



Govt awaits PTI response to alternative venue offer

- Interior minister says protesting party asked to shift its protest to Sangjam
- PTI team visits Adiala jail late at night 'to consult Imran' for second time in 24 hours
- PM, govt functionaries blame protesters for cop's death, vow accountability

ISLAMABAD: An scattered group of protesters began to trickle into the outskirts of the capital on Monday night, the government and PTI apparently opened a 'back-channel' for the sake of negotiations.

In a late-night presser, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi seemed to confirm talks with the protesting party, saying that the government had offered Sangjam, on the outskirts of Islamabad, as a venue for their protest.

PTI leaders met Imran Khan on a second floor later on Monday night at a specially arranged meeting, where they reportedly laid the government's proposals before the incarcerated party founder.

The outcome of the meeting was not immediately clear, as the PTI delegation left without speaking to the media.

However, Mr Naqvi said that they were waiting for a response from the party and asked journalists, who were present on getting an answer, to wait for an outcome.

Earlier in the day, sources claimed that PTI and government leaders had held talks, ostensibly to finalise a venue where PTI supporters could be allowed to stage a demonstration in Islamabad.

Kurram death toll rises to 73 as sporadic clashes continue

Overnight firing between tribes in Lower Kurram leaves one dead, four others wounded

KURRAM: Officials on Monday said the death toll from the recent violence that has plagued the restive Kurram tribal district had risen to 73, amid a vicious conflict that is interrupted by sporadic gunfire.

Officials said that overnight firing between tribes divided along sectarian lines left one man dead and four others wounded in Lower Kurram. There were also reports of an eve-

ning of fire and incidents of arson from different areas in the region.

Authorities acknowledged that the two sides had taken steps to abide by the terms of the休ing ceasefire, including the release of five women held hostage by one side and the return of two dead bodies.

While officials continued to work behind the scenes to keep the situation under control and prevent further escalation, the political leadership was conspicuous by its absence, as it is supposed to take the process forward and work towards a permanent ceasefire.

Sources said that an official delegation of the provincial government on Sunday negotiated a ceasefire between the two groups, who agreed to release hostages before returning the land as well. One group, how-

ever, refused to release hostages, they said.

Locals reported that incidents of gunfire continued in Alai and Bagar areas of Lower Kurram and Khar Kalay and Balochkhel areas of Upper Kurram.

The clashes broke out on Thursday after a convoy of passenger vehicles came under attack in Lower Kurram and resulted in the death of at least 39 people. The attack, allegedly a reprisal for an earlier assault on 26

July, triggered a wave of violence in the district.

The number fatalities since Thursday's attack has risen due to the death of critically wounded individuals. The total number of those with injuries due to armed clashes now stands at 63, officials said.

Soon after the attack, Chief Minister Ali Amin Khan Ghanipur had ordered an official delegation comprising Minister for Law Abid Ali Afridi, Advisor to Chief Minister on Information Barrister Muhammad Ali Soofi, Chief Secretary Nadeem Adam Chaudhary and police chief Akhtar Hayat Khan to visit the district and assess the situation.

On Sunday, Mr Soofi said that the warring groups had agreed to a wide-ranging ceasefire, an exchange of hos-

tags and retrieval of bodies.

The district, which borders Afghanistan, has long been plagued by sectarian tensions, often fuelled by disputes over land ownership. While the government-appointed land commission reportedly submitted its findings in the past, the report remains unpublished due to sectarian sensitivities.

Meanwhile, educational institutions and markets remained closed on the fifth day of the armed conflict while the annual Eids ur-Ramazan, being held by the Kohat educational board, were also postponed.

Head of the private aided teachers' association Mohammad Hayat Khan said that the exams were postponed indefinitely and that all the educational institutions in the area were closed.

Belarusian president arrives on three-day visit

The Belarusian president is being accompanied by a high-level delegation comprising government officials and representatives from leading business companies.

Constable dies, dozens injured in skirmishes on capital's outskirts

- Police detain, book hundreds of activists; cases also lodged against Imran, Bushra, Gandsapur, Omar Ayub and other party leaders over violence
- Marchers seize police equipment, remove barricades in their path amid advance towards capital
- Bushra Bibi vows to continue fight for Imran's release until her 'last breath'

TAXILA / ISLAMABAD: A policeman, injured in clashes with protesters at Jaspal checkpoint near Taxila, died on Monday as PTI supporters continued to overturn roadblocks and barricades on main highways, to continue advancing towards the capital.

Separately, police registered cases against Imran Khan, Bushra Bibi, Dr Arif Alvi, KP CM Ali Amin Gandsapur, Opposition Leader in the National Assembly Omar Ayub Khan and family members of senior PTI lawmakers, leaders and workers across Punjab over violent protests on Nov 24.

The FIRs were registered under dif-

ferent sections of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC), as well as the Anti-Terrorism Act (ATA).

Constable Mohammad Muhsin, 46, who had travelled from Multan to assist the Rawalpindi police, sustained critical injuries during clashes with protesters and was shifted to the IRSP Rawalpindi, where he succumbed to injuries.

His funeral was later held at the Rawalpindi Police Lines, before his body was sent to his native town for burial.

Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi, who visited the injured officer at the hospital, extended condolences to Muhsin's family, honouring his sacrifice.

"The government stands by his family in this time of grief, and all perpetrators will face legal consequences."

In a late-night presser, Mr Naqvi revealed that a Rangers official had also sustained a fatal injury, warning protesters that they would not tolerate attacks on law enforcement.

Eight journalists on bail after 'flimsy case'

GUJARAT: Eight journalists of Hyderabad are on interim bail after being booked by Kassola Police Station on Nov 20.

They were present on the terms of the house of former MNA Mohd Hassan Bhatti where his daughter MNA Aneeqa Mehmood Bhatti was scheduled to address a news conference when Hyderabad police reached there, pushed the media persons out and did not allow them to attend the news conference.

Later on, a case was registered against eight of them, namely Armeed Parvez, Hafiz Azizur Rehman, Shabbar Gul, Sheik Javed, Asrar Shah, Javed Asad, Ehsanullah and Shafeeq Wattoo, under sections of the PNC on the report of Sub-Inspector Mushtaq Hussain.

The journalists later obtained bail before arrest from a court until Nov 29.

Journalists associations condemned the registration of a case against the journalists for performing their professional duties.

They have demanded quashing of the case; otherwise, the journalists would stage protest demonstrations.

Police alleged they raided the venue on the information of presence of former MNA Shaukat Bhatti who was a proclaimed offender and some other POs but the journalists abetted them to escape from the scene and interfered with official work of police.

The journalists denied the allegations and termed the police action unjustified.

Govt plans to instal 30 air quality monitors across Punjab

Eases curb on heavy vehicles, allows construction activity

LAHORE: In an initiative to combat rising air pollution, the Punjab government announced on Monday the installation of 30 advanced air quality monitors across various cities in the province.

The development is coupled with eased unregulated restrictions in key districts, aiming to improve environmental conditions while supporting economic activity.

Senior Minister Maryam Aslamzai revealed that 30 advanced air quality monitors were being installed across various cities in the province, with Lahore's monitoring capacity increasing to eight units.

She said the new monitors in Lahore are strategically placed at TMO, Kadam,

Jawahar Police Station, Shahdara Teaching Hospital, Punjab University, and Wildlife Park, Rawalpindi. Other cities benefiting from this initiative include Rawalpindi (three monitors), Faisalabad, Sheikhupura, and Nankana (one each), as well as Multan, Gujranwala, and Bahawalpur (two each). Sargodha (two monitors) and Dera Ghazi Khan (one monitor) are expected to activate their systems by the end of this month. These devices are linked to the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) central control room for real-time monitoring.

The senior minister highlighted that the collected air quality data will be integrated with the Global Air Quality Index (AQI) system, providing accurate and reliable information to the public and researchers. This system is designed to facilitate timely actions against pollution and improve environmental conditions.

"This initiative is a revolutionary step to safeguard human lives. It will provide transparent data to the public and

ensure an effective solution to air pollution challenges," said Maryam Aslamzai.

This programme is not only a significant step toward environmental conservation but also an example of utilizing digital technology to enhance governance and improve public service delivery.

Meanwhile, the Punjab government had issued several restrictions imposed to combat smog in four key districts—Lahore, Multan, Faisalabad, and Gujranwala—providing much-needed relief to residents and business.

The EPA issued the new directives (available with Dawn), aimed to strike a balance between addressing environmental concerns and maintaining economic growth.

The restriction on the entry of heavy vehicles into these districts has been lifted, allowing smooth transportation and logistics operations. Brick kilns, previously shutdown to reduce emissions, are now permitted to operate, though it

is anticipated that compliance with specific environmental standards will be required. Construction activity has also been allowed.

Driving establishments, including restaurants and hotels, can now operate until 10pm, extending their previous closing hour. Markets and shopping centres must continue to close by 8pm, as per government orders, to limit emissions and conserve energy during peak pollution hours.

The government has underscored the importance of cooperative efforts in mitigating smog-related challenges. Citizens and businesses are encouraged to adopt eco-friendly practices and adhere to the revised guidelines to ensure a sustainable environment.

The decision follows a period of strict enforcement aimed at reducing pollution levels, which impacted daily life and economic activity. These relaxations are seen as a step towards easing the burden on businesses while maintaining the battle against smog hazards.

Is it politics or terrorism, asks Azma

LAHORE: Punjab Information Minister Armaan Khokhar said on Monday a policeman was killed and another 70 suffered injuries during clashes with Imran Khan's supporters.

"Constable Mirzaqbal lost his life (in a clash with PTI workers) while 20 cops injured, of whom the condition of five is critical. They (PTI) have taken police officers hostage. Is this politics or terrorism?" the minister asked at a press conference here.

He said in Attock police officers were attacked. In Sanglaor, a police officer was shot in the leg and in Wah Cantt, a constable was injured.

"I want to tell Imran Khan that this is not a jungle. She is inciting Pashtuns to attack the state, leading armed mobs, and adding a religious colour to the PTI aggression," he said.

He claimed the PTI and its armed factions wanted to dismantle to advance their disruptive political agenda.

He said Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz had ordered that police officers should remain unarmed while the PTI had come armed from KP to wreak havoc and instigate violence.

"If even one of their members gets a scratch, they create an uproar domestically and internationally," he said, adding the state was under attack from the PTI which want negotiations as well.

Expressing concern for the people of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, the minister lamented their "suffering" under such leadership. She noted a "stark contrast" between the crowds KP Chief Minister Ali Anas Gardezi attracted and the lack of support for Imran Rao. —Staff Reporter

Police identify 35 people involved in Nishtar AIDS scandal

PMA comes out in support of 'guilty' medics, condemns govt for action

LAHORE: Muslim Police identified 30-35 people, including the Nishtar Hospital staff, who were behind the alleged tampering with the records of the kidney patients who tested positive for HIV/AIDS. However, police lack the mandate to investigate the health professionals.

On the other hand, the Pakistan Medical Association (PMA) has come out in the support of the medics, including the Nishtar Medical University (NMU) VC, who were suspended for negligence that resulted in infections of dozens of kidney patients with

HIV in the hospital.

Police completed the probe into the forged test reports of the patients on the directions of Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz when the HIV/AIDS scandal in the nephrology unit of the hospital came to the light.

An official told Dawn police would submit findings of the investigation to the health department for further action.

"We have no mandate to investigate the healthcare professionals held guilty of the HIV/AIDS outbreak in the Nishtar Hospital," he said, adding that the Muslim police probe was limited to the issue of patients' records that were tampered with.

During the investigation, he said, police found that the private labs had tampered with the record of dialysis patients enrolled with the Nishtar Hospital and generated new falsified test reports to mislead the authorities. He revealed that a hospital

employee was running a dialysis centre out of the government health facility and he had used in his private lab the test kits supplied officially to the Nishtar Hospital.

The police officer added that nearly 30-35 persons, including the hospital employees, were found involved in preparing false test reports of the dialysis patients who contracted HIV/AIDS due to negligence of the medics.

To a question, he said, the investigation was carried out under the supervision of an NSP.

The PMA condemned the government's action against the NMU VC and other health professionals in the wake of the scandal.

Talking to the media at a press conference held on Monday, the PMA leaders declared the suspension of the senior medics on the basis of an inquiry conducted by the fact-finding committee illegal, illogical and against the rules.

The reports suggested that the PMA

came to the support of the guilty NMU senior faculty members and other doctors when a senior leader of the association, Dr. Murtaza Sharif, was held responsible for allegedly tampering with the record of the patients who tested HIV/AIDS during the dialysis in the hospital.

Talking to the media, PMA Lahore chapter president Prof. Asifur Rehman, Dr. Kamran Saeed, Prof. Shahid Malik, Dr. Ishaq Ahmed Chaudhry, Dr. Iram Shahzadi and Dr. Waqar Khan responded to the Punjab government's request to re-examine the resignation submitted by NMU VC, Dr. Mohsin Khokhar.

Prof. Nasir declared the action against

the NMU VC and other health professionals a violation of the departmental and police action against the senior doctors of the Nishtar Medical College.

"The Punjab government initiated proceedings against the NMU senior VC at a time when the world was observing an inter-

national day for the elimination of violence against the women," the PMA leader said and added that the doctors would not tolerate humiliation of the health professionals and announced that a PMA delegation would meet PMI-N supreme Nasir Sharif to raise the matter.

Prof. Nasir also raised questions over the findings of the inquiry committee, saying that it was half-baked, incomplete and full of anomalies. He declared the standard guidelines of the Punjab AIDS Control Programme controversial regarding the time period of performing the AIDS tests of the dialysis patients.

The PMA leaders put the blame on the bureaucracy, including the health secretary, for misvaluing the matter, saying that the CII was not properly informed by the inquiry committee and the health authorities about the facts behind the incident.

A climate change initiative

Hamid announces, SCBA chief rejects call for lawyers' agitation

• PTI-aligned lawyer leader claims their campaign will kick off with a convention in Lahore on Nov 30 • Rauf Attu says SCBA alone can issue call for such a movement

LAHORE / ISLAMABAD: PTI Senator and lawmaker Hamid Khan, on Monday called for a lawyers' movement from Punjab on Nov 30 against the 26th constitutional amendment. However, Supreme Court Bar Association president Mian Muhammad Rauf Attu threw the apex body's weight behind the constitutional bench formed under the 26th amendment and rejected the agitation called by the senior lawyer.

Hamid Khan, an ex-SCRA president, while addressing a presser in the Lahore High Court Bar Association auditorium, said the issue was directly related to lawyers, adding that it would be a lawyers' movement, not political.

The said movement would be kicked off at an all-Punjab lawyers' representative convention being hosted by the LHCBA on Nov 30.

He claimed the legal fraternity had rejected the amendment as it would destroy the judicial system.

Commenting on the results of the recent SCRA election, Hamid Khan, who heads the Professional Group of lawyers, alleged interference and rigging on part of intelligence agencies. He claimed that his candidate for vice-president — Khawar Khan from Sindh and Habib Qureshi from KP — were initially declared winners but defeated in the re-count.

He also vowed to continue the struggle against the 26th amendment. "If they think we have fallen silent, they are mistaken," he said.

Soon after Hamid Khan's presser, the SCRA president in a statement declared, "I want to assure that this association cannot allow any one to promote political agendas using the shoulders of legal fraternity." Mr Attu said that the legal fraternity's recommendations had been fully incorporated in the amendment.

Adding that the SCRA had full confidence in the establishment of the constitutional bench and would not allow anyone to undermine the integrity and disrupt the working of the constitutional bench for party political whims.

Describing Hamid Khan's presser as akin to aligning with a specific political status, he made it clear that his statements do not reflect the legal fraternity's position. He regretted that Hamid Khan suddenly criticised the legitimacy of the amendment passed by a democratically-elected parliament.

"I want to make it abundantly clear that authority to make a call for any lawyers strike / protest, or movement solely rests with the elected representatives of the legal fraternity, not with any unselected person, let alone any politically aligned personality such as Senator Hamid Khan," he said.

Such calls are only meant to create division within the legal fraternity, Mr Attu said.

The women factor in Pakistani politics

While the 'politicisation' of Bushra and Aleema flies in the face of Imran's own opinions about 'hereditary politics', it speaks volumes about what compels families of politicians to step up

THE old adage "what goes around, comes around" has never been more fitting than in the case of PTI founder Imran Khan, who has found himself trapped by the irony of his own words, delivered on a number of occasions as part of the political rhetoric he has used against his opponents.

The recent entry of his wife Bushra Bibi and sister Aleema Khan into the political fray has left many wondering if it is a betrayal of values, or a necessary move in the ever-changing world of politics?

For years, Mr Khan criticised traditional politicians for promoting hereditary politics and launching their own family members, particularly women, into the political arena, specifically targeting the Sharifs for bringing Kulsoom and Maryam Nawaz into politics.

PTI members and workers, in the past, have often smear campaigns on women in targeting the two Sharif family women over the political roles they had adopted.

Both Bushra Bibi and Aleema Khan — who had previously been playing the role of me-

mbers between the incarcerated party leader and the PTI leadership — have now become more involved in the party's leadership. The former, who was released from prison following her fall in the Tashkhaban case last month, has reportedly presided over a number of meetings in the PTI stronghold of KP. She was surprised many by issuing a political statement on Thursday that caused a storm of "irreverential proportions".

Many believe that Mr Khan has sought the help of his wife and sister to further his political agenda due to his frustration with the current party leadership.

There is no doubt that Bushra Bibi and Aleema Khan, with little to no political experience or aspirations, were compelled to take on the political field due to the prevailing circumstances, given that most of the PTI's top tier leadership is either in prison, or including our dear up.

A page from history

This is not a new trend or phenomenon in Pakistani politics. Indeed, the country has seen women family members of prominent politicians playing a similar role in the past, primarily out of necessity.

However, a couple of names on this list stand out and shoulder above the rest, those of Fazila Jinnah and Benazir Bhutto.

The Quaid-i-Azam's sister, who remained by his side throughout the struggle for independence and thereafter, was a known campaigner. Yet, she formally waded into the

political arena some 17 years after the death of her brother. At the time, her hand was forced by Agha Khan, the country's first military ruler, and she had to contest a lopsided election, facing baits and a malicious campaign that went as far as to dub her a "traitor".

The lady will forever be an Maududi's mother of the nation in contemporary history books as dubbed by some to be an "agent of Kabul" in the 1960s. It sounds hard to believe, but this was part of a high-profile newspaper advertisement campaign, sponsored by the state.

Then, following the imposition of martial law and the rounding up of the PPP leadership after the deposition of then PM Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, it was the Brahmian born Begum Nusrat Bhutto and her daughter, Benazir, who stepped in to fill the political void.

While her mother jumped into the fray out of necessity, Benazir was already being groomed for leadership by her father as she regularly accompanied him in political meetings and foreign tours.

Following her demise, her spouse and daughter had to tread a thorny road, faced with persecution and exile, before the party could mark a return to power in the first democratic elections held in the post-Zia era.

This wasn't the end of her struggle, though, and history repeated itself in the 1990s. Dogged by allegations of corruption, the dismissal of the PPP government and imprisonment of her husband, she was forced into exile once again. Although she

managed to return to the country in 2007, she wound up paying the ultimate price for championing democracy when she was assassinated after a rally in Liaquat Bagh.

Forced into the limelight

Raqeeb Nasir Wali Khan is one of the first names that comes to mind when we look back at women who were forced into the political limelight by circumstances.

The wife of Pashtun nationalist leader Khan Abdul Wali Khan, she waded into politics after the arrest of her husband and the banning of his National Awami Party (NAP) by the then PPP government in 1972. She led the movement to secure her husband's release and remained active in politics for many years after his death.

She also made a history by becoming the first woman elected from their SWFP on a general seat in the 1977 elections and later played a crucial role in the struggle against the military dictator Gen Ziaul Haq from the platform of MRD.

Then, it was the turn of Kulsoom Nawaz, the wife of three-time prime minister Nawaz Sharif, to fight for her husband while he was imprisoned by military dictator Pervez Musharraf. Who can forget those iconic photos of her car being towed by the authorities from Lahore's Canal Road, with her still defiantly seated inside.

More contemporary examples include the two sisters of President Asif Ali Zardari, Maryam and Bilquis, and Dr Ayesha Farooq Pechuwal, who have been active in politics for decades.

While Dr Pechuwal has kept a low profile in internal party matters, preferring to concentrate on service delivery as a member of the provincial cabinet, Ms Talpur has risen to occupy a central position in party circles. Known as 'addi' (the word Sindhi for 'sister'), she also entered politics when her brother

last month stated that the board would consider the promotions of officials in different ministries, ISI as well as Intelligence Bureau.

All relevant federal secretaries, the FBR chairman, chief secretaries and inspector general of police were asked to attend the meeting. However, sources said, due to the prevailing law and order situation, the police chief's were unable to participate in the meeting.

was facing a long incarceration under the Nawaz Sharif regime in 1990s. But while most of these women had to take on a political role under the yoke of military regimes, Bushra Bibi and Aleema Khan have been pushed into a similar situation under 'civilian rule'.

Bushra's role

PTI's opponents say that Imran Khan's past criticism of traditional politicians for promoting hereditary politics now seems hypocritical, when the women from his own family have jumped into the political arena.

On the other hand, PTI supporters claim that the two women were compelled to enter politics due to the government's policy of persecuting its opponents and cracking down on the PTI leadership and workers.

The focus over Bushra Bibi's recent statement also addresses the political situation. Although she has been in the news since their marriage, due to her reported influence on Mr Khan's political decisions, Bushra is mostly remained behind the scenes while the PTI was in power.

Following her husband's incarceration, she was also dragged to court in various cases and only recently secured her freedom. Her latest statement, a rare appearance via video message that sparked controversy, was also necessitated by the conflicting messages coming out of the party leadership regarding the protest planned for Sunday.

While it remains to be seen how Bushra Bibi's supporters will react to these two women's role in the party's decision-making circles, there are already reports of concern within some sections of the party over the new roles assumed by Bushra's spouse and sister. It's nothing we haven't seen before, and Bushra and Aleema are unlikely to be the last women to wade into politics to save the men of their family.

CIA building declared sub-jail to accommodate arrested PTI protesters

ISLAMABAD: The Crime Intelligence Agency's building in the federal capital has been declared a sub-jail by the Islamabad administration to detain the leaders and workers of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) during the ongoing protests.

Officials of the capital police told Dawn that during the ongoing protests, the capital police have arrested over 500 local leaders and workers.

Due to the engagements in security duties and shortage of space in the lockups of the police stations, police, arrested political individuals will neither be interrogated nor transported anywhere else, they said.

"Currently, all the prison vans and other police vehicles are deployed at different locations as per the security plan. Detaining such arrested persons in the lockups of the police stations is a risk under the prevailing circumstances," the officers said.

Sources said more police stations will be declared sub-jails if required.

The arrests were made from various areas including Fazlabad, Tarnol, Sangani, Chungi No 26, Express Chowk, Noon, Nilore, Shams Colony, and Banigala.

So far, the capital police have registered seven cases against the leaders and workers of the protesting party, for creating unrest and undermining public safety.

The tribal police have booked two nominated and 325 unidentified persons. Shahzad Town 402, Banigala 502, and the Shams Colony police have booked 450 accused in multiple cases.

Similarly, the Nilore and Tarnol police have booked over 350 and over 300 individuals respectively under various charges.

According to the FIRs, the implicated individuals were armed with weapons, stones, iron rods, batons, stones and sharp metallic pieces.

The police claimed that the accused resorted to arson, firing, pelted vehicles with stones and blocked roads, chanting anti-government slogans and forcefully closing shops.

Moreover, the capital police Monday partially opened major thoroughfares where shipping containers were placed to block the flow of traffic.

At these blockade points, the barriers were partially removed to make way for a single vehicle to cross at a time.

The police officers further said that the convoy of the PTI leaders and workers coming from KP comprised over 34,000 persons. Till late in the evening, the protesters had crossed the Hadda interchange.

Meanwhile, the Inspector General of the Islamabad Police (IGP), Syed Ali Naqib Ilahi, visited D-Chowk and various other areas to inspect antiriot measures.

He met the officials of Islamabad police and other law enforcement agencies to boost their morale, who according to him were performing duties in order to maintain peace in the federal capital.

On the occasion, IGP Islamabad instructed the officials to be highly alert to deal with any emerging law and order situation.

"We shall take every possible measure to protect the lives and property of citizens and thwart adventurism," he said while addressing the officials.

He further said officials were performing their duties, putting their best efforts to maintain peace in the capital.

All the officers have been directed to stay vigilant in their respective areas and brief the personnel to deal with any untoward situation.

Three dead, five injured in Neelum Valley jeep accident


MUZAFFARABAD: At least three people were killed and five others injured, three critically, when a passenger jeep plunged off a steep road in Neelum Valley on Monday evening, police said.

The jeep, carrying around 10 persons, including the driver, was heading to Botali village via a steep link road branching from Kunial-Shahi, located some 73 kilometres northeast of Neelum.

While negotiating a sharp bend in the second cut, the vehicle rolled backward out of the driver's control and plunged into a lower section of the same road around 8:30 pm, said SP Neelum Khawaja Siddique.

He said that according to an initial report, three people identified as Gohar Ali, 22, son of Kamran Shah (driver), Anwar Bibi, 50, wife of Abdul Hameed, and Mujahid Shah, 33, son of Imdad Shah, died on the spot.

Five injured passengers were identified as Syed Rafique Shah, 25, Chaudhry Mohammad Ahsan, 47, Chaudhry Abdul Hameed, 45, Fiaz Kazmi, 11, and Ishq Khan. Of them, Ali Saeed was allowed to go home due to minor injuries, and the rest were hospitalized, the SP said.

Imran, Bushra and PTI leaders booked for 'criminal conspiracy, inciting people'

Number of PTI supporters arrested in last four days reaches 170 in Rawalpindi; two police officials beaten up and injured by protesters

RAWALPINDI: Police have registered two FIRs against PTI founder Imran Khan, his wife Bushra Bibi, central leadership and over 300 workers of the party on the charges of criminal conspiracy and inciting people to protest.

In the first FIR registered at the District police station on Sunday, the police accused Imran Khan, his wife, ICP Chief Minister Ali Aslam Gandapur, former president Dr Arif Alvi, Omar Ayub, Sherryar Riaz, Atif Haq, Hammed Athar, Khurram Khan and Asad Qasim of inciting to commit the offence on November 24 protest.

Police also detained 26 supporters of the PTI, including Arsal and Nayyer Abbas of Chakwal. Five of the detainees, who were teenagers, were discharged while the remaining 21 were remanded in police custody for five days.

Likewise, the Sadiqabad police arrested 27 PTI supporters who were later remanded in police custody for three days. The number of PTI supporters detained by the police has reached 170 during the last four days.

Police also detained 26 supporters of the PTI, including Arsal and Nayyer Abbas of Chakwal. Five of the detainees, who were teenagers, were discharged while the remaining 21 were remanded in police custody for five days.

On November 19, Bushra Bibi issued a video message and delivered Bushra Khan's direction to party MNAs to bring 5000 participants each and MPAs 1000 protesters each for the march to Islamabad.

Police said Aleema Khan, sister of Imran Khan, while talking to media outside the Adialia jail on November 22 called upon people to come out for their 'Adalat' on November 24.

On November 19, Bushra Bibi issued a video message and delivered Bushra Khan's direction to party MNAs to bring 5000 participants each and MPAs 1000 protesters each for the march to Islamabad.

"Despite the Punjab government's imposition of Section 144 on Nov 22, Imran Khan, Nizam, founder of PTI and its central leadership, Bushra Bibi, Ali

Aslam Gandapur, Dr Arif Alvi, Arsal Alvi, Omar Ayub, Sherryar Riaz, Atif Haq, Hammed Athar, Khurram Khan and Asad Qasim refused to withdraw the protest call," said the PFR.

It added that on the conspiracy of Arsal, Bushra Bibi, Chaudhary Asmer Afzal, Chaudhary Mohammad Nasir, Ziad Khudoglu Khan and Tariq Asif Sharif, who were leading the protesters, Chaudhary Jawaid Khan, Farwali Mahmood, Sajid, Shabnur Khan, Khurram Mohammed, Aslam, Raja Sohail Khan, Rashid Mohamed Mirza, Chaudhary Tikkha Khan, Raja Asif, Chaudhary Sharif Hamid, Raja Riaz, Mohammad Tasveer, Babar Shahzad, Athar Alvi, Madius, Aslam Khan, Mohammad Irfan, Tajuddin Iqbal, Nayyer Abbas, Arsal Alvi, Sajid, Sajid Hussain, Saleem Manzar, Matloob Hassan Dadi, Iqbal, Sajid, Zia, Tareen Iqbal, Imdadullah, Mohammad Khan, Abdullah Arain and Mohammad Usman along with 100 to 200 unidentified people blocked Sadiqabad Road by setting off fire on fire.

Police said a police team was on duty when armed PTI workers started shouting slogans, "Kashmir Naseeb to Pakistan Naseeb" etc. The protesters blocked the road causing gridlock, disrupting and endangering public life.

The protesters were told that gathering of the public had already been banned on the government had imposed Section 144, but they ignored and instead of dispersing started scuffling with police and opened fire on the police, but

the officials escaped unharmed.

However, a police van was damaged due to fire which also created panic and fear in the area. The protesters dispersed with the police station on the position.

The District police registered the FIR on the complaint of Mohammad Arslan, under 35 sections of the law, including section 2(TATA), criminal conspiracy, obstructing police from performing duty, blocking road and other relevant sections of the law.

Another FIR was registered with the Sadiqabad police on the complaint of Chaudhary Moataz, sub-inspector, against the PTI founder in which the KP chief minister, Bushra Bibi and Aleema Khan were booked under section 7 of Anti-Terrorism Act.

In the FIR, the police accused the PTI founders of inciting people and hatching a criminal conspiracy. The police said local PTI leaders Raja Basharat, Sardar Nasir Ali Khan, Zulfiqar Khan, Malik Tahir, Rashed Haider, Zafar Ali Satti, Zain Sarai, Shafiq Riaz, Asad Alvi, Malik Taimoor Aslam Raja, Raja Shafiq and others appeared in District Kalu Khan and started a chicken mela.

A reinforcement of police was called when about 100 PTI supporters led by Saeed ul Haq shouting slogans appeared on the road and pulled police with stones injuring two officials.

The police recovered batons, catapults, stones and party flags from those detained.

Mushaal slams world community's silence towards abuses of Kashmiri women

ISLAMABAD: Mushtaq Hussaini Muttick, wife of incarcerated Kashmiri leader Yasin Muttick, has expressed her utter dismay and frustration over the "doct and dumb approach" adopted by the international community and women's rights organizations towards the horrific use of sexual violence as a weapon of war to quell the Kashmiri freedom movement.

Mushtaq, Chairperson of the Peace and Culture Organisation in a statement to mark the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women regretted the lack of action to stop the epidemic of violence against women and girls in the occupied valley.

She said that the occupation forces crossed肆s of Kashmir and Indian acts to silence the dissenting voices, as the human rights and women rights organisations watch the situation like silent onlookers.

Mushtaq applauded UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres for his call to observe the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. She urged him to raise awareness about the violence and humiliation faced by women in Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IOJK) and to take concrete steps to put an end to these inhuman acts.

She emphasized that the violence against women in Kashmir is a stark example of how rape is being used as a weapon of war to crush the will of the Kashmiri people and deny them their fundamental right to self-determination.

She stressed that it is essential to acknowledge the severity of this issue and work towards creating a safer and more just environment for the women of Kashmir.

Mushtaq highlighted the devastating impact of the Indian forces' brutal actions in Kashmir, which have left over 30,000 women widowed and more than 90,000 children orphaned.

Furthermore, she added, several thousand Kashmiri girls and women have been victims of sexual violence.

The Chairperson recalled that the Indian army's atrocious force severely impacted the lives of over 50,000 women in Kashmir since 1989.

Mushtaq pointed out that as documented by Amnesty International and other human rights organizations, these actions include gang rapes of young girls and elderly women, abductions by military and paramilitary forces, and sexual abuse, sometimes in the presence of male family members, adding that these heinous acts are used as a weapon of war, perpetuating a cycle of violence and trauma.

Furthermore, the presence of over 700,000 Indian military and paramilitary forces in the Kashmir

Valley has significantly heightened the sense of insecurity among women and children.

The Chairperson expressed her deep disappointment that the situation in the occupied valley has drastically deteriorated, primarily due to the international community's inadequate and unconvincing response to the plight of the Kashmiri people, particularly women.

Mushtaq pointed out that the armed forces in Kashmir have been granted impunity to exploit women's rights and freedoms, often through sexual violence.

She cited a report by the US High Commission for Human Rights, highlighting the Kashmir-Povertymainly rape as a significant example of the state's failure to investigate and prosecute allegations of sexual violence.

This incident occurred 27 years ago, on February 23, 1995, soldiers from the Indian Army's Rajputana Rifles regiment gangraped around 23 women from Kangan and Poshpora villages in Kupwara district and despite attempts to seek justice, the authorities have consistently denied and blocked them.

Mushtaq called upon the US High Commission for Human Rights, Amnesty International, and Human Rights Watch to press the Indian military government to stop the worst ongoing women's rights violation and hold accountable the perpetrators of these horrific crimes.

Pakistan, Belarus discuss enhancing ties in matters of legal affairs

ISLAMABAD: A meeting between Minister for Law and Justice Senator Aslam Naqeeb Tarar and Belarusian Minister of Justice Kovalevskyi Evgeny took place on Monday, setting the stage for enhanced bilateral relations in the field of justice and legal affairs.

The meeting was conducted in a spirit of mutual respect and cooperation, with both leaders expressing a strong commitment to strengthening ties between their nations.

According to the statement issued by the Ministry of Law and Justice, discussions covered an array of critical issues, including the digitization of the legal system, capacity building for legal professionals, legislative drafting and fostering international cooperation.

Minister Kovalevskyi Evgeny outlined the scope and responsibilities of Belarus' Ministry of Justice, identifying opportunities for collaboration.

The dialogue centered on several shared interests including development of International Mediation and Arbitration Centres (IMAC), implementation of Case Assignment and Management Systems (CAMS), exchange programmes for bar councils and legal professionals, enhancing legal education and awareness.

Both sides acknowledged the importance of these initiatives in modernizing their respective legal systems and facilitating a more robust framework for international cooperation.

The meeting culminated in several noteworthy developments.

An invitation extended by the Belarusian minister for a delegation from Pakistan to visit Belarus was warmly welcomed by Tarar.

A comprehensive review of previous treaties and agreements was presented, laying the groundwork for future partnerships.

Both ministers expressed eagerness to collaborate on capacity building and legal education initiatives, emphasizing an active exchange of expertise and resources.

Meeting of journalist body 'disrupted' in D. G. Khan

District police officer says organisers didn't seek prior permission

ISLAMABAD: The district administration in Dera Ghazi Khan last week forced an early end to a meeting of journalists discussing threats to their lives and the state of media freedom in Punjab's Sargodha belt, according to a press release of the Freedom Network.

A local official said the district administration did not allow the event to go ahead because the organisers had not obtained permission, a requirement under the law.

The press release said Iqbal Khattak, the representative in Pakistan of Reporters Without Borders (RSF), and a team of Freedom Network members expelled from Dera Ghazi Khan.

"Stop the meeting and leave the district," an official who introduced himself as "Tehsildar [sub-district officer] Chaudhry Hassan" told Mr Khattak.

The official was accompanied by Yousaf, the SHO of D.G. Khan's Sialkot police station. The incident took place on Thursday (Nov 21), according to the press statement.

Mr Khattak is also a member of the Punjab Journalists Protection Coordination Committee, set up by the provincial government last year to investigate crimes of impunity against journalists. A Punjab police DG heads the committee.

Journalists from Dera Ghazi Khan, Multan, Lahore and Layyah attended the meeting.

Chaudhry Hassan or Yousaf did not show any order written, nor did they have any legal provision allowing them to force an early end to the meeting, the statement said.

"Instead, they specifically asked the RSF Pakistan representative, Freedom Network team members and local journalists, including a women media practitioner, to 'wind up the meeting and leave the venue at once.'

"Truly, the local journalists had been lamenting about widespread intimidation, enforced censorship, self-censorship and threats and violence they face from intelligence agencies' personnel and district officials before the raid took place."

Neither was any charge sheet framed nor any citation of violation of law given by the raiding team, according to the statement.

Tehsildar Hassan's written reply to the journalistic protest was: "The AC [assistant commissioner] has ordered." When the two officials were pressed to produce any written order from the assistant commissioner, the tehsildar said: "We have verbal orders. You know how the system works."

The tehsildar continued taking "instructions on the phone from unknown sources". The officials also kept pressing the hotel administration to remove the participants to leave by forcing the lights off.

"We met Additional Inspector General Muhammad Kamran Khan in Multan on Nov 19 to discuss how the Punjab Journalists Protection Coordination Committee could play its role to protect journalists in the Sargodha belt," Iqbal Khattak said.

"We also met former Punjab governor Malik Riaz Rajawan to seek support of the ruling Pakistan Muslim League-N in Lahore and he was obliging. We also met senior lawyers and civil society leaders in the region to discuss measures that can help stakeholders combat impunity for crimes against journalists in the region," he added.

The authorities had shut the D.G. Khan Press Club in June after opposition leaders held a press conference and sent the club's president, Sher Alian Bawali, and Ghulam Mumtaz Lashari, president of the local journalists union, to jail under the Maintenance of Public Order. Both alleged they were severely tortured in custody.

"The closure of Dera Ghazi Khan Press Club is a grave violation of the government's commitment to freedom of expression, and we urge Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz will look into the issue and help re-open the club at the earliest," Iqbal Khattak said.

DPO denies claim

Syed Ali, the D.G. Khan DPO, told Dawn that the event was stopped since the organisers didn't have permission from the local administration.

Any international organisation holding an event in D.G. Khan was bound to seek prior permission, the DPO explained.

He said officials of the local administration and police visited the hotel after receiving information about the organisers to show the permission letter granted by the authorities, which they failed to produce.

"The officials requested them [journalists] to end the meeting and the representatives of the organisation agreed to disperse peacefully," the DPO said.

In reply to a question, he denied the allegation that the participants were not allowed to leave home as the hotel.

"We allowed the NGO members and others to leave the pre-arranged hotel," the DPO said.

personnel.

He also said that it was easy for the government to prevent marchers from advancing if they used force, but added that they were showing restraint because the government did not want to give the PTI more fuel for their agitation in the form of dead bodies.

Protests reach Islamabad

Meanwhile, a pitched battle erupted at Changi No 26 — on the outskirts of the capital — on Monday night between police and PTI protesters after an advance team of the party's caravan reached the area.

Following the PTI caravan's passage through Rawalpindi, additional police and paramilitary forces were called in to reinforce security at both Changi No 26 and Nicholson Monument near Taxila.

An advance party of over 500 PTI protesters arrived at Changi No 26 after 8pm, leading to a massive confrontation with law enforcement personnel. The police used rubber bullets and tear gas, while the protesters retaliated by throwing stones and shouting slogans.

At the time of going to press, scattered clashes were reported from various areas on the outskirts of Islamabad. Footage shared on social media platforms also showed KP CM Ali Aslam Chaudhary's vehicle surrounded by protesters, present at Changi No 26.

Fight for Hassan's release to go on

Addressing charged PTI supporters and workers from atop a container at Barhan Interchange in Taxila, Bawali vowed to continue his fight for Imran Khan's release until his "last breath", urging the crowd to remain united in their efforts.

"Until Imran Khan is with us, we will not rest this protest. It will remain here until my last breath, and I ask all of you to stand by us," she declared, rallying the supporters. "This isn't just about my husband, it's about the future of our country and the leadership we deserve."

Bawali praised the bravery and resilience of the Punjab community, calling them "a proud and honourable nation" and expressing confidence in their steadfastness in the fight for justice. "I know the Punjabi people will stand by us till the end," she said. "They will not

abandon this cause in the face of adversity."

Clashes on M-1

In Attock, which saw some of the heaviest clashes between protesters and law enforcers on Monday, police claimed that 80 personnel, including a sub-inspector, were injured.

Two others were critically injured due to alleged firing by PTI workers marching towards Islamabad on the Islamabad-Peshawar Motorway (M-1), a police spokesperson said.

The spokesperson said that protesters threw stones, assaulted officers and fired directly at police persons at Kathi Pahari — located between the Barhan and Hakkai interchanges on M-1 — resulting in injuries to around 80 personnel.

Constable Waqif, on special duty from Faisalabad, sustained a gunshot wound to the neck and remains in critical condition. Similarly, Constable Samiullah from Sargodha is also in serious condition after suffering a bullet injury.

Meanwhile, PTI workers clashed with Punjab policemen at Pathankot, off the M-1 near Hassanabdal. Despite heavy fire-gear shelling, they managed to remove the shipping containers placed in their path, forcing police constituents to retreat and seek shelter.

The charged protesters also seized a prison van, using it to transport their supporters from one barricade to another near Barhan, before setting it ablaze. They also painted anti-government slogans on the vehicle.

The protest is continuing in Sargodha, Akora Khattak in Sahiwal and Mansehra. Meanwhile, police in Lahore also carried out a raid.

PM slams PTI

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and other government leaders criti-

cised PTI's protest and held the party responsible for the death of a police constable.

In a statement on Monday, PM Shehbaz condemned the death of Constable Muhsin and ordered the immediate arrest of those responsible for it.

He held the protesters responsible for the incident and said the entire nation, including him, paid tribute to the martyred constable.

The prime minister expressed his condolences to the bereaved family, the PM Office media wing said in a press release.

He also directed to provide the best medical facilities to police personnel injured in clashes with the protesters.

He said the perpetrators involved in the May 9 riots were "some agents resorting to violent acts".

The "attack on police personnel" in the name of a so-called protest was condemnable, the PM said, adding the cops and law enforcement personnel were doing their duty of maintaining law and order.

Whichever the country moved on the path of progress, "these miscreants resorted to acts of burning and laying siege throughout the country".

UN urges restraint

Meanwhile, the United States appealed for restraint from Pakistani authorities and those bands of protesters marching on the capital to call for the release of jailed opposition leader Imran Khan.

"We call on protesters to demon-

strate peacefully and refrain from

violence and, at the same time, we call on Pakistani authorities to respect human rights and fundamental freedoms and to ensure respect for Pakistan's laws and constitution as they work to maintain law and order," State Department spokesman Matthew Miller told reporters at a press briefing on Monday.

'Targeted operations' underway to destroy terrorist camps: Bugti

CM seeks alternative solutions to tackle issue of militancy

QUIETTA: While admitting existence of terrorist camps in Balochistan, Chief Minister Mir Sarfaraz Bugti on Monday said that government forces were carrying out targeted operations to root out terrorism from the province.

Talking to journalists after the provincial assembly session, he criticised the political parties that are opposing operations and asked them to suggest alternative solutions other than military action to deal with the menace of terrorism.

"They should come with their suggestions and new considerations for the elimination of terrorism, and the government will implement it," CM Bugti said, adding that terrorists were roaming freely on the streets, kidnapping children and killing civilians and security forces personnel.

When his attention was drawn to rumours about the possibility of changing the chief minister, he said, "I have no knowledge about any such discussions."

He pointed out that lawmakers from PPP and PML-N as well as other members of the Balochistan Assembly had given him the vote of confidence, he said that no one has submitted a no-trust motion against him as yet, turning it to a rumor.

CM Bugti reiterated that he would continue to serve the province as long as the opportunity was available.

HDC delegation

During a meeting with a delegation of the Higher Education Commission (HEC) headed by its chairman, Dr Mukhtar Ahmad, the chief minister underlined the need for preventing anti-state indoctrination of students. He noted that organised groups in many universities across Balochistan and the country were involved in fostering such sentiments.

Provostial Minister for Education Rameela Ramzan Khan Darvazi, cabinet members Sadiq Umar and Faiz Mohammad Kakar, MPA Asghar Tareen, and high officials also attended the meeting.

CM Bugti said his government would raise awareness about this issue by organising a national conference to address it.



Kurram ceasefire

DESPITE efforts by the KP government to bring about a ceasefire in Kurram tribal district, the bloodletting has continued. An official delegation said on Sunday that a seven-day truce between rival tribes had been brokered. The latest round of violence was sparked by the atrocious attack on a convoy on Thursday in which over 40 people were murdered. In an apparent retaliatory move, over 20 people were killed in armed attacks on Friday. Locals told media that there were few signs of a ceasefire on Monday, while officials said the death toll had risen further. The unfortunate fact is that Kurram has been rocked by tribal-cum-sectarian violence for the past several months, yet the state has preferred a firefighting approach, only stepping in after high loss of life. A land dispute is said to be the trigger for the violence that erupted in July, while deadly clashes also took place last year. In fact, tensions go back to 2007, when lethal clashes and their aftermath reportedly resulted in thousands of deaths.

The continuing violence indicates the complexity of the situation in Kurram. For there to be durable peace, the underlying factors fueling tension need to be addressed judicially. For one, terrorist and sectarian groups cannot be given any space to operate. Their malignant across-use local tribal and land disputes to stoke the flames. Thorough action is needed to neutralize the militants in Kurram and the surrounding districts, while strict vigilance should be maintained to ensure that terrorists based in Afghanistan cannot cross the border. Moreover, the state must ensure people can safely travel between cities and towns, and that violent groups do not maintain any 'no-go areas' in the region. It is the state's duty to secure the right of movement, and it must deliver on this obligation. Also, an official land commission has reportedly reached a conclusion regarding the dispute at the heart of the matter, but has not made its findings public due to 'sectarian sensitivities'. These findings should be made public, and all sides must reach an amicable solution to end the dispute.

PPP chief Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari has blamed the KP administration for the poor security situation in Kurram. Unfortunately, over the decades, all organs of the state — the federal and provincial governments, as well as the security establishment — have repeatedly failed to maintain order, protect citizens and judiciously resolve disputes in Kurram. This must change if the state wants to prevent further bloodshed in this volatile area. Local tribes had signed an accord in Monroe in 2008, which was revitalized in 2011, to help bring peace to the region. This framework should be pursued to permanently end violence in Kurram.

Hollow victory

THREE conclusion of COP29 in Bali has left developing nations — struggling with the mounting costs of climate disasters — feeling lousy. While the adoption of a \$300bn annual climate finance target by 2035 marks a threefold increase from rich nations' previous \$100bn commitment (which was met two years late in 2023), it is a pale shadow of what the world needs to slow down climate change. Climate experts have stressed the need for \$1.3tr in annual climate finance to meet the Paris Agreement's goals. The Global North's insistence on private sector financing and blame-shifting to high-emitting economies like China and oil-rich Gulf states further muddles the discourse. For Pakistan, the stakes are particularly high. With a \$348bn climate finance gap looming by 2030, our efforts at mitigation and adaptation risk being stalled. Despite this, we demonstrated resilience at COP29. From the Recharge Pakistan initiative to the National Climate Finance Strategy, Islamabad's proposals reflect its determination to confront the crisis. The Pakistani Pavilion, a hub of dialogue and advocacy, was a testament to this commitment, even amid severe economic constraints. Yet, without significant global support, such steps remain aspirational at best.

The world cannot afford to delay action. With 2024 poised to be the hottest year on record and global temperatures on track to rise by 3.1°C by century's end, inaction will be catastrophic. Wealthy nations must not only deliver on their \$300bn promise but also ensure equitable access to these funds. Red tape that slows disbursement must be dismantled. At home, Pakistan must accelerate the transition to renewable energy, implement strict environmental protection laws, and establish a robust climate-change monitoring system. Our cities need climate-smart urban planning, while rural areas require sustainable farm practices and water management solutions. The government must also enhance coordination between the federation and provinces on climate initiatives. However, real progress will depend on both domestic action and global solidarity. The recent floods, droughts, and other extreme weather events worldwide underscore our shared vulnerability. As we look towards next year's summit in Brazil's Amazon rainforest, Pakistan must continue its advocacy for climate justice while demonstrating tangible progress on its own commitments. The presence of climate-sceptic leadership in major economies adds urgency to securing and implementing robust financing mechanisms now. The time for half-measures is long past.

Infrastructure schemes

THREE government's decision to finance priority PSDP schemes on a three-year rolling basis is a significant step towards reforming the public development programme and curbing the threaf-forward effect of scarce resources. The reform effort has been a part of LMP programmes since 2021. However, it seems to have been gaining momentum lately due to stringent monitoring by the Fund. Still, it would be premature to expect the shift in PSDP's strategy to deliver immediate results.

Public funding through annual development programmes is an important tool governments have to create growth infrastructure. But infrastructure is expensive to build and resources for development are shrinking, with the private sector having little interest in funding these projects. Little wonder that our annual infrastructure spending of 2pc of GDP is one of the lowest in the region and well below the national GDP-level requirement of 10pc. So the buckling in piling up and the threaf-forward effect is becoming a drag on our shrinking resources due to successive governments' inability to reduce wasteful expenditure and increase tax revenues. Besides, each incoming government — federal and provincial — in addition incomplete projects, compelling many to dub the country a 'graveyard of development projects', with tens of billions of rupees needed to close the growing infrastructure gap and fund incomplete schemes. While reforming these programmes is essential to ensure the efficient utilisation of taxpayers' money and transparency — from the selection of a scheme to its completion — as well as to prevent cost and time overruns, which result from delayed project implementation, and to stop the rapid rise in the backlog of incomplete schemes, it is not enough to fill the funding gap for infrastructure development. It is also time that the authorities become innovative about financing infrastructure through private investment. Only private investment along with a reformed public development spending framework can help plug the growing gap.

A capital lockdown

The PTI is comfortable in the knowledge that the government is scoring an own goal.

COVID-19 may be a thing of the past for the rest of the world but in Pakistan, the lockdowns are here to stay. Lockdowns to control the smog and lockdowns to control demonstrations — the state has tried and tested all. One could perhaps argue that the former is often a lockdown but for the fact that the state spent and blocked agitations as a constant state of affairs, while the notion of a lockdown is temporary, with an end in sight.

The lockdown is here because the PTI is on it's way again from KP to Islamabad with a crowd. Its size varies on social media, depending on who is commenting, while mainstream media too is in lockdown. On the latter, while discussions about the protest are aplenty, there is little to no reporting. And there are no visuals. In a way, it's like the song in summer — everyone knows it's still there but it doesn't need to be addressed because it's less visible.

No one can say whether the protest will end with Ali Amjad Khanzada and Arif Ali closing the eyes of The Final Countdown, with participation in the backdrop. But there is merit in the argument that the lockdown is itself a defeat for the government as it shows not just nervousness but also goes paid to claims of a healthy economy with intent from investors abroad.

The PTI understand this even better than it did in October. Its journey to Islamabad is making history progress, and it is comfortable in the knowledge that the government is scoring an own goal by locking up half the country, leading to economic losses as well as running the risk of shortages of necessities in urban centres. At the same time, the show must go on, police which was deployed days earlier, in a vlog on Sunday night from D-Chowk, Aman Toor reported that Sindh Police recruits were without warm clothes as they patrolled on a cold winter night.

But this is not to say the PTI faces no risks. Those in government in KP and others who are part of one assembly or another also do not want

to upset the applecart too much, despite the pressure from Imran Khan and the workers. This was evident not just in the constant reports of PTI leaders who wanted to delay the protest; in addition, the criticism being directed at Corridor 1 since its disappearance at the protest in Islamabad from the party base also shows the pressures the KP government has to juggle.

At the same time, the crowds accompanying the KP rally show that the party workers and supporters are not sufficiently disengaged by the leadership to stay at home.

However, it is still worth asking what the PTI hopes to achieve. Overthrowing the government seems to go for revolution it is doubtful if even the party ideologues believe it. Second, in Pakistan, protests usually set the stage for a overthrow of a government rather than prove to be the final blow. But in this specific case, the PTI might be more interested in using it as a bargaining chip. There is now a strong perception that the release of Imran Khan's wife was a result of the previous protest. This nine-around-the-report of the negotiations held before this protest point to this; the PTI asked for the release of Yousaf Rashed and other prisoners in Lahore as a confidence-building measure.

If the demand is or isn't conceded, this game of cat and mouse can be played again and again.

Perhaps, though, it is also important to understand why the PTI can play this game repeatedly, considering it has a government in KP and the province's short distance from Islamabad.

It appears there was some understanding at the time of election that depriving the PTI of forming a government in KP would perhaps lead to far too much instability. And this is why the party now has the ability to march in large numbers to Islamabad. While there are constant threats to impose governor's rule in the province, this would be a foolhardy step. The already

volatile situation in KP will simply worsen. However, even this would not have been enough for the PTI to mount such share of power were it was not for the fragile economic situation.


Despite the non-stop repression in Punjab, such such occasion allows young men to play a cut-and-thrust game with the police for hours. It may not show that Pakistan is at the cusp of a revolution but the possibility of violence on the streets cannot be discounted. With Pakistan's demographic numbers and the economy, this is a risk no one can calculate accurately, regardless of the multiple analyses about Punjab's DNA of militancy.

This is what PTI and Khan are counting on. And not a revolution.

Postscript: Perhaps this is a good time to ask what the state plans to do with the PTI prisoners. It has been over a year since these people were detained — in jail as well as military custody — without any kind of trial. We are told via strained journalism and statements (analysis) that they cannot be freed, cannot be forgiven, for the 'crime' was so great. And that this is also to create deterrence.

Indeed, Pakistan society has always been big on deterrence — if we hanged a few thousand in the streets, corruption would stop, or if a rapist was hanged, the crime would stop. But thinkfully, for reasons of incompatability, we have rarely managed such events of brutality, though it has allowed the myth to continue. Still, it needs to be pointed out that at times a state needs to calculate if the deterrence is creation at the cost of people's anger and harm is worth the risk. The prisoners need to be released, all of them, and especially the women. The trials can continue but without this endless incarceration. It is time to send Yousaf Rashed home. ■

Waiting for Trump, apprehensively

IS Donald Trump the Godot the world is waiting for, with apprehension and hope? But Godot, as Samuel Beckett's 1949 cult play suggests, may not show up at all, ever. In fact, Godot, whatever he is or whatever power he may hold over his characters, could be no more than a figment of a deliriously absurd imagination.

More realistically, Godot perhaps symbolizes anxiety that beset a generation of intellectuals after the gory victory of Churchill over a grumpy Hitler. Many couldn't see the difference between the colonial racism, just as it is difficult for pacifists to divine Kevin Spacey from Boris Johnson, or Trump from Joe Biden. For Extragon and Vladimir, the two stoic Trumps converging under a withered tree, their waiting itself was their life. They needed each other, and they were fed up with each other. At one point, they vented their spleen by cursing each other. "Yankee," "Cunt," "Mazay," the epithets characterizing an otherwise like other with the ultimate insult "Criss!"

In today's living absurdity, the stakes are truly existential not just in an ideological sense. Biden and Vladimir Putin are posing a mortal threat to the planet. Biden more than Putin, as one is inclined to believe with the support of Douglas Macgregor, Scott Ritter, Theodore Postel and Ray Mollerov among America's leading security analysts.

Yet, much of the world seems to be waiting for Trump one way or another, mostly with apprehension, like passengers in a plane with engine failure, bracing for a crash landing, heads lodged firmly in the knobs or elsewhere. Others see him as the saviour they were waiting for. There are those who haven't a clue what they are in for with Trump though they would like to see him an ally as they are. Biden on many ways. The category includes Benjamin Netanyahu and Narendra Modi. Both members fear Trump would embrace Putin and throw Ukraine under the bus. Putin sees in him an outside chance to win the war allowing him to focus instead with China on building BRICS.

Those who see Trump as a saviour include Israeli settlers of the West Bank and potentially

also of Gaza. For the Palestinians, it can't get any worse. For them, the attributes ascribed to Trump at the gate, have been usurped and enacted by the supposedly agreeable Biden and his advisors, Antony Blinken and Jake Sullivan, principally.

Many supporters of Palestine, most of them Muslims in Michigan, voted for Trump as the lesser of the evils. It was a desperate gamble against extremely heavy odds. Biden offered support for human life in Gaza by promising to stop the arms flow if Israel didn't open the border for food and medicines to save the remaining women and children, and possibly the hostages too, from the visitations of arriving winter. In reality, Biden openly described himself as a

Khartoum, and continued to indulge Netanyahu's narcissism on Arab women and children.

Trump promised Netanyahu the world in his previous avatar but is likely to settle for hisnicie if it strengthens Israel's hand in striking a deal with Arab states. The dealmaker for Palestine is, as Trump turning his back when a leading Saudi dissident was chopped into pieces on the alleged orders of the crown prince of Saudi Arabia. He got his competing interests in balance and concluded that \$100 billion worth of arms to be sold to Riyadh held greater charm than beating the drum of human rights and personal liberty.

The Saudis are incidentally hostile to an independent Palestinian state fostered by Iran and Arab masses, but are in no position to dismiss it publicly. They may be writhing for Trump to deal a crushing blow to Iran but bear the risk to their own survival as greater. Trump the dealmaker

could put petrodollars in one scale and Netanyahu's future in the other and offer a state with municipal rights to the Palestinians.

Trump may not be the Godot Netanyahu sees him as. Because Israel would need to be placated too, possibly with the relaxation of sanctions he imposed on Tehran. Godot, if he exists, has no easy choices. He is a bantful, and it holds a tricky prospect, given its nuclear threshold and capability with advanced missiles, to disrupt Trump's dreams for a great America.

As for Modi, Trump had the words to flatter his ego. "I remember India before. It was very torn. There was a lot of dissension, lot of fighting. And I brought it all together. Like a father would bring it together. Maybe he is the father of India. We would call him the father of India ... I think he has done a fantastic job." Trump said before meeting Modi in New York. To further concretise for a better than Pakistan prime minister Imran Khan, and reportedly offered to mediate on the Kashmir dispute. A few things have happened to worry Modi under Biden's watch. He was invited as a key member to the anti-China Quad, but the group is now considered dead in the water. The Anglo-Saxon AUKUS — involving Australia, the UK and US has suffered.

Two other events have threatened to queer Modi's pitch internationally, and both occurred under Biden's watch. His closest political adviser are struggling with a US indictment in an assassination plot targeting an American citizen, a Sikh activist. More worryingly, his closest associate in the business world, Gautam Adani, is indicted in the US in a case of high corruption.

Reports say Modi could bail out of the crisis with a lucrative arms purchase as the Saudis did. However, that could annoy his trusted friend, Putin. There are many interests for what Trump might do. The best hope probably comes from a shrewd critic who described Samuel Beckett's work as "a play in which nothing happens, twice". ■

Future socialisms

"SOCIALISM is dead. Long live Socialism," wrote fellow Berkeley scholar Roger Berkman in 1997, ironically predicting socialism's rise in new forms even as older ones were falling. As capitalism's damaging toll on humans expands largely, the search for alternatives to the dominant narrative. Many think this means ending wage labour, profits and private capital, which they wrongly see as capital's core.

But sociologist Karl Polanyi argued that there had existed even before capitalism for long. Capitalism rose only in the 17th century when capital's interests became society's dominant logic to replace other human concerns, with a false promise that it would ensure common welfare.

Capitalism expands its profits by penetrating all human spheres and forcing humans to satisfy all their needs via markets that they are notifying via family, community, state or nature for free, arguing that socialist solutions better cater to all human needs. But the flip of this ideal, spread curiously by owners of big capital, are visible now in high inequality, environmental loss, resource wars and exploitation of millions of workers. All suggests that, as capital's dehumanising interests hold sway over human realms that transgress commercial logics. Thus, ending capital's corrupting sway over all other human concerns is imperative.

Socialism is usually seen as a system with state-owned production assets. But Polanyi's insights about capitalism's core require a new vision of socialism as systems with common welfare as its dominant logic (state welfare that an uncertain deserved one in capitalism) that allows all ownership forms that don't risk common welfare. This vision can span many forms of socialism, as the plural in the title suggests. The Nordic model is a form built on private capital, with common welfare ensured via the provision of public social services, big state investment in education, health, and other human capital services and strong labour-force protection via unions and safety nets.

But poor states lack the globally competitive economies to generate enough taxes to fund a generous welfare state. They need a conjoint twin: a developmental self-care-welfare state where the first twin spurs an inclusive economy that gives income options to all able beings, and the welfare twin that gives safety nets to the few labour-deficit beings. But new forms must avoid the ill of failed forms: over-centralised political and economic power that disempowers and disempowers masses, kills energies and creativity and causes political autocracy and economic

unproductivity.

Oddly, large oligopoles are producing some such results even in capitalism that aged oligarchs did to former USSR. Donald Trump wants to keep most US oligarchs that can't compete with efficient Chinese units, just as Soviet oligarchs tried against efficient US ones 50 years ago.

Politically, new forms must combine multiplicity democracy over a unitary system and dispense power horizontally and vertically. Empowered local bodies must empower community organisations to help gain market power, protection, assets, skills and social services. The economic system must be similarly developed and encourage a wide range of ownership forms, ie, entrepreneurship, nonprofits, producer cooperatives, dispersed ownership at different state levels and bodies and private companies, with a bias for micro, small and medium units.

The state must reduce the cause of poverty among small producers and labourers in rural and urban areas in different regions. Such bottom-up analysis will reveal not only the lack of economic and social investment by the state for such groups as key factors but also their exploitation and marginalisation by market and local elites. This

will give a wide, structural agenda that covers legislation, policies, strategies, projects, services and institutional reform at federal, provincial and local levels.

This major investment in poor regions will drive national progress as reduced poverty ignites win-win growth that benefits society. Our internal market is small, despite our large population, given low incomes. Increasing incomes will expand the national market size and profits for producers. This in turn will expand incomes for the poor and hence national market size and ignite a virtuous progress cycle. Local initiatives will tap local savings digitally to plough them into local investments. Recent regulation will replace deregulation and broader state units restructuring will replace only privatisation.

Such developed and empowering socialisms will use the political and economic mobilisation of masses as the key force driving both a state and economy of the people, by the people and for the people. ■

Banking shortcomings

SYSTEMS in Pakistan often operate below potential. We could be closer, but remain mired in red tape, beholden to power structures and burdened by hidden and friction costs. Despite an educated middle class and a growing youth bulge, we barely make a dent in the world's top banking sector in importance.

Banks are criticised for delayed formation, documentation and digitisation of the economy. Implementers of monetary policy, banks are the first port of call when it comes to improving national savings rate, external trade or private sector credit. Without healthy banking, standards of living or the GDP will not improve.

So why isn't our banking there yet?

One could be forgiven for believing that our banks are creating all the value they can, based on the recent national debate on banking profitability. However, Banking on our Banks, a joint analysis by CEPD and Altimetry Technologies, asks if we are looking at the right benchmarks for evaluating banking competitiveness.

If we shift our gaze to banks in similar markets, there is a widening performance gap. Consider India's HDFC bank. Twenty years ago, HDFC and HBL were comparable in size. In 2024, HDFC ranks 13th globally by market capitalisation. The closest Pakistani bank is at number 284, HBL, standing at 472. While the volume of reserves, market size and regulatory contexts varies, acknowledgement, if any, to the impact of the decisions made by both banks.

Our best banks reveal similar shortcomings in efficiency, profitability, and growth, when measured against their peers in the region who compete by focusing on growing advances with innovative products and technology-driven improvements in credit allocation and disbursement. Pakistani banks focus on investments and returns on government debt. The outcome of both choices is clear.

When we widen our lens to include countries that our banks operate in, our vision becomes更廣. By conservative estimates, frictional costs in Pakistan's tax collection system costs loads of Rs2 trillion every year, including the opportunity cost of currency in circulation (Rs0.6tr) and non-interest bearing current account(Rs0).

Part of the challenge in our overregulated banking sector is the emphasis on safety, minimising risk at the cost of innovation. Innovation results from a desire to change, but often breaks things. When safety is the prime motivator, breakage becomes a four-letter word.

For decades, the regulator has driven banking innovation — ATMs, national connectivity, faster check clearance, branchless banking and now digital and mobile

banking. Yet many believe this top-down approach with a focus on safety is restricting risk appetite and growth.

Banks are incentivised to lend within well-travelled paths, prioritising uncompetitive sectors like energy, agriculture, and tourism while ignoring high-potential industries. A banking-specific maturing of the "Dutch disease". Absence of competition discourages new product development and the ability to live on new sectors. Considering approval processes and predictable returns deter innovation with both the regulator and within banking boards.

We need market-driven incentives, responsive regulators, forward-looking boards and a sensible approach to supervision. Otherwise, banks will continue to prioritise comfort lending over bold decisions necessary for economic transformation. Small and medium enterprises are the backbone of economic growth but remain a banking弱點. Export-focused borrowers pose a different challenge. Their tech focus makes them asset-light and talent-heavy making them unattractive for asset-backed loans. The same is true for the growing low-cost private school market. Party-informed, party under the radar, it doesn't fit within conventional credit transaction.

Is it just burdensome compliance and underwriting requirements that deter banks? Or is there more to the equation that prioritises larger exposures? The mystery element 'X' is scale. We scaled the liability side but left advances behind. Data-driven models, market-relevant pricing and customer-driven products are one solution.

Digitalisation, reducing inefficiencies and building anew come with a price tag. There are regulatory burdens to overcome, skittish investors to pacify, unpredictable economic challenges to confront. The space in our life these challenges are surmountable — they are, but are we willing to take them on. The path forward demands courage for regulators to rethink models, for banks to take calculated risks, for policy makers to align incentives with innovation.

But only systems worthy of Pakistan's extraordinary potential can help us reach it. ■

Human trafficking needs govt action



HUMAN trafficking in the country is on the rise again, which is reflected in the fact that in the month of October alone, the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) arrested 109 human traffickers in the Chitral-Karimabad region. As many as 206 cases of human trafficking were reported by FIA, and 119 of 119 cases were presented to various courts during that period.

According to the 2024 Trafficking in Persons Report by the American State Department, the Pakistani government failed to meet minimum standards in several key areas. Unfortunately, these shortcomings included the inability to effectively investigate, prosecute and convict human traffickers, as well as inadequate enforcement of existing laws. The 2018 Prevention of Trafficking in Persons Act, despite amendments, continues to allow the imposition of fines in lieu of imprisonment, further weakening its deterrent effect.

In 2023, a total of 1,588 trafficking cases had been reported, out of which 1,432 were prosecuted. However, only 231 subsequently resulted in convictions. Among those prosecuted, 231 involved sex trafficking, yet only four convictions were secured. Meanwhile, 108 cases pertained to other forms of trafficking, with only 10 convictions. The remaining 1,059 cases involved forced labour trafficking, resulting in 132 convictions. This is a minuscule number, given the scale of the problem.

Corruption as well as official complicity remains significant obstacles to combatting the menace of human trafficking. The State Department document also noted that the government did not report any investigation, prosecution or conviction of government employees complicit in human trafficking crimes.

At such, many traffickers continue their operations by bribing officials or applying loopholes in the legal system to avoid punishment. The culprits actively

use social media platforms, as can be seen in the accompanying image, to promote their illegal activities and minimise penalties.

Human trafficking networks across the country are complete as well as deeply entrenched, often with ties to international crime syndicates. These networks smuggle individuals across international borders, particularly to the Gulf states and Europe, where victims are forced into labour or prostitution.

In recent years, several horrifying cases have emerged where groups of migrants were abandoned or subjected to brutal treatment by traffickers in foreign countries, many of whom faced life-threatening situations.

To tackle human trafficking timely and effectively, the government must take a more proactive and results-oriented approach. Besides, strengthening the legal framework, and ensuring full-scale implementation of the laws are critical. This includes providing specialised training to law enforcement personnel to identify, disrupt, and dismantle trafficking networks. Additionally, the government needs to establish a robust system for the protection and rehabilitation of trafficking victims. This will also be an important step.

Criminal negligence

THE recent spate of accidents, involving a particular bus company, has left the people of Gilgit-Baltistan stunned and outraged. Just weeks ago another bus of the said firm lost its track on the Karakoram Highway and resulted in three deaths and several injuries. With a staggering 53 lives lost and more than 75 injured in just a few years, it is imperative to scrutinise the company's operations and demand accountability.

The frequency and severity of these incidents expose a disturbing pattern of negligence and disregard for human life. The 2019 Balmar Park accident, which claimed 21 lives, was a wake-up call that went unheeded. Subsequent accidents in 2022 and others have only reinforced the notion that the company concerned prioritises profits over safety.

In the 2017 Skardu accident, a bus from the company collided with a truck, resulting in five deaths and 10 injuries. In 2015 Karim accident, a bus fell into a ravine near Karim, resulting in 12 deaths and 25 injuries. In 2013, a bus collided with a car near Gilgit, resulting in three deaths and five injuries. A bus crashed into a truck near Mansehra, resulting in four deaths and 10 injuries in 2022.

Investigations have consistently revealed glaring lapses in safety protocols. Drivers have been found guilty of overspeeding, reckless overtaking, and ignoring safety guidelines. Faulty brakes, worn-out tyres,

and inadequate safety features have contributed to the accidents. Buses have been consistently overloaded, adding to the risk factor. Drivers lack proper training, leading to inadequate response time and decision-making. The bus company's management has demonstrated a staggering lack of concern for passenger safety.

Additionally, the company has failed to provide adequate information on safety measures and accident investigation. Its management has shifted blame onto drivers, passengers and external factors instead of acknowledging its own systemic failures.

Enough is enough, one must say. The government and its various regulatory bodies must take immediate actions, such as suspension of the company's operating license until safety standards are met. There should be independent investigations into all the accidents mentioned above, apart from regular inspections of vehicles and drivers to ensure safety compliance.

The lives lost as well as those injured are not mere statistics; they represent families torn apart, futures cut short, and a nation's trust shattered. Will the authorities finally take action, or will the courage continue?

Cremation incinators

Surgical site infection

FOR patients to recover safely from breast cancer surgery, surgical site infections (SSIs) must be minimised. Preoperative measures are the first step in any effective strategy. Infection risks are greatly decreased by educating patients about good hygiene practices and maintaining controlled conditions, like isolation, in the best of these abilities.

It is also advantageous to implement decolonisation regimens for patients who have staphylococcal aureus colonization. In order to reduce skin flora, patients can be advised to take chlorhexidine gluconate baths and should get prophylactic antibiotic within an hour of operation.

Strict adherence to aseptic protocols and minimal handling of the tissue are crucial in the operating room. To create a sterile field, surgical draping is required. Staff members near the site should wear protective gowns because longer surgeries have been associated with higher SSIs rates.

Healthcare professionals can reduce the incidence of SSIs during all breast cancer procedures by scrupulously adhering to these practices, which will ultimately improve patient outcomes and hasten their recovery time.

Six cops, passerby injured in Tank police post attack

DERA ISMAIL KHAN: Six policemen and a passerby were injured when terrorists attacked a police post in the Civil Imam area of Tank district on Monday.

According to a statement issued by the police, the attackers used both small and big firearms during the assault on the police post.

Rescue 1122 troops and DIB transported the injured policemen to the District Headquarters Hospital in Tank for initial medical care. Later, they were shifted to the DIB Hospital in Dera Ismail Khan.

Hospital sources confirmed that all the injured policemen and the passerby were in stable condition.

Local enforcement agencies responded promptly to the incident. A joint team of police and security forces was dispatched to the site to initiate an investigation.

The authorities cordoned off the area and launched a search operation to track down the culprits.

Tank district police officer Aslam Nasir Khan visited the Civil Imam police post and appreciated the personnel for their swift response in repelling the assault.

He issued directives to enhance security protocols, emphasizing the mandatory use of bullet-proof jackets and helmets. He also urged officers to remain vigilant, avoid distractions such as use of mobile phones while on duty, and actively monitor for suspicious activities.

One killed, three injured in Bajaur cylinder blasts

BAJAURO: One person was killed and three others were injured in separate gas cylinder explosions in Khan village Monday.

Residents and Rescue 1122 officials said the first incident occurred near the Khan Civil Colony in the wee hours of Monday when a gas cylinder exploded in a house, causing it to collapse, leaving the owner Farid Khan dead on the spot.

Residents of adjacent houses said that the 62-year-old was a retired government employee.

They said he was heating water for morning power in his room when the gas cylinder exploded with a bang, destroying most parts of the house.

The residents said that the explosion also damaged some appliances. Soon after the incident, residents of the nearby houses and rescue workers reached the area and recovered the body from the debris.

According to Rescue 1122, the second cylinder blast occurred at a shop in the main vegetable market of Khan. They said that three people, identified as Sulaiman Khan, Ibrahim Khan and Abdullah, were injured in the incident.

Conditions of all the injured, who were immediately shifted to the District Headquarters Hospital, Khan, were said to be out of danger.

ANP sees ‘well-planned intrigue’ behind growing terrorism in KP

Observes black day against Parachinar violence

PESHAWAR: The Assam National Party (ANP) observed a black day across Khyber Pakhtunkhwa on Monday against the recent Parachinar convoy bloodbath and other terrorist attacks in the province.

Addressing a rally in front of the Peshawar Press Club here, ANP provincial president Muin Iftikhar Hussain said a “well-planned conspiracy” was behind a surge in terrorism in the province, with international powers and their facilitators involved in it.

He criticised the government for failure to protect public life, especially in the Kurram tribal district where a convoy of passenger vehicles was attacked leading to the killing of dozens of people.

Mr. Hussain condemned the Parachinar violence and demanded action against culprits.

He expressed solidarity with the affected families and said his party was committed to stand by them.

The ANP leader criticised the provincial and federal governments over “inaction and silence” on the issue.

He complained that the governments were busy with street protests instead of addressing

people’s issues. The party also announced plans to hold a peace march across the province to condemn terrorism. It also formed a peace jirga, led by Baig Mohammad Khan, to visit Parachinar and negotiate with stakeholders to find a peaceful solution to the issue.

Meanwhile, the ANP activists staged a protest against terrorism in front of the State Press Club, drawing district cabinet members and workers in large numbers.

They raised concerns about the poor law and order situation in the province and complained that the escalating violence had rendered the people vulnerable.

The speakers said the recent carnage in Kurram Agency proved the growing unrest in the province.

They urged authorities to identify and prosecute those responsible for these heinous acts.

The ANP leaders warned the government that if effective measures weren’t immediately taken to restore peace in the province, their party would “take action to ensure stability.”

In Swabi district, the ANP activists gathered on the Swabi-Jhangiani Road and blocked the road to traffic, complaining about the failure of the government to protect public life and property.

They demanded restoration of peace in Kurram.

Former forest minister Arsal Sher Khan said a lot of blood had already been shed on

Pakistan land, so more bloodshed was inevitable.

He said the government should act for peace and provide security to the people.

In the Lower Dir district as well, the ANP staged a rally against the rising violence on the call of its provincial president, Mumtaz Hussain.

Dozens of party workers, led by the district leadership, attended the demonstration, shouting slogans against the government over the recent Parachinar carnage.

The speakers, including ANP district president and former MPAs Hajji Bahadur Khan, senior vice-president Malik Sagid Yousafzai and leaders Malik Afzal and Mian Faizan Hussain, criticised the federal and provincial governments over fail-

ure to protect public life in parts of the province.

They said Pechistan were being targeted under a “planned conspiracy” meant to turn the region into a war zone.

The ANP also observed a black day in Lakki Marwat and Bannu district.

Holding banners and placards, party workers and student activists gathered outside the press club building on the Old Lahore Road in Lakki city.

In Bannu, the ANP activists showed up outside the press club building to condemn the growing terrorist attacks in the province, especially the recent convoy bloodbath in Kurram tribal district.

They expressed sympathies for the families affected by the recent terrorist attacks.

Outside the Khar Press Club, the protesters shouted slogans for peace in the region.

They condemned the recent attacks on passenger vehicles in Kurram district.

Fire destroys hundreds of trees in Sararogha forest

SOUTH WAZIRISTAN: A massive fire broke out in Chakothi’s hilly area of Sararogha tehsil of Upper South Waziristan district on Monday, burning down thousands of precious trees.

A Rescue 1122 spokesman said that a rescue team promptly arrived at the scene after receiving information about the fire. “The firefighters are currently engaged in efforts to extinguish the blaze.

28 recently repaired schools handed over to education dept in Khyber

Officials say repair of 43 others damaged schools nearing completion

KHYBER: Kurbah Rural Support Programme (KRSP) launched over 28 government schools that were recently repaired to education department in Khyber tribal district while work on the remaining 43 others were nearing completion, officials said.

Dryout fears mount as lockdown disrupts fuel transportation

POL suppliers seek immediate measures to avoid shortages

ISLAMABAD: The tight lockdown of major cities, motorways and national highways imposed by the government to thwart PTI's march on the federal capital has started breaching down the supply chain of petroleum products, particularly in Punjab and Islamabad.

Senior government officials said the fuel-carrying tankers and lorries movement had been severely affected in major cities because of official barricades. On top of that, most private companies were taking addi-

tional precautions in rolling out their fleet. Tankers already on the roads were instructed to offload their stocks at the nearest available portage for safety reasons to avoid any mishap, as such vehicles were considered moving bombs in any law and order scenario.

As a result, the retail pumps were drying out in critical economic centres like Lahore, Rawalpindi, and Islamabad, as those cities became hotspots for agitation and violent reactions by the government. The officials said the pressure had shifted to the state-run Pakistan State Oil (PSO) to keep the cities not with fuel supplies, and private oil marketing companies (OCMCs) were also being pulled into it to meet their responsibility.

The national fuel supplier first reported the crisis-like sit-

uation to the government at the Federal and provincial levels and then to the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (Ogra) for immediate measures. Early in the morning, PSO also approached the Punjab chief secretary and inspector general police (IGP) of Punjab and Lahore as well as district administrations to look into the matter and extend special "assistance in facilitating fuel transportation with particular attention to replenishing stocks in Lahore Division".

PSO sought immediate attention from the federal and provincial governments and Ogra "to mitigate disruption in fuel supply across Punjab, particularly in the Lahore Division, due to the closure of key highways and arterial routes. This

situation has arisen due to the

current low and order backlog".

PSO reported that "the closure of highways has significantly delayed fuel transportation, resulting in an acute risk of stock depletion at fuel stations" and added that the Lahore Division, a significant economic and commercial activity hub, was especially vulnerable. "The availability in replenished fuel supplies promptly is adversely impacting essential services, daily operations, and the livelihoods of millions residing in this division and nearby areas", the PSO said.

It requested the provincial government and the police to help address these challenges and make "urgent intervention to prioritize the Lahore Division and allow the un-

restricted passage of fuel tankers from depots to petrol stations". PSO explained that ensuring an uninterrupted supply of fuel in the Lahore region will not only stabilize the local situation but also mitigate the risk of a broader crisis, and smooth transportation of fuel tankers will help ensure the continuous supply of fuel to the population, particularly in the Lahore Division and address the prevailing shortages effectively.

Oil falls \$2 on possible peace deal in Mideast

HOUSTON: Oil prices fell more \$2 on Monday after multiple reports that Israel and Lebanon had agreed to the terms of a deal to end the Israeli-Hezbollah conflict, citing improved senior US officials.

Brent crude futures were down \$2.02, or 2.69 percent, at \$74.15 a barrel by 9:17 a.m. CST (1557 GMT), while US West Texas Intermediate crude futures were down \$2.08, or 2.39%, at \$85.16 a barrel.

Israel said on Monday that it is moving toward a ceasefire in the war with Hezbollah but there are still issues to address, while Lebanese officials voiced guarded optimism but said Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was not to be trusted.

"It seems the news of a ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon is behind the price drop, though no signage has been disrupted due to the conflict between the two countries and the risk premium in oil has been low already before the last price decline," said Giovanni Staunovo of UBS.

Oil markets are being pushed up and pulled down on rising oil drilling supply, disruption fears, Phil Flynn, senior analyst at Price Futures Group, said in a Monday note.

A report that Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu approves Lebanon ceasefire in principle could be a friendly catalyst, yet we may see more details as they become available.

Last week the world was stunned as Russia launched surprise missile strikes at Ukraine, Flynn wrote in his Energy Report.—Reuters

90pc bankers see cybercrimes as biggest threat

Criminals quickly adopting new techniques: PwC-Pak

KARACHI: About 90 per cent of bankers believe that cybercrime is the biggest challenge confronting banking in the country, according to a survey conducted by PricewaterhouseCoopers-PwC Pakistan.

Sixty-nine per cent lost trust in their major concern and 60 per cent believe terrorism is the biggest threat, the survey showed. "Bankers in Pakistan operate within an evolving financial crime ecosystem," said the survey report.

With criminals quickly adopting new techniques and means to exploit vulnerabilities in banking technologies and processes, there is an even greater need for institutions to remain vigilant and adaptive in their fight against financial crimes, it added.

To analyze the banking industry's current state of preparedness, PwC Pakistan conducted a financial crime survey this year, primarily targeting Chief Compliance Officers (CCOs) and heads of business functions, with participation by over 75 respondents.

The results indicate that CCOs' perceived risk of major types of financial crime typologies including cybercrimes, fraud, Terrorist Financing (TF), Money Laundering (ML), tax evasion and sanctions, has increased significantly. This may be due to increasing digital adoption, economic vulnerabilities, resultant higher inflation levels and rise in terrorism risk in the country, said the report.

The percentage of CCOs who consider risk to be "very high" are cybercrime 90 per cent; fraud 70pc; terrorism financing 60pc; tax evasion 50pc; money laundering 55 per cent and sanctions 50pc.

Adoption of digital technology

An increasing adoption of digital technology in Pakistan necessitates the need to have robust financial crime risk management, the report suggested.

More than 60pc of the CCOs and heads of business and enabling functions, new technology, data, HR and cost constraints are top challenges in financial crime compliance.

To address these challenges and mitigate elevated levels of financial crime risks, CCOs believe following areas may require investments in the next 12 months.

About 95pc investments required for data governance, management and cleaning; 75pc for Technology optimization; 75pc for specialized training programmes and 65pc for implementation of emerging technologies.

Findings from PwC Pakistan's Financial Crime Survey 2024 indicates that banks are still facing challenges in reaching steady and high-performing stages with respect to their financial crime technologies.

As the industry faces a new era of transformation marked by digital innovation, technology optimization, regulations, and shifting customer expectations, the role of culture and talent in driving results is more critical than ever before, the survey added.

Banks in Pakistan have abundant data that can enable institutions to identify niche segments, assess their behaviors to understand preferences, and then insights to design data-driven strategies and create attractive propositions to attract, engage, reward and retain customers.

EU steps up Spanish olives spat with US

GENEVA: The European Union on Monday requested authorisation at the World Trade Organisation to impose counter-measures to compensate for US customs duties on Spanish olive imports.

The request was filed a meeting of the WTO's Dispute Settlement Body (DSB) after Washington challenged the amount of retaliation proposed by the EU (\$35 million annually), a Geneva-based trade official said.

The EU response for DSB authorisation to impose countermeasures on imports from the United States is intended "to compensate for the US's failure to comply with an earlier panel ruling limiting US anti-dumping and countervailing duties on ripe olives from Spain", the source said.—AFP

Eight MoUs signed with Belarus to boost trade

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and Belarus on Monday signed eight memorandums of understanding (MoUs) and agreements in various sectors to realize the true potential of bilateral trade.

The MoUs and agreements were signed during the Pakistan-Belarus Business Forum, co-chaired by Commerce Minister Javaid Khan and Belarus' Minister of Energy Alexey Kushnarenko. The MoUs were signed before Belarus' president's arrival in Islamabad.

Both ministers witnessed the signing of these documents, which are expected to pave the way for deeper economic ties. The MoUs will involve a five-year collaboration arrangement between JSC Belavia and National & Pharmaceuticals and a product supply agreement between JSC Motor Plant and Shahnawaz Trade Links in 2025.

JSC Belavia and Shahnawaz Trade Links agreed to sell trees in the Pakistani market, as did JSC Belavia and Shahnawaz Belavia. Logistics collaboration will be established between BUE Belarusian service and the National Logistic Corporation.

BEL Belmedpreparaty and Bio-Medical Systems signed a memorandum of understanding for pharmacy regime transfer and supply and a medical supply deal between JSC Belarusian and Ross International Trading in 2025. JSC Trustor Works and Green Corporate Initiative will cooperate on

agricultural machinery.

Pakistan's exports to Belarus fell 10.23pc to \$7.98 million in FY24 compared to \$8.95m in the preceding year. However, imports from Belarus surged 393pc to \$27.63m in FY24, up from \$5.41m in the previous year.

Speaking at the business forum, Mr Khan said there is a need for trade diversification, emphasising the untapped potential in sectors such as food, pharma, textiles, logistics, and energy.

He highlighted that the bilateral trade volume needs to reflect the economic capabilities of the two countries. He stressed the need to diversify trade, capitalising on the potential of respective strong sectors.

Mr Khan said all economic sectors are open to foreign investment and priority areas include energy, infrastructure, telecommunications, manufacturing, minerals, ICT, agriculture, and marine.

The minister said that eight BUE MoUs/agreements reflect the complementarity of bilateral trade and will pave the way for more to happen.

Speaking at the forum, Alexey Kushnarenko said events of this format were an effective platform for direct dialogue between the business circles of Belarus and Pakistan.

He said that Belarusian agricultural machinery, industrial, petrochemical, and dairy products are in demand in the Pakistani market, and light industrial goods and food products supplied from Pakistan are in demand in Belarus.

Eight migrants drown off Greek island

ATHENS: Greece's coastguard has found the bodies of eight migrants — six men and two women — who drowned off the island of Samos, authorities said on Monday, in the second migrant shipwreck in the Aegean Sea this month.

Greek police found a further 36 people alive in the northern part of Samos, while three people, trapped in a rocky area of the island, were rescued by coast guard officers, the coast guard said. Aircraft and vessels assisted a search and rescue operation, it added.

According to a coastguard official, authorities were alerted to the incident by a non-governmental organization and estimate that about 50 people had been on board the vessel that brought them off Samos.

Greece, in the southeast corner of the European Union, has long been a favoured gateway to Europe for migrants and refugees from the Middle East, Africa and Asia.

More than one million crossed from Turkey or Greece's neighbouring eastern islands in 2015-2016. Many have drowned while attempting the perilous journey on flimsy boats.

The number of arrivals later dropped before surging again last year. Greek Shipping Minister Christos Stylianidis said Greece's priority was to put an end to human trafficking networks which were getting profits above the lives of innocent people.

"I want to express my deep sorrow for the loss of eight people, among them six young children," he said in a statement. "We will tackle the great problem of illegal immigration which has exceeded the limits of endurance of the European Union." Four migrants died on Nov 6 after a boat sank off the island of Rhodes.

So far this year, about 54,000 migrants have reached Greece, the second largest number in southern Europe behind Italy. The vast majority of them arrived by sea, according to data from the United Nations refugee agency UNHCR.—Reuters

Japan to bring home WWII dead from Bangladesh

DHAKA: Japanese officials in Bangladesh are preparing the bodies of 23 soldiers who died during World War II to return them home after more than 80 years, exhumation teams said on Monday.

The bodies were exhumed from Bangladesh's Maymyo War cemetery, near Comilla, where more than 200 people from multiple nations killed during the war were buried.

"Japanese soldiers were treated at the Maymyo field hospital, before returning to their injuries," said Hitoshi Saito, Bangladesh country manager.

Japan's government says it seeks to return remains of Japanese war dead, especially from regions that saw heavy fighting during the war — including the Philippines, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Indonesia, Thailand and Myanmar.—AFP

Moscow assures Taliban of removal from negative list

Kabul assured of restoring Afghanistan's observer status in SCO

KABUL: Top Russian security official Sergei Shugay visited Afghan government officials on Monday, assuring them Moscow will soon remove the Taliban from its list of banned organisations, Kabul said.

The Russian delegation's visit coincided with ongoing diplomatic efforts by China and Iran. Special envoys from those nations are currently in Kabul, marking a rare political gathering of representatives from three US-coded countries Donald Trump's recent election victory.

Shugay, the secretary of Russia's Security Council, met an Afghan cohort in Kabul headed by Deputy Prime Minister for Economic Affairs Abdul Ghani Baradar.

He "expressed Russia's interest in increasing the level of bilateral cooperation with Afghanistan," Baradar's office said in a statement released on social media site X.

He also announced that, to expand political and economic relations between the two countries, the Islamic Emirate's name would soon be removed from Russia's blacklist.

The Islamic Emirate is the name the

Taliban government uses to refer to itself.

Analysts say Moscow may be using cooperation with Kabul to counter the threat from Islamic State Khorasan (IS-K) — the Afghan-based branch of the militant group.

In March, more than 140 people were killed when IS-K, government besieged a Moscow-supported fort. Taliban authorities have reportedly said security in their top destination priority and have pledged militarily stalling foreign attacks will be ousted from Afghanistan.

"The Taliban certainly are our allies in the fight against terrorism," Russia's ambassador to Afghanistan, Dmitry Kuznetsov, said July. "They are working to eradicate terrorist cells."

Areas of interest

The visit highlighted potential areas of collaboration, including trade, transit, and investment, according to statements from the Taliban.

The discussions covered a range of topics, including political relations, economic partnerships, and Russian investment in sectors such as mining, transportation, and agriculture. Shugay also emphasised Russia's support for the AfghanTrans project, which seeks to boost Afghanistan's role in regional connectivity.

Baradar, for his part, highlighted the Taliban's commitment to banning narcotics cultivation and eliminating security threats in Afghanistan and the region. "We are working to create opportunities for Afghanistan to export in the region and beyond," Baradar said, emphasising Afghanistan's desire to play a key role in strengthening the North-South economic corridor.

Shanghai Cooperation Organisation

In a separate meeting with Abdul Karim, the Taliban's Political Deputy Chief Minister, Shugay raised Russia's intention to restore Afghanistan's observer status in the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) under Taliban leadership. Russian officials, including Special Envoy for Afghanistan Zamir Kabulov, also participated in the talks alongside Taliban intelligence director Abdul Haq Wasiqi.

China's Special Envoy Yu Xiaoyoung met with Taliban Foreign Minister Asir Khan Muttahid earlier this week to express China's interest in economic cooperation. Russia and China have yet to disclose full details of their meetings, but analysts suggest these engagements reflect a coordinated effort by the three nations to address shared concerns over Afghanistan's stability and limit US influence in the region.—Agencies

One killed as DHL plane crashes near Lithuanian capital

VILNIUS: A DHL cargo plane crashed on Monday near the Lithuanian capital's airport, killing one crew member, but authorities stopped short of linking the tragedy to a recent series of sabotage cases.

Lithuanian officials have in past weeks probing alleged acts of incendiary devices being planted on cargo planes.

The plane, which had arrived from the German city of Leipzig, crashed about one kilometer (0.6 miles) from Vilnius airport, hitting six several buildings as it skidded several hundred metres, according to the police and the DHL company. Images from the crash site showed debris from the plane and packages on fire scattered across a residential area cordoned off by the emergency services.

"So far, there are no signs or evidence suggesting this was sabotage or a terrorist act," Defense Minister Lithuania Linas Linkevicius told reporters, adding the probe to establish the cause could take "about a week".

"We cannot rule out the case of terrorism. We have learned that such things are possible, we see an increasingly aggressive Russia... but we cannot make any attributions at point fingers yet," State Security Department chief Darius Jurauskis said.—AFP

Philippine VP labelled 'mastermind' of assassination plot

MANILA: The Philippines justice department on Monday labelled Vice President Sara Duterte the "mastermind" of a plot to assassinate the country's president, giving her five days to respond to a subpoena.

Duterte is being asked to explain herself in the wake of a following weekend press conference where she said she had instructed that President Ferdinand

Marcos be killed should an alleged plot to kill her succeed.

"The government is taking action to protect our duly elected presidents," Justice Undersecretary Jesus Andrade said at a Monday press briefing.

"The premeditated plot to assassinate the president as declared by the self-proclaimed mastermind will now face legal consequences." Speaking to reporters

earlier, Duterte said she planned to respond to the subpoena. "I will gladly answer the questions they want to ask, but they must answer my questions as well," she said.

"We'll just talk then when I get the subpoena." In his first public comments on the matter, Marcos earlier in the day vowed to "fight back in the face of a threat he called "disturbing".

The Marcos-Duterte alliance that swept to power in 2012 has collapsed spectacularly in the lead-up to next year's mid-term elections, with both sides trading allegations of drug addiction.

Duterte, who is facing potential impeachment hearings, told reporters that she herself was the subject of an assassination plot and had instructed that Marcos be killed should it succeed.—AFP

Bestselling *Woman of Substance* author Barbara Taylor dies at 91

LONDON: Bestselling British-American writer Barbara Taylor Bradford, whose debut novel, *A Woman of Substance*, turned her into an overnight success and sold over 30 million copies, has died aged 91, a spokeswoman said on Monday.

Taylor Bradford, who wrote 40 novels and matched up to \$1 billion book sales worldwide during her career, died peacefully at her home in Scotland following a short illness.

She "was surrounded by loved ones to the very

end", the spokeswoman said, adding that a private funeral would be held in New York.

A Woman of Substance tells the story of waitress Emma Harte who overcomes a terrible start in Taylor Bradford's native Yorkshire in northern England to build a business empire, navigating numerous personal challenges along the way.

Many of her subsequent novels are also set in Yorkshire and follow a similar rags-to-riches theme, ending her own story of success against

the odds, powered by grit and hard work.

"What I really wanted

to do was to write about a very strong woman, because I'm strong," she said in an interview in 1983.

"That doesn't mean I'm tough or hard but I have the strength to meet adversity, not to give in," she said, adding that she wrote 12 hours a day, seven days a week. Her most recent novel, *The Wonder of It All*, was published last year.

Born in Leeds in north-

ern England in May 1933,

Taylor Bradford began her working life aged 15 as a typist for her local newspaper, *The Yorkshire*

Evening Post before becoming a reporter.

She moved to London aged 20 where she continued working as a journalist while slapping her toe into the world of fiction.

She started and abandoned several novels before striking gold with *A Woman of Substance*, which was an instant success when it was published in 1979.

Bookshelves

The novel spent 45 weeks on the New York Times bestseller list. It was turned into a double

Emmy-nominated miniseries in 1985 and starred Liam Neeson with British actor Jenny Seagrove in the role of Emma Harte.

Seagrove paid tribute to "a dear friend" and "a powerhouse of glamour and warmth".

"Barbara never diluted her warmth and humour or her ability to relate to everyone she met, whether a character or a princess. She never, ever forgot that she was just a girl from Yorkshire that worked hard and made good," she said.

Taylor Bradford was honoured in 2007 by the

Queen Elizabeth II who made her an OBE (Officer of the Order of the British Empire) for services to literature.

She had lived in the United States since 1964 following her marriage the previous year to American film producer Robert Bradford. The couple were married for 25 years until his death in 2005.

Taylor Bradford's spokesman said she would be buried alongside her late husband at Westchester Hills Cemetery, north of New York City.—AFP

Romania braces for parliament vote after far right's poll upset

BUCHAREST: A far-right, pro-Russian candidate took a surprise lead on Monday in Romania's presidential election, bolstering his party's hopes for a parliamentary vote this week that could either be a strategic shift for the east European NATO member.

Călin Popescu took pole position with 23% after the first round of voting on Sunday, a political earthquake in the country of 19 million people that has so far resisted nationalist appeals that have gained traction in neighbouring countries.

His victory and the second-place showing by Elena Iancu, a centrist mayor, ended the hopes of Prime Minister Marcel Ciolacu to compete for the presidency in the second-round run-off on Dec 8.

Iancu scored 19.1%, ahead of the 19.05 won by Cioloș, who told reporters that his Social Democratic Party (PSD) "won't challenge" the narrow result, and announced his resignation as party leader.


Experts say the far right's surprise success could profoundly affect the parliamentary elections later this week, by making it difficult to form a viable coalition government.

Extreme forces and Iancu's centre-right party now have "wind in their sails", sociologist Gheorghe Dumitrescu said, though "it remains to be seen if they know how to capitalise" on it.

Popescu's standing surged ahead of the vote with a viral TikTok campaign calling for an end to aid for Ukraine, which shares a 650-kilometre (400-mile) border with Romania.

He has also sounded a sceptical note on Romania's Nato membership, a key issue as the defense alliance面对Kyiv in its fight against Russia's invasion launched in 2022.

"Tonight, the Romanian people cried

out for peace. And they shouted very loudly, extremely loudly," Popescu said.

"The far right is by far the big winner of this election," political scientist Cristian Păcuraru told AFP of the result that sent shock waves across the country. Maria Cris, 79, said she was surprised by Popescu's lead in the first round but had been impressed after watching his TikTok video.

"He seems a man of integrity, serious and patriotic. He inspires seriousness. I think only someone like him can bring change," said the pensioner, who shunned the ballot box and said she was planning to vote for Popescu in the second round. Alex Tudose, the owner of a construction company, was gleeful.—AFP

Three Uzbeks held in UAE over Israeli rabbi's murder

JERUSALEM: Emirati authorities said on Monday three suspects from Uzbekistan were in custody over the murder of a rabbi, a rare violent incident involving an Israeli citizen in the UAE, as his body was flown to Israel for burial.

The United Arab Emirates signed a peace agreement with Israel in 2020 under the US-brokered Abraham Accords.

Tzvi Kogan's death was a blow to the tiny Jewish and Israeli community in the UAE, which has kept a lower profile since the outbreak of the conflict in Gaza in October 2023.

The 28-year-old UAE-based rabbi was found dead by security services last week. The three suspects were arrested on Sunday, and after "preliminary investigations" the interior ministry identified them in a statement.

"The authorities revealed the identities of the three perpetrators, all of whom are Uzbek nationals," said the statement published by the official WAM news agency.

It named them as Oliband Tukhshevich, 28, Makhmudjon Alibekovich, 28, and Azizbek Karimovich, 33.

The ministry said authorities were taking "the necessary actions to uncover the details, circumstances and motives of the crime".

Kogan was in the UAE as a representative of the Chabad Hasidic movement, which is known for its outreach efforts worldwide.

A spokesman for Israel's airport authority confirmed that his body had been flown home. Kogan's funeral will take place on the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem's eastern part of the city on Monday.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu condemned "the murder of an Israeli citizen and a Chabad emissary", calling it "an abhorrent anti-Semitic terrorist attack".

In Washington, the White House urged accountability for the "heinous crime".

Neither Israeli nor Emirati officials provided any details about the circumstances of Kogan's murder.

In 2023, also year Israel normalised relations with the UAE, Bahrain and Morocco, Kogan joined his older brother Reuven and his wife in Dubai in the UAE, according to the Chabad Lubavitch movement.

Chabad said on its website Kogan had married a kosher supermarket in Dubai, while a photographer said he was elated on Monday with windows blinds down.

There is no figure for the number of Jews in the UAE, but an Israeli official said there were about 2,000 Israelis in the Gulf country, with the Jewish community estimated to be up to twice that figure.

UAE presidential adviser Awwad Gangash insisted Sunday the country remained "a society of tolerance and coexistence", in a post on social media platform X that made no direct reference to Kogan.—AFP

Prosecutors ask judge to dismiss subversion case against Trump

WASHINGTON: US prosecutors on Monday asked a US judge to drop the criminal case accusing president-elect Donald Trump of seeking to overturn his 2020 election defeat, citing his impending return to the press denuoy following his successful 2024 campaign.

Prosecutors, working with Special Counsel Jack Smith, cited a longstanding US Justice Department policy that sitting presidents should not face criminal prosecution.

The move represents a remarkable shift from the special prosecutor who obtained indictments against Trump in two separate cases accusing him of crimes that threatened US election integrity and national security.

It comes less than a week after Trump's election victory over Democratic Vice President Kamala Harris was not just a political triumph, but also a legal one.

Trump pleaded not guilty in August 2023 to four federal charges accusing the Republican of conspiring to obstruct the election and certification of votes following his 2020 defeat to Democrat Joe Biden.

Trump, who as pres-

BEIRUT: Israel-based Hezbollah's Beirut stronghold on Monday saw battles rage in Lebanon's south after the group claimed 50 attacks on Israeli targets the day before.

The Israeli military said Hezbollah fired 250 projectiles into Israel on Sunday, part of a wave of attacks the militants had had targeted areas including the Ashdod naval base in southern Israel and military areas near Tel Aviv.

The military said on Monday that it had "conducted intelligence-based strikes on several Hezbollah command centres" in Beirut's southern suburbs, which Israel has repeatedly bombed since it launched air strikes on Sept. 30.

The military later reported having carried out attacks on 25 Hezbollah targets across the country in the span of an hour. "Among the targets struck were the Executive Council's command centre, and intelligence control and collection centres, where Hezbollah commanders and operatives were located," the army said in a statement.

The strikes took place in Nahiyiyeh, Baabda, the Bekaa Valley, southern Beirut and the city's suburbs, it said. The strikes came after a spate of heavy air raids in and around the capital's south.

Lebanon's education ministry suspended classes on Monday at schools, technical institutes and private higher education institutions in Beirut and a number of sur-

rounding areas, citing "the current dangerous conditions".

Israeli ground forces have also entered several villages and towns near Lebanon's southern border, including Khiam, where Lebanese official media on Monday reported clashes with Hezbollah fighters.

In the southern district of Tripoli, the Lebanese health ministry reported at least 12 people killed in a pair of Israeli attacks, one on a road near the city of the same name, and another in the nearby town of Maalaka.

Window of opportunity?

The escalation came as the United States, European Union and United Nations pushed for a truce in a war that Lebanon says has killed at least 3,754 people in the country since October 2023, most of them in the last two months.

On Monday a senior UN official urged: "The parties to accept a ceasefire" in Lebanon.

In Beirut on Sunday, top EU diplomat Josep Borrell called for an immediate ceasefire, after US envoy Amit Shafrazi said last week that a deal was "within our grasp".

Joan-Noel Barro, the Foreign minister of France — which along with the United States has spearheaded the efforts towards a truce — called on Israel and Lebanon on Sunday to seize a "window of opportunity" to negotiate an end to the fighting.

The UN envoy site Avi Mizrahi reported that the parties were close to a deal that would involve a 48-day truce period in which the Israeli army would pull back; the Lebanese army would redeploy near the border and Hezbollah would withdraw its heavy weapons north of the Litani River.

The draft agreement also provides for the establishment of a US-led committee to oversee implementation, as well as US assurances that Israel can take action against imminent threats if the Lebanese military does not, according to Avi Mizrahi.

Israeli media also reported that Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was likely to endorse a US ceasefire proposal.

Asked in New York whether Israel had accepted a ceasefire agreement, the country's ambassador to the US, Danny Danon, said: "We are moving forward on this front."

He said he assumed "that the cabinet will meet today or tomorrow to discuss it". The war in Lebanon followed nearly a year of limited exchanges of cross-border fire initiated by Hezbollah in support of its ally Hamas.

Pessimistic about a deal

One displaced resident of Shatila, an Israeli town near the Lebanese border, said she did not want to see a truce that would allow Hezbollah to regroup. "I don't want a ceasefire, because if they do it along the lines that they've announced, we'll be in the same place in five years," said 23-year-old teacher Dorit Sisay.

"I am very pessimistic about this agreement... The only thing I want is for my daughter to sleep well at night, without (rocket) alerts, and for her not to be afraid of anything," Israel's Foreign Minister Yair Lapid Ben Gvir warned, adding a ceasefire deal in Lebanon would be a "historical missed opportunity" to eradicate Hezbollah.

"I understand all the constraints and reasons, and still it is a grave mistake," he wrote on X.—AFP

G7 ministers discuss ceasefire efforts in Mideast

PRAGUE: Indian Foreign Minister Antonio Tajani said on Monday he was "optimistic" for a cessation of hostilities in Lebanon, as Middle East tensions dominated a G7 meeting near Prague.

Trump's lawyers had previously said they would seek to dismiss the charge based on a US Supreme Court ruling in July that former presidents have broad immunity from prosecution over official actions taken while in the White House.

"Looking forward to our discussions during this important visit," Sharif posted on X, formerly Twitter, after receiving Lukashenko.

Focus on trade and cooperation

The two leaders are set to discuss various areas of collaboration, par-

ticularly trade and investment. According to the Belarusian presidency, the discussions will prioritise practical steps to develop trade and economic ties and explore new areas of cooperation.

The two sides aim to devise a joint action plan to enhance bilateral engagement. Trade between Belarus and Pakistan totalled approximately \$50 million in 2023, a figure both countries agree is far below the potential.

In addition to bilateral issues, the leaders will exchange views on regional and global security and explore avenues for cooperation at multilateral forums. Multiple agreements and ministerial outcome documents are expected to be signed during the visit.

Foreign ministers prepare agenda

Earlier in the day, Foreign Minister Shahzad Dar met his Belarusian counterpart, Maxim Rybachuk, to finalise the agenda for Mr Lukashenko's visit.

17 missing after tourist boat capsizes in Egypt

Cairo: Egyptian

authorities said 17 people including foreigners were missing after a tourist yacht capsized off the country's Red Sea coast on Monday, with 28 others rescued.

The vessel, which was carrying 21 tourists of various nationalities and a 14-member crew, sent out a distress call at 5.03am (0300 GMT), said a statement from Egypt's Red Sea governorate.

A tally confirmed that tourists involved in the incident include nationals from Britain, China, Finland, Poland and Spain.

The "Sea Star"

embarked on Sunday on a multi-day diving trip from Port Ghalib near Marsa Alam in the southeast, and had been due to dock on Friday at the town of El Quseir, 200 kilometres (124 miles) north.

According to a manager of a diving resort close to the rescue operation, one surviving crew member said they were "hit by a wave in the middle of the night, throwing the vessel on its side".

Authorities in the Red Sea capital of Hurghada on Sunday shot down marine activities and the city's port due to "bad weather conditions". But winds around Marsa Alam had remained favourable until Sunday night, the diving manager said, before picking again by morning.

By Monday afternoon, it became increasingly

"unlikely that the 17 missing would be rescued after 12 hours in the water," he said, requesting anonymity because he was not authorised to speak to the media.

The Marsa Alam area saw at least two similar boat accidents earlier this year but there were no fatalities. The Red Sea coast is a major tourist destination in Egypt, a country of 105 million that is in the grip of a serious economic crisis. Nationally, the tourism sector employs two million people and generates more than 10 percent of GDP.

Dozens of dive boats criss-cross between coral reefs and islands off Egypt's eastern coast every day, where safety regulations are robust but unevenly enforced.—AFP

Countries remain divided on UN plastics treaty

BONN: As delegates from 175 countries gathered in Bonn, South Korea, on Monday for the fifth round of talks aimed at securing an international treaty to curb plastic pollution, diverging divisions cast doubts on whether a final agreement is in sight.

South Korea is hosting the fifth and ostensibly final UN Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee (INC-5) meeting this week, where the previous round of talks in Ottawa in April ended without a path forward on curbing plastic production.

Instead, rules will be focused on chemicals of concern besides other measures, after petrochemical-producing nations such as Saudi Arabia and China strongly opposed efforts to target plastic production over the protests of countries that bear the brunt of plastic pollution.

The divisions plaguing plastic treaty negotiations continue that have long stalled UN efforts to curb global warming, with the most recent climate summit, COP25, having just ended with an agreement that passed unnoticed as toothless.

"Without significant intervention the amount of plastic entering the environment annually by 2040 is expected to nearly double compared to 2022," INC Chair Luis Viana Valdivieso said at the opening session in Bonn on Monday.

"It is about humanity rising to meet an existential challenge," he said, noting that microplastics have been found in human organs.

The United States raised eyebrows in August when it said it would ban plastic production caps in the breath-taking it alignment with the EU, Korea, Peru and other countries in the High Ambition Coalition.

Donald Trump's administration, however, has raised questions about that position, unclear its first presidency has honoured suchilateral agreements and any commitments to do or stop US oil and petrochemical production.

The US delegation did not answer questions on whether it would reverse its new position on proposed plastic production caps, but it "supports ensuring that the global environment addresses plastic products, chemicals used in plastic products, and the supply of primary plastic polymers," according to a spokesperson for the White House Council on Environmental Quality.

UN Environment Programme executive director Inger Andersen said she was confident the talks would end with an agreement, pointing to the commitment from the G20 nations at last week's summit calling for a legally binding treaty by the year-end.

For a Pacific island country like Fiji, a global plastics treaty is crucial to protect its fragile ecosystems and public health, said Nivisha Michael, Fiji's climate negotiator and chief climate and plastic negotiator.—Reuters

Agha to head constitutional bench of SHC

In absence of both PTI members Omar Ayub and Shibli Faraz, JCP in a majority decision okayed nine-judge bench

ISLAMABAD: The third meeting of the Judicial Commission of Pakistan (JCP) on Monday nominated by majority Justice Mohammad Karim Khan Agha to head the nine-judge constitutional bench of the Sindh High Court (SHC), established under the 20th Constitutional Amendment.

The meeting was held in the Supreme Court building, presided over by Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Yaqoob Afzal, who is also the chairman of JCP, to consider a single point agreed on the formation of constitutional benches.

Other members of the Sindh High Court constitutional bench nominated were Justice Sallim Jasseer, Justice Omar Shah, Justice Yousaf Ali Sayeed, Justice Abdul Majeed Baloch, Justice Zaffar Ali Saqib, Justice Ms Samra Akram Mirza, Justice Khadija Hussain Soomro and Justice Arshad Ali Bakro.

The decision to set up the nine-judge constitutional bench of SHC was made with a majority of 11 to four. Both members of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) Omar Ayub, who is also Leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly as well as Leader of the House in the Senate, Shibli Faraz, could not make it to the meeting. The meeting even waited for the two members for two hours but since their mobile phones were switched off, the JCP decided to commence the proceedings.

The present meeting was expected after two weeks (Nov 25) to nominate judges of the Sindh High Court to become members of the constitutional bench in the high court.

The Monday's meeting was held in line with another resolution approved by the Sindh Assembly for the formation of the constitutional bench in the province with simple majority under Article 202-A of the newly passed 20th Amendment.

The meeting was attended by Justice Saeed Manzoor Ali Shah, Justice Mansoor Akbar, via video link, Justice Amna ul-Din Khan and Justice Jassal Khan Mianwali, Chief Justice of SHC Muhammad Shahid Nadeem, senior puisne judge of SHC Justice Nauman ul-Haq, Federal Law Minister Aslam Naqeeb Tarar, Attorney General for Pakistan (AGP), Senator Usman Aslam, Senator Farooq Hamid Naik, Shehbaz Afridi Ahmed, Member of the

National Assembly, Ms Bushra Khurshid Barocha, Ninth Law Minister Zia ul Hassan Laiyer, Senior member of Pakistan Bar Council (PBC) Akhtar Hussain and Sindh Bar Council member Qurban Ali Madani.

Justice Mansoor Ali Shah and Justice Mansoor Akbar, however, deferred whereas CJP chose to abstain from voting.

According to the public announcement, JCP, after an extensive and thoughtful exchange of views, considered the formation of the constitutional benches in the SHC and approved nine judges with a majority of 11 to four. The constitutional bench will function for two months.

Justice S.K. Agha has done LLB (Hons) from the Birmingham University (UK) and had passed the Law Society Solicitors Finals Examination from Guildford College of Law.

Justice Agha commenced his legal career in 1987 at London law firm Cameron Mackay as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of England and Wales. His main practice areas were investment property and secured lending.

On his return to Pakistan Justice Agha was enrolled as an advocate of SHC and entered private practice with his main practice areas being banking, finance and criminal law and served for a brief period as the country's legal counsel for Citibank NA Pakistan. He was later called to the Bar from Lincoln Inn, London.

Justice Agha was also appointed as a prosecutor at the United Nations (UN) International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) based in The Hague.

Whilst at the ICTY the judge was involved in some notable prosecutions for war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide during the 1990s Balkans conflict including the prosecution of the former President of Serbia Slobodan Milošević.

At The Hague, Justice Agha also graduated from the Leiden University with an LL.M. in Public International Law, with Specialization in International Criminal law.

After serving at the ICTY his leadership was appointed to the UN-backed Special Court for Sierra Leone to lead the prosecution of the Armed Forces Revolutionary Council (AFRC) for war crimes and crimes against humanity during their overthrow of the then Sierra Leonean government.

Justice Agha was later appointed a senior Appeals Counsel in the African and Civil Defense Force (ACDF) appeals and assisted in drafting the indictment of Charles Taylor the former President of Liberia who was later convicted of war crimes and crimes against humanity.

Life comes to standstill across Balochistan amid strike

Protesters seek child's recovery as schools, colleges stay shut; courts, roads remain deserted

QUETTA: Rail and road traffic in Balochistan remained suspended for hours on Monday as a complete wheel-jam strike was observed across the province on a joint call of political parties, traders and civil society against the abduction of a 10-year-old schoolboy.

All government and private schools, colleges and universities in Quetta and other parts of the province remained closed, while several cases including the one pertaining to student's abduction scheduled for the day could not be heard in the Balochistan High Court due to the absence of judges.

In Quetta, the provincial president of Pakistan Awami Tehreek (PAT), Murtaza Zareen, along with leaders of the multi-party alliance, representatives of the business community had announced last week that a strike would be observed across the province to press the authorities for immediate and safe recovery of the child.

All roads and highways linking

Balochistan with Sindh, Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa provinces were blocked on Monday as protesters placed barricades and

enforcement agencies, for their failure in safe recovery of the child despite the passage of 10 days.

While talking to reporters outside the provincial assembly building, chief Minister Mufti Maroof Bagh, however, claimed that the government and its forces were using all available resources for the early recovery of the last-stopped student. He expressed regret over the kidnapping.

The 10-year-old son of a jeweller was kidnapped and has not yet been found in a van. Arrested men had occupied the vehicle near his home in the Parel Bagh area and abandoned him on Nov 15.

In response to the protest call, transporters did not ply buses, coaches, goods trucks and other vehicles on roads across Balochistan. In Quetta, too, a wheel-jam strike was observed as vehicles remained off road throughout the day. There was no traffic outside the city outskirts.

Also, the Quetta-Chaman pas-

senger train was cancelled by the railway authorities. "There was no train service between Quetta and border town Chaman due to wheel jam strike," a senior railway official said.

However, no untoward incident was reported from any area during the province-wide protest, as strict security arrangements were made by the authorities in Quetta and other areas, with deployment of heavy contingents of police, levies and Frontier Corps.

Debate on Adani scam, violence stalled in Indian parliament

NEW DELHI: The stage was set on Monday for a clash between India's ruling coalition and the opposition over corruption charges the US Department of Justice has brought against businessman Gautam Adani, considered a close associate of Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The first day of the winter session of parliament saw both houses laying adjourned over demands for a discussion on the politically explosive case as well as on the deadly violence in Manipur and Nagaland.

Jagdeep Dhankar, chairman of the Rajya Sabha, received 13 notices from opposition MPs to raise the issue of "alleged corruption, bribery and financial irregularities of the Adani Group".

Some members also submitted notices calling for a discussion on the violence in Nagaland, Manipur and the Jammu-and-Kashmir areas of Jammu and Kashmir.

Dhankar, however, rejected the notices saying, "These notices do not conform to the directions imparted by the chair on this subject. I have not been able to persuade myself to agree to the same."

Proceedings were then

adjusted for 15 minutes and then for the remainder of the day. The House will recover on Wednesday.

Speaker of the Lok Sabha, Om Birla, began the proceedings by reading out obituary references. The House observed a minute's silence to pay respects to the deceased.

However, an opposition MP asked for a discussion on the US indictment involving Indian tycoon Gautam Adani. Birla announced that the House was adjourned till 12pm. When pro-

ceedings resumed, opposition reiterated their demand that was rejected by Sarathya Ray who was occupying the chair at the time. The Lok Sabha will reconvene on Wednesday, 1pm.

Last week, the US Department of Justice (DoJ) and the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) accused Adani of running a \$265 million bribery scheme from 2019 to 2024 to secure solar energy contracts in India, projected to yield \$2 billion in profits over 20 years.

"As alleged, the defendants orchestrated an elaborate scheme to bribe Indian government officials to secure contracts worth billions of dollars and Gautam S. Adani, Nagar H. Adani and Vincent S. Jainis lied about the bribery scheme as they sought to raise capital from US and international investors," said Steven Pease, the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of New York.

Adani, who heads the Adani Group, and Nagar H. Adani, believed for their roles in agreeing terms of Adani Green Energy Ltd.

Reports said, meanwhile, that a US agency was re-examining its decision to lend over \$550 million to a Sri Lankan port project backed by the Adani Group. The US International Development Finance Corp had agreed to provide \$553m in financing for the port terminal project in Colombo, Sri Lanka, last November. The project is partly owned by the Adani Group.

Reports quoted an official from the agency as stating that they are "actively assessing the ramifications" of the allegations and are committed to ensuring their projects and partners maintain high standards of integrity and compliance.

Reports said no funds have been disbursed under the loan commitment yet.

1. Pakistan Tea Association respectfully disagrees the enforcement of MRP at a flat rate of Rs. 1,200/- per kg for further sales tax and withholding tax via EDRO 1.73/01/2024 dated 01.11.2024.
2. Imported tea weighing 5 kgs and above be treated as raw material which is further blended, mixed and packed.
3. Under serial No. 14, 3rd Schedule of Sales Tax Act 1990, an 18% sales tax is being applied based on the imported tea.
4. The imposition of a flat rate per kg will have severe negative consequences for a large portion of the tea trade. This could result in reduced business activity and ultimately lead to a loss of revenue for the national exchequer via reducing several exemptions.
5. Fixing the MRP at the rate per kg will affect the lowest earning brackets (Pakistan urban as well as rural) equally to higher earning brackets, which will put more burden on lower and lower middle classes and will be a disastrous situation.
6. The fact that consumption doesn't vary means that tea taxes offer by socio-economic classes, location and tea variants, otherwise how can a lower earning bracket consume equally to upper earning brackets, gives difference of income?
7. Moreover it is a fact that tea is a part of our daily diet and is a staple food item and not a drink, and for poor segment tea is all with milk, and bread, three times a day. Most of our population in rural as well as urban areas consume tea as per their earning. MRP will give incentives to unscrupulous elements to exploit the situation and thus import of low priced tea will find its way thru illegal channels.
8. Most importantly we urge government to do away all exemption FATA/PATA, No Import / EPIS, remission of DPF/PDF facilities etc. which will pave way for rationality to get its previous revenue. One woman or girl killed every 10 minutes by relative

UN report says 85,000 women, girls killed intentionally in 2023

IRANIAHABAD: Globally, 85,000 women and girls were killed intentionally in 2023, 69 per cent of these homicides — 59,000 — were committed by an intimate partner or other family member, while 149 women and girls die every day at the hands of their partner or close relative, which means one woman or girl is killed every 10 minutes, reveals a report on femicides released on Monday.

The report, "Femicide in 2023: Global Estimates of Intimate Partner/Family Member Femicides" jointly produced by UN Women and UN Office for Drug and Crime, was released to mark the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, observed on Monday.

According to the report, a vast majority of intentional killings of women and girls worldwide are perpetrated by intimate partners or other family members. This suggests that the

home remains the most dangerous place for women and girls in terms of the risk of lethal victimisation. Women and girls everywhere continue to be affected by this extreme form of gender-based violence and no region is excluded.

With an estimated 23,700 victims of intimate partner/family member femicide in 2023, Africa is the region with the highest number of victims in aggregate terms. Moreover, Africa continues to account for the highest number of victims of intimate partner/family member femicide relative to the size of its population. The Americas and Oceania also recorded high rates of intimate partner/family member femicide in 2023, at 1.6 and 1.5 per 100,000 respectively, while the rates were significantly lower in Asia and Europe, at 0.8 and 0.6 per 100,000, respectively.

The intentional killing of women in the private sphere in Europe and in the Americas is largely committed by intimate partners. Out of all women killed by intimate partners or other family members in those two regions in 2023, 51pc were murdered by their intimate partners in Europe and 59pc in the Americas.

Over the past two decades, the number of

countries reporting data on the killing of women and girls by intimate partners or other family members increased slowly. The number peaked in 2020 at 75 countries, but subsequently decreased and by 2023 was half the number in 2020. Furthermore, at present only a few countries are able to produce data on forms of femicide committed outside the domestic sphere in compliance with the UNODC-UN Women Statistical Framework for measuring gender-related killings.

Even though men and boys account for the vast majority of homicide victims, women and girls continue to be disproportionately affected by lethal violence in the private sphere. An estimated 85pc of all homicide victims in 2023 were women while 20pc were men, but lethal violence within the family takes a much higher toll on women than men, with almost 60pc of all women who were intentionally killed in 2023 being victims of intimate partner/family member femicide.

Violence in the family sphere can target both sexes but just 52pc of all male homicides in 2023, by contrast, were attributed to intimate partners or other family members.

Israel steps up strikes; four more killed

Cairo: Heavy rains flooded tent encampments of displaced Palestinians across the Gaza Strip on Monday, adding seasonal winter misery to a condition already devastated during the past 11 months, as Israeli forces stepped up strikes in the enclave.

Overnight, overnight inundated tents and in some places washed away the plastic and cloth shelters used by displaced Gazans, most of whom have been uprooted several times during the conflict between Israel and

settled earth — even to make a living for her children, but rainwater spoiled the floor and damaged the area, threatening to put her out of work. "The dough drowned in water, and many families drowned in water. It was raining on top of me,"

Muslims said seven Palestinians were killed by two Israeli air strikes in the area of Jaba.

Israeli attacks in Gaza last killed more than 44,000 people, mostly civilians, and displaced nearly the entire population of the enclave.—Reuters

Mbappe on target as Real cruise to Leganes win

LEGANES: Kylian Mbappe ended his goal drought with a close-range strike and midfielder Jude Bellingham scored a header as Real Madrid thrashed Leganes 3-0 on Sunday.

With a game in hand, Real are second in the standings on 30 points, one behind Barcelona.

Mbappe latched on to Vinicius Jr's through ball and forced the run after 10 minutes, but his celebration was short-lived as the goal was ruled out for offside.

Mbappe was goalless in his last four games in all competitions, his last goal coming in a win over Celta Vigo last month.

However, the former Paris St Germain striker netted his seventh league goal of the campaign after combining again with Vinicius to give Real the lead two minutes before the break following a Leganes defensive error that Bellingham capitalised on.

"We switched the position of the strikers a bit, with Mbappe on the outside and he did well," said coach Carlo Ancelotti after the match.

Real enjoyed most of the possession in the second half, giving goalkeeper Thibaut Courtois, back in the squad after a muscle injury, little to do.

Uruguayan midfielder Federico Valverde scored the second from a free kick with an unstoppable long-range effort after Bellingham had been foiled in the fifth minute.

The England international put the icing on the cake in the 85th minute when he headed home after the ball bounced off the crossbar.

"We were very comfortable in the first half, playing

"The game we wanted to, but (got conceded) after a penalty... furthermore, it got away from us because of our errors," admitted Leganes defender Sergio Canales. "The team gave everything, and with the smallest opportunity, they punished us."

VICTORY OUT OF LIVERPOOL CLASH

Real visit Premier League and Champions League leaders Liverpool on Wednesday, but will be without Vinicius, who sustained a leg muscle injury in the win at Leganes.

Spanish media reported the Brazilian winger is expected to miss almost a month, which would also keep him out of the Champions League visit to Atlanta on December 10, as well as Wednesday's match at Anfield.

Champions League holders Real have started their European campaign in shaky form, with two defeats in their opening four matches.

They lost 1-0 at Lille and 3-1 at Sociedad, but AC Milan in their last outing in the competition, leaving them 18th in the expanded group table and could be in trouble with a bad result at Anfield.—Agencies

Sampaoli beaten on Rennes debut

PARIS: Former Argentina boss Jorge Sampaoli began his Stade Rennais tenure with a 1-0 loss at Lille on Sunday, while riot police were deployed to stop an attempted pitch invasion by Rennes fans.

Rennes' players started right before half-time as Lille extended their unbeaten run to eight games to stay at point behind third-placed Olympique de Marseille.

Rennes' seldom threatened as they remained only one shot on target, and slid to a narrow defeat in 12 matches.

Sampaoli, a 2015 Copa America winner with Chile, is now tasked to lead Rennes in games against St Etienne, Nantes and Angers before the new year.

Nantes stamped to their fourth consecutive defeat as they lost 2-0 at home to Le Havre in a game interrupted after fans attempted to invade the pitch.

In stoppage time, disgruntled Nantes fans attempted to storm the pitch, but were stopped by riot police. Over half an hour later and after the fans were cleared from the stands, the final whistle was played.

Jean-Claude Kapoian opened the scoring for Le Havre in the third minute, with Steve Nzonzi doubling their lead in the 24th to secure all three points.

Without a win in nine games, Nantes sit 16th after 12 games, in relegation playoff spot.

Elsewhere, Angers maintained a 1-0 win over Angers while Nice came from behind to beat Strasbourg 2-1 in the late kick-off to move up a spot to fifth.—Agencies

China's Ding beats 'nervous' Gukesh in world chess opener

SINGAPORE: Defending champion Ding Liren of China on Monday ended a long wait since his last victory to beat teenage challenger Gukesh Dommaraju of India in the opening game of their World Chess Championship match.

Ding, 32, had not won a classical chess match since January and he appeared to be on the defensive early on against his opponent, who played with the white pieces, and took up a great deal of his time attempting to contemplate each move.

But he turned things around with a bold attack by his queen, and put 18-year-old Gukesh on the back foot and also left him facing time pressure.

Ding managed to press home his advantage in masterful fashion and, although Gukesh was able to defend the center, he eventually conceded the game after 42 moves in more than four hours of play.

"For sure I was nervous... it would be nice

printing if I said I wasn't nervous, I was surely nervous," Gukesh told reporters after the match.

"But after the game started, I calmed down... I think I was playing some good chess... and then I kind of flipped."

Ding, who took a nine-month break from chess last year due to personal difficulties and depression, said he had ample time to prepare for the match since his last classical game two months ago.

Playing the black pieces, Ding said he thought he was at a disadvantage.

"But then suddenly I found this idea... I'd be (able) to create counter-attacks on the square side, and I just moved the piece very quickly," he said in an after-match news conference.

The result ended a run of 28 classical games without a win for Ding, who had been winless since beating Dutchman Max

Wojciechowski in January.

Ding and Gukesh will face off for game two at Singapore's Resorts World Sentosa on Tuesday.

At his age, Gukesh is the youngest player in history to challenge for the World Championship and he will hope to surpass Gary Kasparov as the youngest undisputed world chess champion.

There are 14 match days and four rest days scheduled for the world chess crown.

The first player to get 7.5 points will be declared the winner with tiebreaks used if the players are tied on seven points.

The winner between Ding and Gukesh, who qualified by winning the Candidates tournament in April, will take home a prize fund of \$2.5 million. World number one Magnus Carlsen, who had been world champion since 2013, relinquished his title in 2022, citing a lack of motivation.—Agencies

Haider slams ton as Shaheens thrash Sri Lanka 'A'

ISLAMABAD: A sparkling century by Haider Ali and an all-round performance by Shoaib Malik powered Pakistan Shaheens to a comfortable 10-wicket victory over Sri Lanka 'A' in the first 50-over match here at the Islamabad Cricket Stadium on Monday.

Haider scored 108 and Abdul Samad contributed 56, helping Shaheens to an imposing 304-7 in their allotted 50 overs. Shaheen then followed up his 48-ball 42 by claiming 3-21, as Sri Lanka 'A' were bowled out for 198 in 31.6 overs.

Batting at number four, Haider faced 96 balls, striking eight fours and six sixes. He reached his half-century off 50 deliveries with two boundaries and three sixes, before accelerating to reach his century off 98 balls with seven fours and six sixes.

Haider added 120 runs from 119 balls for the fourth wicket with Samad, whose 63-ball knock included five fours and a six. Their partnership reduced Shaheens from a sticky position at 94-3 after being put into bat.

The Indians scored 461 in the first powerplay and capitulated on the fourth-wicket stand to accelerate late in the innings. They added 85 runs in the final 10 overs, with Mohammad Hameed hitting an unbeaten 36 and 25 balls (four fours and a six) and Mohammad Imran chipping in with a quickfire 15-all 10 balls (two fours).

For Sri Lanka 'A', Usman Malani was the standout bowler with figures of 3-61, while Chaitanya Wickramasinghe (2-52) and Dilshan Madushankar (2-62) also chipped in.

In reply, Sri Lanka 'A' struggled to build partnerships, slumping to 61-4 and later to 136-7 before being bowled out. Wickramasinghe top-scored with 47, while Sonal Dinesh (38) and Sahan Arachchige (35) provided some resistance.

Mohammed Imran junior picked up 2-30. Srijaekiran, Mohammad Imran, Ubad Shahzad, and Mohammad Moustaq each claimed one wicket to complete the comprehensive victory.

Sinner completes year to remember as Italy retain Davis Cup

MALAGA: Jannik Sinner completed his sensational year by leading Italy to a successful defence of the Davis Cup with victory over the Netherlands in the final on Sunday.

The world number one earned a 7-6 (7-5), 6-2 triumph against Tallon Griekspoor for the winning point after Marco Cecchinato had put the defending champions ahead with a convincing 6-4, 6-2 win against Botic van de Zandschulp.

Sinner ends 2024 with titles at the Australian Open, US Open and the ATP Finals.

"The whole team is amazing, we tried to defend our title and we have done it, so we're extremely happy... there's a lot of work behind it," said Sinner as Italy won the Davis Cup for a third time.

Italy became the first team to defend the title since the Czech Republic in 2013, and the Federation Cup was it, along with the Davis Cup in the same season.

Strong Italian support, along with an orange wall of Dutch fans, made for a fine atmosphere at the Martin Carpena arena, with the Netherlands in the final for the first time in 104 years of trying.

However, defeating Sinner this year has been right on impossible for most players, let alone with the pressure of carrying a nation's hopes on their shoulders.

Griekspoor, ranked 40th, has now lost all six meetings with Sinner but battled remarkably well, forcing

Sinner to save two early break points.

Serving to Griekspoor, Griekspoor twice held to love and hit two aces in the 12th game to force a tiebreak.

Sinner secured an early service break and another for a 5-2 lead, fitting down a 2-0 set to take the first set.

The Italian brought up and overcame his first break point of the match to take a 2-1 lead in the second set.

Griekspoor produced a backhand winner to drag his way back on serve but could not good work with a double fault that allowed Sinner to break again at 3-2 lead.

The game was up for the Dutch and Sinner broke again in the seventh game before sealing his triumph with his fourth match point with a serving serve. Griekspoor could not return.

"I had no other option than playing a high level match — if you want to have a chance against Jannik in this kind of tour, this kind of stage, this kind of confidence," said Griekspoor.

Jannik is very tough to beat, especially with the season he had, he deserves all of it."

Netherlands captain Paul Haarhuis was part of the last Dutch team to reach the semi-finals 22 years ago.

"I don't have a low relationship with second place, I have a hate relationship with second place," said Haarhuis. "I've though I'm probably proud of the guys, for now it feels [incredible]."

Bornstein edged the first set against Van de Zandschulp but his 6-3 win in the second and left the Dutchmen no

chance, winning in 76 minutes.

The world number 27, who came to support Italy as they ended a 47-year wait for the trophy in 2023 as he recovered from an ankle injury, was crucial in their Davis Cup defence.

The 28-year-old passed up with Sinner to help Italy triumph in a close decider against Argentina in the last eight, before selecting his semi-final singles partner against Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis.

"It feels unbelievable, it feels really great to be on court — if you win it's better, but being able to be here, here and enjoying this kind of atmosphere is the most important thing for me, because I missed that," said Bornstein.

"I definitely feel that my level never really left. When you're strong physically and mentally it's not easy to play poor football."

Van de Zandschulp, ranked 80th, became the last player to defeat Rafael Nadal before the Spanish superstar bowed into retirement earlier in the week.

However, he was blown away in the ninth game of the first set. The Italian opened up three break points and took the first to claim a 5-4 lead.

In the second set, Bornstein, who was Wimbledon runner-up in 2021, broke in the third game and again in the seventh. The Italian produced 10 forehand winners and 16 aces on his way to victory, peeling up Sinner to finish the tie.—AFP

Lukaku keeps Napoli on top with Roma winner

NAPLES: Romelu Lukaku ensured Napoli maintained their one-point lead at the top of Serie A with the only goal in Sunday's 1-0 win over his old club AS Roma.

It took 58 minutes for Napoli to break the deadlock, with Lukaku slotting in to meet Giovanni Simeone's low cross from close range and score against the team he played for the last season.

Napoli have 29 points after 13 matches, one point ahead of Atalanta, Inter Milan, Florence and Lazio who occupy second to fifth respectively — with Juventus four points behind the team in sixth in a crowded title race which is yet to offer up a clear favourite for the Scudetto.

It was a disappointing day for Roma manager Claudio Ranieri, who began his third stint in charge at the club with a 1-2 loss at the table with 13 points.

"When we arrive at the stadium, we can feel the way the fans react to us. We were today and we are happy," Lukaku told Sky Sport Italia. "I just want to do well for the team. We have a presence that we need to go through the league it would be tough because the other sides won but we got the result we wanted."

Napoli had an early chance to take the lead, but Khouma Biyik failed to convert, sending a free header wide after being left unmarked at the back post.

Roma goalkeeper Miloradevic was kept busy, making several crucial saves, including a strong stop from Scott McTominay's angled attempt.

Roma woke up after Lukaku's goal in the second half, with Arturo Vidal powering a header off the wood-

work from a free-kick minutes later, but they couldn't find an equaliser.

Napoli could have added another goal in the final seconds of that match when David Neres sent a curling shot from the edge of the box just wide.

Neres has a job on his hands at Roma, who are four points above the relegation zone.

"We have problems, that's why they called me, and we played against a team fighting to win the title," said Ranieri. "Given all that, I'm happy with the performance. We made mistakes but the desire to get the man on the right track in there."

Roma's struggles will hurt Roma all the more given the fast form of their local rivals Lazio, who beat Milan 3-0 to claim their seventh straight win in all competitions.

Sassuolo, Mazzarri and Fratta all scored in the second half after the visitors' Tommaso Pobega was sent off just before the break.

Florentino extended their winning streak to seven Serie A matches earlier on Sunday, a run they had achieved since April 1968, with a 2-0 victory at Cagliari courtesy of goals from Yacine Adli and Moise Kean.

David (David) Luiz played a crucial role for Florentino, making an incredible triple-save to deny the hosts around the hour mark.

Patrick Vieira was denied a winning start as Monaco manager after a late Roberto Soriano penalty gave fellow Serie A strugglers Cagliari a 2-2 away draw.

Parc des Princes keeper Kevin Trapp had a save to leave Monaco in 10th, level with Cagliari and two points above Lecce.—Agencies

He said that Waqas, Hamza, Farhan and Ali Muhammad were rescued.

He said Nabeel was a resident of Block-4 in Clinton whose body was handed over to the Rescue 1122 team at Ibrahim Hyderi.

Saeed Baloch, general secretary of the Pakistan Fishermen Forum, told Dawn that the victims father, Bilal, owned an eatery in Ibrahim Hyderi.

Mr Baloch also confirmed that the victims were not fishermen. He said generally, residents of Ibrahim Hyderi and other localities of the megapolis tended to visit the island annually during the annual fair.

Internet disruptions affect routine life, causing misery to Karachiites

Students, office-goers, online business owners and content creators share similar ordeal

KARACHI: Like other parts of the country, internet disruptions have plagued Karachi for the past three days, affecting day-to-day activities of everyone and causing financial loss to those dependent on online services.

Citizens report issues with Wi-Fi and mobile data services as well as social media apps including Facebook, WhatsApp and Instagram. They are unable or facing immense difficulties to send pictures, voice notes, large files or upload videos.

The outages are linked to the ongoing protests by the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) supporters heading towards the capital, Islamabad, where barricades and blockages have hampered the situation.

Karachi, despite being a metropolitan city,

still lacks an accessible transportation system, leaving a large percentage of citizens to rely on online taxi services. This disruption has caused major frustration, particularly among students and professionals who are most affected.

"I commute daily from Saudi Town to L.L. Chundrigar Road using Ryde. It has been the most comfortable and affordable app for me so far. However, the internet disruptions have made it almost impossible to find a ride in the morning and even in the evening," Aslam Jaffar, an employee of a private company, told Dawn.

"This has been an absolute mess. What have common citizens done to deserve this? In the midst of political chaos, it is about the common man who suffers," he added.

Neha, a 23-year-old student at Baqai Medical University, shares a similar concern.

"I cannot afford to miss my classes, of course, but commuting has become such a headache these days that I don't even put it into words. I used to book a ride back at my desired rates every morning through Ryde, but with the current state of the internet, I

now have to pay twice or sometimes even three times more than I used to. I'm afraid things are only going to get worse from here."

The other side of the coin is not much different. Riders face similar challenges, sometimes even worse, due to their heavy reliance on the ratings they earn through these apps. "I am not able to receive even five rides since yesterday. If I accept a ride, either the map doesn't work or the app crashes. It's so frustrating and honestly don't know when this will end," said Khuda Baksh, a Yango driver.

Small business owners, content creators also suffer.

The disruptions have been a huge setback for small business owners.

"As a small business owner, almost everything depends on the availability of the internet and social media," Maham Tariq, owner of Mayhem Bakes, shared.

"From clients to vendors to contacting riders, the entire chain is disrupted due to these

Murad irked by slow progress of Karimabad underpass project

Expresses displeasure over delay in Korangi causeway, Malir Expressway completion

KARACHI: Expressing grave displeasure and concern over the minimal progress on the Karimabad Underpass project in the past 17 months, Sindh Chief Minister CM Syed Murad Ali Shah directed the local government department on Monday to expedite the construction work that caused severe traffic congestion in and around the vicinity.

Instructed in June last year under the Karachi Development Authority (KDA), the project was expected to be completed in two years. But it progressed at a snail's pace and the digging and construction

work piled untold misery on people due to frequent traffic jams that also slowed down vehicular traffic on the major streets in Central districts.

The chief minister, who presided over a meeting to review progress of Karimabad Underpass and two other important projects of the city, was asked to learn that only 200 metres of the 1,000-metre underpass were completed and overall the physical progress of the project was merely 35 per cent. Similarly, the two other projects — Korangi Causeway Bridge and Malir Expressway — also faced horrendous delays.

A press statement issued from the Chief Minister House said that the CM directed the local government department to submit a date-wise plan for the three projects.

"Why is this ordinary delay being faced in completing the projects when

All set to reunite Madhubala with sisters at Safari Park

Four Paws will relocate zoo elephant to the sanctuary today

KARACHI: Madhubala's big day has finally come. The lonely 17-year-old African elephant is all set to be reunited with her sisters — Matilda and Sonia — at Safari Park on Tuesday (today) after 15 years under the supervision of experts of Four Paws (FP) and the Karachi Metropolitan Corporation (KMC).

According to officials, the relocation — a unique and sensitive operation taking place for the first time in Pakistan — marks significant moments as Madhubala will be the second and last elephant in the country getting freedom from zoos captivity. The first one was Kavita, housed at the Islamabad zoo and later shifted to a sanctuary in Cambodia in 2020.

Living in solitary confinement for more than a year since the tragic death of her long-time partner Noor Jahan, Madhubala received her last lessons on crate training — the exercise of making her step willingly into a large metal transport container that would be hauled on a truck — on Monday. The experts have already declared her fit for the relocation.

"We can't wait to finally see them reunited in their new home. Such a big day for Madhubala tomorrow (Tuesday) but I could see in her eyes that she is ready," shared Pia Eysenbeek, who is associated with FP as its field mission coordinator.

Matilda and Sonia don't know yet what a nice surprise awaits them. The sisters will finally be together after 15 years," she added.

Explaining the nature of the relocation process, Dr. Asim Khan, who is leading the FP team, said they were taking care of all technical details to ensure that the transportation was risk

and stress-free for Madhubala.

"She will receive tranquilizer before the transport to ensure a smooth relocation process. Animals cannot be sedated during transport as this could risk their health and well-being. We have pre-planned some stops to monitor Madhubala's well-being during the transport," he said.

It might be recalled that Madhubala along with her three sisters were separated from their herd and brought to Karachi in 2009. Their flight in captivity forced activists to file a case in the high court in 2020, which led to the intervention of international veterinary experts in their welfare.

While the fight for their well-being continued and the experts called for providing species appropriate environment to the animals, Noor Jahan met a tragic death in 2023, leaving Madhubala alone.

Since then, plans were announced several times for her relocation but none could be made

finalised. The KMC finally signed an agreement with FP on Madhubala's relocation with her sisters this year in Feb.

"This reunion is a result of collective effort. I am feeling excited yet nervous for the reunion. I pray everything goes well," said Madhubala, Sonia and Matilda thrive together for the rest of their lives," said Owais Aslam, one of the petitioners in elephants case and legal consultant of FP.

Mahina Omar, animal rights activist and coordinator of PAWS who fought the legal battle with Mr Aslam, called upon the KMC to look into the plight of other animals, especially Rani, the Diana monkey known as bear.

E-taxis to boost employment opportunities for youth: Sharjeel

KARACHI: Sindh Senior Minister Sharjeel Memon has said that the Sindh government is planning to introduce electric buses in a move to offer employment opportunities to unemployed youth.

Addressing a press conference here on Monday, he also outlined several projects by the PPP government aimed at "providing the best possible facilities to the public" in different areas.

The minister, who holds portfolios of information and transport, also referred to several projects initiated by the Sindh government in flood-affected areas, including providing free electricity to people through solarisation, building houses for 2.1 million families, and offering relief in the agriculture sector.

"The Sindh government was the first to introduce EV 9 (electric vehicle) buses, followed by the launch of the Pink Bus service," he said. "The government also plans to introduce EV 9s to provide employment opportunities for unemployed youth. All departments of the Sindh government are actively making efforts in their respective areas to serve the people."

Talking about the current political situation, the minister criticised Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) for "creating chaos" in the country in the name of protest and claimed that the final call by party founder Imran Khan had failed miserably, as the people had rejected the narrative built by the former prime minister.

Man shot dead in Surjani Town

KARACHI: A young man, said to be a worker of a mainstream religious party, was shot dead in Surjani Town, police said on Monday.

Area SIBO Ghulam Hussain Pirzada said the victim, Mohammed Khalid, 25, was on his way home on a motorcycle. He was passing through a deserted place on a muddy road in Sector-3 when some unidentified assailant(s) opened fire on him. He suffered a bullet wound in the chest and died on the spot.

The body was shifted to the Abbottabad Hospital for medicolegal formalities.

The officer said said the suspect(s) did not take away his cell phone and motorcycle. The incident was being investigated with three angles — a matrimonial issue, robbery bid and targeted attack on religious grounds, he added.

The victim had got married recently. He had studied at a seminary and also taught there for some time before joining a factory. He was affiliated with a mainstream religious party, but was not very active.

The police did not name the religious party.

IGP-West Anti-Mafia said the exact motive was still not known, adding that police were waiting for the relatives to lodge an FIR and give their opinion to initiate formal proceedings to ascertain possible motive and identity of the killers.

Policeman killed, colleague hurt in dacoits' attack on picket

SUKKUR: A police constable was killed and his colleague was wounded when a gang of dacoits attacked their picket within the jurisdiction of Gujarpur police station in Panu Arqi taluka late on Sunday night.

Police officials said the dacoits rained bullets on the police post with automatic weapons and managed to escape before reinforcements arrived. Constable Arbaaz Chachar died in the attack and his colleague Raja Mohammed Magus sustained critical injuries. The body and the wounded were shifted to hospital, said police officials.

The slain constable's funeral prayer was held at Police Lines, Sukkur, in which DIG Faizal Abdur Rehman, SSP, Armed Ahmed Sheikh, Sector Wing Commander Beld Nadeem, police officers, members of the deceased family and a large number of citizens participated.

A police squad buried the coffin of the fallen colleague before his body was taken to local graveyard for burial.

Later, talking to media persons, the police officers said that the department was proud of the officers and jawans who had sacrificed their lives to establish peace in the district.

They said that their sacrifice would never go in vain as they were martyred in the line of duty. The morale of police was high and operation against dacoits would continue with full force till complete peace was restored in the district, they vowed.

Man killed after unidentified attackers fire at eatery

NAWABSHAH: A man was killed and another was seriously injured when unidentified armed men fired at a roadside eatery in Qazi Ahmed town on Monday.

Sources said the attack was aftermath of a running dispute between rival groups and police were making efforts to arrest the attackers.

Man dies as two-wheeler hits roadside pole

PPP responds to Muttahida's outbursts over poor civic conditions in Hyderabad

Accuses MQM of having destroyed the city over four decades

HYDERABAD: Pakistan Peoples Party's provincial and local leaders on Monday lambasted the Muttahida Qaumi Movement-Pakistan (MQM-P) for their long-time against Sindh government and said it should first account for its own performance when it had been controlling civic bodies for decades.

Speaking at a news-conference in the local press club, PPP's Sindh information secretary Asif Obaidra, former MPA Asif Jabbir Khan and newly-appointed general secretary of the party's Hyderabad chapter Wasim Raajpoot accused the MQM-P of having destroyed the city's civic bodies by itself while it had been controlling them since 1988 until recently.

Performance of the incumbent PPP-backed mayor, who has been elected for

a first term, is far better than Muttahida's, they claimed.

Jabbir Khan said that the MQM-P did not have any moral ground to take on PPP. He said PPP had done a lot of development work in a short span of time after getting the slot of mayor.

He pointed out that PPP has built the Abdul Sattar Edhi road, which would connect city areas with highway. He said 90pc of the work had already been completed and the remaining was pending on account of certain issues. He said encroachments were blocking further progress.

The said the mayor was also trying to get piped feeders from HESCO to run sewerage facilities in order to avoid an emergency situation during rainy season. Similarly, he said, Latifabad Unit-4 filtration plant would ensure basic drinking water supply for the city.

Asif Obaidra lashed out at MQM-P for its "several rhetoric against PPP's ethnic grounds" which, he said, had been going on for decades. "City has changed now... Jabbir Khan and Wasim Raajpoot living Urdu-speaking Sindhis and belonging to Hyderabad city were most representing PPP," he said.

He maintained that if the city was without drinking water today, the MQM-P was responsible for this because it had ruled over the city for 15 to 40 years. Obaidra dubbed MQM-P representatives as "sheela jangaris and waddas", and challenged that Muttahida had done anything, it should present it to the public. He asked MQM lawmakers to tender their apology first for doing nothing for people.

Six encroachment project rejected

Speaking about federal government's plan to dig canals, Obaidra said PPP's instance was quite clear. The Sindh chief minister had opposed the Christian and other canals through his letter to the federal government and asking it to consider a meeting of the Central Committee (CC).

He criticized those who were taking on president Asif Zardari for clashing a meeting on Green Pakistan Initiative where the issue was discussed. He argued that the presidency did not have executive powers. PPP would reach out to ministers after exhaustsing all remedies at parliament ary forums, he said, adding that these matters were to be discussed

in National Economic Council (NEC) under the chairmanship of prime minister.

He recalled that PPP had attended JI-U's multiparty conference, where the Sindhi irrigation minister had shared all facts and figures on this issue. Sindhi's representative had opposed the canals project in the Central Development Working Party (CDWP) meeting as well, he said.

Obaidra said that the Sindh chief secretary had written letters to federal government twice to share his concerns over these projects.

Jabbir Khan said that issues of Hyderabad Water & Sewerage Corporation relating to disbursements of salaries and pensions were under consideration of government. He said that he had informed government that unless subsidy for the corporation was restored, things could not change, and noted that such a subsidy was given to Punjab's WSS.

He said that recruitment in the corporation had been made on political grounds. "If such employees were recruited, then it would become another political issue."

School facing partial demolition offered six months' time to relocate

HYDERABAD: The district administration on Monday offered to the Strong Base School, a decades-old institution, postponement of a demolition operation to retrieve 1,140-sq-yd encroached land and a portion of street annexed by it. However, certain conditions have been attached to the offer.

The Anti-Eencroachment Tribunal had on Nov 21 ruled that the illegally raised structures were encroachments and should be removed / demolished. The school management had failed to produce any document that could prove that the disputed spaces under its occupation were allotted to it by the

District Red Crescent Society (DRCS), Hyderabad.

The management held negotiations with Deputy Commissioner Zain Ul Abidin Mirza during the latter's visit to the premises on Monday for retrieving the lands to be retrieved in an anti-encroachment operation.

The DC decided to allow time to the management provided it agreed to shift the school till the end of the current academic year, i.e. May 31, 2025.

This sufficient time is, however, subject to the signing of an undertaking drafted by the DC.

Speaking on the media, the DC said that the school management would also have to undertake that it would not challenge the

Anti-Eencroachment

Tribunal's decision at any other forum as the district administration itself was providing it a relief i.e., postponement of anti-encroachment operation.

In case of non-compliance, it fails to abide by the terms and conditions of the undertaking, the AC City would get the anti-encroachment operation carried out to retrieve the entire government land administrating 1,140 square yards currently under illegal occupation of the Strong Base School as already determined by the Anti-Eencroachment Tribunal, the DC said.

The school building, ground-plus-one, is situated between DC House and Radio Pakistan's Hyderabad station. Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (HMC) is the custodian of the land and

had leased it out to the DRCS decades back. The society had handed over the premises to the private school's management on its tenure.

Probe into entry in record

According to DC, he has ordered an inquiry into the "authenticity of the entry (along with its overwriting) regarding the total area of school premises and the lease agreement made between HMC and DRCS office." This inquiry will be conducted by the AC City," he said.

The DC said that through this overwriting, the 970-sq-yd area of school's premises seemed to have been changed to 1,140 sq-yd under illegal occupation of the Strong Base School as per the original lease agreement as per the relevant law and policy.

Imran, Bushra and PTI leaders booked for 'criminal conspiracy, inciting people'

Number of PTI supporters arrested in last four days reaches 170 in Rawalpindi; two police officials beaten up and injured by protesters

RWALPINDI: Police have registered two FIRs against PTI founder Imran Khan, his wife Bushra Bibi, central leadership and over 300 workers of the party on the charges of criminal conspiracy and inciting people to protest.

In the first FIR, registered at the Dhaulpur police station on Sunday, the police accused Imran Khan, his wife, KP Chief Minister Asif Ali Zardari, former president Dr Arif Alvi, former Agha, Sherry Riaz, Arif Riaz, Hamza Arshad, Khurshid Khan and Asad Qasir of refusing to withdraw the call for the November 24 protest.

Police also detained 26 supporters of the PTI, including Ajmal and Nayyar Abbasi of Chakwal. Five of the detainees, who were teenagers, were discharged while the remaining 21 were remanded in police custody for five days.

Likewise, the Dhaulpur police arrested 27 PTI supporters who were later remanded in police custody for three days. The number of PTI supporters detained by the police has reached

170 during the last four days.

In Sadipahad, two police officials were injured and beaten up allegedly by PTI supporters who also tore their uniform, searched their anti-risk tools, including helmets, jackets and pants containing cash and CNICs. A tear gas gun carried by Nasir Abbasi, head constable, was broken after being searched by the mob. However, the police narrowly escaped a mob attack.

Dhaulpur and Rawalpindi had already been put under a lockdown since Sunday with all highways and link roads leading to the federal capital blocked and thousands of police and paramilitary personnel deployed in an attempt to prevent the PTI supporters from marching to Islamabad.

Imran Khan, imprisoned in the Central Jail Attock, has made a 'final call' to his supporters to descend on Islamabad to demand his release and protest against amendments in the constitution and changes in the judiciary.

Police said Ameena Khan, sister of Imran Khan, while talking to media outside the Attock jail on November 22 called upon people to come out for their 'Azadi' on November 24. On November 19, Bushra Bibi issued a video message and delivered Imran Khan's direction to party MNAs to bring 5000 participants each and MPAs 10000 protesters each for the march to Islamabad.

Despite the Punjab government's imposition of Section 144 on Nov 22, Imran Khan Niazi, founder of PTI and its central leadership, Bushra Bibi, All

Ameen Chaudhary, Dr Arif Alvi, Aswad Alvi, Omer Arsh, Sherry Riaz, Arif Riaz, Hamza Arshad, Khurshid Khan and Asad Qasir refused to withdraw the protest call," said the FIR.

B added that on the conspiracy of Ajmal Niazi Raja, Chaudhry Aswad Alvi, Chaudhry Mohammad Niaz, Zain Khalique Khan and Tariq Aziz Bhutta, who were leading the protesters Chaudhry Javed Khan, Farrokh Mahmood Suri, Shabnur Khan, Khawaja Mohammad Alian, Raja Sohail Khan, Riazul Mohammad Minhas, Chaudhry Tikki Khan, Maje Arsh, Chaudhry Shahid Hamid, Raja Saghi, Mohammad Taseer, Salar Shahzad, Asif Abbasi, Mianwar, Arif Khan, Mohammad Irfan, Tajuddin Riaz, Naseer Abbasi, Arif Abbasi, Naseeb Hussain, Saleem Mansoor, Mohamed Hassan Dado, Saghi Zia, Tareer Iqbal, Imdadullah, Mohammad Khan, Abdullah Arvin and Mohammad Umar along with 500 to 200 unidentified people blocked Dhaulpur Road by setting old tyres on fire.

Police said a police team was on duty when armed PTI workers started shooting slogans. "Khan Niazi to Pakistan Niazi" etc. The protesters blocked the road causing problems, disrupting and endangering public life.

The protesters were told that gathering of the public had already been banned as the government had imposed Section 144, but they ignored and instead of dispersing started shouting with stones injuring two officials.

Three dead, five injured in Neelum Valley jeep accident

MUZAFFARABAD: At least three people were killed and five others injured, three critically, when a passenger jeep plunged off a steep road in Neelum Valley on Monday evening, police said.

The jeep, carrying around 10 persons, including the driver, was heading to Sosai village via a steep link road branching from Kundal Shahi, located some 72 kilometers northeast of here.

While negotiating a sharp bend in the second cut, the vehicle rolled backward out of the driver's control and plunged onto a lower section of the same road around 5:30 pm, said SP Neelum, Khawaja Sidique. He said that according to an initial report, three people identified as Ghulam Ali, 22, son of Karanat Shah (driver), Ansar Shah, 50, wife of Abdul Hamid, and Mujahid Shah, 30, son of Imdad Shah, died on the spot.

The injured passengers were identified as Rehmat Shah, 20, Chaudhry Mohammad Ashraf, 47, Chaudhry Abdul Hamid, 46, Firdaus Kazmi, 11, and Ishtaq Imad. Of them, Mr Imad was allowed to go home due to minor injuries, and the rest were hospitalized, the SP said. — Staff Correspondent

CIA building declared sub-jail to accommodate arrested PTI protesters

ISLAMABAD: The Crime Intelligence Agency's building in the federal capital has been declared a sub-jail by the Islamabad administration to detain the leaders and workers of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) during the ongoing protests.

Officials of the capital police told Dawn that during the ongoing protest, the capital police have arrested over 500 local leaders and workers. Due to the engagements in security stations and shortage of space in the lockups,

of the police stations police, arrested political activists will neither be interrogated nor transported elsewhere else, they said.

Consequently, all the prison vans and other police vehicles are deployed at different locations as per the security plan. Detaining such arrested persons in the lockups of the police stations is a risk under the prevailing circumstances," the officers said.

Similarly, more police stations will be declared sub-jails if required.

The arrests were made from various areas including Faisalabad, Taxila, Sangla, Chiniot, Noorpur, Gujrat, Nowshera, Nowshera, Lahore, Okara, and Bahawalpur.

So far, the capital police have registered seven cases against the leaders and workers of the protesting party for creating unrest and undermining public safety."

Daily wage earners – the silent victims of every political turmoil

For labourers like Mohammad, a single lost day of work can mean going hungry

RAWALPINDI: With commercial and social life coming to a standstill in the garrison city in the wake of the ongoing political unrest, Mohammad Nasir, a daily wage labourer, prepares to return home empty-handed for the second consecutive day.

He had arrived at Raja Bazaar with his tools of substance to find work for the day, only to see potential employers vanish.

For a daily wage like Mohammad, a single lost day of work can mean going hungry.

The 32-year-old labourer says he works as a construction worker and usually arrives at Raja Bazaar early in the morning in hopes of being hired for the day but for the last two days, he could not find any work due to the political turmoil that has engulfed the twin cities in the wake of the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf's (PTI) protest call.

"I borrowed money from a relative to put the meal on the table for my five-member family the other day, hoping that tomorrow, the situation would improve."

But road closures have poured cold water on his hopes, and those of those around of others like him.

Another labourer, Mohammad Nasir, said that he earned Rs1,000 to Rs2,000 daily but the current-like situation has damped his chances today.

"Despite the placement of freight shipping companies on Major Road, I came in search of work, only to return empty-handed."

For those living hand-to-mouth, situations like these become more than inconvenience.

The toll of the lockdown is not limited to daily wages only, as vendors, especially small ones find it hard to survive amid low customer footfall.

"In the last two days, not a single customer has turned up here," said Muhammad Asif, a shopkeeper.

Zafar Ahmed, an owner of a clothing shop in Saddar, expressed similar concerns, complaining about the slow pace of business activity.

Although Saddar remained open, it too seemed devoid of customers as people continued to avoid travelling.

The Rawalpindi district administration has closed down the Sami Bridge, Marie Chowk, Moti Mehal Cinema, Waria Khan, Gwaliroondi, Piarwadi and other areas.

White trucks are parked on Mall Road in front of PTCL offices, a single lane going towards the Armed Forces Institute of Cardiology remains open to traffic.

Due to the closure of entry and exit points of Rawalpindi city and the Cantt area, oil tankers failed to supply fuel to filling stations, sparking fear of fuel shortages from Tuesday (today).

All Pakistan Oil Tankers Association spokesman Naseem Butt said keeping in view the situation in Lahore, Islamabad and Rawalpindi, transport to these cities has been halted.

"This is significantly impacting the transit of tanker lorries carrying PSL products, which could lead to disruptions in supply," he said.

He said that the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (Ogra) is actively engaging with the district administration for permission has not been granted to restore the supply of the fuel to filling stations.

He said that most of the petrol filling stations have stuck for only one or two days.

15 years on, work on Chirah Dam still hasn't started

Eneec had approved project in 2009. Under PC-I, work was to be completed in 2013

ISLAMABAD: Despite the passage of 15 years after approval by the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Eneec), work on Chirah Dam could not be started while the twin cities of Rawalpindi and Islamabad are facing a growing shortage of water.

Eneec had approved this project in 2009 for providing 15 million gallon per day (mgd) water to the residents of Islamabad and Rawalpindi.

According to its PC-I, the project was supposed to be completed in 2013; however, no practical steps were taken to construct the dam on Sain River near Chirah village.

The project worth Rs2.3 billion was a joint venture of CDA and Small Dams Organisation (SDO) and the latter was supposed to execute it.

The project was supposed to be ready in 2013, according to its PC-I.

The issue came under discussion recently at a meeting on water issues which was chaired by CDA Chairman Mohammad Ali Rabbani and attended by representatives from SDO and Water and Sanitation Agency (WasA) Rawalpindi.

The meeting was told that the proposed dam was at estimation stage. Sources said that the CDA chief showed his displeasure over the immediate delay and directed to remove obstacles for early start of the project.

"We do agree the project is facing an immediate delay, but there is no delay on our part as SDO is the executing agency," said director media CDA Shafiq Khan. He said that many years ago the CDA had paid Rs852 million to SDO for the project. "Recently in a meeting this issue was discussed in detail," he said.

The sources said that during the meeting it was decided that the CDA will hold a meeting with SDO to make a decision.

"In coming days, we will hold a crucial meeting in this regard," an official said.

The sources said keeping in view the inflation rate the cost of the project had increased manifold.

It is relevant to note that both

Rawalpindi and Islamabad have been facing shortage of water. Islamabad is a water-scarcity hit city as CDA has been supplying around 65mgd to urban areas while the total need of both urban and rural areas is more than 220mgd.

The people in rural areas are mostly dependent on water boring and other small schemes of the district government.

On the other hand, during the last almost three decades, no new dam has been built to overcome the shortage of water in Islamabad which has only three major sources - Saini Dam, Khawar Dam and tubewells. However, it also gets around three mgd of water from Rawal Dam, which mainly provides water to residents of Rawalpindi.

Over the years, various proposed projects including Abbottabad/Battala dams designed to provide 100 mgd each to Islamabad and Rawalpindi, Chinar carryover Dam in Islamabad, Shahzad Dam and proposed Dihara Dam remained under discussion in various meetings of the CDA. However, no step was taken to start construction work. These projects are still at the feasibility stages.

Earlier, various departments were dealing with water related issues. However, last month the federal government transferred the administrative control of all water-related departments from the Metropolitan Corporation of Islamabad (MCD) to the CDA, as the civic agency was complaining that it was unable to address the shortfall of millions of gallons under the current arrangement. After getting control of the department, the CDA set up a new organisation "Islamabad Water" headed by Director General Saniat Khan Zuberi.

A summary on the basis of the decision made by the federal cabinet had said the Water Management Wing of CDA was unable to meet a shortfall of almost 100 million gallons in urban areas and cannot extend its services to the 1.3 million people living in villages around Islamabad.

"The gap in supply and demand for clean water is increasing day by day due to positive change in urban population and climate conditions. There is no integrated planning and management, no water and sewerage infrastructure master plan is available and no water and sewerage business plan has ever been prepared."

After being convinced by CDA's point of view, the cabinet approved the summary but it is yet to be seen how Islamabad Water will perform.

Security boost needed to safeguard trans-Indus districts

INDRA GHATI KHAN: Enhanced security measures are needed to prevent trans-Indus districts against a fresh wave of militancy in the country, especially in neighbouring Balochistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa provinces.

Locals say that as security concerns escalate, there is an urgent need to strengthen security measures at the entry points of Indra Ghazi Khan district.

A local resident of Tumman Qasim said that their area Tumman Qasim shares its boundaries with troubled areas of Balochistan and KP. Key checkpoints such as Bewta, Sakhi Naum, Tumman, Ghani Ghari and Shah Wali are strategic locations for the installation of large scanner gates.

These scanners will help thoroughly inspect loaded trucks to curb smuggling activities and detect potential

cross-boundary hidden under legitimate goods. Ensuring comprehensive security at these entry points could significantly reduce the risk of illicit activities.

A retired official of the Baloch Levy said that it is prime time to re-activate the Baloch Levy, a specialised paramilitary force traditionally responsible for safeguarding the provincial boundaries of Dera Ghazi Khan and Rajanpur. These districts will benefit immensely from the Levy's reactivation.

Their presence can enhance border surveillance and provide critical support to existing security forces.

Another dire need is convening a grand jirga of the 10 tribes inhabiting the Sulaiman Range.

These tribes include Maceri, Darishuk, Lurek, Gowhar, Lughari, Khosa, Lurek Soori, Bunder, Quaraish and Kharan.

Local tribal people suggested, during a conversation with Dawn, that a

traditional tribal council could assign responsibilities to tribal leaders for safeguarding the passes of the Sulaiman Range, government infrastructure and their respective Jumma (tribes).

The removed steel bridge connecting Punjab with Balochistan, a strategic asset, is one such critical infrastructure that requires heightened protection.

With tribal cooperation alongside security forces, this effort can reinforce the defense of the two districts against external threats.

Commandant of Border Military Police and Baloch Levy Asad Chaudhri, responding to a query regarding holding a jirga of heads of tribes in the Sulaiman Range, said that instead of holding a jirga, they are consulting heads of tribes individually to make them responsible for the safety and security of passes located in their respective Jummas.

Govt plans to instal 30 air quality monitors across Punjab

Eases curb on heavy vehicles, allows construction activity

LAHORE: In an initiative to combat rising air pollution, the Punjab government announced on Monday the installation of 30 advanced air quality monitors across various cities in the province.

The development is coupled with eased smog-related restrictions in key districts, aiming to improve environmental conditions while supporting economic activity.

Senior Minister Marriyum Aurangzeb revealed that 30 advanced air quality monitors were being installed across various cities in the province, with Lahore's monitoring capacity increasing to eight units.

She said the new monitors in Lahore

are strategically placed at TBIQ, Kafra, Jya Bhagat Police Station, Shahdara Teaching Hospital, Panjab University, and Wildlife Park, Lahore. Other cities benefiting from this initiative include Rawalpindi (three monitors), Faisalabad, Sheikhupura, and Sialkot (one each), as well as Multan, Gujranwala, and Bahawalpur (two each). Sargodha (two monitors) and Dera Ghazi Khan (one monitor) are expected to activate their systems by the end of this month. These devices are linked to the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) central control room for real-time monitoring.

The senior minister highlighted that the collected air quality data will be integrated with the global Air Quality Index (AQI) system, providing accurate and reliable information to the public and researchers. This system is designed to facilitate timely actions against pollution and improve environmental conditions.

The EPA issued the new directives (available with Dawn), aimed to strike a balance between addressing environmental concerns and maintaining economic stability.

This initiative is a revolutionary step to safeguard human lives. It will provide

transparent data to the public and ensure an effective solution to air pollution challenges," said Marriyum Aurangzeb.

This programme is not only a significant step toward environmental conservation but also an example of utilising digital technology to enhance governance and improve public service delivery.

Meanwhile, the Punjab government had eased several restrictions imposed to combat smog in four key districts - Lahore, Multan, Faisalabad, and Gujranwala - providing much-needed relief to residents and businesses.

The EPA issued the new directives (available with Dawn), aimed to strike a balance between addressing environmental concerns and maintaining economic stability.

The restriction on the entry of heavy vehicles into these districts has been lifted, allowing smooth transportation and logistic operations. Brick kilns, previously shuttered to reduce emissions, are now permitted to operate, though it

is anticipated that compliance with specific environmental standards will be required. Construction activity has also been allowed.

Dining establishments, including restaurants and hotels, can now operate until 8pm, extending their previous closing hours. Markets and shopping centres must continue to close by 8pm, as per government orders, to limit crowds and conserve energy during peak pollution hours.

The government has underscored the importance of cooperation efforts in mitigating smog-related challenges. Citizens and businesses are encouraged to adopt eco-friendly practices and adhere to the revised guidelines to ensure a sustainable environment.

The decision follows a period of strict enforcement aimed at reducing pollution levels, which impacted daily life and economic activity. These relaxations are seen as a step towards easing the burden on businesses while maintaining vigilance against smog hazards.

Deseating Imran from NA-95 Larger bench sought on plea against ECP powers

LAHORE: Justice Riazuddin Haider of the Lahore High Court on Monday proposed formation of a larger bench to decide a petition challenging the legitimacy of section 137(4) of the Election Act 2007 invoked by the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) to debar former prime minister Imran Khan from NA-95, Mianwali, in Toba Khalsa.

The judge observed that important legal questions had been raised in the petition, which required to be decided by a larger bench.

The judge forwarded the

petition to the chief justice with a request to form a larger bench on the matter.

Abid Ahmad, a lawyer, filed the petition through Advocate Asif Siddiqui, pleading that former premier Imran Khan had been disqualified under sections 137(4) (power to prosecute for corrupt practice), 162 (corrupt practice) and 173 (making false statements or declarations) of the Act, however, in these sections, there was no mentioning of word "disqualification".

He argued that not sharing details of Toba Khalsa gifts and proceeds from them did not lead to disqualification. He said it could occur only when the

prosecution commenced within 120 days of filing of nomination papers.

The petitioner claimed that the prosecution under section 137 of the Act was only possible to be initiated within 120 days of the filing of Toba Khalsa statements. However, in the Imran Khan case, the last such statement was filed on Dec 31, 2011.

Therefore, he said, the prosecution could have been initiated by April 30, 2012 but the same could not be commenced within the stipulated period of 120 days.

He contended that the ECP verdict disqualifies

Police identify 35 people involved in Nishtar AIDS scandal

PMA comes out in support of 'guilty' medics, condemns govt for action

LAHORE: Military Police identified 30-35 people, including the Nishtar Hospital staff, who were behind the alleged tampering with the record of the kidney patients who tested positive for HIV/AIDS. However, police lack the mandate to investigate the health professionals.

On the other hand, the Pakistani Medical Association (PMA) has come out in the support of the medics, including the Nishtar Medical University (NMU) VC, who were suspended for negligence that resulted in infections of dozens of kidney patients with

HIV in the hospital.

Police completed the probe into the forged test reports of the patients on the directions of Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz, when the HIV/AIDS scandal in the nephrology unit of the hospital came to the limelight.

An official told Dawn police would submit findings of the investigation to the health department for further action.

"We have no mandate to investigate the healthcare professionals held guilty of the HIV/AIDS outbreak in the Nishtar Hospital," he said, adding that the Military police probe was limited to the issue of patients' records that were tampered with.

During the investigation, he said, police found that the private lab had tampered with the record of dialysis patients enrolled with the Nishtar Hospital and generated new falsified test reports to mislead the authorities. He revealed that a hospital

employee was running a dialysis centre out of the government health facility and the lab used in his private lab the test kits supplied officially to the Nishtar Hospital.

The police officer added that nearly 30-35 persons, including the hospital employees, were found involved in preparing forged test reports of the dialysis patients who contracted HIV/AIDS due to negligence of the medics.

In a question, he said, the investigation was carried out under the supervision of an SSP.

The PMA condemned the government's action against the NMU VC and other health professionals in the wake of the scandal.

Talking to the media at a press conference held on Monday, the PMA leaders declared the suspension of the senior medics on the basis of an inquiry conducted by the fact-finding committee illegal, illogical and against the rules.

The reports suggested that the PMA

came to the support of the guilty NMU VC for faculty members and other doctors when a senior leader of the association from Multan was also held responsible for allegedly tampering with the record of the patients who carried HIV/AIDS during the dialysis in the hospital.

Talking to the media, PMA Lahore chapter president Prof Asifur Rehman, Dr Kamran Saeed, Prof Shahid Malik, Dr Ibrar Ahmed Chaudhry, Dr Iram Shahzad and Dr Waqarul Haq Qattoo, addressed the journalists and rejected the resignation submitted by NMU VC Mehran Khakwani.

Prof Nasir declared the action against the NMU VC and other health professionals a continuation of the departmental and police action against the senior doctors of the Nishtar Medical College.

Fuel shortage looms large amid PTI agitation

LAHORE: Major cities in Punjab have started facing shortage of petroleum products after the depots in Patoki and Sheikhupura stopped supplies due to closure of roads because of the PTI protest.

Stateholders apprehend that the situation may worsen on Tuesday (today) and onward, if the roads are not opened to allow entry of oil tankers.

"Around 40 percent of the total 460 petrol pumps in Lahore have either no or meager quantity of petrol, diesel etc. And if the current situation persists, there would be no petrol in Lahore on Wednesday or Thursday," Pakistan Petroleum Dealers' Association Information Secretary Khawaja Ali told Dawn on Monday.

"We are really worried about this situation," he says, adding that the government will have to open roads if it wants to keep Lahore and other major cities in Punjab functional.

According to him, as many as 140 petrol pumps in Gujranwala are also witnessing shortage of petrol. Some of them have gone totally dry, he maintains, adding that fuel supplies to Lahore are made both from Patoki and Sheikhupura depots.

Lahore Deputy Commissioner Syed Musa Rizvi says the administration will ensure petrol supplies to Lahore by all means.

"I have talked to the officers of the Pakistan State Oil (PSO), assuring them of entry of tankers into the city very soon," he says.

"I will also talk to the office-bearers of petroleum dealers' association to solve their problems in this regard," he adds.

Meanwhile, bakers and motorists in various parts of Lahore faced difficulties in getting petrol.

"I finally succeeded in getting petrol at a filling station in Jhelum Town after being refused by the staff at three other outlets," a motorcyclist told Dawn.

Eight journalists on bail after 'flimsy case'

GUJARAT: Eight journalists of Hafizabad are on interim bail after being booked by Kassoli Police Station on Nov 20.

They were present on the lawns of the house of former MMA Mehdi Haider Bhutto where his daughter MMA Ameena Mehdi Bhutto was scheduled to address a news conference when Hafizabad police reached there, pushed the media persons out and did not allow them to attend the news conference.

Later on, a case was registered against eight of them, namely Aijaz Parvez, Hafiz Aslam Rehman, Shabir Gul, Shabbir Javed, Asim Shah, Javed Asad, Ehsanullah and Shafiqat Wattoo, under sections of the PPC on the report of Sub-Inspector Mushtaq Hussain.

The journalists later obtained bail before arrest from a court until Nov 29.

Journalists associations condemned the registration of a case against the journalists for performing their professional duties.

They have demanded quashing of the case; otherwise, the journalists would stage protest demonstrations.

Police alleged they raided the venue on the information of presence of former MMA Shaheed Bhutto who was a proclaimed offender and some other PCs that the journalists avoided them to escape from the scene and interfered with official work of police.

The journalists denied the allegations and termed the police action unjustified.

Rights of those causing chaos be suspended, says PA speaker

LAHORE: In the backdrop of the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf's ongoing agitation for the release of the party's incarcerated leader Imran Khan, the Punjab Assembly Speaker Malik Muhammad Ahmad Khan has called for suspending the rights of those who create "chaos" in the country.

"Peaceful protest is the right of every citizen. However, the rights of those who cause chaos in the country should be suspended, regardless of whether they are members of any

elected house," he said.

Talking to the media during the oath-taking ceremony of the Punjab Assembly Press Gallery's new leaders, Khawaja Nasir and Aslam Shiekh, before on Monday, the speaker said the Constitution grants every citizen the right to peace protest; but it does not permit acts that "jeopardise national security".

Referring to the events of May 9, 2023, he remarked that those were not ordinary allegations, but "direct attacks on the nation's armed forces and institutions".

Without naming Khawaja Nasir, the speaker said, "The chief minister of a province 'collaborated with others to attack the federation'. These individuals are engaged in discrediting opposition politicians and the judiciary on social media."

He commended the Chinese government for continuing investment in Pakistan despite

the challenges of terrorism, adding that PTI deliberately undermined the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) initiative.

The speaker urged the government to take strict measures to restrain such elements, emphasising that the armed forces are a source of pride for any nation, yet baseless allegations are being hurling at the army.

LHC upholds objection to plea against 26th Amendment

LAHORE: Lahore High Court Chief Justice Asifa Naseem on Monday sustained a registrar office's objection to the maintainability of a petition against the Constitution (26th Amendment) Act 2024.

The chief justice heard the petition filed by a citizen, Nasir Ahmad Chaudhary, on which the office had previously raised objections to its maintainability.

The chief justice questioned the petitioner's lawyer about the lack of information regarding a similar petition already under consideration in Supreme Court.

She also noted that no supporting documents were attached to substantiate the petition.

The chief justice observed that it was inappropriate to file petitions on the same issue in multiple courts across the country.

The petitioner says disregarding the principle of seniority also places a restriction on judicial independence.

He argues that preventing a Supreme Court judge from hearing cases undermines judicial independence.

He further contends that including parliamentarians and ministers in the judicial commission infringes upon the judiciary's autonomy.

He pleads that monitoring and issuing instructions to high court judges by the parliamentary committee would obstruct judicial independence.

He also assails allowing the chief election commissioner to work till the appointment of his successor contradicts the principle of the Constitution.

The petitioner asks the court to set aside the Constitution (26th Amendment) Act 2024 for being unconstitutional.

PESHAWAR: The Awami National Party (ANP) observed a black day across Khyber Pakhtunkhwa on Monday against the recent Parachinar convoy bloodbath and other terrorist attacks in the province.

Addressing a rally in front of the Peshawar Press Club here, ANP provincial president Mian Iftikhar Hussain said a "well-planned conspiracy" was behind a surge in terrorism in the province, with international powers and their facilitators involved in it.

He criticised the government over failure to protect public life, especially in the Koram tribal district where a convoy of passenger vehicles was attacked leading to the killing of drivers of people.

Mr Hussain condemned the Parachinar violence and demanded action against culprits.

He expressed solidarity with the affected families and said his party was committed to standing by them.

The ANP leader criticised the provincial and federal governments over "inaction and silence" on the issue.

He complained that the government was busy with street

protests instead of addressing people's issues.

The party also announced plans to hold a peace march across the province to condemn terrorism. It also formed a peace brigade, led by Basir Mohammed Khan, to visit Parachinar and negotiate with stakeholders to find a peaceful solution to the issue.

Meanwhile, the ANP activists staged a protest against terrorists in front of the Searf Press Club, drawing district cabinet members and workers in large numbers.

They raised concerns about the poor law and order situation in the province and complained that the escalating violence had rendered the people vulnerable.

The speakers said the recent carnage in Kurram Agency pressed the growing unrest in the province.

They urged authorities to identify and prosecute those responsible for those heinous acts.

The ANP leaders warned the government that if effective measures weren't immediately taken to restore peace in the province, their party would "take action to ensure stability".

In Swabi district, the ANP activists gathered on the Swabi-Jhangora Road and blocked the road to traffic, complaining about the failure of the government to protect public life and property.

They demanded restoration of peace in Koram.

Sher Khan said a lot of blood had already been shed on Pakistani land; no more bloodshed was intolerable.

He said the government should act for peace and provide security to the people.

In the Lower Dir district as well, the ANP staged a rally against the rising violence on the call of its provincial president, Mian Iftikhar Hussain.

Dozens of party workers, led by the district leadership, attended the demonstration, shouting slogans against the government over the recent Parachinar carnage.

The speakers, including ANP district president and former MPA Haji Baloch Khan, senior vice-president Malik Rajid Yousafzai and leaders Malik Attaullah and Mian Haris Hussain, criticised the federal and prov-

vincial governments over failure to protect public life in parts of the province.

They said Pakistani were being targeted under a "planned conspiracy" meant to turn the region into a war zone.

The ANP also observed a black day in Lakki Marwat and Buner districts.

Holding banners and placards, party workers and student activists gathered outside the press club building on the Old Katchen Road in Lakki city.

In Buner, the ANP activists showed up outside the press club building to condemn the growing terrorist attacks in the province, especially the recent convoy bloodbath in Koram tribal district.

ANP district president Nas Ali Khan Wazir, POF district president Faizan and leaders

Shah Qayyum Baloch, Malik Sohrab Khan Wazir, Malik Tahir Khan and Hukmat Pakhtoon, said sectarian tensions were being fanned by vested interest in the region.

In Shangla district, the ANP demonstrated outside the Airport Press Club against the growing incidents of terrorism in the province.

Carrying placards and shouting slogans against terrorism and sectarian incidents, the protesters marched through the Alpuri bazaar.

ANP provincial deputy general secretary Matiullah Khan and other speakers said Pakhtunkhwa could no longer tolerate Pakhtunkhwa bloodshed.

A demonstration against the Parachinar incident was also reported in Charsadda district.

The speakers, including ANP provincial vice presidents Qasim Ali Khan Mohammad and leader Shahzadullah Taimoor Khan, criticised security agencies over the bad law and order situation in the province.

The ANP also held a demonstration in Bajaur tribal district, with participants demanding early, durable solution to the conflict in the Koram tribal district.

They expressed sympathy for the family affected by the recent terrorist attacks.

Outside the Khar Press Club, the protesters shouted slogans for peace in the region.

They condemned the recent attacks on passenger vehicles in Koram district.

Fire destroys hundreds of trees in Sararogha forest

SOUTH WAZIRISTAN: A massive fire broke out in Khankhala hilly area of Sararogha tehsil of Upper South Waziristan district on Monday, burning down hundreds of precious trees.

A Rescue 1122 spokesman said that a rescue team promptly arrived at the scene after receiving information about the fire. "The firefighters are currently

engaged in efforts to extinguish the blaze.

However, intensity of the fire continues to increase, fuelled by strong winds, making it challenging for rescuers to control it," he added.

The official said the cause of the fire remained to be known.

The incident marks the third such

blaze hitting the area in the month of November, resulting in the destruction of thousands of valuable trees, leaving behind only ashes.

The frequent occurrence of blazes increases the need for effective measures to prevent fires in the region, ensuring protection to environment and natural resources.

Neonatal intensive care unit becomes operational at Swabi hospital

Unicef provided assistance for establishment of 46-bed facility

PESHAWAR: The 46-bed neonatal intensive care unit has become operational at the Bacha Khan Medical Complex, Swabi, to provide modern care to newborns.

BKMC director Dr Khalid Massud told Dawn that the unit, established with the Unicef's assistance, was the largest in

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa catering to patients not only from Swabi but from Buner, Sonat, Charsadda, Dir, Haripur and Abbottabad districts.

He said that the medical complex had assured the services of qualified neonatalogist and was in the process of getting recognition from the College of Physicians and Surgeons Pakistan to pursue the way for postgraduate training in neonatology as they were desperately needed in the province.

Dr Khalid said that the complex was in the process of finding intensivists (critical care doctors) in the near future.

This new facility has been established at a cost of Rs12 million, he said, adding that the Unicef has pledged to sustain the hospital to ensure uninterrupted power supply.

"This neonatal care unit is the first of its kind in the province, offering comprehensive, high-quality and essential care to newborns," he said.

Dr Khalid said that the unit would also reduce patient load on hospitals in Mardan and even in Peshawar where patients were referred to from the entire province.

Assistant professor Dr Iqbalullah, who heads the unit, told Dawn that Unicef head Dr Iqbalullah Khan played a key role in the establishment of the first NICU, which was equipped with the latest and modern equipment to provide both intensive and non-intensive care

care to newborns.

"Keeping in mind the highest cause of mortality in newborns, such as prematurity, we have made a four-bed low-risk mother care unit and seven-bed mother care unit operational to provide care to premature and low birth weight babies," he said.

The neonatalogist said the KMC offered an evidence-based intervention, which promoted weight gain, cognitive improvement, and behavioral improvement in premature babies.

"It has 100per cent occupancy with all facilities for premature babies and their

mothers. We aim to enhance learning and teaching, and recently sent one staff nurse and one doctor for KMC training to the Postgraduate Medical Institute in Peshawar," he said.

Dr Iqbalullah said health-care providers required special training on a specialty which didn't have the required trained people.

He said the state-of-the-art facility also included a critical care unit, high dependency unit, and an isolation unit to ensure that neonates received all services under one roof.

Dr Iqbalullah said Unicef had been working closely with the pro-

Six cops, passerby injured in Tank police post attack

DERA ISMAIL KHAN: Six policemen and a passerby were injured when terrorists attacked a police post in the Gul Imaam area of Tank district on Monday.

According to a statement issued by the police, the attackers used both small and big firearms during the assault on the police post.

Rescue 1122 teams swiftly transported the injured policemen to the District Headquarters Hospital in Tank for initial medical care. Later, they were shifted to the DH Hospital in Dera Ismail Khan.

Hospital sources confirmed that all the injured policemen and the passerby were in stable condition.

Law enforcement agencies responded promptly to the incident. A joint team of police and security forces was dispatched to the site to initiate an investigation.

The authorities cordoned off the area and launched a search operation to track down the culprits.

Tank district police officer Aslam Khan visited the Gul Imaam police post and appreciated the personnel for their swift response in repelling the assault.

He issued directives to enhance security protocols, emphasising the mandatory use of bulletproof jackets and helmets. He also urged officers to remain vigilant, avoid distractions such as use of mobile phones while on duty, and actively monitor for suspicious activities.



One killed, three injured in Bajaur cylinder blasts

BAAJUR: One person was killed and three others were injured in separate gas cylinder explosions in Khar school on Monday.

Residents and Rescue 1122 officials said the first incident occurred near the Khar Civil Colony in the wee hours of Monday when a gas cylinder exploded in a house, causing it to collapse, leaving the owner, Fazal Karim, dead on the spot.

Residents of adjacent houses said that the 62-year-old was a retired government employee.

They said he was heating water for morning prayer in his room when the gas cylinder exploded with a bang, destroying most parts of the house.

The residents said that the explosion also damaged home appliances. Soon after the incident, residents of the nearby homes and rescue workers reached the area and recovered the body from the debris.

According to Rescue 1122, the second cylinder blast occurred at a shop in the main vegetable market of Khar. They said that three persons, identified as Gulben Khan, Ibrahim Khan and Abdur Rehman, were injured in the incident.

Condition of all the injured, who were immediately shifted to the District Headquarters Hospital, Khar, was said to be out of danger.

Consumers complain vegetable prices doubled in Mansehra

LAKKI price review body rejects traders' demand to increase rates of food items

MANSEHRA/LAKKI MARWAT: Consumers complain that vegetable prices have almost doubled in markets of Mansehra as traders openly violate the official price list.

The district price and control committee led by the deputy commissioner sets fruit and vegetable price lists.

However, vendors and shopkeepers have been raising nearly double the prices determined by the committee. The committee fixed the price of potatoes at Rs120 per kilogramme, but shopkeepers sold it at Rs180 per kg.

Garlic is being sold at Rs700 per kg instead of Rs650 per kg, while an Rs200 per kg instead of Rs150 per kg, and prices of other vegetables have also increased by Rs50 to Rs80 per kg.

"None of the shopkeepers or vendors follows the price list. I paid Rs240 per kg for tomatoes while the committee set the price at Rs160 per kg," Ashraf Shah, a buyer, said.

He asked as to who would ensure that govt-

men's work as traders consistently sold fruits and vegetables at prices much higher than those fixed by the district administration.

"I understand that vendors blame the disruption of freight transport on the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf protests in the federal capital, but this has become a routine, and we are constantly burdened by self-created inflation," Mr Shah said.

Buyers urged the district administration to ensure the prices set by the committee were enforced in letter and spirit, and due measures were taken to justice under relevant laws.

Though vegetable prices have been high for the last couple of weeks, they surged significantly on Monday as trucks and pick-up vehicles carrying tomatoes and other agricultural products could not reach their destinations owing to traffic disruptions on major arteries, a local fruit and vegetable vendor claimed.

In Lakki Marwat, the district price review committee has rejected traders' demand to increase rates of pulses, meat, milk and spices, saying that after reduction in prices of oil commodities there is no justification to enhance rates of mineral food items.

The committee met at the District Headquarters Complex, Tugra, on Monday with deputy commissioner Zainab Ali Shah in the chair.

Additional deputy-commissioner Sikandar Khan, additional assistant commissioners Ghori Ali Khan, Arman Ali Khan and Mohammad Arif, district food controller Khan Zaman, representatives of traders and consumers' bodies and local municipal officers were in attendance.

Ignoring the requests of traders' representation, the committee kept the prices of various items unchanged.

The deputy commissioner took notice of reports regarding slaughtering of animals outside the slaughterhouses, and asked the relevant authorities to make such places functional in Lakki city and other towns of the district.

"It must be ensured that animals are slaughtered in the slaughterhouses in the presence of veterinary experts," he maintained.

He asked the price magistrates to carry out joint inspection visits of butchers and markets with the livestock and food authority experts and keep a check on prices and quality of milk, spices and other food items.

Mr Shah also asked traders to improve hygiene of their outlets, keep food items covered and avoid indulging in illegal acts of profiteering and hoarding.

He said his administration would not tolerate artificial price hike and the traders involved in violation of the official price list would face stern action.

CIA building declared sub-jail for arrested PTI protesters

ISLAMABAD: The Crime Intelligence Agency's building in the Federal capital has been declared a sub-jail by the Islamabad administration to detain the leaders and workers of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) during the ongoing protests.

Officials of the capital police told Dawn that during the ongoing protests, the capital police have arrested over 500 local leaders and workers.

Due to the engagements in security-related shortage of space in the lockups of the police stations, arrested political individuals will neither be interrogated nor transported somewhere else, they said.

"Currently, all the prison vans and other police vehicles are deployed at different locations as per the security plan. Detaining such arrested persons in the lockups of the police stations is a risk under the prevailing circumstances," the officers said.

Sources said more police stations will be declared sub-jails if required.

The arrests were made from various areas including Faisalabad, Tariq, Sangareni, Chongi No 26, Express Chowk, Noon, Nidore, Shams Colony, and Bhagala.

So far, the capital police have registered seven cases against the leaders and workers of the protesting party for creating unrest and undermining public safety.

The Sialkot police have booked two nominated and 325 unidentified persons, Shahzad Town 402, Barigadda 382, and the Shams Colony police have booked 470 accused in multiple cases. Similarly, the Attock and Tarnol police have booked over 350 and over 300 individuals respectively under various charges.

According to the FIRs, the implicated individuals were armed with weapons, iron punches, iron rods, batons, stones and sharp marble pieces.

The police claimed that the accused resorted to aerial firing, peleted vehicles with stones and blocked roads, shouting anti-government slogans and forcefully closing shops.

Moreover, the capital police Monday partially opened major thoroughfares where shipping containers were placed to block the flow of traffic.

At those blockade points, the barricades were partially removed to make way for a single vehicle to cross at a time.

The police officers further said that the convoy of the PTI leaders and workers coming from KP comprised over 34,000 persons. Till late in the evening, the protesters had crossed the Hukla interchange.

Meanwhile, the Inspector General of the Islamabad Police (IGP), Syed Ali Naqib Ruri, visited D-Chowk and various other areas to inspect antiriot measures.

He met the officials of Islamabad police and other law enforcement agencies to boost their morale, who according to him were performing their duties in order to maintain peace in the federal capital.

On the occasion, IGP Islamabad instructed the officials to be highly alert to deal with any emerging law and order situation.

"We shall take every possible measure to protect the lives and property of citizens and thwart agitators," he said while addressing the officials.

He further said officials were performing their duty, putting their best efforts to maintain peace in the capital.

All the officers have been directed to stay vigilant in their respective areas and brief the personnel to deal with any untoward situation.

Daily wage earners – the silent victims of every political turmoil

For labourers like Mohammad, a single lost day of work can mean going hungry

RAWALPINDI: With commercial and social life coming to a standstill in the Garrison city in the wake of the ongoing political unrest, Mohammad Nasir, a daily wage labourer, prepares to return home empty-handed for the second consecutive day.

He had arrived at Raji Bazaar with his tools of subsistence to find work for the day, only to see potential employers vanish.

For a daily wage like Mohammad, a single lost day of work can mean going home.

The 32-year-old labourer says he works as a construction worker and usually arrives at Raji Bazaar early in the morning in hopes of being hired for the day but for the last two days, he could not find any work due to the political turmoil that has engulfed the twin cities in the wake of the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf's (PTI) protest call.

"I borrowed money from a relative to put the meal on the table for my five-member family the other day, hoping that tomorrow, the situation would improve."

The road closures have迫使 cold water on his hopes, and those of thousands of others like him.

Another labourer, Mohammad Kamran, said that he earned Rs1,000 to Rs2,000 daily but the customer-like situation has dampened his chances today.

"Despite the placement of freight shipping containers on Marree Road, I came in

search of work, only to return

for those living hand-to-mouth, situations like these

become more than inconvenient.

The toll of the lockdown is not limited to daily wagers only, as vendors, especially small ones find it hard to survive amid low customer footfall.

"In the last two days, not a single customer has turned up here," said Mohammad Aslam, a shopkeeper.

Zafar Ahmed, an owner of a clothing shop in Sadiq, expressed similar concerns, complaining about the slow pace of business activities.

Although Sadiq remained open, it too seemed devoid of customers as people continued to avoid travelling.

The Rawalpindi district administration has closed down the Sana Bridge, Marri Chak, Mori Mehal Cinema, Waris Khan, Gwadarmandi, Piarwali and other areas.

While trucks are parked on Mall Road in front of PTI offices, a single lane going towards the Armed Forces Institute of Cardiology remains open to traffic.

Due to the closure of energy and exit points of Rawalpindi city and the Canttment areas, oil tankers are failed to supply fuel to filling stations, sparking fear of fuel shortages. Team Tuesday today.

All Pakistani Oil Tankers Association spokesperson Norman Butt said keeping in view the situation in Lahore, Islamabad and Rawalpindi, transport to these cities has been halted.

"This is significantly impacting the transit of tanker lorries carrying PSL products, which could lead to disruptions in supply," he said.

He said that the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (Ogra) is actively engaging with the district administration but permission has not been granted to restore the supply of the fuel to filling stations.

He said most of the petrol filling stations have stock for only one or two days.

28 recently repaired schools handed over to education dept in Khyber

Officials say repair of 43 others damaged schools nearing completion

KHYBER: Sharif Rural Support Programme (SRSP) handed over 28 government schools that were recently repaired to education department in Khyber tribal district while 43 others were nearing completion, officials said.

Addressing a ceremony in Bala on Monday, SRSP education campaigners Waqar Khan and Suleman Khan said that some of militancy-affected and some old school buildings were repaired with the financial assistance of Project for Communal Development Office (PCDO).

They said that education department had identified at least 24 schools for boys and girls for repair and rehabilitation in Khyber tribal district under the project.

They said that these 24 schools were fully repaired in the first phase of the project and were handed over to education department.

The speakers said that SRSP now started similar activity in its second

phase with a target of repairing 95 partially damaged schools. They said that repair of 43 of the total 95 schools was nearing completion while work on the remaining 52 schools was underway.

"The main objective of this project is not only to rehabilitate school buildings but also to create conducive atmosphere, which could attract a maximum

student SRSP for reconstruction and rehabilitation of the damaged schools.

Officials of education department said that the reconstructed and rehabilitated schools were identified on the basis of their existing conditions as some of these institutions were constructed in 1970s and 1980s but repair was concluded since then.

They hoped that with the completion of the second phase, students' enrollment in Khyber would increase as the reconstructed schools were also provided with solar systems and bathrooms facilities.

Earlier, China Aid project had also announced reconstruction of more than 50 fully damaged government schools in Bala.

Officials said that 31 of these militancy-affected schools were reconstructed and would be handed over to education department in December.

They said that only two schools were still awaiting reconstruction as work was delayed due to land issue as the owners of the previous school building failed to provide the required land for its reconstruction.

Officials said that the Chinese government also pledged to provide financial worth Rs2 million to primary schools, Rs1 million to middle schools, Rs1 million to high schools and Rs9 million to higher secondary schools in Bala.

15 years on, work on Chirah Dam still hasn't started

ISLAMABAD: Despite the passage of 15 years after approval by the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (NEC), work on Chirah Dam could not be started while the twin cities of Rawalpindi and Islamabad are facing a growing shortage of water.

Rawalpindi approved this project in 2009 for providing 15 million gallon per day (mgd) water to the residents of Islamabad and Rawalpindi. He said that many years ago the CDA had paid Rs852 million to NED for this project. "Recently, in a meeting this was discussed in detail," he said.

The sources said that during the meeting it was decided that the CDA will hold a meeting with NED to make a decision.

"In coming days, we will hold a crucial meeting in this regard," an official said.

The sources said keeping in view the inflation rate the cost of the project had increased manifold.

It is relevant to note that both Rawalpindi and Islamabad have been facing shortage of water, Islamabad is a water scarce city but CDA has been supplying around 65mgd to urban areas

while the total need of both urban and rural areas is more than 220mgd.

The people in rural areas mostly dependent on water boring and other small schemes of the district government.

On the other hand, during the last almost three decades, no new dam has been built to overcome the shortage of water in Islamabad which has only three major sources: Naini Dam, Khayber Dam and rawwali. However, it also gets around three mgd of water from Rawal Dam, which mainly provides water to residents of Rawalpindi.

Over the years, various proposed projects including a Ghazi Barothra/Turbat dam designed to provide 100 mgd each to Islamabad and Rawalpindi, Chinar Barrage Dam in Islamabad, Shahzad Dam and proposed Dabara Dam remained under discussion in various meetings of the CDA. However, no steps taken to start construction work. These projects are still at the feasibility stage.

Earlier, various departments were dealing with water related issues. However, last month the federal government transferred the administrative

control of all unmetalled departments from the Metropolitan Corporation of Islamabad (MC) to the CDA, as the civic agency was complained that it was unable to address the shortfall of millions of gallons under the current arrangement.

After getting control of the department, the CDA set up a new organization "Islamabad Water" headed by Director General Sardar Khan Ziaur.

A summary on the basis of the decision made by the federal cabinet had said the Water Management Wing of CDA was unable to meet a shortfall of 65mgd in urban areas and cannot extend its services to the 1.3 million people living in villages around Islamabad.

"The gap in supply and demand for clean water is increasing day by day due to positive change in urban population and climate conditions. There is no integrated planning and management, no water and sewerage infrastructure master plan is available and no water and sewerage business plan has ever been prepared."

After being convinced by CDA's point of view, the cabinet approved the summary but it is yet to be seen how Islamabad Water will perform.
