





# 'I WANT TO SEE' MY SON'S KILLERS 'SUFFER IN JAIL'



## Mother of one of the six teenagers slain in horrific 5-day stretch of city gun violence cries out in pain

The mother of a teenager fatally shot in the head on his way to a friend's birthday party in the Bronx hopes his cowardly killers and their families suffer.

Victim Joshua Sparrow, 18, and his 15-year-old cousin were just about to enter the Morrisania apartment building where the party was being held when they were confronted by three masked men at about 7 p.m. last Monday, cops and family said.

"I want to see them suffer in jail. I want to see them rot," the victim's mother, Jenny Sparrow, 36, said of the gunmen, who have not been caught.

"I'm going to be honest with you, I want their families to suffer. Because we pay attention to our kids. None of my kids are

murderers. My son wasn't looking for trouble. They were."

Joshua was one of six teens to die from gun violence in the city during a frightening five-day stretch. He had nothing but a good time on his mind when he was killed, his mother says.

"He liked parties, girls, his friends. He loved his family. Nobody could say anything bad about my child. My son wasn't a troublemaker. My son did not argue," she said. "He had just a beautiful smile. He always laughed. He was happy."

The grieving mother said the teen's cousin recounted the events leading to the bloodshed outside the building on Rev. James A. Polite Ave. near E. 164th St. to his own mom, who then relayed the narrative to her.

"[The suspects were] already waiting. My son was on his way to a friend's birthday. He was not thinking of the enemy. He wasn't thinking of no beef. He wasn't thinking of nothing," Jenny Sparrow said. "He was approached by three young hotheads that were already carrying, with masks on their faces, and they were grilling my son."

Sparrow said her son asked the trio, "What's good?" to which they asked, in return, if "he was good." Joshua said, "Yes," before continuing to the residential building's front doors.

Shots rang out and Joshua was struck once in the back of the head and once in the torso.

"They were walking away. My son was trying to avoid it. His cousin was like, 'Come on! They were walking away and they shot

him," his mother said.

"That was cowardly. You are a cowardly person, waiting for my son to walk away when you couldn't face him like a man. Y'all couldn't jump my son but you pulled out a gun when his back was turned?"

Police responding to a 911 call found Joshua mortally wounded in the building's lobby. Medics rushed him to Lincoln Hospital, where he died. No arrests have been made.

Joshua's birth had special meaning to his mother.

"He was my gift from my mother," she explained. "My mother died in 2005 in January from cancer and three months later I found out I was pregnant. He was born the next year, Jan. 7. He came home looking identical to my mother."

"He always was a dancer. I remember having the ultrasound and he was in my stomach, literally dancing in the ultrasound," she added. "My baby could sing. He could dance. He was a jokester. He was very respectful, and he was a good kid."

In the days following her son's slaying, Sparrow woke up screaming and was unable to keep food down.

"I wanted to shave my hair. I wanted to kill myself. I wanted to die," she said. "The one thing that gave me hope and purpose, something to live for, when my mother was taken by cancer, was ... there was never a murder in my family."

"We've all dealt with sickness. We know you get old, you get sick, you die," she added. "We know that. But murder?"

The teen had plans to enroll in a program

this winter to complete his GED.

"My son always wanted to be a lawyer," his mother said. "I told him, 'You could do it, Baby. Whatever you want you can do it.'"

Adding to the difficulty in processing the sudden loss, Sparrow had hardly spoken to Joshua since he moved out of her Brooklyn apartment in August due to ongoing strife with his 15-year-old brother.

After Joshua moved to his aunt's Bronx apartment Sparrow, concerned for his safety, wanted him to return to Brooklyn, but it was difficult to contact the teen.

"His brother kept saying, 'Ma, I'm gonna go get my brother,'" Sparrow said. "I kept telling him, 'Make it right with your brother.' He said, 'I know, Ma, I'm gonna get him this week.'"

Joshua's death capped off a shocking rash of teen shooting deaths in the city.

The bloodshed began when 16-year-old Clarence Jones was shot in the torso by a pair of gunmen on Razor scooters near W. 124th St. and Lenox Ave. in Harlem about 1:30 a.m. on Oct. 24. He was about nine blocks from home when he was killed, cops said. A week later, police arrested a 15-year-old boy for the slaying and charged him with murder.

The day after Clarence's slay, Malachi Deberry, 15, was shot to death about 8:40 p.m. at Lenox Road and Rockaway Parkway in Brownsville, Brooklyn. Malachi was just a few blocks from home when he was killed.

That same day, 18-year-old McNally Zamor died after being shot in the head

Oct. 16 in Canarsie, Brooklyn. A 15-year-old gunman was nabbed the following day and charged with attempted murder and criminal possession of a weapon. Charges will likely be upgraded in the wake of the victim's death.

About 11:40 p.m. on Oct. 26, Tae'Arion Mungo, 16, was shot in the chest on Auburn Place near N. Portland Ave. in Fort Greene, Brooklyn, less than 600 feet from where he lived with his dad and grandmother in the Ingersoll Houses. He died at New York-Presbyterian Hospital Brooklyn Methodist. About 7:20 p.m. the next day, Tristan Sanders, 15, was shot twice in the chest in a hallway of an Albany Houses apartment building on St. Marks Ave. near Troy Ave. in Crown Heights, Brooklyn. He died at Kings County Hospital.

# 'NOT SEXY,' BUT IT'S

## Upgrade to the 'so damn old' MTA power infrastructure,

On a sweltering July day this past summer, straphangers trying to get home on the J train were left to sweat it out on the platform.

A 60-year-old power transformer in the subway system's Delancey-Suffolk substation — which MTA officials said had been operating for twice as many years as it should have — finally gave up the ghost, killing power to sections of the third rail throughout lower Manhattan. Trains, unable to move, were out of service from 6 p.m. on July 16 until just before 4:30 a.m. the following day, when replacement transformers were brought online.

"This is because the infrastructure is so damn old," MTA Chairman Janno Lieber told reporters later on the morning of July 17. "[The transformer] is a major piece of equipment that [was] 30 years past its useful life."

"It's not sexy," he said of the massive block of oil-bathed copper coils tasked with powering the third rail and, with it, the 16 electric motors that move a given eight-car J train. "It's not a shiny new car, it's not a brand-new station, it's not a new line — but we all depend on it every time we go into the subway."

According to the MTA's \$68 billion 2025-29 capital budget — currently under review by the state — the agency is hoping to spend \$4 billion over the next five years to repair and upgrade its power infrastructure.

The bulk of that, nearly \$3 billion, is earmarked for the subway system's traction power network — the collection of substations and transmission lines scattered throughout the five boroughs to take tens of thousands of volts of alternating-current power from Con Ed and turn it into the 650 volts of direct current power the trains need to run.

MTA officials say that's no small task,

given the age and complexity of a system originally built to serve the separate individual lines that ultimately became the New York City subway system.

"[Of the] 224 substations [in the subway system,] we've identified 77 of them as having a majority of components in poor or marginal condition," the MTA's head of construction and development, Jamie Torres-Springer, told the Daily News during a recent visit to some of the system's power stations. "They're in a state of disrepair."

The subway substations have one job: to change the power generated by Con Ed into something usable by subway trains. Electricity generated at power plants has what's called an alternating current — its direction swaps 60 times per second. This AC power can travel long distances along a wire without losing much voltage — but it's useless for subway cars designed to run on DC, or direct current, power.

Transformers — massive coils of copper,

bathed in oil to discourage electrical arcing and cooled by either air or water — bring the tens of thousands of volts down to hundreds. The current then goes to a device called the "rectifier," which straightens AC into DC.

Forty feet below East New York, Brooklyn, at the Atlantic substation, Joe Daidone, the 46-year-old chief superintendent of NYC Transit's power department, spoke to The News over the buzz of high-voltage electrical current.

"This is from the late '30s or early '40s," he said, pointing to the large gray transformer that dominated the underground room. "It's original to the substation."

One of several pipes feeding from a nearby water tank into the water-cooled transformer was made of shiny brass — a recent replacement for a corroded coolant line, Daidone said.

"That's not a problem. We can shut down the station and change the pipe," he said.

"The problem is, if this is deteriorating, what's going on inside?"

"Most likely, everything is corroded inside," he said of the 80-year-old transformer. "We're just buying time."

Substations are set up throughout the system so that if one fails, others nearby can take over. Doing so, however, increases the strain on the adjacent substations, wearing out their components at a faster rate.

The Atlantic substation, which powers a section of the Fulton Line of the A and C trains, was already decommissioned once, in 2000, when its rectifier — a Depression-era mercury-arc system — was deemed too old to continue safely functioning.

Five years later, however, Daidone's team found a way to press the Atlantic substation back into service.

"That rectifier was borrowed from the garbage pails of the Long Island Rail Road," Daidone said, pointing to a massive red and silver collection of diodes, fuses and heat

sinks behind the transformer. "Fifteen years ago, I put that into service."

The rectifier — state of the art in the 1960s and long since discarded by NYC Transit's sister railroad — is the Atlantic substation's most modern component.

MTA's sought-after \$4 billion investment in power — \$3 billion for the subway, \$1 billion for the commuter railroads — won't be enough to modernize the whole system. The MTA capital plan estimates the money will allow for work on 60 of the 224 substations, with only "some" undergoing a full overhaul.

Across the river in Manhattan, the Central substation on 53rd St. offers a glimpse of what that could look like.

Cavernous and brightly lit, the above-ground facility is home to three separate transformers powering the nearby A, C, E, D and F trains.

Two of the three are modern, air-cooled units, with computerized controls and a

back catalog of replacement parts on offer from their manufacturers. A sleek row of computerized circuit breakers includes cabinets with replacement units, ready to swap in at a moment's notice.

Officials say the "cleaner" power — more consistent rectification and a more constant DC voltage — that such systems can produce will be even more important when the MTA starts converting more lines to Communications-Based Train Control.

CBTC, a computerized signaling system, will allow the MTA to run trains closer together — increasing the number of trains and thus the amount of power required on a given section of track.

It remains to be seen if the MTA will be able to fully fund its proposed capital program. Accounting for expected state and city contributions, the MTA is still seeking to close a \$33 billion funding hole. Asked about the proposed budget shortly after its approval by the MTA board in September,

Gov. Hochul said the \$68 billion figure wasn't "final," and could still be rolled back.

But Lieber has repeatedly emphasized the importance of "state of good repair" work in the coming years.

MTA officials said they expect the Atlantic substation — which serves a portion of the line the MTA hopes to convert to modern signals — will be one of the substations prioritized for a full overhaul in the budget: a new transformer, a new rectifier and maybe even new circuit breakers.

Back at the Atlantic substation that had Daidone eyeing its row of antique mechanical breakers as desirable spare parts, he lamented, "There's only three substations I know that have this breaker," pointing to a particularly intricate-looking device on the far end of the wall.

"When we rehab this place, that is coming with me," he continued. "I'll save [another] substation and get it back online because if it"

# Young dad's hopes die

## B'klyn man gunned down walking dogs wanted to wed, leave city

A young Brooklyn dad with big plans to get a job, get married and leave the city had his dreams snuffed out by a killer's bullets, his heartbroken girlfriend told the Daily News on Sunday.

Aarmani Dawkins, 25, was walking his aunt's dogs when he was ambushed in the courtyard of his aunt's building on Pitkin Ave. near Pennsylvania Ave. in East New York at about 5:30 p.m. Saturday. He lived with his grandmother just around the corner from his aunt's building.

"I just wish I had more time with him," Dawkins' childhood sweetheart, Jazia Soto, said. "I was literally just thinking last week about marrying him."

Dawkins (photo) was soon due to pick up his 5-year-old son, Aarmani Jr., when he was killed.

"I texted him and I was like, 'Do you have any chicken nuggets or something for the baby when he gets here?' and he didn't reply," Soto, 24, said. "I was like, 'Oh that's weird.' It was just left on delivered."

"Like 30 minutes later, around 6:30, his sister was calling me. She was like, 'You need to come to the hospital.' She told me, 'Aarmani got shot. He's dead.'"

Soto was left to explain to their son what happened.

"I told him this morning, and he was crying his eyes out," Soto said of their son. "He plays video games, so he knows what it means when somebody dies, but he was crying. And when I was breaking it down he was like, 'Daddy's an angel, he's with grandma now.'"

Soto heard the details of what happened from a relative who watched surveillance footage of the slaying.

"He was holding the dogs, and he ended up letting go of the leashes and he looked confused. He was wearing a ski mask. He would wear it sometimes because he didn't like his facial hair because it made him look older," she said. "He put his hands up and dropped the leash, and then they still shot him."

Medics rushed Dawkins, shot in the neck and stomach, to Brookdale University Hospital, but he could not be saved.

"There were people running, and we heard two shots," said one neighbor, who declined to give her name. "It happened in the courtyard. A person was on the ground. He was facedown."

"These buildings used to be very good, and this kind of stuff never happened," another neighbor added. "The last two months with these new younger kids hanging here there's been incidents but nothing crazy to this extent."

The 75th Precinct, where the shooting took place, has seen eight homicides



through Oct. 27 of this year, a sharp drop from the 18 killings in the same time period last year.

Police believe Dawkins was the killer's intended target, though a spokeswoman couldn't provide any information on a motive Sunday.

Hawkins went to Thomas Jefferson High School but left after Soto got pregnant to help her take care of their son. The couple met through Facebook, where they had mutual friends.

"I knew him since I was 13 and he was 14," Soto explained. "I hated him at first — he was too pretty. And then I started talking to him and then I was like, 'I love this man so much.'"

Soto called Dawkins her first love. "We planned all of our life since I was 15 years

old, and I didn't think he would just die," she said.

Dawkins had two other children, ages 5 and 2, through other relationships and spent most of his time taking care of his grandmother and young son, Soto said.

"He would ask, 'When will you marry me?' and I would say, 'Whenever you can make me a housewife,'" Soto said. "He was like, 'Give me a few months, and we can get there and leave New York.'"

She said he was working on getting a job so he could move them to South Carolina.

"He was like the sweetest person ever. He was figuring out some things, but he had a routine and didn't mess with anyone," she said. "He usually doesn't do

much, which is why this is confusing. He would run errands for his family, play video games and take care of his kid."

Dawkins was "blunt and funny," with a dark sense of humor, she said. In his spare time, he'd play Call of Duty and Apex Legends.

"He would walk his aunt's dogs like once or twice a day," she said.

Soto can't imagine who could want Dawkins dead.

"I feel like it could've been mistaken identity because how do you identify someone if they have his face covered?" she said. "He is tall as hell, and I don't know how anyone can mistake him."

"He had no problems with nobody," she added. "He looked mean, but he was so sweet. He never fought before in his life."

# TRUMP: MAYBE WE SHOOT REPORTERS

## Says he shouldn't have left White House after 2020 loss

LITITZ, Pa. — Donald Trump gave a profane, violent and conspiracy-laden speech two days before the presidential election, talking about reporters being shot and suggesting he “shouldn’t have left” the White House after his 2020 loss to Democrat Joe Biden.

In remarks Sunday that bore no resemblance to his standard speech in the campaign’s closing stretch, the former president repeatedly cast doubt on the integrity of the vote and resurrected old grievances about being prosecuted after trying to overturn his defeat four years ago. Trump intensified his verbal attacks against a “grossly incompetent” national

leadership and the American media, steering his rally in Lancaster, Pa., at one point on to the topic of violence against members of the press.

The GOP nominee for the White House noted the ballistic glass placed in front of him at events after a gunman’s assassination attempt in July at a rally in Butler, Pa. Trump talked about places where he saw openings in that protection.

“I have this piece of glass here,” he said. “But all we have really over here is the fake news. And to get me, somebody would have to shoot through the fake news. And I don’t mind that so much.”

It was the second time in recent days that Trump has talked about

guns being pointed at people he considers enemies. He suggested former Rep. Liz Cheney, a prominent Republican critic, wouldn’t be willing to support foreign wars if she had “nine barrels shooting at her.”

With less than 48 hours before Election Day, Trump continues to promote falsehoods about elections and argue that he can only lose to Democrat Kamala Harris if he is cheated, even though polls suggest a tight race.

Some of his allies, notably former chief strategist Steve Bannon, have encouraged him to prematurely declare victory on Tuesday even if the race is too early to call. That’s what Trump did four years ago, starting a process of fighting

the election results that culminated in the Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection at the U.S. Capitol.

For much of this year, Trump has run a relatively disciplined campaign that emphasized the issues and voters his aides believe could deliver him victory, even as he clung to false theories about voter fraud and went on frequent digressions stirring controversy. But that discipline is increasingly collapsing.

Trump in recent weeks has joked about golfer Arnold Palmer’s genitalia, continued using gendered or sexist language in his efforts to win over women and staged a rally at New York’s Madison Square Garden that included crude and racist insults

that dominated headlines.

Trump co-campaign manager Susie Wiles, long credited with bringing order to his often-chaotic political operation, watched the former president silently from off-stage Sunday.

His campaign later sought to clarify his meaning in talking about the media.

“President Trump was brilliantly talking about the two assassination attempts on his own life, including one that came within a quarter of an inch from killing him, something that the media constantly talks and jokes about,” campaign spokesman Steven Cheung said in a statement. “The president’s statement about protective glass placement has

nothing to do with the media being harmed, or anything else."

Harris was campaigning Sunday in Michigan, where she told a predominately Black church congregation in Detroit that God offers America a "divine plan strong enough to heal division."

The two major candidates offered starkly different tones with the campaign almost at an end, as Harris said voters can reject "chaos, fear and hate."

Trump usually veers from subject to subject, a discursive style he has labeled "the weave." But outside the Lancaster airport, he went on long tangents and hardly mentioned his usual points on the economy, immigration and rote criticisms of Harris.

Trump referred to John Bolton, his former national security adviser and now a strident critic, as a "dumb son of a b---h." And he repeated familiar and debunked theories about voter fraud, alleging that Democrats could only win by cheating. Public polls indicate a tight and competitive race across the battleground states that will determine the Electoral College outcome.

"It's a crooked country," Trump said. "And we're going to make it straight. We're going to make it straight."

Harris pushed back at Trump's characterizations of U.S. elections, telling reporters after the church service that Trump's comments are "meant to distract from

the fact that we have and support free and fair elections in our country." Those "good systems" were in place in 2020, Harris said, and "he lost."

The vice president said she trusts the upcoming vote tally and urged voters, "in particular people who have not yet voted, to not fall for this tactic, which I think includes suggesting to people that if they vote, their vote won't matter."

"Trump's unhinged ramblings and dangerous rhetoric confirm what those closest to him have already told us: He is completely unfit to lead and would put our democracy and the rule of law at risk if given a chance," said Democratic National Committee spokesman Alex Floyd.

## Will be a tight battle for GOP Senate leadership, fought mainly in secret

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans vying to replace long-time leader Sen. Mitch McConnell have been crossing the country to campaign and fundraise for colleagues, making their final arguments before a consequential ballot the week after the presidential election.

But their pitches are mostly behind closed doors, and most GOP senators won't yet say which lawmaker they are backing.

South Dakota's Sen. John Thune, McConnell's current No. 2, and Sen. John Cornyn of Texas, who held that job before Thune, are the front-runners in the Nov. 13 secret ballot to replace McConnell. The Kentucky senator is stepping aside from the post in January after almost two decades as leader.

The winner could steer the direction of the party for years to come and possibly become the next Senate majority leader if Republicans win enough seats in Tuesday's election.

The outcome is, for now, uncertain.

Only a few Republican senators have publicly endorsed a candidate. Many say they are still undecided. The third senator in the race — Florida Sen. Rick Scott, who is dealing with his own reelection bid — could act as a spoiler. And another candidate could still jump

in.

In many ways, "the two Johns" are remarkably similar, making the choice difficult for their colleagues. Both are well-liked and, in the mold of McConnell, lean toward the more traditional wing of the Republican Party.

But both have also suggested they will try to move on from the McConnell era with a more open approach.

"I'm trying to find differentiation because they're both great guys," said Sen. Thom Tillis (R-N.C.), who has worked closely with both of them.

The two men are trying to distinguish themselves from McConnell by making clear that they support Donald Trump in this year's presidential election. Like McConnell, they have both sparred with Trump in the past, especially after the Jan. 6, 2021, attack on the Capitol.

But Thune and Cornyn have talked to Trump frequently in recent months, attended campaign events and visited his Florida home.

Whether Trump wins and endorses one of the contenders, could become a determining factor.

"I don't know what he'll do," Cornyn said of Trump in September.

"But this is obviously an election between senators, and I think that's where the voters are."

# ISRAEL: WE GRABBED SYRIAN HELPING IRAN

## First time the IDF has conducted ground raid into Syria

JERUSALEM — The Israeli military said Sunday that it carried out a ground raid into Syria, seizing a Syrian citizen involved in Iranian networks. It was the first time in the current war that Israel announced its troops operating in Syrian territory.

Syria did not immediately confirm the announcement.

Israel has carried out airstrikes in Syria multiple times over the past year, targeting members of Lebanon's Hezbollah and officials from Iran, the close ally of Hezbollah and

Syria. But it has not previously made public any ground forays into Syria.

The Israeli military said the seizure was part of a special operation "that took place in recent months," although it did not say exactly when it occurred.

The disclosure of the raid comes as Israel has waged an escalated campaign of bombardment in Lebanon for the past six weeks, as well as a ground invasion along the countries' shared border, vowing to cripple Hezbollah.

On Saturday, an Israeli military official said naval forces carried out a raid in a northern Lebanese town, seizing a man they called a senior Hezbollah

operative.

The army did not specify in its statement Sunday where in Syria the raid took place or when. It identified the man seized as Ali Soleiman al-Assi, saying he lives in the southern Syrian region of Saida. It said the man had been under military surveillance for many months and was involved in Iranian initiatives targeting areas of the Israeli-annexed Golan Heights near the border with Syria.

Body camera footage of the raid released by the army showed soldiers seizing a man in a white tank top inside a building. The man was brought to Israel for interrogation, the military said.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu visited the border with Lebanon on Sunday, saying his focus was trying to keep Hezbollah from rearming itself through the "oxygen lifeline" of Iranian weapons transferred to Lebanon via Syria. Israel says its campaign in Lebanon aims to push Hezbollah away from the border and put an end to more than a year of fire by the group into northern Israel.

Israel's strikes in Lebanon have killed more than 2,500 people over the past year. In Israel, 69 people have been killed by Hezbollah projectiles.

Meanwhile, Israeli forces continued their campaign in Gaza. Shell fire hit Kamal Adwan

Hospital in northern Gaza, injuring patients, including children, hospital Director Hossam Abu Safiya said in a statement to the media. He said the shells hit the hospital's nursery, dormitory and water tanks, just after a delegation from the World Health Organization ended a visit.

Kamal Adwan and two other nearby hospitals have been hit by Israel several times amid the fighting. Late last month, Israeli troops stormed Kamal Adwan, detaining a large number of people, including much of the staff, Abu Safiya said at the time of the raid. The military said those detained included members of Hamas, without providing evidence, and said weapons were



# Tehran holding U.S.-Iranian dual citizen for trial

A U.S.-Iranian dual citizen and journalist is being held prisoner in Iran, the U.S. State Department acknowledged Sunday.

Reza Valizadeh (photo) has been detained since September, according to Voice of America. Valizadeh returned to Iran earlier this year after living abroad for more than a decade.

“I arrived in Tehran on March 6, 2024. Before that, I had unfinished negotiations with the [Iranian Revolutionary Guard’s] intelligence department,”

Valizadeh wrote in his last social media post in August. “Eventually I came back to my country after 13 years without any security guarantee, even a verbal one.”



Valizadeh was detained for his work with Radio Farda, a partner of Radio Free Europe that operates as an independent media agency in Iran. Such outlets are considered hostile by Iran’s hardline Islamist government.

According to Valizadeh’s social media posts, his family members were detained and questioned in February, sparking his decision to return to Iran.

Valizadeh was sent to Iran’s notorious Evin prison, according to the Human Rights Activists News Agency. He will face a closed-door trial in Iran’s Revolutionary Court and he will not be permitted to see the evidence against him.

Valizadeh is the first American citizen known to be detained in Iran since a September 2023 prisoner swap in which five Americans were traded for five Iranians. That swap also included \$6 billion in frozen Iranian funds but that money has since been locked up because of Iran’s support of Hamas.

“We are working with our Swiss partners who serve as the protecting power for the United States in Iran to gather more information about this case,” the State Department said. “Iran routinely imprisons U.S. citizens and other countries’ citizens unjustly for political purposes. This practice is cruel and contrary to international law.”

In the southern part of the territory, an Israeli strike hit a group of people gathered outside in an eastern district of Khan Younis, killing at least eight Palestinians, including four children and a woman, the Gaza Health Ministry’s emergency services said. The city’s Nasser Hospital, which received most of the bodies, confirmed the figures.

Palestinian officials said an Israeli drone strike Saturday hit a clinic in northern Gaza where children were being vaccinated for polio, wounding six people, including four children. The Israeli military denied responsibility.

Dr. Munir al-Boursh, director general of the Gaza Health Ministry, told The Associated Press that a quadcopter struck the Sheikh Radwan clinic in Gaza City early Saturday afternoon, just a few minutes after a United Nations delegation left the facility.

The World Health Organization and the UN children’s agency, known as UNICEF, which are jointly carrying out the polio vaccination campaign, expressed concern over the reported strike.

“Today’s attack occurred while the humanitarian pause was still in effect, despite assurances given that the [humanitarian] pause would be respected from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m.,” said

Rosalia Bollen, a spokeswoman for UNICEF.

Lt. Col. Nadav Shoshani, an Israeli military spokesman, said the Israeli military did not strike in the area at the specified time. It was not possible to resolve the conflicting accounts.

A scaled-down campaign to administer a second dose of the polio vaccine began Saturday in parts of northern Gaza. It had been postponed from Oct. 23.

An Iranian-American journalist who once worked for a U.S. government-funded broadcaster is believed to have been detained by Iran for months now, authorities said Sunday, further raising the stakes as Tehran threatens to retaliate over

an Israeli attack on the country.

The imprisonment of Reza Valizadeh, acknowledged to The Associated Press by the U.S. State Department, came as Iran marked the 45th anniversary of the American Embassy takeover and hostage crisis Sunday. It also followed Iran’s Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei threatening Israel and the U.S. the day before with “a crushing response” as long-range B-52 bombers reached the Middle East in a bid to deter Tehran.

Valizadeh had worked for Radio Farda, an outlet under Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty that’s overseen by the U.S. Agency for Global Media.

# Fla. 'killer clown' freed

## She married the victim's husband & served 7 years in prison

A Florida woman convicted of killing a woman while wearing a clown suit, then marrying the victim's husband, has been released from prison.

Sheila Keen-Warren, 61, was released seven years into a 12-year sentence. She pleaded guilty to second-degree murder but could have faced the death penalty if convicted at trial.

Despite pleading guilty, Keen-Warren maintained her innocence and said she only cut the plea as a risk-reward calculation.

"We are absolutely thrilled that Ms. Keen-Warren has been released from prison and is returning to her family," her attorney Greg Rosenfeld told The Associated Press. "As we've stated from the beginning, she did not commit this crime."

On May 26, 1990, Marlene Warren opened the door at her Palm Beach County home and greeted a visitor, dressed as a clown. The visitor handed Warren, 40, a fistful of balloons then shot her dead and walked out to a Chrysler sedan.

Warren's murder went unsolved for decades. In 2002 her former husband, Michael Warren, married Sheila Keen. Keen had previously worked at Warren's car dealership, and the two opened a restaurant in Tennessee together.

At the time of Marlene Warren's murder, witnesses told police Michael Warren and Sheila Keen were having an affair. The two denied it when asked by police and acquaintances, though Marlene Warren was reportedly considering a divorce.

"If anything happens to me, Mike done it," Marlene Warren told her mother, according to police.

Michael Warren was never charged in connection with his wife's death. Sheila Keen-Warren was arrested in 2017 and remained jailed ahead of a potential trial. In April 2023, she took a plea deal and served an additional 18 months.

"Sheila Keen-Warren will always be an admitted convicted murderer and will wear that stain for every day for the rest of her life," Palm Beach County State Attorney Dave Aronberg said in a statement Saturday.

# WORKER'S 'TERRIBLE' DEATH

## Kin mourn delivery cyclist killed by FDNY emergency vehicle

The day before he died from being struck by an FDNY emergency vehicle racing to a crisis in Brooklyn, Victor Hidalgo turned 24.

Hidalgo, who worked as a delivery man seven days a week — including on his birthday — was on the job, riding his e-bike east on Sackett St. in Park Slope when he was struck by the passing EMS vehicle, which had its emergency lights flashing, near Fourth Ave. around 8:15 p.m. on Wednesday.

"It's so sad. Terrible," said Hidalgo's aunt Tomasa Hidalgo, who spoke in Spanish with the help of a translator. "My brother is his papa. They are destroyed. And his wife," she said.

"The police, the ambulances, they are supposed to help [people], not hurt them," she added.

Hidalgo, who was born in the U.S., grew up in Mexico and had recently moved back to New York City to make a better life for

his wife and 1-year-old son. He had been living with his aunt in the Bronx.

"He used to be in college and then when he had a son, he quit school and he tried to organize his life to do something for his baby," his aunt said.

Hidalgo had been studying sociology in Mexico, but found work in New York City as a delivery man after his son was born.

"He worked seven days a week," his aunt said. On weekdays, he made deliveries on his e-bike for a pharmacy in Harlem. On weekends, he would ride for other delivery services, according to his aunt and friends.

"His goal was to bring his wife and his son with him" to the U.S., his aunt said.

The day Hidalgo died began like any other, with a goodbye to his aunt before he left for work.

"He said, 'Auntie, I'm leaving.' I said, 'OK, take care,'" his aunt told the Daily News.

Hidalgo usually worked late into the night, so his aunt was surprised when she got a call from the hospital at around 9:30 p.m.

"He would usually return after 10 [p.m.], sometimes 11. I didn't expect anything," she said.

The call left her numb.

"I'm still in shock," she said. "I didn't think anything, because it was too hard to assimilate what they say."

"It's so so sad. Something like this, we can't understand. We can't realize how things happen in life. We are trying to manage the situation," said longtime family friend Ismael Martinez, 47.

Martinez was with Hidalgo's aunt when she had to call her nephew's wife and father in Mexico and deliver the awful news. "The time she called them, they weren't even able to speak," Martinez said.

"He was 24 years old and one day," Martinez added.

Hidalgo spent his 24th birthday working. He had recently returned from a two-week visit with his family in Guerrero, Mexico. "His family back in Mexico, they celebrated [Hidalgo's birthday]" when he was there earlier this month, his aunt said.

Hidalgo enjoyed riding his e-bike around

the city making deliveries, and was not worried about accidents, according to his aunt. At the same time, he always wore a helmet.

"He has a helmet. All the time we see him, he has a helmet," Martinez said.

Hidalgo's family has not yet held a funeral for him. They are waiting until his body can be returned to Mexico, an expensive and difficult process. "We have to work with the government to get [Hidalgo's body] back" to Mexico, his aunt said.

The family has started a GoFundMe effort to help defray costs of transporting Hidalgo's body.

Hidalgo's death marked the second time in nine days a bicyclist was killed in an incident involving a city emergency vehicle.

The ambulance that hit Hidalgo was responding to a call about a baby choking, FDNY officials said. The emergency was handled by one of the three other emergency units deployed, according to FDNY officials.

The 44-year-old driver of the ambulance that struck Hidalgo remained at the scene. No charges were immediately filed.

## No more slow counting

Tomorrow night, New Yorkers will know shortly after 9 p.m. how they voted for president and other public offices and what they decided on the ballot questions. That's how it should be and it will be much better than four years ago, when many of the results weren't promulgated until a week after Election Day.

In 2020, during COVID, when many New Yorkers cast their ballots by mail for the first time, the vote counting process in this state was maddeningly slow. It caused mistrust and conspiracy theories grew. Confidence in the validity of electoral integrity was damaged.

The problem wasn't the Post Office, which delivered the ballots just fine back to the local Board of Elections. The delay was caused by New York State law that required that nothing coming in by mail could even start to be tabulated until seven days after Election Day.

The law, on the books for many years, had been written to assume that everyone would vote in person and so all the Election Day data, as to who had actually voted on the machine, had to be reviewed to see if a registered voter had indeed voted in person.

If a person had indeed appeared in the flesh and voted on the machine, any such mail ballots would be ruled void and discarded, having never been opened.

Only if it was determined that a citizen had not exercised the franchise at the poll site, would the person's mail ballot be opened and the paper ballot fed into the machine. That worked fine when there were just a relative handful of absentee ballots.

## A bogus charge against Israel

Six U.S. senators – Democrats Ben Cardin, Dick Blumenthal and John Fetterman and Republicans Lindsey Graham, John Thune and Joni Ernst – put aside their many differences in the hours before the national elections and jointly wrote to the supervising body of the International Criminal Court, sitting at The Hague.

Their well-founded bipartisan complaint is that the ICC prosecutor, British lawyer Karim Khan, violated the international treaty governing the court in his request for indictments of Israeli Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu and Defense Minister Yoav Gallant on charges of war crimes and crimes against humanity for the war in Gaza following Hamas' barbarous Oct. 7 pogrom, which murdered 1,200 Israelis and took 251 others as hostages.

Under the concept of "complementarity," the ICC is required to let a country's own legal system (in this case, Israel's independent judiciary) investigate such allegations and pursue charges if warranted. If a country lacks a legitimate and mature legal system or if a country with such precedents and tradition refuses, only then should the ICC step in.

So since Russia has a phony court system entirely subservient to the whims of the Kremlin, the ICC prosecutor won indictments from the court for the alleged criminal actions of Vladimir Putin and three other Russians stemming from the illegal and unprovoked invasion of Ukraine.

However, as the six senators point out, Israel has the means to conduct its own probe and should have been afforded that opportunity as the ICC treaty mandates. Their letter states that officials from Khan's office were set to fly to Israel on May 20 to consult with the Israelis. However, Khan's

The rise of COVID, however, brought in millions of mail ballots and the system buckled as the ballots had to be held until a week after the polls closed and then cross checked against the register of those who had voted in person.

That has changed, thanks to a 2021 state law pushed by the state Sen. Mike Gianaris. And just last Thursday, in a Halloween decision, the highest in New York State, the Court of Appeals, unanimously upheld the last piece of the new law, allowing for a speedier count.

Now the presumption has been reversed. Any voter requesting a mail ballot is assumed to have filled it out and mailed it back to be counted. And that's what happened. Mail ballots, once received back at the Board of Elections, are opened and counted and the tallies only made public once polls close on Tuesday night.

If a mail ballot requester also appears at a poll site, the computerized voter list will indicate that a mail ballot was sent out and the person will not be allowed to vote on the machine.

An affidavit ballot, what they call a provisional ballot in other states, will be offered to the citizen. Those affidavit ballots will be held until seven days after Election Day and only counted if a valid mail ballot was never returned.

What it means is that almost all the ballots will be counted and the results published tomorrow night. Only arriving mail ballots (having been postmarked by Election Day and received seven days later) will not be included immediately and be added in later.

But for the large bulk of ballots, the results will be known shortly after 9 p.m. Imagine that.

aides never boarded the flight from Amsterdam and left the Israeli welcoming party at Ben Gurion Airport to greet a plane they were not on.

That same day, Khan announced that he was applying to the court for arrest warrants for Netanyahu and Gallant, an outrageous breach of the court's protocol, rightly denounced by the White House.

Dead men aren't indicted, even by the ICC, so the requests are moot. As for the two Israelis, Netanyahu and Gallant, the court should deny the request.

The senators also raise press reports that Khan personally is subject to a sexual harassment claim lodged by a female employee of the ICC and used the requests for arrest warrants as cover to distract from his own problems.

Either way, whether the public fillings were politically motivated or personally motivated or any other reason, Khan's seeking of indictments against the Israelis was improper.

His actions do nothing to advance the cause of international justice, but risk causing serious damage to the ICC as an institution.

# N.Y.'s elections are safe & secure

With the 2024 campaign season ending, it's important for New Yorkers to know that our elections are safely and successfully administered and this election will be the most secure in New York's history.

I've worked on election security in New York since 2016, when Russian actors were first exposed for probing American election infrastructure in other states. Since then, New York has invested tens of millions of dollars into election cybersecurity. Every county – including their Boards of Election – has received both funding and state-of-the-art technology to ensure systems are secure, and cybersecurity anomalies are investigated and addressed immediately.

Nonetheless, we should expect foreign adversaries like Russia, China, and Iran to use bot-fueled social media, phony websites pushing planted stories, and AI-generated fake audio recordings and videos to sow distrust in elections and their outcomes.

And we should expect unscrupulous media personalities, political opportunists, and domestic extremist groups to disparage election security and outcomes because it brings them attention and money. While this can all be unsettling, New Yorkers can be confident the election outcomes will reflect the voters' intent because of the safeguards Gov. Hochul and our team have implemented.

New York is prepared for this election and the vote counting and a deluge of mis-, dis-, and mal-, information (MDM) can't change that.

We have invested in two distinct elections-specific command centers to ensure a rapid, coordinated response to any disruptions that might occur. These centers will ensure state leaders can provide New Yorkers with timely, accurate information throughout the election. The first is the state Board of Elections' Secure Elections Center. Supported by state and federal agencies, it provides a single point of contact for local Boards of Elections to report issues regardless of cause.

In addition, the State Police Joint Elections Operations Center is also protecting our elections, operating a centralized hub for state and federal law enforcement and homeland security professionals to track and respond to security events that could disrupt an election. And the NYS State Watch Center, run by the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services, maintains 24/7 all hazards awareness to coordinate the response to anything – whether natural or manmade – that could interfere with your ability to vote. Moreover, since 2017 state and

local officials have partnered with the federal Department of Homeland Security to run 23 election security tabletop exercises throughout New York, including an executive level exercise directed by the governor this summer. These drills ensure that federal, state, and local stakeholders are aligned and prepared.

Our elections are managed by bipartisan teams, ensuring there's no political bias in how they're run or how ballots are counted. Paper ballots ensure accurate physical evidence of voters' choices. Pre-election testing and post-election audits of voting machines are conducted bipartisanly before and after each election. Bipartisan staff also review each voter registration application individually to determine voter eligibility. These measures ensure that our elections remain fair and secure.

New Yorkers must be prepared too. Don't allow yourself to be misled by MDM. Voters can find validated, official information on where, when, and how to vote at the state Board of Elections website (elections.ny.gov).

We all must be responsible consumers and producers of information about candidates, issues, events, and election outcomes. Foreign adversaries, propagandists, and political opportunists know the power of emotion and will try to exploit it to achieve nefarious ends – whether that's generating distrust in election outcomes, promoting false narratives, or just creating chaos.


Protect yourself and protect our democracy: be skeptical of salacious headlines – false information is usually preceded by clickbait; if you want real news, use sources that publicize their journalistic standards and cross reference them against similarly reputable publications; and always assess the author's or commentator's agenda – ask yourself whether it's to inform or enflame.

After years of joint-training and investment, I can say with confidence that New York elections are secure and that the final tally of votes will reflect the will of the people. New York is prepared for this. New Yorkers must be too. We are all responsible for protecting our democracy, and being informed and vigilant is essential.

As Thomas Jefferson once said, "an educated citizenry is a vital requisite for our survival as a free people." Facts matter now more than ever. Seek out accurate information regardless of how you feel about the issues or how you intend to vote. Our country depends on it.

# Albany's Dem/GOP duopoly blocks third parties

New Yorkers filling out their ballots this year will notice something unusual: there are only two presidential candidates listed. In fact, New York has the dubious distinction of being the sole state in 2024 with only two presidential candidates on the ballot.

In a time when both Democratic and Republican parties loudly decry alleged voter disenfranchisement, New York has managed to suppress every alternative party and constrain voter choice. This is a serious form of voter suppression that has received almost no political attention, and it comes at a time when 58% of Americans polled by Gallup show support for a third political party.

Most voters would be unsurprised to learn the reason behind this lack of choice: former Gov. Andrew Cuomo inserted a change to election law in the pandemic budget of 2020 designed to punish the Working Families Party and eliminate smaller parties like the Greens and Libertarians, then make it impossible to regain ballot status, and the Legislature passed it. In business this would be called cartel-like behavior, but in New York limiting voter options is politics as usual.

Overnight, the requirements for parties wishing to retain ballot status and

more easily run candidates changed from 50,000 votes for a gubernatorial candidate to 150,000 votes or 2% of the vote (whichever is higher) in a gubernatorial and presidential election. After losing status, a party must petition their candidates on as independents, and Cuomo changed that requirement from 15,000 signatures statewide to 45,000 in 42 days — the toughest in the nation.

My own party, the Greens, lost ballot status in 2020 and tried to regain it this year, with petitioners heroically collecting 42,000 signatures for Jill Stein, many of them motivated by Dr. Stein's opposition to the ongoing genocide in Gaza. It wasn't enough, and cost a significant amount of money; it cost RFK Jr. even more — more than \$1 million for a failed attempt for ballot access.

When a petition drive may cost more than \$1 million, it is safe to say that smaller parties have no hope for placing presidential candidates on the New York ballot. Unfortunately, the courts have also seemed to not care about this assault on democracy, and rejected each ballot access case brought in front of them.

For parties like the Democrats and Republicans, who seem to represent little more than not being the other these days, that might be a good thing. But for voters, and for democracy, it is a serious problem.

If you want to vote for a candidate and party that supports your values, say: ending the conflict in Gaza, single-payer universal health care, rapid transition to renewable energy and massive public works to get there (the Green New Deal), living wage jobs and housing for all, and abolishing student debt, which the Greens support, you'll have to write-in Jill Stein this year — not the same at all as being on the ballot.

Because smaller parties aren't on the ballot, it will affect their ability to easily run candidates at state and local levels, too — another suppression of democratic choice.

In a healthy multiparty democracy, the electoral system would allow credible ways for parties and their candidates to gain ballot status and win office, like nearly every other representative system in the world. Different policies would get a hearing, ones that could benefit New Yorkers. It might also temper polarization: parties might need to form coalitions, acknowledging and even

respecting other organizations than their own.

Gov. Hochul and the Legislature can and should revoke Cuomo's ballot suppression passed in 2020. But why stop there? New York should set the gold standard for ballot access, becoming a model of democracy rather than sham democracy. Why not lower the requirements for candidates to match New Jersey: 800 signatures of qualified voters, or Louisiana, where a presidential candidate need only file a \$500 fee?

Parties should have their own way to permanent ballot status: in Nevada, small parties need 1% of total registered voters in the state, 1% of total votes for any partisan office, or petition signatures from voters equal to 1% of the votes cast in the last general election for Congress.

New Yorkers may be denied choice on the ballot this year, and those of us that want to vote for candidates like Stein, Claudia De La Cruz of the Party for Socialism and Liberation, or Libertarian Chase Oliver will have to settle for a write-in. But New York can change this and to help build the robust democracy that its citizens deserve.

## L.I. ex-con arrested for hitting Manhattan cop with tire iron, metal bat in unprovoked attack

A Long Island ex-con was arraigned in Manhattan Criminal Court on Saturday after he was nabbed for striking a Manhattan cop with a tire iron and a metal bat in an unprovoked attack, cops said.

Nicholas Salemi, 36, of Brentwood was arrested and charged with assault in the second and third degree, and criminal possession of a weapon in the fourth degree, court records show. Salemi's bail was set at \$100,000 cash

or \$300,000 bond, the Manhattan District Attorney's office said.

Officer Alex Zhu and his partner were driving in their patrol car near Clinton and Delancey Sts. on the Lower East Side when Salemi angrily approached the pair at about 3:35 a.m. on Friday, police said.

Salemi, described as being "extremely aggravated," threw a bottle of water into the patrol car before he began swinging a tire iron and a metal bat around.

The enraged man threw the tire iron at the officer, striking him in his right shoulder, cops said.

Salemi then struck the cop with

the baseball bat, knocking him to the ground, police said.

The officer was taken to Bellevue Hospital where he was being treated for bruising to his right shoulder and pain in his leg and wrist, according to sources and Salemi's criminal complaint. Officer Zhu also needed multiple stitches for a gash on his shin.

In 2015, Salemi began a four-year stint in an upstate prison for a robbery conviction, Department of Corrections and Community Supervision records show.

He has a total of 34 prior arrests, including some for drugs, police sources said.

## Hit-run driver in fatal bike crash flees cops in Harlem

A minivan driver fleeing an NYPD car stop in Harlem fatally struck a bicyclist, drove off and has not been caught, cops said Sunday.

The driver was behind the wheel of a Toyota minivan when cops tried to pull him over at W. 152nd St. and Broadway about 10:40 p.m. on Saturday, police said.

He sped east to W. 155th St. and St. Nicholas Ave., where he plowed into a man riding a bike, and kept going, cops said.

The bicyclist died at the scene. His name was not immediately released.

The driver has not been caught.

It wasn't immediately clear if cops pursued the driver after he fled the car stop.

On Oct. 22, a Queens bicyclist was fatally struck by a pickup truck driver fleeing cops.

That collision renewed concerns that the NYPD, which last year decreed it was done letting suspects routinely speed away from police, is often too aggressive in chasing cars.

Cops pursued the Dodge Ram driver suspected in a burglary in progress for about a mile into Astoria from Long Island City, where he T-boned the 37-year-old bicyclist in the intersection of 37th St. and 34th Ave., police said.

Amanda Servedio had just pedaled into the intersection when she was struck by the oncoming Dodge Ram, shocking surveillance video obtained by the Daily News shows. An NYPD van was hot on the Dodge Ram's heels with its lights flashing.

Servedio was thrown from her bike on to a parked car, police said.

The officers in the van abandoned the pursuit and stopped to render aid to Servedio as the Dodge Ram sped off, police said. The truck was later found abandoned.

Medics rushed Servedio to Elmhurst Hospital Center, but she could not be saved. She was about eight blocks from home when she was struck.

## As Washington's rise continues, Giants sink further

Daniel Jones threw his first touchdown pass at MetLife Stadium in 672 calendar days and scored three total TDs Sunday. But a late surge wasn't enough to change the Giants' fortunes in their fourth straight loss, a 27-22 division defeat to the Commanders.

Washington rookie phenom quarterback Jayden Daniels led five scoring drives in seven possessions before kneeling out the clock at the Giants' 1-yard line instead of scoring. "They just outplayed us," defensive tackle Dexter Lawrence said. "I think the offense played well enough for us to win. The defense just got beat up today."

Giants rookie receiver Malik Nabers, who was held without a first-half catch, rationalized amid his disappointment that he'd rather build something from the ground up because "it feels better when you come from the mud and you start winning successfully."

When asked if the Giants can do that here, though, Nabers gave an interesting answer.

"Yeah, you've just got to build. You've got to build up," he said. "You've got to put the right people in place to be successful. You've got to get the right keys. You've got to get the right guys on the team to win."

"Obviously, the Commanders have done that," he added, discussing the division rival led by Daniels, his LSU quarterback and good friend. "They've got the right guys that they want to be on the team, and they're winning."

The right guys that they want on the team? It's difficult to interpret that as anything other than Nabers saying the Giants need different or better players.

Not that he's wrong.

First-place Washington (7-2) swept the season series for the first time since 2021. The Giants fell to 2-7 this season, 0-5 at

home and 0-4 in the NFC East. And Joe Schoen's and Daboll's record dropped to 4-12-1 in NFC East games since they took over in 2022.

Edge rusher Brian Burns sat on the floor next to Lawrence's locker long after Sunday's game was over — with both players still in their uniforms — discussing the defeat.

Lawrence resented a question about whether that scene reflected his frustration.

"If I'm talking to my teammate, that ain't nothing for you to be concerned about," He said. "We were just talking about the game and what we are gonna do to be better."

Burns also preferred to keep the conversation private, but he did say that he and Lawrence had discussed "things that need to change for this week coming up."

There was a sense post-game Sunday, however, that the changes Nabers, Burns and other Giants view as necessary are not coming anytime soon.

Jones recorded no first-half passing yards in this loss due mostly to play-calling and poor pass protection. Burns, Lawrence and the Giants' pass rush generated no pressure on Daniels, recording no sacks and only two quarterback hits all afternoon.

Jones mounted a fourth quarter comeback on a two-yard touchdown run with 9:25 to play and a 35-yard TD pass to tight end Theo Johnson with 2:48 remaining.

But Daboll unsuccessfully went for the two-point conversion after both scores, and the Giants' defense couldn't get a stop due to a non-existent pass rush and poor tackling.

"That's something that we talk about during the week," Daboll said. "If we get in that situation, that's what we're going to do. But it's analytics-based. I felt good about what we had and they did a good job of stopping it."

Jones said of failing to close the game out: "Very frustrating. Tough position. We've got

to find a way to make some more plays and win these games. So yeah, very frustrating."

The Commanders only scored six second-half points on two Austin Seibert field goals, while Giants rookie kicker Jude McAtamney of Derry, Ireland, made his first career field goal from 31 yards in the third quarter.

Washington's offense still controlled the ball and clock enough, however, to stiff-arm the Giants' late push. The Giants now will travel to Munich, Germany, to face the Panthers (2-7), who just upset the Saints.

Pass rusher Azeez Ojulari might not be on the flight with the NFL trade deadline upcoming at 4 p.m. Tuesday, while trade candidate and wide receiver Darius Slayton might stick around after going in concussion protocol during Sunday's loss.

Two Daniels touchdown passes to McLaurin buried the Giants in a 21-7 hole by halftime. Jones, meanwhile, totaled zero passing yards, a 2-yard TD pass to tight end Chris Manhertz, and 50 yards rushing at half.

McLaurin's 18-yard TD catch with six seconds remaining in the half was a killer.

Rookies Dru Phillips and Tyler Nubin missed tackles on a back-breaking 24-yard Dymari Brown catch and run on third and 18 from the Giants' 42-yard line to set it up.

That was McLaurin's second touchdown on corner Deonte Banks, but there was also no pressure on Daniels from the Giants' four-man rush.

There was a gaping hole on the Giants' D-line on Austin Ekeler's 20-yard run to pace Washington's second scoring drive, as well. That run and a Daniels fourth-down conversion scramble set up an Ekeler one-yard TD run for a 14-7 Washington lead with 6:21 remaining in the half.

Daboll, meanwhile, didn't even feel confident enough in his offense to throw a pass

with Jones.

The Giants' coach called 16 running plays to three pass plays in the first quarter, evoking memories of last season's loss in the rain to the Jets with Tommy DeVito at QB.

When Daboll dropped Jones back to pass for the first time on the Giants' sixth snap, left tackle Chris Hubbard got smoked by Commanders pass rusher Dante Fowler to force a Jones fumble.

Officials blew the play dead as incomplete, which negated Washington's touchdown return. But the play was overturned to a fumble upon review, and it only took Daniels four plays to punch it in from 31 yards out.

A Cor'Dale Flott pass interference penalty gave Washington the ball at the one, and Daniels hit McLaurin for a one-yard TD on Banks for a 7-0 Commanders lead with 7:04 to play in the first quarter.

Jones and the Giants offense answered with a 16-play, 73-yard drive capped by Jones' two-yard TD pass to Manhertz. It marked Jones' first touchdown pass at MetLife Stadium in 672 days, a span of six consecutive games without throwing one between the 2023 and 2024 seasons.

Nabers was held to no catches on one target in the first half, as Commanders coach Dan Quinn came out with a targeted plan and double teams for the rookie receiver — and Daboll clammed up and refused to throw it until the second half.

"When you run the clock out in the first half, you're scratching in the second half to try to score points, as many as possible," Nabers said of the early runs. "As an offense, you've got to be versatile. You've got to be able to run."

"You've got to be able to pass. You can't pick between half and half what you want to do. But like I said, I'm not the play caller."

No he's not. Daboll is. And Schoen is the GM. And something needs to change.



# Dak hurt, 'Boys drop 3rd straight

ATLANTA — Kirk Cousins threw three touchdown passes and the Falcons maintained their hold on first place in the NFC South with a 27-21 victory Sunday over the struggling Cowboys, who took their third straight setback and lost quarterback Dak Prescott to a hamstring injury.

Cousins completed 19 of 24 passes for 222 yards, including 13 in a row at one point for the Falcons (6-3). He recorded scoring plays of nine yards to Drake London, 36 yards to Darnell

Mooney and 11 yards to Ray-Ray McCloud, the third three-TD game of the quarterback's debut season with Atlanta.

Tyler Allgeier capped the Falcons' fifth win in six games by powering

into the end zone from six yards with just over 11 minutes remaining.

The Cowboys (3-5) tried to rally behind Cooper Rush after Prescott was ruled out, having completed 18 of 24 for 133 yards and a touchdown.

Rush guided an 86-yard drive in the closing minutes, capped by a four-yard touchdown pass to Jalen Tolbert and two-point conversion. But the Falcons recovered an onside kick to seal the victory.

It's the longest losing streak for Dallas since a four-game skid during the 2020 season, which is also the most recent time the Cowboys finished with a losing record (6-10).

They are on their way to another in 2024, having already matched their loss total from each of the past three seasons.

Coach Mike McCarthy figures to be under even more heat after this performance, which included a fake punt that didn't have a chance, a fourth down sweep by receiver CeeDee Lamb that was thrown for a three-yard loss, and botched coverage in which three defensive backs got tangled up with each other and left Mooney all alone for his touchdown catch.

For good measure, the Dallas offensive line surrendered three sacks to a team that came into the game with an NFL-worst six sacks through the first eight weeks.


Atlanta lost its top receiver in the opening quarter when London landed hard on his right hip after hauling in the scoring pass from Cousins. He rode an exercise bike on the sideline, trying to loosen up his hip, but was ruled out for the rest of the game at halftime.

Mooney and McCloud stepped up to fill the void. Mooney caught five passes for 88 yards, while McCloud hauled in his first TD of the season to make it 21-10 early in the third quarter.

Bijan Robinson recorded another big day for the Falcons, carrying 19 times for 86 yards and hauling in a team-high seven receptions for 59 yards.

Lamb was sidelined late in the game with what appeared to be a right shoulder injury, but he was able to return.

London finished with two catches for 27 yards. DL Grady Jarrett left the game with an Achilles strain and LB Troy Andersen (knee) missed his fifth straight game.

## Bills win on late 61-yarder

ORCHARD PARK — Tyler Bass tuned out the doubts, the ongoing questions about his consistency and the most recent challenge to his job.

Bills coach Sean McDermott showed faith in Bass by sending him out to try a 61-yard field goal with five seconds left, and the kick was good to give Buffalo a 30-27 victory over the Dolphins.

"It means everything. Very emotional," the 27-year-old Bass said of a field goal that was the longest of his career and broke the franchise record by two yards. Steve Christie had the previous mark, a 59-yarder in 1993.

"Just reminding myself that I love this, I love the sport. This is what I've

dreamed of and when I was out there," he added. "I honestly wasn't thinking about anything. Just went through my process and trusted my preparation. And that was it."

The kick capped a thrilling, back-and-forth duel between Buffalo's Josh Allen, who threw three touchdown passes after halftime, and Miami's Tua Tagovailoa. The teams traded leads four times and combined for seven consecutive scoring drives in the second half.

The Bills continued their domination of the Dolphins by sweeping the season series. Buffalo (7-2) has won six straight, 13 of 14 and nine in a row at home over Miami.

And with their best nine-game start since 2020, the Bills have built a commanding, four-game lead in the AFC East over the Jets as they seek a fifth consecutive division title.

The Dolphins (2-6), meantime, played what they considered their most complete game of the season only to drop their third straight. They lost on

a field goal in the final seconds for the second straight week following a 28-27 loss to Arizona on Chad Ryland 34-yarder as time expired.

Tagovailoa lost his second straight start after missing four games with a concussion.

"Hats off to Tyler Bass for making that. Hats off to their team, they did a great job. It was a great game," said Tagovailoa, who finished 25 of 28 for 231 yards and two touchdowns. "There's things that we could fix on both sides of the ball, offensively and defensively, but I think we're taking a step in the right direction as a team."

Miami tied the game one last time when Tagovailoa threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to

Jaylen Waddle with 1:38 remaining to cap an 11-play, 81-yard drive.

The Bills took over at the 30 and had their drive extended by back-to-back penalties. Chop Robinson jumped offside on third-and-14 from the Buffalo 26. On the next snap, former Bills safety Jordan Poyer was flagged for unnecessary roughness for his helmet-to-helmet hit on receiver Keon Coleman on Allen's deep attempt up the left sideline.

Buffalo's drive stalled at the Miami 43 following a spike and two incompletions with 10 seconds remaining. Bass not only split the uprights, but had enough length to reach the first row of fans in the end zone.

"So proud of him. So happy for him. I got emotional in my little postgame speech out there, just the trials and tribulations that he's been in throughout this year," Allen said.

## Spinning, leaping Saquon leaves Jaguars stunned

PHILADELPHIA — Saquon Barkley made a dazzling backward hurdle during a stellar performance and Nakobe Dean grabbed a game-saving interception to help the Eagles to their fourth straight win, 28-23, over the Jaguars on Sunday night.

Barkley recorded 27 carries for 159 yards and a touchdown. He also caught three passes for 40 yards and a TD.

The Eagles (6-2) held on after coach Nick Sirianni wasted chances to put easy points on the board. The Eagles went 0 for 2 on fourth down and were 0 for 3 on 2-point conversions, forcing them to let Jake Elliott try a 57-yard field goal with 2:16 left.

Elliott missed, giving the Jaguars (2-7) the ball at their own 47-yard line.

Eagles defensive back Avonte Maddox was flagged 18 yards for pass interference that helped move the ball to the Eagles 13.

But Jacksonville's second-half rally ended when Trevor Lawrence's terrible pass was picked off in the end zone by Dean for the linebacker's first career interception.

Barkley, already proving a pivotal free-agent pickup for the Eagles, starred in another dominant effort with arguably the most acrobatic play of the season.

The play that left mouths agape: Hurts dumped a pass to Barkley in the second quarter and he faked out one defender and used a filthy spin move that left another Jaguars defender flailing on the ground before he pulled off a split-leg, backward leap over Jacksonville cornerback Jarrian Jones for the 14-yard gain.

In Baltimore, Lamar Jackson threw for 280 yards and three touchdowns to finish with a perfect passer rating, Derrick Henry surpassed a few more rushing milestones, and the Ravens had little difficulty with Denver's defense Sunday.

Justin Herbert passed for 250 yards and two touchdowns — all in the first half — to lead the visiting Chargers over the Browns, who couldn't get anything going with Jameis Winston.

### TITANS 20, PATRIOTS 17

Nick Folk kicked a 25-yard field goal with 2:32 left in overtime and the host Titans beat the Patriots, giving coach Brian Callahan his first victory at home this season.

The Titans (2-6) snapped both a three-game skid overall and at Nissan Stadium.

### PANTHERS 23, SAINTS 22

Chuba Hubbard scored on a 16-yard run with 2:18 left and the Panthers snapped a five-game losing streak, beating the visiting Saints.

Bryce Young completed 16 of 26 passes for 171 yards a touchdown to improve to 1-3 against the Saints in his career. Coach Dave Canales would not say after the game if Young would start next Sunday against the Giants in Munich.

### BENGALS 41, RAIDERS 17

Joe Burrow tied a career high with five touchdown passes, Chase Brown rushed for a career-high 120 yards and the Bengals got their first home win, routing the Raiders.

Burrow was 27 for 39 for 251 yards. He threw touchdown passes

to Brown, Andrei Iosivas, Drew Sample and the last two to Mike Gesicki. But he also threw an interception that was returned by Jack Jones for a TD early in the fourth quarter.



### CARDINALS 29, BEARS 9

Emari Demercado ran 53 yards for a touchdown just before halftime, James Conner added 107 yards on the ground and the surging Cardinals put together a dominant performance to beat the visiting Bears.

Third straight win denied

The Nets' first game of a back-to-back on Sunday looked like it had the right ingredients brewing for the team's third straight win: Cam Johnson got off to a hot start with eight straight points; Detroit began playing like its 1-5 record suggested; and young star Cade Cunningham had yet to make an impact on the game.

To make matters worse for J.B. Bickerstaff's squad, Johnson continued his torrid start into halftime. The Nets went into the

intermission up five, getting 22 points from Johnson, the most by a Net this season through the first two quarters.

But Johnson, who shot 7-of-10 from the field (3-of-6 from deep) by halftime, cooled off in the period while the Pistons outscored the home team, 31-20. In that quarter, it was Detroit's Tobias Harris leading the charge, helping the Pistons turn the game around to secure a 106-92 win at Barclays Center on Sunday evening.

"My biggest concern is our offense in the second half," coach Jordi Fernandez said. "Obviously,

you got to give them credit with their physicality, but I think they did it in the first half, too."

The loss — versus a lowly opponent — was a tough blow for a Nets team slated to suit up again tonight against a stronger Ja Morant-led Grizzlies squad.

"Obviously, this is a game that we all have to look at ourselves in the mirror and be better tomorrow. Watch film," Fernandez said. "I'm gonna help them with don't do this again... it's pretty

awful. So, we just don't want to do that."

Harris scored 18 points, including seven in the third quarter that helped turn the game around.

Johnson, who finished with a game-high 26 points, went 1-of-4 in the third after looking sure to eclipse the 30-point mark for the first time this season.


But still, the Nets had a chance to get back into the game after entering the fourth quarter down just six points. The deficit, however,

grew to 11 after Cunningham scored with eight minutes remaining, forcing Fernandez to call a timeout.

The poor outing came after two games with a double-double and coming one rebound short of another in Friday's win over the Bulls.

# Nic on course to get into starting lineup

Nets center Nic Claxton is still on a path back to the starting lineup after beginning the regular season with a hamstring injury. Claxton's minutes have been monitored through the first six games of the season, and he's yet to start in any of them.

But before the team's home matchup against the Pistons on Sunday, coach

Jordi Fernandez said how the center responds to the team's latest back-to-back set could dictate when a return to the starting lineup happens.

"Yeah, there's a plan for him to start at some point," Fernandez said. "Right now, it's important for him that he goes through the back-to-back and he feels good, and then from there we'll readdress the situation and see where we're at."

The Nets host the Grizzlies tonight.

"He didn't play the last back-to-back," Fernandez said. "Tonight after the game, we will address what the plan is for tomorrow, and if we can accomplish this, then we'll address the next step. Again, we have a great group with the performance and medical, and Nic has been doing a great job. He was a big part of the last win

for us."

## WHAT HAPPENED TO WATFORD?

Nets forward Trendon Watford (hamstring) was expected to make his season debut against the Bulls on

Friday, but he was a late scratch after suffering a setback. Before the win against the Bulls, the YES Network broadcast said the 23-year-old's ham-

string flared up during warmups.

On Sunday, Fernandez said Watford went through "a certain workout schedule" and "had some awareness that we had to address."

"And obviously if there's awareness of whatever part of his body, especially if it's the one that we're concerned with, then we decided to not dress him and look at the whole situation again. So everything looks good right now," the coach said.

## MANAGING SIMMONS

Ben Simmons started Sunday, which means he would miss tonight's game.

The strategy coincides with the team's plan not to have Simmons play both ends of a back-to-back coming off of lower back surgery.

# Embiid shoves columnist in locker-room confrontation

Sixers star Joel Embiid reportedly shoved a journalist Saturday night after taking issue with a recent column that referenced the star's son and late brother.

The Sixers' chief of public relations reportedly intervened as Embiid shoved Hayes.

The NBA said it is investigating the situation.

Hayes' column referencing Embiid's family was one of several recent pieces in which he was critical of the 2023 NBA Most Valuable Player.

Embiid sat out of the Sixers'

124-107 loss at home to the Grizzlies on Saturday due to left knee injury management and is yet to play this season. The Sixers, who have also been without Paul George, fell to 1-4.


The 7-foot Embiid underwent surgery on the lateral meniscus in his left knee in February, costing him two months.

He returned before the end of the 2023-24 regular season and played at least 39 minutes in each of the Sixers' six games in their first-round playoff loss to the Knicks. He then played for the gold-medal winning Team USA at the Olympics over the summer.

# Ducks pull in as unanimous No. 1 in poll

Oregon was the unanimous choice for No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll on Sunday, strengthening its bid for the top spot in the College Football Playoff selection committee's first rankings of the season.

The Ducks are No. 1 in the AP Top 25 for the third straight week, and unanimous for the first time, following their 21-point road win against Michigan.

Georgia, which received one No. 1 vote last week, remained No. 2 after overcoming Carson Beck's three interceptions and pulling away late to beat Florida.

Ohio State earned a one-spot promotion to No. 3 with its win at Penn State, the Buckeyes' eighth in a row in the series. Fourth-ranked Miami, which beat Duke, and No. 5 Texas, which was idle, each moved up a spot. Penn State, which had been in the top five

in the previous four polls, slipped

to No. 6.

The CFP's expansion to 12 teams this season means losses by top teams to other top teams aren't a certain disqualifier in the race for the national championship. The CFP's first rankings of the season will be released Tuesday and updated weekly until the bracket is announced Dec. 8.

Tennessee held its place at No. 7 despite scuffling well into the fourth quarter against three-win Kentucky and winning, 28-18.

Indiana jumped five spots to No. 8, its highest ranking since it was No. 7 in 2020 — and best in a non-pandemic season since the Hoosiers were No. 4 during their 1967 Rose Bowl season. The Hoosiers rolled past Michigan State, 47-10, on the road to go 9-0 for the first time in program history; every win this season has been by double digits. No. 9 BYU and No. 10 Notre Dame were idle. Army, at No. 18, saw its highest ranking since it was No. 10 at midseason in 1960.

## RED BULLS STUN CREW

Daniel Edelman scored the decisive goal in a shootout after three straight saves by Carlos Coronel and the Red Bulls outscored Columbus, 7-6, following a 2-2 draw on Sunday, eliminating the defending champion Crew with a first-round sweep in the best-of-three series.

The Red Bulls, the seventh seed in the Eastern Conference, took a 2-1 lead late when Emil Forsberg followed his first career assist in the postseason with his first postseason goal — on a penalty kick in the 80th minute.

Second-seed Columbus came up with the equalizer in the sixth minute of stoppage time when Christian Ramírez used an assist from Alexandru Matan to score his fourth goal in eight playoff appearances. Matan's assist was his second in eight postseason appearances. The Crew was successful on its first four PK attempts, but Coronel thwarted shots by Yevhen Cherbko, Max Arfsten and Matan in order to send the Red Bulls to the second round.

# Time for GMs to take center stage in MLB

The Dodgers spent big last offseason before winning big this postseason, taking home a World Series title after committing more than \$1 billion to players like Shohei Ohtani, Yoshinobu Yamamoto and Teoscar Hernández.

Now it's time to see which teams are in the mood to open their wallets for free agents in preparation for the 2025 season.

The Ohtani sweepstakes dominated last year's offseason conversations until the Japanese superstar inked an eye-popping \$700 million, 10-year deal last December. With apologies to Juan Soto, there might not be anyone that commands that kind of salary in the coming months, even if this year's class is arguably deeper.

Soto, Willy Adames, Corbin Burnes, Max Fried, Blake Snell, Alex Bregman and Jack Flaherty are among the high-level players who are looking for new teams. After that, there's another enticing tier of players like the previously mentioned Hernández, Anthony Santander, Jurickson

Profar, Ha-Seong Kim, Pete Alonso, Christian Walker and Sean Manaea who could provide a big lift for championship-contending teams.

MLB's general managers will meet this week in San Antonio, Texas, in the unofficial opener to the offseason. There usually aren't a lot of moves during these early November conversations, but the groundwork is often laid for future deals.

Here are some things to watch as MLB free agency opens this week:

Soto shined as a Yankee, but don't expect a NY discount

This class may be deep, but there's no doubt the No. 1 prize is Soto. The four-time All-Star already has 201 career homers, a career .421 on-base percentage and helped lead the Yankees to the World Series before losing in five games to the Dodgers.

He's also just 26 years old.

One of the more intriguing teams to watch over the coming months is the Mets, who overcame a slow start to advance all the way to the NL Championship Series before losing to the Dodgers.

Alonso has been a big part of the Mets' lineup for the past six seasons, mashing 226 homers. Manaea, Luis Severino and José Quintana are also on the market after all were important pieces of the pitching rotation.

It'll be fascinating to see what happens with veterans like Paul Goldschmidt, Walker Buehler, Shane Bieber and Carlos Santana. These are guys who have some miles (and surgeries) on their bodies, but have been great big leaguers for a long time.

Goldschmidt was the 2022 NL MVP for the Cardinals, but his offensive production took a dive over the past few years. Still, he's a first baseman that's good in the clubhouse and keeps his body in excellent shape.

Buehler came back from his second Tommy John surgery this season. There were several ups and downs, though his sterling performance in the World Series is reason to believe he has plenty left. He threw six scoreless innings against the Yankees, including a scoreless ninth to clinch the series in Game 5.

# 'AM I DREAMING? I WON NEW YORK'

## Nageeye becomes first runner from Netherlands to win NYC

Abdi Nageeye and Sheila Chepkirui used strong kicks in the final mile to pull away from their nearest competitors and win the New York City Marathon for the first time Sunday.

Nageeye, who became the first runner from the Netherlands to win the men's race, was step-for-step with 2022 champion Evans Chebet before using a burst of speed heading into Central Park for the final time to come away with the win in 2 hours, 7 minutes, 39 seconds. Chebet finished six seconds behind.

"At the finish I was like, am I dreaming? I won New York," Nageeye said.

He had run the race three times before with his best finish coming in 2022, when he was third.

"I know the course," Nageeye said. "Today was two things: survive that race and my race is after 36 (kilometers; 22 miles). I was thinking like a cyclist, survive 36K and you're going to win."

Chepkirui was running New York for the first time and pulled away from defending champion Hellen Obiri in the women's race in the last stretch.

"Let me push the last mile, let me give it my best," the Kenyan said. "When we were around 600 meters to go, I said to myself, I have to push harder. When I saw Hellen wasn't coming, I knew I was going to win and was so happy."

Chepkirui, who started to run marathons in 2022, won in 2:24.35. Obiri finished nearly 15 seconds behind.

Obiri was looking to be the first consecutive champion since Mary Keitany of Kenya won three in a row from 2014-16. Vivian Cheruiyot of Kenya finished third, giving the African nation the top three spots.

Tamirat Tola, the men's defending champion and

Paris Olympic gold medalist, finished fourth, right behind Albert Korir.

"I had a good year," Tola told The Associated Press through a translator. "I won the Olympics and then to come back to New York after that, you know it's a tough course. I know that I expended a lot of energy. Around the 33-kilometer mark I felt my muscle tighten and my muscles just couldn't handle it."

Tola, who set the course record last year, was looking to be the first back-to-back men's champion since Geoffrey Mutai of Kenya won in 2011 and 2013. The 2012 race was canceled because of Superstorm Sandy.

The top Americans finished sixth in both races. Conner Mantz led the men and Sara Vaughn the women. Vaughn was in the lead group heading into Mile 20 when they entered the Bronx before she dropped off the lead pack.

Vaughn was geared up to run Chicago before COVID-19 kept her from competing in that race. She was a late addition to this marathon.

The day got started with an upset in the men's wheelchair race as three-time defending champion Marcel Hug was beaten by Daniel Roman-chuk, who also won in 2018 and 2019. Susannah Scaroni won the women's wheelchair race. It was her second victory here. She also took the 2022 race.

The 26.2-mile course took runners through all five boroughs, starting in Staten Island and ending in Central Park.

This is the 48th year the race has been in all five boroughs. Before that, the route was completely in Central Park when it began in 1970. The first race had only 55 finishers while more than 50,000 competed this year.

The weather was perfect to run in with temperatures in the lower 40s when the race started. Last year, it was 61 degrees when the race started.

## A Message from HTC President Rich Maroko



The passage and signing into law of the **Safe Hotels Act** is a huge victory for hotel workers, union and non-union alike, across every corner of the city. Offering unprecedented protections for workers and the guests you serve, this law will set a new standard to improve the workplace environment and traveler experience.

Here are some of the requirements in the **Safe Hotels Act**:

- Hotels must be licensed in order to operate. This gives the city enforcement power to ensure hotels are being operated responsibly and fairly.
- Hotels must provide panic buttons to workers who enter guest rooms, which can be pressed to summon help in case of assault or other emergencies.
- Hotels must directly employ their workers in housekeeping and front desk operations. This prevents the use of subcontracting, which often results in wage theft and other worker mistreatment.
- Hotel workers who speak out about unsafe conditions or violations of the law are protected against retaliation or punishment by their bosses.

If you're a **non-union hotel worker**, here are some important things to note:

- If you're a subcontracted worker, your job is protected under NYC law. In fact, when the agency's current contract expires, you must be offered your job directly by the hotel at the same or higher pay rate.
- It's better in the union. Union housekeepers make, on average, over two times what non-union housekeepers make, have free family healthcare, and a pension plan. They are able to negotiate for fair workloads, receive 5-days notice of their schedules, and demand respect on the job.
- It's your right to join the union. You and your coworkers have the legal rights and the POWER to win what unionized workers have. If you want more information about how to become a union member, contact us at **646-647-6660** or [organize@nyhtc.org](mailto:organize@nyhtc.org). It's confidential.


