# **INDIA IS A TOP 10 DEEP TECH MARKET BUT** FACES A MAJOR FUNDING GAP, SAYS A REPORT

India has emerged as a top 10 global region for deep tech funding but faces a significant gap compared to leading nations.

India has emerged as one of the top ten regions in the world for funding deep technology startups However, the gap in funding between India and other leading nations remains significant, high-lighted a report by Speciale Invest and Oister Global. The report stated that while Indian startups re-ceived USD 3.4 billion in funding between 2016 and 2023, their counterparts in China secured 12 times more (USD 37.6 billion), and those in the United King-dom received four times as much (USD 13.4 billion). It said "Indian Deep Tech sector has been among the top 10 well-funded deep tech regions in the world The gap between Indian deep tech fund-

ing and other leading nations is humongous" The United States leads the global deep tech funding landscape with a massive USD 177.4 billion raised during the same period. China follows with USD 37.6 billion, while the UK, France, and Sweden secured USD 13.4 billion, USD 8.6 billion, and USD 7.8 billion, respectively. Other countries in the top 10 include Israel (USD 7.8 billion), Germany (USD 6.2 billion), Canada (USD 5.6 billion), India (USD 3.4 billion),

and Japan (USD 3 billion). While India's funding in the sector is still modest, the report noted that a growing number of startups are scal-ing up to higher valuations. However, the country has exits, such as significant ini-

tial public offerings (IPOs) or acquisitions, which are crucial for building investor confidence. These exits play a pivotal role in at-tracting more capital and fostering innovation with-in the deep tech ecosystem. The report believed it is only a matter of time before India sees big exits in the deep tech space. For this to happen, the country needs to build a robust ecosystem that supports innovation, investment, and scaling op-portunities. Successful exits will not only instil confidence among investors but also set the stage for India to bridge the funding gap and compete with global lead-ers in the deep tech sector. India's deep tech journey has begun on a promising note, and with the right eco-system in place, the country could soon play a larger role on the global stage.

## DAHD Secretary urges dairy federations inaugurates Raipur-Ambikapur flight service to adopt circulara economy practices

Alka Upadhyaya, Secretary, Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying (DAHD), on Thursday, ad-vised the dairy federations to work on circular economy in work on circular economy in the dairy sector and be pro-actively involved in getting the benefits in consultation with National Dairy De-velopment Board (NDDB). During a review meeting on Milk Situation in the coun-try, Secretary stated that during the Department's upcoming conference on circularity in the Dairy sector, every State should come up with at least one project on Biogas to join the circularity movement. She added that the move will help in reducing the carbon footprint of the



dairy sector and at the same time also help in enhancing income of Dairy Farmers. The discussion also included the use of water within the dairy value chain and approaches to ensure its efficient utilisation. It was pointed out that the integration of automation could lead to a consider-able reduction in water consumption at processing plants, thereby aiding the efforts of the National Water Mission and the National Action Plan on Climate Change. Upadhyaya emphasised that

India holds the top position globally in milk produc-tion, generating approximately 239.3 million metric tons in the year 2023-24. She emphasized that Dairy Federations should focus on enhancing milk procurement and increasing the price paid to the farm-ers, while also consider-ing consumer interests. Secretary DAHD said that the overall milk situation in the country is stable and the Wholesale Price Index (WPI) & Consumer Price Index (CPI) with the year-

on-year inflation rates for milk recorded at 2.09 and 2.85 respectively for the month of November 2024. There is an adequate com-modity stock of Skimmed Milk Powder, Whole Milk Powder, White Butter, and Ghee. At the same time, there has been an improve-ment in milk procure-ment and milk procure-ment prices over the year. Secretary (DAHD) advised, all Milk Federations to take up active participation in the Midday Meal and Inte-grated Child Development Services (ICDS) programs of the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MoWCD) and the Ministry of Human Resource Devel-opment (MoHRD), as these represent the largest insti-tutional domestic market for the dairy sector.

Addressing the public during the closing ceremony of the Bastar Olympics-2024, Shah highlighted the significant progress in com-bating Naxalism over the past decade, citing a 73 per cent reduction in the deaths of security personnel and a 70 per cent decline in ci-vilian casualties in regions once dominated by Naxals.

By March 31, 2026, we will completely country," Shah asserted The Home Minister credited the enhanced effectivenes of anti-Naxal operations to the formation of a BJF government in Chhat-tisgarh. He remarked that during the initial five years, the campaign

"In the first year of the government in Chhattisgarh, 287 Naxals were killed, 992 were arrested, and 837 sur-rendered," Shah said. "I urge all Naxals to surrender, give up arms, and become part of the main-stream to work for the welfare of the country. I can proudly say that Chhat

He commended the Chhattisgarh Police for their achievements in the fight against Naxals. Shah arrived in Chhattisgarh on Saturday for a three-day visit, scheduled from December 14 to 16. During his visit, he will chair a high-level security review meeting in the state capital, Raipur, to assess the security situation and related developments

# Shri Ram Mandir project in Ayodhya wins 'Sword of Honour' for Safety'

The 'Ram Temple project' of the Shri Ram Janmaboomi Temple in Ayodhya has been awarded the 'Sword of Honour' by the British Safety Council, Chairman Construction Committee Nripendra Misra said in a statement on Sunday. In a statement, Misra said that this award was one of the highest recognitions in safety management and that the British Safety Council evaluates the safety processes, practices, and on-site activities during its audits, and only those who receive a five-star as ment were eligible for the 'Sword of Honour' award. "Shri Ram Mandir project in Ayodhya Dham has won the prestigious 'Sword of Honour' award given by British Safety Council. It is one of the prestigious accolades in safe-ty management. British Safety Council conducts the audit



of the process, practices, and finally on-site activity assess-ments," the statement read. Larsen and Toubro, the company responsible for the construction of the temple, was also awarded a 'Golden Trophy' by the National Safety Council for its safety measures during the construction pro-cess, the statement added. The temple has been built under close coordination between Larsen and Tou-bro and Tata Consulting Engineers, with effective supervision by the Construction Committee of Shri Ram Janmbhoomi Teerth Kshetra Trust.

The statement stated that the construction of the first and second floors, including the Shikhar (spire) of the temple, was in its final phase, with completion expected by June 2025. The temple is being built using Bansi Paharpur stone from Rajasthan, with a total of approximately 15 lakh cubic feet of stone, along with significant marble cladding, the statement added. Earlier this year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi led rituals at the Pran Pratishtha ceremony in the sanctum sanctorum of the Shri Ram Janmaboomi Temple of Ram Lalla. The magnificent Shri Ram Janmbhoomi Mandir is con-structed in traditional Nagara style. Its length (east-west) is 380 feet: its width is 250 feet, and its height is 161 feet, and it is supported by a total of 392 pillars and 44 doors. The pillars and walls of the temple showcase intricately sculpted depictions of Hindu

deities, gods, and goddesses In the main sanctum sancto rum on the ground floor, the childhood form of Bhagwan Shri Ram (the idol of Shri Ramlalla) has been placed. The main entrance to the Mandir is situated on the eastern side, which can be approached by ascending 32 stairs through the Singh Dwar. There are a total of five Mandaps (Halls) in the Mandir: Nritya Mandap, Rang Mandap, Sabha Man-dap, Prathana Mandap, and Kirtan Mandap. Near the Mandir is a historic well (Sita koop), dating back to the ancient era. In the southwestern part of the Mandir complex, at Kuber Tila, the ancient Mandir of Bhagwan Shiv has been restored, along with the installation of a statue of Jatayu. The foundation of the Mandir has been constructed with a 14-meter-thick layer of roller-compacted concrete (RCC), giving it the appearance of artificial rock

this Friday. The report however expects inflation to moderate in the months ahead, which could influence the Fed's policy outlook. Additionally, jobs data will remain a signifi-



cant factor as the central bank evaluates the strength of the labour market and overall economic resilience The report highlighted positive trends in the US economy. It pointed to resilient economic activity. lower borrowing costs, and broader earnings growth as supportive factors for the fi-

nancial markets. It emphasized the increas-ing monetization of artificial intelligence (AI) and the possibility of greater capital market activity, especially under a potential second Trump administration, as contributing to a favourable environment for US equi-

# **RBI FLAGS RISING SUBSIDIES BY** STATES AS INCIPIENT STRESS

he Reserve Bank of India (RBI) on Thursday termed in-creasing spending by states on subsidies as an "incipient stress" and called for rationalisation of such outgoes.
The central bank in a report

'State Finances: A Study of Budgets of 2024-25' said that the states need to contain and rationalise their subsidy outgoes so that such spending does not crowd out more productive expenditure.

multiple options, Kiruna town in Sweden could have helped them resolve the vexed mosque-temple issue that resulted in thoughtless violence, disquiet and divi-sion in society. Kiruna, a Swedish town

north of the Arctic Circle, is undergoing one of the most ambitious urban relocation projects in history due to the expansion of the Swedish government owned Luossavaara-Kiirunavaara [LKAB] iron ore mine beneath the town. As part of this process, many build-ings, including the iconic Kiruna Church, considered to be one of the most beautiful buildings in Sweden, are being relocated to a new area approximately 3 kilometers east of its current location. Kiruna's church is a terracotta-colored building designed to resemble a hut of the indigenous Sami people. In fact, the word Kiru-na comes from the Sami word giron, which means

Sometime in 2025, the entire 600-tonne church's

wooden building will be loaded onto trailers and moved to a new spot near the local graveyard.

On a private visit, this correspondent saw how local authorities and com-munity leaders are treating church's relocation not just about preserving the church but as a symbol of their collective efforts to Kiruna's unique heritage and identity while adapting to the challenges posed by modern industrial activi-

Kiruna Church, com-pleted in 1912, is one of Sweden's largest wooden buildings and a prime ex-ample of early 20th-centu-ry Nordic architecture. It has significant cultural and historical value, making its preservation and reloca-tion a top priority.

The LKAB iron ore mine

in Kiruna is the world's largest underground mine that produces iron ore for steel mills and other industries. The mammoth, round the clock under-ground mining activities in Kiruna cause consistent threat to the stability of all city buildings, residences shops and commercial establishments. A large part of the town was moved in 2004 setting an example of a town to be relocated. The town is also relocating about 3,000 homes and other buildings. The 1958 clock tower from the previous town hall was dismantled and rebuilt alongside the new landmark after cracks emerged in many

government and school buildings. A new railway station has already been opened further away from the mine. By 2035, approximately 6,000 people out of its current population of 18000, will have been relocated to new housing.

Some of the roads, currently 20 feet in breadth, are being expanded to 40 feet, so that the church's structure is moved easily. Henning Larsen promises to reas semble it in its original de-

There are over 20 signifi-cant buildings from the old town of Kiruna to the new location after getting dismantled and reconstructed in its original form. A mem-ber of Henning Larsen team says physically mov-ing the entire town turns out to be a complex, ex-pensive and unique challenge but making residents

accept the change is a far more formidable task. "The challenge for Kiruna city is not only about moving an entire city, but also moving the minds of citizens and creating a new home and identity," he said while declining to be identified. He said many people asked him even if the church is moved physically, graves and birches would not. Ebba Busch, Sweden's

deputy prime minister and in charge of climate and business views LKAB as Sweden's goldmine," having large deposits of rare earth elements, vital to produce electric car batteries and wind turbines.

The Sámi language is part of and includes several dia-lects, such as North Sámi, Lule Sámi, and South Sámi, North Sámi is the most widely spoken. Rein-deer herding is central to Sámi culture and remains a significant source of live-lihood. Other traditional practices include fishing, hunting, handicrafts (duodji), and joik, a traditional form of singing.

For centuries, Sámi lands

and culture were subjected to colonization, Christian-ization, and assimilation policies by the Swedish state. These policies included restrictions on the use of Sámi languages and forced displacement. Swedish society admits that mining, forestry, and other indus-tries have been encroached on Sámi lands, impacting their traditional way of life.

The Sámi Parliament of Sweden (Sámediggi) was established in 1993 to represent Sámi interests in areas like culture, lan-guage, and reindeer herd-ing. However, its powers are limited, and it functions primarily as an ad-visory body. Efforts are underway to preserve and revitalize Sámi languages, traditions, and knowledge systems. Festivals like the Jokkmokk Winter Market celebrate Sámi culture and attract visitors from around

Climate change and Warming temperatures are affecting reindeer mi-gration patterns and disrupt ecosystems that the Sámi depend on. The Sámi population faces ongoing struggles for land and wa-ter rights, as their traditional territories overlap with areas used for industrial development in addition to systemic discrimination and racism, although awareness and advocacy efforts are increasing.

When cure is impossible by low cost methods, the intention is to provide care. Hence, euthanasia for no cure illness is illogical. The society and medical professionals become despondent and

the patients take extreme

measures such as suicide, euthanasia or substance use, whenever there is no cure. Here ,palliative and rehabilitative care rescues the patient and the family. At times, the family is advised to get the patient discharged from the hos-pital and wait for death to come. The reasons quoted for such decisions are non-availability of bed, futile intervention, poverty, and resources to be utilised for other curable patients. Unfortunately, the majority of our pa-tients' family accept the suggestion. The percep-tion of the society needs to be altered and also the doctors need to emphasize care rather than just

Eradicating the invalid: According to euthanasia opposers, if we embrace 'the right to death with dignity', patients with incurable and debilitating illnesses will be eliminated from our society. But palliative care would provide a relief from excruci-

ating symptoms and pain. Constitution of India: According to Article 21 'Right to life' is a natural right but suicide is incon patible and inconsistent with the concept of 'right to life'. After the legalisation of euthanasia, there is a grave concern that the State may not invest in health (working towards Right to life). In Holland, legalised euthanasia led to a severe downfall in the quality of care for terminally-ill patients. So, there should not be any space for euthanasia in any form in a welfare state.

## SYMPTOM OF MEN-TAL ILLNESS:

One witnesses instances of attempts to suicide or completed suicide in patients suffering from depression, and schizophrenia . It is also documented in patients suffering from obsessive compulsive disorder. Hence, it is imperative to evaluate the men-tal status of the patient seeking euthanasia. An attempt to suicide is a psy-chiatric emergency and considered a desperate call for help or assistance in classical teaching.

# COMMERCIALISATION OF HEALTH CARE:

Passive euthanasia is witnessed in a majority of the hospitals across the country, where poor patients and their fam-ily refuse or withdraw treatment because of the huge expenses entailed in eeping them alive. One it is legalised, commercial health sector will serve death sentences to many disabled and elderly citi-zens of India for a paltry amount of money. The

Supreme Court Judge-ment has emphasised this. Studies have reported

that many terminally ill patients opting for eu-thanasia suffer from major depression, and that the longing for death in terminally ill patients is correlated with depression. They desperately require palliative and re-habilitative care. Zealous , compassionate and humanistic team of health professionals need to look after them and the complete expenses need to be borne by the State so that 'Right to life' be-comes a reality and suc-ceeds before 'Right to death with dignity'. Just like the death sentence is granted to offenders in the rarest of the rare cases by courts, eutha-nasia should be granted only in the rarest of the

The grit to survive against all odds will van-ish from the character of human beings, if the option of euthanasia is available to patients and their families. The truant medical profession als will use it to their advantage to convince the patients and families to utilise this option.

Al's integration into our lives is inevitable, but its impact depends on the choices we make now. As individuals, we must exercise caution in sharing personal data. As a soci-ety, there is a need to demand accountability from corporations and governments. For India, fostering digital literacy and awareness around data security will be critical to en-suring that technology remains a force for progress rather than a source of peril. 'Dummy' students: CBSE conducts surprise inspection at 29 schools, to take legal ac-

The Central Board of Sec ondary Education (CBSE) conducted a series of surprise inspections at 29 schools in Delhi, Bengaluru, Varanasi, Bihar, Gujarat and Chhattis garh to check enrolment of 'dummy' students, officials said on Thursday. According to CBSE Secretary Himanshu Gupta, a total of 29 teams, comprising a CBSE officer and a principal from an affiliated school, conducted the inspections. "Majority of the inspected schools were found to have violated the Board's Affiliation Bye-Laws by en-rolling students beyond their actual attendance records,

effectively creating 'non-attionally, schools were found to be flouting infrastructural norms of the board," Gupta

"CBSE has taken these violations seriously and is in the process of issuing show-cause notices to the schools found in breach of regulations. The Board is also considering le galaction against the default-ing institutions," he added.

The inspections were con-ducted on Wednesday and

Thursday.

Eighteen of the violating schools are in the national capital, while there are three in Varanasi, two each in Ben-galuru, Patna, Ahmedabad, Bilaspur, and Chhattisgarh. Scores of students preparing for engineering and medical entrance exams prefer to take admission to dummy schools so that they can focus solely on their preparations for the competitive exams. They do not attend classes and straightaway appear in the board exams. Aspirants also choose dum-

my schools keeping in mind the quota in medical and en-gineering institutes available for the students from certain states. For example, the candidates who have completed classes 11 and 12 in Delhi are considered for admission to the medical colleges of the na-tional capital under the Delhi

# SC: UP amendment to Section 106 TP Delhi High Court: No pruning of trees Act inoperative after parliamentary amendment of 2003

The Supreme Court in the case Naeem Bano Alias Gaindo vs Mohammad Rahees observed and has held that if the Parliament amends a law which being on a subject in Concurrent List, then an earlier State amendment to the same provision would become

The court in the case held that the Uttar Pradesh amendment to Section 106 of the Transfer of Property Act, 1882, which was car ried out in 1954, would be come inoperative after the Parliament amended Sec-tion 106 in the year 2003.

The Uttar Pradesh amendment provided for a notice period of thirty days for the termination of

alease. The Parliamentary amendment of 2003 amended Section 106 to provide for fifteen days notice period.

The issue raised before the court is that which pro-



vision would be apply in

the State of Uttar Pradesh. The appellant approached the Supreme Court after the Allahabad High Court de-ferred a decision citing the pendency of a larger bench reference.

The Supreme Court ob-served that the Transfer of Property Act was traceable to Entry 6 of List III of the Seventh Schedule of the Constitution- 'Transfer of property other than agri-cultural land; registration of deeds and documents.'

The court referred to Article 254 of Constitution of India which provides that the Parliamentary law will India which provides that the Parliamentary law will prevail over a State law in the event of a repugnancy

between the two. The Uttar Pradesh Amendment Act would be come inoperative due to the application of Article 254(2) of Constitution of India.

The bench comprising of Justice BV Nagarathna and Justice NK Singh was hear-ing the present matter. The bench in the case

held that the Uttar Pradesh amendment to Section 106 would pale into insig-nificance owing to implied repugnancy and incon-sistency between the U.P. State amendment and the Parliamentary amendment to Section 106 of the T.P. Act

ation of the President and had received the Presiden-tial assent. Therefore, on the Parliament amending a provision subsequent to a State legislature's amendment of a provision of law found in the Concurrent List, the Parliamentary amendment would apply. The Article 254 of Constitution of India is an instance of Parliamentary suprem-

The court also observed that in view of the amendment made to Section 106 by the Parliament by Act 3 of 2003 with effect from December 31, 2022, the substitution in Section 106 made by the Legislature of the State of U.P. is impliedly repealed and Section 106 as amended with effect from amended with effect from December 31, 2002 by the Parliament, would apply. This is on the strength of the proviso to clause (2) of Article 254 of the Constitution of India

Accordingly, the court remitted the matter back to the High Court for decision

It has been argued be-fore the court that the of-ficials failed to follow the directions issued by court requiring the Tree Officers to spell out reasons for permitting the felling The counsel, Advocate

Aditya N Prasad appear ing for the petitioner, Bhavreen Kandhari, ap-prised the Court about the permissions granted by DCF, South Forest Division for light and heavy pruning of trees. The court in the case ob-

served that there being a prima-facie contravention of provisions of DPTA, contravention of judicial orders and an overall unsatisfactory state of affairs. The court also stated that it seems that the Dep-uty Conservator of Forest, South Forest Division is not aware of the statutory

duty and responsibility cast upon the Department of Forest and Wildlife. Adding to it, the court stated that the said court

reminded the DCF of their role of preservation of trees, which is the pri-mary objective behind the statute and that permission for felling, cutting, removing or disposing of a tree under section 9 of the DPTA cannot be passed in a causal and

cavalier manner. There-fore, the section 9 of the DPTA in itself restricts such permission to be given only in exceptional circumstances and only after due inspection of the trees concerned.

The bench headed by Justice Singh in the case observed and has issued a show cause notice to the Deputy Conservator of Forest, South Forest Division as to how blanket permissions for prun-ing of trees were given without due inspection or reasons in contravention to the provisions of DPTA. The court stated that, 'The said court has repeatedly passed direc-tions to prevent incessant and mindless felling of trees in Delhi, however the Department has con tinued to display a lack of sensitivity towards the

Further, the court directed the Forest Depart-ment for filing an affidavit which indicate the forest land in Delhi and the extent of illegal and unauthorized encroachments

on the same. Last Year, the court in its order stated that no permission shall be granted to anyone by the city au-thorities for felling of trees for construction of houses in the national capital.

The court in the case directed the Delhi's Principal Chief Conservator of Forests to ensure that the orders permitting the tree felling, under Delhi Pres-ervation Of Trees Act, 1994, are uploaded with-in a period of 48 hours on the official website.

Accordingly, the court listed the matter for further consideration on January 10, 2025.

targets, focusing on the ports of Ras Issa, Hodeidah, and al Salif. Eight tug boats were destroyed, and strikes extended to fuel and oil tankers, as well as a power plant in Sana'a.

# 'Israel's deprivation of water in Gaza is act of genocide'

Human Rights Watch said on Thursday that Israel has killed thousands of Pales-tinians in Gaza by denying them clean water which it says legally amounts to acts of genocide and extermina

tion.
"This policy, inflicted as estinian civilians in Gaza, means Israeli authorities have committed the crime against humanity of extermination, which is ongoing. This policy also amounts to an 'act of genocide' under the Genocide Convention of 1948," Human Rights Watch said in its report.

It said international partners had sent water tankers through Israeli crossings, including last week, and Israel had facilitated the entry of more than
