# 'Reeks of retaliation'

## Probation chief illegally demoted aide who asked not to carry firearm: suit

City Probation Commissioner Juanita Holmes violated Civil Service law when she demoted an assistant commissioner in charge of the Bronx who asked not to have to wear a firearm while on duty, court papers allege.

In one of her earliest acts after moving to the Probation Department from the NYPD in 2023, Holmes ordered all probation officers to carry firearms. The edict caused a stir because many officers felt that they didn't need to be armed to do their jobs.

In March, Assistant Commissioner Lisa D'Ambrosio — technically an administrative probation officer — asked to be exempt from the edict because both of her hands were injured, according to the lawsuit she filed last month.

In May, D'Ambrosio put in for retirement after not getting a response from Holmes. Two days later, she was demoted and her \$120,000 salary was slashed 31% to roughly \$82,500.

"The lack of dignity and respect from department leadership has shifted the way I view my 34 years of dedicated Civil Service and achievements," D'Ambrosio told the Daily News. "After three decades of service, seeing a culture of hostility overshadow opportunities for community change is disheartening. It reflects a toxic environment that threatens employee morale and public safety."

D'Ambrosio filed suit in July with another senior probation official, Karen Armstrong, the assistant commissioner in Queens, who alleges that Holmes similarly demoted her and slashed her salary by the same 31% after she asked for medical leave to have surgery.

The duo, each of whom served the agency for 34 years, are seeking

\$10 million in damages.

"We didn't deserve to be treated like this," Armstrong told The News. "We served this city with dignity and were treated like we did something wrong."

Their lawyer Edward Pichardo said the commissioner "seems to be behaving in a very authoritarian manner. She appears to perceive any taking of leave as disloyal. It's the loss of a wealth of experience and all reeks of retaliation."

The mayor's press office and the city Law Department didn't respond to a request for comment.

In a statement, the city Probation Department said it was "unable to comment on pending litigation but remains steadfast in its commitment to cultivating a diverse, equitable and inclusive workplace."

The lawsuits come at a time the department is facing continued staffing challenges. The department has 389 officers and 169 supervising probation officers, roughly 45% fewer probation officers than it did in 2019, Holmes said in May.

Dalvanie Powell, president of the probation officers union, said in a June letter that the shortfall forced the agency to sharply reduce the number of officers in Family Court and shift them to supervising adults. "The reduced number of staff has significantly increased the caseload of my members. While public safety is our primary concern, so is the burnout that my dedicated members are feeling," Powell wrote. "This operational situation is not acceptable."

According to the lawsuit, Armstrong and D'Ambrosio were also transferred out of the boroughs they have been working in for many years. D'Ambrosio was moved to Queens, while Armstrong was moved to the Bronx.

Armstrong is currently out on medical leave, while D'Ambrosio is about to retire, Pichardo said.



# FISH POND STIRS FLAP

## Leaky B'klyn hydrant inspires mini-aquarium, & 'rescue heist'

A group of Brooklyn men created a makeshift goldfish pond in a puddle pooling under a leaky hydrant, delighting some locals, and concerning others who fear the fish will not survive.

Longtime Bedford-Stuyvesant resident Hajj-Malik Lovick, 47, said he and some friends were tired of looking at an often-leaking hydrant on Hancock St. near Tompkins Ave. — and decided to reinvent the inch-and-a-half-deep puddle below it into a community aquarium.

"It was like a condemned Johnny pump. Why not make it better than leaving things that look broken? Why not fix it?" Lovick said as he sat in a lawn chair guarding the pond.

The community pond has expanded, Lovick said, with people coming from different boroughs and even Connecticut to contribute.

"People give us stuff. ... They drop off shells. They drop off fish, food, stuff like that," he said. "We just do better and better with it every day for the kids. They stop by, they love it, and we feel good for what we did for the community, to make it better."

"[I want to] make it a better place as much as I can," Lovick said of his neighborhood.

However, news stories and videos of the aquarium circulating on social media have drawn the attention of local animal rights advocates and city officials, who are concerned the fish will not survive under the hydrant.

City Department of Environmental Protection workers have shut the hydrant off several times since Thursday only to find someone continues to turn it back on after they leave, officials said.

"There are real safety concerns with damaged or leaking hydrants; it can impact the availability of water for fire emergencies, and it can impact water pressure and cause supply issues for the neighborhood," said Beth DeFalco, the department's deputy commissioner for public affairs and communications. "We love goldfish also, but we know there is a better home for them than on a sidewalk."

Environmental Protection Department workers have asked the men to rehome the fish, to no avail.

A 29-year-old neighbor who keeps fish as a hobby believes the small tree bed is overpopulated with fish, putting them at risk of catching life-threatening diseases.

"This is not a sustainable project and eventually this fish puddle 'fish pond' is going to either be cut off by the city, dry out, or these fish are going to start dying in droves," said the local woman who only gave her name as Emily.

Lovick said the fish are well taken care of.

"They've been living for two weeks now. ... They've been fed every day, three

times a day. We take care of them and clean out the pond and make sure there's no cigarette butts and rubbish," he said. "The fish been living longer than any goldfish ever lived right now. So there's nothing wrong with it."

Experts say the environment poses plenty of risks for the fish.

"There is a possibility they will survive, although it's certainly not an ideal habitat," veterinarian Julius Tepper, who runs the Long Island Fish Hospital, told NBC4 New York. "You've got issues with pollution that could be a problem. You've got issues with predatory birds."

Emily said she voiced her concerns to one of the fish owners last Monday when

she first ventured to the hydrant. The man dismissed her and declined her offer for tanks to rehome the fish.

In the early-morning hours of Wednesday Emily returned with a friend, equipped with plastic bags and a fish net. The pair scooped roughly 35 fish from the tree bed in what animal advocates have dubbed the "late-night rescue heist."

Emily said several other smaller rescues were coordinated on social media with other concerned residents, leaving her with 70 goldfish.

Roughly 30 fish were rehomed to locals, while Emily continues to care for the remaining 40.

"Why would you want to steal \$8 fish? I

told her, 'I will buy her some fish,' Lovick said of Emily. "That's just something for us. And to give back to the kids and back to the neighborhood!"

Now the men guard their pond around the clock and have even installed security cameras to "make sure nobody puts their hand in there," Lovick said.

On Saturday, passersby chimed in, largely in support of the makeshift community pond.

"This fire hydrant has been leaking for a long time," said 37-year-old block resident Shay. "We have an aquarium now in Bed-Stuy. I think it's a positive attraction because [the hydrant] was never fixed. So if they're gonna utilize it in that way for right now, why not? We got bigger fish to fry in Bed-Stuy."

One woman brought her 1-year-old son to see the colorful fish on Saturday.

"This is his first time and he loves it. He loves fish," local mother Taylor Evans said. "Might as well bring out the nature in the community."

Lovick said they plan to distribute the fish to neighborhood kids when temperatures drop in September.

Meanwhile, Emily said she hopes the community can find a sustainable solution to house the well-loved fish, suggesting a container pond in a nearby community garden.

"I just want to see these guys have something nice," she said, "without having to walk past a puddle of 100 fish gasping in their own waste and dying."

# A LIFE CUT SHORT BY A STREET FIGHT

Bx. man dies year after clash from seizures triggered by brain injury

A Bronx man beaten in the head in a street fight died more than a year later from seizures brought on by the brain injury he suffered — and now his death has been ruled a homicide, the Daily News has learned.

The NYPD is asking the public's help identifying the killer who pummeled Jose Nicholas Peña during an argument near E. 170th St. and Jerome Ave. around 11:45

p.m. on Aug. 31, 2022.

Peña, the dad of a girl, was just a few blocks from the apartment building where he lived and worked as the super when he was attacked.

"He's a hardworking person," the victim's brother Guillermo Peña-Matos, 34, told the Daily News. "All he wanted to do is just work and support his family."

A day or two after he was attacked, Peña took himself to Jacobi Medical Center, where he was admitted overnight.

"He was given notice that because of the injury he is inflicted with seizures," his brother said of the hospital stay. "He never

had it before."

Peña soon resumed normal life but was never quite the same, his loved ones say, and he died suddenly last Dec. 31 at age 34.

"My brother was doing his usually business and it happened, like how any seizure is. No one expects it," his brother said of Peña's death. "He was ready for a new job, he was ready for a lot of things. It was sudden."

The city medical examiner deemed Peña's case a homicide last month after an autopsy determined he died of posttraumatic seizure disorder due to blunt force head trauma he suffered during the street

clash.

At the time of his death, Peña had recently started working security for a high-end building in Manhattan.

"He was proud," Peña's pal Eric Dejesus said, describing his last interaction with the victim shortly before Peña's death.

"He was like, 'Hey, I just started a new job! I don't smoke Newport anymore because I work with a whole bunch of white people downtown. So you want a Marlboro?' I said sure and I took it from him. The next day or the day after my friend tells me he passed away."

"Literally it was one day to the next," a

still stunned Dejesus added. “Hey, Bro, I just got a job. You want a cigarette?” Two days later, gone. ... He looked like he was good, but you never know what’s [going on] inside. He looked like the normal Jose.”

But Dejesus witnessed the aftermath of one of Peña’s sudden seizures about a month before his death.

“He was sitting down like this talking,” Dejesus said. “Then I turned my back, went into the store. When I came out he was on the floor. His eyes were rolling back, half in, half out.”

“I called the cops and the ambulance,” he added. “One of the people that was

around said, ‘His name is Jose and he suffers from seizures.’ That’s how I found out he had seizures.”

The attack also affected the victim’s personality.

“He was real paranoid in the sense of who might attack next,” Dejesus said. “But that still didn’t affect who he helped and stuff. He was still a nice guy. He helped everybody out. ... Above all, he was a really good-hearted good person. Good soul.”

“He never really held a grudge,” Dejesus added. “Life is too short. He wanted you to enjoy the little things. The little things is what counted. Being able to wake up every

day is something to be grateful for – that’s what he was grateful for at least. Every day.”

For years, before getting the new job in Manhattan, Peña worked security and helped out at the Stop and Go Smoke Shop on Jerome Ave. near W. 170th St., just a block from where he was attacked.

Eight months after his death, a large photo of the victim drinking a beer is still displayed at the store, part of a memorial created for him.

The victim’s brother created a GoFundMe that raised more than \$7,000 to cover the victim’s funeral expenses.

“All he cared about was making sure that his only daughter, Eliani, was taken care of,” Peña-Matos wrote. “He will always be remembered as the man that will go to bat to make sure that you are OK.”

“He was an avid fan of Batman animated series, Dragon Ball Z, and many other animés,” the brother added.

“We would have hourlong discussions on which is the best anime of all time. Was it Yu Yu Hakusho? Was it Dragon Ball Z? Was it Sailor Moon??? He was always a goofball, making sure that he puts a smile on the faces of his daughter and his nephew, my son.”

# Chuck: Forget it, MAGA!

## Meat of the matter is, I won't allow cuts to CDC amid listeria outbreak

Chuck's got a beef with this proposal. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer plans to block a Republican budget that would cut \$1.8 billion from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's budget amid a listeria outbreak.

Schumer (D-N.Y.) announced Sunday that the proposal would go nowhere as long as he remains majority leader in the Senate.

"I am here today amid active federal budget negotiations to say that I will not let MAGA cold cuts to the CDC amid this deli meat listeria outbreak pass the Senate," Schumer said.

Listeria connected to Boar's Head deli meats has been tracked and traced across the Midwest and East Coast, according to the CDC.

Of 43 hospitalizations, at least four were in New York City and at least two more occurred on Long Island. In total, 14 New Yorkers were hospitalized, according to CDC data.

Three people have died from the outbreak, in New Jersey, Illinois and Virginia. A few New Jersey residents have also been hospitalized.

Listeria is particularly dangerous to people who are pregnant, older than 65 or immunocompromised. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches and tiredness, and they can develop anytime within two weeks of

contact with the bacteria.

"New York is partially an epicenter of the sickness with the listeria outbreak, and so I have asked the CDC to focus a special team here to address the situation, and they have and I laud their efforts and praise this grueling work," Schumer said.

The budget cuts referenced by Schumer were included in a 2025 fiscal year proposal from the Republican-led House Appropriations Committee. The committee approved the bill along party lines back on July 10. It includes a 22% cut to the CDC budget, amounting to about \$1.8 billion.

Schumer pointed out that CDC funding allows the agency to track and limit outbreaks such as the ongoing listeria problem. Boar's Head recalled about

7 million pounds of deli meat on July 30, expanding an initial recall from July 25. The outbreak was first detected in May.

While Congress is currently in the middle of its August recess, budget negotiations are expected to become tense, with Republicans controlling the House while Democrats hold a slim advantage in the Senate. The process will also take place during the hotly contested presidential race between Donald Trump and Kamala Harris.

The CDC was far from the only organization targeted for budget cuts in the Republican proposal, which also focuses on the Social Security Administration and federal student aid programs, among other social agencies.



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# FRANKLIN SHUTTLE

## It's back to full service after bridge replacement on B'klyn

Full service is set to resume Monday on the Franklin Ave. shuttle in Brooklyn, following a monthlong closure of the four-stop line's northern terminal to replace a damaged portion of the elevated track.

The work — which replaced a half-block long bridge at St. Marks Ave. in Crown Heights along with new tracks and a new third rail — is the first major construction on the line since it was renovated in the 1990s after a decade's long community campaign to save the line from demolition.

"In our system, we inspect, on a regular basis, every inch of structure, all the time," Jamie Torres-Springer, the MTA's head of construction and development, told the Daily News during a tour of the worksite last week.

Those inspections found that the steel of a small, 1905-vintage truss bridge, running between apartment buildings between St. Marks Ave. and Prospect Place, was corroded enough to warrant replacement.

"We could fix this, try to rehabilitate all this steel, but in the end it made more sense just to replace the old truss [bridge]," Torres-Springer said.

That work has taken a little over a month, as crews with construction firm RCC built a new, girder-style bridge in the 1905 structure's place, and ran new tracks, walkways and third rails over St. Marks Ave.

The Franklin Ave. shuttle, which runs from the southern end of Prospect Park up to the Franklin Ave. station at Fulton St. in Bedford-Stuyvesant, has been running a truncated route for the past month, terminating at the Park Place station just south of the work site.

"We had to replace this entire thing because the structure deteriorated," Torres-Springer said. "We were not able to maintain the structure's condition over the years."

The construction boss said his department will be budgeting for more structural repair work in the coming five-year capital plan, in an effort to address structural defects before then necessitate major service shutdowns.

Torres-Springer's team has identified roughly 60,000 such defects throughout the subway system that it aims to address. The department currently plans to address rust and apply overcoating to 19 miles of the system's 65 elevated miles.

The MTA shut the line down Saturday and Sunday to run test trains along the length of the Franklin Ave. line, ahead of a planned 5 a.m. reopening of full service Monday morning.

Some 15,000 straphangers ride the Franklin Ave. shuttle on the average weekday, according to MTA data.

Glancing at a subway map, it's easy to dismiss the Franklin Ave. shuttle — one



of three such lines too short to warrant its own numbered or lettered bullet from the Transit Authority — as a relatively inconsequential piece of Gotham's massive subway system.

But the four-stop, mile-and-a-half line is an important one in rapid-transit history.

The Franklin Ave. shuttle predates the subway by 36 years, having begun life in 1878 as a portion of the Brooklyn, Flatbush and Coney Island Railroad. The brick tunnel under Eastern Parkway just north of the shuttle's Botanic Garden stop is the oldest tunnel in the city subway system.

The line became part of the consolidated Brooklyn Rapid Transit company in 1896, and it was a BRT train of wooden cars on what would become the Franklin Ave. line that flew off the rails in 1918, slamming

into the side of a tunnel under Malbone St. — now Empire Blvd. — just north of the Prospect Park station.

That wreck killed at least 93 passengers — it is, to date, the deadliest in New York City subway history — and forced changes in subway car construction, signaling and controls.

But for those Crown Heights residents who rely on the shuttle to connect them to the city — riders can transfer to eight other subway lines across the shuttle's four stops — the shuttle's most historic chapter was the fight to keep it standing.

"It's the glue that holds the community together," said Fred Monderson, 75, who's lived on Park Place in Crown Heights for 47 years.

Monderson, a three-decade veteran of

Brooklyn's Community Board 8, was one of a broad coalition of activists who fought to save the shuttle from being decommissioned in the 1980s and '90s.

At that time, much of elevated structure carrying the train north of Park Place was more than 75 years old — remnants of a 1905 overhaul whose structures were quickly showing their age.

By the early '80s, The News reported on the shuttle under the headline "Doomsday Express," given the woeful state of the track. Others called it the "Ghost Train," given how infrequently it arrived.

"Go for a ride on the Franklin Ave. shuttle in Brooklyn," one 1981 article in this paper began, "and see the death of the subway system."

Cracks in the retaining walls under

the Franklin Ave. station, rickety wooden stations, pervasive fare jumping, and a \$38 million repair bill led MTA brass to suggest closing the line and replacing it with a bus route in the early 1980s.

"There was significant deterioration of the line," recalled Joe Rappaport, who headed the Straphangers' Campaign, a riders advocacy group, in the 1980s and '90s.

When the MTA proposed to take the line down, a broad coalition of local community boards, transit advocates, business groups and a local church pushed back.

"We went to an MTA board meeting with students from one of the local high schools," Rappaport recalled. "We had tombstones with the names of the stations. The MTA chairman at the time

said, 'Well, you could take the bus.'"

Monderson and his fellow activists felt that Crown Heights and Bedford-Stuyvesant, the historically Black neighborhoods served by the shuttle, were less important to the MTA's leadership at the time.

"The MTA was downsizing, they were cutting service in the minority communities," he said.

The campaign to save the shuttle took nearly two decades, and snowballed to include local elected officials and politicians in Albany. It involved leafleting campaigns calling attention to maintenance money being spent at stations that weren't nearly as neglected as the shuttle stops.

In the end, the coalition won, and

transit officials agreed to rebuild the line in the mid '90s.

"The MTA is not easily convinced," Monderson said. "But if you mobilize — do you know how many hearings I went to, to speak at?"

"Part of it was, I think we wore the MTA down," Rappaport said.

The Franklin Ave. shuttle was shut down for a major overhaul in July 1998.

By the time the line reopened in 1999 — minus a decommissioned and ultimately dismantled station at Dean St. — the repair costs the MTA had sought to avoid in the 1980s had ballooned to \$74 million.

From the tracks above St. Marks Ave., last week, a News reporter could make out the skeletal structure of a new residential tower taking shape along Atlantic

Ave. to the north.

Directly east — close enough for the construction equipment to shake as the shuttle's R-68 cars lumber by — another new residential building was being erected near Franklin Ave.

From the shuttle's fresh tracks, views of new apartments — one of New York's oldest stories: build transit and new buildings will come.

As for Monderson, he said he doesn't ride the shuttle much anymore these days.

"I'm not as swift as I used to be," he said with a laugh.

The train is still on his mind, though. Monderson said he wants to lobby the MTA once again — this time for a plaque along the line to recognize the community activists who kept it alive.

# Appointment of new FDNY commissioner expected today

Businessman and philanthropist Robert Tucker is expected to be named the new city fire commissioner on Monday, according to multiple sources with knowledge of the appointment.

Tucker, 51, is the CEO of a private security company and a longstanding member of the board of directors of the FDNY Foundation, the official not-for-profit organization of the FDNY. He will replace outgoing Fire Commissioner Laura Kavanagh — appointed in 2022 as the first woman to serve as commissioner since the department’s creation in 1865.

The announcement of the new FDNY leader is expected to take place at 11 a.m. at the Fire Academy on Randalls Island.

Although multiple sources at the FDNY union and a former city official told the Daily News that Tucker was widely expected to be tapped as commissioner, the mayor’s office was equivocal when asked for comment Sunday night.

“As we always say, no appointment



is made until it is announced,” Mayor Adams’ spokesman Fabien Levy told The News.

An FDNY spokesman directed all inquiries to City Hall.

Tucker is currently the CEO of T&M protection resources, a private firm that offers security, intelligence and protection resources, according to the company’s website.

Although he has not been a firefighter, Tucker is a self-proclaimed “fire buff”

whose ties to the FDNY run deep.

“I used to chase fire engines on my bicycle” as a youngster growing up in Manhattan, Tucker said in his FDNY Foundation biography.

After meeting former Fire Commissioner Joseph Spinnato, Tucker got his first job as a teenager working in the FDNY communications office, at the time located in Central Park.

After college, Tucker attended Pace University School of Law.

Before joining T&M in 1999, he worked as special counsel to the Queens district attorney.

Tucker became involved in fundraising for the FDNY after the terror attacks on the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001.

“I wanted to be more involved, to try to leverage my contacts and my love of the department with something meaningful. I figured the best way to do that was to become a part of the foundation’s board of directors,” Tucker said in his FDNY Foundation biography.

In 2014, he was named an honorary fire commissioner for his work at the foundation, which previously named him an honorary assistant chief in 2010 and an honorary deputy chief.

Tucker formerly served on Adams’ public safety and justice transition committee.

He was first considered for the job in 2022, but the position ultimately went to Kavanagh, who finished her term Wednesday.

Kavanagh’s resignation comes as she and the city are facing a lawsuit from multiple senior officials who claim to have been the victims of age discrimination.

# Four hours of Bronx motorcycle horror: 3 killed in 2 crashes

Three men were killed in a pair of motorcycle crashes less than four hours apart in the Bronx – including an early Sunday wreck where two riders slammed into a tree, police said.

The mayhem began when 21-year-old Tramaine Womack, riding a 2005 Suzuki north on St. Anns Ave. in Melrose, sped through a steady red light on E. 156th St. about 9 p.m. on Saturday, police said.

Womack crashed into a 2015 Toyota RAV4 going east on E. 156th St. and suffered severe body trauma, cops said. Medics took him to Lincoln Hospital, but he couldn't be saved.

The victim was just a few blocks from his home in the McKinley Houses when he crashed.

"I'm feeling hurt," Womack's mother told the Daily News. "My son was a happy, loving person. He did not like arguments. No fights, nothing. He was not in the game."

"He never bothered nobody," she added. "My son always was respectful. Take the garbage out. Go shopping and come back in the house."

The SUV driver, a 55-year-old woman, suffered minor injuries, as did her passengers, a 56-year-old woman and a 21-year-old man, cops said. The driver faced no immediate charges.

Womack, who leaves behind 10 siblings, was planning for his 22nd birthday on Sept. 11.

"The last time I spoke to my son yesterday



it was 5:30 [p.m.]. He was ordering a birthday outfit," his mother said.

"He said, 'Mom, I'm gonna wear this nice outfit.' Because my son liked designer clothes. He loved expensive clothes. His outfit was like \$5,000. He already ordered it. He liked expensive sneakers. Expensive shoes. He said, 'Ma, you know I'm going to be fly for my birthday.'"

"We was in the kitchen," she added. "He started pinching my cheeks. He said, 'Ma, you got the old cheeks.'"

About 4 miles from where Womack crashed, two young men riding a motorcycle struck a tree in an industrial area near Commerce and Newbold Aves. about 12:45 a.m. on Sunday, cops said.

Both men died at the scene. One victim was 21. His name was not immediately released.

Cops were working to identify the other victim, believed to be in his 20s.

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# Too close for comfort

## Film 'War Game' imagines U.S. on brink of civil war in Jan. 2025

Election results are contested. Far-right extremist groups are plotting to overthrow the Electoral College vote count. Protesters gather in Washington. TV news screens blare: "Capitol in Chaos."

In the White House Situation Room, the president gathers with advisers to consider their next moves. Only this is not Jan. 6, 2021, but a simulation of an insurrection very much like it.

In January 2023, a group of former generals, senators, governors and civil servants gathered in a Washington hotel to run an exercise, a war game, to experience the U.S. on the brink of civil war in January 2025 and, maybe, to find a few ways to avoid a widely shared nightmare.

In this queasily familiar but slightly alternate reality, the incumbent is President John Hotham, played by former Montana Gov. Steve Bullock.

"On the one hand, I'm fairly used to dealing with challenging situations," Bullock said in an interview. "Here, it really was between the fog of war and the fog of disinformation, trying to figure out what was right not just for today but for tomorrow. It was definitely a tense six hours."

For those six hours, Bullock and a group of government and military officials — Democrats and Republicans, many of them highly accomplished — lived through a U.S. coup. And throughout it, directors Tony Gerber and Jesse Moss were there with cameras to catch everything that unfolded.

Their film, "War Game," in theaters now, is an almost-real political thriller that marries improvisational theater and dystopian science fiction to add up to a sobering documentary about our current political reality. It's a "Dr. Strangelove" for today.

"I couldn't help but feel that it was prophetic, that it would be a kind of crystal ball that would help us peer into a possible future, perhaps to avoid it," Moss says. "We didn't know if the country would descend into civil war."

The game was conceived by Vet Voice Foundation, a nonprofit for veterans. The group was motivated by the fact that military veterans were prominent in the Jan. 6 riot at the Capitol; nearly 1 in 5 of those who faced charges for their involvement had a military background.

A particular inspiration was a Washington Post op-ed by retired U.S. generals who wrote that they were "chilled to our bones" at the possibility of a successful coup and raised the concern that rogue military units could throw the chain of command into disarray.

"Given what we saw on Jan. 6, anything is plausible," says retired Gen. Linda Singh, who plays the chief of the National Guard Bureau in the film. "For us, it

may not necessarily be active military, but we've seen a lot of veterans in that group, whether they're working for police departments or they're retired. We have to plan for the most extreme."

In "War Game," the fictional group of extremists, the Order of Columbus, is led by Kris Goldsmith, an Army veteran who became disillusioned after fighting in Iraq after 9/11. In the film, he says, he's playing a twisted version of himself. About 7% of the National Guard are said to be members of the Order of Columbus, which backs Gov. Robert Strickland (actor Chris Coffey) for president.

In the mix are some renown politicians and former members of the military who have been known for prioritizing country over politics. They include retired Gen. Wesley Clark, the former NATO supreme allied commander; former North Dakota Sen. Heidi Heitkamp, and retired Lt. Col. Alexander Vindman, who in 2019 testified about former President Donald Trump's call to the president of Ukraine in which he asked him to smear his political rivals.

"I take both my testimony in front of Congress and my participation in this movie to be a showcase of career public service, solely interested in the public good and U.S. national security,"

Vindman says. "You could agree or disagree with some of the decisions that were made, but I think we effectively showcased folks looking out for the U.S."

In that way, "War Game" may less represent a fearful possible future than it does what the dedication of career civil servants looks like. "Those are patriots. All of them — Democrats and Republicans," says Bullock, a Democrat who was twice elected governor in the largely conservative Montana.

"I'd like to think they reflect our political system," Gerber says. "I think they reflect the best of our political system."

Moss calls "War Game" — which nearly matches the title of the 1983 Matthew Broderick nuclear war thriller — a kind of prequel to Alex Garland's near-future-set American dystopia "Civil War," released this year. Moss also, with Amanda McBaine, co-directed one of 2024's other notable election-related films: "Girls State," which documents Missouri teenage girls forming a mock government. That film, with Vice President Kamala Harris now the Democratic nominee, Moss considers newly relevant. Meanwhile, "War Game" seems to shift week to week. In one scene, an assassination attempt is discussed as a remote possibility. "The film seems to

change every time it screens," Gerber says. "But the relevance of our film does not end with this election. The issues we currently face did not arise overnight. It's been a long, slow bake to get to this point. We as a nation have a lot of self-reflection in store and hopefully 'War Game' is part of that process."

In "War Game," the situation turns perilous. Military bases are compromised. State capitols are overrun. Given the urgency, President Hotham is advised to hack the email of his opponent, who is opposing the peaceful transfer of power, and to declare the Insurrection Act — the possible implementation of which has been a rising anxiety for some analysts. Bullock, playing president but looking the part, opts against such moves, arguing they have to consider the ramifications down the line. "Wherever we are on the political spectrum, preserving the rule of law and the underpinnings of this 250-year experiment is pretty damn important," Bullock says. "It is concerning to me that the vice presidential nominee [JD Vance] said if he was Mike Pence he would have done otherwise. But we have got to remember, there are things more important than an individual election, and that's sort of the promise that this country has offered."

# Family affair at box office: Ryan & Blake movies are winners

In the Ryan Reynolds-Blake Lively box-office showdown, both husband and wife came out winners.

Reynolds' Marvel Studios smash "Deadpool & Wolverine" remained the top movie in North American theaters for the third straight week with \$54.2 million in ticket sales, according to studio estimates Sunday. Worldwide, it's now surpassed \$1 billion. "Deadpool & Wolverine," though, was closely followed by "It Ends With Us," the romance drama starring Lively, which surpassed expectations with a stellar \$50 million debut.

Together, the films created a kind of family edition of "Barbenheimer," in which a pair of very different movies thrived in part due to counterprogramming. Only this time, the opposite movies were fronted by one of Hollywood's most famous couples. The films' one-two punch wasn't entirely unprecedented. In 1990, Bruce Willis' "Die Hard 2" led the box office while Demi Moore's "Ghost" came in second.

The weekend also featured a high-priced flop. "Borderlands," the long-delayed \$120 million videogame adaptation directed by Eli Roth, launched with a paltry \$8.8 million for Lionsgate. The film, starring Cate Blanchett, Kevin Hart and Jack Black, was shot all the way back in 2021. After delays and reshoots, it finally landed in theaters effectively dead-on-arrival; it scored just 10% fresh on Rotten Tomatoes and seems likely contend for one of the worst movies of the year.

Meanwhile, "Deadpool & Wolverine,"

which co-stars Hugh Jackman, continued its march through box-office records. The film, directed by Shawn Levy, is only the second R-rated movie to reach \$1 billion, following 2019's "Joker." In three weeks, it's already one of the most lucrative Marvel releases and trails only Disney's other 2024 smash, "Inside Out" (\$1.6 billion worldwide) among movies released this year.

Lively makes a cameo in "Deadpool & Wolverine" but she both stars in and produced "It Ends With Us." Adapted from the best-selling romance novel by Colleen Hoover, Lively stars as Lily Bloom, a Boston florist torn between two men, one from her present life (Justin Baldoni, who also directed the film) and another who was her first love (Brandon Sklenar).

"It Ends With Us" cost a modest \$25 million to produce, so it will turn a significant profit for co-financers Columbia Pictures and Wayfarer Studios.

Like another female-skewing summer-release book adaptation from Sony, "Where the Crawdads Sing," "It Ends With Us" could hold well through the typically slower August box-office period. Audiences gave it an A- CinemaScore.

Reynolds and Lively occasionally played up the convergence of their movies.

Last week, Reynolds posted a video of himself posing junket questions to Sklenar. The timing paid off especially for Lively, whose film doubled earlier opening-weekend forecasts.

Neon's "Cuckoo," a German Alps-set horror film by filmmaker Tilman Singer, opened with \$3 million on 1,503 screens.

It stars Hunter Schafer and Dan Stevens.

## JD hails Trump's Fed idea, keeps up heat on Tim record

ATLANTA — Republican vice presidential nominee JD Vance used a round of Sunday news show appearances to disparage the Democratic ticket and promote Donald Trump's record and second-term plans and defend himself from criticism over past remarks that have become a campaign issue.

The Ohio senator, in a series of taped interviews, said there was merit to Trump's suggestion that presidents have more control of U.S. monetary policy and kept up the GOP line that Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz, the Democrats' vice presidential candidate, had exaggerated his military record.

Vance, who shadowed Vice President Kamala Harris and Walz during their visits to several battleground states last week, was quizzed about abortion and his past comments about American family life, among other topics.

Some highlights from his appearances:

### Trump right on Fed independence

Trump recently suggested that presidents "should have at least a say" on monetary policy set by the Federal Reserve. He did not offer specific proposals.

Curtailling the Fed's independence from political interference as it determines interest rates would be a fundamental change. Even as he tried to argue that Trump said nothing about taking "direct" control of rates, Vance endorsed Trump's general idea.

"President Trump is saying I think something that's really important and actually profound, which is that the political leadership of this country should have more say over the monetary policy of this country," Vance said. "I agree with him. That should fundamentally be a political decision. Agree or disagree, we should have America's elected leaders having input about the most important decisions confronting our country."

Bank of America CEO Brian Moynihan questioned the wisdom of such a major change. "I think if you look around the world's economies and you see where Fed central banks are independent and operate freely," he said, "they tend to fare better than the ones that don't."

### Mining Walz's military record

Walz served 24 years in the Army National Guard and was once deployed to Europe, though never to an active war zone. In a video from 2018, he referred to carrying weapons "in war." The Harris campaign said last week that Walz misspoke.

"Scandalous behavior," said Vance, a military veteran.

When it was noted that Trump avoided Vietnam with dubious claims of bone spurs, Vance said that "obviously a lot of people have reasons for not serving. I criticize somebody for embellishing their record, for lying, saying, 'I went to war.'"

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg, a combat veteran and a top Harris ally, said Republicans are circulating "the one time" that a long-serving veteran "slipped up" talking about his military service.

LAS VEGAS — Big crowds, go-to applause lines, talk of joy — and some unsolicited Republican counterprogramming.

These were common themes during the first big campaign swing for Vice President Kamala Harris and her running mate, Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz, as the new Democratic ticket barnstormed through five battleground states this past week on a get-to-know-us tour.

They opened with a boisterous rally in Philadelphia on Tuesday, hours after Harris announced Walz as her running mate. From there it was a march through Wisconsin, Michigan, Arizona and Nevada. Planned stops in Georgia and North Carolina were washed out by Tropical Storm Debby.

The tour was a way to help both candidates introduce themselves to voters, especially independent and undecided voters in states where the Democrats are in tight races against Republican nominee Donald Trump and his running mate, Ohio Sen. JD Vance.

It was also a way for Harris and Walz to get to know each other better.

A look back at the campaign swing:

### Size matters

Thousands of people have been flocking to Harris' campaign rallies, a sign that her groundbreaking candidacy has generated new momentum among Democrats who were unenthused about President Biden's reelection bid. Harris is the first Black woman and first person of Asian descent to become a major political party's nominee for president.

By the campaign's count, 12,000 people turned out for rallies in Philadelphia and Eau Claire, Wis. It was 15,000 in the Detroit area and in Glendale, Ariz. In Las Vegas on Saturday, more than 12,000 people were inside a university arena when authorities halted admissions because people were becoming ill waiting outside in 109-degree heat to go through security. About 4,000 people were still in line when the entrances closed, the campaign said.

To Lance Jones, a Tucson native who attended the Arizona rally, it felt like "the tables have turned with Harris and Walz." He predicted his state "is going from basically red to purple to blue."

Those crowd numbers annoyed Trump, who regularly attracts thousands to his own rallies.

"Oh, give me a break," he said at a news conference when asked about Harris. "Nobody's had crowds like I have."

### Republican counterprogramming

The Republican ticket didn't just weigh in from afar, Vance tried to shadow his Democratic rivals during the opening days of their tour. He made appearances in Philadelphia and Detroit hours before the Democrats arrived in those cities.

But after Harris and Vance landed around the same time in Eau Claire on Wednesday, the Republican stepped off his plane and walked toward Air Force Two.

Vance later joked about the in-your-face

move, saying he had a "bit of fun" while trying to "check out my future plane." Air Force Two would become his primary mode of travel if he and Trump are elected in November.

### The stump speeches

Harris and Walz delivered basically the same speeches — heavy on personal biography — from one rally to the next, with some tweaks to tailor their remarks to the particular audience and state.

Harris added lines about fighting for working people and the upside of organized labor to her remarks in Michigan. In Arizona and Nevada, where migration is a big concern, she drew on her prosecutorial background to tell the crowd she had gone after transnational gangs, drug cartels and smugglers when she was California's attorney general.

"I prosecuted them in case after case, and I won," Harris said.

In Las Vegas, where the economy is heavily dependent on the hospitality

industry, she promised to work to eliminate federal taxes on tips for restaurant and other service industry employees. Trump, who floated the same idea several months ago, posted on social media that she was a "copycat."

Harris closed her rallies by asking people what kind of country they want to live in, before calling them to action and declaring, "When we fight, we win."

Walz, largely unknown outside the Midwest, went deep on his personal story of serving in the Army National Guard and his years as a high school teacher and football coach, as a member of Congress and governor. In a campaign partly centered on restoring reproductive rights, he shares that he and his wife, Gwen, suffered through years of in vitro fertilization treatments before their daughter, Hope, was born.

### Go-to applause lines

Each candidate has lines that rev up the crowd

## Harris-Walz stops feature big crowds, talk of 'joy' with Vance in shadows

– “Hear me when I say, I know Donald Trump’s type,” says Harris, describing the kinds of people she went after as a prosecutor.

– “Even if we wouldn’t make the same choice for ourselves, there’s a golden rule: Mind your own damn business,” says Walz, explaining what he said was the Midwest approach to private, personal decisions such as whether to have an abortion.

– “We’ll sleep when we’re dead,” says Walz, urging audiences to give it their all for however many days are left in the campaign.

New buzzwords: ‘joy’ and ‘weird’

Walz introduced both words to the campaign. Even before he joined the Democratic ticket, his description of Trump and Vance and their policies as “weird” caught on. Harris herself used the description a few times.

As Walz says, “No one’s asking for that weird crap.”

Walz also credits Harris with “bringing

back the joy” to politics, and Harris herself described the Democratic ticket as “joyful warriors.”

### ‘Lock him up’

At several stops, the crowd started chanting “lock him up” aimed at Trump, an echo of the chants that Trump’s campaign audiences directed at Democrat Hillary Clinton during the 2016 race.

Harris has a ready comeback to move things along. “Hold on. Let the courts take care of that. We’re going to beat him in November,” she says.

Likewise, she had a ready rejoinder for disruptions from protesters upset that the administration isn’t doing more to protect Palestinians during Israel’s war with Hamas in Gaza.

As she told them in Arizona, “I respect your voices, but we are here to now talk about this race in 2024.”

### Who’s counting?

At each stop, Walz reminded people of the countdown to Election Day, Nov. 5.

By Friday in Phoenix, it must have seemed a blur: He was off by a day when he set the countdown at 87, instead of 88 days.

He isn’t the only one counting.

A troop of Girl Scouts greeted the vice president at the airport in Wisconsin on Wednesday, 90 days out from the election. Snippets of their conversation overheard by reporters suggested they may have been chatting about summer plans.

Harris was heard replying, “I’m planning on going somewhere in 90 days.”

### Bonus stop

Harris had one last stop on Sunday – San Francisco – before returning to Washington. This one was all about collecting campaign cash for the fight ahead.

Former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) joined Harris for the event, which the campaign said raised more than \$12 million.

Pelosi spoke of wanting “democracy to win an Olympic gold” on Election Day.

## Biden: Pressure from Dems led me to drop out

President Biden said conversations with other Democrats led to his decision to drop out of the presidential race.

In his first interview since the historic decision, Biden (photo) explained his rationale on “CBS Sunday Morning,” saying he wanted to make sure Donald Trump lost the 2024 presidential election.

“A number of my Democratic colleagues in the House and Senate thought that I was gonna hurt them in the races,” he said. “Although it’s a great honor to be president, I think I have an obligation to the country to do the most important thing and that is we must, we must, we must defeat Trump.”

Before he dropped out, Biden was trailing Trump in national polls. Following his decision to leave, his presumed replacement as nominee, Kamala Harris, has gained ground in the same polls.

But for weeks, despite those numbers, Biden had insisted on staying in the race. At one point, he said he would only drop out if “the Lord Almighty” came down and told him to.

However, between the disastrous June 27 debate – which Biden says he was sick for – and his July 21 decision to leave the race, several Democrats joined the chorus calling on Biden to leave the race.

“I was concerned, if I stayed in the race, that would be the topic,” he said Sunday. “I thought it would be a real distraction.”

Biden said he would join Harris and her vice presidential choice, Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz, on the campaign trail. He called Walz “my kinda guy.”

During the interview, Biden emphasized his belief Trump is a danger to American democracy. He said he did not believe there would be a peaceful transition of power if Trump lost the election, similar to the deadly Jan. 6, 2021, riot at the U.S. Capitol after Biden defeated Trump in 2020.

“If Trump loses, I’m not confident at all. He means the stuff he says; we don’t take him seriously. He means it,” the president said. “All the stuff about, ‘If we lose, it’ll be a bloodbath.’”

## Shirtless man busted scaling Eiffel Tower hours before Olympics closing ceremony

The Eiffel Tower and its surrounding area were evacuated hours before the Olympic closing ceremony Sunday because a man was climbing the tower.

French police spotted the shirtless man around 3 p.m. and began escorting visitors away from the area. He was seen while in the

second section of the tower, just above the Olympic rings that were installed above the lower viewing deck.

The intentions of the man, who was arrested, remained unclear.

Some people were briefly locked on the tower's second floor during the man's ascent, but police released them after about 30 minutes.

Though it was a centerpiece

of the opening ceremony, the Eiffel Tower was not expected to play any role in the closing ceremony.

The festivities were scheduled for around 9 p.m. at Stade de France in the northern suburb of St.-Denis. The stadium hosted rugby and track-and-field events through the Games.

Paris was crawling with police officers Sunday in advance of the

closing ceremony. Authorities said 20,000 officers were deployed throughout the city and St.-Denis, with 3,000 around the Stade de France.

Despite that show of force, cops were unable to explain how the man was able to begin scaling France's most famous landmark in the middle of the afternoon.

Though there were fears and threats before the Olympics, the

Games went off without any interruption for more than two weeks.

Terror threats did disrupt another major event in Europe during the Games — three Taylor Swift concerts scheduled in Vienna.

All three shows were canceled after cops arrested two men accused of plotting a terror attack outside the venue.

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

## Hezbollah's drones 'a threat that has to be taken seriously'

BEIRUT — Lebanon's militant Hezbollah group launched one of its deepest strikes into Israel in mid-May, using an explosive drone that scored a direct hit on one of Israel's most significant air force surveillance systems.

This and other successful drone attacks have given the Iranian-backed militant group another deadly option for an expected retaliation against Israel for its airstrike in Beirut last month that killed top Hezbollah military commander Fouad Shukur.

"It is a threat that has to be taken seriously," Fabian Hinz, a research fellow at the International Institute for Strategic Studies, said of Hezbollah's drone capability.

While Israel has built air defense systems, including the Iron Dome and David's Sling, to guard against Hezbollah's rocket and missile arsenal, there has been less focus on the drone threat.

"And as a result there has been less effort to build defensive capabilities" against drones, Hinz said.

Drones, or UAVs, are unmanned aircraft that can be operated from afar. Drones can enter, observe and attack enemy territory more discreetly than missiles and rockets.

Hezbollah proclaimed the success of its May drone strike, which targeted a blimp used as part of Israel's missile defense system at a base about 22 miles from the Lebanon border.

Israel's military confirmed Hezbollah scored a direct hit.

"This attack reflects an improvement in accuracy and the ability to evade Israeli air defenses," said a report released by the Institute for National Security Studies, an independent think tank affiliated with Tel Aviv University.

Since the near-daily exchange of fire along the Lebanon-Israel border began in early October, Hezbollah has used drones more to bypass Israeli air defense systems and strike its military posts along the border, as well as deep inside Israel.

While Israel has intercepted hundreds of drones from Lebanon during the Israel-Hamas war, its air defense systems are not hermetic, an Israeli security official said. Drones are smaller and slower than missiles and rockets, therefore harder to stop. That's especially true when they are launched from close to the border and require a shorter reaction time to intercept.

The official, who was not authorized to speak publicly, in line with Israeli security restrictions, said Israeli air defense systems have had to contend with more drones during this war than ever before, and Israel responded by attacking launch points.

Last Tuesday, a Hezbollah drone attack on an Israeli army base near the northern city of Nahariya wounded six people. One

of the group's bloodiest drone attacks was in April, killing one Israeli soldier and wounding 13 others plus four civilians in the northern Israeli community of Arab al-Aramsheh. Hezbollah also sent surveillance drones that filmed vital facilities in Israel's north, including in Haifa, its suburbs and the Ramat David Airbase, southeast of the coastal city.

While Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah has boasted that the militant group can now manufacture its own drones, its attacks so far have mainly relied on Iranian-made Ababil and Shahed drones. It has also used a drone, at least once, that fires Russian-made S5 guided missiles.

Hezbollah's increasing capabilities have come despite Israel killing some of its most important drone experts. The most high-profile was Shukur, who Israel said was responsible for most of Hezbollah's most advanced weaponry, including missiles, long-range rockets and drones.

In 2013, a senior Hezbollah operative, Hassan Lakkis, considered one of its drone masterminds, was shot dead south of Beirut. The group blamed Israel. More recent strikes in Syria attributed to Israel killed Iranian and Hezbollah drone experts.

In its early days, Hezbollah used lower-tech tactics, including paragliders, to

attack behind enemy lines.

After Israel withdrew from southern Lebanon in 2000 after an 18-year occupation, Hezbollah began using Iranian-made drones and sent the first reconnaissance Mirsad drone over Israel's airspace in 2004. Following the 34-day Israel-Hezbollah war in 2006, Lakkis took charge of the drone program.

Hezbollah increased its use of drones in reconnaissance and attacks during its involvement in Syria's conflict. In 2022, as Lebanon engaged in indirect negotiations to demarcate its maritime border with Israel, the group sent three drones over one of Israel's biggest gas facilities in the Mediterranean before they were shot down by Israel. Hezbollah's drone program receives substantial assistance from Iran, and the UAVs are believed to be assembled by experts of the militant group in Lebanon.

"Since Iran has not been able to achieve aerial supremacy, it has resorted to such types of aircraft," retired Lebanon Gen. and military expert Naji Malaieb said. Russia has benefited from buying hundreds of Iranian Shahed drones to use in its war against Ukraine.

In February, the Ukrainian intelligence service said Iranian and Hezbollah experts were training Russian troops to

operate Shahed-136 and Ababil-3 drones at an air base in central Syria. Russia, Iran and Hezbollah have a military presence in Syria, where they have been fighting alongside President Bashar Assad's forces.

The Lebanese militant group still apparently relies on parts from Western countries, which could pose an obstacle to mass production. In mid-July, three people were arrested in Spain and one in Germany on suspicion of belonging to a network that supplied Hezbollah with parts to build explosive drones for use in attacks in northern Israel.

The Spanish companies implicated, like others in Europe and around the world, bought items, including electronic guidance components, propulsion propellers, gasoline engines, more than 200 electric motors, and materials for the fuselage, wings and other drone parts, according to investigators.

Authorities believe Hezbollah may have built several hundred drones with these components. "Israel's air force can fire missiles on different parts of Lebanon, and now Hezbollah has drones and missiles that can reach any areas in Israel," Iranian political analyst and political science Prof. Emad Abshenass said. He added that as the U.S. arms its closest ally, Israel, Iran is doing the same by arming Hezbollah.

## The jobs are safe

The data is in: the arrival of migrants to NYC has not, in fact, tanked the availability of jobs for Black and Hispanic native New Yorkers. That's according to research published last week by the Center for NYC Affairs at The New School, which noted that employment for these populations has kept growing and is near record highs at the same time as the city has received tens of thousands of migrants.

NYC has of course been the national locus of immigration and its attendant benefits for generations, a legacy that most New Yorkers will point to with pride, yet this symbiosis has once again been cast into doubt by Donald Trump's and JD Vance's insistence that immigration somehow a threat to Black employment, or as Trump has repeatedly put it, "Black jobs."

This is nothing new. The idea of immigrants taking away people's jobs has been around as long as one group of immigrants felt settled and began fearing that the next was a threat to their viability. Americans from English and German backgrounds viewed Irish, Italian and Jewish newcomers with suspicion; these then came to view Chinese immigrants unfavorably and then all of the above were suspicious of Mexican arrivals.

Each group worried mightily that their footholds would be displaced, and political opportunists have always been all too happy to drive the wedges deeper to some end. From the 19th century Know-Nothings through Trump, immigrant-bashing has always had some currency in the political sphere, with the fear of economic backsliding always ready fuel.

What these opportunists are hoping for is that people won't think too deeply about how the economy and employment dynamics actually work. Jobs

aren't just a finite pool that workers can dwindle until there are none left; jobs create other jobs, and immigrants have often been the people growing the economy in ways that benefit everyone.

In an inverse scenario, if immigrants simply stopped coming and New York's population were to crater instead, we can guarantee that this wouldn't magically leave more jobs open for the Black and other communities of color that would remain. It would sap at our economic vitality and ultimately leave every community worse off.

There are, of course, real issues with the city's employment panorama and the status of Black and other disadvantaged workers, including persistently lower wages and higher unemployment than for white counterparts, but immigrants sure aren't the problem there.

Taking aim at asylum seekers who are arriving without anything but a hope that this city provides as much opportunity as they've been led to believe by every bit of pop culture is counterproductive and a distraction from the policies and initiatives that might actually help the city's Black workforce — things like support for workplaces that want to unionize and better enforcement of wage theft.

Not to mention, these groups are not at all separate; while many people still reflexively envision migrants as Latino people from South and Central America, for months now a huge percentage of arrivals have been Black migrants from West Africa and elsewhere, highlighting the absurdity of trying to pit them as a group against Black New Yorkers. With the proper support, these folks can establish themselves as a new generation of New Yorkers who will keep our economy humming along.

## Amtrak's Gateway lies persist

Last Monday, our editorial headlined "End Amtrak's Gateway lies" argued that the railway continues to falsely insist that it must spend \$17 billion to demolish the Midtown homes and businesses south of Penn Station, centered on Block 780, in order to expand the station capacity.

That day's presentation by Amtrak was exactly as we expected with everything concerning Amtrak and its \$50 billion Gateway boondoggle: Full of fibs.

The two speakers were Petra Messick, a senior program director for Amtrak's capital delivery, and Foster Nichols, a senior vice president & technical fellow, rail operations planning, for the multinational giant WSP.

They said that the alternative plans offered by two civic groups, ReThinkNYC and the Tri-State Transportation Campaign, to avoid the Block 780 demolition by instead utilizing through-running of trains, both fail to achieve what Amtrak and NJTransit need. The analysis is worthless.

Amtrak cannot produce a fair and independent review of a competing plan to its own cherished blueprints. And as for WSP, they have long been on the payroll. The Gateway Trans-Hudson Partnership, which has been working on Amtrak's monstrosity for years, is a consortium of WSP, AECOM and STV.

WSP is so proud of its close ties to Gateway that they had four of its men, Phil Rice, Jerry Jannetti, Drew Bazil and Omar Khan, present at the signing of Gateway's \$6.88 billion contract with the feds last month. While we were there, we don't know these guys, but WSP helpfully put out a press release with their photo.

Messick laughably said, "Amtrak's goal is more trains for more people to more places" yet Amtrak is refusing any deviation from its foolish and wasteful

Gateway scheme, which will not add a single passenger nor a single seat when the new Gateway tunnel opens. Under their delusion, all nine parts of Gateway (including Block 780) must be built. That's the \$50 billion price tag.

Messick also said Amtrak does repairs of the existing 1910 Hudson tunnel during the weekends. That's an old lie. Using the Freedom of Information Act, we have proven that Amtrak rarely does weekend work.

Another lie was that "anytime you do work here, you have to take tracks out of service." She added that "a project that might take two years if you had complete access to the tracks for two years straight, could take six years if you're doing it every weekend. You have to take tracks out of service. You have to inconvenience people. It becomes more difficult, more costly, and it takes longer."

Untrue, all of it. The 1910 tubes can and should be fully repaired nights and weekends, like the MTA did with the L train and like a truly independent report from the world-renowned experts at London Bridge Associates showed. Amtrak rejected the LBA findings, but it remains the truth. The East River tubes should also be repaired the same way, night and weekends, as everyone else in the world does.

Like LBA did, a real outsider must review all through-running options with the mandate to make it succeed, including the best of all, the original Access to the Region's Core tunnel (not the far inferior modification that Chris Christie correctly killed) that brings the new Hudson tunnel into Penn Station and out to Grand Central Terminal. Find an engineer to make that work, sparing Block 780 and \$17 billion.

# A Jewish fast tied to Jerusalem's fate

Most Americans are likely familiar with the fall-season Yom Kippur fast, part of the High Holy Days that commence, 10 days earlier, with Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year.

Less known, but these days quite significant, is another Jewish fast day that occurs each summer. While Yom Kippur is about atonement for sins, the summer fast day commemorates tragedies.

Tisha B'Av (the "Ninth of [the month] Av), which commences this year this evening and lasts for 25 hours, has come to be associated with a number of sad historical happenings. They include the commencement of the First Crusade in 1096 and the expulsion of the Jewish populations of England, France and Spain — in 1290, 1306 and 1492, respectively — all of which happened on the ninth day of Av or its morrow.

But the main reason for the mourning day are the destructions of the two central Jewish Temples in Jerusalem and the subsequent exiles of Jews from the land they had lived in since biblical times. The first Temple's razing, by the Babylonian Empire, occurred in 586 BCE; the second, in 70 CE, was perpetrated by the Romans.

What makes this Jewish fast significant this year are the widespread claims, intensified of late by the Gaza war, that the Jewish presence in the Holy Land is a case of "colonization," that Jews living there are "interlopers."

Examples range from Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas, who has called Israel "a colonial project that has nothing to do with Judaism," to withered rock star Roger Waters, who characterizes Americans who support Israel "very, very dim people... completely attached to the idea of the illegal settler colonialism of the Zionist movement in Palestine."

Countless and loud "progressive" pundits and protesters eagerly echo those sentiments.

To be sure, in the late 1800s and especially in the years before and after the Holocaust, many Jews emigrated from various European countries to the land of their forefathers. And after Israel was recognized as a country by the UN, Jews in Arab lands, facing intensified discrimination and violence, fled to the nascent state.

But there had also always been a Jewish presence in the Holy Land over the prior many centuries. And those who arrived in the Holy Land in the

19th century and over the decades since were, in an historical sense, not coming in but, rather, coming back.

None of which is to say that the Arab population in Israel should have suffered, as it did for various reasons, as a result of the Jewish return to the Holy Land. And the full rights of citizenship in the state should be, and are, the very same for Arabs as for Jews.

The statuses of non-citizen Arab residents of Israel proper and residents of the territories Israel captured in the 1967 Six-Day War (oh, if all wars could last a mere six days...) are quandaries that beg to be resolved, and can be with goodwill on both sides, short in supply as it is in the region. Jewish settlers, moreover, who engage in violence against Arabs or Arab property belong in jail no less than any criminal.

But none of that can obscure an undeniable fact: The Jewish connection to the Holy Land is ancient, current and eternal.

This morning, like every morning, the Hebrew name for Jerusalem, or its synonym Zion, passed my lips some 10 times.

Before breakfast.

Those words are part of the morning prayers religious Jews have prayed thrice daily, every day, over the course of millennia.

And then, after breakfast, in the grace after meals, I praised God for "the Land and for sustenance." The land referred to is Eretz Yisrael, the "Land of the Jews."

People can criticize the contemporary state of Israel for any of a number of reasons, some justified, others less so or not at all. But one thing that no one who has the slightest familiarity with Jewish history can do is deny the connection that the Jewish people have had in their hearts since ancient times — a connection that never faltered or faded — with the land today called Israel.

On Tisha B'Av, despite the return of so many Jews to the Holy Land, Jews there and the world over — as we have done every year over the past 2,000 — will neither eat nor drink for some 25 hours. We will sit on the ground or low chairs like mourners.

Because even with a successful and vibrant Israel, Jews have yet to feel truly secure in their indigenous land.

# The truth behind Trump's helicopter tall tale

Last Thursday, Donald Trump told a story about a helicopter ride he took with former San Francisco Mayor Willie Brown, calling it a “near death” emergency landing on a field in New Jersey. Hearing this, Nate Holden, a former Los Angeles councilman, spoke to Brown and then called Politico and gave them the real story about a helicopter trip with Trump that was forced to land at a nearby airport in 1990.

Along with Holden, I was also on that helicopter flight, along with Trump's brother and another top executive. And this is why we were on the flight.

I was then working for Trump as his executive vice president in charge of construction and development. I oversaw construction, got permits, negotiated leases, lobbied legislatures and municipalities, met with city and state officials, community groups, etc. At that time, we were working with investors who had bought the old Ambassador Hotel in L.A., where RFK was shot. They lured Trump into becoming a part owner by agreeing to put him in charge of everything and pay him a fee for construction costs and a large commission on sales and leases.

The year before, 1989, Donald was approached with an offer to buy the

Ambassador and its 24 acre parcel outright. He sent me out there to look at it and let him know if I thought it was right for us. I actually did not think he was all that serious because he would have looked at it himself or sent someone higher on the ladder than me.

It was totally beat up and you wouldn't even think of saving it but the property was magnificent. Trump would want to build a massive mixed use project here, but the problem was the location. It was in Mid-Wilshire, a part of L.A. that is not at all, to be kind, high end. Not a Trump location. I met the owners, went to their house, had dinner and went back to New York and told Trump it was not a Trump site.

Several months later, Trump was approached by his very good friend, and the most important zoning lawyer in New York, asking him to meet with the people who actually bought the property, a group with English, Irish and American investors.

One of the group members was embarrassingly in awe of Donald and they asked him to join the partnership as a

partner and also to be the developer and the company would reimburse all expenses and give Trump a 6% markup on everything from the cost of the architects, to my salary, to the construction and as a fee on all sales and rentals. He could not resist a deal like that and decided he would build Trump City West with, of course, the world's tallest building.

So I set out to build a team to construct a massive 6 million-square-foot project on the 24 acres.

The L.A. school board wanted to put a school there. Using eminent domain, it condemned part of the site, and valued it at \$50 million, but still needed to get the \$50 million from the state. I lobbied state officials including Brown, who was then speaker of the state Assembly, to support our efforts to prevent it. We were to appear at a hearing and argue against the funding. Brown was essential to us and I developed a relationship with him. I gave him a cap from the Trump Princess and Trump allowed Brown to use his private jet.

Holden, the L.A. councilman, was going to be our most important speaker at the hearing.

Just before the hearing, I flew with Holden to Trump Tower to meet Donald to talk strategy. Upon arrival we were

told Trump did not have time to meet there and we were to accompany him on a helicopter flight to Atlantic City and talk on the flight.

Soon after we took off, the copter began shaking. To reassure Holden, someone started explaining why there was turbulence where the Hudson River met the Long Island Sound, and I was thinking what nonsense, and watching the co-pilot furiously pushing an instrument back and forth.

Soon the copter really started shaking and the pilot announced that we would have to land at the nearest airport. Everyone on board was scared. I was mostly watching the others, including Trump, who was terrified. The pilot was very calm and that reassured me. I had made emergency landings before. I never thought our lives were in danger, but it was scary.

We landed safely and went to AC on Trump's commuter copter. Laughing at him, Trump said Holden, a Black man, turned white. It was Donald who turned white.

We never really got to talk about the Ambassador project.

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# Debby downer lingers across East

PHILADELPHIA — The weather system previously known as Hurricane Debby was not quite done with parts of the U.S. on Sunday as flood warnings remained in effect in North Carolina and thousands were without power in New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

After hitting Florida as a hurricane Aug. 5, the storm spent nearly a week unleashing tornadoes and flooding, damaging homes and taking lives along the East Coast before moving into Canada on Saturday.

While many rivers had receded by Sunday, flood warnings remained in effect across central and eastern North Carolina, where more thunderstorms were possible over the next few days. With the ground already saturated from Debby, the National Weather Service said localized downpours could result in additional flash flooding throughout the coastal Carolinas.


Authorities in Lumberton, N.C., said in a Facebook post Saturday that one person died after driving into floodwaters on a closed road and getting swept away. Officials didn't identify the driver, but said that what they hoped would be a post-storm rescue, quickly turned into a recovery.

"It bears repeating," the agency said in the post. "Never drive into flooded roadways and obey road closed signage."

In South Carolina, the National Weather Service's Charleston office warned Sunday that as much as 3 to 4 inches of additional rainfall was possible in the afternoon and evening, and could lead to flash flooding. Showers and thunderstorms could develop across Charleston County down through Chatham County and inland, the office said.

Even in drier areas, more than 35,000 homes and businesses in Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania and Vermont still had no electricity as of Sunday afternoon, according to the tracking website PowerOutage.us. Some 23,000 outages lingered in hard-hit Ohio, where Debby-related storms including tornadoes blew through the northeastern part of the state Wednesday.

Debby's last day and night over the U.S. inundated parts of New York, Pennsylvania and New England with rain and flash flooding on Friday, prompting evacuations and rescues.

Officials in Tioga County in north-central Pennsylvania said Sunday morning that 10 teams of emergency service volunteers would be out surveying residents about damage as responders kept up the search for a person missing since the flooding.

"Please be kind to them, because these are volunteers ... they work here in the 911 center, they're fire, police, they're EMS, these folks are dedicating their Sunday to help you out," said County Commissioner Marc Rice.

Faith-based disaster relief organizations were also mobilizing to help assess damage and provide help, state Rep. Clint Owlett said. "That's going to be a big deal."

President Biden approved a major disaster declaration Saturday for Florida counties affected by Hurricane Debby, including Manatee and Sarasota.

The president ordered federal aid to supplement state, tribal and local recovery efforts in areas affected by the storm.

The assistance can come in the form

of grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the storm, the declaration said.

Meanwhile, the National Hurricane Center is tracking another potential tropical storm in the Atlantic. Officials said a tropical depression is likely to form within the next day or two and could approach portions of the Greater Antilles by the middle of the week.

## Murder case dropped against man accused of killing Detroit synagogue leader

A murder case against a man accused of killing a beloved Detroit synagogue leader has been dropped entirely.

Michael Jackson-Bolanos, 28, had been accused of fatally stabbing Samantha Woll, 40, at her home in October 2023. Last month, Jackson-Bolanos was acquitted on a charge of first-degree premeditated murder, but the jury deadlocked on charges of felony murder and home invasion.

Judge Margaret Van Houten ruled Friday that retrying Jackson-Bolanos on the felony murder charge would constitute double jeopardy, violating his Fifth Amendment rights.

He won't walk free, however.

The jury convicted him on a charge of lying to police, and he was sentenced to 18 months behind bars, with credit for around 240 days served.

Woll was found fatally stabbed outside her home on Oct. 21, 2023, and many feared she was

the victim of an antisemitic attack two weeks after Hamas attacked Israel.

Police said they found no evidence Woll was the victim of a hate crime. Jackson-Bolanos was arrested about two months later, after security cameras and cell phone data put him in the area of Woll's home at the time of the crime.

According to Jackson-Bolanos, he was nearby looking for unlocked cars to break into when he came across Woll's body.

Jackson-Bolanos said he touched her body and then ran away. At trial, he testified in his own defense and was asked to explain those actions.

"I didn't know whether she had fallen outside or was drunk. Me as a person — yeah, I am out doing wrong — I still wanted to make sure that this person was OK," he told the court. "When I realized she was dead, I wanted nothing to do with the entire situation. I'm a Black guy in the middle of the night breaking into cars and I find

myself standing in front of a dead white woman. That doesn't look good at all."


Prosecutors promised to appeal Van Houten's decision to drop the additional murder charge.

About a month before Jackson-Bolanos was arrested, another man, Jeffrey Herbstman, told police he may have killed Woll. He said he was her former boyfriend, but cops said he made the call in a medication-induced panic attack.

For a moment, it looked like the U.S. women had run out of luck. The quest for eight straight Olympic gold medals appeared shaky due to a combination of sloppy play, a hostile road game environment and a French team ready to avenge a loss in the men’s gold-medal matchup a day prior.

Sunday’s gold-medal game against France was undoubtedly Team USA’s worst game of the 2024 Paris Olympics. Cheryl Reeve’s team flirted with defeat after going down 10 to open the third, but the team inched its way back thanks to a spark from Kahleah Copper and A’ja Wilson’s game-high 21 points.

The French, down by three, nearly forced overtime with a heave by Gabby Williams that went in with her foot on the 3-point line as regulation time expired. The French team broke down in tears after realizing Williams’ effort wasn’t good enough. Meanwhile, the relieved Americans celebrated their 67-66 win and their eighth straight gold medal.

“Gabby hit some great shots down the end, tough shots,” Wilson said of Williams, who finished with a team-high 19 points. “We understood what we had in our locker room and leaning on each other and talking to one another and believing that we believed in each other and that’s the greatest thing about it.”

The United States stayed on top of the basketball world with its 61st consecutive win overall.

“It’s amazing. It truly is a dynasty that we have built here at USAB,” Wilson said. “And I am so proud of the resilience that my team showed. We could have fumbled it many times, but we pulled through. To say I am a two-time gold medalist, I am so blessed.”

The Americans entered the finale as double-digit favorites, having won the previous five tournament games by an average of 18.6 points.

But a determined French squad was prepared.

The Americans fell victim to the French’s pressure early. Napheesa Collier’s layup to end the first half tied the game, 25-25, as both teams headed to the locker room struggling to score.

Breanna Stewart and Wilson missed layups they make in their

sleep. Each guard tabbed by Reeve struggled to protect the ball, which led to 13 first-half turnovers.

Things started to look really bad after France opened the third quarter on a 10-0 run.

A team with the world’s best players looked like a shell of itself. But the U.S. rode a second-half wave from Copper, who responded with her own ball pressure that turned into offense for the Americans.

After not playing many key minutes in the tournament, Copper might have been the most important American on the court for most of the night. Her squad outscored Team France by eight points in her 22 minutes off the bench. She finished with 12 points, five rebounds, two assists and two steals.

After failing to make a field goal in the first half, Kelsey Plum contributed 12 points in the second to help undo France’s run.

Wilson’s dominance down the stretch was reminiscent of her close-out Game 4 win over the Liberty in the 2023 WNBA Finals. The layoffs were falling, she dominated in the midrange, and she eventually ended the night with four blocks and a steal.

After going 2-for-8 in the first half, she finished the game hitting her last four shots from the field.

After the win, Wilson – and the rest of Team USA – celebrated with LeBron James, Sue Bird, Dawn Staley and other stars in attendance.

“What a tremendous basketball game. The 12,000-plus that were here were just treated to an unbelievable environment and the level of athleticism and competitiveness that these players had,” Reeve said. “What a better way to finish the Paris Olympics than to see that? We feel really fortunate, happy, a lot of words. There’s a lot of trust that has to happen, so I’m just thrilled that we’re able to get a win.”

The victory gave Diana Taurasi, who didn’t play in the closeout game, her sixth consecutive gold medal, making her the most decorated basketball player in Olympic history, breaking a tie with Bird.

It also compete a Team USA basketball takeover, with the men’s squad also defeating France in its gold-medal game Saturday. Stephen Curry’s heroics in that matchup gave the team its fifth straight gold.

## Chiles ordered to return bronze, but

American gymnast Jordan Chiles has to return bronze medal she won in the Paris Olympics floor exercise after the Court of Arbitration for Sport voided an on-floor appeal by her coach that awarded her third place, the International Olympic Committee announced Sunday.

The committee announced the medal will be reallocated to Romanian Ana Barbosu after the International Gymnastics Federation said Saturday night it would respect the court's decision and elevate Barbosu to third place.

The decision came less than 24 hours after

CAS voided a scoring appeal made by Team USA coach Cecile Landi during the competition that placed Chiles on the podium.

The US Olympic and Paralympic Committee said it will appeal the decision.

"We firmly believe that Jordan rightfully earned the bronze medal, and there were critical errors in both the initial scoring by the International Gymnastics Federation and the subsequent CAS appeal process that need to be addressed," the US Olympic and Paralympic Committee said in a statement.

CAS ruled Saturday that Landi's appeal to have 0.1 added to Chiles' score came outside the one-minute window allowed by the FIG. The ad hoc committee wrote that Landi's inquiry came a minute and four seconds after

Chiles' initial score was posted.

The IOC said in a statement it will be in touch regarding the return of Chiles' bronze and will work with the Romanian Olympic Committee to discuss a reallocation ceremony honoring Barbosu.

"The initial error occurred in the scoring by FIG, and the second error was during the CAS appeal process, where the USOPC was not given adequate time or notice to effectively challenge the decision," said the USOPC statement, which was released Sunday.

It was unclear the exact process the appeal would take first. The two potential places the USOPC could take the appeal would be to Switzerland's highest court, the Swiss Tribunal, or the European Court of Human Rights.

# USA's Valente pedals away with cycling gold

Jennifer Valente rolled around the Vélodrome National de Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines one last time with the American flag held aloft Sunday, a dominant defense of her Olympic omnium title giving her a second gold medal in a span of four days.

The Stars and Stripes flew often after cycling events at the Paris Games.

The Americans won three gold medals and six in all for their best showing at the Olympics in four decades, and Valente capped everything off in style. The 29-year-old from San Diego finished with 144 points in the final event of the cycling program, well ahead of Daria Pikulik of Poland and Ally Wollaston of New Zealand, who rounded out the omnium podium.

## HASSAN'S MARATHON STRETCH

Nobody will ever accuse Sifan Hassan of taking the easy route at the Olympics.

Heading into the last 150 meters of her 10-day Olympic odyssey that spanned three events and 38 miles, the Netherlands runner traded elbows with Tigst Assefa of Ethiopia, and then sprinted by her to win the women's marathon.

Hassan added gold to the bronze medals she won in the 5,000 and 10,000 meters.

"I feel like I am dreaming. At the end, I thought, 'This is just a 100-meter sprint. Come on, Sifan. One more. Just feel it,'" Hassan said. "Every step I challenged myself, and now I am so grateful."

Hassan raised her hands and yelled as she crossed the line, before wrapping the Dutch flag around her head. Then, taking

in the enormity of her win, Hassan plunged her head in her hands and appeared to weep with joy.

## U.S. DENIED VOLLEYBALL GOLD

Monica De Gennaro of Italy made three previous trips to the Olympics only to leave empty-handed each time.

Finally, at age 37, she's going home with the gold.

Italy beat the defending champion U.S. team Sunday to win gold in women's volleyball at the Paris Olympics.

## WATER POLO BRONZE FOR U.S.

A couple days before the U.S. men's water polo team played its first game at the Paris Olympics, coach Dejan Udovicic let down his guard for a brief moment.

Udovicic, 54, a hard-driving Serbian who played and coached in his native country, said he had changed a lot since he took over the U.S. program in 2013.

"I figured out that I cannot change them. I cannot change the culture in the way how I want immediately," Udovicic said. "So I needed to change myself a lot. So it's not who I am, but I, I needed to change, to really be on the same page that they would be winning group. And they helped me in that it's not easy to handle me, honestly. I am grateful for that."

Evidence of that growth – for Udovicic and his team – was everywhere as the U.S. made a surprising run deep into the Olympic tournament. The Americans lost, 10-6, to Serbia in the semifinals on Friday, but they rallied for a wild 11-8 victory over Hungary in the bronze medal match Sunday.



# U.S. plans to fight on

CAS wrote Saturday that the initial finishing order should be restored, with Barbosu third, Romanian Sabrina Maneca-Voinea fourth and Chiles fifth. The organization added the FIG should determine the final ranking "in accordance with the above decision," but left it up to the federation to decide who would get the medal behind gold winner Rebeca Andrade of Brazil and silver medalist Simone Biles of the U.S.

The FIG said it was the IOC's call on whether to reallocate the medal. The IOC confirmed Sunday it would respect FIG's decision and seek to have Chiles' medal returned.

The rapid turn of events added another layer to what has been a difficult few days for all three athletes.

# Now boxer fights harassment

PARIS – Olympic boxing champion Imane Khelif has filed a legal complaint in France for online harassment after a rain of criticism and false claims about her sex during the Paris Olympics, her lawyer said Sunday.

Khelif, who was Algeria's flag bearer in the closing ceremony, won gold Friday in the women's welterweight division, becoming a new hero in her native Algeria and bringing global attention to women's boxing.

The complaint was filed Friday with a special unit in the Paris prosecutor's office for combating online hate speech, alleging "aggravated cyber-harassment" targeting Khelif, lawyer Nabil Boudi said. In a statement, he described it as a "misogynist, racist and sexist campaign" against the boxer.

It is now up to prosecutors to decide whether to open an investigation. As is common in French law, the complaint doesn't name an alleged perpetrator but leaves it to investigators to determine who could be at fault.

Khelif was unwittingly thrust into a worldwide clash over gender identity and regulation in sports after her first fight, when Italian opponent Angela Carini pulled out just seconds into the match, citing pain from opening punches. False claims that Khelif was transgender or a man erupted online, and the International Olympic Committee defended her and denounced those peddling misinformation. Khelif said the spread of misconceptions about her "harms human dignity."

Earlier, Kirsty Burrows, an official in charge of the IOC's unit for safeguarding and mental health, filed a complaint with French authorities saying she received death threats and harassment online following a news conference in Paris at which she had spoken in defense of Khelif.

The Paris prosecutor's office said it received Burrows' complaint and agents from the National Unit for the Fight against Online Hate are investigating the alleged offenses, including death threats, public provocations aimed at attacking a person, and cyberbullying.

## Judge, Soto and Stanton all homer to back sharp Stroman

A little extra bullpen work served Marcus Stroman well.

Pitching Sunday for the first time since he was pushed back to tinker with his mechanics, Stroman delivered one of his strongest starts in two months in the Yankees' 8-7 victory over the Rangers in the Bronx.

Aaron Judge, meanwhile, moved closer to MLB history with his 299th career home run.

Stroman limited the defending World Series champions to one run over five-plus innings, working around four hits and three walks on 89 pitches to help the Yankees (70-49) clinch a series victory.

"It's hard, over the course of a year, to be so dialed in mechanically," Stroman said. "You're gonna go through spurts, so I'm glad to kind of lock it back into where I need to be."

Stroman threw only six four-seam fastballs, which averaged 90.0 mph. That was up slightly from his season average of 89.8 mph entering Sunday, but still down from his average of 92.0 mph last year. He finished the day with one strikeout and only one swing and miss.

"I'm not results-based," Stroman said. "Definitely making strides in the right direction, but I feel confident."

The right-hander, who primarily leans on his sinker, entered Sunday with a 6.32 ERA over his previous 10 starts. He surrendered seven runs in 2.2 innings his last time out in a home loss to the Blue Jays.

Stroman was originally in line to pitch Thursday, but the Yankees pushed his start back by three days to give him time to make adjustments. On Thursday, Stroman said he "figured some things out" in the bullpen and felt he'd made the necessary changes.

"Probably the extra couple of days (helped), but turning those into work days, too, allowed him to fine tune that a little bit," Aaron Boone said. "Felt like he did a better job, just from the ground up. I thought his lower half set him up for success today, and that was maybe the difference in him pitching the way he did."

A Long Island native, the 33-year-old Stroman joined the Yankees in the offseason on a two-year, \$37 million contract with a conditional player option. He pitched to a 2.60 ERA through his first 12 starts.

He improved to 8-6 with a 4.01 ERA overall this season.

Judge's home run — a seventh-inning solo shot — was his MLB-best 42nd. He

now boasts 299 career homers in 952 games. The fastest to 300 home runs was Ralph Kiner, who achieved the feat in 1,087 games.

"That's not what we play for," Judge said of approaching 300. "I just play to help this team win and put them in a good position. Hopefully it comes with a win. Then it will be something special."

Judge's homer was one of four hit by the Yankees on Sunday. Juan Soto clubbed two, including one directly before Judge's, giving him 30 for the season. Soto has now homered against all 30 MLB teams.

It was the fourth time Soto and Judge went back-to-back.

"It's special," Stroman said of the sluggers. "I truly think we're witnessing history. I think we take it for granted a little bit, just because (with) how incredible

they are each and every day, it's easy to just kind of think that's just expected. It's hard to even put into words what they're doing this year."

Giancarlo Stanton, meanwhile, hit a three-run blast in the fifth inning,

immediately after the Rangers issued an intentional walk to Judge.

It was the sixth time an opponent walked Judge intentionally in the last eight games.

"You've got to want that opportunity and be able to capitalize on it," Stanton said of making teams pay for walking Judge. "Otherwise, it's gonna keep happening. Whether it's me or a lefty (hitter) behind him, depending who's starting, it's important for us to capitalize on that."

The Yankees led, 8-3, after seven innings, but reliever Mark Leiter Jr. surrendered three runs on homers to Nathaniel Lowe and Carson Kelly to cut Texas' deficit to 8-6.

Yankee closer Clay Holmes then sweated out a four-out save, issuing two walks, a hit and a run on 45 pitches. The game ended with Leody Taveras grounding out to second base with runners on second and third.

Texas starter Andrew Heaney, who pitched to a 7.32 ERA over 12 appearances with the Yankees in 2021, was charged with four runs (three earned) in 4.2 innings and took the loss to fall to 4-12. The Yankees improved to 13-17 in games started by left-handers this year.

The Yankees split a doubleheader with the Rangers (55-63) on Saturday. With Sunday's win, they finished their season-long home stand at 5-4.

The Orioles lost Sunday in Tampa Bay, putting the Yankees back into a tie for first place in the AL East.

## Aaron closes on 300, but it's 'not what we play for'

**A**aron Judge is closing in on 300. The Yankee slugger hit the 299th home run of his career in Sunday's 8-7 win over the Rangers, putting him on the doorstep of MLB history.

The 374-foot, opposite-field solo shot came during the seventh inning of Judge's 952nd career game. Ralph Kiner holds the record for the fewest games to 300 homers with 1,087.

Judge finished Sunday with 3,420 career at-bats. Babe Ruth needed the fewest at-bats to reach 300 home runs with 3,830.

"That's not what we play for," Judge said of approaching 300. "I just play to help this team win and put them in a good position. Hopefully it comes with a win. Then it will be something special."

Now in his ninth season, Judge leads the majors with 42 home runs, 106 RBI, 98 walks, a .462 on-base percentage, a .699 slugging percentage and a 1.161 OPS. His .328 average ranks second among MLB hitters.

On Sunday, Judge went 3-for-3 with two runs and an intentional walk. The bottom of the eighth inning ended with Judge on deck, and the Yankees did not bat in the ninth.

"It's incredible," said Giancarlo Stanton, who reached 300 in the fifth-fastest time when he did so in 2018 in his 1,119th

game.

"(Judge) does something special every day, every night," added Stanton, who is MLB's active home run leader with 422. "Being able to see most of his career so far, besides for one year, it's been fun to watch the evolution. He's got more in store."

Judge, 32, debuted with the Yankees in 2016 at age 24. He is seventh on the Yankees' all-time home run list, having passed Derek Jeter (260), Jorge Posada (275) and Bernie Williams (287) this season.

His 62 home runs in 2022 set an American League single-season record.

Judge is set to become the 162nd member of the 300 home-run club — a fraternity that Anthony Rizzo joined earlier this season.

### JAZZ'S HOT START

Jazz Chisholm continues to strike the right note with the Yankees.

With two more home runs in Saturday's doubleheader, the newly acquired Chisholm became the first Yankee ever to hit seven homers in his first 12 games with the team.

"He's brought an energy and kind of a different joy into the room that's really

blended in well with our guys," Boone said before Sunday's series finale against the Rangers. "I'm really enjoying getting to know him and watching him play and seeing what makes him tick."

Chisholm's eighth-inning solo shot in Saturday's second game — a 9-4 loss to the Rangers — gave him 20 home runs this season, setting a new career high.

His 61 RBI and 25 stolen bases through 113 games with the Yankees and Marlins also marked career bests for the five-year veteran, with nearly two months remaining to pad those stats.

"There's no denying the talent," Boone said. "Hopefully he's just

scratching the surface from a career standpoint with what he can be, because I think we're all seeing here, for the first couple of weeks, it's a pretty dynamic skillset."

The lefty-swinging Chisholm, 26, represented this year's biggest trade-deadline acquisition by the Yankees, who sent three prospects, including power-hitting catcher Agustin Ramirez, back to Miami.

### INJURY UPDATES

The plan for Clarke Schmidt's return is coming together.

The right-hander is set to begin a rehab assignment around Aug. 22 and could be back in the rotation by the second week of September, if not earlier, general manager Brian Cashman said Sunday on SiriusXM's MLB Network Radio.

Fellow starter Cody Poteet, who also threw a live session Saturday and is scheduled for another Wednesday, is a little behind Schmidt in his rehab from a right triceps strain, Cashman said.

Right-handed reliever Lou Trivino, meanwhile, is set to begin a rehab assignment "in the middle of next week," Cashman said. Trivino has been out since undergoing Tommy John surgery in May 2023.





Immediately before Chisholm's second home run Saturday, Giancarlo Stanton hit a two-run shot.

That 451-foot no-doubter marked Stanton's first home run in eight games and 30 at-bats since returning from a hamstring strain that sidelined him for more than a month.

Stanton added a three-run homer and a sacrifice fly in Sunday's 8-7 win over the Rangers. He is now hitting .250 with two homers and seven RBI in nine games since being activated.

## Mets end brutal Seattle trip with blowout loss, take 22-1 pounding over weekend

SEATTLE – The Mets were looking for the Mariners to make mistakes. Instead, they made too many of their own and were swept as a result.

It was about as bad of a three-game series possible for the Mets in the Pacific Northwest. Coming into the series, the Amazins' were holding onto the third NL Wild Card spot and, thanks to a loss by the Braves, they were able to survive a series-opening loss and maintain that spot.

But now, after a 12-1 stomping at the hands of the Mariners at T-Mobile

Park on Sunday night, the Mets head back home after a 10-game road trip 0.5 games behind their NL East rivals. They managed only a single run in Seattle this weekend, a home run by Jeff McNeil in Sunday's series finale.

McNeil's 11th homer of the season came in the top of the sixth off right-hander Luis Severino. It cut the deficit to 4-1, but the Mariners' lead soon swelled to nine after a disastrous bottom of the sixth.

Right-hander Ryne Stanek, who was traded from Seattle last month to bolster the Mets' bullpen, was hit hard right away. Jorge Polanco drilled a 1-0

fastball for a double off the right-center field wall that was nearly a home run. Luke Raley walked and a wild pitch moved the runners over. Stanek walked Josh Rojas to load the bases with no outs.

Dominic Canzone, who was 2-for-2 with two doubles before the seventh, struck out. But Stanek and the Mets were far from out of the woods.

Facing No. 9 hitter Leo Rivas, Stanek reached back for a 98 MPH fastball. It was a strike to the outside corner of the plate, but Rivas got a hold of it and lined it to right field to score Polanco.

With the Mariners up, 5-1, the Mets went to veteran right-hander Adam Ottavino, who struggled against the same lineup his last time out Friday night. He didn't fare much better this time.

Leadoff hitter Victor Robles hit a hard grounder up the middle and Jeff McNeil attempted a spinning throw to first base for the out. The throw was off target and Pete Alonso couldn't pick it. Two more runs crossed.

After striking out Randy Arozarena for the second out, Ottavio gave up a three-run bomb to Cal Raleigh, the cleanup hitter's second homer of the day.

Left-hander Danny Young allowed two runs in the eighth. The Mariners

poured it on while the Mets couldn't buy an out or a run.

Right-hander Luis Severino went toe-to-toe with Castillo for the first four innings. He allowed a leadoff home run to Polanco in the second inning, but was effective until the fifth. Canzone doubled to lead off and was moved over on a bunt by Rivas. Severino struck out Robles, but a single by Arozarena scored Canzone to make it 2-0. Then Raleigh homered, swinging at the first pitch from Severino and sending it over the right-center field fence.

Severino took his third straight loss (7-6), giving up four earned runs on six hits, walking two and striking out eight over five innings.

Castillo held the Mets to one run on four hits, walked two and struck out nine in six innings (10-11).

The Mets went 4-6 on the trip to move to 61-57 on the season, losing a series to the lowly Angels before winning a makeup game in St. Louis and a series against the Rockies. They were road weary by the time they got to Seattle (63-56) to face the league's best pitching staff, but few could have predicted they would be outscored 22-1 over three games.

They'll return home for a nine-game home stand and try to recapture the magic they had at Citi Field earlier this summer.

## Marte's return comes at right time for Mets

SEATTLE – Starling Marte is inching closer to a return from a knee injury. It couldn't come at a better time.

Marte continued his rehab assignment Sunday in New Jersey with Double-A Binghamton. The right-fielder will play at least two more games next week in either Double-A or Triple-A with the next step being seven or more innings in back-to-back games.

The club is monitoring him to see how his body responds from his rehab outings, but so far the veteran has gone through his rehab without any setbacks and has reported no knee pain.

With the offense struggling to produce runs and a few players needing days off, Marte's return could provide an offensive spark while also allowing for more lineup flexibility.

"He's a big part of this team," manager Carlos Mendoza said Sunday before the Mets played the final game of a three-game set against the Mariners. "He's been out for a long time and guys, I feel like they're stepping up, but he's going to be a huge addition for us with the bat speed and everything."

After missing much of the 2023 season with groin injuries, Marte was enjoying a solid bounce-back campaign before injuring his knee in June. It didn't seem he was injured the way he was swinging the bat. Marte hit .351 with a .922 OPS with two doubles, two triples, a home run, 11 RBI and four stolen bases in four attempts in the 16 starts he made before going on the injured list.

The Mets still aren't sure how the injury occurred. The team called it a bone bruise, but Marte said his doctors believed it to be an overuse injury.

Whatever the cause may be, he recently told the Daily News that when he returns, he won't be limited in any capacity. Known for his speed on the basepaths, Marte expects to pick right back up where he left.

Without him, the Mets have primarily been using Tyrone Taylor and Jesse Winker in right field. Winker was traded by the Nationals last month and could return to DH duties when Marte returns. Taylor has done well offensively and defensively and will continue to spell outfielders at all three spots.

But with other injuries, the depth is in danger of dropping. The Mets gave Harrison Bader a day off Sunday and used Brandon Nimmo in center field, Winker in left and light-hitting outfielder Ben Gamel in right. Jeff McNeil was set to play outfield, but third baseman Mark Vientos was scratched late with a left ankle injury.

### TERRIFIC LEGACY

Late pitcher Tom Seaver's daughter, Sarah Seaver Zaske, and her family were in attendance at T-Mobile Park on Sunday. Seaver Zaske, who is based in Washington, brought her three sons and some of their friends to watch the team her father played for. The family chatted with Mendoza and former Mets pitcher David Cone on the field before the game.

Cone was in Seattle with ESPN as part of the broadcast team for Sunday Night Baseball.

### TRAINER'S ROOM

Right-hander Dedniel Núñez (pronator strain) threw a bullpen session at Citi Field on Sunday. Right-hander Sean Reid-Foley (shoulder impingement) was set to pitch Friday night with Triple-A Syracuse, but because of storms in the northeast the game was postponed. The Mets hope to get Reid-Foley on the mound Tuesday with Triple-A Syracuse to pitch more than one inning.





# NABERS LIMPS OFF

Giants' top pick hurt at practice, WR likely to sit out next preseason game

Malik Nabers hurt his left foot at Sunday morning's Giants practice and was hobbling slowly and gingerly with his shoe off before sitting down to stay off it completely.

The team's initial belief as of early Sunday afternoon was that Nabers has a minor left ankle sprain, but their top receiver has to undergo follow-up tests to confirm that preliminary diagnosis.

This injury presumably rules Nabers out of Saturday's second preseason game in Houston at least.

The No. 6 overall pick has had an encouraging training camp as the focal point of Brian Daboll's 2024 offense. But he has had a challenging last few days:

He saw zero targets on 12 snaps in last Thursday's preseason opener against Detroit. And although he caught a touchdown pass from Daniel Jones in Sunday's practice, he couldn't escape the session without getting banged up.

The Giants need him healthy because of the explosive potential he has shown as the heir apparent to Saquon Barkley as Daboll's new top weapon.

"(Nabers) has shown me that, in my mind, he's a true No. 1 receiver in this league," defensive backs coach Jerome Henderson said Sunday. "There are gonna be some corners on other teams that are gonna see this guy as a young player, and they're gonna have their hands full. They're gonna see that this dude is a real, big-time player."

"You don't get a play off with

him," the DBs coach continued. "Even when you're in good position, he will keep closing back to the ball. He has great body control. He has great quickness. He is a legit No. 1 receiver in my mind."

He can only be a true No. 1 receiver, though, if he's on the field. So the focus now must be on making sure he's ready no later than the start of the regular season. That could mean he has seen his last game action of the preseason.

Nabers exited an 11-on-11 rep limping at Sunday's practice, walked to a trainer and removed his left cleat. He then reached down and rubbed the top of the outside of his left foot before limping to the sideline.

There, Nabers removed his sock and went barefoot and sat down on the grass as three trainers examined him. When he stood

up, he was limping very slowly and uncomfortably. So he then sat down on an equipment chest to watch the end of practice, where he could extend his left leg and ankle into the air.

The initial diagnosis of a minor ankle sprain could be considered encouraging, but it's also important to remember that some recent Giants player injuries have turned out to be different than originally believed.

Right tackle Evan Neal's broken left ankle was initially misdiagnosed as a sprain last season, so he was rehabbing it as a sprain until a follow-up scan revealed he had a fracture that required surgery. He then had a spring setback, and he only just came off the physically unable to perform list Sunday for individual drills in his first practice of camp.

Quarterback Drew Lock's injury from Thursday's preseason opener also is worse than originally believed.

GM Joe Schoen said during the game broadcast that: "It looks like he got out OK. He's gonna be all right. If something happened and he had to go back in the game, he could, from the word I received."

But then it was reported that Lock has a strained oblique and a hip pointer, or a bad bone bruise, and he is going to miss time, at least a few weeks.

Daboll said he expects Jones to play for the first time this preseason in Houston, which means the starters will get some playing time. That likely won't include Nabers now, though, as time ticks toward the Week 1 opener on Sept. 8 against the Vikings.

# TE Jackson to fill in as Giant QB

**B**rian Daboll said the Giants are not signing another quarterback, even though Daniel Jones and Tommy DeVito are the only two healthy QBs on the roster for this week's game in Houston. The coach said instead, the Giants will have tight end Tyree Jackson prepared as an emergency third QB if necessary.

"It'll be Tyree. We had him in Buffalo. Tyree Jackson," Daboll said. "He has played quarterback. If he had to go in, he knows our system, taking snaps, albeit he's been a tight end the last couple years. But he'll take some quarterback center exchange out here. But I don't envision playing him unless something happens."

Jackson, 26, a college quarterback at Buffalo, has been a tight end since he joined the Eagles in 2021. As an undrafted rookie in 2019, he led Joe Schoen's and Daboll's Bills to a huge fourth-quarter comeback from 23-6 down in the final preseason game to win, 27-23, over the Vikings. He hit none other than wide receiver David Sills on the winning

touchdown pass with eight seconds remaining.

On Sunday, Jackson got smoked by safety Tyler Nubin at the goal line on a hospital ball by DeVito, but he continued practicing after receiving a quick check from head athletic trainer Ronnie Barnes.

The Falcons, meanwhile, waived quarterback Nathan Rourke on Sunday after one preseason game. So it's possible the Giants could try to bring Rourke back as insurance after cutting him early in camp.

They opened up an extra roster spot to do that if they wish by waiving corner Kaleb Hayes and running back Jacob Saylor while signing only one player, former Miami Hurricanes undrafted rookie linebacker K.J. Clody.

## SCHMITZ ALSO BACK ON FIELD

Center John Michael Schmitz (shoulder) returned alongside Evan Neal for individual work, even though he did not participate in team drills. When he stepped in for a first-team walkthrough, though, it looked like a preview of

the Giants' Week 1 starting five: left tackle Andrew Thomas, left guard Jon Runyan Jr., Schmitz, right guard Greg Van Roten and right tackle Jermaine Eluemunor. Van Roten played a lot of center in Sunday's 11-on-11 periods with Aaron Stinnie at right guard, but Van Roten also slid over to right guard at times with Austin Schlottmann stepping into the pivot. That looked like the Giants giving Van Roten some work at the position he projects to play in Week 1, the position he played all of last season with the Raiders. ...

Tight end Lawrence Cager (hamstring) also returned to practice, and tight end Jack Stoll (concussion) began his ramp-up back to participation ... Corner Cor'Dale Flott (quad) is out for at least another week. So Nick McCloud started as the No. 2 outside corner opposite Deonte Banks. Tre Hawkins III also rotated in with McCloud after being named the Giants' defensive player of the game for their preseason win over the Lions ... Linebacker Dyontae Johnson (ankle), safety Elijah Riley (concussion), safety Gervarrius Owens (knee) and wide receiver Dennis Houston (right hand in a heavy wrap) did not practice

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## Dodgers rookie righty Ryan may miss rest of season

Dodgers rookie right-hander **River Ryan** will miss the remainder of the season with an elbow injury that occurred during his fourth career major-league start Saturday against the Pirates.

Dodgers manager **Dave Roberts** did not know the specifics of Ryan's injury after the 25-year-old underwent an MRI on Sunday morning. Roberts did say Tommy John surgery is under consideration for the former two-way player, who was acquired in a trade from the Padres in March 2022.

"They are waiting on other scans to determine the exact course of action," Roberts said.

Ryan went 1-0 for the Dodgers this season with a 1.33 ERA and went 4 2/3 scoreless innings before he departed Saturday's game. He had a 2.22 ERA in eight minor-league starts over three different levels in 2024, while the Dodgers limited his usage in the minors to 49 appearances (45 starts) over three seasons.

Ryan said he started to feel tightness in his forearm in the third inning Saturday and continued to pitch until he was removed in the fifth inning after showing discomfort following a pitch to the Pirates' **Michael A. Taylor**.

"It's part of the game, man," Ryan said after Saturday's game. "The pitch clock definitely makes you speed up a lot. Back in the day, you didn't have to speed up as much

when you threw. So throwing back-to-back pitches in 15 seconds, it starts to take a toll. But we'll see how it pans out."

## VERLANDER WORKS WAY BACK

**Justin Verlander** took his first step to returning to the Astros, tossing three innings for Triple-A Sugar Land on Saturday night.

Working back from neck stiffness that's sidelined him for two months, the 41-year-old, three-time Cy Young Award winner threw 52 pitches, 36 for strikes, allowing one run with three strikeouts and two walks.

Astros manager **Joe Espada** said they were waiting to hear how he felt Sunday, and then he'll probably get another rehab start before he could get back to the majors.

Verlander hasn't pitched since June 9. He also missed the beginning of the season with right shoulder inflammation before going 3-2 with a 3.95 ERA in 10 starts. He made his season debut April 19.

## RANGERS CHECK OUT MAX'S SHOULDER

**Max Scherzer**, who has been limited to eight starts this season, is returning to Texas to get his fatigued right shoulder checked out, general manager **Chris Young** said Sunday.

Scherzer was placed on the injured list Aug. 2 with fatigue and will not return when first eligible later this week.
