Rikers road repair deal KO'd after winning bidder increased price

City Comptroller Brad Lander rejected a multimillion-dollar road repair contract for Rikers Island after the Correction Department allowed the winning bidder to inexplicably jack up the price, the Daily News has learned.

Lander sent a letter Thursday to the Correction Department denying the three-year contract after the winning bidder, Stasi Industries, was allowed to increase its \$2.7 million bid to \$4.5 million after it was awarded the contract.

The second-lowest bid, from Road Work Ahead, and the third lowest, from New York Asphalt, were both for more than \$4.9 million, significantly higher than the Stasi Industries bid.

The comptroller's office also objected to ties between Stasi and Road Work Ahead, because Stasi's principal, Crescenzo Stasi, is related to Road Work's principal, Luigi Stasi. The ties

went undisclosed in the Correction Department's documents to the comptroller's office, according to Lander's letter.

The department's "award of this contract to Stasi, despite a litany of procedural failures and contract shortcomings, undermines the principles of fairness ... designed to protect public moneys and preserve confidence in the city's procurement ecosystem," Lander wrote.

Department officials did not immediately reply to a request for comment.

The contract controversy began Dec. 19 when Mark Grae, a lawyer for New York Asphalt, sent a letter to Correction Commissioner Lynelle Maginley-Liddie complaining the two other firms had an "unfair competitive advantage" and called for an investigation.

"Notably, Stasi and Road Work are purportedly owned by two brothers, Crescenzo Stasi and Luigi Stasi," Grae wrote. "These two companies could be, in reality, the same company. Stasi and Road Work may alter

ego companies and have certain common elements of ownership, management, employees, office space and equipment."

But, the comptroller's office states, correction officials failed to thoroughly investigate the New York Asphalt complaint.

Luigi Stasi of Road Work Ahead said he and Crescenzo Stasi are not brothers but third cousins. "His company has no affiliation with my company," he said. "We're distant relatives and that's it"

Crescenzo Stasi told The News he didn't know the contract had been rejected.

"It was a clerical error as far I know. Our bid was still lower than the others," he said.

Both companies are based on Long Island. The contract was for repair of road surfaces, curbs and sidewalks at correction facilities on Rikers Island and in the Bronx. The Correction Department asked for the contract to be registered May 23, and the comptroller's office sent it back unsigned June 21.

There's no free lunch, & now MTA says there will be no free buses

The free-bus pilot program that made one line in each borough free to use for up to a year is not expected to be renewed, MTA officials indicated Monday.

The program, which began last year, is set to expire at the end of August. MTA officials said Monday that the program did not drive sufficient new ridership to justify the estimated \$15 million cost, and that affordability should be sought via systemwide efforts like the city's half-off Fair Fares program.

"There was a lot of fanfare on this pilot," Acting NYC Transit President Demetrius Crichlow said at a meeting of the MTA's board. "Our hope was that this pilot would get people out of their cars and onto buses on these routes.

"We did not see anything that aligned with that initial intent," said Crichlow.

Gov. Hochul had given the MTA \$15 million in funding last year to make five lines free for one year. The MTA's chosen routes — the B60, Bx18, Q4, S46 and M116 — have been fare-free since late September.

Jon Kaufman, the MTA's chief of strategic initiatives, said Monday that surveys conducted among riders on the five lines showed that ridership has gone up on the free routes by about a third.

Only 12% of riders surveyed said they were new to the bus route, Kaufman reported.

"Everyone else we were speaking to on those buses had already been taking the route," he said.

"They increased the frequency of their riding on the route, but it wasn't a surge of new people to the transit system," he said.

Riders that were new to the free routes largely told the MTA they were running errands or engaging in leisure activities. Those who were already regulars on a given route were more likely to be going to work or to school, Kaufman said.

But for Assemblyman Zohran Mamdani (D-Queens), one of the

principal architects of the state law that called for the pilot program, those facts made the program a success.

"This pilot achieved exactly what we hoped it would — to bring economic relief to working-class New Yorkers," Mamdani told the Daily News.

The income profiles of the free-bus riders was largely consistent between those new to the routes and those who had been regular riders before the pilot.

Roughly 44% of new riders and 46% of regulars reported making less than \$28,000 a year. Only 14% of that group said they were enrolled in the Fair Fares program, which offers half-off transit fares for those making less than the federal poverty line.

Mamdani said the goal of the pilot had been to ease economic pressures on working-class New Yorkers. Kaufman, the MTA official, argued the effect was limited to only five routes.

Kaufman suggested the MTA consider other approaches if it was trying to help low-income New Yorkers use the transit system.

"If your goal is to help with affordability, I think there's smarter ways to do this," Kaufman told the MTA's board.

With the free-bus program, "you're only helping people on [one] route," Kaufman continued. "Broad affordability helps wherever you're going."

Mamdani pointed to one stat in particular from Kaufman's data: 23% of those surveyed said they wouldn't have taken the trip if the bus were not free.

"We're talking about New Yorkers gaining access to the city they live in," Mamdani said. "This pilot allowed New Yorkers to take the trips they wanted to take and live their fullest life."

Notably, the free-fare pilot has not appeared to increase fare evasion on nearby routes — a fear MTA brass had repeatedly voiced in the runup to the trial.

On average nearly 50% of bus riders statewide currently skip the fare.



Eric touts housing gain

Hails 12% increase, urges more neighborhoods to pitch in

Mayor Adams and top administration officials announced Monday that the city financed the preservation and construction of nearly 29,000 affordable and public housing units over the past year — a 12% increase over last year when the city funded more than 26,000 such units.

Adams touted both years' numbers as record-breakers during a press conference in the South Bronx, but noted that, with extremely low vacancy rates in the city, the ultimate goal is to build more and to do it in every corner of the city — despite resistance from some quarters.

The mayor likened the struggle to fulfill the goal of bringing low-income housing to those neighborhoods to the segregationist South of decades ago.

“Every neighborhood should take upon its portion of housing in their community. When you have 59 community boards and 10 ... have built more affordable housing in one year than the other 49 combined, what does that say?” Adams said. “This is not the Deep South of 1950. Jim Crowism

can't exist in our city. Every part of this city must have an obligation to build more housing.”

His announcement comes as he and his administration are trying to win approval for their City of Yes for Housing Opportunity plan, which would loosen zoning red tape to allow for “a little more housing” to be built in every neighborhood citywide, theoretically relieving demand. Under the current version, that would include eliminating parking mandates and making it easier to convert basement apartments.

As homelessness numbers have surged, and with the city experiencing a historically dire rental vacancy rate of 1.4%, Adams has spent the last 10 months touting that plan as his primary solution to the housing crisis.

But it has proven to be incredibly divisive as it works its way through the approval process. The real estate industry, pro-development groups and even members of the far left, who typically clash with the mayor, have embraced it while community boards and natural Adams allies in the outer boroughs have fought hard against it, expressing fears about the impact on suburban neighborhoods.

Adams also touted his record in tending

to the historically beleaguered New York City Housing Authority, saying his administration converted 3,678 NYCHA apartments into newly renovated residences.

Separately, administration officials noted that the city financed 25,266 affordable homes through the Department of Housing Preservation and Development and the Housing Development Corporation. Of those, 14,706 were newly constructed, 2,155 are permanent supportive housing units, and 4,085 are units for the formerly homeless, the highest numbers on record for the latter two categories.

They also trumpeted the administration's use of CityFHEPS housing vouchers — a point of controversy with the City Council, which overrode a mayoral veto to expand that program, but which Adams has resisted implementing.

According to Adams' team, the city moved more than 12,000 people out of homeless shelters and into permanent housing — “a record number of homeless New Yorkers” — through that program over the last year.

One City Council source, who asked to speak anonymously due to tensions with the administration, voiced skepticism Monday over the mayor's framing of who

deserves credit.

“The truth is that the Council pushed through the obstruction of the mayor's budget director to add funding for affordable housing in the budget and Council members' advocacy and oversight on CityFHEPS has forced the administration's hand on the program,” the source said. “The administration still refuses to comply with local law, which has left tens of thousands of New Yorkers facing evictions and blocked from help by this mayor.”

Republican Council members, who are often aligned with Adams, have said the plan would destroy neighborhoods.

Councilman Christopher Marte, a Democrat who represents lower Manhattan, has also spoken out publicly against the City of Yes. During a marathon City Planning meeting earlier this month, he criticized it as overly dense and complicated, describing its passage through local review as “irresponsible, disingenuous and a misappropriation” of the review process.

“This is not a plan for New Yorkers. This is a plan for people who profit off New York,” he said. “We cannot wait for affordability to trickle down; we need it now and we need to mandate it.”

3 shot, 1 fatally, at party near shelter; bullets hit wrong people: witness

Three people were shot, one fatally, near the troubled migrant shelter on Randalls Island early Monday, police said — and residents claimed the trouble started over a robbery.

The 3:30 a.m. bloodshed, during a party celebrating the re-election of Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro, has been linked to a previous robbery.

The 44-year-old slay victim and a 32-year-old man who was shot in the throat were hit by bullets intended for someone else, a witness said.

“There were a lot of shots, like a machine gun. Pop pop pop pop pop,” said one shelter resident as he described the victims. “She was innocent. He was innocent. She was dancing at the party when the gun was fired.”

Medics rushed the woman victim to Harlem Hospital, but she could not be saved. Her name was not immediately released.

“Many people were shocked to hear about the girl,” said one migrant, who asked his name not be printed. “But let’s hope they find the culprit and that justice is served.”

The other victims, the man shot in the throat and a 31-year-old woman struck in the back, are in stable condition at the same hospital.

The witness, a migrant staying at the shelter, said the trouble began when a gunman came looking for someone he believed stole his necklace.

“He thinks that person was in the party. So he got p---d,” the witness said. “He went back to the Bronx to get a gun. He came with a gun. All the people that were partying, they got nothing to do with the robbery.”

He said about 200 people were at the party.

“She was a very nice woman,” he said of the victim. “She was selling juice here,” he added, pointing to the shelter entrance near a pedestrian bridge.

Another woman said she saw the woman who was killed every day.

“Why? Why they got to kill her?” she said. “She was always right there. Selling Coke, hot dogs, drinks, soda. We all met her. We would buy from her. She was very nice and friendly. Thank God I wasn’t there. I was in my bed.”

Several areas on Randalls Island were taped off by cops as they investigated hours later. Broken beer bottles, crushed Bud Light cans, blue medical gloves and large pools of blood could be seen near ballfields and picnic benches at one of the crime scenes.

There were no immediate arrests.

On July 21, two people were shot outside a migrant shelter in Clinton Hill, Brooklyn.

One victim died that day, the other two days later. One suspect has been charged but the triggerman is still being sought, as is the gunman who shot dead another man seven minutes earlier a few blocks away.

The back-to-back Brooklyn shootings are connected, police said, and are linked to Venezuelan gang tensions

JOE'S SUPREME FIX FOR COURT

Touts 18-year term limits and ethics code,
urges Constitution bid to bar prez immunity

President Biden Monday unveiled a sweeping plan for Supreme Court reforms, including term limits for justices, a binding ethics code and a constitutional amendment proclaiming that presidents are not immune from criminal prosecution.

The package seeks to undo a remarkably successful Republican push to forge a right-wing supermajority on the nation's top court that has rolled back abortion and voting rights and made it much easier for former President Trump to avoid accountability.

"I have great respect for our institutions and separation of powers," Biden argued in

a Washington Post op-ed published Monday. "What is happening now is not normal, and it undermines the public's confidence in the court's decisions, including those impacting personal freedoms."

Biden, who is a lame duck after announcing he won't run for reelection, planned to elaborate on the proposal Monday at the Lyndon Baines Johnson Presidential Library in Austin, Texas, to mark the 60th anniversary of the Civil Rights Act.

The plan has next to no chance of passage in the Congress, where Republicans control the House and can block legislation in the Senate. A constitutional amendment, which would require ratification by three quarters of states, would be even tougher to

pass given the polarization between red and blue states.

Democrats hope to use the proposal as a rallying cry for changes on the top court, which Republicans have effectively used to push their policy agenda on a range of issues in recent years.

Additionally, the justices have been rocked by a series of financial and conflict-of-interest scandals involving Justice Clarence Thomas and Justice Samuel Alito, both leading conservatives.


The plan would abolish the current lifetime appointments to the court and instead implement a system in which the president would appoint a new justice every two years for an 18-year term.

The goal is to avoid the political gamesmanship that has marked appointments by both parties and ensure a gradual evolution of views among the justices.

Biden also wants Congress to pass a code of ethics for the Supreme Court that would require justices to disclose gifts, refrain from public political activity and recuse themselves from cases in which they or their spouses have conflicts.

He urges Congress and the states to pass a constitutional amendment reversing the Supreme Court's recent landmark immunity ruling determining that former presidents have broad immunity from prosecution.

Vice President Kamala Harris, who is the Democratic candidate for president

now that Biden has announced he is not running, quickly backed the plan.

Trump has derided any plan for court reforms as a liberal scam. He boasts that his installation of three conservative judges delivered a generation of Republican dominance on the nine-judge court.

Led by Chief Justice John Roberts, the Supreme Court has issued a string of right-wing rulings in recent years including rolling back legal abortion and watering down the Voting Rights Act, while erecting ever-higher obstacles to even the most commonsense gun regulations.

Liberals accuse the top court of espousing its own brand of judicial activism that conservatives once decried.

Thomas has sparked outrage with

reports that he accepted millions of dollars in secret gifts from GOP megadonors for everything from luxe vacations to private school tuition and even his elderly mother's home.

Alito, who has also been exposed accepting gifts, and Thomas have refused to step aside from cases involving Trump's efforts to overturn his loss in the 2020 election even though their wives are outspoken supporters of that scheme.

At the Alito home in Virginia, the justice's wife, Martha-Ann Alito, hoisted a flag associated with rioters who attacked the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021. Thomas' wife, Ginni Thomas, texted White House officials urging Trump to resist the peaceful transfer of power to Biden.

A new reality for women in Iowa: Abortion now banned after 6 wks.

An Iowa law functionally banning abortion after six weeks took effect Monday, after years of Republican-led efforts.

The law bans abortion procedures after a "fetal heartbeat" is detected, before many women realize they are pregnant. Nationwide, about 60% of abortions occurred after six weeks of pregnancy, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"There is no right more sacred than life," said Gov. Kim Reynolds, a Republican.

Reynolds and other conservative lawmakers in the state spent years trying to pass the six-week ban, only to be blocked by several court decisions. But in June, the Iowa Supreme Court upheld the law in a 4-to-3 decision, and a district court allowed it to take effect Monday.

Iowa is now one of four states to ban abortion after six weeks. In 14 states, abortion is almost entirely illegal. All 18 restrictive states are governed by Republicans, and they are largely in the southern and central parts of the country.

Prior to Monday, Iowa had been one of the few Midwest states to permit abortion up to 20 weeks into pregnancy. Kansas, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota still allow such

procedures. Nebraska bans abortion after 12 weeks of pregnancy.

"We have spent months planning for the possibility of this new reality, putting in place patient navigators and other supports to connect patients with the care they so desperately need — both now and in the future," Planned Parenthood North Central States said in a statement after the Iowa Supreme Court decision.

Those preparations included working with Planned Parenthood locations in Mankato, Minn., and Omaha, according to the group's chief medical officer, Sarah Traxler. Additionally, reproductive health clinics will remain open in Iowa to provide abortions before six weeks.

Some medical professionals have argued the term "fetal heartbeat" is inaccurate to begin with. About six weeks into pregnancy, a cluster of cells begins sending electrical impulses. That cluster of cells eventually develops into different structures of the heart.

The Iowa ban includes exceptions in cases of rape, incest and if the woman's life is in danger. Last year, an Iowa poll found 61% of residents believed abortion should be legal, while 35% supported a ban. However, Gov. Reynolds still proclaimed "the Iowa Supreme Court has upheld the will of the people of Iowa." **With News Wire Services**

FBI to conduct 'victim interview' with Don over assassination try

Republican Party presidential candidate Donald Trump will meet with federal agents investigating the assassination attempt against him earlier this month in western Pennsylvania.

FBI Special Agent Kevin Rojek called the meeting "a standard victim interview like we would do for any other victim of crime, under any other circumstances."

The 78-year-old nominee is believed to have been struck by a bullet or bullet fragment after a 20-year-old gunman using an AR-15-style rifle missed a clear shot at him from roughly 150 yards.

Federal investigators have conducted roughly 450 interviews in connection to the shooting, but still haven't determined a motive. Alleged shooter Thomas Crooks was killed by a sniper team after firing several shots that killed a bystander and wounded Trump and two other men at a MAGA rally.

Secret Service Director Kimberly Cheatle resigned amid criticism over security lapses leading to the deadly shooting in Butler County on July 13. CBS News said Crooks fired eight shots in six seconds from a rooftop perch before a bullet took his life.

Trump (photo) has long been at odds with the FBI.



He complained in November that federal agents searching his country club home in Florida for classified documents didn't remove their shoes. Numerous sensitive documents were recovered. Criminal charges brought against Trump were later dismissed.

FBI Director Christopher Wray angered Trump last week when he told the House Judiciary Committee his agency wasn't sure whether the GOP party leader was directly struck by a bullet or injured by fragments from one that hit something else nearby.

"No, it was, unfortunately, a bullet that hit my ear, and hit it hard," Trump wrote on his Truth Social social media platform. "No wonder the once storied FBI has lost the confidence of America!"

The FBI didn't say when it plans to meet with Trump.

Heroes grab stabber

Migrant dad helps hold suspect after woman knifed in Qns. subway

A 23-year-old woman was stabbed in a Queens subway station by a panhandler after she wouldn't give him money — prompting heroic good Samaritans to grab the attacker and hold him until cops arrived, police said Monday.

The woman refused to hand over any cash to the beggar when she was confronted on the mezzanine of the Jamaica-Van Wyck subway station near Richmond Hill at about 8:28 p.m. Sunday, cops said. The denial enraged the panhandler, who stabbed the woman in the chest.

The victim was rushed by medics to Jamaica Hospital in stable condition. By then, brave bystanders had stepped in and grabbed the suspect, who police identified

as Randol Centrerres, 24.

Alexandro Robles Lino, one of the good Samaritans who helped nab Centrerres, told the Daily News the encounter was frightening, but that he was proud to be able to help the woman and do his part to make the city safer. Centrerres has been charged with assault and weapon possession.

Robles Lino, 37, a recent migrant from Venezuela who is a father of five, said he and his children were heading to the migrant shelter in Jamaica, Queens, where the family has been staying when he saw the chaotic scene.

"I was pretty scared, because I was with my four small children," Robles Lino told The News on Monday. "But [I] armed myself with courage, with bravery, because this girl needed help."

"We got off the train from Jamaica station, and when we went up the escalators, I see there's a man attacking a woman," Robles Lino said. "He's stabbing her, I think he's stabbing her in the stomach."

"She was attacked inside the turnstile on her way down to the subway," he said. "And he was stabbing her with the knife in the stomach. She was screaming, 'Ah, ah, ah.' And that's when we realized. And my son panicked, because he was going in front of us, toward the little kids. ... Thank God we were able to defend this lady."

After making sure his kids were safe and away from the violence, Robles Lino said he and a friend approached the attacker, who was trying to escape.

"He wanted to go down and get on the train to escape," he said. "I left my kids downstairs with my friend's wife and we went up to catch him while the police arrived."

Robles Lino and his friend then grabbed the stabber before he could get away, wrestling him to the ground, a video of the heart-pounding encounter that was shared with The News showed.

After handing the attacker over to police officers, Robles Lino rushed to comfort

his terrified kids amid an ordeal that left everyone rattled, he said. Robles Lino's son Matias, 7, told his dad he didn't want to live in the city anymore where such violence is possible, the shaken father said. But when his kids saw the police shaking their dad's hand, they relaxed, he said.

"My kids said, 'Dad, wow, you're a hero!'" he said.

Robles Lino and his family have been living in a Jamaica shelter since coming to the city from Venezuela in 2022. Robles Lino said he's working on getting his Social Security and work permits so he can leave the shelter and build a more stable life for his family.

The fearless dad hopes people will remember his story before forming negative conclusions about migrants.

"It is true that there are many people committing crimes and doing bad things — but there are also so many people who come to do things right," he said. "We are not all the same, you know?"

ISRAEL DETAINS NINE

Investigated over allegations of abuse of a prisoner at a

SDE TEIMAN BASE, Israel — The Israeli military said Monday that it is holding nine soldiers for questioning about allegations of “substantial abuse” of a detainee

at a shadowy facility where Israel has held Palestinian prisoners throughout the war in Gaza.

The military did not disclose additional details surrounding the alleged abuse, saying only that its top legal official had launched an inquiry. An investigation by the Associated Press and reports by rights groups have exposed

abysmal conditions and abuses at the Sde Teiman facility, the country’s largest detention center.

A report by the United Nations agency for Palestinian refugees, UNRWA, this year said detainees alleged that they were subjected to ill-treatment and abuse while in Israeli custody, without specifying the facility.

The military has generally denied ill-treatment of detainees. Following the accusations of harsh treatment that prompted a court case, Israel said it was transferring the bulk of Palestinian detainees out of Sde Teiman and upgrading it.

Israeli media reported that military police officers who arrived

at Sde Teiman in southern Israel to detain the soldiers were met with protests and scuffles. Later, dozens of protesters who had come to show support for the soldiers burst through the facility’s gate, waving Israeli flags and chanting “shame.”

After the military cleared the protesters, several hundreds of

them regrouped outside the military base where the nine soldiers were taken for questioning.

Video showed a swarm of people trying to push their way through the gates of the base and being pushed back by soldiers. Some of the protesters were masked and carried guns. Others called through megaphones for

the soldiers' immediate release.

Israeli military chief Lt. Gen. Herzi Halevi condemned the protesters' break-in at Sde Teiman and said he fully supports the military prosecutors' investigation into the abuse allegation. "It is precisely these investigations that protect our soldiers in Israel and the world

and preserve the values" of the military, he said.

Israel has detained thousands of Palestinians since the Oct. 7 Hamas attack that sparked the war in Gaza, according to official figures. However, hundreds were released after the military determined they were not affiliated with Hamas.

Israeli human rights groups say the majority of detainees have at some point passed through Sde Teiman.

The detentions came as international mediators are trying to bring Hamas and Israel to agreement on a ceasefire deal that would wind down the war in Gaza and free the remaining


110 hostages held there.

Also, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Monday vowed heavy retaliation against Hezbollah amid furious diplomatic efforts to prevent a spiral into regional war following a weekend rocket strike that killed 12 children in the Israeli-controlled Golan Heights.

Neighbor nabbed in slay

'We're going to always love you,' cries mom of B'klyn victim

A suspect has been nabbed for fatally shooting a neighbor at a Brooklyn NYCHA complex two weeks ago, leaving the victim's family shattered by gun violence for a second time.

Aaron Granton, 28, was arrested Saturday for allegedly shooting 32-year-old Deon Williams in the heart on July 13.

Williams was shot outside the Sumner Houses on Marcus Garvey Blvd. near Myrtle Ave. in Bedford-Stuyvesant about 6:25 p.m., echoing the tragic death of his brother Andre Avant in 2009.

Both Williams and his accused killer lived in the Sumner Houses but in different buildings. It wasn't clear what sparked the shooting.

Williams was rushed by medics to Kings County Hospital, but he could not be

saved.

During Williams' funeral at the Lawrence H. Woodward Funeral Home in Bedford-Stuyvesant on Monday, his mother, Charlotte Williams, shared her heartache.

"Just a message for my son," she said during her eulogy. "You will not be forgotten. We're going to always love you."

"I am not sad because the suffering I see my son go through, having seizures at least eight times out of the month, they were so severe," she added. "He was tired of a lot of things that was going on."

On April 21, 2009, police found Avant, 19, with a gunshot wound to the head near Putnam Ave. and Ralph Ave., about a mile and a half from the Sumner Houses. He died at the scene.

"Streets of New York are not safe. That's it," the mom told the Daily News over the phone after Monday's funeral.

Deon Williams leaves behind his children and five siblings. His 10-year-old son

recited a heartbreaking poem at his funeral.

"Now, all we have are memories and your picture in the frame," the boy read. "Your memory is our keeping with which will never part. God has you in His keeping. We have you in our prayers."

"I've lost another nephew to gun violence," an aunt lamented during the emotional service. "So next time you think that you need a gun to make you feel gangster, to go take somebody's life, it ain't gangster. ... Reap what you sow, and it's going to come on you or it's going to come on your family, it's going to be returned."

"Words can't even express what life would be like without my little brother," Deon Williams' older brother, Chris, told mourners.

"On his worst days, he ensured the people around him felt special," a relative wrote of Deon Williams on a GoFundMe to raise money for his funeral. "Deon was a man of confidence and wanted everyone to feel like a star."

"In Deon's last days, his proudest moment was a conversation he had with a young man about loving the gap between his front two teeth, a physical trait Deon grew to love about himself," she added.

"This is only one example that highlights the warm-loving person Deon was. In his free time, he spent his days writing raps, making people laugh with his silly jokes, and building his clothing brand. While these things brought Deon immense joy, his children were his true happiness."

The accused killer has no criminal history, police say, but was arrested in Brooklyn on Friday for weapon possession after being allegedly caught with a switchblade. He was charged with the murder the next day and ordered held without bail after his arraignment in Brooklyn Criminal Court.

Deon Williams had multiple prior arrests. He was conditionally released by parole in September 2019 after serving six years in state prison for a robbery and attempted assault conviction, records show.

Texts belie 'bite' pol's claims

B'klyn's Zhuang: I had no influence on march vs. my arrest

Brooklyn Councilwoman Susan Zhuang, under fire for allegedly biting a cop during a demonstration against a homeless shelter in her district, said over the weekend that she was not involved in organizing a protest march condemning her arrest. But text messages obtained by the Daily News raise questions about that claim.

The Sunday event involved hundreds of demonstrators marching from Manhattan's Folley Square to Brooklyn's Cadman Plaza to voice solidarity with Zhuang in the wake of her July 17 arrest on felony charges that she bit an NYPD chief so hard in the arm it drew blood during a chaotic protest against a shelter development in her Bensonhurst district. The district has no homeless shelters.

As first reported by The News, the Sunday march was co-organized by John Chan, a southern Brooklyn community advocate

who has drawn scrutiny for his ties to China's Communist Party as well as for getting help from Zhuang's team to raise money for a local nonprofit group he operates.

Asked about Chan's role in the march, Zhuang was quoted in a local report late Sunday as saying she is "not part" of his group and had "not been part of planning" the protest.

But texts Zhuang sent out Sunday morning to hundreds of constituents tell a different story.

In the texts, disseminated in a WeChat group just hours before the march got underway, Zhuang, a conservative Democrat, told constituents to not bring signs to the demonstration criticizing Mayor Adams.

"Do not attack the mayor, we're going to have opportunity to sit down with him to negotiate," Zhuang wrote to the WeChat group, which has some 500 members, one of whom provided screen grabs of the messages to The News on condition of anonymity. "This sign is no good for

negotiations."

In a second message, Zhuang urged constituents to not "clash with the police" during the march. Both messages were written in Chinese and independently translated by The News.

Zhuang did not return a request for comment Monday on the discrepancy between her public remarks and the WeChat messages.

Esther Jensen, a rep from the Actum consulting firm that Zhuang has hired to handle her communications operations, sought to clarify the nature of the councilwoman's involvement in the march when shown copies of the WeChat messages.

"The Council member was not involved in the logistics for planning this event," Jensen said. "The Council member was supporting the NYPD as she always has, and was advocating for the safety of her community."

It's unclear from the messages what type of negotiations with the mayor Zhuang was referencing. Jensen would say only that Zhuang is "using her position as

on that he wants to help Zhuang "resolve" the criminal charges against her and the dispute over the shelter development in her district.

Zhuang, who has pleaded not guilty to the assault charges against her, maintains she was trying to help an elderly woman at the chaotic July 17 protest where she allegedly bit the chief.

In public remarks, she has not specifically addressed the bite attack allegation.

The 32-room shelter that's slated to be developed in Zhuang's 43rd Council District would house single adult men.

Proponents of the shelter, including the mayor's administration, have said it's a much-needed addition in a neighborhood that currently isn't providing any housing specifically meant for the homeless.

Zhuang and other residents counter that the shelter would cause public safety issues in the district and have argued that building affordable housing on the site would be a better option.

a public servant to collaborate with City Hall to best serve her constituents."

Spokesmen for the mayor did not immediately respond to emailed questions.

Two days after her arrest, Zhuang, who has styled herself as a pro-police lawmaker, met privately with the mayor at City Hall.

Adams, who's politically aligned with Zhuang, has declined to say what they discussed in the meeting. He told reporters later



2 killed, 11 hurt in stab spree at Brit children’s event

Thirteen people were stabbed, two fatally, during a “major incident” at a children’s event space where a “Taylor Swift Yoga and Dance Workshop” took place in Southport, England, on Monday.

Authorities said two children were killed in the bloodshed that also left nine kids and two adults wounded. Six of the kids and both adults are said to be in critical condition.

Merseyside police said a 17-year-old suspect from the town of Banks was in custody Monday afternoon.

“We can also confirm that the incident is not currently being treated as terror-related,” cops reported on social media.

Authorities are trying to ascertain a motive. The suspect’s name hasn’t been released.

Chief Constable Serena Kennedy said her officers were called to the bloody scene shortly before noon local time.

“When they arrived they were shocked to find that multiple people, many of whom were children, had been subjected to a ferocious attack and had suffered serious injuries,” Kennedy said.

The owner of an auto repair shop who witnessed the incident said the victims appeared to include several “young girls,” according to the BBC. Several mothers were reportedly heard “screaming” during the chaos.

Another witness living near the crime scene said the mother of one victim

claimed her daughter was barely conscious after being attacked.

“I’ve never seen anything like it,” that woman said. “We didn’t know what was going on.”

The injured adults were “bravely trying to protect the children who were being attacked,” the BBC said.

“One man has been arrested and a knife seized,” police posted on social media. “There are casualties.”

Authorities added there was no longer a threat to the public and urged the public against speculation while law enforcement investigates.

Bloodied children were seen fleeing a building where a Taylor Swift-themed event geared toward children between 6 and 11 years old was taking place,

according to The Associated Press.

“Horrendous and deeply shocking news emerging from Southport,” newly anointed Prime Minister Keir Starmer posted on X. “My thoughts are with all those affected.”

King Charles, too, was aghast and issued a statement.

“My wife and I have been profoundly shocked to hear of the utterly horrific incident in Southport today,” the king said on X.

Southport is a coastal city in northwest England bordering the Irish Sea. It’s home to roughly 94,000 people. The village of Banks is located roughly 4 miles to its northeast on the border of Merseyside and Lancashire counties.

Merseyside police said they were not searching for any other suspects.

Saboteurs in France disrupt internet during Paris Olympics

Saboteurs cut fiber-optic cables in multiple parts of France early Monday, disrupting internet and phone service as the country hosts the Summer Olympics in Paris.

Officials said the incident appeared to be coordinated.

“Large sections of cables were cut. You would have to use an ax or a grinder,” Nicolas Chatin, spokesman for internet service provider SFR, told Agence France-Presse.

Other service providers confirmed the outages occurred.

“A new major sabotage of long-distance cables took place last night in France around 2:15 a.m.,” Nicolas Guillaume, CEO of internet service provider Netalis, wrote on social media.

Free Pro, another provider, warned of a “significant slowdown” as service was restored.

Le Monde reported that service was affected in six districts, but Orange, the main telecom provider to the Olympics, was not included, leaving service in Paris untouched.

“Last night, our telecommunications operators were affected by damage in several departments,” Junior Minister for Digital Affairs Marina Ferrari said. “I condemn these cowardly and irresponsible acts.”

A series of coordinated arson attacks against the French rail system occurred Friday – the same day of the opening ceremony – leading to travel disruptions.

The government is investigating the possible involvement of ultraleft activists in the arsons, according to Agence France-Presse. At least one arrest was made Sunday near a train yard at Oissel in northern France.

High-speed rail service was fully restored Monday. No group has claimed responsibilities for either sabotage, and it’s unclear if investigators believe they are linked.

Transport Minister Patrice Vergriete said Monday additional resources, including 50 drones, 250 security agents and 1,000 maintenance workers, had been dispatched to beef up security along the country’s rail system, which has more than 17,000 miles of track.

The damage caused by the sabotage will “very probably” amount to millions of euros, including “commercial losses” and “repair costs,” Vergriete said.

Cop in Black woman slay was booted from Army

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — The Illinois sheriff's deputy charged in the shooting death of Sonya Massey was kicked out of the Army for the first of two drunken driving convictions in which he had a weapon in his car, authorities said, but that didn't stop multiple law enforcement agencies from giving him a badge.

Before his policing career began with six jobs in four years — the first three were part-time — Sean Grayson, 30, was convicted twice in a year of driving under the influence, which cost him his stint in the military.

The convictions plus his previous employment record should have raised serious questions when the Sangamon County Sheriff's Department hired him in May 2023, law enforcement experts say.

Grayson, who has since been fired, is charged with first-degree murder, aggravated battery with a firearm and official misconduct in the death of Massey, a 36-year-old Black woman who had called 911 on July 6 about a suspected prowler at her home in Springfield, 200 miles southwest of Chicago. Grayson, who is white, has pleaded not guilty.

"Six jobs in four years should have raised a red flag. And you would ask why he wasn't hired full-time in any of those [part-time]

jobs," said Chuck Wexler, executive director of the Police Executive Research Forum, a Washington-based think tank. "Combined with a track record of DUIs, it would be enough to do further examination as to whether or not he would be a good fit."

Grayson, who enlisted in the Army in 2014, was charged with DUI in Macoupin County, just south of Sangamon County, after traffic stops on Aug. 10, 2015, and July 26, 2016.

The first DUI led to his discharge from

the military in February 2016 for "serious misconduct," according to a U.S. official who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss personnel information, adding that Grayson had an unregistered gun in his vehicle.

Macoupin County State's Attorney Jordan Garrison confirmed that police found a gun in the center console, but Grayson did not face a weapons charge because he was a resident of Fort Riley, Kan. Kansas has an open-carry firearms law.

Grayson received a general discharge under honorable conditions — rather than an honorable discharge — because he was charged by a civilian law enforcement agency and his military service otherwise was good. His attorney, Daniel Fultz, declined to comment Monday.

A misdemeanor DUI charge doesn't by law preclude someone from serving in law enforcement, said Sean Smoot, chairman of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, but a hiring agency can certainly consider it.

"I am shocked an agency would hire someone with two DUIs, but multiple agencies apparently did," Smoot said.

Massey's father, James Wilburn, has demanded the resignation of Sangamon County Sheriff Jack Campbell. "He does not intend to step down," Campbell spokesman Jeff Wilhite said.

A statement from Campbell's office indicated that the county merit commission and state law enforcement board recommended Grayson's certification as an officer despite the DUIs, and he passed a drug test, criminal background check, psychological evaluation and 16-week academy course.

Body-worn camera video of the killing released last week has unnerved the capital city, where a 1908 race riot prompted the creation of the NAACP a year later.

"Black women are under attack," said Teresa Haley, a consultant and founder of Visions 1908, a social and economic justice and education advocacy group.

DAD WHO WENT TOO FAR

Gets jail for intimidating witnesses in son's manslaughter case

A Manhattan man convicted of waging an intimidation campaign against witnesses with information about his son's fatal stabbing of a young Bronx basketball star — blasting them online as “snitches and rats” — received a six-month jail term Monday.

Steve Darbasie appeared for his sentencing in Manhattan Supreme Court following his conviction at trial last month, when a jury found him guilty of witness tampering and intimidating a victim or witness for meddling in his son Tammuz Darbasie's since-resolved manslaughter case.

After claiming his son had acted in self-defense, Darbasie created an anonymous Instagram account under the name

“Ratzzzz” to post about three witnesses who identified his son as Terrell Wigfall's killer — obtaining CCTV footage showing them talking to police via his son's defense attorney Frank Rothman, who testified at the father's trial.

Within days of Darbasie setting up the account in December 2022, an unknown assailant smashed the rear windshield of a vehicle that one of the witnesses was sitting in, according to prosecutors. Another got a text describing her as a rat.

Tammuz Darbasie, 24, pleaded guilty to first-degree manslaughter in April 2023 stemming from Wigfall's Aug. 22, 2022, stabbing near 11th Ave. and W. 54th St. He received a five-year sentence, with prosecutors saying at the time they had difficulty securing eyewitnesses.

“Steve Darbasie waged a relentless

campaign of intimidation, using social media as a sword to both punish witnesses for speaking with police and attempting to prevent them from testifying about his son's crime,” Manhattan District Attorney Alvin Bragg said in a statement Monday.

“Honest testimony is the bedrock of our criminal legal system, and when witnesses are harassed and intimidated, our ability to hold accountable those who commit violent acts suffers. We will not tolerate any such attempts, as I hope this trial conviction makes clear. My thoughts are with the loved ones of Terrell Wigfall as they continue to mourn his loss.”

Wigfall, a 24-year-old father of one studying at Bronx Community College, was stabbed in the chest during a brawl. The high-scoring hoopster underwent heart surgery and battled for his life for weeks

at Mount Sinai West hospital before he died Sept. 16. Police identified Darbasie as the suspected knifeman soon after, and he surrendered the following month.

During his season in the Bronx, Wigfall averaged nearly 20 points per game and broke the 20-point barrier in nine of the team's 16 games. The 6-foot-1 guard also led the Bronx Community College Broncos in steals, free throws, assists and blocks.

“Terrell, lost to violence, a young dad, star athlete, and graduate of West Side HS,” one of his high school teachers, Mark Torres, wrote on social media after his killing. “We miss you and will always LOVE and Remember you! Rest in Paradise.”

Steve Darbasie's attorney Alberto Ebanks did not return requests for comment. Wigfall's loved ones could not be reached.

Bring in a receiver for Rikers

The mayor who first declared in an Emergency Executive Order that there was a state of emergency existing in Department of Correction facilities, including on Rikers Island, was Bill de Blasio, on Sept. 15, 2021. That emergency has remained ever since, renewed every five days, first by de Blasio for the balance of his term and since Jan. 1, 2022, by the current mayor, Eric Adams.

The emergency can really only end when a federal judge decides that Rikers should be handed over to a court-appointed receiver to run the place, which will hopefully happen soon. We would think that the terrible local federal lockup, Brooklyn's Metropolitan Detention Center, should also get new management.

As to Rikers, over the weekend, Adams renewed the Emergency Executive Order again (we estimate it was his 188th time) and added to it by suspending some of the ill-founded constraints on Rikers management imposed by the City Council. The measures, about the use of solitary confinement, were passed over Adams' proper veto and set to take effect. So the mayor said no, as implementing the Council's ban would have been detrimental to maintaining order and safety in the jail, endangering both the detainees and the correction officers guarding them.

Adams said that he acted because, "It is of the utmost importance to protect the health and safety of all persons in the custody of the Department of Correction and of all officers and persons who work in the City of New York jails and who transport persons in custody to court and other facilities, and the public."

We don't need to get into all the details here and rely on the words of Steve Martin, the expert federal monitor overseeing Rikers.

Martin wrote that he opposes solitary confinement and has "been at the forefront of the national effort to reduce and eliminate the use of solitary confinement in adult and juvenile systems." However, Martin concluded that Council went much further, requiring that detainees be released from "de-escalation and emergency lock-in" within four hours and from restrictive housing within 30 days, no matter the specifics or danger of the situation. Martin wrote that the ban would "exacerbate already dangerous conditions."

In striking down part of the Council's Local Law 42, Adams modified that portion of the law that prevented the placement of detainees in restrictive housing for more than 60 days during the course of any 12-month period, changing it to a review of detainees' placement in restrictive housing every 15 days.

To push back against the mayor, the Council can go to state court to challenge Adams' Emergency Executive Order (actually, he issued three of them related to Rikers on Saturday). But the real venue for the future of Rikers belongs in the courtroom of Manhattan Federal Judge Laura Taylor Swain.

Swain will be deciding on whether or not to appoint a receiver, an action supported by Manhattan U.S. Attorney Damian Williams, state Attorney General Tish James and a host of advocates and observers. This is no slight against Adams and Department of Correction Commissioner Lynelle Maginley-Liddie, who are trying as best they can in an impossible situation.

A receiver can cut through bureaucratic rot and decades of built-in bad practices, protecting the detainees and the officers. Judge Swain, over to you.

Free and fair or fixed?

The largest number of migrants streaming into the U.S. and to New York City are from Venezuela and so Americans are directly impacted by stability in that country. Now comes a suspicious election favoring President Nicolás Maduro, with his puppet electoral council granting him a dubious victory over challenger Edmundo González that could cause even more chaos there.

Maduro is a continuation of a regime, launched by Hugo Chávez, that has robbed Venezuelans of a chance to enjoy the vast wealth that the country could have generated with its vast oil reserves. Chávez was freely elected in 1998, with a promise to fix things.

He did not. Chávez was convinced that he and his party alone had the right and ability to govern the country, and moved to abolish the legislature and independent courts, muzzle the press and bring independent watchdogs and civil society to heel.

Programs that had initially relied on sky-high oil prices and to dent poverty and increase social services were not sustainable, and Chávez had increasingly little oversight and opposition to keep him in check and provide alternate governing visions. Quality of life plummeted, and every subsequent election got a little more suspect, until Maduro took over as Chavez's handpicked successor when Chávez died in 2013.

Now we find ourselves here, with international governments across Latin America casting doubt on this election, which takes place after Maduro used the levers of power to crack down on the opposition and bar opposition leader María Corina Machado from running at all. Venezuela once had

free and fair elections, which is how Hugo Chávez first won.

But an unpopular president refusing to be voted out by the public is not something that only happens in Latin American countries. Let's not forget that the prior president of the United States tried to do the same four years ago. Donald Trump's Jan. 6 insurrection was a last-ditch effort to physically prevent the transfer of power, but his earlier attempts were rooted in using or trying to use the formal levers of power to tilt the outcome of the election in his direction.

Entreaties for the Georgia secretary of state to "find" enough votes to put him over the top are no different than Maduro leaning on his electoral council to fudge the numbers in his favor, or stop counting before they all come in.

The main difference is that Trump's gambit failed, in part because of the decentralized nature of U.S. elections. He could pressure state officials here and there and gin up fake electors, but he did not directly oversee the machinery of the election. Still, we shouldn't take it for granted that his coup did not succeed; a lot of people in different jobs around the country had to make the decision not to go along, and we're all lucky they did.

In this country, the rightful winner took power and we can only hope that the rightful winner in Venezuela, probably González, somehow manages to prevail over Maduro and his forces. Democracy requires people of good will on both sides; for the loser to accept the results and for the winner to rule within the bounds of the law.

And that's the same in English and Spanish.

N.Y. is way behind on its climate law

Five years ago this month, on July 18, 2019, New York's Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act was signed into law. The CLCPA established ambitious climate goals and a justice-oriented approach to achieving them. It demanded steep greenhouse gas emissions reductions — at least 85% across New York's entire economy, with a goal of net-zero emissions.

The CLCPA required rapid evolution of the electric grid to reach 100% clean electricity. And it sought to foster more equitable outcomes for disadvantaged communities, requiring that they receive a set percentage of the benefits of clean energy spending. This provision became the model for the federal government's "Justice40" policy.

That moment of New York climate and justice leadership is starting to seem very distant. Although the CLCPA remains the law of the land, agencies increasingly treat it as strangely optional. Their inaction risks foregoing a generational opportunity to build the future that the law demands — and increasing the cost that future New Yorkers will bear to clean up (and live with) their mess. The state entities charged with making it a reality must get started on the core programs that equitably fund investments in a cleaner, safer future.

The CLCPA gives New York's environmental agency, the Department of Environmental Conservation, primary responsibility for economy-wide emissions reductions, and directs all other agencies and authorities to help achieve them. The law established a multi-year process to work out key details, which culminated in a scoping plan. The DEC then had until January 2024, to promulgate rules and regulations to achieve those reductions. Then, the state would have had six years to achieve the first benchmark: 40% cuts by 2030.

But no such rules and regulations have been introduced. Last year, the DEC floated the concept of a New York Cap and Invest Program, which had been recommended in the scoping plan. NYCI would put a price on emissions outside the electric sector (electricity already faces a carbon price through the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative). It would thus create an economic incentive to reduce emissions and raise funds to build low-emissions infrastructure and programs.

But the NYCI details that were made public appeared to be too modest to accomplish what the law requires. Since then, the DEC has fallen silent, and recent

comments by the governor suggest no attempt to make good on the CLCPA's promise.

Beyond failing to advance NYCI, New York is backsliding on climate, having suspended congestion pricing — the flagship program that would deter traffic congestion and emissions while raising funds to improve low-carbon public transportation. The Legislature specifically directed the establishment of congestion pricing, and the scoping plan treated it as a done deal.

And yet, after years of hard work to shape a fair and effective program, secure the necessary approvals, and construct the operational infrastructure, congestion pricing has been shelved, and the MTA has had to suspend needed repairs and improvements that it would fund. By leaving the tolling infrastructure unused, New York is losing hundreds of millions of dollars, driving up future costs, and burdening disadvantaged communities. At this point, lawsuits may force the courts to tell state agencies that congestion pricing and the improvements it funds are not optional.

While NYCI and congestion pricing remain stalled, New York's electric sector is at least on the road. The CLCPA gave New York's utility regulator, the Public Service Commission, primary responsibility for decarbonizing electricity, and the PSC has been working toward CLCPA renewable energy goals in collaboration with other agencies since 2020. While they too are unlikely to make their 2030 goals, there is now an opportunity for course correction, as the PSC and the state Energy Research and Development Authority recently released, for public consideration and comment, a report examining the deficit and proposing options.

To achieve the CLCPA's climate and justice goals, sectors other than electricity also require sustained focus and accountability, as well as incentives and dedicated funding. Placing a modest regulatory cost on harmful activities, like traffic congestion and climate pollution, can help fund cleaner, more beneficial alternatives fairly and efficiently. By halting their efforts at the starting gate, the agencies and authorities responsible for effecting the CLCPA's vision are threatening to reduce the landmark law to empty words. They need to act now rather than allow New York's CLCPA's goals to slip away.

NYC is making e-bike dashes to your door safer

In New York City, where our streets and sidewalks bustle with energy and purpose, most of us increasingly rely on so-called “micromobility.” Whether you are boosting your two-wheeled commute or ordering take-out, groceries, or something you purchased online, more e-bikes and scooters are coming our way on the city’s busy streets. While e-bikes offer us an efficient and environmentally friendly way to get around our city, Mayor Adams is tackling some important challenges head-on, including fire safety.

Last week, the mayor announced new steps to prevent deadly lithium-ion battery fires and promote safe e-bike charging and usage. The New York City Safe Charging Accelerator has three core components:

- New rules that would allow property owners to install safe, regulated e-bike battery swapping and charging cabinets on public sidewalks. This would shift more battery charging from inside apartments to safer outdoor infrastructure.
- The nation’s first municipal trade-in pilot program for eligible food delivery workers to swap unsafe e-bikes and other powered mobility devices and their batteries with certified, high-quality e-bikes and batteries.
- A \$1 million public education campaign on the dangers of unsafe lithium-ion batteries.

The urgency behind these steps is underscored by disturbing trends since the pandemic: since 2019, lithium-ion battery fires have claimed the lives of 29 New Yorkers and injured more than 400 others. Shockingly, nearly 60% of these fires occurred while batteries were not even charging. Meanwhile, of the 30 traffic fatalities among cyclists last year, 23 were on e-bikes, a record. The sobering toll of death and injury underscores the critical need for proactive measures to reduce the risks from the expanding number of e-mobility devices on our streets.

A city Department of Transportation pilot launched earlier this year brought the first e-bike charging hubs to our streets, addressing previous regulatory barriers while promoting accessibility and safety for e-bike users. The new rules will build on this program to allow property owners to install battery swapping hubs outside their buildings. This will complement the administration’s other work to help promote e-bike riding, including the record production of protected bicycle lanes and the widening of protected lanes on major Manhattan avenues.

The administration is now also proposing rules to govern a first-in-the-nation trade-in program for unsafe e-bikes and batteries. Designed to incentivize the transition from uncertified and non-street legal devices to UL-certified e-bikes and batteries, this initiative will help participants dramatically reduce the risk of battery fires. We are prioritizing food delivery workers, who rely most heavily on these vehicles. Serving on the front lines of New York’s bustling food scene, these workers deserve access to reliable and safe equipment.

Equally crucial to safety are DOT’s and the Fire Department’s education campaigns, aimed at raising awareness about the e-bikes’ faster speeds and lithium-ion battery safety. Through targeted advertisements and community outreach, the campaigns are educating New Yorkers on best practices for riding these bikes as well as using and disposing of their batteries — emphasizing the importance of using certified batteries and avoiding repairs that compromise safety.

These efforts are not isolated; they are part of the mayor’s comprehensive “Charge Safe, Ride Safe” action plan unveiled last year. That plan outlined a multifaceted approach to promote safe battery usage, expand education initiatives, and advocate for greater regulation — at the local, state and federal level.

On this last point, we have also made major progress. The Council has shown leadership on several bills, and Gov. Hochul signed major legislation governing these batteries this month. After several FDNY trips to D.C., the House has also passed national uniform safety standards for batteries (we await Senate action). All levels of government have united towards the safe usage of these batteries — because we recognize electric micromobility is here to stay.

All these new initiatives and regulation mean more than just new ways to safely charge; they mark a cultural shift towards responsible e-mobility practices, empowering New Yorkers to adopt cleaner and greener transportation options without compromising safety or sustainability — all while cultivating an environment where innovation continues to flourish responsibly.

By taking these innovative steps to enhance the safety of New Yorkers where they live, work, and travel, we will save lives. The administration is removing barriers to safe charging, creating more welcoming infrastructure, implementing innovative trade-in programs, and educating the public — together paving the way to a safer and more sustainable New York.

Man dies 3 days after punch by moped rider in Hell's Kitchen

A German immigrant has died after being knocked unconscious from a punch by a man riding a moped on the sidewalk outside a Hell's Kitchen bar, police said Monday.

Florian Oltmann, 38, died at Bellevue Hospital Friday, three days after he and a friend were knocked out during an argument with the moped rider.

Oltmann and the other victim, a 56-year-old man here on business from Illinois, left Rudy's Bar & Grill on Ninth Ave. near W. 43rd St. and were walking toward their awaiting Uber when the moped rider bumped into the older victim, bumping him with his arm.

That sparked an argument and the moped driver quickly circled back and began arguing with the two men, cops said. During the exchange, he punched the older victim in the face, knocking him

unconscious, cops said.

Oltmann, who had tried to intervene to prevent the assault, was also punched in the face, according to police.

The force of the blow sent Oltmann reeling backward onto the sidewalk, smacking the back of his head on the concrete.

The other victim was taken to Mount Sinai West, where he was treated and released.

The attacker took off and is still being

sought. He's described as Black and about 5-foot-10 with black hair pulled back into a braid. He was wearing a white T-shirt and black pants with a white stripe running down the leg.

Cops released surveillance footage of the suspect last week and are asking the public's help identifying and tracking him down.

Anyone with information is asked to call Crime Stoppers at (800) 577-TIPS. All calls will be kept confidential.

Maduro declared victor in Venezuela election as opponent claims he has proof that he won

CARACAS, Venezuela — Venezuelan opposition candidate Edmundo González says his campaign has the proof it needs to show that he is the winner of the country's highly anticipated presidential election whose victory authorities handed to President Nicolás Maduro.

González and opposition leader María Corina Machado told supporters gathered Monday outside his campaign headquarters in Venezuela's capital that they have obtained more than 70% of the tally sheets from Sunday's election, and they show González ahead of Maduro (photo).

As he spoke, thousands of demonstrators took to the streets to protest what they said was an attempt by Maduro to steal the election in which both candidates claimed victory.

Shortly after the National Electoral Council, which is loyal to Maduro's ruling

party, announced that he had won a third six-year term, angry protesters began marching through the capital, Caracas, and cities across Venezuela.

In the capital, the protests were mostly peaceful, but when dozens of riot gear-clad national police officers blocked the caravan, a brawl broke out. Police used tear gas to disperse the protesters, some throwing stones and other objects at officers who had stationed themselves on a main avenue of an upper-class district.

The demonstrations followed an election that was among the most peaceful in recent memory, reflecting hopes that Venezuela could avoid bloodshed and end 25 years of single-party rule. The winner was to take control of an economy recovering from collapse and a population desperate for change.

"We have never been moved by hatred. On the contrary, we have always

been victims of the powerful," Maduro said in a nationally televised ceremony. "An attempt is being made to impose a coup d'état in Venezuela again of a fascist and counterrevolutionary nature."

In the capital's impoverished Petare neighborhood, people started walking and shouting against Maduro, and some masked young people tore down campaign posters of him. Heavily armed security forces were standing just blocks from the protest.

"It's going to fall. It's going to fall. This government is going fall!" some of the protesters shouted as they walked.

"He has to go. One way or another," said María Arráez, a 27-year-old hairdresser, as she joined in the demonstration.

As the crowd marched through a different neighborhood, it was cheered on by retirees and office workers who banged on pots and recorded the protest



in a show of support. There were some shouts of "freedom" and expletives directed at Maduro.

Elsewhere, some protesters attempted to block freeways, including one that connects the capital with a port city where the country's main international airport is.

Officials delayed the release of detailed vote tallies from Sunday's election after proclaiming Maduro the winner with 51% of the vote, compared with 44% for retired diplomat Edmundo González. The competing claims set up a high-stakes standoff.

"Venezuelans and the entire world know what happened," González said. But he and his allies asked supporters to remain calm and called on the government to avoid stoking conflict.

Several foreign governments, including the U.S. and the European Union, held off recognizing the election results.

U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken said Washington had "serious concerns" that the announced tally did not reflect the actual votes or the will of the people.

against them.

After failing to oust Maduro during three rounds of demonstrations since 2014, the opposition put its faith in the ballot box.

The country sits atop the world's largest oil reserves and once boasted Latin America's most advanced economy. But after Maduro took the helm, it tumbled into a free fall marked by plummeting oil prices, widespread shortages of basic goods and hyperinflation of 130,000%.

U.S. oil sanctions sought to force Maduro from power after his 2018 reelection, which dozens of countries condemned as illegitimate.

But the sanctions only accelerated the exodus of 7.7 million Venezuelans from their crisis-stricken nation.

Voters lined up as early as Saturday evening to cast ballots, boosting the opposition's hopes it was about to break Maduro's grip on power.

The official results came as a shock to many who had celebrated, online and outside a few voting centers, what they believed was a landslide victory for González.

Chisholm, Judge both blast pair as Yanks batter Wheeler, Phils

PHILADELPHIA — Before the Yankees began their highly anticipated series against the first-place Phillies on Monday, the conversation surrounding Jazz Chisholm Jr. focused more on his glove than his bat.

With the experienced center fielder and second baseman playing third base for the first time as a pro, Aaron Boone explained why he feels the 26-year-old can learn the hot corner on the fly.

“Special athlete,” the manager said. “This is a guy that came up as a shortstop. So I feel like he has all the skills and ability to be able to handle it.”

Chisholm supported that theory in his second game with the Yankees, playing third without incident in a 14-4 win. He even started a double play on his first

attempt at the hot corner.

However, Chisholm’s biggest impact came at the plate when he took Phillies ace Zack Wheeler deep in the second inning.

The opposite-field solo shot was Chisholm’s 14th home run of the year, but his first with the Yankees. Just as he often did with the Marlins, Chisholm finished his trot around the bases with his signature Euro step. He hit another homer in the ninth.

Chisholm wasn’t the only Yankee to go yard against Wheeler, as Aaron Judge started the scoring with his 38th homer of the season in the first inning. The league-leading bomb traveled 406 feet, but the Yankees’ captain outdid himself later in the night.

With Phillies reliever Yunior Marte on the mound in the seventh, Judge made it 39

homers, belting a two-run moonshot 430 feet.

With 39 home runs in 108 team games, Judge is slightly behind his historic 2022 pace. That year, he hit 43 longballs over the same span before finishing with 62 homers, an American League record.

Earlier in the game, with Wheeler still pitching, Ben Rice slugged his own bases-empty blast after Chisholm. The Yankees then found other ways to inflict damage on Wheeler, as Juan Soto and Austin Wells drove in two runs apiece in the fifth. Soto did so by ripping a double, while Wells ran out the first triple of his career after taking Wheeler to the wall in right-center field.

As expected, the Yankees officially activated Giancarlo Stanton off the injured list. Stanton, batting fifth and DH’ing, had

been on the shelf with a left hamstring strain since June 23. Prior to that, he had been enjoying a bounce-back season, hitting .246/.302/.492 with 18 homers and 45 RBI. He went hitless in four at-bats Monday, walking and scoring a run.

All in all, Wheeler allowed seven earned runs and seven hits over five innings after entering the game with a 2.55 ERA.

Anthony Volpe added a two-run blast of his own in the eighth before Soto sent another run home with a double. Chisholm then matched Judge’s evening in the ninth while using his bat, cranking a two-run homer off position player Garrett Stubbs.

Meanwhile, Luis Gil held his own against a formidable Phillies lineup. He totaled 5.1 innings, five hits, three earned runs, three walks, eight strikeouts and 92 pitches while using his slider more than his fastball again.

Two of those runs came from Brandon

Marsh, who clubbed a second-deck homer in the fourth before adding an RBI single in the sixth. The latter ended Gil's night.

The righty also allowed a run in the third when a wide Kyle Schwarber slide into second led to an off-balance throw from Gleyber Torres. Torres later made his 14th error of the season, which came a day after he made headlines for not sounding to psyched about experimenting at third base.

Coincidentally, Gil's spring training performance against the Phillies on March 11 catapulted him into the Yankee rotation after Gerrit Cole came down with a case of elbow inflammation. Gil struck out eight and permitted one hit over 3.2 scoreless innings that day.

He's since posted a 3.20 ERA over 21 starts in his first season back from Tommy John surgery.

Because of his recent injury history and

unprecedented innings count (112.2), there's been a lot of talk over whether Gil will stay in the rotation all year. While things can change, Boone expressed confidence that Gil will remain a starter the rest of the way.

Boone shared that sentiment on Sunday after Gil popped into his office in Boston.

"He feels like he's prepared and trained for the long haul of the season," Boone said, summarizing their conversation. "So I'm excited where he's still at physically, but always something we're paying attention to."

The Phillies scored another run on a wild Michael Tonkin pitch in the seventh, but the blemish hardly mattered.

After another successful night on offense, the Yankees will try to stay hot at the plate against Aaron Nola on tonight. Gerrit Cole will start for the Yankees.

First day with Bombers turns into Jazz odyssey

PHILADELPHIA – Growing up in The Bahamas, Jazz Chisholm Jr.'s whole family revered the Yankees and Derek Jeter.

Always one to march to the beat of his own drum – even as a kid – Chisholm wanted to be different. He adopted the Yankees as his favorite team, but he gravitated toward Alex Rodriguez, who butted heads with Jeter when the two were teammates.

Chisholm told that to Jeter, the Marlins' former minority owner and CEO, when the two were together in Miami. Chisholm, with a smile on his face, recalled how the onetime Yankees captain "hated" hearing that.

On Sunday, Chisholm made his Yankees debut after the team sent three prospects to the Marlins on Saturday. He donned No. 13, which once belonged to Rodriguez, but sang Jeter's praises in his very first comment as a Yankee.

"I was super excited,"

Chisholm said after playing center, batting fifth and going 1-for-5 with an infield single, a stolen base and a strikeout in an 8-2 victory over the Red Sox. "Every kid dreams of being a Yankee. It's the most famous team in baseball that Derek Jeter played on. Everybody's favorite player was Derek Jeter growing up. I had him as an owner, so I just feel like it was only right to come and put on this uniform."

Asked why he picked No. 13, he said "there were no single digits available." At that point, he hinted at who he admired most as a child.

"I grew up watching Jeter, A-Rod, (Robinson) Canó, (Mark) Teixeira, (Nick) Swisher, all those guys together," the 26-year-old said. "So it was only right to find the number that I really adored as a kid watching A-Rod."

Chisholm said his flight to Boston spent an extra hour in the air as multiple planes circled Logan International Airport for reasons that were never relayed to him. He then drove through 30 extra minutes of traffic.

"There were a lot of stops to getting here, but I got here, put on the uniform and went out there and played," Chisholm said. "I was just hoping I'd still be able to start the game. (Aaron Boone) texted me yesterday and asked me if starting would be too much for me after coming off the plane and I was just like, 'No, I'm ready to go. I'm ready to come help us win, go out there and play my butt off.'"

Still, the delays added to what had already

been a chaotic two days for Chisholm. So did the fact that, like his family, a lot of Bahamians follow the Yankees.

That includes the island country's prime minister, Philip Davis.

"I think every everybody in The Bahamas is a Yankees fan no matter what, just by default," said Chisholm, a Nassau native. "Like I got a (text) message from the Prime Minister. Everybody's been messaging me about playing for the Yankees. They want to come out and watch the games and come to New York. So it's been really, really hectic. I still see my phone ringing over there right now."

Chisholm's wild weekend continued in the ninth inning on Sunday, as he slipped rounding second base and took an accidental elbow to the jaw from Sox second baseman Romy Gonzalez. He laid on the infield dirt and was tended to by trainers for a bit, but he ultimately stayed in the game, stole third and scored on a DJ LeMahieu sac fly.

Afterward, Chisholm said he was fine, though

Boone experienced an "oh no" moment with the ballplayer feeling some initial pain.

"He got hit pretty good," the manager said.

With Chisholm okay, more change awaits him.

A second baseman at the start of his career before moving to center, Chisholm will learn third base with the Yankees. He's never played the position as a pro, but Boone said that could change depending on how he looks there.

Either way, he will work on the position with infield coach Travis Chapman.

"Feel like he has the skillset to do it," Boone said. "I know he's open to doing it, but I want to see how that looks."

Chisholm echoed his willingness to learn the hot corner on short notice.

"I mean, I went out there and played center field for the first time last year and I felt like it was pretty difficult at first, but I just feel like I could go and play anywhere and help my team win," he said. "For me, it's just going somewhere. Especially a winning team, and they're asking me to go somewhere to help them win? I'm definitely gonna go out there and do it."

Boone added that he sees Chisholm as a middle of the order threat after he hit .249/.323/.407 with 14 doubles, four triples, 13 home runs, 50 RBI, 22 stolen bases and a 101 OPS+ for the Marlins.

"I'm excited we got him," Boone said. "I'm looking forward to getting to know him here over the next several days and hopefully getting him settled in."

Mets DFA Subway pen hero Diekman

Nearly a week ago, left-hander Jake Diekman became an unlikely Mets hero when he struck out Aaron Judge in the bottom of the ninth inning at Yankee Stadium, securing a Subway Series win for the team from Queens. But after Diekman gave up three earned runs to the Braves over the weekend in two outings, the Mets decided they had seen enough of the veteran lefty's struggles.

The Mets designated Diekman for assignment Monday and called up Matt Gage from Triple-A Syracuse. Diekman was 2-3 with a 5.63 ERA in 32 innings this year (43 appearances), with four saves, eight holds and three blown saves. Manager Carlos Mendoza will now have to rely on two unproven left-handers in Gage and Danny Young when it comes to getting out left-handed hitters in the late innings.

"Not an easy one," Mendoza said Monday of the decision to designate Diekman. "Especially when you're dealing with a guy like Diekman who has been with us since spring training all the way to this point. That's a long time. He was such a professional. He was always willing to take the baseball and when it was hard for him, when going through his struggles and things like that, he was always available."

A 37-year-old veteran of nearly 13 years, Diekman was fiery when he needed to be (tossing the water cooler at the dugout wall comes to mind), but he could quickly turn the page on a bad outing. However, the bad outings added up. Diekman wasn't the same pitcher that he was for the Rays last season when he posted a 2.18 ERA over 45 1/3 innings.

"He always wanted to be there, but we got to a point where we needed to make a decision back there," Mendoza said. "We decided to go that route."

The bullpen has been in a state of near constant turnover since the start of the season. Of the eight relievers the Mets carried on the Opening Day roster, only Edwin Diaz and Adam Ottavino remain. Sean Reid-Foley is on the injured

list and Drew Smith and Brooks Raley are out for the season.

No teams go into the season with the same bullpen they end it with, so the Mets are not unique in this situation. While David Stearns and his front office have done a good job of finding undermined role players like Jose Iglesias, they haven't been as successful with relief pitchers. Injuries to key prospects like Nate Lavender and Grant Hartwig haven't helped, either.

The rotating door of relievers has been challenging for Mendoza to navigate.

"You've got to get familiar with a lot of these guys," Mendoza said.

"You don't know how comfortable they are either going back-to-back or going multiple innings, how quick they recover, situations in the game like whether you will give them a clean eating or coming in with runners on. So there's a lot to learn here from a lot of these guys that you're not very familiar with, and that's kind of been the biggest thing."


The strategic part of managing a bullpen has been easier for Mendoza.

"As far as making decisions, like when to throw them and when to face different parts of the lineup, that's been fine," Mendoza said. "It's just more like getting familiar with it here."

Gage is an Upstate New York native who played college baseball for Siena College. He hasn't allowed an earned run in 5 1/3 innings with Syracuse after being picked up on waivers from the Dodgers. The 31-year-old has logged 19 2/3 innings in the big leagues in his career and throws a two-seamer and a cutter, and gets right and left-handed hitters out.

Harrison Bader returned to the lineup after missing the last five games with a sore ankle. ... Francisco Alvarez sat out Monday as a precautionary move with a sore shoulder. The Mets don't believe the injury to be serious and are managing his workload to be able to keep him off the injured list.



Last call for Amazin's and rest

Jesse Winker wasn't blindsided.

An impending free agent, Winker says the fourth-place Nationals were upfront about their intentions before they shipped him to the Mets on Sunday, two days before today's MLB trade deadline.

"The last week or so, it's hard not to pay attention to it because, essentially, your life's changing, and there are things that come with that," Winker told the Daily News on Monday at Citi Field. "It's just your job to put it together as quickly as possible and meet your next team."

Such is life before the deadline.

Winker, a 2021 All-Star outfielder in the midst of another solid season, marked the biggest acquisition of the summer thus far by the surging Mets, who emerged as buyers after turning their season around.

Earlier this month, the Mets traded for

right-handed relievers Phil Maton and Ryne Stanek to help bolster a bullpen beset by injuries.

But president of baseball operations David Stearns still has areas where he can improve the Mets.


The loss of Brooks Raley to season-ending elbow surgery cost the Mets their top left-handed reliever. On Monday, the Mets designated another lefty, Jake Diekman, for assignment after the veteran pitched to a 5.63 ERA over 32.0 innings.

The Mets currently employ three left-handed relievers in Danny Young, Alex Young and the recently called-up Matt Gage, all of whom have bounced around the league in recent years.

An established left-handed reliever would help, as would another starting pitcher after the Mets lost ace Kodai Senga to a high-grade calf strain that's expected to end his regular season.

The Mets hope promising rookie starter Christian Scott, who went on the 15-day injured list last week

Rout Twins on eve of trade deadline

The Mets solidified their status as buyers by trading for two relievers and a bench bat. One night before the trade deadline, the Mets encouraged the front office to continue its buying spree with a 15-2 win over the Twins at Citi Field.

Pete Alonso hit his 21st home run of the season and left-hander Jose Quintana was especially sharp in six innings of work. The Mets scored six in the fourth inning, five in the sixth and four more in the seventh. They batted around twice and piled on the runs, staying relentless in their approach.

The Twins used six different pitchers, including outfielder Matt Wallner. It got ugly quick.

Quintana gave up a double and an RBI single to start the game, but then struck out Royce Lewis on a full count and hit cruise control from there. He faced almost no traffic on the basepaths after the first inning until the sixth, when Byron Buxton singled to lead off and Carlos Santana hit a one-out single to put two on with the Mets up 6-1. But Willi Castro popped up to left field and Austin Martin struck out to end the inning.

Quintana (6-6) gave up minimal hard contact and walked only one while striking out five. The Mets' lead was never in danger.

Minnesota right-hander Simeon Woods Richardson melted down in the fourth inning. The Mets' second-round draft pick in 2018, Woods Richardson was traded to the Blue Jays ahead of the trade deadline in 2019 along with left-hander Anthony Kay in exchange for Marcus Stroman. Until Monday, he had been enjoying a solid rookie campaign, but the Mets tagged him for six earned runs in one inning, the second-most he's

given up in the Major Leagues and the most since he gave up seven to the Nationals in April.

Alonso led off with a solo home and the next six batters reached base before Brandon Nimmo recorded an out with a sacrifice fly.

Finally, down 5-1, the Twins went to the bullpen for right-hander Cole Sands.

J.D. Martinez's sac fly put the Mets up, 6-1. The Mets were far from done, even if Woods Richardson (3-2) was.

In the bottom of the sixth, right-hander Josh Staumont gave up a leadoff single to

Harrison Bader, he then walked Francisco Lindor and gave up an RBI single to Nimmo. He managed to get

Martinez to ground into a forceout but Lindor came around to score.

Things continued to devolve from there.

He walked Alonso and Taylor legged out an infield single to load the bases. Staumont walked Mark Vientos to bring in another run before getting pulled for left-hander Steven Okert.

Even Okert struggled. He gave up a sinking liner to Jeff McNeil and right fielder Max Kepler bailed him out with a sliding catch.

Still, it scored Alonso. Luis Torrens walked to keep the bases loaded and Okert hit Bader in the ankle with a pitch to bring in another run.

In the seventh, with right-hander Jose Butto pitching in place of Quintana, Taylor robbed catcher Ryan Jeffers of a home run with a catch over the right-field wall. Jeffers finally got that home run in the ninth inning off Butto, who recorded the three-inning save.

The Twins (58-47) came into the series holding the second AL Wild Card spot and the Mets (56-50) came in holding the third spot in the NL.

It was a decisive win over a good team, one that should warrant more trade help.

"I know (the front office is) busy, but my job is to manage the 26 (players) and prepare for today's game," Mets manager Carlos Mendoza said before Monday's series opener against the Twins. "If something comes my way through my desk, then I'll give my opinion, but nothing changes for our preparation."

After striking out as a pinch hitter Sunday, Winker was in the Mets' starting lineup for the first time Monday against right-handed starter Simeon Woods Richardson, playing right field and batting fifth between righty hitters Pete Alonso and Mark Vientos.

"We brought him here to hit against right-handed pitching," Mendoza said. "I like to break up the righties there, and he's gonna give you good at-bats. That's why we brought him here. He'll continue to get opportunities. There will be days where he might hit fourth, he might hit third, depending on who's

in the lineup, who's getting a day and who we're facing."

Winker, 30, primarily played left field with the Nationals before serving solely as a designated hitter or pinch hitter over the past month. He has experience in all three outfield positions.

Mendoza told Winker he would play in the corner outfield spots. The Mets have been without starting right fielder Starling Marte since June 22 due to a bone bruise in his right knee, and his timeline to return remains unclear.

Mendoza said the Mets have not discussed using designated hitter J.D. Martinez in the outfield, nor were they eager to move left fielder Brandon Nimmo to right after he already shifted from center field to accommodate the offseason arrival of Harrison Bader.

"I'm ready for whatever," Winker said. "However they want to use me, I'll be ready. It's my job to be ready at any moment."

Still not lovin' that dirty water in Paris

Concerns about the water quality in the Seine River led officials to call off the swimming portion of an Olympic triathlon training session for a second straight day Monday.

Organizers overseeing the event at the Paris Games are optimistic that triathletes will be able to swim in the city's famed waterway when the competition starts today.

The sport's governing body, World Triathlon, its medical team and city officials are banking on sunny weather and higher temperatures to bring levels of E. coli and other bacteria below the necessary limits to stage the swim portion of the race, which also includes biking and running.

World Triathlon made the decision to cancel the swim workout early Monday following a meeting over water quality in the Seine, which is closely linked to the weather. Rain deluged Friday's opening ceremony and showers persisted Saturday, forcing some tennis matches and the skateboarding competition to be postponed.

The representatives for Paris 2024 and triathlon's international federation said tests conducted in the Seine on Sunday showed water quality levels leading into the training session that "did not provide sufficient guarantees to allow the event to be held." The delegation blamed the recent rain.

French sports minister Amélie Oudéa-Castéra told French news channel CNEWS on Monday that officials are "absolutely serene about all of this." The plans they put in place to control bacteria levels in the river have been effective, but the weather is beyond their control, she said.

RECORD NUMBER OF LGBTQ+ ATHLETES IN PARIS

A record number of athletes openly identifying as LGBTQ+ are competing in the 2024 Paris Olympics, a massive leap during a competition that organizers have pushed to center on inclusion and diversity.

There are 191 athletes publicly saying they are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, queer and nonbinary who are participating in the Games, according to Outsports, an organization that compiles a database of openly gay Olympians. The vast majority of the athletes are women.

That number has quashed the previous record of 186 out athletes

counted at the COVID-19-delayed Tokyo Olympics held in 2021, and the count is only expected to grow at future Olympics.

"More and more people are coming out," said Jim Buzinski, co-founder of Outsports. "They realize it's important to be visible because there's no other way to get representation."

The number of people willing to take the spotlight as an LGBTQ+ Olympian has skyrocketed in past decades. Buzinski said that when they started tracking the numbers at the Sydney Olympics in 2000, they counted only around five people.

Organizers of the Paris Olympics have underscored diversity and inclusion as major themes, showcasing drag queens and

refugee athletes in Friday's opening ceremony. That has received some blowback from religious conservatives.

RARE WATER POLO LOSS

The U.S. women's water polo team was handed a rare loss at the Paris Olympics on Monday, falling, 13-11, to Bea Ortiz and Spain in a rematch of the final at the Tokyo Games.

The U.S. is going for its fourth consecutive gold medal. No team — men or women — has won four straight water polo titles at the Olympics.

It was the program's second loss at the Olympics since it dropped the 2008 final. It went 5-0-1 in London, 6-0 in Rio de Janeiro and 6-1 in Tokyo.

"It's a long tournament," U.S. coach Adam Krikorian said. "We've got to learn from it and hopefully, if we get in that situation again, we can be a bit more poised."

After its 10-9 loss to Hungary in group play in 2021, the U.S. ripped off four straight wins by a combined score of 63-26. That included a dominant 14-5 victory over Spain in the final.

This time around, it was a much different performance.

Ortiz scored five times on eight shots for Spain, which beat France, 15-6, in its Group B opener on Saturday. Maica Garcia Godoy scored two goals, and Paula Leiton Arrones also scored while taking advantage of the United States' youth at the center position.

"It feels great, but this is not the goal of the tournament," Spain's Anni Espar Llaquet said. "It was an important game and we want to try to get ranked first in the group, but this means nothing."

Team USA's quest to achieve its eighth straight gold medal began in a big way Monday night at Pierre Mauroy Stadium.

Led by Aces superstar A'ja Wilson, the Americans entered the tournament as overwhelming favorites to be the last team standing at the end of the Paris Olympic Games.

Wilson and Team USA showcased why they are the favorites in Monday's 102-76 win over Japan. The team executed Cheryl Reeve's gameplan and realized a clear advantage in the Olympic opener: size.

Japan's tallest player — Maki Takada — stands at 6-1, a clear height difference with Team USA's frontcourt starting with

WNBA MVP winners Wilson and Breanna Stewart, who both stand at 6-4. To make matter worse, the 6-9

Brittney Griner came off the bench to dominate around the rim.

"When it came to our strengths, it was our depth and our height," Wilson said. "And we tried to punish them in the paint, but also on the defensive end, staying in front of them because Japan is a team that really likes to rip and run and that's not like us. So it made us play out of our defensive schemes, which made us lock in even more, so I'm just glad about the presence that we have."

Wilson, who went into the Olympic break as the obvious WNBA MVP frontrunner, opened Olympic action with the same dominance. She raced up and down the court, defended the rim and scored throughout the midrange.

The Aces superstar finished with 24 points, 13 rebounds, four assists and four blocks in 26 minutes. The Japanese players knew they were in trouble after Wilson registered eight points and two blocks in less than seven minutes to start.

The biggest negative for the Americans Monday was the poor shooting from deep. They finished 4-for-20 (20%) from downtown while Team Japan shot 15-for-39 (38%). Each trey for Team Japan cued its fans inside the arena to applaud despite the overwhelming deficit.

Japan's Mai Yamamoto (17 points) hit a game-high five treys. Four other players contributed two treys apiece.

But Team USA's dominance in the paint — 64-22 — was more than enough to offset the poor three-point shooting. And the Americans constantly pushed pace and shared the ball. Chelsea Gray's 13 assists led to plenty of scoring opportunities. Reeve's team assisted on 35-of-42 field goals in the win.

Team USA led by 11 at halftime but the lead ballooned to as many as 32 before the final buzzer. Kahleah

Copper's layup with 2:18 remaining in regulation ensured that every American player scored in the matchup.

In the second quarter, Copper collided with Rui Machida and appeared to be in pain. She favored her midsection before walking to the sidelines. The Mercury star looked OK afterward and returned in the fourth quarter.

Stewart finished with 22 points, eight rebounds, three assists and three blocks while Griner contributed 11 points and nine rebounds. The trio of Stewart, Griner and Wilson dealt with defenders on their hips throughout the win, which is made possible with FIBA rules not including a defensive three-second penalty.

The efforts clearly didn't work, as the trio combined for 57 points and 30 total rebounds (11 offensive).

"Points in the paint and controlling the boards are going to be huge for us moving forward," Wilson said. "So if we can continue that, I feel like we're in good shape."

U.S. men's team grabs first gym medal since 2008

PARIS — The Japanese men's gymnastics team claimed Olympic gold with an epic comeback over its top rival.

With China poised to claim its first Olympic title in 12 years with one rotation to go, Japan surged ahead to win the Paris Olympics men's team competition Monday after an intense and nail-biting duel.

Behind the two powerhouses of men's gymnastics and in the absence of Russia, the Americans earned bronze for their first medal since 2008.

The Japanese, which trailed by more than three points going into the last apparatus, overtook their rivals after China's Su Weide fell twice off the horizontal bar and Xiao Ruoteng underperformed under pressure. Japan won with a small margin of 0.532 points.

Su also botched a landing on vault earlier in the evening. He took the blame for the bitter defeat.

"Today taught me a big lesson," Su said. "It's a big regret. I feel sorry for my senior partners in the team. They have worked very hard in this cycle, there were a lot of injuries in the buildup, and because of my errors today, we lost the gold medal!"

After qualifying in fifth place, the U.S. men ended a 16-year drought to the delight of the dozens of fans waving American flags who chanted "USA! USA!" throughout the evening.

The Americans posted a total of 257.793 points to edge Britain for the bronze. Frederick Richard and Brody Malone were at the top of their game, and every member of the U.S. team contributed. Stephen Nedoroscik, the pommel horse specialist, joined his teammates on the final rotation.

"I had my coach by my side and he does a great job of taking the nerves out of (me) and he hypes me up," Nedoroscik said. "But these guys hit every routine before me and I have a statistic — when people hit before me, I also hit. So I went out there and did my job and I enjoyed the moment!"

Russia, which won gold at the Tokyo Games, did not compete because of its role in the war against Ukraine.

The women's final, featuring seven-time Olympic medalist Simone Biles, takes place on Tuesday.

U.S. TAKES SILVER AND BRONZE IN 400M

American teammates Katie Grimes and Emma Weyant stood side-by-side on the Olympic podium, each with a shiny new medal around her neck.

They could celebrate knowing nobody could have caught Canadian Summer McIntosh in her dominant 400-meter individual medley victory Monday night.

"Just so happy to be back on the podium, it's been kind of a long three years for me," Weyant said. "So just getting back up there with a teammate means the world!"

McIntosh, the 17-year-old sensation touched in 4 minutes, 27.71 seconds to capture Olympic gold in commanding fashion.

Grimes finished second in 4:33.40 for silver and Weyant earned bronze with a 4:33.93.

For Weyant, this was a comeback of sorts on the biggest stage. She was disqualified in the prelims at the U.S. National Championships last summer for doing a dolphin kick during the breaststroke leg.

"This is kind of like a redemption year, that's been my mindset the whole year," Weyant said. "Getting that out of my head definitely was not at the forefront, but definitely putting in the work to get back to where I need to be."

Former world recordholder Ryan Murphy earned bronze in the 100-meter backstroke, while teammate Luke Hobson earned one of his own in the 200 freestyle in the third night of swimming competition at La Defense Arena.

NBA talent keeps U.S. on top for now

Nikola Jokic could only hang his head in distress.

This is a feeling the three-time NBA MVP is accustomed to imposing on his opponents, but for the second time in a row against a loaded Team USA roster, Jokic, in atypical fashion, had no answer to this basketball equation.

Jokic's new teammates are a step slower and less skilled than the teammates he won an NBA title with in 2023.

Only three of them — Bogdan Bogdanovic (Hawks), Nikola Jovic (Heat) and Vasilije Micic (Hornets) — are active NBA players. And while Jokic may be a three-time league MVP, he is both the only player on the Serbian national basketball team with an All-Star appearance and the only full-time NBA starter (though Bogdanovic is perennially among Sixth Man of the Year candidates) on the roster.

Which is why Serbia's defensive rotations are far slower than Jokic had become accustomed to, playing alongside Jamal Murray (Canada), Michael Porter Jr., Aaron Gordon and Kentavious Caldwell-Pope in Denver. Even with Bogdanovic back in the rotation.

It's also why Team Jokic lacked offensive firepower, and ultimately, it's why Team USA defeated Serbia, 110-86, to take a 1-0 record after the Olympic group play opener.

More NBA talent gives a country the

tools to compete with Team USA for Olympic gold. Less of it, and you get lopsided whippings the likes of which the Americans can use to widen the margin in the group and advance to the knockout rounds.

South Sudan is the wild card and next up for Team USA, and after nearly defeating the Americans in a one-point loss in the USA Basketball Showcase games, the Sudanese team claimed its first-ever Olympic victory with a 90-79 victory over Puerto Rico on Sunday.

The South Sudan NBA talent is on its coaching staff: A 10-year NBA career gave birth to a notable track record as an assistant coach for Royal Ivey, who is bringing his chops as a longtime point guard and an assistant coach on Ime Udoka's Rockets staff, to the international game.

Look no further than the three-point column for NBA traces on the Sudanese team: Ivey's squad took 49 threes in the victory over Puerto Rico and made 23 of them. The team played fast, defended at a high level and made a name for itself in Olympic competition.

Ivey also has former Bulls star Luol Deng as the lead assistant coaching South Sudan.

NBA talent on the sidelines, however, is not the same as NBA talent on the court.

Team USA is decorated, the flag-bearing LeBron James leading a roster so deep, neither reigning NBA champion Jayson Tatum nor breakout superstar guard Tyrese Haliburton were needed to unpack Serbia by 26. Kevin Durant didn't need any warmup

LeBron almost triple-doubled on the Serbians with 21 points, nine assists and seven rebounds, and Stephen Curry's walk-off three gave him 11 points and cemented both a 26-point margin and a 1-0 Team USA record.

This, however, will be the final Olympic run for Team USA as the world knows it.

James is 39, Curry is 36 and Durant is 35. And while USA Basketball continues to reign supreme, other countries are

Jazz steps in at 3B for first time as a pro

PHILADELPHIA — Jazz Chisholm Jr. had never played third base as a pro, but the new Yankee found himself there on Monday. Aaron Boone believes the second baseman/center fielder can learn on the fly, as he's a "special athlete."

"This is a guy that came up as a shortstop," Boone said. "So I feel like he has all the skills and ability to be able to handle it. There may be some growing pains that

we gotta go through there and we gotta live with that and work alongside him, but at the same time, I want to keep it simple for him. Asked if Chisholm is his everyday third baseman, Boone said, "He could be. We'll see."

With Chisholm at third and Ben Rice at first, the Yankees had players learning new positions at the corners on Monday.

That's not ideal, but Boone said that Rice, a catcher by trade, has adapted well.

The hope is that Chisholm will, too, though the Yankees' infield alignment could always go through another change before today's trade deadline.

"There's definitely things we gotta work through from that standpoint," Boone said. "So concerned? Maybe a little bit, but the one thing I know is we're a much better roster today than we were two days ago."

"It's not always exactly how you want it, and that's why we gotta continue to

work hard to make sure we're helping guys get better?"

CORTES AWARE OF RUMORS

Standing in the Yankees' locker room at Citizens Bank Park, Nestor Cortes said he was aware of his name coming up in trade rumors. With a bullpen to throw on Monday, he was trying to focus on his next start, scheduled for Wednesday in Philly.

Cortes' agent told him his name had made the rumor mill, but he doesn't think the Yankees have talked to his reps. Cortes hasn't talked to Brian Cashman or Boone about the rumors.

Cortes added he wants to stay put. He's confident that the Yankees want to keep him, but he knows that teams need to give to get at other areas of need.

"I'm not thinking about the trade deadline," the lefty said. "I'm not thinking about being moved from here. If it happens, it happens, but I'm not worried about it."

Novak tops Nadal, likely for last time

PARIS — Novak Djokovic dominated Rafael Nadal at the start, then held off a comeback attempt to win, 6-1, 6-4, at the Paris Olympics in the second round Monday, the 60th — and likely last — head-to-head matchup between the two tennis greats.

Djokovic claimed 10 of the initial 11 games, with Nadal nowhere near the skilled and ever-hustling version of himself who won a record 14 French Open trophies on the same red clay at Roland Garros that is hosting Summer Games matches. Instead, Nadal was diminished, showing every bit of his 38 years, and looking like someone who might be ready to head into retirement after playing only sparingly the past two seasons because of a series of injuries, including hip surgery.

Then, suddenly, the indefatigable Nadal got going, making a push to turn this contest competitive, which surely no one — least of all Djokovic — found too surprising. Nadal captured four consecutive games in the second set, including a forehand winner to break to make it 4-all. He raised his left fist, drawing roars from a packed Court Philippe Chatrier crowd that repeatedly tried to encourage him with chants of "Ra-fa! Ra-fa!"

That's when Djokovic, a 37-year-old from Serbia, regained control. He broke right back, pointing to his left ear while walking to the sideline as if to taunt Nadal's supporters. Djokovic then served out the victory, before meeting Nadal at the net for a hug.

Djokovic owns 24 Grand Slam titles, and Nadal 22, the two highest men's totals in the century-plus history of the sport. Both have been ranked No. 1, and no two men have played each other more often in the professional era. They are two-thirds of the so-called Big Three of men's tennis, along with Roger Federer, who retired with 20 Slam titles. That trio enjoyed unprecedented success and prompted endless debates about which was the "GOAT."

But Djokovic and Nadal are accustomed to meeting — and fans are accustomed to watching them — in the latter stages of events, including nine major finals, not merely the second round. It happened that early this time because while Djokovic is the top seed at the Summer Games, Nadal's ranking is outside the top 150 on account of a lack of matches.

Part of Nadal's troubles Monday were caused by not being in tip-top shape. His right thigh has been taped up.

Ex-MLB pitcher Moronta killed in motorcycle crash

Former Major League Baseball pitcher **Reyes Moronta** has been killed in a motorcycle accident in the Dominican Republic, one of his former teams said Monday.

The 31-year-old Moronta played for the Giants, Dodgers, Diamondbacks and Angels over six seasons.

"We profoundly regret the unexpected death of pitcher Reyes Moronta, who died yesterday," Dominican team *Aguilas Cibaenas* said on its social media accounts.

Moronta was riding a motorcycle in the Villa Gonzalez community, in the northern part of his home country, on Sunday night when the accident occurred.

"The *Aguilas* board, the baseball operations department and players share the pain with his family, and we pray for his eternal rest," the team said.

Moronta was cut from the *Bravos de Leon* team of the Mexican League last week. He had posted an 8.69 ERA with

24 strikeouts and four saves in 19 2/3 innings pitched.

TEXANS' AUTRY SUSPENDED

Texans defensive lineman **Denico Autry** was suspended for the first six games of the regular season on Monday for violating the NFL's policy on performance-enhancers.

Autry denied he knowingly ingested a banned substance but said he would accept the suspension. Autry said he discovered the pharmacy that filled a prescription for him had "intentionally, recklessly, or negligently" included a banned substance.

Autry is allowed to participate in preseason practices and games. His first regular-season availability will be Oct. 20 at Green Bay. Autry apologized to the Texans organization, teammates and fans for any distraction his positive test causes.

Autry, 34, has 59 sacks in 10 NFL seasons. He had a career-high 11 1/2 last season for the Titans and signed a

two-year, \$20 million free-agent contract with the Texans in March.

RODDY GOES TO HAWKS

The Hawks acquired **David Roddy** from the Suns in exchange for **E.J. Liddell** in a swap of power forwards on Monday.

Liddell was traded for the second time in less than one month. The Hawks acquired Liddell as part of a package that included two first-round draft picks in a deal that sent high-scoring guard **Dejounte Murray** to the Pelicans on July 6. Liddell was a second-round pick from Ohio State by New Orleans in 2022.

Roddy was the No. 23 overall pick by Philadelphia in the 2022 draft before his draft rights were acquired by Memphis.

Roddy started 13 of 65 games with Memphis and Phoenix in the 2023-24 season and averaged 6.5 points and 3.2 rebounds. He scored in double figures in 18 games and had two games in which he matched his career high with 10 rebounds. Roddy (6-5, 255) averaged 11.1 points and 5.5 rebounds in his 13 starts.

Aaron lashes out at sloppy Jets

Jets players have said Aaron Rodgers is a “perfectionist” who demands the best from them daily.

That was on full display Monday morning when Gang Green put on the pads for the first time in training camp.

Overall, it was a bumpy day for the Jets’ offense, which looked out of rhythm. On the first pass play during 11-on-11 drills, a pass bounced off wide receiver Allen Lazard’s hands and into safety Chuck Clark’s for Rodgers’ first interception during this year’s camp.

That was just the beginning of the problems for the offense. The more significant issue has been center Joe Tippmann’s snaps to Rodgers during the first five practices.

On more than a few occasions, Tippmann has delivered high snaps the four-time MVP had to jump to get. On Monday, Tippmann sent half a dozen high snaps to Rodgers.

In one instant, a high shotgun snap went to Rodgers, and he delivered an incomplete pass to Malik Taylor. That’s when Rodgers completely lost it and became animated yelling at Tippmann.

Rodgers also had his foot stepped on during a run play by either Tippmann or Jets guard John Simpson, and the quarterback again voiced his displeasure.

“First day in pads, some of the operation wasn’t as clean with the snap with the control and the quarterback,” Robert Saleh said. “A couple of good things in the run game.”

“It was back and forth.”

When asked about Tippmann’s high snaps throughout training camp, Saleh didn’t seem too concerned.

“He has to work on it,” he said. “There’s something going on, but he will get it down. He snapped for us last year, he will be fine.”

Several players have said that Rodgers has set the standard for not just the offense but the entire team. Monday showed what comes with Rodgers’ standard of excellence.

Jets tight end Tyler Conklin went as far as to call Rodgers the “Openheimer” of football.

Along with Tippmann’s miscues, several passes were dropped, and Rodgers was sacked three times by Javon Kinlaw, Tanzel Smart, and

Sam Eguavoen. Rodgers did finish the day completing 8-of-13 passes with that one interception to Clark.

“It was a little frustrating today,” Conklin said. “As an offense, especially after having had some really good together, you don’t want to go out there and have a bad day, I guess I could say.”

“Days like that, you learn a lot about yourself. There’s a lot of

camp and a lot of practices to figure stuff out. It is just part of the process.”

One aspect the Jets are attempting to improve this year is avoiding self-inflicted wounds. Last season, without Rodgers, the Jets were the most penalized team with 124 infractions.

Gang Green also had one of the worst offenses in the NFL a season ago without Rodgers, finishing 31st in yards (268.6) and 29th in points per game (15.8). With Rodgers back from his Achilles tear, the Jets’ offense should vastly improve. However, Monday showed that the team still has a way to go.

“His standard and level of play are something a lot of guys haven’t seen yet,” Lazard said about Rodgers. “Even this organization, they really haven’t been with him on a game day because being with him on a sideline on a Sunday is a different than being with him in camp and being with him in the preseason or being with him throughout the week.”

“When the cameras are on and the bullets are flying, everyone is a little bit more turned up. He obviously expects the same standard

that he holds himself to. Today just didn’t resemble that at all. I think, as an offense, we were a little bit sloppy at first.

“I started out the second play of the team period with a tipped pass and an interception and things just kind of rolled downhill. I think it’s a great teaching moment for us with how to handle adversity because it’s going to be times this year when we come out, and we are down seven, or we are down 14 going into the second quarter. We still have to have that belief in ourselves as individuals and as a whole that we are going to come out of that game with a win.”

REDDICK STILL A NO-SHOW

There was reportedly progress between the Jets and holdout Haason Reddick after the edge rusher did not report for training camp last Tuesday.

Seven days later, Reddick still has not reported to Florham Park.

After a player holds out for six days, he may be required to forfeit up to 15% of his salary allocations for each training camp day missed and an additional 1% for each day missed up to 25%, which is the maximum, according to the NFL collective bargaining agreement.

Rodgers setting tone for Gang Green

After an incomplete pass during the fourth training camp practice on Saturday, Aaron Rodgers appeared to wave off the second-team offense coming onto the field.

A few plays later, Rodgers found Allen Lazard in the end zone for a touchdown to end the session on a positive note.

This is just one example of Rodgers setting the standard for the Jets and everyone in the locker room.

“As a quarterback, he’s a vocal leader,” Robert Saleh said. “He’s a guy that everybody looks to for leadership on the football field.”

“Aaron is fantastic, his personality. I’ve said it before. He’s an unbelievable teammate. His wealth and knowledge and his understanding of football makes him pretty much another coach on the football field, so when he speaks, our guys listen.”

“The guy’s been one of the more accomplished players in the history of football. If he has a nugget to give you and I was a young guy, I’d write that down in my notebook, and I’d remember it for the rest of my life.”

Setting that standard of excellence is critical for trying to turn around a Jets franchise that has been one of the worst teams in the NFL since it reached back-to-back AFC Championship games in 2009 and 2010. Since 2010, Gang Green has the third-worst record in the league (88-139). Only the Jaguars and Browns have won fewer games than the Jets during that span.

The Jets haven’t made the playoffs since 2010, tied with the Buffalo Sabres for the longest postseason drought in North American sports.

Ever since Rodgers stepped into the league, all he has known is winning. He was drafted to a Packers franchise in 2005 with a quarterback in Brett Favre, who helped set their standard and turned around a franchise that fell on difficult times before his arrival.

So when Rodgers became the Packers’ starting quarterback in 2008, he already knew what it took to win at a high level. That standard of excellence is likely the driving force behind winning four NFL MVP awards, being named to five All-Pro teams and winning Super Bowl XLV.

Now, Rodgers has brought that to the Jets and has been a resource for his teammates trying to improve on both sides of the ball.

“Just watching him and how he attacks the day,” Jets cornerback Sauce Gardner said about Rodgers. “It’s something as little as picking different people to have lunch with, have breakfast with, you know when he comes into the building. Just little things like that.”

“He is really a great dude. He has been around a while and played for another team, so he knows how things should be run. He’s a leader.”

“He has a standard, and that’s the standard we follow.”

In between practice snaps, Rodgers coaches up teammates daily. During Saturday’s practice, Rodgers and wide receiver Garrett Wilson were seen having a spirited conversation on the side before the two shook hands and got back on the field.

“I think you have to set the standard by the way you show up every day,” Rodgers said. “You have got to be active in meetings, you have to be attentive, you got to be tapped into the energy of the team.”

Line in flux already as the pads come on

Aaron Stinnie won a Super Bowl with Tom Brady and the Buccaneers in 2020.

The Giants' left guard said what he learned from that experience was that persistence, belief and hard work matter.

"It's a long road," Stinnie, 30, said Monday after the team's fifth camp practice. "You just gotta bury your head down, buy into the situation, buy into the team, buy into the mentality, and attack every single day like it's your last."

If enough Giants linemen exhibit that kind of resilience, maybe Brian Daboll's offense will be able to find a way in 2024. Right now, however, the deck is seemingly already stacked against the Giants' efforts at consistency and adequacy on the O-line.

Monday's first padded practice featured three of five starting offensive line spots that were different from the Giants' original plan for the group that must protect Daniel Jones.

Projected starting right tackle Evan Neal (ankle, physically unable to perform list) still isn't practicing. So Jermaine Eluemunor was kicked out to right tackle despite spending the entire spring at left guard, and now he's laboring through some bruised ribs.

Daboll wasn't even willing to say on Sunday that Neal will definitely be available for Week 1 of the

regular season.

"It's day-to-day, and each day he's getting better," the coach said. "When he's ready to go, he'll be ready to go."

Projected starting center John Michael Schmitz (shoulder) missed a second straight practice on Monday, too. So backup Austin Schlottmann primarily snapped to Jones, with right guard Jon Runyan Jr. rotating in for a handful of select snaps.

Daboll admitted Runyan wasn't supposed to get center snaps this early, but they've had to accelerate those trials due to their injuries.

"We'd like to just have the five guys out there, but the reality is they're not," Daboll said. "So you have to make alternative plans. Getting center reps for Jon - maybe not this early in camp - but we were going to do that at some point."

Stinnie, a seven-year pro whose 12 career starts all have come in the last two seasons, now is the Giants' first-string left guard, as well, due to Eluemunor's move to

right tackle.

Undrafted rookie Jake Kubas and incumbent backup Jalen Mayfield took turns as the next right guards up when Runyan slid to center on Monday.

Mayfield is one of the "practice squad guys" who played in last year's loss at Miami that GM Joe Schoen cited when he said in Hard Knocks: "You can have Pat Mahomes and he can't f---ing win behind that."

The Giants' first-team offense ran the ball more than expected on Monday, but not effectively. Rookie slot corner Dru Phillips made some hard-nosed stops on Devin Singletary and Eric Gray, respectively.

Kayvon Thibodeaux beat Eluemunor for what would have been an early sack.

The interior held up in pass protection for some Jones completions with top defensive tackle Dexter Lawrence (illness) not practicing, including one Jones throw to Malik Nabers with the offense backed up against its own goal line.

Then Jones fumbled the next snap exchange from Schlottmann before handing off to Tyrone Tracy Jr. on a broken play.

On Sunday, offensive line coach Carmen Bricillo even got in Eluemunor's face after the right tackle allowed a rusher to get upfield and hem the quarterback in.

It was only a tough-love exchange between a coach and player who like and understand each other dating back to last season's shared experience with the Raiders.

But it still reflected the urgency of this situation: the Giants have to figure out their front before their Week 1 opener against the Vikings.

Co-owner John Mara called it "ridiculous" at the NFL owners' meetings this March that he is speaking annually about how "fix" the perpetually broken line.

"You're right, it's ridiculous, and it's a continuing source of frustration for me," Mara said. "It's time to get it fixed. We've invested in a couple of No. 1 draft picks on

offensive tackles. We have a No. 2 draft pick playing at center, and now we have spent some money in free agency. We have a new offensive line coach. I expect us to be a hell of a lot better this year."

Neal was Schoen's No. 7 overall pick in 2022. Schmitz was his 57th overall second-round pick in 2023. Eluemunor, Runyan Jr., Schlottmann and Stinnie were all his free-agent signings this spring. Mayfield was added at the start of last season, and Kubas was signed this spring.

Left tackle Andrew Thomas is the only holdover from the previous regime playing in any permutations of the starting group, and he is the best of the bunch - as evidenced by his strong one-on-one reps handling Brian Burns' pass rush in 1-on-1s on Monday.

Maybe mixing and matching will help a ton of their depth linemen gain experience, and maybe time will heal their injuries and allow them to gel in time for the games that count.

DAY FIVE PRACTICE NOTES

Big-money edge rusher Brian Burns practiced on Monday but didn't finish it on the field with his teammates. Burns needed something on his foot or ankle checked during 11-on-11 and eventually was standing on the grass barefoot watching. He initially appeared to be favoring something in his lower body after one of his 1-on-1 reps against Thomas.


