

Flooding fears in N.Y.

Remnants of Debby expected to bring dangerous downpours

Keep your umbrellas handy, New York. Stormy days are far from over, thanks to Debby.

After torrential rains Tuesday led city officials to issue flash flood warnings for Manhattan and the Bronx and Gov. Hochul to urge those in low-lying areas to have “an evacuation plan ready,” meteorologists warned Wednesday that more downpours are expected in the Northeast through the weekend.

Some areas in upstate New York, northern Maryland and Vermont could see up to 6 inches of rain through Saturday morning as the remnants of the slow-moving Tropical Storm Debby makes its way north, the National Weather Service said in its Wednesday morning advisory.

“This will likely produce considerable flash and urban flooding as well as river flooding,” weather officials said.

Debby, which made landfall along Florida’s Gulf Coast on Monday as a Category 1 hurricane before it was downgraded to a tropical storm, was slowly moving off the coast of South

Carolina Wednesday morning after submerging streets and knocking down power knocking out power to more than 300,000 customers across Florida, Georgia and South Carolina.

The storm, which has been linked to the deaths of at least six people, is expected to pick up some strength again before making a second landfall late Wednesday or early Thursday.

On Tuesday, Gov. Hochul warned New Yorkers of “huge volumes of rain” expected to hit the city by Wednesday morning, and said residents should expect more extreme weather by the end of the week.

“It’s too early to tell the impact that Debby will have on New York, but every model shows that we are in the bull’s-eye, right in the path of this storm coming”

Hochul told reporters adding she had “already activated 100 members of the National Guard, predeploying them to be able to assist wherever necessary.”

On Tuesday, New York City officials deployed new technology to alert residents of low-lying areas about possible flooding dangers and other extreme weather conditions.

Around 1 p.m., five emergency management teams flew sound-equipped drones in areas in Queens, Brooklyn, Staten Island and the Bronx to let residents know about the potential for flash floods – and what to do in an emergency.

“If you live in a basement or ground-floor apartment, be prepared to leave your apartment if flooding occurs,” the small aircraft blasted in English and Spanish while flying through areas including the Rockaways in Queens, Coney Island in Brooklyn, Throgs Neck in the Bronx and Fox Beach on Staten Island.

The drones flew over areas deemed to be especially flood-prone, Zach Iscol, the mayor’s emergency management commissioner, explained to the Daily News. **With News Wire Services**

3 Taylor shows in Vienna canceled after attack foiled

All three Taylor Swift concerts scheduled for Vienna were canceled after Austrian authorities uncovered a terror plot on Wednesday.

The shows were supposed to run Thursday through Saturday at Ernst Happel Stadium. But in the morning, police arrested two suspected extremists accused of planning an attack.

“With confirmation from government officials of a planned terrorist attack at Ernst Happel Stadium, we have no choice but to cancel the three scheduled shows for everyone’s safety,” concert organizers wrote on social media.

A 19-year-old Austrian man who pledged his allegiance to the Islamic State was arrested in Ternitz, south of the Austrian capital, authorities announced. The teenager was not identified further.

Another suspect was arrested in Vienna, though police did not identify the second man or describe his role in the plot.

There was “a focus by the 19-year-old perpetrator on the Taylor Swift concerts in Vienna,” according to Franz Ruf, public security director at Austria’s interior ministry. The suspect had taken “preparatory actions” for a possible attack, Ruf said.

Authorities searched the 19-year-old’s residence and found chemical substances, Ruf confirmed. Investigators were still determining whether he was capable of building a bomb with the items he had.

Investigators believe the teenager and his accomplice were radicalized on the internet.

Following the arrests, officials initially said they would simply beef up security at all three Swift shows, but in the afternoon they announced the cancellations.

Organizers said all tickets would be automatically

refunded within 10 business days.

Swift’s Eras Tour shows were expected to draw 65,000 people each day, with thousands of more fans listening outside the stadium. The concerts are so popular and expensive stateside that many Americans purchased tickets to European shows and flew across the Atlantic Ocean to see Swift in person.

A different Taylor Swift event was recently the site of deadly violence elsewhere in Europe, when a 17-year-old attacked a Swift-themed dance class in England and killed three little girls.

Axel Muganwa Rudakubana, who will turn 18 in a few weeks, has been charged with killing Bebe King, 6; Elsie Dot Stancombe, 7; and Alice Dasilva Aguiar, 9, at the event in Southport, about 10 miles north of Liverpool. Another 10 people were wounded in the attack.

“The horror of yesterday’s attack in Southport is washing over me continuously, and I’m just completely in shock,” Swift said afterward in a statement. “These were just little kids at a dance class. I am at a complete loss for how to ever convey my sympathies to these families.”

The U.K. was also the site of a notable concert tragedy in 2017, when brothers Salman and Hashem Abedi bombed an Ariana Grande concert at Manchester Arena, killing 22 people and wounding more than 1,000.

Last year, a British inquest found the nation’s intelligence agency, MI5, could have prevented the attack if it acted on information about Salman Abedi before the bombing.

Swift’s tour, which began in March 2023 outside Phoenix, is scheduled to end Dec. 8 in Vancouver. However, veteran Swift watchers believe she may extend it five days to her 35th birthday.

As of Wednesday evening, Swift had not commented on the alleged terrorist attack nor her canceled shows.

KILLING IN QUIET NABE

One person held in stabbing on Flatlands, Brooklyn, street

A man was fatally stabbed after a bloody encounter with an apparent stranger on a quiet residential Brooklyn block Wednesday, police said.

The victim was slashed multiple times in the head and abdomen near Avenue K and E. 53rd St. in Flatlands about 8 a.m., cops said.

One witness, who would only give his name as Alan, said he saw an alleged suspect walking back and forth with a knife.

"I saw a deranged guy walking back and forth with a knife in his hands, he was wearing a black hoodie," the 50-year-old day trader said. "When the cops arrested him he was hiding and he was wearing multiple layers of clothes."

"Cops recognized him by his bloody hands and knife," he added. "When they arrested him, he was wearing a different top. He took off the top layer before he was cuffed. It was so strange. It makes no sense how it transpired."

A resident in the area, who did not want to be identified, said he saw the shocking aftermath of the stabbing.


"It started up the block, he was lying there, bleeding all stabbed up by the garage. He was not moving," the resident recounted about the slain victim.

Medics rushed the victim to Brookdale University Hospital, but he could not be saved. His name was not immediately released.

A motive for the deadly attack remains a mystery. Police said only that a man was taken into custody for questioning.

Man left in coma from Harlem street shooting dies three weeks later

Three weeks after he was shot in the stomach trying to flee a barrage of bullets at a Harlem sidewalk cookout, a 24-year-old man who lapsed into a coma while handcuffed to his hospital bed has died, cops said Wednesday.

Tresean Gilchrist's distraught parents said he didn't even know he had been shot when he was among a crowd of people who ran for their lives when the bullets started flying along W. 144th St. near Seventh Ave. on July 13.

Only moments before he collapsed did he realize that he hadn't outrun the bullet.

"One of his friends that was there told me that's what he said, 'I got shot,'" said the victim's anguished mother, Imee Wilkins. "His friend said, 'Lay down, lay down,' but it was too late. Tresean fell down just like that."

Cops initially said Gilchrist was shot after an argument with the gunman near W. 140th St. about 1 a.m. But Gilchrist's mother and father, who talked to other people at the party, said he was wounded by a stray shot fired at the barbecue after a beef between two other men.

The gunman, who was dressed all in black, ran off.

Cops recovered three spent bullet casings at W. 144th St., according to preliminary reports.

A friend of Gilchrist's notified his parents that he'd been wounded, and the pair rushed to Harlem Hospital, where they waited as their son endured seven hours of surgery — at one point flatlining on the table as doctors worked to save his life.

Making the situation worse, Gilchrist's parents claim that after the surgery they were notified that they would not be able to see their son because of an outstanding warrant stemming from a 2021-2022 arrest for jumping a subway turnstile.

The parents said they were forced to seek permission at a police precinct to visit their son and it wasn't until nearly 11 hours after he finished surgery that they finally got into the room with him.

They said they were shocked to find him shackled to his bed. He remained handcuffed, his parents said, even after an infection forced doctors to amputate his leg.

"The individual had an arrest warrant," an NYPD representative said in a statement. "He was handcuffed and was in police custody until the warrant was vacated on July 16."

Gilchrist's parents were outraged.

"They had him in handcuffs," said the victim's dad, Jerome Gilchrist. "We had to go to the precinct first to come visit him and he had a cop in front of his room like he was going to run or something."

"The leg that got cut off, that's they leg that was handcuffed. He had one on his arm and one on his leg," he added.

"They even shackled his feet," Wilkins said. "I was like, this is ridiculous. He can't move or anything."

Doctors had told Gilchrist's parents that following the shooting Gilchrist struck his head and suffered a traumatic brain injury.

After three weeks, the parents made the difficult decision to take their son off life support.

"That was the worst decision I ever had to make," the father said. "It bothered me every day to see him like that and his leg was cut off."

"When they were talking about his head injury, they were saying he'd never be able to remember anything, may not know who he was. We would have to put him in a facility and he'd be on a machine and we'd be talking to him the way we are now. I didn't want to continue seeing him like that."

In addition to working as a security guard, Gilchrist bought and sold high-end sneakers and had a taste for the finer things in life, his parents said.

"He loved designer things," his mother said. "He'd wear a \$600, \$700 pair of jeans. His tastes were above my means."

"When he gave gifts he gave great gifts. He'd make sure he'd take care of you. And his girlfriends will tell you, he took care of them."

Kavanagh thinks of 9/11, hails rank & file as she leaves post

As she leaves FDNY Headquarters Wednesday, outgoing Fire Commissioner Laura Kavanagh will be gifting something from her office to her successor: a poster honoring the 343 members who died on 9/11.

The message the poster evokes is both simple and profound: Never forget about the rank-and-file members risking their lives every day under your watch.

Kavanagh received the poster from former top FDNY spokesman Frank Gribbon and kept it near her desk throughout her years as first deputy commissioner, acting commissioner, and finally, the city's first woman fire commissioner.

"It made some of the big decisions I made over the last few years seem a lot less hard," Kavanagh told the Daily News. "I would always think, what would these men have wanted?"

On Wednesday, after 10 years with the FDNY, Kavanagh handed over the reins to First Deputy Commissioner Joseph Pfeifer, who will be the department's acting commissioner until Mayor Adams names a replacement.

Whoever that person is, Kavanagh hopes that he — or she — utilizes a "ground up" leadership style rather than a "top down" one from the eighth floor of headquarters.

"They have to go out to the firehouses and EMS stations, they really need to do that," said Kavanagh, who says she has visited every FDNY unit in the city. On Tuesday, she spent her morning with the firefighters in Rescue 1 in Hell's Kitchen,

greeting them as they returned from a 911 call.

"It was something members found unusual," she said of the visits. "But headquarters is where you purchase things and sign documents."

"We are here because of them," she said of the rank and file. "Making this a human-centric job always remained my goal."

It was also one of the reasons why she ended up butting heads with the department's top chiefs, a handful of whom still have a pending ageism lawsuit against her.

When she was first appointed FDNY commissioner, Kavanagh made it clear to her chiefs that the bullying of firefighters and EMS members by their superiors was no longer acceptable. She also instituted improved leadership training for recently promoted officers facing a more diverse workforce.

"Being an officer in the FDNY is a far more complex job than it was a decade ago," Kavanagh said. "In addition to fighting fires, they have to keep a group of people cohesive, safe and well trained. Anything that affects one member can affect their group and their performance in the field."

Kavanagh hopes her successor expands officer training. She also hopes they continue with digitizing the FDNY's personnel system, which allows firefighters and EMS members to access their own files and navigate how they want their career path to go in the department.

The digitized system will help firefighters move up the ranks on their merits rather than who they know can put a good word in for them, she said.

"Most of our members are now first-generation firefighters of all races and genders," she said. "You no longer have to know someone to know how your career will unfold. You can actually plan it yourself."

Kavanagh has been credited for making the department more diverse, quadrupling the number of women firefighters and for being on the front lines in the city's fight against exploding lithium-ion batteries. She's also helped the department upgrade its equipment and technology, especially the use of drone technology.

She announced her departure on July 13 and wants to spend time with family before figuring out what her next step will be.

Kavanagh says her role as commissioner was an all-consuming 24/7 job, and she didn't know if she could continue giving her all while missing out on important family events.

"For me, it's been seven years going at 100%," she said about her various leadership positions in the department. "It's time to take the baton and give it to someone with the same amount of enthusiasm."

Her time as commissioner, in fact, reinforced just how important connections with family and friends can be.

"This is a place that reminds you to be more present, and it reminds you how fleeting that could be," she said. "The Fire Department has changed me forever. It really showed me what it means to show up for people. It's not about sending a card. When they're needed, their presence is all encompassing. That is the fabric of life."

Yet critics claim Mayor Adams pressured her to step down over increased tensions between herself and the department chiefs.

She had also "lost touch with the membership," one FDNY source said.

From the outset, Kavanagh's tenure was criticized by her staff chiefs, upset that she demoted three of them just months after taking office. Several chiefs asked to be demoted in solidarity, but Kavanagh never signed off on any of the requests.

Kavanagh said such criticism "was never part of the equation" in her decision to leave. "[Those criticisms] don't matter to me at all," she said.

Adams has said repeatedly he would like Kavanagh to stay on as FDNY commissioner or in another capacity in city government.

"New York City has been incredibly lucky to have @FDNY Commissioner Laura Kavanagh at the helm during our most challenging and perilous moments over the last two years," Adams posted on X Wednesday. "Not only has she broken the highest glass ceiling, but her leadership has made us safer. I and all New Yorkers are deeply grateful for her service. Best of luck, Commissioner."

As she closes the door to her office, she says she hasn't ruled out returning to city government but leaves proud to be a trailblazer as the first woman FDNY commissioner.

"It hasn't fully hit me," she said about the legacy she left with the FDNY. "I see how much it matters when I get the opportunity to meet with young woman and girls. Sometimes just women on the street stop me. I don't think people are paying attention, but there are those moments people stop me and said it made a difference."

Vagrant charged in 2 unprovoked stabs in Queens

A homeless man was charged Wednesday with stabbing two strangers in Queens in unprovoked attacks minutes apart, leaving one of them clinging to life, police said.

Feruz Radjabov is accused of stabbing a man pumping gas in Ozone Park in the back and then dashing into a nearby subway stop — where he allegedly slashed the throat of a man waiting for the train.

Radjabov, 40, was charged Wednesday with attempted murder, felony assault and weapon possession plus criminal trespass, resisting arrest, obstructing governmental administration and harassment.

The first victim, a 25-year-old man, was pumping gas at the Mobil station N. Conduit Ave. near Cohancy St. in Ozone Park when he was knifed without warning at about 5:15 p.m. Tuesday. Surveillance video captured that attack, police say.

“He was bleeding a lot from the left side,” station worker Rakib Hussein, 30, said of the victim. “He was pumping gas at pump No. 1, and the guy walked up and stabbed him in the back.”

The young man staggered into the gas station where Hussein was working behind the cash register and begged him for help, he recounted.

“He said, ‘Call the police,’” Hussein recalled. “When I saw how hard he was bleeding, I was in shock. I was scared. What was I supposed to do?”


Medics rushed the victim to Jamaica Hospital, where he is recovering.

Radjabov ran from the Mobil station into the Aqueduct-N. Conduit Ave. train station a block away and slashed a 69-year-old man in the neck on the Far Rockaway-bound platform, according to cops.

The elderly man was in critical condition at Jamaica Hospital.

Radjabov was nabbed minutes after the second vicious attack. According to ABC7 New York, Radjabov hid under the platform at the subway station after the stabbings, where police caught up with him.

The suspect was brought to Queens Hospital for a psychological evaluation, the TV station reported.

Videos show Bronx dismember suspects push cart, take train

Cops investigating the discovery of dismembered body parts dumped and set on fire under a bridge in Yonkers used surveillance video to track the suspects back to a Bronx apartment building where additional remains were recovered, police sources said Wednesday.

The suspects were caught on video taking most of the dismembered body in a collapsible shopping cart onto Metro-North, then taking the train from the Bronx to Yonkers, where they torched the remains, sources said.

More body parts, including two severed hands in a crockpot and possibly two human legs in trash bags in the freezer, were found inside the apartment on Rogers Place near Dawson St., in the South Bronx.

Surveillance video obtained by the Daily News shows two people rolling the shopping cart down the block on Rogers Place at 12:16 a.m. Monday — about two hours before the remains were discovered burning in Yonkers.

The cart is pushed down the sidewalk by a man wearing a baseball cap and a

long-sleeved sweatshirt with a cigarette or a pen dangling out of his mouth. He is followed by someone in a bulky hooded sweatshirt.

It wasn't clear Wednesday if the video obtained by the Daily News is included in the video recovered by cops.

An 18-year-old woman who lives in an apartment on the Bronx building's third floor said she heard a commotion Monday night that sounded like a heavy object being moved.

"In the stairwell I heard a noise around 12 o'clock," she said. "I wanted to go to the deli, but I didn't because it was late. It sounded like someone was bringing something heavy up or down the stairs."

Cops are still trying to identify the victim and learn how the person died.

No arrests have been made. Cops are still hoping to question the Bronx apartment's 40-year-old tenant, who often rents one of his rooms out for extra cash, neighbors said.

The building's residents say the main tenant had lived there for the last five years but has not been seen since the body discovery. On Wednesday, the apartment remained a sealed crime scene with cops in and out throughout the day.

"One day I saw him at the door," the 18-year-old woman's mother said of the apartment's primary tenant.

"I was carrying a lot of groceries, and he offered to help me. I told him no, but when I came back for the second trip he still helped me."

"He wore glasses," she added. "He was nice. He said, 'Can I help with this?' I said, 'No, I can do it.' But he insisted. He was always alone when I saw him."

Another resident, a 47-year-old woman, said the man lived with a roommate.

"The roommate was only there for about two months," she said. "His roommate seemed friendly but was just a little off. I never felt comfortable enough to have a conversation with him."

The victim's teeth were bashed out to help slow identification, investigators believe, according to police sources. The teeth were found in the Bronx apartment, according to local reports.

Body parts were first found on fire in a shopping cart under the Oak St. bridge in Yonkers at about 2 a.m. Monday, cops said.

Yonkers firefighters put out the blaze and discovered the body parts inside the cart. Cops arriving at the scene quickly recovered video footage that showed two people rolling the body from the nearby Mount Vernon West Metro-North station.

Yonkers police called the NYPD, who picked up the trail from there. Using

surveillance video, detectives painstakingly traced the morbid trip from the Metro-North station to the South Bronx and finally to the apartment building on Rogers Place, police sources said.

Cops executed a search warrant at the apartment around 11:30 p.m. Monday, where the additional remains were found. A pistol and drug paraphernalia were also found in the apartment.

Crime scene unit cops were spotted entering the building in white hazmat suits and blue plastic booties.

"I have 34 years working in that building," the super told the Daily News Tuesday. "I've never seen something like that in this building."

The police activity was also caught on video.

"I saw when the police go knock on the door," the super said. "I saw them bring the body [parts] outside."

Also caught on camera, he said, were a man and a woman who rented a room in the apartment. He said they came to the building in a car Monday before cops showed up.

"They go inside, open the door, go inside, looking for something and then they leave," he said. "Somebody that lives there rents the room."

No arrests have been made.

KAM, TIM STORM

Dems ride momentum into key swing states Wis. and Mich.

Kamala Harris and Tim Walz barnstormed through the Midwest battleground states of Wisconsin and Michigan on Wednesday as they sought to ride a wave of momentum that has dramatically upended the presidential race.

Fresh off the well-received debut of Walz, the Democratic ticket headed to the heartland to build on the surge that has catapulted Harris into a virtual dead heat with former President Donald Trump with just 90 days to go before Election Day.

“Coach Walz and I know that when America’s middle class is strong, America is strong,” Harris told a sprawling crowd in Eau Claire, Wis. “The promise of America is what makes it possible for Gov. Walz and me to stand here together. Only in America.”

She attacked Trump for the right-wing Project 2025, which she called a blueprint for a second Trump term: “We’re not going back,” she declared.

Harris shushed the sprawling crowd when they started chanting “lock him up” about Trump.

“The courts are gonna take care of that part,” Harris said.

“We’re going to beat him in November,”

Walz, a folksy former teacher and football coach, grew up in rural Nebraska and is expected to play a key role in taking the Democratic message to small towns and cities across middle America.

After repeating his signature gibe at Republicans to “mind your own business,” Walz pumped up Harris as a leader for all Americans.

“Kamala Harris wants to take us forward to a future where everyone matters,” Walz said.

Walz’s small-town upbringing in the Great Plains strikes an

evocative contrast with the inspirational run of Harris to become the first Black woman president.

Democrats hope the combo package can seal the deal in the so-called blue wall states that Trump flipped to the GOP column in 2016, but swung back to Biden and Harris in 2020.

In the first 24 hours since Walz was unveiled, the Harris campaign says it raised \$36 million from individual donors, building an advantage over Trump and the GOP.

Harris can likely reach 270 electoral votes to win the White House if the ticket sweeps all three states, including

Pennsylvania, where Walz made a great impression on an overflow crowd of 10,000 supporters in North Philadelphia on Tuesday.

Biden won the perennial swing state by just 20,000 votes, meaning the Democrats need to win small cities like Eau Claire as well as running up the score in the cities of Milwaukee and deep-blue Madison.

The newly minted ticket heads to Detroit later, where Democrats are hoping Harris’ bid for history can mobilize legions of Black and Latino voters who may have been sitting on the sidelines when the 81-year-old Biden was bidding

close to home turf of new veep pick

for four more years.

The Rev. Wendell Anthony, president of the NAACP Detroit branch, said the excitement over Harris is “mind-blowing.” He likened it to Barack Obama’s first run for president in 2008, when voters waited in long lines to help elect the nation’s first Black president.

The trip aims to rebuild the traditional Democratic coalition of labor, youth and people of color that tipped the scales for Biden in 2020. That coalition showed signs of fraying, especially in Michigan, where anger over Biden’s handling of Israel’s war in Gaza has run high in the state’s

large Arab-American community.

The nation’s largest auto workers’ union, the United Auto Workers, is signaling it will strongly back Harris, especially now that Walz is her No. 2. UAW President Shawn Fain praised Walz for standing “with the working class every step of the way.”

Trump’s vice presidential nominee JD Vance is shadowing Harris and Walz as they tour the swing states that will likely determine the winner of the fall election.


After Michigan, the campaign focus will shift to the Sun Belt battleground states of Arizona and Nevada, where Trump is thought to hold narrow leads.

Planned rallies in Georgia and North Carolina are in limbo due to the extensive flooding spawned by Tropical Storm Debby.

Vance, who suffered a rocky rollout after Trump picked him last month, is seeking to settle into the traditional veep’s role of attacking the opposing ticket instead of defending his own record of offbeat statements.

He even took a peek at Air Force Two on the tarmac of the airport in Eau Claire, saying he planned to be riding in it after winning the election with Trump.

“We’ve got to throw Kamala Harris out of office, not give her a promotion,” Vance said.

Trump eases off on demand for debate on Fox

Former President Donald Trump Wednesday softened his ultimatum for a debate with Kamala Harris, suggesting a clash could be in the cards.

A couple of days after insisting a debate would have to be on conservative-leaning Fox News, Trump suggested he really wants to debate Harris regardless of what network hosts it.

“I think Fox would do a really good job,” he said in an interview on Fox. “But two people have to agree.”

“The most important thing is we get a debate,” Trump added. “I want to debate her. I think it’s important for the country that we debate.”

There was no immediate response from the Harris campaign to Trump’s apparent concession that he would have to negotiate the terms of the debate with his rival’s campaign.

Trump also derided Harris as “nasty” and “not a good debater,”

without elaborating.

“We’ll see because we’ll be debating her, I guess, in the pretty near future,” Trump said.

Trump had previously agreed to two debates with President Biden. The first one on CNN turned into a historic debacle for Biden and eventually led to his decision to pull out of the race and endorse Harris.

The second clash was expected to be on ABC on Sept. 10.

Harris agreed to take Biden’s place for the ABC debate and taunted Trump about his reluctance to face her.

“If you got something to say,” she said at a campaign rally, “say it to my face.”

But Trump has said the debate deal was invalid after Biden left the race.

Trump pronounced last week that he had “agreed” to a Sept. 4 debate with Harris on Fox to be held in front of an arena audience, even though the new Democratic standard bearer has not agreed to any switch.

NYPD official in lawsuit

Protester says she was thrown to ground & kneed last year

A high ranking NYPD official is among several defendants in a lawsuit accusing him of body slamming a woman to the pavement in lower Manhattan during a May 2023 protest, leaving her with a broken eye socket and a laceration to her forehead, court records say.

Kaz Daughtry, the Police Department's deputy commissioner of operations and two senior commanders are accused in the lawsuit filed against the city last week by Shakim McKnight of tackling and pinning her to the ground on May 8, 2023, near Crosby and Houston Sts. while she says she was filming a vigil for Jordan Neely, the homeless man killed during a scuffle a week earlier aboard the F train with former Marine Daniel Penny.

While it's unclear what prompted police officers at the scene to pursue McKnight, her lawyer, John Paul De Verna, said his client was crossing the street to get away from the crowd when Daughtry darted across a traffic divider and grabbed her, slamming her to the ground. Other officers including an inspector and a

deputy chief "put their knees upon [McKnight's] back, piled on top of [McKnight] while kneeling them and grabbing and twisting their ankle," the lawsuit says.

About a dozen people were arrested during the chaotic protest at the Broadway-Lafayette subway station. The chokehold death of Neely touched off a series of protests and vigils in the days following the episode.

"The pictures and video speak for themselves; Ms. McKnight was brutally assaulted while exercising her constitutional right to film during the remembrance vigil. Her grave and serious injuries were compounded by a delay in medical attention," De Verna said. "To make matters worse, to my knowledge, no disciplinary action was taken against Kaz Daughtry or any other of the officers involved."

A police source who requested anonymity said that "this individual did not get hurt from physical contact with Kaz Daughtry. This individual ran into a pole." A video provided by the source appears to show McKnight hitting a pole just before Daughtry grabs her.

Video and photos taken at the scene show the encounter



and McKnight being loaded into a police van with blood on her face. Verna said McKnight suffered a sprained ankle and wrist, a forehead gash and a broken eye socket. He said she spent hours in a precinct without medical attention before she was finally placed on a stretcher and taken to Bellevue Hospital for treatment.

He said she was only charged with disorderly conduct for failure to disperse, which is a non-criminal violation. A copy of the summons states, "[She] was with more than two other people in a public street and refused to comply with multiple lawful orders to disperse."

Cops gave her a desk appearance ticket at the hospital, DeVerna said. She went to two court dates before the disorderly conduct violation was dismissed two months later on July 11, 2023. Because of the dismissal, the original arrest records are sealed.

"I have never experienced something like this in my life. I'm still hurt emotionally and physically," McKnight, 29, a Brooklyn resident, told the Daily News. "For weeks afterward I could not even leave the house. Now, when I leave the house, anytime I see a cop, I'm scared that something else is going to happen to me."

McKnight's lawsuit also names John Corbisiero, an NYPD inspector

in Manhattan South who signed the summons, John Dadamo, a deputy chief assigned to the Strategic Response Group, and Frank Russo, a cop assigned to a Community Response Team.

McKnight was one of about a dozen people arrested during the vigil, which also included veteran photo-journalist Stephanie Keith. Keith's work has appeared in the New York Times and Reuters. The NYPD said they found a Molotov cocktail at the scene of the vigil and Mayor Adams, at the time, defended the police actions.

The vigil took place one week after the deadly encounter between Penny and Neely, who scuffled on a subway train heading toward the Broadway-Lafayette station May 1, 2023, after Neely became aggressive. Penny placed Neely in a chokehold and Neely passed out and died.

Neely's death was ruled a homicide, and a Manhattan grand jury indicted Penny on second-degree murder charges in June 2023. The case is pending.

Daughtry was a detective at the time of the encounter with McKnight, his official bio states. In July 2023, he was named a civilian assistant commissioner, then a deputy commissioner in February, according to the bio.

Man charged in stabbing at L.I. carnival park

A man has been indicted on assault charges for allegedly stabbing a Florida man at a Long Island amusement park last month, officials said Wednesday.

Daniel Tomasky, 42, of Shirley, is accused of stabbing the victim, later identified as 47-year-old James Burns, “in front of multiple children” at Adventureland Amusement Park in Farmingdale on July 7, Suffolk County District Attorney Raymond Tierney said in a news release.

The incident unfolded just before 5 p.m. when Tomasky (photo) and members of his family “got into an altercation with members of the victim’s family.”

Burns, who wasn’t initially involved in the argument, ended up being stabbed in his abdomen, investigators said.



“Tomasky allegedly pulled a knife from his waistband, charged at the victim, and then stabbed him,” prosecutors said.

Burns was taken to Nassau University Medical Center in critical condition, where he underwent surgery for his injuries.

After the attack, Tomasky placed the knife “in a sewer drain near his vehicle,” according to Suffolk County Police.

The knife was recovered from the sewer and Tomasky was arrested at the scene.

Tomasky was arraigned Wednesday in Suffolk County District Court on multiple charges, including assault, criminal possession of a weapon and endangering the welfare of a child.

He pleaded not guilty to all charges.

“This was a clear case of self-defense,” Tomasky’s attorney, Michael Brown, told the Daily News in an email.

According to Brown, Tomasky was only reacting to a group of five or six adults, “some with very extensive criminal histories,” who continued to aggressively attack his client and his wife.

“Clearly, he felt his life as well as the lives of his wife and child were in jeopardy,” Brown said.

Judge Anthony Senft ordered Tomasky be held on \$50,000.

In a statement shared with the Daily News shortly after the incident, Adventureland Park officials said, “For more than 60 years, Adventureland has been providing Long Island families with a convenient, affordable and fun local destination.”

Don't put crook in MDC

Judge: If 74-yr.-old is sent to 'barbaric' jail, I'll send him home

Conditions at Brooklyn’s notorious Metropolitan Detention Center federal jail are so horrific that a Long Island judge ruled he would vacate an elderly tax scammer’s sentence and give him house arrest instead if he’s sent there.

Long Island Federal Court Judge Gary Brown sentenced 74-year-old Daniel Colucci to nine months behind bars on Monday, but wrote a trap door into his decision so he wouldn’t be subjected to the “dangerous, barbaric conditions” at the Brooklyn jail.

If for some reason the federal Bureau of Prisons sends Colucci to the MDC — which typically houses suspects awaiting trial and sentenced defendants awaiting their transfer to a prison facility — that sentence will be vacated, Brown ruled on Monday.

Brown’s decision includes a litany of incidents at Sunset Park jail, including includes a recent, caught-on-video stabbing that underscores the severe understaffing there.

Video of that April 27 stabbing shows a lone correction officer arriving on the scene 37 seconds into the three-on-one assault, then shows the victim stagger away unassisted as the correction officer chases the attackers.

In June and July, two MDC inmates were stabbed to death less than six weeks apart,

“Allegations of inadequate supervision, unbridled assaults and lack of sufficient medical care are supported by an increasing body of evidence, with certain instances that are irrefutable,” Brown wrote. “Each of the five

months preceding this opinion was marred by instances of catastrophic violence at MDC, including two apparent homicides, two gruesome stabbings and an assault so severe that it resulted in a fractured eye socket for the victim.”

Colucci was convicted of a nearly \$1 million series of tax frauds, including schemes where he “misappropriated sums withheld from his employees’ paychecks that were intended for tax payments and intentionally failed to make employer matching contributions,” Brown wrote.

Those crimes merit incarceration, the judge wrote, but he doesn’t want to take the chance that Colucci, who has a host of medical problems and a recent cancer diagnosis, be sent to the MDC.

Though the jail mainly houses suspects awaiting prosecution, about 40 of its nearly 1,300 inmates are not there pretrial, BOP officials said.

White collar defendants with sentences shorter than a year can wind up serving their time at the MDC, defense attorneys told the Daily News.

“Given the age and medical condition of this defendant, such an outcome would offer unacceptable risks,” Brown wrote.

He called his ruling “undoubtedly unusual,” but added, “the present conditions at MDC make such a sentence materially different than one served at a jail or prison elsewhere in the United States that is appropriately managed.”

Brown is one of a growing list of federal judges in New York’s Eastern and Southern

Districts to decry the conditions at MDC. In a blistering January ruling, Manhattan Federal Court Judge Jesse Furman refused to send a 70-year-old convicted drug dealer there post-sentencing, writing, “There is no way the grim conditions at the jail will materially improve until the grave staffing shortages are addressed. And that is not going to happen unless the political branches commit considerably more resources to the matter, which seems unlikely to happen any time soon.”

A spokeswoman for the federal Bureau of Prisons declined comment on Brown’s decision, and wouldn’t divulge the agency’s plans for Colucci.

Colucci’s lawyer, Richard Kestenbaum, called Brown’s ruling unusual, particularly because the judge included photos from inside the jail in his opinion.

“I never saw pictures in a sentencing order. He felt pretty strongly about how awful it is,” he said.

Colucci remains free under supervision as he awaits his prison designation. Kestenbaum, who was seeking no jail time for his client, said the ruling presents him with a conundrum.

“It leaves me in an awkward spot now. Am I supposed to call BOP and try to argue for assigning him to MDC, then it gets vacated? I’m not so sure the judge would be too happy with me doing that,” the defense lawyer said.

Still, he added, “As awkward as this whole thing is, the posture is very awkward, he was sensitive to sending somebody there. So you’ve got to give him credit for that.”

Dirty Mex. cop denied

Ex-head of security won't get new trial on taking cartel bribes

Former Mexico top cop Genaro Garcia Luna won't get a new trial, a Brooklyn judge ruled — determining that the crooked law enforcer offered fellow inmates at the Metropolitan Detention Center up to \$2 million in bribes to cook up a story that his rivals were looking to frame him.

Garcia Luna, 56, Mexico's ex-secretary of public security, was convicted after a four-week trial last year of taking millions of dollars in bribes from El Chapo's notorious Sinaloa cartel.

Garcia Luna's lawyer, Cesar de Castro, filed a motion to vacate the conviction in December, alleging several witnesses at the trial perjured themselves.

As part of that motion, de Castro provided an affidavit from an MDC inmate named Edgardo Mejia, who said he saw a fellow inmate talk on a contraband cell phone with two of the government's cooperating witnesses. One of the cooperators bragged about concocting a story about Garcia Luna to shave years off his sentence, he complained.

Prosecutors made a point at the trial to say their cooperators weren't communicating with each other.

When prosecutors investigated Mejia's claims, they learned that Garcia Luna offered to pay other inmates to confirm the tale, Judge Brian Cogan said in his 16-page ruling Tuesday.

One of those inmates took notes, and recorded Garcia Luna with a contraband cell phone, the judge wrote.

In the recording, Garcia Luna could be heard telling the inmate to come up with a story convincing enough that de Castro would believe it, Cogan wrote.

"The notes and the recording are just as damning as they could be," Cogan wrote. "This was a clear scheme by defendant to obstruct justice through bribery

— defendant started out with a \$500,000 offer of a bribe, but to overcome [the inmate] hesitation, the offer ultimately went up to \$2 million."

De Castro declined to comment about the behind-bars bribery allegations, except to say that he addressed them in his reply brief, which challenges

the inmate's timeline of events, questions if his notes were real, and calls the recording "incomprehensible."

De Castro said he was "extremely disappointed" with the ruling. "We respect but disagree with the decision and are especially concerned that the Court did not address fundamental

problems with this prosecution," he said, noting that one witness testified that he was present in a facility with Garcia Luna that hadn't actually been built yet, and was shown software that hadn't been created at the time of their meeting.

"Mr. Garcia Luna will appeal," he said.

First El Chapo, now El Mayo in the same court

Accused Mexican druglord Ismael "El Mayo" Zambada Garcia, who co-founded the Sinaloa cartel, will be tried in the same Brooklyn courthouse where El Chapo was convicted in 2019.

Two sources familiar with the case against the 76-year-old cartel leader confirmed that Zambada will be headed to Brooklyn Federal Court after his arrest last month in Texas.

Zambada and Joaquin Guzman Lopez, a son of Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman, were busted by U.S. authorities after they landed in El Paso on July 25. He was lured onto the small, private plane and believed he was

traveling somewhere else, The Associated Press reported.

In a statement to CNN, Zambada's lawyer, blamed Chapo's son for the arrest.

"Joaquin Guzman Lopez forcibly kidnapped my client. He was ambushed, thrown to the ground, and handcuffed by six men in military uniforms and Joaquin. His legs were tied, and a black bag was placed over his head," attorney Frank Perez said in the statement.

"He was then thrown into the back of a pickup truck and taken to a landing strip. There, he was forced onto a plane, his legs tied to the seat by Joaquin, and brought to the U.S. against his will. The only people on the plane were the pilot, Joaquin and my

client."

Zambada and Guzman "have allegedly overseen the trafficking of tens of thousands of pounds of drugs into the United States, along with related violence," FBI Director Christopher Wray said shortly after his arrest.

The U.S. government was offering a reward of up to \$15 million for information leading to Zambada's capture.

El Chapo was convicted and sentenced to life plus 30 years in 2019, after a blockbuster trial in Brooklyn. The jury found Chapo trafficked more than 150 tons of cocaine, heroin, methamphetamine and marijuana into the U.S. while generating billions in profit and conspiring to commit murder.

Tiny Jin Mei Dumpling in Chinatown is tasty, chewy bargain

One of my favorite methods for finding hidden dining gems around NYC is simply walking around a neighborhood I'm less familiar with and, if a place looks a little sketchy, is cash-only and has next to no seating, count me in. That's how I found Jin Mei Dumpling.

Visiting Chinatown often reminds me of the beauty in chaos: the smells, the sights, the sounds and, most of all, the dumplings. The salty, doughy morsels were calling me, so I didn't do any prior research, didn't even ask around about where I should go. I simply walked and walked some more until I found a place that clearly said, "We might look like a place you should walk right by, but we promise you won't be disappointed if you stop."

I approached Jin Mei, where I counted five people waiting for food, which made the tight storefront look packed. There's just one small table for dining in, right underneath the only evident menu, which is printed in red on the window. An additional table with two chairs was smack in the middle of the sidewalk, occupied by two men who awkwardly crouched as they ate soy-laden dumplings from takeout

containers. The scene reminded me of an Anthony Bourdain episode where he and a companion uncomfortably dined in plastic chairs on the streets of Vietnam.

The menu had somewhere around a dozen items listed, and I ordered a nice mix: scallion pancake, pork dumplings and wonton soup.

About three minutes later, I was given two rectangular takeout containers and was told my total was \$10. I was a little confused — there was no world in which I would find soup in either of these containers, but alas, I handed over 10 bucks. I opened up the containers to see a mountain of dumplings in one and steamed buns in the other; no scallion pancake or wonton soup in sight.

I peeked my head inside, "Excuse me, do you have scallion pancakes?"

"No," a woman said as she continued to prep other orders.

"OK, what about wonton soup?" I said.

"No soup today," she said, without raising her head.

There is no sense in getting upset in a situation like this. I personally feel this "take it or leave it" attitude only enhances my dining experience. I mean, who's mad about getting steamed buns they didn't order?

I snagged the singular open table at the window to enjoy my dumplings, or as I like

to call them, my little pillows of happiness. I was amazed by the amount of food in each box. Before digging in, I counted 10 steamed pork buns and 15 traditional pan-fried pork dumplings. That's 25 dumplings for \$10. In New York City. In 2024.

The pan-fried golden exterior of the traditional dumplings created a sort of crust that kept a few of them stuck together, so I pulled them apart like monkey bread. I didn't mask my first bite with soy or hot sauce (both of which are available at the small takeout table). An oily, juicy liquid poured all over my chin, and the dough, which was a little thicker than some dumplings, had a nice chewy bite.

The same way you simply know when you're eating fresh pasta thanks to its chew, it was clear I was eating fresh, hand-rolled dumpling dough. That didn't surprise me, as I watched three women through the window hard at work. I saw flecks of green mixed throughout the pork, which I assumed were scallions. Despite my tendency to add extra sauce to everything, these dumplings truly didn't need it. They're juicy, meaty and completely packed with flavor.

The steamed pork buns had a much breadier dough, which is expected for bao-style dumplings. I'm guessing the only reason there were only 10 instead of 15 is

because they're much larger and take up more space in the box. I took the same approach of not dousing them in sauce prior to biting in, but my first bite was almost all breadly dough instead of filling.

Once I reached the center, I was met with that same, warm, oily, slightly brothy pork filling. Because of the thick bread exterior, these babies were screaming to be doused in some hot sauce and soy, so I went back up to the counter to help myself.

Jin Mei Dumpling reinforces my love for New York City. I love that in a city that continually increases in price, there's always someplace like Jin Mei offering not just affordable food, but homemade food that transports you to another continent, made with passion so intense you can taste it ... even if it's not what you ordered.







Google the word 'monopoly'

Even those of us who Google every day – and that's the vast majority of us – can and should applaud this week's federal court ruling holding that the company is maintaining its dominance in internet search through an illegal monopoly. Google search can simultaneously be a very, very useful product (indeed, the judge said it is "widely recognized as the best" general search engine "available in the United States") and one that might not stay in the digital catbird seat if it weren't strong-arming competitors.

D.C. Federal Judge Amit Mehta's ruling is rooted in the fact that Google spends billions of dollars to have its search engine installed as the default on new smartphones and other devices. In just one recent year alone, those agreements cost the company \$26 billion – far more than most competitors can possibly afford.

While users certainly have a choice to go into their settings and change the default search engine to Bing (7% market share in the U.S.) or DuckDuckGo (2% market share), Google – with 90% market share overall and even higher than that on mobile devices – knows it's a big deal to be the automatic option for millions. If it weren't, they wouldn't pay anything near that sum.

When users reflexively rely on Google, every click that follows further cements Google's dominance in advertising – which in this case the judge said enabled monopolistic pricing – and a wide range of other realms. It's the key that unlocks the door to making money online.

The judicial-ordered remedy is still to be determined; the legal process to arrive at that will begin

Judicial elections without voters

Unlike the two political branches of government, the executive and the legislative, which are always in the public eye, from president to governor to mayor (and somewhat less from the Congress to the Legislature to the City Council) the third branch, the judiciary, usually is in the background.

And while sometimes a big case or decision will rise to general attention, how lawyers become judges grinds on with minimal interest (with the notable exception of appointments to the U.S. Supreme Court).

So here we are again, it's judge making time in New York, as the political parties prepare to hold their ridiculous conventions to nominate their candidates for the state's most important trial court and Albany pulls a fast one to bypass voters for Civil Court and Family Court spots.

Years ago, a Manhattan federal judge ruled that these party conventions were unconstitutional, a decision affirmed 3-0 by an appeals panel (with an federal appeals judge named Sonia Sotomayor on the panel). But the Big Nine in Washington unanimously upheld the totally nutty system, with Justice John Paul Stevens writing that, "I recall my esteemed former colleague, Thurgood Marshall, remarking on numerous occasions: 'The Constitution does not prohibit legislatures from enacting stupid laws.'"

Tonight the Democrats in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens have their conventions. Manhattan has only one opening on state Supreme Court, while Brooklyn has six and Queens seven.

Last year, the Manhattan Dems messed around with their independent screening panel, but this time we've heard of no issues. Last year, they also broke state law by having County Committee Chair Nico Minerva, whose wife was then in the running, call

next month. This could include penalties or structural changes that weaken the company's ability or outright prevent it from setting Google as the default.

Also to be determined is whether the ruling and remedies will stand once the logic of the decision is subjected to the scrutiny of higher courts. There will be appeals – Google has a very well-funded legal department, as does the U.S. Department of Justice and state attorneys general who brought the case. They're both hunkering down for the long haul.

This was already looking like an unsettled moment for internet search engines. A new generation of AI-enabled tools including Perplexity AI, OpenAI's SearchGPT and Bing are jockeying with Google's new AI-enabled search to do more than just deliver a list of hits to queries.

These programs take an increasingly massive and confusing internet and distill it so that users can increasingly get everything they need without leaving the page where they entered their query. That's going to wind up giving Google, or whatever relative upstart makes inroads against it, even more power and moneymaking ability than before.

We hope the ruling withstands the scrutiny of higher courts. Consumers should be utterly free to pick Google if they like it best, and we think many will probably make that choice, at least in the near term. After all, the word Google has become a category-define brand name akin to Xerox or Kleenex. But the decision ought to be made on the level, not with one of the biggest hands on the world wide web putting its fat thumb on the scale.

the convention to order and then illegally run the proceedings, as we exposed.

This time, Kyle Ishmael will convene and then hand off to Minerva. It's also good that none of the conventions around the state (the Bronx is Monday along with Long Island and Rochester; Westchester is Tuesday and Buffalo goes Wednesday) are using courthouses. Last year, we also exposed that.

Of course, Republicans do all the same things, but they just aren't a factor in the boroughs.

Still, this year we are much more upset about a dozen new judges for Civil Court in New York City and 12 new Family Court judges outside the city.

The state Constitution (Article VI Section 15) says that NYC Civil Court judges shall be elected for 10-year terms and state law directs open primaries (unlike the closed conventions). Article VI Section 13 says exactly the same for Family Court judges outside the city. Family Court judges in the city are appointed by the mayor for 10-year terms and there are four new spots on that bench.

But the Legislature and Gov. Hochul created the new judges too late for the June 25 primary. The bill wasn't even introduced until June 3, which was the final week of the session that began in January. The measure passed the Senate on June 6 and the Assembly on June 7. Hochul signed it on July 17. Oops! Sorry about that, voters. No primary, so the party bosses just pick the candidates (three each for Civil Court in every borough but Staten Island).

The new judges are needed to ease backlogs, but the Legislature and Hochul did an end run around the state Constitution. We don't like electing judges, but if that's the case, they should be elected by voters and not hand-picked by party bosses.

The broker fee bill will raise rents

Speak with two New Yorkers and you're likely to get three opinions. This applies to almost every topic imaginable, except for one: There is universal agreement that the cost of rent in New York is too high. Yet, the City Council is considering new legislation, which if enacted, will trigger a massive rent increase, making the city more unaffordable than ever.

In June, the City Council's Consumer and Worker Protection Committee held a hearing on the bill, known as the Fairness in Apartment Rental Expenses, or FARE Act. The legislation would mandate that whoever hires a real estate agent for a rental transaction pays their fee.

At present, roughly half the listings on public sites such as StreetEasy are free of broker fees while others require tenants to pay it. The City Council wishes to end this system and dictate from who pays that fee.

During the hearing it became clear that the Council had no data, no quantitative evidence, or any material facts to support the claim that legislating which party pays a rental broker fee would improve the rental market or drive down its costs. In fact, the Council chided a representative from the city Department of Housing Preservation and Development who testified that his agency had no analytical data to share with the Council that could support the bill.

If the FARE Act was passed landlords would raise rents significantly to offset their increased cost. This new base rent would reverberate not just on rent origination, (when one-time broker fees are paid), but on lease renewals which would be higher. Rents would not just go up in the aftermath of the FARE Act, they would continue to go up in the years after its adoption.

In the absence of any data that the FARE Act would benefit New Yorkers, the Council instead relied on their own assumptions about the market, feedback from special interest groups, and baseless claims on social media. The sponsor of the bill claimed, on TikTok, that you pay "thousands of dollars to someone who just opens the door" and then at the hearing denied that he said that.

The proponents of this legislation are substituting leadership for likes and build their arguments around inaccurate assumptions: "renters don't pay broker fees outside New York City" (false), "rent stabilized housing would be unaffected by

this change" (also false), "market forces will keep landlords from raising rents if they need to pay fees" (very much false).

The FARE Act is well-intended by elected officials who are searching for ways to bring down housing costs. But as recent history demonstrates, well-intentions are no substitute for sound policy prescriptions. We learned this the hard way in 2019 when rent reform took Albany by storm with the Housing Stability and Tenant Protection Act (HSTPA), a sweeping piece of legislation that upended real estate in New York.

The goal of the HSTPA was stability – lower rents, more affordable housing, better protections for rent stabilized tenants. Some argued this package would make history for tenants, and it did, just not in the way supporters expected. Today, as a result of HSTPA, rents have never been higher. Rent regulated housing has suffered ruinous declines, including an estimated 50,000-plus units that now sit vacant.

Government was looking to address the problem of affordability, but they approached it in the wrong way and made the city even less affordable. Sound familiar? Unless the FARE Act is defeated, history is about to repeat itself.

The good news is that there are plenty of ways we can work together with the Council to increase affordability. For example, there are more than 1,000 vacant city-owned lots just waiting to be developed for affordable housing, which along the way will create good paying union jobs during their construction.

After the hearing ended, I reached out via private message to the councilmember who sponsored the legislation. While I vigorously opposed his position, I thanked him for his time and invited him out for an in-person meeting. I believe government is at its best when it speaks not in an echo chamber but with others who have diverse, even opposing views. To date, I have not heard back regarding my invitation.

Like its name implies, the FARE Act is an expense – and it's one that NYC renters simply cannot afford. Instead, let's work together to enact meaningful reforms that will make the city more affordable for everyday New Yorkers.

Cori Bush & Jamaal Bowman gone: How Latimer won

Some are saying that Squad member Rep. Cori Bush lost in St. Louis because of money and Gaza – they said the same about Squad member Rep. Jamaal Bowman here. That’s how pundits, analysts, and keyboard consultants assessed the biggest primary win against a congressional incumbent in the past decade. I can’t speak for Missouri, but in New York, they couldn’t be more wrong. I should know – I’ve guided George Latimer’s campaigns for almost a decade and managed his winning primary against Bowman in June.

Based on media coverage, you would never know polling showed Latimer starting ahead by 10 points. If you followed social media or national press, you’d never know about his 35 years of public service, goodwill with the electorate, and track record of delivering for constituents.

Our message was, “Real Results, Not Rhetoric.” Staying disciplined to that and executing on campaign fundamentals – voter contact, grassroots organizing, and earned media – while not getting drawn off message by social media chatter were the keys to holding and building our margin of victory.

We also benefited from Latimer being a relentless retail campaigner. Campaign season or not, George meets voters – at senior centers, train stations, civic meetings, everywhere. You will not find a candidate

more dedicated to retail – not to mention at age 70.

We knew local grassroots support mattered, so we secured endorsements normally off the table for a challenger, from every local Democratic committee which endorsed, winning multiple unions (while keeping others neutral), and a broad coalition of local elected officials.

Knowing that outside groups would spend heavily on both sides, we kept our paid communications generally positive. We focused on bread-and-butter wins on Democratic values: infrastructure, gun violence, and abortion rights. Bowman went for the predictable slash-and-burn negatives. But, because we led with a positive message on actual results Latimer had delivered, that inoculated him before the attacks. And when they did attack, voters knew better.

Our communications approach was layered: 18 mail pieces across six different targeted universes, digital video, static digital, radio, and four television ads on core Democratic values. During the News12 debate, George compared Bowman’s approach to his own as “being vocal vs. being local.” Bowman’s message spoke to a national

far-left fundraising network when ours stuck to the basics that Democratic primary voters here care about.

We refused to cede Latino or Black voters. Many campaigns – and consultants – err by ignoring their opponent’s base. However, we knew we could score a respectable percentage in these areas, effectively cutting off Bowman’s chance of winning.

In the 70% minority community of Mount Vernon, George’s hometown, Bowman won 86% of the vote in 2022. This year, that dropped to 65%. As county executive, Latimer delivered the restoration of Memorial Field, a recreational facility important to the community that Bowman dismissed as “just a field.” George didn’t flip 20% because of his position on Gaza – he did by delivering.

We devoted unprecedented resources to Latino outreach, including bilingual mail, canvassing, digital, radio, and video. These efforts succeeded, with George winning 63% in the heavily Latino area of Port Chester where Bowman previously won 52%.

On GOTV weekend, our campaign traveled the district for voter outreach events with union carpenters, public employees, electricians, Democratic committees, and a large Jewish Day of Action. The Bowman campaign held a rally outside the district with national figures which got more headlines than voter contact.

There are two major takeaways from the most expensive primary in congressional history. First, is what is often said but rarely practiced – social media is not real life.

Bowman fed into the misguided belief that likes on X/Twitter are validation that he was resonating with voters, making his campaign about Gaza and George’s pro-Israel supporters. Gaza is important, but with our democracy under attack and an economy that’s squeezing everybody, it’s not where voters were focused. And Bowman’s relentless attacks against AIPAC did more to galvanize voters against him than motivate voters for him.

Second, while our side spent more, both sides had enough money to be heard. But our campaign and message better reflected the whole Democratic Party, a big tent strategy. All of this led to us not only maintaining our original 10-point lead, but expanding it. Latimer won areas Bowman previously won twice – Greenburgh, New Rochelle, Pelham – and was competitive in Yonkers. In the final days, Bowman claimed he had the “many versus the money.” What he failed to realize was we had more of both.

Orsillo has returned to his position as senior vice president for Red Horse Strategies after serving as Democrat George Latimer’s campaign manager for his congressional primary.

Profit, not anchors, corrupted broadcast news

Manhattan: I worked as a video editor in broadcast news for 26 years. Voicer John Di Genio should understand that broadcast news divisions used to be loss leaders when Chet Huntley and David Brinkley were anchors. Their job was to present the news of the day and draw in an audience that would stay tuned for the primetime shows that followed.

That changed in the 1980s, when broadcasters were no longer required to provide public affairs and news programs to obtain a Federal Communications Commission license. Broadcasters soon found that news divisions could be profit centers, just like sports and entertainment. Despite being profit-motivated, the news divisions at ABC, CBS, CNN and NBC still require real evidence before an accusation is ever reported.

My wife worked at Fox News for a year when it was a startup. She found that they had no real standards other than emphasizing the most scandalous and sensational parts of a story to get viewers. Since then, Fox has found that hosts like Sean Hannity (photo) buying into the MAGA mass hysteria keeps the viewership. Presenting theories and rumors as facts amps up the audience.

When sued by Dominion Voting Systems for airing false news about its voting machines, Fox's defense was that it was only presenting opinion and that it didn't believe its audience would be so gullible. Fox was wrong and had to pay out \$787 million. If you want broadcast journalism that you can absolutely trust, then watch the nonprofit "PBS News Hour."



2 gunmen blast away and wound 6 men outside Bronx park

A brazen pair of shooters opened fire on six men outside a Bronx park Wednesday night, police said.

The gunshot victims were hanging out around 8:15 p.m. outside a Bronx building close to St. James Park, near E. 191st St. and Morris Ave., when two men arrived and immediately opened fire.

“There was several people hanging out under the scaffolding, Commanding Officer Patrol Borough Bronx Benjamin Gurley said. “Two males, one with a helmet, one without,

come through St. James Park, they park a scooter in the park and they come up the stairs. They fire approximately nine rounds at the group hanging out, striking six people.”

The victims included five men who are in their 20s and one who is in his 30s.

Injuries varied, police said.

One victim was shot in the stomach, another was hit in the groin. Another victim was struck in the right hand, one in the right leg, one in the torso and one in the right arm.

“When the police arrived, there was two victims at the scene, there was two other victims that fled in a vehicle and

flagged down EMS and was taken to an area hospital. And then we had two other victims that walked into two different hospitals, one in Queens and one in the Bronx,” Gurley said.

None of the injured were in critical condition and all were expected to survive.

“There were shots, lots of shots. I came down and they were loading them into ambulances. It was crazy, yo,” one witness said.

Anyone with information on the suspect is asked to call Crime Stoppers at (800) 577-TIPS. All calls will be kept confidential.

Big increase in French imports of Russian gas draws ire in EU

Shipments of Russian liquefied natural gas to France more than doubled the first half of this year, according to new analyses of trade data, at a time when Europe has tried to pull back from energy purchases that help finance the Kremlin's invasion of Ukraine.

Europe has restricted oil imports from Russia, but natural gas is still allowed. And while companies in France are importing the most, one analysis found EU countries overall imported 7% more Russian LNG, natural gas that has been chilled and liquefied for easier ocean transport, in the first half of this year compared with the same period a year ago.

Oleh Savvitskyi, a founding member of nonprofit Razom We Stand, which campaigns for tougher sanctions on Russian fossil fuels, said the EU's goal of phasing out all Russian fossil fuels by 2027 was “appallingly off track.” He said countries buying Russian LNG are sabotaging the continent's energy transition and adding billions to Russia's war effort.

European governments have said banning Russian gas imports entirely would

send energy and heating bills skyrocketing and industrial users of gas would suffer, too.

The analysis first came from the Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis, a U.S. nonprofit with a goal of speeding the world's transition to more sustainable energy. IEEFA examined data from Kpler, a shipping tracker, and ICIS, a commodity data provider, both of which also provided their own analysis.

The institute said companies imported almost 4.4 billion cubic meters of Russian LNG to France in the first half of this year, compared to more than 2 billion cubic meters in the same period a year ago. The next biggest importers, Spain and Belgium, saw a 1% rise and a 16% decline respectively, IEEFA said.

TotalEnergies, the French energy giant that accounted for the largest share of the imports in a list of cargoes between January and June seen by The Associated Press, said it was bound by contracts signed before Russia's Ukraine invasion. And France's Finance and Economy Ministry told the AP that Houthi rebel attacks on ships moving through the Suez Canal have forced a reshaping of LNG imports — gas from the Middle East can no longer get easily to

Europe, while Russia's route from the Arctic has been unaffected.

The ministry noted that France is one of Europe's main entry points for LNG. France and Spain, with seven each, have the most LNG terminals in Europe.

At the same time France was importing more Russian LNG, it was importing less from other suppliers, including the United States, Angola, Cameroon, Egypt and Nigeria — an amount approaching the jump in Russian LNG, according to the analysis. None of those other countries' LNG exports were affected by Red Sea attacks.

Pricing data for Russian LNG isn't public. It typically sells for a small discount because some buyers don't want it, said Jason Feer, of energy consultants Poten and Partners.

The extra gas isn't being used by French homes or industry. Demand in France fell 9% in the first half of this year compared to last year. Meanwhile, France's export of gas by pipeline to Belgium rose almost 10% in the first six months, according to Kpler. It's not possible to tell how much of that export was Russian LNG.

“What that tells you is people are making money off this trade,” said Feer.

Russia's biggest LNG project is in the

Arctic Circle's Yamal Peninsula, a joint venture with TotalEnergies, which owns 20%. Under a contract signed in 2018, TotalEnergies is committed to buying 4 million tons of gas from there annually.

TotalEnergies said by email that it was legally bound to honor its contracts and will do so “as long as Europeans governments deem Russian gas necessary for the European Union's security of supply.”

Only if new sanctions were imposed could the purchases be suspended, it said. TotalEnergies said its imports of Russian LNG into Europe had actually fallen over the period studied.

An EU Commission spokesman said imports of Russian gas fell considerably between 2021 and 2023.

A temporary volume increase “does not put into question the EU achievements over the past two years,” spokesman Adalbert Jahnz said. “We have diversified our imports and the bulk of the necessary gas is supplied by reliable partners, such as Norway and the U.S.”


But Razom We Stand's Savvitskyi called for the EU to implement a full embargo on the commodity. TotalEnergies “should not have a free pass to keep Europe hooked on Russian gas,” he said.

HEAVEN AND HELL

Yanks grab twin-bill opener vs. Angels, but take pounding in nightcap

With light rain and a crowd to match descending on the Bronx, the Yankees started a traditional doubleheader with a 5-2 win over the Angels on Wednesday. They dropped the nightcap, however, in an 8-2 Angel romp.

The Bronx Bombers struck first in the opener, benefiting from an Austin Wells RBI single and a run-scoring double from Anthony Volpe in the opening inning. The second inning brought another run, as Oswaldo Cabrera went deep with the bases empty for his seventh homer of the season.

"Just trying to produce and move the lineup," said Wells, who has settled in nicely as the latest cleanup hitter.

Two more runs crossed the plate in the fourth, as Alex Verdugo picked up an RBI double before Aaron Judge added a ribbie on a single.

Judge's league-leading RBI count is now up to 104 with August being just a week old.

All of those runs were charged to Angels starter Daniel Davis, who didn't make it through the fourth inning.

Meanwhile, the Halos wasted multiple scoring opportunities with Luis Gil on the mound. The right-hander was erratic from the jump, throwing 30 pitches in the first.

Gil ultimately walked five batters over five innings and a career-high 107 pitches. And yet, the Angels never scored off the starter, who only

allowed two hits.

"Definitely difficult out there today. I'm trying to locate all my pitches," Gil said of gripping the ball. "But you know you have to understand that it happens. And in the moment, you just gotta find it within you to be the best you can be out there."

Gil also struck out six while lowering his ERA to 3.06. While Gil wasn't perfect, Aaron Boone appreciated the pitcher getting through five innings with a second game still to be played.

"It was a bit of a struggle there just to get him in rhythm and stuff," the manager said. "His stuff was good, fastball profile really good. Just a lot of big, long counts. But in the end, he gave us five shutout and kind of grinded his way.

"Good job of battling today by Luis."

The Yankees weren't as fortunate in the second contest.

The visitors battered Will Warren in his second major-league start, tagging the rookie right-hander for eight earned runs over 4.1 innings. Warren also totaled eight hits, three walks and six strikeouts.

Most of the damage against the 25-year-old came in the second inning, as Mickey Moniak started the scoring with an RBI single. Nolan Schanuel then worked a walk with the bases loaded.

Zach Neto, who had already homered in the first game, crushed a grand slam to give the Angels a 6-0 lead before the inning came to an end. The shortstop added a two-run double off Warren in the fourth.






Yanks push Stroman's next start back as he works on mechanics

Marcus Stroman will not make his next start as scheduled.

He was originally supposed to pitch against the Angels tonight. But with rain forcing the Yankees to shuffle their pitching plans for a Wednesday doubleheader and Stroman struggling for an extended stretch, the



right-hander's next start will come against the Rangers on Sunday.

On Wednesday, Aaron Boone said that the Yankees' desire to avoid altering the schedules of multiple starting pitchers factored into that decision. The doubleheader already forced Nestor Cortes to push his next turn from Wednesday to tonight, but Carlos Rodón and Gerrit Cole will stay on schedule with Friday and Saturday starts, respectively.

However, Boone added that he "felt like there would be some benefit in Stro having a couple of bullpens to work through some things."

Boone said Stroman focused on his mechanics during a bullpen session on Tuesday. The pitcher

was not happy with his mechanics after his last start on Friday.

"I'm just very out of sync," Stroman said after allowing seven earned runs over 2.2 innings against the Blue Jays. "Everything's not fluid right now. So it feels very different pitch to pitch."

Stroman said his mechanics could be contributing to the drop in velocity he's experienced this season. While not a power pitcher by any means, his four-seam fastball averaged 92 mph last season. This year, that number is just 89.8

after he averaged 88.8 mph against Toronto.

However, Stroman said he's not worried about the decrease. Neither is Boone.

"I've felt like he's in a pretty good place right now as far as some of the things he's been working through and some of the things (on) video that he's looked at, and then how his bullpen went yesterday," Boone said. "So no, not too concerned. And physically, he feels good."

Stroman added that he's healthy

after his last start.

Regardless, the first-year Yankee has not pitched well in quite some time. Stroman had a 2.60 ERA over 12 starts prior to June, but he's got a mark of 6.32 in his last 10 starts.

He also hasn't completed four innings in two straight outings, a span that's seen him surrender 10 earned runs and 17 hits over six frames.

"I'm not sure, to be honest, but I'm gonna figure it out," Stroman said when asked what is off. "I feel

like I've been in situations like this before. So I always have the confidence to come out of it. It's been a rough last few starts."

Signed over the offseason to be a dependable No. 3 starter, Stroman would not be in the Yankees' rotation if the playoffs began today. While there is still time for him to turn things around, Stroman has also positioned himself as the odd man out when Clarke Schmidt returns from a lat injury.

WALKING JUDGE

A few days removed from the Blue Jays intentionally walking Aaron Judge multiple times, Boone said he hasn't given much thought to whether MLB should change the rules regarding automatic free passes.

He also said that other teams could certainly replicate Toronto's strategy with Judge in the midst of another MVP-type season.

"I don't know that it's a one-off, but I know other teams won't take that approach," Boone said. "It just depends probably club to club, series to series, how they're viewing our hitters, if a guy's hot or those kind of things."

Boone also said he's thought about flip-flopping Juan Soto and Judge in the Nos. 2 and 3 spots. But that's not something the skipper is ready to do, as he doesn't want to upset a good thing.

Ryan Feltner was the opener and allowed one run on a Pete Alonso RBI single in the first inning. Noah Davis was the bulk man and surrendered just one run in four innings of work. Colorado used seven pitchers in total and only Victor Vodnik allowed significant damage in the ninth, surrendering three runs.

Jose Butto came on in relief of Blackburn and tossed a scoreless seventh and eighth inning as the

right-hander's contributions in the bullpen continued.

Edwin Diaz took the ball in relief of Butto in the ninth with the club leading, 5-2. After allowing a leadoff triple, Diaz retired the next three batters in order to secure the save in a series-evening victory.

David Peterson will take the ball for Carlos Mendoza's squad today to try to grab the series victory.

Austin Gomber — 4.66 ERA — will take the ball for Bud Black's squad in the rubber match.

In shocker, U.S. Halls in 400M gold

SAINT-DENIS, France — As the flash of red, white and blue streaked past one sprinter — then the next, then the next — the American man delivering the latest out-of-nowhere comeback on the track said he had one thing going through his mind: “Get home, son! Get home, son!”

Quincy Hall got home in first, then fell to the ground and did snow angels.

Just another routine day in a come-from-behind kind of Olympics for the U.S.A.

Hall reeled in three runners down the stretch of the 400-meter final Wednesday to deliver another heart-stopping win for his country at the Stade de France. He finished in 43.40 seconds, beating Britain’s Matthew Hudson-Smith by .04 seconds; they are now the fourth- and fifth-fastest men in history at the distance.

Hall’s late push came the evening after American Cole Hocker rocked his sport by coming from way back to beat the favorites in a memorable men’s 1500.

Add in Noah Lyles, whose only lead in his 100-meter thriller Sunday came at the exact point he crossed the finish line, and it’s easy to see a pattern.

“I’ve got determination,” Hall said. “That’s what got me to that line. A lot of hurt, a lot of pain.”

The win came an hour after Lyles advanced to the final of the 200 meters despite finishing second to Letsile Tebogo in his semifinal. Lyles will race for the gold medal today.

Things looked bad for Hall, a 26-year-old who starred at South Carolina and who breeds dogs, as the eight sprinters approached the final curve.

He was five meters behind Hudson-Smith and 2012 champion Kirani James, both to his left, and as they rounded the bend, Hall was making up ground on Jareem Richards to his outside. It looked to be shaping up as a good battle for bronze.

With his arms pumping low and wide and his head bobbing, Hall passed them all, then thrust his chest out to beat the Brit. Hall fell to the ground and scissored his arms and legs back and forth — snow angels in 80-degree weather on the bright purple track.

“I just wanted to keep doing what my coach told me to do, just keep driving and keep driving and get home,” Hall said.

Lost in that chaos was Samukonga, the Zambian, who also came from nowhere to take third.

Hall is the first American since LaShawn Merritt in 2008 to capture gold in the one-lap race that the country dominated for decades before that. He joins the likes of Michael Johnson, Jeremy Wariner and Lee Evans among the champions the United States has produced in the most tactical sprint on the track program.

“I knew these guys would get out try to see who they could throw off their race,” he said.

Turns out, not him.

The new champ’s reaction when he crossed the line: “I just won. It’s over. Next four years, I can say I’m Olympic champion.”

Jokic, Serbia stand in Americans’ way today

Team USA has faced little resistance through its first four Olympic games in Paris, beating Serbia, South Sudan, Puerto Rico and Brazil by an average margin of 24.7 points.

The Americans’ 35-point triumph over Brazil in Wednesday’s Olympic quarterfinals, fueled by Devin Booker and Joel Embiid, was their most impressive performance yet.

However, while Team USA

has been dominant in these Olympics, none of its wins have been more impressive than what Serbia, who the Americans will face in the semifinals today, accomplished in its quarterfinal matchup against Australia.

Serbia trailed by 24 points at halftime, until Nikola Joki took over with his third double-double performance. The three-time NBA MVP finished with 21 points, 14 rebounds, eight assists and four steals to lead his country to a 95-90 win in overtime. It went down as the largest

comeback in Olympic basketball history.

Joki continues to prove why many view him as the best player in the world. And after going 1-of-6 from the field the last time Serbia faced the Americans at the start of group play, the versatile big man will be looking for revenge.

“Every game is its own test,” LeBron James said. “No matter what happened in the first two, it’s about what goes down (tonight). So, we need to lock in our film session, lock in during the day and then come out and be

ready to go.”

The Serbs have not been as dominant as the Americans in Paris, but they are battle tested, and that matters. Team USA remains the heavy favorite, but that is no excuse for them to get cocky. Coach Steve Kerr is trying his best to prepare the team accordingly.

“We can’t get lulled to sleep because we beat them twice,” Kerr said. “We have to be prepared for their best effort. We’ve got to think about what they are going to do differently. Joki, I guess he could play 40 minutes. What else

do they have up their sleeve?”

Joki, who has averaged 19.3 points, 11.8 rebounds, 7.5 assists, 2.5 steals and 1.0 blocks in the summer games, played just 13 minutes in Serbia’s loss to the Americans in group play. Expect that to change today. If the Serbs have any hope of pulling a historic upset, any success they have must start and end with Joki.

“I guess we’ll be ready for that,” Joel Embiid said. “If that’s what they think they have to do to try to beat us, then they won’t hesitate to do that.”

Young keeps U.S. women going strong

As expected, Team USA achieved its 59th consecutive win, beating Nigeria in an Olympic quarterfinal matchup at Bercy Arena Wednesday. But how the U.S. got there was a bit different.

Jackie Young's breakout game in the group stage finale against Germany gave her a spot in the starting lineup in Wednesday's 88-74 win. The victory booked the United States a trip into the semifinal round against Australia on Friday.

And Team USA coach Cheryl Reeve — again — benefited from all the tangles the Aces superstar brings to her lineup: lockdown defense and efficient shooting.

Young followed up Sunday's 19-point outing with 15 points on 6-of-10 shooting to go along with three rebounds and two assists. The only thing she couldn't do Wednesday was knock down a trey. She finished the night missing all four of her attempts from downtown.

Young started in place of Diana Taurasi, who got most of her minutes with the second unit. The adjustment paid dividends for both stars: Team USA dominated in minutes Young played with the first unit while Taurasi looked more comfortable flowing with the offense off the bench.

Young started alongside Chelsea Gray, Breanna Stewart, A'ja Wilson and Napheesa Collier. And Taurasi spent most of her first-half minutes with Alyssa Thomas, Jewell Loyd, Sabrina Ionescu and Phoenix Mercury teammate Brittney Griner.

Taurasi's three first-half assists came within the

free-flowing offense that dominated Nigeria all night.

She knocked down only one trey before halftime, but Young and the rest of the superstar roster carried Team USA to a 19-point halftime lead.

Young replaced Taurasi to finish the half and ended the second quarter with a sweet no-look pass to Stewart, who finished with 13 points and six rebounds. It capped a half that immediately justified Reeve's decision to insert Young into the starting lineup. And that dominant play continued in the third, with the Aces superstar contributing to an overall defense that forced Nigeria to miss its first eight shots of the second half.

Nigeria guard Promise Amukamara's corner trey at the 5:30 mark broke the cold spell, but her team trailed by 26 points at that point. The game was already out of reach for the Nigerians, who trailed by as many as 33 points in the loss.

They outscored the Americans, 26-12, in the fourth as Team USA took its foot off the gas.

Wilson finished with a team-high 20 points, 10 rebounds and two blocks. Griner contributed 11 points, three rebounds, one steal and one block. Gray dished four assists to go along with one point. Taurasi shot 1-of-4 from the field and dished four assists. Each member of Team USA scored and Kahleah Copper was the lone American to not record an assist.

Amukamara finished with a team-high 19 points. Any Okonkwo and Ezinne Kalu scored 17 and 16 points, respectively.

After playing for Liberty coach Sandy Brondello during the WNBA season, Ionescu and Stewart will now look to eliminate their coach, who leads Australia, from Olympic competition for a shot at gold.

USA shut out on beach for first time

Miles Partain and Andy Benesh couldn't stop the slide, so the United States is leaving beach volleyball at the Paris Olympics without a medal for the first time.

The 21-14, 21-16 loss to the Qatari team of Cherif Younousse and Ahmed Tijan in the quarterfinals on Wednesday made it the first American medal shutout since the sport was added to the Olympic program at the 1996 Atlanta Games. Partain and Benesh carried American hopes with both women's teams and the other men's team already out of the tournament.

"I wish one of our teams did (win a medal)," Partain said. "We did the best we could."

SUNI LAUGHS AT HERSELF

Suni Lee is good at sports. She's also a very good sport.

The Olympic gymnast poked fun at herself by participating in a viral trend in which athletes share videos showing themselves messing up while competing.

Typically, the videos are accompanied by a caption to the effect of, "Unfortunately I was not selected for the Olympics."

But Lee put her own spin on it.

Lee, 21, posted a TikTok video of her falling during Monday's balance beam final, which prevented her from medaling in the event.

"Unfortunately I was selected for the Olympics," Lee captioned the clip, which included the "Star Banged (Bass Boosted)" background music that many have used in the trend.

MORE WRESTLING GOLD

The most unusual day of Sarah Hildebrandt's

wrestling career ended with her earning an Olympic gold medal.

The American won the 50-kilogram women's category on Wednesday, defeating Yusneylis Guzman Lopez of Cuba, 3-0, in the championship match to become the fourth U.S. woman to win a gold medal.

For a while, she thought she wouldn't even have a gold medal match. Vinesh Phogat of India appeared to reach the finals of the 50-kilogram category after three wins on Tuesday. But United World Wrestling, the sport's governing body, disqualified her after she barely missed weight on Wednesday morning.

Measures such as cutting Phogat's hair weren't enough to shed the necessary weight. Team India said Phogat was 100 grams — about a fifth of a pound — over the weight limit.

Hildebrandt originally thought she had won gold by forfeit. Instead, Guzman Lopez, who had lost to Phogat in a semifinal, was moved up from a bronze medal match.

WEIGHTLIFTING DROUGHT ENDS

Hampton Morris does not have a driver's license. He does have an Olympic bronze medal.

The 20-year-old who trains in his garage at home in Marietta, Georgia, on Wednesday became the first U.S. men's weightlifter to take home a medal of any color at the Games in four decades. Narrowly missing out on a world record that would have gotten him silver, Morris followed Mario Martinez and Guy Carlton from Los Angeles in 1984 as the most recent American men to medal at the Olympics.

"It's amazing that I'm able to leave that kind of mark in the sport," Morris said after finishing third in the men's 61-kilogram division.

NBC has no plans to drop Snoop Dogg while he's hot.


Top executives at the network expressed a strong desire to continue featuring the fan-favorite rapper at future Olympics after he became a viral staple of the Paris Games.

garb to every event he's attended. He swam alongside Michael Phelps in one of his many memorable NBC segments.

"I'm having so much fun," Snoop Dogg, whose real name is Calvin Broadus, recently told The Associated Press.

"This ain't the town to sleep in. This ain't the time to sleep. This is time to be on it like you want it. It's different events happening day and night. I want to be active with everything,

because I love the American athletes and competition. This is what I'm here for."

Known for lasting hip-hop hits such as "Drop It Like It's Hot" and "Gin & Juice," Snoop Dogg co-hosted an NBC show, "Olympic Highlights," with Kevin Hart at the Tokyo Games three years ago.

His standout success on that humor-focused highlights show left NBC wanting more.

"Over the last year and a half,

we got together with Snoop and really brainstormed what this role could be," Molly Solomon, NBC's executive producer and president for Olympics coverage, told The Athletic.

"I called him an Ambassador of Happiness. If you watch his content, everybody wants to meet Snoop, take a selfie with Snoop and just be around Snoop. We've been pleasantly surprised by his popularity, but you never ever underestimate

Snoop Dogg."

The 2026 Winter Olympics are set to take place in Italy.

The 2028 Summer Games, meanwhile, are slated for Los Angeles – where Snoop Dogg is from.

"This opportunity was nothing but a chance for me to show the world what it's supposed to look like," Snoop Dogg told The AP, "when you put the right person in the right environment."

Backup Lock is Giant priority in preseason opener against Detroit

Daniel Jones and the Giants' starters are not expected to play in Thursday night's preseason opener against the Detroit Lions at MetLife Stadium, although head coach Brian Daboll has not officially revealed his plans.

But there are still plenty of players and developments to watch closely as Joe Schoen's third team begins to take shape. Here are five things to watch in the Giants' first of three exhibitions before the games start to count.

1. DREW LOCK'S PLAY

Lock, 27, the Giants' free agent signing and No. 2 quarterback, has not pushed Jones at all in camp after taking all of the spring first-team reps while Jones rehabbed his knee. Lock has made some good throws downfield running the second-team offense, and he has had recent success with on-target slant routes to get his speedy slot receivers in space. But he needs to instill more confidence in the Giants' lone backup plan to Jones.

Because although Lock has underwhelmed, he is still much more capable

than fan favorite Tommy DeVito, who took a sack without throwing the ball on Tuesday despite wearing a non-contact jersey. DeVito probably will play more than Lock does Thursday, but Lock's performance is what matters in Daboll's first game as the team's new permanent play-caller.

2. ALLEN ROBINSON'S SURGE

Robinson, 30, a veteran with pedigree, has come on strong the last week playing with Lock and the second-team offense. If he keeps producing, it will be interesting to see where he fits in the wide receiver room, where Schoen kept seven on cutdown day in 2022 and six in 2023.

The Giants' clear top four are Malik Nabers, Darius Slayton, Wan'Dale Robinson and Jalin Hyatt, with returner and backup slot Gunner Olszewski making five. Isaiah Hodgins is ahead of Robinson on the depth chart right now, which makes six. And special teamer Miles Boykin may crack the lineup as a seventh.

But could Robinson turn this into a roster spot battle with Hodgins, since neither guy plays special teams? Or would Schoen keep seven and tab Robinson over Boykin, retaining six wideouts who only help on

Fights cost Big Blue, Lions \$200K each

The NFL has fined the Giants and Detroit Lions organizations \$200,000 each for the numerous fights that broke out at the teams' joint practices Monday and Tuesday in East Rutherford, N.J.

The league announced the discipline Wednesday morning.

The NFL had reminded all 32 teams in a July memo that fighting and unprofessional conduct at joint practices would not be tolerated. But head coaches Brian Daboll and Dan Campbell were

unable to keep their teams under control in New Jersey this week.

Giants GM Joe Schoen actually ended up on the field near a scrum during Monday's red zone period trying to break up one of the dust-ups.

"From my position I just want to get good work and everybody come out of practice healthy. That's the biggest concern for me," Schoen said on NFL Network Tuesday.


The third-year GM took the opportunity to clear up that he was not actually involved in the fighting.

"We were doing a red zone period. Our whole team was

on one side, theirs was on another. So I was right there by the ruckus or whatever was going on," the Giants GM said of the surreal scene. "I was just trying to keep our guys back. So I think it got a little bit overblown in terms of my involvement, and I know my strengths and weaknesses. So I was just trying to keep our guys back. No way was I getting involved."

The Giants and Lions will face each other Thursday night in their preseason opener at MetLife Stadium. They do not play each other this regular season.

That's too bad.

offense? That latter scenario seems unrealistic since the top four are so clearly defined, and there won't be many snaps left on offense. But it will be interesting to watch.

3. THE CORNER CONUNDRUM

The Giants' corner position is one of the most concerning on the roster. Second-year pro Deonte Banks is being asked to ascend and take on shutdown No. 1 duties in a new defensive scheme, which will be a challenge in itself. And then there is nothing certain behind him.

Veteran Nick McCloud already is claiming first-team snaps from Cor'Dale Flott as the No. 2 corner, which was the inevitable conclusion all along. But that rotation doesn't instill confidence in a permanent solution, and former slot Darnay Holmes and second-year pro Tre Hawkins III are now running as the team's top reserves on the outside behind them.

Schoen continues to churn the waiver wire and free agent bargain bin for players who can give coordinator Shane Bowen a better secondary. In the meantime, these are the games where guys like David Long Jr., Breon Borders and Tre Herndon (slot) can prove their worth. Long has made some plays in practice. This game could reinforce, however, how thin the Giants are on the back end.

4. THE ROOKIES' DEBUTS

First-round pick Malik Nabers might not play in this game if the starters sit, but the rest of the Giants' rookies are expected to play on Thursday.

Second-round safety Tyler Nubin will be a player to watch closely since he only began practicing several days ago and needs to get up to speed quickly to be a factor — if not a starter — for Week 1. And both rookie running backs warrant a close look: fifth-round pick Tyrone Tracy Jr. and undrafted rookie Dante "Turbo" Miller.

If the Giants made the roster today, Tracy and Miller both would deserve to make the team ahead of second-year pro Eric Gray, a Schoen fifth-round pick last year. Miller has been explosive all camp and also offers ability on kick returns.

Defensive tackle Elijah Chatman already

has earned snaps with the first-team defense, meanwhile, so his preseason game evaluation will be important. Undrafted guard Jake Kubas and wide receiver Ayir Asante are also intriguing prospects with some upside.

That's obviously in addition to third-round slot corner Dru Phillips, who has been physical and impressive, and fourth-round tight end Theo Johnson, who looks like he'll be the Giants' No. 1 tight end sooner rather than later.

5. THE NEW KICKOFF RULE

Here is a promise: fans at MetLife Stadium will walk away Thursday night both intrigued and confused by the new kickoff rule.

The NFL doesn't want fans going to the refrigerator for a sandwich on every kickoff knowing that the ball is just getting kicked out of the end zone. So the league adopted an experimental kickoff format this year, which was already tried out by the XFL, to try to force teams to kick the ball into the field of play rather than for an automatic touchback.

But this is the first time the league is using the new rule in games, so everyone's understanding and execution of it is evolving.

The new setup will pack at least 19 of the 22 players on the field within 10 yards of each other

on the receiving team's side of the field between the 30 and 40-yard lines.

Ten of the kicking team players will line up on the receiving team's 40-yard line. The receiving team can put nine or 10 players in a "set-up zone" between its 30 and 35 yard lines and up to two returners in the "landing zone" between the goal line and the 20.

And none of those 19 or 20 players on the 40 or in the "set-up zone" are allowed to move from when the official blows his whistle to initiate the play until the ball is caught by a returner or hits the ground.

The kicker will kick the ball off from the opposite 35 and will be incentivized to keep the kick in play: Any kick that lands short of the 20 will be automatically spotted at the 40. And touchbacks will give the offense the ball on the 30-yard line — or the 20 if the ball hits in play and rolls in.

Piece of cake, right?



Joint practices a chance for Jets to take command

The Jets will hold their first joint training camp practice on Thursday when the Commanders visit Florham Park ahead of their preseason opener on Saturday.

With many starters expected to sit out the preseason clash, Thursday's practice will be a chance to assess both teams' progress two weeks into training camp.

"It's a good opportunity after a long time going up against each other and seeing the same faces and playing against your teammates," Jets tight end Tyler Conklin said.

"Work your craft against different schemes and different people. I think it's a really good opportunity for us as a group offensively. Just come together and keep building on what we've been doing throughout the first two weeks of camp."

A day before participating in a walkthrough on Wednesday because of inclement weather, three fights broke out at Jets practice on Tuesday. Following the third one, Jets coach Robert Saleh huddled the team in the middle of the field to tell his players to keep their cool.

Miles away in East Rutherford, the Giants and Lions had multiple fights at their joint practices on Monday and Tuesday. That resulted in the NFL fining both teams \$200,000 as the league is emphasizing having clean joint practices.

Last month, all teams were reminded in a memo that "fighting and unprofessional conduct at joint practices would not be tolerated."

"You know our rule here, we do our best not to punch," Saleh said. "I know we haven't been great at it here since yesterday, but that's the big rule, just don't punch. You're going to get into these shoving matches, but like I've told our guys, if you throw a punch, you're kicked out of a game, so don't do it in practice."

"You know, as a coach you always want your team playing with a little bit of edge. [Are the] fights a result of guys going too hard, or is it a result of guys playing cheap? And if the frustration is just because one guy is going so hard and you're getting your butt kicked, so you have this natural reaction to fight back and you start swinging, good, you probably needed that."

"Fights happen for many different

reasons," Saleh continued, "but if it's because you're competing your tail off and your guys are just sick of competing because it's been 10 days or however long it's been and you're sick of seeing this big, ugly human in front of you and you're going back and forth battling every day, if that's the result of why there's a scuffle that's fine, that's really not a big deal to me."

Along with keeping the joint practices drama-free, the Jets also need to start seeing more from their offense.

Since the Jets put the pads on for the first time during training camp, their offense has been inconsistent. Outside of their July 31 practice in which Aaron Rodgers threw six red zone touchdown passes, the Jets have suffered from plenty of miscues and un-

even performances.

During Tuesday's practice, Rodgers completed 9 of 16 passes, but he was sacked three times and dealt with a lot of pressure. Considering the Jets' defense has been a top-five unit the last couple of seasons, it is no surprise the offense has had growing pains.

WILLIAMS OFF PUP LIST

WR Mike Williams is one step closer to being ready for Week 1.

On Wednesday, Williams was activated from the physically unable to perform list after passing his physical.

Williams, who signed a one-year deal with the Jets in March, tore his ACL during the third game of the 2023 season when he was a member of the Chargers. Before his injury, Williams had 19 catches for 249 yards and a TD.

Because he began training camp on the PUP list, Williams can start practicing after being medically cleared. Throughout training camp, Jets head coach Robert Saleh told reporters that Williams was on a similar timeline as running back Breece Hall last year. Hall tore his ACL during the 2022 season and was activated from the PUP list on Aug. 15.

A month before their opener against the 49ers on Monday Night Football on Sept. 9, the Jets will slowly work Williams back.

"That's my goal, to be able to, you know, go out there, play this season and give it my all," Williams said in June. "Give this team a chance to win the big thing"
