



Tempers flare during year's first sitting of parliament

ISLAMABAD: Even though talks between the PTI and government to bring down political temperatures are not in their third round, there was no let-up in the acrimony between opposition and government lawmakers in the lower house of parliament on Monday.

As the National Assembly met for the first time this calendar year, the session was marred by

ISLAMABAD: A third round of the talks between the government and the PTI will commence at Parliament House on Jan 16, when the opposition party is expected to share its demands with the government in written form.

The in-camera meeting, to be held at 11:30am, will be chaired by National Speaker Ayaz Sadiq, who is the head of the negotiations committee.

rising protests by PTI lawmakers soon after Opposition Leader Omar Ayub finished speaking.

At the outset of proceedings, Mr Ayub demanded an independent inquiry commission on the alleged psychological and physical torture of civilians during their trials by military courts. It may be noted that last month, scores of PTI supporters were convicted by military courts for their involvement in the May 9 violence.

Mr Ayub also chided government functionaries for their comments on the possible outcome of the Al-Qadir Trust case and claimed that following a deal between the United Kingdom's National Crime Agency (NCA) and a private businessman, the money landed in the Supreme Court's account before being transferred to the national treasury. "What have Imran Khan and Bushra Bibi got to do with it?" he questioned.

The PTI also raised alarm over the alleged 'disappearance' of its activists on Nov 26 and sought their immediate recovery.

Soon after he wrapped up his speech, opposition lawmakers instigated bedlam. The decision to lodge such a protest had been taken at a joint parliamentary party meeting of PTI lawmakers and MNAs, held earlier, and the environment remained tense throughout house

Politicos stress need for security talks with Kabul

- COAS meets party leaders and representatives in Peshawar, receives briefing on counter-terror ops
- No major operation in KP but IBOs will continue, military tells political leadership

PESHAWAR: The country's political leadership has asked the military brass to engage with Afghanistan to address Pakistan's internal security problems.

In an almost four-hour long meeting with Chief of Army Staff General Syed Asim Munir on Monday, representatives of several political parties expressed their concerns over the prevailing law and order situation in the province.

Sources privy to the meeting said the political leadership wanted full implementation of the National Action Plan (NAP), while also suggesting a review of the plan to make certain changes, if required.

Speaking to Dawn, sources privy to the meeting — which was attended by representa-

tives of JUI-F, PPP, PML-N, JI, QWP as well — disclosed that everyone "suggested engagement with the interim Afghan government — formal or informal".

They explained that all participants were of the opinion that cooperation between the neighbouring countries could facilitate bringing peace to the region.

However, the army chief pointed out that the Afghan interim rulers had failed to adhere to repeated warnings in the past.

"They don't listen to us," sources quoted the army chief as telling those calling for formal or informal dialogue with the interim Afghan government. The political leaders then suggested the military leadership use "other ways for engagement" with Afghan interim government to resolve issues.

The military leadership

made it clear that no new military operation was being carried out and they must take ownership of the situation in KP, though "intelligence-based operations, will be intensified," sources said. They said the military also asked political parties for feedback.

Sources said several other matters, including the capacity building of the provincial police force, were taken up during the meeting.

In an official statement, ISPR confirmed that the COAS interacted with KP politicians belonging to different political parties, adding that the participants agreed on the need for one political voice and public support against the scourge of militancy.

The political representatives shared vivid clarity on

27 terrorists killed in Kachhi area shoot-out, says ISPR

QUETTA: Security forces have killed 27 terrorists in an intelligence-based operation in the Kachhi area of Balochistan, military's media wing said on Monday.

In a statement, Information Services Public Relations (ISPR) said that security forces carried out the operation on the intelligence reports about the presence of armed terrorists in the area. It said the security forces steadily cordoned off the area, effectively engaged the terrorists' location and 27 terrorists were killed in an intense exchange of fire.

The ISPR further claimed that multiple hideouts, including caches of arms, ammunition and explosives, were also destroyed during the operation.

"The killed terrorists were involved in numerous terrorist activities against the security forces as well as innocent civilians and were highly wanted by the law enforcement agencies," the military's media wing said, adding that security forces of Pakistan with the support of the nation remain determined to thwart attempts at subverting peace, stability and progress of Balochistan.

The security forces conducted an operation in Kachhi district in the

FO condemns 'Islamophobic' narratives targeting UK Pakistanis

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's Foreign Office on Monday condemned "racist and Islamophobic" narratives in the United Kingdom that target the British-Pakistani community over a growing scandal, warning against maligning an entire diaspora for the crimes of a few.

"To demonise such a large and diverse community on the basis of the actions of a few individuals needs to be condemned," the FO said in a statement, adding that such commentary contravenes decades of cooperation and goodwill between the two countries.

The remarks follow renewed political and media scrutiny of past grooming scandals in northern England, involving predominantly Pakistani men accused of exploiting vulnerable girls. The issue resurfaced after fallacious Khan Masud, who also came misreporting, sir X, accused British Prime Minister Keir Starmer of inaction during his tenure as director of public prosecutions (2008-13).

The scandal first came

No closure yet in £190 million case against Imran

- Decision postponed for third time due to absence of accused, lawyers
- PTI counsel blames 'lack of coordination' between judge & court staff
- Gehar dismisses speculation, says postponement has nothing to do with ongoing talks

ISLAMABAD: The verdict in the £190 million corruption case against former prime minister Imran Khan and his spouse Bushra Bibi was deferred for the third time after the accused failed to appear in the courtroom, purportedly due to the lack of coordination between the presiding judge and his staff.

The proceedings in the case, which revolves around the

Al-Qadir Trust, being heard by Judge Nasir Javed Raza, closed on Dec 18 and the verdict was initially scheduled to be pronounced on Dec 23.

However, it was postponed till Jan 6 and the judgement was again deferred till Jan 13 since the judge was not available on that date. As the court

convened in Adiala Jail on Monday, the verdict could not be pronounced due to the absence of the accused and their legal team. It is expected to be announced on Jan 17.

On Thursday, Judge Raza said the verdict was completely ready and had its signature, but the accused and their lawyers did not appear in the court. The court had been in session since 8:00am, awaiting the attendance of the accused and their lawyers, but they were not present. The judge noted that prior

reminders and messages had been sent to ensure their presence. He said that Bushra Bibi, who is on bail, did not appear even though she knew the date of the verdict. The judge acknowledged that on January 6, the verdict was deferred because he was unavailable due to official training.

The court stressed that ample opportunities had been provided to the accused throughout the trial to present their defence. Judge Raza, showing leniency, stated, "They should

be given another opportunity", as he postponed the verdict.

However, Khudai Yousaf Chaudhry, a member of ex-PM Imran Khan's legal team, claimed that the judge arrived earlier than the time fixed for the verdict with mutual consent. He said that he spoke with a senior staff member of the court at 9pm on Sunday and informed him that Bushra Bibi was in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and could reach

Five of family die as container loaded on trailer falls on car

BAHAWALPUR: Five persons, including women and children, of a family died and three others suffered serious injuries when a container loaded on a trailer fell on a parked car they were occupying at Musafikhana Adda, about 30kms from here late on Sunday night.

According to Police, 1122 officials, the trailer first hit the car (No BHM-3534) parked in front of a shop, after which a container loaded on the vehicle fell on it.

As a result, five persons, identified as Shahzia (40), Sumayyah Qasim (28), Hafsa (24), Hamna (9) and Zain (8), died. In the incident, three others — Asif (34), Ayesha (30) and Huzefa (12), were seriously injured.

Down has learnt that the deceased and injured persons were residents of nearby Foz Colony, Musafikhana. The bodies and the injured persons were relieved after cutting the badly damaged frame of the car by the rescuers and Musafikhana police personnel, reaching the spot on being informed of the incident.

The injured persons were shifted to the Bahawal Victoria Hospital (BVH), where bodies of the deceased were also transported. Police official reached the scene to take the legal action against the trailer's driver.

The funeral prayers for the deceased, attended by a large number of people, were later offered in a cotton factory, after which they were buried in a local graveyard.

Katcha gangsters kill four in Khanpur revenge attack

RAHIM YAR KHAN: A gang of Katcha area attacked the house of relatives of an alleged police informer and killed four of his relatives, including three brothers, at Basti Chaudhri Lashari of village Jagja Abadian in the Zahirpur town of Bahawal Khanpur at night.

On the other hand, police claimed that two attackers were killed when they were trying to escape towards the Katcha area.

According to the police sources, the dacots of Indhar Gang attacked the house of Irfan, an uncle of the late Usman Chaudhri, at around 10pm.

Immediately after their arrival, the dacots killed Irfan's three sons, Muhammad Arabi (15), Muhammad Makki (15), Muhammad Madri (10), and a relative Muhammad Zaman (38).

In a video message Irfan said he had informed police about the attack of the dacots but police did not reach even after half an hour of the attack. He said the police had just used his nephew Usman Chaudhri who was killed in the confrontation with the dacots in 2023. He further said that it was the duty of police to provide them with security because police were already providing security and meals to the family of Usman Chaudhri. He said his whole family was murdered and now even the

inspector general police or DDC could not help him. Irfan said that the dacots took revenge of the killings of Jams Indhar and his accomplices.

According to some locals, the area of Jagja Abadian witnessed the sound of shots fired by the dacots and there was panic among the villagers. The police did not respond to call at 12 when the district police officer and Station House Officer Zahirpur were a few kilometers away from the scene. In a WhatsApp message, a police spokesperson claimed that after the killing of four innocent citizens, police failed the attempt of the attackers to escape. After the attack of dacots, they were being chased and the heavy firing

started in which two dacots were killed. He claimed that they belonged to the Indhar, Shar and Kotha gangs; however, he did not disclose the name of the deceased suspects.

Jams Indhar, the ring leader of Indhar Gang, and his three accomplices, Munshi Indhar, Sonar Shar and Kana Shar, were killed in an encounter in July 2023 while two dacots were injured. The encounter happened in the Katcha area of Kachhore and Karahdast. According to the sources, after the killing of Jams Indhar, Jams Indhar and Tanvir Indhar were leading the gang and it is suspected that they were behind the attack on Irfan's house and killing of his three sons and a relative.

Separate lanes project for bikers launched

LAHORE: The pilot project to allocate dedicated lanes for cyclists and motorcyclists on Ferozpur Road was formally launched to ensure smooth and unobstructed traffic flow, reduce accidents and for safety of the commuters.

The pilot project will lead to similar interventions on other major roads in Punjab capital, according to the Lahore Development Authority (LDA) officials.

"Under the pilot project, Ferozpur Road will soon have dedicated lanes, covered with low-height concrete walls on both sides, for the cyclists and motorcyclists, as the work has been launched by the team of LDA's urban development wing," an official source in the authority told Dawn on Monday.

According to him, the pilot project consists of four-kilometer-long lanes on both sides of the road from Kalma Chowk to Lahore Bridge (Qasimb). And upon success of this pilot activity, a regular project is likely to be launched on other major roads in the city, including Jail Road, The Mall, Mohan Road, Wazir Road and Canal Road.

LDA Director General Tahir Farooq also paid a visit to the pilot project site and inspected the ongoing work there. On this occasion, LDA Chief Engineer Asrar Saeed and the Project Director Haroon Saeed briefed the DGI on the development works.

"These lanes will be separated from the main road by using concrete stones and eco-friendly blue paint. In the first phase, a four-kilometer-long lane is being built on both sides from Kalma Chowk to Lahore Bridge," said Mr Saeed while briefing the DGI. He said the bikers' lane would be 12 feet wide and ease the commute for the people.

May 9 riots cases High court sets aside objections to Imran's seven pleas

LAHORE: A Lahore High Court two-judge bench on Monday overruled the registrar office's objections to seven bail petitions of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) incorporated founding chairman Imran Khan in as many cases of May 9 riots, including an attack on the Lahore corps commander's residence.

The objection on eighth petition regarding the missing certified copy of the bail case judgment, instructing the counsel to attach it with the application.

An anti-terrorism court had on Nov 27 denied bail to the former prime minister in these eight cases. The petitions mainly argued that the prosecution failed to establish the petitioner's association with the unfortunate occurrences narrated in the FIRs.

They said the petitioner has been implicated in the May 9 cases as a result of a well-orchestrated plan, merely to harass and humiliate him for political reasons, even though admittedly he was in the custody of the National Accountability Bureau (NAB).

The arrest of the petitioner was never required in the cases, which was evident from the fact that police remained reluctant to secure his arrest during the period of five months and 12 days after the dismissal of his previous bail by the trial court.

The petitions alleged that the indifferent behaviour of police and lack of effort in securing the arrest of the petitioner at a time when he was detained in Adiala Jail, negated the argument that arrest of the petitioner was not required in the cases.

The sole allegation against the petitioner in the cases is of 'shameless', which has been supplemented by the prosecution most vaguely, the pleas added.

They argued that the trial judge overlooked the fact that frivolous and baseless allegations related to the May 9 events have already been rejected due to inconsistencies in the story of the investigating agency.

The petitions asked the court to set aside the trial court's decision and grant bail to the former prime minister in the eight FIRs.

ANTHRAPIC LAW: Lahore High Court Chief Justice Ahsan Nadeem on Monday issued a notice to the attorney general for Pakistan to assist on a matter related to implementation of the Anti-Rape Act 2021.

The chief justice was heading a full bench seized with a bail petition of a rape suspect, Waqar Ali.

Justice Farooq Haidar and Justice Ali Zia Rajwa were the other members at the bench.

The chief justice expressed concern that failure to enforce the anti-rape law could lead to the acquittal of accused persons in rape cases. She remarked that

number of rape cases had surpassed murder cases. She emphasised that the lack of enforcement of the Anti-Rape Act 2021 is resulting in the acquittal of accused individuals.

Prosecutor General of Punjab Syed Farhad Ali Shah informed the bench that the rules under the anti-rape law were being implemented. He said under Section 7 of the Act, special prosecutors had been appointed and a separate cell had been established to monitor rape cases on a daily basis.

The bench summoned the provincial secretary for prosecution to appear in person in the next hearing. It also gave relevant instructions a final chance to submit their reports. The bench sought reports on the trial proceedings involving minor victims in rape cases.

The bench directed the prosecutor general and the advocate general of Punjab to submit reports on meetings and progress regarding the implementation of the anti-rape act.

The bench adjourned the proceedings till submission of the reports by the authorities concerned.

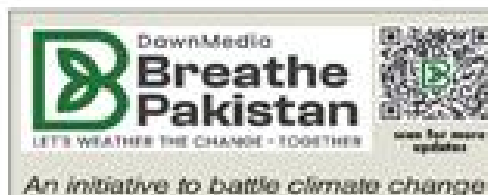

SC asks if army law covers constitutional violation penalties

Judges question whether evidence presented before military courts fulfils Qanoon-i-Shahadat requirements

ISLAMABAD: Justice Mansoor Hali, a member of the Constitutional Bench hearing the case of military trial of civilians, has wondered whether the Pakistan Army Act (PAA) 1952 outlined any punishment for officers who suspend the Constitution.

Justice Hali was part of the seven-judge bench hearing intra-court appeals (ICAs) against the Supreme Court's October 2023 order of nullifying the military trial of civilians involved in the May 9 violence.

She also posed questions about Article 6 of the Constitution, which deals with high treason.

If the provision was applicable to every citizen, then how are certain fundamental rights, also enshrined in the Constitution, not applicable to the armed forces (AF) under the PAA, observed Justice Hali.

In response to the queries, Khawaja Hameed, representing the Defence Ministry, contended that Article 6 prevails over all laws.

On this, Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhail wondered what punishment was outlined in Article 6 for aiding constitutional violations.

He remarked that even the judiciary has endorsed or validated the abrogation or suspension of the Constitution in the past.

Justice Muhammad Ali Maqsood recalled how during the treason trial of Gen Pervez Musharraf, the names of certain judges were taken, but they were never tried.

Legality of military trials

When Mr Hameed laid out the PAA provisions that outline the process to set up courts for trying civilians, Justice Mandokhail remarked that there was no dispute over these courts.

The only point of concern was the extent to which the act could include civilians in its domain, he observed.

The counsel highlighted past Supreme Court decisions that empower the higher judiciary to review military court verdicts if legal requirements were not met.

Another bench member, Justice Syed Hasan Ashraf Rizvi, remarked that without examining the military court's

judgments, how will the court know whether the requirements of Qanoon-i-Shahadat act have been adhered to or violated?

He also asked if the court could see the record of these cases.

"We want to see what was the standard of evidence recorded in the military trial, was the cross-examination of the witnesses was conducted, was the right to present defence witnesses were allowed, whether the right to be represented through a counsel of choice was given and whether the witness recorded was reflected in the judgment by the military court or not," asked Justice Rizvi.

The counsel agreed to put case records before the court and the procedure followed in the trial without revealing the convict's identity.

The apex court should not address the merits of the cases and the trials should not be affected by the proceedings of this case, the counsel said.

Justice Anwarul Hq Khan, who is heading the bench, asked the counsel to keep the record safe.

The court will ask for it if need be since there will be appeals against the trials.

Justice Maqsood said it was necessary to see the record to ascertain whether a fair trial was ensured and requirements of the Criminal Procedure Code were fulfilled.

He added that it was also necessary to determine whether a joint trial of all accused took place to ensure that the prohibition of double jeopardy in the trial was ensured.

The prohibition of double jeopardy is a legal principle that prevents an accused from being tried or charged again for the same crime if they have already been tried and found not guilty.

The counsel, Mr Hameed, stated that the trials were conducted separately and argued that the Supreme Court "cannot see" the quality of evidence in military trials.

The counsel said before reviewing the quality of evidence, the Supreme Court has to consider the jurisdiction of the present appeals.

Justice Hali said the court will not discuss the cases but can examine the record.

When Justice Mandokhail observed that he was confused as to how an ordinary citizen was convicted to the discipline of the armed forces, the counsel replied that if the citizen was accused of seducing an army officer, the provision of law dealing with maintaining discipline in the armed forces apply to them.

Demolition of bunkers kicks off in Kurram

Parachinar residents hold shutter-down strike over prolonged roadblocks

KURRAM: Following a peace agreement between the warring sides in Kurram district, security forces and the district administration began demolishing bunkers in Lower Kurram using explosives, while the residents of Parachinar observed a shutter-down strike on Monday to protest the prolonged closure of roads.

Kurram Deputy Commissioner Asif Khan said that efforts were underway to demolish all bunkers in the region, adding that according to the 14-point Kohat peace agreement, all bunkers in the district would be demolished by February 1.

In Lower Kurram, two bunkers have already been demolished — one each in Khar Kili and Balish Khel. Gunship helicopters continued to fly over the area as security

forces and the district administration arrived in Lower Kurram early Monday morning to carry out the demolition operation.

Tribal leader Jaleel Bangash emphasised the importance of all parties implementing the peace agreement, urging the government to prioritise the first point of the agreement and take necessary measures to open and secure routes.

Haji Saleem Khan, another tribal leader, said that sustainable peace is in the best interest of all parties, and that the public should cooperate with the elders and government to achieve this goal.

The people of Parachinar, the headquarters of Kurram district, have been stranded for the last three months due to roadblocks and are demanding the immediate reopening and securing of the routes. The shortage of essential supplies had the residents to carry out the shutter-down strike.

Leaders of the Kurram District Drug Association said medicine shops had run out of stock due to the roadblock. At a joint press conference in Parachinar, Pakistan Drug Association Parachinar pro-

blem Haji Syed Hameed, chairman Momen Hussain and Syed Hakeem Hussain expressed concerns that the prolonged road closure had emptied their medical stores.

They said children and other patients had died due to a lack of treatment, with the death toll surpassing 100. They highlighted the distressing situation, explaining that patients were repeatedly turned away without treatment, leading them to shut down their medical stores.

Speaking at a joint press conference at the DDO hospital in Parachinar, Young Doctors Association leaders Dr Zulfikar Ali, Dr Sajjad, Dr Rafiq and others said that the lack of medicines and inability to transfer patients to Peshawar had caused immense suffering. Patients were dying in agony due to the closure of the routes, they said, adding that the situation was becoming increasingly unbearable.

MPA Ali Hashi Irfani called for the immediate opening of the routes, noting that thousands of people had been trapped in the area for over 100 days due to the blockade.

Gillani issues production order for PTI lawmaker

ISLAMABAD: Senate Chairman Yousaf Raza Gillani on Monday issued production order for PTI Senator Ejaz Chaudhry, who has been incarcerated for 18 months.

This is not the first production order issued for the senator, who is imprisoned at Lahore's Kot Lakhpat Jail. In March last year, Mr Chaudhry was due to be produced in the Senate, but was unable to attend the session.

In November, he was among 21 other PTI figures formally indicted by a Lahore Anti-Terrorism Court (ATC) in cases related to countryside riots on May 9, 2023, registered with the Rawat Court and Sarwar Road police stations.

Mr Chaudhry said that despite being a member of the Senate, he was not allowed to attend parliamentary sessions.

"No hardship has been able to break us and not will it. The state oppression will end," he added. The request to produce Mr Chaudhry was made by Opposition Leader in the Senate Shafiq Faraz.

"The Honourable Chairman Senate considers necessary the presence of Senator Ejaz Ahmad Chaudhry during the sittings of the 345th session of the Senate of Pakistan," the order read.

"The Honourable Chairman Senate has been pleased to summon Senator Ejaz Ahmad Chaudhry to attend the sittings of the said session at the Parliament House."

The order, addressed to the secretary of the interior minister among others, directed them to "produce Senator Ejaz Ahmad Chaudhry at the commencement of each sitting of the said session", stating that Chaudhry would be returned to their custody upon the end of the sitting.

Pakistan, Saudi Arabia sign Haj agreement 2025

Under the accord signed in Jeddah, 179,210 Pakistani pilgrims will perform Haj this year

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Religious Affairs and Interfaith Harmony Chaudhry Salik Hussain and Saudi Minister of Haj and Umrah Dr Tawfiq bin Fawzan al-Rabiah signed the annual Haj agreement 2025.

The agreement was signed in Jeddah, formally recognising that 179,210 Pakistani pilgrims will perform Haj this year.

The agreement includes

a commitment to provide the best possible facilities to Pakistani pilgrims, who will be offered special accommodation in Mina at reduced rates.

The Saudi Minister of Haj and Umrah, Dr Tawfiq bin Fawzan al-Rabiah, assured Mr Hussain to provide all possible support for better facilities for Pakistani pilgrims.

Stay in Medina

To make the Haj journey more accessible, easier, and comfortable, a short Haj programme of 20 to 25 days has been introduced. Pilgrims will have the option to choose their accommodation in Medina for a duration of four to eight days.

Each pilgrim will receive a specially designed bag containing the Pakistani flag, a QR code

for identification, and relevant information. A special mobile app will provide all information to the pilgrims on their mobile phones, enabling them to stay updated about their Haj group's information, training schedule, flight details, accommodations in Saudi Arabia, and live maps and locations of sites during Haj.

Mr Hussain will also participate in a four-day international Haj conference and expo in Jeddah organised by the Saudi Ministry of Haj, where additional agreements will be made with institutions and companies responsible for providing facilities to pilgrims.

The Haj quota is allocated by the Saudi Haj ministry based on the Muslim population in the relevant country.

PM Shehbaz orders expansion of faceless customs system to several cities

Calls for collaboration with private sector to boost investment in housing projects

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said on Monday that the faceless customs assessment system, which will be fully operational in Karachi next month, should be expanded and implemented in other cities without delay to ensure that imports across the country could benefit from this system.

The prime minister stated this while chairing a review meeting on the matters related to the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR).

It was attended by Minister for Economic Affairs Ahsan Khan Cheema, Minister for Law and Justice Asim Naeem Tarar, Minister of State for Finance and Revenue Ali Pervez Malik and other senior officials, the PM Office Media Wing said in a press release.

The prime minister observed that significant progress had been achieved in digitisation and reforms within the FBR in previous months, adding that for the first time in history, a system with faceless digitisation system had been introduced in the customs process. He directed the Ministry of Information

Technology and Telecommunication and FBR to work together to further improve the faceless customs assessment system.

He desired that the system should be shifted to artificial intelligence by minimising the human intervention.

He ordered the development of a comprehensive strategy for the implementation of the track and trace system in various industrial sectors.

The meeting was briefed on the recent FBR reforms. The faceless customs system at all Karachi port terminals would be made fully operational by the end of February this year, it was told. Besides, efforts are under way to ensure its operation nationwide soon. A central control room is being established to monitor the system, it was informed.

The meeting was apprised that body cameras and tablets would be used to make the inspection recording system more transparent.

Mobile signal jammers and CCTV cameras are also being installed at all terminals to enhance the transparency of the inspection system.

A transparent recruitment process for the new customs system had been initiated while a track and trace system had been implemented in all industrial units of the tobacco, fertilisers, sugar, and cement industries, the meeting was briefed.

The implementation of the track and trace system led to a significant increase in revenue from the tobacco, sugar, cement, and fer-

rous industries in the fiscal year 2023-24 compared to the previous corresponding year. The meeting was told that upgrade of the web-based One Customs began and its design was expected to be completed by the end of March.

Low-cost housing schemes

Chairing another meeting, PM Shehbaz ordered the completion of ongoing federal government's low-cost housing projects expeditiously, besides asking for collaboration with the private sector to boost investment in the housing projects. He also instructed ensuring a third-party validation of the projects.

The Ministry of Housing informed the prime minister about the progress on the ongoing reforms and policy measures in its various departments. It was informed that consultations with all the stakeholders for amendments to the National Housing Policy 2001 had been completed and the process for its final approval would be completed by March.

The meeting was also apprised of the ongoing and future projects under the Pakistan Housing Authority. It was told that work was progressing rapidly on 630 low-cost residential units in Kachhik, Quetta, and 4,112 units in Islamabad. Work on 5,728 low-cost residential units in Peshawar would begin soon while work on 5,600 residential units in Rawalpindi and Islamabad would kick-start in the near future.

'Jolted' by missing persons complaints, CJP wants to 'hear other side' too

Says cases of enforced disappearances are high courts' domain; announces financial aid plan for less privileged litigants

ISLAMABAD: Chief Justice of Pakistan (CJP) Yahya Atrifi has conceded that the widespread complaints of enforced disappearances "jolted" him but said he wants to "hear the other side" as well.

In an interaction with court reporters on Monday, the CJP said he received complaints about missing persons during his visits to different parts of the country.

"During my visits to Chitral (North), Gwadar (Balochistan) and Sadiqabad (Punjab) — members of Bars highlighted the serious issue of missing persons," the CJP said while speaking to a delegation of

the Press Association of the Supreme Court (PASC).

The CJP said the prevalence of these complaints "disturbed" him and was a "jolt" to him.

However, he told the bar members that he wouldn't respond to them immediately on the subject or give any decision unless he "heard the other side" too.

The CJP also said the issue of missing persons was the jurisdiction of high courts under Article 199 of the Constitution and that the Supreme Court would not interfere with the authority of subordinate judiciary.

Complaints against judges

Justice Atrifi conceded that a number of complaints against different judges were pending before the Supreme Judicial Council (SJC).

On a suggestion that people should know against which judge the complaint has been disposed of by the council to help

reclaim his respect, the CJP said he would respond to the proposal after sharing with the council.

"When asked about perceived animosity amongst SC judges, he said the court heard 'tough cases' during the last three or four years where judges 'took positions'."

However, he expressed optimism that the situation would improve. "After all, we judges are brothers. It's a fraternity."

"Give us six months. Let judges breathe. It will end bettering," CJP observed.

Financial aid programme

While sharing his vision to improve the justice system, the CJP talked about empowering the judges of district judiciary, especially those in the remotest areas, by acknowledging and recognising them.

"Being the Supreme Court chief justice, it is my responsibility to provide the civil judges opportunities."

"In the future, no superior [court] judge

will attend international seminars or conferences without taking along with them judges of the district judiciary too," the CJP said.

He vowed to send abroad the best judges from the farthest places.

The CJP also intended to provide monetary support to litigants in district courts who cannot pay for their cases.

He said the Law and Justice Commission of Pakistan (LJC) would soon finalise a project to provide litigants with a decent representation in district courts free of cost.

When asked whether the attempt will not coincide with the Law Ministry's programme of supporting different Bar Associations, CJP Atrifi said the law division may provide financial assistance, but the present programme was independent of it and targeted towards the district judiciary.

High courts and district courts will suggest cases to LJC that deserve free repre-

sentation, he said.

"We will take small incremental steps to ensure the justice system delivers."

The CJP said the Supreme Court had engaged the Federal Board of Revenue and Chartered Accountant Maqsood Farooqi to help categorise taxation cases and expedite their disposal.

The court was also trying to develop a mechanism to deal with urgent applications by constituting dedicated benches to deal with election matters, criminal cases, etc.

CJP Atrifi said every judge of the Supreme Court was independent and each disposes of cases in their own way.

The judges "should not be bracketed" rather criticised in a constructive manner.

The chief justice compared the court to the Titanic ship, saying it cannot be turned suddenly.

The delivery of justice can be improved by changing the direction of the top courts, he added.—Nasir Iqbal

Muslim world's VCs conference from Feb 4

Minister accuses PTI of running away from £190m scam case

Tanvir says verdict in case was supposed to be announced on Monday, but the accused failed to appear in court

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Information, Broadcasting, National Heritage and Culture Attaullah Tanvir on Monday said the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leadership was running away from the 190 million pound corruption case because they know that their hands were not clean and they were involved in the scam.

Addressing a press conference along with Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) senior leader Senator Talat

Chaudhry, he said there was no example in the history that billions of rupees were waived like this, as the black money was whitened through creation of a fraudulent trust.

He said the 190 million pounds case was a classic example of "robbing Peter to pay Paul".

The minister said the verdict in the 190 million pound case was supposed to be announced on Monday, but the accused failed to appear in court.

The minister said the PTI leadership had made a habit of not appearing in courts.

He said the PTI had also used delaying tactics for six years in the foreign funding case. Similarly, he said in the Toshakhana case, they also used delaying tactics and sought adjournments after adjournments.

"Sometimes the PTI leaders changed lawyers, sometimes they changed the

letters of attorney," the minister remarked. He said innocent people never change attorneys and lawyers but it has been the practice of the PTI to use delaying tactics in court cases.

He asked why the PTI needed to take a sealed envelope to the cabinet meeting and get its approval without opening it when it was in power.

He alleged that the then cabinet approved the £190m deal without knowing the facts in the sealed envelope brought by Shahidul Akbar. He said it was a mega corruption case in the history of Pakistan.

"It was not just a coincidence, it was a well-thought-out plan", he said.

The minister said the PTI chief also refused his house in Lahore from the mega corruption. Billions of rupees were collected from the person whose billions of rupees were written off by the federal cabinet, he said.

Replying to a question, the minister said the founder of PTI was in jail but why his spouse Bushra Bibi did not turn up in the court.

He said it was the discretion of the concerned judge to decide whether to announce the verdict in the presence of the accused or otherwise.

He said the PTI leadership was divided now and they did not see eye to eye on many matters.

Mr Tanvir remarked that the PTI had seen the needs of mistrust and hatred among the nation but it was itself reaping its harvest.

He said the judge could issue warrants for mandatory presence of an accused during the trial only.

To another question, he said Farha Qazi was wanted in many cases but she was a co-accused in this case, whereas the PTI founder was the main accused.

Energy crisis in Gilgit-Baltistan dominates Senate body meeting

Tourism boom in region hampered by climate, infrastructure challenges

GILGIT: A parliamentary committee on Monday discussed power, development and tourism projects in Gilgit-Baltistan, focusing primarily on addressing the region's electricity crisis.

A meeting of the Senate Standing Committee on Kashmir Affairs and Gilgit-Baltistan, chaired by its chairman Senator Najid Mir at the Parliament House in Islamabad, was informed that GB faced a significant power deficit, with summer demand reaching 254MW against a production capacity of just 122MW. This gap underscores the urgent need for new energy projects.

Senator Zeshan Khattak, a member of the committee, highlighted power as one of the region's biggest challenges. "We must explore solar projects as a solution, particularly for remote areas where hydroelectricity is not feasible," he suggested.

The meeting also discussed financial allocations for both the Annual Development Programme (ADP) and Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) for the fiscal year 2024-25 for GB.

The ADP has been allocated Rs26 billion, with Rs7.5bn already disbursed. However, the committee noted an outstanding three-forward of Rs13bn for the ADP, underscoring the long-term nature of these investments.

The PSDP allocation for the same period stands at Rs13.5bn, including Rs6bn earmarked for prime minister's initiatives. The PSDP has an outstanding three-forward of Rs9bn, reflecting the scale and ambition of the federal government's development commitments to the region.

Among the key energy projects under development are the 54MW hydropower plant in

Attahad and 34.5MW hydropower plant in Skardu, which are expected to significantly address the region's energy needs and provide clean power to local communities.

The GB additional chief secretary included the committee on international collaboration in the region, highlighting China's active involvement in critical sectors such as energy, tourism, agriculture, trade and special economic zones.

However, he pointed out that Chinese investors have raised concerns over the lack of sovereign guarantees for power projects and the high tariffs in GB's energy sector, which have deterred investment.

Tourism

During the meeting, GB Chief Secretary Akbar Ahmed Mir highlighted the rising number of tourists in the region, but said that despite this growth, the region faced challenges related to climate change, sustainability and inadequate infrastructure.

To address these issues, GB has developed 10 management plans focused on environmental conservation, with feasibility studies underway for ski resorts, air taxis, and a cable car service. However, the lack of coordination in the National Finance Commission formula has posed barriers to completing these projects.

The region's airports also face constraints. Skardu airport, though larger, accommodates only 12 flights during the summer, while Gilgit airport struggles with even fewer connections, the meeting was told.

Senator Mir emphasised the significant incentives available for tourism investment in GB, including its status as a tax-free zone, low regulations, affordable electricity, investor facilitation, and a visa-on-arrival policy for citizens of 65 countries.

The committee also recommended granting observer representation to GB and Azad Kashmir in national constitutional discussions to better address their unique needs.

Iran's envoy, CM discuss steps to boost trade, educational ties

Ambassador offers scholarships for Pakistani students, expresses desire to launch other programmes

QUETTA: Iran's ambassador to Pakistan, Dr Reza Amiri Moghaddam and Balochistan Chief Minister Sardar Sargat on Monday discussed steps to promote trade, educational and cultural relations between Pakistan and Iran.

The discussion took place when Iran's envoy, along with members of his delegation, called on Mr Sargat at the Chief Minister House here.

Mr Sargat welcomed Dr Moghaddam and members of his delegation and said that establishment of peace and order in the region would increase trade activities and curb smuggling and illegal trade of goods between Pakistan and Iran.

The chief minister said that it is the need of the hour to further strengthen trade, cultural and social relations between the two brotherly countries.

He said that trade relations between Balochistan and Iran would be promoted at different levels to boost up legal trade activities between the two countries and to curb smuggling.

Mr Sargat said that effective measures would be taken, in coordination with the federal government, for resolution of problems being faced by traders of the two countries in legal trade activities.

The chief minister said that the establishment of law and order would increase trade activities between the two countries and this would also curb smuggling of goods.

In this regard, Mr Sargat said, a meeting will be held in Islamabad in which representatives of the chambers of commerce will be invited.

The chief minister assured members of Iran's delegation that no legal commercial container or truck of Iranian traders would face any problem in Balochistan.

For timely resolution of such problems, he said, the Iranian Consulate should appoint one of its representatives who will be in touch with relevant authorities of the Balochistan government to help traders.

The Iranian ambassador offered cooperation in various fields of social development including increasing trade volume, educational scholarships, and technical education.

Dr Moghaddam offered scholarships for Pakistani students and expressed Iran's desire to launch various programmes for Pakistani students.

The CM appreciated the offer and said that the Iranian Consulate and officials of the Balochistan government would jointly prepare a plan for the scholarship programme.

Mr Sargat said that under this offer, a special educational scholarship programme would also be launched for the Hazara community living in Quetta.

During the meeting, the Iranian envoy invited the Balochistan chief minister to visit Iran.

Mr Sargat accepted the invitation of Dr Moghaddam and said he would soon visit Iran along with a delegation.

During the meeting, the Iranian envoy informed the chief minister about the appointment of a Baluch governor in Sistan-Baluchistan province of Iran.

The chief minister welcomed the Iran's move and termed it a good omen.

At the end of the meeting, the two leaders reiterated their resolve to further promote bilateral relations and exchanged warm wishes.

Disciplinary action ordered against striking doctors

QUETTA: The provincial health department on Monday swung into action against the ongoing strike by doctors at government-run hospitals, directing the authorities to take measures against the protesting medical staff under the Balochistan Employees' Efficiency and Discipline Act (BEEA).

On the other hand, doctors criticised the boycott of OPDs in government hospitals across the province to protest the arrest of their leaders.

According to the Young Doctors Association, Grand Health Alliance Chairman Dr Babar Shah and Dr

Babur Masihkhail were arrested at Civil Hospital Quetta late on Saturday night. They were picked up on charges of attacking and assaulting Director General Health Balochistan Dr Ameen Masihkhail.

A health department notification on Monday directed the district health officers and hospital heads implement the BEEA and Discipline Act against the striking doctors.

The notification asked the officers and employees not to participate in strikes within the premises of government hospitals.

Any officer or employee found supporting or facilitating the strike will face disciplinary action.

The health department notification emphasised that any form of

protest or strike on the premises of any government hospital would not be tolerated, and strict disciplinary measures would be enforced under BEEA.

It noted that strikes and protests disrupt essential health services and negatively impact public welfare.

Security personnel, including private security firms, were instructed to remain vigilant and perform their duties effectively. Any negligence in security will not be tolerated.

The doctors' boycott includes OPD services, elective operations, and other services at Quetta's Civil Hospital, causing difficulties for patients, especially those who came for treatment from remote areas.

Sanjdi mine owners booked; one body yet to be found

QUETTA: The body of the last victim of the coal mine tragedy in Sanjdi was not recovered till Monday, four days after the accident.

Police registered a case against the owners and the management on Monday on a complaint filed by Mines Inspector Akbar Rashid.

The FIR named Sheikh Akbar Aziz and Hayat Khan as the accused.

Twelve miners died after an explosion of methane gas in the mine on Jan 8.

"The miner whose body has not been recovered yet was working somewhere in the middle of the collapsed mine when it caved in," Qasim Baloch, the chief inspector of Mines, told Dawn. Rescue teams have been able to retrieve the bodies of 11 labourers from two different

layers in the mine.

CM's promise

Balochistan Chief Minister Mir Sarfaraz Bugti said on Monday that his government would take measures to protect workers in the mining sector.

He told Dr Rashidullah, the leader of the Opposition in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly, the provincial government would give financial assistance to families of workers who lose their lives in accidents. "We will also update safety measures in order to avert mining accidents."

The chief minister said stress mine workers were the backbone of Balochistan's economy, it was the government's duty to address their grievances. — Staff Correspondent

Man killed in Turbat bomb blast

GWADAR: A man was killed on Monday when the bomb he was trying to plant at the Gwadar-Quetta Highway in Turbat district exploded, police said.

Officials identified the deceased as Manzoor Ahmed, who worked as a watchman in the health department, Turbat.

Police claimed that the man was planting the explosive device in the junk area. However, the device exploded during planting.

No other details were immediately available.

At the very start of Question Hour, a PTI lawmaker, instead of asking a question, raised the issue of the Nov 26 protest. Throughout the session, PTI lawmakers kept raising demands about the alleged shooting at D-Chowk that supposedly claimed the lives of several protesters. PTI members also staged a walkout during Question Hour.

'Smoke-screen'

The federal ministers for defence and information responded to the party's outburst during Question Hour. Defence Minister Khawaja Asif said the PTI was using dialogue as a smoke-screen, and questioned whether talks were possible in such an environment.

"They [PTI leaders] say that I am against negotiations. They do not want to talk, as behaviour demon-

strated by them in the National Assembly will not help in making the talks successful," the defence minister said.

He said the NA speaker himself and a former prime minister, Raja Feriwal Adral, were involved in talks, and the most important thing was to ensure the smooth functioning of the house.

He said the PTI used to say the government had no authority and there was no use in talking to the ruling coalition.

Mr Asif advised the PTI to directly negotiate with those who they thought wielded actual power. He observed that the chair extended courtesy to the opposition leader out of the way by giving the floor to him during the question hour, but he misused the opportunity.

Information Minister Attaulah Tarar also lambasted the PTI, alleging that the former ruling party through their 'agents' inside

and outside the country built a fake narrative on social media about the Nov 26 crackdown. He pointed out that the PTI leaders themselves had differentiation over the number of deaths in Islamabad on November 26.

Mr Tarar said that the PTI leadership should remember the killing of innocent people of a family in Salford during their tenure.

The minister also brought up the crackdown on the TLP in Lahore and the stampede in Multan's Qasim Bagh during the PTI government.

A PTI member, Iqbal Akhbar, tried to scuttle the information minister's speech by pointing out a lack of quorum, but the house was found to be in order.

Agha Rafiqullah of the PPP also criticised the attitude of the PTI members, saying that no one should expect that they would speak about issues faced by the public.

the court by 11am. He further said that the court official agreed and asked them to appear at the said time. The senior official mentioned by the PTI leader was approached by Dawn to confirm his claim, but despite multiple attempts, he did not respond.

According to Mr Chaudhry, when the PTI legal team, comprising Barrister Gohar Ali Khan, Salman Akram Raja, and himself, reached the prison, the judge had already left. Due to the absence of his legal team, PTI founder Imran Khan did not appear in court. Bashra Bibi also arrived after the judge had left.

Bashra Imran Khan and Bashra Bibi, property tycoon Malik Raza, his son, Ali Raza Malik, former accountability advisor Mirza Shuhad Akbar, Zaif Bakhtari, Farhan Shahzad alias Farah Gogi, and lawyer Ziaul Masood Naseem are named in the reference. They have been declared absconders by the court because of their persistent absence.

No deal

Reacting to the development, PTI Chairman Gohar Ali Khan asserted that the postponement was "not the outcome of any deal". "Attempts are being made to give the impression that a deal is being done. There is no deal. The trial court's attitude towards us [PTI] has been unjust," the PTI interim chairman, flanked by Mr Raja, told reporters outside Adiala.

He said that before they entered the Adiala jail, the judge had already decided to postpone the hearing until January 17. Mr Raja, referring to the ongoing talks between the PTI and the government to defuse political tensions, clarified that it was incorrect if anyone wanted to imply that the decision was delayed because of those. "We will not enter into any deal," the PTI leader said.

Barrister Gohar added, "Imran has said that the Al-Qadir Trust case decision should be announced. We can see it written on the walls that we have been repeatedly wronged."

Meanwhile, Azeema Khattak, sister of the PTI chief, claimed the verdict was to be announced at 10.30am, adding that she reached there on time. "Some were told that the decision would be announced at 11am," she said while speaking to reporters outside Adiala.

She added that Imran had been waiting for the verdict in the case for about a month as he wanted to appeal the case in a high court.

"I think the government is under a lot of pressure because the entire world is watching," she said.

Bashra's bail rejected

A local court rejected Bashra Bibi's interim bail in three cases related to the PTI's protest on November 26. The court extended her bail in another case.

Additional District and Sessions Judge Muhammad Afzal Majoka presided over the hearing of pre-arrest bail applications in three cases. In a separate hearing before Judge Chaudhry Aamir Zia, Bashra Bibi's lawyer argued for her pre-arrest bail in another case. After reserving its decision, the court extended Bashra Bibi's interim bail in the fourth case and accepted her exemption from attendance. The next hearing is scheduled for January 23.

Highway blockades disrupt traffic in Balochistan

GWADAR: While traffic between Gwadar and Karachi was suspended for at least 24 hours due to a gas leak from a tanker carrying liquid petroleum gas, the Quetta-Karachi highway remained blocked due to protests against the recent arrests in Zohri area.

The coastal highway was closed by authorities as a precautionary measure to avoid any untoward incident, as there was a gas leak from the tanker heading from Iran to Karachi.

Meanwhile, the Quetta-Karachi highway was blocked at Anjira cross and Sorab area by protesters demonstrating against arrests made in the Zohri area. The blockade, which lasted over 40 hours, caused significant disruptions to traffic, stranding hundreds of vehicles, including passenger coaches and trucks.

The local administration successfully negotiated with the protesters, and the highway was reopened late in the evening, restoring traffic flow. — Staff Correspondent

Left behind

FOR a country that produced the world's youngest Nobel laureate for championing girls' education, Pakistan's statistics make for tragic reading. Some 22.8m children are out of school — roughly equal to the entire population of Sri Lanka — and the female literacy rate languishes at 49pc. Last week's International Conference on Girls' Education in Muslim Communities in Islamabad laid bare these truths, though solutions remained elusive. The gathering had a notable absentee. The Taliban regime in Afghanistan, where girls are banned from secondary education, declined to attend. This was not surprising: its interpretation of religion appears medieval; even Muslim societies of yore valued learning more highly than today's Taliban do.

Pakistan's own educational woes, while not so extreme, are scarcely less worrying. Prime Minister Shabbaz Sharif's declaration of an "education emergency" joins a long list of similar pronouncements that have produced more hot air than actual learning. We spend a paltry 2.5pc of GDP on education, well below the UNESCO-recommended 4pc. In contrast, Malaysia and Turkey, fellow Muslim-majority nations, boast female literacy rates of above 90pc. Bangladesh has surged ahead with over 70pc of its women able to read and write. The economics of ignorance are stark. In an era where AI and quantum computing dominate conversations about the future, Pakistan's tech sector remains stunted thanks to its educational shortcomings. The World Economic Forum ranks the country near the bottom in educational attainment and economic participation — a double whammy that threatens to leave it behind in the global knowledge economy.

Some bright spots exist. The Danish schools initiative in Punjab, which provides quality education in underdeveloped rural areas, shows what targeted intervention can achieve. The newly established Pakistan Education Endowment Fund aims to support children from low-income families in higher education. But such initiatives are few. The conference concluded with the signing of the Islamabad Declaration, a 17-point document that recognises girls' education as both a "religious obligation" and a social necessity. The declaration will be presented to the UN Security Council, though cynics might wonder whether it will join the growing pile of well-intentioned but ineffective international commitments. Malala Yousafzai, who attended the conference, put it bluntly: 12.5m Pakistani girls remain out of school. Ms Yousafzai, who served as TTP assassination attempt in 2012 for advocating girls' education, is a powerful symbol of both Pakistan's educational challenges and its potential. But symbols alone cannot teach children to read. The path forward is clear: substantially increase education spending, dismantle cultural barriers to girls' education, and transform declarations into concrete action. Until then, Pakistan risks condemning another generation to ignorance — and itself to economic irrelevance in an increasingly knowledge-based world.

Mining tragedies

TWO recent deadly mining tragedies in Balochistan have once again exposed the hazardous nature of work in this sector, and the lack of safety protocols for miners. Two workers have been confirmed dead after a coalmine collapsed in Harai on Sunday, while 11 bodies have been recovered from a mine in Saraji near Quetta. The labourers were trapped thousands of feet underground in the latter incident when a methane gas explosion occurred on Jan 9. While the mining sector can bring significant riches to owners, the lives of those who toil underground doing back-breaking work appear to come cheap. Last year, too, we saw a number of fatal incidents, mostly in Balochistan; 12 miners perished in a gas explosion in Harai in the deadliest accident. Each time such tragic incidents occur, the state promises to look into the matter. Even after the latest incidents, the provincial mines and minerals department has promised an inquiry. If past precedent is any guide, these unfortunate episodes will soon be forgotten, and the colliers, who live a hand-to-mouth existence, will continue to risk their lives in the mines.

It does not have to be this way. In fact, Pakistan's mining sector could benefit if workers were protected by adequate safety protocols and compensated well for their work, and received adequate compensation in case of injury or accident. The Pakistan Central Mines Labour Federation has demanded all of these. It has called for ratification of ILO-C 176 — the Safety and Health in Mines Convention, 1995 — as well as awareness programmes focusing on workers' safety. Activists add that the state has failed to enforce the relevant regulations. Moreover, the Industrial, Global Union says Pakistan's workers lack health facilities and medical care in the vicinity of mines. If those facilities were made available at the mining sites, many lives could possibly be saved if affected workers were administered immediate medical care. But sadly, greedy owners and a callous state care little for these toilers. This attitude must change; those mine owners found to be cutting corners in implementing safety standards must be penalised while the state should ratify ILO-C 176 to signal that it values the health and safety of miners. There is no doubt that mining is a dangerous profession, but attempts could be made to minimise the hazards.

Winter sports

FOR a country with huge winter sports potential, events in Pakistan are few and far between. Therefore, the start of the seventh season of the Karakoram Winterlude is welcome. It shows that the organisers have done well to keep interest afloat and promote new talent. Ice hockey on the frozen Alin pool in Hurnas draws a huge crowd and it was heartening to see corporates getting involved in the opening match as Allied Bank and HBL, clashed. At a time when many corporates have downsize or closed down their sports wings, this is a positive sign. However, that is where it all ends. For a country blessed with three of the world's most famous mountain ranges and areas where there is snow almost the whole year, Pakistan has produced precious few Winter Olympians. Only three skiers, namely Mohammad Abbas, Mohammad Karim and Syed Human, have represented Pakistan at the top winter sports event. Ice hockey's popularity is growing, but not much is being done to promote the sport. Similar is the case with snowboarding, which is popular among residents in the north. For now, only local talent participates in sports festivals to prove their mettle.

Last week, the Pakistan Winter Sports Federation announced its annual calendar, which features just one snowboarding championship. There is nothing for ice hockey while ski events dominate. Once again, skiers will lead Pakistan's participation at the Asian Winter Games in China next month, with Karim taking part in the alpine skiing event and Mohammad Shabbir in cross-country skiing. Other winter sports are lagging behind. There is plenty of talent but very little has been done to house it to allow superior athletes to emerge and compete against the very best in the world. Winter sports athletes need not only specialised training but also the best equipment. If the government can provide a framework to ensure their availability, Pakistan can realise its winter sports potential.

Credibility crisis

For one side, social media is full of lies; for the other, mainstream media is biased.

IS the age of old or legacy media over? At times, it feels so, be it in Pakistan or in the United States, in light of recent political events. Last summer's pair (already Donald Trump and his wingman Elon Musk) are no fans of the faculty-facilities in traditional newsrooms and seem to prefer podcasts and X. At home in Pakistan, there are similar trends but views are sharply divided between two camps.

Indeed, as with politics, the polarisation in Pakistan has also affected views and attitudes of what the media. For one side, social media is full of lies, misquoting its viewers and listeners. For the other, mainstream media is far too biased and social media provides a voice to the vulnerable who are ignored by the former. And those in power adhere firmly to the first view that social media is simply a mirror to be controlled. No wonder then that we are constantly being lectured about the pitfalls of and the evil that is social media. We are also being deprived of it, more and more frequently, through administrative measures.

In addition, the donor culture that prevails in Islamabad has offered a shiner First World solution to our Third World woes with social media — fact-check! From mainstream media houses to donor-funded initiatives, we now have setups that are 'blocking facts' by authenticating videos, images and statements. However, from the point of view of the people, there is merit to the second argument — social media is flourishing because of the state-imposed censorship on mainstream media, due to which it has lost credibility.

Indeed, social media has filled the gap in information.

First, this gap was created by mainstream media sacrificing facts for the sake of views. With celebrity anchors and a proliferation of talk shows, the focus shifted to prime time shows rather than news. And the show formats (guests from parties plus the host) meant there

was very little space for reporting. Instead, the air was filled with the opinions of guests as well as analysts and even the host. This created the perception of mainstream media being dominated by opinions. At the same time, news organisations spent less and less on reporting. As a result, news bulletins have been reduced to simply providing a run-down of the various statements of various government and party officials as well as 'stories' provided by the subjects themselves (the instance, political parties themselves tend to provide accounts of what happened in an internal meeting, which will then be 'run' as an exclusive). This has also allowed media owners to avoid the wrath of any player that has a say in the advertisements the channels are independent on.

Second, the pressures of a multilayered censorship have further cemented the perception that mainstream media doesn't tell the 'truth'. Blatant coverage of parties, organisations and people, as well as the pressure to put out distorted views and news, has caused this, compelling more and more people to turn to social media.

For instance, the blanket ban on or very limited coverage of the various protests in the country means that those who want to find out about the issues have no choice but to turn to social media where unfiltered news will also reach those interested. This is as true of, say, a rally by the PTM or PTI as judicial politics.

In addition, there is also a significant chunk of viewers/listeners who want more variety than the one kind of talk show offered by television — they are moving to social media for serious, lengthy conversations available in podcasts.

If this diagnosis is accepted, the prescription will also be different from what Islamabad is offering as a solution. In other words, if the state wants to discourage people from listening to social media or the lies in it, mainstream media has to report independently, gain credibility

and then provide the fact-check.

For this, the state and political parties will have to stop back. This has happened in the past; the Pakistani state and its relationship with the media is not a linear story. As the pendulum swings between the establishment and civilian power, the space for the media also shrinks and expands. And chances are that this time around, it will prove to be no different. As political space opens up, so will the press gain room to breathe. Only then will it also be able to act as a counterweight to social media.

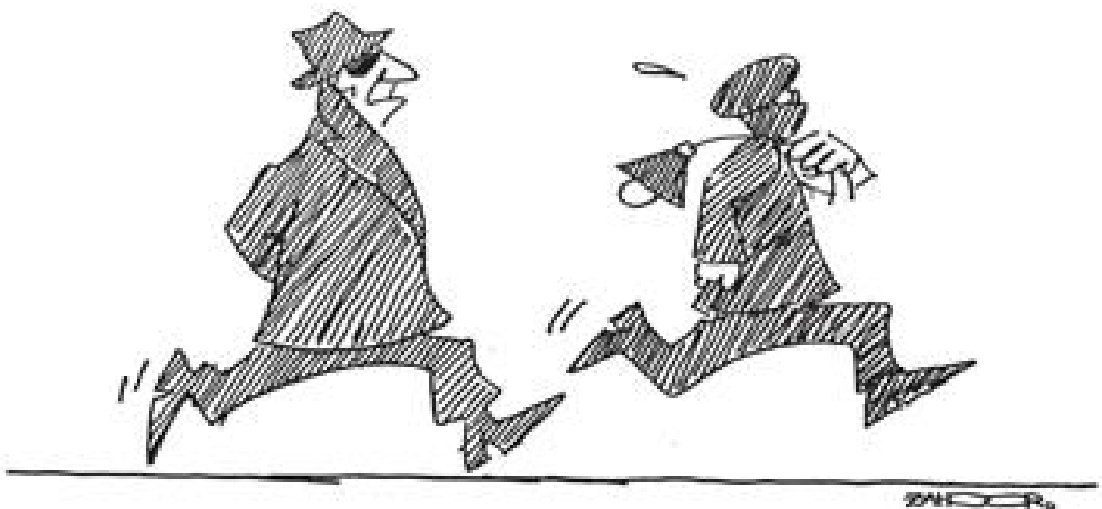
This is not to say that the state will only cede space under compulsion. One would do well to remember that it is also in the interest of the state. Because only a credible mainstream and legacy media, which is able to report fearlessly on the state and the government, will be able to fact-check. A hampered and cowed media, as it exists at the moment, cannot.

Second, a credible mainstream media is essential for the state itself to have credibility. One is not possible without the other; be it for domestic legitimacy or international. After all, it was not without reason that the Kargil conflict and its coverage by India's burgeoning private media led to the decision in Pakistan to allow private news channels. Pakistan realised then that a state-owned PTV could not match the noise created by an entire private industry, or the goodwill it created domestically as well. And more recently, the operation in Kwat would not have enjoyed the support it did across the length and breadth of Pakistan had it not been for the journalists who covered it in the valley or the operation against it.

Eventually, those in power will have to accept this. Without a stronger mainstream media, efforts to counter social media and fake news will be no different than propping up a government that enjoys no democratic mandate. ■

As stags dazzled by headlights

LOS Angeles is burning, singeing the rich and the homeless in its wake. Gaza is in tatters, leaving an unconscionable toll of a perpetually violated people, but not without wounding and maiming the tormentors. The fire and the slaughter are both man-made tragedies and are linked, though difficult to accept as such.

As the stag is caught in the headlights of the approaching milk van, which crushes the animal in the end to leave it crippled or dead while keeping the delivery deadline before daybreak, the world is standing frozen on the cusp of a terrifying catastrophe. It doesn't see nature's wrath it has invoked with at least a century-old abuse of the planet.

Worse, it remains sanguine about the supremacy of nuclear fiction and gaspword as protection against the oncoming calamity. Israel is emblematic of the tragedy. Created as a home for survivors from Nazi ghettos, it is today a replica of Nazi Germany. As the Nazis rationed their thirst for blood and laid with European race theories, the Jewish elite embraced Zionism and took a leaf from their tormentors to cover Palestinian land with claims of divine exclusivity.

Imperialism, which transformed Israel into its unshakable ship, doesn't always see the need for divine enemies. It has not its open, for example, on its own allies in Greenland and Canada. Its entrenched interest lies crucially in denial of climate change although the hunt for critical resources is on in case someone robs it wrong.

On a different scale, in India, corporates close to the government are being facilitated by the state to stake a claim on the nation's natural resources. They are cornering forests and water resources and displacing the indigenous inhabitants. They care little that the Himalayan ice is melting, rivers are running dry and a water-sharing treaty between India and Pakistan is being weaponised. There seems no room to sidestep the milk van, which is speeding like China's bullet train to Tibet but with its guardrails to deter the stag's headlong fate. The global stage has ingredients of Greek tragedies that lay low the protagonists with speeding inevitability. Occasionally, it's luck that runs out on the hero. Among the least concerned by the mayhem in

Donald Trump.

It would, of course, have been better for the world if its joys and sorrows were not determined by America's four-yearly mood swings and its pursuit of perennially shifting 'core interests' — that's not the way the world is structured. Trump's second coming starting next week brings with it a more extreme variant of the worry. The core interests have suddenly shifted to terrifying claims on allies, making them palpably nervous. Or to be clearer, Trump brings worry for some and hope for others. The variation is evident.

While the Chinese president expectedly turned down the invitation to Trump's Jan 20 swearing in, the Indian prime minister is reportedly disconcerted at not being invited, too after earlier efforts including his foreign min-

ister's alleged stakeout in Washington, D.C. Trump has raised close to \$200 million from the coming inaugural, says the *Forbes* magazine.

According to Indian reports, the foreign minister and not Narendra Modi has been invited to represent India. The grovelling is made worse by an absurd fact of history whereby Prime Minister Modi had publicly canvassed — to the world's astonishment and to many an Indians' embarrassment — for Trump's re-election, which he lost. During Modi's recent visit to the US, however, reports said Trump was expecting to see him, presumably to raise handy electoral support from the mostly Democratic Indian diaspora. Modi apparently misinterpreted the election outcome and didn't meet Trump.

There are greater worries stemming from and hopes hinging on Trump's second presidency including in South Asia. Trump's overriding interest in the Global South is, of course, his fear

of BRICS. It's difficult to see any South Asian country ditching the most promising alternative that BRICS has become to gasping US imperialism. At an individual level, there have been wranglings about Trump's soft corner for Imran Khan who, reports say, he could help get back his job. The story is more complex given the grid pro quo Trump would demand from those he favours: betraying BRICS.

There are accusations, and there are reasons to believe them, that the Biden administration waylaid Imran after he met Vladimir Putin in Moscow. Richard Grenell, a close associate of Trump, did, however, publicly demand the release of Imran Khan.

Bangladesh would be on edge too, given the fact that the current dispensation in Dhaka is seen as being close to Hillary Clinton. Her India connection is remembered for the blunder she dined at an Ambani wedding in 2015. That the reason shows up Modi is no secret. For the other regional countries, their ties with the US for the next four years would be measured through the prism of Sino-US relations, Trump's top priority.

The larger world, meanwhile, remains sandwiched between two bad choices. The outgoing Democratic administration has been neck-deep complacent in the horrific genocide in Gaza. It's equally responsible for setting off the slaughter underway in Ukraine by trouncing and provoking Russia.

Many American opponents, including a friend who has applied to give up her US nationality, see Trump as an unbroken real estate shark who became America's most divisive politician since the Civil War. They say he wants to make his country great again in its most dire times. Therefore, he must first negotiate the charged-up opposition from the vast swathe of Americans suspicious of his toxic worldviews. Trump's US is expected to be vertically divided over gender rights, climate change and race relations besides a host of tricky hairpin bends on domestic and global policies. Should the milk van head over on a sharp bend, it would be the best experience the stranded stag could possibly hope for. ■

Systemic change

LIKE in many other places, education reforms have been frequently initiated in Pakistan with great vigour and sincerity, only to fade out as a disjointed set of inputs, further adding to the systemic inertia. A piecemeal approach to reforming components of the education system without aligning all stakeholders into a collective that works with student learning, as the singular priority of systemic transformation has consistently failed the children.

Collective leadership must be the guiding principle for ensuring quality education for all. For the reforms to be not another, the entire ecosystem around education needs to be understood and transformed holistically.

Systems do not change by themselves; people change them. The theory of change practised worldwide is premised on strong people, especially the youth, inside the insupportable system to change it from within. We must develop culture of people with ambition, capacity, and resilience to change the entire ecosystem around children. Collective leadership acts as a force multiplier for all stakeholders to affect the requisite change and ensure that every child gets the education and future they deserve regardless of their socioeconomic background.

One may ask, what is this ecosystem, and who are the actors or leaders who can affect these changes in their spheres of influence, sparking a chain reaction throughout the system, propelling the change forward, and creating a buzz around the education crisis similar to the one the global community has finally succeeded in creating around climate change?

A child's home, community, school, policy framework, and civil society are all part of their education ecosystem. Students do not walk into a classroom alone; they bring their family's socioeconomic circumstances, neighbourhood challenges, and the cultural moorings of their community with them. In other words, the heavy schooling everyone talks about may appear light compared to the social and emotional baggage that weighs children down and prevents learning.

Agency and leadership development at every level of this ecosystem is imperative to developing a pipeline of human resource capable of envisioning and implementing transformative change in education and all associated sectors. Neither the number of schools and the quality of their infrastructure, nor the textbooks and curriculum alone can ensure that all children realise their potential. Research worldwide bears witness that communities with voice and governance structures geared towards responsiveness and accountability drive need-appropriate allocation of resources, a simple way of ensuring the system is equitable.

Globally, seven out of 10 children in mid-to-low-income countries cannot comprehend a written text by age 10. Pakistan is no different; most children are four to five years behind their grade levels in learning. Over the past 15 years, the Teach For All network has learned from more than 60 partner organisations across continents that it is not technical inputs that generate learning outcomes but a critical mass of committed stakeholders throughout the education ecosystem who work together to bring about the change required for learning gains.

This critical mass or collective leadership, as we call it, emerges agency from every level of the ecosystem. It is committed to social justice and believes in learning and leadership development among all its constituents. It is locally rooted and diverse, inclusive of people who have experienced inequality and those who wield influence, and it has networks to collaborate and learn together.

The current system is not working for most children due to misplaced priorities, inefficiencies, and inequities. Learning outcomes, critical thinking, problem-solving, life skills, empathy, social emotional well-being, and whole child development have taken a back seat to brick-and-mortar models and exam scores.

Youth worldwide face multiple challenges, including climate change, AI-based automation, forced displacements, wars, internal conflicts, rising pushback against immigration, gender-based violence, and economic downturns leading to unemployment. To improve their chances of surmounting these hurdles, we must develop them as leaders of a better future for themselves, their communities, and our planet.

More than reforms that address a few existing challenges through technical interventions and without questioning the premise and logic of the system, a transformation is needed to make learning outcomes the centrepiece of the education system and shift the purpose, principles, and practices guiding it according to the present context and future challenges.

AI & environment

ARTIFICIAL intelligence (AI) is one of the most consequential technologies today. It is dramatically changing the world, altering business models and ushering in transformational development in education, healthcare, communication, and agriculture, to name a few. It has introduced efficiencies to our workplaces, improved industrial productivity, optimised resource use and reduced waste. AI's rapid rise is attributed to availability of data and a phenomenal growth in computational power.

AI has also furnished new tools to address environmental issues and climate change. From spotting smog in the sky and detecting deforestation on the land to modelling microclimates in the ocean, AI's potential is tremendous. AI-based early warning systems predict cyclones, or rain and minimise the extent of damage. Forecasts about droughts and heatwaves provide timely information to vulnerable communities. AI-generated techniques in smart agriculture help farmers cope with water stress, prevent waste, optimise crop yield and ensure food security.

But AI can also harm our fragile planet. AI is power hungry. Data collection, storage and application require an elaborate system of energy-intensive data centres. A rise in AI deployment means a rise in the number of data centres with a commensurate demand for power. A recent International Energy Agency meeting noted that the "electricity demand for data centres and digital services would likely rise substantially in the next few years, despite continued improvements in the efficiency of hardware and software". To operate under controlled temperatures, data centres need air conditioning consuming more energy. The United Nations Environment Programme's (UNEP) recent "Issue Note" on AI points out that the number of data centres worldwide has grown from 100,000 in 2012 to over eight million, with energy consumption doubling every four years.

With the current global energy mix still dominated by dirty fuels, this trend can translate into a spike in greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. In the process, our planet will be the unintended victim. Until a just energy transition is expedited, AI's carbon footprint is set to increase.

AI's appetite for power is matched by its thirst for water. To cool the heat generated by energy-intensive servers, large quantities of water are needed. Global demand for water for AI needs is estimated to reach four to six billion cubic metres by 2027.

AI's potential negative impact on environment goes further. Critical minerals are an essential part of hardware for digital technologies. Found mostly in high-water-stress areas of developing countries,

such mining, without efficient mitigation measures, puts more pressure on natural resources, damaging biodiversity, polluting air and spawning GHG. Waste and e-waste produced during the life cycle of digital technologies is another emerging problem.

Fortunately, these problems can be solved through a strategy that incorporates AI's pros and cons. The Summit of the Future last September acknowledged AI's promise to accelerate progress across the SDGs and address its possible negative impacts on the environment and other areas. But how can this promise be realised equitably? The missing link between AI's potential and a strategy to extract its full advantage is a regulatory regime.

International discourse on the issue has generally revolved around matters of privacy, and disinformation, etc, but environmental costs are now part of it. Governments and tech companies — leaders in deploying AI at scale — concede that environmental impacts will need to be included in any discussion and tackled urgently. An international governance system is needed for the gamut of subjects in the AI realm.

The first steps were taken in this direction at the UN last year. A global dialogue on AI governance has been initiated and an independent international scientific panel established to produce evidence-based impact, risk and opportunity assessments. To aid these efforts, UNEP's "Issue Note", contains several recommendations, including establishing a standardised method and metrics for measuring AI's environmental impact, and developing a mechanism for mandatory reporting and disclosure of AI's direct environmental impacts by tech companies, focusing on consumption of energy, water, mineral resources, carbon emissions and e-waste.

In the interview, he also declined to give Israel a guarantee ... and said: "We have to judge what is in our national interest above any and all other considerations." He also said that he backed the view expressed by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger who ... refused to rule out the use of force in the Middle East if the "free" or industrialised world-based strategists. — News agencies

[Meanwhile, as reported by news agencies from Lahore,] Mir Afzal Khatt, Federal Minister for Commerce, has categorically stated that no drastic revision of import policy was under Government consideration and people in trade and industry should not pay attention to any rumour, whatever, in this connection. ... The Minister observed that since there [were] no abnormal imports, the Government had no intention to tighten up the present liberal character of the import policy.

1950 | Seventy-five years ago

Coal crisis averted

KARACHI: A coal crisis in Pakistan, which was apprehended owing to India stopping its supplies, has been successfully averted. The Government of Pakistan have finalised deals for immediate shipments of 195,000 tons of coal from Europe, while allocations of another 900,000 tons are expected during the next few months. Steps have also been taken to step up appreciably the indigenous production of coal in Pakistan.

A Press note issued by the Ministry of Industries on Friday (Jan 13) announced that the Government "have purchased" 85,000 tons of coal from Poland, 60,000 tons from the UK and 50,000 tons from France. Shipments would start immediately.

France has offered another 300,000 tons of coal to Pakistan and the Government were negotiating for 400,000 tons from Poland [and] 200,000 tons from the UK, allocations of which are likely within the next few months, the Press note added. Coal from Europe will cost Rs 30 per ton more than the Indian coal, but the price factor, according to experts, would be offset by the superior quality of the slow-burning European coal. — Staff correspondent

May 9 and West's double standards



THE United States and its transatlantic partner European Union have raised objections on military trials of civilians in Pakistan. This led me to explore the "fascinating" history of military courts, and the trials of civilians in military courts in the US and Europe. The US legal system typically maintains a clear distinction between military and civilian jurisdictions. However, in specific situations, military courts have jurisdiction over civilians, especially when national security is at risk, or when civilian crimes occur within a military context.

One of the notable examples of a civilian being tried by a US military court occurred after World War II. Iva Hukob-Togari, an American citizen, had been in Japan during the war as a broadcaster, and was accused of spreading Japanese propaganda over the radio. After the war, she was arrested and tried by a US military tribunal in 1949.

Despite her claims that she had been coerced into participating, and did not support the views she relayed on air, she was convicted of treason and sentenced to 10 years in prison. A more contemporary example of civilians being tried in US military courts is that of a member of Al Qaeda members and Taliban fighters. They were tried often in military tribunals rather than civilian courts. In the United Kingdom, a notable example is the trial of William Joyce, infamous for his broadcasts as a Nazi propagandist. Although the UK had civilian courts capable of handling such cases, his trial took place in a military court. Joyce was convicted and executed in 1946.

It is also important to recognise that violence, violent protests and attacks on military installations are considered forms of terrorism in many countries, including those in the West. Both in the US and Europe, there have been instances where civilian-led protests escalated into violence, resulting in attacks on military installations.

While not a direct attack on a military installation, the 1971 Africa Prison riots in New York serve as a significant

example of violent protests involving civilian participants, which led to military involvement and were regarded as acts of domestic terrorism. The attacks by the Irish Republican Army (IRA) were also widely viewed as terrorism by the UK government.

In Pakistan, the May 9 violence severely impacted national security, political stability, and the integrity of the country's democratic institutions. The reaction from the US and the West has been marked by double standards.

While they employed military courts to deal with civilians in their own countries, they have raised objections to the episode in Pakistan. Ironically, the West had previously expressed no concerns about Pakistan's military courts when the current opposition was in power. This selective outrage speaks for itself. The issue of dealing with terrorism is entirely Pakistan's internal matter, and the world, including the US, should refrain from interfering in our domestic affairs.

Digital initiative

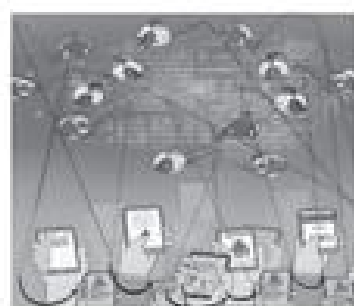
THE Digital Nation Pakistan Bill, 2024, is an important initiative aimed at not only improving the people's lives, but also raising the status of the country in

PAKISTAN has experienced devastating internet restrictions in the last more than two months. With fundamental functionality restricted, social media platforms are hardly accessible. There are worse lies that Pakistan might be moving towards digital isolation similar to that of North Korea because virtual private networks (VPNs) have been targeted and a firewall regime has been implemented.

Every hour of downtime costs more than \$1 million, according to the Pakistan Software House Association (PSHA), which estimates that recent internet interruptions have cost \$100 million. The information technology (IT) industry, which formerly grew at a rate of 30 per cent per year, is currently facing difficulties. As tech companies consider moving out, freelancers deal with shaky connections, and foreign clients reconsider alliances. These obstacles must

be eliminated if Pakistan is to compete for a \$1 trillion economy and reach its \$60 billion IT export goal.

A slow and interrupted internet has become the new standard, impeding business, education and overall economic growth. While the government talks of a digital economy, its policies contradict progress. In order to advance, it must encourage candid communication, ensure that social media companies are held fully responsible through appropriate regulation, and enable people to differentiate between false information and the truth. It is also crucial to rebuild confidence in independent media.

A firewall system is actually an obstacle in the way of Pakistan's progress and prosperity. These limitations are stifling innovation and economic potential in a society rushing towards 5G.

The government must move quickly to restore dependable internet connectivity.

Waziristan forest fire controlled after two days

Swabi man ends life after killing wife for 'honour'

SWABI: A man allegedly killed his wife for honour and later died by suicide in Chota Lohor tehsil here on Monday.

Police and Rescue 1122 officials said that the incident took place in Jaisal Dhok area.

Chota Lohor city SHO Gohar Khan said that the accused shot dead his wife from a chota range inside a room of his house, and later also shot himself dead.

Sajjad Khan, a brother-in-law of the deceased woman, reported to the police that he was with his family at his house when at 3am his nephew knocked at the door to their room, saying his father opened fire on his mother, and later got himself injured with a pistol.

Sajjad said when they went there, his 28-year-old sister-in-law was lying in a pool of blood and his brother was injured, while a pistol was also lying with him.

He said his injured brother was taken to Bache Khan Teaching Hospital, Shahmansoor, where he later succumbed to his injuries.

Sajjad said his brother was angry that his wife had gone to her parents' house without his permission, which created a rift between the couple.

The police have registered an FIR and started investigation.

Six injured in Kohat gas leak blast

PESHAWAR: Six members of a family, including five children, were injured, two of them critically, when a blast occurred inside a house in Kohat due to gas leak on Monday.

The police said the incident occurred in Garhi Hissar area.

Rescue workers shifted the injured to the District Headquarters Hospital, Kohat, from where two of the critically injured children were referred to a Peshawar hospital.

The injured were identified as the wife of Ashraf, Hakeema, 10, Sakhtawar, 7, Fatima, 6, Waris, 12 and Hasiba, 4. — APP

KP proposes solutions to Rs1.5tr hydel profit dues issue

Seeks NHP payments in line with CCI decisions, control of Wapda power stations

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has come up with three proposals to settle its long-standing issue with the centre over the non-payment of Rs1.5 trillion net hydro profit dues from 2016 to 2022.

During the Jan 10 meeting of a special committee, the KP government proposed payment of outstanding NHP amounts in accordance with the Council of Common Interest's decisions, granting control of Wapda's power stations to provinces, and implementing an interim NHP payment agreement by enhancing consumer tariff by Rs1/Kwh to generate requisite funds.

The committee was formed by the CCI on Dec 23, 2019, to propose an "out-of-box solution" for the payment of NHP to the provinces. It has so far held five meetings.

The issue of Rs1.5 trillion NHP dues in line with the Kari Committee Methodology (KCM)

for the period of 2016-22 has been subject of prolonged negotiations since 2018.

In its latest submission, KP has said the federal government should pay NHP in line with Article 161(2) of the Constitution, Presidential Order No 3, decisions of the CCI from 1991, 1993, 1997, 1998, 2005, 2018 and 2022, and the calculation made by the Jehangir Khan committee in the report approved by the CCI on Dec 23, 2019.

It added that the federal government should fund the power house component of Wapda development projects through PNDP instead of revenues generated through Wapda generation tariff to make funds available for the payment of the NHP to the entitled province.

The second proposal stated that the transfer of the Wapda hydropower stations to provinces as proposed by the Punjab government and agreed by KP and decided in the third meeting of the out-of-box committee on Jan 11, 2022.

Besides, the proposal said that transfer of HPPs to provincial government on analogy of generation policy 1975 and 2015 and outstanding payment of NHP as per KCM to be made by the federal government till date

of transfer of HPP to the province while the operation and maintenance can be retained by Wapda.

The third proposal stated till the finalisation of these three options, the federal government should announce the second interim agreement of NHP payment by enhancing the consumer and tariff by Rs1/Kwh to generate the requisite funds.

"Options may be finalised within a month," the proposal said, adding that payment of NHP should be made directly by the CPFA-G through escrow account instead of Wapda.

It said that Pakhtunkhwa Energy Development Organisation projects should be facilitated to sell up to 1500 MWs of power through electricity wheeling while water user charges to be enhanced to Rs3/Kwh.

When contacted, Hameezullah Khan, the KP government's representative tasked with negotiating NHP with the federal government, said that the province presented its proposal in the fifth meeting of the "out-of-box" committee, which was formed on December 23, 2019.

He said Article 161(2) of the Constitution declared that the net profits earned by the federal

government, or any undertaking established or administered by the federal government from the bulk generation of power at hydro-electric stations shall be paid to the province in which the hydro-electric station is situated.

Mr Khan said that CCI was the relevant forum to determine net profits.

He said that after the numerous CCI decisions on the matter and recommendations of a committee led by deputy chairman of the Planning Commission Dr Jehangir Khan for the payment of NHP in line with the KCM, the federal government came up with the excuse of having no money.

He, however, said that the power component of new hydro-electric stations was funded from Wapda revenues and the water component from the Public Sector Development Programme.

"The power component of Diamir-Basha, Mohmand and Dam dams amounts to Rs2.24 trillion, while the water component totals Rs1.4 trillion. When the federal government says it has no money, KP's contention is that the Rs2.24 trillion funded Wapda into this project is our money," he said.

The KP's representative also

said that the federal government's stated that payment of NHP to the province would raise electricity prices was incorrect.

He said that the price of a unit of electricity had gone up from Rs16 to Rs20, while the circular debt had touched Rs2.2 trillion and that had nothing to do with the payment of NHP.

In April 2018, the KP government had taken the implementation of KCM, adopted by the CCI in 1991 and the forum constituted a committee to deliberate upon the issue of determination of rates/net profits in light of the decision of CCI.

The committee presented its report to the CCI on December 23, 2019, which stated that practicality of the implementation of the KCM couldn't override the constitutional statutes and the rise in the price of electricity was a matter of public policy and couldn't be given preference over Article 161(2).

It added that the federal government should ensure payment of NHP on the basis of calculations made by the committee for 2016-17.

The KP government has calculated NHP dues at Rs1.5 trillion as per KCM for the period from 2016-17 to 2022-23.

PA forms committee to discuss bill returned by governor over objections

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly on Monday constituted a special committee for a detailed discussion on the KP Laws Amendment Bill, 2024, which was returned by Governor Faisal Karim Karshi over objections about the move to equate the chief minister's advisers and special assistance with the ministers.

The development came during a session chaired by Speaker Balal Saloom Swati. The speaker said the governor had returned the bill and wanted it to be reconsidered by the house.

He read out the governor's message about the bill, which read, "After careful examination of the proposed bill, titled KP Laws Amendment Act, 2024, he is constrained to withhold assent and return the bill to the KP Assembly for reconsideration."

The governor noted that the bill proposed inclusion of advisers and special assistants, where the word minister appeared in the existing laws, rules and regulations, notification or all other legal instruments. "This blanket amendment appears to lack any clear justification or defined need."

The governor insisted that as per the Constitutional Framework, advisers and special assistants

were not members of the cabinet and couldn't exercise executive authority, which was the prerogative of elected representatives serving as ministers, and that they're not accountable to the provincial assembly, a fundamental principle ensuring democratic oversight of the executives.

He added that ministers, as elected representatives, enjoyed constitutionally-defined status and direct accountability to the legislature and the public. "Equating advisers and special assistance who lack electoral legitimacy with ministers, raises serious constitutional concerns," he noted.

According to him, the KP Government Rules of Business, 1985, which derives legitimacy from the Constitution, govern the formation and functioning of various committees. He said adding that extending powers and privileges to the unelected individuals under these provisions risks disrupting cabinet functions and the constitutional role and responsibilities of ministers, and would be clearly unconstitutional.

"Given the broad and undefined scope of the amendment, the assembly must reconsider its necessity scope and constitutional validity. A more focused approach, based on demonstrable need, would be preferable to the current generic proposal," he said.

The governor pointed out that in order to ensure compliance with Constitutional provisions, the KP Amendment Bill, 2024, was being referred to the provincial assembly for reconsideration.

During the session, opposition PPP member Ahmad Karim Karshi said that special advisers had never been elected.

"During PTI government, Hafiz Sheikh was nominated for NHC meetings as an adviser, so people filed a writ petition in the court objecting that Sheikh was not a federal minister to chair the NHC meeting," he said.

The lawmaker said the provincial government didn't have a finance minister and if an unelected person was sent to a committee's meeting, the federal government would snap him from attending it.

He added that people would go to the court as the ministers were replaced with advisers and special assistance in the Act.

"It will be much more effective and appropriate to reconsider the apprehensions and concerns of the governor KP," he said.

Member of the opposition JUIF Adnan Khan said that he had proposed amendments but they were not considered.

"Advisers and special assistance are not part of the cabinet," he said, wondering how

an unelected person could be held accountable.

MPA Hussain Laghari said that the committee were part of the house and unelected persons attending the meeting, was contrary to the definition of democracy and supported the opposition benches that unelected people should not be part of the cabinet or proceedings of the house calling it against the Constitution.

JUIF member Mariam Luthar Rehman said that the 25 Constitutional Amendment was passed after consultation with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf.

In response, law minister Atah Alam Afridi said the house that the main objective of the amendment bill was to provide legal cover to the advisers and special assistance as they held several departments and chaired meetings.

He said that there were 34 departments and the advisers and special assistance helped the chief minister adding that the advisers were covered under the Constitution, while the special assistants were covered under Rule 31(A) of Rules of Business.

"I suggest the formation of a special select committee for discussing the bill before the next session and the seeking of the advocate general's opinion to satisfy us. The entire house could be taken on board," he said.

Mr Afridi said according to Article 16 of the Constitution, any matter for reconsideration could be returned with or without amendment by the provincial assembly.

"As far as the 25th Constitutional Amendment is concerned, an advocate general could speak on the floor of the house that covered advisers and special assistance," he said.

The minister said under Article 131 (1), five advisers could become part of the cabinet and there was no mention of elected or unelected persons.

Former speaker of the assembly Murtaza Ahmad Ghani also supported the opposition's objections to the bill and asked the law minister if he would sit in a meeting chaired by unelected persons.

He said the bill should be sent to the select committee for a detailed discussion.

The house also unanimously passed a resolution, which demanded of the provincial government to recommend to the federal government to fulfil the promises made regarding the development of merged tribal districts. It also called for the provision of funds promised by the federal government and other provinces.

No terrorism case reported in Chitral last year

CHITRAL: The Lower Chitral police registered nine cases of murder and 13 cases of attempted murder, seven cases of rape and 10 cases of abduction in 2024, but no case of robbery was reported during the period.

The police also registered 34 cases of hurt, 53 cases of assault, while no case of attack on police, child abduction, missing persons and kidnapping for ransom were reported in 2024.

As per data gathered from the office of the district police officer, no incidents of robberies, including bank heist, vehicle and bike snatching were reported, while the number of theft cases decreased to 15 compared to 28 in 2023.

No case of terrorism was reported, while the number of fatal traffic accidents rose to 11 compared to only six in 2023.

As many as 255 cases were registered during 2024 under different sections of Control of Narcotics Act, while 16 cases of Arms Ordinance, 12 of Forensic Act, four of arms, six of cheating were reported. No case of forgery, fake NCR, hate speech and gambling was reported.

The Lower Chitral police recovered 145 kilograms of heroin, 645 litres of liquor, 5.5kg of opium, 0.5kg of heroin and 1.5kg of ice drug, while the arms and ammunition seized during the period included a shot machine gun, two rifles, 13 shotguns, 10 pistols, 254 rounds, three-meter detonator, five daggers and four kg explosive powder.

A total of 125 proclaimed offenders were arrested in 2023, which dropped to 115 in 2024. — Correspondent

Says Pakistan to achieve 13.5pc tax ratio in FY25

KARACHI: Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb has said that the country is preparing to launch a tax-to-GDP ratio of 13.5pc in FY25. He also announced Panda bonds this year to shore up finances, Dawn.com reported on Monday.

The country is planning to raise \$200 million to \$250m from Chinese investors over the next six to nine months, the finance minister told Bloomberg in an interview.

Panda bonds are a type of debt security issued by foreign entities in the Chinese capital markets, and they are denominated in Chinese yuan (RMB).

In March last year, the finance minister announced that Pakistan was keen to tap Chinese investors by selling as

much as \$300m in Panda bonds.

These bonds allow foreign investors, including multinational corporations, international financial institutions, and sovereign governments, to access capital from Chinese investors.

"The country is very keen to

tap the panda bonds and the Chinese capital markets," Mr Aurangzeb said according to the report. "We have been coming as a country not to tap it previously."

Speaking on the sidelines of the Asian Financial Forum in Hong Kong, the minister also

confirmed that the International Monetary Fund (IMF) mission is scheduled to visit Pakistan next month, adding that it would be the country to broaden its tax base and reach a tax-to-GDP ratio of 13.5 per cent, from 10pc in December.

"We are well on our way to achieving that target, not only because the IMF is saying that but because, from my perspective, the country needs to get into that benchmark to make our fiscal situation sustainable," he said.

The IMF's executive board approved a 30-month \$7bn Extended Fund Facility in September to enable the country to "sustain macroeconomic stability and create conditions for stronger, more inclusive and resilient growth".

In July, global rating agency Fitch also upgraded Pakistan's long-term foreign-currency issuer default rating (IDR) to CCC+ from CCC on the back of the country's deal, while Standard and Poor's (S&P)

maintained its rating of CCC+. According to the report, Pakistan has undergone 25 loan programmes over half a century, with the IMF insisting the country institute "durable reforms in key areas of the energy sector, tax collection and state-owned enterprises to end a cycle of indebtedness".

Aurangzeb also told Bloomberg that the country's gross domestic product (GDP) "will probably expand 3.5pc in the fiscal year ending June".

"We are into that phase of stabilisation," Aurangzeb stated. "Now, where do we go from here? We have to focus on sustainable growth. We are now very focused on fundamentally changing the DNA of the economy to make it export-led."

The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP), which lowered its key interest rate to 10pc in December, cited that growth prospects had somewhat improved, and it had managed to keep inflationary and external account pressures in check.

Pakistan, BD joint business council formed

KARACHI: The Federation of Pakistan Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FPCCI) and the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) on Monday signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) to form Pakistan-Bangladesh Joint Business Council (PBJBC) to strengthen, facilitate and enable trade between the two countries.

The delegation headed by FPCCI President Aftab Khan Sheikh also participated in the Bangladesh Pakistan Business Forum in Dhaka. The visit to Bangladesh is taking place after a gap of 12 years. Pakistani businessmen look forward to meeting Dr Muhammad Yunus, Chief Advisor to the interim Bangladesh government in a couple of days.

FPCCI Administrator Muhammad Hafeez Rahman emphasised utilising the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) and the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) to strengthen bilateral trade relations.

He said there is ample scope for the two countries to work closely in energy, education, technology, human resources development, research and innovation to meet the challenges of the fourth industrial revolution. Mr Aftab said that diverse industries sectors and versatile like electronics, cars, industrial machinery, computers, toys, garments, sanitary products, handicrafts, fabrics, ready-made garments, leather, home appliances, processed foods, furniture, plastic goods, jute products, cosmetics, sports goods and jewellery, were represented in the business forum.

He said the delegation had a productive meeting with Bangladesh Commerce Minister Sheikh Bashiruddin a day earlier, during which he expressed his government's intent to facilitate Pakistani exporters and products.

He added that the Bangladesh government has already relaxed visa requirements for Pakistani nationals, and Pakistan has reciprocated.

Mr Bashiruddin said that both countries would jointly search for options like investments, trade and industrial relations. He also assured the delegation of supporting Pakistani companies.

The FPCCI president highlighted that the trade delegation also had high-profile meetings with the Bangladesh Investment Development Authority (BIDA), where they discussed collective trade promotion activities, the exchange of delegations, and single-country exhibitions.

Azerbaijan to set up trade centre in Lahore

LAHORE: Azerbaijan is set to establish a trade centre in Lahore to strengthen ties between the business communities of both countries and create new opportunities for mutual cooperation.

This was announced by Azerbaijan's Ambassador Khazar Farhadov during his speech at the Lahore Chamber of Commerce and Industry on Monday.

"We are going to establish Azerbaijan Trade Centre in Lahore and Pakistan-Azerbaijan Chamber of Commerce to bring the business communities of both countries closer and open new avenues for mutual cooperation," he said.

The ambassador highlighted the duty-free access granted to Pakistani rice by Azerbaijan until 2027, encouraging traders to capitalise on this opportunity, especially considering Punjab's reputation for producing high-quality Basmati rice. He assured that Azerbaijani authorities would provide maximum facilitation to Pakistani traders exploring opportunities in Azerbaijan. Referring to the positive impact of direct flights between the two countries, the ambassador revealed that bilateral trade volume has tripled since 2022, growing from \$50 million to significantly higher levels. He said that over 80,000 Pakistanis visited Azerbaijan last year which reflected the growing interest and people-to-people connections.

The ambassador also invited Pakistani investors to explore opportunities in Azerbaijan's industrial and energy sectors and highlighted the country's strategic position as a key international transport corridor between Asia and Europe.—Staff Reporter

Petrol, diesel to cost Rs6 more in next fortnight

ISLAMABAD: The prices of high-speed diesel (HSD), petrol and kerosene are estimated to increase by up to Rs6 per litre on Wednesday for the next fortnight due to higher international prices.

Informed sources said the ex-depot petrol price was estimated to go up by Rs5.6 per litre depending on the final calculation on Jan 15. Kerosene and diesel prices are expected to rise by about Rs4 and 2 per litre, respectively.

The estimates for higher prices of petroleum products stemmed after bulls returned to the international market last week following US President-elect Donald Trump's threats of strict sanctions on Russian oil and energy exports. The recent prices have risen by up to \$1.2 per barrel since then.

These sources said the average price of HSD and petrol slightly increased in the international market last fortnight, while the refinery cost of kerosene also inched up. Import premiums on petrol and diesel remained unchanged while the exchange rate generally remained stable.

The latest calculation showed a rise of around Rs5.50-6.50 per litre in petrol, Rs2.50 in HSD and Rs4 in kerosene for the next fortnight.

An OGRA official said the diesel price increase could be adjusted within the in-built freight equalisation margin (IFEM) — a mechanism meant for

nationwide uniform prices.

The ex-depot petrol and diesel prices are Rs252.66 and Rs258.34 per litre. Kerosene's official rate is Rs162.95. On Dec 31, the government increased petrol and diesel prices by 50 paise and Rs2.96 per litre, respectively.

Petrol is mainly used in private transport, small vehicles, rickshaws, and two-wheelers, and it directly affects the budget of the middle and lower middle classes. Most of the transport sector runs on HSD. Its price is considered inflationary as it is mostly used in heavy transport vehicles, trains and agricultural engines like trucks, buses, tractors, tube wells and threshers, which adds to the prices of vegetables and other staples.

The government is charging about Rs76 per litre tax on petrol and HSD. Although the general sales tax (GST) is zero on all petroleum products, the government charges Rs40 per litre petroleum development levy on both products that normally impact the masses.

The government also charges about Rs16 per litre customs duty on petrol and HSD, irrespective of their local production or imports. In addition, about Rs17 per litre distribution and sale margins are charged by oil companies and their dealers on both products.

On the other hand, a change of Rs50 per litre on light diesel and high octane blending components and 95RON petrol used by the wealthy in luxury imported vehicles.

Oil prices climb \$2, hits 4-month high

NEW YORK: Oil prices climbed about 2pc on Monday on expectations that wider US sanctions on Russian oil would force buyers in India and China to seek other suppliers.

Recent futures rose \$1.48, or 1.8pc, to \$81.16 a barrel by 11:58 a.m. EST (1618 GMT), while US West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude rose \$2.15, or 2.8pc, to \$78.72.

That put Brent on track for its highest close since Aug. 26 and WTI on track for its highest close since Aug. 12, and kept both benchmarks in technically overbought territory for a second day in a row.

Moreover, with Brent and WTI four-month prices rising around 7pc over the past three trading sessions, the premium of four-month contracts over near-dated futures, known in the energy industry as time spreads, soared to their highest in several months.

The US Treasury imposed wider sanctions on Russian oil producers late last week.—Reuters

Textile parks to boost exports

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar has emphasised the need to establish state-of-the-art textile parks through partnerships with international and domestic investors to boost exports and create jobs.

Chairing a meeting of the Working Group for the Establishment of Textile Parks in Pakistan on Monday, Mr Dar observed that these parks would help diversify the industrial sector in the country.

Mr Dar, who also holds the foreign minister's portfolio, underscored the need

to capitalise on available land in Special Economic Zones (SEZs) by upgrading them into "plug-and-play" facilities to attract immediate industrial investments.

He asked all stakeholders to expedite actionable plans, remove procedural bottlenecks, and align efforts with the government's vision of sustainable economic growth and export enhancement.

The working group, constituted by the prime minister in September last, includes representatives from the Board of Investment (BoI), Ministry of

Industries and Production, Ministry of Commerce, Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC), Economic Affairs Division, and Power Division.

Provincial Coordination Committees of Punjab and Sindh and the Embassy of Pakistan, Beijing, also participated to ensure seamless collaboration.

In September last, the BOVI group of China signed a memorandum of understanding with the BoI to establish a facility to manufacture textile parts of international standard in Pakistan.—Amin Ahmed

Bulls stage 983-point rally on value-hunting

KARACHI: Amid a relative political calm and improved economic outlook, the stock market witnessed an across the board buying spree as attractive valuations, helping the benchmark KSE-100 index staged an impressive rally on Monday.

Ali Najib, Head of Sales at Insight Securities, said it was a clear sky day at PSX as the index soared easily during the trading hours and settled at 114,230, an increase of 983 points or up 0.87 per cent day-on-day.

At first, the benchmark index received some profit-taking but after that selling there was no bumps in the road. Investors did some value-hunting post last week's massive selling as blue-chip stocks were available on attractive price levels offering handsome dividend yields.

Indian PM opens tunnel to zones near China, Pakistan

SRINAGAR: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated a strategic Himalayan road tunnel on Monday, pushing all-weather access northwards towards contested high-altitude border zones with China and Pakistan.

The Z-Morh or Sonmarg tunnel, stretching 6.4km beneath a treacherous mountain pass cut off by snow for between four to six months a year, is part of a wider infra-structure drive in border zones.

It helps connect Indian-held Kashmir with Ladakh, acting as a stepping stone in opening the Srinagar-Ladakh Highway all year round.

"With the opening of the tunnel here, connectivity will significantly improve," Modi said, wrapped in a jacket from the freezing cold after cutting the ribbon on the \$1.3 billion project that has taken a decade to construct.

India and China, the world's two most populous nations, are intense rivals competing for strategic influence across South Asia, and their 3,500km shared frontier has been a perennial source of tension. Their troops clashed in 2020, killing at least 20 Indian and four Chinese soldiers, and forces from both sides today face off across contested high-altitude borderlands.

However, Beijing and New Delhi agreed in October on patrols in disputed areas, shortly before a rare formal meeting — the first in five years — between Chinese President Xi Jinping and Modi.

Another tunnel on the same route, the 13km-long Zaski tunnel, is more than halfway completed and slated to open in 2026, according to the information ministry.

India has also built a \$3.9 billion railway line connecting the lowland plains with occupied Kashmir for the first time, including the construction of the Chenab Rail Bridge, the highest of its kind in the world.

The 27km-long railway begins in the garrison city of Udhampur, headquarters of the Indian army's northern command, and runs through Srinagar. —AFP

Ukraine targeted gas pipeline to Türkiye: Russia

MOSCOW: Russia accused Ukraine on Monday of launching a drone attack on the infrastructure of a major gas pipeline that carries Russian supplies to Europe via Türkiye.

The allegation — which Kyiv has not commented on — comes amid an escalating energy row between the two countries, almost three years after Russia launched its full-scale military offensive.

Kyiv halted the transit of Russian gas via Ukraine on Jan 1 — ending decades of energy cooperation that had brought billions of dollars to both countries — in a bid to cut off revenue for Moscow's army.

The United States last week rolled out fresh sanctions on Russia's oil sector. The Russian defence ministry said Ukraine had fired nine attack drones on Saturday at a gas compressor station in the village of Gai-Kudine, near Russia's southern coast on the Black Sea.

The site is across from the annexed Crimean peninsula — heavily targeted by Kyiv throughout the three-year conflict. —AFP

US to curb AI chip exports in bid to block China's access

New rules update controls on chips, requiring authorisations for exports, re-exports and in-country transfers

WASHINGTON: The United States unveiled new export rules on Monday on chips used for artificial intelligence, furthering efforts to make it tough for China and other rivals to access advanced technology in Joe Biden's final days as president.

The restrictions build on curbs announced in 2023 on exporting certain AI chips to China, which the United States sees as a strategic competitor.

In recent years, Washington has expanded its efforts to curb exports of state-of-the-art chips to China, which can be used in AI and weapons systems, as Beijing's tech

advancements spark concern among policymakers. "The US leads the world in AI now — both AI development and AI chip design — and it's critical that we keep it that way," Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo told reporters.

The new rules update controls on chips, requiring authorisations for exports, re-exports and in-country transfers — while also including a series of exceptions for countries considered friendly to the United States.

AI data centres meanwhile will need to comply with enhanced security parameters to be able to import chips. But the latest move drew industry criticism and warnings that it would hurt US competitiveness.

Semiconductor industry Association chief executive John Nardella said: "We're deeply disappointed that a policy shift of this magnitude and impact is being rushed out the door days before a presidential transition and without

any meaningful input from industry." He added in a statement that the rule could cause "lasting damage to America's economy and global competitiveness" by cooling key markets to rivals.

Chip giant Nvidia said in a blog post that "while cloaked in the guise of an 'anti-China' measure, these rules would do nothing to enhance US security."

Trump decision?

The rules make it "hard for our strategic competitors to use smuggling and remote access to evade our export control," White House National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan said. They also create "incentives for our friends and partners around the world to use trusted vendors for advanced AI," he added. The new rules will take effect in 120 days, Raimondo said, giving the incoming administration of President-elect Donald Trump time to potentially make changes. —AFP

Mali begins seizing gold stocks from Barrick mine

BAKAR: Mali's junta has begun seizing gold stocks from the Loulo-Gounkoto mine operated by Canadian firm Barrick Gold, according to a security source and an internal company memo said on Monday.

Since coming to power in a 2020 coup, Mali's military rulers have promised a fairer distribution of revenue from the lucrative mining industry in the country, stepping up pressure on foreign firms in recent months.

Barrick Gold and the Malian state have been at loggerheads over the underground and open-pit Loulo-Gounkoto site in the country's west — one of the world's largest gold complexes.

Authorities began enforcing a provisional order to seize gold stock at the site on Saturday, Barrick Gold said in a note to local staff. The junta had days earlier issued an interim attachment order against the existing gold stock on site.

Malian authorities sent a helicopter to Loulo-Gounkoto on Saturday to make the seizure, a security official said. When questioned, Barrick Gold referred to a previous statement. The Canadian firm owns 80 per cent of the Loulo-Gounkoto mine, with Mali retaining the rest. The junta has been blocking shipments from the site for more than seven weeks. Last Monday, Barrick Gold said it would be forced to temporarily suspend operations at Loulo-Gounkoto if junta-imposed restrictions were not resolved within the week.

The company reiterated the possibility of halting operations in an internal memo. Authorities charged and detained four Malian employees of Barrick Gold in late November. In December, they issued national arrest warrants for the company's South African CEO and the Malian managing director of Loulo-Gounkoto for "money laundering". —AFP

South Korea's impeached president gets a pay rise

SEOUL: Suspended South Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol will receive a scheduled pay rise, official documents showed on Monday, despite an impeachment trial and investigation into his ill-fated martial law declaration. Yoon suspended civilian rule on Dec 3, sending soldiers into parliament and plunging South Korea into its worst political crisis in decades. He was forced to back-track hours later.

He has been impeached by lawmakers and is awaiting a final Constitutional Court ruling that could finalise his removal from office, while separately facing an investigation probe with investigators working to detain him for questioning. However, Yoon was given a raise, according to the civil servant salary table for 2025, even as he remains held up in the presidential residence using his security detail to resist arrest. The document from the Ministry of Personnel Management indicates Yoon's salary will rise to 26.6 million won (\$178,400) — a three per cent raise compared with last year.

Yoon is only suspended from duty because the impeachment motion is still being deliberated by the Constitutional Court, so he retains his status as president and will be able to receive his salary and security benefits. —AFP

Bangladesh govt files graft cases against Hasina's family

Starmer urged to fire minister hit by Dhaka probe

DELHI: Bangladesh's anti-graft commission has filed cases against ousted leader Sheikh Hasina and her family, including a British government minister and a senior United Nations official, its chief said on Monday.

The cases are linked to an alleged large-scale land grab of lucrative plots in a suburb of the densely populated capital Dhaka. "Sheikh Hasina, in collaboration with some officials, allocated plots for herself and her family members," Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) director general Akhter Hossain told reporters.

Hossain said those named in the case also include Hasina's niece, British anti-corruption

minister Tulip Siddiq. She has insisted she has done nothing wrong. Hasina's daughter Saima Wazed, the World Health Organisation's South East Asia chief, is also listed.

"The ACC investigation team has obtained the necessary documents and found sufficient evidence to file the cases," Hossain said. "They will include relevant details, such as property acquisition while concealing further investigations." Hasina's son, Sajed Wazed Joy is also named, as well as Hasina's sister Sheikh Rehana, Siddiq's mother.

Siddiq referred herself this month to the standards adviser of British Prime Minister Keir Starmer. The referral came after British newspapers the Sunday Times and Financial Times reported that she had lived in properties linked to Hasina's administration.

Starmer under pressure

Starmer on Monday faced fresh pressure to

sack his anti-corruption minister Tulip Siddiq, amid accusations over her family ties to Bangladesh's toppled premier. Earlier this month, the UK minister referred herself to Starmer's standards adviser, following a flurry of allegations including that she lived in properties linked to her aunt and the Awami League party Hasina led.

Asked on Monday whether Siddiq's position in the UK government remained tenable, senior British minister Priti Patel told Sky News she had "done the right thing" with the self-referral.

He insisted the standards adviser had the powers to "carry out investigations into allegations like this". "That is what he is doing, and that is the right way to deal with this," Patel said. But UK opposition politicians want Siddiq fired. "I think it's untenable for her to carry out her role," the Conservative finance spokesman Mel Stride told Times

Radio. "It's inappropriate for Tulip to be in the position that she holds at the moment. She is the anti-corruption minister in government."

'Phish robbery'

In December Siddiq emerged as a named target of a probe by Bangladesh's anti-corruption commission into the alleged embezzlement by Hasina's family of \$5 billion committed to a Russian-funded nuclear power plant.

Money laundering investigators there have since ordered the country's big banks to hand over details of transactions relating to Siddiq as part of the probe. Siddiq is an MP for a north London seat who is part of the finance ministry and responsible for the UK's financial services sector as well as anti-corruption measures.

Over the weekend, a Sunday Times investigation revealed details about the claims that

Siddiq spent years living in a London flat bought by an offshore company connected to two Bangladesh businessmen. The flat was eventually transferred as a gift to a Bangladesh barrister with links to Hasina, her family and her ousted government, according to the newspaper.

It also reported Siddiq and her family were given or used several other London properties bought by members or associates of the Awami League party.

Bangladesh's interim leader, Muhammad Yunus, a Nobel Prize-winning microfinance pioneer who heads a caretaker government, demanded a detailed probe in light of the allegations.

He told the newspaper the proportion could be linked to wider corruption claims against Hasina's toppled government, which he said amounted to the "plain robbery" of billions of dollars from Bangladesh's coffers. —AFP

Climate activists paint over Darwin's grave at Westminster Abbey

LONDON: Climate activists from Just Stop Oil painted over the grave of British naturalist Charles Darwin at Westminster Abbey on Monday.

Two activists entered Westminster Abbey — Britain's site for royal weddings, coronations, burials and a major tourist attraction — and used spray chalk on Darwin's grave, the campaign group said in a statement.

The activists wrote "1.5 is dead" in orange over the surface of the white marble gravestone — a reference to recent news that global temperatures in 2024 had exceeded 1.5 Celsius above the pre-industrial era for the first time.

"We have passed the 1.5 degree threshold that was supposed to keep us safe," one of the activists said. "Darwin would be turning in his grave to know we are in the midst of the sixth mass extinction."

Darwin, best known for his theory of evolution by natural selection, died in 1882. He is buried in Westminster Abbey's Scientists' Corner, where Isaac Newton and Stephen Hawking are also buried. The church confirmed the incident in a statement.

"The Abbey's conservators are taking immediate action to clean the memorial and do not anticipate that there will be any permanent damage," a spokeswoman said.

"The police were called to the scene and dealt with the incident. The Abbey remains open for visiting and worshiping." Just Stop Oil activists have staged a number of high-profile protests in Britain including by disrupting sports and theatre events, gaining over the US embassy building in London and throwing soup at Van Gogh paintings. —Reuters

Biden says US 'stronger' on world stage now than it has been for decades

WASHINGTON: President Joe Biden, in a rare foreign policy speech a week before Donald Trump's White House comeback, has said that America is stronger on the global stage than it has been for decades.

The outgoing US president took aim at Russia, China and Iran, and urged the West to maintain support for Ukraine in an address at the State Department setting out his international legacy.

But Biden's unspoken target was Trump as he touted his rebuilding of international alliances over the last four years after his Republican rival's chaotic first term. "The United States is winning the worldwide competition compared to four years ago," said Biden, after diplomats at the State Department gave him a standing ovation.

"America is stronger. Our alliances are stronger, our adversaries and competitors are weaker."

The Democrat added that America's ties with its allies were the strongest "in decades," and said partners in the National Security alliance were now "paying their fair share".

Trump has repeatedly criticised NATO countries, at one point saying he would encourage Russia to do "whatever the hell it wants" to allies that did not pay their way.

The incoming president has also previously expressed admiration for Russian President Vladimir Putin, but Biden mocked Putin over the progress of Moscow's invasion of Ukraine. "When Putin invaded, he thought he'd conquer Kyiv in a matter of days. The truth is, since that war began I'm the only one that stood in the center of Kyiv, not him," said Biden.

He said the US and its allies "can't walk away" from Ukraine, as which Washington has sent billions of dollars in military aid since the war started in 2022.

China won't 'surprise' US

Biden insisted that China would "never surprise us" and that the United States would remain the world's dominant superpower.

"According to the latest predictions, on China's current course they will never surprise us — period," Biden said.

He added that Washington managed its complex ties with Beijing and that the relationship "never tipped over into conflict" in his four years as president.

Gaza tense

His speech was more restrained on Israel's attacks in Gaza, with his administration facing criticism from within his own party for its continuing support of Israel. But he said a Gaza ceasefire deal was "on the brink" of "finally coming to fruition".

The Democrat also defended another major foreign policy blunder — the fall of Afghanistan's US-backed government to the Taliban and the US withdrawal of 2021. "Looking back, that was the right thing to do. And I believe history will reflect that," Biden said.

The 82-year-old president finally urged the Trump administration to continue Biden's green energy policies, saying climate deniers under Trump were "dead wrong" and "come from a different century".

Biden's foreign policy speech will be followed by a farewell address to the nation from the Oval Office in prime time on Wednesday. —AFP

Iran, European powers hold N-talks ahead of Trump return

GENEVA: Iran and European powers met in Geneva on Monday under a shroud of secrecy to discuss Tehran's nuclear programme, just a week before US President-elect Donald Trump takes office.

They were the second round of talks in less than two months, following a discreet meeting in Geneva last November between Tehran and the three European powers, Britain, France and Germany, known as the E3.

The meeting was largely shrouded in secrecy, with few details revealed about the topics discussed or even the venue of the talks. "The Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister Majid Takht-Ravanji and his counterparts from the E3 met on Monday evening," ISNA news agency reported.

"They discussed issues of mutual interest, including suggestions for lifting sanctions, the nuclear issue and the worrying situation in the region," it added without elaborating. Later, Iran's Deputy Foreign Minister for International Affairs Kaosar Ghazalpour described the talks as "serious, frank, and constructive". "We discussed ideas involving certain details in the sanctuaries and nuclear fields that are needed for a deal," he said in a post on X.

"Biden's administration should be commended and to reach a deal, all parties should create and maintain the appropriate atmosphere. We agreed to continue our dialogue," he added.

Before the meeting, the German foreign ministry said that the talks were "not negotiations" while Iran similarly emphasised that they were merely "consultations". The talks, which will cover a "wide range of topics", Iran's foreign ministry spokesman Esmail Qasbi said.

'Breaking point'

On Thursday, France's foreign ministry said the meeting was a sign that the E3 countries were "continuing to work towards a diplomatic solution to the Iranian nuclear programme, the progress of which is extremely problematic". The talks come with Iran's nuclear programme under renewed focus in light of Trump's return to the White House.

During his first term, Trump pursued a policy of "maximum pressure", withdrawing the US from a landmark nuclear deal which imposed curbs on Iran's nuclear programme in return for sanctions relief. —AFP

Lebanon's president names ICJ judge Salam as PM

Hezbollah terms the move 'complete US coup'

BEIRUT: Lebanon's President Joseph Aoun on Monday picked international jurist Nawaf Salam to form a government for the war-torn country and pull it out of economic crisis.

A majority of Lebanese lawmakers endorsed Nawaf Salam, the presiding judge at the International Court of Justice in The Hague, after two years of caretaker governments.

"The president of the republic called on Judge Nawaf Salam to take him with forming a government, knowing that he is currently abroad. It has been decided he will return tomorrow," the presidency said.

Aoun, whose election last week ended a two-year vacancy for the post, held consultations with lawmakers ahead of announcing his nominee. By Monday afternoon, 84 members of parliament told Aoun they backed Salam, according to a tally by Lebanese media, with nine endorsing Najib Mikati who has served as prime minister in a caretaker capacity.

Aoun's election last week was made possible in part by the weakening of Hezbollah in a war with Israel. With the prime minister named by the president, the eastern Mediterranean country has been run by a caretaker government for more

than two years amid a crushing economic crisis.

Under Lebanon's power-sharing system, the president must be a Maronite Christian, the prime minister a Sunni, and the parliament speaker a Shia.

'Change'

Salam's backers view the judge and former ambassador as an impartial figure able to carry out much-needed reforms, a contrast to Mikati regarded by critics as under Hezbollah's influence.

Lawmaker George Adwan of Christian party the Lebanese Forces said after meeting Aoun and endorsing Salam that it was time for Hezbollah to focus on "political work". "The era of weapons is over," Adwan told reporters.

Hezbollah ended a deadly war against Israel this autumn truce and weakened.

Under a ceasefire deal, the group must pull its fighters from areas of southern Lebanon near the Israeli border as the national army — until last week under Aoun's command — and UN peacekeepers deploy there.

Hezbollah also lost a key ally in neighbouring Syria when religious-led forces toppled president Bashar al-Assad last month. Independent lawmaker Methum Khalaf said he backed Salam as a candidate of change.

A source close to Hezbollah said

that the movement and its ally Amal movement supported Mikati. The Monday front page of *Al-Malah*, a newspaper close to Hezbollah, said Salam's nomination would be tantamount to a "complete US coup", after Washington had backed Aoun for president.

'Two options'

In his inaugural speech on Thursday, Aoun said his election as president would usher in a "new phase" for the country. Lebanese university professor Ali Almad said support for Salam's nomination reflected "the real changes that Lebanon is experiencing".

"Today there are two options in the country: a serious reform option, called Nawaf Salam, and an option that takes us back, called Najib Mikati," he said.

Some opposition lawmakers on Saturday threw their weight behind anti-Hezbollah lawmaker and businessman Fouad Makhlouf, but on Monday he withdrew to allow consensus around Salam. Whoever heads Lebanon's new government will face major challenges, including implementing reforms to satisfy international donors amid the country's worst economic crisis in its history.

They will also face the daunting task of reconstructing swathes of the country after the Israeli-Hezbollah war and implementing the Nov 27 ceasefire agreement. —AFP

Nigeria's air force says it killed 16 civilians by mistake

MAIDUGURI: Nigeria's air force said it was investigating reports of civilian casualties during a weekend air strike that targeted armed gangs in the northwest, the latest military operation where innocent people may have been accidentally killed.

The army and air force have increasingly tried aerial assaults against the growing threat in the northwest and central region posed by armed criminal gangs, known locally as bandits, that kill villagers and carry out mass kidnappings.

Nigeria's Air Force (NAF) spokesperson Air Vice Marshal Olusola Akintoyewa said late on Sunday an air strike in northwestern Zamfara state on Saturday had targeted bandits, and that the air force had managed to rescue kidnapped victims. But residents said that at least 15 civilians, including local security guards, were killed.

An investigation into the matter was being conducted, Akintoyewa said in a statement. Air strikes have inadvertently killed civilians before.

In December, at least 50 people were killed after a military fighter jet pursuing bandits mistakenly bombed civilians in northwestern Sokoto state. Akintoyewa said the NAF would work to minimise and prevent any harm to civilians and civilian infrastructure in its operations.

Nigeria's Chief of Defence Staff General Christopher Musa told local television on Monday that the military did not intentionally target civilians and that the Zamfara incident would be fully investigated. —Reuters

unflinching support of the armed forces and law enforcement agencies in nation's fight against militancy and agreed on the need for a unified front beyond political colours against the extremist philosophy of militant groups, ISPR said.

Security briefing

to light through a 2014 report revealing that over 3,400 girls in Rajasthan were groomed and stayed between 1997 and 2013. Similar cases were reported in other towns, such as Odisha.

Authorities faced criticism for failing to address the ethnic dimensions of the crimes, fearing accusations of racism.

Mukh announced Sharma of being "complicit in the rape of Britain" by not prosecuting offenders more effectively during his leadership of the Crown Prosecution Service. While Sharma defended his record, Mukh's remarks fuelled divisive political discourse and calls for a national inquiry.

Amid the growing controversy, Pakistan's PD emphasised the positive contributions of British Pakistanis, who it said have played a vital role in the UK's growth and cultural enrichment.

"British nationals of Pakistani origin have a rich history of contributing to the United Kingdom's growth, development and, indeed, freedom," the statement said. It also highlighted the sacrifices of Muslim soldiers from present-day Pakistan during the two World Wars and the community's current role in the UK's health, retail,

and service sectors.

British Pakistanis also hold significant positions in public life, including as members of parliament, councillors, and police officers, the statement noted. "Their cuisine and music enrich British culture," it added.

Pakistan reaffirmed its commitment to its "norms" and "robust" relationship with the UK, emphasising the importance of countering divisive narratives. "We note with deep concern the increasingly racist and Islamophobic political and media commentary in the UK that is aimed at conflating the reprehensible actions of a few individuals with the entire 1.7 million British Pakistani diaspora," the statement said, calling for fair characterisation of Pakistani origin community.

The PD remarks come as British leaders grapple with balancing demands for accountability over growing xenophobia and concerns about fading xenophobia.

Despite the controversy, Pakistan urged both countries to focus on shared values and mutual respect, implying that inflammatory rhetoric could damage the longstanding ties between the two countries.

After that the third round would be a step forward towards finding a solution as the PTI will present its demands in writing to the committee. "Submission of written demands will itself be a breakthrough," he said, adding that the atmosphere for the talks was peaceful and conducive.

Before this, two meetings have taken place, but without any significant progress. A source said that in the third meeting, the PTI could demand the formation of a judicial commission over the events of May 9 and its repercussions.

Senator Irfan Siddiqi, who is a member of the government committee, said that the PTI would present its demands in writing in the third meeting.

"We have to see whether these will be the only demands or if they will also suggest ways to implement them. For example, if they (PTI) demand the formation of a judicial commission, will they also suggest the terms of reference of the commission?" he asked.

The senator said the PTI took 42 days to submit its demands and it should not expect that the government would act promptly.

"We will share these demands with all coalition partners and seek their opinion, and then the final reply will be given," he added. He said the government thought that the PTI would share its demands with the National Assembly speaker, but it seemed the opposition party would table them in the committee meeting.

Celebrations in Wad Madani as Sudan's army takes over strategic city

Power outages in the country after drone attack on major dam

WAD MADANI/PORT SUDAN: Civilians and soldiers celebrated in Wad Madani, the capital of Sudan's El Gharbia state, after it was recaptured by the Sudanese army from the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF), marking a possible turning point in a devastating more than two-year civil war.

"We are so happy, we can't express ourselves," said one woman on Sunday, as soldiers shot into the air and people cheered on the streets. "A whole year we have been agonised, we haven't been able to breathe."

The war began in the capital Khartoum in April 2023 over the integration of the Sudan Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). It has created one of the world's largest humanitarian crises, pushing more than 12 million people out of their homes, and plunging half of the population into hunger.

The RSF's occupation of El Gharbia turned the fertile state into one at risk of famine. Its tight-knit villages were emptied out by violent raids as

fields lay fallow or were set on fire, residents and eyewitnesses have said. The RSF denies the accusations and says it is fighting rogue actors who are committing abuses.

The army's ability to regain full control of the state would be pivotal in its attempts to choke the RSF's supply lines to Khartoum and the army-controlled eastern half of the country. The RSF still controls most of the capital.

"The KAF's capture of Wad Madani boosts its own morale and puts large RSF contingents at risk of encirclement in the area," said Jalel Harbouch, an associate fellow at the London-based Royal United Services Institute. "It also forces the KAF to intensify pressure on Khartoum before potentially shifting its focus westward," he said, while warning that the RSF could launch a counteroffensive on al-Fashir, the army's last remaining holdout in the western Darfur region.

"This is a big victory that we thank God for, but we are not stopping, we are going on with it, we are in a hurry, and God willing, soon every inch of Sudan will be cleansed," General Shams al-Din Kaddadhi, deputy leader of the armed forces, told troops and civilians in Madani.

The bodies of RSF soldiers could be seen on the road and bridge lead-

ing into the city, but eyewitnesses reported few clashes inside Madani. The relatively swift takeover comes after weeks of advances by the army in surrounding villages, newly equipped in recent months with fresh armaments and new recruits to allied forces.

The Joint Forces, a collection of former rebel groups, as well as Sudan Shield, led by RSF defector Abusagla Keikhal, participated in the recapturing of Wad Madani. The RSF chose to withdraw after being overwhelmed in the lead-up to the takeover, sources in the paramilitary said. They added that its soldiers were exhausted by airstrikes and by dwindling stocks of ammunition and supplies.

Engulfed electrical infrastructure

As forces were celebrating the recapture of capital of Sudan's El Gharbia state, the seat of Sudan's army-aligned government, however, battled power outages on Monday after a drone attack damaged on paramilitaries hit a major hydroelectric dam in the western country's north, eyewitnesses said.

The Sudanese army, at war with the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) since April 2023, said in a statement that the attack on Merowe Dam was part of a "systematic campaign" against military

sites but also targeting "vital" infrastructure.

Eyewitness in Port Sudan on the Red Sea, where the army-aligned government and the United Nations have been based since the war's early days, said widespread power outages have persisted since early Monday.

The army said that Merowe Dam and its power station, located about 350 kilometres north of the capital Khartoum and serving Port Sudan and other areas, were hit by "a number of suicide drones".

"Some houses were damaged, which will be repaired," the army statement said. "Online footage showed fires engulfing the dam's electrical infrastructure. Since the early morning attack, local media said that the army-controlled cities of Albara, Dongola and Omdurman — across the Nile from Khartoum — have also been hit by power outages."

In November last year, the army accused the RSF of targeting Merowe with 16 drones, though no casualties or significant damage were reported at the time. The dam is one of Sudan's biggest sources of hydroelectric power. Merowe city, in Sudan's Northern State, is also home to a major military airport.

The latest attack came two days after the army recaptured Wad

Madani, the capital of the central state of Al-Jazira, after more than a year of paramilitary control.

In addition to decimating Sudan's already fragile infrastructure, the war has claimed the lives of tens of thousands of people, uprooted more than 12 million and pushed many Sudanese to the brink of famine.

They withdrew northwards towards other towns in the state and

Khartoum, eyewitnesses said, chased by army airstrikes. Fierce fighting could be expected as the RSF fights to maintain control of Khartoum, where the army has made gains, the RSF sources said. Many of the paramilitary's fighters come from militias and tribal groups outside of Khartoum and had little will to fight for the country's centre, the RSF sources added. —Agencies

‘Breakthrough’ in talks as Gaza truce deal draft finalised

Norway to host 3rd meeting of Global Alliance seeking two-state solution

DOHA: Mediator Qatar gave Israel and Hamas a final draft of a deal to end the war in Gaza on Monday, after a mid-night “breakthrough” in talks attended by US President-elect Donald Trump’s envoy, an official briefed on the negotiations said.

The official said the text for a ceasefire and the release of hostages was hammered out at talks in Doha which included the chiefs of Israel’s Mossad and Shin Bet spy agencies and Qatar’s prime minister as well as Steve Witkoff, who will become US envoy when Trump takes office next week. Officials from the outgoing US administration are also thought to have participated.

“The next 24 hours will be pivotal to reaching the deal,” the official said.

Israel’s Kan radio, citing an Israeli official, reported on Monday that Israeli and Hamas delegations in Qatar had received a draft and that the Israeli delegation had briefed Israeli leaders. Israel, Hamas and the foreign ministry of Qatar did not respond to requests for confirmation or comment.

Officials on both sides, while stopping short of confirming that a final draft had been reached, described progress at the talks.

A senior Israeli official said a deal could be sealed within a few days if Hamas replies to a proposal. A Palestinian official close to the talks said information from Doha was “very promising”, adding: “Gaps were being narrowed and there is a big push toward an agreement if all goes well to the end.” The United States, Qatar and Egypt have worked for more than a year on talks to end the war in Gaza.

De facto deadline

Trump’s Jan 20 inauguration is now widely seen in the region as a de facto deadline. The US president-elect has said there would be “bail to pay” unless hostages held by Hamas are freed before he takes office, while outgoing President Joe Biden has also pushed hard for a deal before his leaves.

The official said talks went until the early hours of Monday, with Witkoff pushing the Israeli delegation to Doha and Qatar Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani pushing Hamas officials to finalise an agreement.

The head of Egypt’s general intelligence agency Hossam Mohamed Badahy was also in the Qatar capital as part of the talks, the official said.

Trump envoy Witkoff has travelled to Qatar and Israel several times since late November. He was in Doha on Friday and travelled to Israel to meet Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Saturday before returning to Doha.

Biden also spoke on Sunday by phone with Netanyahu, stressing “the immediate need for a ceasefire in Gaza and return of the hostages with a surge in humanitarian aid enabled by a stoppage in the fighting under the deal”, the White House said.

Two-state solution

In a related development, dozens of countries will send delegations to Norway on Wednesday as part of a global alliance aiming to find a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, Norway’s foreign ministry said on Monday.

Palestinian Prime Minister Mohammed Mustafa, the head of the UN’s Palestinian refugee agency UNRWA, Philippe Lazzarini, and UN envoy to the Middle East Tor Wennesland are among those due to attend.

It will be the third meeting of the Global Alliance for the Implementation of the Two-State Solution, whose creation was announced in September on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly in New York.

“While we must continue to work for an end to the war (in Gaza), we must also work for a lasting solution to the conflict that guarantees self-determination, security and justice for both the Palestinians and the Israelis,” Norway’s Foreign Minister Inger Lise Støre said in a statement.

Representatives of more than 80 countries and organisations are expected to take part in the meeting, though no official Israeli delegation has been announced.

Israel was angered when several countries — including Norway — decided to recognise the Palestinian state, an agency

FIA begins process to seize properties of human traffickers

GUJRAT: In line with recent directions by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) has initiated the process of confiscating properties of those involved in human trafficking, Dawn has learnt.

The action, initiated under the Anti-Money Laundering Act (AMLA) 2010, mainly targets those booked in human trafficking and other related cases, as well as suspects already in FIA custody.

The AMLA gives investigation officers the power to send a reference for the seizure of a suspect’s property to the anti-money laundering cell at the directorate level, which can then initiate the process by obtaining the assent of the concerned magistrate within a few days.

Last week, DM Shehbaz Sharif had directed the officials concerned to expedite the prosecution process against all those involved in human smuggling effectively.

He ordered the authorities to appoint top lawyers for prosecution in consultation with the law ministry, and assigned the Foreign Office to contact the relevant states to expedite the extradition of the Pakistanis allegedly running human trafficking operations abroad.

Sources in the local land revenue department in various districts of Gujranwala region confirmed the confiscation of the properties in their respective districts.

An FIA source said that initially, the properties and assets of those human traffickers involved in the recent Greek boat tragedy, would be seized in the first phase, followed by similar action against those

involved in the June 2023 boat tragedy, off the Libyan coast, as these incidents had caused the deaths of dozens of illegal immigrants intending to travel towards Europe.

Official sources explained assets were being seized in Sialkot, Gujrat, Mandi Bahaudin and Gujranwala districts, since most of the traffickers hailed from these zones of Central Punjab.

The authorities have already identified human traffickers belonging to the Jajja network of Sialkot’s Pastor school. In Mandi Bahaudin, alleged human trafficker Asif Saloomi and his associates in Hedian village and other such agents were among those whose properties were marked for confiscation by the FIA.

The FIA claimed to have arrested at least two more human traffickers involved in the recent Greece tragedy, which claimed the lives of at least 40 Pakistanis on Dec 14, 2024.

The arrests have been made from Gujrat and Hafizabad districts by the FIA crime circle, Gujrat.

According to a senior FIA official, the prime suspect in the human smuggling network was identified as Imran Shakkor, a resident of Bhaddar village in Kharian taluk of Gujrat.

The official said the suspect was successfully tracked down and apprehended after his accomplice, Zain Ali, was arrested already in the same case from Sakhi area of Hafizabad district on Saturday the last.

Another suspected human trafficker Zahir Iqbal, resident of Mandi Bahaudin, was arrested for allegedly extorting Rs700,000 from a man promising him to send his son to Italy for overseas employment.

Geopolitics making cybersecurity challenges more complex: WEF

The global cybersecurity challenges have become more profound and complex due to geopolitical tensions, a new World Economic Forum (WEF) report says.

“Global Cybersecurity Outlook 2025” published on Monday said cybersecurity is entering an era of unprecedented complexity as geopolitical tensions are intensifying, new technologies are emerging at breakneck speed and threats are becoming more sophisticated.

Nearly 60 per cent of organisations stated that geopolitical tensions have affected their cybersecurity strategy, as per the report.

The geopolitical turmoil has also affected the perception of risks, with one in three CEOs citing cyber espionage and loss of sensitive information / intellectual property (IP) theft as their top concern. Around 49pc cyber leaders expressed concerns about the disruption of operations and business processes.

“The rapid adoption of

emerging technologies is contributing to new vulnerabilities and new threats.”

The report called for a shift in perspective from cybersecurity to enhanced cyber resilience — the ability to mitigate the impact of significant cyber incidents on its goals and objectives.

The WEF report underscored the importance of evaluating cyber risks from a socioeconomic perspective to effectively allocate resources and strengthen resilience against these threats.

At the same time, expanding regulatory demands, vulnerabilities in interwoven supply chains and a widening cyber skills gap are exacerbating the challenges organisations face in staying secure, the report said.

The reports added that 66pc of organisations expect artificial intelligence to have the most significant impact on cybersecurity in years to come and 32pc reported having processes in place to assess the security of AI tools before deployment.

The growing complexity of cyberspace is “exac-

erating cyber insecurity, widening the gap between large and small organisations, deepening the divide between developed and emerging economies”.

Some 35pc of small organisations believe their cyber resilience is inadequate, a proportion that has increased sevenfold since 2022.

This disparity in cyber resilience is further highlighted by regional differences in preparedness, the report said, adding that only 15pc of respondents in Europe and North America lack confidence in their country’s ability to respond to major cyber incidents. In contrast, the proportion was 34pc in Africa and 42pc in Latin America.

The public sector is disproportionately affected, with 34pc of respondents reporting insufficient resilience, compared to just 10 per cent of medium-to-large private sector organisations.

This insecurity extended to the cyber workforce, with 49pc of public-sector organisations indicating they lack the necessary talent to meet their cyber security goals.

Justice Shah wonders if ‘non-CB’ judges can be prevented from hearing constitutional matters

ISLAMABAD: Justice Syed Mansoor Ali Shah, the senior justice judge of the Supreme Court, wondered on Monday whether judges who were not part of SC’s constitutional bench could be prevented from hearing cases that involve constitutional interpretation, in the wake of the recently adopted 24th amendment.

The observation came during the hearing of an appeal moved by the federal government’s revenue division against a Sindh High Court (SHC) judgement, challenging the view of the tax regulatory duty. Headed by Justice Shah, the three-judge bench also consisting of Justice Ayaz A. Malik and Justice Irfan Usman had taken up the appeal.

The SHC had struck down Section 221(2) of the Customs Tax Act 1969.

Senior counsel Salimuddin Ahmed told DAWN that during the hearing, Justice Shah said the court would frame a set of questions and would be requiring the counsel’s assistance.

At the outset, Justice Shah wondered would the appeal go to the constitutional bench or the regular bench, asking if the present bench could hear the matter since the case requires interpretation of legal and constitutional provisions.

“Is it possible that the judges of the Supreme Court are kept

deprived of hearing constitutional matters?” Justice Shah observed, adding that lawyers could take their time in responding to the court’s queries.

Justice Shah observed that the jurisdiction of ordinary benches had been taken away through Article 191A. “We have to see whether the jurisdiction could be taken away or not,” he remarked. It also involved the question of independence of judiciary, he added.

“We already have a team looking at reorganising LA 2.0,” he said.—APP

Officials fear LA fire will take ‘dangerous turn’ today

Frustrated evacuees told they can’t return home before Thursday

LOS ANGELES: Firefighters were battling massive wildfires on Monday that have ravaged Los Angeles and killed 24 people, with officials warning of incoming dangerous winds that could whip up the flames further.

The fires ripped through the second-largest city in the United States for the seventh day, reducing whole communities to scorched rubble and leaving thousands without homes.

Massive firefighting efforts have stemmed the spread of the Palmdale Fire, which was burning toward upscale Brentwood and the densely populated San Fernando Valley.

But conditions are not dramatic-

cally worsen, with “extreme fire behaviour and life threatening conditions” over the coming days.

Winds up to 110 kilometres per hour mean a “particularly dangerous situation” will occur on Tuesday, said National Weather Service meteorologist Rose Schneider.

Those gusts could fan flames and whip up embers from existing burn zones into new areas, firefighters warned.

A fire department official in Los Angeles said his department had received new water trucks and firefighters from far afield and was primed to face the renewed threat.

Asked whether hydrants could run dry again, as they did during the initial outbreak of fires last week, Mayor Karen Bass replied: “I believe the city is prepared.”

There was frustration for evacuees who were told they would not be returning home until Thursday

when winds subside.

Some have stayed for hours in

the hope of getting back to homes they fled to pick up medication or a

change of clothes.

But Sheriff Robert Luna said on Sunday escorts into those areas were being suspended because of the winds and dangerous conditions among the wreckage, as well as the need to retrieve victims’ bodies.

Teams with cadaver dogs were carrying out grid searches with the grim expectation that the confirmed death toll would rise.

Several more arrests of looters were made, including one burglar who had dived as a firefighter tried from flames.

Nighttime curfews in evacuated zones have been extended and additional National Guard resources have been requested.

A fire in Palmdale, an upscale neighbourhood, has consumed 23,500 acres and was just 13 per cent contained.

Video footage showed “fire tornadoes”, red-hot spirals that occur when a blaze is so intense it creates

its own weather system.

But containment of the 14,000-acre fire in Eaton, a neighbourhood in Altadena, had improved, with 27 per cent of its perimeter controlled.

The medical examiner of Los Angeles county published a list of fatalities without giving details of any identities. Eight of the dead were found in the Palmdale fire zone, and 16 in the Eaton zone, the document said.

The sudden rush of people seeking somewhere to live has posed a growing problem for the city, with reports of illegal price gouging from opportunistic landlords.

California Governor Gavin Newsom vowed the city would rebuild, saying there would be a “Marshall plan” — a reference to the US support that put Europe back on its feet after World War II.

“We already have a team looking at reorganising LA 2.0,” he said.—APP

Djokovic joins Alcaraz, Sinner in Australian Open second round

MELBOURNE: Novak Djokovic survived a scare in his quest for tennis history before following Carlos Alcaraz and defending champion Jannik Sinner into the second round of the Australian Open on Monday.

But Greek former finalist Stefanos Tsitsipas and home favourite Nick Kyrgios both fell at the first hurdle, with the combative Australian going out a-weeping and in pain.

In the women's draw, Iga Swiatek and Coco Gauff powered through with minimum fuss as they launched their bids to dethrone two-time defending champion Aryna Sabalenka.

Another winner was two-time Australian Open champion Naomi Osaka, who defeated France's Caroline Garcia 6-3, 3-6, 6-3.

On a blockbuster second day in Melbourne, Djokovic lost the first set to 107th-ranked American Nicholas Pietrangeli in the prime-time evening match on Rod Laver Arena.

But the Serbian great, hoping to roll back the years and win an 18th Australian Open and record 25th Grand Slam singles title, recovered to ease through 4-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

In front of new coach and former rival Andy Murray, Djokovic struggled to raise a smile in the immediate aftermath.

"At the end it was great but I think he was the better player for a set and a half," said the 37-year-old.

Italian world number one Sinner was warmly welcomed on Rod Laver Arena before defeating Chile's Nicolas Pietrangeli 7-6(7/5), 6-1.

Sinner is playing under a cloud after twice testing positive for traces of a steroid in March.

He denies wrongdoing and was cleared by tennis authorities, but the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) appealed and is seeking to ban him for up to two years.

"I was curious to see how it was. You never know what's happening," he said about the reception.

"I was happy about the crowd," added Sinner, who has not tested defeat since losing to Alcaraz in the Beijing final in October.

Alcaraz, a four-time Grand Slam champion but never a winner in Melbourne, had a couple of hairy moments before seeing off Kazakhstan's Alexander Shevchenko, 6-1, 7-5, 6-1.

"This is a tournament I really want to win one day, hopefully this year," said the 21-year-old Spaniard.

There was disappointment for home fans as the colourful but temperamental Kyrgios, only recently back from 18 months out with injury, lost 7-6(7/5), 6-3, 7-6(7/5) to Britain's Jacob Peralta.

Kyrgios spoke to physics multiple times in the second set after winning in pain while serving and fired explosives at his coaching line.

The 11th-seeded Tsitsipas became the first major casualty when Alex Michelsen blasted past him 7-5, 6-3, 2-6, 6-4.

The 26-year-old Greek, who played Djokovic in the 2023 final at Melbourne Park, never looked comfortable against the 41st-ranked American.

"It just sucks in a way that I'll be hanging around for quite a while now before my next tournament comes in," said Tsitsipas.

Two-time US Open semi-finalist Frances Tiafoe visited twice on court before pulling through in five sets against Frenchman Arthur Rinderknecht.

The women's draw provided few upsets on day two.

Red-hot world number three Gauff laid down a marker as she swept aside former Melbourne champion and fellow American Sofia Kenin.

Gauff is seeking this year after leading the US to United Cup glory and ended past the 2020 Australian Open winner 6-3, 6-3 in 80 minutes.

"I knew it was going to be difficult, but you know, I'm happy with how I played," said Gauff, the 2024 US Open champion.

World number two Swiatek defeated Czech doubles specialist Katerina Siniakova 6-1, 6-4 to get her tournament up and running.

The Pole has won five Grand Slams but her best performance at Melbourne Park is the semi-finals in 2022.

"For sure it wasn't an easy first round, so I'm happy that I'm through," said Swiatek.

US Open finalist Jessica Pegula, the seventh-seeded American, blew away home player Maya Joint 6-1, 6-0.

Victoria Azarenka, the 2012 and 2013 champion, was a notable early loser as the Belarusian went down 6-2, 7-6(7/5) to Italy's Lucia Bronzetti 6-1, 7-5, 6-1.

Ex-world champion Fury retires again

LONDON: Former world heavyweight champion Tyson Fury said Monday he had retired from boxing just weeks after suffering a second straight defeat at the hands of Oleksandr Usyk.

"I'm going to make this short and sweet," the British fighter said in a social media post. "I'd like to announce my retirement from boxing."

"It's been a blast, I've loved every single minute of it," added Fury, who has, however, previously performed a number of U-turns over his future in the ring.

The "Gypsy King", 36, last fought on Dec 21 when he lost his rematch against Usyk in Riyadh.

Asked after the fight whether the public would see him fight again, Fury said: "You might see, you might not see. Who knows?"

Fury enjoyed two stints as heavyweight champion and retired with a record of 34 wins, two defeats and one draw.

He announced he was quitting after beating Dillian Whyte in April 2022 but returned to action later that year.

Frank Warren, who promotes Fury, told the BBC he had not spoken to the boxer prior to his retirement announcement.

"I've said all along that there is no way I will be trying in any way to influence him," Warren said. "If that's what he wants to do, that's great. He's done everything he can do."

Probably been the best British heavyweight of his generation by far.

"Two-time world champion, two closely fought fights against Usyk. He's got plenty of money, got his wife about him, got a lovely family. God bless him, enjoy."

Fury was beaten by Usyk on all three judges' scorecards by 116-112 in Saudi Arabia last month.

The Ukrainian won their first fight in May 2024 by split decision.

Fury's retirement appears to mean he will not take on another former world champion, Anthony Joshua, in an all-British showdown.—AFP

Cummins to lead Australia at CT

MELBOURNE: Pat Cummins will captain Australia at the Champions Trophy after being named in a preliminary 15-man squad also featuring fellow quick Josh Hazlewood on Tuesday.

Cummins will skip the Test series in Sri Lanka in January and early February for personal reasons but will return to Australia's colours for the one-day international tournament being played in Pakistan and UAE from Feb 19.

Hazlewood missed the last two Tests in the recent series triumph over India because of calf and side injuries but will reunite with Cummins and Mitchell Starc in the pace attack that has helped Australia to multiple successes over the last decade.

There was no place in the squad for opener Jake Fraser-McGurk, who has been short of runs, but otherwise the squad had a familiar feel with all but three of the team that won the 50-over World Cup in 2023 included.

All-rounders Matt Short and Aaron Hardie as well as quick bowler Nathan Ellis are the least experienced international players in the squad with less than a dozen ODIs each.

"This is a balanced and experienced squad," head selector George Bailey said in a news release. "It offers a variety of options for team management depending on opposition and the conditions that may present in Pakistan."

The Champions Trophy, which Australia won in 2006 and 2009, was last played in 2017.

The ninth edition of the tournament will run from Feb 19 to March 9 mostly in Pakistan with only the matches involving India taking place in the UAE for political reasons.

Australia have been drawn with Afghanistan, England and South Africa for the opening group stage.

Nortje back in SA squad for Champions Trophy

JOHANNESBURG: Fast bowler Anrich Nortje was on Monday named in South Africa's 15-man squad for the ICC Champions Trophy One-day international tournament in Pakistan next month.

Nortje, 31, has not played in a 50-over match since September 2023 when he suffered a stress fracture.

He came back to be South Africa's most successful bowler in the T20 World Cup last year but has not played an international match since the final against India in Barbados. He turned down a Cricket South Africa contract in order to play T20 franchise cricket.

Nortje had been due to play in white-ball matches against Pakistan last month but suffered a broken right toe while batting in the test.

Coach Rob Walter said he was confident Nortje would be in peak physical condition for the Champions Trophy.

"He was at our camp in Pretoria looking really quickly," said Walter. "He was superb and super-emergent to be playing for South Africa again and it was just one of those unfortunate circumstances. Anrich is the ultimate professional, he looks after himself and takes care of his conditioning. I've got no doubt he'll be

good to go."

Follow fast bowler Lungi Ngidi will also return after recovering from the groin injury which kept him out of South Africa's home international season.

Ten of the squad played in the 2023 World Cup in India, where Walter said the team had "played exceptional cricket" to reach the semi-finals.

While South Africa's quest for a major trophy continues, Walter said a core group of players would benefit from reaching the semi-finals and final of their last two international Cricket Council events.

"They know what it feels like to be in the candidate," he said.

South Africa will play in a tri-series tournament in Pakistan against the hosts and New Zealand ahead of the Champions Trophy but are likely to have to select some different players because of a clash with the closing stages of the SA20 franchise tournament.

Anderson to play on for Lancashire

LONDON: England's record Test wicket-taker James Anderson has agreed a new one-year contract with Lancashire that takes him past his 43rd birthday, the county side announced on Monday.

The veteran pacer has not played since an emotional farewell to Test cricket against the West Indies at Lord's in July 2024 but reportedly said he still had something to offer as a player.

Anderson bowed out of Test duty

with 704 wickets — the most taken by a seamer in the history of the format and the highest number by an England bowler of any type.

He has since had several spells acting as a mentor to England's quicks, but the urge to play remains strong even though he went unselected in the recent Indian Premier League season.

"I am incredibly excited to sign this contract with Lancashire and resume playing professional cricket

again next season," said Anderson, who turns 43 in July.

"This club has played a huge part in my life since I was a teenager, so to have the opportunity to wear the Red Rose again and help the side in both red and white ball cricket is one that I am really looking forward to."

Lancashire's first County Championship match in the 2025 season is against Middlesex at Lord's, starting on April 4.—AFP

Lategan wins Dakar stage eight to consolidate lead

RIYADH: Toyota's Henk Lategan of South Africa consolidated his lead atop the driver standings of the Dakar Rally by winning the eighth stage on Monday.

The 30-year-old, in his fourth Dakar outing, covered the 487km special between Al-Dhahran and Riyadh in the 51min 54sec.

Lategan, who also won the Jan 3 prologue, extended his lead over home hero Youssef al-Kahtani to 5min 41sec in the general classification.

Despite a two-minute penalty for speeding on the stage, Lategan finished the day's driving 1min 47sec ahead of competitor Guy Boucher, also in a Toyota.

"There was one canyon where everybody was getting lost," said Lategan. "And we were a little bit nervous going

into there because you see cars coming from the front and cars coming from all angles out the mountains."

"At the end, we went all the way out the canyon and then finally found our way. So we stepped from, let's say, one step or so on the road all the way to first. And then we were opening for quite a while."

"And then we made one or two small navigation errors. We had a puncture earlier on. So, not a bad day. We're happy to have found that one waypoint, but not the perfect day."

France's Matthieu Barrois (Century) presented an all-South African podium by finishing third, five seconds ahead of Brian Baragwanath.

Qatar's five-time champion Nasser al-Attiyah completed the stage 12min 17sec off

Lategan's pace and rose six fourth in the standings, at 14min 14sec.

Sweden's Mattias Ekström is third.

"It was a very tough day," said Attiyah, who has seen fellow rivals Carlos Sainz and Sebastian Loeb withdraw from the grueling race.

"Sometimes when we were opening it was very difficult. Youssef had a good time and when he passed we just followed him, until the dunes when we passed him, but it was really difficult. I am happy to finish this day. We still have four days left and the navigation was very hard. Sometimes we were lucky, other times not, but we made it here."

Argentinian Luciano Benavides (KTM) won the 14th category's stage, 2min

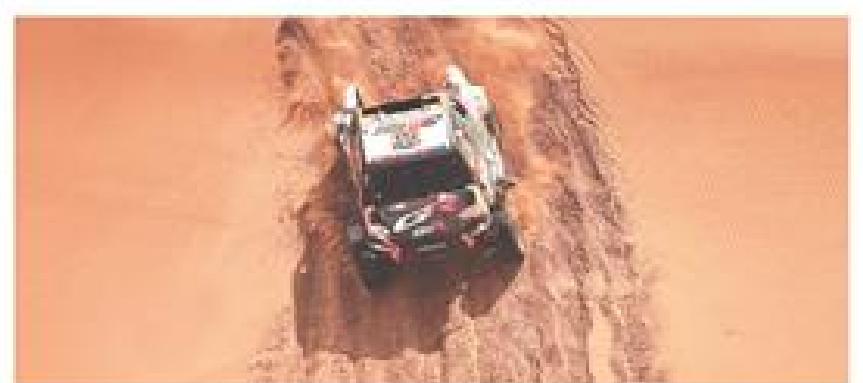
08sec ahead of French rider Adrien Van Beveren.

Spain's Toshia Scharreus was third, while Australian Daniel Sanders retained the overall lead by just over 11 minutes.

Scharreus had initially been named provisional stage winner, but Benavides and Van Beveren were recorded with the time spent assisting Chilean Pablo Quintanilla, who fell after 133km and was forced to withdraw due to a shoulder injury.

"Opening a lot of the stage was good and I had a really good rhythm," said Sanders. "I think tomorrow's going to be the last difficult navigation day before we head down to the Empty Quarter."

Tuesday's stage nine features a 357km special from Riyadh to Haradh.—AFP

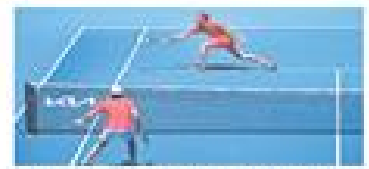

Luxury car, Rs12.9m recovered in trader kidnap case: IO

KARACHI: An anti-terrorism court was on Monday informed that investigators had recovered Rs12.9 million and a "luxury" car allegedly purchased with the ransom money paid by a cryptocurrency trader to his kidnappers to earn freedom.

The investigating officer of the case informed the court that the suspects held in the case, including two Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) officials, had transferred the ransom money to a bank and later used the amount to purchase a luxury sedan (Mercedes-Benz), which had been recovered.

On Monday, the IO brought the eight suspects — CTD constables Ali Sajid and Muhammad Umar, along with Harris Ashar, Muhammad Rizwan Shah, Noman Riffat, Tariq Hassan Shah, Musammi Raza and Umar Jilani — before the administrative judge of the ATCs in CTD for extension in their remand.

The IO informed the court that the police had recovered a Mercedes-Benz car purchased with the ransom money and an amount of cash from the suspects.

He also informed the court that complainant Anwar Malik had identified the two suspects before the judicial magistrate (West) and assigned their roles in the commission of the offence.

The IO requested the court to extend their physical remand as he needed to interrogate them and apprehend the absconding suspects — Hamad, Zameer, Musammi, Ali Raza, Rashid Lodhi and others.

After hearing the IO, the court extended their police custody for five more days.

Meanwhile, according to a press statement, a team formed by the ANCC to apprehend the suspects and recover the ransom amount, approximately \$340,000 in digital coins, paid by a cryptocurrency trader for his release, has recovered around Rs12m in cash, Rs900,000 in prize bonds and a Mercedes-Benz vehicle from the suspects.

According to the FIR, the crypto trader was abducted on Dec 25, 2024 at 1:40am in a police mobile without number plate by five men in plain clothes. They brought him near the FTA Sadr Office, Karachi, got opened his Binance account and transferred coins worth \$340,000 into different digital wallets/accounts.

They reset his cell phone, handed it back to him and dropped him near the main entrance of the Quaidi-Azam at 4am. Later, eight suspects were booked and arrested for their alleged involvement in the kidnapping of the trader and releasing him after he transferred the ransom into their digital wallets.

Bilawal touts Sindh's efforts to combat infant mortality

Quoting a report by PALISI network, PPP chief says province's death rate now at 2.9pc, against national average of 5.4pc; credits public-private partnerships for the success

KARACHI: Pakistan Peoples Party chairman Bilawal Bhutto-Zardari on Monday took great pride in the Sindh government's public-private partnership initiatives, especially in healthcare sector and lauded its significant achievements in reducing the child mortality rate in the province.

The PPP chief was speaking at a ceremony to mark the release of a report by the Pediatric Acute Long Injury and Sepsis Investigators (PALISI) network, a US-based health institute, highlighting a significant reduction in child mortality rate in Sindh's public hospitals.

The event was organised by Dow University of Health Sciences at the Dr Ruth Pfau Civil Hospital Karachi.

While Mr Bhutto-Zardari did not speak much on the report during his speech, he took to social media in later and shared its key findings.

"Infant mortality rates in Sindh now stand at 2.9 percent while rest of Pakistan is at 5.4 percent," he posted on X (formerly Twitter).

He continued: "US-based PALISI Global health reports that both Sheikh Zayed Children Hospital, Larkana & Civil Hospital Karachi have a 1.2 percent mortality rate. Compared to 1.4 percent for Aga Khan which is a Private hospital and 6.3 percent rate in 19 similar countries.

"Our child-life facility is now the only public sector pediatric facility in Pakistan to be rated 5/5 SafeCare Quality level. Proud of everyone who has been a part of the successful transformation of Sindh's healthcare over the last 15 years," the X post concluded.

House committee formed to investigate BIEK exam results

Education minister, six treasury, opposition members to conduct inquiry into students' concerns over first year exam

KARACHI: Accepting the demand of opposition parties, the Sindh Assembly on Monday finally formed a parliamentary committee to investigate the controversial results of the intermediate board in Karachi.

While announcing the formation of the committee, headed by Education Minister Syed Sardar Shah, Law and Parliamentary Affairs Minister Zia Larja assured the

House that there would be no compromise on the issue of the future of children and said that competent and capable chairmen of education boards would be appointed very soon.

The committee, comprising Sadia Javed, Taha Ahmed, Shabbir Ahmed Qureshi, Yasir Baloch, Wasim Ahmed, Farooq Ahmed as members, was constituted following a call attention notice given by the Muttahida Qasmi Movement Pakistan member Abdul Wassam.

The JJ and MQM-P had been raising the issue of wrongdoing in the results of intermediate exams in the house since the start of the recent assembly session. They had strongly protested over the issue in the house as the party members were denied to take up the issue.

Mr Wassam said that he had to move a call attention notice on the issue of the poor results as the party members were not allowed by the chair to speak on point of order.

He said that there were irregularities going on in the city's intermediate board and a large number of students were affected by them.

The law minister said that he had already offered the opposition to hold talks on the matter. "If it is about the future of children, we would definitely resolve the issue amicably," he assured the opposition.

Mr Larja told the house that interviews for the chairmen of boards across the province were underway. "Efforts are being made to ensure that good and capable people are appointed chairmen of the boards," he added.

Increase in dog-bite cases

In her call attention notice, MQM-P's Farah Siddiqi said that there was a huge

'Sindh outperformed other provinces'

During his speech at the CHL, Mr Bhutto-Zardari noted that the public-private partnership programmes of Sindh had outperformed all other provinces and the federal government.

He recalled that the public-private partnership model was first introduced by former prime minister Benazir Bhutto in the party's 1993 election manifesto, which was now yielding results.

"Punjab has established two emergency rooms, in Multan and Lahore, while Balochistan, Gilgit-Baltistan, and other regions have also set up similar facilities. We need to engage with Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Azead Kashmir to ensure their people benefit from this initiative as well," he said.

He congratulated the Sindh government, the provincial health department, and the ChildLife Foundation for their efforts. "It is a moment of pride that your hard work and success are now being recognised globally. Congratulations to all of you," he added.

Recalling the past, PPP chairman said that after 2015, certain segments of the media "exaggerated" child mortality rates in Sindh, often portraying the province in a negative light. "Reports about child mortal-

ity were sensationalised as breaking news, with live feeds from hospitals across Sindh starting from Tharparikan," he stated.

While child mortality rates are improving across Pakistan, the state remains alarmingly high, posing a challenge for all provinces, including Azad Kashmir and Gilgit-Baltistan, he said.

He said that over the last 15 years, the Sindh government launched several initiatives to address this issue, including partnerships with the ChildLife Foundation under the public-private partnership model.

"Emergency facilities for children have been established in Karachi, Larkana, Nawabshah, Hyderabad, Sukkur, and Khairpur, alongside telemedicine services in 105 taluqs," said Mr Bhutto-Zardari.

"Our dream is to establish ChildLife emergency facilities in every district to provide free and quality healthcare to the public," he said and appreciated the future plans to introduce urgent care centres to reduce the burden on existing emergency facilities.

He attributed this progress to the 18th Amendment and the Sindh government's commitment to the public-private partnership model.

He also pointed out that Sindh often faces resource shortages

due to inescapable federal allocations. However, the PPP's government countered these challenges by adopting the public-private partnership programme, he added.

Earlier, Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah said that the successful partnership between the Sindh government and the ChildLife Foundation had reduced infant mortality in the province to 2.9pc, which is significantly lower than the national average of 5.4pc.

"The paediatric mortality rate in ChildLife-operated emergency rooms stands at just 1.2 per cent, comparable to the best private hospitals in the country," he said.

The CM emphasised that his government was dedicated to ensuring that every child in the province has access to world-class emergency healthcare within 30 minutes, available round the clock and free of charge.

He said that his government had launched a 24/7 telemedicine network across all 105 taluqs of Sindh, allowing access to expert paediatric consultations, even in the most remote areas.

At the beginning of the programme, Mr Bhutto-Zardari and the CM visited the telemedicine control room and got a briefing on the operation of the system.

Man, sister die in car collision

LARKANA: A man and his sister were critically injured in a head-on collision between two cars on Plaza Shah Kahir road late on Sunday night and died later at Trauma Centre.

The victims were identified as Mujeeb-ur-Rahman Janjoo, 32, and his sister Daheer Khatoun, children of famous Sindh short story writer Zahid Hussain Janjoo.

Nobody in the other car involved in the accident was injured and one of its occupants, who was said to be member of Magal clan, escaped after the accident, said police officials but they avoided identifying his name.

However, police arrested Parvaz Barbo, driver of the car, which was owned by a Magal clansman, and took the two cars into custody.

The bodies were handed over to heirs after completion of medico-legal formalities. The tragedy saddened residents of Dhamraho village, 15 kilometres from Larkana, where the bodies arrived there for burial.

Man killed, woman injured for 'honour'

NAWABSHAH: A young man was stabbed to death in the name of honour but the woman, who was accused of being his lover, survived an attack by her husband in Yousuf Shamro village near Paddan on Monday.

The engaged husband Intaze Shamro and his associates identified as Zahid Ali, Wazir Ali and Sultan Shamro attacked the victim Anwar Shamro with knives when he was busy working at a brick kiln in the village, leaving him for the dead, and managed to escape.

The injured was taken to Paddan Rural Health Centre from where he was shifted to Peoples Medical University Hospital, Nawabshah, in critical condition but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Intaze Shamro had earlier attacked his wife Me Uzal with an axe and left her critically injured. She was rushed to hospital and luckily survived the attack on her life.

Sabe Ali, brother of late Anwar lodged an FIR at Paddan police station against Intaze Shamro, Zahid Ali, Wazir Ali and Sultan Shamro under Sections 302 and 34 PPC.—Correspondent

Severe cold disturbs life, fog disrupts road and rail communication in upper Sindh

SUKKUR: Thick fog has badly affected the rail and road transport networks in the upper Sindh districts — gripped in severe cold for the last few days.

The sharply declining minimum temperatures have forced most people to remain indoors, and still, use woollens to save themselves from cold-related effects and ailments.

Over the last three days, attendance in both private and public sector offices and movement of vehicles on roads has been very thin in Sukkur, Ghotki, Jacobabad, Kandhkot-Kashmore and Shikarpur districts.

The chilling cold waves had started sweeping through the Sukkur and Ghotki region on Friday evening and gradually gripped the entire region within the next two days. On Monday, the minimum temperature in most districts of upper Sindh ranged between three and five degrees Celsius but the feel-like temperature was stated to be below the freezing point.

The minimum temperatures in central and southern Sindh also dropped sharply on Monday evening.

Trains schedules disturbed

The schedule of the arrival and departure of passenger trains has been disturbed due to the thick fog in the northern areas of Sindh. According to senior railway officials in Lahore, the timings could not be maintained as the country's northern areas, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Punjab and Balochistan were also hit by thick fog.

They said the extremely low visibility situation remained dangerous during night hours and usually started improv-

ing at different timings in different areas all afternoon. Therefore, they said, most train services had to be run behind schedule, hence late arrival at their destinations.

Passengers helpless

Scores of men, women and children intending to travel by train were found to be helpless due to the absence of staff at the 'inquiry window' of most railway stations. Media personnel visiting several stations in Sukkur, Ghotki and some other districts reported that the families and individuals were seen looking for the staff to know about the exact timings of the arrival and departure of their desired trains but in vain.

Some of the passengers speaking to them said they braved the chilling weather conditions to catch the train but

were disappointed to find no one here to tell as to how long they would have to wait for the same. They said they had decided to leave their homes after failing to receive such information from the 'inquiry' over phones.

An official, who had no involvement with the inquiry or information, told the media that how could the staff at the inquiry give people such information when they too did not have any idea.

The perturbed passengers said the railways authority must at least have a perfect telecommunication network and the government should ensure an uninterrupted Internet service so that people should not undergo such miseries.

Road communication

The intercity bus services were also hit by fog and severe cold. Operators of

these services told the media at their stands that they had been getting a very low number of bookings over the last few days. Most intending travellers seemed to have postponed their plans due to the tough weather conditions. "We are also avoiding to run our services during the hours when thick fog envelops our route because driving in such a situation is highly risky," they said.

Other modes of transport, like cabs and rickshaws, are faced with a much decline in availability of passengers. The number of such vehicles plying on roads and in lanes appeared to be around 10-20pc as against the normal quantum.

'Life-saving utilities'

Life for the people of upper Sindh districts' rural areas is as tough as it has been for decades because there has been no improvement in the electricity and gas supplies to them. Workers are even tougher for them as most villages lacked even infrastructure of these essentially required utilities. These people barter dry wood, straws and junk to keep themselves and their homes warm.

The urban areas do have the infrastructure but power loadshedding, suspension of supply and breakdowns mostly stretch over 12 hours a day, hence little respite from harsh weather conditions.

Like most other areas of the country, upper Sindh also faces a deepening gas crisis for months. Absence of proper and adequate electric and gas supply not only deprive the urban population of a source of heating their homes, but also disable them to cook food. The situation has now become a matter of survival for people of both urban and rural areas.

The worst hit in harsh winters are the elderly, weak and ailing men and women, besides small children.

increase in dog bite incidents in 2024 and asked the minister concerned as to what steps were being taken to contain the menace.

She said as many as 18 people were killed in dog bite incidents in 2024, adding that 11 of the victims died as they did not get vaccine.

The MQM-P MPA said that Rabies Control Programme Sindh (RCPS) was launched in 2021 but according to media reports it was not functional due to paucity of funds. "There is helpline 1093 which is not active, while the RCPS website is also closed," she said.

In reply to her notice, Parliamentary Secretary for Municipalities Kiraj Qasim Noorvi said that the RCPS faced shortage of funds due to Covid-19 and other financial constraints of the provincial government.

He said that the RCPS office was properly working with the sanctioned staff and application was also there to lodge complaints of stray dogs.

However, he said that the terms and union committees were responsible to curb the menace of stray dogs.

He shared that the over 13,500 stray dogs were neutered and over 25,000 others were vaccinated by the RCPS, adding that

the anti-rabies vaccine was available at government health facilities across the province.

Bill to appoint baronets as VC introduced

Wapda workers protest sackings

Officials of All Pakistan Wapda Hydro Electric Workers Union (CPAW) Iqbal Ahmed Khan, Azam Khan, Hamid Khan, Allah Deen Kaimkhani and others, who led the protest, demanded immediate reinstatement of the five employees in the Hesco Laser operation circle.

They said that despite shortage of staff, employees were being sacked by officers on the basis of personal likes and dislikes and some employees' failure to pay to the officers 'monthly', a euphe-

mism for bribe in cash.

They said that officers accused the sacked employees of failing to meet recovery targets to justify their decision. The dismissal of experienced employees, who should rather be respected for their hard work, was just condemnable, they said.

They requested law recovery as protest for their retrenchment and said the recovery targets pertained to only July-August period of last year, which had improved in subsequent months still they were dismissed.

The union leaders claimed that they had worked hard for the department over the last 30 years of their service but they were sacked with one stroke of pen. The sacked employees were also deprived of all monetary benefits in short violation of labour laws, they lamented.

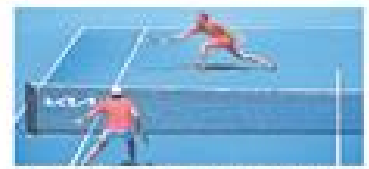

CDA opens one underpass of Serena interchange to traffic

Entire project likely to be completed by end of this month

ISLAMABAD: The Capital Development Authority (CDA) opened one of the underpasses of the Serena interchange project to traffic on Monday.

Under the said project, three underpasses with loops will be constructed: one on Khayaban-i-Sherwadi and two on Srinagar Highway.

The underpass on Khayaban-i-Sherwadi in front of Serena has been opened. This single-bore underpass will cater to traffic moving from Globe Chowk (Constitution Avenue) towards Ansari.

The traffic moving towards Constitution Avenue outside Serena will use the old route, which is also

being overhauled.

During a visit to the site on Monday, CDA Chairman Muhammad Ali Razaudhan visited the site on Monday and showed satisfaction with the pace of work.

"Completion of this underpass is a milestone as it will provide easy access to citizens," the statement quoted the CDA as saying. He also directed the CDA teams to get the horticulture work of the project completed at the earliest.

Sources said that Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi had directed the CDA to complete this project as early as possible.

He had directed the CDA to complete all aspects of the project, including horticulture work and lane markings, by the end of this month, as Pakistan was going to host the Champion's Trophy next month and visiting teams would stay in Islamabad.

As per PC-1, the completion time of this project was six months, but the target had been revised to 40 days after the directions of the prime minister and the interior minister. After 68

days, the Sherwadi underpass has been opened.

Meanwhile, CDA is also working on another important and separate project to provide a direct link between Murree Road and Srinagar Highway to get maximum benefit from underpasses being constructed on Srinagar Highway.

Without the construction of an underpass on Murree Road to link it with Srinagar Highway, traffic from Murree Road cannot enter Srinagar Highway. Without it, the motorists will have to go to the Kashmir Chowk (also known as Dhokri Chowk) to move towards Srinagar Highway. In light of this requirement, the CDA through a consultant has already completed the initial design of the underpass.

"Soon we will start work on the Murree Road underpass as well," said an official, adding that the CDA chief had already visited the Murree Road site and directed the officials concerned to expedite pre-tender requirements, such as the approval of final design and budget estimates.

Lawmakers asked to help constituents reap benefits of CM's initiatives

RAWALPINDI: Punjab transport minister Bilal Akbar Khan on Monday asked lawmakers to help their constituents register for the Punjab government's aid programmes, including the Karaman Package, to realise the potential of these initiatives.

During a meeting at the Commissioner's office to review the performance of the government departments, the minister said he had been entrusted by Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz to oversee coordination

among stakeholders in Rawalpindi Division to provide relief to the public.

Public representatives and divisional heads participated in the meeting, which was briefed by Rawalpindi Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, and Regional Police Officer Babar Sarfraz Alga regarding the divisional performance.

Speaking on the occasion, Bilal Akbar Khan said that the Punjab CM said that joint efforts of parliamentarians, and administrative officers would lead to public relief. "We will try to

bring regional policies in the remote areas of Punjab daily.

Regional policies will be made keeping in mind the local problems and needs," he added.

Sharing details about the initiatives, the provincial minister said the government was about to launch a solar panel project in the energy sector, so public representatives should inform the people about its registration process.

He claimed that 32 new field hospitals had been added to the health-care system over the past 100 days, adding that up to 35,000 people were

getting free treatment in the remote areas of Punjab daily.

In order to resolve the traffic problems, he said e-buses would be procured. "Electric buses have been ordered to solve the transport problems of Rawalpindi."

78 e-buses will be operated on six routes, including Taxila-Wah Cantt, U Principal Road to Chungi No. 26, and Dastak to Rawalpindi," he said. Mr Khan said that the government's target was to transform 150 bus stands into model bus stands within one year.

He said that every

institution in Punjab will provide services to the public on their doorstep through the Dastak mobile application.

"Maryam Ki Dastak" offers services such as domicile certificates, FIR copies, birth certificates, learner's driving licences, and e-ratting through the "Dastak Doorstep Delivery App" and web portal.

During the briefing by RPO Rawalpindi, it was informed that the crime rate in Rawalpindi has reduced significantly.

According to the latest data, there has been a 24 per cent decline in property dispute cases in

Rawalpindi, a 29 per cent decline in robbery cases, and a 52pc decline in theft cases. Similarly, the cases of car thefts have reduced by 27pc.

Deputy Commissioner Dr Hassan Waqar Cheema, while giving a briefing on the progress made on the special initiatives of the chief minister in the district, said that 553 students have benefited from the Chief Minister Internship Programme so far.

In the first phase of school outsourcing, 256 educational institutions have been outsourced, the deputy commissioner added.

Woman arrested for allegedly killing stepson

RAWALPINDI: A woman accused of torturing to death her four-year-old stepson was arrested by the Civil Lines police. Shahbaz Bibi, a resident of Jhanda Chichi, lodged an FIR with Civil Lines police saying that she got married to Mohammad Ali 15 years ago and was blessed with five girls and two sons.

She said that her husband's second wife, Aqsa Naz, lived in the same house in Jhanda Chichi and often used to beat her children. Upon returning home, she found Aqsa beating her four-year-old son, Abdul Hadi, with a baton and choking him.

She added that she intervened to rescue her son, with the help of her husband's elder brother, and took him to the District Headquarters Hospital (DHQ) where he was pronounced dead.

According to initial police investigation, several torture marks and bruises were found on the body of the boy.

The body of the deceased was handed over to his family after postmortem.

Police said the accused woman had been arrested after a murder case was registered against her. — Staff Reporter

Minister accuses PTI of running away from £190m scam case

Tarar says verdict in case was supposed to be announced on Monday, but the accused failed to appear in court

ISLAMABAD: Minister for Information, Broadcasting, National Heritage and Culture Attaullah Tarar on Monday said the Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf (PTI) leadership was running away from the 190 million pound corruption case because they knew that their hands were

not clean and they were involved in the scam.

Addressing a press conference along with Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) senior leader Senator Tahir Chaudhry, he said there was no example in the history that billions of rupees were waited like this, as the black money was whitened through creation of a fraudulent trust.

He said the 190 million pounds case was a classic example of "robbing Peter to pay Paul".

The minister said the verdict in the 190 million pound case was supposed to be announced on Monday, but the accused failed to appear in the court.

The minister said the PTI leadership

had made a habit of not appearing in court.

He said the PTI had also used delaying tactics for six years in the foreign funding case. Similarly, he said in the Toshakhana case, they also used delaying tactics and sought adjustments after adjustments.

"Sometimes the PTI leaders changed lawyers, sometimes they changed the letters of attorney," the minister remarked. He said innocent people never change attorneys and lawyers but it has been the practice of the PTI to use delaying tactics in court cases.

He asked why the PTI needed to take a sealed envelope to the cabinet meeting and get its approval without opening it

when it was in power.

He alleged that the then cabinet approved the £190m deal without knowing the facts in the sealed envelope brought by Shahbaz Akbar. He said it was a mega corruption case in the history of Pakistan.

"It was not just a coincidence, it was a well-thought-out plan," he said.

The minister said the PTI chief also rebuilt his house in Lahore from the mega corruption. Billions of rupees were collected from the person whose billions of rupees were written off by the federal cabinet, he said.

Replying to a question, the minister said the founder of PTI was in jail but why his spouse Rukhsa Bibi did not turn up in the court.

He said it was the discretion of the concerned judge to decide whether to announce the verdict in the presence of the accused or otherwise.

He said the PTI leadership was divided now and they did not see eye to eye on many matters.

Mr Tarar remarked that the PTI had seen the seeds of mistrust and hatred among the nation but it was itself reaping its harvest.

He said the judge could issue warrants for mandatory presence of an accused during the trial only.

To another question, he said Farha Gogi was wanted in many cases but she was a co-accused in this case, whereas the PTI founder was the main accused.

Robbers, thieves strike at eight places in capital

ISLAMABAD: Criminals looted cash and valuables worth over six million rupees from eight places, including three houses and a shop, in the capital, police said on Monday.

Moreover, a battery was stolen from a car parked alongside the heavily-guarded Chief Commissioner Complex.

In the first incident, a gang of robbers looted a house located in the limits of Hattak police station, the police said. Three persons armed with weapons raided the house of Mohammad Zulfikar Khan at Model Town and held the residents, including women, at gunpoint.

They ransacked the house and looted cash and gold ornaments worth Rs1.2 million and escaped.

Similarly, robbers looted another house located in the area of Shalimar police station. The police said four armed men entered the house of Maqbool Siddiq at Mera Aka when the residents were asleep.

The gangster demanded the insurance in a room and also beat up Mr Siddiq. They looted Rs100,000 cash, and valuables worth Rs400,000.

Three gunmen entered the house of Mohammad Waris at G-10/3, in the area of Ramna police station, and looted cash Rs4,000 and household articles and escaped.

In another incident, two persons armed with weapons looted a medical store in Shalimar, the police said, adding that the robbers raided the store owned by Sajdar Abbas at 3/11 and held up the shopkeepers at gunpoint and looted Rs170,000.

Furthermore, two gunmen snatched six mobile phones from different persons at G-9/4 in the limits of Karachi Company police station.

Besides, a gang of two robbers looted cash, and valuables from Syed Danish Kazmi and his friends in the area of Shalimar police station.

Meanwhile, thieves stole gold ornaments worth Rs1 million from a house at Shalimar Town police station. The thieves broke into the house of Sher Khan at Farash Road when the residents were away and stole 13 gold ornaments.

Moreover, thieves also stole a battery from a vehicle parked along the wall of the Chief Commissioner Complex, housing the office of Chief Commissioner at G-10/4.

Policeman shot, injured in Pindi

RAWALPINDI: A police official was shot and injured by unidentified motorcycle riders and managed to escape firing gunshots creating panic and fear in the Westridge police area on Sunday night.

The police have registered a case against the two unidentified motorcycle riders under section 7- Anti Terrorism Act (T-ATA) and other relevant sections of the law and launched a search for the culprits.

Police constable Abdul Jabbar lodged an FIR with the police saying that he and constable Zahoor Saleem were patrolling in the area on motorcycle on Sunday night and were doing random checking of vehicles.

He said that while they were patrolling in the area, they signalled a motorcycle rider on suspicion. Instead of responding to the police, the motorcycle riders opened fire on the police patrol.

As a result, he was injured after being hit by a bullet fired by the motorcycle riders. However, Zahoor responded to the gunmen in the same area.

The motorcycle riders tried to speed off on their motorcycle, but it could not start and they had to escape on foot. Police said panic and fear gripped the area due to firing.

Meanwhile, City Police Officer Syed Khalid Hamdani on Monday visited the City Traffic Police Headquarters. During his visit the CPO visited various branches and reviewed the facilities provided to the citizens.

Police spokesman said that the CPO also inspected the new driving simulator being added to the driving school and showed interest in modern technology and gave instructions to extend the driving simulator to other driving licence centres.

During the visit to the One Window Licensing Hall, the CPO reviewed the facilities provided to citizens and issued orders for immediate solution of citizens problems.

They set up a picket near the Wheat Godown where three persons riding on a motorcycle appeared, he said, adding that on suspicion the police personnel signalled them to stop. However, they started firing on them when reached close to them.

The police personnel ran away in panic to save their lives while leaving behind their weapons and motorcycle on the spot, the officer said, adding that while running away from the spot one of the officials fell on the road and sustained injuries.

Later, the suspects took an official SMG and escaped towards Faisalabad, he added. — Staff Reporter

Pakistan, Kyrgyzstan keen to explore opportunities in medical education

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PMDC) president, Dr Riwaz Taj, on Monday made it clear that no compromise would be made on the quality of medical education being provided to Pakistani students within the country, or abroad.

He was talking to a delegation from Republic of Kyrgyzstan, led by Minister of Science and Education DSh. Kerzhubayeva, which visited the PMDC to discuss promotion of medical education and explore opportunities for collaboration.

Kyrgyz Ambassador Ayatbek Anshabiev, rectors, heads of Kyrgyz universities and representatives from the education sector were also part of the delegation.

The discussion revolved around the registration criteria for foreign medical graduates, admission standards for Pakistani students in foreign institutions and accreditation protocols for foreign medical colleges.

The PMDC president emphasised that Pakistan had made significant progress in the medical field. He noted that the country currently had 186 medical and dental colleges, producing healthcare professionals.

He further stated that over 105,000 doctors were registered with the PMDC, which was playing a crucial role in meeting the healthcare needs of the nation.

He said Pakistani graduates were respected across the globe.

"Only graduates from PMDC-recognised foreign institutions are eligible for the provisional registration and can appear for the National Registration Examination (NRE). The graduates who successfully pass NRE steps I and II qualify for a full licence to practice medicine or dentistry in Pakistan," Dr Riwaz Taj said.

According to a statement, while sharing admission criteria for Pakistani students seeking enrolment in foreign medical institutions, he said students must be admitted to a PMDC-recognised foreign institution and candidates must check the list and fulfil the criteria available on its website before proceeding abroad for their studies.

Regarding the accreditation of foreign medical institutions, Prof Dr Riwaz Taj explained that the PMDC had maintained a list of recognised foreign institutions on its official website.

"This list is provisional and subject to periodic review. PMDC has developed a new accreditation process, requiring foreign institutions to meet the standards set by the national regulator, the World Federation for Medical Education (WFME), and the PMDC criteria," he said.

The PMDC president said Pakistan's medical education system had earned global recognition for its high standards.

"Collaboration with Kyrgyzstan will provide an excellent opportunity for mutual growth and the advancement of medical education in both countries. However, no compromise will be made on the quality of medical education within the country, or outside for the Pakistani students," he added.

The Kyrgyz minister of science and education appreciated Pakistan's contributions to the global medical fraternity and expressed keen interest in strengthening ties between the two countries in the field of medical education.

Both the sides also agreed to explore avenues for joint capacity-building measures to further enhance the quality of medical education.

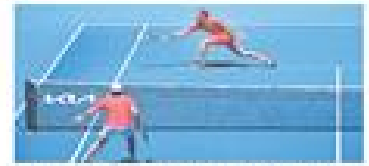

Separate lanes project for bikers launched

LAHORE: The pilot project to allocate dedicated lanes for cyclists and motorcyclists on Ferozpur Road was formally launched to ensure smooth and uninterrupted traffic flow, reduce accidents and for safety of the commuters, especially those riding cycles and bikes.

The pilot project will lead to similar interventions on other major roads in Punjab capital, according to the Lahore Development Authority (LDA) officials.

"Under the pilot project, Ferozpur Road will soon have dedicated lanes, covered with hand-painted concrete walls on both sides, for the cyclists and motorcyclists, as the work has been launched by the team of LDA's urban development wing," an official source in the authority told Dawn on Monday.

According to him, the pilot project consists of four-kilometer-long lanes on both sides of the road from Kala Chak to Lahore Bridge (Quarshi). And upon success of this pilot activity, a regular project is likely to be launched on other major roads in the city, including Jail Road, The Mall, Mubarak Road, Wazir Road and Canal Road.

LDA Director General Fiaz Farooq also paid a visit to the pilot project site and inspected the ongoing work there. On this occasion, LDA Chief Engineer Aamir Saeed and the Project Director Haroon Rafi briefed the DG on the development work.

"These lanes will be separated from the main

Katcha gangsters kill four in Khanpur revenge attack

RAHIM YAR KHAN: A gang of Katcha area attacked the house of relatives of an alleged police informer and killed four of his relatives, including three brothers, at Banti Chaudhri/Lahori of village Jaga Abbas in the Zahirpur town of tehsil Khanpur at night.

On the other hand, police claimed that two attackers were killed when they were trying to escape towards the Katcha area.

According to the rescue workers, the Katcha area of Indhar Gang attacked the house of Irfan, an uncle of the late Usman Chaudhri, at around 10pm. Immediately after their arrival,

the Katcha killed Irfan's three sons, Muhammad Anis (15), Muhammad Maqsood (15), Muhammad Maqsood (10), and a relative Muhammad Zaman (38).

In a video message Irfan said he had informed police about the attack of the Katcha but police did not reach even after half an hour of the attack. He said the police had just used his nephew Usman Chaudhri who was killed in the confrontation with the Katcha in 2021. He further said that it was the duty of police to provide them with security because police were already providing security and meals to the family of Usman Chaudhri. He said his whole family was murdered and now even the inspector general police or IHG could

not help him. Irfan said that the Katcha took revenge of the killing of Jaga Indhar and his accomplices.

According to some locals, the area of Jaga Abbas witnessed the sound of shots fired by the Katcha and there was panic among the villagers. The police did not respond to calls at 15 when the district police officer and Station House Officer Zahirpur were a few kilometers away from the scene. In a WhatsApp message, a police spokesperson claimed that after the killing of four innocent citizens, police failed the attempt of the attackers to escape. After the attack of Katcha, they were being chased and the heavy firing started in which two Katcha were

killed. He claimed that they belonged to the Indhar, Shar and Keshi gangs; however, he did not disclose the name of the deceased suspects.

Jaga Indhar, the ring leader of Indhar Gang, and his three accomplices, Maqsood Indhar, Shar Shar and Keshi Shar, were killed in an encounter in July 2021 while two Katcha were injured. The encounter happened in the Katcha area of Kachhore and Kandhlot. According to the sources, after the killing of Jaga Indhar, Jaga Indhar and Tahir Indhar were leading the gang and it is suspected that they were behind the attack on Irfan's house and killing of his three sons and a relative.

Court seeks report on Anti-Rape Act

Failure to enforce law resulting in acquittals: CJ

LAHORE: Lahore High Court Chief Justice Ahsan Nadeem on Monday issued a notice to the attorney general for Pakistan to submit a report on the enforcement of the Anti-Rape Act 2021.

The chief justice was hearing a full bench appeal with a bail petition of a rape suspect, Waqar Ali. Justice Farooq Baloch and Justice Ali Zia Raza were the other members of the bench.

The chief justice expressed concern that failure to enforce the anti-rape law could lead to the acquittal of accused persons in rape cases. He remarked that the number of rape cases had surpassed murder cases. He emphasized that the lack of enforcement of the Anti-Rape Act 2021 is resulting in the acquittal of accused individuals.

Prosecutor General of Punjab Syed Farhad Ali Shah informed the bench that the rules under the anti-rape law were being implemented. He said under Section 7 of the Act, special prosecutors

LHC sets aside objections to Imran's seven pleas

LAHORE: A Lahore High Court two-judge bench on Monday overruled the registrar office's objections to seven bail petitions of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) members.

According to the bench, the court set aside the objections to seven bail petitions of Mr Khan filed through Barrister Sajid Sadiq.

During the hearing, the counsel informed the bench that the registrar

office raised a similar objection on seven bail pleas, saying they lacked the thumb impression of the petitioner.

He said the office raised an objection to the eighth plea about the absence of a certified copy of the Islamabad case judgment against the petitioner.

Barrister Sadiq assured the court that he would submit a new affidavit at the next hearing to address the objections.

The bench set aside the objections raised by the office on seven bail applications and directed the office to allow diary numbers to the cases for hearing.

However, the bench sustained the objection on eighth petition regarding

the missing certified copy of the Islamabad case judgment, instructing the counsel to attach it with the application.

An anti-terrorism court had on Nov 27 denied bail to the former prime minister in these eight cases.

The petitioners mainly argued that the prosecution failed to establish the petitioner's association with the urban terrorism occurrences narrated in the FIRs.

They said the petitioner has been implicated in the May 9 cases as a result of a well-orchestrated plan, merely to harass and humiliate him for political reasons, even though admittedly he was in the

Five of family die as container loaded on trailer falls on car

LAHORE: Five persons, including women and children, of a family died and three others suffered serious injuries when a container loaded on a trailer fell on a parked car they were occupying at Musafirkhana Aulia, about 30kms from here late on Sunday night.

According to Rescue 1122 officials, the trailer first hit the car (No BFM-3636) parked in front of a shop, after which a container loaded on the vehicle fell on it.

As a result, five persons, identified as Shahzad (40), Sumayyah Gassim (28), Hafsa (14), Hameed (9) and Zain (8), died. In the incident, three others — Asif (34), Ayisha (30) and Huzefa (12), were seriously injured.

Dawn has learnt that the deceased and injured persons were residents of nearby Fair Colony, Musafirkhana.

The bodies and the injured persons were retrieved after cutting the badly damaged frame of the car by the rescuers and Musafirkhana police personnel, reaching the spot on being informed of the incident.

The injured persons were shifted to the Bahawal Victoria Hospital (BVH), where bodies of the deceased were also transported.

Police official reached the scene to take the legal action against the trailer's driver.

The funeral prayers for the deceased, attended by a large number of people, were later offered in a cotton factory, after which they were buried in a local graveyard.

Bhutto wanted to release his Maula Jatt movie once again for which he made the digital print of the movie but it could not be released. He also wanted to produce a film *Lakhpal Daboo* but his dream could not materialise. The film fraternity expressed deep sorrow and grief on his demise. — *Staff Reporter*

Maryam pledges 100,000 houses in a year

LAHORE: Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz has promised provision of as many 100,000 houses to homeless people in Punjab within a year.

Addressing the inauguration ceremony of the three-marla Zehra Homes/Masum Flats at Kala Shah Kaku here on Monday, she said: "Some 100 deserving families have got their own houses. I appreciate RUHA (Rural Urban Development Authority) and the housing ministry for completing Zehra Homes/Masum Flats in a short span of two-and-a-half months."

"I want to tell the thousands of Zehra Homes that this house belongs to them for life. This is your house. Apni Ghar, Apni Ghar is one of the best schemes in the world."

She said as many as 2.2 million families in Punjab did not have their own houses.

"Some 100,000 houses will be provided to the deserving families within a year. Those who own plots of one to 10 marla are being given interest-free loans up to Rs1.5m on easy conditions. Those who get the loan will have to pay Rs14,000 per month in easy installments for seven years. If someone has borrowed Rs1.5m for seven years, he has to pay only Rs1.5m. Not even a single penny will be paid in addition to it. Thousands of houses are under construction in 37 districts of Punjab under the Apni Ghar, Apni Ghar scheme. A few [houses] are in the final stages of completion."

"A scheme is going to be introduced in which two residential plots will be given to the deserving people to build houses soon. Thousands of deserving and poor people will be given three marla plots," she said.

Police work out Rs1.9bn losses in riots

Clashes with PTI activists erupted on May 9, 2023, Sept 28, Oct 4 and Nov 26 in 2024; report suggests introduction of anti-riot regulations

LAHORE: The Punjab police have estimated huge damages exceeding Rs1,900 million (Rs1.9 billion) in the wake of four riot incidents which took place during the last two years, mainly during the May 9 violent attacks in 2023, and total injuries to over 500 police personnel.

In a detailed report sent to the Punjab government through the home department, the central police office (CPO)

revealed that the protesters of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) damaged a total of 143 police vans and nine military vehicles in the four events so far which required a significant repair and reconstruction work to make the buildings fully operational.

While assessing the financial loss against the damaged vehicles, the police department came up with the whopping figure of Rs1.17m, providing details of all the police motorbikes and other vehicles, including those completely burnt by the protesters when they had thrown the petrol bombs in most parts of Punjab.

The report further said a policeman and four citizens also lost their lives during the protests, submitting claims for the compensation for the riot victims and the specific damages caused to the police resources, saying the provincial police can't bear the loss 'in isolation'.

The Punjab police report said the violent events took place on Sept 28, Oct 4

and Nov 26 in 2024, besides those occurred on May 9, 2023. (A copy of the report is also available with Dawn). The report has marked Lahore, Rawalpindi, Faisalabad, Multan and Attock, the cities where fierce clashes had erupted between the supporters of Imran Khan, leaving majority of the police personnel deployed to maintain the law and order injured, many of them seriously.

It added the loss to the exchequer was assessed on the basis of the detailed reports prepared and sent by the districts' police to the CPO.

The heads of the investigation, operations and legal branch of the Punjab police got the assessments verified before sending the same to the provincial government.

The Punjab police authorities also stressed upon the government to introduce anti-riot regulations to avoid the huge loss in future.

The event-wise statistics shared in the report declared the May 9 attacks alone

as a nightmare for the Punjab police.

The report said four citizens lost their lives, and 169 police personnel were injured in the violent attacks. Similarly, the Punjab police estimated a loss of Rs1,800m it has suffered when the protesters attacked and damaged nine police buildings and Rs1.12m for destroying 97 police vehicles on May 9.

The protests erupted out on Sept 28, 2024 damaged 21 police vehicles amounting to Rs2.25m, besides leaving 28 personnel injured, some of them seriously.

The report stated the police suffered a loss of Rs1.98m during the clashes with the PTI workers when the latter attacked and damaged 18 vehicles on Oct 4 across the province besides injuring 37 personnel.

On Nov 26, the data shows, 267 personnel were injured by the unruly protesters and caused a damage of Rs1.17m when they attacked and damaged six police vehicles.

NCHR orders vehicular emission check

Air pollution in Lahore poses significant health risks, economic losses, and reduced visibility. The Air Quality Life Index indicates that air pollution in Pakistan shortens the average life expectancy by 3.9 years. — Staff Reporter

Qureshi, others indicted in Askari Tower case

LAHORE: An anti-terrorism court (ATC) on Monday indicted PTI vice chairman Shah Mehmood Qureshi, along with other leaders and activists including fashion designer Khadija Shah in the Askari Tower attack case of May 9, 2019.

ATC Judge Mansoor Ali Gill conducted the hearing at Kot Lakhpat jail where the incarcerated leaders and workers of the PTI were present for framing of the charges against them.

However, all the accused persons pleaded not guilty and the judge committed prosecution witnesses for recording their statements on Jan 23.

Besides Mr Qureshi, those indicted among the incarcerated include PTI Punjab President Dr Yamin Rashid, former governor Omar Sarfraz Cheema, Senator Iqbal Chaudhry and former provincial minister Mian Mahmood Raza Khan.

Those out of jail

including former MNAs Ayesha Hamza Malik and Rubina Jamil, social media activists Sanam Javed and Tayyaba Raja, and fashion designer Khadija Shah also attended the hearing and denied the charges against them.

They have already been indicted in multiple cases of May 9 riots.

The accused persons have been charged with offences, including inciting public against state and resorting to attacks on public and private properties, during the attack on Askari Tower.

Gulberg police registered the case of the attack.

Separately, the judge adjourned the trial proceedings of other cases, including Jinnah House attack and burning police vehicles in Maghbaria for Jan 27 and Jan 28 respectively, due to the unavailability of the prosecution team.

The judge was informed that the prosecutors concerned could not make it to the jail due to strict security arrangements.

May 9, Nov 26 incidents PA speaker links judicial commission to complainant

LAHORE: Punjab Assembly Speaker Malik Muhammad Ahmed Khan says there must be some complainant in a case for setting up a judicial commission on it.

"A plaintiff must come forward for the judicial investigation of November 26. Show me any case in which neither bodies nor their representatives. For establishing a judicial commission there should be some complainant," he said

while answering a query during a media talk here on Monday.

"A person whose own character is stained with lies cannot be a plaintiff in a case. Somebody should come up and say that someone is misusing and then a commission may be formed on it."

Responding to a question about the ongoing dialogue between the PTI-N government and the opposition PTI, he called for distinguishing between "crime and politics".

"If burning the country

an act of politics or a crime? In turning political activists into a violent mob with the agenda of targeting a certain area, a crime? ... My country is my home and no one has the authority to set fire to my house and call it politics," he said, stressing, "You cannot mitigate a crime with a political act."

Asked why those who held press conferences, dissociating themselves from the PTI, were not tried in the May 9 attacks cases, the speaker said he

had his own point of view regarding the dialogue and this issue.

"In my opinion, those who quit PTI by holding a press conference were also involved in the crime. They had committed the crime."

To a question that if Imran Khan renders an apology, should he too be forgiven, the speaker said "The who needs to tender an apology should do so, and he who is in a position to forgive should do it (forgive)".

Responding to a query

about putting off the announcement of the court verdict in the 190 million pound case against Imran Khan and his wife Bushra Bibi, he said there was no harm in it because evidence has been recorded, prosecution and defence witnesses have appeared and all other due processes must be completed.

"If the judges are taking time in announcing the verdict, there is no harm in it. In my opinion, there's neither undue haste, nor delay in the case."

Private firm to begin waste management operations

MUZAFFARGARH: Under the 'Safer Punjab' (Clean Punjab) programme, initiated by Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz, services from the private sector have been engaged for garbage collection and disposal in cities and rural areas.

An agreement was finalised with Daewoo, set to commence operations on Jan 24, with the system going online by Jan 26.

This was announced by Deputy Commissioner Qasim Ali during a meeting with officials from Daewoo and related departments.

The DC said the company should appoint a supervisor at the union council level who would work with the DC's officials.

She directed the company officials to recruit local people and make the recruitment process very transparent and recruit working people on merit.

She said a report on the funds spent so far should be submitted. She

directed assistant commissioners to monitor all matters and guide the company.

Representatives of the Daewoo Bin Service, said that a survey was underway at the district headquarters, tehsils and union council levels, which would be completed soon and work would start from Jan 24 as per the schedule.

They said discussions were also underway to rent machinery and appropriate steps were being taken to hire sanitary workers.

BURNI: A two-year old child suffered burns when he fell into a stove while playing at his home on Monday in Khanpur Bagga Sheer, some 15 kilometers away from city area.

According to the family, the child, Muhammad Zeeshan, suffered burns when he accidentally fell into the stove.

A rescue team was dispatched to the scene and officials confirmed that the child had been burned in the incident. He was later shifted to the hospital in a critical condition.

Power pilferage detected in Attari Saroba

LAHORE: The Lahore Electricity Supply Company (LESCO) inspection team on Monday detected a large number of power pilferers in Attari Saroba area.

A Nishar Colony Sub-Division team led by its SDO conducted an operation in the area and nabbed the suspects who were stealing electricity by attaching a hook to the LESCO supply line on Ashiana Road.

The LESCO team disconnected the illegal connection and registered cases against the suspects, besides charging them for 40,000 units as a detection bill, according to a spokesman.

Meanwhile, LESCO on Monday recovered Rs9.018 million from 257 chronic defaulters in all the five districts Lahore, Sheikhupura, Narokana Sahib, Kasur and Okara during its recovery campaign.

LESCO spokesman told the media that the company has recovered outstanding dues of Rs9m from 31 defaulters in Northern Circle; Rs6.051m from 27 defaulters in Eastern Circle; Rs2.051m from 48 defaulters in Central Circle; Rs0.061m from 24 defaulters in Southern Circle; Rs0.017m from 22 defaulters in Narokana Sahib Circle; Rs0.094m from 44 defaulters in Sheikhupura Circle; Rs0.041m from 40 defaulters in Okara Circle; and Rs0.051m from 21 defaulters in Kasur Circle.

FBR condemned for revoking 25pc rebate for teachers

LAHORE: The Federation of All Pakistan Universities Academic Staff Association (FAPUASA) has condemned the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) for its decision to discontinue the 25 per cent tax rebate for researchers and full-time teachers, deeming the move illegal and illogical.

In an online meeting chaired by FAPUASA President Dr Anwar Abbas Magai and moder-

ated by General Secretary Dr Muhammad Usin, the association criticised the FBR's letter issued on December 30. The letter, titled "Intimation Regarding Discontinuance of 25pc Rebate in Respect of Researchers/Full Time Teachers", was described as a direct violation of legislative authority, as the rebate had been approved by the federal finance minister and incorporated into the National Assembly proceedings on June 28, 2024.

Dr Magai said that the rebate, consistently provided during the fiscal years 2021-22 and 2022-23, was explicitly extended in the 2023-24 budget.

He said that the FBR's unilateral decision undermines the democratic process and called for the immediate withdrawal of the letter. He urged the finance minister and prime minister to hold the FBR accountable for overstepping its jurisdiction.

The meeting also expressed solidarity with the All Government Employees Great Alliance Against Pakistan in its protest against the Punjab gov-

ernment's new pension rules and urged preparatory to retirement (LPH) regulations.

Dr Muhammad Usin termed the new rules unjust and illegal, highlighting that pensions are an integral part of the EPS service structure. Any cuts or modifications, he said, violate the rights of public servants.

FAPUASA announced its participation in the Agaza rally scheduled for Jan 22 in Islamabad, followed by a sit-in to demand the immediate withdrawal of the new pension rules.

LHC seeks reasons for readvertising VC slot

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court on Monday sought reasons from the Punjab government for re-advertising of the vice chancellor post at the Islamia University Bahawalpur (IUB).

Justice Shahid Karim was hearing a petition filed by Prof. Dr. Muhammad Naveed, challenging the government's decision to re-advertise the post.

A counsel for the petitioner argued that his client met the eligibility criteria for the VC slot and was even recommended by the search committee for the position.

He pointed out that the petitioner had stood first and was placed on the top of the merit list in a pool of three shortlisted candidates out of more than 200 after screening.

He stated that the government suddenly halted the appointment process, without providing any justification.

He contended that despite the earlier selection process, the higher education department issued a new advertisement for the position, raising transparency concerns.

The petitioner's counsel claimed that the government failed to provide reasons for not finalising the earlier recommendation.

He asked the court to direct the authorities concerned to appoint the petitioner as IUB VC in the light of his eligibility and the search committee's recommendation.

The judge directed a law officer to submit a reply on behalf of the government, explaining reasons for the new advertisement and the delay in the appointment process.

PTI challenges election tribunal having ex-judge

LAHORE: Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) Secretary General Salmaan Akhtar Raja has filed a petition before the Lahore High Court challenging the establishment of an election tribunal comprising a retired judge.

Through his counsel Barrister Samiur Khana, the PTI leader pleaded that the election tribunals consisting of both serving and retired judges were formed simultaneously, which contravened the principles of judicial independence.

He argued that such an arrangement undermines the separation of judiciary from the executive and violates constitutional principles.

The petitioner asked the court to set aside the amendment to the

Election Act 2017, which allowed the appointment of retired judges to election tribunals. He also sought the dissolution of the election tribunals chaired by retired justice Rana Zahid Mahmood.

The petitioner requested the court to issue a stay order restraining the tribunal from functioning until a final decision on the matter is made.

Advocate Salmaan Raja had contended the Feb 8 general election as a PTI-backed candidate for national assembly seat from NA-128, Lahore. However, Anam Chaudhry of Imtihan-i-Pakistan Party (IPP) had won from the constituency.

Anam secured 122,576 votes against 159,024 of Raja. — Staff Reporter

Mechanic kills self after shooting employer

Missing boy's remains found after three months

SAHIWAL: Remains of a missing teenage boy were found in a field near Chak 15/14-L, Iqbalnagar Aulia, three-and-a-half months after he went missing.

Sahir Ali, 14, a resident of Green Town, near Chak 15/14-L, was working at a junk shop for the last one year. On Sept 20, Sahir did not return home after work. His family contacted his employer who said the boy had left for home. The family searched for him at all possible locations but could not trace him.

On Sunday, a light blue shirt, jeans pants, mobile phone cover and remains of a human body were found in the fields. The matter was reported to the

police. Sahir's family identified the remains from the shirt. Family later learned that Sahir was murdered.

Sahir's father Muhammad Sander said the family initially thought Sahir had gone to his aunt's house in Kanur but no one followed up.

Kanawal SDO Zoonshan Dogar said no complaint had been filed with the police in the past three months. Zoonshan said Sahir's skull and bones were scattered within a one-meter radius. Police sent the remains to Lahore for forensic analysis.

Kanawal Police registered a murder case against unidentified persons on a complaint of Sander.

MURDER: A woman was shot dead by her in-laws over a domestic dispute at village Matamwala, tehsil Chichawatni.

Reporters said Hina Sajid, daughter of Sajid Shah, a resident of Mansa Jashid, tehsil Mian Channu, was married to Tajamal Shah. From the beginning, she had complaints about mistreatment from both her husband and in-laws. Her father, Sajid, frequently intervened to resolve the issue but there were constant reports of Hina being tortured by her in-laws.

The FIR states that on Jan 11, Hina called her father, Sajid, requesting him to take her home as she could no longer bear the violence from her husband.

Next day Sajid, along with Asad Shah and Khawar Shah, went to Matamwala for negotiations. During the discussion, Qaiser Abbas entered the room, pointed a 30-bore pistol at Hina and shot her in the head. Hina received two bullets and

died on the spot while Qaiser escaped.

Shahid Police registered a murder case against Hina's husband, Tajamal Shah, and her brother-in-law, Mariel Hassan and Qaiser, on the complaint of Sajid.

SHOT DEAD: A boy was shot dead over a minor dispute at Chak 19/15-L.

Reporters said 13-year-old Karam had quarreled with his village mates, Muhammad Hamid, Shauif and Jamal, some days back over a minor issue. Eyewitnesses reported that both groups used abusive language and sticks during the fight. Yesterday, Karam was walking in the village street when Hamid shot him dead.

Sakhar police registered a murder case against three suspects on the complaint of Karam's father, Akram.

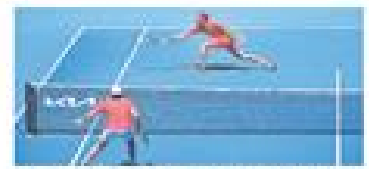

KP proposes solutions to Rs1.5tr hydel profit dues issue

Seeks NHP payments in line with CCI decisions, control of Wapda power stations

PESHAWAR: Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has come up with three proposals to settle its long-standing issue with the centre over the payment of Rs1.5 trillion net hydel profit dues from 2016 to 2022.

During the Jan 10 meeting of a special committee, the KP government proposed payment of outstanding NHP amounts in accordance with the Council of Common Interest's decisions, granting control of Wapda's power stations to province, and implementing an interim NHP payment agreement by enhancing consumer tariff by Rs1/Kwh to generate requisite funds.

The committee was formed by the CCI on Dec 23, 2019, to propose an "out-of-box solution" for the payment of NHP to the provinces. It has so far held five meetings.

The issue of Rs1.5 trillion NHP dues in line with the Kari Committee Methodology (KCM)

for the period of 2016-22 has been subject of prolonged negotiations since 2018.

In its latest submission, KP has said the federal government should pay NHP in line with Article 161(2) of the Constitution. Presidential Order No.3, decisions of the CCI from 1991, 1993, 1997, 1998, 2016, 2019 and 2022, and the calculation made by the Jehanzeb Khan committee in the report approved by the CCI on Dec 23, 2019.

It added that the federal government should fund the power house component of Wapda development projects through PREDP instead of revenues generated through Wapda generation tariff to make funds available for the payment of the NHP to the entitled province.

The second proposal stated that the transfer of the Wapda hydropower stations to provinces as proposed by the Punjab government and agreed by KP and decided in the third meeting of the out-of-box committee on Jan 11, 2022.

Besides, the proposal said that transfer of HPPs to provincial government on analogy of generation policy 1995 and 2015 and outstanding payment of NHP as per KCM to be made by the federal government till date

of transfer of HPP to the provinces while the operation and maintenance can be retained by Wapda.

The third proposal stated till the finalisation of these two options, the federal government should announce the second interim agreement of NHP payment by enhancing the consumer end tariff by Rs1/Kwh to generate the requisite funds.

"Options may be finalised within a month," the proposal read, adding that payment of NHP should be made directly by the CPFAAG through source account instead of Wapda.

It said that Pakhtunkhwa Energy Development Organisation projects should be facilitated to sell up to 1500 MWs of power through electricity wheeling while water use charges to be enhanced to Rs1/Kwh.

When contacted, Hameezullah Khan, the KP government's representative tasked with negotiating NHP with the federal government, said that the province presented its proposal in the fifth meeting of the "out-of-box" committee, which was formed on December 23, 2019.

He said Article 161(2) of the Constitution declared that the net profits earned by the federal

government, or any undertaking established or administered by the federal government from the bulk generation of power at hydro-electric stations shall be paid to the province in which the hydro-electric station is situated.

Mr Khan said that CCI was the relevant forum to determine net profits.

He said that after the numerous CCI decisions on the matter and recommendations of a committee led by deputy chairman of the Planning Commission Dr Jehanzeb Khan for the payment of NHP in line with the KCM, the federal government came up with the excuse of having no money.

He, however, said that the power component of new hydro-electric stations was funded from Wapda revenues and the water component from the Public Sector Development Programme.

"The power component of Diamar-Basha, Mohmand and Dams dams amounts to Rs2.24 trillion, while the water component totals Rs1.4 trillion. When the federal government says it has no money, KP's contention is that the Rs2.24 trillion funded Wapda into this project is our money," he said.

The KP's representative also

said that the federal government's stand that payment of NHP to the province would raise electricity prices was incorrect.

He said that the price of a unit of electricity had gone up from Rs88 to Rs95, while the circular debt had reached Rs1.2 trillion and that had nothing to do with the payment of NHP.

In April 2018, the KP government had taken the implementation of KCM, adopted by the CCI in 1991 and the forum constituted a committee to deliberate upon the issue of determination of rates/net profits in light of the decision of CCI.

The committee presented its report to the CCI on December 23, 2019, which stated that practicality of the implementation of the KCM couldn't override the constitutional duties and the rise in the price of electricity was a matter of public policy and couldn't be given preference over Article 161(2).

It added that the federal government should ensure payment of NHP on the basis of calculations made by the committee for 2016-22.

The KP government has calculated NHP dues at Rs1.5 trillion as per KCM for the period from 2016-17 to 2022-23.

Waziristan forest fire controlled after two days

SOUTH WAZIRISTAN: The raging forest fire in Wana Kot Kora mountain of Lower South Waziristan, which gutted precious trees and plants, was finally brought under control on Monday.

Rescue 1122 officials said a firefighters' team and fire tenders worked tirelessly for two days to contain the blaze.

They said teams from rescue and forest departments participated in the operation. The cause of the fire remains unknown, but its impact was devastating. Precious trees of chestnut and Ghor Ghoray (blackcurrant) were destroyed in the blaze, which left a trail of destruction in its wake.

Rescue officials said despite challenges, the teams completed the operation in extremely difficult conditions, battling darkness, cold and rugged terrain. Their efforts finally paid off as the fire was brought under control on Monday.

The forest fire had broken out on Saturday, engulfing hundreds of valuable chestnut and blackcurrant trees.

Swabi man ends life after killing wife for 'honour'

SWABI: A man allegedly killed his wife for honour and later died by suicide in Chota Lahor tehsil here on Monday.

Police and Rescue 1122 officials said that the incident took place in Jahul Dhok area.

Chota Lahor city SHO Gohar Khan said that the accused shot dead his wife from a close range inside a room of his house, and later also shot himself dead.

Sajjad Khan, a brother-in-law of the deceased woman, reported to the police that he was with his family at his house when at 3am his nephew knocked at the door to their room, saying his father opened fire on his mother, and later got himself injured with a pistol.

Sajjad said when they went there, his 20-year-old sister-in-law was lying in a pool of blood and his brother was injured, while a pistol was also lying with him. He said his injured brother was taken to Bacha Khan Teaching Hospital, Shalmanse, where he later succumbed to his injuries.

Sajjad said his brother was angry that his wife had gone to her parents' house without his permission, which created a rift between the couple.

The police have registered an FIR and started investigation.

Six injured in Kohat gas leak blast

PESHAWAR: Six members of a family, including five children, were injured, two of them critically, when a blast occurred inside a house in Kohat due to gas leak on Monday.

The police said the incident occurred in Garhi Rastidar area.

Rescue workers shifted the injured to the District Headquarters Hospital, Kohat, from where two of the critically injured children were referred to a Peshawar hospital.

The injured were identified as the wife of Ashraf, Haleema, 10, Bakhtawar, 7, Fatima, 6, Waris, 12 and Hasiba, 4. — APP

No robbery, terrorism cases reported in Chitral last year

CHITRAL: The Lower Chitral police registered nine cases of murder and 13 cases of attempted murder, seven cases of rape and 19 cases of abduction in 2024, but no case of robbery was reported during the period.

The police also registered 34 cases of hurt, 53 cases of lethal attack, while zero

cases of attack on police, child abduction, missing persons and kidnapping for ransom were reported in 2024.

As per data gathered from the office of the district police officer, no incidents of robberies, including bank heist, vehicle and bike snatching were reported, while the number of theft cases decreased to 13 compared to 28 in 2023.

No case of terrorism was reported, while the number of fatal traffic acci-

dents rose to 11 compared to only six in 2023.

As many as 255 cases were registered during 2024 under different sections of Control of Narcotics Act, while 16 cases of Arms Ordinance, 32 of Foreigners Act, four of arson, six of cheating were registered. No case of forgery, fake CNIC, hate speech and gambling was reported.

The Lower Chitral police recovered

145 kilograms of charas, 645 litres of liquor, 6.5kg of opium, 0.5kg of heroin and 1.5kg of ice drug, while the arms and ammunition seized during the period included a shot machine gun, two rifles, 13 shotguns, 10 pistols, 214 rounds, three-meter detonator, five daggers and four kg explosive powder.

A total of 125 proclaimed offenders were arrested in 2023, which dropped to 115 in 2024.

PA forms committee to discuss bill returned by governor over objections

Law minister insists legal cover will be provided to CM aides as they hold several departments

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly on Monday constituted a special committee for a detailed discussion on the KP Laws Amendment Bill, 2024, which was returned by Governor Faisal Karim Kundi over objections about the move to equate the chief minister's

advisers and special assistance with the ministers.

The development came during a session chaired by Speaker Rafique Saloom Swati.

The speaker said the governor had returned the bill and wanted it to be reconsidered by the house.

He read out the governor's message about the bill, which read, "After careful examination of the proposed bill, titled KP Laws Amendment Bill, 2024, which was returned by Governor Faisal Karim Kundi over objections about the move to equate the chief minister's

rules and regulations, notification or all other legal instruments. "This blanket amendment appears to lack any clear justification or identified need."

The governor insisted that as per the Constitutional framework, advisers and special assistance were not members of the cabinet and couldn't exercise executive authority, which was the prerogative of elected representatives serving as ministers, and that they're not accountable to the provincial assembly, a fundamental principle ensuring democratic oversight of the executives.

He added that ministers, as elected representatives, enjoyed

defined status and direct accountability to the legislature and the public. "Empowering advisers and special assistance who lack electoral legitimacy with ministers' raises serious constitutional concerns," he noted.

According to him, the KP Government Rules of Business, 1985, which derives legitimacy from the Constitution, govern the formation and functioning of various committees, he said adding that extending powers and privileges to the unelected individuals under these provisions risks disrupting cabinet functions and the constitutional role and responsibilities of ministers, and would be clearly unconstitutional.

"Given the broad and unfocused scope of the amendment, the assembly must reconsider its necessity, scope and constitutional validity. A more focused approach, based on demonstrable need, would be preferable to the current generic proposal," he said.

The governor pointed out that in order to ensure compliance with Constitutional provisions, the KP Amendment Bill, 2024, was being returned to the provincial assembly for reconsideration.

During the session, opposition PPP member Ahmad Karim Kundi said that special advisers had never been elected.

"During PTI government,

Rafa Shakh was nominated for NHC meetings as an adviser, so people filed a writ petition in the court objecting that Shakh was not a federal minister to chair the NHC meeting," he said.

The lawmaker said the provincial government didn't have a finance minister and if an unelected person was sent to a committee's meeting, the federal government would stop him from attending it.

He added that people would go to the court as the ministers were replaced with advisers and special assistance in the Act.

"It will be much more effective and appropriate to reconsider the apprehensions and concerns of the governor KP,"

he said. Minister of the opposition JUI-F Adnan Khan said that he had proposed amendments but they were not considered. "Advisers and special assistance are not part of the cabinet," he said, wondering how an unelected person could be held accountable.

MPA, Hameez Laghmani said that the committees were part of the house and unelected persons attending the meeting, was contrary to the definition of democracy and supported the opposition benches that unelected people should not be part of the cabinet or proceedings of the house calling it against the

Six regional labs to ensure timely detection of diseases

Health dept has sent request to finance dept for release of funds

PESHAWAR: Health department has decided to establish six regional laboratories to ensure timely detection of diseases and make quick response to get broken on spread of ailments in the province.

The department has sent a request for release of funds to finance department after which these new laboratories will be notified, according to officials. They said that as per plan, these laboratories would have a total of 57 staffers, including 53 from health department and four from Khyber Medical University (KMU).

Initially, four laboratories will be established, one each in Peshawar, Swat, Hazara and Dir Lail Khan. These regional laboratories will perform testing at district and divisional level for local hospitals while Public Health Reference Laboratory (PHRL) at KMU will act as a provincial lab.

PHRL was established in 2016 as part of World Health Organisation's International Health Regulations by health department at KMU to ensure prompt testing of epidemics and ensure prevention of outbreaks.

It will impart training to staffers of regional laboratories to enable them to perform investigations and help the public health section at health department to take steps for prevention of outbreaks of ailments.

Officials said that four people would be taken on board to work in microbiology and molecular sides. The planned laboratories will conduct all tests, except highly specialised ones, which will be sent to PHRL. Currently, PHRL receives specimens from all districts and send the results accordingly.

PHRL, under a memorandum of understanding, has been sending samples for testing to National Institute of Health (NIH), Islamabad, in case the required facilities are not available in it. The results of such tests, received from NIH, are shared by it with respective health officials in districts.

"PHRL will take care of proficiency and quality control besides compilation of data and will share the same at national forums. It will also do advanced level and rare testing. For instance, some tests such as that for Crimean-Congo Haemorrhagic Fever (CCHF), which is not happening in all districts, and the cost of its kit is Rs400,00," official told this service.

As per five-year plan, the regional laboratories will be equipped with modern items to perform district level testing including that for malaria, dengue and typhoid etc.

Officials said that PHRL completed eight years of its existence during which it performed tests for more than 40 notifiable diseases, especially its eight million PCRs for Covid-19 at a cost of Rs150 million. These tests would have cost more than Rs5 billion in private laboratories. PHRL not only saved more than Rs4.5 billion for health department but also played crucial role in prevention of the pandemic.

"Finance department is likely to release funds to PHRL, the employees of which have been without salaries for the past five months," officials said. They said that PHRL sought Rs27 million and Finance Minister Mohammad Aslam assured them of provision of funds to keep PHRL afloat as it would play basic role in setting up regional laboratories in addition to performing advance level testing for all hospitals in the province.

They said that PHRL, as per plan, would provide full support to regional laboratories through trainings and consumables.

They said that health department accorded priority to PHRL because it was playing vital role in identification of epidemics.

"The recent example is the detection of six import cases at Bacha Khan International Airport last year. The patients were then isolated and spread of the virus was prevented in a timely manner. From a single import case could have infected more people if it was not detected," said officials.

Constitution.

JUI-F member Maulana Latif Rehman said that the 26 Constitutional Amendment was passed after consultation with the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf.

In response, law minister Ahsan Ali Khan Afridi told the house that the main objective of the amendment bill was to provide legal cover to the advisers and special assistance at their held several departments and chaired meetings.

He said that there were 34 departments and the advisers and special assistance helped the chief minister adding that the advisers were covered under the Constitution, while the special assistants were covered under Rule 31(A) of Rules of Business.

"I suggest the formation of a special select committee for discussing the bill before the next session and the working of the advocate general's opinion to satisfy us. The entire house could be taken on board," he said.

Mr Afridi said according to Article 16 of the Constitution, any matter for reconsideration could be returned with or without amendment by the provincial assembly.

"As far as the 26th Constitutional Amendment is concerned, an advocate general could speak on the floor of the house that covered advisers and special assistance," he said.

The minister said under Article 131 (1)(1), five advisers could become part of the cabinet and there was no mention of elected or unelected persons.

Former speaker of the assembly Mushtaq Ahmad Ghani also supported the assembly's objections to the bill and asked the law minister if he would sit in a meeting chaired by unelected persons.

He said the bill should be sent to the select committee for a detailed discussion.

The house also unanimously passed a resolution, which demanded of the provincial government to recommend to the federal government to fulfil the promise made regarding the development of merged tribal districts. It also called for the provision of funds promised by the federal government and other provinces.

The resolution, moved by MPA Ahsan Khan, read that the new National Finance Commission Award be announced and the payments regarding the war on terrorism be made.

It also said that the federal and provincial governments should provide three of the federal divisible pool funding to the provincial government for development of the merged tribal districts, bringing them on par with developed areas.

Minister Afridi, however, said that the federal government would never announce a new NFC Award as it threatened KP's share in national funds from 34 per cent to 19 per cent.

PHC moved against use of mercury in gold mining in Kohat

Petitioners term the practice environmental hazard

PESHAWAR: The residents of Khushal Garh, Kohat, on Monday moved Peshawar High Court against use of mercury in gold mining in the area, terming it an environmental hazard resulting in contamination of air, polluting the Indus River and also affecting agricultural land adjacent to the mines.

A petition was jointly filed by former provincial minister Anwar Khan Afridi and 13 others as public interest litigation in the green bench of the high court through Advocate Nazam Mahmud Kaskhel.

They contended that using and dumping mercury was not according to human, animal, flora and fauna and aquatic life and was also having a negative impact on agricultural lands.

They said that use of mercury and other environment polluting activities of miners should be declared unconstitutional as a healthy environment was fundamental right of everyone after the passage of Constitution (Twenty-Sixth) Amendment Act.

Petitioners said that the practice was also violative of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Environmental Protection Act and Minamata Convention on Mercury, a multilateral environmental agreement that addressed specific human activities that were contributing to widespread mercury pollution.

They requested the court to restrain the official respondents and private contractor from polluting the environment by burning mercury into open air, dumping the same in agricultural and other properties and throwing the waste into the Indus River in the interest of justice.

Petitioners requested the court to declare the issuance of relevant government orders as violative of fundamental rights, illegal and without lawful authority.

They prayed the court to declare that a healthy environment was a fundamental right by virtue of Constitution 26th Amendment and the respondents were bound to obey, protect and enforce laws, policies and SOPs governing the subject matter.

The respondents in the petition are KP government through chief secretary, secretary of mines and minerals, KP Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), director general mines and minerals, Kohat deputy commissioner, its district

police officer (DPO) and a private company Himalayan Earth Exploration.

Petitioners claimed that late in Khushal Garh was one of the finest for agriculture in the area. They stated that of late Gold Placer Mines were discovered in the area, which were advertised and auctioned by the government. They said that the lease of the mines spread over 25 square kilometres was allotted to the private respondent on Nov 8, 2024.

They said that in the lease granting order it was mandatory for the private company to ensure that the mining should be environment friendly. They alleged that the contractor started mining in the rented area without following SOPs and state of the art placer gold mining.

They said that it had been damaging the environment through water and soil as well as

air making it an area unfit for the inhabitants to survive in due to use of mercury while separating gold from byproducts it came with.

Citing several side effects of mercury, petitioners stated that its exposure to humans could cause neurological damage, skin infections, impaired immune function and reproductive harm, etc.

They said that mercury exposure in plants could inhibit seed germination and growth, damage root systems and disrupt photosynthesis. They claimed that they had approached the relevant officials time and again about the use of mercury in gold mining, but in vain.

Petitioners claimed that there were many lost suit and environmental friendly procedures available for mining of placer gold, but the contractor was not utilising the same and instead relying on mercury burning.

Corruption rampant in KP, alleges JI Hazara chief

BATTAGRAM: Jamaat-e-Islami Hazara region chief Abdul Razvi Afridi has alleged that some local and international players are opposing his party's entry to power corridors.

Talking to media persons at the Battagram Press Club here on Sunday night, he added that these powers employed a multifaceted approach to exert influence over elections, utilising tactics such as vote manipulation, propaganda and rigging. He alleged that these powers exploited various tools, including charitable families, media and social media, to spread propaganda and pave way for

their preferred candidates.

Mr Afridi criticised the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf government in the province for failing to provide jobs, housing, and quality education to citizens. He alleged that corruption was rampant in the PTI government, with politicians and officials embezzling funds meant for public welfare. This, he claimed had led to widespread disillusionment among the people.

Mr Afridi expressed deep concern over 'bad governance' in KP where every saint day teachers, clerks and doctors were staging protest for their rights. He alleged

that the provincial government, MNAs and MPAs were involved in kickbacks, with a significant portion of government funds being misappropriated for personal gains. This, he said had led to a breakdown in the delivery of public services, causing immense hardship for the masses.

The JI Hazara chief emphasised that his party was committed to providing a viable alternative to the existing political order. He argued that his party's vision for a just and equitable society was based on Islamic principles and Qadafi's vision for Pakistan. — Correspondent

Govt asked to revisit Chitral's master plan draft

CHITRAL: The political parties and civil society organisations here the other day unanimously demanded of the provincial government to revisit the draft master plan of Chitral town to make it consistent with the aspirations and needs of the people and ground realities of the area.

In a joint meeting convened and presided over by the Amir of Jamaat-e-Islami Lower Chitral Waheedul Din, the meeting was participated by former district naib Maghfiat Shah, Qari Jamal Abdul Nasir (JUI-F), Nasir Wali Shah (PPP), Shahid Ahmed (PTI), Mohammad Kassar advocate (PML-N), M I Khan Sarhad (ANP), Faizal Kamal advocate (district bar), Nasir Ahmed Khan (traders) and Sajjad Ahmed Khan (local bodies).

The participants expressed their strong reservations about the draft master plan and formed a

totally inconsistent with the topography of the town and aspirations and needs of the people.

They said the Lahore-based consultant did not bother to ask with the stakeholders to ascertain their sentiments views regarding the document of urban planning for their town and did it on the basis of 'google map' only.

They said the unravelling of the draft master plan had seen shock waves across the town filling the people with apprehensions and anger, who are determined to resist its ratification to any extent if their reservations were not removed.

They vowed that the activities of political parties of all shades and civil society will be united under one banner to get the master plan 'corrected' by opposing the present one tooth and nail. — Correspondent

Funds demanded for salaries of school employees

Manshehra LG members fear closure of educational institutions

MANSHERRA: Local government representatives and residents on Monday demanded of the government to release funds for the salaries of teachers and other staff members of schools and colleges functioning under the Elementary Education Foundation Khyber Pakhtunkhwa across the province.

Now,

"Five out of 88 schools and colleges functioning in our district are on the brink of closure as the government hasn't paid salaries to teachers and other staff since Feb last year," chairman of Safada village council Basharat Ali Swati told reporters here.

Accompanied by his council's representatives and residents, Mr Swati said that poverty-hit girls and boys attending five of 88 schools and colleges across the province had been facing the risk of losing their education due to a lack of funds.

"A girls' college has been functioning in Safada village council where underprivileged girls have received education.

Now, it might be closed as teachers and other staff members can't continue to work without salary," he said.

The council chairman said the government had failed to release funds for teachers and other staff working under the Elementary Education Foundation's education support programme and new school initiatives in 88 schools and colleges throughout the province.

"If the schools and colleges functioning under the Elementary Education Foundation are closed, the future of thousands of male and female students will be at risk," he said.

Mr Swati said parents of girls attending the only female college in his village council frequently visited his office, urging him to raise the issue with the provincial government to immediately release salaries.

"We want to make it clear to the provincial government that if the salaries are not released within a week, we will take to the streets in protest," he said.

Meanwhile, Pakistan Peoples Party provincial general secretary Shahid Salim Khan on Monday said his party believed in people's prosperity through development projects.

"Our party believes in empowering common people, which is why we created dis-

tricts and tehsils in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa during our coalition government with the Awami National Party in the province," Mr Khan told a party function here.

PPP divisional president Malik Farooq, former MPA Sajida Tabassum and district president Malik Mumtaz were also in attendance.

The PPP general secretary said his party had created most of the districts in the Hazara division.

"If we come into power in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, our government will follow suit, and Tarawal will be granted the status of another district in the Hazara division," he said.

Tank women protest 'irregularities' in distribution of ration

DURA ISMAIL KHAN: Women wearing white took to the streets on Monday against alleged irregularities in distribution of rations meant for the poor by a non-government organisation in Tank district.

The protesters gathered outside the deputy commissioner's office and blocked the Tank-South Waziristan Road for several hours.

The women said that though they had been issued tokens to collect their rations, they were denied the aid. They alleged that the rations were unfairly distributed to other individuals chosen by the organisers, leaving them desperate and angry.

Speaking to media representatives, the protesting women accused the NGO and its local partners of favouritism, claiming that the rations were distributed among workers of a political party and their relatives, bypassing deserving individuals. The ration distribution programme supported by the Tank government and executed by NGO Peace and Development Organisation has faced widespread criticism for mismanagement.

The protesting women said they had travelled long distances, leaving behind their families and spending money on transportation, only to be treated disrespectfully. They resented being pushed out of the distribution point and humiliated.

The women called upon the provincial authorities to take notice of the alleged mismanagement and implement treatment of deserving recipients. They vowed to continue their protest till justice was served.

RELIEF FOR KURRAM FAMILIES: Chairman Pakistan Red Crescent Society (PRCS) for merged districts Imran Waris on Monday said following directives of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Governor Ishaq Dar, the society was making all-out efforts to provide essential medicines and non-food items to the residents of the restive Kurram district.

Talking to media persons, he said that most consignments of relief goods would be dispatched as soon as the routes were cleared.

Mr Waris further said that the PRCS teams were the first to provide aid to the affected families in Kurram.

He praised dedication of Red Crescent volunteers for carrying out humanitarian duties even in difficult circumstances. — Correspondent
