## PM calls for meaningful talks on Kashmir issue

- Urges India to move beyond Aug 5, 2019, mindset
- Addresses AJK Assembly as nation observes Solidarity Day
- COAS reiterates military's commitment to Kashmir cause

**MUZAFFARABAD:** As people across the country came together in various ways to express solidarity with the struggling people of Indian-held Jammu and Kashmir on Wednesday, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif urged Delhi to move beyond the mindset of Aug 5, 2019, and engage in a meaningful and result-oriented dialogue to fulfil its commitments to the Kashmiris and the world regarding the implementation of the UN Security Council resolutions.

"We have always adhered to the principle of peaceful coexistence with our neigh-

bours. We want all disputes, including Jammu and Kashmir, to be resolved through peaceful means based on democratic and diplomatic principles. This is essential for the development and prosperity of all those people living in this region," the prime minister said in his address to the Azad Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly, presided over by Speaker Chaudhary Latif Akbar.

The session was among a slew of activities held across the country as well as in many other parts of the world to mark Kashmir Solidarity Day, a yearly national feature to mark the support for the Kashmiri freedom movement.

While the prime minister drove to the Legislative Assembly, the army chief went to a nearby military installation where he interacted with a select group of

## PTI ropes in ex-PM Abbasi to steer Opp alliance

**ISLAMABAD:** After talks between the government and the opposition collapsed last week, the PTI made another push to establish a joint front against the federal government and invited its former prime minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi to become part of its anti-government movement.

The meeting with the former PMIL-N lawmaker from Marwat came after PTI founder Imran Khan wrote a letter to Army Chief Gen Aslam Munir proposing "immediate measures" to bridge the gap between the party and the military.

The PTI has also made efforts to convince Mardan Hashmi Khan of the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam and former PPP senator Mianwali Nawaz Khokhar to become part of its anti-government alliance.

It may be noted that in April last year the PTI already formed a multi-party opposition alliance known as Toliakar, comprising Senate Ittehad Council, pro-Balochistan Muttahida Council, Balochistan National Party-Mengal, Jamiat-e-Ulema-e-Muslimeen, and Majlis Wohdat-e-Ulema.

The PTI officials said they grand alliance would be steered by Mr Abbasi. This was decided after major opposition parties gathered at the residence of former

## Karim Aga Khan — Imam of the atomic age

**SHAII Karim Ali Bhushani**, better known to the world as the Aga Khan, was a prince without a physical realm. Yet he mingled with kings and presidents, and oversaw a fortune reportedly worth billions of dollars.

Prince Karim, who passed away on Tuesday at the age of 86, was the fifth hereditary imam of the Ismaili Muslims, and the fourth to bear the title of Aga Khan. In his nearly 60-year tenure as Ismaili imam, he worked for the socioeconomic uplift of his flock, as well as the larger communities wherever Ismailis could be found.

Claiming descent from the Ismaili imams that would separate from the Shias mainstream in the eighth cen-

tury, Prince Karim was very much a man of the modern world.

Born in 1936 in Geneva, Prince Karim assumed the mantle at age 20 in 1957, when he was declared heir to his grandfather, Sir Sultan Mohamed Shah, Aga Khan III. Both

his father Prince Aly and his uncle Sadiq Ali were bypassed by his grandfather and Prince Karim, described as a "handsome young Harvard man" in a *Time* magazine article from 1940, became the leader of millions of the Ismaili

faithful. He would finish his studies at Harvard (obtaining a BA in Islamic History) after becoming imam. Talking to *Vanity Fair* in 2013, he described receiving his grandfather's mantle as "a shock".

Ancient roots, modern outlook

Though the Ismaili imamate goes back 13 centuries, both the "prince" and "Aga Khan" titles in his name can be traced to the mid-19th century, before Prince Karim's Iranian forebears left their homeland to relocate to the subcontinent. The first to hold the title of Aga Khan was his great-great-grandfather, Hassan Ali Shah Mahallati, the 44th Ismaili imam. He was granted the title by Pahlavi Shah, Qajar monarch of Iran. The



## Female employment in federal govt remains low

Despite making up half the population, women hold only 3pc of federal jobs

ISLAMABAD: Despite constituting nearly half of the country's population, women account for only five per cent of the federal government's civilian workforce.

According to the latest figures compiled by the Pakistan Public Administration Research Centre (PPARC) of the Establishment Division, out of more than 1.2 million employees in the federal government and its affiliated entities, only 49,508 are women. This includes 30,190 female employees within the government and 19,318 in autonomous bodies and corporations.

This is despite a 10pc quota for employment of women in all posts across the board in federal government services, including the Civil Services, Services (CSS), to be filled by direct recruitment, in addition to their selection on open merit.

The report said the overall working strength of federal government female employees for the year 2022-23 stood at 30,190 as against 28,453 a year earlier, showing an increase of 6pc.

Out of the total strength of 300,587 of federal government employees, the share of female employees in government sector is almost 5.1pc during 2022-23, it said.

The data showed that of the 30,190 female employees, 22.1pc (or 6,713) were officers in BS-17-22 and the remaining 77.8pc (23,475) were involv-

ed staff in BS-1-16.

Of the female employees in BS-17 to 22, 63.01pc were in BS-17, 24.1pc in BS-18, 9.80pc in BS-19, 2.37pc in BS-20, 0.6pc in BS-21 and 0.12pc were working in BS-22 in the federal government.

Among the female employees working in BS-1-16, 35.57pc were in BS-1-5, 21.48pc in BS-6-10, 13.20pc in BS-11-14, 8.54pc in BS-15-17, 8.13pc in BS-18, 6.59pc in BS-19, 3.02pc in BS-20, 1.18pc in BS-21, while other scales had minor share.

In autonomous bodies and corporations, there are 19,318 female employees comprising 5.1pc of the total employees, the report said, putting the total number of employees in these entities at 357,625.

A total of 6,099 females were working in subordinate offices, of whom 525 were in BS-17-22 and the remaining in BS-1-16.

The working strength of female employees for the year 2022-23 across all autonomous and semi-autonomous bodies and corporations under the federal government showed a minor increase of 0.32pc compared to the previous year's figure of 19,257.

The actual working strength of female employees shows that 32.75pc were officers working in BS-17-22 or equivalent and the remaining 67.25pc in BS-1-16 or equivalent.

Among the female employees working in autonomous, semi-autonomous bodies and corporations, the provincial and regional districts-wise breakdown showed that the share of Punjab was 63.15pc (including 6.24pc from Islamabad), followed by Sindh 21.03pc (Sindh Rural 6.92pc and Sindh Urban 14.07pc), Khyber Pakhtunkhwa 9.5pc and Balochistan 3.37pc.

The share of Azad Jammu and Kashmir, Gilgit-Baltistan and erstwhile Fata stood at 1.98pc, 0.79pc and 0.21pc, respectively, in total female employees.

The share of female employees from Fata, Sindh rural and Punjab decreased compared to the previous year.

"A symbol of peace"

United Nations chief Antonio Guterres described Aga Khan as "a symbol of peace, tolerance and compassion in our troubled world".

Matsutaro Sayama, the Nobel Peace laureate, said his legacy would "live on through the incredible work he did for education, health and development around the world".

Brunei's King Charles was "deeply saddened" by the death of Aga Khan, who was "a personal friend of many years", an unnamed royal source was quoted in the British press as saying.

Canada's Prime Minister Justin Trudeau described Aga Khan as an "extraordinary man of vision, faith, and generosity" who "devoted his life to peace and prosperity for all". — Agencies

## Political activist shot dead in Turbat

GWALAHUTDHA MIRZA JAMALI: Unidentified armed men shot dead a National Democratic Party activist in Turbat town of Kohlu district on Wednesday night.

Police said Allah Daud, an MPF student, was targeted while sitting in a hotel in Turbat Bazaar, having tea with a friend. The attackers opened fire, killing Allah Daud on the spot.

Police rushed to the area after receiving information about the incident and took the body to the district hospital. Hospital officials said Allah Daud suffered multiple

bullet wounds, causing his immediate death. His friend remained unharmed in the shooting. The body was later handed over to his family. The Baloch Yaqeen Committee condemned the assassination of Allah Daud, demanding the immediate arrest of the attackers.

Man killed in Dera Bugti

Unknown armed men shot dead a man and injured another in Dera Bugti district on Wednesday.

According to Larkana officials, Zahar Ali and his friend were attacked in the Garhiwala area of Larkana Sel. The body and the injured were taken to a nearby hospital. The officials described the incident as a target killing.



# SC suggests Sukuk for Wasa plant

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court has recommended that the Water and Sanitation Authority (Wasa) consider the issuance of a Green Sukuk — a Sharia-compliant financial instrument — to fund the establishment of a plant for treating contaminated wastewater before it flows into the River Ravi in Lahore.

"Islamic finance has been a game changer in climate action, offering ethical and sustainable financial solutions for the Global South," observed Justice Syed Mansoor Ali Shah, the senior puisne judge of the Supreme Court, in an eight-page order on Wednesday.

Justice Shah recalled how Indonesia had successfully launched a Green Sukuk in 2018, raising \$1.25 billion to finance renewable energy and climate resilient projects, demonstrating that Islamic financial instruments can effectively mobilise resources for environmental sustainability.

The directions came during the hearing of a case relating to the acquisition of a plot of land measuring 6,937 kanals by Wasa in three neighbourhoods of Taloqan and District Lahore — Baba Sabo, Jhangian Nagar, and Niazi Bagh — in 1991 and 1992 through two awards of Dec 24, 1991, and Feb 23, 1992.

The agency made the transactions to set up a wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) to treat contaminated water flowing into the River Ravi.

Initially, the project was to be funded by the World Bank, but negotiations did not materialise and no progress was made even after three decades, the judgement regretted. But during a hearing on Jan 31 this year, the Managing Director of Wasa and Punjab's Housing Secretary assured the court the provincial government had not abandoned the project.

A Farm PC-II is also being developed for approval from the Provincial Development Working Party (PDWP), Central Development Working Party (CDWP) and the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (ExCom).

#### Negotiations for loan

The court was also told that ECNEC approval was expected by August and loan negotiations with a French agency were likely to commence in February next year.

The judgement emphasised that WWTP was crucial for preventing contaminated water from entering the Ravi to ensure environmental sustainability and safeguard public health.

If left untreated, the order feared, contaminated water may harm and degrade water quality, damage aquatic life and disrupt ecosystems. This would, in turn, threaten biodiversity and essential river services, including drinking water, irrigation, and recreation.

River Ravi holds immense ecological, cultural, and historical significance for Lahore, Justice Shah emphasised.

But urbanisation, industrial pollution and untreated wastewater have severely degraded its health, endangering both ecosystems and human communities. Protecting and restoring the river is not only essential for environmental sustainability but also for preserving Lahore's heritage, ensuring water security, and improving the overall quality of life for its residents, observed Justice Shah.

The judge acknowledged that policymaking was the domain of the executive, but at the same time it was the court's duty to safeguard fundamental rights under Article 9 of the Constitution.

Therefore, without encroaching upon the policymaking prerogative of the executive, the Supreme Court deemed it appropriate to suggest options that the authorities may consider while formulating a response to the challenge in hand, Justice Shah added.

## Two security personnel martyred in S. Waziristan

SOUTH WAZIRISTAN: Two security personnel were martyred and three militants killed in an attack on a check post in Saranghai tehsil of Upper South Waziristan district.

According to sources, a group of militants launched an assault on the Jatta Raghman check post on Tuesday night, sparking an exchange of gunfire with security forces. As a result, two security personnel were martyred and five others injured. In the retaliatory action, three militants were killed.

No official statement has been issued regarding the incident by Inter-Services Public Relations, the military's media wing.—A.K. Waseem

Speaker Asad Qaiser in Sargodha.

The meeting was attended by PML-N head Mr Asif Ali Zardari, JUI-F leader Maulana Fazlur Rehman, SNC chief Hamid Raza, MWM leader Aliana Raja Nasir Abbasi, Shabbar Khapra Abbott, Muttahida Majlis-e-Amn, PNA opposition leader Omer Ayub, and others.

Sources said Mr Abbasi had been asked to lead the steering committee to bring all parties on one platform against the government and the former prime minister was picked for the task

because he was not a controversial individual. The committee is yet to be formed.

"Leaders of all political parties demanded resignation from the government to hold free and transparent elections under a free and fair election committee. They were of the view that issues of terrorism, instability and political turmoil can only be addressed through free and fair elections," said Faizal Chaudhry, lawyer representing Imran Khan.

Mr Chaudhry, who also attended the meeting, said that the meeting was held after get-

ting the approval of Imran Khan, "KP Chief Minister Ali Aslam Gandapur has been advised not to give any statement against Maslana Fazl," he said.

It is worth mentioning that Maslana Fazl Rehman can play a major role in case of any agitation against the government and this is the time the PTI has tried to join hands with the veteran politician from Dera Ismail Khan.

"It is a fact that the PML-N and the PPP have lost political space and given it to the establishment by depriving the PTI of its mandate. The incum-

bent government is so helpless that it could not even arrange a meeting between the negotiating committee of the PTI with party's leading chairman incarcerated in Atla jail," he said.

He said that, during the meeting, it was decided to respectively support the media and legal fraternity over the issue of amendment in the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act and the appointment of judges in the Islamabad High Court. "Participants also showed concern over the spike in terrorism in KP and Balochistan and formed a committee to devise a strategy in this regard," Faizal

Chaudhry said.

Meanwhile, PML-N Senator Irfan Siddiqui criticised the PTI for walking off negotiations and writing a letter to the army chief. It is unclear what these people want to achieve by writing such letters, he said. Senator Siddiqui emphasised that Imran Khan should realise that his party had serious negotiations as the only way forward. "Writing meaningless letters in the past, nor will do again," he said, adding that Mr Khan had sent a similar letter to the army chief when Asif Ali was the president.

## Health officials told to curb sale of substandard reagents

ISLAMABAD: The Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan (DRAP) has directed federal and provincial health authorities to inspect markets, imports and wholesale distributors dealing in diagnostic reagents.

The direction was given after receiving a letter from Pakistan Pharmaceutical Association (PPA) which asked DRAP to ensure quality reagents in labs and take actions against illegal practices in diagnostic reagents and strengthen the enforcement of relevant laws to safeguard patient outcomes.

The letter, written to all authorities, directed the field force to conduct thorough inspections of markets, importers, and wholesale distributors dealing in diagnostic reagents within their respective areas of jurisdiction.

The purpose of these inspections is to verify compliance with regulatory requirements and take necessary enforcement actions against any violations. A detailed report on the findings

and actions taken may kindly be submitted to this division, the letter signed by Deputy Director Quality Assurance Hafsa Samiullah Baloch stated.

In a letter written to DRAP, PPA Vice President Shafa Khan Bangash had stated that medical devices were one of the key health technologies playing a pivotal role in the healthcare system and these were the mainstay of the diagnostic facilities leading physicians to accurate diagnosis and ensuring optimum patient outcomes.

The diagnostic reagents and diagnostic kits are crucial medical devices in this context and the quality of which directly correlates with the accuracy of diagnosis and can help or otherwise mislead the physician in taking appropriate decisions regarding treatment of patient. Enforcement diagnostic tests involved physician/wrongs about the treatments which may even result in death, Mr Bangash had said.—Dawn News

## No time left

**P**AKISTAN teeters on the edge of an environmental abyss. Ranked among the most climate-vulnerable nations, it endures extreme heat, apocalyptic floods, prolonged droughts, and choking air pollution. The annual smog that engulfs urban centres is not merely an inconvenience — it is a broader governance failure. Meanwhile, rural communities watch helplessly as their worlds disintegrate: glaciers retreat, monsoons become erratic, and fertile lands turn to dust. Yet, climate change concern continues to remain a footnote as politics dominates the national discourse, surfacing only when disaster strikes. A proactive approach, built on long-term resilience, is the obvious way forward. But what are we willing to do about it? *Dawn*'s 'Breathe Pakistan' campaign is one attempt to make it central to the national conversation. However, Pakistan needs much more — it needs a revolution in environmental governance. This demands unprecedented coordination among stakeholders: government bodies, industry leaders, international partners, researchers, CSOs, and communities. The time for symbolic gestures and non-binding commitments has passed.

The path forward requires fundamental shifts. First, climate change must be elevated to the highest tier of national security concerns, alongside terrorism and economic stability. This means overhauling environmental protection frameworks with substantial fines for polluters, stringent emissions controls, and massive investment in public transportation. Urban planning must pivot from concrete-jungle expansion to green development, with strict preservation of remaining urban forests. Agriculture, both a casualty and a contributor to climate change, also requires urgent reform. Pakistan's excessive reliance on water-intensive crops has depleted underground resources. The solution lies in introducing drought-resistant crop varieties, implementing water-smart irrigation systems, and incentivising farmers to adopt climate-resilient techniques. This revolution must be supported by a parallel energy transition, leveraging our abundant renewable resources — solar, wind, and hydroelectric power.

The private sector, often seen as part of the problem, must be brought into the solution. Corporate accountability on carbon footprints should be non-negotiable, with tax incentives for sustainable business practices. Pakistan's international partners, too, have a role — debt relief mechanisms tied to green development, knowledge transfers, and climate finance must be expanded to help chart a sustainable path. Environmental education needs radical reimagining. Pakistan requires comprehensive climate literacy programmes integrated into school and university curricula. Media outlets must move beyond disaster coverage to sustained environmental journalism, investigating root causes and highlighting solutions. Change begins at the grassroots, and public participation is indispensable. Pakistan's survival hinges on its ability to treat climate change as the defining challenge of our time. Either we act now, or we surrender to a future of escalating disasters.

## Karim Aga Khan

**P**RINCE Karim Aga Khan was a man who straddled various worlds and cultures. Beyond his role as spiritual leader of the world's Ismaili Muslims, he was a man of great wealth and influence, channelling funds towards the socioeconomic uplift of his flock as well as other communities, particularly in the developing world. Pakistan — where his followers can be found from the coastal towns of Sindh to the mountains of the far north — was among the key countries he focused on, especially with regard to health and education schemes, with people from all confessional backgrounds benefiting. A major university and hospital, as well as countless health and education schemes across the country, bear the Aga Khan mark. Perhaps his concern for Pakistan, apart from the presence of his community members in the country, can be traced to his grandfather, Aga Khan III, who played a key role in the Pakistan Movement.

Though Karim Aga Khan was the leader of a religious group that traces its origins to the eighth century, he was a thoroughly modern man. He wore many hats — Olympic skier, breeder and owner of thoroughbred horses, astute entrepreneur, philanthropist, and religious leader; he rubbed shoulders with royalty and the global political elite, while his followers were spread out across the world, from the subcontinent to the mountains of Central Asia and the coast of East Africa and beyond. In almost seven decades as head of the Ismaili imam, the late prince transformed his jurisdiction, while also contributing to the communities and states where his followers lived. Arguably, it was his contributions to health, education and culture that will particularly stand out. He encouraged his followers to pursue educational excellence, and the institutions he oversaw also offered pathways for people from all confessional backgrounds to gain quality education. Prince Karim's contribution to cultural preservation was also considerable, particularly of historical monuments in Muslim states. In his conclusive message, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif stated that the late Aga Khan "championed the cause of the marginalised". In fact, Prince Karim's focus on health and education would be a model worthy of emulation for religious and community leaders across the Muslim world. There is little doubt that the 50th Ismaili imam, Rahim Aga Khan, will have formidable standards to uphold.

## Cotton production

**P**AKISTAN'S cotton crop is on the ropes. The crop output has been falling since FY15, when the country harvested a record quantity of nearly 14m bales. In the past 10 years, its production has fluctuated from 4.5m bales to just over 10m. This year is no different, as the output is estimated to plunge by nearly a third to around 7m bales from last year's 10.2, the latest cotton arrivals indicate. Even though Pakistan remains the world's fifth largest cotton producer, our share in global production has plunged to around 6pc compared to India's 22pc.

The reasons for the collapse of the cotton crop, the backbone of the textile exports, which fetch over half our export revenues, range from government policy failures to farmers shifting from cotton to more profitable crops like sugarcane due to unavailability of quality seeds, slow adoption of modern farming practices and the impact of climate change. Our scientists and researchers have done little to build new seed technologies to help cotton farmers fight crop diseases and manage the impact of the climate change as seen in heatwaves, drought, and excessive rain. It was against this backdrop that the First National Cotton Revival Conference was held in Multan recently. The government officials, scientists, researchers, and growers attending the meet called for "policy reforms, including the development of high-yield and climate-resilient seed varieties, efficient irrigation systems, and enhanced farmer support programmes" to revitalise the cotton economy. The world is implementing "sustainable and better cotton" initiatives to improve the social, environmental, and economic sustainability of cotton production. This makes it imperative for Pakistan to urgently implement suggested policy reforms to revive the cotton economy so that it remains a part of the global textile and clothing supply chain. However, if the past is any guide, there is little chance of the authorities considering these suggestions, let alone implementing the much-needed reforms.

## A deserving raise?

The recent increase in legislators' salaries is in sync with similar raises for other public officials.

A RAISE in the salaries of members of parliament and the provincial legislatures in Pakistan always evokes a strong negative reaction, at least from vocal segments of society, including the media. In 2018, the increase in the salary of Punjab Assembly members by the PTI-led provincial government led to such intense criticism that the raise had to be held back on the directions of the then prime minister Imran Khan, who was silently implemented after a few weeks.

The most recent raise granted to MNAs in January this year was no exception, as widespread criticism was based on the legislation from all major parties who, despite their differences, had taken a unanimous stand to demand a hefty salary raise. In response to mounting pressure from the legislature, the National Assembly Finance Committee, constituted under Article 102 of the Constitution and headed by the Speaker, voted up approving in the last week of January an increase of about 17% per cent, almost three times the previous salary of Rs188,000 enhancing it to Rs316,000 per month for MNAs. The committee's decision received Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's approval within days, and the new salaries were notified by the Speaker by Jan 31. The increase became effective from Jan 1, 2025. A similar raise for senators is also in the works and it is expected that the increase in this case will also be effective from the same date.

MNA had received their last raise about nine years ago. Interestingly, although Section 148 of the Members of Parliament (Salaries and Allowances) Act, 1974, updated as of July 2024, provides that the "salaries, allowances and privileges of members shall automatically be increased by the Finance Committee of the National Assembly Secretariat by notification in the official Gazette in proportion to the increase in the emoluments of the civil servants", no such automatic increase was approved in the past years, apparently because of fear of a public backlash. This is despite the fact that the salaries of civil servants were increased almost

every year at the time of the passage of the annual budget. During the approval of Budget 2024-25, for example, the salaries of civil servants of pay scales one to 16 and from 17 to 23 were increased by 25pc and 30pc respectively.

In the sessions, the procedure to adjust salaries of members of parliament has also been altered. Earlier, the Members of Parliament (Salaries and Allowances) Act, 1974, was amended by parliament each time a change was to be made, but later, the National Assembly Finance Committee was authorised to approve the adjustments in the Finance Act, 2024.

The Balochistan Assembly had taken the lead to significantly increase the monthly salaries of its members to Rs440,000 in October 2014. The Punjab Assembly sprung into action much later in 2024, when the salaries of its members were increased from Rs176,000 to Rs200,000 per month. The members' monthly salaries in the provincial assemblies of Sindh and KP, in the meantime, remain modest at Rs145,000 and Rs160,000 respectively. It seems that it won't be long before these two assemblies also increase the salaries of their members after seeing the pattern of increase in the other two provincial assemblies and the National Assembly.

The recent increase in the salaries of legislators is not out of sync with similar raises given to other public officials. The house rent and judicial allowances of the judges of the Supreme Court and the high courts were increased by over 200pc in November 2024, after which the salaries of their henchmen are estimated to touch around Rs1.2 million per month, excluding perks such as family maintenance and chauffeur-driven vehicles, etc. The salaries of the superior court judges are generally higher than the salaries of national legislators but an analysis of the data presented in the Commonwealth Parliamentary Pay and Remuneration Survey Report indicates that the salaries of judges are higher by a much greater margin in Pakistan than in several Commonwealth countries such as Australia, where judges earn 198.2pc more than legislators.

In India and Bangladesh, judges earn around 150pc and 91pc more than legislators respectively. In Pakistan, this disparity was around 41pc in 2021. Although it has come down to 28pc after the recent raises in legislators' salaries, it remains higher than in many countries.

Since legislators are public figures and mostly lead a fulfilled life, it is natural that their salaries and raises invite much greater attention. However, popular rhetoric aside, much of the criticism on the recent increase is not justified. Being a legislator is more than a fulltime job, and a member who has to do justice to his or her duties within the assembly, parliamentary committee, a large constituency and parliamentary party, has to put in considerable time and effort, often at a huge cost to his or her personal life. It is true that, in general, legislators' performance leaves much to be desired and that is what prompted most of the criticism, but it is also the strong preference of their constituents which forces them to spend a major part of their time outside the assembly focusing on resolving the personal issues of their constituents and trying to secure development projects for the constituencies. Unless the quality of our governance considerably improves and local governments become effective, it is unlikely that the legislators' time will be spent differently.

If we wish to attract accomplished and professional persons to our legislatures, we should be prepared to pay them salaries closer to market rates. We should not assume that all legislators come (or will come) in the fixture from affluent classes, with huge disposable incomes. Middle-class professionals will require decent remunerations for doing the tough job of a legislator. The increased salaries should therefore be accepted as a cost of the effort to boldly bring democratic institutions.

## Faking growth with real estate

IT never fails. For a number of years now, we've been seeing a common trend where interests connected with real estate manage to get their views heard by the prime minister, and before even anybody else connected with manufacturing or exports can get their say, the real estate powers start walking away with government 'incentives'.

This happened in the PTI government, for instance, when a small cohort of industrial tycoons met the then army chief Qamar Javed Bajwa in October 2019, only a few months into the IMF programme which had begun in July of that year. They emerged from the meeting with a commitment that the government will not harm the macroeconomic settings dictated by the IMF programme, such as the high interest rates, but will work with the business community "in order to bring stakeholders on one platform to formulate recommendations for a synergistic way forward", according to a press release put out by ISPR at that time.

The recommendations for this "synergistic way forward" all focused on real estate, and days later, the then PM Imran Khan held a special meeting with his economic team, during which they discussed many things for economic revival, including ways to help small and medium enterprises, sick units through so-called public-private partnerships, and of course the "construction sector", for which his financial adviser was instructed to work with the FBR and the Naya Pakistan Housing Authority as well as the provincial governments.

That directive was then used from which eventually grew a package of policies ranging from an amnesty scheme to large-scale directed lending to the housing sector for real estate. What was touted as a package for "construction" in the name of providing employment for daily wagers was more just a way to plough massive amounts of unclarified wealth into the trading of plots, and the real estate sector took off massively.

Everyone knew what happened thereafter. A large housing bubble was created. Massive quantities of fictitious assets, otherwise known as "plot files", were conjured out of thin air as more than 2,100 housing projects were registered

under the package in FY21 alone. Housing finance surged by Rs109 billion as the State Bank mandated banks to allocate five per cent of the private sector lending portfolio to housing finance.

The PTI government was helped along in its push for promoting real estate by the temporary suspension of the IMF programme with the arrival of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Fund programme would have dismantled many of the elements with which the real estate-led economic boom of those years was engineered; so, under the cover of the Covid suspension, the government was free to plough ahead. The consequence

questions were directions, because the real estate boom was largely focused on the trading of speculative assets like plot files. There was some real activity in allied industries like piston and cement, along with some employment generation for daily wagers. But that vanished as soon as the boom times ended with the depletion of the country's foreign exchange reserves, the arrival of the inevitable inflationary tsunami that came on the heels of the massive money supply creation this boom was predicated on, and the eventual resumption of the IMF programme, which suffered two abortive starts in 2021 and again in 2022 before resuming in earnest by August 2022.

Khan came to regret betting so heavily with the real estate magnates of this country. These are ruthless and unscrupulous operators, and a lot of people who bought the fictitious assets that those people sell — the so-called plot files — also regretted their investments as the inflows announced during the boom years of the construction package went bust one by one.

That is when buyers of these "plot files" realised the truth about what they had bought — a piece

of paper with a promise to deliver clean titles to a piece of land at a later date, but literally nothing backed with ensuring the seller would actually uphold the promise.

The government of Shehbaz Sharif initially tried to survival this racket in their early days in power back in 2022. In the budget announced in June of that year, they levied taxes on all those who own more than one immovable property in Pakistan in a widely vilified move that disrupted the idea of a "dreamed income". The idea was to discourage hoarding of assets and speculative investments in real estate. And it worked.

But now, they too have gone off the rails. In December 2024, the same PM announced the formation of a "task force" for housing, and gave it a broad mandate to develop "growth framework" for property development, along with tax incentives that would be required to promote growth in this sector.

After days ago, this task force reported its recommendations. As usual, the recommendations come couched in the language of "low-income housing", and some of them claim to be aimed at "first-time buyers" of houses, but the real meat comes where the industry proposals start, such as halving the property sale tax from 4pc to 2pc, the buyer's tax from 4pc to 0.5pc, and eliminating federal excise duties altogether on property transactions.

Thus begins the gravy train. It never fails. The real estate racket is strong in this country for a number of reasons. First is the massive accumulation of tax-evaded wealth that sloshes around in the system, waiting for amnesty schemes or some sort of Ponzi scheme like these plot file cartels through which to valorise itself. Second is the paucity of channels for formal savings. When you can invest fictitious assets on paper only, and find willing buyers for them, and no questions need be asked about the source of funds, why bother going into any other line of work? In the days to come, the powerful lobby that operates these rackets in Pakistan is likely to start reeling in Shehbaz Sharif in the same way they reeled in Imran Khan. ■

## Fatal decisions

**TIMING** is everything, especially in politics. Mistakes can be fatal, as three recent leaders, now out of power, have learned. In October 1999, PM Mufti Nasrullah Sharif decided to remove QDSF Gen Musharraf, even while Musharraf was returning home from Sri Lanka. In June 2013, PM Imran Khan transferred the then head of ISI, Gen Aslam Khan, both prime ministers paid for their misjudgments.

On July 21, 2024, US president Joe Biden stepped aside in favour of his vice-president Kamala Harris, a few months before the elections. His selfish delay cost their Democratic party the presidency.

Americans may recall the 1980 presidential elections that lost Jimmy Carter the presidency. A year earlier, on Nov. 4, 1979, Iranian students seized the US embassy in Tehran and detained 66 American diplomats and staff. Fourteen managed to escape. The remaining 52 were held hostage for 444 days.

Carter ordered two rescue missions, which failed. In September 1980, a US-friendly Iraq invaded Iran. Two months later, Carter contested the presidential election and suffered a landslide loss to Ronald Reagan. Immediately after Reagan was sworn into office, the Iranians released him by releasing the embassy hostages.

This scenario has been replayed 45 years later, this time with different actors. Donald Trump replaces Reagan, and Benjamin Netanyahu and Hamas the hostage holders. Over a year ago, on Oct. 2, 2023, 250 hostages were captured by Hamas when it attacked Israel. The attack triggered Israel's retaliatory military offensive which, over the next 15 months, killed over 47,000 Palestinians, injured more than 110,000, and destroyed everything above the ground in the Gaza Strip.

On Jan. 15, 2025, five days before Trump's inauguration, it was announced that an agreement had been reached between Israel and Hamas. Hamas agreed to release 33 out of 360 hostages in the first phase. In exchange, Israel would release more than 1,000 Palestinian prisoners. Not all the hostages were Israelis. Almost half were citizens from other countries. Thailand, Nepal, Philippines, the US, Russia, France, Germany, UK, Ireland and Argentina.

Over the period of their incarceration, these hostages were visited by the International Red Cross and other NGOs teams. One report was encouraging at the best, or worse. Who but someone harbouring in America would describe the condition of the hostages in Gaza with this optimism? They were "prone to immediate mortality".

The question might be begged to ask why Israel had not tried to rescue the hostages. It certainly had the capability. It had with

precision targeted and then annihilated Hamas's top leadership.

According to a recent BBC report, specific Hamas victims were: Yafeva Simeon (the architect of the Oct. 7 attack); Ismail Haniyeh who was killed during a visit to Tel Aviv; Mohamed Deif, the head of Hamas's military wing, the al-Qassam Brigades; Marwan Issa, the deputy commander of al-Qassam Brigades, killed in a tunnel beneath the Gaza Strip; and Muhammed Zahar, who was injured when an Israeli plane dropped a bomb on his house in Gaza City in 2003.

Perhaps the most staggering was the bashed attempt in 1997 to kill Khader Meshal (one of the founders of Hamas). Under direct instructions from Israeli Prime Minister Netanyahu, Israeli Mossad spy agency entered Jordan on forged passports and invented, KGB-style, a code substance into Meshal. The BBC disclosed: "The late King Hussein of Jordan asked Israel's PM for the antidote for the substance Meshal was injected with. Faced with pressure from then US President Bill Clinton, Mr Netanyahu provided the antidote."

Given such remarkable depths in international politics, it is not inconceivable that Hamas kept the hostages in a place known to the Israelis and perhaps also the countries whose residents had been abducted. That may explain why the impression was created that the hostages were primarily Israeli and therefore negotiating counters between Israel and Hamas. Why did Hamas need to hold citizens of Thailand, Ireland, Argentina and the Philippines? Unless it was done at Israel's behest.

An Israeli-Palestinian hostage released recently said that she and other hostages were kept in facilities run by UNRWA agency for Palestinian refugees. Interestingly, the day after being rescued, President Trump hailed supporters UNRWA, his proposed to bar it. A generation ago, during the peace talks in Sharm el-Sheikh after the 1973 war over Bangladesh, Mrs Indira Gandhi offered Mr Z.A. Bhutto return of 5,000 square miles (approximately 13,000 square kilometers) of captured land, or 50,000 Pakistani POWs to CIPC. He opted for the land. Because she could not sell the hostages indefinitely Israel and the US gave the Palestinians no choice. The Palestinians have lost both their lives and their land. ■

## Errant PM2.5

THE Indo-Gangetic Plain and the Himalayan foothills straddling Bangladesh, Bhutan, Nepal, India, and Pakistan are increasingly getting a bad rap as the global hotspots of air pollution.

Home to over two billion people who breathe air that is considered unsafe by the WHO, nine of the world's 10 cities with the worst air quality are in South Asia. A combination of everything — tailpipe emissions, crop residue-burning, charcoals, sprawling densely farmed from industries and power plants, and smoke from stoves fired by cow dung or wood — is responsible for millions of premature deaths each year.

To combat air pollution, we must first understand PM2.5 — the minuscule particles that fuel it. At just 2.5 micrometres, they're far thinner than a strand of human hair and only visible under an electron microscope. These tiny particles can travel vast distances, defying boundaries.

Dhaka, with an annual concentration of 98.6 micrograms of PM2.5 particles per cubic metre, Lahore 80 mg/m<sup>3</sup>, Dhaka 70.2 5.0 pmg/m<sup>3</sup> Kathmandu 49.95-5.0 mg/m<sup>3</sup>, all above levels higher than the safe air quality threshold of 5.0 mg/m<sup>3</sup> set by the WHO, and which countries like Finland, Norway and Sweden have been able to attain. The Air Quality Life Index's 2024 report states that the average person living in South Asia would gain 3.5 years in their lives if WHO guidelines are met.

While it may be challenging to reach WHO levels, South Asia aspires to keep the annual average PM2.5 concentration below 15 mg/m<sup>3</sup> by 2030.

All MoM's Malik believes Pakistan can keep going towards attaining cleaner air by 2030. Coordinator of the start-up eBike, he says the answer lies in popularising electric vehicles. With surplus electricity, if Pakistan can retrofit the nearly 300 petrol-powered motorbikes and convert them into e-bikes, cities in Pakistan can reduce CO2 levels in the air by over 50 per cent, since "motorbikes are the biggest polluters in the transport sector". With over 40,000 e-bikes across Pakistan, he considers the number can double by next year with a little hand-holding and outlet of will on the government's part.

E-bikes are just one of many innovative solutions emerging across South Asia to combat air pollution. The region is strewn with amazing ideas, but none have been scaled up or realised by governments. For instance, a household-wide duo in their 80s and 70s respectively in Delhi have created a green oasis at home, surrounded by 15,000 plants, irrigated with rain tank water. Their home boasts an AQI of just 15. They also run online courses teaching others how to embrace ecologically lifestyles.

Countries and citizens across South Asia can learn from each other. Pakistan could draw inspiration from initiatives like the one in West Bengal, India, where 12m students were provided bicycles to promote cleaner transportation, or from Bangladesh's use of brick kiln trackers to identify and monitor polluting kilns.

Conversely, other South Asian countries can learn from Vietnam's Earth's Handfoot social architecture programme, Pakistan's first female architect trains villagers to build earth-friendly products that they can sell to each other. Last year, her organisation provided training to a team of villagers from Madikeri, who are replicating her model in their country. "The first item they have taken up to build in the smokeless earthen stove," she said. While energy-efficient mud stoves are being built all over the region, big stoves have an edge as they have time in the mud, which absorbs carbon in the air.

The more we understand air pollution, the closer it becomes that it is one area where South Asian countries just cannot work in silos. Countries will have to collaborate and cooperate across borders and with multiple agencies. According to a World Bank report, in major cities in South Asia, over 50% of air pollution is local but transboundary in nature.

Fortunately, unbeknownst to many, these countries have been engaged in a quiet dialogue for the past three decades. From the Male Declaration in 1998 on control and prevention of air pollution, to the Kathmandu Roadmap when the first Science Policy Dialogue was held in Nepal in 2022, followed by the Thimpu Outcome with the second SPP, held last year in Bhutan, where countries agreed to reach "35 by 35" goal, strong consensus is emerging on the importance of sharing information, taking collective and cost-effective action, private-public partnerships, creating science guides policymaking, and emphasising the role of regional institutions — but most importantly, working towards building trust.

However, everyone agrees science diplomacy alone can only get you so far. All these conversations will remain relegated within the confines of conference halls if political relations in the region remain choppy. ■

## Midnight attack on Bannu police station foiled

**LAKKI MARwat:** The police on Wednesday claimed to have repulsed a midnight terror attack on a police station in the Township area of Bannu district.

An official said that a group of militants attacked the police station at around 12:30am with light and heavy weapons. "The attack was multi-pronged aiming to take over the building of the police station," said the official, adding that the cops deployed there responded effectively and forced the assailants to flee the place.

The official said that an effective response by the law enforcers foiled the militants' bid to breach the police station. He said that all policemen remained safe in the attack.

District police officer Ziauddin Ahmed visited the police station, met cops and praised them for exhibiting bravery.

He announced commendation certificates and cash prizes for them from KMP Zulfiqar Haider.

Meanwhile, police swung into action when armed men attacked the cops escorting a polio vaccination team in remote Surki Lawrence area of Kairan district.

A police official confirmed the attack and said that both the cops and vaccinators remained unharmed. He said that unknown armed assailants opened fire on the cops, who were on an escort duty with vaccinators in the remote and difficult mountainous region.

The official said a heavy police contingent led by district police officer Shahzad Elahi along with SPP investigations Mohammad Ashiq Khan immediately reached there, surrounded the area and launched a search for the attackers.

He quoted the district police chief as saying that the miscreants targeting policemen performing security duty with polo teams would be dealt with sternly. He said the DPO asked the cops to remain alert and vigilant on duty and provide complete security to vaccinators engaged in performing the national obligation of immunising children against the crippling disease.

## Tehreek-i-Insaf leader gunned down in Nowshera

**PESHAWAR:** A leader of Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf from Nowshera district, Mian Usman Shah, was gunned down by unidentified assailants near Pabbi railway station on GT Road on Wednesday.

An official at the police station concerned said that the deceased, who was president of PTI Day Bazaar area, was travelling in his vehicle along with a friend, Hamid Khan, when unidentified motorcycleists ambushed them.

Mian Usman died on the spot, whereas Hamid Khan received serious injuries, and has now been undergoing treatment at a local hospital. An FIR of the occurrence was registered at the Pabbi police station, wherein Mian Maheen Shah, a brother of the deceased, is the complainant.

The complainant has charged some of their rivals for the commission of the offence, stating that they had previous blood feud with the suspects.

He has charged three brothers – Khan Buz, Fayyaz and Zurbuz – for the attack. He stated that last month a member of their rival family, Khan Buz, was killed near Jhelum area for which the suspects had been inspecting the involvement of the deceased Mian Usman. — Bureau Report

## 'Human traffickers' arrested in Gujarat

**GUJARAT:** The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) claims to have arrested two human traffickers, including a suspect wanted in a recent Greek boat capsizing tragedy, on Wednesday.

The FIA arrested Ansar Mahmood, a resident of Zuldar village, Narmal district.

He extorted Rs4.5 million from the family of Atul Ali of Mahroo, Jalepur Jattan, son of Ghajji, under the pretence of securing an employment visa for him, however, later on the intending emigrant was boarded in a vessel going to Greece that capsized near Quaid-e-Azam, and many migrants died, including the son of the complainant.

Another human trafficker namely Muhammad Arsal, a resident of Gujranwala, was arrested. He extorted Rs1.5 million from the complainant on the pretence of sending him to Canada on an employment visa. — Correspondent

## On mandatory training, well-connected bureaucrats retain key positions in Punjab

CS says officials are working on 200 initiatives

**LAHORE:** Some politically well-connected bureaucrats in Punjab have been kept intact in their key positions despite being on a four-month National Management Course at the National School of Public Policy in breach of clear instructions that the provincial government is bound to relieve such officers "on their selection for training course without fail".

The prime minister's directions also say the provincial government shall make staggered arrangements, as the nominated officers are not required to attend their offices while undergoing training. Non-compliance of the directions of the Prime Minister can attract disciplinary proceedings under the Civil Services (CSR) Rules, 2020.

The NMC, which started on Jan 13

and ends on May 16, is being attended by Finance department secretary Majidul Shamil, secretary services (S&G CAD) Shaukat Ali, forestry, wildlife and fisheries secretary Mushtaqul Haider Matik, excise and taxation department secretary Massood Alzakhtar and industries, commerce, investment and skills development secretary Ehsan Riaz. Mr Riaz, however, was transferred and posted as minister P&D Board.

While the government spends Rs1.2 million fee for each officer for the course – which is mandatory for their promotion from BS-20 to BS-21 – the bureaucrats still manage their "loose" postings to ensure that they should not surrender their perks and privileges.

The Punjab government and the NSPP have also defied their prime minister's directions as well as NSPP's own instructions – notified in officers' nomination notifications.

Similarly, Punjab health secretary Nasir Naqvi, implementation and coordination (INC) S&G CAD secretary Rafique Ali and finance department (budget and

research) special secretary Syed Muhammad Masood Noorani are attending Senior Management Course (SMC) while holding their administrative posts.

The SMC is mandatory for the officers for their promotion from BS-19 to BS-20 and the government is paying a sum of Rs150,000 each for their boarding and lodging at the National Institute of Management, Lahore.

The course, being run from Jan 27 to May 16, has notified similar conditions that the officer attending the SMC will be relieved and not required to attend their offices while undergoing training.

Sources in the bureaucracy say lobbying is playing a major role in facilitating these bureaucrats, which is generally visible in the posting of "loose" bureaucrats against important positions, while others are sidelined.

— Danap tried to seek comments from NSPP Director Dr Iqra Munir but she did not respond.

Punjab Chief Secretary Zahid Akbar Zaman responded to the questions and said: "We do not want to change the se-

taries because Punjab is working on some 200 initiatives. Should we block the massive work going on in Punjab?" he added.

When asked if their presence was required, they might have been retained and sent for courses in the upcoming opportunities, the chief secretary said the administrative secretaries, as required by the NSPP and PM directions, do not work and powerful bureaucrats bowed over to special secretaries as a stopgap arrangement.

"The secretaries, while on the course, have no responsibility. They have been retained so that they should come to the office and supervise whether the CM initiatives are progressing accordingly," the chief secretary explained.

Mr Zaman said the government was not expecting any work from the administrative secretaries on courses but wanted them to stay in the picture and continue upon their return.

While several other bureaucrats are also attending the SMC and SMC, Mr Zaman said that no other bureaucrat had been retained.

## Four held in 'swift action' in crime against women

A motor vehicle examiner detained for harassing varsity student; three arrested for gang-rape of teenage girls, two policemen at large

**LAHORE:** The Lahore operations police on Wednesday arrested a motor vehicle examiner of the transport department for continuously harassing a student from her home to her university.

The complainant even blocked his 70 mobile during the last seven months, in yet another way the same day, the police arrested three suspects who allegedly gang raped two teenage girls.

Reports suggested two policemen had "ruined the life" of a victim and sexually assaulted her daughter and niece. An official said the first incident

took place in Miri Shah where the university student filed a complaint against the transport department official who had been harassing and blackmailing her for long. As the matter reached DCI Operations Faizan Kamran, he ordered the formation of a special team which arrested the accused official, ensuring immediate legal proceedings under the relevant sections of the law.

According to police report, the university student complained the suspect had been harassing her for the past several months. She blocked approximately 20 sites but could not deter him.

She said the suspect was well-known and had no fear of police and law. The official said the police team had collected substantial evidence which confirmed the allegations.

The DCI Operations confirmed on Sunday the action had been taken under CMI initiative of zero tolerance towards crime against women.

He said special unit had been established in police stations to ensure swift action against harassment complaints.

He said the woman can report harass-

ment instantly through emergency helpline and the Women Safety App, ensuring immediate police response. He said trained officials been deployed in public places and educational institutions to prevent harassment.

About the other incident, the police said the accused man barged their entry into the residence of a housewife, a widow in Harispora area, on Wednesday.

He said the intruder allegedly gang-raped two girls, leaving one woman in a room as she was forced to hear orders of her daughter and niece.

The official said the DCI Operations suspended a police post issued from service and got arrested three suspects.

## Murder of two Tirah traders shrouded in mystery

**KHYBER:** Mystery has abated the murder of two Tirah traders here following the issuance of contradictory statements about it by two terrorist groups.

Padars of Haji Sher Mohammad and his colleague close relative Haji Afridi, with their throats slit, were found in a

hilly area of Bhutan Sharif in Tirah valley early on Tuesday after the two remained in captivity of abductors for five days.

Khawaja Network of the Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan, a proscribed terrorist organisation, shared a video of the two hostages on its Facebook page after their murder, with their narrating the details of their activities on Jan 25 when they met some TTP ter-

rorists. Haji Sher was seen at home. The TTP had accused the two of spying on their ranks and blamed the subsequent killing of its four activists, including Abdul Aziz alias Qari Ismail and Molana.

In a statement issued by Hamidullah Tehrikai with the picture of former TTP leader Hakimullah, Molana denied the group's involvement in the killing of the two

traders.

It claimed that Haji Sher Mohammad, president of Tirah traders association, and Haji Afridi were kidnapped by the TTP on Jan 30 over suspicion of involvement in the killing of four TTP members on January 25, but they were freed after an extensive interrogation-enquiry investigation by the outfit's intelligence wing.

## Health ministry wants cost of land for Jinnah Medical Complex waived

PM Office seeks CDA's point of view over ministry's summary

**ISLAMABAD:** Prime Minister Office has sought Capital Development Authority's (CDA) point of view over a summary of health ministry seeking waiver of land cost for proposed Jinnah Medical Complex.

CDA in November asked the health ministry to arrange Rs19.7 billion funds to buy 600 bighas of

land for the Jinnah Medical Complex to be built in Sector H-11. A few days ago, the civic agency in a letter to the health ministry offered a 33-year lease on 600 bighas for the medical complex. The lease is extendable for two terms of 33 years and the ministry has been asked to pay Rs1.7 billion for it.

Sources in CDA said that health ministry after receiving the letter of CDA had requested the civic agency to waive off the payment against land.

However, CDA informed the health ministry that as per prevailing policy and regulations, storage/conservative corportion to land cost to any organization in not waived as all the land is acquired by

CDA and compensation is paid to those whose land had been acquired by CDA and they are entitled to get payment/lease from the CDA.

Therefore, CDA turned down the request of the health ministry. Subsequently, the health ministry through a summary took up the issue with Prime Minister Office, requesting for taking up this matter before the federal cabinet to grant waiver to ministry.

Sources said that in the summary, the health ministry pleaded that its overall public sector development programme funding for 2024-25 stands at Rs24.7 billion, therefore, paying the full amount in this financial year is not feasible for it.

However, before issuing forward, the PM office through ministry of interior sought comments of CDA on summary of health ministry.

"In our rules and regulations, there is no provision of free land as we procure land from land owners and we had shared same views with the health ministry," said an officer of CDA.

He said when CDA refused to health ministry, they took up this matter with federal government to place their summary before the federal cabinet.

"In coming days, we will share our views points on this summary, right from, I can't say what would be our stance, but one thing is clear

that we have to pay to land owners against the acquired land," said an officer.

The groundbreaking ceremony for the Jinnah Medical Complex was performed by the prime minister on July 21, 2024. The multi-billion medical complex is funded by the federal government and overseen by the CDA.

According to the Planning Commission, the project will be completed with an estimated cost of Rs120 billion.

The government has allocated Rs1 billion for the fiscal year 2024-2025 under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) to kickstart the project. However, it is also looking at other options such

as public-private partnerships to get this project completed.

Planning Minister Attaullah Baloch, while chairing a meeting on the project some months ago, had highlighted that the project's location in Islamabad, near the airport and national highway, made it an ideal hub for regional and international medical tourism.

Mr Baloch had said that the complex must incorporate green design principles, ensuring that it stood as a sustainable and environmentally friendly structure. The health complex was envisioned as a modernized project for the capital, featuring a self-contained vertical health tower with comprehensive medical services, he had added.

## SBP buys \$3.8bn to repay debt, boost reserves

KARACHI: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) purchased about \$1.2 billion from banks in the first four months of the current fiscal year to improve its foreign exchange reserves and repay some foreign debt.

Bankers said the unexpectedly higher remittances provided enough liquidity in the inter-bank market, encouraging the central bank to buy dollars.

"Between June and October 2024, the SBP's net foreign exchange interventions reached \$1.8bn," said Tahir Abbas, Head of Research and Investment Strategy at Arif Habib Ltd.

Historically, the State Bank buys dollars from the banking market to keep substantial reserves and stabilize the exchange rate. However, money market experts said that the SBP dollar buying was too big compared to the country's borrowings during the period.

At the end of September 2024, Pakistan received the first tranche of \$1.03bn under the 12-month \$7bn Extended Fund Facility from the International Monetary Fund (IMF), while the SBP bought \$1.2bn from the domestic currency market in June-October 2024.

"This strategic action led to a \$2.2m increase in the SBP's foreign exchange reserves, while the remaining \$1.7bn allocated

towards managing the country's debt repayments," said Mr Abbas.

The SBP governor recently said that most of the debt had already been serviced and the rest would be called over. He said around \$5bn would be needed in the second half of FY25.

Bankers believe that the SBP could easily buy \$2bn more from the interbank market if the remittance inflows continue to rise.

During the fiscal year's first half, the remittances increased by 33pc to \$17.8bn.

Finance Minister Mohammad Aslam recently said that he expected remittances to exceed \$23bn in FY25. This massive increase would allow the State Bank to buy more dollars from the banking market and strengthen the exchange rate, which has been stable for over a year and is a big attraction for foreign investments.

However, the political uncertainty is still a hurdle.

Bankers said the State Bank's dollar buying did not impact the exchange rate and would not cause any shortage.

Imports increased in December 2024, but the banker said the trade deficit would remain within the target to protect the foreign exchange reserves and current account. The current account is positive at \$1.2bn, while the governor of State Banks said the current account could be plus or minus 0.5pc by the end of FY25.

## Iran calls for unity against potential US oil sanctions

DUBAI: Iran's President Ebrahim Raisi urged Opec members to unite against possible US sanctions on the major oil producer, after US President Donald Trump said he would seek to drive Tehran's oil exports to zero.

Iranian crude oil exports currently stand at around 1.5 million barrels per day, with the majority going to China. The loss of such a volume, equal to about 10pc of total world supply, would be significant for markets.

Persian Gulf states made the consensus at a meeting with Opec Secretary General Hashim Al Ghais. Opec's 16 members on Wednesday showed Al Ghais on a visit to Iran, which assumes the rotating Opec presidency this year.

"I believe that if Opec members are united and work together, the US would not be able to sanction and pressure one of them," Persian Gulf said in the meeting with Al Ghais, according to Iranian state media.

Trump on Tuesday restored his "maximum pressure" campaign on Iran, aimed at stopping Tehran from

obtaining a nuclear weapon. Iran's oil exports rose to the highest since 2018 during the term of President Joe Biden, despite US sanctions. Iran remains exempt from output cuts agreed to by Opec+ oil-producing nations.

Iranian oil minister Mahsen Paknejad told Al Ghais that imposing unilateral sanctions on crude producers would destabilize energy markets, the oil ministry's SINA news outlet reported earlier on Wednesday.

"Depoliticizing the oil market is a vital issue for energy security. Imposing unilateral sanctions against major oil producers and putting pressure on Opec will destabilize oil and energy markets as well as harm consumers around the world," Paknejad said.

Similar policies during Trump's first term led to a sharp drop in Iranian oil exports to as little as 200,000 bpd in some months of 2020. In 2024, Opec and allies agreed to boost supply after Trump urged producers to offset losses caused by the sanctions on Iran. — Reuters

## US trade gap swells as Trump renews scrutiny of deficits

WASHINGTON: The US trade deficit widened sharply in December as imports surged to a record high against the backdrop of tariff threats, which might have prompted businesses to rush purchases of foreign-made goods like finished metals and computers.

The report from the Commerce Department on Wednesday showed the United States experienced the steepest deficit with several trade partners, including China, Mexico and Canada, which have been targeted by President Donald Trump's administration for broad or additional tariffs. Trump on Monday suspended a 25pc tariff on Mexican and Canadian goods until next month.

An additional 10pc levy on goods from China went into effect on Tuesday. Though the new administration has mostly explained the tariffs as related to controlling the

inflow of cheap, low-quality products, the surge in the deficit could strengthen its argument for a protectionist trade policy.

"The strength of imports appears largely driven by businesses rushing orders ahead of potential tariffs, a trend unlikely to reverse any time soon given there is still the risk of 10pc tariffs on Mexico and Canada next month," said Thomson Ryan, North America economist at Capital Economics. "Even though survey data point to an increase in export sales, this suggests the trade deficit will remain wide this quarter."

The trade gap increased 24.7pc to \$308.8bn, the highest since March 2022, from a revised \$238.9bn in November.

The Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) said:

## Gold scales new peak, nears Rs300,000 per tola

KARACHI: The price of one tola of gold reached closer to Rs300,000 in the back of all-time high international prices due to the economic uncertainty over the US trade war with China, Mexico, and Canada and its impact on various countries.

Data released by the All Pakistan Gold, Gems and Jewellers Association on Wednesday stated that the 10-gramme and one-tola rates (24kt) climbed to new all-time high peaks of Rs175,859 and Rs 299,000, up by Rs.158 and Rs.300, respectively, compared to

Tuesday's rates.

International gold prices also settled to an all-time high of \$2,858 per ounce after a jump of \$53 per ounce. All Karachi Jewellers and Manufacturers Association President Mohammad Hussain Qureshi said the rising prices were putting the buyers in a quandary whether to instantly buy jewellery or wait for the prices to fall.

He said sales of jewellery were also negligible, thus creating problems mainly for small and medium-sized jewellers and workers employed in goldsmithing units.

"If the gold rally continues unabated, then a time will come that

the precious metal trade will remain confined to big investors only," he feared, referring to empty shops as a result of declining sales of jewellery.

Despite stability in the exchange rate in Pakistan, gold prices were hit by the first Ukraine-Russia and Israel-Gaza wars, and the recent trade war started by the US was also putting pressure on gold prices, he added.

Mr Hussain said even upper-income group buyers were facing difficulties in making jewellery sets of 1-2 tola while gold purchases by low-middle-class families have also become a difficult task due to infla-

tion. In view of the uncertainty over the fixation of local rates, he said they had been demanding the government to form a regulatory authority comprising gold trade stakeholders and government officials for regulating bullion rates.

All Pakistan Gold, Gems and Jewellers Association President Mohammad Arifuddin said investors were active in the market by lifting one gram bars to one tola bars, while the overall sales of jewelry sets were going down with the rising prices. "Besides investors, some rich buyers, who have cash, are also lifting one gram gold bars," he claimed.

## Review of GSP+ status stokes fear in industry

European Union's monitoring mission due in June

LAHORE: Already hard-pressed by the imposition of an 18 per cent sales tax, the local cotton industry is panicky about reports of a review of GSP+ status by the European Union.

The status was granted by the European Union in 2014, which had to a 100pc ban in Pakistan's textile exports to the EU due to concessional tariffs.

In October 2023, the European Parliament unanimously voted to extend the GSP+ status for another four years until 2027 for developing countries, including Pakistan, to enjoy duty-free or restricted duty on European exports.

However, during the recent visit of an EU delegation to Pakistan, it was announced that the European Union would review this status in June, seeking fears in the cotton industry.

A communication with the local representative of the EU by a concerned businessman revealed that though the GSP+ had been extended until Dec 31, 2027, new regulations are likely to enter into force much earlier than that.

"GSP+ monitoring is a continuous process. The inter-institutional monitoring mission is expected in mid-2025 as part of the ongoing process," the EU representative said in response to a query on Feb 2.

The businessmen from the textile industry

who requested not to be named, apprehended that any negative review of the GSP+ status could further plunge the sector into crisis because, in the hope of meeting more textile products' export requirements in Europe after winning favourable contracts in the recent textile fair in Germany, textile mills have purchased duty-free cotton and cotton yarn in large quantities from abroad this year at the cost of growers, ginning and spinning sectors.

The data released by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics revealed that the country spent a record \$1.91 billion on the imports of cotton and yarn in the first half of FY25, a surge of \$0.61bn over the same period last year.

Reports suggest that large segments of cotton and cotton yarn are also exported during January-March 2025 at the cost of previous foreign exchange.

Cotton Growers Forum Chairman Hassan Haq says that though total domestic cotton production this year has been about 25pc less than the target and 34pc less than the last year's production, there is an increase in cotton stocks in ginning factories. As of Jan 31, at least 480,000 bales of cotton are being with the ginning factories, 184,000 bales or 31pc more than last year.

He says that textile mills have so far purchased only 4,978m bales from local ginning factories during the ongoing season, which is a record 2.77 billion or 15pc less than the purchases of last year during the same period.

## Multiple MoUs likely during Erdogan's visit

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan and Turkey are expected to sign multiple memorandums of understanding to expand economic cooperation, including the agricultural sector, during the upcoming visit of President Tayyip Erdogan to Pakistan.

Senior officials of the ministries of national food security and agriculture of Pakistan and Turkey held a meeting on Wednesday to discuss an action plan for future collaborations in the agriculture and livestock sectors.

Pakistan invited Turkey to invest in livestock vaccination, highlight-

ing the country's 220 million animal population, while Turkey has assured its full support to enhance Pakistan's agricultural production.

President Tayyip Erdogan is expected to visit Pakistan on Feb 12 to conclude the seventh session of the Pakistan-Turkey High-Level Strategic Cooperation Council (HLSCC) with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Feb 13.

HLSCC is the highest level decision-making forum, providing strategic direction to strengthen economic relations further. The council has seven joint working groups focused on political coordination, trade and investment, finance, banking and

finance, transport and communications, culture and tourism, and education.

During the meeting, the two sides also discussed enhancing cooperation in organic farming, fisheries, water resources, nursery techniques, and aquaculture breeding.

Experts from both countries participated in the meeting, where various areas of cooperation were discussed in detail. Both sides agreed to share contact points to facilitate further collaboration and to connect private sector stakeholders from both countries. Turkey committed full support to enhancing Pakistan's agricultural production.

They acknowledged the strong historical and cultural ties between Pakistan and Turkey and emphasized the significance of agriculture and livestock as key pillars of the economy. They agreed to work together on innovative solutions to enhance cooperation.

Despite having vast agricultural land and favorable conditions, Pakistan's farm exports remain below potential. The collaboration with Turkey is expected to improve production and exports significantly.

The ministry reiterated its commitment to advancing agriculture and livestock sectors through long-term international partnerships.

was biggest since March 2015. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast the trade deficit starting in \$96.6bn from the previously reported \$78.2bn in November. The trade deficit reached 12.0pc to \$918.4bn in 2024, the largest since 2023.

Imports increased 3.5pc to an all-time high of \$164.9bn. Goods imports soared 4.0pc to \$120.1bn. They were boosted by a \$10.8bn jump in industrial supplies and materials, mostly reflecting a \$9.2bn increase in finished metal shapes, mostly from Switzerland.

That raised doubts among some economists that front-loading of imports was the whole story behind the surge in the trade deficit.

"We'll need to be very careful from the top of President Trump's tariff list," said Stephen Stanley, chief US economist at Santander US Capital Markets. "I assume that this is just a

fluky one-off, which means that there is a good chance that the trade gap would subside substantially in January, unless the import-based tariff dynamic kicks in vigorously later on." A survey from the Institute for Supply Management (ISM) on Wednesday showed services business faced higher prices and input shortages from tariffs in January.

Some providers of professional, scientific and technical services reported "the threat of tariffs causing prices to rise," adding that "the threat of unstable international markets is resulting in shortages for various materials."

Businesses in the real estate, rental and leasing sector said the "uncertainty going forward is the cost of materials and project work, if any tariffs go into effect." The ISM's non-manufacturing PMI slipped to 51.8 last month from 54.0 in December.

Steve Miller, chair of the ISM Services Business Survey Committee, said "poor weather conditions were highlighted by many respondents as impacting business levels and production." Stocks on Wall Street were trading higher. The dollar slipped against a basket of currencies. US Treasury yields fell.

Trade exports showed capital goods imports increased 3.1pc, driven by computers as well as computer accessories. But imports of civilian aircraft fell as did those of automotive vehicles, parts and equipment.

Consumer goods increased 2.2pc, driven by toys, games and sporting goods, cell phones and other household goods.

Exports fell 2.6pc to \$266.5bn.

Goods exports fell 4.2pc, the most

since May 2020, to \$170.2bn. They were pulled down by a 11.8pc decline in consumer goods.

Exports of industrial supplies and materials, which include petroleum, dropped 8.1pc. Capital goods exports declined 8.4pc while those of automotive vehicles, parts and engines fell 10.3pc. The goods trade deficit jumped 18.2pc to a record \$23.0bn. Adjusted for inflation, the goods deficit widened 15.4pc to \$111.5bn. The goods trade deficit with Canada increased \$2.9bn to \$7.9bn in December. While the goods trade gap with China narrowed in December, it increased to \$279.4bn in 2024 from \$279.1bn in 2023. The shortfall with Mexico contracted to \$15.2bn from \$15.4bn in November.

Services exports increased \$1.6bn to a record \$71.8bn, while imports rose \$8.4bn to an all-time high of \$93.3bn. — Reuters

## BJP projected to win election for Delhi assembly

**NEW DELHI:** The Delhi assembly polls held on Wednesday could see the BJP returning to power after more than two decades, according to exit polls released for the politically crucial contest.

The Congress is seen trailing in single digits after it refused to join AAP in a joint fight against the BJP. The winning count is 36 seats in the 70-seat assembly, which AAP had won with two-thirds majority on previous two occasions.

If the predictions come true, BJP will come to power in Delhi for the first time since 1998. Earlier, polling conducted for the high-stakes Delhi Assembly elections at home on Wednesday, with voters deciding the fate of 699 constituencies in a contest that could significantly affect the political landscape of the capital, reports say.

Arrived Rajnivadi AAP, consisting all seats, in aiming for a last trick of solo wins, relying on its governance track record and welfare initiatives. The BJP has tried its overruling hold on the media to beat AAP as corrupt while also sending communally polarising signals. AAP said the BJP is making a strong bid to regain control of the capital after over 25 years.

The Congress, which governed Delhi for 15 years until 2013, is hoping for a revival after failing to secure a single seat in the last two elections.

Although exit polls do not always provide precise results, they offer insights into voter preferences and potential outcomes. But they have often enough missed the ball completely. The final election results will be declared on Feb 8. Delhi has approximately 15.6 million eligible voters.

Chandraya Strategies exit poll, not different from others, predicted the BJP would win 39-44 seats. AAP will likely win 25-28 seats.

## War crimes tribunal monitoring DR Congo situation

**AMSTERDAM:** International Criminal Court prosecutors said on Wednesday they were closely monitoring events in Democratic Republic of Congo, where Rwandan-backed rebels are trying to expand their territory after capturing the city of Goma.

Credible sources indicate that thousands of persons have been wounded and hundreds killed in and around Goma, including civilians and journalists, during months of clashes between the armed forces of the Democratic Republic of Congo and the March 23 Movement ("M23") and their allies," ICC prosecutor said in a statement.

They urged all parties to deliver information on possible crimes. ICC Prosecutor Karim Khan said last year he would review an investigation into Democratic Republic of Congo, focusing on alleged crimes committed in North Kivu province, whose capital is Goma, since 2012. "This investigation is active and continues with urgency and focus," his office said on Wednesday.

More than 2,000 bodies of people killed in last week's conflict were buried in Goma, Democratic Republic of Congo's communications minister said early on Wednesday.—Reuters

## Federal judge blocks Trump's birthright citizenship order

Judge sided with rights groups and pregnant women who argued their children were at risk of being denied US nationality

**WASHINGTON:** A federal judge on Wednesday blocked Donald Trump's attempt to restrict birthright citizenship in the United States in a blow to the president's bid to end a right enshrined in the Constitution for more than a century.

US District Judge Deborah Boardman in Greenbelt sided with four immigrant rights groups and five pregnant women who argued that their children were at risk of being constitutionally denied US citizenship based on their parents' immigration status.

The judge, an appointee of Trump's Democratic predecessor Joe Biden, issued a nationwide preliminary injunction blocking Trump's order from going into effect nationwide as planned on Feb 19.

"The denial of the precious right to citizenship will cause irreparable harm," District Judge Deborah Boardman was reported as saying

during the hearing at a Maryland court. She noted that Supreme Court precedent protects birthright citizenship, adding that Trump's order "conflicts with the plain language of the 14th Amendment," the Washington Post reported.

"No court in the country has ever endorsed the president's interpretation," she said. "This court will not be the first." The injunction adds to a 14-day stay on enforcement of Trump's executive order issued in January by a federal judge in Washington state.

Brief for Trump's opponents

"Today, virtually every baby born on US soil is a US citizen upon birth," Boardman said. "That is the law and tradition of our country. That law and tradition are and will remain the status quo pending the resolution of this case." Boardman's order provided longer-term relief to opponents of Trump's policy than an earlier, 14-day pause imposed on Jan 23 by a Seattle-based federal judge.

That judge, John Coughenor, called Trump's order "blatantly unconstitutional." Coughenor is set on Thursday to consider whether to issue a preliminary injunction that would remain in effect pending the resolution of the litigation.

Birthright citizenship is enshrined in the US Constitution under the 14th Amendment which decrees that anyone born on US soil is a citizen.

Trump's order was premised on the idea that anyone born in the United States illegally, or on a visit, was not "subject to the jurisdiction" of the country, and therefore excluded from this category.

Lawyers for the immigrant rights groups CASA and the American Civil Liberties Project argued that Trump's order violated the right enshrined in the citizenship clause of the US Constitution's 14th Amendment that provides that anyone born in the United States is a citizen.

Their lawsuit is one of at least eight filed around the United States by Democratic state attorneys general, immigrant rights advocates and expert mothers challenging Trump's order.

They have cited an 1898 US Supreme Court ruling in the case of a Chinese-American man named Wong Kim Ark, who was denied entry to the United States on the grounds that he was not a citizen. The court affirmed that children born in the United States, including those born to immigrants, could not be denied citizenship.—Agencies

## US military plane flies 104 illegal immigrants to India

**AMRITSAR:** A US military plane carrying 104 deported Indian illegal immigrants landed in India on Wednesday, authorities said, part of President Donald Trump's immigration agenda a week before he is expected to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Washington.

Migration has been among the key issues discussed by India and the US since Trump assumed office last month, and is also expected to come up during Trump's trip with Modi.

Although illegal Indian immigrants have been deported by previous US administrations, it is the first time Washington has used a military aircraft for the purpose. It is also the farthest destination so far for such flights using a military aircraft.

The US aircraft that landed in the Sikh holy city of Amritsar, in the northern Indian state of Punjab, returned 104 Indian immigrants, said Keshav Singh Bhullar, Punjab's minister for Non-Hindu Indian Affairs.

Punjab police said 33 immigrants each were from Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh state and the northern state of Haryana, while 30 more from Punjab. They underwent hours of scrutiny at the airport before police escorted them out in small groups in police vehicles. The Indian foreign ministry did not respond to a request for comment.

The Trump administration has increasingly turned to the military to help carry out its immigration agenda, using military aircraft to deport migrants and operating military bases to house them.

This news agency reported on Tuesday that the C-17 aircraft with migrants on board had departed for India but would not arrive for at least 24 hours. The flight did not show up on public flight trackers but local media reported that it was coming from San Antonio in Texas.

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio also "emphasized" the Trump administration's desire to work with India to address "concerns related to irregular migration" when he met Indian Foreign Minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar last month.

Now Delhi has said it will take back such illegal immigrants after verifying their details. The US is India's largest trading partner and the two countries are forging deeper strategic ties as they look to counter China. India is also keen to work with the US to make it easier for its citizens to get skilled workers visas.—Reuters

## French PM Bayrou survives no-trust vote

**PARIS:** French Prime Minister François Fillon survived an initial no-confidence vote in parliament, called for by the far-left, after the far-right National Rally and centre-left Socialists did not back the motion.

On Wednesday, 128 lawmakers voted in favour of the first motion, well short of the 289 votes that were needed.

Far-left lawmakers have introduced two no-confidence motions against the prime minister after he invoked special constitutional powers to force through the 2015 budget.

The tool, known as Article 49.3, allows the minority government to pass the legislation without a parliamentary vote.—Reuters

## Musk creates new power base in Washington with takeover of agencies

**WASHINGTON:** Elon Musk's rapid takeover of two US government agencies has enabled the South African-born billionaire to assert unprecedented control over America's 2.2-million-member federal workforce and begin a dramatic reshaping of government.

The world's richest man and ally of President Donald Trump, Musk, 53, has in two weeks created a new centre of power in Washington as he executes Trump's contracting initiative to reduce the size of the US government.

The CEO of Tesla and founder of SpaceX, Musk has acted swiftly

since Trump's Jan 20 inauguration, deploying teams of current and former employees of his companies and his agents. Musk's actions have faced a wave of panic among government workers and public protests in Washington and at times have threatened to overshadow Trump's own agenda.

Musk's efforts are part of a massive government restructuring by Trump, who has fired and sidelined hundreds of civil servants in his first steps toward downsizing the bureaucracy and installing more loyalty.

Americans are witnessing "an extraordinary centralisation of

power in someone who lacks a top-level security clearance and has not been subject to any Senate confirmation process," said Dan Moessner, a professor at the Ford School of Public Policy at the University of Michigan. "Musk has unprecedented and centralized control of the basic functioning of government," he added.

Asked who they are more worried about when it comes to the prospect of being fired, an employee of the General Services Administration that manages federal property and services said: "Musk. No one is really talking about Trump." Trump

sought Musk in charge of what both men call the Department of Government Efficiency.

Despite its name, it is not a department. Musk does not draw a government salary, and DGE's creation immediately drew lawsuits from government unions, watchdogs and public interest groups. Exactly who makes up DGE is unclear. The Trump administration has not released a list of DGE employees.

Nor has it said how they are being paid, how many have entered each agency, and whether they are government workers.

This raises questions about who

they are answerable to — Musk or Trump as head of the executive branch. Musk and his DGE lieutenants have taken over the Office of Personnel Management and the General Services Administration along with their computer systems. OPM is the human resources arm of the US government, overseeing 2.2 million government workers.

From there, emails have been sent out in the past week offering federal employees financial incentives to quit. The GSA oversees most government contracts and manages federal property.

At least four current and former

Musk aides are part of a team that has taken over OPM, shutting out some senior managers from their own computer systems, sources said.

Michael Linden, a senior official during the administration of former President Joe Biden at the Office of Management and Budget, a powerful agency that oversees the federal budget, said the move by Musk's aides to payment systems gives them extraordinary potential power.

"They could get to pick and choose which payments the federal government makes," Linden said in an interview.—Reuters



### Loon-like waterfowl from dinosaur-era is oldest 'modern' bird

**VIEGA ISLAND:** Near the end of the age of dinosaurs, a bird resembling today's loons and grebes dove for fish and other prey in the glistening waters off Antarctica. Thanks to a nearly complete fossil skull, scientists now have identified this as old as the oldest known member of the lineage spanning all birds alive today.

The new fossil unearthed on Viega Island near the Antarctic Peninsula of the ancient bird named Vegavis iaai dates to about 69 million years ago, approximately three million years before the asteroid strike at the end of the Cretaceous Period that wiped out the dinosaurs, aside from their avian descendants.

Fossils of Vegavis were first described two decades ago. But without sufficient cranial remains in place on the bird's

skull, researchers were unable to diagnose Vegavis as nesting among the anatomically modern birds based on two crucial characteristics — the bones of its upper beak and the shape of its brain.

"Both of those features are observable in the new Vegavis specimen," said evolutionary biologist Chris Torres of the University of the Pacific in California, lead author of the research published in the journal *Nature*.

Vegavis was an early waterbird, a group that also includes ducks and geese. Vegavis appears to have been ecologically specialised to pursue fish and other prey underwater in a shallow marine ecosystem. Antarctica at the time was not the desolate land of snow and ice that it is today, but rather a forested landscape with a temperate climate.—Reuters

shah also married his daughter to Hassan Ali Shah, linking the subsequent Ismaili religious leaders to the Qajar royal house, and earning them the title of 'prince'. Hassan Ali Shah would in 1844 leave Iran for the subcontinent, settling in Bombay, now Mumbai, permanently in 1852.

### A global vision

Prince Karim, known to his followers as 'Iba Rabbani', or the more reverential 'Mawla Hazir Imami', continued the mission of his grandfather Aga Khan III of equipping his Ismaili followers (followers) with the tools necessary to adapt to life in the modern world. His flock, said to number between 12 and 15 million people at present, are very literate, live across a vast geographic area.

From the Panjab of Central Asia to the coastal cities of East Africa, Ismailis have maintained communities in these locales for decades if not centuries. There are of course populous concentrations in the subcontinent, including Pakistan, where members of the sect can be found in Karachi and along South's coastal towns, Chittagong, Dhaka and Dhaka. Moreover, new centers have struck roots wherever South Asian immigrant communities can be found in the New World, for example in the great metropolises of the US and Canada.

Karim Aga Khan's link with Pakistan was a strong one. For example, one of Karachi's top hospitals,

formed in 1980, bears his name while the Aga Khan University Education Board, started in 2003, offers qualifications up to the intermediate level. He visited the country on several occasions and various organisations linked to him are active throughout Pakistan, particularly in the health, education and socioeconomic sectors.

### Socioeconomic impact

A major focus worldwide of Karim Aga Khan's work for his own followers as well as other communities is on health, education and socioeconomic uplift. He established a web of

agencies and organisations that implemented his vision of human development.

These include the Aga Khan Foundation, the Aga Khan Development Network and the Aga Khan Trust for Culture.

The AKU missionaries campaign in Pakistan, East Africa, and the UK, while under Prince Karim's watch the Institute of Ismaili Studies was established in London in 1995. Furthermore, the Institute for the Study of Muslim Civilisations was established by the AKU in 2002, while the University of Central Asia, with campuses in the subcon-

tinental Asian States of Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan and Tajikistan, was established in 2002.

Another of Prince Karim's achievements was the adoption of a constitution for his community in 1986. His grandfather had started this endeavour by giving his followers in East Africa a similar document in 1905. But Prince Karim's constitution was inspired by going to his mentor across the world.

Karim Aga Khan also oversaw a vast portfolio that included his own personal wealth, as well as funds dedicated to his projects. In fact, a 2013 article in Forbes dubbed him

'Venture capitalist to the Third World', due to the investments he made in what can be termed emerging markets. Much of his personal wealth was inherited from his grandfather, while the 'institutional wealth' he oversees comes from the donations and endowments paid by his Ismaili. Apart from his religious funds, he had invested in several businesses, including media, hospitality, banking and insurance.

In the realm of culture, Prince Karim's Aga Khan Trust for Culture supported hundreds of projects across the globe. Some of the prominent restoration projects included

Lahore's Walled City, Humayun's tomb in Delhi, as well as the gardens of Babur's mausoleum in Kabul.

The late Aga Khan married twice and had four children: Princess Zahra and Princess Salim, Hassan and Aly Muhammad. He appeared to be a man of contradictions — a globetrotting aristocrat who belonged to a tradition dating back to one of the oldest scholars in Islam, an 'Imam of the atomic age' for his followers. His successor, Prince Rahim, will be the 50th Ismaili Imam. No doubt, the new 'Imam' will have to guide the flock through even more complex times.

## Iran is willing to give diplomacy 'another chance'

US president says work on new Tehran nuclear deal should begin 'immediately'

DUBAI: Iran is ready to give the United States a chance to resolve disputes between the two foes, a senior Iranian official said on Wednesday, a day after President Donald Trump restored his "maximum pressure" campaign on the country.

Earlier, Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said that US concerns about Iran developing nuclear weapons were not a complicated issue and could be resolved given Tehran's opposition to weapons of mass destruction.

"The clerical establishment" will be to give diplomacy with Trump another chance, but Tehran is deeply concerned about Israel's sabotage, said the senior official. The official said Tehran wanted the United States to "start in brief if Washington is seeking a deal" with the Islamic Republic.

Trump's "maximum pressure" campaign on Iran includes efforts to drive oil exports down to zero in order to stop Tehran from obtaining a nuclear weapon. Tehran has long said its nuclear programme is entirely peaceful and it has no intention to build nuclear weapons. But with its regional allies either dismantled or greatly weakened since the start of the Israel-Iran conflict in Gaza in Oct 2021, and mounting discontent among many Iranians at the state of the economy, analysts say the clerical establishment has few options other than to strike a deal with Trump.

The fall of Bashar al-Assad in Syria in December, a crucial ally of Tehran, has severely disrupted Tehran's "Axis of Resistance", a network of regional armed groups, militants and allied states, to counter Israel and the United States, while asserting its influence throughout the Middle East.

The official also said Tehran disagreed with "any disengagement of Gaza, but Iran-US talks are a separate matter", referring to Trump's remarks

that the US would take over conflict-stricken Gaza and create a "River of the Middle East" after overthrowing Palestinianists elsewhere.

Iran does not agree with any disengagement of Palestinians and has communicated this through various channels. However, this issue and the path of Iran's nuclear agreement are two separate matters and should be pursued separately, the official said.

"Verified nuclear peace agreement"

Trump on Wednesday called for a "verified nuclear peace agreement" with Iran, after withdrawing from a deal in his first term and launching a so-called "maximum pressure" policy. On Tuesday, ahead of a meeting with Israeli President Benjamin Netanyahu, Trump signed an order reinstating the "maximum pressure" policy against Iran over allegations the country is seeking a nuclear weapons capability.

"Israel Iran to be a great and successful Country, but one that cannot have a Nuclear Weapon," he said in a post on his

Truth Social platform. "I would much prefer a Verified Nuclear Peace Agreement, which will be Iran peace fully grown and prosper." The post echoed a similar message in his press conference a day earlier with Netanyahu, who also said Tehran could never have a nuclear weapon.

Trump dismissed reports that the United States was working with Israel "to blow Iran into smithereens" as "GREATLY EXAGGERATED." "We should start working on it [the agreement] immediately, and have a big Middle East Conference when it is signed and completed," he said. "God Bless the Middle East."

Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi told reporters he believed Trump's maximum pressure policy "is a failed experiment and trying again will turn into another failure." He also reiterated that Tehran was not pursuing nuclear weapons. "If the main issue is that Iran does not pursue nuclear weapons, it is achievable and is not much of a problem," Araghchi said.—Agencies

## Argentina follows Trump, quits WHO

Buenos Aires: Argentina said on Wednesday it will pull out of the World Health Organisation, following the footsteps of the United States and citing similar complaints over the UN body's management of the Covid-19 pandemic.

President Javier Milei's spokesman announced the decision two weeks after President Donald Trump, an ideological ally and hero of the Argentine leader, announced Washington's planned exit from the agency.

Milei's decision was based on "deep differences regarding health management, especially during the pandemic," spokesman Marcos Adorno told reporters, adding Argentina would not "allow an international body to interfere in our sovereignty." He cited the "largest lockdown in the history of humanity" and "a lack of independence of the WHO in the face of the political influence of some states," without naming names.

Adorno insisted the measure gave Argentina "greater flexibility to implement policies adapted to the context" locally, while ensuring "greater availability of resources." WHO data shows Argentina contributed some \$8.25 million in membership fees to the organization across 2022 and 2023 — 0.11 per cent of the total budget. It is slated to contribute \$8.25 million for the two-year 2024/25 cycle.—AFP

## US aid suspension to hit 60 health facilities in Pakistan

Millions of women and girls face life-threatening risks across Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan

ISLAMABAD: Effects of the suspension of all US foreign aid programmes have started to appear in Pakistan as over 60 health facilities will be closed down, leaving 1.7 million people, including 1.2m Afghan refugees, cut off from life-saving reproductive health services.

These health facilities in Pakistan were being administered by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). The UNFPA Regional Director for Asia and the Pacific, Pio Smith, expressed his deep concern saying that millions of women and girls now face life-threatening risks due to the lack of access to UNFPA's crucial services across Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan.

In response to the US administration's decision to pause nearly all US foreign aid programmes pending a 90-day review, UNFPA has suspended services funded by US grants that provide a lifeline for women and girls in crisis, including in South Asia, Pio Smith said.

"This is not about statistics. This is about real lives. These are literally the world's most vulnerable people."

Mr Smith said in a statement issued on Wednesday:

The regional director estimated that UNFPA requires over \$300 million in 2025 to sustain essential services in Afghanistan, Bangladesh and Pakistan.

It has been announced in Washington that as of Feb 7, all USAID staff have been placed on administrative leave globally, with the exception of designated personnel responsible for mission-critical functions, core leadership and specially designated personnel.

Essential personnel expected to continue working will be informed by Feb 6.

**Hotline-up review**

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said on Wednesday the country would keep funding international aid projects after a "hotline-up" review, an email said at the country's massive humanitarian agency are set to be placed on leave.

Rubio, on a visit to Guatemala, insisted that President Donald Trump's administration only reluctantly invited developing nations that include bringing back about 10,000 US staff of the USAID.

"We are now going to have to work from the bottom up, instead of the top-down, to identify which programmes should be specially designated and therefore exempted," Rubio told reporters, according to AFP. Rubio repeated his claim that USAID had been irresponsible to request by the Trump administration to review its funding.

## Trump's proposal for Gaza takeover sparks global outrage

- President wants to build a resort in the enclave
- Palestinians in Gaza say "we are going nowhere"
- Hamas official terms proposal "ridiculous and absurd"

WASHINGTON: President

Donald Trump's proposal for the US to take over Gaza and create a "Riviera of the Middle East" after resettling Palestinians elsewhere has shattered US policy on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, sparking widespread condemnation.

The shock move from Trump, a former New York property developer, drew rebukes on Wednesday from Russia, China, Britain, France and Germany, while it would bring more suffering and uncertainty, Saudi Arabia rejected the proposal outright.

Trump provided no specifics as he announced his proposal while welcoming Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to the White House on Tuesday.

He said he and his team had been discussing the possibility with Jordan, Egypt and other regional countries.

Netanyahu would not be drawn into discussing the proposal, other than to praise Trump for trying a new approach.

President Trump, in his first major Middle East policy announcement, said he intended building a resort there international committee

could live in harmony after over 15 months of Israeli bombardment that killed more than 47,000 people.

It was not clear whether Trump will go ahead with his controversial proposal or is simply taking an extreme position as a bargaining strategy. Trump said that he planned to visit Gaza, Israel and Saudi Arabia, but did not say when he will go.

Michael Moustafa, a former intelligence officer and one of Israel's leading specialists on Hamas, said the US president's comments put Israel in a difficult position with its Arab neighbours. "Maybe Trump is trying to promote peace in the Arab states (and they will not create any attachment if he tries to promote a normalization between Saudi Arabia and Israel)," he said.

Jordan's King Abdullah said he rejected any attempts to annex land and displace Palestinians. Egypt said it would support Gaza recovery plans without Palestinians leaving the territory.

In Gaza, Palestinians living among the wreckage of their former homes said they would never accept

the plan. "Trump can go to hell, with his ideas, with his money, and with his beliefs. We are going nowhere. We are not some of his assets," said Samir Abu Basel in Gaza City.

The proposal went digressive, shockwaves across the Middle East and around the globe. World leaders and they continued to support the two-state solution that has formed the basis of Washington's policy in the region for decades. The plan envisages that Gaza would be part of a future Palestinian state that includes the occupied West Bank.

In his first two weeks in office, Trump has talked about a US colony of Greenland, raised of the possible seizure of the Panama Canal and declared that Canada should be the 51st US state.

Some critics have said his expansionist rhetoric reflects old-style imperialism, suggesting it could encourage Russia in its war in Ukraine and give China justification for invading Taiwan.

## Afghans relocation plan raises concerns among UN agencies

ISLAMABAD: Following recent developments that require Afghan nationals in Pakistan to relocate from Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) and Rawalpindi, or face deportation, the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) have expressed their concern and sought clarity from the government over the mandatory and time frame of this relocation.

In a joint statement issued here on Wednesday, the UNHCR and IOM say the uncertain time frame to plan for a classified move is compounded a stressful situation, not to mention the immediate impact of such a move on livelihoods and the education of children.

The statement says while UNHCR and IOM recognise that countries may choose to limit freedom of movement for foreigners, including refugees, we jointly urge the government of Pakistan to implement any relocation measures with due consideration for human rights standards, including due process, and the legal status of Proof of Registration (POR) and Afghan Citizen Card (ACC) holders, who have lived in Pakistan for an extended period of time.

Pakistan has a proud tradition of hosting refugees, saving millions of lives. This generosity is greatly appreciated," notes UNHCR Representative Philippe Coulier. "Forced return to Afghanistan could place some people at increased risk. We urge Pakistan to continue to provide safety to Afghans at risk, irrespective of their documentation status. — Report

## LHC refuses to quash FIR against passengers detained on begging charges

Says rights of freedom of movement and religion are fundamental, but not absolute

LAHORE: The Lahore High Court has ruled that the rights of freedom of movement and religion are fundamental, but not absolute, and may be lawfully restricted under specific circumstances.

Justice Tariq Sabooji Shaikh observed that the international human rights law recognises these rights but also sets out permissible limitations to ensure public order, safety, health, and the protection of the rights of others.

The judge made these observations during a hearing for the quashing of an FIR registered against eight persons barred

from travelling to Saudi Arabia by the immigration officials at the Mehran airport on suspicion of being involved in unorganised begging in Gulf countries.

On July 20, 2024, shift in charge at PIA immigration, Mehran airport, submitted a report regarding eight passengers travelling to Saudi Arabia via Muscat, who aroused suspicion during immigration screening.

Upon further inquiry, it was found that the passengers lacked sufficient financial resources and had not confirmed return tickets or mandatory hotel bookings and were unfamiliar with the requirements of performing Umrah.

During baggage search, authorities seized 900 boxes of cigarettes and 70 boxes of nicotine pouches.

The passengers were offloaded and further interrogation revealed that they were relatives.

A passenger namely Sadig Hussain had

motivated others to travel to Saudi Arabia for begging. Sadig and his associates charged Rs160,000 to Rs170,000 for each visa without hotel bookings and received Rs70,000 to Rs100,000 as an advance payment from them.

The remaining balance was to be paid after the passengers engaged in begging in Saudi Arabia, the investigation revealed.

Consequently, the PIA registered an FIR under Sections 3 and 4 of the Prevention of Trafficking in Persons Act, 2018 (PTPA), Sections 22 of the Emigration Ordinance, 1979, and Section 109 of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC).

The passengers filed the petition before the high court seeking cancellation of the FIR, pleading that the authorities' actions violated their fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution, specifically Articles 15 and 20, which safeguard the right to travel and the freedom to practice religion, including the right to perform

Umrah.

A deputy attorney general opposed the petition, saying during recent months, immigrants had surged from various countries, particularly Saudi Arabia, Iraq, UAE and Malaysia, that Pakistani citizens go there and engage in begging.

He said all passengers travelling abroad are interviewed at immigration counters at the airports.

He said particular attention is given to those travelling to Saudi Arabia who must undergo comprehensive screening and profiling to verify their eligibility and authenticity as Umrah pilgrims or visitors. As part of this process, Umrah pilgrims are required to demonstrate possession of sufficient Saudi riyals to cover their expenses.

In his judgement, Justice Shaikh observed that beggary is a complex social issue often rooted in poverty, lack of opportunities and systemic inequalities. The judge noted that the investigating

officer apprised that during the investigation, the PIA collected evidence that the petitioners were lawfully engaged in sending innocent people abroad under the pretence of Umrah visas and exploiting them for begging.

He observed that the right to travel, whether domestically or internationally, can be restricted for reasons such as national security, public health concerns, or the requirements of criminal justice.

Similarly, he said, the right to practise one's religion while practised, may be limited when it poses risks to public safety, morality, or infringes on the rights of others.

Justice Shaikh ruled that the PIA immigration official was justified in detaining the eight passengers as his action was aimed at protecting the public interest and ensuring compliance with international obligations.

With these observations, the judge dismissed the petition saying there are no grounds for quashing the FIR.

Visiting goalkeeper Javi Leteiro denied Simeone's attempt from close range with a great save before the half-hour mark, but the Brazilian managed to make it 3-0 in the 42nd minute after brilliantly cutting inside a defender in the box.

Gallar thought he had scored a hat-trick after the break, but his 40th-minute goal was ruled out for offside before he left the field to a standing ovation on the hour mark.

"I'm very happy tonight, it's been crazy. I want to thank the team because we've made a huge effort," the Argentine manager told Telesport.

"I'm happy for the goals, I think about the things I have to improve day by day. I still have many flaws and details that I want to improve to keep growing."

Substitute Angel Correa then scored with a superb low shot from distance in the 78th minute, before setting up Alexander Sorloth, who also came on in the second half, to seal the rout four minutes from time.

Having secured a spot in the semi-finals for the second consecutive season, Atletico will turn their attention to La Liga where they face leaders Real Madrid in Saturday's derby.

"Today was a very tough game, so we need to rest, prepare well and go for it all on Saturday," the 22-year-old Simeone added.

## Alcaraz battles through in first match since Australian Open

THE HAGUE: Spanish tennis star Carlos Alcaraz battled through against local hero Botic van de Zandschulp at the Rotterdam Open on Tuesday, his first match since quarter-finalist bowled over at the Australian Open.

Van de Zandschulp had a set point at 5-4 but continued to serve a double fault, Alcaraz snatched opportunity and he brought the match back on level terms at 5-5 with a powerful forehand drive.

The set fell apart for a tie-break and sure enough, the pair were soon locked at 5-5. Alcaraz saved his best form for the key moment, unleashing several winners to take the tie-break 7-5.

The second set was also hard-fought, going on serve until the

sixth game when an errant Alcaraz backhand gifted Van de Zandschulp a break and a 4-2 lead.

The local favourite served the set at 5-3 and levelled the match one set all as Alcaraz hit yet another forehand wide to the delight of the partisan home crowd.

Two double faults and a wild forehand swung the match back in the Spaniard's favour in the decisive set as he broke at the first time of asking, racing into a 3-0 lead.

The break seemed to knock the energy out of Van de Zandschulp and he lost his serve again to give the top seed the chance to serve out at 5-5.

Alcaraz sealed the match with a delicate forehand drop shot to

## PFF elections on hold as FIFA continues to push for constitutional amendments

**KARACHI:** It has now been made clear by FIFA that elections of the Pakistan Football Federation will not be held unless the congress accepts the constitutional amendments proposed by the global football body.

It is turning out to be a mockery of democracy after the PFF Congress members overwhelmingly rejected the amendments during its extraordinary meeting last month.

"As a result, the electoral process, sporting development, and international participation could be suspended until the elected congress adopts the proposed amendments," the PFF Normalisation Committee, headed by PFF in September 2019 after years of crisis in the country's football governing body, said in a statement on Wednesday.

A letter by PFF NC chairman Haroon Malik to the congress members, a copy of which is available with Dawn, states a "deadlock has been created".

"FIFA and the Asian Football Federation in the strongest terms have opined that while the congress members want to be part of the FIFA family, they do not wish to align with the spirit and principles of FIFA and the AFC, and the newly-elected congress members have created a deadlock," wrote Haroon in the letter. "During numerous discussions, both verbal and physical, PFF has been征求意见ing on the need for the constitutional amendments to align with the FIFA principles."

Stressing that the amendments were "for the future of Pakistan football", he added that "FIFA's commitment to compliance is non-negotiable" and that he planned to set up meetings with the congress members to resolve the issue.

During last month's extraordinary congress meeting, which was held virtually after another one planned for November was postponed, PFF and the AFC had presented an "all or nothing" offer to the congress members with amendments to be made in entirety or none at all.

While most amendments had been agreed on, the disagreement centred around Article 38 of the PFF Constitution regarding the constituency of the president.

Currently restricted to members of the congress or officials of PFF, AFC or FIFA, the world's football governing body wants to open the election to anyone who has played an active role in football management and organisation at any level in the country.

The PFF Congress, which rejected the amendments 19-5, believes that the change will allow anyone who has lost elections at a lower levels — district and provincial — can still run for presidency.

### UNRELENTING PUSH

PFF and the AFC have been relentless in pushing for the

amendments.

In his letter to Haroon when the PFF NC was given its latest ultimatum on Oct 15, FIFA general secretary Martin Gruberler suggested that there had been movement to ensure that the amendments were passed without a hitch during November's extraordinary congress.

A day before the meeting was to be held, a constitutional review workshop was held in Lahore. However, the changes never began after six departments presented their submission from the vote.

"The Bureau for the FIFA Council took note that, on 13 November 2024, just before the first Extraordinary PFF Congress could begin, the representatives of six departmental associations that had been excluded from the PFF Congress for failing to comply with statutory requirements requested to participate and vote at the congress," Gruberler noted in the letter, a copy of which is available with Dawn.

"To ensure due process and to avoid risking the rejection of the proposed constitutional changes, it was decided not to allow their participation, and, instead, that their request for inclusion would be referred to the PFF's internal bodies for appeal, in accordance with the established procedure."

"As a result, the members of the PFF were informed on the same day that the PFF Congress would no longer ... to adopt the new PFF Constitution once the appeal had been resolved."

Dawn had asked FIFA how it could have a truly democratic election of the PFF when — as it is more apparent in the former — departments were blocked for the fear of proposed amendments being rejected.

Sources in the global football body told Dawn that FIFA would not go down that route. But while the departments were eventually allowed to return to the congress and a majority voted against the amendments, PFF's unrelenting push continued.

"It's an unrelenting manoeuvre," a member of the PFF Congress, refusing not to be named, told Dawn.

### GOVERNMENT MEETING

FIFA had never expressed explicitly, when it was appointing the Normalisation Committee in Pakistan, that constitutional amendments were part of its mandate.

But Dawn had revealed when the Haroon-led body was installed back in January 2021 in a review of the NC, that constitutional amendments will be forthcoming.

Before its push for constitutional amendments, PFF had vowed to hold a meeting with government officials, possibly to take them on board with the move it was negotiating.

That meeting never happened, whether PFF revisits that plan, which could potentially ease the way for the constitutional amendments to go through, remains to be seen.

Both Pakistan and New Zealand are scheduled to hold practice sessions at Gaddafi Stadium on Thursday, marking the first cricketing activity at the newly-renovated venue. Workmen are still putting the final touches on the stadium, which is set to be completed in a record 110 days.

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif is scheduled to inaugurate the revamped Gaddafi Stadium on February 7, just a day before the start of the tri-nation series at the same venue.

## PCB, ICC silent over Champions Trophy gate-money sharing formula

**LAHORE:** It remains unclear about how will pocket the gate money coming in ticket sales of the Champions Trophy.

Dawn reached out to both Pakistan Cricket Board and tournament organisers International Cricket Council with the query, but neither had responded by the time this story was filed.

With India's matches of the Champions Trophy set to be held in Dubai as per a "hybrid model" — agreed upon due to its government refusing to allow the team to travel across the border — there is a substantial difference between the ticket prices of the matches in Pakistan and those in Dubai.

Principally, the PCB reserves the right over gate money of all Champions Trophy matches as the host board but its alliance over the matter and so of the ITC has created suspicion, with a hefty revenue potentially at stake.

The most expensive ticket for the matches in Pakistan costs Rs25,000, which, as compared to ticket prices in Dubai is extremely cheap.

According to a media report, the Pakistan India match has fetched a record revenue of Rs3.47 billion in ticket sales, while the total revenue to be earned from India's group matches against Bangladesh and New Zealand is estimated to be Rs2.7 billion.

The report said the minimum price of the ticket for the Pakistan India was AED500, while the maximum at ticket cost for the match was AED12,500.

All the tickets of the inaugural fixture were sold out within an hour. There are chances that strong financial parties might have bought maximum tickets to sell out at higher prices later.

In a recent press conference, PCB chairman Mohsin Naqvi had disclosed that the ITC had agreed to hand more amount to the PCB than what the event will generate through gate money. But whether the agreement covers the Dubai revenue is yet to be clarified.

Naqvi had also said that the extra share coming from the ITC would help offsetting the exceeded costs for the ongoing stadium upgrades in Lahore, Karachi and Rawalpindi.

The PCB had set a budget of Rs2.80 billion for the purpose but it is learnt that it has exceeded to around Rs2.1 billion. Dawn had reported earlier that the ITC had discussed all the three venues ready to host Champions Trophy matches seven weeks before the upgrade, but the PCB still decided to carry on with its ambition.

## Coetzee named in below-strength SA squad for tri-nation series opener

**JOHANNESBURG:** Fast bowler Gerald Coetzee was on Wednesday named in a below-strength South African squad for the first match of a tri-series tournament in Pakistan leading into the Champions Trophy in the same country.

Coetzee has recovered from a hamstring injury which ruled him out of the current SA20 franchise competition in South Africa.

He is set to replace the injured Aashish Naidu in the Champions Trophy if the present No. 11 runs in tri-nation series matches against New Zealand and hosts Pakistan.

Most South African leading players are involved in the closing stages of the SA20.

The squad for South Africa's match against New Zealand in Lahore on Monday includes only two players confirmed for the Champions Trophy, captain Temba Bavuma and all-rounder William McCarthy.

Among four players untagged at international level in Durban Beach, one is former Test player Vernon Philander and brother of Clinton Philander, who made his Test and One-day International debut against Pakistan in recent home series.

More players will be added to the squad depending on the result of a SA20 knock-out match on Wednesday.

Keshav Maharaj and Heinrich Klaasen miss the first match but will be available for the second ODI against Pakistan in Karachi on Feb. 12.

South African ODI regular Marco Jannink, Aiden Markram, David Miller, Kagiso Rabada, and Rassie van der Dussen will not take part in the tri-nation series but have already been named in the squad for the Champions Trophy.

The names of India's former captain, Ishant Sharma, Virat Kohli, Suresh Raina, Shikhar Dhawan, Bhuvneshwar Kumar, Ravindra Jadeja, Axar Patel, Ravichandran Ashwin, Ravneet Bopanna, Kuldeep Singh, and Mohammed Siraj, and Pakistan's Babar Azam, Fakhar Zaman, Mohammad Rizwan, Imad Wasim, Mohammad Hafeez, and Mohammad Ali, and England's Jonny Bairstow, Jos Buttler, Ben Stokes, and Tom Banton, are yet to be confirmed.

## Students heave sigh of relief as university teachers set to resume classes today

• Decision indicates teachers' sincerity towards education: Pupusa • Association to boycott ruling party lawmakers, ministers and bureaucrats "at every level" as teachers-govt standoff continues • Plans to move court against controversial law that allows non-PhD bureaucrats to become VCs

KARACHI: Students of public sector universities across Sindh, who have suffered the most due to the government-teachers stand-off over a controversial law, received a sigh of relief on Wednesday when the Federation of All Pakistani Universities Academic Staff Association (Fapusa) decided "resume" classes from Thursday onwards.

While holding the Sindh government responsible for the academic loss of thousands of students, the association said the "decision to temporarily resume activities indicate teachers' sincerity towards education".

Teachers belonging to Fapusa had boycotted for more than two weeks academic activities at 17 institutions of higher learning in Sindh and staged protest demos against a controversial law that allowed the provincial government to appoint bureaucrats as vice-chancellors of public sector universities.

The teachers resorted to a strike on Jan 16 following a decision of the provincial cabinet to change the criteria for appointment of vice-chancellors and allow non-PhD bureaucrats to

lead universities. Later, the ruling Pakistan Peoples Party used its numerical strength in the Sindh Assembly to get passed the controversial amendment to the universities' law last week despite strong opposition.

A new phase of resistance?

On Wednesday, the Sindh chapter of Fapusa held an online meeting that took several key decisions to sustain the politic and the media pressure on the government.

Source said that these steps included challenging the "the unconstitutional law" in court and holding protests of MPAs, ministers, and bureaucrats from the ruling party at every level.

"Every visit of these officials to universities will be observed as a black day to protest their anti-education policies," shared Fapusa-Sindh president Dr Shabir Ali Chishti.

Describing the new mode of protest as a strategic shift in teachers' struggle, he said: "From tomorrow [Thursday], our struggle will mark a new phase of resistance, where teachers will conduct classes by wearing black armbands every day. Every lecture will include awareness sessions

on the catastrophic implications of this amendment."

The members, he said, also decided to suspend all academic activity at 12 noon on Feb 11. They would organise protest rallies in their respective universities, he added.

"We will be engaging national and international academic bodies to expose the Sindh government's assault on higher education. There will be general body meetings in coming weeks in Karachi, Hyderabad, and Khairpur in further mobilise faculty and students," he said.

The association would also hold press conferences, protests and rallies across Sindh while its central body would be asked to observe another "black day" in coming days in universities across the country, he added.

On behalf of the association, he regretted students' loss due to teachers' strike and said the decision to temporarily resume activities indicate teachers' sincerity towards education.

## Murad asks Chinese firms to invest in transport, energy projects

CM holds talks with top firms during China visit

KARACHI: Sindh Chief Minister Syed Murad Ali Shah has met top Chinese companies in Beijing and invited them to invest in Karachi's transport system, highlighting the need for early completion of the much-awaited Karachi Circular Railway (KCR) project.

The chief minister, along with Sindh ministers Sharjeel Mehmood and Nasir Shah, was accompanying President Asif Ali Zardari on his five-day official visit to China.

A CM House spokesperson said that Mr Shah on Wednesday met chief executives of major Chinese companies in Beijing and discussed important infrastructure projects such as KCR and bus rapid transit (BRT) system.

He said that the collaboration was aimed at modernising the city urban transport system.

He said that the chief minister told the Chinese companies that the KCR project had been pending approval from the Chinese authorities since 2016.

The press statement issued from CM House said that in a significant step towards economic cooperation, the delegation comprising Senior Minister Sharjeel Mehmood, Energy Minister Syed Nasir Hussain Shah, Senator Sharjeel Mehmood, and Pakistan's Ambassador to China Khalil Hashmi and others met top executives of Chinese companies and discussed major infra-structure and energy projects "paving the way for enhanced bilateral partnerships".

The Chinese companies included China Beisan Trucks, China North Vehicle Company, and Jiangsu Trade Electro-Mechanical.

The chief minister discussed with Chinese companies several key projects designed to boost Sindh and Pakistan's economic growth. "Partnerships were explored to further develop Thailand's energy capacity."

The chief minister informed the Chinese companies that projects like electricity, coal to gas, coal to diesel and coal to solar projects could be developed.

The chief minister discussed the

introduction of electric buses and trams to promote cleaner and efficient public transport.

He expressed strong optimism about the potential of these collaborations, saying: "These projects represent not only significant progress for Sindh, but also a crucial contribution to Pakistan's national development agenda. The Karachi Circular Railway, Thailand development, and the adoption of modern electric transport will dramatically enhance public services and stimulate economic activity."

He emphasised the importance of leveraging China's technological expertise to accelerate the province's development and create numerous job opportunities.

These partnerships, he concluded, would lead to multiple joint ventures, fostering sustained economic and industrial growth for both Sindh and Pakistan.

Meanwhile, Senior Minister Sharjeel Mehmood met a Chinese EV bus manufacturer in Beijing and invited them to invest in the province.

According to a statement issued here, during his visit to the Chinese capital, he formally invited the Chinese company to establish an EV bus manufacturing plant in Karachi.

## Projects for six 'strategic' canals not tabled in EcneC: Khuhro

**LARKANA:** Pakistan Peoples Party Sindh president Nasar Ahmed Khuhro has said that the issue of six canals has not even been tabled in the ECNEC or any other relevant forums and hence Sindh is raising it in voice against it, which should be heard.

Mr. Khuhro said at a press conference at Larkana Press Club on Wednesday that the new canals would certainly get water from Indus River but where would they get water from when the Indus River System Authority had already pointed out water shortage in the system.

He said that in civilian government, all decisions were routed through DOWP, CDWP, ECNEC, NEC and CEC but the issue of canals was not even tabled in the ECNEC or any other forums, he said.

Mr. Khuhro, who also heads the Public Accounts Committee of Sindh Assembly, called on the fed-

eral government to restart construction of the remaining portion of Right Bank Outfall Drain (RBOD) whose work had started in 2021 at a cost of Rs 4 billion.

The work on the RBOD had been stalled since 2016, he said and asked the centre to provide funds to complete this project. Sindh was also consulting various agencies of land in Thatta, Badin, Sujawal, Sanghar and other areas due to water scarcity, he said.

He disclosed that one had swallowed 1.6 million fertile land and stressed completing RBOD and repairing Left Bank Outfall Drain (LBOD).

He said that rise in population and shrinkage of fertile land could seriously threaten 'food security'. Sindh had failed to implement the Water Apportionment Accord, he said.

He cited Prime Minister's claim that inflation had declined by three per cent and said the end sufferer was the population connected with agriculture that bore the brunt of soaring prices.

He said that peasants, farmers and agriculturists had been left at the mercy of market which had given birth to a host of difficulties for them. The government had not been able to support prices of wheat, paddy, cotton or other crops, he said.

He urged the government and private entrepreneurs not to import wheat in future and criticised fixing separate support prices for wheat in Sindh and Punjab.

He claimed that due to climate change the rice production had reduced by half. Rice was a cash crop which earned foreign exchange but this time the foreign earning would go down by 50 per cent, he said.

He said that it was a cumulative economic loss where the role of mid-levelmen was disastrous for agricultural sector.

Khuhro was unhappy over what he called slow pace progress on the construction of booths for the conservation of houses for flood-hit people.

He said that peasants, farmers and agriculturists had been left at the mercy of market which had given birth to a host of difficulties for them. The government had not been able to support prices of wheat, paddy, cotton or other crops, he said.

## 'Fault' in CDA underpass raises questions, concerns

Sharp loop inside underpass eats up one lane; official claims no flaw in design of loop

ISLAMABAD: A sharp loop in the newly constructed Jinnah Avenue underpass has raised question marks on the design of the project, as motorists are worried about the potential road rage due to such a loop in which three-lane road abruptly becomes a two-lane road after entering the underpass.

Jinnah Avenue, if one is moving from F-10 towards D-Chowk, has three lanes but the newly built underpass has eaten up one of the lanes. One lane has been used to build a loop for an exit towards 9th Avenue. The loop itself is problematic because it is a dog-leg bend and a curve wall right after it.

It is apparent that heavier vehicles will not be able to use this smoothly. "I fear whenever heavy vehicles, such as school buses and emergency vehicles, will use this loop, their tandem will badly disturb the speedy traffic on this road," said Haseeb Khan, a motorist.

It may be noted that in all other projects, the CDA builds an extra lane for loops to ease the flow of heavy traffic, but in this project, it has surprisingly reduced one lane.

A former government official, who lives in F-11 and uses this road for commute, said the CDA should look into the issue as after the construction work at the F-10 roundabout, the flow of traffic would increase which could lead to traffic congestion in the underpass. This is not the first time that a CDA project has had a design flaw. The civic agency made a blunder in the design of the roundabout outside the Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE) in H-8/4. This roundabout has created at least three points where traffic coming from different directions converge and it often faces traffic mess during rush hours.

was completed in 42 days. It is part of the Jinnah Avenue interchange project worth Rs4.1 billion, which has two components – an underpass (already completed) and a flyover, which is underway. According to the CDA, the flyover will be completed on February 14.

Separately, a CDA statement said Chairman Mohammad Ali Riazwaan along with the relevant officers visited the Jinnah Avenue Interchange project and reviewed various construction activities, including the under-construction flyover bridge and road infrastructure.

The press release said that during the briefing, it was highlighted that asphalt work was progressing rapidly on the roads surrounding the Jinnah Avenue Interchange project, and construction on the protected U-turn being built on the

avenue adjacent to the project was also moving ahead.

The CDA chief was briefed about the construction of a protected U-turn at the F-10 roundabout and adjacent F-10 road. It was further informed that the construction activities at the F-10 roundabout would be completed this month and opened to traffic. The chairman stated that contractors and resident engineers should ensure the highest quality of construction work on-site and guarantee its timely completion.

CDA's member engineering Syed Nadeem Rizvi, while giving a detailed version, said there is no flaw in the design of the loop.

"The width of the loop is 30 feet with no height restriction. All types of vehicles can use it smoothly," he said, adding

that the loop was designed in accordance with international engineering standards.

"It is not the way people look at this loop, turning radius is safe," Mr Rizvi said, adding that the CDA and traffic police will have to ensure speed limit and for this loop, the speed limit is 50km per hour.

"We are also going to take safety measures which include separate colouring of lanes, direction boards, signage etc. We will take all precautionary measures," the CDA member engineer said.

When asked why an extra lane was not constructed for the loop, Mr Rizvi said: "I have already said, the loop and underpass were constructed in accordance with international standards, there is no need to be worried."

However, before moving forward, the PM of the through ministry of interior sought comments of CDA on summary of health ministry.

"In our rules and regulations, there is no provision of free land as we procure land from land owners and we had shared same views with the health ministry," said an officer of CDA.

He said when CDA referred to health ministry, they took up this matter with federal government to place their summary before the Federal cabinet.

"In coming days, we will share our view points on this summary, right now, I can't say what would be our stance, but something is clear

that we have to pay to land owners against the acquired land," said an officer.

## Police suspect honour killing in runaway girl case

RAWALPINDI: A young girl who reportedly ran away from her home died shortly after being brought back home by her parents and was laid to rest in the Jatti area, raising suspicions in the police that she might have been killed over 'honour'.

A detective local constable posted at the Jatti police station reported on Tuesday that he was on duty near Syed Adda when he received information that a 17-year-old girl, who was a first-year student (college student) and resident of Syed Karran, had been missing from her home.

In a statement, he further said that after her parents knew that she had been missing, the girl's father and uncle launched a search and finally she was found at the Syed Adda.

She was brought home by her parents who suspected that she had been killed someone and attempted to run away from home. The DCP further said that the news of the girl's death spread in the area as the deceased was laid to rest in a local graveyard at about 2pm on Tuesday.

Police will file a request in the court of law to get permission for the exhumation of the body to ascertain the real circumstances and the cause of her death. A senior police officer confirmed that the incident had come to their knowledge and police were investigating it. According to the postmortem report, the legal proceedings will be initiated accordingly.

Last week, the Jatti police arrested four suspects after the exhumation and the initial report revealed that the 21-year-old girl had been poisoned by her sister's in-laws to cover her rape. The orphan girl was sexually assaulted for months allegedly by her brother-in-law and his accomplice who killed her and laid her to rest in the Jatti area.

## Court orders transparency in CUI rector's appointment

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) has ruled on the controversy related to appointment of the Rector of Comsats University Islamabad (CUI), emphasizing the need for transparency and procedural competence in public sector appointments.

The case was filed by Dr Shahid Khatri, who challenged the appointment of Professor Dr Sehail Mumtaz as Rector CUI through a notification issued on Sept 29 last year.

The petitioner, who was ranked as the top candidate by the university's Senate, argued that his appointment was unfairly overlooked in favour of Dr Mumtaz, who was ranked second. Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kayani, while discussing the petition, highlighted the legal obligation of appointing authorities to provide valid reasons for deviating from merit-based recommendations.

The court noted that the Ministry of Science and Technology or the President's Secretariat failed to justify out of turn appointment ignoring the top-ranked candidate. The ruling reinforced that discretionary powers must be exercised fairly and within defined legal limits.

The court cited a precedent from the Supreme Court (2021 SCMPL 1092) and underscored that the top candidate has a legitimate expectation of appointment unless compelling reasons dictate otherwise.

During the hearing, government representatives informed the court that a fresh selection process had already been initiated for the rector's appointment following new rules drawn from the President's Secretariat. The court acknowledged this development and ruled that Dr Khatri should be reconsidered in the ongoing selection process.

"The petitioner's credentials, already available with the Search Committee and Senate, must be fairly evaluated alongside other candidates," Justice Kayani stated in the verdict. — Murtaza Akbar

## Health ministry wants cost of land for Jinnah Medical Complex waived

PM Office seeks CDA's point of view over ministry's summary

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Office has sought Capital Development Authority's (CDA) point of view over a summary of health ministry seeking waiver of land cost for proposed Jinnah Medical Complex.

CDA in November asked the health ministry to arrange Rs17.7 billion funds to issue 600 kanal of

land for the Jinnah Medical Complex to be built in Sector H-16. A few days ago, the civic agency issued a letter to the health ministry offering a 33-year lease on 600 kanal for the medical complex. The lease is extendable for two terms of 33 years and the ministry has been asked to pay Rs15.2 billion for it.

Sources in CDA said that health ministry after receiving the letter of CDA had requested the civic agency to waive off the payment against land.

However, CDA informed the health ministry that as per prevailing policy and regulations, exemption/waiver corresponding to land cost to any organization is not granted as all the land is acquired by

CDA and compensation is paid to those whose land has been acquired by CDA and they are entitled to get payment/plot from the CDA on summary of health ministry.

Therefore, CDA turned down the request of the health ministry. Subsequently, the health ministry through a summary took up this matter with Prime Minister Office requesting for taking up this matter before the federal cabinet to grant waiver to ministry.

Sources said that in the summary, the health ministry pleaded that its overall public sector development programme funding for 2024-25 stands at Rs24.7 billion, therefore paying the said amount in this fiscal year is not feasible for it.

However, before moving forward, the PM of the through ministry of interior sought comments of CDA on summary of health ministry.

According to the Planning Commission, the project will be completed with an estimated cost of Rs120 billion.

The government has allocated Rs5 billion for the fiscal year 2024-2025 under the Public Sector Development Programme (PSDP) to kickstart the project. However, it is also looking at other options such as public-private partnerships to get this project completed.

Planning Minister Ahsan Iqbal, while chairing a meeting on the project some months ago, had highlighted that the project's location in Islamabad, near the airport and national highways, made it an ideal hub for regional and international medical tourism.

Mr Iqbal had said that the complex must incorporate green design principles, ensuring that it stood as a sustainable and environmentally friendly structure. The health complex was envisioned as a multi-centered project for the capital, featuring a self-contained vertical health tower with comprehensive medical services, he had added.

## Man found murdered in E-11

ISLAMABAD: A man was found murdered in a wooded area at E-11, police said on Wednesday.

## Pakistan urged to promote actuarial education

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan needs to promote actuarial education in universities through modern books such as Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) to strengthen its economy, the International Society of Actuaries (ISA) Managing Director (MD) Andy Peterson said on Wednesday.

The actuary professional need to integrate actuarial concepts into business curricula, the country needed awareness and outreach programmes.

"Actuaries are key to Pakistan's growth, enhancing insurance stability, risk management and public policy design. Their expertise in data-driven decision-making and ultimate risk assessment helps economy in stability and sustainable development," Mr Peterson said.

He added that actuaries also support financial inclusion through micro-insurance and takaful and play a crucial role in designing pension schemes and health care systems for long-term social welfare.

The ISA MD said that academia and the industry have to extend financial support, such as scholarships and case discussions, co-existence accountability for actuarial studies.

"Industry-academic partnerships and professional upskilling can align education with global standards and industry needs, driving growth," he said, adding that Pakistan has made progress in actuarial sciences, with growing student interest.

He said nearly 400 Pakistani members enrolled in the ISA Affiliate Membership Programme as of 2024.

However, Mr Peterson added that the challenges persist, including limited awareness, high costs and under-developed industry integration.

He said that efforts should expand outreach, enhance affordability, integrate actuarial sciences from curricula, foster industry collaboration, and leverage actuarial expertise in public policy.

Responding to a question about developing countries like Pakistan taking benefit from fostering actuarial skills in their academic, professional and policy-making structures, he said that fostering actuarial skills will benefit Pakistan by expanding the insurance sector, enhancing risk management through predictive analytics and supporting economic stability.

"Initiatives like ISA's Global Access Pilot Programmes can help improve access to actuarial education and Pakistan actuaries hold prominent roles across the Middle East and South Asia, showcasing how nurturing local talent can drive regional influence and economic growth," the ISA MD added.

He also suggested that parents should consider career options for their children in this sector as the actuarial profession in Pakistan offers global job prospects, competitive earnings and global mobility.

Actuaries play key roles in insurance, banking and public policy, using analytics to manage risks and solve complex problems.

"It has a strong demand both locally and internationally. This career provides financial stability, intellectual challenge and the opportunity to work globally," Mr Peterson added. — Kalis Ali

## Kashmir struggle to continue till logical conclusion, says Mushaal

ISLAMABAD: Moshua Hassan Muftak, the wife of jailed Kashmiri Hurriyat leader Mohammad Yasin Malik on Wednesday said that the Kashmir freedom struggle will continue till its logical conclusion.

She was speaking at a vigil gathering at an event held on Kashmir Solidarity Day observed across both sides of the line of control and elsewhere in the world to urge world powers and the UN to act now to resolve the Kashmir dispute.

The event was organised by the Pakistan Cultural Forum to express support for the Kashmiri people's struggle to achieve their right to self-determination.

"The Indian government, notorious for its oppressive policies, has turned the once human-like valley into hell through decades of systematic oppression and suppression," Mushaal stated.

Prominent figures from various walks of life, including politicians, intellectuals and artists participated in the event.

Earlier, Mushaal, who is also the Chairman of the Peace and Culture Organisation, led a Kashmir Solidarity Walk with members of civil society from Kalim International Hospital to D-Chowk.

The walk aimed to highlight the policies of the Narendra Modi-led Indian government, including forced disappearances, torture and extrajudicial killings in Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IOJK).

Mushaal emphasised that the day serves as a reminder to the global community of its responsibility toward the oppressed Kashmiri people. She urged the United Nations (UN) to honour the promises made to the Kashmiris 78 years ago and to support their struggle for the right to self-determination.

The Hurriyat leader emphasised the need for collective action to raise awareness about the plight of the Kashmiri people and to pressure the international community to intervene in resolving the long-standing dispute.

She also paid tribute to the sacrifices of Kashmiri martyrs and vowed that they would continue their struggle until a just resolution of the Kashmir dispute is achieved, in accordance with the UN-agreed formula and the aspirations of the people of the entire valley.

Mushaal urged the international community to break its silence and take immediate action on the human rights abuses perpetrated in occupied Kashmir.

She emphasised the importance of collective action to halt the bloodshed and work towards a durable, peaceful resolution of the protracted conflict, aligning with the aspirations of the Kashmiri people and UN resolutions.

The chairperson highlighted the brutal tactics and inhuman acts inflicted upon prisoners, particularly her husband Yasin Malik, and of him.

Mushaal said that the international community's silence on the Kashmiri issue was令人震惊, as despite the gross human rights violations, forced disappearances, torture and extrajudicial killings, the world failed to take any action.

The so-called human rights organisations remained tight-lipped and observed unmissed silence over the brutalised war crimes being committed by the repressive Indian government.

Mushaal said that her husband has been languishing in the notorious Tihar jail, in India, for years.

She expressed concern about his health and well-being, fearing that he may be awarded a death sentence in politically motivated cases.

The Islamabad police expressed strong support for Kashmiris' struggle on the Kashmir Solidarity Day on Wednesday.

According to a statement, Islamabad Inspector General of Police (IGP) Syed Ali Naqib Rizvi said Islamabad police stood in solidarity with the brave Kashmiri people, acknowledging their sacrifice and unwavering struggle for freedom.

He further said that the department was ensuring comprehensive security for the events and rallies held in connection with Kashmir Solidarity Day.

Additionally, he said over 1,500 officers and personnel were deployed for security duties.

Deputy Inspector General (DIG) Islamabad, Jawad Turki, oversaw security measures, the statement read.

Moreover, Islamabad police officers were actively expressing solidarity with the oppressed Kashmiris suffering under Indian occupation, he added.

## Pakistani herbal medicines popular in Kazakhstan: envoy

ISLAMABAD: Kazakhstan Ambassador Yerhan Kistain has proposed collaboration in the herbal medicine sector as medicines are highly popular in his country.

He was speaking to participants of an awareness session held in connection with World Cancer Day at Mayo International Hospital.

Mr Yerhan Kistain reaffirmed Kazakhstan's interest in strengthening ties with Pakistan in healthcare, medical research and pharmaceutical development.

He highlighted the potential for joint investment in hospital infrastructure, digital health technologies and exchange programmes for doctors and medical students.

Dr Yasmeen Rehman, a US-trained oncologist at the hospital, delivered a presentation on cancer prevention, early diagnosis and treatment advancements.

Speaker Haroon Nasir highlighted alarming statistics, revealing that Pakistan records over 185,000 new cancer cases annually, with breast cancer being the most prevalent, affecting one in nine women.

He stressed that timely screening and timely medications could prevent up to 40 percent of cancer-related deaths.

He emphasised the importance of cross-border collaboration between Pakistan and Kazakhstan in healthcare. He outlined key areas for cooperation, including medical education, partnerships between universities in both countries, established training schools to enhance professional training and joint cancer research and initiatives.

## Constable killed in accident

ISLAMABAD: A constable of Islamabad police was killed in an apparent hit-and-run accident late on Tuesday, the police said.

The constable was identified as Mohammad Asir, deployed with the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) of the Islamabad police.

## On mandatory training, well-connected bureaucrats retain key positions

CS says officials are working on 200 initiatives

LAHORE: Some politically well-connected bureaucrats in Punjab continue to hold their current positions despite being on a four-month National Management Course at the National School of Public Policy in breach of clear instructions that the provincial government is bound to release such officers "on their selection for training course without fail".

The prime minister's directive also says the provincial governments shall make arrangements, as the recruited officers are not required to attend their offices while undergoing training.

### Cotton industry on edge due to GSP Plus review reports

LAHORE: Already hit hard by imposition of 18 per cent surcharge, the local cotton industry is in a bind on the reports of review of GSP Plus status by the European Union.

The GSP Plus status had been granted by the European Union in 2018, leading to a 108pc hike in Pakistani textile exports to the EU due to concessional tariff.

The status was later extended to 2027 a few years ago.

However, during the recent visit of an EU delegation to Pakistan, it was announced that the economic bloc would review this status in June this year, causing a wave of concern in the entire cotton industry.

A communication with the local representative of the EU by a concerned businessman

revealed that though the generalised tariff preference (GSP) had been extended until Dec 31, 2027, new regulations are likely to enter into force much earlier than that.

"GSP Monitoring is a continuous process. The inter-service monitoring mission is expected in mid-2025 as part of the ongoing process," the EU representative said in response to the query on Feb 2.

The businessman from the cotton industry, who requested not to be named, apprehends that any negative review of the GSP Plus status could further plunge the sector into crisis because in the hope of sending more textile products" export encouragement to Europe after winning lucrative contracts in the recent textile fair in Germany, textile mills have

their perks and privileges.

The Punjab government and the NSPP have closed their eyes and violating prime minister's directions as well as NSPP's own instructions - notified in officers' recruitment notifications.

Similarly, Punjab health secretary Nadeem Sajid, implementation and coordination (IS&C) S&GAD secretary Rafaqat Ali and finance department (budget and accounts) special secretary Syed Muhammad Mansoor Nauman are attending Service Management Course (SMC) while holding their administrative posts.

The SMC is mandatory for the officers for their promotion from RS-19 to RS-20 and the government is paying a course fee of Rs 350,000 each for their boarding and lodging at the National Institute of Management, Lahore.

The course, being run from Jan 27 to May 16, has notified similar conditions

that the officer attending the SMC will be relieved and not required to attend their office while undergoing training.

Sources in the bureaucracy say lobbying is playing a major role in facilitating those bureaucrats, which is generally visible in the posting of "favoured" bureaucrats against important positions, while others are sidelined.

## Four held in 'swift action' in crime against women

A motor vehicle examiner detained for harassing varsity student; three arrested for gang-rape of teenage girls, two policemen at large

LAHORE: The Lahore operations police on Wednesday arrested a staffer for continuously harassing a university student for seven months.

The arrested man is a motor vehicle examiner of the transport department. The complainant has been blocked his 70 mobile since during the last seven months.

In yet another case the same day, the police arrested three

suspects who allegedly gang-raped two teenage girls.

Reports suggested two policemen had "riddled the house" of a woman and sexually assaulted her daughter and niece.

An official said the first incident took place in Miri Shah where the university student filed a complaint against the transport department official who had been harassing and blackmailing her for long.

As the matter reached DPO Operations Panel Komar, he ordered the formation of a special team which arrested the accused official, ensuring immediate legal proceedings under the relevant sections of the law.

According to police report, the university student complained the inspector had been harassing her for the past several months. She blocked approximately 70 calls during the last seven months.

She said the suspect was well-connected and had no fear of

police and law.

The official said the police team had collected substantial evidence which confirmed the allegation.

The DPO Operations confirmed in their action had been taken under CM initiative of zero tolerance towards crime against women.

He said special units had been established in police stations to ensure swift action against harassment complaints.

He said the women can report harassment instantly through emergency helpline and the Women Safety App, ensuring immediate police response. He said trained units had been deployed in public places and educational institutions to prevent harassment.

About the other incident, the police said the armed men barged their entry into the

## Last-minute changes in shrimp tender raise transparency concerns

LAHORE: The ongoing tendering amid a controversy over the eleventh hour for the procurement of shrimp-related articles has created doubts from some of the bidders, who believe that some "special people" are likely to be "facilitated" allegedly by the Punjab Fisheries Department to win the project.

Fisheries Department Director General Dr Sikandar Hayat is unaware of this development.

The situation turned suspicious after a tender document was secretly uploaded on the E-procurement website on Tuesday night — just two days before tender opening date including Feb 5, Kashmir Day holiday — explaining some changes in specification of certain

items and other terms and conditions.

The procurement modified specifications for certain items and introduced a request meant for bidders to present samples on the opening day.

"In correspondence, specifications of a couple of items were changed with a direction to also bring samples of these items on the tender opening day — Feb 6 morning and one of the bidders.

"With changing of specifications, it is not possible to prepare sample due to issues related to import etc. It is also surprising that the condition of bringing samples of the items on the date of tender opening (Feb 6) was not mentioned in the main tender published on Jan 18."

The Punjab Fisheries Department had initially floated the tender through the

mission deadline remains unchanged," said another bidder, suspecting deliberate exclusion of competition.

The modifications effectively tailor the tender to suit certain suppliers, ensuring their eligibility while shutting out others. This lack of competition could lead to inflated prices, increasing the financial burden on Punjab's shrimp farming projects and misusing taxpayer money.

"These actions set a dangerous precedent, allowing procurement officials to manipulate tenders and channel contracts to favored entities at exorbitant costs," the bidder added. Instead of fostering a transparent bidding environment, such tactics discourage new entrants, hindering the growth of Pakistan's shrimp industry.

Ethical and legal concerns loom over

these developments. If tenders continue to be awarded through procedural manipulation, Punjab's shrimp farming expansion plan risks financial instability. The bidder urged Punjab government authorities to investigate these irregularities and ensure future tenders uphold fair competition and the best interests of the industry.

Fisheries Department Director General Dr Sikandar Hayat, when contacted, expressed ignorance on the issue, stating he would take action if anything has happened wrong. "I will check the tender and correspondence, etc, with the project team. And if anything I find wrong I will either cancel the tender or extend the date for opening the existing tender for a healthy competition with participation of more and more bidders," he said.

## Kashmir a tripartite issue: JI emir

LAHORE: Jamaat-i-Islami Emir Hafiz Nauman Rabbani has declared that Kashmir is a tripartite issue, integral to Pakistan's destiny and completion.

Speaking at a Kashmir March organised by the Jamaat on The Mall to mark the Kashmir Solidarity Day on Wednesday, he warned that anyone who attempts to sell out Kashmir would face the wrath of the Pakistani nation.

He criticised the government position, stating that the Kashmir issue had been sidelined in recent years.

“On this Kashmir Solidarity Day, we announce reorganisation of the Kashmir freedom movement,” he proclaimed.

“Pakistan should not seek trade with India but work to isolate globally,” he said.

The JI leader criticised Islamabad's “apologised” stances on Kashmir, urging the government to advocate the cause internationally instead. He stressed

that Azad Jammu & Kashmir should be turned into the same camp for the Kashmir freedom movement, adding that “silence on Kashmir is equivalent to supporting Indian imperialism and the Butcher of Kashmir.”

Rabbani urged the Pakistan government to condemn Trump's plan to evacuate Gaza and reaffirm support for Palestine. He labelled the US, Israel and India as the three biggest terrorists in the world, stating that “Netanyahu, who has slaughtered 60,000 Palestinians, is now sitting in Trump's lap.”

He denounced the plan to “empty Gaza,” saying the world had rejected it and warned that the US was facing global isolation for backing Israeli genocide.

He also pointed out that India was heading toward diplomatic isolation, with its actions against separatists in the US and Canada angering both nations.

Rabbani highlighted India's human rights violations in Nagaland, Manipur, Assam, Punjab and occupied Kashmir where 100,000 Kashmiris have been martyred, and one million Indian troops continue their brutal occupation.

He urged the Pakistani government to accelerate global diplomatic efforts for Kashmir, instead of discussing trade deals for oil and portions with India.

“We are not against the Indian people,” he clarified, “but we will not accept any ties with India if Kashmiris get their right to self-determination.”

Similarly, he declared, “If any Pakistani ruler ever thinks of recognising Israel, the nation will fight against him.”

The JI chief also criticised the UN silence despite its 17 resolutions on Kashmir, lamenting that the Pakistani government had also grown silent on the issue in recent years. He said Islamabad was solely focusing on the western border, ignoring Indian aggressions on the eastern front.

He pointed to reports of a Kashmir deal during former COAS Gen Raheel's tenure, stating if those claims were false, “the government and security forces must issue a clear stance and reaffirm support for the Kashmir freedom movement.”

Rejecting the argument that Pakistan's weak economy prevents it from taking a strong stance, he said, “Pakistan is rich in resources. If the economy is weak, it's due to corrupt rulers, not the people.”

He also called for a clear explanation regarding reports of Indian militance (RAW) operations inside Pakistan. He urged Pakistan to expose India's crimes globally and mobilise conscious voices to support the Kashmir freedom movement.

Expressing hope for Kashmir's liberation, he asserted, “The day is near when occupied Kashmir will be free from Indian rule and become part of Pakistan.”

The JI also organised nationwide rallies in solidarity with the people of Kashmir in Islamabad, Rawalpindi, Karachi, Quetta, Peshawar, Islamabad, Multan, Hyderabad, Sukkur, Banu, Dera and other cities.

## Woman arrested with 9kg heroin

SAFEGATE: Sialkot police have arrested a woman and recovered Rs 1 million worth of fine quality quantity from her possession.

# Another tiger dies at zoo in Bahawalpur

**BAHAWALPUR:** Another rare Bengal tiger died in captivity at the local zoo on Wednesday.

It was learnt that the 20-year-old big cat was brought here in 2010. It was claimed that the tiger fell ill sometime ago and had its one leg crippled due to the illness. Later, it was fed beef meat.

Mohammad Usman Baloch, Wildlife deputy director of Bahawalpur division who holds the additional charge of the zoo curator, did not respond to DAWN's calls. However, he was quoted as claiming that the Bengal tiger had completed its life cycle and met a natural death.

Due to curator's non-availability, it was yet to be learnt whether the postmortem examination of the dead tiger was carried out or not.

It was the second tiger death in a few weeks. Earlier, a usually-revered forest died of kidney failure.

In the second encounter within the limits of Dhamali police station, two robbers identified as Mohammad Asif and Saeed, residents of Chhishian in Bahawalnagar district, were killed while their three accomplices managed to escape. Their bodies were shifted to a hospital for postmortem examination.

The PIB said both the deceased were involved in 15 criminal cases and wanted to Bahawalpur, Vehari, Lodhran and Bahawalnagar police. A car, arms and robbery tools were recovered from them.

## Complainant faces proceedings under anti-rape law

**MUZAFFARGARH:** The first case under the Anti-Rape Act in Punjab has been registered at the Muzaffargarh city police, where a woman initially filed a case against an accused for rape but later retracted her statement in court.

According to police, Ayesha Iftab testified in favour of the rape suspect in the court of additional district and sessions judge and declared him innocent. Subsequently, a case was registered against her under the provisions of the Anti-Rape Act of 2021.

Earlier, she had also recorded statements against the suspect before the medical officer and the sessions magistrate in connection with the rape case.

According to the first information report, the woman lodged a rape complaint against the suspect at the civilian police. The suspect obtained bail from the court, while the case landed before a local magistrate where Ayesha recorded a statement against the suspect.

Later, she underwent a medical examination at the district headquarter hospital.

On the day of the present trial hearing, the police presented solid evidence against the suspect. However, the complainant retracted her statement and testified in favour of the suspect in the court of Additional Sessions Judge Tahir Khalil, who confirmed the bail.

Following this, the police registered a case against Ayesha for providing false information and registered a case against her under section 232(A-B) of the Anti-Rape Act of 2021 and Section 213 of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC).

**CASE RESOLVED:** Police solved a bailed murder and robbery case and arrested alleged offenders Wednesday.

The killers turned out to be none other than the victim's nephews, who murdered Ali Haider on Dec 12, 2024.

Sessions DSP Muhammad Akbar said the suspects attempted to disguise the murder as a robbery and fled with Rs1.7 million.

The police said Ali was killed in Sargodha after selling land worth Rs1.5 million. The perpetrators took the cash

and killed him.

His son Ghulam Mustafa approached the Sargodha police and registered a case against unidentified suspects under sections 302, 392, 34, and 411 of the PPC.

Police said the suspects had plotted to murder their uncle by luring him to Bahawalpur under the pretense of handing over the land payment.

**CHILD CRIME:** A man allegedly threw hot milk on his 7-year-old daughter and forced his wife in a room during a domestic dispute in the Rohillaewali area. The girl suffered severe burns due to scalding milk.

According to the police, a case was registered at Rohillaewali police station, and the suspect's brother was arrested while raids are underway to apprehend the main suspect.

Muhammad threw hot milk on his daughter, Khadija Bibi, following a domestic alteration. The girl sustained burns in the incident, and the suspect also physically assaulted his wife, Roza.

Both the woman and her daughter were shifted to Muzaffargarh DHQ Hospital.

purchased duty-free cotton and cotton yarn in large quantities from abroad.

An import of cotton and cotton yarn is duty-free, while there is an 18pc tax on the trade of local cotton; the millers have been importing the commodity in large quantities from abroad this year at the cost of local cotton growers, ginning and spinning sectors.

The data released by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics reveals that from July to December 2024, the country imported cotton and yarn worth \$1.93 billion, which is a record \$643 billion more than the same period last year.

Reports suggest that large shipments of cotton and cotton yarn are also expected during January-March 2025 at the cost of previous foreign exchange reserves.

Cotton Growers Forum Chairman Ihsanullah Ihsan said that while domestic cotton production this year has fallen 50 per cent short of the target and is 24 per cent lower than last year, cotton stocks in ginning factories have increased. As on January 31, at least 480,000 bales of cotton were held by ginneries — 31 per cent (14,000 bales) more than during the same period last year.

Despite this, textile mills have purchased only 4,978 million bales from local ginning factories so far this season—25 per cent (1.2 million bales) less than last year's purchases during the same timeframe.

## Govt returns Rs40bn to pension and gratuity fund

CM side says Sehat Card bills being paid on monthly basis

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has managed to return a whopping Rs6 billion to the provincial pension and gratuity fund, which the previous Pakistan Tehreek-e-Taliban government withdrew to finance its development projects, pushing the province to the brink of bankruptcy.

Official sources told Dawn that the previous government had withdrawn Rs6 billion from the pension and gratuity fund between June 2021 and

December 2022 on account of the fund's shortage resulting from an overambitious development strategy, which even pushed the province's throw-forward liability into 15.2 years.

Sources told Dawn that out of Rs6 billion, Rs4 billion was withdrawn in just three months of October, November and December of 2022 alone.

They said that current government has recouped and deposited Rs6 billion in its pension and gratuity fund.

The sources said that apart from clearing Rs6 billion liability out of the Rs6 billion left in Sehat Card, billions of rupees left for water and sanitation services companies, federal municipal administration, other developmental departments left from the 2018-21, amounting to Rs20.80 billion have also been cleared

by present government.

The sources said that presently there was no liability on part of the provincial government as it has cleared not just previously left liabilities but also releasing monthly amounts to all departments.

They said on June 22, 2021, the KP Pension Fund had transferred to the provincial government's Account 1. Similarly, another Rs10 billion was transferred to same account from the pension fund February 11, 2022 while another sum of Rs10 billion was transferred to the same account on Sept 9, 2022. Besides, Rs1 billion was transferred to Account 1 of the provincial government on November 30, 2022 and another Rs1 billion on December 22, 2022.

When contacted, advisor to the chief minister for Finance

Masoomul Ahsan said that the previous provincial government withdrew Rs4 billion from its pension and gratuity fund to meet its salary and other immediate needs during the post-Covid financial crisis.

Mr Ahsan said that the current government had deposited Rs40 billion in the pension fund in two tranches of Rs20 billion each.

He also said that the government had paid Rs33 billion in lieu of Sehat Card arrears and liabilities over the last 11 months.

The aide to the CM said that not only was the provincial government clearing the bill for the expenses incurred on account of Sehat Card but it had also paid Rs1 billion out of Rs20 billion liabilities.

He also said that the government was paying the Sehat Card

health insurance scheme bills on a monthly basis, leaving no liabilities.

Earlier last month, the KP government had announced to deposit Rs10 billion in its debt management fund.

In a statement, the provincial government had stated that it had deposited a substantial amount of Rs10 billion in the debt management fund, with plans to contribute an additional Rs30-40 billion, depending on the financial landscape.

It added that the debt management fund could accommodate up to 10 per cent of KP's total debt of Rs725 billion.

"We [KP] have already initiated transfers and are committed to reducing our financial liabilities, setting a benchmark for other provinces and the federal government," it said.

Meanwhile, the situation in Tirah valley in general and at the Bagh-Maidan Markaz in particular remained sombre, with most shopkeepers and traders keeping mute over the murder of their leader.

## Midnight attack on Bannu police station foiled

LAKH MAFRAWAT: The police on Wednesday claimed to have repulsed a midnight terror attack on a police station in the Township area of Bannu district.

An official said that a group of militants attacked the police station at around 12:30am with light and heavy weapons. "The attack was multi-pronged aiming to take over the building of the police station," said the official, adding that the cops deployed there repelled effectively and forced the assailants to flee the place.

The official said that an effective response by the law enforcers foiled the militants' bid to breach the police station. He said that all policemen remained safe in the attack.

District police officer Ziauddin Ahmed visited the police station, met cops and praised them for exhibiting bravery.

He announced commendation certificates and cash prizes for them from IGP Zahid Hamid.

Meanwhile, police swung into action when armed men attacked the cops escorting a polio vaccination team in remote Surki Lengwah area of Kurak district.

A police official confirmed the attack and said that both the cops and vaccinators remained unharmed. He said that unknown armed assailants opened fire on the cops, who were on an escort duty with vaccinators in the remote and difficult mountainous region.

The official said a heavy police contingent led by district police officer Shabaz Elahi along with SP investigations Mohammed Aslao Khan immediately reached there, surrounded the area and launched a search for the attackers.

He quoted the district police chief as saying that the miscreants targeting policemen performing security duty with police teams would be dealt with sternly. He said the DPO asked the cops to remain alert and vigilant on duty and provide complete security to vaccinators engaged in performing the national obligation of immunising children against the crippling disease.

## Tehreek-i-Insaf leader gunned down in Nowshera

PESHAWAR: A leader of Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf from Nowshera district, Mila Umar Shah, was gunned down by unidentified assailants near Pabbi railway station on GT Road on Wednesday.

An official at the police station concerned said that the deceased, who was president of PTI Ong Deasai area, was travelling in his vehicle along with a friend, Hamed Khan, when unidentified motorcycle ambushed them.

Mila Umar died on the spot, whereas Hamed Khan received serious injuries, and has since been undergoing treatment at a local hospital. An FIR of the occurrence was registered at the Pabbi police station, wherein Mila Masroor Shah, a brother of the deceased, is the complainant.

The complainant has charged some of their rivals for the commission of the offence, stating that they had previous blood feud with the suspects.

He has charged three brothers – Khan, Farooq and Zabba – for the attack. He stated that last month a member of their rival family, Khan Farooq, was killed near Jacobabad for which the suspect had been inspecting the involvement of the deceased Mila Umar. — Bureau Report

## Murder of two Tirah traders shrouded in mystery

KHYBER: Mystery has shrouded the murder of two Tirah traders here following the issuance of contradictory statements about it by two terrorist groups.

Brother of Haji Sher Mohammad and his colleague and close relative Hajar Afridi, with their three sons, were found in a hilly area of Butan Sharar in Tirah valley early on Tuesday after the two remained in captivity of abductors for five days.

Khyber Network of the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan, a proscribed terrorist organisation, shared a video of the two hostages on its Facebook page after their murder, with Hajar narrating the details

of their abduction on Jan 25 when they met some TTP terrorists. Haji Sher was seen in tears.

The TTP had accused the two of spying on their men and blamed the subsequent killing of its four activists, including Mehsud Aziz alias Qari Ismail and Mehdia.

In a statement issued by Hamdan Tufaili with the picture of former TTP leader Makhsoomullah Mehmed denied the group's involvement in the killing of the two traders.

It claimed that Haji Sher Mohammad, president of Tirah trader association, and Hajar Afridi were kidnapped by the TTP on Jan 20 over suspicion of involvement in the killing of four TTP members on January 25, but they were freed after

being found innocent after an extensive interrogation-case investigation by the outlet's intelligence wing.

"Some informants killed the two traders soon after these releases that we can do now is the TTP is not in favour of peace among people."

Daon tried in vain to reach the jirga members who held talks with suspected terrorists to secure the release of the two hostages as their mobile phones were snatched off.

Local sources said that Haji Haseeb Khan, local emir of the Jamiat Ulema Islam-Pak, who led the jirga, were into hiding after the two captives were found dead as he and his colleagues wanted to avoid any interaction with media or government officials.

## Dera farmers' body wants agriculture tax withdrawn

**DERA ISMAIL KHAN:** The local farmers' association has rejected the agricultural income tax imposed by the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government under the 'Measures' of the International Monetary Fund, and threatened to launch protest movement if the levy wasn't withdrawn.

This came during a meeting of the association held here on Wednesday.

MPA Maslana Luther Rehman and Dera Ismail Khan Miankhal were also present.

The meeting was presided over by Haji Abdul Rashid Dhang.

The participants highlighted the challenges faced by landowners and farmers, concerning the heavy taxation on agricultural income.

The meeting decided that key regional figures, including Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Governor Farukh Karim Khan - who hails from Dera Ismail Khan - would be contacted for support.

Speaking on the occasion, Maslana Luther Rehman, the parliamentary leader of Jamiat Ulema-Islam-Fazil in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly, criticised the tax, stating that agriculture was the backbone of the economy, and "harvesting" it would harm the nation.

He emphasised that policymaking should be consultative and practical, warning that "further economic destruction" should be avoided. He called the one per cent tax on an income of Rs150 million a "disgrace" to the nation.

He also highlighted that completing the left canal project would make the province self-sufficient in wheat production.

MPA Dera Ismail Khan Miankhal pointed out that 60 per cent of the province's cultivated land was in Dera and Torki. He accused the PTI government of adopting anti-farmer policies, stating that no work had been done on Canal Zain Dara's distribution, as clearing of irrigation canals had taken place, and heavy machinery was being removed. He also alleged that wheat procurement was deliberately delayed, benefiting certain vested interests.

The protest leaders warned that the sudden approval of the agricultural tax without debate in the assembly was even harsher than IMF's conditions. They demanded the withdrawal of tax on Rs1.2 million of income, and revision of the land rent collection policies.

On the occasion, Abdul Rashid Dhang announced plans to challenge the tax in court and called for unity among farmers to safeguard their rights. He criticised Chief Minister Ali Saeed Garooper for failing to support the farming community.

Other speakers also voiced their concerns over the "punitive" taxation policies. They highlighted that farmers were already paying taxes on agricultural inputs such as pesticides, fertilisers, and machinery.

## Lawyers oppose transfer of land to new cantonment board

**SWAT:** Khwassadha Telab Bar Association has opposed transfer of land to proposed cantonment board in Swat.

According to a statement issued by Khwassadha Telab Bar Association, here on Wednesday, a general body meeting of the association was held with Advocate Khawar Ali Khan in the chair.
