



Imran can't be tried for failing to deposit gift in Toshakhana: IHC

- Detailed order on bail plea says rules amended in 2023 can't be applied retroactively
- FIA prosecutor completes cross-examination of Toshakhana official
- Much-awaited decision in £190m reference deferred again due to absence of judge

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC), in a detailed judgment on the post-arrest bail petition of former prime minister Imran Khan in the Toshakhana case, has declared that the accused cannot be prosecuted for failing to deposit a Balfour jewellery set — gifted by the Saudi crown prince — in the state treasury under the rules.

In a 14-page verdict, Justice Mianqul Hassan Arora said that only the submission of a receipt was mandatory, and not the gift itself, under the Toshakhana rules of 2018.

While penalties were introduced in 2023 through changes in the rules for non-submission of gifts to the state treasury, the same could not be applied retroactively to actions from prior years, the court ruled.

The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) had no

tiated criminal proceedings against Imran Khan and his spouse Rukhsar Bibi, alleging procedural violations, undervaluation of the expensive jewellery set gifted by the Saudi crown prince, and a resulting loss of Rs12.8 million to the national exchequer.

The agency argued that Mr Khan influenced the "undervaluation" of the gift. However, the IHC judgement stated "no direct threats or pressure" were attributed to the former premier in the case.

Besides, the detailed verdict also cited that Sohail Abbasi, who evaluated the gift, became a sworn witness after being pardoned by the head of the anti-graft watchdog National Accountability Bureau (NAB), but the testimony remains unverified.

The court noted that the defence counsel maintained that the recipient of the gift money was submitted to the Toshakhana as per 2018 rules, thus the accused did not violate any law.

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PTI links success of talks with govt's 'seriousness'

- Party spox claims 'rogue elements' in ruling coalition want to sabotage the process
- PM's aide says dialogue can't move forward if PTI doesn't put its demands in black & white

ISLAMABAD: As it awaits a meeting with party founder Imran Khan to finalise its demands, the PTI has accused the federal government of being "transactional" about talks with the opposition party, claiming that statements coming from certain ministers may put a damper on the dialogue process.

In a statement on Monday, PTI spokesman Shoaib Waqas Akram and government officials should not doubt the intentions of the opposition party, claiming that talks were not making any progress due to the "transactional attitude" of the ruling coalition.

The dialogue, which kicked off over two weeks ago, has not made any significant headway so far. The major hurdle so far are the PTI negotiators' lack of access to Imran Khan, and the PTI's unwillingness to share its demands with the government in writing.

Mr Akram urged the government to rein in the "rogue" elements within its ranks, who were allegedly determined to

sabotage the negotiation process and had become major obstacles to its success.

A day earlier, Senior Ishaq Siddiqui had expressed apprehensions that the new demands of the PTI "may sabotage the entire negotiation process". The statement followed a suggestion by the PTI seeking the involvement of the establishment in the process.

In his statement issued on Monday, the PTI spokesperson claimed that the government failed to appreciate the PTI's concerns with equal seriousness. He added that PTI's commitment to resolving the current political impasse was clear when Imran Khan took the initiative to form an emergency negotiating committee.

He emphasised it was incoherent upon the government to bring down the political temperature and ensure uninterrupted access to the PTI founding chairman for his regular inputs regarding the negotiation process because only he could make final decisions. He urged the government to fulfil its commitment

Ahsan downplays PPP's beef with federal govt

- Minister says differences exist in every household, but it doesn't mean there is a problem
- Sindh CM's office insists 'no communication' with Centre on establishment of Pakistan Maritime and Seaport Authority

KARACHI: The PMO-Ned government on Monday tried to downplay differences with its erstwhile ally, the PPP, as a cabinet minister tried to end their dispute on maritime problems, saying that just because there were differences doesn't mean there is a problem.

In an impassioned statement, Mr Ahsan said that the government's survival "hung on PPP's support" and that it would "collapse" if that support was withdrawn.

Asked by Sindh Energy Minister Syed Nasir Hussain Shah, Mr Ahsan said that differences in a coalition government were inevitable.

He was referring to concerns raised by PPP spokesman Shoaib Maqsood earlier, who accused the federal government of not consulting his party on key decisions such as the establishment of the Pakistan Maritime and Seaport Authority (PMMSA).

In an impassioned statement, Mr Ahsan had said that the government's survival "hunged on PPP's support" and that it would "collapse" if that support was withdrawn.

Asked by Sindh Energy Minister Syed Nasir Hussain Shah, Mr Ahsan responded to questions regarding the conflict by saying that "slight differences were usual

when governments were formed via coalition."

"These problems happen even in a household — between husband and wife — but it does not mean there is a problem," he said, adding that both parties had managed their differences amicably.

"This is the beauty of Pakistan's democracy, that two parties with independent values live with maturity," he said.

"Rather than having two countries with their differences, they collaborate and work for the country's future," he added.

He said that both parties put their differences aside whenever it came to the country's development.

"We need to keep our politics aside and both parties have to play their

part," he said, adding that the understanding between the parties existed since the Charter of Demands was signed between Nawaz Sharif and Benazir Bhutto in 2006.

"This is the beauty of Pakistan's democracy, that two parties with independent values live with maturity," he said.

"Rather than having two countries with their differences, they collaborate and work for the country's future," he added.

He said that the internal and external challenges faced by Pakistan needed everyone's joint effort.

No registered Afghans will be deported until June 30, SC told

Report states 784,954 illegal foreigners have been repatriated so far

ISLAMABAD: With the Constitutional Bench set to resume the hearing of a petition against the mass deportation of Afghans on Tuesday today, the federal government has assured the Supreme Court that validity of the notifications issued to the registered refugees had been extended until June 30.

The public interest petition, to be heard by a seven-judge bench headed by Justice Amin ul Haq Khan, was filed by a coalition of

civil society activists comprising rights campaigners former senators Farhatullah Babar and Mumtaz Ali Shah, missing persons' supporters Amna Masood Jafri and lawyer Jibril Nasir, Ishaq Manzoor and Imran Shahid through Advocate General Iqbal Gilani. The petition was filed in the wake of a mass deportations decision announced by the Apex Commission on Oct 3, 2023.

In its report, the federal government assured the Supreme Court that all Afghan refugees who have been living in Pakistan following their registration in any form, including holders of POFs or Afghan Citizen Cards (ACCs), will be provided full legal protection and will not be apprehended or deported.

This promise extends till June 30, 2025, as per the July 22, 2024 ratification issued by the Ministry of States and Frontier Regions. The total number of POF and ACC holders living in Pakistan is estimated to be 1.3 million and 700,000, respectively.

The report, filed by Additional Secretary Interior Nasir Muhammad Boosar, stated that until now a total of 784,954 illegal foreigners, including Afghans, had been repatriated.

The report explains that since the rollout of phase II of the Illegal Foreigners Repatriation Pilot (IFRP), a majority of illegal foreigners, including Afghan nationals, have been repatriated.

However, the foreigners, who have been registered, were not

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Trudeau to step down once successor chosen

If future has seen significant increases in climate policy, Trudeau has led

reconciliation, and social programmes like national childcare. However, declining public support, mounting internal dissent, and recent by-election losses have placed the Liberals in a precarious position.

"This country deserves a real change in the next election," Trudeau said. "It has become clear to me that if I am having to fight internal battles, I cannot be the best option in that election."

The decision was finalized over the holiday season, Trudeau explained, following extended discussions with his family. "Over the holidays, I had the chance to reflect. I've had long talks with my family about our future," he said. "Last night, over dinner, I told my kids about the decision I am sharing with you today."

In addition to beginning the leadership process, Trudeau confirmed that he had asked Governor-General Mary Simon to prorogue Parliament until March 24. He argued that this would provide the Liberal Party with the necessary time and space to focus on its leadership transition.

Parliament has been paralyzed for months after what has been the longest session of a minority parliament in Canadian history, he said. "Proroguing allows for the focus required to navigate this transition."

The announcement follows growing calls from within the Liberal Party for Trudeau to step aside, a movement that gained momentum after the resignation of Finance Minister Chrystia Freeland in December.

Freeland, once seen as one of Trudeau's closest allies, criticized his leadership as she stepped down, further emboldening dissenting voices within the party. By late December, a growing number of Liberal MPs had publicly urged him to resign.

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Three slain in fresh spate of terror attacks

LAKKI MARWAT: At least three people, including two policemen, lost their lives and two persons of the Frontier Constabulary received injuries in multiple attacks by militants targeting law enforcers and civilians in the Lakki Marwat and Bannu districts on Monday.

Two police officials were martyred after unidentified gunmen targeted them in the Jakabak area of Lakki Marwat, said an official, adding the attack took place near Naseer Khan graveyard in the limits of the Ghaniyal police station. Both policemen were killed on the spot and the survivors managed to escape on a motorcycle.

The slain constables, Hikmatullah and Khan Bahadar, were on their way to their respective duty stations on a motorcycle from their village Kherwali Pura. It was said that the deceased constables Hikmat and Khan Bahadar were deployed at the Shaboor, Rahat, Ali Khan police stations of Dera Potoh town and Shaboorkhel police station, respectively. They were assigned the duty to receive official letters and communications from their respective police stations and take/dispatch them to the district police office daily, he said.

After the attack, a heavy contingent of law enforcers reached the area and launched a search for the assailants. Hearing

Four die, 20 injured as bus overturns

MUZAFFARGARH: Four passengers died while 20 others got injured seriously when a speeding bus overturned along the T3 Link Canal near Sultan Colony on Monday.

The bus, traveling from Rawalpindi to Multan, suffered a tyre burst, causing the driver to lose control and resulting in the accident.

Local residents immediately rushed to the scene and called rescue officials.

According to rescue teams, four passengers died on the spot due to severe head injuries, while over 20 others were critically injured.

The injured were shifted to nearby hospitals for emergency treatment.

Some of the critically injured patients were later shifted to Multan Hospital in Multan. The deceased were also moved to a local hospital, and their bodies were handed over to their families.

Kot Addu Deputy Commissioner Syed Munawar Abbas Baloch and DPO Syed Haider Ali Haider visited the accident site and supervised the rescue operations.

The bus involved in the incident belonged to a private transport company.

The accident occurred near Head Muhammadabad due to the combination of a tyre burst and speeding.

Rescue teams and a contingent of Kot Addu police worked to remove injured passengers and recover bodies by cutting through the bus.

Killing for a 'cause': shooter does it for Umrah tickets

LAHORE: Sialkot police have arrested a young man identified as Usman, accused of killing Muhammad Iftiaz on Jan 1 in exchange for two Umrah tickets and a motorcycle.

A police official stated that the suspect was allegedly hired by Iftiaz, deceased's brother-in-law, over a property dispute.

Iftiaz had previously transferred his house to his wife's name but demanded it back after a domestic dispute. His wife refused, stating she would consult her brother, Riaz, before making any decision.

The disagreement escalated and led to heated exchanges. Following this, Iftiaz's wife left his home and moved in with Riaz.

Iftiaz allegedly hired Usman to kill Riaz.

The police tracked the suspect using Safe City cameras and call data records. The police arrested the shooter and are seeking for the arrest of the other suspect, the police official said.—Staff Reporter

Three brothers killed in lock-up as rivals storm police station

Team formed to probe into security lapse amid reports of thin police presence

LAHORE/TOKRI NIGAR: In what appeared to be a case of a security lapse, three armed men carried out a brazen attack at a police station in Tandojamia tribal of Faisalabad district and allegedly killed three brothers and injured their cousin having a murder case.

The attackers stormed the Saddar police station by scaling the walls using a bamboo ladder, killed their rivals in lock-up within a few minutes and fled the scene without any resistance as there were only three policemen on duty posted at the police station when the attack was carried out.

The police declared the incident a result of an old enmity between the two local groups of Tandojamia tribal—Sakheras and Kharais—who had so far allegedly killed eight persons of each other in Tandojamia.

Those who lost their lives in the fresh tribal attack were identified as Muhammad Bilal, Muhammad Usman

and Nasir Ali, the men belonging to Sakhera group. The injured, Muhammad Asif, was shifted to Tandojamia THQ hospital in a critical condition.

They were arrested for allegedly murdering three men of rival Kharai group and a case was lodged against them under 7 ATA and other relevant charges.

The police troopers showed that 41 police personnel posted at the Tandojamia Saddar police station had gone to their homes, leaving three posts, who were on physical rounds granted by the anti-terrorism court, almost unarmed.

Southern party to the incident declared it a case of security lapse, holding the divisional SP, DSP and other police officers responsible for the attack and killing of the suspects in custody saying the Faisalabad police high-ups had already conveyed them in writing to keep the suspects in tight security following the almost unarmed.

The attackers stormed the Saddar police station by scaling the walls using a bamboo ladder, killed their rivals in lock-up within a few minutes and fled the scene without any resistance as there were only three policemen on duty posted at the police station when the attack was carried out.

They said the police officers blatantly violated the instructions and left the deceased at the mercy of the these policemen.

Faisalabad Regional Police Officer (RPO) Dr Abd Khan told Dawn that the assailants brought wooden ladder and went to the backside of the police station on finding the main gate closed.

He said the armed men went to the

roof of the police station and then reached the corridor through the stairs where a police constable, Kaleem Shah, fired warning shots on finding the armed strangers.

However, the attackers opened indiscriminate fire, forcing the constable to stop firing and take shelter in a portion of the police building.

The assailants then went to the police lock-up and unleashed massive firing on their rivals, killing three of them on the spot and injuring another critically.

The attackers belonging to the Kharai group fled the scene after completing the task, the RPO said, adding that he reached the site along with Faisalabad City Police Officer Komran Adil soon after the attack.

To a question about security lapses, he said, enmity started between Sakheras and Kharais groups for the first time when the former attacked and injured a man of the latter group in March 2023.

The attacker belonging to the Sakhera group, Muhammad Imran, was declared proclaimed offender CPD in this case, the RPO said.

He went on saying the armed men from Kharai party avenged and allegedly murdered two men of the rival group in August 2023. A murder case was lodged against the men of the attacking group accordingly.

An litigation was ongoing, Dr Abd said, the Sakhera party carried out an armed attack in October last year and allegedly killed three men of the rival group whom they were en route to the district court.

The Tandojamia City police lodged a murder case under 7 ATA and other relevant charges and arrested the four suspects of Sakhera group in the above-mentioned killings of three individuals.

To a question about security lapses, the RPO said he would not spare anyone and set an example for others.

According to sources, at least 10 individuals of the attacking group had been arrested but police have not as yet confirmed their arrests.

Meanwhile, Inspector General of Police Punjab Dr Umar Arora took notice of the police's negligence, constituted an inquiry team of three senior police officers to investigate the matter separately to fix a responsibility against these hard-guilty of security lapses which led to the killing of three innocent martyrs.

The inquiry officials, including DIG Intelligence special branch police Punjab (IASP) head of the committee, additional IG complaints Ghulam Ali Chishti and additional IG operations Zahid Nauman Marwat have reached Faisalabad.

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Rs100bn increase in Honhaar Scholarship funds

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Punjab forms wide-ranging district coordination committees

LAHORE: In line with the Revised National Action Plan (RNAP), the Punjab government has constituted District Coordination Committees (DCCs) to undertake a host of actions, ranging from curbing smuggling, ensuring registration of madrasahs, commission as well as establishment of District Narrative News Centres (DNNCs) to neutralising hostile narratives against the government.

In pursuance to the decision of the Central Apex Committee, presided over by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, the RNAP had called for the constitution of DCCs, assigning several functions to these bodies, including execution of policy decisions to prevent extremism and terrorism and implement decisions made by the federal and provincial apex committees.

The Punjab home department has constituted and notified DCCs to be convened by the deputy commissioners (DCs) of the respective districts across the province.

Each committee, having members not less than 40-50 officers, comprising CPPO (or Lahore/CPO/DPG), representatives of local formation heads of all five departments,

representatives of special branch, Counter Terrorism Department (CTD), Intelligence Bureau (IB), Federal Investigation Agency (FIA), Anti Narcotics Force (ANF), Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI), Military Intelligence (MI), representatives of Customs (where required) and any other approved member as required.

The DCCs have been tasked with executing the policy decisions regarding the NAP and apex committee to strengthen the security framework at the district level. The committees have been asked to implement and enforce security policies relating to the prevention of extremism, terrorism and other unlawful activities.

The respective DCCs have also been assigned the task of ensuring registration of madrasahs with the relevant authorities, while implementing the NAP reforms for madrasah education, to bring all religious seminaries under regulatory oversight, leading to their contribution to national peace and security.

These committees have also been tasked with establishing District Narrative News Centres to ensure that dissemination of any information aligns with the policies and narrative of the Punjab government.

The committees will be required

to work with traditional and digital social media outlets to ensure widespread dissemination of government narratives.

They will also develop and execute rapid-response strategies to manage disinformation, monitor using tools to track public sentiment and disinformation campaigns, accordingly.

The committees have also been empowered to launch crackdowns on narcotics smuggling, power theft and other illegal activities. The committees have been ordered to target warehouses dealing in smuggled goods and non-custom paid (NCPP) items, including vehicles.

The committees will also be required to shut down illegal petrol pumps and take action against unlawful settlements and unauthorised activities in peripheral areas.

The committees are supposed to establish direct communication channels between district and provincial authorities for close coordination and liaison to maintain consistency and transparency in security issues and law enforcement. The DCCs will also monitor establishment of Safe Cities Authorities for enhanced real-time surveillance and monitoring to ensure effective law enforcement in all major cities of the province.

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PM for seizing assets of human traffickers

• Asks FO to extradite Pakistanis involved in 'heinous trade' abroad • Sukkur court summons PM, other officials on Jan 15 over boat tragedy

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Monday ordered strict legal action against human trafficking in the country, including immediate confiscation of their properties and assets.

The directives came hours after an additional sessions judge in Sukkur summoned the prime minister, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi and Deputy PM Ishraq Dar on Jan 15 in connection with a recent incident in which 25 Pakistanis were killed when their boat capsized off the coast of Greece.

The judge issued the summons while hearing a petition which contended that due to the government's "negligence", unscrupulous Pakistanis were trying to reach Europe through illegal routes and losing their lives in the process. The petitioner demanded action against those responsible for the killings.

Chairing a review meeting on measures taken against human trafficking, PM Shehbaz praised the Federal Investigation Agency for taking action against government officials for their involvement in the illegal practice.

He directed that strict punitive measures be taken against the facilitators, said a press release issued by the PM Office's media wing.

The prime minister was briefed on the measures taken against human trafficking, progress on the legal actions against facilitators and about legislation for the eradication of this practice.

The prime said that prosecution process against all the individuals involved in the heinous trade should be made more effective, adding that top lawyers be appointed for prosecution in consultation with the ministry of law and justice.

He said the Foreign Office should contact the countries concerned to expedite the extradition of those Pakistanis who are running human trafficking operations

abroad.

He directed that the ministry of information and broadcasting, in collaboration with the ministry of interior, should launch an awareness campaign about using only legal channels for overseas employment.

He said the country should promote vocational training institutions that could provide certified professionals to the international market in accordance with modern requirements, adding that the screening process for individuals travelling abroad should be made more effective at the airports.

Notice:

Earlier, Additional Sessions Judge Sajid Javed Mirza issued notices to the PM, the foreign minister, and the interior minister through the speaker of National Assembly and directed them to appear before the court on Jan 15 on a petition filed by advocate Mohammad Ali Shah.

The petitioner held the respondents responsible for the deaths of 25 Pakistanis who he said were compelled to go abroad for employment because the government had failed in fulfilling its responsibilities, adding that the government had lost its way.

The petitioner appealed to the court that a case be registered at the Robert police station against the government officials for their alleged negligence.

Message to Allah:

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif paid tribute to Shaheed Altaf Hussain who had laid down his life 11 years ago to save his school and classmates from a devastating attack. Protesters said the daily lives of locals have been paralysed, and students cannot study, putting their future at stake. They said trade activities, online businesses, and other pursuits have come to a halt, affecting their livelihoods.

After several consultations on Monday evening, the protest organi-

zation, which includes Uthaiullah Baig, a Gilgit Assembly member from Hunza, Awami Workers Party leader Baloo Jan, PPP officer Zahoor Karim and PML-N leader Rehan Shah, announced that the protest would continue.

Addressing the protesters, they announced their joint decision to intensify the protest from Tuesday, as the Gilgit government had failed to fulfill their genuine demands. They said no vehicle, except for emergency cases, would be allowed to pass through any route in the area.

Women and children would also

join the protest, as there would be complete shutdown and shutdown strike to press the authorities to meet their demands.

Zahoor Shah, one of the organisers, said the Gilgit government's offer had already been rejected by protesters. He said fuel should immediately be supplied to thermal generators for their operation to increase power supply. He said work on the power projects in Hunza must also be expedited. The organisers said people in other areas of GB were also facing 22-hour-long blackouts.

Political polarisation:

On the other hand, Advisor to GB Chief Minister on Information Firas Shah told a press conference that 90pc demands of the protesters had already been met by the government. He accused the PML-N, PPP and other political parties of exploiting locals for their political interests.

The adviser questioned Gilgit assembly lawmaker Uthaiullah Baig's performance when he was senior minister to solve power crisis. He said the elected member from Hunza had failed to initiate a single power project.

Instead of thermal generators, he added, the GB government was working on a long-term solution. He claimed that work on several under-construction power projects would be completed next year.

Internet users grew in 2024, says minister

KARACHI: Dispelling the impression that internet interruptions had been a recurring problem over the past year, IT Minister Shamsa Farina Khanjozai maintains that the number of internet users in the country had grown over the past year.

In a statement, the minister said that an overall statistical evaluation of Pakistan's exports saw a 33 per cent growth over five months, "a mark that was inconceivable had internet interruptions been a regular norm".

The comparative growth of internet users from 2023 to 2024 was up by 25 pc, she said, adding that this was a "reflection of the reduced and consolidated efforts put together [sic] by the IT minister regarding connectivity".

Last week, a report from Top10VPN.com, an independent VPN review, claimed that the cumulative financial impact of internet shutdowns and outages in Pakistan during 2024 was around \$1.62bn.

However, Ms Khanjozai contended that fixed-line or broadband internet was never shut and "The IT industry is fully functional, apart from the brief outages experienced during the months of August and September". She claimed that the information regarding internet closures had been "far exaggerated than where it truly stands".

German diplomat found dead in Islamabad

The embassy then informed the police and officials from Secretariat police station who reached the flat and shifted the body to hospital.

The police were told that the diplomat was a heart patient. It was not clear when the diplomat died. However, he had last used his WhatsApp at 7:44pm on Saturday, police said.

Spokesperson for the German diplomatic mission did not respond to Dawn's requests for comment.

NA body orders hiring of local experts for revision of master plan

Summary moved to federal cabinet for formation of master plan commission, CDA informs committee

ISLAMABAD: A parliamentary panel on Monday directed the Ministry of Interior to engage local experts, town planners and reputable firms for the timely finalisation of Islamabad's master plan.

The National Assembly Standing Committee on Interior met at Parliament House with Raja Khurram Shahzad Nawaz in the chair.

The chairman of the CDA briefed the committee and said a summary had been moved to the federal cabinet for formation of the master plan committee.

The previously formed commission

had directed hiring of international consultants for the revision of the master plan.

The committee expressed displeasure over hiring of international firms, considering it "wastage of taxpayers' money."

The chair emphasised that the Ministry of Interior should engage local professional experts to ensure timely completion of the master plan.

Dominic Associates, a Geneva-based firm that prepared the master plan in 1960, had recommended its revision after every 20 years in accordance with the needs of time.

However, successive governments did not bother to make proper revision rather kept focusing on selective changes without any input from professionals, resulting into poor planning in the capital city.

So far, over 50 major changes have been made to the master plan and the incoming government also made at least seven changes to it last month without getting any input from experts.

In the new changes, at least three sectors have been excluded from Zone I of Islamabad and made residential sectors after changing their original status of half green and half for institutions.

Meanwhile, the committee also expressed displeasure about the implementation of luxury fees on unregistered vehicles and directed the Ministry of Interior to ensure not only the cancellation of the notification dated August 2, 2024 but also refund of the collected amounts to the public in line with the committee's previous recommendations.

Furthermore, the committee recommended a one-time relaxation for new registrations and a token late fee for three months.

The ministry was directed to consult the relevant departments and stakeholders to review the increased slabs and formulate a standardised registration fee structure.

Meanwhile, the director general PIA was directed to brief the committee

on the government's current policy and strategies for addressing human trafficking cases.

The chair directed the DG chief to present a legislative draft for stricter punishments for agents involved in human trafficking and to fix responsibility on PIA officials and officers found complicit in such cases.

Meanwhile, the committee considered the "Naturalisation (Amendment) Bill 2024" (sections 3-9, 11 & 12) and "The Code of Criminal Procedure (Amendment) Bill 2024" moved by Syeda Naseem, Northern MPA, and recommended that the bills be passed by the National Assembly.

The committee also reviewed "The Pakistan Citizenship (Amendment) Bill 2024" (section 14A), "Government Bills," "Pakistan Land Port Authority Bill 2024" and "The Criminal Law (Amendment) Bill 2024" (section 498 A) moved by MNA Sofia Nasir Shah and deferred them to the next meeting.

authority in "legality", the money and in return received billions of rupees and hundreds of kameez from Riaz's Town.

As per the reference, Malik Riaz transferred 240 kameez of land to Farzad Shahzad while Zafar Baloch received land under a trust, which NAB argued did not exist at the time of transfer.

The prosecution further alleged that a trust was created only after the adjustment of the £150m, raising doubts about its legitimacy and purpose.

Similarly, the court had commented that the government should also be asked to allow the UNHCR and its partner organisations to register and expeditiously process and decide all the asylum-seeking applications filed by the foreigners residing in Pakistan.

The court should also order the federal government to coordinate with all relevant federal and provincial law enforcement agencies to secure the fundamental rights of all persons who were for the time being in Pakistan, the petition said.

It alleged that the government policy had failed to pro-

vide any mechanism that could distinguish between the birth-right citizens and illegal immigrants. Thus, it violates the ruling in the Hafeez Haiderullah Saboor case.

The petition contended that the policy of deporting the refugees was in violation of the principles incorporated in Article 2A of the Constitution. Besides, the policy also failed to take into account the fact that many of the persons being deported or made liable to deportation may be doubly marginalised on account of factors like ethnicity, religion, gender etc.

Being apprehended and deported.

The government pleaded that the petition may be dismissed as being not maintainable, frivolous, baseless, contrary to law and in the best interest of justice.

The principal argument of the petitioners was that not only was the mass expulsion a violation of

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Fragile peace

WHILE a peace deal to end the violence in Kurram tribal district was signed on New Year's Day between the warring tribes, the fact that the local deputy commissioner was attacked in the district mere days after the signing shows how difficult the challenge of maintaining calm in this region will be, DC Jawadullah Mehsud and members of his security detail came under attack in the Bagar area on Saturday. Reportedly, a protest was underway in the locality, and the attackers were amongst the demonstrators, the KP government spokesman said. Luckily, Mr Mehsud survived the attack and was rushed out of the area. However, the question arises if the state cannot protect one of its senior functionaries, how will it keep Kurram's ordinary citizens safe from violence and terrorism?

Fortunately, the peace deal has held despite the attack on the DC, while the KP government has promised to apprehend the perpetrators. Arrests have reportedly been made, while a meeting held to review the situation in Kohat, headed by the KP chief minister, decided that the provincial administration will take punitive measures against those who breach the peace. Notably, it has been decided that anyone carrying a weapon will be considered a militant. It is clear that there are elements in Kurram who do not want to see peace prevail in the district. The state, backed by the local tribes, must isolate and punish those malignant actors so that the fresh cycle of bloodshed in Kurram can be brought to a close.

The recently concluded peace deal offers a roadmap to lasting calm, but it can only work if the state has the will to enforce it, and the local tribes agree to abide by all its points. The primary criteria for calm in Kurram is a need to downplay the district, and neutralise all militant and sectarian groups active in the area. This includes keeping a close eye on the Afghan border, from where terrorists can and do infiltrate. Moreover, there must be freedom of movement across the district, and there cannot be any "no-go" areas closed off to certain tribes or sects. The blockade of upper Kurram has created a grave humanitarian situation, and the state must guarantee the district's people have access to food, fuel, medicines etc at all times. Also, those who have lost loved ones, as well as those whose property has been destroyed in the recent clashes, must get justice. And the land and water disputes that have long fuelled tension in the area must be addressed judiciously. None of this will be easy in a tribal area which has seen decades of on-again, off-again skirmishes, exacerbated by sectarian differences and geopolitical factors. But the state cannot ignore the suffering of Kurram's people.

Captive power cut

THE IMF's refusal to relax its demand for discontinuation of massively subsidised gas supplies to mostly inefficient captive power plants owned by wealthy textile producers, in order to eliminate cost distortions between power supply from the national grid and in-house generation, is understandable. Where power supply is a problem, captive power producers would be asked to pay additional Rs17,700/cu.m Btu on top of prevailing LNG prices to strip them of the cost benefits of in-house generation. The condition, one of the key structural benchmarks of the ongoing \$7bn funding programme, is aimed at compelling the government to wean the industry off energy subsidies, and encourage factory owners to shift to the national grid to stem falling power production — a major reason for soaring capacity payments to IPPs and unaffordable consumer tariffs. The electricity price subsidies for the industry have mostly been withdrawn under IMF oversight.

On the face of it, the condition appears harsh for exporters, as it would somewhat raise the cost of textile exports. But it isn't. Generous energy and other subsidies doled out to textile exporters over the past several decades have made them inefficient, preventing product diversification and value-addition. Once they are weaned off subsidies, we may see some inefficient industries close down, with others investing in new technologies to stay competitive in the international markets. This action will also give small and medium textile exporters, who can't afford captive power to slash their production costs, a fair chance to compete with the large producers in the market and grow bigger. It should also help divert gas to the much more efficient RLNG-based power generation plants, reducing the burden of growing capacity payments on the national exchequer and consumers. Indeed, the gas utilities have concerns about the drop in their sales amidst "250 surplus LNG cargoes" that Pakistan must procure under long-term contracts with suppliers. The concerns aren't totally misplaced, but the growth in demand from the on-grid power sector is expected to significantly offset the gas companies' projections of losses due to the decrease in demand from the captive power sector. No doubt, it's a complex situation where stabilisation of one segment of the energy sector is affecting the other. Yet these challenges need to be confronted head-on, sooner rather than later.

National embarrassment

PAKISTAN has utterly failed in protecting its children from polio, a preventable disease that has been eradicated nearly all over the world. With 68 cases reported in 2024 compared to Afghanistan's 25, we find ourselves in the embarrassing position of being the worst performer among the only two countries where polio is still endemic. Officials from Pakistan's polio programme point to our superior reporting mechanisms and suggest that Afghanistan's numbers may be underreported. However, this can in no way excuse our dismal performance. The fact remains that Pakistan, with its considerably stronger infrastructure and institutional capacity, should not even be in the same conversation as war-torn Afghanistan when it comes to public health metrics. Polio in our parts has spread to 83 districts. Our environmental surveillance has detected the virus in 591 sewage samples across 109 sites. These are scary numbers. Security challenges in erstwhile Pata, Karachi, and Peshawar have indeed hampered vaccination efforts. Yet, this narrative of perpetual hurdles is worrisome than Pakistan's polio eradication programme, active since 1994, has lately been hit by mismanagement, vaccine refusals, and gaps in immunisation coverage. Despite nine vaccination campaigns and mapping efforts, 12pc of our infected children had zero doses of the oral polio-vaccine. This failure cannot solely be attributed to external factors; it underscores systemic inefficiencies and lack of political will.

The formation of a new team by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, including focal person Ayesha Raza Parvez and national coordinator Amanullah Iqbal, suggests recognition of the crisis — but we have seen similar initiatives before with little lasting impact. The programme's officials must adopt innovative strategies to overcome resistance, improve access, and ensure accountability at every level. The global eradication of polio is within reach, and Pakistan has no excuse to remain an outlier. It is time to end this national disgrace once and for all.

A woman silenced

The authors point out how the Mustafa Zaidi case was given more attention than the events of East Pakistan.

AROUND a decade ago, when digital media was still a thing of the future, The Serial had the market and captured imaginations. An investigative podcast that looks into an earlier murder of an 18-year-old high school girl in the United States, the episodes take the listener to the murder, its investigation and the trial. The boyfriend was convicted of the murder. The podcast takes a deep dive into the case, raising questions and pointing out loopholes in the prosecution's case that convicted the young boy.

The podcast was an instant sensation. In a period of two years or so, the podcast had been downloaded 80 million times, setting a still-unbroken trend of true crime podcasts. Since then, other than the podcasts itself, we have also been treated to a TV series, Only Murders in the Building, which is based on the popularity of the trend, as well as books. For instance, a young adult book, *A Good Girl's Guide to Murder*, which has now been turned into a show by Netflix, is clearly not just inspired by the investigation journalism but also the original case.

Sadly, journalism in Pakistan rarely speaks too for any issue other than high politics; even crime is a sideshow in our little world. If a paper or television, crime rarely ever makes it into the top headlines or the front page, and even less frequently does it lead to in-depth reporting.

But recently, two women journalists took the decision to delve into a 50-year-old crime, Tasha Masood and Sabo Ishaq began with a podcast on an old but famous case from Karachi and later turned it into a book, which I listened to a single day.

Titled *Society Girl*, the book follows the death of post and civil servant Mustafa Zaidi in Karachi, in 1974, in secret. The 40-something-year-old was found dead in his house, while a young married woman was also present there in a state of unconsciousness. She

was later accused of his murder and then acquitted. But from the time the body of Zaidi was discovered to the acquitted, the case, according to the authors, became a staple for the newspapers of those days, from the English to the Urdu, from the broadsheets to the more sensationalised evening news.

Following a trial that has been cold for 50 years, the authors have their work cut out for them, and while they provide a detailed account of the events and most of the evidence available on record, as in the case in real life, the mystery of Zaidi's death remains a mystery. Neither are they really able to tie up any of the loose ends, thrown up by their own narration of the story. But when they have done in their account of the case like a community of sorts on the socio-cultural contours of Karachi in which both Mustafa Zaidi and the young woman, Shahnaz Gill, resided, as well as the larger political context.

In the account of Mustafa Zaidi's early years and his multiple attempts at suicide, the two authors lead into a short discussion about mental health and the ignorance about it. Shahnaz's move to Karachi along with her husband and their social life allows them to discuss the life of the city's elite, from club memberships to the nightlife provided at hotels such as the Metropole. And the trial leads to a discussion of how the newspapers turned this into a witch-hunt of a young woman, even though there was little evidence of the death being murder.

The two journalists provide a wonderful account of how the newspapers turned the entire saga into one of a "bad" woman. Zaidi and Gill were both married to other people and seemed to be having an affair; they were both found (one dead and one alive) in odd circumstances, and despite Zaidi being known for his infidelity, it was the woman who was targeted by the press and the society at large. Even the fact that Zaidi

had floors painted with Gold's names, calling her Pakistan's Christine Keeler, fell to questions about her rather than the toxicity of his act. (Christine Keeler is the woman who was at the centre of the Profumo affair in the UK.)

The case is covered in such fine detail that the authors are points to point not how it was given more attention than the events of East Pakistan. At one point, even Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto used it in a speech to gain姊妹 points, by promising not to let the accused leave the country.

But by the end of the book, one is struck not just by the misogyny of the times but also the impact it had. The book paints a picture of a complicated man, who is brilliant, talented, complicated and perhaps toxic. His friends speak of him, as do his relatives, and there is his poetry, which also reveals his thoughts.

And on the other side there is a silent woman. Her family didn't speak to the authors of the book and, during the case, Gill simply gave one "interview". Other than that, there is perhaps a statement or two that she gave to the police during the investigations. Women friends and others who socialised with her on saw her at court either focus on her looks or mention her lack of intellect. One of them even calls her "petite". It is as if she had no personality, no thoughts, no desires or needs.

At one level, a woman who was embroiled in a scandal of those proportions 50 years ago perhaps could not afford to do anything but stay quiet. But the fact that those who were associated with her could also not add any flesh and blood to her was hard to digest long after I finished reading.

The woman was silenced in so many more ways than we realise. While the man went, not even after his death. ■

Prometheus or Dr Frankenstein?

DR Manmohan Singh, who passed away last week, will be remembered in contrasting ways. As finance minister and as prime minister, he condemned left-wing communism as the biggest internal security threat to India. The author-backed right wing agreed.

Consequently, too many leftist intellectuals and academics are in jail over unfounded claims that they posed a threat to Indian democracy. By the time it was Singh's turn to hand over the baton to Narendra Modi, which he grudging but refused to see as a logical outcome of his economic policies, Singh was warning that India's Gandhian brief recurred to emergency.

It was the end, it was too late to head the entrenched warning. The threat to Indian democracy was either posed by the left or by the right. It couldn't be coming from both, unless they had ganged up as they did selflessly against Indira Gandhi's brief recourse to emergency.

Dr Singh is thus faulted as India's economic Prometheus, after the Greek legend who defied a神 of Olympus by taking fire from them and giving it to humanity.

Praveen is showered on him for opening India's economy, which strove to unleash the complex nation's hidden energies. In some versions of the Greek myth, Prometheus is also credited with the creation of humanity from clay, a description the erstwhile effacing former PM would probably loathe.

Many respected him for his cultural roots and not for his policies. Of his three daughters, one is an author who has also written extensively on social issues with forest conservation in Mizoram. Another daughter is a history professor, with seminal work on Indian history to her credit. The third daughter, Amrit Kaur, is a respected human rights lawyer in New York. We just heard her singing Dua in a tribute to her father. She constructed "Rajya mein rang Bhang" with an emotionally viril alap that helped dispel the gentle notes of Rajya Sabha in Maharashtra's fabled composition of the poem.

One remembers how early in Manmohan Singh's tenure as prime minister his party press agent, Sonia Gandhi, went searching for Sugata Joshi, an out-of-work book about legendary music stars by Shashi Bhushan herself an accomplished classical singer and recipient. Sonia Gandhi came to know that Singh's wife, Gursharan Kaur, was reading the book. Sonia respectfully

offered it and gave the prime minister's wife the previous gift of a book; one that would have made Nehru smile approvingly. Recalling similar uplifting stories should help dispel the cultural darkness gripping the country since Narendra Modi began advising citizens on how to fry pakoras on solar gas stoves.

The second view about Manmohan Singh's interventions as finance minister (1991-1993) and as prime minister (2004-2014) places him as the protagonist in the 19th century Gothic novel about a scientist's tricky experiment that goes horribly wrong. Dr Victor Frankenstein's monster in the Indian context has been resurrected by the economic experiment that Dr Singh was asked to begin in 1991. The Congress was in a crisis following the assassination of Rajiv

Gandhi in May that year. The bursting of the Soviet market and the oil price shock saw India barely staying off default by pawning its gold reserves. What followed was the rise of a Frankenstein-like middle class, much of which thrives on base of its progenitors. Worse still, Singh's policies shored up business captains who ganged up to promote Narendra Modi as prime minister.

In other words, the logic of Singh's reforms dictated the dissolution of the democracy that enabled the tycoons to become super rich and which left the poorer masses living in hope of the bonanza trickling down to their shabby houses. One shudders to see crony-rich Pakistan picking up the discredited IMF model, which has led to the dilution of democracy in India and elsewhere.

But let us begin at the beginning, or somewhere around there, to assess Dr Singh's thought experiment. *Anupaya varis pada in Mahasamudra*

in 1993 required me to cover the devastation for a Western news agency. Several instructive lessons lay in store; one such was watching Shri Suresh Kumar removing with bare hands and unmatched dedication the rotting bodies and animal carcasses.

It was the same Shri Suresh, remember, that had violently targeted Muslims in the 92-93 Mumbai carnage after the destruction of the Babri masjid. Isn't it the same with rightwing groups in Pakistan, where, too, the government is outpaced by the Jamaat or Jamiat cadre in vicious misdeeds; say, in the flood-ravaged mountains? A stark lesson in the latter visit was narrated to me by the author-turned-journalist, Malareshwar's then chief minister Sharad Pawar just one over several mornings after he returned from the daily press conference to his makeshift office.

Pawar was India's defence minister when he met then Chinese premier Li Peng. Pawar said Li was worried about Dr Singh's reforms, as his coalition government had not taken the last man into confidence.

Pawar said China hadn't taken the last man into confidence either about its reforms. Li said China's one-party system could handle any resultant turbulence with ease, while India, given its democracy, would struggle. Michael Gorbachev, he said, bore a closest resemblance to India's problems.

"Gorbachev succeeded by introducing perestroika and glasnost simultaneously," Li said to Pawar. Perestroika, or radical restructuring, and glasnost, understanding an open society, don't go together, I said. Sure enough, the Rao government needed to bribe a bunch of MPs to win the vote for Singh's reforms. Besides, Singh had to give a false address in Assam to qualify for a Rajya Sabha seat from there.

Additionally, the Supreme Court rejected journalist Kulbhushan Yadav's petition against allowing the rules for election to the Rajya Sabha, initially designed on the council of states. The court rejected the constitution and allowed citizens of any state to be elected to the Rajya Sabha from any other state. Singh never got elected to the Lok Sabha, as it was a hardly court ruling. ■

Nasty outcomes

WHAT a difference 20 years make! I am thinking of Richard Hollbrooke. Before he became familiar to us as the diplomatic face of the All-Pak operation during the American intervention in Afghanistan, he was worried about the appropriateness of democracy in tribal societies. With reference to the upcoming elections in Bosnia in 1996, he posed this fateful question: What if elections are free and fair, and those elected are racists, fascists, and separatists?

What, indeed, what is the shoe on the other foot? Americans have elected, for the second time, a man we can identify with so easily — inclined for a crime and one whom his supporters won't deny is a liar, a racist, and a sexist. Someone who believes elections can be stolen, references coincide, and incites an insurrection to overturn the verdict. Someone on record telling voters that if they elected him they would never need to vote again.

As long as such unpromising outcomes occurred elsewhere, Americans were giddy enough to restore decent governance with reference to liberalised regime change. Of course, the offenders need not only be racists, fascists, and separatists; anyone who wouldn't play ball with the Washington Consensus was a legitimate target — how could anyone be decent who refused to play ball with the inheritors of the Enlightenment? But how does one enact regime change at home? Mr Hollbrooke is no longer around to offer a remedy for the new dilemma pressing from all sides.

In its history, America never put in place a guardian institution to stop such nasty democratic outcomes in the first, or negate them in the national interest by isolating offenders, locking them up, or sending them into exile. In grave enough situations, a guardian institution could even save the country by dividing it into more manageable units. Alas, such blessings are reserved only for the divinely chosen, and America, with its lack of sufficient faith, thinking a mere Electoral College would suffice, is paying the price.

America is not the only country facing this consequence; almost all those who were so recently proclaiming proudly the end of history are now uprooting leaders intent on kicking away the electoral ladder since they have used it to climb to the top. The stark lesson here is that the modern democratic experiment, less than 250 years old if one dates its beginning to that of the oldest democracy in 1789, is in deep trouble.

Why may this be so? In terms of a palpable phenomenon, certainly because democracy has failed to deliver what the

majority of voters expected from it. Opinions differ, but 1976 is a good year to date the beginning of the discontent that has been festering ever since. Right or wrong, there is the growing sense that the system as it exists is unsatisfactory to the needs of the majority and that the only way forward is to turn it upside down, even if taken unnecessary characters to do so.

Leading up to this outcome are less obvious causes. Most important is the deterioration of the political equality of one person-one-vote to the oligarchic inequality of one dollar-one-vote. Over the last century, the economy evolved under capitalism from small owner-operated firms without market power, to giant transnational corporations with more muscle than many countries.

The year 1976 was when the state ended its regulatory control of the free market dominated by corporate power. And, in 2010, the American judiciary removed all limits on the use of corporate funds to influence elections.

The bottom line is that the modern democratic experiment is in deep trouble.

Add to this globalisation, the financialisation of capital, and the removal of controls on international movement. Industrial jobs started to disappear across borders in search of low wages, while inequality went through the roof at home. Not surprisingly, the number of people with terrorist connections to the economy, living from pay cheques to avoid paying cheques, began to grow. All they had left was the vote and an anger ready to be tapped by those promising to restore the past. Counteracting appeals to sustain the status quo in order to "save" democracy ring hollow, because democracy could neither get food on the table nor restore the love of dignity.

Here, then, is the tragic story. After decades of being told that East Asia would surely become like the West, the transition is headed in exactly the opposite direction. The West is becoming more statist and authoritarian by the day. Liberal democracy is under siege and fading grounds.

It was only the present few who could discern what was coming; who went along with the promise of democracy, all the while keeping the reader in their all knowing and all seeing control. ■

Financial crimes

FOLLOWING the 26th Constitutional Amendment, the criteria for appointing high court judges have been framed under the Judicial Commission of Pakistan (Appointment of Judges Rules, 2024). This has provided an opportunity to consider appointing judges who have background and expertise in dealing with financial crimes cases, such as money laundering, terrorism financing, tax fraud, and so on.

The Financial Action Task Force (FATF) finally removed Pakistan from its "grey list", under which it closely monitors countries for money laundering and terrorism financing, in 2022 — four years after the country was placed on it. It was a hard-won relief. However, without an effective law enforcement mechanism and criminal justice system, along with measures to ensure adequate judicial supervision when dealing with financial crimes, Pakistan may once again end up being placed on the FATF grey list or facing similar sanctions.

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has included combating terrorism financing, money laundering and proliferation financing (fund the weapons of mass destruction) in its mandate, while the World Bank has formulated the National Money Laundering/Terrorist Financing Risk Assessment Toolkit. The IMF's involvement in Pakistan's debt crisis has also created an urgent need for improved tax collection, which requires the judiciary to play a robust role. In April 2024, the IMF asked Pakistan to amend its tax laws to prevent massive fraud and introduce the General Anti-Avoidance Rule by amending the Sales Tax Act of 1990. By December 2024, Pakistan's perceived risk of default had declined 88 per cent.

Recently, however, the Supreme Court of Pakistan upheld the Lahore High Court's view in the Taj International (Pvt) Ltd case, that no criminal proceedings are justified if there is no prior assessment of salaried. While some are appreciating this verdict, others have been critical and of the opinion that both criminal and civil litigation can proceed simultaneously. Critics have worried that the verdict may adversely affect tax collection, while others have requested that such verdicts and legislation soon facilitate the rich even though the poor continue to face higher probabilities of incarceration and never-ending litigation. It is recalled, for example, that many individuals were named in the Panama Papers scandal, yet there never was any proper prosecution nor any legislation against offshore companies involved in money laundering. A judge of the LHC named in the Panama Papers simply resigned to save himself from accountability.

of the Tokyo Electric Power Company for the 2011 Fukushima nuclear plant accident in Japan, instead of solely blaming the tsunami that caused it. Meanwhile, a private company has wasted billions of litres of water in Pakistan but has never been held accountable. Judges from the district judiciary ought to be specially trained for such cases so they can be properly utilised when they are eligible for elevation to the high courts.

Pakistan has amended several laws, especially the Anti-Money Laundering Act of 2019 and the Anti-Terrorism Act of 1992, to meet FATF's criteria. However, the courts must now be equipped to deal with cases of financial crimes. Both the high court and the Supreme Court used special benches to hear such cases, and they can start by appointing specialist judges who are able to deal with them. ■

Bhutto thanks USSR

KARACHI: Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto has expressed "deep appreciation of the invaluable assistance" being provided by the Soviet Union to Pakistan in his efforts to bring about fundamental changes in the country's economy, according to a Press release of the Soviet Embassy. In a message to weekly "Moscow News" ... Mr Bhutto recalled his recent visit to Moscow, and said that his discussions with Communist Party leader Leonid Brezhnev and Premier Alexei Kosygin reflected "mutual conviction that the development of friendly and good neighbourhood relations between Pakistan and the Soviet Union was completely to accord with the interests of the Soviet and Pakistani peoples and served the cause of strengthening peace and security in Asia and throughout the world".



ECC bans ozone-harming materials

Committee decides to discontinue PM's subsidy scheme at Utility Stores

ISLAMABAD: The Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) of the cabinet decided on Monday to immediately ban ozone-depleting insulation and foaming materials — polyol blended with hydrochlorofluorocarbons (HCFCs) — due to climate concerns.

The committee also approved supplementary grants totaling Rs10 billion.

The meeting of the ECC, presided over by Finance Minister Mohammad Asaduzzaman, also repeated its Aug 15, 2024, decision that approved the grant of industry status to the warehousing and logistics sector.

The meeting did not allow continuation of the PM's subsidy scheme for Utility Stores Corporation.

The finance minister expressed displeasure when the ministry of warehousing and logistics sector was brought up and showed concern over the incomplete mention of the ECC's previous decision even after a passage of almost five months.

Oil industry seeks role in framing of deregulation policy

ISLAMABAD: The oil industry has expressed concern over its exclusion from an official working group involved in developing a roadmap for deregulating the downstream oil sector.

In a letter to the Petroleum Division and Ogra, the Oil Companies Advisory Council (OCAC) — an association of over three dozen oil companies and refiners — has said it had requested the government in November last to include major private sector stakeholders in the working group for consultation on deregulation.

However, this remained a dream. "It is concerning to note that private sector refiners and oil marketing companies (OCMCs), which play a pivotal role in the downstream oil industry, have not yet been included in the consultation process," wrote OCAC's chairman Aedil Khanzai to the secretary petroleum.

He said the oil industry was already facing existential challenges due to the exemption of sales tax on petroleum products, smuggling of petroleum products, delay in revision of OMC margins and other challenges highlighted repeatedly by the industry.

Mr Khanzai demanded that the private sector be involved in the consultation process to develop a balanced and workable deregulation policy for the industry. "Any unilateral decision on such a critical matter in haste will have severe ramifications for the oil industry and could intensify the existing challenges faced by it," the OCAC wrote.

The letter followed a three-day deadline given last week by Petroleum Minister Dr Mansoorul Haq to the petroleum secretary for a working paper on deregulation drafted by the Prime Minister's Office and the Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC). The secretary had to travel abroad the next day, and the deadline expired again, like many others in the last two years.

Mr Khanzai, also the chief executive officer of Artock Refinery, said the Petroleum Division had been avoiding consultations for deregulation and revision of the pricing mechanism of petroleum products, and the oil industry's requests in this regard were going unheeded.

He said the 2024-25 budget was making normal operations unsustainable and jeopardizing the implementation of the Brundtland Refining Upgradation Policy.

"While the selection issue still remains unresolved in spite of numerous meetings and directives of the prime minister and SIFC, taking up revision of petroleum products' pricing mechanism at this stage is not only ill-timed but non-inclusive of private sector stakeholders in consultation can lead to complications as we have witnessed in the formulation and implementation of the Brundtland Refineries Policy over last five years," Mr Khanzai said.

He said that despite instructions from the prime minister and the finance minister for consultations with industry, "instructions in the Petroleum Division think otherwise or maybe they feel more comfortable working with public sector companies only", he disclosed.

The government had taken in hand the process for deregulation of oil prices more than a year ago but had not moved beyond deadlines for working papers and presentations. In April last year, the Petroleum Division asked the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (Ogra) to share a presentation on the analysis and implications of deregulation of petroleum products" within three days.

The paper shared by the regulator kept piling up due to the petroleum division until the PM Office recalled the issue in July. Even then, there was no progress on the ground as the minister and secretary of petroleum remained on arm's length.

The government has been criticised for high petroleum product prices, even though it was not an effort to change fixed tax rates on various products under the decontrolled pricing mechanism. It wanted to get out of the process while the prices were not relatively lower.

"The ECC reiterated its previous decision made on Aug 15, 2024, whereby the summary containing proposal of declaring warehousing as industry was approved," an official statement said.

Instead of the ECC, the finance minister lectured the participants over the importance of "timely policy measures to address critical economic, energy and industrial needs with a focus on transparent and efficiency in implementation".

The commerce ministry requested the ECC to ban the import of polyol blended with HCFC-141b and HCFC-142b because of its adverse impact on environment. These materials are in use in the refrigeration, insulation and foaming sectors and many countries had banned their use two to three decades ago.

The meeting was available in many countries and since a number of domestic industries had also produced to those materials, there would be no problem for the market to make adjustments.

Therefore, the ECC approved the ban with effect from the end of this month, but directed that all legal and procedural requirements be completed within two weeks. The committee also instructed the ministry of climate change to consult the ministry of industry and production to ensure that there was sufficient time for the industry concerned to be properly informed.

The ECC approved the Rs120.822m grant.

The meeting decided that "no new letters of credit (LCs) for the banned chemicals shall be opened" any longer.

The ECC approved eight supplementary grants worth Rs10bn. The list includes an unspecified grant of Rs1.95bn allowed to the defence ministry.

The meeting also approved a grant of Rs5.27m million to the National Commission on the Status of Women (NCSW), which involved the reallocation of funds from the Ministry of Human Rights (MoHR). The funds would be proportionately used for women empowerment and gender equality Money for PSDP projects.

The ECC approved a request by the information ministry for a Rs1.68 billion grant to facilitate the execution of 15 projects under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) for 2024-25.

The ministry came up with a proposal to clear outstanding liabilities for the "Korean Culture Week" event and the 2nd Shanghai Cooperation Organisation's (SCO) Council of Heads of Government (CHOGM) meeting held in Islamabad last year.

Due to insufficient budgetary allocations under operational heads, subsidies amounting to Rs425 million for the culture week and Rs632.2m for the RDCI (Rural Development Wing) in Islamabad last year.

The ECC approved the Rs120.822m grant.

The committee gave its approval to a request by the ministry of interior for a Rs150.157m grant to cover security arrangements and maintain law and order during the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation Summit, repair site of severely damaged during violent protests, and address other law enforcement needs.

The meeting approved a Rs1.5bn grant to the Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training to increase the salaries of faculty members under the Tenure Track System, which had not been revised since 2021.

The committee cleared a payment of Rs1.71bn (against Rs1.72bn) to Huanan Technologies Co of China through a supplementary grant by the interior ministry to clear the remaining five per cent of the contract cost for the Safe City Project Islamabad, as directed by the Islamabad High Court.

The ECC rejected a request by the Ministry of Industries to continue the Prime Minister's Relief Package through the Utility Stores Corporation (USC) in 2024-25. "The ECC approved a payment of Rs1.527m to cover expenses incurred by USC between June 30 and Aug 15, 2024, on condition that the subsidy is budgeted for this year, and no further expenditures would be carried beyond this period," a statement said.

Banks advance record Rs1.9tr to private sector

KARACHI: The private sector borrowed a record Rs1.9trillion from banks during the first half of FY25, registering a surge of 26% per cent from the same period last fiscal year.

The latest data released by the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) on Monday indicated that banks have been extending advances to the private sector despite existing risks posed by sluggish economic growth and political uncertainty.

In the first quarter of the current fiscal year, the bank advances were initially lower, but the steep fall in the interest rate encouraged the private sector to go for the relatively cheaper money. Since June 2024, the State Bank has slashed its policy rate by 500 basis points to 11pc from an unprecedented level of 22pc, which had stifled the growth.

The sharp deceleration of Consumer Price Index-based inflation, which hit almost a seven-year low of 4.1pc in Dec 2024, was the key reason that compelled the country's monetary policy managers to slash the rate again.

The falling inflation has created space for more rate cuts in the upcoming monetary policy reviews, making financing cheaper for the private sector but denting the banks' incomes.

As a strategy, the government has been borrowing through long-term treasury bills and Pakistani Investment Bonds, which are lower than the maturity amount.

The SBP data showed that the private sector borrowed Rs1.907tr during July-December FY25 against Rs1.72tr in the same period of last year, a surge of 26%.

The main reason for higher lending to the private sector was the massive increase in advances during December, as banks issued 11% the last month of 2024 but if the government would impose a 15pc interest-rate cap on advances (ABC),

The banks also pumped a record Rs1.55tr into the Non-Bank Financial Institutions (NBFI) during July-December 2024-25 against Rs1.05tr in the same period last year.

Similarly, the Islamic banking lending rose to Rs1.23tr compared to Rs1.26tr in the same period last year.

However, the Islamic branch of the conventional banks remained less-keen and advanced Rs1.5bn against Rs2.02tr in the same period last year.

The State Bank reported that the banks' total credit to the non-government sector during the first half of the current fiscal year was Rs1.21tr compared to Rs1.08tr in the same period last fiscal year.

Blocked US Steel deal could hit investments, warns Japanese PM

TOKYO: Japan's prime minister on Monday urged Washington to dispel concerns that a decision by Joe Biden to block Nippon Steel's takeover of US Steel could impede future investments.

The US president's announcement last week cited a strategic need to protect domestic industry, a move that drew sharp criticism from both companies and Tokyo.

A US government panel had failed to reach consensus on whether the \$14.9 billion acquisition threatened national security, shifting the decision to Biden in the waning days of his presidency.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe said the veteran Democrat's decision had sparked worries over future Japanese investments in the world's largest economy.

"It is unfortunate that there are concerns being raised within Japan's industrial world over future Japan-US investment," Abe told reporters.

"It's something we have to take seriously," Japan and the United States are each other's top foreign investors.

"It would be inappropriate for the Japanese government to comment on the management of an individual company that was under review as per US domestic law... but we will strongly call on the US government to take steps to dispel those concerns," said Abe.

"They used to be able to explain clearly why there is a national security concern, or else further discussions on the matter will not work," he added. —AFP

Higher petroleum imports widen trade gap with ME

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's trade deficit with the Middle East advanced an increase of 3.8% per cent to \$5.214 billion in the first five months of 2024-25 from \$5.309bn due to the rise in petroleum imports.

According to data compiled by the State Bank of Pakistan, the widening trade deficit concerns for policymakers mainly because of the rising arrival of petroleum products from the region.

The demand for Pakistan products surged in the United Arab Emirates (UAE), Saudi Arabia and Qatar during the period under review.

Exports to Saudi Arabia rose 10.05pc to \$303.42bn in July-November from \$266.94bn over the last year. In FY24, exports declined 1.53pc to \$16.16bn compared to \$18.05bn in the same period the preceding year.

Pakistan has recently signed a free trade agreement with the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) states to minimise its trade imbalance with the region.

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Exports to the Middle East rose 8.52pc to \$1.149tn in July-November from \$1.243tn over the same period last year. In FY24, the exports declined 1.23pc to \$1.235tn from \$1.253tn in FY23.

In FY24, imports from the kingdom increased by 16.45pc to \$1.034bn against \$8.034bn in the same period last year.

In FY24, imports from Saudi Arabia declined by 9.01pc to \$4.495bn against \$4.508bn in the preceding year.

Exports to UAE increased 13.17pc to \$92.52bn in July-November from \$817.85m over the last year. In FY24, exports to the UAE surged 41.5pc to \$2.028bn from \$1.467bn in FY23, primarily due to a significant rise in exports to Dubai.

Pakistan's top export products to the UAE include rice, bovine carcases, meat and bone, cotton-waste fibres, jute and sisal in July-November. In July-November, the imports from UAE increased by 20.85pc to \$2.283bn from \$1.862bn over the last year.

Exports to Bahrain declined by 22.47pc to \$22.56bn in July-November from \$29.04bn in the corresponding period last year. The imports from Bahrain increased 1.82pc to \$75.099m in July-November from \$72.275m.

Exports to Kuwait saw a decline of 9.61pc to \$37.53m in July-November from \$41.53m over the previous year. However, imports increased by 16.45pc to \$4.495bn from \$3.8477bn in July-November.

Pakistan's exports to Qatar saw a negative growth of 22.4pc to \$50.55m in the first five months of the current fiscal year against \$60.63m over the corresponding months of last year.

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Bangladesh issues second arrest warrant for Hasina

DHAKA: A Bangladeshi court has issued a second arrest warrant for exiled former leader Sheikh Hasina, this time for her alleged role in enforced disappearances, the chief prosecutor said on Monday.

Hasina has already issued an arrest warrant on charges of crimes against humanity for 27-year-old Hasina, who fled to neighbouring India in August after she was toppled by a student-led revolution. Her European supporters have widespread human rights abuses, including the mass detention and extrajudicial killings of her political opponents.

Tajul Islam, chief prosecutor of the domestic International Crimes Tribunal (ICT), said the second warrant relates to enforced disappearances during her rule. More than 500 people were allegedly abducted by Bangladeshi security personnel, with some detained in secret facilities for years.

Victims have begun coming forward since Hasina's ouster with harrowing accounts of their ordeal. "The court issued a warrant against Sheikh Hasina and 11 others, including her military adviser, military personnel, and other law enforcement officials," Islam told reporters.

Bangladesh asked India in December to send Hasina back to face trial, a demand to which Delhi declined to respond. Islam said the court wanted to go ahead with the trial.

"We want to ensure the trial concludes as soon as possible, but that doesn't mean we will break the law or impose a verdict without due process," he told reporters.—AFP

Macron urges 'realistic' expectations from Ukraine on territory

PARIS: French President Emmanuel Macron called on Ukraine on Monday to curb "realistic" expectations on territory as its fight against the Russian invasion heads into a fourth year, saying he saw no "space and room" to the conflict.

Outlining France's foreign policy for the coming year, Macron also took aim at Elon Musk, the billionaire owner of social media platform X and close ally of US president-elect Donald Trump, accusing him of supporting "a new international reactionary movement".

Russia, which invaded Ukraine in February 2022, is currently occupying about a fifth of its territory. "There will be no quick and easy solution in Ukraine," Macron said in a speech to French ambassadors gathered at the Elysee Palace.

But he also warned that Ukrainians needed to have "realistic discussions on territorial issues", clearly outlining Kyiv for the first time to consider territorial concessions. Trump has promised to bring a swift end to nearly three years of fighting, without offering any concrete proposals for a ceasefire or peace deal. Both sides are looking to secure better position on the battlefield before Trump's January 20 inauguration.

"The United States of America must help us to change the nature of the situation and convince Russia to come to the negotiating table," Macron said. Europe will have to offer "security guarantees" for Ukraine, he added.—AFP

European leaders retort angrily to Musk's tirade

Starmer slams those 'spreading lies and misinformation' after days of incendiary posts by Musk

LONDON: European leaders expressed growing frustration with tech billionaire Elon Musk on Monday, as a major row escalated between members of Britain's government and US president-elect Donald Trump's key ally.

UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer slammed those "spreading lies and misinformation" following days of incendiary posts by Musk on his X platform over historical sex offences against children in northern England.

Musk, who is set for a role in Trump's administration, then accused the centre-left Labour leader of being "deeply complicit" in the rape rap" and "utterly despicable".

European leaders, including

French President Emmanuel Macron, have also weighed in against Musk. The French leader said the Spain X boss was "directly intervening in elections", including in Germany where Chancellor Olaf Scholz has condemned the Tesla boss for backing an extreme-right party.

Norwegian Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre said he found it "worrying" that someone with so much wealth and influence was getting involved in the politics of European countries.

Much of Musk's focus in recent days has been on Britain and his political stances involving groups that first emerged during Starmer's 2009-2013 tenure as chief state prosecutor for England and Wales.

The comments pose a major challenge for Starmer's government, as it tries to fend off growing support for the far-right while also seeking to maintain good relations with Trump's incoming administration.

Musk's tirade, which included demands for a new public inquiry

into the scandal, has prompted some UK opposition politicians to join in the criticism and call for a fresh national probe.

Take

The issue has long been seized upon by far-right figures, including Tommy Robinson, one of Britain's best-known far-right agitators, whom Musk has praised and said should be released from jail.

Responding to media questions on the topic, Starmer insisted he was "not going to individualise this to Elon Musk" but said "a line has been crossed" with some of the online criticism.

"Those that are spreading lies and misinformation as far and as wide as possible, they're not interested in victims, they're interested in themselves," Starmer told reporters, without naming Musk.

"I'm prepared to call out this for what it is. We've seen this playboy money master the whipping up of intimidation and threats of violence, hoping that the media will amplify it."—AFP

Trump asks court to delay hush money sentencing

WASHINGTON: US president-elect Donald Trump on Monday urged a judge to delay the sentencing set for Friday in his New York hush money case, as he prepares for his historic White House return.

Judge Merrick Garland ruled last week that Trump's attorneys should go ahead despite the Republican leader's inauguration in two weeks, rejecting his argument that his election victory should apply and to the case.

Trump's attorneys said in a filing that they are appealing Merrick's ruling upholding Trump's conviction by a Manhattan jury and argued the judge must pause the case in the meantime.

"By virtue of President Trump's filing of appellate proceedings raising his claim of presidential immunity, all proceedings in this court are automatically stayed by operation of federal constitutional law," Trump's legal team said.

"In the alternative, even if such a stay were discretionary, the court should grant such a stay." The filing was made public as Trump set to be certified as the winner of the 2024 presidential election on Monday, four years after his supporters rioted at the US Capitol in an attempt to overturn his 2020 defeat.

Trump's lawyers asked Merrick to notify the parties in the case whether he will cancel the sentencing and said they would file two appeals in state court. Trump, the first former president ever convicted of a crime, has been permitted to appear either in person or virtually on Friday.

He was convicted in May of 14 counts of falsifying business records to cover up a hush money payment to adult film star Stormy Daniels on the eve of the 2016 election to stop her from revealing an alleged 2006 sexual encounter.—AFP

Spanish tourist killed by elephant at Thai sanctuary

BANGKOK: A "panic-stricken" elephant killed a Spanish tourist while she was bathing the animal at a sanctuary in southern Thailand, police said on Monday.

The 23-year-old woman was hit by the stressed animal's trunk at the Koh Yai Elephant Care Centre in Phra Nga province, according to police. "A female tourist was killed while bathing an elephant," Jaran Rungsarng, the local police chief said.

Authorities have contacted the Spanish embassy to confirm the victim's identity.

The sanctuary declined to provide details of the incident when contacted. Wild elephants have killed 227 people, including tourists, in the past 12 years, according to the Department of National Parks, Wildlife and Plant Conservation.

An elephant killed a 49-year-old woman at a national park in Loei province in northern Thailand last month. While encounters between villagers and wild elephants are common, attacks at sanctuaries remain rare.

Bathing elephants is a popular activity among visitors in Thailand, where about 2,800 elephants are held for tourism purposes across the country, according to World Animal Protection.

However, animal rights groups argue that bathing elephants can cause them distress and some sanctuaries in the country do not allow it.—AFP

What is the latest science telling us about climate change?

AFTER another record-breaking year for global temperatures in 2023, pressure is rising on policy-makers to step up efforts to curb climate change. The last global scientific consensus on the phenomenon was released in 2023 through the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, but scientists say evidence shows global warming and its impacts have since been unfolding faster than expected.

Here is some of the latest climate research:

Critical point

The world may already have hit 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 F) of warm-

ing above the average pre-industrial temperature — a critical threshold beyond which it is at risk of irreversible and extreme climate change, scientists say.

A group of researchers made the suggestion in a study released in November based on an analysis of 2,000 years of atmospheric gases trapped in Antarctic ice cores.

Scientists have typically measured today's temperatures against a baseline temperature average for 1850-1900. By that measure, the world is now at nearly 1.3 C (2.4 F) of warming. But the new data suggests a longer pre-industrial baseline, based on temperature data span-

ning the year 13 to 1700, which put warming at 1.49 C in 2023, the study published in the journal *Nature* concluded.

Ocean changes

The warming of the Atlantic could loosen the collar of a key current system, which scientists warn could already be happening.

The Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation (AMOC), which transports warm water from the tropics to the North Atlantic, has helped to keep European winters milder for centuries. Research in 2018 showed that AMOC has weakened by about 15 percent since

1950, while research published in February 2024 in the journal *Science Advances* suggested it could be closer to a critical slowdown than previously thought. In addition, with the world in the throes of a fourth mass coral bleaching event the longest on record scientists fear the world's reefs could pass a point of no return.

Scientists will be studying bleached reefs from Australia to Brazil for signs of recovery over the next few years if temperatures fall.

Extreme weather

Ocean warming is not only fueling stronger Atlantic storms, it is

also causing them to intensify more rapidly, with some jumping from a Category 1 to a Category 3 storm in just hours. Growing evidence shows this is true of other ocean basins. In October 2024 Hurricane Milton needed only one day in the Gulf of Mexico to go from tropical storm to the Gulf's second most powerful hurricane on record, hammering Florida's west coast. Warmer air can also hold more moisture, helping storms carry and eventually release more rain. As a result, hurricanes are delivering flooding even in mountainous areas like Asheville, North Carolina, inundated in September 2024 by

Hurricane Florence.

Forests and fires

Global warming is drying waters and sapping moisture from forests, creating conditions for bigger and better wildfires from the US West and Canada to southern Europe and Russia's Far East. Research published in October in *Nature Climate Change* calculated that about 10pc of dead trees associated with such wildfires since 2000 could be attributed to the climate effect on wildfires. *Beastie* Assessors in 2024 was in the grip of its worst and most widespread drought since records began in 1950.—Reuters

Indonesia launches free meal programme to combat stunting

JAKARTA: Indonesia launched an ambitious \$4.3 billion free meal programme on Monday to combat stunted growth due to malnutrition, a key election promise of President Prabowo Subianto.

Prabowo has pledged to provide nutritious meals free to tens of millions of schoolchildren and pregnant women, saying it would improve their quality of life and benefit economic growth.

This is historic for Indonesia for the first time conducting a nationwide nutrition programme for toddlers, students, pregnant and breastfeeding mothers, presidential spokesman Hanif Nurul said late on Sunday.

At least 190 kitchens run by third party catering services opened nationwide, including some run by military bases, and were busy preparing meals from midnight before distributing them

to schoolchildren and pregnant women. The government has allocated 10,000 rupiah (\$0.48 cents) per meal, with kitchens preparing rice, protein, vegetables and fruit for students.

The programme has a budget of \$1 trillion (Rp4.3 trillion) for the 2025 fiscal year and is set to deliver meals to almost 80 million people by 2029.

Prabowo has championed the programme since last year's presidential campaign and his team has said the poorest and most remote areas of the Southeast Asian archipelago would be prioritised.—AFP

Maoists kill nine Indian troops

Decades-long insurgency has claimed over 10,000 lives

RAJPUTA: Indian Maoist guerrillas killed nine members of the security forces on Monday by detonating a roadside bomb that tossed their vehicle into the air, police said.

Photographs published by Indian media showed a deep crater ripped into the road by the blast.

More than 10,000 people have died in the decades-long insurgency waged by the rebels, who say they are fighting for the rights of marginalised indigenous people in India's resource-rich central regions.

Government forces have stepped up efforts to end the long-existing armed conflict, with some 287 rebels killed in 2023, according to official figures.

The attack on Monday in the central state of Chhattisgarh took place as soldiers were returning from an anti-Maoist operation on Saturday, where four rebels and a police officer were killed.

"Eight security forces and a driver were killed today when the vehicle in which they were travelling came into contact with a landmine," said Vivekanand Nirla, chief of the state police's anti-Maoist operations.

The rebels, also known as Naxalites after the district where their armed campaign began in 1962, were inspired by the Chinese revolutionary leader Mao Zedong.

Around 1,000 suspected Naxalites were arrested and 817 surrendered during 2024.

Amit Shah, India's interior minister, warned the Maoists rebels in his speech to mark an "all-out" assault, saying the government expected to crush the insurgency by early 2026.

Shah, a close confidant of India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi, repeated his promise after the latest attack on Monday: "I promise that this sacrifice of our men won't go unanswered," Shah said in a statement.

"We will wipe out maximalism from our country by March 2026," the powerful minister added.

The movement gained in strength and numbers until the early 2000s when New Delhi deployed tens of thousands of security personnel against the rebels in a stretch of territory known as the "Red Corridor".

The insurgency has been drastically restricted in areas in recent years.

Authorities have since invested millions of dollars in local infrastructure and social projects to combat the Naxalite appeal.—AFP

Erdogan warns against division of Syria

ISTANBUL: Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said on Monday he would order an intervention to prevent any splintering of Syria, a warning aimed particularly at the country's Kurdish forces.

"We cannot accept under any pretext that Syria be divided and if we notice the slightest risk we will take the necessary measures," the Turkish head of state said, adding that "we have the means".

Erdogan's warning in the latest aimed at the Kurdish-dominated Syrian Democratic Forces and the United States, which backed the SDF's offensive against the militant Islamic State group. Turkey said that it was "only a matter of time" before Syrian Kurdish fighters — especially the West as essential in the fight against the IS group fighters — will be wiped out. "Conditions in Syria have changed. We believe it's only a matter of time before PYD/KYPG is eliminated," Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan told a news conference in the capital Ankara.

Turkey sees the People's Protection Units (YPG) — the main component of the US-backed Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) — as a terrorist group linked to its outlawed domestic foe the Kurdish Workers' Party (PKK).

Saying there is no room for "taros" in Syria, Erdogan said that "should the risk present itself, we could intervene in one night".—AFP

Narco-musical *Emilia Perez*, immigrant drama *Brutalist* win big at Golden Globes

BEVERLY HILLS: Oscar-nominated "Emilia Perez" and epic immigrant drama "The Brutalist" were the big winners at the Golden Globes on Sunday, as prizes were shared widely across an international crop of nominees at the year's first major showbiz awards gala.

French director Jacques Audiard's Mexican-set "Emilia Perez" took four prizes, including best comedy or musical film, while "The Brutalist" was named best drama and also picked up best actor for Adrien Brody, who plays a Hungarian Holocaust survivor.

"Emilia Perez," about a drug lord who transposes to life as a woman, had entered the night with the most nominations at 10.

It won for best non-English language film and best original song, while Zoe Saldaña took best supporting actress honours, nudging out her co-star Selena Gomez.

"You can maybe put us in jail, you can beat us up, but you never can take away our soul, our resistance, our identity," said Karla Sofía Gómez, the film's star, who is transgender. She added: "Raise your voice... and say, 'I won. I am who I am, not who you want!'" Big wins at the Globes can help review voters make audiences and build vital momentum toward the Oscars in early March.

Sunday also proved an important night for "The Brutalist," which shrugged off concern over its sprawling runtime to earn best director for Brady Corbet. "I was told that no one would come out and see it," said Corbet, of his epic about a Jewish architect who survives Nazi persecution and emigrates to the United States.

"No one was asking for a three-and-a-

half-hour film about a mid-century designer... but it works," he added. In one of the night's biggest upsets, Brigitte Fonda's *Brutalist* was best actress in a drama film for "I'm Still Here," which chronicles a family ripped apart by the country's military dictatorship in the 1970s.

Comebacks

Brody's win was one of the night's remarkable career comebacks, more than two decades after he became the youngest ever Oscar best actor winner for "The Piano," in which he also played a Holocaust survivor.

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"No one was asking for a three-and-a-

"popcorn screen," "I bought in, and I believed that, and that corroded me over time," said the now 62-year-old "Ghost" star.

But "I had this magical, bold, courageous, out-of-the-box, absolutely broken-spirited come across my desk called 'The Substance,'" and the universe said no that "you're not alone."

Onstage

The always-controversial Globes are in year two of a revamp, following a Los Angeles Times exposé in 2021 that showed that the awards' voting body — the Hollywood Foreign Press Association — had no Black members.

Now under new ownership, and with the HFPA disbanded, organisers were hoping to capitalise on a ratings bump registered last January.

Comedian Nikki Glaser hosted the ceremony, kicking off the gala with an interview... well-received... monologue: "Welcome to the 82nd Golden Globes. Gwyneth's biggest night," she quipped, referring to the weight-loss drug that has proven wildly popular in famously looks-conscious Hollywood.

Among the dramas, "Constance," a fictionalised account of high-stakes Vatican horse-trading, depicting how the death of a pope sets the church's various factions into battle for its future, took the award for best screenplay.

In comedy, Sebastian Stan won the best actor for "A Different Man," in which he portrays a man who undergoes experimental treatment for a disfiguring facial condition, but continues to face the consequences. "Our ignorance and dismissive fear around disability and disfigurement has to end here," said Stan.—AFP

Three Israelis killed in West Bank shooting

Tel Aviv imposes a cordon around all villages in the area to search for suspects

JERUSALEM: Three Israelis were killed and several injured on Monday in a shooting attack on a car and bus near the settlement of Kedumim in the Israeli-occupied West Bank, Israeli national ambulance service Magen David Adom (MDA) said.

The attack, on a major road used by both Israelis and Palestinians, comes amid a diplomatic push for a deal to end the 15-month-old conflict in Gaza and return Israeli prisoners home and may pose another obstacle to sealing such a deal before US president-elect Donald Trump takes office on Jan 20.

Footage posted on Israeli news sites showed at least two men emerge from a car and apparently open fire on nearby vehicles near the Palestinian village of al-Fawwar, just above the road from Kedumim.

Israel's finance minister Ronny Peretz, who lives in the settlement where the attack took place, called for an urgent cabinet meeting "to discuss a shift in strategy and to genuinely eradicate terrorism".

The northern West Bank cities of Nablus and Jenin "should look like Jaffa," he wrote, referring to a town in the north of the Gaza Strip

that has been completely destroyed by repeated Israeli bombardments.

Meanwhile, on the far right of Israeli politics, for years called for Israeli sovereignty in the West Bank, which is land that Palestinians want for a future state. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu met senior military and security officials to discuss the situation and approved plans to capture attackers as well as "a series of additional offensive and defensive actions" in the West Bank. "No one will be spared," he posted on X.

There was no immediate comment from the Palestinian authorities in the West Bank.

Hamas, which has run the Gaza Strip and has a presence in the West Bank, praised the attack as a "heroic response against the occupation's continued crimes (including) the war of genocide in Gaza". But it did not claim responsibility. The West Bank has been transformed by the rapid growth of Jewish settlements since Netanyahu returned as the head of a far-right nationalist coalition two years ago. During that time, a surge in settler violence has led to US sanctions.

Since the Oct 7, 2023, raid by Hamas on southern Israel that triggered the conflict in Gaza, the violence in the West Bank has spiralled, with hundreds of Palestinians and several Israelis killed.

Act honestly.

Israel's defense minister Israel

Katz said he had instructed the military to "act forcefully" in response to Monday's attack.

Israeli Army Radio said the military had imposed a cordon around all villages in the area to search for the suspects, who it believes fled to a nearby Palestinian village.

MDA said two women in their 60s and a man around 40 years old were pronounced dead at the scene, while eight passengers were wounded, including a 63-year-old male who had driven who is in serious condition.

Hamas spokesman Abu Uthman said in a post on Telegram that "Israel will never enjoy security" unless the Palestinian people also have security.

Hundreds of thousands of Israelis have settled in the West Bank since Israel captured the territory in a 1967 war. Most countries consider the settlement illegal, although Israel disputes this, citing historical and biblical ties to the land.

Palestinian security forces moved into Jenin, in the northern West Bank, last month in a move they say is aimed at suppressing armed groups of "outlaws" who have built up a power base in the city and its adjacent refugee camp.

On Sunday, Israeli forces killed a 37-year-old man in a town north of Jenin after opening fire on his home, while a 17-year-old was killed in an Israeli raid in Aqaba camp in Nablus, according to Palestinian officials.—Reuters

plans to impose tariffs on Canadian imports. The evolving trade tensions and domestic economic challenges, such as inflation and housing affordability, have put additional strain on the Liberal government's agenda.

First elected as Liberal leader in 2013, Trudeau has been a dominant figure in Canadian politics, combining charisma with a progressive policy platform that resonated with many voters. His initial victory in 2015 was seen as a repudiation of the Conservative government under Stephen Harper, but subsequent elections in 2019 and 2021 returned minority governments, reflecting a more divided electorate.

"This has been one of the most difficult decisions of my life," Trudeau said as he concluded his remarks. "But I know it's the right one for my family, for my party, and for the future of this country."

about the attack on police officials, residents armed with weapons also came out of their houses to hunt down the attackers.

In the ensuing operation, one militant commander was gunned down by the law enforcers and villagers. "In the ensuing gun battle, the police with the help of the CTB commandos and armed villagers eliminated a militant commander in the area," he added.

A Reserve 1122 official said that they immediately dispatched a medical team, along with an ambulance vehicle, to the scene of the attack where the control room received information about the incident. He said that the bodies of martyred cops were shifted to the District Headquarters Hospital Tajaan for medical formalities. The coffins were later taken to the police lines in the District Headquarters Complex, where last rites were performed and the bodies were dispatched to the Kharsadeh Police area for burial.

Two injured in Beira

In Beira, a Frontier Constabulary camp located near the airport in Balaklala and a police post in the Bargatze area of Wazir subdivision came under attack on Sunday night. A police official said that two FC soldiers were injured in the attack and shifted to a hospital.

"Their condition is stable," he said, adding that the Frontier Constabulary personnel effectively responded and forced the assailants to flee. He said the police who repelled a terrorist attack on a post in Bargatze, in the Wazir subdivision.

"Terrorists armed with light and heavy weapons attacked the post in a bid to breach it, but the policemen deployed there exhibited unprecedented bravery and repelled in the same manner," he added.

One killed in attack on cash van

In a separate attack in Lakki Marwat, a cash van owned by a private security company came under attack on the busy Marghada road. Police and revenue officials said armed men targeted the van with grenades and rockets, killing the driver and injuring others.

They said the driver was identified as Muhammad Asif, a resident of Karak, and the injured included Nasim Khan of Barisal and Saeed Rabbani of Karak. A rescue official said the deceased and the injured were moved to the Government City Hospital. The wounded were later referred to Barisal due to their critical condition.

Safety was beefed up both in Lakki Marwat and Barisal after the attacks, with the police having increased patrolling and searching the suspected hideouts of miscreants and criminals in the area.

Moore says 'I'm just in shock'

BEVERLY HILLS: Demi Moore won her first acting award in a career spanning five decades on Sunday, scooping a Golden Globe for the body-horror film "The Substance".

The 62-year-old beat Amy Adams, Cynthia Erivo, Milkey Madison, Karla Sofía Gómez and Zendaya to win best actress in a musical or comedy film, a category that had been considered very competitive.

"I'm just in shock right now," Moore said in her acceptance speech. "I've been doing this for so long, over 40 years. This is the first time I've ever won anything as an actor and I'm just so humbled and so grateful," Moore, who began her acting career in the early 1980s, is known for films like "St. Elmo's Fire", "Ghost", "Independence Day" and "Striptease".

"Very surprised by her win, she said she had once been told by a producer 30 years ago that she was a 'jewelry actress'.

"At that time, I really think mean that this wasn't something that I was allowed to have, that I could do movies that were successful, that made a lot of money but that I couldn't be acknowledged," Moore said.

"I bought in and I believed that, and that corroded me over time to the point where I thought a few years ago that maybe this was it, maybe I was complete, maybe I've done what I was supposed to do," Moore, who was twice nominated for a Golden Globe in the 1990s, said after receiving the script for "The Substance" when she was at "a low point".

"And the universe told me that you're not done," she said, adding her thanks to writer-director Catalina Fierro and costar Margaret Qualley.

In the movie, Moore plays an ageing TV fitness instructor who signs up for a mysterious medical regime that promises to create the perfect version of herself.—Reuters

US Congress certifies Trump's election victory

• Certification clears the way for president-elect to be sworn in on Jan 20 • Quadrennial ritual stands in sharp contrast to four years ago when Trump's supporters stormed the Capitol

WASHINGTON: The US Congress formally certified Republican President-elect Donald Trump's November election victory over Democratic Vice President Kamala Harris, clearing the way for him to be sworn in on Jan 20.

The certification of the election results on Monday in the 50 states and the District of Columbia was accomplished in a brief, formal ceremony during a joint session of the House of Representatives and Senate. It was presided over by Harris, acting as vice presidential role as president of the Senate.

The quadrennial ritual stood in sharp contrast to four years ago when a mob of Trump supporters stormed the Capitol in a failed bid to block the certification of then-President Trump's 2020 loss to Democratic President Joe Biden.

Trump continues to falsely claim that his 2020 defeat was the result of widespread fraud, and has warned throughout his 2024 campaign that he harbored similar concerns until his Nov 5 defeat of Harris.

"Congress certifies our great election victory today — a big moment in history," Trump wrote on his social media platform Truth Social on Monday.

The joint session of Congress proceeded even as a winter storm howled over the nation's capital, dropping about 6 inches (15cm) of snow and snarling travel.

The final certification backed up preliminary findings that Trump won 312 Electoral College votes to Harris's 226.

Republicans control White House, Congress

Republicans also captured a majority in the US Senate and held a narrow edge in the House in November's election, which will give Trump's party support he needs to implement his planned agenda of tax cuts and a crackdown on immigrants living in the country illegally.

Democrats did not try to block certification of Trump's victory on Monday.

"We must renew our commitment to safeguarding American democracy," No.

House Democrat Katherine Clark said in a statement earlier in the day. "As elected leaders, our loyalty must be to the Constitution, first and always. We are here to honor the will of the people and the rule of law."

Security inside and outside the Capitol was heightened in preparation for the certification and was expected to remain in place through Trump's swearing-in.

The Capitol grounds were ringed by metal fences hundreds of yards from the US Capitol, and accessible only via checkpoints guarded by uniformed police officers.

Convoys of black police vehicles were on hand, led by 10-wheel Baltimore police mobile command centre. New York Police Department reinforcements were also patrolling the area.

Inside, extra teams of uniformed US Capitol Police officers were checking the entrance area including doors and underground tunnels leading to the House and Senate chambers.

Trump has said he plans to pardon some of the more than 5,000 people charged with taking part in the Jan 6, 2021, assault on the Capitol, when a mob fought with police, smashing its way in through windows and doors and chanting, "Hang Mike Pence," referring to Trump's then-vice president, in a failed bid to stop Congress from certifying Biden's victory.

In the 2021 melee at the Capitol, rioters surged past police barricades, assaulting about 140 officers and causing more than \$2.8 million in damage. Multiple police officers who battled protesters died in the weeks that followed, some by suicide.

As a result of that day's violence, Congress passed legislation late in 2022 beefing up guards to ensure that the certification process is administered in a legal manner.

Many of those changes were directly in response to Trump's actions leading up to and including Jan 6, 2021. For example, the new law asserts that the vice president's role is largely ceremonial.—Reuters

LHC orders steps to fight worsening air quality in Multan

Seeks implementation of 2020 order for tree plantation along motorway

ISLAMABAD: The Lahore High Court has issued directions to relevant authorities to combat the worsening air quality in Multan, emphasizing the need for tree plantation and climate justice.

The air quality index (AQI) in south Punjab's largest city reached the hazardous level of 209 in November 2024, the worst ever witnessed in the city and the highest in the country at the time.

The court approved incorporation of six new respondents, including the additional chief secretary and heads of various south Punjab departments, to ensure accountability and expedited measures to address the crisis.

The court underscored the responsibility of government departments, citing Rule 10 of the Punjab Government Rules of Bandiana, 2011, which mandates secretaries to ensure efficient administration and adherence to laws. It further emphasized the implementation of its 2020 order for tree plantation along the Lahore-Abial Multan Motorway (LM-3) to mitigate environmental conditions.

In its detailed judgment, the court referred to landmark cases emphasizing climate justice and

inter-generational equity. It reiterated the constitutional right to a clean and sustainable environment under the newly inserted Article 54, which guarantees every citizen the right to healthy ecosystem.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) had previously declared an environmental health emergency in Multan in November 2024, introducing measures such as shifting educational institutions, closing construction activities, and suspending heavy transport and suspending brick kilns and furnace-based industries.

However, the court observed that these efforts, while commendable, were insufficient without long-term solutions such as urban forestry.

The judgment echoed global calls for climate resilience, emphasizing the judiciary's role in mitigating effects of climate change.

Drawing from national and international precedents, the court stressed the importance of sustainable development, singling authorities to prioritize policies that protect biodiversity and combat air pollution.

Pakistan faces major nutrition, food security challenges

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan faced significant challenges in nutrition and food security in 2024, and despite some progress, the country still struggles with high rates of malnutrition and food insecurity, the latest nutrition survey says.

High food prices, climatic shocks, and reduced investment contribute to acute food insecurity.

Around 22 per cent people are facing high levels of acute food insecurity. This situation is expected to improve slightly post-harvest season, according to the bulletin, published by the ministry of national health services, regulations and coordination.

The country faces major challenges in meeting the food security and nutrition targets of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030. Only 38pc of children are adequately breastfed for the first six months of life. Over 40pc of children under five years are stunted; 17.7pc are wasted; 28.8pc are underweight while more than half are anaemic and suffering from deficiencies in essential nutrients and vitamins such as iron (28.6pc), zinc (18.8pc), vitamin A (24.7pc) and iodine (24.7pc).

The National Nutrition Survey 2019 had revealed persistently high rates of under-nutrition along with an emerging trend of being overweight and obese. Malnutrition is extremely high in Pakistan, with several areas in the country considered to be at emergency levels of malnutrition.

PIA expands international, domestic operations

Flag carrier adding new flights to Kuwait, Bahrain, Doha, Dammam and Jeddah

R. A. W. A. L. P. I. N. D. I. / LAHORE: Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) has announced plans to expand both its domestic and international operations by launching new flights starting in January. The national flag carrier is adding flights to Kuwait, Bahrain, Doha, Dammam and Jeddah.

A spokesperson for PIA said the airline has introduced new international routes to Kuwait, Bahrain and Doha, in addition to expanding its services to Dammam and Jeddah. The airline is also expand-

ing its domestic network with additional weekly flights between Karachi and Peshawar. A third weekly flight from Karachi to Peshawar will be part of the schedule beginning January 25.

The spokesperson said PIA would resume its weekly two-way flights between Lahore and Kuwait from January 25. In addition, two new weekly flights from Lahore to Dammam will begin of January 22.

He said additional flights would be operated from Sialkot to Jeddah from January 20. A new two-way weekly flight from Sialkot to Doha will begin on January 21. These new flights are part of the airline's efforts to restore and introduce international services to and from various cities in Pakistan.

The spokesman emphasized that PIA is committed to enhancing connectivity and ensuring convenient travel options for its passengers. Both

domestically and internationally.

This expansion follows the European Aviation Safety Agency's (EASA) decision to lift the ban on Pakistan flights to EU countries. After this, PIA has also resumed its services to Europe and the United Kingdom.

As part of its fleet regeneration efforts, PIA is working on bringing back aircraft that had been grounded for extended periods. Recently, an ATR aircraft, which had been in long-term storage, was reintroduced to service. With the addition of this ATR, PIA has strengthened its domestic operations, particularly on routes to Gilgit, Sialkot, Turbat and Gwadar.

The PIA management is focused on ensuring punctuality, with an on-time performance target set at 90 per cent, the spokesman said, adding that the airline is currently meeting this target consistently on a daily basis.

Legal community opposes civilians' trial in military courts: Hamid Khan

LAHORE: Senior bar leader Senator Hamid Khan on Monday said the lawyers share a unanimous opinion against trials of civilians by military courts.

Speaking at a press conference in the auditorium of the Lahore High Court Bar Association, he said that the sentence announced by the military courts in cases related to the May 9 events were unconstitutional.

He pointed out that there was already a decision by a five-judge bench of the Supreme Court on this matter.

He said the seven-member bench of the Supreme Court has

deeply disappointed the legal fraternity.

"By allowing the announcement of the decision by the military courts, the Supreme Court has let down," Senator Hamid said.

He stated that the lawyers do not consider military courts as legitimate and did not accept their decisions.

He said that the decision to allow military trial verdicts was a stain on the Supreme Court.

He said the military courts were only meant for trying military personnel and taking civilians' trials by military courts was unconstitutional.

Senator Hamid Khan further said that the cases related to the 24th Amendment should be heard by a bench

comprising all judges of the Supreme Court.

"We all demand that these cases be presented before a full court," he added.

He said the so-called constitutional bench was a product of the 24th Amendment.

He claimed that the constitutional bench has no right to hear cases against the amendment.

The PIA senator also demanded the case against the 24th Amendment should be broadcast live, saying the Supreme Court proceedings have been broadcast live in the past as well.

SHCRA President Asad Munroor Butt and other leaders of the Professional group of lawyers were present at the press conference.

First major US winter storm of year hits mid-Atlantic states

• Emergency declared in several states; hundreds of schools closed • Over 250,000 customers without power • Airlines cancel over 1,300 flights

WASHINGTON: The first major winter storm of the new year swept across the US Middle Atlantic states on Monday, closing down federal offices and public schools in Washington, D.C., after dumping more than a foot of snow in the Ohio Valley and Central Plains.


The nation's capital can expect accumulations of six to nine inches before the storm moves past to sear Monday evening, the US National Weather Service said. Governors in several states, including Kansas, Kentucky, Arkansas, West Virginia and Virginia, have already declared states of emergency.

In the wake of the storm, frigid Arctic air was filling the cold, bringing freezing rain and icy conditions to a

much of the country stretching from Illinois through Maryland and Virginia. Treacherous driving conditions are expected in many areas.

The Central Plains, where the storm dumped heavy snow over the weekend, were already in a deep freeze. Parts of Kansas experienced bitter cold wind chills, with values from five to almost 25 degrees Fahrenheit below zero (minus 15 to 32 degrees Celsius) overnight. The cold air will persist, with daytime highs only in the mid-teens to lower 20s.

In Washington, the snow will not keep the US Congress from meeting on Monday to formally certify Republican Donald Trump's election as presi-

dent, House Speaker Mike Johnson said on Sunday. But federal offices in the nation's capital will be closed, the Office of Personnel Management said.

Hundreds of schools announced in advance that they would not open on Monday due to the storm. Public schools in Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Washington and Philadelphia.

Over 250,000 homes and businesses in central and the northern US were without power on Monday, data from PowerOutage.us showed. The storm is expected to move offshore late on Monday, but it will be replaced by Arctic air, lowering daytime temperatures significantly, the National

Weather Service said. The Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) on Sunday announced a weather watch from Jan 10, alerting anticipated cold weather across its region, which is expected to increase electrical demand and could reduce reserves. However, grid operators are forecast to remain normal during the ERCOT weather watch.

Overnight, Energy Institute reported the highest number of affected customers, with 63,417 clients without power, followed by Appalachian Power Company in West Virginia, with 31,242 clients without power.

Flights cancelled Airlines in the United States canceled more than 1,300 flights on Monday. A total of 1,306 flights were canceled and 414 flights were delayed, as of 2:30pm ET, according to flight-tracking website FlightAware.

Southwest Airlines canceled 264 flights, the most among carriers, followed by American Airlines at 176.

Carriers, including Southwest, American, United Airlines and Delta Air Lines, also issued travel advisories warning about an impact due to the storm.

The Federal Aviation Administration had warned on Friday that gusty winds, snowfall and dense freezing rain could impact travel in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic regions.—Reuters

Marseille hit five to close gap on leaders in Ligue 1

PARIS: Olympique de Marseille closed the gap on leaders Paris St-Germain to seven points at the top of Ligue 1 after crushing struggles Le Havre 5-1 at the Velodrome on Sunday as the season approached its halfway point.

Valentin Rongier, Bilel Nader, Neal Maupay, Edouard Mendy and Uche Okechukwu scored the goals for Roberto De Zerbi's team, who also moved three points clear of third-placed AS Monaco with the victory.

Marseille have won five and drawn one of their last six outings in all competitions, and have scored nine goals in two matches either side of the four-night-long winter break.

Rongier drew in the first from distance on 25 minutes and Nader fired a low shot into the far corner to make it two, the 21-year-old scoring his first senior goal on just his second Ligue 1 start.

Maupay, who is on loan from Everton in a deal that will become a permanent transfer at the season end, headed in Marseille's third goal before the interval.

Nader, who was starting in the absence of the ill Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang, did not disappoint for the second half as Marseille added a fourth goal on 66 minutes, when Mason Greenwood squared for substitute Wissam Ben Yedder.

Garcia, who is on loan from the French, completed the scoring for the home side as De Zerbi's men scored five in a Ligue 1 game for the third time this season.

Le Havre, who are in the relegation zone, pulled one back late on when former Marseille player Andre Ayew headed in.

Elsewhere on Sunday, Championnat League-relegated Reims charged to a 2-0 defeat away at Angers, a result which leaves them 12th in Ligue 1 as the season reaches its midway stage next weekend.

Toulouse were surprise 1-0 winners at RC Lens in a battle between a Kaka-less Lens side, while Strasbourg came from behind to beat Amiens 3-1 in Alsace.

Last-gasp Dembele strike earns PSG French Super Cup victory over Monaco

PARIS: A stoppage-time goal by forward Ousmane Dembele earned Paris St-Germain a 1-0 win over AS Monaco in the French Super Cup on Sunday as the Ligue 1 champions lifted the trophy for the third consecutive season.

Reported 11-times winner PSG, who faced last season's Ligue 1 champion Monaco after the Parisians had won both the League and the French Cup, was the competition for the 13th time in the last 12 years.

"It was a great game between two teams who play good football," said Luis Enrique, "The result is well deserved and reflects our domination, against

one of the best teams in France and in Europe."

In lively encounter at Doha's Stadium 93, made from 934 recycled shipping containers for the 2022 World Cup, PSG had 27 chances — nine of them on target — without breaking the deadlock.

But Dembele ensured the game did not go to penalties when he sealed the win for the French champions two minutes into injury time, netting inside the far post after Fabien Ruiz fed him with a neat pass across the face of the goal.

Summer signing Thilo Dumont was close to giving PSG the lead in the ninth minute but hit the

bar while Lee Kang In was denied by Monaco goalkeeper Philipp Kostic with an effort from distance in first-half stoppage time.

Dembele and Vitinha also tested Kostic in the opening 45 minutes while Monaco's Maguire Akpeyi and Takumi Minamino forced Goalkeeper Donalys Mendoza into saves, with the PSG keeper returning to the pitch after recovering from a knee injury.

A goal in the last minute always feels like being stability in the 'Rock,' said Monaco's Austrian coach, Ali Hunter.

"But being honest, PSG deserved to win. They had more chances."

No goals were scored in the first half of a French Super Cup for the first time since 2010 when Olympique de Marseille beat PSG 5-4 on penalties after the match ended goalless.

PSG, who beat Nantes and Toulouse in the previous two editions, won 4-2 at Monaco last month in Ligue 1 with Dembele scoring a second-half brace.

Four-time winners Monaco last lifted the trophy in 2000, then won runners-up in 2017 and 2018, losing both times to PSG.

PSG return to league action next Sunday when they host St Etienne while Monaco visit local Nantes on Friday.—Agence

Indonesia sack coach Shin, citing World Cup target

JAKARTA: Indonesia sacked coach Shin Tae-yong on Monday with the country's football chief saying the team needed stronger leadership as it battles for a place at the 2026 World Cup.

Thousands of people in the Southeast Asian nation are passionate football fans, but Indonesia's sole World Cup appearance came during Dutch rule in 1938 and the country has rarely threatened a return since independence in 1945.

Erick Thohir, who heads the Indonesian Football Association (PSSI), said Shin's work with the team had "ended" and his replace-

ment, whom he declined to name, would arrive in Indonesia on Jan 11.

"We need a leadership that implements strategies we agreed with the players, communicates better, and implements better preparations for our national team," Thohir told a press conference.

Indonesia are third in their World Cup group after six of 10 matches, one point behind Australia in the battle for the second automatic spot in the finals.

If they finish third or fourth, they could still go to the finals in North America through further rounds of qualifying and an

intercontinental playoff.

Thohir, who said he had interviewed three candidates to replace Shin during a recent trip to Europe, was not concerned that changing coaches in the middle of the campaign would disrupt the team.

"It's normal. Lots of countries switch coaches during World Cup qualifiers," he added.

"This is something we've been discussing for many months. Back, but I think the moment is right, because we still have 2 1/2 months preparation for next games."

"We still have four matches and we want to get as many points as we can."—Reuters

University teams' coaches raise concerns over selection of HEC cricket team

LAHORE: The cricket coaches from the University of the Punjab (UoP) and Central University of Punjab (CUP) have raised concerns over what they claim is a biased selection process for the Higher Education Commission (HEC) cricket team, set to compete in the upcoming Patron's Trophy First-Class tournament, starting Wednesday.

The coaches have called on both the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) and the chairman of the HEC to investigate the matter and take appropriate action.

UoP coach Akhtar Munir

told, speaking at a press conference on Monday, that both UoP and CUP had performed well in the recent inter-varsity cricket tournament in Peshawar, with UCP finishing second and UoP securing third place.

Following the tournament, 33 players were invited to attend the final selection trials. However, Akhtar pointed out that the trials were held in Karachi instead of Peshawar or Islamabad, where the HEC's head office is located.

"But when the trials were held in Karachi, 70 to 80 players showed up, and surprisingly, many of those who had not participated owing to the inter-varsity matches were selected for

the final squad of 20," Akhtar explained.

PCB coach Madihaan echoed these concerns, adding that some selections appeared questionable. "Among the selected players in Peshawar, the son of Pakistan's former captain Misbah-ul-Haq, who did not play a single match in the inter-varsity tournament nor had any notable performances in other domestic events. Yet, he has made the final squad."

The coaches have raised alarm over the selection of at least eight players who did not feature in the inter-varsity matches, suggesting that merit had been overlooked in favor of other factors.

"We presented to the HEC chairman about this issue, but our concern went unheard. Now, we are appealing to the PCB chairman to take notice of the situation," said the coaches.

Akhtar, who is well-respected domestic cricket organizer and coach, also highlighted doubts surrounding the so-called match between Peshawar and Lahore's universities. He questioned how Peshawar University, the eventual winner, managed to score 52 runs in the final two overs of their innings, leading to suspicions about the fairness of the contest.

"We request the PCB to investigate this matter as the matches were officiated by umpires appointed by the board," he urged.

The coaches warned that if the current pattern of non-merit-based selections persists, private universities may be discouraged from maintaining their cricket teams, as the sports requires significant funding.

Thus, they believe, could hinder the development of young talent who are eager to pursue both academic and sporting careers.

The coaches also criticized the PCB's policy of allowing players who have participated in domestic tournaments to be eligible for selection in the HEC cricket team, further questioning the integrity of the selection process.

Osaka upbeat about Australian Open

Sydney: Naomi Osaka will undergo a scan on the injury that forced her to pull out of the Auckland Classic final but remains optimistic about playing at the Australian Open, the former world number one said on Monday.

Osaka, the 2019 and 2021 champion at Melbourne Park, was reduced to tears when an abdominal injury forced her to quit while leading Clara Tauson 6-4 in her first WTA final almost three years.

"I'm having an MRI today to assess," the 27-year-old said in a brief statement.

"I don't feel that it's too serious and I still feel very optimistic about AO."

Osaka, who returned to the tour a year ago after a long maternity break, had shown glimpses of the form that won her four major titles in her run to the final in Auckland.—Reuters

Spaniard Paula Badosa also narrowly avoided defeat, battling for nearly three hours to complete a 6-7 (6-7), 6-3, 7-5 comeback win over American Peyton Stavros.

"I'm so tired, I went through all the emotions," said Badosa, a former world number two, now ranked 12.

Russia's Kasatkina, runner-up at the last two editions of the Australian Open warm-up event, beat Australia's Olivia Gadecki five times to advance 6-2, 6-3.

"I think Adelaide is the tournament I've played most in my career," said the 27-year-old, who made six WTA finals last year and won two titles.

"It's the beginning of the season, I'm happy to be back."

"My tactic today was to turn on my legs and win as many points as possible and play aggressively when I had the chance."

The match featured four service breaks in the first five games as third seed Kasatkina got re-acquainted with the Memorial Drive centre court.

"She will meet me at the Australian Open," said Williams junior runner-up Emerson Jones, a wild-card entry who scored an impressive 6-4, 6-0

win over China's Wang Xinyu.

Croatian Vekic, a Wimbledon semi-finalist last year, saw her Australian Open build-up go from bad to worse with a 6-2, 6-3 defeat to Kazakhstan's Yulia Putintseva.

The world number 19 was also beaten in two group matches in Perth at the United Cup.

Victory moved Putintseva into a second-round clash against either American fourth-seed Danielle Collins or Taiwan's world number 18 Anna-Lena Friedsam.

"Today I played great, I was focused all the way through," said Putintseva. "We've played so much and known each other's games well. There are no secrets on the court."

In other matches, 2021 US Open finalist Leylah Fernandez was eliminated by Russia's Ekaterina Alexandrova in three sets, with her reward a clash against American world number eight Emma Raducanu, who had a bye.

The first Grand Slam of the year begins in Melbourne on Sunday.—AFP

Australia set sights on world domination after taming India

SYDNEY: Cricket's World Test Championship final is still five months away but it is already playing on the mind of Australia skipper Pat Cummins, saying the defense of their title is "a huge goal" after defeating India.

Australia surged into a June showdown against South Africa at Lord's with a six-wicket victory in the fifth Test against India in Sydney on Sunday.

The thrilling win sealed a first series triumph against their South Asian rivals in a decade.

It also confirmed their place in a clash against South Africa that will determine the world's most consistent red-ball side over the last two years from the nine teams contesting the WTC.

"To hold the Border-Gavaskar Trophy is an amazing feeling, and the extra layer is now securing a spot again in the World Test Championship final, which was always a huge goal for us in this cycle," Cummins said.

"We talk about the World Test Championships a lot. It's a trophy we're really proud to hold so we want to go back and defend it."

"I think it's a great tournament that you've got to play well consistently and across all different conditions against different teams."

"We can't wait to get over there."

South Africa booked their spot under the WTC's average points system where they beat Pakistan in a dramatic two-wicket win at Centurion late last month.

Australia play two Tests in Sri Lanka starting later this month before a lengthy red-ball break leading into the WTC final.

Cummins appears likely to miss the Sri Lanka tour for the birth of his second child, with Steve Smith in pole position to take over as captain.

But the Australian skipper is adamant that after four years in the role, he has no plans to hand over the armband permanently at any stage.

"First of all, I absolutely love what I do. That's the biggest driver in wanting to play Test cricket and work with this team and support staff," Cummins said.

"I absolutely love everything about it, it's that much fun. If I can keep doing it for a while, even better."

Cricket Australia reveals who and nearly 200 spectators attended the Border-Gavaskar Trophy series, despite two matches ending within three days.

The numbers were boosted by the Boxing Day Test in Melbourne going all five days, with a record 37,000 people turning out across the match.

South Africa sweep series despite Pakistan's improved batting show

CAPETOWN: South Africa made light work of a modest target of 58 to claim victory against Pakistan by 10 wickets at a sun-baked Newlands on Monday, wrapping up the series 2-0 inside four days of the second and final Test.

Pakistan had built up the home side's victory charge with a second innings score of 478 having been asked to follow on, their effort led by captain Shan Masood's final 145 on a shade wicket.

Bat-scooter Kagiso Rabada (31) and spinner Keshav Maharaj (34-37) kept chipping away at the Pakistani wickets, aided by some poor shot selection.

David Reddington was promoted to open at the South African second innings after double-centurions from their first, Ryan Ricklefs, sustained a hamstring strain.

Reddington passed 44 from 30 balls to see his side to victory in 7.1 overs.

"The result is very satisfying, it was good old Test cricket. There was something in it for the bowlers with the new ball and then the wicket really flattened out," South Africa captain Temba Bavuma said. "It was a good experience that will build us in good stead as a team. Certain parts of the game we let go, but off those learnings will make us better."

South Africa have won their last seven Tests in a row, their second best run of victories behind a nine-game winning streak between 2002-2003.

It is perfect preparation for their appearance in the World Test Championship final against Australia at Lord's from June 11-15.

Pakistan resumed the fourth day on 23-1 for one, though they were effectively two down after former batter Saeed Ajmal fractured his ankle while fielding on the first day.

Despite the wicket offering little to the bowlers in terms of seam or turn, South Africa picked up two wickets in the morning session, as Khurram Raees caught by Masood at point off seamer Marco Jansen for 18.

Rabada bowled Kamran Ghulam for 28, a delivery after they had been bowled out for 108 in their first innings.

The home side took the new ball shortly after lunch and then brought two more wickets, including the key scalp of Shoaib, who was trapped leg before wicket by 36-year-old fast bowler Kagiso Rabada, South Africa's youngest ever Test player.

Saad Shakoor scored 23 before he was caught at second slip by Andile Morkom off Rabada.

Mohammad Rizwan (41) and Saboor Ali Agha (48) continued to show resistance but both fell to Masood, who also claimed the wicket of Aslam Jamil following a bouncy 34.

Pakistan's total of 478 is the highest score followed on score by a visiting team in South Africa, a vastly improved display after they had been bowled out for 108 in their first innings.

"We didn't start off well with ball and bat, conceding too many runs. In South Africa's first innings of 615 and folded quite early in our first innings on a really nice surface," Shan said. "The fightback after that was the thing you look for as a team and individuals really stepped up."

Shan will use the fact his side allowed South Africa to score a massive 478 in their first innings, which meant the tourists were always chasing the game.

Now that it is anything new, Pakistan have played well in practice recently but also underpinning added pressure. Shan hoped they can be more consistent in their upcoming two-Test home series against West Indies that starts on Jan 17.

"We need to learn how to win the crucial moments," he said.

Mullah Nisar acquitted 'for want of evidence' in encounter case

KARACHI: A sessions court acquitted a suspected gangster for lack of evidence in another case pertaining to the assault on police in an alleged encounter in 2014.

Additional District and Sessions Judge Abdul Zadpeer Chaudhry, who is also the presiding officer of the General Bench of Multan Court (South), acquitted Nisar Ahmed alias Mullah Nisar as the prosecution failed to prove charges against him for allegedly attacking the policemen.

The court directed the jail superintendent to release the accused if he is not required in any other case. However, Nisar will remain imprisoned as he is implicated in multiple cases.

Highlighting lacunes in the investigation, the court noted: "A review of the evidence presented at trial revealed significant deficiencies in the prosecution's case. The testimonies of both the complainant and the investigating officer were marred by contradictions and omissions."

The absence of independent witness from the area, particularly in a case involving an armed encounter, severely undermined the prosecution's credibility, the court observed.

Additionally, the lack of forensic evidence, as no police weapons were sent to the forensic science laboratory for examination, further weakened the case, it added. "The failure to properly account for the arms and ammunition used by the police and the absence of corroborating evidence from independent witnesses diminished the probative value of the recovered items."

The court ruled that the prosecution failed to meet its burden of proof, and in line with established legal principles, the accused was given the benefit of the doubt.

Regarding the absconding co-accused, Faisal Pathan, Shahzad Kamran and Nasim Laiqa, the court ruled that the case file remained dormant until they were arrested and produced before the court.

According to the prosecution, the complainant testified before the court that on March 10, 2014, while serving as a Sub Inspector at the Kalabagh police station, he was patrolling with his subordinates when he received information about the presence of "notorious gang members" — including Faisal Pathan, Shahzad Kamran, Mullah Nisar, Nasim Laiqa, and others — at Ghulabi Gali in Jamshoro.

The informer stated that the gang members were allegedly preparing to commit

Opposition raises concerns over boy's drowning in open manhole

• Minister urges collective action to prevent children from falling into uncovered gutters • Says KWSC placed covers on 32,000 manholes last year • House passes resolution to pay tribute to Zulfikar Ali Bhutto on birth anniversary

KARACHI: The Sindh Assembly on Monday echoed with the opposition's concern over the death of a minor boy, who drowned in an open manhole in Shah Faisal Colony a day before, as it criticised the authorities for being "inefficient" while Local Government (LG) Minister Saeed Ghani appealed to the public to "take action" against encroachment elements involved in sealing the covers.

At the outset of the proceedings, Leader of the Opposition Ali Khawaja of the Muttahida Qaumi Movement (Pakistan), on a point of order, took up the issue of manholes that lack covers and asked the government to ascertain who was responsible for such negligence.

Mr Khawaja said that there were thousands of open manholes across the city, which posed danger to the public, and demanded that assistance be arranged for the districts that suffered due to lack of sewer covers.

Referring to Friday's protest by the opposition in the house, he also said that the controversial results of the by-elections in Karachi was an important issue. He said that the students would have to bear the impact of the poor results as they would not be able to get admission in public universities and professional colleges.

Responding to the opposition leader's concerns over uncovered manholes in the city, LG minister Saeed Ghani said that the provincial government, relevant civic agencies and the public had to play their due role in preventing fatalities of children falling into open sewers.

Mr Ghani told the house that the Karachi Water and Sewerage Corporation (KWSC) in the last year had placed 32,000 covers in

the metropolis and added that there were around 400,000 utility holes in the city.

The LG minister said that every union committee in the city had been asked to keep 50 to 100 manhole covers ready for the uncovered gutters in their respective jurisdictions.

He told the house that the covers were either stolen or broken by "unscrupulous elements" retrieving steel from them.

He appealed to the public to take action against persons involved in sealing and snatching of manhole covers.

Tribute to Bhutto

Members from both sides of the aisle also lauded the political acumen and vision of the founding chairman of the Pakistan People's Party, Zulfikar Ali

Bhutto, as the house unanimously passed a resolution to pay homage to him on his birth anniversary.

Senior parliamentarians and PPP-Sindh President Nasir Ahmed Khokhar tabled the resolution after Speaker Syed Aslam Shah suspended all other business on the agenda to discuss the resolution on the request of the Law and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Zia Lailai.

It said the house acknowledged Bhutto's instrumental role in shaping Pakistan's history, notably in establishing the country's nuclear programme, promoting socio-economic development and introducing its first constitution of 1973.

"Nasheed Zulfikar Ali Bhutto's unwavering dedication to democracy and parliamentary supremacy continue to inspire generation of Pakistanis. His selfless efforts to support Pakistan during a critical period have left an indelible mark on the nation," the resolution said.

Speaking on the resolution, Mr Khokhar said that the greatest achievement of Bhutto was giving the country a unified constitution.

The PMPA, who is also chairman of the assembly's Public Account Committee, said that it was also necessary to implement the Constitution that the nation was proud of. "After the Constitution was made, we were able to show our face to the world," he said.

He said that Asif Zardari, Farzal Taqiq and other party

SHC issues notice on plea challenging judges' appointment rules

Judges' nominations must come only from judicial members of JCP to protect public trust in judiciary, bench told

KARACHI: A division bench of the Sindh High Court (SHC) on Monday issued a notice to the deputy attorney general in a petition challenging the rules for appointing judges in the superior courts.

The petition was filed by lawyer Momin Ali, through his

counsel Ibrahim Naftulekar, before a regular bench of the SHC, seeking to declare Rule 101, related to nominations for appointment, and Rule 10 (5), which states that the Secretariat shall not include the names of the members proposing the nominations in the two consolidated lists of nominees for the commission's consideration, under the Judicial Commission of Pakistan (Appointment of Judges) Rules, 2024, unconstitutional.

After the preliminary hearing, the division bench headed by Justice Zahid Ahmed Rajput put the deputy attorney general on notice for Jan 22.

The counsel for the petitioner submitted that on Dec 12, 2024,

Pakistan (JCP) approved the rules in a meeting. It stated that Rule 101 allowed any member of the JCP to nominate a candidate for appointment as a judge in the superior courts.

Referring to the composition of the JCP before and after the 26th Amendment to the Constitution, the counsel argued that the executive, having a majority, could vote for its "favoured nominees" and appoint them as judges of the superior courts.

Regarding the composition of the commission of members who make nominations under Rule 10 (5), the counsel argued that it was an attempt to hide from the public at large whether a nominee was put forward by the executive or a judicial member.

The counsel pointed out that nominations must come exclusively from the JCP's judicial members to protect public trust and confidence in the judiciary.

"The mode and manner for the appointment of judges must be transparent, which is an established principle," the petitioner stated.

The counsel asked the court to declare Rule 10 (1) and Rule 10 (5) of the judges' appointment rules as ultra vires, arbitrary and unconstitutional on the grounds that granting the executive the authority to make nominations in the JCP could lead to the appointment of individuals who shared allegedly close links with the executive and were more inclined to cooperate with them.

The counsel pointed out that nominations must come exclusively from the JCP's judicial members to protect public trust and confidence in the judiciary.

WWF mission gives fisherfolk vision to save blind Indus dolphins

Under fund's programme, volunteers educate fishermen about steps to ensure safety of the mammal

SURKHEER: Quite unlike other dolphins, the Indus river dolphin is a unique species. When coming into the Karachi harbour, people in boats are often pleasantly surprised to find friendly and happy dolphins chasing their vessels as they long and dance in contrast the blind and smaller river Indus dolphin in estuaries and quiet.

Guarded in nature, these mammals in the river, never know them selves about the dangers around them, which have made them an endangered species. Your boat in the river may be surrounded by several blind dolphins but you only get to see a grey fuzzy disappearing into the water. But if you are lucky and alert, still, the small ripples, which

they make as they move out to breathe, carry big effects.

Shaf Mohammad is a local community volunteer, working along the river banks. The volunteers, identified by their blue badges and caps with the printed message 'Dolphins for Indus', are part of the World Wildlife Fund for Nature, Pakistan's (WWF-Pakistan) programme to empower communities and protect biodiversity.

"'Dolphins' is the local word for the Indus dolphin. When fishermen spread out their nets to catch fish in the river, we ask them to first make sure there are no dolphins getting caught in them," Shaf Mohammad told Dawn. "If they find any dolphin, they are to immediately lower their nets to help them escape," he explained.

"Also, our looking out for them day and night here has helped in increasing their dwindling population," he

said. "Earlier, people used to catch them and kill them to extract oil. We had that practice stopped by spreading awareness that the oil had no medicinal value. It is plain fat," he added.

"The Indus dolphin is my saviour [Janma]," said Naseem Khanum, a WWF volunteer. "Since we tell people about the endangered creature, things have been changed so much that if a dolphin gets stuck in a net by mistake, the fishermen themselves try their best to help it escape," said Naseem.

Apart from explaining to the locals about the importance of saving the dolphins, the programme is also helping them sustain their own livelihoods through other means than fishing. The women have been shown how they can grow vegetables through kitchen gardening. "This way they can use the vegetables they grow in their own cooking and also sell the extra in their village to make a little money," said Hina Tariq, a community mobiliser for the WWF.

Meanwhile, Tohsheed Ghani, Manager, Food and Agriculture Programme for WWF

Pakistan, said that there are many things aligned with the Indus dolphin. "When a species here is not doing well and is endangered, it also points to river health and environmental degradation. That's where conservation of the environment becomes necessary. You need to act to save your planet," he pointed out.

It was explained that in the last 20 years or so, while building a concrete jettty, we started killing the real people. We have unfortunately lost 71 percent of our biodiversity, which is apparent with the disappearance of so many plants, insects and animals and the increased frequency of natural disasters.

Mohammed Irfan Malik, coordinator conservation for WWF-Pakistan, said that there are some 2,000 dolphins, of six species from Jhalala to Suleiman Barrage. While pointing out the many reasons behind the high mortality rate of the dolphins, the biggest of which was entanglement in fishing nets and getting stuck in canals, he said that saving wildlife one just needs patience, but also funding.

He mentioned some of the programmes for the cause such as the

programmes for engaging students. Besides, there are also capacity building programmes where community members are trained in eco-guides for dolphin watch boat safaris. Fishing boats have also been converted to eco-tourism boats with joint branding of WWF-Pakistan and Bank AlBaraka for this purpose.

GDA leader granted bail

LARKANA: The district and sessions judge on Monday granted interim bail to former GDA MPA Moazzam Ali Abbasi against a sum of Rs60,000 in a case registered against him, his son and others at Dera police station.

The application for bail confirmation would now be heard on Jan 13, according to Advocate Javed Baloch, counsel for the former MPA.

Abbasi told media persons in a brief talk at the court that the FIR was merely a tool of political victimisation. Abdul Ahad Mejaz, who was nominated in the FIR, had voluntarily surrendered but police were not producing him in the court and were still unnecessarily pressurising his father, he said.

He appealed to Chief Justice of Sindh High Court, judges of SHC circuit court Larkana, Sindh chief minister and KPP to intervene and ensure Mejaz was produced in court for remand in accordance with law.

However, efforts of PPP MPA Sardar Khan Chando, chairman of Chando clan, and Maulana Rashed Mahmood Soomro bore fruit in the shape of a settlement, he said.

Inquiry into rift between former Sukkur DIG and Ghotki SSP completed

HYDERABAD: The inquiry team formed by Sindh Inspector General of Police Captain Naseem Khan on last year's rift between the Sukkur DIG and Ghotki SSP has submitted its findings to KPP with members of the team having different viewpoints.

The KPP said that competent authority would look into it to proceed with the recommendations as per law.

The inquiry was initiated in October 2024 following the October 16 letter addressed by DIG Dr Mohammad Shah to the KPP and somehow leaked to the media. The leak exposed the belligerence of Ghotki SSP Dr Hafeez Bagri against the DIG.

The DIG had accused the SSP of "trading" a dangerous and unpredictable path" by engaging with notorious criminals involved in multiple heinous activities, including killing of policemen, kidnapping for ransom and looting police wagons.

SSP Bagri had shared his views with the media against DIG Shah over a letter after SHO Shadab Lukhia's arrest while investigating Hyderabad DIG Tariq Razzaq Dhairya for pressuring him to release Lukhia in the wake of the October 14 killing of an alleged dacoit, Umer Shear along with Ali Mohammed Shah, a cousin of former PEL MPA Shaharyar Shah. Shaharyar had remained unscathed.

The KPP removed the two officers following the controversy and formed the team to probe the whole episode. Since

then the two officers were posted in Central Police Office (CPO) Karachi. The inquiry team had submitted its findings last month but the KPP returned it with the observations that it was not drafted in line with the relevant norms of reference (RoR).

The committee consisted of Inspector Yasir Minhas, Additional IGP Counterterrorism Department, as its chairman, Asir Farooqui, DIG Crime & Investigation Sindh, and Taseer Ali Khan, DIG Finance, as members.

It was asked to inquire into the contents of the DIG's letter against the SSP, to dispel the allegations levelled by SSP in the media, to ascertain conduct of the DIG and SSP in the aftermath of incident of firing on ex-MPA Shaharyar Shah, to ascertain working relationship

and differences between the DIG and SSP regarding ongoing anti-robbery operation in Ghazi.

Source privy to the probe confided to Dawn that Minhas and Farooqui had found fault in both officers' ends as far as "official line of police professional working" was concerned whereas DIG Shah had mostly talked about uncalmed conduct of SSP Bagri.

When contacted, both DIG Pir Mohammad Shah and SSP Bagri declined to offer any comment saying that they were restrained by the hierarchy from discussing anything in the media. The officers have given their viewpoint before the inquiry team, and Dawn has learnt that the two officers were heard in person jointly for well over two hours.


The demand was made before a delegation comprising activists of different civil society organisations that visited the bereaved family's home in Jarchow village of Umeriot district on Monday.

Goods transport strike hits Larkana

LARKANA: Goods transport operators observed a strike in Larkana on Monday against imposition of a ban on the entry of their trucks and other heavy vehicles into the city.

Considering the ban that resulted in losses to them and disruption in bringing in supplies from all other parts of the country, they held a demonstration at the main office of city's truck stand.

Leaders of the Goods Transport Owners Association, speaking to the media, demanded free movement of the vehicles as per the decision taken by the civil administration in 1998.

Haji Momin Ali Sarjo, the

patron in chief of the association, explained the adverse effects of the禁令.

The leaders pointed out that over 400 daily wage earners engaged in loading and unloading of goods were suffering due to the ban.

The goods arriving from different parts of the country also could not be delivered to the consignees, they added.

They said that the piling up of booked goods would undermine the trade and commercial activities and labourers' livelihood.

They said a religious party was opposing the presence of truck traders' shops in the area on the "base excuse" that frequent and

unusual movement of heavy vehicles was causing traffic jams.

They attributed the move to instability of the traffic police.

It is learnt that the Larkana Assistant Commissioner, Raja Khan Qureshi, realising gravity of the situation, convened a meeting in his office on Monday evening to sort out the issue.

Secretary Regional Transport Authority Ajaz Ali Sohray, DGP Parvez Rakhrani, rankholders and senior traffic police officers attended the meeting.

The transport secretary pointed towards the traffic congestion and said that heavy vehicles were problematic.—Correspondent

NA body orders hiring of local experts for revision of master plan

Summary moved to federal cabinet for formation of master plan commission, CDA informs committee

ISLAMABAD: A parliamentary panel on Monday directed the Ministry of Interior to engage local experts, town planners and reputable firms for the timely finalisation of Islamabad's master plan.

The National Assembly Standing Committee on Interior met at Parliament House with Raja Khurram Shahzad Nasar in the chair.

The chairman of the CDA briefed the committee and said a summary had been moved to the federal cabinet for formation of the master plan commission.

The previously formed committee had directed hiring of international consultants for the revision of the master plan.

The committee expressed displeasure over hiring of international firms, considering it wastage of taxpayers' money.

The chair emphasised that the Ministry of Interior should engage local professional experts

to ensure timely completion of the master plan.

Dominic Associates, a Greece-based firm that prepared the master plan in 1980, had recommended its revision after every 20 years in accordance with the terms of time.

However, successive governments did not bother to make proper revision rather kept focusing on selective changes without any input from professionals, resulting into poor planning in the capital city.

So far, over 20 major changes have been made in the master plan and the transcurrent government also made at least seven changes in it last month without getting any input from experts.

In the new changes, at least three sectors have been excluded from Zone 1 of Islamabad and made residential sectors after changing their original status of hill green and hill for institutions.

Meanwhile, the committee also expressed displeasure about the imposition of heavy fees on unregistered vehicles and directed the Ministry of Interior to ease not only the cancellation of the notification dated August 2, 2024 but also refund of the collected amounts to the public in line with the committee's previous recommendations.

Furthermore, the committee recommended a one-time relaxa-

tion for new registrations and a token late fee for three months.

The ministry was directed to consult the relevant departments and stakeholders to review the increased slabs and formulate a standardised registration fee structure.

Meanwhile, the director general PIA was directed to brief the committee on the government's current policy and strategies for addressing human trafficking and the responsibility of PIA officials and officers toward combat in such cases.

Meanwhile, the committee considered the "Naturalisation (Amendment) Bill 2024" (sections 3-8, 11 & 12) and "The Code of Criminal Procedure (Amendment) Bill 2024" moved by Syed Naseem UlHaq, MNA, and recommended that the bills be passed by the National Assembly.

The committee also reviewed "The Pakistan Citizenship (Amendment) Bill 2024" (sections 1-4) (Government Bill), "Pakistan Land Port Authority Bill 2024" and "The Criminal Law (Amendment) Bill 2024" (section 498 AA) moved by MNA Sofia Saadat Shah and deferred them to the next meeting.

Steep increase in poultry rates upsets residents

R. A. W. A. L. P. T. E. D. I. Residents are unhappy with the government over a steep increase in the price of chicken and eggs within one week, saying the administration had seemingly given a free hand to the poultry industry instead of regulating the prices.

The price of live chicken (kg) increased from Rs433 to Rs610 compared to last week whereas the meat is being sold at Rs597 per kg compared to Rs68/kg.

People said due to high prices, chicken, as well as other types of meat, had become unaffordable.

Chicken is available at Rs680 per kg in the market while the official price is Rs610 per kg. A dozen eggs cost Rs150 compared to the official rate of Rs130 per dozen. Not just the chicken, the prices of mutton and beef are not regulated as well. Mutton is being sold at Rs1200 per kg against the official price of Rs1050 per kg and beef is being sold at Rs1400-1500 per kg against the official price of Rs800 per kg.

"Chicken meat is available for Rs680 per kg and live chicken is available at Rs610 per kg," said Nasar Ali, a visitor at Raja Bazaar.

Mohammed Khan, a government employee, said the price has increased due to the decrease in the production of chicken, the prices had increased.

He said that the poultry demand increased due to the wedding season and there was less production, which drove the prices up.

To question, he said there was no problem regarding the supply of chicken feed, but due to a decrease in the production of chicken, the prices had increased.

He said that the government should devise new policies to facilitate the farmers to produce more chicken, which would bring down the prices. However, he expected that the prices would not decrease in the coming days.

German diplomat found dead in Islamabad

ISLAMABAD: A German diplomat was found dead in Diplomatic Enclave on Monday, police said.

The deceased was identified as Thomas Jürgen Bleekfeld, 58, second secretary at the embassy of Germany.

Police said the diplomat was found dead with his eyes, nose and mouth bleeding at his residence located in Karakoram Heights inside the high security area.

The police said the diplomat did not come to office on Monday and also did not respond to phone calls made from the embassy.

In response, the embassy sent an employee to the residence of the diplomat, who did not get any response from inside the house.

Later, officials from embassy reached the residence and broke the locks open and entered the flat without informing the police, and found him dead.

The embassy then informed the police and officials from Secretariat police station who reached the flat and shifted the body to hospital.

The police were told that the diplomat was a heart patient. It was not clear when the diplomat died. However, he had last used his WhatsApp at 7:45pm on Saturday, police said.

Spokespersons for the German diplomatic mission did not respond to Dawn's requests for comment.

NA committee for strengthening social protection system

ISLAMABAD: The National Assembly Standing Committee on Poverty Alleviation and Social Safety on Monday stressed the need for strengthening social protection system to provide relief to poor segments of the society.

The meeting, chaired by MNA Ghulam Ali Telpur, focused on critical issues related to strengthening social protection systems in Pakistan.

The CEO of the Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund (PPAF) presented an overview of ongoing initiatives, including micro-insurance schemes for agriculture and livestock, funded through government grants.

These programmes, active in Balochistan and Sindh, support small and medium enterprises and aim to transition 34pc of BISP beneficiaries off social safety nets.

The chair directed PPAF to submit comprehensive reports, including Google Maps locations of ongoing projects, and mandated that NGOs working under PPAF should collaborate with MNAs and public representatives in their respective districts.

The committee expressed its dissatisfaction over the PPAF's briefing materials and directed them to include comprehensive details on donor agencies and address other omissions. The updates on these directives are to be presented at the next meeting.

The committee expressed concern over the absence of government audits for PPAF since 2020. The chair directed PPAF to comply with audit requirements.

Finally, the committee requested a detailed briefing from the ministry on the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) at the upcoming meeting, reaffirming its commitment to strengthening poverty alleviation and social safety initiatives across the country. — Staff Reporter

CDA takes charge of Diplomatic Shuttle Service

10 e-buses allocated by civic body to charge Rs1,000 for each trip

ISLAMABAD: The role of private contractors became a thing of the past on Monday after the Capital Development Authority (CDA) took control of a shuttle service for citizens visiting the diplomatic service for their visa applications.

Ten electric buses have been deployed for this service at CDA Chairman Mohammad Ali Randhawa directed the CDA's engineering and design wing to provide the best facilities on visa applications and upgrade facilities.

The service commenced with 10 buses and Rs1,000 will be charged for a trip. Several officials appreciated the CDA/MCI move to end the role of the contractor and endorsed this service to stop the

exploitation of citizens. "The fare should be decreased from Rs1,000, as instead of focusing on revenue generation, the CDA/MCI should focus on providing services to citizens," an official said.

It is relevant to note that private contractors, who were allowed to go Rs100 to Rs1,000 per trip, had been overcharging the passengers besides running an illegal car service, sometimes charging up to Rs20,000 per trip. Last year, a European diplomat had also informed the then CDA chairman about the overcharging issue faced by visitors to embassies.

Following the complaint, the then chairman of the CDA, Arunval Haq, chaired a meeting and reprimanded DMA officials, prompting them to issue a warning letter to the contractor on September 25.

The bus service has put an end to this practice.

Stonias told Dawn that the private parties allegedly in connec-

tion with the Directorate of Municipal Administration were making all out efforts to remain charge of the service instead of

inside the enclave, is seemingly the most expensive service across the country.

It was launched after the 9/11 attack as a security measure after the federal government banned the entry of private vehicles into the enclave.

The contract, which expired on Friday, was awarded in 2020 for Rs102.6 million per year.

According to sources, some DMA officials wanted the service to "contractors" through contractors because they allegedly enjoyed a good relationship with them. Now the CDA buses will charge Rs1,000 per passenger and a computerised fare system will be in place to facilitate the citizens.

"The CDA should run this service permanently to help citizens or this service should be ended for good and visa seekers should be allowed to move freely into the diplomatic enclave of their own country," said an official. It is re-

levant to note that on December 27, the DMA tried to award a new contract, but at the eleventh hour, the tender was deferred and one of the DMA officials was also suspended.

Sources said that when the notice was brought to the notice of the chief commissioner, he had directed that instead of private contractors, the CDA's buses should be utilized for the services to help citizens.

On the first day of the service, the contractor's staff was still present on the site. However, DMA Director Dr Sana Paracha told Dawn that there was no role of the contractor in running this service anymore.

"Today, none of their staff members are present there to guide the DMA staff about the operations. From now on, they have nothing to do with this project. They are not even allowed to enter the premises," she said. — Kashif Abbasi

However, the number of injuries in the last two years has been estimated at 10 to 50 million, and the number of people disabled in accidents is more than two million annually. — Staff Reporter

She asked the nursing students to improve their professional efficiency and capacity to cope with the requirements of the modern era.

She said that in developing countries nurses have major parts in the medical profession and “if we start new courses and good trends it can help a lot to bring the nurses on

par with them”.

She said the present government had a clear vision for the health sector and “we all should strive hard to translate these dreams into reality”.

She said “Our nurses are well trained and equipped professionally to extend their services for the ailing humanity round the clock and they always work shoulder to shoulder with doctors”.

She stressed that it is encouraging that the number of nurses in Pakistan has increased by 70pc over the past decade, but this number is still insufficient according to global health standards.—Correspondent

Senate body concerned about pollution in Rawal Dam

Work on circuit house by Punjab govt in irrigation colony should be halted if it is against laws, says chairperson

ISLAMABAD: The Senate Subcommittee on Climate Change and Environmental Coordination expressed concern about pollution in Rawal Dam and the construction of a circuit house inside the dam's irrigation colony by the Punjab government.

The committee in a meeting chaired by Shahzad Durrani discussed environmental issues concerning Rawal Dam,

including the construction of the circuit house by the Punjab Irrigation Department and severe pollution affecting the dam's ecosystem.

The meeting was attended by representatives from the relevant government departments, including Pakistan Environment Protection Agency (Pepa), Water and Sanitation Agency (Wasa) and the Capital Development Authority (CDA).

The circuit house was constructed inside the Rawal Dam Irrigation Colony Zone 3 without permission from Wasa.

The committee expressed displeasure over the performance of various departments dealing with the issue and the violation of laws, rules and procedures.

Senator Durrani said work on the house within the irrigation colony should be halted immediately if it was

being constructed in contravention of laws and regulations.

The committee also reviewed reports on water pollution levels at Rawal Dam which serve as a critical water source for Rawalpindi.

The managing director of Wasa said untreated sewage from Rawalpindi was being discharged directly into the dam, exacerbating water contamination. Wasa currently provides 55 million gallons of water daily to Rawalpindi, but with rampant unregulated construction the city faces a severe risk of future water shortages.

The director general of PwC IPA called attention to the lack of data regarding the types of waste entering the dam, particularly from various drains feeding into it. It was also revealed that the sewerage systems around Rawal Dam were heavily polluted and very poorly cleaned.

The meeting was told that 65% of pollution in the dam was caused through untreated and 35% from Punjab.

Senator Durrani underscored the importance of addressing the growing environmental crisis.

"The population around the dam is increasing exponentially. How can we continue to allow construction within a two-kilometre radius of a national park?" he asked. The committee also called for daily cleaning of the dam, and the establishment of solid waste management systems that could potentially generate income and even produce electricity.

The committee assessed data from the health department regarding water-borne diseases in the region and called on the CDA to provide a report on its waste management efforts around Rawal Dam.

Three brothers killed in lock-up as rivals storm police station

Team formed to probe into security lapse amid reports of thin police presence

LAHORE/TOKA TEK SINGH: In what appeared to be a case of a security lapse, five armed men carried out a brazen attack on a police station in Tandojamwala town of Faisalabad district and allegedly killed three brothers and injured their cousin facing a murder case.

The attackers stormed the Sadar police station by scaling the walls using a bamboo ladder, killed their rivals in lock-up without any resistance and fled the scene without any resistance as there were only three policemen out of total 68 posted at the police station when the attack was carried out.

The police declared the incident a result of an old enmity between the two local groups of Tandojamwala rehdi-

Sokhara and Kharval — who had so far allegedly killed eight persons of each other in Tandojamwala.

Those who lost their lives in the fresh lethal attack were identified as Mohammad Rehal, Mohammad Usman and Nasir Ali, the men belonging to Sokhara group. The injured, Muhammad Ali, was shifted to Tandojamwala THQ hospital in a critical condition.

They were arrested for allegedly murdering three men of rival Kharval group and a case was lodged against them under 7 ATA and other homicide charges.

The police inquiry showed that 67 police personnel (police constables) of Tandojamwala Sadar police station had gone to their homes, leaving three suspects, whom no one had been granted by the anti-terrorism court, almost unattended.

Seniors prior to the incident declared it a case of security lapse, holding the divisional SP, DSP and other police officers responsible for the attack and killing of the suspects in custody saying the Faisalabad police high-ups had already conveyed them in writing to keep the

suspects in tight security following the old enmity between the two groups.

They said the police officers blatantly violated the instructions and left the deceased at the mercy of the three attackers.

Faisalabad Regional Police Officer (RPO) Dr Abid Khan told Dawn that the assailants brought a wooden ladder and went to the backside of the police station and forced the main gate closed.

He said the armed men went to the roof of the police station and then reached the corridor through the stairs where a police constable, Kalim Shahid, fired warning shots on finding the armed strangers.

However, the attackers opened indiscriminate fire, forcing the constable to stop firing and take shelter in a portion of the police building.

The assailants then went to the police kitchen and unleashed massive firing on their rivals, killing three of them on the spot and injuring another critically.

The attack challenging to the Kharval group that the same after completing the task, the RPO said, adding that he

reached the site along with Faisalabad City Police Officer Kamran Afzal soon after the attack.

To a question, he said, enmity started between Sokhara and Kharval groups for the first time when the former attacked and injured a man of the latter group in March 2023.

The attacker belonging to the Sokhara group, Mohammad Irfan, was declared proclaimed offender (PO) in this case, the RPO said.

He went on saying the armed men from Kharval party avenged and allegedly murdered two men of the rival group in August 2023. A murder case was lodged against the men of the attacking group accordingly.

An inquiry was ongoing, Dr Abid said, the Sokhara party carried out an armed attack in October last year and allegedly killed three men of the rival group when they were on way to the district court.

The Tandojamwala City police lodged a murder case under 7 ATA and other

Ramzan Sugar Mills case hearing adjourned

LAHORE: An anti-corruption court Monday adjourned the proceedings on the Ramzan Sugar Mills case against Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and his son Hassan without any prognosis.

Judge Sardar Iqbal Dogar was scheduled to hear the case, but the hearing could not take place due to his unavailability.

Prime Minister Shehbaz was represented by his brother Arsalan Hassan while Hassan Shehbaz once again skipped the hearing due to a back injury. His legal team submitted a request for a one-time exemption from personal appearance.

The next hearing is now scheduled for Jan 18, when the

lawyers of PM Shehbaz and Hassan would present arguments on their acquittal petitions.

On Oct 17, an accountability court transferred the Ramzan Sugar Mills reference to the anti-corruption court due to lack of jurisdiction following amendment introduced to the National Accountability Ordinance 1999.

The NAB, after the amendment, cannot prosecute an alleged offence involving money less than Rs100 million and the offence amount in the mills reference was below the minimum limit.

The accountability court was informed that the NAB in its reference made a case of

Punjab forms wide-ranging district coordination committees

LAHORE: In line with the Revised National Action Plan (RNAP), the Punjab government has constituted District Coordination Committees (DCCs) to oversee a host of actions, ranging from curbing smuggling, ensuring registration of madrasas (mosques) as well as establishment of District Narrative News Centres (DNNCs) to neutralising hostile narratives against the government.

In pursuance to the decision of the Central Action Committee, presided over by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, the RNAP had called for the constitution of DCCs, assigning several functions to these bodies including execution of policy decisions to

prevent extremism and terrorism and implementing decisions made by the federal and provincial apex committees.

The Punjab home department has constituted and notified DCCs to be convened by the deputy commissioners (DCOs) of the respective districts across the province.

Each committee, having members not less than 18-19 officers, comprises CCOO (or Lahore/CPPM/DPDC), representatives of local formations, heads of all law departments, representatives of special branches, Counter Terrorism Department (CTD), Intelligence Bureau (IB), Federal Intelligence Agency (FIA), Anti-Narcotics Force (ANF), Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI), Military Intelligence (MI), representatives of Customs (where required) and any other excepted member as required

The DCCs have been tasked with executing the policy decisions regarding the NAP and apex committees to strengthen the security framework at the district level.

The committees have been asked to implement and enforce security policies relating to the prevention of extremism, terrorism and other unlawful activities.

The respective DCCs have also been assigned the task of ensuring registration of madrasas with the relevant authorities, while implementing the NAP reforms for madrasah education, to bring all religious seminaries under regulatory oversight, leading to their contribution to national peace and security.

These committees have also been tasked with establishing District Narrative News Centres (DNNC) to ensure that dissemination

of any information aligns with the policies and narrative of the Punjab government.

The committees will be required to work with traditional and digital social media outlets to ensure widespread dissemination of government narrative and neutralise hostile narratives.

They will also develop and execute rapid response strategies to manage disinformation, besides using tools to track public sentiment and disinformation campaigns, according.

The committees have also been empowered to launch crackdowns on narcotics smuggling, power theft and other illegal activities. The committees have been ordered to target warehouses dealing in smuggled goods and non-custom paid (NCP) items, including vehicles.

The committees will also be required to

shut down illegal petrol pumps and take action against unlawful settlements and unauthorized activities in peri-urban areas.

The committees are supposed to establish direct communication channels between district and provincial authorities for close coordination and liaison to maintain consistency and transparency in security issues and law enforcement.

The DCCs will also monitor establishment of Safe Cities, Authority for enhanced maritime surveillance and monitoring to ensure effective law enforcement in all major cities of the province.

It has been made mandatory for the DCCs to meet at least once a month for coordination and to review the progress of ongoing operations, besides updating the Provincial Implementation Committee by sharing key insights.

Non-payment of compensation Police action against protesting labourers

SAHIWAJ: The Yousofabad police baton-charged and dispersed 13 labourers protesting over what they claimed, the non-payment of medical compensation for a colleague whose finger was severed while operating a machine at a textile mill near village G/S-L late on Sunday.

The labourers blocked the highway for over three hours starting at 10:30pm, causing traffic disruption. Passengers reported a two-kilometre-long traffic jam worsened by fog.

Despite police attempts to negotiate with protest leader Khalid Khokhar when negotiations failed, police resorted to baton charge to clear the highway within 30 minutes.

The police registered an FIR under sections 241, 245, 248, and 149 of the Pakistan Penal Code against 13 protesters, including Mr Khokhar, on the complaint of ABBG Gulzar Ahmed. However, no arrests have been made.

The incident origi-

nated on Jan 4, when Adam lost a finger while operating machinery. The mill provided initial medical treatment, but his colleagues demanded full compensation as per labour laws.

Mr Khokhar told Dawn that the demands included fair compensation for the injured labourer and the withdrawal of criminal charges against peaceful protesters.

Sources said that the District Labour Department was largely inactive, sending only a field officer to assess the situation without initiating formal negotiations or taking action against the mill for unsafe working conditions.

District Labour Officer Hyder Shah confirmed the worker's injury but provided no details about any steps taken to address the issue.

However, the general manager of the mill stated that the injured labourer had received treatment at both public and private hospitals.

He said that a meeting between the mill owner and the labourers had not occurred, which prompted the road protest.

Man who killed his polio-affected daughter dies

RATHLAWALPUR: The man who had allegedly killed his polio-affected daughter the other day before attempting suicide in Lodhran expired at the Bahawal Victoria Hospital (BVH) on Monday.

Muhammad Irfan had slit the throat of his 23-year-old daughter Misraat and 25-year-old son Khalid before attempting to kill himself with the same knife. He and his son were shifted to the emergency department of Bahawal Victoria Hospital (BVH) where he expired. Irfan was a resident of Ranti Larkana. Attaullah Abbasi on Shehbaz Road in district Lodhran.

According to the BVH doctors, Irfan's body was handed over to police after his postmortem while Khalid was still in critical condition. Lodhran City police, on the complaint of the deceased's second son Iqbal, had registered a murder case against Irfan.

Traders protest Rs6m robbery

GUJRAT: Scores of traders from the city's major mobile phone and accessories market staged a protest on Rawalpindi Road after Rs6 million were stolen from five shops by four robbers early on Monday morning.

The incidents occurred in the precincts of Kotri Attaullah, the president of the Mobile Phone Dealers Association, the traders gathered at the crime scene and staged a sit-in. They blocked the road to protest police inaction against robbers in Gujrat city.

The traders accused the police of delaying the registration of robbery cases and failing to curb the rising incidence of theft. Following assurances from the police to register a case, the protesters dispersed peacefully.

Police have since registered a case under section 392 of the Pakistan Penal Code against unidentified suspects and launched an investigation. — Correspondent

Dwindling literary culture of DG Khan in era of smartphones and fast food

DERA GHazi KHAN: The decline in literary spaces and loss of reading culture in Dera Ghazi Khan city has played a role in promoting tolerance behaviour of its people as is evident from day to day life.

The city once used to boast of at least four vibrant book centres where the readers could find literature or books on diverse topics beyond the textbooks. These centres played a vital role in fostering intellectual curiosity and shaping moderate and progressive attitudes among the residents.

Dilbaria Khatar, one of these bookshops, was founded by the late Razia Ahmed. It stood out as a bastion of literary culture. Ahmed was not only a pioneer in publishing Sindhi poetry by the local poets but was also a bold advocate of freedom of thought. His book centre played an active role in nurturing the culture of critical thinking during Gen Zia's oppressive dictatorship when certain books were banned or were made

inaccessible.

The Paramount News Corner, originally run by a man known as Chacha Ramman, is now being managed by his son Shaukat Ahmed. It offered a range of books alongside newspapers. Other notable names included Allah Rakha's Book Centre and Nasir Book Centre. The latter aimed at serving the community but couldn't survive the growing lure of social media and digital distractions.

In addition to these book centres, the city was home to several libraries that were integral to an intellectual life. The Public Library of Company Bagh and the National Centre Library offered readers a world of books. The Postgraduate College Library, now a part of Ghazi University, mandated student membership. Small private libraries also flourished, offering books on art and meeting the literary needs of many.

However, with the advent of cell phones and the rise of social media, these literary spaces have dried up. Shaukat Ahmed, the owner of Paramount News Corner,

attributes the trend to the increasing use of smartphones.

"New technology and smartphones have significantly reduced public interest in books, periodicals and digests. Circulation of daily newspapers is also decreasing steadily. Youngsters now form a minor category among book buyers, whereas his father used to tell him that in the 1970s and 1980s, people from all walks of life irrespective gender used to visit the book stall to buy books, periodicals and digests of their own choice," he says while responding to a query about the decline in the sale of books other than textbooks.

At present, Maktaba Tasveer-e-Islam in Block B, Maktaba Zakaria in Block 10 and book centres established in front of Imambargah Mirza as well as adjacent to it are fulfilling the reading requirements of the readers but at a limited scale.

The proprietor of Maktaba Zakaria points out higher prices of books as another reason for the decline in reading, explaining that the rising cost of paper has made books unaffordable for working classes.

He also blames the internet for contributing to the reduced sales of books.

Kabir Jiwani, a teacher of English literature at the Govt Graduate College, argues that cost is not the only reason.

"Youngsters are also becoming more interested in the disappearance of book centres in the city while the mushroom growth of fast-food outlets and eateries has reached alarming levels. He notes that the trend reflects more spending by people on food and individualistic habits, adversely affecting both their physical and mental well-being."

Today, the once-thriving Public Library of Company Bagh stands neglected, its shelves are gathering dust. The National Centre Library has closed its doors and the library of the Postgraduate College has been absorbed into Ghazi University, losing its independent identity. Private libraries that once rented out books have vanished, leaving no alternative for the book lovers.

The Qayyimkhan has attempted to fill the gap with a small library, but its space and resources are insufficient. An e-library established at the stadium also failed to attract readers, reflecting the lack of interest of the citizens in physical and digital literary spaces.

Mudhairs were a regular feature of the city. There were literary bazaars organised by poets and writers that used to hold functions regularly to maintain and improve the aesthetic sense of the dwellers of the city.

At present, DGK Arts Council head Nasir Tufail is trying to fill a large gap created by the decline of literary activities but the decline of these centres and libraries mark a significant loss for our city.

Once a community that cherished literature and intellectual growth, the residents of Dera Ghazi Khan are now left with limited options to nurture the minds of future generations. The need for revitalising public libraries and more vibrant literary spaces now is more urgent than ever as they remain essential for fostering critical thinking and preserving cultural heritage.

'Woman poisons husband to death to conceal affairs'

Pakistan earns \$20m from kinnow exports

SARGODHA: Pakistan earned \$20 million in foreign exchange from kinnow exports last month, according to Chaudhry Shaukat Ahmed Naizi, director of the Pakistan Horticultural Development and Export Board, Ministry of Commerce.

Speaking about the production of Sargodha's renowned sweetkin kinnow, he said over 2,800 containers were exported globally in December. Of these, 1,350 were shipped by sea, with the UAE receiving 450 containers, Indonesia 283, Oman 151, Sri Lanka 150, and the Philippines 97. Additionally, 1,374 containers were transported by road to destinations including Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan, Iraq, and



Afghanistan. Naizi said there was a 40% decline in kinnow production due to climate changes. He called for the introduction of new plant varieties. He said that the introduction of improved kinnow varieties has extended the crop's availability to eight to nine months.

BAN LIFTED: The Malaysian government has lifted its ban on laboratory testing of Sargodha's sweetkin kinnow, paving the way for increased exports.

The restriction, imposed in November 2024, had disrupted exports, with shipments halted at Malaysian ports. Sargodha Chamber of Commerce President Khurja Yasir Qayyum said the ban was lifted with Malaysia's High Commission and Federal Minister for Commerce Basma Kamal Khan.

The Food Safety Quality Programme Division of Malaysia's Ministry of Health later rescinded the inspection requirement. Mr Qayyum thanked Trade Investment Commissioner Talib Javed for his pivotal role in resolving the matter.

ANTI-ENCROACHMENT DRIVE: The Sargodha

Municipal Corporation has ramped up its anti-encroachment campaign, demolishing illegal structures, sealing 35 plots, and confiscating goods from encroachers across the city.

Under the supervision of acting chief officer Usman Farooq, teams targeted various markets and announced that the operation would continue daily.

On the occasion, the authorities said that strict actions will be taken on complaints of encroachment on footpaths and collecting monthly extortion by placing carts and stalls in front of shops.

Mr Farooq said that operation cleanup would continue on a daily basis to clear the city of encroachments. He urged citizens to cooperate with the authorities and remove encroachments on their own or legal action will be taken.

PA again passes Overseas Commission Bill returned by governor

Minister insists legislation will help address expats' complaints against depts.

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly on Monday passed the KP Overseas Commission Bill, 2025, for the second time after Governor Fazlur Rehman Khan returned it, insisting the matters related to overseas Pakistanis fall within the jurisdiction of the federal government.

On Dec. 3, 2024, the KP Assembly unanimously passed the bill to establish a commission to address complaints of overseas Pakistanis from the previous national government agencies.

The bill, moved by law minister Afzal Khan, said that the commission would "receive and redress the grievances of overseas relating to government agencies, other complaints and suggestions of such overseas to offices concerned and for matter connected therewith or ancillary thereto."

It added that the commission would consist of the chief minister as its chairman and the inter-provincial coordination minister, special assistant to the CM, or adviser to the CM as vice-chairman.

"After enactment, the law will be applicable on any person of Pakistani origin and domicile holder of KP who is either

permanently or temporarily settled outside Pakistan for employment, or for carrying on a business or vacation, or for any other purpose with intention to stay outside Pakistan for an unspecified period."

The assembly again passed the bill when Speaker Baloch Suleiman Shahi, who was in the chair, read a letter from the governor for "reconsideration of the KP Overseas Commission Bill, 2024."

In the letter, the governor noted that welfare and grievances of overseas Pakistanis fell in the Federal Legislative List and that the bill would conflict with the constitutional principles of consociated field as the subject of immigration was already legislated and administered by the federal government, while the provincial governments did not possess the constitutional authority to legislate on matters included in the federal legislative list such as immigration.

The proposed establishment of provincial commission will create a jurisdictional overlap potentially leading to legal challenges and it would also interfere with the Immigration Ordinance 1973 which explicitly places the regulation of immigration under the purview of the federal government. The attempt to create such a commission not only undermines federal jurisdiction but also risks infringing upon the Constitutional mandated separation of powers between federal and provincial authorities regarding immigration related matters," governor's read the letter.

Law minister Afzal Khan Afridi told the house that the law department had already shared its opinion on the bill, whose approval would lead to the resolution of all

complaints of overseas Pakistanis against provincial government departments.

He said the law department answered everything about the bill and that the Punjab Assembly passed the Overseas Commission Act in 2014.

"We respect this [act of the governor]," he said, adding that around 50 per cent of remittances sent by overseas Pakistanis come from people belonging to KP.

In its formal opinion, the law department insisted that the governor had rightly pointed out that the subject fell within ambit of the federal legislative list of the Constitution but the scheme provided under the bill was required to be looked into in-depth for the reason that matter mentioned therein provide for redressal of the grievances of overseas Pakistan relating to government agencies—the agencies of the KP government—a matter purely falling within the legislative competence of KP.

Member of the opposition PPP Ahmad Karim Khan said bills were always sent to the governor for approval.

He said such letters should be shared with lawmakers as well for consideration and discussion.

"The Constitution says that in case of any inconsistency in the federal or provincial laws—the federal law will prevail," he said.

The lawmaker said such matters should not be handled in a hurry.

The speaker observed that the law department's reply was clear that the Overseas Pakistan Commission would deal with matters about provincial gov-

ernment departments.

The house later re-examined the KP Overseas Pakistanis Commission Bill, 2025, before passing it by a majority vote.

Also, the speaker pointed out that the assembly was given the status of a committee to hold talks with the Pakistan Quami Jirga over Pakistanis issues.

He said the committee did a great job by addressing the situation following an attack on a Pashayi Talibani Movement camp in Khyber tribal district.

Mr Satti said that during the talks with the committee had decided that it would submit a list of 63 others along with its demands for discussion.

"It was decided that the committee will hold deliberations on the PQJ's demands. The recommendations will be forwarded to the provincial or federal government," he said.

The speaker announced that the committee would meet at the assembly at 2pm today (Tuesday) with Mr Gondaripar in chair.

During the session, MPAs Asif Khan Mehmood pointed out that a list of landmine victims from South Waziristan tribal district was shared with the house, but those residents had yet to be compensated. He said that amounting hadn't been paid on the matter for the last six months.

The chair assured the lawmaker of a speedy process of compensating payment.

Over 100,000 children remain unvaccinated in last polio drive

Peshawar records highest number of refusal cases, says report

PESHAWAR: The reluctance of parents to polio vaccination continues to haunt the future of their nations in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa as 111,118 children remained unvaccinated in the December campaign up from 95,814 in October-November drive.

According to data compiled by officials of Emergency Operation Centre (EOPC) Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, during the five-day campaign carried out from mid-December 2024, vaccinators covered 6.38 million targeted children in 30 districts and the December drive was conducted in 35 districts but indicators with regard to unvaccinated children remained similar.

Peshawar, the epicentre of refusals, lost the tally of unvaccinated persons with 13,072 missed and 8,229 refused cases in December drive, which also showed that no refusal was recorded in Shangla, Malakand, Dir Upper, Chitral, Lower and Upper, Buner, Kohistan, Upper and Lower, Kalorai Palas and Waziristan Upper.

The number of unvaccinated persons in Battagram, Dir Lower and Buner remained two each in Haro, Abbottabad and Torkhar three each, in Okara four, in Swat eight, and in

refusals of their parents.

In the December anti-polio campaign from Oct 28 to Nov 3, vaccinators missed 1.5 per cent of the targeted children in the provinces due to refusal of their parents or their unavailability at home.

Of the total of 6.38 million targeted children in 30 districts, 78,325 missed polio vaccine due to their absence from home during the anti-polio team's visit while 17,479 didn't receive the vaccine due to refusal or reluctance of their parents. Both the numbers of missed children and refusals have gone up since then.

The October-November campaign was carried out in 30 districts and the December drive was conducted in 35 districts but indicators with regard to unvaccinated children remained similar.

Peshawar, the epicentre of refusals, lost the tally of unvaccinated persons with 13,072 missed and 8,229 refused cases in December drive, which also showed that no refusal was recorded in Shangla, Malakand, Dir Upper, Chitral, Lower and Upper, Buner, Kohistan, Upper and Lower, Kalorai Palas and Waziristan Upper.

The number of unvaccinated persons in Battagram, Dir Lower and Buner remained two each in Haro, Abbottabad and Torkhar three each, in Okara four, in Swat eight, and in

Mohamed 27. The number is negligible, according to the report.

After Peshawar, Buner recorded 4,103 refused cases, Lakki Marwat 1,629, Mardan 1,048, Dera Ismail Khan 998, Kohat 944, Shabot 877, Charsadda 562, Nowshera 420, Karak 397, Khyber 285, Tank 151 and South Waziristan 145. However, all districts reported more missed children.

Sources told this writer that both missed and refused cases were just a fraction of the whole targeted children but as per international protocol each and every child should be given two drops of vaccine in each campaign till five years.

They said that authorities were concerned about the main districts like Peshawar, Mardan, Charadda, Buner and Dera Ismail Khan where the vaccination is circulation and could be tackled only through vaccination of the whole eligible population.

Escaping vaccination through direct refusal and pretending to vaccinations that children were not available were almost same as both remained unvaccinated and exposed to being infected with polio virus, they added.

Pakistan diagnosed 68 polio cases in 2024 including 20 in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and 27 in Balochistan and in Sindh.

Islamabad and Punjab recorded one infection each. Experts believe that the current year will be no exception as cases will continue to emerge.

They say that polio vaccination has become a vicious cycle as vaccinations continue to perform poorly in difficult circumstances because in every campaign alleged terrorists attacked them and police personnel guarding them.

In 2024, armed motorcycle-killed 20 people and injured 53 while two others were kidnapped. The dead included 16 policemen, three polio workers and one civilian. Since 2012, 155 people, mostly police personnel, have been killed during polio vaccination campaigns. Frightened by terrorism, onslaught against polio teams, vaccinators don't have the courage to force reluctant parents for vaccination and try to locate missed children.

Sources said that the responsibility to trace missed and refusing families rested with district administrations and police, who were evolving directives from chief secretary prior to every drive to ensure immunization of all children.

They said that under the directives committed to fall on short sword and every campaign avoided a replay of the previous one.

Govt asked to promote digital education in merged areas

BAJAU: Award National Party (MNA) Nasir Khan on Monday emphasized the need for promoting digital education across the tribal districts to equip the local youth with modern skills.

Addressing the inaugural ceremony of a newly established private digital academy in the Khan-Buner area, he highlighted the need for young people to excel in technology skills to qualify.

The ANP MNA played the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf provincial government for not taking steps for promotion of digital education in the province.

The lawmaker noted that computer lab in most of the educational institutions in the tribal districts were non-functional because of lack of computer systems and absence of electric supply.

He said the provincial government should make the computer labs in the educational institutions functional. He also asked for establishing skills training centres across the tribal districts to empower youth locally. The MNA pledged to raise the issue on the floor of the provincial assembly.

Other speakers, including IT experts, described the promotion of modern technology critical for the empowerment of youth.

They welcomed the establishment of the private information technology institution and asked the well-off people to invest in such initiatives to equip youth with modern digital skills. — Correspondent

Employees blast govt over pension cuts

SWAHI: Government employees on Sunday regretted that while parliamentarians had been regularly increasing their perks and privileges, their pensions were first curtailed and were now going to be done away with altogether.

Speaking to Dawn on condition anonymity, employees working in various departments deplored that the ruling elite had pushed the country into economic turmoil, devouring all vital of the state during the last 75 years.

Teachers of different cadres said that the federal ministry of finance had applied different cuts to pensions. They said the government had abolished multi-employment and it was declared that instead of last basic pay now the pension would be calculated on the average salary drawn over the last two years of service.

"With the drastic cuts in pension, the little chance left in the public sector jobs has vanished," said an English teacher, who is retiring in June. "More and more youth looking for greener pastures because they have no hope of finding a decent job in Pakistan. In recent years the brain drain has accelerated," he noted.

A senior official of the health department said that the pension benefits were curtailed under a well-planned strategy.

Amjad Khan, provincial general secretary of Marday Umaran, a teachers' wing of Awami National Party, said that the government's decision on pension had alienated the employees. He said employees across the country were expected to start a protest campaign soon.

"A meeting of public sector employees has been convened in Peshawar next week to chart a future course of action," he said.

CDA takes charge of Diplomatic Shuttle Service

10 e-buses allocated by civic body to charge Rs1,000 for each trip

ISLAMABAD: The role of private contractors became a topic of the day on Monday after the Capital Development Authority (CDA) took control of a shuttle service for citizens visiting the diplomatic enclave for their visa applications.

Ten electric buses have been deployed for this service as CDA Chairman Muhammad Ali Ramzan directed the CDA's engineering and design wings to provide the best facilities to visa applicants and upgrade facilities.

The service commenced with 10 buses and Rs1,000 will be charged for a trip. Several officials appreciated the CDA's move to end the role of the contractor and endorsed this service to stop the exploi-

tation of citizens. "The fare should be decreased from Rs1,000, as instead of focusing on revenue generation, the CDA/MCI should focus on providing services to citizens," said an official.

It is relevant to note that private contractors, who were allowed to get Rs250 to Rs1,000 per trip, had been overcharging the passengers besides running an illegal car service, sometimes costing up to Rs20,000 per trip. Last year, a European diplomat had also informed the then CDA chairman about the overcharging issue faced by visitors to embassy.

Following the complaint, the then chairman of the CDA, Arshad Iqbal, chaired a meeting and expremised DMA officials, prompting them to issue a warning letter to the contractor on September 25.

to award a new contract, but at the eleventh hour, the tender was deferred and one of the DMA officials was also suspended.
