Trump tells rally he can win NM

Thousands wait hours in line to see Trump


Thousands of Donald Trump supporters spent hours in traffic and waiting in line for a chance to see the presidential candidate in Albuquerque on Thursday. Some had traveled from Las Cruces, Truth or Consequences and even Arizona.

There were so many people eager to attend Trump's last-minute campaign visit to New Mexico that thousands were left outside of the rally, watching Trump's speech on a large screen that initially did not have sound.

Down the road, a group of approximately 40 protesters chanted their objections to the former president.

Vendors with Trump hats and

Despite trailing in state polls and having lost twice in New Mexico, Donald Trump expressed confidence on Thursday that Hispanic voters could help deliver him an unlikely victory in the state when votes are counted next week.

"We almost won it twice, and I believe we won it twice," Trump said to an estimated crowd of 7,000 people who gathered at a private hangar near the Albuquerque International Sunport for the former president's campaign rally.

Trump touched down in his private airplane just after noon and spoke for nearly 90 minutes before departing for another campaign stop in Nevada.

He spent much of his speech criticizing his Democratic rival, Kamala Harris, whom he described as a "total stiff," and voicing concerns about crimes committed by undocumented immigrants.

But Trump also touted his growing support levels among Hispanic voters, saying "Hispanics love Trump."

A recent Journal poll found 41% of Hispanic

US district judge halts 'de facto' ban on use of campaign funds

State senator had made \$200 donation for a high school student workshop

Veteran state Sen. Jerry Ortiz y Pino of Albuquerque tapped his campaign account in 2021 to make a \$200 donation for a high school student's summer workshop.

The modest expenditure was subsequently deemed illegal under the state's Campaign Reporting Act, but a federal judge this week decided the ban on charitable donations to individuals was itself problematic.

So U.S. District Judge Margaret Strickland of Las Cruces halted, at least for now, any enforcement of the provision by the New Mexico Secretary of State's Office—for any political candidate with campaign money to spend. Strickland agreed with Ortiz y Pino's

request for a preliminary injunction to keep Secretary of State Maggie Toulouse Oliver from referring such campaign expenditures for civil and criminal enforcement.

"The threatened injury to Senator Ortiz y Pino's First Amendment rights to political speech outweigh the harm a preliminary injunction may cause Secretary Toulouse Oliver," Strickland wrote. "... (T)he Court finds that an injunction will not adversely affect the public interest. Enjoining a statute

that restricts political speech promotes the public interest."

The ruling came after Ortiz y Pino, a Democrat, sued Secretary of State Toulouse Oliver in March, contending that her enforcement of that part of the campaign reporting law violated the First Amendment. Her office asked Ortiz y Pino to repay the \$200 to his campaign funds, but he refused. She referred the matter to the state Attorney General's

Harris says Trump's comment on women 'is offensive to everybody'

Former president said at a rally he would protect women 'whether they like it or not'

PHOENIX — Kamala Harris said Thursday that Donald Trump's comment that he would protect women whether they "like it or not" shows that the Republican presidential nominee does not understand women's rights "to make decisions about their own lives, including their own bodies."

"I think it's offensive to everybody, by the way," Harris said before she set out to spend the day campaigning in the Western battleground states of Arizona and Nevada.

She followed up those remarks at her rally in Phoenix: "He simply does not respect the freedom of women or the intelligence of women to know what's in their own best interests and make decisions accordingly. But we trust women."

The comments by Trump come as he has struggled to connect with women voters and as Harris courts women in both parties with a message centered on freedom. She's making the pitch that women should be free to make their own decisions about their bodies and that if Trump is elected, more restrictions will follow.

Trump appointed three of the justices to the U.S. Supreme Court who formed the conservative majority that overturned federal abortion rights. As the fallout from the 2022 decision spreads, he has taken to claiming at public events and in social media posts that he would "protect women" and ensure they wouldn't be "thinking about abortion."

At a rally Wednesday evening near Green Bay, Wisconsin, Trump told his supporters that aides had

urged him to stop using the phrase because it was "inappropriate."

Then he added a new bit to the protector line. He said he told his aides: "Well, I'm going to do it whether the women like it or not. I am going to protect them."

Harris said the remark was part of a pattern of troubling statements by Trump.

"This is just the latest on a long series of reveals by the former president of how he thinks about women and their agency," she said.

Harris tied Trump's comments to his approach to reproductive rights, but Trump generally speaks more of protecting women from criminals, terrorists and foreign adversaries, in keeping with the bleak picture he paints of a country in decline.

"I'm going to protect them from migrants coming in. I'm going to protect them from foreign countries that want to hit us with missiles and lots of other things," Trump said during a rally in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

He seemed to tie in abortion when he first used the "protector" language in a Truth Social post and at a rally in Indiana, Pennsylvania, on Sept. 20. He assured the women who would be "protected" that they "will no longer be thinking about abortion."

The dispute showed

signs Thursday of further entrenching each candidate's supporters.

It was not only women who described Trump's remarks as offensive. At the Harris rally in Phoenix, Edison Kinlicheenie, 50, said he sees Trump more as a threat than a protector, noting that the former president has a track record of preying on women.

"I have a wife and a daughter, so I wouldn't let no predator like that come around" them, Kinlicheenie said.

At a Trump rally in Albuquerque, Sarah Pyle, 41, cited the opposition to allowing transgender athletes to compete in women's events to portray Trump as someone who helps women.

"I don't want my girls to grow up in a world like this," the Albuquerque mother said, referring to the controversy. "We fought for women's rights for so long, and now we're giving them back to men. It makes no sense."

More broadly, Trump and Republicans have struggled with how to talk about abortion rights, particularly as women around the nation are grappling with obtaining proper medical care because of abortion restrictions that have had implications far beyond the ability to end an unwanted pregnancy.

Trump has given contradictory answers about his position on abortion, at some points saying that women

should be punished for having abortions and showcasing the justices he appointed. During his successful 2016 campaign, he told voters that if he were elected, he would appoint justices to the Supreme Court to overturn Roe v. Wade and said he was "pro-life."

But in recent weeks he's promised to veto a national abortion ban, after repeatedly refusing to make such a pledge. He's said the states should regulate care and said some laws were "too tough."

Since 2022, the patchwork of state laws on abortion has created uneven medical care. Some women have died. Others have bled in emergency room parking lots or became critically ill from sepsis as doctors in states with strict abortion bans send pregnant women away until they are sick enough to warrant medical care. That includes women who never intended to end pregnancies. Both infant and maternal mortality has risen.

Harris' campaign has highlighted Trump's statements around women. In one campaign ad, a woman who became gravely ill with sepsis after a pregnancy complication stands in front of a mirror looking at a large scar on her abdomen, as audio plays of Trump's comments about protecting women.

Harris hopes abortion will be a strong motivator for women at the ballot box.

In early voting so far, 1.2 million more women than men have voted across the seven battleground states, according to data from analytics firm TargetSmart.

That doesn't necessarily translate into Democratic gains. But in the 2020 presidential election, there was a 9 percentage point difference between men and women in support for Joe Biden and Kamala Harris, according to AP VoteCast, a survey of more than 110,000 voters.

Rocket fire kills 7 in Israel; US officials seek cease-fire support

TEL AVIV, Israel — Israeli authorities say rocket barrages fired from Lebanon have killed four foreign workers and three Israelis in northern Israel in the deadliest cross-border strikes from the country since Israel launched its ground invasion.

Israel was pressing on with its deadly aerial attacks on Hezbollah across Lebanon, where health authorities on Thursday reported 24 people killed. In northern Gaza, Israeli forces struck one of the last functioning hospitals, the World Health Organization said, destroying much-needed supplies that agency had delivered to the facility.

The latest violence in Lebanon and Gaza came as top U.S. diplomats were in the region to push for cease-fires.

US Muslims struggle to find candidate they can tolerate

ATLANTA — Just four years ago, most U.S. Muslim voters supported Democratic President Joe Biden. But with his administration's support for Israel and handling of the wars in the Middle East leaving many of them feeling outraged and ignored, some are seeking a rebuff of the Democrats through the ballot box, including by favoring third-party options for president.

Others wrestle with how to express their anger amid warnings by some that another Donald Trump presidency would be worse for them.

Survivors of deadly collapse at Georgia dock seek state's help

SAVANNAH, Ga. — Survivors of a deadly walkway collapse at a state-operated ferry dock in Georgia say state officials should help them pay for funerals for the seven people killed as well as medical bills and counseling for those who lived. Lawmakers on Georgia's Senate Urban Affairs Committee heard Thursday from four people who were at the dock on Sapelo Island when a metal gangway collapsed Oct. 19, sending dozens plunging into the water.

Los Angeles County sues Pepsi, Coca-Cola over plastic bottle

LOS ANGELES — Los Angeles County is taking on Pepsi and Coke for their role in plastic pollution. In a lawsuit filed Wednesday, the county alleged PepsiCo and Coca-Cola companies have misled the public about the recyclability of their plastic bottles and downplayed the negative impacts of plastic disposal.

Coca-Cola and PepsiCo own brands like Dasani, Sprite, Gatorade, Mountain Dew, and more. They have been ranked as the world's top plastic polluters for five consecutive years. A spokesperson representing both companies denied the accusations, saying their bottles are "designed to be recycled and remade and can include up to 100% recycled plastic."

US economy grew at a solid 2.8%, consumers help drive growth

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy grew at a healthy 2.8% annual rate from July through September, with consumers helping drive growth despite the weight of still-high interest rates.

The gross domestic product — the economy's total output of goods and services — did slow slightly from its 3% growth rate in the April-June quarter. But the latest figures still reflect surprising durability just as Americans assess the state of the economy in the final stretch of the presidential race.

Cold air, moisture bring snow to Hawaii's Mauna Kea

HONOLULU — Snow fell on Hawaii's tallest peak this week, briefly turning the mountaintop into a winter wonderland. The summit area of Mauna Kea on the Big Island got about 2 inches of white powder.

Hawaii is better known for its warm weather, beaches and rainforests. But it's not unusual for snow to fall at the

higher elevations on Mauna Kea during the wetter, winter months.

The summit is so high — it sits 13,803 feet above sea level — that temperatures there can drop below freezing year-round, creating the potential for snow during any month.

This week, an upper level disturbance brought colder temperatures as moisture came in from the east and moved over the islands Sunday through Mon-

day, said Maureen Ballard, a senior meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Honolulu.

"Combination of cold temperatures and moisture equals snow when it's below freezing," Ballard said.

Webcams mounted on the Canada-France-Hawaii Telescope showed the ground covered in white shortly after sunrise on Monday. Two days later, the cameras showed the snow was gone.

Today in history:

On Nov. 1, 1938, in a two-horse match race, Seabiscuit defeated the favored Triple Crown winner War Admiral by four lengths in what was dubbed the "Race of the Century" at Pimlico Race Course in Baltimore.

Also on this date:

In 1765, the Stamp Act, passed by the British Parliament, went into effect, prompting stiff resistance from American colonists.

In 1861, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln named Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan General-in-Chief of the Union armies, succeeding Lt. Gen. Winfield Scott.

In 1894, Nicholas II became Emperor of Russia, succeeding his late father Alexander III.

In 1936, in a speech in Milan, Italy, Benito Mussolini described the alliance between his country and Nazi Germany as an "axis" running between Rome and Berlin.

In 1950, two Puerto Rican nationalists tried to force their way into Blair House

In 1995, peace talks opened in Dayton, Ohio, with the leaders of Bosnia, Serbia and Croatia present.

Flaunting that independent spirit ahead of the election

More NM voters decline to register with either party

Independent voters rival Republicans in Bernalillo County in numbers and are expected to surpass them in the coming years, according to political analysts.

Nearly a quarter of voters, 24%, are registered as independent or decline to state, while approximately 28% are Republicans, according to registration statistics from the New Mexico Secretary of State's Office.

Nationwide, those who identify as independent outnumbered either major party as early as 1991, according to surveys by Gallup. That trend has persisted with 43%

of those surveyed identifying as independent, while Democrats and Republicans each clocked in at 27% in 2023.

It is unclear how many of those people are officially registered as independents ahead of the 2024 election as the U.S. Census Bureau releases national statistics after the election.

Closing that 4% gap between independent and Republican voter registrations in New Mexico is not so much a probability as an inevitability, according to longtime New Mexico political analyst Brian Sanderoff of Research & Polling Inc.

"Those who are more likely to declare a party are passing away as they get older," Sanderoff said, "and they're being replaced by a younger generation of people who are less enamored with either major party and

decide to go unaffiliated."

In 2018, the majority of new state voters registered as independent, according to the Secretary of State's Office.

How much power the independent voting bloc has is up for debate. On one hand, independents are desirable targets for campaigns.

"Independent voters have a lot of clout," Sanderoff said, "to the extent that the political campaigns recognize that by definition, an independent voter is more persuadable."

However, independents are less likely to actually turn up to the polls, Sanderoff said. This is supported by early voting statistics that show that, as of Oct. 17, only 3.3% of registered independent voters had gone

Visitors can design their own art as miniature parade floats

The Albuquerque Museum is hosting a free community event featuring shoebox parade floats, a DJ spinning Motown and a screening by the acclaimed filmmaker Sterlin Harjo ("Reservation Dogs").

Equal parts Day of the Dead and a celebration of Native American and Latinx artists, the party runs from 1-8 p.m. on Saturday, complete with food trucks and music.

Visitors will get to design their own art projects in the form of miniature parade floats, museum curator Josie Lopez said.

"We'll provide the materials; shoeboxes and different kinds of paper," she said. "Hopefully, they'll bring their own photographs."

The individual works will reflect the museum's installation of Mario Ybarra Jr.'s full-sized parade float dedicated to his mother.

"She'd clean the house every Saturday while listen-

ing to her favorite music," Lopez said.

The piece features a platform where visitors can attach their own hand-made flowers, she added.

"On top of that, it spins with marionettes of his mother. It's mostly Motown music. It is totally nostalgic," Lopez added.

The Seminole/Muscogee filmmaker Harjo will screen his latest film "Love and Fury," a tribute to Indigenous artists.

"The film follows several (Indigenous) artists as they navigate the art world," Lopez said. Co-creator of the TV series "Reservation

'Disruption is coming' to education

AEI fellow, former teacher Robert Pondiscio delivers stark insights during Chamber meeting

During the Greater Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce's annual meeting this week, American Enterprise Institute senior fellow Robert Pondiscio began his remarks by asking for a show of hands of how many people had attended a geographically zoned district public school.

Almost all the hands in a ballroom at the Albuquerque Convention Center went up.

Pondiscio then asked how many people attended a private school or some other form of school. Around the same number of hands went up.

But the number of attendees who signaled they attended charter school was fewer — and only one hand went up for home schooling, Pondiscio noted.

He said, today, about 40% of children are attending another type of school other than a one in a geographically zoned district.

"That is a remarkable shift that has occurred within the lifetime of everybody in this room," said Pondiscio, a former New York City teacher and journalist who became an education policy expert. "Our perception of public education is evolving."

He then told the group, "The forces of disruption have come at last for education," as they have in other economic sectors.

It was those same exact words Pondiscio, who has no ties to New Mexico, wrote in an Oct. 18 column for the Journal. In his column, Pondiscio said his Wednesday speech at the convention center would allow him to "get the conversation started," which he did not only in his speech but in a spirited question-and-answer session with attendees. Albuquerque Public Schools Superintendent Gabriella Blakey and several members of the APS Board of Education attended.

"You could have had anybody (speak at this meeting), but to have someone from the world of education policy says something good about this organization," Pondiscio said.

Pondiscio elaborated on his "disruption" argument by using the term "peak oil," which describes the irreversible decline of oil production after reaching its peak rate.

"We have not yet reached 'peak oil' — we might not in our lifetime — but we have hit peak public education, peak public school," Pondiscio said. "There are some, too, who believe it will leave a disaster — and

258 MDC inmates register to cast their ballots

While there are many barriers to the ballot, being behind bars doesn't have to be one of them.

In early October, 258 Bernalillo County Metropolitan Detention Center inmates registered to vote during a drive put on by MDC staff and election volunteers, the jail announced recently.

Those who registered to vote made up 14% of the current inmate population, 1,796 inmates, according to the booking sheet.

For scale, two years ago, 1,350 votes

were the margin of victory for Democrat Gabe Vasquez in the race for the 2nd Congressional District seat.

In New Mexico, convicted felons are unable to vote while serving their sentences. Although not all inmates in MDC are legally eligible to vote, there is a sizable percentage who are awaiting a trial or serving sentences for misdemeanors.

In 2023, the Legislature passed a law that allows felons who are no longer incarcerated to re-register to vote, which restored voting rights to 17,000 New Mexicans.

This law also restored voting rights

to "on paper" felons, meaning people on probation and parole.

Spokespeople from MDC were uncertain of how many inmates were eligible voters.

The event was originally intended to be one day, but due to ongoing interest from eligible inmates, volunteers returned the following week to continue registration.

Third-party Voter Registration Agents, who are nonpartisan volunteers, helped the inmates to register to vote and filed 275 inmate requests for absentee ballots.

'I want justice for him'

Crime Stoppers seeks info on Southeast ABQ homicide

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is looking for information regarding a homicide in Southeast Albuquerque in early October.

According to a Crime Stoppers Facebook post, Arturo Montoya, 47, was fatally shot on Oct. 5 in an alley south of Cochiti SE, between Florida and Indiana.

Crime Stoppers said two pickup trucks were seen entering the alley before and after the shooting. If anyone recognizes these vehicles or has any information on the investigation, they are encouraged to contact Crime Stoppers

Montoya's daughter, Lily Montoya, told the Journal on Thursday that the last few weeks have been "really rough" and she wants to know who shot her father.

"I heard there were some bad people who did hurt my dad and I want justice for him," she said.

A GoFundMe page was set up to raise money for Arturo's family and cover funeral expenses.

"This life was rough and unfair to him. He went down a bad path in life and no matter how hard he tried he couldn't get out of it," the post states. "He wanted nothing more than to be there for his family, especially his 4-year-old granddaughter.

"The bond they shared was like nothing else and it's heartbreaking that she will never see or hold her papa again and that he will

not have another opportunity to create a better path for himself..."

Lily Montoya said her father always watched football decked out in Pittsburgh Steelers gear

and loved to camp and fish.

"My dad was a good man with a big heart," she said, "and my heart is broken (knowing) that he doesn't get to be there for his granddaughter anymore."

maybe it will."

There is good reason to be nervous about school-age children when public school ideals are abandoned, he said.

"The relationship between Americans and public schools have never been more in play than it is right now," Pondiscio said.

Home schooling, charter school and private school attendance have all gone up, he said, while pandemic-era disruptions "broke that habit of schooling for young families."

Pondiscio also cited chronic absenteeism — when a student misses 10% or more of the school year — as an issue that has hurt public schools nationwide. He said New Mexico had some of the worst rates of chronic absenteeism in the country, which data from The Associated Press and Stanford University found in 2023. Although Pondiscio did not mention it, data from Albuquerque Public Schools showed that 31% of its students were chronically absent in the 2023-2024 school year.

The disruptions lead Pondiscio to believe that by the end of the decade, half of American children "will do something else" for their education other than attend a traditional public school.

Despite disruptions in public education, there is an upside, he said.

"In redefining public education, not as real estate, not as that experience that we all had — a collection of buildings called public schools — the potential is here to usher in a new age of educational dynamism," Pondiscio said.

He left attendees with a few closing thoughts, including "like it or not, disruption is coming" to education.

"Avoid the temptation to pit private and public entities against each other," Pondiscio said.

APS school board member RONALDA TOME-WARITO, who noted during a discussion with Pondiscio that she is an advocate for children with disabilities, said in an

interview following the senior fellow's speech that she disagrees with many of his views on education.

"Often, when I put his lens to mine, I don't see all kids fitting in," Tome-Warito said.

Terri Cole, president and CEO of the Chamber, praised Pondiscio's insights on education and told the Journal why her group invited the senior fellow to speak.

"He is an insightful author, former public school teacher and journalist, and one of the most innovative thinkers in America today on how to improve education," Cole wrote in an email prior to Pondiscio's remarks.

"At the Chamber, we believe our city's and state's long-term economic growth hinges, in large part, on our ability to ensure every child has access to a great school and is prepared for college, a career, and life. That's why we're so eager to put a spotlight on education reform today at our annual meeting; delivering a great education to New Mexico children is as essential to a child's success in life as it is to our community's success economically."

Dogs," Harjo and the Glorieta-based artist Cannupa Hanska Luger (Standing Rock Reservation) will launch a live audience recording of the "Broken Boxes Podcast" series "Long Con," an ongoing conversation between the two artists.

"Obviously, in terms of the art project, there's going to be a lot of celebrating and creating and engaging in material that is hands-on," Lopez added. "There will be some interesting insights into the art world."

About the artists

Sterlin Harjo, co-created the Emmy Award-nominated TV series "Reservation Dogs" and has directed multiple feature films and documentaries exploring Indigenous experiences. A founding member of the 1491s, a Native sketch comedy troupe, Harjo has received numerous awards for his work in film and television. In an October New York Times story about the 2024 MacArthur Fellowships, Harjo (a recipient) said, "The dreams that I had when I was young about changing the world and about changing representation and about showing us as real human beings, all of that meant something and it did change the world."

Cannupa Hanska Luger, an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes of Fort Berthold as well as Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara and Lakota, was born on the

Standing Rock Reservation in North Dakota. Now based in Glorieta, Luger creates monumental installations, sculptures and performances incorporating ceramics, steel fiber, video and repurposed materials. He has been exhibited at both the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the 2024 Whitney Biennial.

Mario Ybarra Jr., a former University of California at Irvine art professor, is a Los Angeles-based conceptual artist combining street culture with fine art to reflect Mexican American experiences. Ybarra's work examines excluded social norms, often focusing on complete environments, histories and stories. He is the founder of Slanguage Studio artist group and has significantly impacted his community through art education. His work has been exhibited internationally, including at London's Tate Museum, and the 2008 Whitney Biennial.

to the polls, accounting for a total of 12% of those who have voted.

Democrats and Republicans have flocked to early voting in much greater numbers, accounting for approximately 51% and 36% of ballots cast respectively.

"That's probably due to the fact that independents are just less partisan to start, and might just decide that they don't like any of the candidates and stay home," Sanderoff said.

Additionally, there are few options outside of the two parties on the ballot in New Mexico. In New Mexico, there are only two independent candidates on the ballot beyond Robert F. Kennedy Jr., who remained on the ballot despite dropping out of the presidential race in August.

One is Zach Withers, a farmer born and raised in the East Mountains who is taking his hands off of the butcher block and stepping into the fray of local politics.

"There's a lot of hate in our communities, and we have so much more in common than we have differences," Withers told the Journal. "And we're being manipulated into supporting two parties that don't actually have a whole lot of substantive differences on most of the issues that affect everybody's lives."

What are those key issues? According to Withers they're the tangible necessities of life: water and food. For Withers, neither side is doing enough to address water scarcity in the East Mountains.

Powering Withers' campaign are three volunteers and nearly \$3,000 in donations, most of which has been spent on signage and newspaper ads, according to a finance report submitted to the Secretary of State.

Meanwhile his rival, Stefani Lord, the Republican incumbent, has spent more than \$50,000 on her reelection campaign thus far and received more than \$87,000 in campaign contributions, according to data from the Secretary of State's Office.

Lord's top four donors are other candidates' campaigns, including her own, and the Roosevelt County Republican Central Committee. Withers' top donors are private citizens who donated from a thousand to a few hundred dollars.

"I actively try to discourage people giving me money," Withers said. "Go have a face-to-face conversation with your neighbor instead."

As an independent, Withers had to collect 318 signatures, which is five times as many signatures as a Democratic candidate needs to run. According to the candidate handbook, to run for state representative, District 22, a Libertarian needs 10 signatures, a Republican 114 and a Democrat requires 63. This "muddled" process creates a barrier, Withers said.

Deputy Director of New Mexico Open Elections Perry Radford agrees, calling this inequality in signature threshold a "real impediment" to prospective independent candidates.

New Mexico Open Elections advocates for a range of voting reforms including semi-open primaries, equal ballot access and ranked-choice voting.

New Mexico has a closed primary system, meaning that registered independent and minor party voters are excluded from voting in the primaries — although they can choose to change their political affiliation through same-day registration in order to cast a ballot, and then register again as an independent afterward.

This system discourages a large population from voting, Radford said. Although independents can participate by changing parties, Radford argued, not many do.

"I feel the majority of people are not deeply partisan and are disenfranchised through that (primary) system," Radford said.

New Mexico is one of only 10 states with closed primaries.

Research shows that young people, who have the highest percentages of independent voters, are disproportionately affected by these ballot barriers.

The shift toward independent votership didn't happen overnight. The greatest growth in registered independents happened in the 1990s.

From 1990 to 2000, independent voters in New Mexico increased by nearly three times, growing from 6.5% to 17%, statistics from the Secretary of State show.

Urban growth that attracted young people to Bernalillo County, presidential bids by independent candidates such as Ross Perot, and turmoil in the Clinton White House are potential factors to explain this sudden shift.

Back on the farm, Withers said his main goal is to "give people an option that doesn't suck."

Spain searches for bodies after unprecedented flooding

Disaster has claimed at least 158 lives, with 155 people killed in one region alone

BARRIO DE LA TORRE, Spain — Crews searched for bodies in stranded cars and sodden buildings Thursday as residents salvaged what they could from their ruined homes following monstrous flash floods in Spain that claimed at least 158 lives, with 155 deaths confirmed in the eastern Valencia region alone.

More horrors emerged Thursday from the debris and ubiquitous layers of mud left by the walls of water that produced Spain's deadliest natural disaster in living memory. The damage from the storm late Tuesday and early Wednesday recalled the aftermath of a tsunami, with survivors left to pick up the pieces as they mourn their loved ones.

Cars were piled on one another like fallen dominoes, uprooted trees, downed power lines and household items all mired in mud that covered streets in dozens of communities in Valencia, a region south of Barcelona on the Mediterranean coast.

An unknown number of people are still missing and more victims could be found.

"Unfortunately, there are dead people inside some vehicles," Spain's Transport Minister Oscar Puente said early Thursday before the death toll spiked from 95 on Wednesday night.

Rushing water turned narrow streets into death traps and spawned rivers that tore through homes and businesses, sweeping away cars, people and everything else in its path. The floods demolished bridges and left roads unrecognizable.

Luis Sánchez, a welder, said he saved several people who were trapped in their cars on the flooded V-31 highway south of Valencia city. The road rapidly became a floating grave-

yard strewn with hundreds of vehicles.

"I saw bodies floating past. I called out, but nothing," Sánchez said. "The firefighters took the elderly first, when they could get in. I am from nearby so I tried to help and rescue people. People were crying all over, they were trapped."

Regional authorities said late Wednesday that rescuers in helicopters saved some 70 people stranded on rooftops and in cars, but ground crews were far from done.

"We are searching house by house," Ángel Martínez, one of 1,000 soldiers helping with rescue efforts told Spain's national radio RNE from the town of Utiel, where at least six people died.

"Our priority is to find the victims and the missing so we can help end the suffering of their families," Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez said after meeting with officials and emergency services in Valencia on Thursday, the first of three official days of mourning.

An 'extraordinary' deluge

Spain's Mediterranean coast is used to autumn storms that can cause flooding, but this was the most powerful flash flood in recent memory. Scientists link it to climate change, which is also behind increasingly high temperatures and droughts in Spain and the heating up of the Mediterranean Sea.

Human-caused climate change has doubled the likelihood of a storm like this week's deluge in Valencia, according to a rapid but partial analysis Thursday by World Weather Attribution, comprising dozens of international scientists who study global warming's role in extreme weather.

Spain has suffered through an almost two-year drought, meaning that when the deluge happened, the ground was so hard that

it could not absorb the rain, leading to flash floods.

The violent weather event surprised regional government officials. Spain's national weather service said it rained more in eight hours in the Valencian town of Chiva than it had in the preceding 20 months.

Farms damaged

While the most suffering was inflicted on municipalities near the city of Valencia, the storms unleashed their fury over huge swaths of the south and eastern coast of the Iberian peninsula. Two fatalities were confirmed in the neighboring Castilla-La Mancha region and one in southern Andalusia.

Greenhouses and farms across southern Spain, known as Europe's garden for its exported produce, were also ruined by heavy rains and flooding. The storms spawned a freak tornado in Valencia and a hail storm that punched holes in cars in Andalusia. Homes were left without water as far southwest as Malaga in

Andalusia.

Residents hunt for basic supplies

As the shock dissipated, anger grew over the authorities' handling of the crisis, both for their late warnings of the looming floods and the chaotic relief response.

Many survivors had to walk long distances in sticky mud to find food and water. Most of their cars had been destroyed and the mud, destruction and debris left by the storm made some roads unpassable.

Some 150,000 people in Valencia were without electricity on Wednesday, but roughly half had power by Thursday. An unknown number did not have running water and were relying on whatever bottled water they could find.

And with emergency personnel focused on recovering the dead, survivors were left to find basic supplies and clean up the mess. Volunteers joined locals in moving wrecked vehicles, removing junk and sweeping mud.

With local services clearly overwhelmed, Valencia regional President Carlos Mazón on Thursday asked if Spain's army could assist with distributing basic goods to the population. The government in Madrid responded by promising to send in 500 more soldiers, more national police and Civil Guards.

But necessity — and the post-apocalyptic atmosphere — prompted some to enter abandoned stores. The National Police arrested 39 people for looting on Wednesday.

Some people said they had to steal supplies, especially those who have no running water or a way to get to stores that were not wrecked.

"We are not thieves. I work as a cleaner at the school for the council. But we have to eat. Look at what I'm picking up: baby food for the baby," said Nieves Vargas in a local supermarket whose doors had been tossed aside by the water and was unattended by staff. "What can I give to the child, if we don't have electricity."



Jerry Sandel



Jerry Wayne Sandel, revered by those who knew him as tough and persistent, yet kind and fair; succumbed to his long-time bout with COPD on October 25, 2024, in a manner of his choosing surrounded by his beloved wife Clair and other members of his family at his home in Farmington, New Mexico.

Jerry was born in Woodson, Texas in 1942; moved to Farmington, New Mexico in 1957, graduated from Farmington High School in 1960, and attended Texas Tech University from 1960 to 1964. After attending college, he returned to Farmington to work with his parents, Wayne and Sally Sandel, to help build a fledgling oilfield service contracting company, which remains successful in business to this day.

A mainstay in San Juan County, Jerry quickly became known as the conservative voice representing the community in Santa Fe, from 1971 until 2000, as a New Mexico State Representative for House District One. In his illustrious career as a state representative, Jerry demonstrated his commitment to doing the right thing when he famously joined with the Cowboy Coalition. His House colleagues showed their respect for Jerry's commitment when he mended fences with those he broke ranks with to become Chairman of the Taxation and Revenue Committee, Chairman of the Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Interim Committee, and as Chairman of the Legislative Finance Committee. In 2003, Jerry was appointed by Governor Richardson as Chairman of the New Mexico Blue Ribbon Tax Reform Commission.

Sandel was hailed by Speaker Raymond Sanchez as "Steady at the Helm" after 25 years of service and as "Chief Who Not Knows His Power" by his colleagues for the manner in which he conducted often very difficult and contentious committee hearings. Later in his years, Jerry would reminisce with pride that he never lost a floor vote for any piece of legislation that he carried. Throughout his years, Jerry amassed many awards and accolades including Farmington Chamber of Commerce History Makers Hall of Fame, Farmington High School Hall of Fame, and San Juan College Hall of Fame. In 1998, the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association presented Jerry the Jason W. Kellahin award for his outstanding contribution to the Oil and Gas Industry. Jerry also received the Association of Commerce and Industry's "VIVA" award in 1998 recognizing him as an outstanding New Mexico businessman. A tremendous honor bestowed upon Jerry on his 75th birthday was when the Boys and Girls Club of Farmington dedicated its gym to the community leader.

While Jerry believed strongly in serving his community through public service, his true passion was the family businesses Aztec Well Servicing, Triple S Trucking, Totah Rental, and Roadrunner Fuels. Jerry's dedication to these companies and their employees cannot be overstated. In fact, as Jerry was transitioning, he wanted to ensure that each of his employees knew that he was thinking of them, that he cared for them and their families, and it was their livelihood and success that was the foundation of his drive to thrive. There was and is little else of greater significance to Jerry than the Aztec Well Family of Companies, their customers, and the people who dedicate themselves to making them function. We thank you on his behalf!

Jerry was preceded in death by his parents Wayne and Sally, his first wife Nancy and his niece Stephanie Volkerding. Jerry is survived by his wife of twenty-one years Clair Sandel, his sister Sherry Pigford and husband Donnie, his children Jason Sandel and wife Stacy, and Dr. Shelly Sandel and husband Dr. Bill Henry, Jeff Sandel, and step-son Ransom Cole; his nephew John Volkerding and husband Chuck, his grandchildren Stella Sandel, Spencer Henry, Zooey Sandel (and his mother Ashley Alden), and Jasper Sandel, and his grand-nieces Shylynn Pigford and Jenna Volkerding, and grand-nephew Lukas Volkerding.

Office and the State Ethics Commission, which took no action. Ortiz y Pino, who isn't running for reelection this year, reported the \$200 expenditure on his campaign finance report filed with the Secretary of State. The money went to high school student Ariana Alvarado to "support her academic endeavors so she could participate in a week-long, out-of-state workshop ... for high school students," his lawsuit states.

New Mexico law permits political candidates to use campaign funds to make charitable donations not to individuals, but only to nonprofit organizations that fall under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Such campaign funds also can go to the expenditures of a campaign and to legislators' expenditures for mail, telephone and travel to service constituents. But legislators can't use the funds for personal or legislative session living expenses.

It's too late to bring a criminal prosecution because of the 3-year statute of limitations, the judge found.

Meanwhile, the State Ethics Commission, which has authority to bring a civil action, informed Ortiz y Pino that "the specific circumstances surrounding the expenditure (to Ms. Alvarado), including the timing and amount of the contested expenditure, in addition to the fact that Senator Ortiz y Pino is not seeking reelection, together do not support the use of the Commission's resources and personnel to commence a civil action related to this expenditure."

Ortiz y Pino said his campaign treasurer and Albuquerque lawyer Phillip Baca in particular believed the secretary of state had overstepped her powers by

requiring that only charitable contributions can be made to a 501(c)(3) organization. The case is expected to proceed on whether a permanent injunction should be issued.

A spokesman for the secretary of state told the Journal this week that no decision has been made as to whether the agency will appeal the judge's ruling.

Ortiz y Pino said in a Journal interview that what's important is for candidates to report such expenditures on campaign finance reports filed with the secretary of state. "If you're giving money to your sister-in-law or to a would-be supporter in return for support, that kind of situation would be different," he added.

In court filings, he noted that the Cibola High School student, who wasn't a constituent, had been raising money to attend a workshop for high school students interested in health careers.

Strickland's ruling stated that a preliminary injunction will not, as Toulouse Oliver had argued, prevent the state from enforcing the Campaign Reporting Act; "it simply will be preliminary enjoined from enforcing (the) de facto ban on using campaign funds to make charitable donations to individuals."

The judge also found that the secretary of state offered no evidence to show that a ban on giving charitable contributions to individuals was enacted to prevent quid pro quo corruption.

Citing a prior court opinion that a candidate's spending does nothing to corrupt the candidate, she wrote, "a preliminary injunction will not weaken public confidence by preventing New Mexico from regulating quid pro quo corruption (or the appearance thereof)."

NM state regulators put price tag on increasing cannabis enforcement

Saying his department can put a "dent" in the flow of illicit cannabis in New Mexico, state Regulation and Licensing Department Superintendent Clay Bailey's team has released its proposed \$61.6 million budget for the 60-day legislative session that starts in January.

The fiscal 2026 budget request seeks to add law enforcement capabilities for the Cannabis Control Division and an additional 10 compliance officers to help increase the number of inspections at marijuana businesses across the state.

The multimillion-dollar proposed budget, which includes \$2 million from the state's general fund to add compliance officers and another \$1.1 million to add seven special agents to the division, comes as the CCD has seen an increase in illicit activity within New Mexico's budding cannabis industry. Bailey said unlicensed growers are harvesting 20,000 to 50,000 plants, while others who are licensed are growing more than legally allowed under their license type.

"I don't envision my people going out there arresting folks — that's not the plan," Bailey told the Journal in a recent interview. "But they would be capable of it. ... I'm here asking not because I want extra responsibilities, (but) because somebody needs to do it and it needs to be done. It needs to be done now."

Bailey called the flow of illicit products in the marketplace a "huge problem."

He added: "I think if you talk to any of the businesses that are in business legally, they'll tell you it's a problem, too, and it's something that we need to be able to stop and put a halt on."

Ben Lewinger, executive director of the New Mexico Cannabis Chamber of Commerce, said, "augmenting" RLD's capabilities to include law enforcement duties is a policy priority for his organization. Like Bailey, he and businesses the Chamber represents have noticed the trend of illicit products grown and sold in New Mexico.

"I think what we are experiencing in the industry now is still a high volume of illegal activity," said Lewinger,

er, adding that it has also led to other illegal activities such as human trafficking and the production of other narcotics.

Bailey said the \$1.1 million for special agents, as well as a special request of \$465,000 for vehicles, is contingent upon separate legislation approval giving RLD law enforcement authority.

Law enforcement aside, Bailey said his division is running thin on compliance officers, increasing the workload for the dozen currently on the job. He said the addition of those compliance officers isn't an expansion but helps the division "get to these inspections in a timely manner."

Compliance officers with CCD have completed more than 2,200 inspections so far in 2024, compared with 1,100 in 2023 and 138 in 2022 — the first year of legalized, adult-use sales.

But the division is also overseeing 3,071 licensed premises, according to an October count, which spans retail, manufacturing and growing facilities.

"We're stretched so thin," Bailey said. "(Adding 10 compliance officers) would make it at least reasonable to get to all the inspections in a timely and yearly rotation, I believe, and it will allow us to do the other things that need to be done as we're moving forward."

Lewinger said the number of proposed compliance officers in CCD's

budget proposal is still too low. He said New Mexico needs to get more in line with states like Colorado, which he said is more equipped to enforce rules and regulations.

Lewinger's comments fall in line with those of others, including Justin Dye, chairman of Schwazze, the company that owns R.Greenleaf and Everest Cannabis Co. Dye told legislators earlier this month that Colorado, for instance, has one inspector for every 47 licensees, compared with New Mexico, which has one for every 256 licensees.

"As a division, they are tremendously under-resourced for the task at hand," Lewinger said. They shouldn't "short sell what their resources need to be to support this industry, not just in 2025 but looking into the future as well."

RLD also has a series of special requests, including \$560,000 to cover vehicles for compliance officers and \$745,000 for the equipment needed to seize and destroy illicit cannabis products.

A key legislative committee will release its proposed budget for the coming year in January, just before the start of the 60-day session. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's administration will also release its own spending plan.

Those two budget proposals will then serve as blueprints of sorts as legislators debate and ultimately approve a state budget for the fiscal year that starts in July 2025.

Microsoft, Meta knock Wall Street sharply lower

Meta delivered better profit than forecast for the latest quarter, but investors were expecting even more from them.

Man who killed eagles on reservation sentenced to nearly 4 years in prison

BILLINGS, Mont. — A Washington state man who authorities said killed at least 118 eagles as part of a wildlife trafficking ring that operated on a Native American reservation in Montana was sentenced Thursday to three years and 10 months in prison and must pay more than \$777,000 in restitution.

The trafficking ring over more than a decade sold eagle feathers and parts on a black market that exploits high demand among tribal members who use them in powwows and other ceremonies. The defendant and others killed at least 107 hawks and as many as 3,600 birds overall, prosecutors said.

The poaching operation centered on the Flathead Indian Reservation in northwestern Montana, which researchers say has some of the highest concentrations of eagles and other birds of prey in the U.S.

Travis John Branson of Cusick, Washington, pleaded guilty in March to conspiracy and wildlife trafficking charges.

Prior to being sentenced, Branson apologized to the court and his family.

"It's my own fault," he said. "I know what I did was wrong."

He declined to comment further after the hearing.

In text messages obtained by investigators and presented at the sentencing hearing, Branson wrote of killing birds since the 1980s.

"So many I can't remember anymore LOL," Branson said in one text.

Other texts described eagles being shot in Nevada and Idaho and instances of dozens of birds being shot on a single weekend.

"This is just a small glimpse of the killing that

was happening," U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Special Agent Mona Iannelli said during the hearing.

A second defendant in the case told authorities that the trafficking ring had been operating since 2009, killing 300 to 400 birds annually.

Prosecutors had asked U.S. District Judge Dana Christensen in Missoula to impose a "significant" prison sentence and order Branson to pay restitution of \$5,000 for each eagle killed and \$1,750 for each hawk.

Branson faced up to five years in prison on the conspiracy charge. But his public defender asked for a sentence of probation and claimed that prosecutors overstated the number of birds killed.

Federal Defender Andrew Nelson also disputed the restitution amount, saying it was too high for the eagles and the hawks should not be counted.

Branson had no prior criminal history, according to Nelson. Because of the criminal charges, he lost his job as a maintenance supervisor for the Kalispell Tribe in Washington, Nelson said, and the defendant suffered a stroke in April.

A second person has been indicted in the case and prosecutors from the U.S. Attorney's Office have said others were also involved.

The criminal case underscores the persistence of a thriving illegal trade in eagle feathers despite law enforcement efforts over the past decade that netted dozens of criminal indictments across the U.S. West and Midwest.

Bald eagles, once highly imperiled by the pesticide DDT, have bounced back in recent decades and are now abundant. The recovery of golden eagles has been more tenuous and research-

ers have warned that the population is on the brink of decline due to shootings, poisonings, electrocutions on power lines, collisions with wind turbines and other threats.

It's illegal to buy or sell eagle feathers or other parts. The government has sought to offset strong demand for feathers among Native Americans by providing them for free from a government repository. But they're unable to keep up with demand and the repository has a yearslong backlog.

Branson made between \$180,000 and \$360,000 from 2009 to 2021 selling bald and golden eagle parts illegally, court records said.

Court documents quote Branson as saying in a January 2021 text that he was going on a "killing spree" to obtain eagle tails.

"It was not uncommon for Branson to take upwards of nine eagles at a time," prosecutors with the U.S. Attorney's Office in Montana wrote in a court filing. "Not only did Branson kill eagles, but he hacked them into pieces to sell for future profits."

The second defendant, Simon Paul, of St. Ignatius, Montana, remains at large. A federal judge issued an arrest warrant for Paul in December after he failed to show up for an initial court hearing. Court documents have suggested he fled to Canada.

Federally recognized tribes can apply for permits with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to take a

Colorado gov. works to remedy leak of voting system passwords

DENVER — Colorado's Democrat governor said Thursday that he is providing state aircraft and vehicles to help with changing voting system passwords that were accidentally leaked on a state website.

The mistake comes amid skepticism of voting systems, even though U.S. election nationwide remain fair and reliable.

The passwords were left on a spreadsheet online for months, Colorado Secretary of State Jena Griswold announced on Tuesday. Now, local, state and federal agencies are working together to change the passwords by Thursday evening, and analyze logs to ensure there hasn't been any tampering.

The Colorado County Clerks Association said in a statement that because Colorado's voting systems have layers of safeguards, and with the remediation plan already in motion, "county clerks can say with confidence that Colorado elections are secure."

Former President Donald Trump's campaign sent a letter to Griswold to express concern, which followed a similar letter from the chairman of the Colorado GOP.

Griswold has called Colorado the gold standard for election security, though the leaked spreadsheet follows a hiccup in 2022.

Colorado's other voting security measures include around-the-clock surveillance, badge-guarded access, and multiple passwords that must be used in-person and in secured areas — the access to which is tracked. Colorado voters fill out paper ballots, which are audited after the election.

The voting system was "built with many layers of security to protect against just this type of occurrence," said Matt Crane, the association's executive director and a former Republican county clerk. "Every clerk is taking this issue seriously and is staying laser-focused on delivering the safe and accurate elections that Coloradans have come to expect from us."

Those tasked with changing the compromised passwords are working in pairs, under direct observation from local election officials, according to a statement from Colorado Gov. Jared Polis' office.

"We want to be able to provide assurances that all votes are counted fairly and accurately for this election and all elections," Polis said.

"Colorado has countless layers of security to ensure voter's voices are heard. I'm thankful to the governor for his support to quickly resolve this unfortunate mistake," Griswold said.

voters surveyed in New Mexico expressing support for the former president. That support level was above what most Republican candidates have received in recent New Mexico statewide elections, even though most Hispanic voters surveyed still supported Harris.

At one point during his speech, Trump asked the crowd whether they preferred the term "Latino" or "Hispanic" — most, by their applause, appeared to prefer the latter — and described his visit to New Mexico as "good for my credentials with the Hispanic or Latino community."

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham accused Trump after his Thursday rally of "using" New Mexico to bolster his ego and political ambitions.

"To just admit he was only here as a prop I thought was so disrespectful," Lujan Grisham told the Journal.

She also blasted Trump's election victory claims, as President Joe Biden defeated then-incumbent Trump in New Mexico by 11 percentage points — or roughly 100,000 votes — in 2020.

"It is really outrageous that he continues to lie to the folks of New Mexico," Lujan Grisham said.

Trump accused Harris of speaking with "words all over the place," but at times rambled during his own speech, such as commenting on how many F-35 fighter jets he's bought when a jet flew by — "personally, I like the F-22 the best," he added — and crediting his administration with defeating the Islamic State group after talking about rebuilding the military.

He also repeatedly said "the fake news" doesn't depict his rallies or policies accurately, telling Thursday's rallygoers to "look at this group" of media members standing in a sectioned-off area of the crowd.

The Trump rally also provided a platform to several New Mexico Republicans running in this year's general election, as U.S. Senate candidate Nella Domenici and 2nd Congressional District candidate Yvette Herrell both spoke at the event.

Herrell, who is locked in a hotly contested race with Democrat Gabe Vasquez, said that Republicans are going to "close the southern border once and for all."

Domenici, for her part, called for a "new day" in New Mexico.

"It's time to bring back Donald Trump and it's time to bring back a Domenici," she said, referring to her late father, former longtime

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici.

Domenici, who up until recently had refused to say whether she planned to vote for Trump, told the Journal after Thursday's rally she agreed with much of the former president's message.

"The key message I agree with is we don't have to be in decline," she said in an interview.

'Drill, baby, drill'

At one point during his speech, Trump vowed to end "(former President Barack) Obama's war on American energy" and alleged that Harris would destroy more than 90,000 oil and gas jobs in New Mexico by banning fracking.

"If Kamala is elected, New Mexico's economy would be reduced to rubble," Trump said.

Harris has maintained on the campaign trail she would not ban fracking, though she voiced support for such a move while run-

ning for president in 2019.

Trump also said Harris' policies would destroy 35% of New Mexico's budget, which is roughly the percentage of revenue provided by taxes and royalties on the oil and gas industries.

But New Mexico House Speaker Javier Martínez, D-Albuquerque, described that claim as another lie from Trump.

"The fact of the matter is that New Mexico is an oil and gas-producing state, and I'm also proud that we have some of the most pro-climate statutes in the entire country," Martínez told the Journal. "We can do both."

New Mexico has seen its revenue levels surge over the past three-plus years, due largely to a boom in oil production in the Permian Basin. The state is now the second-largest oil producer in the nation — behind only Texas — and New Mexico oil drove nearly half of the United States' total oil production growth last year, according to legislative data.

Trump also said he would end Harris' 100% electric vehicle mandate if elected. There is currently no existing EV mandate under Biden and it remains largely unclear what Harris' plans around EVs are, though she's supported Biden's increasingly tough clean vehicle regulations.

Trump also complained about high inflation rates and the state of the economy, saying a Trump administration would end "the inflation nightmare immediately and create a record jobs boom."

"You know how we're going to get them down? We're going to drill, baby, drill," Trump said, evoking cheers from the crowd.

Immigration claims

Trump claimed New Mexico

has seen millions of people come across its section of the southern border, including 10,000 convicted criminals and thousands of undocumented immigrant gang members.

In the 2024 fiscal year, U.S. Border Patrol reported 1.5 million migrant encounters in the Southwest, compared with 2 million encounters in the previous fiscal year. Additionally, Border Patrol reported 523 gang-affiliated apprehensions nationwide in the 2024 budget year.

"One of the biggest reasons we will win this state is that you have among the worst border problems of any state in America, and I am the only one that knows how to fix it," he said.

Trump specifically referenced the 2021 case of an "illegal alien criminal" convicted of murder in Las Cruces, which happened when he was out on an unsecured bond — Joel Arciniega-Saenz. However, Arciniega-Saenz's place of birth was the U.S., according to the Las Cruces Sun News.

Trump's visit marked the first New Mexico campaign stop by either of the leading presidential candidates in this year's election cycle.

However, Lujan Grisham pointed out Democratic vice presidential nominee Tim Walz recently visited the Navajo Nation.

Trump, who previously held two campaign stops in Albuquerque in 2016 and one in Rio Rancho in 2019, said some of his campaign staffers had counseled him not to visit the state this year.

"They all said don't come. I said, why? 'You can't win New Mexico,'" Trump said. "I said, 'Look, your votes are rigged. We can win New Mexico.'"

rubber-duckie plushies with Trump's signature hairstyle walked up and down the line offering their wares. A man sold T-shirts of Trump's opponent, Vice President Kamala Harris, which read "Say No to the Hoe."

Veronica Lieffring of Albuquerque and Jerome Von Holland of Santa Fe made friends while waiting in line. Lieffring has voted for Trump since his first run for president in 2016. Sometimes her support has been "wobbly," she said, because of Trump's aggressive attitude, but she believes he's the one "we need to go in the right direction."

Nearby, Jason Kinnaman and his wife, Johanna, brought their seven children, aged 5 to 17, from their home in Arizona to the rally.

"No president is our savior, right? Jesus is our savior — but we do need good leadership," Kinnaman said.

Timo Chacon of Santa Fe was wrapped in a Trump flag. He believes a Trump presidency will be better for his wallet, and that Trump could usher in lower grocery prices and inflation rates.

"You can't argue with

somebody who's been shot, and vilified by the press and the media," Chacon said.

In an American flag suit, wearing a ghoulish mask and a baseball cap with the message, "Make America Ghouls Again," Brent Morris of Albuquerque said he was there to show the Trump supporters what they will get if they reelect Trump.

"I don't believe in his policies. I don't believe in his hate. I don't believe in his lies," Morris said.

Trump supporter Chris Flores of Albuquerque stopped to say hi to Morris, shake his hand and ask if she could "give an American hug."

Not all interactions were so polite. A group of approximately 40 protesters shouted and drummed near the end of the rally line. In an intense moment, some protesters and rallygoers shouted in each other's faces. Tensions calmed when the protesters moved farther away from the parking lot shuttle drop-off.

The protest's chief organizing group was The Party for Socialism and Liberation, which has its own candidates, Claudia De la Cruz for president and her running mate, Karina Garcia, in the 2024 election.

Marisa Sedillo, a PSL organizer, noted her party showed up to protest

Trump because his policies are harmful, particularly to immigrants.

Sedillo and her group wanted to send the message that the Republican presidential candidate "is not welcome in Albuquerque."

As members of PSL sent their message to Trump outside the rally, so did Couy Griffin, the former Otero County commissioner who was convicted of illegally entering the U.S. Capitol grounds at a 2022 bench trial at U.S. District Court in Washington while being acquitted of disorderly conduct.

Griffin was sentenced to 14 days and given credit for time served after his arrest in Washington in the days leading up to Joe Biden's inauguration.

Separately, Griffin has been banished from public office for aiding in insurrection at the Capitol under a state district court ruling. The U.S. Supreme Court in March refused to hear an appeal of the ruling.

On Thursday, while riding a horse named Red, Griffin said he showed up, not to attend the Trump rally, but, "I feel like my place for this is more to visit with the people. Being outside in the line, that's good enough."

Griffin, who has attended past Trump rallies and showed off pictures of him with the former president

in the Oval Office during an interview, said he believes the 2020 election was "compromised," and that not enough investigations were conducted.

"I pray the truth eventually still comes out," Griffin

said. "When you take your oath before God and you honor your oath by voting in a way to honor your oath, there is never anything to be afraid of."

Several Trump supporters speaking to the Journal

waffled on whether President Biden won the 2020 presidential election — a fact Trump has disputed since his loss four years ago.

Linda Archuleta of Albuquerque said, "Yes, according to the numbers," Biden won the last election.

"Numbers don't lie — that's the good thing about statistics," Archuleta said. "When he (Trump) brought that up, it was questionable, the numbers; but again, many people did respect the process, and we saw what happened when Biden and Harris were elected and what they did to our country."

Albuquerque resident Jesse Jaramillo, a Republican, said he believes Biden won the last election, but that election officials in numerous swing states, like Arizona and Georgia, "could have done more" to either validate some votes or toss others out.

"That process wasn't done," Jaramillo said. "(Biden) won by changing it. The election was rigged."

But he said he will accept the outcome of the 2024 presidential election, just like he did last time.

"Whoever is in office, that's the person we need to be praying for," Jaramillo said.

Season ticket sales on pace to surpass last year

Interest in Lobo basketball climbing toward highs of a decade ago

The UNM Lobo men's basketball team is about to surpass last season's season ticket base that helped the program climb back into the Top 25 in the country in average home attendance. The Lobos won 26 games last season and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in a decade. And their fans came along for the ride, helping UNM post a Mountain West best average home attendance of 13,042, which also ranked 23rd in the nation. That was helped tremendously by a

season ticket base of 8,159. As of Thursday, the Lobos were at 8,097 season tickets sold — 99% of last season's number — and had little doubt the program would surpass last season's figure by Monday's 7 p.m. tipoff against Nicholls State, the start of the regular season. Season ticket sales continue through Dec. 1. "We have a lot of renewals that are still coming in ahead of Monday," said Jalen Dominguez, UNM's interim deputy athletic director and executive director of the Lobo Club. "We expect the number to get ahead of last year's number fairly soon as some wait to

renew until right when the season starts." The 8,097 figure would have ranked as the 55th best average home attendance in Division I last season — one spot behind the Big Ten's Minnesota and one spot ahead of the Pac-12's Utah (now in the Big 12). In fact, after an offseason ticket price increase — only in select premium seating areas — UNM has already surpassed its revenue mark from a year ago in season ticket sales. Also, Dominguez said the Lobo Club

Michael Buckley knew what his first collegiate catch would look like. He saw it tossing the ball to himself in the backyard of his childhood home in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, darting and juking barefoot across the grass. Night after night in his apartment in Albuquerque, lined up with nameless and faceless cornerbacks, releasing against air. Thousands of imaginary passes, years of solitary routes. "Just visualize, visualize, visualize," the redshirt junior wide receiver said Tuesday. He did not, however, know when it would happen. Entering this season, Buckley had played just seven offensive snaps in three up-and-down, sometimes injury-afflicted seasons with New Mexico. His parents back in Mexico would always call — sometimes "more frustrated than me," he chuckled — and ask why he wasn't playing.

Details emerge in Santa Fe football team hazing incident

Police: Players accused of sexually assaulting other player

Two Santa Fe High football players are accused of sexually assaulting another player inside the team's locker room in early October. The Santa Fe Police Department did not confirm if anyone has been charged in the incident, which is being investigated as a hazing. Santa Fe Public Schools spokesperson Joe Abeyta told the Journal he had no comment on the investigation. Santa Fe Public Schools Superintendent Hilario Chavez confirmed to the Journal on Oct. 24 that Demons head football coach Andrew Martinez was on paid administrative leave, which will be

in effect through the entire investigation. On Oct. 8, Santa Fe police received a call of a sexual assault at Santa Fe High School. According to a Santa Fe Police Department incident report, released to the Journal through an Inspection of Public Records Act request, a 14-year-old football player reported being assaulted on Oct. 4. Police said the teen told them his teammates held him down, removed some of his clothes and one player used his genitals to slap the teen across his face. The report states the teen did not report the incident to anyone, not even coaches and his parents. He told police another student found out and laughed about it in class and "made fun of him." Police said one of the team's coaches told police the alleged victim and two players accused in the assault were in "manager-type roles" with the team.

LA eyes repeat with Ohtani returning to mound in '25

Eight players are free agents, with two planning to retire

LOS ANGELES — The Los Angeles Dodgers' first game of the season in South Korea was overshadowed afterward by Shohei Ohtani's interpreter hinting at his stealing from the Japanese superstar. Their last postgame was a beer and champagne-fueled celebration of the franchise's eighth World Series title.

In between came a multitude of injuries, especially to the rotation as well as Mookie Betts' broken hand and Freddie Freeman's sprained ankle, Ohtani's historic 50/50 feat, the franchise's 11th National League West title in 12 seasons, and compiling the best record in the majors.

Then came the playoffs, where the Dodgers proved a resilient bunch.

They trailed rival San Diego 2-1 in the National League Division Series and rallied to win in five games.

They were pushed to six games in the NL Championship Series by the New York Mets before advancing.

They were about to lose the World Series opener until Freeman delivered the first walk-off grand slam in Series history. They ran through eight pitchers to eke out a 7-6 victory over the New York Yankees to close out the Series in five games.

"We just kept going. Even in the postseason, I don't think anyone

had us picked. I don't think they had us picked to get out of the first series," manager Dave Roberts said. "For us to go out there and fight and scratch and claw and win 11 games in October, that's a credit to our guys."

Investing a billion dollars to acquire Ohtani and fellow Japanese player Yoshinobu Yamamoto last offseason certainly paid off, even if Ohtani's playoff performance didn't match what he did during the regular season when his offense carried the Dodgers.

Ohtani reached career highs in home runs, stolen bases and RBIs and is the favorite to win NL MVP honors. In the playoffs, he went 2 for 19 with no RBIs and had one single after partially dislocating his shoulder in Game 2 of the World Series.

"What Shohei's done for our ball club, the Dodger fan base domestically, globally, I just don't think you can quantify," Roberts said. "He was playing with one arm in the postseason. So most guys would probably tap out, but

he was going to not be denied at playing and posting and being in the lineup."

The Dodgers made some key pickups at the July trade deadline, including pitchers Jack Flaherty — who was one of three healthy starters in the playoffs — and Michael Kopech as well as utilityman Tommy Edman, whose offense in the NLCS earned him MVP honors.

Ohtani's former interpreter is on his way to jail on bank and tax fraud charges when he's sen-

tenced in December. Ohtani is going back to being a two-way sensation next year when he resumes pitching after he spent this season recovering from a second elbow surgery.

The Dodgers have eight players who became free agents when the World Series ended: Walker Buehler, Flaherty, Kiké Hernández, Teoscar Hernández, Daniel Hudson, Joe Kelly, Kevin Kiermaier and Blake Treinen.

Hudson announced his retirement after Wednesday night's victory, while Kiermaier had already said he planned to retire.

The Dodgers hold team options on Austin Barnes and Miguel Rojas for next season. Clayton Kershaw has a player option and has said he plans to be back after a toe injury kept him out of the playoffs.

But for now the celebration continues.

After winning a neutral-site World Series against Tampa Bay in 2020 and being denied a parade because of the coronavirus pandemic, the Dodgers have pent-up energy to burn.

"I'm sure there's no asterisk on this one," Roberts said.

They will commemorate their championship with a downtown parade and Dodger Stadium celebration on Friday, which would have been Fernando Valenzuela's 64th birthday. The 1981 NL Cy Young Award and Rookie of the Year winner died last week.

"It's going to be emotional," said Roberts, who was friends with Valenzuela. "I know he's smiling right now and very proud of this organization."

NY turns attention to keeping Soto

Sloppy fifth inning leads to bitter disappointment

NEW YORK — The New York Yankees season ended in a comedy of errors that left them to pursue Juan Soto without a title glow.

Soto was the last player lingering in the dugout after Wednesday night's 7-6 loss in World Series Game 5, watching the Los Angeles Dodgers celebrate after New York frittered away a five-run lead with a monumental meltdown that included three errors, a catcher's interference call, a balk and a pitcher failing to cover first base.

He walked up a step on the first-base end, pointed to the sky, then followed his Yankees teammates to the clubhouse for perhaps the final time.

"I would love to see him in pinstripes for quite a long time," captain Aaron Judge said.

Aaron Boone thought in an even more expansive span.

"I hope he's here forever," the manager said.

A free agent at 26, Soto is likely to command a contract of at least \$500 million. His market is likely limited to baseball's big-market behemoths, the Yankees, Mets and Dodgers along with perhaps the Blue Jays, Cubs, Giants, Padres, Phillies and Red Sox.

"Everyone wants to be on a winning team," Soto said. "That's one of the biggest things that you look up to."

He gave no hints of a favorite, answering questions as carefully as he observes the strike zone.

"I'm going to be available for all 30 teams," Soto said. "I don't want to say anybody has any advantage because at the end of the day, we're going to look at

what they have and how much they want me."

While the Yankees went an AL-best 94-68 and won the East after missing the playoffs in 2023, they self-destructed against the Dodgers and consigned themselves to a 15th straight season of without a title.

With the Yankees ahead 5-0 in the fifth inning of Game 5, Judge dropped Tommy Edman's fly to center for his first error since May 2023, Gold Glove-winning shortstop Anthony Volpe bounced a throw to third trying for a forceout and ace Gerrit Cole didn't cover first on Mookie Betts' grounder to Anthony Rizzo.

Boone was shattered. The clubhouse remained closed to media for an extended period after the game while the manager and players exchanged thoughts on the season and ending, according to reliever Clay Holmes.

"This is going to sting forever," Boone said.

"I'm heartbroken," he added, his voice quavering. "I haven't had that feeling of being — celebrating and going home, like many of the guys in there. I'm 51. I poured my life into that. You're chasing that, and when you get that close, it's heartbreaking."

He recalled the Yankees' Series-ending Game 6 loss to Miami in 2003, when Boone was a player.

"I can still see the Marlins and hear the Marlins celebrating on our field," he said. "It was one of the most painful moments that I've experienced."

New York has a 2025 option on Boone, who said Wednesday he hasn't thought about his future after leading the team to a 603-429 record, three AL East titles and one pennant in seven seasons. The Yankees' 15 years without winning the World Series is the third-longest drought in fran-

chise history, behind the first 20 seasons from 1903-22 and 17 from 1979-95.

Much of the roster will change. Torres is a free agent along with Holmes, Tommy Kahnle and Tim Hill among the relievers and left fielder Alex Verdugo. The Yankees are likely to decline Rizzo's \$17 million option. Cole can opt out of his contract, but New York can void that by adding a \$36 million salary for 2029.

New York has weakness at the bottom of its batting order. The No. 8 slot was 21st in the majors at .219 and the No. 9 hole 12th at .228.

Jazz Chisholm Jr., inserted at third after he was acquired from Miami in July, could replace Torres at second.

DJ LeMahieu, coming off three straight injury-marred seasons, is signed for two more years at \$15 million each.

While Jasson Domínguez could be an option in the outfield, he struggled at the plate and defensively in left field following his return from Tommy John surgery.

Judge, likely to win his second AL MVP after hitting 58 homers, slumped to a .184 average with three homers and nine RBIs in 14 postseason games. Now 32 following his ninth season with New York, Judge spoke before the Series of how champion Yankees such as Derek Jeter and Mariano Rivera have a validation.

"They definitely got a different aura walking around here when you got a couple of rings on your fingers," he said.

Giancarlo Stanton hopes players learn "never to have this feeling again" and arrive at spring training with even greater focus and a determination to limit miscues.

"Up the level in all aspects," he said.

Costas retiring from baseball play-by-play after 42 years

Angels acquire Soler from Braves

NEW YORK — After 42 seasons, Bob Costas is retiring from baseball play-by-play.

Costas had done games the past couple seasons for MLB Network and TBS Sports. His final games were the American League Division Series between the New York Yankees and Kansas City Royals.

Costas' contract with TBS expired at the end of the season, but his plans to retire from baseball play-by-play had been in the works for over a year.

The Athletic was the first to report on Costas' baseball play-by-play retirement. Costas plans to address his decision at a future date.

Baseball has always been Costas' favorite sport. He called games on NBC from 1982-89 and again from 1994-2000. He was one of the announcers for the 1995 World Series and then the main play-by-play voice for the Fall Classic in 1997 and '99.

He joined TBS in 2021 to serve as studio host for its coverage of the National League Championship Series and then called games the past three seasons. TBS has had a package of Tuesday night regular-season games to go with its postseason coverage since 2022.

Costas had also done games on MLB Network since its start in 2009. He will continue to do some work for the network on key events, including the Baseball Hall of Fame announcement.

In 2018, he received the Ford C. Frick Award for broadcast excellence from the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Costas is also known for being the prime-time host of NBC's Olympics coverage from 1992 to 2016.

ANGELS-BRAVES TRADE: The Los Angeles Angels have acquired outfielder Jorge Soler from the Atlanta Braves in a trade for right-hander Griffin Canning.

Soler has been a productive power hitter for five teams over the previous 11 major league seasons.

The Cuban slugger was the MVP of the 2021 World Series with the Braves, and he also won a ring with the Chicago Cubs in 2016. He led the AL in homers with the Kansas City Royals in 2019.

Canning is an Orange County native and a former second-round pick who has been part of the Angels' starting rotation for the past six years when healthy.

WORLD SERIES RATINGS: The Dodgers' 8-7 victory over the Yankees in Game 5 for their eighth

World Series title and second in five years averaged 18.6 million viewers on Fox, Fox Deportes and streaming, according to Nielsen. That is the most-watched game in the Fall Classic since Game 7 in 2019 when the Washington Nationals' victory over the Houston Astros averaged 23.22 million.

The series averaged 15.81 million, its best performance since 2017 when Houston's victory over the Dodgers in seven games averaged 18.93 million. It's also quite a turnaround from last year when the Texas Rangers won the title over the Arizona Diamondbacks in five games, averaging a record-low 9.11 million.

PITCH CLOCK: Nine-inning games in the World Series averaged 3 hours, 19 minutes in the second year of the pitch clock, up from 3:01 in 2023.

The Series average was 3:24 in 2022 and 3:38 in 2021, the last season before the PitchCom electronic pitch-calling device. The 2023 average was the fastest since 1996.

Mid-inning pitching changes increased to 5.2 from 3.8 in 2023 and 2.5 in 2022. World Series runs per game rose to 10.0 from 9.3 in 2023 and 5.8 in 2022. Pitches increased to 315 from 298, the highest total since 2018.

KIRILLOFF RETIRES: Minnesota Twins outfielder Alex Kirilloff announced his retirement on Thursday at age 26, after a series of injuries kept the 2016 first-round draft pick from fulfilling his potential.

Kirilloff was limited to 57 games this season because of a lower back injury, batting .201 with five home runs, 20 RBIs and a .653 OPS. He last played on June 11.

After being sent down to Triple-A St. Paul, Kirilloff reported further soreness in his lower back. Kirilloff told reporters that he was diagnosed with a chronic stress fracture and a slipping vertebrae that could take up to a year to fully rehabilitate.

Broncos, Aztecs look to stay perfect in conference play

The teams are among national leaders in sacks

BOISE, Idaho — National rushing leader Ashton Jeanty resumes his run for the Heisman Trophy and No. 15 Boise State continues to chase a spot in the new 12-team College Football Playoff when the Broncos host the San Diego State Aztecs on Friday night in a matchup of teams undefeated in Mountain West play.

The Broncos (6-1, 3-0) can solidify their spot atop the Mountain West standings as the calendar turns to November. San Diego State (3-4, 2-0) is still trying to find an identity in Sean Lewis' first season as coach. Colorado State is the only other team undefeated in MW play, also at 3-0.

Coach Spencer Danielson said there's still plenty of room for the Broncos to learn and grow. Even though the Broncos beat San Diego State when they played in Boise in 2022, they don't forget any home loss, including the 19-13 defeat at the hands of the Aztecs on their blue turf in 2018.

"We know it's going to be a huge test Friday night on the Blue. Undefeated in conference. Monster game," Danielson said. "We've had battles here on the Blue versus San Diego State. I'll never forget, 2018, losing on the Blue to San Diego State. You don't forget those moments. Those are the things we're excited to attack, especially who they are and what they're going to be about. We've got to be ready to play and we will be."

Lewis said BSU is "a really complete team that's playing high-level ball" and said Jeanty is "a physical runner with home run speed."

Lewis also lamented SDSU blowing a 12-point fourth-quarter lead Saturday night and losing 29-26 at home to Washington State.

While pleased with the Aztecs' growth, he said he's "still sick to my stomach about the results, but we'll grow from it and learn from it, the progress that we continue to make. Unfortunately, a part of progress is pain that comes along with it — and we felt some of that on Saturday night — but we obsess about the process and not necessarily the results."

Ashton Jeanty

The sophomore from Jacksonville, Florida, is either first or second in the FBS in several categories. He leads the nation with 1,376 yards rushing, 196.6 yards per game and 203.71 all-purpose yards. He's tied for first with 19 total touchdowns, 16.3 points per game and 114 total points.

With 1,376 yards rushing and 12 receptions, he is the first FBS player to reach those marks in his team's first seven games since 1998 Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams of Texas (1,484, 15).

Sack exchange

Boise State leads the FBS with five sacks per game while San Diego State is third at four per game. The Aztecs' Trey White continues to lead the FBS in sacks (11.5), sacks per game (1.64), tackles for loss (15.5) and TFLs per game (2.2).

Aztecs keeping it close

San Diego State has had its last four games decided by three points or fewer and is 2-2 in those contests. Those games have been decided by a combined 10 points. It's the longest such streak in MW history and the longest active streak in the FBS.

Going bowling

The Broncos are coming off a 29-24 win at UNLV that made them bowl eligible for the 27th consecutive season, the nation's second-longest active streak behind Georgia at 28. Jeanty didn't play up to his standards but still rushed for 128 yards and the winning 1-yard touchdown on fourth-and-goal with 12:38 left.

Booting for Boise

Broncos kicker Jonah Dalmas has 90 career field goals, good for fourth in FBS history and just seven back of the FBS record of 97 held by NC State's Christopher Dunn (2018-22). With a career field-goal percentage of 89.1 (90-for-101), Dalmas is second in FBS history, trailing only Nebraska's Alex Henery, who converted at 89.5% (68-for-76) from 2007-10.

Jeanty's football roots trace back to Navy base in Italy

Before starring at Boise State, he ran over opponents in Europe

GRICIGNANO DI AVERSA, Italy — The football field immediately strikes the eye for visitors driving on an overpass approaching the U.S. Navy Support Site outside of Naples.

An American football field in the middle of southern Italy.

Turn past the pothole-filled local streets, get through the security gate, and the unkempt Italian roads are replaced by perfectly paved thoroughfares. Home to more than 500 families, the Navy base is where Heisman Trophy candidate Ashton Jeanty learned to play football.

Now a junior running back for 15th-ranked Boise State and a unanimous selection on The Associated Press midseason All-America team, Jeanty's talents were first spotted by Naples High School football coach Jim Davis when he was in seventh grade.

Not on the football field, though. That's because tackle football wasn't an option for middle schoolers.

It was on the basketball court during middle school lunch.

"He's going up for a layup and he's getting so much height I'm thinking this kid's about to dunk the ball," said Davis, who also teaches physical education at the school. "As a seventh grader, you can imagine how short he is. He's 5-9, 5-10 now. So he was probably closer to 5-4 or 5-5. And it's like, 'Wow, look at the power this kid has at such a young age.'"

Davis had to wait two years to unleash that power in his team when Jeanty was a high school freshman in 2018.

And it wasn't until the coach moved Jeanty from quarterback two games into the season that he really began to take off.

"I realized he needed to be the running back. I could get anybody to hand off the ball to him," Davis told the AP during an interview at the military base this week.

In the remaining four games of Naples' season, Jeanty ran for over 1,200 yards on fewer than 100 carries and scored 17 touchdowns.

"I'd be lying to you if I told you that (I thought) he would be a Heisman candidate," Davis said. "The only person that probably really felt that way was himself. But I knew he could play at the next level, and that's why I knew he had to leave here to get the exposure."

So Davis encouraged Jeanty to go back to the United States for his final three years of high school. And that's what Jeanty did by enrolling at Lone Star High School in Frisco, Texas. Now he leads the nation with 1,376 yards in seven games for Boise State and is considered the top running back prospect

for the NFL draft.

Get on the bus

The one year of football that Jeanty played in Italy was unlike anything most American high school athletes experience.

Naples' closest competition is nine hours away at a similar base in Vicenza in northern Italy. During Jeanty's season, the team also played games in Germany, Belgium and Spain. The game in Germany required an 18-hour bus ride.

Current Naples quarterback Camden Kasperek was the ballboy when Jeanty played on the team.

"On those long bus trips, you do a lot of team bonding, a lot of cool opportunities, a lot of fun trips with the team," Kasperek said, adding that Jeanty still keeps in touch with him via social media and follows the school's results.

Home away from home

Featuring a movie theater, a bowling alley and a supermarket stocked with American goods, the Navy base is like a home away from home for the kids who live there.

"We have Popeyes and Wendy's and Subway, and they can buy American clothes and they can buy Skippy peanut butter and Halloween candies now and they'll go trick or treating here shortly," Davis said. "So,

yeah, it's very much like a little America."

Volcano vista

Because the Navy support site field doesn't have lights, some of the team's games are played at the Carney Park military recreational facility inside a dormant volcano in nearby Pozzuoli.

The rec site is linked to a relationship between the U.S. military community and Naples that dates back to World War II.

"It's pretty neat," Davis said. "You see the crater all around you."

Military life

Growing up in a military family helped shape who Jeanty is.

"The sense of discipline, order. You work until the job (is) done, not just because the time is over," Davis said. "He has that work ethic."

Other athletes have followed Jeanty's path before from overseas bases to the elite level like George Teague, Michael Strahan, Alejandro Villanueva — and Shaquille O'Neal in basketball.

Military life translates well to football.

"It's all about teamwork, discipline and honoring the chain of command: not having to like the person next to you, but respecting them to get the mission complete," Davis said.

Tough to tackle

Davis often wakes up during the middle of the night now to watch Jeanty play. What he sees isn't much different from what the coach witnessed first-hand six years ago.

"He wouldn't go down on the first hit. He was explosive. You just felt like you're always sitting on the edge of your seat waiting for him. You know, next touch might be a touchdown," Davis said.

"Most of our games were high scoring, like 45-42, 38-35. We were just very fortunate most of those times that we had the ball last. So we were never out of it as long as we gave it to No. 2."

Buckley could only shrug. "I just told them I had to stay the course," he said, "and my time will come."

And then Saturday came.

With wide receivers Luke Wysong and Caleb Medford out for the majority of UNM's 17-6 loss to Colorado State, Buckley hauled in his first career catch — a 15-yard gain on second and 8 — on his way to finishing with seven receptions for 90 yards.

When the Lobos needed him the most, there was Buckley — a 6-foot-0, 180-pound walk-on who treated every practice like a game — at the center of UNM's most improbable breakout performance of the season.

It's not fair to say nobody saw it coming. "I don't want to say the word unbelievable," wide receivers coach Micah Simon said, "because in this world, anything you want to do, you can do it. Anything you want to do, you can put your mind to it. "And Buckley, he's that guy, right?"

If most football stories are, in some way, about fathers and sons, Buckley's is no different. John Buckley weathered a rough childhood in Seattle, one his son said left him homeless at 15. He decided to move to Mexico when he was "19, 20 — really young," Buckley said.

John Buckley never left, marrying Blanca, and building a career in real estate; Buckley says he's "Mexican by heart

now." But John always loved the Seahawks, and there might not have been a happier man in Cabo when Seattle crushed Denver 43-8 on Feb. 2, 2014 for its first and only Super Bowl title.

The seed was planted. "I saw how happy he was," Buckley, then 12, said, "and I wanted to do that."

If you've ever fallen down a wormhole of YouTube compilations with titles such as *Nastiest Jukes in NFL History* or *NFL 'FILTHY' Route Running*, Buckley is a kindred spirit. After falling in love with the game, he learned it from YouTube, studying mid-2010s luminaries such as Odell Beckham Jr. and Antonio Brown.

That's when the visualization in the back yard started.

"I would try to imitate that exact same clip: 'OK, he's doing this — boom,'" Buckley said.

Maybe a year after those backyard sessions started, Buckley joined a club team in Cabo — and scored 36 touchdowns in six games. At least that's what he remembers. He played wide receiver, safety, running back, long snapper, kicker. "I was everything," Buckley said.

He wasn't bad, either. With a few seasons at the club level in hand, Buckley started to hit the camp circuit in the United States and kept hearing the same thing: He needed to play high school, then college football if he wanted a realistic shot of making the NFL.

In Buckley's "tiny" slice of Cabo, everybody knows each other. His middle school and

high school were merged, roughly 130 kids together. He had known all his best friends since he was 1- or 2-years-old. It's one big family expanding beyond John, Blanca and his three sisters. "Honestly, I just feel so much love," Buckley said.

He left it all, alone, when he was 16 — a "sacrifice" that rivaled those bonds in scope and scale. Buckley moved in with family friends in Orange County, California, and enrolled at nearby Santa Margarita Catholic High School, sitting out his sophomore year because he was ineligible.

Despite playing in the Trinity League — perhaps the most competitive prep football league in the country — Buckley didn't know how college recruiting worked, and he bounced from host family to host family. "I had no idea," he said. "I just decided, 'you know what, I'm just gonna go hard and play.'"

As a senior in 2021, Buckley caught 17 passes for 349 yards and four touchdowns, earning first-team All-Trinity League honors as did Arizona quarterback Noah Fifita and Michigan defensive tackle Mason Graham that year. The list is an embarrassment of riches: Just about every name ended up as a highly-touted Power 5 recruit, the next crop of players fortifying the league's vaunted reputation.

Every name but Buckley. By July, he had a "couple of looks" and a handful of preferred walk-on offers when UNM came into the fold. The promise, from former wide receivers coach Bran-

don Blackmon, was that he'd have a chance to play. Nothing more, nothing less.

As a freshman, Buckley notched one game appearance and returned a kickoff 32 yards. Then, a long, frustrating stretch of nothing. Injuries thwarted his sophomore year, derailed his junior season. When head coach Bronco Mendenhall was hired in December, he was looking for a fresh start with a new staff.

On Monday morning, Mendenhall put him on scholarship.

"That's something that we will never forget," Medford said. "Like, I've been a part of many receivers rooms and this is just one that really, I'm gonna remember for the rest of my life. Just because of his story and his like, (the) inspiration that he brings to everybody here."

When wide receiver Ryan Davis transferred to UNM in January 2023, he first knew Buckley as the "King of Cabo." If someone was going to get some work in on the JUGs machine, it was a safe bet Buckley was going, too. He also asked (seemingly) a million questions on "the littlest things," Davis said.

How do you hold the ball? How do you swing with it and still run full speed? How do you dip your shoulder like that? Are you running on your toes when you're running?

"Just all the questions you can ask — anything to gain an advantage, he wants (it)," Davis said. "And I love him for that."

To Medford, he's "Baja Buckley," a glider that runs free-flowing routes like he's playing

soccer. Not much is known about "The Interview," a thinly veiled secret from Mendenhall's near-mythic offseason program.

The only certainties are that it's a timed workout, and it's hard: "Honestly, it's just a lot to explain," Medford laughed. "I can just tell you, man, there's some prowlers (an exercise), dog. It was the prowlers for all of us."

Whatever it was, Medford remembered that Buckley asked to do it again — Mendenhall wasn't impressed with his time. "To do it twice, that's just — you gotta have a lot of courage, you really do," Medford said.

Buckley admits he tries to keep it out of his mind. He doesn't want it to be an excuse. "Say, 'oh, just because I'm from Mexico, this is all right to do,'" he said. And Buckley's big moment will forever be intertwined with a conference loss to CSU that left him and a locker room full of teammates far more frustrated than not.

"It brought tears to my eyes," he said. "It's heartbreaking to know that we could have won a game — and we didn't."

But for all that went into it, perhaps not even Buckley could have visualized the pure joy and excitement he felt moving from catch to catch, target to target. Or the phone call with his parents after the game, John and Blanca brought to tears by their son's performance.

And perhaps that doesn't matter now. You don't have to see what you can feel.

"And that part," Buckley said, "felt good."

Falcons look to keep running against Cowboys

RB Bijan Robinson hitting his stride with first-place Atlanta

ATLANTA — Bijan Robinson and the NFC South-leading Atlanta Falcons are moving up while Dak Prescott and the Dallas Cowboys have fallen below .500.

Robinson is a big reason the Falcons (5-3) have won four of their last five games as they enter Sunday's game against Dallas (3-4).

Atlanta took sole possession of first place in the division with last week's 31-26 win at Tampa Bay. The Cowboys are third in the NFC East after Prescott threw two interceptions in a 30-24 loss to the San Francisco 49ers. It was the Cowboys' second straight loss.

Robinson has topped 100 scrimmage yards in three straight games and scored four touchdowns in that span. The Cowboys rank 31st against the run after giving up 223 yards on the ground in the loss to the 49ers.

Kirk Cousins threw four touchdown passes against Tampa Bay, including one to Robinson.

"I think we all on offense, if we execute right, we all can play very well," Robinson said. "And I think for me, I'm starting to just grow my confidence from week to week."

The Cowboys rank last in the league in rushing.

Turnover woes

Prescott has two interceptions in each of the past three games, a first in his nine NFL seasons. The Cowboys have forced just two turnovers in the past five games, sinking to a tie for 26th in the NFL

with five takeaways.

Dallas is minus-8 in turnover margin after finishing at least plus-10 in each of the past three seasons. The Cowboys made the playoffs at 12-5 each time.

"Personally, I'm very frustrated," coach Mike McCarthy said. "It's a focal point, but we can't change yesterday. We know how to do it. We've done it. They have to quit being words and be practices and exercise drills that equate to Sundays. That's our focus."

Falcons pride

Veteran defensive tackle Grady Jarrett says he is enjoying Atlan-

ta's reaction to the team's surge to first place under first-year coach Raheem Morris.

"I think people are just proud," Jarrett said. "... You see people wearing Atlanta Falcons stuff. ... It's something we cherish, but we've got to continue to perform."

The Zimmer connection

Dallas defensive coordinator Mike Zimmer was Minnesota's head coach from 2014-21, and Cousins played for the Vikings from 2018-23. Cousins isn't counting on his knowledge of Zimmer and his scheme being a factor on Sunday.

"I think that would be kind of overrated, if you will," Cousins said Wednesday. "I think his scheme is so sound, and I don't think there's much you can extract there. You know, he's been around the league for so long and is so respected and has had a scheme that gives people problems for so long that I don't think there's too much that having worked together would make much difference."

Zimmer noted that Cousins "used to go against us every day. Takes good care of the football. Very smart."

Emotional Diggs

Dallas cornerback Trevon Diggs apologized for a confrontation with a reporter over a social media post after the loss to San Francisco. It was a rare public display of emotion for the normally soft-spoken Diggs, who thought the post unfairly questioned his effort on a long pass play that didn't directly involve him.

Diggs, who approached the reporter in full uniform outside the locker room before it was opened to reporters, has always kept his media interactions to a minimum. That included in 2021, when he had the first double-digit interception season in the NFL in 40 years with 11 and was named an All-Pro.

When Diggs did talk, the sessions didn't last long. That changed this week, when the apology was just a small part of a 10-minute Q&A that covered plenty of topics. Among them was the question of whether Diggs was trying to show fans he cared.

"I definitely care," Diggs said. "I definitely have a lot of emotions that I don't show. So, I let that moment get the best of me. Like I said, you got to keep the main thing the main thing. At the end of the day, we lost. We all got to play better. We all got to find a way to win."

Prove it outside the South

The Falcons haven't demonstrated they can look like a playoff team when playing outside the weak NFC South. Atlanta is 4-0 against division opponents after completing a sweep of the season series against the Buccaneers.

The Falcons looked far less imposing in a 34-14 home loss to Seattle on Oct. 20 and are 1-3 outside the division.

Broncos and Ravens rebound from 0-2 starts

Baltimore's offense and Denver's defense are leading teams

BALTIMORE — The Baltimore Ravens and Denver Broncos have come a long way since starting the season 0-2.

How they've done it is quite a contrast — Lamar Jackson and the Ravens with their dynamic offense, and the Broncos by pressuring quarterbacks and making it tough for opponents to score.

That's the matchup — Baltimore's offense against Denver's defense — that will be in the spotlight Sunday when the Ravens host the Broncos. Each team has won five of its last six games to recover nicely from a slow start.

"As the season progresses, obviously the games begin to gain more significance," Denver coach Sean Payton said. "Certainly this will be our toughest challenge to date by far. This is a real, real good football team."

Baltimore (5-3) is averaging an NFL-best 452 yards per game. Derrick Henry leads the league in rushing by a wide margin, and Jackson is No. 1 in passer rating. The Ravens have big-play threats and have been efficient in the red zone, scoring touchdowns on 25 of their 33 trips.

The Broncos (5-3) have held six of their eight opponents under 20 points, and they rank second in the league in sacks.

"Their guys are really active, they play hard. That's one thing you see on film," Ravens offensive coordinator Todd Monken said. "They've done a great job of building the core personalities of the players they've got playing on the field — I think that's impressive, how hard they play and schematically how they challenge you with their pressure package."

Jackson has been sharp against the blitz this season, but his status isn't entirely clear after he missed practice Wednesday and Thursday. He was listed on the injury report with back and knee issues, although there wasn't any sign of a major problem during last weekend's game at Cleveland.

The Browns won that one 29-24 to snap Baltimore's five-game winning streak. The Ravens trail Pittsburgh in the AFC North by one game. Denver is second in the AFC West behind unbeaten Kansas City.

Rough road

The Broncos' three October victories were blowouts. They beat the Raiders 34-18, the Saints 33-10 and the Panthers 28-14.

Now comes the hard part.

The Broncos' next two games are at Baltimore and Kansas City and the outcomes could go a long way in determining if Denver is a legitimate playoff threat, something the team hasn't been since the Peyton Manning era.

"I just think we're very prepared mentally," cornerback Patrick Surtain II said. "Just going throughout the midst of

season, things that we overcome. Obviously, we know the challenge at hand these next couple of weeks. This time of the year is very critical, as far as getting to that next step, to that next stage, and we're prepared for this opportunity. We know what the road ahead looks like and we just have to keep on building the building blocks and set us up for success at the end of the day."

New addition

The Ravens added another threat to their offense this week by trading for receiver Diontae Johnson.

"He's quick, he's fast, he's got great hands. An explosive player," coach John Harbaugh said. "You take those talents, and you fit him into what you're doing, and let's roll."

Rookie class

Rookie wide receiver Troy Franklin and Devaughn Vele are starting to carve out bigger roles in Denver's offense.

"Those are young players that are growing right in front of our eyes. We talk a lot about Bo's growth, but there are other younger players that are getting experience," Payton said, referring to rookie quarterback Bo Nix. "I think that's important, and they've handled it well."

Impressive company

The Ravens have become the fourth team to score at least 20 points with at least 375 total yards in each of their first eight games, joining the 2000 Rams, 2007 Patriots and 2013 Broncos. The Patriots and Broncos both reached the Super Bowl.

Other injuries

Aside from Jackson, the big question for the Ravens this week is the health of their struggling defense. Cornerbacks Marlon Humphrey (knee) and Nate Wiggins (shoulder/illness) have been limited this week, although Wiggins was back to full participation in practice Thursday. Defensive linemen Brent Urban (concussion), Travis Jones (ankle) and Broderick Washington (knee) all missed at least some practice time.

Safety P.J. Locke (thumb) and tackle Mike McGlinchey (knee) are the only two Broncos with injuries of note.

Jets beat Texans to snap 5-game skid

Garrett Wilson makes eye-popping TD catch

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Garrett Wilson made a dazzling one-handed 26-yard go-ahead touchdown catch early in the fourth quarter and the New York Jets snapped a five-game losing streak by beating the Houston Texans 21-13 on Thursday night.

Aaron Rodgers had three touchdown passes, including another earlier one-handed score by Wilson and a 37-yard throw to recently acquired Davante Adams, and the Jets (3-6) won for the first time in four games under interim head coach Jeff Ulbrich.

With the Jets trailing 10-7 and facing third-and-19 from the Texans 26, Rodgers tossed the ball up toward Wilson in the end zone. The star wide receiver jumped and reached up with his right hand with both legs spread in the air — looking like the Michael Jordan "Jumpman" logo.

The play was initially called an incomplete pass, but a video replay review confirmed that Wilson's shin was down in the end zone and a touchdown was called to give the Jets a 14-10 lead with 12:54 left.

It sent the MetLife Stadium crowd into a frenzy after the fans had little to cheer for until that point.

Wilson's catch was reminiscent of the Giants' Odell Beckham Jr.'s one-handed grab against Dallas in 2014.

It also helped make up for a Jets touchdown that wasn't when rookie Malachi Corley made a mental mistake that negated his first NFL score.

With the Jets at the Texans 19 early in the second quarter, Corley took the toss from Rodgers and zipped down the right sideline. Corley sped into the end zone, but just before he crossed the goal line, he dropped the ball out of his right hand to celebrate.

A video review showed he had not gotten into the end zone before he dropped it. So, Corley was credited with an 18-yard run and a fumble. And because it rolled out of the side of the end zone, it was a touchback and a turnover.

Rodgers finished 22 of 32 for 211 yards. His 37-yard touchdown pass to Adams, who earlier was cleared after being checked for a possible head injury, put the Jets up 21-10 with 2:56 left. It was Adams' first touchdown catch since being acquired from Las Vegas earlier this month.

Ka'imi Fairbairn made a 29-yard field goal with 39 seconds left to make it an eight-point game, but Adams recovered the onside kick and the Jets were able to take a knee and seal the win. Fairbairn missed two field goals for Houston.

C.J. Stroud was 11 of 30 for 191 yards for the Texans (6-3), who played with injured receivers Stefon Diggs and Nico Collins.

Chiefs in pursuit of franchise-record 14th consecutive win

Nix now has most wins by a rookie QB in Broncos history

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Kansas City Chiefs have reached the point where they seem to be making history just about every week.

Patrick Mahomes becoming the fastest player in NFL history to throw for 30,000 yards in last week's win over Las Vegas. Travis Kelce sitting one touchdown reception short of passing Tony Gonzalez for the franchise record.

Here's another one: The Chiefs, at 7-0 the last unbeaten team in the league, can set another club record Monday night against Tampa Bay by winning their 14th consecutive game going back to last season. It's a string of excellence that encompasses their run to a second straight Super Bowl title, and the longest in the NFL since they also won 13 in a row during the 2019-20 seasons.

"Guys have accepted the challenge," Mahomes said, "and that's why we've been able to win these games we've won."

The most remarkable thing about the winning streak is the Chiefs have not played particularly well, at least on offense, where they have lost their top two wide receivers and starting running back to what are likely season-ending injuries.

BRONCOS: The rookie quarterback leading the 2024 draft class into November isn't Caleb Williams or Jayden Daniels, the top two selections in April whose epic showdown in Week 8 saw each lead touchdown drives in the final 25 seconds.

It's Denver QB Bo Nix, who was named the AFC's Offensive Rookie of the Month on Thursday, quite a rebound from his rough September.

Nix had a stellar October in which he led the Broncos (5-3) to three blowouts and their best start through eight games in eight years. His five wins have already surpassed the four by John Elway (1983) and Drew Lock (2019) for most victories by a rookie QB in Broncos history.

Nix led all rookie passers in October in touchdown passes (seven), TD-to-interception ratio (7-1), passing yards (870) and rushing touchdowns (two). He helped the Broncos recover from an 0-2 start with five wins in their last six games.

Rutgers' dynamic duo highlight freshman class

Ace Bailey has the upside while Dylan Harper is ready to contribute now

It's not that uncommon for blue-blood programs to have two five-star prospects arrive on campus the same year.

It rarely happens at schools that don't have that kind of tradition. And that's what makes No. 25 Rutgers one of the most intriguing stories of the season as the Scarlet Knights welcome Ace Bailey and Dylan Harper.

Bailey was the nation's No. 2 prospect in his high school class and Harper was No. 3, according to composite rankings of recruiting sites compiled by 247Sports. The impact they can have as freshman teammates became apparent Oct. 17 when Rutgers faced St. John's in a preseason exhibition. Rutgers lost 91-85, but Bailey scored 25 points and Harper added 20.

"Dylan, for a freshman, he's got so much control," St. John's coach Rick Pitino said after the game. "He plays like a senior. He's so much under control. He's got a lot of Clyde Frazier in him, the way he plays. He was amazing. Ace just has great talent. Both of them are great. I think they're terrific. Obviously they deserve the ranking that they're getting."

Bailey, who is 6-10, averaged 33.4 points, 15.5 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 2.9 blocks while winning a state title his senior year at McEachern High School in Powder Springs, Georgia.

Harper, the son of former NBA guard Ron Harper, had 23 points per game his senior year at Don Bosco Prep in Ramsey, New Jersey.

"They're great kids, first and foremost," Rutgers coach Steve Pikiell said. "They're really good passers. They've got to learn some things. College defense is something they're going to continue to get better at. But they're exciting."

247Sports director of scouting Adam Finkelstein said Harper is more polished at this point, but Bailey has the greater upside.

"I think it's very possible that Harper is the more consistently productive college freshman and Bailey gets picked higher in the draft," Finkelstein said. "I think Bailey, with a great year, could contend for that No. 1 overall pick. Harper, it wouldn't surprise me if he can contend with (Duke's) Cooper (Flagg) to be as impactful a college freshman as there is in the country."

Some other freshmen who should make a major impact this season:

Jalil Bethea, G, Miami

Bethea, ranked seventh in the 247Sports composite, is a 6-5 guard from Philadelphia who

had 22.7 points, 6 rebounds and 5 assists per game his senior year at Archbishop Wood. He was named Pennsylvania's Gatorade player of the year.

"He's a dynamic shooter," Finkelstein said. "Physically he's not at the same level. But he's a tough shot-maker who still manages to shoot really high percentages."

VJ Edgecombe, G, Baylor

No. 8 Baylor has had a freshman drafted in the first round each of the last three years (Jeremy Sochan 9th overall in 2022, Keyonte George 16th in 2023, Ja'Kobe Walter 19th in 2024). Edgecombe could be the next freshman to join that list. The 6-5 guard was ranked fourth in the 247Sports Composite. He's from the Bahamas but attended high school at Long Island (New York) Lutheran.

"You're talking about a truly elite athlete, really competitive on both ends of the floor," Finkelstein said.

Cooper Flagg, G/F, Duke

Flagg is the first freshman to

make the Associated Press preseason All-America since Oklahoma State's Cade Cunningham in 2020, according to SportsRadar.

The 6-9 swingman for No. 7 Duke was named the Gatorade national player of the year, Naismith national player of the year and a McDonald's All-American his senior year at Montverde (Florida) Academy.

Finkelstein says Flagg's game is similar to that of former Utah Jazz forward Andrei Kirilenko but added that the Duke freshman might have a higher ceiling. Kirilenko is a former All-Star who played for Utah from 2001-11.

"Kirilenko, like Cooper, was a hugely impactful defender despite the fact he wasn't a 7-footer," Finkelstein said. "I've said Cooper's the best shot blocker I've ever seen who's not a 7-footer, at least at this stage. But offensively he's got a ton of versatility to him too, and a real killer instinct about him."

Tre Johnson, G, Texas

Johnson arrives at No. 19 Texas after scoring 2,563 points in four years of high school basketball and had 17 points in 24 minutes at the McDonald's All-American Game. Rated fifth in the 247Sports composite, the 6-6 guard is from Garland, Texas, but finished his high school career at Link Academy in Branson, Missouri.

"He loves to shoot off the dribble," Finkelstein said. "I expect

he's going to be given a pretty green light in Texas to really pursue that individual offense, and it's going to be about whether he can show that potent scoring ability and maintain his efficiency in order to help impact winning."

Liam McNeeley, F, UConn

McNeeley figures to move right into the starting lineup for the two-time defending national champions, since No. 3 UConn lost four starters from last year's team. The 6-7 forward is ranked 17th in the 247Sports. He played at Montverde Academy the last two seasons.

"He's skilled," Finkelstein said. "He's got real size. He's got real basketball IQ. He's going to a system where he's going to be able to use all his best assets."

Asa Newell, F, Georgia

This 6-11 forward from Montverde Academy scored a team-high 20 points in Georgia's preseason exhibition victory over Charlotte. Newell was ranked 15th in the 247Sports composite. Finkelstein noted that Newell actually came off the bench for much of his time at Montverde.

"Now he goes to a Georgia program where he may actually be more highlighted as a freshman in college than he was as a senior in high school," Finkelstein said.

And in late September, Estrada was inducted into the Albuquerque High School Hall of Fame.

Estrada also served for a few years as the head boys basketball coach at Rio Grande High School.

He was born in Bayard, near Silver City, the eighth youngest of 10 children, and he graduated from Lordsburg High School in 1951.

He enlisted in the Navy and was a two-year letterman for both the men's football and basketball teams as part of the fleet located in Japan in 1952 and 1953.

Estrada is survived by his wife of 68 years, Josie, plus many children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

LA CUEVA TENNIS: The Bears have named their replacement for the retired Dick Johnson, the longtime boys tennis coach who led La Cueva to over a dozen state championships during his career, including earlier this year.

Former Bears standout Michael Tran, a multiple state champion (both individually and as part of the team) at La Cueva during his playing days, will be the program's new head coach.

He was once ranked No. 1 in the Southwest section of the United States Tennis Association. Tran was also a former University of New Mexico Lobo, from 2014-19.

He graduated from UNM with degrees in biology and psychology.

In addition to coaching tennis, Tran also owns and operates Tasty Pot, a Taiwanese restaurant that opened in Albuquerque last year.

HALL OF FAME, PART I: La Cueva was set to induct its 2024 Hall of Fame

class on Friday night, but when the school's football game had to be moved to Thursday because of a lack of officials, La Cueva had to change its plans to honor the inductees.

This year's group: Bryce Alford (2013), one of the school's all-time great basketball players who later played collegiately at UCLA and professionally in Europe;

Mitch Garver (2009), who played soccer and baseball at La Cueva but made his mark primarily in baseball, where he later starred at UNM. Garver has been a longtime pro, spending time with the Twins, Rangers and Mariners. He won a World Series ring last year with Texas.

La'Tasia Larez-Dyer (1996), a volleyball and softball standout at La Cueva who later played at New Mexico State. Three of her children have played for the Bears.

Megan Rice (2003), who excelled in volleyball, basketball and track and field. She later starred on the Northern Arizona basketball team.

Sofie Schunk (2010), who did soccer and track and field; she would go on to play soccer at Marquette University in Milwaukee, and also once qualified for the Olympic marathon.

Rick Ingle, a longtime baseball coach for the Bears and also a counselor from 1992-2023.

HALL OF FAME, PART II: Cleveland also has its Class of 2024. Inductees:

Azure Dorsey, a member of the school's first graduating class and a dominant defender on the girls soccer team. She later played collegiately for Rollins College in Florida.

Amy Salinas also was a member of Cleveland's first graduating class, and also played defender for the Storm. She also ran track and field, swam and played basketball. She played soccer

collegiately at Adams State in Colorado.

Caitlyn Espinosa, like Dorsey and Salinas, was an excellent girls soccer player, plus a member of the basketball and track programs. She played soccer at Fort Lewis College in Durango.

Macario Borrego (2012) was part of Cleveland's first boys wrestling state championship team, and he was an individual champion, as well. He wrestled later for Colorado Mesa University.

Michael LiRosi (2012) was a terrific football player for Cleveland. He was a playmaking middle linebacker for the Storm's first state championship team, in 2011, and was a two-time All-Stater.

Matthew Romero (2012) was a two-way starter in football for three straight years along both lines. He got to Adams State on a football scholarship.

Current Cleveland defensive coordinator Eddie Kilmer has been the architect for multiple, suffocating Storm defenses since his arrival in 2011.

Jim Tillery was one of Cleveland's original staff members, and he led the school to five state bowling championships. He also coached the boys and girls golf teams to a combined five state titles.

Bob Tyler has been a regular contributor to the school and coached both softball and baseball at Cleveland. Same with another inductee, Michael Franklin, who has for years worked behind the scenes in support of the Storm's athletic department.

Joseph Perez (2014) played on that 2011 state football championship team, and has been assisting with the program in many capacities for the last 10 years.

has sold 37 of the 40 suites in the Pit.

"On the suites, we intentionally only sold 37 so we can fulfill some single game orders as well as some select community and charitable use opportunities," Dominguez said.

Pit suite revenue does not go to UNM Athletics, but rather to pay back debt the department incurred from the 2010 renovation of the Pit.

Dominguez noted, too, that the university will be introducing new revenue generating initiatives around merchandise sales, concessions and ticketing that would help fund 505 Sports Venture Foundation, the collective paying UNM Lobo athletes in this new era of name, image and likeness.

WOMEN'S NUMBERS: UNM has sold 3,561 season tickets for women's basketball as of Thursday, about 95% of last season's season ticket base of 3,758.

The women's team also opens the season Monday, tipping off at 11 a.m. against Northern Arizona.

MONEY MATTERS: This season, the Mountain West moved from an 18-game to a 20-game conference schedule, which cut by two the number of nonconference games UNM had to schedule.

The road team in college basketball nonconference games is usually paid a predetermined sum while the home team keeps the revenue from hosting the game.

Though the number of Division I nonconference games UNM will host has gone down, the price to host them has risen. This season, UNM is paying an average of \$90,000 per "buy game," a significant jump in just the past two seasons.

Here is a look at the cost of hosting "buy games" the past three seasons (this does not include in-season tournament games the Lobos host or home-and-home series):

- 2024-25 season: \$270,000 for three DI games (average \$90,000)
 - 2023-24 season: \$410,000 for five DI games (average \$82,000)
 - 2022-23 season: \$355,000 for five DI games (average \$71,000, including a rare, in-season scheduled game against Oral Roberts that was cheaper than normal at \$55,000).
- UNM has paid non-DI opponents \$5,000 per game — regular season or exhibition — consistently for many years.

Against four spades, West led the heart 10. East overtook with the jack to preserve an entry with the ace, assuming West had a doubleton based on the lead, hoping eventually to promote a trump trick for his partner.

ACES ON BRIDGE

This seems like the right idea when you examine the trump position. Declarer could not afford to start drawing trumps lest the defense take the ace-king and then cash two hearts, while a heart return might see West ruff with the nine in front of the dummy. He cashed three rounds of diamonds for a heart discard instead, before playing a spade. Even that was not good enough. West won and crossed to his partner's heart ace, after which a third round of hearts cooked declarer's goose. South could ruff low and be overruffed by the nine, or ruff high — whereupon West would discard and score an extra trump trick. Declarer would have been in decent shape if the spade nine had been outside, but a better line was available. West was known to hold both top spades after East had inferentially shown up with 7 points for his weak two. Therefore, declarer should have

played the club ace, king and a third club, discarding his last heart whether East ruffed in or not. Because West would have had to follow suit to the next heart lead, declarer could now pull trumps safely. Incidentally, if declarer cashes the clubs and then plays a fourth diamond, East ruffs in. If declarer now discards his last heart, so does West. A second heart then creates the trump promotion.

BID WITH THE ACES

South holds: ♠ Q J 10 8 4 3, ♥ K 5 4, ♦ 9 2, ♣ A 10

South West North East ?

ANSWER: This is too much for a weak two, even when vulnerable in the first seat. With the internally strong suit and two controls outside, I would happily open one spade, though I might venture a wide-ranging weak two in third seat. In second seat when vulnerable, this hand is within range for a preempt. Incidentally, change the hearts to queen-jack-third, and a weak two becomes far more attractive.
