FOR A £1.2BN PAYOU Judges rule in favour of store's shopfloor staff

THOUSANDS of Scots supermarket workers could be in line for a share of a potential £1.2billion payout after the biggest ever private sector equal pay claim.

A court ruling yesterday found some shopfloor roles at Asda - carried out mainly by women – are of "equal value" to the better-paid

ones in the supermarket giant's warehouses, which are predominantly filled by men. The judgement covers checkout workers,

customer service staff and shopfloor assistants. The judges at the

Manchester Employment Tribunal compared 14 shopfloor roles with 17 "comparator" roles carried out in warehouses

all of which are better paid. It found that in 12 of the roles, "equal value"

was established with at least some of the "ware-house colleagues" – and in one case with all of them. Two roles.

"If Asda settled the claim, we would be happy. "In this day and age, we shouldn't have to be fighting for equal pay."

CALLS FOR CRACKDOWN ON KIDS

A BOY of 14 has been caught with a gun on a Scots street during a police stop-and-search operation.

Officers seized the firearm from the teenager in Fife after receiving reports of an incident in September.

The shocking discovery was just one of 123 cases of weapon carrying among kids as young as 10 last year.

Figures reveal between April and September, children and young people were found with blades, drugs and other weapons after a series of stop-and-search inquiries across the country.

In June, a girl was found with a weapon and class B drugs in Ayr. The following month, a 10-year-old boy was caught carrying a knife in Edinburgh.

The damning findings, published by 1919 Magazine, have been made public amid the Record's Our Kids... Our Future campaign, which was launched two years ago after we reported on a sickening series of violent

attacks on teens and children across the country.

As part of the campaign, we have demanded the Scottish Government ringfence funding for safe spaces for youths to be guided and mentored in every community.

Katy Clark, Scottish Labour's community spokesperson, said she was "deeply disturbed" to learn children were carrying potential murder weapons in public.

The MSP for West of Scotland said: "The fact that children still young enough to play with toys are walking around with potential murder weapons is deeply disturbing.

Not only does it create a potentially volatile situation for policing, but it is a sign children are being led down a path of crime before they have even reached their teens. The seeming increase of criminal behaviour is highly concerning.

The SNP must support the police to work with schools, social workers and others supporting young people while also ensuring they have the

resources to tackle the organised criminals who are bringing these weapons into our communities in the first place."

The Scottish Police Federation, which represents rank-and-file officers, said a reduction of cops in schools and communities has led to "preventative" opportunities being missed.

Chair David Threadgold said: "Police officers who face members of the public in possession of knives or any other weapon are required to make immediate decisions to try to de-escalate those situations, and there are occasions where it is simply impossible to establish the age of the person involved.

"As police officers have largely withdrawn from school environments, the visibility of police in our communities is less – and the police are seen in communities as merely a reactive force.

"Along with a reducing – if any – preventative element to policing, opportunities are being missed to develop the type of relationships and intelligence gathering that may form part of the solution to this."

In June, 16-year-old Kory McCrimmon died in hospital after a disturbance at Glasgow's Greenfield Park. A 13-year-old later appeared in court charged with the schoolboy's murder.

Court papers state Kory was stabbed on the body with a knife or a similar bladed article.

As part of Our Kids... Our Future, many experts, victims and their families have warned another young person will die unless there is urgent

A Scottish Government spokesperson said: "It is unacceptable any child or young person is caught with weapons, drugs or stolen goods.

"Preventing children from going down a path where they are in conflict with the law and supporting them appropriately, constructively and effectively when they do, has been integral to our approach for over a decade.

"We have invested more than £4million over the last two years to implement the actions set out in the Violence Prevention Framework.

"CashBack for Communities, an early intervention/prevention programme that is funded by money recovered through the Proceeds of Crime Act, has supported around 1.3million young people across all 32 local authorities.

"Police Scotland and their council partners may increase patrols targeting those involved in disorder and criminality."

Kids still harmed and dangerous

IT'S deeply worrying to learn that youngsters were caught in possession of weapons on dozens of occasions last year.

One teenage boy was even caught with a firearm when stopped and searched by police in Fife.

A 10-year-old boy was found carrying a knife in Edinburgh.

It's important to stress the vast majority of Scots children would never consider carrying a weapon.

But the fact some kids feel the need to carry weapons shows the issue is still a real problem.

So much more has to be done to help keep children on the straight and narrow and give them the guidance they need.

We recognise that it's not easy for everyone dealing with the problem.

Authorities now face a more modern problem of how to clamp down on violence being filmed and shared by youngsters on smartphones.

Teachers and education staff also warn that abusive behaviour is a growing problem in classrooms.

The situation has become so bad at Kirkintilloch High School in Dunbartonshire that teachers will walk out this week after concerns were raised over regular verbal abuse and violent attacks.

Workers at the secondary school argue there are no serious consequences for the students involved.

Staff should not have to put him with behaviour that would lead them to take industrial action.

The Record's Our Kids... Our Future campaign was launched in response to an epidemic of youth violence in Scotland.

Two years on, we still regularly report on shocking examples of youths who are only too willing to resort to violence.

LABOUR stalwart Jim Murphy has launched a charity to help young adults from the scheme where he grew up.

The former Scots Secretary said he will provide grants for people in Arden, Glasgow, to enjoy the same opportunities as their middle-class counterparts. Murphy said he will initially be

ploughing in £20,000 to the charity. He told the Record: "People who cannot afford to buy their way out

of inherited poverty shouldn't be trapped into another generation of it. Murphy, a Scottish Labour MP from 1997-2015, was Gordon Brown's Scottish Secretary and a

prominent No campaigner in the independence referendum. He left frontline politics after

losing his seat and now heads an international advisory firm.

Murphy, 57, grew up in Arden in the south of Glasgow before his family moved to South Africa.

His charity, NextGenArden, will help young adults find opportunities at home rather than

having to move abroad. Jim said: "Everybody needs a bit of a break in life.

"Our break came when we left Arden and emigrated. Not every-



one's break should be as dramatic as that.

"People shouldn't have to move away. People shouldn't have their ambitions limited simply because they can't find the money.

This is a genuine attempt to help people at a turning point in their lives.

The charity will offer grants to people trying to find work, training and education. Jim said: "When they leave

school and they want to go to

college or uni but can't afford it, we will help with some of the costs. If they want to start an apprenticeship but can't afford the tools, we'll help with costs.

"If they want to become a lorry driver and they can't afford the lessons, we will pay for the costs. "Anything to do with the world of work, the world of training or

the world of education. "One woman got in touch and

said if you can't afford to give me the money for driving lessons, can

you give me the money for a bus pass so I can get to work?" He added: "It's giving people in

Arden the type of support middleclass parents often open up for their kids."

Murphy lived with his greatgran, gran, parents and one of his brothers in a cramped two-bed flat growing up.

He said his upbringing was "proud" and "rough". Murphy, who briefly led Scottish

Labour, says his upbringing shaped his political beliefs. He added: "My politics are driven by class. I used to get into

trouble saying that working-class parents should have the chance to have middle-class kids. And I don't see that as a bad thing.

"Inequality is about class, wealth, networks, money and soft skills. People who say class is nothing to do with politics misunderstand politics.

"We get much more exercised about people who inherit wealth and what we should do about it than we do about families who inherit poverty.

"This is a genuine attempt in one corner of Glasgow to start doing something about it."

"I've been out talking to some people in Arden and they say, what's the catch?'

"That's one of the things to get over - the cynicism?

INNOCENT OWNERS' MAIL DROP SERVICE ABUSED

A QUIET property on a housing estate in Fife is the unlikely headquarters of an operation that allows company directors to walk away from millions of pounds of debts.

The detached home on Dunfermline's Dunnock Road is a mail drop centre used by John Irvin's Atherton firms, which offer "company rescue services" allowing businesses to be wound up without owners facing massive liabilities.

The Daily Record told yesterday how one tycoon, Jamie Smith, used the Atherton scheme to wind up his Snow Factor business – leaving workers owed thousands in unpaid wages.

Now we can reveal that the home, called Dunnock House, has witnessed a steady stream of HMRC officers, debt collectors and police since Atherton signed up for the mailing service more than two years ago.

The innocent householder runs a legitimate mail drop service at the address.

But Dunnock House – which deals with mail services for many reputable companies – is a place many rogue businesses go to die, with more than 100 involved in the Atherton schemes.

Banned director Neville Taylor was appointed to head up the firms as part of the Atherton operations.

He has made more than £270,000 in fees for putting his name on the director forms – then sitting back and waiting for companies

to be dissolved. Many desperate owners have been seduced

been seduced by the sales pitch that states they can legally walk away from a company and its liabilities – and carry on their business with a different "clean slate" company.

The Record told yesterday how Taylor, 57, was banned from being a director for nine years in January for "repeatedly subverting the insolvency system".

The patsy director was paid to sign up more than 400 companies by scheme mastermind John Irvin, the Largs-based boss of Atherton Corporate Ltd and other dodgy companies.

used by the Atherton schemes, one source said: "The home is simply a mailbox service company.

"They get hundreds of letters, on a daily basis, from lots of people, all chasing debts.

"And then on top of that they get visits from HMRC, sheriff officers and police, which they could be doing without.

'The officials are typically

looking for directors of various different companies, and they usually stem from one customer." The source added: "The police have been here a few times."

To create an illusion of running a legitimate business, Taylor often listed his address as "Office 15" in the four-bedroom home.

We previously told how bogus directors such as Taylor replaced original bosses, who coughed up thousands of pounds to offload company liabilities.

Some directors simply shifted assets and kept going with their businesses – believing the Atherton promise that they will be debt-free.

Creditors are often deterred from recouping their money as assets have been moved out of the dying business and it would cost them more money to chase the debts they are owed. A mountain of mail has been collected, with most letters chasing debts for tax, utility bills, business rates and debts to suppliers and private individuals. It is believed that tens of mill-

ions of pounds could have been written off – temporarily at least – at Dunnock Road.

More cash goes down the plughole as creditors pay for debt recovery, with some unaware directors such as Taylor have no intention of paying the debt.

Last August, liquidators were appointed to wind up Atherton Corporate (UK) Ltd and Atherton Corporate Rescue Limited.

In January, Taylor wa banned from holding any UK directorship for nine years – specifically for his role as a facilitator for Irvin's Atherton scheme.

AN 80-YEAR-OLD whose partner was murdered by Hamas and who was held hostage in Gaza for over a

SALVAGE crews have started lifting the wreckage of a downed US passenger jet from Washington's Potomac River.

The move comes as investigators continue to probe how a US Army helicopter collided with an American Airlines plane last week on a routine approach to the city's Ronald Reagan National Airport.

All 67 people on the plane and chopper died, with 55 bodies so far recovered.

At 10am local time yesterday, the first major section of the aircraft was recovered. A jet engine could be seen emerging from the murky depths, hoisted by a crane stationed on a barge in the middle of the river.

Local Ken Martin was one of those who had gathered at a nearby multi-storey car park to watch the jet being lifted. "It's heartbreaking to see," said the 71-year-old. "You can't help but think about their final moments.

The operation, which began at dawn, is expected to last several days.

The chopper's wreckage will be recovered in a separate operation that is expected to take at least four more days.

WILL TARIFFS MEAN HIGHER PRICES IN UK SHOPS? It depends what the reaction is, how long they last,

and if companies absorb the impact. But with inflation in the UK having ticked back up already, households face a nervous wait.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR INTEREST RATES & MORTGAGES?

If inflation picks up, the Bank of England might pause rate cuts. Higher rates depress spending, so put pressure on inflation. But with new inflationary pressures likely to come from imported inflation and the economy at risk, the Bank could speed up rate cuts.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN

AND JOBS? Trump risks jeopardising an already fragile global economy. UK growth has all but flatlined. More disruption is the last thing No10 needs. Riz Malik, independent financial adviser at R3

financial adviser at R3 Wealth, said: "Trump's tariffs could cause a global

economic slowdown. History has shown they do not have the desired outcome and could ramp up inflation leading to higher interest rates. The UK is not immune."

Some experts compared what is happening now to the Smoot-Hawley Tariff Act of 1930, introduced to shield US firms during the Great Depression, but that had the opposite effect. WOULD SEALING A TRADE DEAL WITH TRUMP HELP? The

government has suggested Trump will want to do a good deal with the UK.

But Prof Portes warned: "We may be able to get away without having tariffs but it doesn't change the fundamental point which is that he is disrupting the global economic trading system."



John's son Sean Ono Lennon, 49, accepted Sunday night's award on the band's behalf, telling the crowd in Los Angeles: "Play the Beatles music to your kids. I feel like the world can't afford to forget about people like the Beatles.

Best Rock Album for their 2023 comeback record, Hackney Diamonds.



FIVE more people have been arrested in connection with disorder in Edinburgh on Bonfire Night, police have confirmed.

Officers used search warrants in the Broomhall and Saughton areas last week as part of an investigation into the disorder in Calder Road.

A 17-year-old male was subsequently arrested in Broomhall last Thursday and a 16-year-old male was arrested in Saughton

Three other males, two aged 19 and one aged 25, were also arrested in connection with offences that took place in Calder Road and Captains Road last year.

Four males, aged 15, 16, 19 and 27, have been reported to the Procurator Fiscal following the incidents in Captains Road.

It takes the total number of people reported across Scotland for criminality linked to Bonfire Night to 61, with 41 of them connected with incidents in the capital.

Inquiries started last November when officers began to identify those responsible for throwing fireworks and other projectiles at passers-by, police, cars and public transport.

Chief Superintendent David Robertson said: "I will continue to reaffirm my message in the wake of the disorder we experienced on November 5, 2024 - that if you were involved, you will be caught.

"It may take time, but you will not evade justice.

'Enforcement activity like this will continue to take place wherever and whenever we have gathered sufficient evidence.

'The public can continue to support us with our inquiries by coming forward with information, or submitting video or photographic evidence via our major incident public portal."

Nurse 'did not abuse' trans doc

A NURSE suspended after complaining about a transwoman doctor using a female changing room insisted she had never used the word "rapist" or made a comment about "chromosomes", a tribunal heard.

Sandie Peggie was suspended from work at the Victoria Hospital in Kirkcaldy, in January 2024 after objecting to Dr Beth Upton, a transwoman, using the female changing room in A&E on Christmas Eve 2023.

Peggie, who began working for the Fife Health Board in 1994, raised concerns after Dr Upton used the same changing room on three occasions in 2023, prompting her to leave.

She said she had "very little" interaction with Dr Upton, whom she met in 2023, and said: "He looked male. He had his hair in a ponytail and a receding hairline and Adam's apple."

Peggie said colleagues, including a female consultant and a male health worker shared her concerns, and a manager said, "I'll get it sorted".

The employment tribunal in Dundee heard after an incident on Christmas Eve 2023, Peggie was suspended in January 2024 without explanation, which was extended on February 2.

She learned of the allegations in February, but her ban was "reinstated" in April after her solicitor asked that Dr Upton should not be allowed to use the female changing rooms.

She returned to work but the probe continued into October, and Peggie said she "felt they were postponing my suspension to try to make things difficult for me returning"

Ms Peggie has lodged a claim against Fife Health Board and Dr Upton.

The tribunal continues.







THE exams timetable has been changed after complaints it piled pressure on pupils.

The Scottish Qualifcations Authority (SQA) said the exams diet for those taking National 5, Higher and Advanced Higher qualifications will start on April 25 – three days earlier than planned.

The original start date meant an increase in the number of coincident and consecutive exams - where two or more clash, or where a pupil has to sit one directly after another.

Exams will still finish as planned on June 2.

Education Secretary Jenny Gilruth said: "This solution significantly reduces the number of coincident and consecutive exams. I hope this provides reassurance to pupils."

Cat ban plan is ruled out by Swinney BY CHRIS McCALL

JOHN Swinney denied Scots could be banned from keeping pet cats.

The First Minister spoke out after a Scottish Animal Welfare Commission warning that domesticated felines have a "significant impact on wildlife".

The SAWC report, Responsible Ownership and Care of Domestic Cats in Scotland, said the pets hunt and "bring back live, often injured, prey to their owners".

It called on ministers to explore cat containment zones in "vulnerable areas" and suggested "cats may not be kept in conservation-sensitive areas".

But the suggestion was shot down by Swinney. He said: "The government is not going to be banning or restricting cats. We have no intention of doing so."

Have we become a nation Of 'digital Sugar' addicts? Psychiatrist Dr Catherine Carney warns Amy Packer

about society's ever-growing technology dependency

LIVING in a tech-savvy digital world has brought its challenges. 'In the UK, there has been a

dramatic rise in the number of cases of digital or technology addiction," said Dr Catherine Carney, who is a psychiatrist and addiction expert at Delamere, a private rehab clinic in Cheshire.

The online world of targeted algorithms has produced an environment of 'digital sugar' designed to tempt people into wanting more and more.

'The dopamine produced by screen engagement and internet use is the same as that from many types of illicit drugs - but spotting the point at which recreational enjoyment tips over into addiction is difficult," she explained.

Many people underestimate how long they spend online. This results in denial about having a problem, particularly when discussing the negative impacts on mental health, relationships or work and academic performance.

"While rehab clinics traditionally focus on substance addiction and addictions such as gambling, we are now seeing an increase in people coming to us for gaming and online screen addiction. It's an area few know much about." Here's what you need to know.

The NHS doesn't recognise it as an addiction: "Technology plays a significant role in modern life," said Dr Carney.

'And not everyone who spends a lot of time using it has negative effects which makes classifying it as a disorder a challenge for health organisations like the NHS and World Health Organisation.

'Unlike substance abuse disorders, which have clear physical symptoms, tech addiction does not present in a uniformly



CUT OFF And not restricted to young recognisable way. Excessive use of social media may affect people differently depending on their personality or social context. making it hard to establish a clear clinical definition.

'While the long-term psychological and physiological impacts are still being studied, the WHO has already taken steps towards recognising some related issues, such as excessive and problematic use of video games. classifying gaming disorder as a mental health condition in 2018." And it's not just about gaming

and social media. 'Tech addiction can involve a

variety of activities, all primarily centred around the excessive and/ or compulsive use of digital devices," Dr Carney explained.

"It can include shopping, dating apps - even compulsively checking work emails. Anything that leads you to endlessly scroll through content without a specific purpose causing time loss and distraction from other tasks or neglecting sleep, work or social activities can lead to dependency.

Social anxiety can be a trigger: "Individuals who struggle with face-to-face interactions may use technology as a coping mechanism or escape from uncomfortable social situations,"

explained Dr Carney. "Social media, gaming or messaging apps may make communication feel safer, but over time this reliance on digital communication can escalate into tech addiction.

"Social media may feel like a comfortable space for selfexpression without the discomfort of in-person communication, while online gaming can also create a sense of belonging in gaming communities where people can interact with others from behind the anonymity of a screen.

"As someone shy retreats into technology, their real-world skills may atrophy further, deepening reliance on technology."

It isn't just a young person's issue: "While it's true young people, especially adolescents, are among the heaviest users of technology, some studies suggest figures as high as 20-25 per cent of teenagers exhibit some signs of problematic internet use of tech addiction - double that of 2018 but the number of over-55s who excessively use tech has also dramatically risen since the pandemic," said Dr Carey.

Tech addicts can experience 'withdrawal': "Similar to building tolerance with substances like recreational drugs and alcohol, addicts may need to spend increasing amounts of time using technology to achieve the same level of satisfaction or enjoyment," said Dr Carney.

Recovery is tough: "Technology is integral to so many of our work and social interactions. Short-term 'digital detox' can be a temporary way to manage tech addiction. But understanding the root cause of your addiction is vital to support long-term, healthy recovery."

examines how your dental health can affect your whole body

OOD dental hygiene isn't just about a glowing smile. Developing positive oral health habits benefits your entire body - while being lax over tooth care or

ignoring annoying minor symptoms could lead to inflammation and severe health issues.

It's thought half the adult population has gum disease – the first sign is often bleeding gums, known as gingivitis.

If left untreated, gingivitis can develop into periodontitis which affects the tissues that hold teeth in place. Teeth can loosen, feel more sensitive or even fall out and breath can become sour. Dr Catherine Tannahill, a dentist at

Portman Dentex (portmandentex.com), explained there is so much more to oral health than pearly whites: "Our teeth act as a gateway to the body, so ensuring you have good oral hygiene means you avoid more serious health conditions."

Heart health: Experts have made the link between not enough tooth brushing and heart disease.

Nyree Whitley, Chief Clinical Officer at mydentist (mydentist.co.uk), said: "Research has shown people who have poor oral health or suffer from conditions such as gum disease or tooth loss are at increased risk of developing cardiovascular issues."

Bacteria that aren't effectively cleaned from your teeth, gums and tongue can make its way around your body in the bloodstream. A study by Aberdeen Royal Infirmary in 2023 found that two-thirds of 160 people admitted with a heart attack had a severe gum infection. Nyree said: "In rare cases, inflammation from bacteria within your mouth can also lead to infection within the lining of your heart, which, over time, could cause clogged arteries.

Failing to keep your mouth healthy has repercussions elsewhere, too. "The first sign of gum disease is bleeding gums and studies have shown those with gum disease may be more likely to have a stroke," said Nyree. "They could also find themselves more at risk of lung

cognitive decline Dementia: Academics have been working to establish a link between dental problems and dementia for some time. Professor Nicola West, who led the MySmile study at The Bristol Dental School, explained, "Recent studies suggest a clear association between dementia and poor oral health.

"A study has shown oral bacteria were four times more likely to be found in an





Alzheimer's brain than a brain without the disease. Other studies have shown that periodontitis is associated with a sixfold increase in the rate of cognitive decline." Prof West has some

positive news, saying: "Evidence indicates that if gum disease can be stabilised, it might be possible to slow dementia disease progression. "Because bleeding gums is a

predictor of developing periodontitis, early detection and management is thought to prevent many cases of

periodontitis before the effects become irreversible.

Being vigilant about gum health, and that of any of your older relatives, is important. As Prof West said: "The key message is brush your teeth twice a day with fluoridated toothpaste and see an oral healthcare professional regularly."

THE MICROBIOME IN YOUR MOUTH

THERE'S much talk about the microbiome and how vital it is to our overall health. But did you know it's not just about your gut our mouths have their own microbiome, too?

Dr Tannahill said: "The oral microbiome refers to the bacteria that dwell in the mouth. This interacts very closely with our immune system and is crucial to good health. We now understand that having an imbalanced oral microbiome allows pathogens to manifest and cause disease."



So how can you care for your oral microbiome? Lifestyle factors play a huge part, said Dr Tannahill. "Stress can have a big impact on oral health. Cortisol affects the immune system and therefore the body is not in its best form to fight plaque."

Stress can also lead to increased consumption of sugary food and drinks, which in turn impacts oral health, so beware of comfort eating. "After eating these foods, the bacteria in plaque convert sugar to acid which attacks the tooth's surface, resulting in tooth decay. Saliva will neutralise acidity, and reverse the decay process, but this needs time to take effect.

"Frequent sugary snacks or drinks may mean the mouth remains under acid attack with no chance of recovery." And while we know smoking is unhealthy, Dr Tannahill pointed out, it has implications when it comes to diagnosing early signs of dental issues: "Smoking is harmful to your teeth, gums and mouth, but in smokers, the normal signs of gum disease are not always present because smoking reduces blood flow to the gums, so you are less likely to experience bleeding when you brush."

Diet is also key: Dr Tannahill reminded us: "As a rule of thumb, foods that are good for the skin are also good for the gums: oily fish, nuts and seeds, milk and cheese, fruit and vegetables."

Keep an eye on your drinks, too: "Drinks with high acidic levels, such as fruit juice, will soften the enamel on your teeth. Brushing straight after drinking these, when enamel is softest, can damage it. Over time, weakened enamel causes staining, sensitivity and cavities."

Be sugar aware: It might seem obvious that too many sugary foods will harm dental health, however it's not just what we eat but when that has an impact. Dr Tannahill said: "We all know we should curb the amount of sugary foods we consume, but we also need to reduce the frequency of consumption."

HOW TO GET A DENTAL APPOINTMENT

THE Office for National Statistics says 96 per cent of those without a dentist and who tried to access NHS dental care were unsuccessful.

Mydentist's Nyree Whitley said: "It can be challenging to get an NHS appointment because of the national workforce shortage. If you spot any signs and symptoms out of the ordinary, try to arrange a check-up."

Nyree added: "If you still struggle, seek providers with more affordable private dental treatments, plans or finance options to spread the cost."

tility and birth weight: Last researchers in China found that ernal periodontitis was linked to babies with a lower birth weight. Pregnant women and women who have had a baby or a stillbirth in the last 12 months are entitled to free dental care as pregnancy hormones can exacerbate inflammation of the gums, leading to possible infections or gum disease.

The NHS advises pregnant women to apply for a maternity exemption certificate, known as a MatEx, to secure free dental appointments.

You will be able to get one from your midwife or doctor. Academics have also begun

examining a link between gum disease issues and infertility.

The findings aren't yet well-defined, but it's thought that the chances of pregnancy will be lower for women with gum disease.

Experts in Sweden believe the condition can cause women to take two months longer to conceive.

Diabetes: Good dental health is key for minimising your diabetes risk. Dr Sampson explained: "The connection operates in both directions, with diabetes increasing the risk of oral health issues and poor dental hygiene exacerbating diabetes.

"Research has shown that if you have gum disease, you are 53 per cent more likely to develop diabetes, and if you have diabetes, you are 34 per cent more likely to develop gum disease.

"It is important to note that controlled diabetes is not a risk factor for gum disease. However, if it is not well controlled, patients can develop a more severe form of gum disease that is harder to treat.

"Severe gum disease can impact blood glucose control, and there is a direct link between how severe your gum disease is and your risk of diabetes complications."
