# JOE BOWS OUT,

## Withdraws from reelex bid 'in the best interest'

President Biden said Sunday he will not seek reelection and is ending his 2024 presidential campaign, a stunning announcement that upends an already tumultuous race for the Oval Office.

The 81-year-old commander-in-chief's historic decision followed weeks of calls from Democratic leaders and voters to bow out of the race after his shaky debate performance last month against former President Donald Trump, the Republican Party nominee.

"While it has been my intention to seek reelection, I believe it is in the best interest of my party and the country for me to stand down and to focus solely on fulfilling my duties as president for the remainder of my term," Biden said in a statement.

Minutes after announcing his departure from the race, Biden threw his support behind Vice President Kamala Harris.

"My very first decision as the party nominee in 2020 was to pick Kamala Harris as my Vice President. And it's been the best decision I've made," he wrote on X. "Today I want to offer my full support and endorsement for Kamala to be the nominee of our party this year. Democrats — it's time to come together and beat Trump."

Harris and Biden reportedly spoke about the plans and hoped for transition earlier Sunday. The vice president quickly racked up endorsements from other prominent Democrats, including notable Biden ally Rep. James Clyburn (D-S.C.), as the party rallied around her.

"I am honored to have the President's endorsement and my intention is to earn and win this nomination," Harris wrote on X. "I will do everything in my power to unite the Democratic Party — and unite our nation — to defeat Donald Trump."

Biden's fitness for office was questioned repeatedly after the disastrous June 27 debate against Trump in which he appeared unable to complete and articulate several different thoughts. Trump, 78, celebrated Biden's departure from the race on Sunday.

"Joe Biden was not fit to run for President, and is certainly not fit to serve — And never was!" Trump wrote on Truth Social. Other Republicans also called on

Biden to step down immediately.

Biden is already the oldest president in American history. His withdrawal sets the stage for an open Democratic National Convention, though Harris is seen as the heavy favorite to claim the nomination. The convention will run Aug. 19-22 in Chicago. Biden said he would address the country "later this week" about his decision not to run.

The last president who was eligible to seek reelection but chose not to was Lyndon Johnson in

1968, though he had already served just over five years in office following the assassination of John F. Kennedy.

Following the debate, polls and analysts predicted Trump as the likely winner in a general election against Biden, numbers that only tilted further toward the Republican candidate after he was nearly assassinated July 13 outside Pittsburgh.

Biden's colleagues in the Democratic Party criticized his debate performance after he stumbled

over sentences and appeared to lose his train of thought. In recent days, rumors swirled that even longtime Biden ally Barack Obama was working behind the scenes to persuade Biden to step aside.

"Joe Biden has been one of America's most consequential presidents, as well as a dear friend and partner to me," Obama wrote in a blog post. "Today, we've also been reminded — again — that he's a patriot of the highest order." Senate Majority Leader Chuck

Schumer (D-N.Y.), House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries (D-Brooklyn) and former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) all reportedly pressured Biden to drop out after polls showed he would likely lose to Trump and damage Democratic chances in the House and Senate.

Biden had publicly resisted calls to drop out as recently as Friday. "That is not happening, period," White House spokesman Andrew Bates said in response to an NBC News report. "The

individuals making those claims are not speaking for his family or his team."

In the primaries, Biden cruised to victory while facing only token opposition from largely unknown candidates. More well-known Democrats such as California Gov. Gavin Newsom, Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker and Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg stayed out of the race.

But after the debate, many in the party began questioning Biden's viability as a candidate.

On July 2, Rep. Lloyd Doggett of Texas became the first Democratic member of Congress to call for Biden to step aside.

The calls slowly grew louder, with Sen. Peter Welch, from Vermont, becoming the first Democratic senator to join the chorus on July 10, followed a week later by Rep. Adam Schiff, a high-profile congressman from California.

Schiff was quickly joined by Sens. Jon Tester (D-Mont.) and Sherrod Brown (D-Ohio), both of whom face tough reelection

prospects in states that voted for Trump in 2016 and 2020.

According to polling aggregator FiveThirtyEight, Trump had a 43.5% to 40.2% advantage over Biden in national polls as of Sunday. Robert F. Kennedy Jr. was polling at 8.7%.

The last brokered convention among the two major American political parties occurred at the 1952 Democratic National Convention. Democrats eventually chose Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson as their nominee, and he was

crushed in the general election by Dwight D. Eisenhower. The brokered convention occurred after Democratic President Harry S. Truman decided not to seek reelection.

However, both Truman and Johnson, the last two eligible incumbents not to seek reelection, dropped out in March of their respective election years. Biden's late departure, after dominating the primary voting process, is unprecedented in American history.

# WHO WILL DEMS PICK?

## Kamala front-runner; Whitmer, Newsom, Shapiro possibles

After President Biden ended his reelection bid Sunday, he endorsed Vice President Kamala Harris, making her the instant front-runner to replace him on the ticket to face former President Donald Trump.

But Harris is officially only one potential candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The nation's first Black woman vice president still needs to win a majority of delegates to the Democratic National Convention in August.

Biden's endorsement will carry a lot of weight, and the vast majority of delegates are pledged to him, although they don't have to vote for Harris now that he has dropped out.

Still, some prominent Democrats have called for an open contest for the

presidential nomination.

That process could include a debate at the convention to help determine who would get the pick.

That dynamic could encourage other possible Democratic rivals to challenge Harris for the nod.

Here's a breakdown of potential nominees.

### Kamala Harris

As Biden's loyal vice president and handpicked successor, Harris is the overwhelming front-runner to succeed him on the ticket, and as of now at least is a good bet to get the nomination.

Harris ran a successful campaign with Biden and served loyally by his side for four years. Tens of millions of Democrats already have voted for her.

In the minutes after Biden gave Harris his endorsement, other top Democrats

jumped in to back her.

But Harris has a couple of tricky weeks to go before the Democratic National Convention, and any slipup could potentially open the door to another candidate.

Some believe America is not ready to vote for a woman, let alone a Black woman, for the nation's highest office.

Harris' identity as a California progressive could also be seen as a particularly tough sell in the Rust Belt battleground states that look likely to determine the next president.

### Gavin Newsom

The California governor is a popular, young and extremely articulate Democratic leader of the biggest blue state in the nation.

Like any other relatively youthful Democrats, the 56-year-old politician would sell himself as a dramatic contrast with the

older Trump.

Like any other white male candidate, though, the California governor would have a tough time selling himself as an alternative to Harris.

Newsom's slicked-back West Coast image might be perceived as a problem in the Midwest swing states.

### Gretchen Whitmer

The Michigan governor is many Democratic strategists' dream candidate: She's the successful and extremely popular leader of perhaps the most pivotal Rust Belt swing state.

At 52, she's younger than many of her rivals, let alone Trump, who is 26 years older than her.

Whitmer has a tough-as-nails Midwest demeanor that could hold broad national appeal, especially in contrast with Trump.

# (Most) N.Y. pols praise Joe's decision and laud his legacy

President Biden announced Sunday he will not seek reelection in 2024, sparking a flurry of reactions from prominent New York politicians just four months before Election Day.

Biden, 81, wrote in his statement he believes dropping out is in the best interest of the Democratic Party and the people of the United States.

"Passing the torch at this critical moment shows his continued commitment to our country," Mayor Adams said in a statement.

He also praised Biden's leadership in the years following the COVID-19 pandemic that devastated the city.

"America owes a debt of gratitude to President Joe Biden," Adams said. "He took us out of COVID, stabilized the country and restored the soul of the nation."

The high praise wasn't solitary.

Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-Manhattan) likened Biden's time in the Oval Office to those of Franklin D. Roosevelt and Lyndon B. Johnson

Biden "will go down as one of the most consequential Presidents in American history — having led our nation's recovery through one of its darkest chapters and making record-breaking investments in American families," Nadler wrote in a post on X. "Joe's announcement today reflects what we've known all along: He is an American patriot who is willing to put America's interests over his own."

Biden has backed Vice President Kamala Harris to replace him as the Democratic nominee. Later Sunday, she announced she would run for president.

Among the vice president's supporters was Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (D-Bronx, Queens), who endorsed Harris' presidential run in a post Sunday night on X.

"Now more than ever, it is crucial that our party and country swiftly unite to defeat Donald Trump and the threat to American democracy," she said.

Looking to the future, Adams said, "From here, the Democratic Party must continue to put working people first and address their concerns about the cost of living, public safety and our shared democratic values. I look forward to working with senior members of the party as we make our push toward November and ensure we address the concerns of New Yorkers and all Americans."

Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) echoed those thoughts, calling Biden's decision a patriotic act.

"Joe Biden has not only been a great president and a great legislative leader but he is a truly amazing human being," Schumer said. "His decision was not easy, but he once again put his country, his party and our future first."

Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-N.Y.) also weighed in, highlighting Biden's numerous accomplishments.

"President Biden has served our country with courage, compassion, integrity and decency," Gillibrand said. "His administration's achievements in gun safety, veterans health care, infrastructure and climate change have significantly improved the lives of millions of Americans."

The Rev. Al Sharpton, an outspoken critic of Trump, reflected on Biden's motivations and his legacy, particularly in addressing racial injustice.

"When Joe Biden first ran for president, he was motivated by the ugliness of neo-Nazis and Klansmen marching in Charlottesville," Sharpton said. "He has fulfilled his promise to heal our nation's soul."

"This administration has delivered for Black America and steered our nation on a better course. We cannot forget the reality of a second Trump term is a real threat, and Biden has made significant strides in ensuring a more equitable future for all Americans."

Meanwhile, Rep. Nicole Malliotakis (R-S.I., Brooklyn) called for Biden to "resign immediately."

"Make no mistake," she said, "whoever replaces Joe Biden on the ballot will push the same left-wing Democrat agenda that is destroying our country and has led to an unprecedented illegal immigration crisis, unsafe and unaffordable cities and record-high interest rates, energy costs and food prices."

In his Sunday afternoon statement, Biden emphasized the progress made during his term and his deep gratitude to the American people. He wrote that he plans to focus on presidential duties for the remainder of his term.

In a post on his social media platform Truth Social, Trump celebrated the news, writing, "Joe Biden was not fit to run for President, and is certainly not fit to serve — And never was!"

"We will suffer greatly because of his presidency, but we will remedy the damage he has done very quickly. MAKE AMERICA GREAT AGAIN!"

She's also a woman, which might make it easier to sell Democrats on her as a trail-blazing alternative to Harris.

## Pete Buttigieg

Biden's transportation secretary is an effective communicator and popular moderate Democrat who won plaudits for a promising, if losing, Democratic primary campaign in 2020.

The gay former mayor of South Bend, Ind., Buttigieg brings Midwest authenticity. At just 42, he would claim a generational mantle for change, a dramatic shift from Trump.

Buttigieg performed abysmally with Black and Latino voters in the 2020 primaries.

That would make him a particularly tough sell to the party's base, especially if there is an open fight with Harris over the nomination.

## Mark Kelly

He's a moderate and popular senator from swing state Arizona. A former astronaut, he's married to Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, who became a liberal hero when she survived an assassination attempt to become a prominent gun control advocate.

## Josh Shapiro

The popular governor of Pennsylvania would instantly make Democrats favored to win the blue wall swing state.

He has a moderate record and recently won praise for his heartfelt statement to the nation after Trump was wounded in an assassination attempt.

Shapiro would be the first Jewish presidential candidate from a major party, which might be a counterpoint to Harris' trailblazing claim as the first Black woman to lead a ticket.

## How it could all play out as Dems suddenly face open contest

With President Biden ending his reelection bid and endorsing Vice President Kamala Harris, Democrats now must navigate a shift that is unprecedented this late in an election year.

Democrats are set to hold their convention Aug. 19-22 in Chicago. What was supposed to be a coronation for Biden now becomes an open contest in which nearly 4,700 delegates will be responsible for picking a new standard-bearer to challenge Republican Donald Trump in the fall.

The path ahead is neither easy nor obvious, even with Biden

endorsing Harris. There are unanswered questions about logistics, money and political fallout.

### Can Biden redirect his delegates?

Biden won every state primary and caucus this year and lost only the territory of American Samoa. At least 3,896 delegates had been pledged to support him.

Current party rules do not permit Biden to pass his delegates to another candidate. Politically, though, his endorsement is likely to be influential.

### What could happen at the convention?

With Biden stepping aside, Democrats technically start with an open convention. But realistically, his endorsement pushes Democrats into murky territory.

The immediate burden is on Harris to solidify support across almost 4,000 delegates from the states, territories and District of Columbia, plus more than 700 so-called superdelegates that include party leaders, certain elected officials and former presidents and vice presidents.

### Will anyone challenge Harris?

Even before Biden announced his decision, Democrats floated

California Gov. Gavin Newsom and Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer as potential contenders in addition to Harris. Yet some Democrats argued publicly, and many privately, that it would be a no-brainer to elevate the first woman, first Black woman and first person of South Asian descent to hold national office.

Given how important Black voters – and Black women especially – were to Biden's nomination and his choice of Harris as running mate, it would be risky, to say the least, for Democrats to pass her over for a white nominee. Democrats already faced historical headwinds before Biden's

withdrawal. Newsom and Whitmer, both of whom are white, and any other Democrat would also have to weigh the short-term and long-term benefits of challenging Harris now versus preserving goodwill for a future presidential primary.

Yet, fair or not, Harris also has not been viewed as an especially beloved or empowered vice president. The best scenario for her and Democrats is to quickly shore up support and project a united front. Democrats could even go forward with their plans for an early virtual vote – a move they'd planned to make sure Biden was selected ahead of Ohio's general election

### What happens to Biden's campaign money?

Biden's campaign recently reported \$91 million cash on hand. Allied Democratic campaign committees brought the total at his disposal to more than \$240 million. Campaign finance experts agree generally that Harris could control all those funds as the campaign was set up in her name as well as Biden's. If Democrats do nominate someone other than Harris, party accounts could still benefit the nominee, but the Biden-Harris account would have more restrictions. For example,

legal experts say it could become an independent expenditure political action committee but not simply transfer its balance to a different nominee.

### How will a vice presidential nomination work?

The vice presidential nomination is always a separate convention vote. In routine years, the convention ratifies the choice of the nominee. If Harris closes ranks quickly, she could name her choice and have the delegates ratify it. In an extended fight, though, the vice presidency could become part of horse-trading – again, a return to conventions of

an earlier era.

### Can Republicans keep Harris off state ballots?

Any curveball during a U.S. presidential campaign is certain to produce a flurry of state and federal lawsuits in this hyperpartisan era, and some conservatives have threatened just that.

State laws, though, typically do not prescribe how parties choose their nominees for president. And some GOP figures – Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine and Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey – have worked already this year to ensure their party did not deny Democrats' routine ballot access.



# New Yorkers have mixed emotions on president's decision to quit the race

After President Biden's announcement that he would not seek reelection in 2024, New Yorkers weighed in with mixed emotions – and relief.

"We knew that it was coming," Bronx resident Roberto Ruiz said of the decision to bow out. "It took too long. He should have dropped out a long time ago."

Rumors began swirling that Biden, 81, would drop out of the race after widespread concern following his devastating debate performance last month.

"That night, things looked pretty bleak," said Sam Warren, 62, of Jackson Heights, Queens. Biden "looked very weak, but then he had a great campaign rally in Pennsylvania and a great interview with Lester Holt."

Queens real estate agent Thomas Henderson agreed.

"I think it is the right thing for the country," said Henderson, 47. "After watching the debate, it was clear he comes off frail and weak."

In a statement, Biden conceded he believes dropping out of the race four months before Election Day is in the best interest of the Democratic Party and the country. He noted he would spend the rest of his time in the Oval Office fulfilling presidential duties.

"I feel sorry for [Biden]," said Ruiz. "He's a good guy. He made a mistake staying this long."

The announcement left Brooklyn resident Victoria Zimmerman worried about the coming months as election season revs up.

"Now we're going to scramble to figure out who we're going to get as his replacement," said Zimmerman, 57. "[Harris is] not going to win it. I don't think she wants the job."

Other New Yorkers felt relief and even celebrated the announcement.

"I heard about the news immediately, [and] I was like,

thank God," said Muhammed Begaliev, of Bensonhurst, Brooklyn. "It was kind of a done deal after a horrible debate situation. [Biden] was leaning toward dropping out anyways."

Later Sunday – and with Biden's backing – Vice President Kamala Harris announced she would be running for president.

"I don't see how they can get another candidate strong enough to beat Trump in several months," said Warren. "If they think it's going to be Kamala Harris, I don't think she has a chance."

Harris has faced stiff criticism over her visibility and impact in office, leaving some doubting she would come out on top in the Empire State.

"I don't think people in New York are going to support Kamala," said Ivan Stallings, 31, also of Jackson Heights. "She didn't do too well as a vice president"


Though Harris is the front-runner with Biden's support, other rumored potential nominees are California Gov. Gavin Newsom, Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and Biden's transportation secretary, Pete Buttigieg.

But any other option may have come too late, according to Upper West Sider Leah Cohen.

"I think a lot of Democrats would have been happy to hear this news last year," said Cohen, 37. "Biden is too old and Trump is out of his mind. Younger, fresher candidates would have been welcomed had this unfolded differently."

Cohen also questioned whether a Democratic candidate joining the race in the eleventh hour could beat former President Donald Trump, who survived a graze wound to the ear July 13 when 20-year-old Thomas Matthew Crooks opened fire during a campaign rally in Butler, Pa.

"I don't believe there's time for a candidate to run a successful campaign against Donald Trump, especially in the months following an assassination attempt," she added.

# Iffy e-bike? Trade it in

## City offering safe 2-wheelers & batteries to delivery workers

Food delivery workers will be able to trade in sketchy, uncertified e-bikes and illegal mopeds for safer equipment by the end of the year, city officials are expected to announce Monday.

The \$2 million trade-in program will provide workers with a new e-bike and two new batteries certified by Underwriters Laboratories in return for their old ride, city transportation officials told the Daily News.

“E-bikes are critical tools used by tens of thousands of delivery workers to support our economy,” Transportation Commissioner Ydanis Rodriguez said in a statement.

“By providing these workers with reliable, safe equipment, we are helping protect this workforce, their neighbors and loved ones, and all New Yorkers who

rely on them each day,” he added.

The program will be open to any New Yorker 18 or older who has earned at least \$1,500 in the past year delivering food.

Any non-UL certified e-bike will be eligible for trade-in, and must be turned in with their batteries, according to the Department of Transportation.

Additionally, any gas or electric moped that lacks a vehicle identification number — and therefore can’t be registered at the DMV for legal street use — will be eligible for trade-in.

Applications are expected to open by year’s end, after a public hearing set for August. Trade-ins are expected to take place next year.

Transportation officials said the program aims to reduce the fire risk associated with shoddily-made lithium-ion batteries, like those sold as cheap replacements for various e-bikes.

The batteries sparked more than 268 fires in New York City last year, killing 18 people, according to the FDNY.

Lithium-ion battery fires are “self-oxidizing,” meaning they can burn even if deprived of oxygen, making it hard to fight the flames.

The Adams administration’s expected announcement comes on the heels of state legislation aimed at getting uncertified lithium-ion batteries off the market altogether.

Gov. Hochul signed a bevy of bills

earlier this month outlawing the sale of shoddy batteries, and her administration has been educating consumers on proper battery charging techniques and teaching firefighters how to extinguish stubborn lithium-ion blazes.

Monday’s expected announcement hopes to use the program to get illegal, unregistered mopeds off city streets.

Despite the term being thrown around to describe most any battery-powered two-wheeler, e-bikes, by law, are pedal-powered vehicles with an electric motor assist. Powered two-wheelers without pedals — mopeds — are akin to motorcycles under the law, and must be registered and have a license plate from the DMV.

That requires a vehicle identification number, which some mopeds don’t have — making them illegal for street use in the state.

Delivery workers with such mopeds are encouraged to trade them in for new, certified e-bikes under the city’s program.

# GETTING KIDS OUT

## Group gets \$25M in new city budget to help migrants who

It seems an inextricable problem: Scores of candy sellers with children in the depths of the city's serpentine subway system, on sweltering platforms and between moving cars.

The adults, commonly moms from South American countries, in need of work. The kids — some strapped onto their parents' chests, others trying to make a sale themselves — tagging along.

"We've really seen the need of migrants selling candy around in parks and subways, but also doing so with their children, putting their children in vulnerable situations,

themselves in vulnerable situations," said Tiffany Hervas, co-founder of Algun Dia, a group of volunteer Spanish-speaking social workers meeting vendors where they are.

"It's parents and their children — young children, as young as 6 months to 3 years old, or even teenagers going around with the coolers and water on a hot summer day."

The city may have found the beginnings of a solution.

A newly adopted city budget allocated \$25 million to Promise NYC, increasing the number of children with access to the voucher program for undocumented families, otherwise ineligible for federal

subsidies because of their immigration status. At least 1,000 young kids will be covered by the program, up from 600 shortly after it was launched.

Advocates say the expansion could help candy and fruit sellers who turn to the flexible, informal work because of child care needs. More than eight in 10 vendors surveyed by Algun Dia said they wanted to pursue other lines of work — but had not been able to due to a lack of child care.

"Many of the individuals that we surveyed didn't even want to be selling candies or fruits in general," said Hervas. "They ended up going into that out of need."

"Now that it is expanded, our outreach

team can go into these communities more confidently knowing that there is more availability," she added.

A large majority of the 75 vendors polled by Algun Dia were from Ecuador, including many who were women under the age of 25. Most were living outside the city's strained shelter system — either in apartments of their own or doubled up in a room or unit with another family. Still, about three in 10 vendors lived in shelters, where leaving their children behind while they work violates shelter policy and can result in a child welfare investigation.

Nearly all had not been assisted by any organization. The sellers said they were

not contacted by state or city agencies or connected with local nonprofits, and those who were said organizations were at capacity and struggled to support them in a timely manner.

Promise NYC launched early last year with a \$10 million investment over six months, and renewed at \$16 million over a yearlong budget cycle. It was left out of Mayor Adams' most recent executive budget, before being negotiated back in by the City Council for the current fiscal year, which started on July 1.

The program contracts with four local organizations that have ties to the major immigrant communities of each borough,

who connect families and programs, and make monthly subsidy payments on behalf of the parents.

The nonprofits include the Center for Family Life in Brooklyn, NMIC in the Bronx and Manhattan, La Colmena on Staten Island, and the Chinese American Planning Council in Queens. Several of those groups have reported waitlists as families were shut out of Promise NYC.

"We are thrilled to be able to continue providing and expanding child care assistance to families whose immigration status makes them ineligible for federal child care subsidies," Commissioner Jess Dannhausser of the Administration for Children's

Services, which oversees the program, said in a statement. "With the expansion of Promise NYC, we expect to be able to serve about 1,000 children over the next year."

Liza Schwartzwald of the New York Immigration Coalition, which helps fund Algun Dia, described the expansion as "an unqualified win."


According to Schwartzwald, who leads the organization's work on families, much of the program's success lies in its implementation.

Parents felt comfortable going to community-based organizations to access services, and the groups in turn helped non-English speakers navigate a

complicated process, she said.

And while the program does have an income requirement, parents can sign a legally binding affidavit attesting to their earnings — instead of asking an employer who hired undocumented workers or those without work authorization to sign a form.

"The majority of the parents — if not all of the parents — that we are seeing selling candy on the subway with their children are parents who would be eligible for this program," Schwartzwald said. "So we're really looking with the Algun Dia project to ensure that families know that this is an option for them."

# Seeks taco, finds death

## Man steps out of cab to see if Qns. eatery open, is slain on street

An immigrant construction worker was stabbed to death on a Queens street after hopping out of the cab he was sharing with his girlfriend to see if his favorite taco spot was open, devastated relatives said Sunday.

Cops were called about 3 a.m. Saturday to New York-Presbyterian Hospital Queens, where Mauricio Bravo Quinonez, 29, died after arriving by private means. Investigators soon determined he had been stabbed multiple times all over his body near 31st Ave. and 92nd St. in

Jackson Heights.

Quinonez's brother, Anival Bravo, 32, said the victim and his girlfriend were headed to her home when they stopped to get tacos, but the shop appeared to be closed.

Quinonez got out of the cab to make sure and was confronted on the street. The girlfriend wanted to get out and help, but the frightened taxi driver locked the doors of his cab and drove her home instead, Bravo said. She called some of her friends in the area to help and found out soon after that he'd been stabbed.

Bravo said he couldn't fathom who would have wanted to kill his brother.

"I have no idea," he told the Daily News. "I just know that the detectives

told us that it was gang-related. I'm like, 'How's it gonna be a gang, other than they mistook them and they chased them all the way over here?'"

Bravo was joined by a group of family members at a makeshift memorial for Quinonez Sunday at the scene of the slaying.

"He liked party, dance, cumbia, stuff like that," Bravo said. "He was funny. We used to make fun of each other, me and him. We used to make jokes. Practically we were the clowns of the family."

"We used to see the family quiet, we used to make them laugh, just make them laugh," he added. "Right now I got no one to laugh with."

Quinonez was about 5 when he and

relatives immigrated to the U.S. from Mexico, settling in Sunnyside, where the family still lives. He dropped out of school at about 16 and started doing construction work for his uncle before going solo.

The victim planned to one day start his own construction company "so he can hire people and give a little help to his friends or whoever needed work," Bravo said.

Cops have made no arrests.

"Eventually they are gonna get him, and things are gonna get right," Bravo predicted.

Quinonez's death marks the second homicide this year in the 115th Precinct, which saw four slayings in all of 2023, NYPD stats show.

# 3 killed at Philly party

## 6 are wounded in early-morning gunfire at outdoor bash

Three people were killed and six others wounded in a shooting early Sunday morning in Philadelphia, authorities said.

The dead were identified only as a 33-year-old man, a 29-year-old man and a 23-year-old man. Five men between the ages of 27 and 30 were wounded along with

a 26-year-old woman.

Cops arrived at the scene in West Philadelphia's Carroll Park neighborhood around 2 a.m., authorities said. Investigators determined there had been "an exchange of gunfire between multiple parties" at an outdoor gathering. Cops found one gun at the scene and recovered 25 to 30 bullet casings from multiple weapons. No suspects have been

named or arrested.

The 33-year-old man, who was pronounced dead at the scene, was shot at close range and likely targeted, Philadelphia Police Inspector D.F. Pace said.

Cops are seeking to review surveillance video and interview witnesses, according to Pace. They estimated around 100 people were present at the party.

Sunday morning's shooting

was the third deadly mass shooting at an outdoor party in Philadelphia this year, according to The Philadelphia Inquirer. On July 4, 19-year-old Maurice Quann was killed at a "pop-up party" in the Kingsessing neighborhood and eight others between the ages of 14 and 24 were wounded. No arrests have been made in that shooting.

And on June 14, Isya Stanley,

17, was fatally shot at a similar party in the city's Fairmount Park neighborhood. Four other teens were wounded in that shooting and no arrests have been made.

Overall, however, homicides in Philadelphia are down 39% so far this year compared with this time last year, according to Philadelphia Police Department statistics.

# CHARGED IN 4 KIN SLAYS

## Brooklyn man accused of stabbing mom, sis-in law and 2 kids

Police have charged a Brooklyn man in the gruesome quadruple murder of his relatives, including two small children.

Shahboz Rajabboev, 24, faces first- and second-degree murder charges in the stabbings of his mother, sister-in-law, 5-year-old niece and 4-year-old nephew in the family's first-floor Bensonhurst apartment Friday night.

The suspect's brother – father of the two slain children – walked into the bloody scene after returning home to his six-story building on W. Eighth St. near Avenue P at around 10:15 p.m.

He encountered Rajabboev, who was scratched and covered with blood, and after asking him where their mother was, the killer mumbled something like, "Go find her," cops said.

The sibling went into the apartment and found his mother, 56-year-old Fayzieva Mavlyuda, dead from multiple stab wounds to the neck, then called 911 – saying he couldn't find his wife and two children.

When police arrived, they found the remaining victims – Maftuna Khakimova, 27,

stabbed to death in a bedroom, wrapped in a sheet, and Kamila Shavkatova, 5, and her brother, 4-year-old Timur, dead in the closet of another bedroom, stuffed in laundry bags, police said.

"There was a lot of people, family members outside here last night. I recognized some of the family members," fifth-floor resident Jennifer Ponzi told the Daily News on Saturday. "The father was outside crying a lot. His whole world is destroyed, he lost his mother, his wife and kids."

As police searched the apartment for evidence, Rajabboev, who also lived there, returned and was taken into custody, police said Saturday.

"He was claiming it was someone else when they took him," said neighbor Paul Saviam, 40. "They arrested him right on the sidewalk outside the building. He was walking and police was here. ... When they questioned him, he was drinking. He was casually looking around when he [was] walking to the building."

Saviam added: "He looked scary, had the eyes of a pit bull."

A small memorial remained outside the building Sunday morning. One family friend, who lives nearby, said the victims' surviving kin wasn't ready to comment.

Rajabboev was awaiting arraignment in Brooklyn Criminal Court on Sunday.





# ISRAEL BOMBS KILL 15 IN GAZA

## Battlefield continues to expand with conflicts in Lebanon raging on and salvos with Yemen

DEIR AL-BALAH, Gaza Strip — Israeli airstrikes killed at least 15 people, including women and children, overnight in Gaza, according to hospital officials and a body count by an Associated Press journalist on Sunday.

The latest strikes occurred as Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu prepared to leave Monday for the United States, where he is expected to meet with President Joe Biden and address Congress to make his case for the nine-month war against Hamas while ceasefire negotiations continue. A team will be sent to continue talks on Thursday, Netanyahu's office said.

The already precarious humanitarian conditions inside

besieged Gaza have worsened with the discovery of the polio virus as water and sanitation services have suffered for the territory's population of 2.3 million, most of it displaced. Traces of the virus were found in sewage samples in Gaza. The World Health Organization has said no one has been treated for symptoms caused by the infection.

Israel's military said that soldiers would be vaccinated, and it would work with organizations to bring in vaccines for Palestinians.

Israel's latest airstrikes were in the Bureij refugee camp in central Gaza, where nine people, including two children, were killed, and the southern city of Khan Younis, where at least six people were killed, including two girls. Men and women wept and embraced

the small bodies in white shrouds. "Unknown body of five-month baby" was written on one.

Smoke also rose from the Nuseirat refugee camp in central Gaza, but there was no immediate word on casualties.

The war in Gaza has killed more than 38,900 people, according to the territory's Health Ministry, which does not distinguish between combatants and civilians in its count. The war began with an assault by Hamas militants on southern Israel on Oct. 7 that killed 1,200 people, most of them civilians, and saw the abduction of about 250 hostages. About 120 remain held by Hamas, about a third of them believed to be dead, according to Israeli authorities.

Netanyahu has vowed to wipe out Hamas' military and

governing capabilities and secure the return of the remaining hostages. Families of hostages and thousands of other Israelis have rallied in weekly demonstrations, urging the prime minister to reach a ceasefire deal that would bring loved ones home.

Mediators Egypt, Qatar and the United States continue to push Israel and Hamas toward a phased deal that would stop the fighting and free the hostages. Concerns about a wider regional conflict continue. Israel on Saturday struck the port of Hodeida in Yemen in the first known Israeli strikes there since the war in Gaza began.

The strikes, in response to a deadly Houthi drone strike in Tel Aviv, threatened to open a new front as Israel battles Iranian proxies in the region.

On Sunday, the Israeli military said that it intercepted a missile fired from Yemen as the Houthis vowed "impactful strikes."

Proxies also include Hezbollah in neighboring Lebanon. On Sunday, Lebanon's military said two of its soldiers were wounded after an Israeli strike hit a watchtower on the outskirts of the border town of Alma al-Shaab.

Earlier Sunday, Israel's military said it struck multiple areas in southern Lebanon after a number of drones were identified crossing from the country into Israeli territory.

It said hits were identified in the areas of Hanita and Ya'ara in northern Israel but no injuries were reported.

# RUSSIA & KYIV TRADE ASSAULTS IN UKRAINE



## Kremlin says it chased 2 U.S. fighter jets away from border, claims they were over neutral territory to aid enemy cause

KYIV — Russia and Ukraine exchanged drone, missile and shelling attacks on Sunday. At least two people were killed in Ukrainian strikes on the partly Russian-occupied Donetsk region, Russian state media said, while Ukrainian officials said Russian strikes wounded at least five.

Also Sunday, Russia said it scrambled fighter jets to intercept two U.S. military long-range bomber aircraft that approached the Russia border over the Barents Sea in the Arctic.

“The crews of the Russian fighters identified the aerial target as a pair of U.S. Air Force B-52H strategic bombers,” Moscow’s defense ministry wrote on the social media platform Telegram, specifying that the planes scrambled were MiG-29 and MiG-31 fighters.

“As the Russian fighters approached, the U.S. strategic bombers turned away from the State Border of the Russian Federation.”

The U.S. routinely carries out flights over international waters. Moscow has recently responded more aggressively to the exercises, accusing the U.S. in June of using

its reconnaissance drone flights over neutral waters in the Black Sea to help Ukraine strike Russian-occupied Crimea.

Along the front line in the east, Russia said it had taken control of two villages, one in the Kharkiv region and one in the Luhansk region.

Ukrainian shelling of Russia-held areas of the Donetsk region killed two people in the village of Horlivka, Russian state news agency RIA Novosti said.

Three people were wounded by Russian drone strikes in southern Ukraine’s partly occupied Kherson region, local officials said Sunday morning. In the

country’s northeast, officials in the Kharkiv region said two people were wounded when a village was hit by Russian shells.

Overnight into Sunday, Ukraine’s air defenses intercepted 35 of the 39 drones launched by Russia, according to air force commander Mykola Oleschuk. In addition, Russia launched three ballistic missiles and two guided air missiles, which did not reach their targets.

Russia’s Ministry of Defense said Sunday that its troops had taken control of two villages: Pishchane Nizhne in the Kharkiv region and Andriivka, sometimes referred to as Rozivka, in the

Luhansk region. Kyiv did not immediately comment.

Officials in the northern Sumy region said Sunday that Russia launched a missile strike on “critical infrastructure facilities” in the city of Shostka. Mayor Mykola Noha specified that “two heating facilities” had been destroyed and urged residents to use electricity sparingly and stock up on water.

With few changes reported along the 600-mile front line, where a recent push by the Kremlin’s forces in eastern and northeastern Ukraine has made incremental gains, both sides in the war have taken aim at infrastructure targets.





# Weird Al is back in a polka state of mind

Ten years ago, “Weird Al” Yankovic made history, as he is wont to do.

“Mandatory Fun,” his 14th and final studio album, debuted at No. 1 on the Billboard 200. It was not only unprecedented for Yankovic (photo), but unprecedented for his genre as a whole: Never before had a comedy album premiered at the top spot.

“I know it feels ironic to decide to stop making albums after having had a No. 1 album,” Yankovic said over Zoom. “But I just like the freedom of being able to really use whatever I want, whenever I want, and not have to be beholden to a label.”

As an exercise of that freedom, and to celebrate 10 years of “Mandatory Fun,” Yankovic has released a new polka medley, “Polkamania!” — a creative cover of some of the biggest songs of the past decade: Billie Eilish’s “Bad Guy,” Adele’s “Hello,” Miley Cyrus’ “Flowers,” “We Don’t Talk About Bruno” from Disney’s “Encanto,” Olivia Rodrigo’s “Vampire,” Lil Nas X’s “Old Town Road,” Luis Fonsi and Daddy Yankee’s “Despacito,” Ed Sheeran’s “Shape of You,” Mark Ronson and Bruno Mars’ “Uptown Funk,” Cardi B and Megan Thee Stallion’s “WAP,” Ariana Grande’s “Thank U, Next” and Taylor Swift’s “Shake It Off.”

This interview with Yankovic has been edited for clarity and length.

**Ten years ago, you said “Mandatory Fun” would be your last album. Does it still feel that way?**

It does. You know, I got a pretty good

sense 10 years ago of what I wanted to do. It still makes sense to me, in that releasing 12 songs at a time doesn’t feel like the best business model for me because I like to be topical. And if you have to sit around and wait till you have 12 songs so you can release them all at once, sometimes that means that a few of those tracks are not going to be quite so topical.

**You’re celebrating the 10 years of “Mandatory Fun” with “Polkamania!” Why another polka medley?**

Well, it’s several things. I wanted to do it because I hadn’t released anything in a while and at some point I want to be back on the road and touring, and it would be nice to have some new material to play live.

Another reason is that over the last 10 years there are a lot of songs that have been on the charts that, for whatever reason, I didn’t take a shot at. And I just thought that those were missed opportunities. I wanted to circle back and pay tribute to a lot of those big hits over the last 10 years.

**How did you select the songs to parody?**

I started by limiting it to songs that have been No. 1 on the Billboard charts. That narrowed it down quite a bit to begin with.

I didn’t do, like, one song per year, but I wanted it to be pretty spread out. And [I picked] songs that I thought were iconic and artists who I thought were iconic, with some of the most memorable songs — songs that had a very identifiable hook to them. And [there was] a lot of personal preference as well.



**Did anyone decline?**

We heard back from Taylor Swift’s people right away, which was amazing. Miley Cyrus and Billie Eilish, both, apparently were delighted that they could be in a polka medley.

The one that we never heard back from was SZA. I wanted to use “Kill Bill.” She didn’t say yes or no. She just never returned our phone calls.

**Is polka innately funny?**

It’s just very incongruous. I learned that very early on. When I was a teenager playing the accordion and trying to get into my friend’s rock bands, they’d never let me in. They thought it was very funny when I tried to play a rock song on the accordion. To them, everything on the

accordion sounds like polka. So I decided to lean into that idea and start doing polka medleys of rock songs, and people think it’s funny. As the polkas evolved, they started taking more inspiration from Spike Jones, the 1940s bandleader who did, like, funny versions of songs. And he would always incorporate gunshots and slide whistles and tuned cowbells and weird sound effects. And I started incorporating that as well.

**Polka medleys are a feature of many of your albums, starting with “Polkas on 45” from 1984’s “In 3-D.” That’s another anniversary — 40 years of that release, which features your famous Michael Jackson parody, “Eat It.”**

I was completely surprised that he gave me his blessing. My manager, I guess, talked to Michael’s representatives, and we heard back fairly quickly that he was OK with it.

At the time, I was virtually unknown. I had one album out that didn’t do that great. I couldn’t believe that we even got his attention.

There’s a contract somewhere in the world that has my signature next to Michael Jackson’s signature, saying that, you know, we are the co-writers of “Eat It.”

Prior to that, it was tough to get anybody’s permission because nobody knew who this Weird Al was.


And then after we got “Eat It,” we had that for ammunition. We could say, “Well, you know, Michael Jackson was OK with that. So why are you giving me a hard time?”

President Biden has withdrawn from the 2024 presidential election, stepping aside in the race to best Donald Trump in a contest over the basic identity of this country.

Whatever one might think of the decision – whether you believe Biden was railroaded out by skittish Dems or stepped aside for the good of the country or something in between – the decision is made and will not be reversed. It took the president three weeks of public hand-wringing and is one of the most consequential decisions he has made in decades of making weighty choices. Now what we must look towards is the future.

Biden also offered a full-throated endorsement of Vice President Kamala Harris, who won alongside him in the 2020 election, ousting Trump and Mike Pence. She is part of the ticket already, and runs into far fewer of the legal and logistical hurdles around ballot access and use of campaign cash as opposed to other potential candidates. She is also a former senator and state attorney general who's proven effective at building an electoral case against Trump.

There is no official nominee until the 3,939 delegates cast their ballots at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago next month, and there will be some Democrats who want to engage in some sort of brokered mini-primary at this stage, advancing their own preferences for a candidate who can defeat the threat of Trump.

Despite some naysaying, it is true that the Democrats have a bench of real talent, with rising stars like Michigan Gov. Gretchen Whitmer having cracked the code of swing-state popularity and potent economic messaging.

## Heavy balance

A federal appeals court last week issued a one-sentence order granting an effort by Missouri and several other states to block the Biden administration's Saving on a Valuable Education (SAVE) student loan forgiveness program, dealing yet another blow to the president's push to help millions of Americans crushed by the burden of high-interest educational loans they often signed onto as teenagers.

The court's order provides no specific rationale for issuing the emergency stay, which is a stopgap while the plaintiffs seek an injunction, which itself is short of a final ruling. Why the legal acrobatics? An uncharitable explanation would be that the courts seem keen on derailing one of Biden's signature promises in advance of the November election.

This is after the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a separate forgiveness program that had relied on a clear congressionally-granted authority for the federal government to forgive student loans, forcing the White House and the Department of Education to keep increasingly limited parts of their debt relief program.

This surviving SAVE effort, which a federal judge had already whittled down, wasn't even wholesale forgiveness, but a measure to lower monthly payments and allow certain borrowers who'd had a debt load of \$12,000 or less forgive their remaining loans after a decade of making regular payments. Many of these borrowers are people who went to affordable schools, as they had been encouraged to do, or didn't even finish their degrees altogether, saddling them with debt without any of the benefits.

Stopping the program in its tracks is not a decision with merely hypothetical consequences. Some 8

Yet everyone should keep in mind that the general election is now less than four months away. Primary season has come and gone. The successor campaign must get in full swing, and the most pressing consideration drawing the contrasts between the new Democratic candidate – who will no doubt hope to continue the Biden policies that have brought inflation under control and unemployment to historic lows, secured the strength of NATO and fought back against a wanton Supreme Court – and Trump, whose track record is well known.

Maybe the Democrats will quickly coalesce behind Harris or maybe she will face a challenge. Either way, it will happen fast. The convention starts four weeks from today.

But in this speed should not be forgotten the time to reflect on Joe Biden's half century in high elected office instead of the issue of his age and fitness for office and acknowledge what the man has done for this country.

Like anyone in the public eye and at the levers of power for this long, Biden has made missteps, but he has spent this term in the White House pushing through the country's largest-ever infrastructure investment, combating the existential threat of climate change, advancing the cause of labor and the American worker, fighting for fairer taxation and competition by enforcing the antitrust laws. The nation owes him its gratitude.

The Republicans have their team of Trump/Vance. The Democrats will now ready their own, likely leading with Harris. But so much has happened since that June 27 debate, which includes a failed assassination attempt and a presidential withdrawal, that predicting the future is impossible.

million people had already enrolled in the program, with more than 4 million already having a monthly payment of zero. These are real people whose financial situation will get measurably worse now that the program's been struck down.

Moreover, enrollees have likely already factored the impact of the program into future financial decisions. Debt and student debt in particular is often cited as a reason that people delay getting married, starting families, buying houses and launching businesses. Student debt at its current level is bad for the economy and bad for our society.

That doesn't mean that the government must wipe the slate clean entirely. It doesn't necessarily make much sense to zero out the balance of a high-earning law school graduate, who made the calculus to take on a significant amount of debt in exchange for the promise of a big payout, though it must be acknowledged that this debt tends to dissuade students from more public-minded professional aspirations. That's why SAVE and other proposals are tailored to the circumstances of individual borrowers.

We hope that the public service forgiveness program that Biden announced on the same day as his court defeat will be allowed to move forward as planned. Workers like nurses, teachers and others who make us all better off should get the chance to move forward with their lives without being punished for devoting themselves to public-spirited lives.

In any case, this type of forgiveness has been authorized for more than 15 years; the only thing Biden is doing is making it actually work instead of leaving eligible borrowers in the lurch. With this judiciary, though, you never know.

# Biden should still run, as Harris' VP

Now that Joe Biden has exited the race for president, the best strategy for the Democratic Party, is the simplest. Switch Kamala Harris and Biden on the ticket. Harris for president and Biden for vice president. Why not?

Voters, pundits and pollsters were concerned about the president's capacity, his ability to execute the awesome responsibilities of the toughest job in the world for four more years. This concern has resulted in a deep fissure in the Democrats' ranks.

The pro-Biden forces look upon those who urged him to leave the race as traitors. They believe big money donors, Nancy Pelosi, Barack Obama and media "elites" are responsible for forcing his exit. They believe that Biden still has a tremendous amount of talent and expertise to share with America and his insights, especially in foreign affairs, will be squandered.

But Biden's skills and experience need not be wasted. Now that he has endorsed Harris as his successor, she should endorse him as hers. The new Democratic ticket should be Harris-Biden 2024.

This ticket will prevent an internal train wreck at a time when the Democrats need to counter the headwinds that have promoted Donald Trump. Biden is not a pariah to tens of millions of voters. He simply needs to be promoted as an elder statesman whose five decades of service will complement the strengths of Vice President Harris.

In addition, the nearly \$100 million sitting in the Biden-Harris campaign account will be easily accessible if both signatories are the same. This might prevent a GOP lawsuit which could claim that if there is someone else on the account, the money would need to be returned to donors.

The coalition of Black, union and Jewish voters who are the most reliable blocs in the party can now be energized to get out the vote. And, if the "most pro-union president ever" is kept on the ticket, workers will feel comforted that the Democrats will have their back.

If Biden, whose political lineage is tied to Rep. Jim Clyburn and the Congressional Black Caucus, is on the ticket, African-Americans might see him as helping to honor his obligation to help those who have helped him. After all, if not for Clyburn's endorsement in 2020 before the South Carolina primary, the Biden ship would have sunk.

Finally, Jewish voters, who have been troubled by the Biden

administration's waffling in its effort to combat Iran-Hamas-Hezbollah-Houthis, will likely return to their full-throated support of the ticket since Harris' ascendancy will offer an opportunity for change.

This simple switcheroo would accomplish many things in one fell swoop. It would create an historic opportunity to have a female president, at a time when women's rights are under attack. No one could promote equal pay, parental leave, child care and the ERA as effectively than Harris with an "amen" from Biden.

Switching Harris and Biden would energize Black, Asian and women voters. With Harris at the top of the ticket, the "peeling away" of Black voters by Trump would stall. Biden's age would complement Harris' energy and enthusiasm.

Moving Biden down the ticket would allow for a graceful exit from the overwhelming task of running the country and running for president. Finally, Harris-Biden 2024 could open the door to a new era of political stagecraft where women are front-and-center, and men are their helpmates.

# A New Yorker visiting inside Israel's bubble

Israeli Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu's visit to Washington this week will undoubtedly draw protests and counter-protests. None of the spectacle, however, is likely to reflect the war as I saw it during a recent trip to Israel.

My wife's siblings and mother live in Israel, along with numerous other relatives. Most of them stand on their country's political left.

Last year I marched with my in-laws in Jerusalem, to protest Netanyahu's extremist government. At home in Park Slope, Brooklyn I have promoted a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

After 1½ I felt more connected than ever to my Israeli kin. I was angry, frightened and sad, just as they were. Yet my focus quickly expanded beyond the suffering wrought by Hamas' homicidal rampage.

I was appalled by the refusal of many anti-Israel protesters to condemn Hamas's crimes. I cringed whenever I saw one of the "Ceasefire Now" signs scattered around my neighborhood, or encountered a passerby displaying a black and white Palestinian keffiyeh.

At the same time the unceasing news coverage of Gaza's civilian casualties had me asking myself whether the IDF was fighting a just war justly. I never settled on an answer.

During my trip to Israel the war was in its eighth month. We stayed in Jerusalem's Baka

neighborhood.

In contrast to Park Slope's sporadic "Ceasefire Now" posters, Baka was blanketed with banners and signs saying, "Bring Hersh Home Now!" Nobody ripped them down.

The message was also spray-painted on lamp-posts and doorways, and anywhere else the words would fit. Hersh is Hersh Goldberg-Polin. He is from Baka and was kidnapped by Hamas.

For several years I have attended a Passover retreat that his family frequented when they lived in the states. This year a photograph of Hersh was taped to a chair in the synagogue, and Hamas released a hostage video of him during the holiday. Attending the Passover gathering, and then staying in Hersh's hometown, made me feel connected to his fate.

Midway through my week in Israel I visited my nephew Jahron. He had spent months as a soldier in Gaza.

Jahron, who is slim with soft facial features, had been tasked with searching for weapons in residential buildings that were often booby trapped. He displayed smartphone pictures of small bombs and guns in

bedrooms and bathtubs.

"Guns next to children's toys," he said, somberly. "Sick. Very sick."

According to public opinion polls Israelis have little sympathy for Gaza's non-combatants. I asked one of my relatives — a two-state solution supporter — what she thought.

"I know what's happening in Gaza is horrific, but I don't have the head-space to think about it," she said. "I have family members in uniform, and my country's existence is at stake. There is no room in my brain for anything else."

On our last day in Jerusalem, 20 people crowded around a lunch table. Several were reservists.

One of them, my nephew Shraga, had just returned from Gaza. He visited Brooklyn a few years ago, before driving an R.V. across the country. In Gaza he drove a tank.

My in-law Shai had also completed a deployment. "It is wonderful to be surrounded by family," he said, giving a toast. "But we should remember that many families can't be together."

I asked Shai when he had reserve duty again. "Not until October," he said. "But I assume we will be fighting Hezbollah before then."

My family has, so far, been spared any tragedies from this war. If a full-full-fledged confrontation erupts with Hezbollah, and its

arsenal of precision missiles, I will be very worried.

Whenever I find myself thinking that Israelis are cold hearted for their attitude towards Gaza's non-combatants, I remember my final moments in Israel. We were riding a taxi to the airport, and the car's radio was on.

A news reporter slowly read the names and ages of eight soldiers who had been killed the day before. As the names were read our driver grimaced, shaking his head side-to-side.

After immersing myself in Israel's collective siege mentality, the pro-Palestinian protests I have encountered, and Israel-solidarity rallies I have attended, now seem like a sideshow — local events, detached from the daily trauma endured by Israelis and Palestinians.

I may be too far removed from the terror of 1½ to judge Israel's response. But my trip clarified what matters to me most about what Israelis call "the situation."

My hope is that Netanyahu's visit will lead to a breakthrough concerning negotiations over a proposal President Biden is pushing to end the war, and free the hostages. If the ongoing talks succeed, Gaza's civilians could start rebuilding their lives, my relatives would be out of harm's way, and Hersh could come home.

I woke up Thursday morning before 6 a.m. and there was no water. I could not flush the toilet. Kitchen sink, bathroom tub, shower and sink made that sucking noise when only air fills the pipe.

I called my management company (they do a pretty good job) and they told me that due to a really bad mistake during an overnight underground repair, tens of thousands of us have not had water for at least five hours, probably more. No news organization is reporting this. Tenants, landlords, management companies – we are at the mercy of the city, which made a horrendous mistake that means people can't flush their toilets, run cold water, take a drink, shower or bathe.

I broke my toe recently. I am 60. It hurts to walk. Luckily, I have a pitcher of water to hydrate. I live in a predominantly Black and Latin neighborhood that is often ignored. It is predominantly Dominican. I love the neighborhood's vibe and the friendliness of my neighbors. In my building, folks hold the doors for each other and say "hola," "hello," "buenos dias" or "good morning" every day to each other.

News organizations tend to forget about us. Generally, we are working class, Black and Latino. Most of us have connections to the Dominican Republic, which is why if you look on a subway map, our little piece of Manhattan is nicknamed "Little Dominican Republic." Please don't forget us. Please cover this story.

# Life below Mendoza line no fun for DJ

The next time DJ LeMahieu steps to the plate, the two-time batting champion will see a .177 average next to his name on the scoreboard.

"It's not something I'm used to," the 36-year-old said Saturday, adding that he's going through one of the worst stretches of his life. "Personally, it's not very fun."

LeMahieu, in the midst of an 0-for-17 skid, was not in the Yankees' order against the Rays on Saturday. The decision came a day after Aaron Boone said the third baseman had "earned" the right to work through his struggles.

LeMahieu did not play Sunday, either.

In addition to his sub-Mendoza average, LeMahieu has totaled a .270 on-base percentage, a .202 slugging percentage, three doubles, zero homers and 11

RBI over 39 games after a broken foot delayed the start of his season. The veteran has a 36 OPS+; 100 is considered league-average.

LeMahieu said he feels "good enough to do my job" and that he's 100% healthy, but that's not exactly an encouraging statement given the way he's played. Boone, meanwhile, noted that LeMahieu has "gotten beat up over the last couple of years" from an injury standpoint. LeMahieu also had a foot/toe issue in 2022.

LeMahieu didn't offer any specifics on things he's been working on, though he said he didn't have a specific focus over the All-Star break aside from staying active.

"I'm just trying to work through it," LeMahieu said. "I mean, it just hasn't been very consistent. I feel like I'm onto something, and then I kind of go backwards a little bit and then I get onto something. But the consistency hasn't been there."

Metrics have offered little indication that LeMahieu can turn things around.

His average exit velocity, Hard-Hit% and Chase% have all moved in the wrong direction since last season. He's also putting the ball on the ground 59.2% of the time.

"I've always hit a lot of ground balls," LeMahieu said, but he's doing so at a personal-worst clip while offering essentially zero power and the softest contact of his career.

Asked if he was confident that he could snap out of his season-long funk, LeMahieu added, "I mean,

it hasn't given me much hope the last month or so. But as long as I've played this game, whatever challenges presented itself, I've always come out of it one way or another. So I just gotta keep showing up, keep working. That's gotten me a lot of success."

Boone said he's trying to be "sensitive" to LeMahieu's shortcomings, but he called him a "very mentally and physically tough guy." Boone believes that makes LeMahieu "equipped to handle things."

The impending July 30 trade deadline could be a consideration, as the Yankees would be wise to find an upgrade for LeMahieu, who is still owed \$30 million over two seasons after 2024. That's especially true following Jon Berti's recent setback while recovering from a calf injury.

The Yankees have been linked to a few third basemen, including Tampa Bay's Isaac Paredes, San Francisco's Matt Chapman and the Angels' Luis Rengifo.

### PRESSING ISSUE

Shortly after the Yankees wasted numerous opportunities against the Rays, Boone said "certain guys" in his lineup have been "pressing a little bit."

It's easy to understand why Alex Verdugo has been one of them. The left fielder entered the game with a .578 OPS since May 8 before going 0-for-4 with a strikeout on a low strike three call.

"Everybody presses man, come on," Verdugo said. "When you're struggling, you want to get out of it. You want to compete. You want to do something good."

"I think my version of pressing is just trying. I'm trying hard and I want to make something happen. I want to help the team. I want to help the guys. I want to get something going. So in that sense, yeah, I have been pressing a little bit."

However, Verdugo went on to say that he thinks he's been controlling at-bats better lately. He likes to work counts, but he's felt "anxious" to put the first pitch in play throughout his extended slump.

Verdugo saw 15 pitches over four plate appearances on Sunday. That included six pitches on the strikeout, which Boone protested and got ejected for.

"It's just getting back to trusting my eyes, trusting my body, trusting my moves, and we'll be right where we need to be," Verdugo said.

A day after losing by eight runs and going 0-for-7 with runners in scoring position, the Yankees had more trouble with timely hitting on Sunday.

While Aaron Judge belted a three-run jack for his league-leading 35th homer in the seventh inning, the captain's blast proved too little, too late in a 6-4 loss to the Rays. The Bombers had other opportunities to score, but they went 2-for-10 with runners in scoring position this time.

The Yankees also left nine men on base.

"Just trying to do too much in a situation like that. I've definitely been there plenty of times where

you're trying to get something going, trying to spark the team," Judge said. "We just gotta go back to doing our job and if you don't get a pitch to hit, pass it to the next guy."

The first inning foreshadowed the afternoon ahead, as the Yankees failed to score despite loading the bases with one out against inefficient Rays righty Shane Baz. The pitcher, making just his third start of the year, lasted 3.1 innings while totaling four hits and five walks. Still, the Yankees couldn't score off him.

Even after one-out double steals in the second and fourth innings — the Yankees also juiced the bases in the second — the pinstripers

remained blank on the board.

"We're giving ourselves opportunities, and the name of the game is cashing in," Aaron Boone said. "It's kind of like football. I feel like we're stopping the run. We're getting third and long and we just gotta find a way to break through."

"We just gotta get one to fall. We gotta stick one in the gap in those situations," the manager continued. But he added that "today was actually a ton of really good at-bats offensively."

Boone also said "there's certain guys pressing a little bit." Alex Verdugo has been one of them, as he entered Sunday's game with a .578 OPS since May 8 before going



0-for-4 with a strikeout.

With his left fielder struggling and the offense dormant, Boone took exception to a low strike three call against Verdugo in the sixth inning. Boone was tossed shortly thereafter.

His fifth ejection of the year came courtesy of home plate umpire Edwin Jimenez.

“I was actually going to first and I heard Boonie yell and I was like, ‘Wait, what?’” Verdugo recalled. “So I turned back and umpire’s like, ‘Yeah, it’s a strike.’”

While the Yankees didn’t score until late in the game, the Rays relied on the long ball against Marcus Stroman. The right-hander held Tampa Bay to two earned runs over 5.1 innings, but a leadoff home run to Richie Palacios put

the Yankees in an immediate hole.

Randy Arozarena followed up with his own solo homer in the fourth – as well as a leisurely trot around the bases – before José Caballero added an RBI single.

Caballero’s knock came after Gleyber Torres’ 12th error. Josh Lowe reached safely on the play and then stole second before racing home.

Stroman finished the day with three total runs, five hits, zero walks, five strikeouts and 87 pitches.

“Again, it’s the longball that’s hurt us,” Boone said, “but I thought overall Stro did his job and gave us a chance to win a ballgame.”

With Jake Cousins on the mound in the seventh, Jose Siri provided insurance with a two-run

homer. Like Arozarena, he slowly circled the bases. Siri also cupped his hand to his ear as he rounded third and Yankees fans booed.

Judge took his time jogging on his home run in the bottom of the frame, but Caballero added a solo homer in the ninth inning. A Juan Soto double got the Yanks a fourth run in the final frame, but the Rays prevailed and took a 2-1 series lead after the Yankees’ superstars didn’t receive much help.

“I think we’re kind of losing sight of how incredible those two guys have been,” Stroman said of Judge and Soto. “So they can’t do everything each and every single time. We can’t put all the pressure on them.”

At best, the Yankees can settle for a split today with the struggling

Carlos Rodón on the mound. Zack Littell will start for Tampa.

Now 59-42, the second-place Yankees have lost 23 of their last 37 games. They endured an 8-18 stretch prior to the All-Star Game, but Stroman still referred to this prolonged period as a “rough patch.”

“I don’t think it’s gonna last long,” the starter added, though it’s been well over a month.

Stroman also said the Yankees haven’t lost confidence, a sentiment Judge also expressed.

“You never want to be in this situation,” he said. “Got a lot of guys in here with some good track records of what they’ve done over the past couple seasons, so it’s definitely surprising, but we got work to do. We can’t sit here and

feel sorry for ourselves. Nobody else is feeling sorry for us. So just gotta keep showing up the next day, keep trying to improve, make changes, make adjustments. If what you’re doing isn’t working, you gotta try something new. So a lot of guys in this room are trying new stuff, trying to figure things out, and that’s all you can ask for.”

“The results are gonna come.”

The Yankees have shared similar thoughts throughout this skid, but the hope was that the break would lead to a hot start in the second half. While they won their first game back on Friday, those hopes have yet to materialize.

“We know we’re better than this,” Boone insisted. “We gotta come ready and salvage the series tomorrow.”

## Senga could take hill for Mets Friday

**M**IAMI — Finally, the light is at the end of the tunnel for Mets ace Kodai Senga and his lengthy rehab from a spring training shoulder injury. The Mets are tentatively planning to activate him off the 60-day injured list this week to make his season debut Friday when the Mets host the Braves.

“At the end of the day, it’s how he’s feeling, and then we’ve got to wait and see how today goes and tomorrow,” manager Carlos Mendoza said Sunday. “Hopefully he’s with us next time out.”

Senga made a rehab start with Triple-A Syracuse on Saturday night against the Rochester Red Wings. The results didn’t look great on paper: five earned runs on eight hits, three walks and one strikeout over only three innings. However, he hit 99 MPH and threw 79 pitches.

The Mets equate his rehab results to spring training results. Senga was diagnosed with a mild right capsular strain in March, leaving him out of action during the Grapefruit League season. His rehab assignment served as his de facto “spring training.”

“The split wasn’t there, but I think it just comes down to him feeling good and how the ball is coming out,” Mendoza said. “Look, this is his (fourth) outing, it’s kind of like spring training for him. You know, when you go through this — through spring training — you’re going to have some outings where it’s going to be a struggle, it’s going to be a battle. And I think that was the case for him yesterday.”

“But at the end of the day, it’s about, how is he feeling physically? He keeps saying he feels good and looks good.”

Senga was working on a few specific things in Syracuse, telling SNY that he was “trying out different things,” but the Mets didn’t know the specifics. A veteran of the Japanese leagues, Senga loves to fool around with various elements of hit pitches and pickoff moves during bullpen sessions and exhibition starts, so the Mets were not surprised.

“I think he doesn’t want to be bad,” said pitching coach Jeremy Hefner. “I think he wanted to pitch better, but I don’t think he was worried about the results. He’s mostly worried about being healthy and making sure his shoulder, his elbow and body feel good.”

The 31-year-old right-hander will rejoin the Mets on Tuesday at Yankee Stadium to throw a bullpen session. The training and coaching staff will then evaluate how he feels the following day and make a final determination for Friday. Should he start Friday, the Mets will limit him to around five innings and 85

pitches, which is what he built up to throwing this month during his rehab assignment. The Mets also plan to go to a six-

man rotation to give him the extra day of rest he has become accustomed to.

This creates some questions for the bullpen. The Mets have three long relievers in right-handers Adrian Houser, Jose Butto and Dedniel Nuñez. While they aren’t afraid to use Nuñez or Butto in high- and medium-leverage innings or for one-inning outings, they may need the length. That means parting ways with a left-handed reliever.

The Mets could designate struggling veteran Jake Diekman for assignment, but the more likely outcome is optioning Danny Young back to Triple-A.

“I don’t think it’s necessarily a bad thing to have some length down there, but I think you’ve just, we just got to take it day by day,” Hefner said. “There will be days where it’s going to look great, and then other times it might not look so great just because we got to use guys in the bullpen maybe longer than we’d want them to or what have you.”

### GOOD SIGNS

The Mets signed eight of 20 picks from the 2024 First-Year Player Draft on Saturday, including second-round selection, left-hander Jonathan Santucci. In addition, the Mets signed five college undrafted free agents.

## Mets can't recover from Chisholm's blast in 4th

MIAMI — The Mets' summer surge is in danger of becoming a summer skid after they dropped two games this weekend to the lowly Marlins.

Offense has been tough to come by for the Amazins' over their last three games, with the Mets dropping the third of a four-game set to the Marlins, 4-2, on Sunday afternoon at LoanDepot Park.

For the second day in a row, the Mets gave themselves chances. They created traffic on the basepaths and made pitchers work, chasing left-hander Trevor Rogers from the game after 4 2/3 innings. But they failed to capitalize each time, going just 1-for-8 with runners in scoring position and leaving nine runners on base.

The Marlins (35-64) were sloppy and listless, but the Mets (50-48) still couldn't come through.

"I felt like we were right there, but just couldn't put anything together," said manager Carlos Mendoza. "They got the big hit."

The big hit was given up by rookie right-hander Christian Scott in the form of a three-run homer by Jazz Chisholm Jr. in the fourth inning.

"They made him work today," Mendoza said. "They put together some good at bats and made contact, and made some hard contact. He was fine stuff-wise. I thought he was OK."

Much like it was for Luis Severino on Saturday, the margin for error was exceptionally thin for Scott. But Severino is a veteran and knows how to turn it on and get crafty with little run support. Scott is competitive, but more methodical. He's still learning how to adjust pitch-by-pitch at a higher level.

Scott got out of trouble in the third inning after loading the bases with one out by striking out Jesus Sanchez and inducing a pop-up to Otto Lopez. But after the Mets scored in the top of the fourth, he gave up back-to-back singles to start the bottom of the frame. A bunt by catcher Nick Fortes moved the runners to second and third, bringing up Chisholm, the leadoff hitter.

Scott fell behind before getting Chisholm to swing at two pitches low and inside. He went inside again with a slider, but he hung it up.

Chisholm drove it to right-center

field to put the Marlins up, 3-1.

"Honestly, it was exactly where I wanted it," Scott said. "He put a good swing on it. I could throw that pitch 100 times and probably get him out most of the time, but he made a good swing. I didn't really feel like it was a mistake because it was exactly where I wanted it."

However, Mendoza seemed to hint that his pitch decision could have been better in that spot. Scott continuously worked inside and wanted a strike inside, when he could have thrown a ball out of the zone to get a free-swinging hitter to chase.

"I think it's one of those that he wishes he had back," Mendoza said. "Especially with two strikes and with a base open and an aggressive hitter.

He was too close on the strikes."

The Mets let Scott finish the fourth inning while Adrian Houser warmed up in the bullpen, but that was it for

the right-hander. He allowed three earned runs on seven hits, walked two and struck out four over four innings in the loss (0-3).

Scott seems to understand what he should have done, yet failed to apply the lesson in that specific at-bat.

"It's sometimes better to miss outside of the zone than in," Scott said.

He should have taken his own advice.

An error by Fortes helped the Mets cut the deficit to one run in the fifth, with the catcher throwing one wild past first base on a strikeout of Harrison Bader. Rogers got Francisco Lindor looking for the first out, but Brandon Nimmo walked and J.D. Martinez singled to drive in Bader.

The rally stopped there. Pete Alonso reached on a force-out and the Marlins replaced Rogers with right-hander Declan Cronin, who struck out Mark Vientos to end the inning.

Houser gave up a two-out homer to Jake Burger in the seventh. Miami went up, 4-2, and the Mets brought in left-hander Jake Diekman, who hit Sanchez with a pitch before striking out Lopez to get the Mets out of the inning.

Diekman put the Mets in position to come back with a scoreless eighth inning, but Miami closer Tanner Scott shut the door, retiring Bader, Lindor and Nimmo for the save (16).

"One of those games where we've just got to turn the page and get ready for tomorrow," Mendoza said.

## U.S. men and women scramble to get things right for Paris after pre-Olympic wake-up calls

The U.S. men's and women's basketball teams both received sobering wake-up calls over the weekend in the lead-up to the Olympics.

The men barely avoided what would have been an all-time epic upset with their 101-100 victory in an exhibition Saturday against a South Sudan team that it was favored to beat by more than 40 points.

Later that night, the women suffered a 117-109 loss to the WNBA All-Stars against players including Arike Ogunbowale and Caitlin Clark, who will not represent Team USA at the Paris Games this summer.

Neither the men nor the women held their heads following Saturday's eye-opening exhibitions. Instead, they shared similar sentiments about learning from their shortcomings before the Olympics begin this Friday.

"I did not do a great job preparing our team," men's coach Steve Kerr said. "We did not focus enough on what they're capable of, and that's on me. I think that really allowed South Sudan to gain confidence early."

"They were great," Kerr continued of South Sudan. "They played a wonderful game and the ending was good for us, just to feel that, to feel what it's going to be like in Paris and Lille."

Team USA trailed by as many as 16 points against a South Sudan team that is representing a country that this month celebrated its 13th anniversary of gaining independence from Sudan.

LeBron James' layup with eight seconds remaining completed the comeback against South Sudan, which is set to compete in its first Olympics

this year.

"I'm going to be honest, I like those ones better than the blowouts," James said as he walked into the tunnel. "At least we get tested."

Seeking its fifth consecutive gold medal and its 17th in 20 Olympic appearances, the U.S. men's team boasts a star-powered but older roster led by James, Kevin Durant, Steph Curry and Joel Embiid.

The women, meanwhile, are seeking their eighth consecutive gold medal and 10th overall. They similarly lost to the WNBA All-Stars in 2021 before going undefeated in those Olympics.

"We'll take this one on the chin and keep moving forward," said Liberty star Breanna Stewart, who scored 31 points in Saturday's loss. "We don't want to peak too soon and we know we can

improve on a lot. ... We're excited to get to London and just really focus on this team and what our ultimate goal is."

Ogunbowale scored an All-Star Game record 34 points, all in the second half. The Dallas Wings star withdrew her name for Olympic consideration months ago, saying recently on the "Nightcap" podcast that the team selects players based more on fit than talent.

Saturday also saw Clark dish out 10 assists in her All-Star debut, while fellow rookie Angel Reese added 12 points and 11 rebounds.

"This is going to help us tremendously," Stewart said. "We can go back and watch the film, focus on how we can continue to be better. It was like a little bit of (a) déjà vu feeling, honestly, but just locking in."

# Brennaman back in booth

Thom Brennaman is set to return to the broadcast booth, some four years after a hot mic caught him saying a homophobic slur.

Brennaman is set to begin next month as The CW's lead play-by-play announcer for its college football broadcasts, The Athletic reported Sunday.

The 60-year-old Brennaman was fired as the TV voice of the Cincinnati Reds and as a Fox Sports announcer after the local Reds broadcast picked up his derogatory remark on Aug. 19, 2020.

"There are no words to describe how grateful I am that they're rolling the dice," Brennaman told The Athletic of The CW. "They don't have to do this."

Brennaman did not realize his microphone was live when he said the slur nearly four years ago in a reference to San Francisco. Later in that broadcast, Brennaman issued an on-air apology that went viral because Nick Castellanos hit a home run during the announcer's address.

"I made a comment earlier tonight that I guess went out over the air that I am deeply ashamed of. If I have hurt anyone out there, I can't tell you how much I say from the bottom of my heart that I am so

very, very sorry," Brennaman began his apology that night.

"I pride myself and think of myself as a man of faith as there's a drive into deep left field by Castellanos, that will be a home run, and so that will make it a 4-0 ballgame."

Brennaman told The Athletic he was "basically fired from everything" within seven hours of the incident. His work since has included hosting shows for Chatterbox Sports, an online medium focused on Cincinnati sports.

He is now set to return to a prime-time gig, starting with the call of Oregon State vs. Idaho State on Aug. 31. He will mainly broadcast ACC games.

"You get pretty spoiled by it," Brennaman told The Athletic of his past work with Fox Sports and the Reds. "You get more than pretty spoiled by it all. I think somewhere along the line I probably started to think I was kind of a big deal, and I'm not a big deal. And you find out when you're gone that you're really not a big deal."

Since his firing, Brennaman has connected with members of the LGBTQ community, saying those interactions were "mainly about listening to people," including Outsports co-founder Cyd Zeigler.

Zeigler said he believed Brennaman deserved a second chance and was happy to see him get one.

# Pogacar grabs Tour title

Tadej Pogacar had no need to attack on the final stage of the Tour de France. Defending a lead of more than five minutes in Sunday's time trial, he was set to win the race comfortably for the third time and first time in three years, anyway.

But defense has not been in his vocabulary during this race and he simply could not resist another attack.

With his main rival, Jonas Vingegaard unable to challenge him,

Pogacar celebrated his Tour victory in style with a dominant win in the time trial ending in Nice for the 17th stage win of his already illustrious Tour career.

The 25-year-old Slovenian rider also became the first cyclist to secure the Giro d'Italia and Tour de France in the same year since the late Marco Pantani in 1998.

"To win both together is another level above," said Pogacar, who rides for UAE Team Emirates. "I think this is the first Grand Tour where I was totally confident every day. Even at the Giro I remember I had one bad day. This year, the Tour

was just amazing. I was enjoying it from day one."

## PAUL TOPS UFC'S PERRY

YouTuber-turned-boxer Jake Paul stopped former UFC fighter Mike Perry at 1:12 of the sixth round of a cruiserweight fight on Sunday to improve his record to 10-1 with seven knockouts.

Perry, who has a 6-1 record in bare-knuckle fighting, was making his professional boxing debut.

Paul knocked Perry down in each of the first two rounds and nearly stopped him with a flurry of punches in the fourth round. He sent Perry to the canvas a third time in the sixth round with an overhand right and left hook. Perry got back to his feet before the 10 count, but he was not steady on his feet and the referee waved the fight off.

The 27-year-old Paul was originally scheduled to face former world heavyweight champion Mike Tyson, but the fight was postponed after Tyson, 57, had a stomach ulcer flareup in May.



# Xander grabs second major of '24 with final-round 65 at Troon

TROON, Scotland — Xander Schauffele won the British Open on Sunday for his second major of the year, delivering a masterpiece at Royal Troon with a 6-under 65 to overcome a two-shot deficit and give the Americans a sweep of the four majors for the first time since 1982.

Schauffele, who faced questions at the start of the season whether he could win a major, now has two of them with the brand of golf that hasn't been seen in 90 years.

He won the PGA Championship at Valhalla by making a 6-foot birdie putt on the final hole for a 65. In a final round at Royal Troon set up for big drama — six players one shot behind, nine players separated by three shots — Schauffele made a tense Sunday look like a nice walk along the Irish Sea.

He is the first player to win two majors with closing rounds of 65 in the same year. Jack Nicklaus is the only other player to do it in his career.

And he never looked more calm, oozing that California chill vibe even as the wind presented so much trouble at Royal Troon. Schauffele said he told caddie and longtime friend Austin Kaiser on the 18th tee that he felt calm.

“He said he was about to puke on the 18th tee,” Schauffele said.

There was no need to panic, even when it took Schauffele six holes to make a birdie when everyone around him started strong. He played bogey-free in a chilly wind and pulled away with three

birdies in a four-hole stretch early on the back nine to go from two shots behind to leading by as many as three.

He won by two shots over American Billy Horschel and Justin Rose, the 43-year-old from England who had to go through 36-hole qualifying just to get into the field. They were among four players who had at least a share of the lead at one point Sunday.

They just couldn't keep up with Schauffele. No one could.

Even with so many players in contention early, the engraver was able to get to work early on those 16 letters across the base of the silver claret jug.

Given the wind, heavy air off the Firth of Clyde and punishing nature of the Ayrshire links, Schauffele's 65 ranks among the great closing rounds in British Open history. Playing in the third-to-last group, he matched the round of the championship with a score that was just over eight shots better than the field average.

The 30-year-old from San Diego became the first player since Jordan Spieth in 2015 to win his first two majors in the same season. And he extended American dominance on this Scottish links as the seventh Open champion in the last eight visits to Royal Troon.

Rose closed with a 67 and it was only good for second place. Horschel, who started the final round with a one-shot lead in his bid to win his first major, dropped back around the turn and birdied his last three holes for a 68 for his

best finish in a major.

“He has a lot of horsepower,” Rose said of Schauffele. “He's good with a wedge, he's great with a putter, he hits the ball a long way, obviously his iron play is strong. So he's got a lot of weapons out there. I think probably one of his most unappreciated ones is his mentality. He's such a calm guy out there.

“I don't know what he's feeling, but he certainly makes it look very easy.”

The player Schauffele had to track down was Thriston Lawrence of South Africa, who birdied three of four holes to end the front nine with a 32.

Schauffele was two shots behind when it all changed so suddenly. He hit a wedge out of the left rough on the difficult 11th and judged it perfectly to three feet for birdie. He hit another wedge to 15 feet for birdie on the 13th, and capped his pivotal run with a 12-foot birdie putt on the par-3 14th.

Lawrence finally dropped a shot on the 12th and didn't pick up any shots the rest of the day. He closed with a 68 and earned a small consolation — a trip to the Masters next April, his first time to Augusta National.

Scottie Scheffler, who got within one shot of the lead briefly on the front nine, lost his way with a three-putt from six feet for a double bogey on the ninth hole. Scheffler finished his round by topping a tee shot on the 18th and making another double bogey. The world's No. 1 player closed with a 72 and tied for seventh.

# HALL OPENS DOORS TO FOUR

Four more MLB greats became part of forever on Sunday afternoon in Cooperstown, where Adrián Beltré, Todd Helton, Joe Mauer and Jim Leyland were officially inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

All four members of the Class of 2024 reflected on their stellar careers, alternating between moments of levity and emotion during their speeches at a 2.5-hour ceremony at the Clark Sports Center in upstate New York.

Beltré became a first-ballot Hall of Famer, receiving 95.1% of the votes from the Baseball Writers' Association of America to recognize a 21-season career in which he recorded 3,166 hits, 477 home runs and 1,707 RBI, and won five Gold Gloves at third base.

The fun-loving Beltré spent seven seasons with the Dodgers; five with the Mariners; one with the Red Sox; and his final eight with the Rangers, with whom he is pictured with in his Hall of Fame plaque.

During his speech, Beltré recalled playing second base during his youth in the Dominican Republic, until he agreed to switch positions with his team's third baseman.

"I immediately fell in love with that position," Beltré said. "I loved every challenge of playing third base. I was hooked. Those hot shots, slow ground balls, bunt plays, I couldn't get enough of them."

A funny moment saw Beltré, who notoriously hated having his head touched, get

surprised on stage by David Ortiz, who snuck behind him and touched his head.

Beltré made his MLB debut in 1998, a year after Helton played the first of his 17 seasons, all with the Rockies.

A career .316 hitter, Helton led the majors with a .372 average, 147 RBI, 59 doubles and a .698 slugging percentage in 2000 to earn the first of five All-Star selections.

The lefty-swinging Helton's 2,519 hits, 369 home runs, 1,406 RBI and 592 doubles all rank first in Rockies history. He won three Gold Gloves as a first baseman.

"My family purchased a VCR for the sole purpose of me watching this 15-minute video

of Rod Carew on 'The Baseball Bunch.' He was talking about hitting the ball the other way," Helton said, referring to the 1991 HOF inductee who also hit left-handed.

"It was literally the only video we owned, and I must have watched it a million times."

Helton received 79.7% of the BBWAA votes in his sixth year on the ballot, putting him past the required 75% threshold.

Before his MLB career, Helton played quarterback at Tennessee, where he overlapped with Peyton Manning in 1994.

"Being the quarterback sandwiched between Heath Shuler and Peyton made my decision to pursue baseball easier," Helton joked.

Helton was briefly managed by Leyland, whose lone season with the Rockies came in 1999. Leyland was better known for his work with Pirates from 1986-96; the Marlins, with whom he won the 1997 World Series; and the Tigers from 2006-2013.

Leyland went 1,769-1,728 (.506) during his 22 seasons as an MLB manager and won Manager of the Year honors three times.

Long before he became Detroit's manager toward the end of his career, Leyland spent his first 18 years in pro baseball as a minor-league player and coach in the Tigers organization.

"Managing in the minors can be tough because you have to release players and shatter their dreams of ever becoming a big leaguer, and I knew that because I was one of them," Leyland said. "On the other side of that spectrum, it is so rewarding because you get the chance to tell a player he's going to the big leagues."

The Contemporary Era Committee voted Leyland for the hall in December. Leyland is not affiliated with a specific team on his plaque. His managerial tenure in Detroit meant sharing a division with Mauer, whose 15 seasons all came with the Twins from 2004-18.

Considered among the greatest catchers in MLB history, Mauer won three batting titles, including in 2009, when he hit a career-best .365 en route to AL MVP honors.

Mauer won three Gold Gloves and hit .306 in his career. He was on 76.1% of the BBWAA ballots, making him this year's other first-ballot Hall of Famer.

## Kershaw due back Thursday

The Dodgers are set to receive a big-name boost to their beleaguered rotation.

Clayton Kershaw is in line to make his 2024 debut Thursday afternoon at home against the Giants after missing the first four months of the season while recovering from November shoulder surgery.

That plan was confirmed by the Dodgers after Saturday night's 7-6 win in 11 innings over the Red Sox in Los Angeles, according to the Los Angeles Times.

Kershaw, 36, made his third minor-league rehab start on Friday night with Triple-A Oklahoma City, allowing three runs on six hits over four innings against the Rangers' affiliate in Round Rock.

The left-hander threw 67 pitches. His previous two rehab starts both lasted three innings.

"I mean, ultimately, it's just where the team is at," Kershaw said after Friday's outing, according to the LA Times. "Because, obviously, I'm not built up to 100 pitches. So would love to come back whenever they need me, obviously. But don't want to put the team in a bad spot, especially the way we've been grinding through the last few weeks."

The Dodgers' rotation is also missing Yoshinobu Yamamoto (triceps tightness); Walker Buehler (hip); and Tyler Glasnow, who is expected to return from lower-back tightness on Wednesday against the Giants.

Fellow starters Tony Gonsolin (elbow) and Dustin May (torn esophagus) are both out for the season.

Kershaw, a three-time National League Cy Young Award winner, pitched to a 2.46 ERA

over 131.2 innings last season en route to his 10th All-Star selection. In February, he signed a one-year deal with a player option.

"Health-wise, I feel good," Kershaw said Friday.

Starting on Thursday would mark Kershaw's first MLB appearance since he surrendered six runs in only 0.1 innings in a loss in Game 1 of the NLDS to the Diamondbacks last October.

He is 56 strikeouts away from 3,000 for his career.

"I know his words are (that) he doesn't want to put us in harm's way as far as putting stress on the bullpen," Dodgers manager Dave Roberts said of Kershaw's impending return before Saturday's game. "But for me, for him to take the baseball, if he feels good about where he's at physically, we can deal with the fallout."

The Dodgers, who are also missing short-stop Mookie Betts due to a broken left hand, lost six of their final seven games before the All-Star break. Saturday's win over Boston was their second in a row to begin the second half. Entering Sunday, the Dodgers were 58-41 and seven games up in the NL West.

Kershaw was one of several star pitchers to miss the start of the 2024 season. Yankees ace Gerrit Cole made his season debut last month after being diagnosed with elbow inflammation during spring training, while the Mets' Kodai Senga (shoulder strain) is nearing his return after making his fourth minor-league rehab start on Saturday.

Houston's Justin Verlander missed the first 20 games with shoulder inflammation and is out with neck discomfort, while Texas' Max Scherzer did not make his season debut until June 23 as he recovered from back surgery.
