and address issues with how the formula functions," he added.

During state budget negotiations, Gov. Hochul tried phasing out a provision of the formula known as "hold harmless" that ensures all school districts receive at least as much per-pupil funding as they did the year before — even if they're registering fewer kids. Both the Senate and Assembly rejected the proposal.

The compromise was a process to study Foundation Aid — a per-pupil formula launched in 2007 to level the playing field for students with more costly needs — and consider revisions.

At Tuesday's hearing, city Schools Chancellor David Banks said revisions should increase funding for students in temporary housing and foster care, and recognize the range of costs in educating children with different disabilities. He also suggested the state should recognize the unique needs of the city, including through an updated regional index that accounts for its high costs, plus funds for state-mandated class size requirements.

"We are the only district in the state required to meet a new class size mandate,

yet we've received no additional funds to account for it," Banks said. "To reduce class sizes is a worthy goal, but we currently do not have the funding to get to 100% compliance in 2028," when the law will be fully phased in.

Foundation Aid was not fully funded until last fiscal year, and even then, experts warned it was in dire need of an update. The funding stream relies on local poverty metrics from the 2000 census, while labor estimates baked into the formula have not kept pace with growing costs.

"The Foundation Aid formula must account for the students that are in our schools today — not the students that were in our schools 20 years ago," said Michael Sill, assistant secretary of the United Federation of Teachers.

Fiscal watchdogs at the Citizens Budget Commission threw their support behind Hochul's proposal to end the "hold harmless" provision, suggesting it will help ensure the neediest school districts are prioritized for state funding. The vast majority of New York's districts, 91%,

have reported enrollment declines since Foundation Aid was implemented.

"I want to emphasize that school aid reform is important not only to meet educational goals and the constitutional commitment [in New York to a basic education], but also to the state's fiscal future," said Andrew Rein, president of the Citizens Budget Commission, adding that education represents nearly 30% of the state's spending.

The next hearings are in Buffalo, Long Island, central New York and the Capital Region. A final report including public feedback is due by early December.

Michael Rebell, the lawyer in the landmark school funding lawsuit known as the Campaign for Fiscal Equity, which prompted the Foundation Aid formula, said the scope of New York's study doesn't go far enough. He announced Tuesday he's launching his own process through Columbia University's Center for Educational Equity to recommend a whole new formula to meet students' needs.

Threat from Iran prompted tighter security for Don

WASHINGTON — A threat from Iran prompted the U.S. Secret Service to boost protection around Donald Trump before Saturday's attempted assassination of the former president, though it appears unrelated to the rally attack, according to two U.S. officials.

Upon learning of the threat, the Biden administration reached out to senior officials at the Secret Service to make them aware, the officials said, adding it was shared with the lead agent on Trump's protection detail and the Trump campaign. That prompted the agency to surge resources and assets. The officials spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive intelligence matters.

The additional resources did not prevent Saturday's attack at a Trump rally in Pennsylvania that left Trump with an injury to the ear, killed one rallygoer and severely injured two more when a 20-year-old with an AR-style rifle opened fire from a nearby rooftop.

"As we have said many times, we have been tracking Iranian threats against former Trump administration officials for years, dating back to the last administration," said National Security Council spokeswoman Adrienne Watson. "These threats arise from Iran's desire to seek revenge for the killing of Qassem Soleimani. We consider this a national and homeland security matter of the highest priority."

Trump ordered the killing of Soleimani, who led the Iranian Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps Quds Force, in 2020.

"At this time, law enforcement has reported that their investigation has not identified ties between the shooter and any accomplice or co-conspirator, foreign or domestic," Watson added.

Federal law enforcement officials were also warning of possible copycat attacks or election-related retaliation after the attempt on Trump's life, as a visibly stronger security detail surrounded President Biden, and independent candidate Robert F. Kennedy Jr. received Secret Service protection.

Presidents — and presidential candidates — are always the subject of threats, but rhetoric online following the Saturday attack at a rally in Pennsylvania has been particularly concerning, "given that individuals in some online communities have threatened, encouraged, or referenced acts of violence in response to the attempted assassination," according to a joint intelligence bulletin by the Homeland Security Department and the FBI and obtained by Associated Press.



Former Trump rivals now laud him in show of convention unity

MILWAUKEE — Donald Trump was feted Tuesday at the Republican National Convention by former rivals who once leveled harsh critiques about him, a remarkable show of unity that reflected how he has shaped the GOP in his image over the last decade.

Eight years ago, one of his major primary rivals was booted off the stage at the Republican convention in Cleveland when he declined to endorse Trump. On Tuesday night, Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas opened his remarks to Trump and thousands of Republican delegates with the shouted declaration, "God Bless Donald J. Trump!"

A party already united behind the former president has become even more fervently supportive after Trump survived an assassination attempt at his rally on Saturday. Democrats, meanwhile,

are riven over whether President Biden should continue his reelection bid after his disastrous debate performance.

Former UN Ambassador Nikki Haley was announced Sunday as a speaker, the day after the shooting, after her office originally said she would not appear at the convention. Haley, who was Trump's last major challenger in this year's Republican primary, directly addressed her supporters after taking the stage Tuesday to a mix of cheers and boos. "My message to them is simple: You don't have to agree with Trump 100% of the time to vote for him," Haley said.

She was followed by Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, a one-time Trump ally-turned-primary rival who has worked to rebuild his relationship with the former president since dropping out of the primary.

"Donald Trump has been demonized. He's been sued. He's been

prosecuted. And he nearly lost his life," DeSantis told the crowd. "We cannot let him down. And we cannot let America down."

Immigration has long been one of Trump's banner issues, as he has criticized the unprecedented number of migrants entering the country illegally through the U.S. border with Mexico. The numbers of unauthorized crossings have fallen abruptly after Biden issued a rule suspending many asylum claims at the border.

At rallies and other campaign events, Trump has pointed to examples of migrants who committed heinous crimes and has blamed migration for the trafficking of

drugs like fentanyl, even though federal data suggest many people smuggling fentanyl across the border are U.S. citizens. He has vowed to carry out the largest deportation operation in U.S. history.

Trump's anti-immigrant rhetoric has also strayed into talking points not backed by evidence, including unfounded claims that migrants are entering the country to vote in the 2024 election.

Rep. Steve Scalise of Louisiana, the House majority leader, made that statement in his remarks, declaring, "Biden and Harris want illegals to vote now that they've opened up the border?"

Senate candidates who were addressing the convention Tuesday not only blamed Biden for the number of migrants crossing the border, but just as often faulted Vice President Kamala Harris, whom Republicans have increasingly focused on amid speculation that she could

replace Biden as the Democratic nominee after the president's poor debate performance.

The GOP candidates, mindful of their own races, sought to blame their Democratic opponents as well. Pennsylvania candidate David McCormick, for example, tied in his challenger, Sen. Bob Casey, with the term "Biden-Harris-Casey wide open borders."

Kari Lake, the party's Senate candidate in Arizona, stuck to a message that appealed largely to the GOP base and her reputation as a former TV news anchor turned conservative firebrand. She blasted the "fake news" for spending "the last eight years lying about President Donald Trump and his amazing patriotic supporters." She also blamed Biden and Democrats for the situation on the U.S.-Mexico border, saying they're "full of bad ideas."

Trump's survival of an attempted

assassination Saturday at a rally in Pennsylvania was on the minds of many in the hall. One of the delegates in the crowd could be seen with a folded white piece of paper over his ear — an apparent tribute to the bandage Trump wore when he entered the hall Monday to a roaring crowd.

The former president was wearing it again when he arrived Tuesday night, appearing even earlier than he did the night before. Trump entered a few minutes after his newly chosen running mate, Ohio Sen. J.D. Vance.

Scalise, who was injured in a politically motivated shooting in 2017 while he was practicing for a charity baseball game, spoke of his own experience when he touched on Trump's attack. "While I was fighting for my life, Donald Trump was one of the first to come to console my family at the hospital. That's the kind of leader he is. Courageous

under fire, compassionate towards others," Scalise said.

In the wake of Saturday's attempt on Trump's life, there was a heightened focus on security at the convention, which drew thousands of people to downtown Milwaukee, including a number of high-profile elected officials.

A man armed with an AK-47 pistol and wearing a ski mask was taken into custody Monday, the convention's first day, near the Fiserv Forum where the convention is being held, a federal law enforcement official said Tuesday.

The 21-year-old was arrested after being encountered by U.S. Capitol Police and Homeland Security Investigations agents who said he was acting suspicious, according to the official, who was not authorized to publicly discuss details of the ongoing investigation and spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.



Harris and Vance chat and eye vice presidential debate

WASHINGTON — Vice President Kamala Harris and Republican J.D. Vance on Tuesday had their first chat since Vance became the GOP vice presidential nominee, but the two sides are still working on terms for participating in a debate, according to three people familiar with the matter.

Harris (above left) has agreed to a debate on CBS News on either July 23 or Aug. 13. Two months ago, former President Donald Trump agreed to those same dates, or one later in the calendar, on behalf of his then-unidentified running mate — but for a debate on Fox News, which President Biden's team has indicated it would reject.

The people, who spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss internal conversations about the debate, said there had been no progress at bridging the disagreements on the network partner and format, but they expect discussions to begin now that Trump has selected Vance (above right), a first-term senator from Ohio.

Harris, in her congratulatory voice mail to Vance on his selection on Monday, urged him to accept the CBS debate, according to one of the people familiar with the discussions.

Vance returned Harris' call on Tuesday and the pair exchanged pleasantries, that person said. A second person said they shared a desire to debate, but didn't discuss specifics.

Last month's debate disaster for Biden, Saturday's attempted assassination of Trump, and the ages of both men atop their respective tickets could raise the stakes for the running mates' potential faceoff.

"Vice President Harris is prepared to debate J.D. Vance," Biden campaign spokesman TJ Ducklo told reporters Monday after Vance was added to the GOP ticket. "We have accepted the proposal from CBS News — I think as folks are aware — to participate in that debate, and we feel very good."

Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren told reporters on a Biden campaign call, "The VP will take it to J.D. Vance."

"The debate is going to have two parts to it," she continued. "It's how strong our vice president is and how good her economic

issues are. I'm looking forward to this debate."

Finding someone who could perform well against Harris was among Trump's considerations as he assessed the field of potential candidates. And on that measure Vance stood out.

Vance had first captured Trump's attention during his campaign for the Senate in 2022 — a viciously nasty primary in which the candidates often seemed to be competing more for Trump's endorsement than for Republican votes.

As Trump was weighing the field, the candidates gathered for a raucous debate in which two of Vance's rivals had a near-physical altercation on stage.

The debate became intense almost as soon as it began, as former state Treasurer Josh Mandel attacked investment banker Mike Gibbons' business dealings in his opening remarks. Soon, the two were standing face to face on the debate stage, shouting at each other as the moderator tried to keep their argument from further escalating.

But instead of jumping into the fray, Vance tried to be the bigger man.

"Sit down. Come on," he said, sitting in a row with the remaining candidates. "This is ridiculous."

Vance, a military veteran, also slammed Mandel as "disgraceful" for using the Marine Corps as a "political football," drawing loud applause from the crowd. "What a joke," he said.

The performance caught Trump's attention and helped Vance win the former president's crucial endorsement.

Trump's campaign did not respond Tuesday when asked whether Vance would agree to one of the two proposed CBS dates.

Trump had said he hoped Harris and his eventual running mate would meet at Virginia State University, which is where Fox proposed holding its event.

The university was originally scheduled to host a debate put on by the nonpartisan Commission on Presidential Debates, and it would have been the first time a historically Black college or university hosted one.

CBS would host the debate in one of the network's studios, which is the Biden team's preference.

RIKERS DETAINEE DIES

Advocates say medical care was delayed for woman, 23

A Rikers Island detainee has died after jail staff “repeatedly ignored” her requests for medical help, culminating in a medical episode severe enough to land her in a hospital, according to her defense lawyers.

Charizma Jones, 23, died Sunday after she suffered a medical episode while at Rikers and was taken to Elmhurst Hospital Center, according to sources familiar with her case.

Jones, who was serving a yearlong jail sentence at Rikers after a Manhattan slashing last year, was awaiting prosecution on new charges in the Bronx after she allegedly punched a correction officer in April.

A spokeswoman for the Bronx district attorney’s office said prosecutors

consented to her release from custody without bail on July 10, after she was hospitalized, following “a hearing where the defense produced documents that she was seriously ill.”

“Words cannot express our sadness and outrage over the sudden death of Charizma Jones, who was just 23 years old, when she passed away Sunday night following her release from [Correction Department] custody,” the Legal Aid Society, which represented Jones in her criminal cases, said in a statement Tuesday.

“Over the weekend, we learned that while Ms. Jones was incarcerated at Rikers Island, she experienced a medical emergency, but was repeatedly denied initial care by [Correction Department] staff. Subsequently, her condition worsened, and she was transferred to a local hospital.”

The exact cause of death was not clear Tuesday.

Legal Aid called for an investigation.

“The circumstances surrounding Ms. Jones’ death warrants transparency and an expeditious and independent investigation,” the public defenders organization said. “We demand that any correction officers who blocked her access to medical care face immediate suspension, and [the Correction Department] must preserve all evidence — including recent camera footage — that exists of Ms. Jones during her time in custody.”

A department spokesman deferred all comment to Correctional Health Services, stating that the department “is not responsible for the medical care of persons in custody (PIC) and the department is not made aware of PIC health/medical issues or status.”

A spokeswoman for Correctional Health Service said that agency “does not comment on individual patient cases

because of health privacy concerns.”

Jones’ death would be the fourth reported jail-related death in 2024 and the first since March 22 when Roy Savage died in Bellevue Hospital from complications of cancer. Savage’s conviction had just been overturned, and he was awaiting a new trial.

Detainee Chima Williams died Jan. 4 while playing basketball, while Manuel Luna died in his cell Jan. 19.

Nine people died in the jails in 2023, 19 in 2022 and 16 in 2021.

Darren Mack, co-director with Freedom Agenda, said that under Mayor Adams, the number of people serving city sentences, as Jones was, has quadrupled.

“The responsibility for Charizma’s death rests squarely on his shoulders,” Mack said. “He could be using his power to provide alternatives to incarceration for more people who are serving short city sentences, like

Charizma. He has done everything else in his power to drive up the Rikers population while subjecting everyone there to harsher conditions and less transparency."

Jones' death comes just a few months after the city agreed to pay \$2.6 million to settle a lawsuit alleging that officers and medical staff failed to respond properly to another detainee, Robert Jackson, 42, who died of a heart attack in June 2021. A Board of Correction report lays out a litany of delays in his care leading up to his death.

A Daily News investigation found that Correctional Health Services staffers have a history of missteps in handling detainees' illnesses and mental health issues, but are rarely disciplined.

The city and the correction officers union continue to oppose efforts by the Justice Department and advocates to place control of the jail under a federal receiver.

The federal government has its own problems handling medical treatment in the city's only operating federal jail, the Metropolitan Detention Center in Sunset Park, Brooklyn.

Most recently, jail staff ignored an inmate's lung cancer diagnosis for months, letting a mass in his chest grow untreated to twice its size as medical staff at Metropolitan sat on the results of a CT scan, court filings allege.

Manhattan Federal Judge Jesse Furman listed a string of medical treatment delays and screwups in a January ruling, and noted, "It is ironic, to say the least, that even as the executive branch fails to do what needs to be done to tend to its own house, it has – through the United States attorney's office – sought the appointment of an outside receiver to address 'unsafe, dangerous, and chaotic' conditions in New York City's jail system."

NYPD capt. suing chief

Says she rejected sex advances, was spurned for promotion

An NYPD captain claims a top chief in Patrol Borough Brooklyn North repeatedly passed her over for a promotion to precinct commander because she rebuffed his attempt to kiss her, according to a lawsuit.

Capt. Gabrielle Walls, a 23-year veteran from a family of police officers, alleges Assistant Chief Scott Henderson tried to kiss her on the lips on Sept. 6, 2022, in the 84th Precinct stationhouse in Brooklyn Heights, according to the lawsuit filed Tuesday in Supreme Court in Manhattan.

Henderson also ran his hand down her arm, the lawsuit alleges. Walls, startled, turned her head away and Henderson ended up planting his lips on her face, the lawsuit alleges.

Walls joined the NYPD in 2000 and was promoted up the ranks. At the December 2019 Police Academy graduation of her niece, Walls, then a lieutenant, beamed in a photograph in the Daily News with her husband and four other relatives — all current or retired NYPD officers. The caption called them a “true blue family.”

Walls was promoted to captain in May 2022 and assigned to the 79th Precinct in

Bedford-Stuyvesant. Her prospects for a precinct command looked bright, the lawsuit alleges.

But after Henderson’s alleged ham-handed kiss attempt, she watched with growing frustration as 10 other captains — all men — were promoted by Henderson to precinct commander ahead of her even though she had more seniority, the lawsuit alleges.

Seven were tapped in 2023 and three more in 2024. All 10 precincts in Brooklyn North are now run by men. Three are black, three are white, and three are Hispanic. One is Bengali-American.

“No woman should have to choose between being harassed by her supervisor and her lifelong career goals,” Walls, whose husband is a retired NYPD cop, told the Daily News. “I hope that this lawsuit will cause other women to come forward to share their plight and drive meaningful change to root out sexual harassment in the department.”

At the outset, Henderson told her he wanted to “mold her” into a commanding officer, that he was “letting her into his inner circle,” the lawsuit claims.

Walls alleges she repeatedly lobbied Henderson to promote her, noting the all-male precinct commanders. But



Henderson kept telling her to be patient, the suit alleges.

In May 2024, Walls was passed over twice more for executive officer posts at the 73rd and 75th Precinct.

In a meeting, Henderson claimed she was a “bad presenter” at meetings, the lawsuit alleges. Walls named a current female commander who is not good at presenting.

“Maybe she was willing to do some things that you are not willing to do,” Henderson allegedly said.

Walls’ lawyer John Scola said Walls didn’t previously file an internal complaint against Henderson because she was concerned it would dead-end her career.

“The NYPD has repeatedly shown that it will not protect its women employees from sexual harassment, nor hold the responsible men accountable,” Scola said.

“Until the NYPD implements systemic changes to eradicate sexual harassment in the workplace, dedicated civil servants like Captain Walls will continue to see their careers unjustly destroyed.”

Walls and Henderson last met on June 20 with Walls telling the chief the situation is “messed up,” the lawsuit alleges. Henderson then accused her of discourtesy and ordered her transferred to the 73rd Precinct then back to the 79th Precinct in one day.

In early July, Walls met with NYPD Chief of Department Jeffrey Maddrey, who told her she was being transferred out of Brooklyn to a Queens precinct, the lawsuit alleges.

The NYPD said it would “decline comment on pending litigation.”

DEADLY ISRAELI STRIKES

Dozens of Palestinians killed in Hamas hunt, some in 'safe zones'

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza Strip — Israeli airstrikes killed more than 60 Palestinians in southern and central Gaza overnight and into Tuesday, including one that struck an Israeli-declared “safe zone” crowded with thousands of displaced people.

Airstrikes in recent days have brought a constant drumbeat of deaths of Palestinians in the Gaza Strip, even as Israel has pulled back or scaled down major ground offensives in the north and south. Almost daily strikes have hit the “safe zone” covering some 23 square miles along the Mediterranean coast, where Israel told fleeing Palestinians to take refuge to escape ground

assaults. Israel has said it is pursuing Hamas militants who are hiding among civilians after offensives uprooted underground tunnel networks.

Tuesday’s deadliest strike hit a main street lined with market stalls outside the southern city of Khan Younis in Muwasi, at the heart of the zone that is packed with tent camps. Officials at Khan Younis’ Nasser Hospital said 17 people were killed.

Apparently referring to the strike, the Israeli military said in a statement that it targeted a commander in Islamic Jihad’s naval unit west of Khan Younis. It said it was looking into reports that civilians were killed.

The attack hit about a half mile from a

compound that Israel struck on Saturday, saying it was targeting Hamas’ top military commander, Mohammed Deif. That blast, in an area also surrounded by tents, killed more than 90 Palestinians, including children, according to Gaza health officials. It is still not known if Deif was killed in the strike.

The new airstrikes came as Israel and Hamas continued to weigh the latest ceasefire proposal. Hamas has said talks meant to wind down the nine-month-long war would continue, even after Israel targeted Deif. International mediators are working to push Israel and Hamas toward a deal that would halt the fighting and free about 120 hostages held by the militant group in Gaza.

The military said Tuesday that it has eliminated half of the leadership of Hamas’ military wing and that some 14,000 militants have been killed or detained. It said it killed six brigade commanders, more than 20 battalion commanders and approximately 150 company commanders in Hamas’ ranks, and that over the course of the war, it has hit 37,000 targets from the air within the Gaza Strip, including more than 25,000 terrorist infrastructure and launch sites.

The figures could not be independently confirmed.

Israel’s ground campaigns have focused on northern Gaza and the southern cities of Khan Younis and Rafah, where it says it has destroyed extensive Hamas tunnel

Media mogul Watson conned investors out of millions: jury

Former TV anchor and Ozy Media CEO Carlos Watson has been found guilty of fraud in a scheme to trick investors and lenders into giving him tens of millions of dollars to keep his startup media company afloat.

The conviction came after an eight-week trial in Brooklyn Federal Court where jurors heard about how he and company executives plotted to forge documents and faked financial records.

Co-founder Samir Rao, who became a government cooperator, described firsthand how he impersonated a YouTube executive during a business call with Goldman Sachs and finetuned the details of the ruse with Watson (photo).



After Watson and Rao founded it in 2013, Ozy produced newsletters, TV shows, podcasts and a festival called Ozy Fest. The jury found Watson committed fraud to secure tens of millions of dollars in investments and loans as the company's debts grew.

Watson was convicted of conspiracy to commit securities fraud and wire fraud, along with aggravated identity theft. In all, Watson could face up to 37 years in prison when he's sentenced. Ozy itself, which was also convicted at trial, faces financial penalties.

"The jury found that Watson was a con man who lied to investors to get them to buy stock in Ozy Media and to shower him with money to grow the company," Brooklyn U.S. Attorney Breon Peace said Tuesday.

The often contentious trial featured frequent flareups between Watson's lawyers and Judge Eric Komitee, who on Tuesday ordered Watson held without bail until sentencing.

In their request Watson be held without bail, prosecutors blasted the wannabe media big shot for sneaking phones into the courtroom, using protected discovery material as fodder for a lawsuit against BuzzFeed and violating a gag order through online comments and a website alleging he was targeted for prosecution because of his race.

In December, Ozy sued BuzzFeed, Semafor and its founder Ben Smith, accusing them of stealing trade secrets.

networks. The offensives have left entire neighborhoods flattened. While ground operations continue in Rafah, airstrikes now appear to be intensifying in areas untouched by previous offensives in the center and the coastal "safe zone."

Strikes late Monday and on Tuesday hit the Nuseirat and Zawaida refugee camps in central Gaza. Strikes on four houses killed at least 24 people, including 10 women and four children, according to officials at Al Aqsa hospital in the nearby town of Deir al-Balah.

Another hit a UN school in Nuseirat where families were sheltering, killing at least nine people. AP footage showed the school's yard covered in rubble and twisted metal from a structure that was hit. Workers carried bodies wrapped in blankets as women and children watched from the classrooms where they have been living.

Israel's military said Hamas militants were operating from the school to plan attacks. Its claim could not be independently confirmed.

Other strikes in Khan Younis

and Rafah killed 12 people, according to medical officials and AP journalists. An AP journalist counted the bodies at the hospital before a funeral was held at its gates.

The military said air force planes struck some 40 targets in Gaza over the past day, among them observation posts, Hamas military structures and explosives-rigged buildings. Israel blames Hamas for civilian casualties because the militants operate in densely populated areas.

The war in Gaza, which was sparked by Hamas' Oct. 7 attack

on southern Israel, has killed more than 38,600 people, according to the territory's Health Ministry, which does not distinguish between combatants and civilians in its count. The war has created a humanitarian catastrophe in the territory, displaced most of its 2.3 million population and triggered widespread hunger.

Hamas' October attack killed 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and militants took about 250 hostage. About 120 remain in captivity, though about a third of them are believed to be dead, according to Israeli authorities.

I booze-botched the anthem

Andress apologizes for Home Run Derby show, sez off to rehab

Country crooner Ingrid Andress apologized to fans for her uneven national anthem at Monday night's Major League Baseball Home Run Derby in a social media post promising she'll seek treatment for an alcohol problem.

"I'm not gonna bulls-t ya'll, I was drunk last night," the 32-year-old singer confessed on Tuesday. "I'm checking myself into a facility today to get the help I need."

The "Wishful Drinking" singer's rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner" was immediately panned online despite a polite ovation from fans at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas. Some players on the field looked confused, while at least one, Philadelphia Phillies third baseman Alec Bohm, could be seen barely keeping it together.

"That was not me last night," Andress' statement continued. "I apologize to MLB, all the fans, and the country I love so much for that rendition."

Next up for Andress appears to be a trip to an unspecified rehabilitation center.

"I'll let y'all know how rehab is," she wrote in her mea culpa. "I hear it's super fun."

Fans online were largely supportive of her decision. Baseball author Ryan Spaeder reposted

Andress' remarks and credited her gumption.

"It takes a lot of backbone to own it," he wrote. "Good luck in recovery."

Andress' wobbly version of the national anthem drew comparisons to other poorly received performances of the difficult tune.

shrieking performance of "The Star-Spangled Banner" that ended with her grabbing her crotch and spitting on the field at the start of a San Diego Padres game.

Thankfully, Monday night's competition — a slugfest that saw Teoscar Hernandez become the first Los Angeles Dodger to seize the derby crown — didn't appear to suffer from Andress' awkward opening number.

The Michigan native, who was raised in Colorado, knows baseball as a family matter. Her father, Brad Andress, was a conditioning coach for the Colorado Rockies from 2000 to 2008 before working with the Mets in 2011. He started his career with the Detroit Tigers.

In 2020, the songstress told Illinois country station WBWN that going on the road with her dad prepared her to deal with adversity on the fly.

"It taught me early on that I'm OK wherever I go because I'll always be able to figure out what to do and how to adapt," Andress said.

Former Black Eyed Peas front-woman Fergie was heavily mocked for her jazzy rendition prior to the 2018 NBA All-Star Game, while Kat DeLuna's 2008 version at an NFL game was previously ranked by Billboard as the worst ever.

A guide to current Broadway shows by Daily News theater critic Chris Jones:

& Juliet: A savvy jukebox musical from London offering a feminist reworking of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" with added bits and songs made famous by Pink, Britney and Kesha, et al. This nonstop party-empowerment show is derivative, over-confident and fun. *Stephen Sondheim Theatre, 124 W. 43rd St.*

Aladdin: Disney's "Aladdin" is a bit too frenetic, gag-heavy and overly anxious to please — but it has settled in as an entertaining family attraction featuring a diverse cast, a fun genie whose antics will always remain a tribute to Robin Williams, and the requisite magic carpet ride against a backdrop of the glittering lights of a utopian Arabian night. *New Amsterdam Theatre, 214 W. 42nd St.*

Back to the Future: The Musical. Closer to a thrill-park ride than a traditional musical, this frenetic new spectacle from London showcases a flying DeLorean car essentially re-creating the role played, years ago, by the helicopter in "Miss Saigon." The show is attracting a family and tourist audience and Roger Bart at peak eccentricity is fun to watch. But unlike the film, the show makes you feel very little. *Winter Garden Theatre, 1634 Broadway.*

The Book of Mormon: A relic of an era when satirists had more guts, Trey Parker and Matt Stone's show lampoons the LDS religion with the same sharp edge familiar from "South Park." Go enjoy a wicked musical from before America lost so much of its sense of humor. *Eugene O'Neill Theatre, 230 W. 49th St.*

Cabaret at the Kit Kat Club: An epic disappointment and a money-grabbing misfire, this revival of a musical theater masterpiece is overpriced, under-erotized and, for the most part, poorly sung. It's an example of the immersive theater craze taken too far and with the wrong



show to boot. Eddie Redmayne, Emcee of this unfortunate shebang, comes off a creepy human jack-in-the-box. Spend your money elsewhere on Broadway. *August Wilson Theatre, 245 W. 52nd St.*

Chicago: This long-lived show celebrating real-life killers of prohibition-era Chicago has been pulling in Broadway suckers since 1996. The real stars here are John Kander and Fred Ebb, who penned a score that drips with melodic aspiration and lyrical cynicism, and Bob Fosse, whose erotically muscular choreography is the perfect match. *Ambassador Theatre,*

219 W. 49th St.

The Great Gatsby: This is what many people think of when they ponder a big Broadway night out: a familiar yet glamorous title from the Jazz Age, a star tenor in the titular role, songs of passion, obsession and resolve set to string-heavy orchestrations, and a massive Art Deco set cascading off the stage, which has the décor to match. The show is dull and emotionally inert but it's the best dressed crowd on Broadway. *Broadway Theatre, 1681 Broadway.*

Hadestown: A dystopian 2019 musical

rooted in the 2010 concept album by Anais Mitchell and updates and retells the classic myth of Orpheus and Eurydice via a compellingly theatrical blend of steampunk, "Westworld" and self-aware Bourbon St. sensuality. It's a thrillingly alarmist show, albeit potentially jarring to those who prefer warmer or more traditional musicals. Mitchell's music variously evokes gospel, blues, blue collar work-song and the ravings of a rabid cult. *Walter Kerr Theatre, 219 W. 48th St.*

Hamilton: Still a tough and expensive ticket, this Lin-Manuel Miranda global cultural phenomenon employs a young, diverse cast to tell the story of Alexander Hamilton, the Founding Father with the long-term berth on the ten-spot, but also a scrappy immigrant who wrote like he was running out of time. The music is eclectic and often gorgeous, the emotional intensity still capable of blowing all else away. *Richard Rodgers Theatre, 226 W. 46th St.*

Harry Potter and the Cursed Child: An epic commitment requiring two tickets and six hours has now been reduced to a more manageable single show. We purists lament the change, which cut much of the subtlety and fun in the text but left all the spectacular theatrical effects. Even in this version, though, Harry Potter fans leave fully satiated. *Lyric Theatre, 214 W. 43rd St.*

Hell's Kitchen: The songs of Alicia Keys are well suited to a jukebox musical. The burst of energy that flows from hits like "Girl on Fire" are dynamic blasts in a show drawing from Keys' own origin story as a kid growing up in the federally subsidized artists' haven of Manhattan Plaza in Hell's Kitchen. No surprises here and you have to love Keys' music. But lots of warm sentiment and affection for a creative Gotham childhood. *Shubert Theatre, 225 W. 44th St.*





Illinoise: A late entry to the season, “Illinoise” is not a traditional musical but Justin Peck’s wordless choreographic response to the Sufjan Stevens album, as played live. If you remember Twyla Tharp’s “Movin’ Out,” a response to the music of Billy Joel, or can imagine “A Chorus Line” in the cornfields of the Prairie State, you’ll have a sense of what transpires here. It’s not for all tastes but very beautiful nonetheless. *St. James Theater, 246 W. 44th St.*

The Lion King: Julie Taymor’s masterful work is 25 years old but still as fresh as a Serengeti morning. This Disney family attraction features stunning puppets, visual tableaux, Elton John songs, African music. It’s deservedly the most successful musical of its era. *Minskoff Theatre, 200 W. 45th St.*

MJ The Musical: This homage to the King of Pop is set during the creative process for Michael Jackson’s “Dangerous” world tour. Although there is little mention of the MJ controversies (the estate prefers it that way), “MJ” offers the chance to hear a slew of iconic MJ hits and experience his choreographic soul through the simpatico-but-original ideas of Christopher Wheeldon. *Neil Simon Theatre, 250 W. 52nd St.*

Moulin Rouge the Musical!: A decadent live translation of Baz Luhrmann’s widely beloved 2001 movie musical and an intense, anachronistic extravaganza that stuffs cuts of pop anthems (70 songs! 161 composers!) inside a letter-box of gorgeous retro-red velour. This is date-night pastiche with a unifying communal playlist, and an omnisexual dip into a sensual ocean with nervous fellow travelers. *Al Hirschfeld Theatre, 302 W. 45th St.*

The Notebook: This weepy musical based on the 1996 Nicholas Sparks novel and the hit 2004 movie has a gorgeous suite of songs from Ingrid Michaelson, landing somewhere between Duncan Sheik, Jeanine Tesori and Sara Bareilles.



ILLINOISE

The populist show is not for romantic cynics, as you might expect, but this actually is a strikingly artful and minimalist telling of love across generations. *Gerald Schoenfeld Theatre, 236 W. 45th St.*

Oh, Mary!: Cole Escola’s chaotic version of Mary Todd Lincoln casts the former first lady as a wild-eyed wannabe cabaret star marinated in whiskey, paint thinner and self-delusion — and the star of an uproariously anachronistic summer farce that has arrived on the Main Stem from edgier points downtown. It’s a

satiric soupcon at just 80 minutes, but the running time packs in more laughs than any place on Broadway. Even Abe Lincoln would laugh at this one. *Lyceum Theatre, 149 W. 45th St.*

The Outsiders: The beloved YA author S.E. Hinton famously penned “The Outsiders” after watching two rival gangs explode at her own Will Rogers School in Tulsa. The resultant musical needed greater expansion of character, a gentler, simpler touch, a better sense of authentic teenage angst and a deeper focus on the heart. But many love this story and will enjoy the talents here and the fresh roots/country score by the Austin-based Jamestown Revival. *Jacobs Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

SIX: The Musical: Just 90 minutes, this small-cast original pop musical is centered on the six wives of Henry VIII who bond in a post-death sisterhood and compete for who actually had the worst time with their bearded pig. Audiences generally ignore the relatively thin gruel and have an empowering blast. *Lena Horne Theatre, 256 W. 47th St.*

Stereophonic: A fabulous, three-hour dissection of ego, insecurity and the messy, messed-up gorgeousness of the creative process, David Adjmi’s “Stereophonic” is about an up-and-coming British rock band on the brink of superstardom making a studio album in California between the summers of 1976 and 1977. What a brilliant piece of must-see Broadway. It’s Chekhovian, babe. *Golden Theatre, 242 W. 45th St.*

Suffs: With Hillary Rodham Clinton as a producer, an all-female cast of 23 playing historical figures, and a weighty topic like the history of women’s suffrage, Shaina Taub’s musical “Suffs” is more of a gathering of the politically like-minded than a complex evening suffused with surprise.

But “Suffs” also is a moving, stirring show that does what all the best Broadway musicals do: It humanizes, empowers, entertains and moves an audience. *Music Box theatre, 239 W. 45th St.*

The Who’s Tommy: Pete Townshend’s prescient 1969 rock opera, a horrifying if ultimately transcendent howl of anger and anguish at the damage wrought on the Boomer generation by their war-scarred parents, has returned to Broadway in a new, born-in-Chicago production from Des McAnuff that will sock you right in the gut. Who leader Townshend’s epic achievement is presented as a loud Boomer coda, an emancipatory rock banquet and a reminder that dads really have improved. *Nederlander Theatre, 208 W. 41st St.*

Water for Elephants: This sentimental musical based on the 2006 Sara Gruen novel and the 2011 Reese Witherspoon movie contains one of the more remarkable ensembles ever seen on Broadway. The hugely talented crew sings, dances and are fully believable as acrobats, aerialists and roustabouts from the tawdry touring circus culture of America in the early 20th century, the setting of a sawdust story wherein an elephant named Rosie busts her trunk through a love triangle. It’s formulaic in places but the terrific ensemble carries it through. *Imperial Theatre, 249 W. 45th St.*

Wicked: Now more than 20 years old, “Wicked” is one of Broadway’s best loved attractions. The musical is a prequel to “The Wizard of Oz” and focused on the intense friendship between two witches, one good, one maybe better. The Winnie Holzman book is a witty tour de force and Steven Schwartz came up with a bevy of emotional numbers, including “Defying Gravity,” one of the great Act 1 closers of all time. *Gershwin Theatre 222 W. 51st St.*

Eric Garner's killing 10 years on

It was a decade ago on this date, July 17, at 3:30 p.m. that a group of plainclothes officers approached Eric Garner in front of a beauty supply store on Staten Island. He was accused of selling loose cigarettes without a tax stamp. Though that's against the law, it's not the kind of thing that requires sending the cavalry. But the cavalry was there, and a tense confrontation ensued – and escalating matters further, one of the officers placed his arm around Garner's neck and brought him to the ground, pressing him against the sidewalk.

Within minutes, and after uttering “I can't breathe” 11 times, Garner was dead – a victim of overzealous policing. The nascent Black Lives Matter movement spread, with that three-word cry on protesters' lips across America.

It should go without saying that the killing of Garner, which shaped New York City and national politics, is something the public had every right to know about. But those were the days before police were routinely equipped with body-worn cameras; the only reason the indispensable bystander video ever went public is because the Daily News acquired it.

And the only reason The News acquired it is because one of our photographers heard what was happening on a police scanner and rushed to the scene. Letting the press listen in on scanners has a great deal of upside – and there's precious little evidence that it puts police officers and operations at any risk. Yet the NYPD has been encrypting more and more of its communications, letting the daily workings of the single most powerful branch of our government escape broader scrutiny. That's wrong.

Reflecting fully on what's happened in the decade since Garner's killing also requires an honest look at police discipline. It was nothing short of a disgrace that it took the NYPD more than five years to fire Daniel Pantaleo, the cop who put Garner in the chokehold. It was a parallel disgrace that the release of police disciplinary records was shielded under a

cockamamie city interpretation of state law known as 50-a.

The latter has been fixed, and the former is a real work in progress. Complaints of police misconduct are up and the likelihood of swift and sure discipline of cops against whom misconduct has been substantiated is in clear decline. Both are problems.

Wlower-level offenses has been properly calibrated. The breaking of “small” laws ought not be ignored; it's a real problem when people vandalize storefronts or the like. But neither should the police kill mosquitoes with sledgehammers. And even when it's appropriate to have officers deal with relatively minor offenses, they must be careful in the tools they apply, as racially disparate and overly aggressive policing is often the result. Case in point: how cops were thrown at social distancing enforcement in the early days of COVID.

In the years before and after the rupture, coincident with the de Blasio administration's agenda, quality-of-life enforcement shifted away from the NYPD. There'd been more than a half-million criminal summonses in 2009. By 2014, the number had dropped to about 350,000 – and by 2019, to under 100,000.

Proponents of the intuitive “broken windows” theory, which says smaller crimes ought not be ignored lest they create fertile ground for bigger offenses, have yet to fully and honestly reckon with the fact that a far lighter touch on policing disorder coincided with a dramatic decline in violent crime.

Quality-of-life summonses have gone from around 58,000 in Fiscal Year 2021 to 135,000 in Fiscal Year 2023 so far under Mayor Adams. That's still far below Bloomberg- or Giuliani-era norms, which is a good thing – and cops rightly say in most cases they're only responding to community complaints.

Ten years after Garner's killing, police have a legitimate role to play in curbing quality-of-life crimes. They must use their power smartly and responsibly.

Of course Menendez is guilty

Bob (Gold Bullion) Menendez, the senior senator from New Jersey, didn't get lucky in his second federal corruption trial as in his first outing against U.S. prosecutors. In Round 1, he managed a hung jury in 2017 and skated, with only a stern letter from the Senate Ethics Committee. He was then reelected the next year. But yesterday, he bought it big time, getting smacked with 16 unanimous guilty verdicts.

When Menendez was indicted by Manhattan U.S. Attorney Damian Williams last September, we predicted that he would not resign, as fellow Democrat Gov. Phil Murphy demanded. Now Murphy has been joined by Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer. Our prediction that Menendez remains in his seat remains the same. He should quit, but he won't.

Just listen to what Menendez said yesterday: “Obviously, I am deeply, deeply disappointed by the jury's decision. I have every faith that the law and the facts did not sustain that decision and that we will be successful upon appeal. I have never violated my public oath. I have never been anything but a patriot of my country, and for my country. I have never ever been a foreign agent. And the decision rendered by the jury today would put at risk every member of the United States Senate in terms of what they think a foreign agent would be.”

Menendez is currently running for reelection as an independent, having ceded the Democratic line to Congressman Andy Kim. Menendez has until Aug. 26 to exit the race. If Menendez doesn't resign, Murphy wants the Senate to expel him. That may happen yet as the Ethics Committee yesterday resumed its probe in this bribery and foreign agent case, with Menendez getting cash and gold bars and a Mercedes in exchange for using his clout as chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

While Menendez's days in the Senate are numbered either through his expulsion or defeat or actually resigning, he will keep fighting his conviction and the current justices of the U.S. Supreme Court, who have been exceedingly lenient on public corruption matters, may let him off the hook.

In case after case, the high court has pushed back on prosecutors, the latest being that for the crime of bribery, the payment must be given to the public official in advance of the action to be taken by the official. Payments following actions are simply gratuities, not bribes. How absurd.

That is the audience that Menendez wants to get before and they may well grant him a pass. If so, it would be terrible, but it will take plenty of time, more time than Menendez has left in his disgraced Senate tenure.

We now need to move beyond seeing AI as merely new and interesting, and also focus on widespread deployment. For those familiar with traditional innovation cycles, it is in this stage when we start to see some real, tangible benefits.

More than just a technological leap, AI is the ultimate productivity booster. Its potential to significantly benefit, not threaten, workers is unmatched. AI can help us work smarter and enhance, rather than replace, the talents that make our workforce run. Workers now have a powerful new partner for collaboration. Leveraging AI capabilities can help an executive assistant automate routine tasks, developers code faster, and make research more accessible.

New York can help make this bright future possible by embracing its role as a global hub for innovation and building the foundation for responsible AI today. A foundation built on the right mix of equity, skills, innovation, and scale.

First, equity. Accessibility must be at the forefront if New York is to fulfill its potential as a global leader in AI. The state must empower all New Yorkers to equitably access the benefits of AI. Everyone deserves access to AI tools that are free from discrimination and bias, tools that genuinely improve lives.

AI reflects our patterns and biases; therefore, our AI workforce should represent our diverse communities. New York has seen waves of technological innovations, and while many have flourished, the broader impact, especially for the most marginalized people, has often been an afterthought. We have an opportunity with AI to think and do differently. The workers most often left behind can and should be positioned as co-creators, rather than collateral.

Second, skills. The half-life of skills has shrunk from 30 years to just seven. That means that during an average career, a worker's overall skills will change five times.

Continuous learning is no longer optional. Research shows that those who learn basic AI skills now can boost their salaries by 25%.

New York State must foster a resilient workforce that adapts and thrives in the evolving AI economy. That's why we are excited to work with leaders across sectors to explore possibilities like developing digital skills training programs, fostering partnerships between tech companies and educational institutions, and funding public-private initiatives that support workforce training.

Third, innovation. New York must create the nation's leading ecosystem for nurturing AI innovation. With its powerful industries, tech giants, startups, and prestigious academic institutions, the state is positioned to be the perfect incubator for developing policies and programs for a thriving AI workforce.

Finally, scale. Despite the clear advantages of AI, only 40% of organizations have actively deployed it, while an additional 40% are still exploring uses of the technology. New York businesses and nonprofits can take the lead by focusing on a few meaningful projects where AI can have the greatest impact now – like IT automation, digital labor, and customer experience – and then scaling those throughout their organizations.

But you can't scale AI unless you trust it. That's why we must also address data quality and risk controls. Trusted AI requires governance tools, regulatory standards, and built-in safeguards to ensure that models don't run adrift.

Gov. Hochul's launch of the Emerging Technology Advisory Board, which we co-chair, is a significant step forward in addressing these four success factors. Along with leaders from finance, labor, philanthropy, venture capital, technology, and other industries, we have been tasked to help grow the AI ecosystem in New York responsibly, embracing diverse education, recruitment, and hiring.

We aim to provide the state with recommendations for deploying open, trustworthy, and responsible AI at scale, ensuring the workforce is resilient and ready to seize new opportunities.

We believe that where New York leads, the rest of the country follows. By embracing AI and integrating it into our workforce, we can set a powerful example of how technology can be a force for good.

Trump wants to win. And that should scare Biden

Hardly a ringing endorsement.

But in other ways, Vance is the perfect Trump vice president.

Since mocking Trump as "one of USA's most hated, villainous, douchey celebs," Vance has done all the things one must to ideally position himself for Trump ascendancy.

In his opportune run for Senate in Ohio, he begged Trump and his voters for forgiveness for those comments, saying, "I regret being wrong

about the guy?"

He dutifully defended Trump against his numerous convictions, calling the efforts at accountability everything from a "sham trial" to a "partisan witch hunt."

And finally, he said the most important thing, which is that he wouldn't have certified the 2020 election like Trump's last VP did.

Presto! Vance is a veep.

But whether the pick is imprudent or obvious (or both) is only part of the story. The important part is, it shows Trump wants to win.

Talk of an X factor selection swirled around Trump almost from the beginning. Rather than go with another seasoned political insider like former Vice President Mike Pence, Trump would select a fellow showman, the thought was. Someone like Tucker Carlson, Arizona Senate hopeful Kari Lake, annoying agitator Vivek Ramaswamy, even Trump's own son, Don Jr.

But instead of doubling down on personality, Trump's selection of Vance is more about who can help secure the win.

He's a direct appeal to rust belt voters — the same voters Republicans believe Democrats have left behind.

In Trump's own words, according to Vance in his first interview since being nominated, "He just said ... 'You can help me win. You can help me in some of these Midwestern states like Pennsylvania, Michigan, and so forth!'"

We'll see if that's true. But in the midst of an already crazy and chaotic election, it's worth pointing out, Trump is making few mistakes these days.

Gone are the Pepe the frog memes and antisemitic graphics that Trump would impetuously post on Twitter during his 2016 run for president.

Someone smart on his campaign told him to rein in the bombast during the first (and likely only) presidential debate. With the added help of President Biden's disastrous performance, it worked.

Someone smart on his campaign told him to distance himself from the ominous-sounding 2025 Project and extreme abortion bans.

And someone smart told him not to dance on Biden's political grave as Democrats devolved into chaos over his fitness. Instead of piling on, Trump was relatively disciplined, even criticizing George Clooney for his disloyalty.

Sure, he's the same old Trump — there's no other kind — but he's running as serious a campaign as we've seen from him.

And with the horrifying attempt on his life over the weekend casting him as the ultimate fighter — a man who'll take a bullet for his voters, in their eyes — that seriousness comes into even sharper relief.

And that's a huge problem for Biden, whose campaign looks less and less serious every day.

It started with the primaries.

While Trump fended off multiple primary challengers fair and square, Democrats protected Biden from a rigorous primary, changed the primary rules to be more favorable, and in the case of New Hampshire, even refused to be on the ballot to improve his standing.

Bubble-wrapping Biden did the ailing 81-year-old few favors.

Trump enters his convention ahead in the polls, widening his lead in several key swing states, tightening the race in blue states like Virginia and New York, while Biden is still getting calls from Democrats to drop out, just weeks before his convention.

Trump looks strong, like a survivor, while Biden looks like he's fighting time with every cough, whisper, shuffle and gaffe.

It's a severe contrast, and one that's only sharpening as the race goes on.

So, how much longer can Biden keep running what increasingly looks like a vanity campaign, while Trump is clearly running to win? Time's already up, if you ask me.



Bldg. fire hurts 9; residents say flames followed dispute

Nine people were hurt, including a child, after a fellow resident set fire to a four-story apartment building in Brooklyn early Tuesday, cops said.

The blaze on Evergreen Ave. near Troutman St. in Bushwick erupted around 2:50 a.m. Witnesses told police that a man in his 60s, who may have lived on the building's first floor, set the fire. He was seen pouring a flammable liquid in the hallway before setting the blaze and running away.

Of the nine building residents who suffered burns and smoke inhalation, four were taken to area hospitals with minor injuries, officials said. Two firefighters also suffered minor injuries and were hospitalized.

Among the injured was a 14-year-old boy with autism who became trapped on a searing-hot fire escape alongside his mother, father and two brothers.

The boy's mom, 37-year-old Yaret Roque, said she was sleeping when a commotion on the street woke her up. She looked out her window and saw two neighbors brawling outside, with one tenant attempting to sic his dog on the other.

She would later hear from fellow residents that the clash involved the first-floor arsonist being bludgeoned by a vengeful neighbor.

"The neighbors are saying it was the first-floor guys doing things, and I heard he also locked the door so we could not get out of the building," Yaret Roque said.

As her neighbors brawled outside, her husband spotted smoke seeping into their kitchen and rushed his

wife and three boys out the window and onto a fire escape, the couple said.

The Roque clan descended to a second-floor landing where they became trapped as fire bellowing from a window below heated the cast-iron fire escape to a broil, Yaret Roque's husband Magdaleno said.

"I was yelling help, help," said the 49-year-old man. "The fire was so hot, the metal."

In desperation, the couple's 17-year-old son snatched the family's dog, a Maltese named Lily, and rappelled to the ground using some cables hanging near the fire escape, his mother said.

"We were screaming, trying

to find a way to go down. My son found some cables there. He said, 'Let me slide down, let me jump.'" Yaret Roque recounted. "We were desperate."

Firefighters rescued the remaining family members, but not before Yaret and Magdaleno's 14-year-old son suffered severe burns, according to his mother.

"One of my sons really got hurt, he's burned," Yaret Roque said. "He's autistic, so it was harder for him to express himself."

Firefighters put the blaze out within an hour. FDNY fire marshals were investigating the arson claims Tuesday morning.

No arrests have been made.

Crooks tow away 3 classic cars in bold Brooklyn heist

In a bold caught-on-vid-eo pre-dawn Brooklyn raid, two crooks towed away three prized vintage vehicles, police said Tuesday.

The men swiped a 1955 Chrysler, a 1966 Ford Mustang and a 1968 Chevrolet Camaro that were securely fastened on a car-hauling trailer attached to a 2017 white Dodge Ram in East New York about 4 a.m. June 25, authorities said.

The crooks, wearing ski masks, pulled up in a white SUV on Atlantic Ave. near Berriman St. Surveillance video released by cops shows they hitched their SUV to the Dodge Ram and

swiftly drove off towing it, along with the vintage cars.

Both thieves were clad entirely in black. One wore a T-shirt and pants, gloves, and sneakers. The second wore a baseball hat, sweater, pants and sneakers.

Cops released surveillance footage of the suspects, their SUV and the stolen vehicles Tuesday.

They are asking the public's help identifying the suspects and tracking them down. Anyone with information is asked to call Crime Stoppers at (800) 577-TIPS. All calls will be kept confidential.

Rest in peace, Oscar. Your spirit and memory will forever remain in our hearts.





A LOT OF WORK TO DO

After All-Star break, Yanks and Mets face crucial second half with eyes on playoffs

With the All-Star festivities behind them, it's almost time for Aaron Judge, Juan Soto, Clay Holmes and Pete Alonso to get back to work.

Tuesday night's 2024 MLB All-Star Game marked the first time Soto and Judge played together at the annual exhibition as Yankees teammates, starting in right and center field, respectively, while batting third and fourth.

A night earlier, Alonso competed in his fifth Home Run Derby, though a first-round elimination meant the two-time champion has now come up short in the event three years in a row.

The invitations to Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas, offered national recognition of Judge, Soto and Holmes' contributions to the Yankees and Alonso's production for the Mets.

But once the regular season

resumes Friday night, all of that will be in the past.

The Yankees are 58-40 and atop the American League Wild-Card standings, though a ninth-inning collapse in Baltimore on Sunday denied them a chance to enter the All-Star break in first place in the AL East.

They've lost 18 of their last 26 games, a dreary stretch in which their once-excellent starting pitching has faltered; Anthony Rizzo and Giancarlo Stanton went down with injuries; and many in the lineup beyond Judge and Soto have struggled.

"Everybody in our clubhouse has had the faith in us, and ... whatever our record is right now, if you would've asked us out of spring training if we would've taken that, I think a lot of people would have signed up for that, plus more," Judge said Monday in Arlington.

"We're a great ball club. We're in a great position to go out and do our thing in the second half."

That pursuit begins with a

homestand in the Bronx, where the Yankees are first set to welcome the Rays for a four-game series that wraps around the weekend.

At 48-48, the Rays represent the easiest opponent left on the Yankees' schedule this month, though Tampa Bay just took two of three during the teams' meeting in Tampa last week.

Gerrit Cole, who is starting to round into his superstar form after missing most of the first half with elbow inflammation, is scheduled to start Friday.

The reigning AL Cy Young Award winner owns an uncharacteristic 5.40 ERA through five starts but is fresh off of a season-best six-inning outing in Baltimore in which he struck out seven and held the power-hitting Orioles to one run.

Also encouraging is the recent rebound of breakout rookie Luis Gil, who posted a 2.03 ERA through his first 14 starts; a 14.90 ERA over his next three; and entered the break

on the high of back-to-back outings with at least six innings and seven strikeouts while allowing one run in both.

Less encouraging is an offense that, since June 15, ranks 28th in the majors with a .224 team batting average, 26th with a .387 slugging percentage, and last with only one stolen base.

Second-year shortstop Anthony Volpe is hitting .174 with a .217 on-base percentage and a .239 slugging percentage over that stretch and has been dropped from the lead-off spot. Alex Verdugo is slashing .158/.220/.228 in that same timeframe. DJ LeMahieu hasn't been much better at .187/.271/.227.

With the July 30 trade deadline two weeks away, the Yankees could explore help on offense, especially if an impact infielder becomes available at their price point.

They're also expected to be in the market for bullpen help — particularly relievers with swing-and-miss stuff. After posing a 0.00 ERA in

his first 20 games, the sinker-heavy Holmes is 0-4 with a 5.68 ERA over his last 20 appearances. He's blown five of his last 13 save opportunities, including Sunday's.

Even with their annual championship-or-bust mantra, the Yankees face greater urgency to win this season because Soto is set to become a free agent this winter and is expected to fetch a historic contract.

The Yankees also don't want to waste a banner year by Judge, whose 34 home runs, 85 RBI, .433 on-base percentage, .679 slugging percentage and 1.112 OPS all lead the majors. Those 34 homers are one more than Judge hit before the break in 2022, when he went on to finish with 62 and set an AL single-season record.

Stanton, who has 18 home runs in 69 games, could return from a left hamstring strain shortly after the break.

Following their series against Tampa, the Yankees are scheduled to host a two-game set with the

Soto drives in 2, Boston's Duran is MVP in AL win

ARLINGTON, Texas — Boston's Jarren Duran, the All-Star MVP, hit a tiebreaking two-run homer in the fifth inning and the American League beat the National League 5-3 on Tuesday night for its 10th win in the past 11 All-Star Games.

Pittsburgh rookie Paul Skenes pitched a hitless first for the NL, twice hitting 100 mph, and Shohei Ohtani hit a three-run homer in the third for a 3-0 lead.

Yankee star Juan Soto hit a two-run double and scored on David Fry's single to tie the score in the third, and Duran went deep off Cincinnati's Hunter Greene.

Soto's Yankee teammate Aaron Judge went 0-for-2, and Mets star Pete Alonso struck out in his only at-bat.

Oakland right-hander Mason Miller got the win after throwing a 103.6 mph pitch, the fastest in the All-Star Game since tracking began in 2008. Hard-throwing Cleveland closer Emmanuel Clase struck out two in the ninth for the save.

The 22-year-old Skenes, who has pitched only 11 big league games since being the No. 1 overall pick in the draft last July, became the first rookie starter since 1995 and had the fewest games played for any player to make an All-Star team. The right-hander threw a hitless first, with a two-out walk to Soto before Judge grounded into a forceout on the next pitch.

Skenes threw 11 of 16 pitches for streaks, with seven fastballs up to 100.1 mph.

Ohtani, who has gone deep 29 times in his first season of his record \$700 million, 10-year deal with the Los Angeles Dodgers, pulled a 400-foot drive to right off Tanner Houck. That came after the Boston right-hander allowed singles to the first two batters he faced: No. 9 batter Jurickson Profar and leadoff hitter Ketel Marte.

When Ohtani went against Miller in the fifth, he struck out on an 89.2 mph slider well inside and out of the strike zone. That was after twice taking strikes on fastballs of more than 100 mph.

Ohtani's first All-Star homer made him the first Dodgers player to go deep in the Midsummer Classic since Hall of Fame catcher Mike Piazza off Cleveland's Charles Nagy in 1996 at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium. Eleven days after his 30th birthday,

Ohtani was an All-Star for the fourth time — his first with the NL.

Baltimore's Andy Santander, after taking over for Soto in right field, had a two-out single in the fifth before Duran's 413-foot homer to right-center after he had replaced Judge in center.

The AL has a 48-44-2 record in the All-Star Game, and had won nine in a row before the National League's 3-2 victory last year in Seattle.

AL starter Corbin Burnes arrived in Texas the morning of the game after spending time at home with his newborn twin daughters. The Baltimore right-hander allowed a walk and then a two-out double to Bryce Harper before getting out of his inning on a comebacker by William Contreras, his catcher last season in Milwaukee.

After his underhand toss of the ball to first base, Burnes had a big smile on his face when he kept jogging and wrapped his arm around Contreras in the baseline.

Bruce Bochy of the host Rangers became the first manager to win World Series titles and All-Star Games in both leagues. Bochy is now 2-3 as an All-Star manager, leading the NL to a win in 2011. He won the World Series three times with the NL's San Francisco Giants in 2010, 2012 and 2014, then led the Rangers to their first championship in his debut season with them last year.

Mets, who won both Subway Series games at Citi Field last month.

The Yankees then go to Boston, against whom they've lost four-of-six games this year, before traveling to Philadelphia for three against the MLB-best Phillies.

August is much easier on paper, with seven of the Yankees' first eight opponents that month currently below .500.

The Mets, meanwhile, entered the All-Star break on an opposite trajectory. After spiraling to a season-worst 11 games below .500 on June 2, the Mets have gone 24-11 and are in sole possession of the National League's third-and-final wild-card spot.

After slow starts, Brandon Nimmo and Francisco Lindor are putting together excellent 2024 campaigns, making them two of the All-Star Game's most glaring snubs.

A season that once seemed destined to devolve into a second consecutive trade-deadline selloff now has the Mets in position to explore

adding talent for a playoff push.

The Mets (49-46) beat up on average-to-subpar opponents to close out the first half, including a sweep of the Nationals and winning two out of three against the Rockies on their final homestand.

They resume play on Friday against another cellar-dweller in Miami, where they'll play four games against a Marlins team whose 33-63 record is the worst in the NL.

It gets tougher from there, with consecutive series against the Yankees, Braves and Twins — all of whom are at least eight games above .500 — looming.

The Mets hope to get a boost with the return of ace Kodai Senga, who looked sharp Sunday in his third rehab start as he works back from a shoulder strain that's kept him out since spring training.

Still, they likely need to add multiple arms in the bullpen, where high-leverage relievers Brooks Raley and Drew Smith suffered

season-ending elbow injuries. Fellow relievers Sean Reid-Foley (shoulder impingement) and Reed Garrett (elbow inflammation) are currently on the injured list.

The Mets' surge has, at the very least, complicated any intention to trade impending free agents such as Alonso, Luis Severino or Harrison Bader. Last week, the Mets acquired veteran reliever Phil Maton from Tampa Bay.

The Mets have seven games remaining against the Braves, seven more against the Phillies, three against the Orioles and three against the NL Central-leading Brewers.

All of those games against Philadelphia and Milwaukee, plus three against Atlanta, make up 13 of the Mets' final 16 games this year. Building a cushion in the wild-card standings before that late-season gauntlet would be advantageous, making the coming weeks even more paramount.

It all starts up again Friday.

Dolan rips new NBA media deal, revenue-sharing policies in letter to league: report

Knicks owner James Dolan issued scathing remarks about the NBA's \$74.6 billion media deal and criticized the league's revenue-sharing policies in a letter sent to league owners on Monday, according to a report from ESPN.

In the letter, Dolan also asserted the national television and streaming package included in the media deal, set to take effect ahead of the 2025-26 NBA season, makes Regional Sports Networks (RSNs) "unviable."

Dolan's sharpest criticism in the letter attacks the NBA's revenue-sharing model, in which the league attacks the disparity between small and big markets by pooling revenue together from all 30 teams and distributing money from higher-grossing teams to lower-performing franchises.

"The NBA has made the move to an NFL model — deemphasizing and de-powering the local market," Dolan wrote in the letter. "Soon, your only revenue concern will be the sale of tickets and what color next year's jersey will be. Don't worry, because due to revenue pooling, you are guaranteed to be neither a success nor a failure."

"Of course, to get there, the league must take down the successful franchises and redistribute to the less successful. This new media deal goes a long way to accomplishing that goal."

He also levied harsh criticisms of the NBA's new media deal, asserting the deal would render RSN's like MSG Network "unviable" given the inclusion of new streaming partners like Amazon Prime Video and Peacock.

"Member teams depend on revenue received from local rights fees and on increased fan engagement through high-quality broadcasts that provide dedicated and tailored coverage for local audiences," Dolan wrote in the letter. "Yet the proposal threatens to completely eliminate [Regional Sports Networks] without a comparable replacement offered by the league and no articulated

plans to address the production and distribution vacuum that the league will inevitably create in its quest to further disrupt the RSN industry."

"The inclusion of streaming partners in the proposal allows fans in all NBA markets to bypass their RSN to watch certain games in their local market. The proposal offers no local protections for RSNs."

Dolan also alleges as part of the new media deal, the NBA itself will retain \$373 million of total basketball-related fees for the 2025-26 season.

Last season alone, the NBA retained \$15 million, or 0.5 percent of the same fees, marking an increase of 2,487 percent in the category.

In the letter, Dolan said the NBA is proposing retaining this money, which totals "\$6 billion (or 8 percent) of the total-NBA related fees ..." without "sufficient justification ... nor transparency into how it arrived at the sum, how these fees will be allocated or to what extent the league will utilize this purported revenue growth to incur new and incremental costs and further expand the league's ever growing expense level."

Dolan also wrote the NBA's sponsorship and local television packages "would also have a negative impact on the value of each member team's local sponsorships," noting a 20 percent reduction to "the delivery of camera-visible benefits" at home games and that "team sponsors/partners would no longer be protected" during national broadcasts.

"These changes drastically increase the challenges associated with attracting and renewing vital sponsorship revenue by creating a particularly unfriendly environment for member team sponsors," he wrote.

Dolan resigned his positions on the league's influential advisory/finance and media committees in a November letter to the board of governors. In his most recent letter, he noted MSG network has seen a 45 percent decline in its traditional paid TV viewership over an eight-year period.

Young Nets missing Jordi as new coach chases Olympic gold

All reports indicate that Jordi Fernandez's tenure as Nets head coach has gotten off to a promising start.

Veteran forward Dorian Finney-Smith appreciates how detail-oriented Fernandez has been in early practices. Second-year forward Noah Clowney loves how hands-on Fernandez can be with his on-court instruction. Other young players on the roster view Fernandez as a coach who can help unlock certain aspects of their game at both ends of the court.

"As a young guy, you always want to have a coach who believes in development," second-year forward Dariq Whitehead said of Fernandez. "Just knowing that we have a coach who came from where we were last year and believes in that process and trusts in that process and knowing that it's a grind."

However, Fernandez has been away from the franchise in recent weeks preparing Team Canada for a run at gold at the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris later this month. He is not expected to report back to Brooklyn until mid-August.

General manager Sean Marks fully supported Fernandez's Olympic pursuits when he was officially hired in April. He believed the more chances Fernandez had to hold a clipboard, the better, and his stance on the situation has not changed.

The chance to lead a national team has been a dream come true for Fernandez, as it would be for any aspiring head coach. Marks never had any intentions of taking opportunity away from him, but Fernandez's absence has still left the Nets in a somewhat awkward position this summer.

"It's definitely strange when you don't have your head coach," Whitehead said.

The Nets are in the process of trying to build continuity under a new coaching regime. Doing so can be difficult without their head coach in the building, even if the situation is temporary. But the franchise has seemingly managed well in spite of it.

The team formed a "robust" offseason program for players and has leaned more heavily on newly-hired assistants such as Steve Hetzel, Fernandez's lead man on the bench who is currently serving as head coach of the summer league

team, and Juwan Howard, whose reputation speaks for itself.

"It's been great," second-year forward Jalen Wilson said of Hetzel's leadership in Fernandez's absence. "His intensity, his attention to detail, I feel like [he has] everything we need to advance this summer. From Day 1 he's been high energy, wanting to get guys better in all different aspects — watching film, on the court. So, I think it's been great to have him around, to be able to pick his brain, and for us to be coached by him this summer is a great opportunity."

Howard played 19 seasons in the NBA, won two championships as a player with the Heat, spent six seasons as an assistant under Erik Spoelstra and more recently served as Michigan men's basketball's head coach. His basketball

experience has been an invaluable asset for the Nets so far, as expected.

"Just picking his brain and seeing how intelligent he is and his knowledge for the game," Whitehead said. "I just love talking to him because he's a real positive dude. Never brings negative energy to practice, even if it's something he was going through outside of practice, you would never be able

to tell, just always being positive and always pushing us to be the best versions of ourselves and looking at us as if we were his own kids and he'd been coaching us for years. So, that's just one thing I respect from him, just always coming in with that right attitude and pushing us to just be the best version of ourselves."

On top of the contributions of Hetzel, Howard and others, Fernandez has been in constant communication with his staff, and he remains in sync with the front office from afar. Nets players will be in capable hands until he returns, and until he does, he will continue to stay in players' ears in whatever way he can.

"He sent us texts the other day," Whitehead said after last Tuesday's practice. "We didn't have the best practice. He texted and said we need to pick it up. He sent us a text that he watched it and that led to us having a great practice. He sent us all texts around 2, 3 in the morning, I guess they were just finishing practice or whatever. We came in, talked about it, talked about him sending us that text, and we picked it up the next day. So, just having a head coach who's still involved while he's not physically here, it's just huge for us, especially as a young team."

Knicks blow big lead, lose to Nets in Summer League

Here's something you'll see in Summer League you're unlikely to see in the upcoming NBA season: a Nets victory over the Knicks.

The Knicks dropped their second straight Las Vegas Summer League game, this time blowing an 18-point first-half lead in a 92-85 loss to their cross-bridge rival on Tuesday afternoon.

They have fallen to 0-2 after Saturday's loss to the Charlotte Hornets and now have two more games left:

Wed., July 17 against the Sacramento Kings, then Fri., July 19 against the Detroit Pistons.

The Knicks got off to a hot start on Tuesday but turned the ball over 20 times and could not recover after the Nets surged back into the game both at the end of the second half and the top of the third quarter, using intensity and timely three-point shooting to ultimately take their first lead of the game on a Jacob Gilyard three at the 7:12 mark of the fourth quarter.

With Jalen Brunson's team-friendly four-year, \$156.5 million extension signed, sealed and delivered, the focus at Madison Square Garden now shifts to another extension-eligible star in position to ink to a long-term deal in New York.

Next up is Julius Randle, the three-time All-Star and two-time All-NBA forward entering the third season of his four-year, \$117 million contract.

Randle can decline the player option on the final year of his deal to hit free agency early in the summer of 2025, and beginning the first week of August, on the three-year anniversary of his first extension in 2021, the Knicks can lock him into a second contract extension.

Randle was one of just five players to average 24 points, nine rebounds and five assists last season prior to his season-ending dislocated right shoulder in late January. The other players to average that stat line over the past two seasons have either already won an NBA Most Valuable Player of the Year award — Milwaukee's Giannis Antetokounmpo, Denver's Nikola Jokic and Philadelphia's Joel Embiid — or project to win one soon: Dallas' Luka Doncic.

The Knicks have made the playoffs three times since Randle left the New Orleans Pelicans for New York in 2019, and the combination of both team and individual success puts the star forward in line for a pay raise.

He has a base salary of \$27.5 million for the upcoming 2024-25 season, a likely All-Star roster incentive worth \$1.38 million, and another incentive worth \$13.8 million if he appears in 65 games and the Knicks make the playoffs.

If they so choose, the Knicks can offer Randle a maximum of a 40% raise on his salary, or a four-year, \$181.5 million extension with potential payout structure featuring \$40.5 million in Year 1, \$43.8 million in Year 2, \$47 million in Year 3, then a possible \$50.2 million player option in Year 4.

Again, that's if the extension is available and if Randle chooses to accept it.

Randle is in a similar position to Brunson, who eschewed an additional \$113 million and instead signed an extension this summer to help give the Knicks cap flexibility to avoid the restrictions imposed on teams with payrolls exceeding the second apron.

Brunson could have gone this summer without an extension, played the entire 2024-25 season, then sought a maximum

contract offer of five years, \$269.1 million next summer.

Randle's numbers differ slightly.

If an extension were not agreed upon this summer, Randle, who will have 11 years of NBA experience, will be eligible for the 10-year-player maximum salary exception of 35% of the projected \$155.1 million salary cap, or a \$54.25 million Year 1 salary in a five-year, \$314.65 million deal.

The deal would immediately make him the highest-paid player in NBA history compared to players who've signed a contract as of this summer.

It would also vault the Knicks right up against the second apron, which lingers at \$189 million this season and will increase in conjunction with the salary cap, which is projected to spike the maximum of 10% following the NBA's renegotiated broadcast right's deal.

That's about \$208 million, a figure the Knicks must avoid to chase a championship now without facing roster-building ramifications later.

As a reminder: Brunson signed at four years, \$156.5 million. OG Anunoby stayed in New York on a five-year, \$212.5 million deal. Mikal Bridges becomes extension-eligible in October but will make \$23.3 million this season and

\$24.9 million in 2025. Josh Hart, Don-te DiVincenzo and Mitchell Robinson are three more eight-figure players. The rookies Pacome Dadiet and Tyler Kolek have cap hits, too.

The Knicks are already projecting at a roughly \$160 million payroll if they use their taxpayer mid-level exception to sign a free agent (like a backup center to help Robinson and Jericho Sims) to a two-year deal. Bringing Randle back at his team-friendly max would vault the payroll north of \$200 million, with the second apron projected at \$208 million.

And if he were to wait until next season to command his 10-year max, the Knicks' payroll would rocket north of the second apron.

There's also one more angle to consider: Randle is perpetually included in trade rumors for a Knicks team in the market for the piece capable of lifting the franchise to championship heights. If Randle were to sign a team-friendly deal, he could then be valued higher by rival executives given the looming salary cap spike over the coming seasons.

All factors are in play for a Knicks front office that's already locked in its star guard, and now has the ability to secure his supporting cast.

Sabrina steps up as shorthanded Libs eclipse Sun

The Connecticut Sun should've known it was in trouble after Sabrina Ionescu began the game with two 25-footers in the first quarter. If Stephanie White's squad didn't get the message by then, Ionescu followed up with a 26-footer that turned into a four-point play after Sun guard Veronica Burton fouled her on the shot.

Even without Stewart (rest) and Laney-Hamilton (knee), Ionescu propelled the Liberty to a 82-74 win at Barclays Center Tuesday. Ionescu's 30 points gave the Liberty its 21st win of the year and put her team 2.5 games ahead of the Sun atop WNBA standings as the league goes on a monthlong break for All-Star and Olympic Games.

This time around, Ionescu was to blame. She nearly totaled Laney-Hamilton (12.7) and Stewart's (19.3) points per game averages by going 7-of-14 from the field, including 6-of-11 from downtown.

Despite double-digit deficits in the first half, do-it-all superstar Alyssa Thomas and the Sun managed to go into the fourth quarter tied.

White was forced to call timeout just 1:13 minutes into the final period after Ionescu generated five quick points. A Kennedy Burke steal led to an open Ionescu trey in transition. Then the sharpshooter returned the favor on the next possession, assisting a cutting Burke for an easy layup.

After the sequence, the Sun failed to tie or regain the lead.

And as the Sun attempted to go for the win, its best player – Thomas – watched from the bench for the entirety of the fourth quarter.

Ionescu took the helm with her teammates unavailable. It's something coach Sandy Brondello has gotten used to as Ionescu previously starred at the point when Courtney Vandersloot missed time earlier in the season due to the death of her mother.

Ionescu now heads to Phoenix – alongside Jonquel Jones and Stewart – for Saturday's All-Star Game. Afterward, Stewart and Ionescu will head to Paris to represent Team USA in the Olympics.

Vandersloot was the only other Liberty player to score at least 10 points Tuesday. Leonie Fiebich and Kennedy Burke got the start and scored nine points apiece. Burke also logged four steals while Fiebich grabbed five boards.

SURGERY FOR BETNIJAH

Laney-Hamilton underwent a successful procedure to "clean out" two loose bodies in her right knee Tuesday. She is expected to miss four to six weeks.

The good news, however, is Laney-Hamilton and the Liberty decided to undergo the procedure right before the Olympic break.

With the WNBA set to pause as its athletes battle for gold for their respective countries in the Paris Olympic Games, the current timeline projects Laney-Hamilton to miss just six games.

"B had a little bit of a clean out today," Brondello said before tipoff against the Sun. "If you're gonna have a clean out it's probably the best time now (during) the Olympic break isn't it? She'll get (recovery) done in four to six weeks they're saying. Everything went well so that's what we'll plan for."

KOBE'S DAD DIES

Ex-Sixer Joe 'Jellybean' Bryant was 69

Joe Bryant, an eight-year NBA veteran and the father of Hall of Famer Kobe Bryant, has died at age 69, his alma mater announced Tuesday.

News of his death was initially shared by Fran Dunphy, coach at La Salle University, who told the Philadelphia Inquirer that Bryant had suffered a massive stroke recently.

"He was a beloved member of the Explorer family and will be dearly missed," La Salle said in a separate announcement.

Joe Bryant's death occurred more than four years after Kobe Bryant was killed in a helicopter crash in Calabasas, Calif., at age 41. The Lakers great's 13-year-old daughter, Gianna, was also among the nine people who died in the January 2020 crash.

Nicknamed "Jellybean," Joe Bryant was a high school standout in his native Philadelphia before playing college ball at the city's La Salle University from 1973-75.

The Warriors selected Bryant in the first round of the 1975 draft, then traded him to the 76ers, with whom the 6-9 forward played his first four NBA seasons. He appeared in all six games of the 1977 NBA Finals, which his Sixers lost to the Bill Walton-led Trail Blazers.

Bryant also spent three seasons with the Clippers and another with the Rockets and averaged 8.7 points and 4.0 rebounds over his eight NBA campaigns. He started 108 of his 606 NBA games.

He spent the next decade playing overseas in Italy and France before transitioning to coaching in 1992. He coached for more than 20 years, including with La Salle and the WNBA's Los Angeles Sparks.

The Sparks went 40-24 during Bryant's separate stints as coach from 2005-06 and in 2011.

Bryant and his wife, Pam Cox, welcomed Kobe in Philadelphia in 1978. Kobe's middle name, Bean, is a nod to his father's nickname.

Kobe Bryant played 20 NBA seasons, all with the Lakers, and won five championships. He averaged 25.0 points per game, earned 18 All-Star selections and won NBA MVP after the 2007-08 season.

"My father was really influential at a really critical time, where I had a summer where I played basketball when I was 10 or 11 years old," Kobe said on "The School of Greatness" podcast in 2018.

"I (didn't) score one point the entire summer. ... My father just gave me a hug and said, 'Listen, whether you score 0 or you score 60, I'm gonna love you no matter what.' That is the most important thing that you can say to a child, because from there, I was like, OK, that gives me all the confidence in the world to fail."

The father of four daughters, Kobe Bryant retired from the NBA in 2016 and won an Oscar for his animated short film, "Dear Basketball," in 2018. He was posthumously inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2021.

THEY'RE WORTH A LOOK

Rookies not named Malik could make Giant splash

Giants first-round pick Malik Nabers will be an exciting focal point at wide receiver this training camp. But Joe Schoen and Brian Daboll need other rookies to step up and contribute to reinforce their roster in year three.

With the Giants rookies reporting to East Rutherford on Tuesday – one week ahead of the full team – here are some of the Daily News' first-year players to watch:

NEED TO SEE MORE

TYLER NUBIN, S, MINNESOTA: The Giants could have taken an offensive lineman, another receiver, a corner or any number of other players that would have helped their roster in the draft's second round. Instead, they put a premium on both talent and roster needs and selected Nubin at safety, where they'd lost captain Xavier McKinney to Green Bay in free agency. So Nubin needs to play. He needs to be a factor, not just a developmental player. And yet he played primarily as a backup to Dane Belton all spring. Nubin was a four-year starter at Minnesota and a second-team All-American. He has 55 college games and 43 starts under his belt. When defensive coordinator Shane Bowen was asked in the spring about how Nubin can earn more snaps, Bowen said in part that his players are "going to earn their role. It ain't on us ... When the time comes they have to make the plays and show they deserve more." That's nothing short of a challenge.

KEEP AN EYE ON

JAKE KUBAS, G, NORTH DAKOTA STATE: There is no telling how Kubas, an undrafted rookie, will perform this summer when the pads come on. But he logged a lot of time at guard in the spring with the second-string offensive line. And if the Giants' Plan "A" for their O-Line doesn't work out, and Jermaine Eluemunor gets kicked outside to right tackle, the next men up on the interior at the moment are veteran Aaron Stinnie and Kubas. Injuries often plague the Giants, too. Just look at last season for a reminder of how critical depth is for the Giants' front. Kubas isn't as far away as one might believe from a higher-profile opportunity.

PROJECTED FAN FAVORITE

THEO JOHNSON, TE, PENN STATE: Johnson was placed on the physically unable to perform list with a hip injury that the team hopes is not a long-term problem. Fans

were already intrigued about Johnson's 6-6, 259-pound frame and his red zone success in college.

When he eventually puts on the pads and starts hitting people in camp, his stock will only go up. Incumbent Daniel Bellinger's Achilles heel last season was his blocking, including several costly penalties that negated positive offensive plays. With Darren Waller retired, Johnson enters the mix with free-agent signings Chris Manhertz and Jack Stoll (finished spring with an injury) and incumbents Lawrence Cager and Bellinger. His blocking in the running game could help him contribute. He also projects to be a regular special teamer.

BACKS ON BACKS

JACOB SAYLORS, RB, ST. LOUIS BATTLEHAWKS: The Giants' running back plan behind Devin Singletary is to mix in a high volume of minimal investments and hope at least one of them will pop. And while they drafted Tyrone Tracy Jr. (Purdue) in the fifth round and signed Dante Miller (South Carolina) as a free agent, the UFL standout Saylor may be best suited to filling the downhill running element that is largely absent from

the Giants' current group (Gary Brightwell was waived-injured in the spring). Saylor, whom the Giants signed in June after a workout, hasn't played in an NFL game. But he was a Falcons practice squadder before going on injured reserve last season. And he totaled 461 rushing yards and five TDs in nine games for the St. Louis Battlehawks this past season. Tracy, a converted receiver, and Miller, an undersized speedster, both will compete in a group that includes incumbents Jashaun Corbin and Eric Gray. But it will be interesting to see Saylor's fit.

DEVELOPMENTAL INTRIGUE

AYIR ASANTE, WR, WYOMING: The undrafted rookie Asante, a St. Peter's Prep product from Franklin Township, N.J., looked like a smooth playmaker with some wiggle at receiver while playing with the reserves this spring. He didn't appear natural as a punt returner, where the Giants gave him plenty of reps.

But the former Holy Cross/Wyoming wideout has versatility, with experience as both a receiver and a ball carrier. And he got in the end zone seven times in his one season with the Cowboys. Even if he has to

get stashed on the practice squad initially coming out of camp, Asante seems like a Daboll type of weapon who could be useful in this offense. The running backs Tracy and Miller, by the way, are also getting reps in the punt and kick return rotation.

HARD-NOSED HITTER

DRU PHILLIPS, CB, KENTUCKY: There is more opportunity for players to grab jobs in the Giants' secondary than arguably any other group on the roster. Cor'Dale Flott has the inside track at outside corner at the moment, but Flott, Phillips and Nick McCloud all in some way are competing at both outside corner and in the slot. Schoen could end up signing a veteran to play the outside, for example, and Bowen simply needs to put his best 11 on the field whoever they end up being.

It will not be easy for a third-round rookie like Phillips to consistently cover top NFL receivers out of the slot (think of the Cowboys' CeeDee Lamb, for example). But Phillips is a competitor, and his proven willingness and ability to take on ball-carriers and deliver big hits coming downhill could give him a leg up situationally.

There's a lot of excitement in the football atmosphere.

On Tuesday, the rookies of the Bears, Bills, Chiefs, Chargers, Dolphins, Saints, Giants, and 49ers reported for training camp. The Jets rookies will report on July 18, while the veterans will come in on July 23.

Before the Jets' first training camp practice on July 24, let's tackle some fan questions in this latest mailbag:

● **How do you see the (Haason) Reddick situation playing out? Do you think he is there next Tuesday?** — @FranS3837

For those who aren't as familiar with the situation, Reddick is in the final year of his three-year, \$45 million contract with the Eagles, which he signed in 2022. He does not have any remaining guaranteed money on his contract.

When the Jets traded for Reddick in late March, he said, "All options are open." Reddick also said he was focused on meeting his new teammates and getting into the building. However, Reddick stayed away for the Jets' entire offseason program throughout the spring, missing the two days of mandatory minicamp last month.

Last weekend, Reddick hosted a youth camp in Camden. However, according to The Philadelphia Inquirer, he declined to discuss the specifics of his contract situation with the Jets.

By missing voluntary OTAs, Reddick lost a \$250,000 workout bonus. The Jets also fined him \$50,000 for missing minicamp. Players who miss training camp can be fined up to \$50,000 daily. So, my thought is Reddick will report on July 23.

Reddick may not like it, but if he wants a new deal, it is in his best interest to show up and have another double-digit sack season. During the last four seasons, Reddick has registered 50.5 sacks playing for the Cardinals, Panthers, and Eagles.

I have several that I will later touch on in Sunday's training camp preview, but I

will give you a sneak peek at one of those. One storyline I will focus on is the rookies and how quickly they can get up to speed.

First-round draft pick Olu Fashanu may not be asked to start at left tackle on Day 1, but if Tyron Smith's injury history is any indication, he

will likely play at some point in 2024. Smith hasn't played an entire season since 2015 and has missed 37 games during the previous four years.

Wide receiver Malachi Corley and running backs Braelon Allen and Isaiah Davis could all play a role throughout the upcoming season.

● **Say (Aaron) Rodgers goes down again. Are the Jets realistically any better than .500 with (Tyrod) Taylor at QB?** — @goessbo

Well, I have good news and bad news. The good news is that the Jets' back-up quarterback situation is vastly improved, with Taylor behind Rodgers as opposed to Zach Wilson a season ago. The bad news is Taylor comes with questions of his own.

Taylor, 34, has significant injury concerns. During the previous three seasons, he dealt with a hamstring strain, ligament tear, concussion, and rib injury. Because of this, the Jets wisely selected Jordan Travis in the fifth round of the 2024 draft. Travis is expected to be cleared for training camp after his season-ending ankle injury at Florida State.

Could the Jets still contend for a playoff spot without Rodgers? Yes, possibly because of their defense, but I wouldn't count on it.

● **Why is everyone sleeping on Xavier Gipson?** — @rlorde69

Gipson had his moments in 2023, including his walk-off punt return touchdown against the Bills in the season opener. But like many rookies, there were times of inconsistency in the return game and as a receiver.

The Jets are still high on him, but he will have some competition for the returner role this year.

Gang Green added veteran Tarik Cohen, a former first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowler.

However, it is Gipson's job to lose, and I also expect him to continue improving his route running to contribute more in the receiver game. His speed always makes him a home run threat whenever he touches the ball.

A month after U.S. Open collapse, McIlroy finally sees Tiger's text of encouragement

TROON, Scotland — Rory McIlroy insists he wasn't ghosting Tiger Woods.

Woods was one of the big-name stars who texted McIlroy after the Northern Irishman's late collapse at the U.S. Open last month.

"Full disclosure, I changed my number two days after the U.S. Open, so I didn't get it until he told me about it today," McIlroy said Tuesday ahead of the British Open at Royal Troon. "I was like, 'Oh, thanks very much.' So I blanked Tiger Woods, which is probably not a good thing."

Michael Jordan and Rafael Nadal had also sent supportive messages after McIlroy missed two short putts — at No. 16 and No. 18 — at Pinehurst No. 2 to set up Bryson DeChambeau's victory.

Jordan and Nadal hit send right away — Woods waited a week. By that time, McIlroy was in full cleanse mode, visiting New York City to be anonymous for a bit and changing his mobile phone number to avoid pesky journalists inquiring about his decade-long drought in majors.

"From the time I left Pinehurst to the time I walked through my front door on Sunday night," he said, "I probably got about 10 or 15 text messages from media members, and I was like, 'It's probably time to get a new

number.' Create a bit of space."

The 35-year-old McIlroy got reacquainted with links conditions last weekend at the Scottish Open with one eye on the Ayrshire coast. Troon last hosted the Open in 2016.

McIlroy had hightailed it out of Pinehurst without congratulating DeChambeau in person, but they chatted Monday.

"He said congrats," DeChambeau said Tuesday. "So everything's great there. He's a fierce competitor. I know he's going to give the fans, give everybody as much as he can this week. I'm going to be doing the same. We're going to be competing. Hopefully it will be another good battle."

McIlroy, a four-time major champion, won the claret jug at Royal Liverpool in 2014 and then the PGA Championship at Valhalla a month later. But no majors since then.

McIlroy played a practice round Tuesday morning with Northern Irish compatriots Darren Clarke — the 2011 Open champion at Royal St. George's — and 21-year-old Tom McKibbin.

Last time at Troon was a frustrating Open for McIlroy. Like in 2016, he's expecting plenty of crosswinds. The greens are slow but "I don't like to tinker too much with the putter," he said.

Walking with Luke Donald on Tuesday morning, McIlroy picked the brain of

Europe's Ryder Cup captain on putting here.

"He always said he liked to focus on the tempo of his stroke and really, if anything, make it a little shorter and a little brisker on greens like this," McIlroy said. "So that's something that — you know, the strike and maybe just think a little bit more about the tempo of the stroke, two good things this week"

Even though McIlroy never saw the text, Woods' message resonated Tuesday.

"I've missed plenty of putts. I've missed plenty of shots. Just like Jordan ... You see all the game-winning shots, but also he's missed a ton of game-winning shots too," Woods said. "The thing is you still take the game-winning shot, and I still want the last putt."

McIlroy tees off Thursday with Ryder Cup teammate Tyrrell Hatton and Max Homa — who was a Ryder Cup bright spot for the Americans — at 10:09 a.m. local time. Defending champion Brian Harman is in the group just ahead of them.

After feeling like "one of the herd" in New York, McIlroy knows his game is still at an elite level. In the five-year stretch from 2015 to 2020, he said he was never that close to winning another major.

"So I'd much rather have these close calls. It means that I'm getting closer."

Barbie tribute for Bird

The doll is part of Mattel's Role Model series as the company celebrates Barbie's 65th anniversary and the company's summer of sports initiative.



UConn, where Bird won two national championships in college, posted a photo of her smiling while holding her Barbie.

NADAL IFFY FOR OPEN

Rafael Nadal was on the U.S. Open entry list released Tuesday via a protected ranking, although that doesn't necessarily mean he will compete in the year's last Grand Slam tournament.

Nadal has been dealing with injuries the past two seasons and playing sporadically. He is participating in his first tournament in 1 ½ months this week in Bastad, Sweden, winning a doubles match alongside Casper Ruud on Monday, then beating Leo Borg, the son of former player Bjorn Borg, in singles on Tuesday.

He is expected to compete at the Paris Olympics, which starts its tennis competition on July 27 and is being held at Roland Garros, the same as the French Open. But it's not clear how much — or even if — Nadal will continue to play after that.

COVID HITS TOUR

Chris Harper of Australia withdrew from the Tour de France ahead of Tuesday's 16th stage, his team said, as COVID-19 infections continue to hit cycling's marquee event.

Harper's withdrawal marks the latest case of coronavirus at the three-week race, following those of Juan Ayuso — a teammate of race leader Tadej Pogacar — Tom Pidcock and Maxim Van Gils.


