

Gaza truce in the balance as Israel threatens to resume war

Egypt 'has plan for enclave's future,' Jordan's king says, talks to be held in Saudi Arabia

The fragile truce in Gaza was hanging by a thread on Tuesday after Israel and Hamas traded accusations and Benjamin Netanyahu threatened to resume the war that has already devastated the Palestinian enclave.


After Hamas halted the latest release of Israeli hostages due on Saturday, the Israeli prime minister said the war would restart if Hamas did not return its captives. "The ceasefire will end," he said, and the Israeli army would "resume intense fighting until Hamas is decisively defeated."

Donald Trump's latest comments raised tensions further. The dust had not settled on the US president's bombshell plan last week to expel Gaza's residents and redevelop the enclave when Trump then said that displaced Palestinians would have no right to return to the territory.

He followed that up with a ceasefire ultimatum to Hamas. "If all of the hostages aren't returned by Saturday 12 o'clock I would say cancel it, all bets are off, and let hell break out," Trump said.

Trump's threat was backed up by far-right extremist Israeli minister Bezalel Smotrich. "Cut off electricity and water, stop humanitarian aid ... open the gates of hell," he said.

Senior Hamas official Sami Abu Zuhri said: "Trump must remember that there is

an agreement that must be respected by both parties. The language of threats has no value and further complicates matters."

UN man in Yemen dies in Houthi captivity

An employee of the UN's World Food Programme has died while being held captive by the Houthi militia in Yemen, the agency said on Tuesday.

The man, identified only as Ahmed, was "arbitrarily detained by local authorities since 23 January," it said.

"A devoted humanitarian and father of two, he played a crucial role in our mission to deliver lifesaving food assistance," agency chief Cindy McCain said.

The Houthis have arrested at least 24 staff from the UN and other humanitarian organizations, most of them since June 2024. In January alone, the militia detained eight UN workers, including six in its stronghold in the northern Saada region. On Monday, the UN suspended its activities in Saada.

The Houthis claimed the June arrests included "an American-Israeli spy network" operating under the cover of humanitarian organizations — allegations emphatically rejected by the UN Human Rights Office.

The militia have controlled most populated parts of Yemen, including the capital Sanaa, since seizing power in a coup in 2014 and early 2015.

Yemen has been the focus of one of the world's largest humanitarian operations during a decade of civil war that disrupted food supplies. The World Food Programme provided assistance to 15.3 million people, nearly 50 percent of the population, in 2023.

Push to educate and regulate

At annual forum in Dubai, WEF's Klaus Schwab urges states to cooperate on ethical regulatory frameworks

While the potential benefits of artificial intelligence are immense, the technology's rapid development has raised concerns about job displacement, the misuse of autonomous weapons, and the erosion of public trust in governments.

At the World Governments Summit in Dubai, global thought leaders emphasized the urgent need for AI regulation and public education to ensure this powerful technology serves humanity rather than destabilizes it.

As AI reshapes how people communicate, work, and live, speakers said the responsibility to regulate and educate falls squarely on governments.

Speaking on the opening day of the World Governments Summit, Schwab, executive Klaus chairman of the World Economic Forum, underscored the need for a comprehensive ethical regulatory framework to guide AI's development.

"We are living in a transition into a new time that will change everything. How we communicate, how we work and how we live," Schwab said. "Governments have to be an agent of change in lightning speed ... They need to provide the necessary infrastructure to sustain change at this rate."

Schwab urged governments to work together in creating policies that ensure AI remains constructive. "What we are seeing today as international efforts is not enough. We need a coordinated global process to make sure that those technologies are constructive," he said.

One of the key challenges with AI regulation is the pace innovation. Governments often struggle to keep up with technological advancements, and without clear regulatory guidelines, AI risks being deployed in ways that could harm society.

Schwab warned against treating AI like nuclear technology, but stressed the importance of governance in shaping its ethical use.

"It is an enabling technology; governments have a big responsibility in shaping these regulations and rules," he said. "Government people today have to be governance architects to create a systems approach to define a system-oriented attitude,"

Beyond economic concerns, AI's role in modern warfare is becoming increasingly apparent. From autonomous drones to AI-powered cyber warfare, technology is changing the way conflicts are fought.

Also speaking on the summit's day, opening Mohammad Al-Gergawi, chairman of the World Governments Summit

The ethical dilemmas surrounding AI-powered warfare remain unresolved. The lack of comprehensive international treaties governing autonomous weapons raises fears that AI could be used to make lethal decisions without human oversight.

and accountability. Governments and international organizations have begun to take steps toward AI regulation, but progress has been uneven.

The EU has led the charge with its AI Act, which classifies AI systems based on risk levels and sets strict guidelines for high-risk applications such as biometric surveillance and critical infrastructure.

The US, while lagging in comprehensive AI regulation, has issued executive orders and guidelines on AI safety and transparency.

On Tuesday, US Vice President JD Vance called on European countries to embrace "the new frontier of AI with optimism and not trepidation" and adopt a lighter touch on tech regulation.

"We want to embark on the AI revolution before us with the spirit of openness and collaboration, but to create that kind of trust we need international regulatory regimes that foster creation," he told the Artificial Intelligence Action Summit in Paris.

"To restrict its development now would not only unfairly benefit incumbents in the space, it would mean paralyzing one of the most promising technologies we have seen in generations."

Last month, Chinese startup DeepSeek sent shockwaves through the tech industry when it released a cutting-edge chatbot allegedly at a fraction of the cost of its American competitors, including OpenAI's ChatGPT.

China has implemented AI governance measures that require algorithms to align with government-mandated social values, although these policies have raised ethical concerns.

Despite these efforts, there is no single global framework governing AL The UN and the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development have called for international cooperation, but geopolitical competition often complicates these efforts.

Schwab emphasized that a fragmented approach to AI regulation is inadequate.

"The future is shaped by us, so let's look with optimism into the future," he said. "Let's look at our future with constructive optimism."

To ensure AI development aligns with human interests, experts say countries should collaborate on common AI governance principles to prevent regulatory gaps and misuse, while also implementing AI education programs to demystify the technology and reduce public anxiety.

Clear rules on the use of Al in military applications agreed at the international level could help prevent unintended escalations, while retraining programs could help workers transition into AI-augmented industries.

As the discussions at the World Governments Summit made clear, failure to act could result in lost public trust, economic upheaval, and the dangerous proliferation of autonomous weapons.

"I hope this summit will create a better landscape for the future of governments and humanity," said Al-Gergawi.

To achieve that vision, policymakers are urged to move beyond rhetoric and take concrete steps toward responsible AI governance. Indeed, the future of AI is not predetermined - it will be shaped by the decisions made today.

World economy 'remarkably resilient despite unprecedented setbacks'

IMF chief Kristalina Georgieva says Gulf countries are performing well, voices concern over Europe's situation

"Today the IMF is supporting over 50 vulnerable countries, half of them are in sub-Saharan Africa more important is we help

... more important is we help countries build the foundations to get on a better part," Georgieva told the WGS during a session with Richard Quest, CNN correspondent and anchor.

"By the way, in this region, \$33 billion, IMF is financing for countries that need that support," she said.

When asked by Quest if she was concerned that inflation was going to resurge, the IMF's top official said that there was a need to see how things evolved.

"If we are in a situation where in some parts of the world there is a slowdown that may push central banks to bring interest rates down, that actually may not be inflationary ... there are many things that we don't know, but what we do know is that we have a situation in which the US economy has been performing quite strongly and will likely continue to be strong and that pushes the dollar up," Georgieva explained.

Addressing a packed hall during WGS's first day, the IMF chief added that the US had outperformed the rest of the G20 members, the only economy to exceed its pre-pandemic trend.

"What does that mean? Capital is moving much more force-fully toward the US ... before the pandemic many on the move went to many places, 18 percent went to the United States and today it is over 30 percent. "So that is the foundation for a strong dollar, and

a strong dollar all other things are equal for the majority of emerging markets and developing economies is trouble ... so then we have inflationary impact," she said.

The IMF sees a picture of a "remarkably resilient world economy despite a series of unprecedented shocks," Georgieva said, elaborating that "we are projecting growth this year 3.3 percent and next year 3.3 percent." The Gulf countries were doing quite well, she said, but expressed more concern about "Europe, and some ... (places) are vulnerable emerging markets where they are doing less well."

Another concern highlighted was "how the tremendous transformations that are happening in the world are integrated in countries' policies."

Taking AI as a case in point, Quest asked: "Do you see us having a good handle on the growth of new technologies?" "So, we look at the front, what is happening with artificial intelligence? It can be a great story, a world that becomes more productive, or it can be a sad story, a world that is more divided ... the haves have more, and the have-nots are completely lost. Georgieva added that there was a need to recognize that "we are in a multipolar world" so cooperation as it used to be "before when we had a world with one country dominating" was going to be different.

"We still have one economy that is the strongest (the US) but we also have many economies, emerging market economies that are moving forward much faster, usually because of the 3 Ds; deregulate, digitize and diversify.

These islands of excellence need to connect more, and we at the IMF are actually promoting more inter-region and crossregion collaboration. I think it is a moment to recognize our host (the UAE) because they are absolutely fantastic in working with everybody," she said.

Connectivity gap poses barrier to economic progress: experts

A massive 5.5 billion people have been connected around the world through such projects as the Edison Alliance, but half as many remain unconnected, Hatem Dowidar, group CEO at e&, told the World Governments Summit on Tuesday.

Dowidar said it was important to ensure this gap was addressed before it led to further economic divide in the future.

He gave the example of two students, one in an advanced economy with access to personalized artificial intelligence programs for education and the ability to collaborate globally with his peers, and another in a less wealthy nation, who had to walk for hours to reach school and had access to only the "very basic training and teaching equipment."

He said: "These two have to compete in the future ... It's really

unfair. And if we don't do anything today to bridge that divide, it will become a bigger problem in the future." Connectivity has become one of the most important ingredients for progress, Dowidar said, adding: "We need to all work together, whether it's governments, businesses (or) organizations."

Today with the advancement of AI, this becomes even more critical as "we can really help a lot of the global south with solutions that improve education, healthcare and economic activity."

Dowidar said there were signs of improvements in technology that would help increase connectivity, such as satellite technology, which was becoming more accessible.

Margherita Della Valle, CEO, Vodafone, said: "For society, connectivity today is essential ... There cannot be any real development without connectivity. She added that her company's most recent evolution has been adding satellite connectivity to their networks.

"Out of the 2.5 billion people who have no access to the internet, there are around 300 million who are nowhere near any form of connectivity, and satellite can get us there," Vodafone's CEO said two weeks ago she made the first mobile space video call in the world using a normal smartphone.

"We are now going to commercially launch the service later this year, and I think it's a great opportunity to bring connectivity to the most remote areas of the planet," she said. ECONOMY

Riyadh charts path to even better days

Kingdom's capital unveils a comprehensive master plan for infrastructure projects in 2025

Saudi Arabia has launched its first comprehensive master plan for all infrastructure projects in Riyadh for 2025 to ease traffic congestion, optimize spending, and align with Vision 2030's sustainable development goals.

Mayor of Riyadh and Chairman of the Infrastructure Projects Center Prince Faisal bin Ayyaf announced the comprehensive plan, which is part of broader efforts led by the capital's Infrastructure Projects Center, established by a Cabinet decision in July 2023.

The plan represents a qualitative shift in the region's development, as it puts an end to random and individual works and moves to a new stage that depends on collective planning and prior coordination.

In a speech during the plan's review ceremony, Prince Faisal said that it will help in addressing clashes between various projects within the region and arranging priorities, by placing all projects within a unified timetable, which will improve the quality of life for the residents in the capital.

Osama Ghanem Alobaidy, adviser and professor of corporate law at the Institute of Public Administration in Riyadh, told Arab News; "The plan announced by the Riyadh mayor is a welcome move to reduce traffic congestions in the city.

The mayor added that infrastructure is vital for any city and raises its capabilities, with Riyadh set to host major global events such as the AFC Asian Cup in 2027, Winter Asian Olympics in 2029, World Expo in 2030, the FIFA World Cup in 2034, and the Asian Games in 2034.

than 66,000 pre-coordinated permits for 2025.

Riyadh has evolved from an emerging city into a global economic hub over the years, and is a leading investment destination. Its land area has expanded immensely, and its population has surpassed 7 million.

Loyalty must be to the state alone, Aoun tells Lebanon ministers

Salam's government told to focus on reforms that will 'revive the nation'

Lebanese President Joseph Aoun has told ministers in the country's new government that their "loyalty and allegiance must be to the state alone, not to any other entity."

Speaking after the official group photo in the presidential palace courtyard, Aoun also told the 24 ministers in Prime Minister Nawaf Salam's government that they "are here to serve the people, not the other way around."

"The key issue is not just the formation of the government but proving credibility by initiating anti-corruption efforts and carrying out administrative, judicial, and security appointments," he said.

Aoun urged ministers to focus on urgent issues, primarily the state budget, municipal and local elections, and the Israeli withdrawal on Feb. 18.

During the first government session, Aoun said that ministers should "refrain from

directing any criticism toward friendly and brotherly nations," adding that Lebanon should not be used as a "platform for such criticisms."

Salam's government, the first under Aoun's presidency, does not include direct party members but rather specialists nominated by political parties.

Aoun said "the country is not bankrupt, but the administration is," highlighting the need to revive the nation through reforms that ministers and the government will work to

Some Israeli soldiers traveling abroad are targeted for war crimes

An Israeli army reservist's dream vacation in Brazil ended abruptly last month over an accusation that he committed war crimes in the Gaza Strip.

Yuval Vagdani woke up on Jan. 4 to a flurry of missed calls from family members and Israel's Foreign Ministry with an urgent warning: A pro-Palestinian legal group had convinced a federal judge in Brazil to open a war crimes investigation for his participation in the demolition of civilian homes in Gaza.

A frightened Vagdani fled the country on a commercial flight the next day to avoid the grip of a powerful legal concept called "universal jurisdiction," which allows governments to prosecute people for the most serious crimes regardless of where they are allegedly committed.

The case against Vagdani was brought by the Hind Rajab Foundation, a legal group based in

Belgium named after a young girl who was killed early in the war by Israeli fire as she and her family fled Gaza City.

Aided by geolocation data, the group built its case around Vagdani's own social media posts. A photograph showed him in uniform in Gaza, where he served in an infantry unit; a video showed a large explosion of buildings in Gaza during which soldiers can be heard cheering.

Judges at the International Criminal Court concluded last year there was enough evidence to issue an arrest warrant for Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for crimes against humanity for using "starvation as a method of warfare" and for intentionally targeting civilians.

Since forming last year, Hind Rajab has made dozens of complaints in more than 10 countries to arrest both low-level and high-ranking Israeli soldiers. Its campaign has yet to yield any arrests. But it has

led Israel to tighten restrictions on social media usage among military personnel.

"It's our responsibility, as far as we are concerned, to bring the cases," Haroon Raza, a co-founder of Hind Rajab, said from his office in Rotterdam in the Netherlands.

It is then up to authorities in each country - or the International Criminal Court - to pursue them, he added.

The director general of Israel's Foreign Ministry, Eden Bar Tal, last month said fewer than a dozen soldiers had been targeted, with no warrants issued.

Universal jurisdiction is not new. The 1949 Geneva Conventions - the post Second World War treaty regulating military conduct - specify that all signatories must prosecute war criminals or hand them over to a country who will.

In 1999, the UN Security Council

asked all UN countries to include universal jurisdiction in their legal codes, and around 160 countries have adopted them in some form.

"Certain crimes like war crimes, genocide and crimes against humanity are crimes under international law," said Marieke de Hoon, an international law expert at the University of Amsterdam. "And we've recognized in international law that any state has jurisdiction over those egregious crimes."

In response to Brazil's pursuit of Vagdani, the Israeli military has prohibited soldiers below a certain rank from being named in news articles and requires their faces to be obscured. It has also warned soldiers against social media posts related to their military service or travel plans. The evidence Hind Rajab

lawyers presented to the judge in Brazil came mostly from Vagdani's social media accounts.

The power of universal jurisdiction has limits.

In the Netherlands, where Hind Rajab has filed more than a dozen complaints, either the victim or perpetrator must hold Dutch nationality, or the suspect must be in the country for the entirety of the investigation - factors likely to protect Israeli tourists from prosecution. Eleven complaints against 15 Israeli soldiers have been dismissed, some because the accused was only in the country for a short time, according to Dutch prosecutors. Two complaints involving four soldiers are pending.

In 2016, activists in the UK made unsuccessful attempts to arrest Israeli military and political leaders for their roles in the 2008-09 war in Gaza.

Raza says his group will persist. "It might take 10 years. It might be 20 years. No problem. We are ready to have patience."

There is no statute of limitations on war crimes.

Pope slams migrant deportations from US, warns 'it will end badly'

In 2016, pontiff said anyone who builds a wall rather than a bridge to keep out migrants was 'not a Christian'

Pope Francis issued a major rebuke on Tuesday to the Trump administration's mass deportation of migrants, warning that the program to forcefully deport people purely because of their illegal status deprives them of their inherent dignity and "will end badly."

Francis took the remarkable step of addressing the US migrant crackdown in a letter to US bishops who have criticized the expulsions as harming the most vulnerable.

History's first Latin American pope has long made caring for migrants a priority of his pontificate, demanding that countries welcome, protect, promote and integrate those fleeing conflicts, poverty and climate disasters. Francis has also said governments are expected to do so to the limits of their capacity.

In the letter, Francis said nations have the right to defend themselves and keep their communities safe from criminals.

"That said, the act of deporting people who in many cases have left their own land for reasons of extreme poverty, insecurity, exploitation, persecution or serious deterioration of the environment, damages the dignity of many men and women, and of entire families, and places them in a state of particular vulnerability and defenselessness," he wrote.

Citing the biblical stories of migration, the people of Israel and the Book of Exodus, Francis affirmed the right of people to seek shelter and safety in other lands and said he was concerned with what is going on in the US.

"I have followed closely the

major crisis that is taking place in the United States with the initiation of a program of mass deportations," Francis wrote.

"The rightly formed conscience cannot fail to make a critical judgment and express its disagreement with any measure that tacitly or explicitly identifies the illegal status of some migrants with criminality."

It is one thing to develop a policy to regulate migration legally; it is another to expel people purely on the basis of

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops put out an unusually critical statement after Trump's initial executive orders, saying those "focused on the treatment of immigrants and refugees, foreign aid, expansion of the death penalty, and the environment, are deeply troubling and will have negative consequences, many of which will harm the most vulnerable among us."

It was a strong rebuke from the US Catholic hierarchy. Trump won 54 percent of Catholic voters in the 2024 election, a wider margin than the 50 percent in the 2020 election won by President Joe Biden, a Catholic.

The Trump-Francis collision course on migration stems from 2016, when Francis famously said anyone who builds a wall rather than a bridge to keep out migrants was "not a Christian."

He made the comment after celebrating Mass at the US-Mexico border during the US presidential campaign when Trump promised to build a wall along the frontier.

But migration is not the only area of conflict in US-Vatican relations. On Monday, the Vatican's main charity Caritas International warned that millions of people could die as a result of the "ruthless" US decision to "recklessly" stop USAID funding.

Caritas asked governments to urgently call on the US administration to reverse course.

Ebola cases in Uganda rise to nine, while 265 others are being monitored under quarantine

Ebola cases in Uganda have risen to nine, while 265 other people were being monitored under quarantine, health authorities said Tuesday.

The nine include the first victim, a male nurse who died the day before the outbreak was declared on Jan. 30. That man remains the only fatality.

Eight patients "are receiving medical care and are in stable condition," a Health Ministry statement said.

Seven of them were admitted to the main public hospital in Kampala, the Ugandan capital, in addition to one being treated in the eastern district of Mbale, the ministry said, adding that "the situation is under control" amid heightened surveillance.

The nurse who died had first sought treatment in Kampala and later traveled to Mbale, where he was admitted to a public hospital.

Kampala has a highly mobile population of about 4 million, and officials are still investigating the source of the outbreak. Tracing contacts is key to stemming the spread of Ebola, which manifests as a viral hemorrhagic fever.

There are no approved vaccines

for the Sudan strain of Ebola that is infecting people in Uganda. But authorities have launched a clinical study to further test the safety and efficacy of a trial vaccine as part of measures to stop the spread of the current outbreak.

The last outbreak of Ebola in Uganda, which began in September 2022, killed at least 55 people by the time it was declared over four months later.

Ebola is spread by contact with bodily fluids of an infected person or contaminated materials. Symptoms include fever, vomiting, diarrhea, muscle pain and at times internal and external bleeding.

Scientists suspect that the first person infected in an Ebola outbreak acquires the virus through contact with an infected animal or eating its raw meat.

Sweden jails woman for keeping Yazidi slaves

A Swedish court on Tuesday sentenced a 52-year-old woman to 12 years in prison on genocide charges, in the country's first court case over crimes committed by Daesh against the Yazidi minority.

Accused of keeping Yazidi women and children as slaves at her home in Syria in the winter and spring of 2015, Lina Ishaq was convicted of "genocide" and "crimes against humanity," as well as war crimes, the court said in a statement.

The court in Stockholm said her crimes warranted a sentence of 16 years, but taking a previous sentence into account set the sentence to 12.

The woman, who is a Swedish citizen, was in jail having already been sentenced by a Swedish court to six years in prison in 2022 for allowing her 12-year-old son to be recruited as a Daesh child soldier.

The court said Tuesday's case concerned nine injured parties, six of whom were children at the time. All the plaintiffs had been heen executed.

After about five months of captivity, they arrived at the convicted woman's home in Raqqa.

Top officials gather in New Delhi for India Energy Week

India's main focus in the energy sector is local production and supply chains, PM Modi says

Thousands of top industry executives, innovators and policymakers gathered in New Delhi on Tuesday for India Energy Week 2025, where they will be discussing energy access and sustainability.

More than 70,000 delegates, officials and visitors are expected to take part in the Indian government's flagship annual energy event, which over the next four days will feature 500 speakers, 700 exhibitors and 10 national pavilions from countries including the US, the UK, Canada, Germany, Italy, Japan and Russia displaying their newest technology.

Held at the Yashobhoomi convention center in New Delhi, India Energy Week 2025 will spotlight energy access, security and new global energy systems, in line with the South Asian giant's vision of energy transition.

"India's energy ambitions stand on five pillars: We have resources, which we are harnessing. Secondly, we are encouraging our brilliant minds to innovate. Thirdly, we have economic political strength, stability. Fourthly, India has strategic geography, which makes energy trade more attractive and easier And fifthly, India is committed to global sustainability. This is creating new possibilities in India's energy sector," Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in a virtual address to the event's participants.

"The next two decades are very important for India's development. And in the next five years, we are going to cross many big milestones. Many of our energy goals are aligned with the 2030 deadline. We want to add 500 GW of renewable energy capacity by 2030. Indian Railways has

set a target of net-zero carbon emissions by 2030. Our goal is to produce 5 million metric tonnes of green hydrogen every year by 2030 ... What India has achieved in the last 10 years has given us the confidence that we will definitely achieve these targets."

India aims to generate 500 GW of electricity from non-fossil fuel sources by 2030, under its nationally determined contributions to the Paris Agreement. Solar energy is the dominant contributor to its renewable energy growth, accounting for 47 percent of the total installed renewable energy capacity.

The solar power sector has observed a 3,450 percent increase in capacity over the past decade, rising from 2.82 GW in 2014 to 100 GW in January 2025, according to the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy.

The growth is fueled by local solar module production, which in 2014 had a capacity of only 2 GW.

"There is a lot of potential in India for manufacturing various types of hardware including PV modules. We are supporting local manufacturing," Modi said. "India's major focus is on Make in India and local supply chains."

Bangladesh plans to hold December polls

Bangladesh is preparing to hold elections in December, the first general vote since the ouster of Sheikh Hasina, the former longtime prime minister, Election Commissioner Abul Fazal Mohammad Sanaullah said on Tuesday.

The country's interim government, headed by Nobel prize laureate Prof. Muhammad Yunus, has been implementing a series of reforms and preparing for elections since taking charge in August, after Hasina fled Dhaka amid student-led protests that called for her resignation.

In November, the transitional authorities appointed a new fivemember election commission, which held a meeting with foreign envoys on Tuesday to present its plans for the upcoming polls.

"We have told them that we must make preparations based on the earliest possible date for the election. Our position remains unchanged. We are preparing with December in mind," Sanaullah told journalists after the meeting.

"The national election is

currently the Election Commission's priority."

Yunus previously said that Bangladesh could hold elections by the end of 2025 or in the first half of 2026, provided that electoral reforms take place first.

This includes having the Election Commission prepare a new voter list, a process expected to take months.

Following 15 years of uninterrupted rule, Hasina and her Awami League party had allegedly politicized key government institutions, including the Election Commission.

In a report submitted to the interim government last week, a special commission on electoral reforms said that Hasina was responsible for rigging the last three national polls in Bangladesh, as it proposed more than 200 recommendations to improve the country's voting system.




potential, particularly through the recognition of Palestinian rights, may hold the key to long-term peace and prosperity.

Netanyahu's arrogance pushing region to the precipice

audi Arabia has hit back at Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's arrogant suggestion that the Kingdom should host a Palestinian state, while rejecting the premise that Palestinians must be displaced from their native land. The Kingdom's Foreign Ministry said that it rejected "such statements that aim to divert attention from the continuous crimes committed by the Israeli occupation against the Palestinian brothers in Gaza, including the ethnic cleansing they are subjected to,"

Netanyahu's tongue-in-cheek statement was not only reckless and in poor taste, but it also backfired, as Arab capitals rallied to condemn his position and defend the Saudi position. At the same time, world leaders expressed revulsion at the notion of uprooting the Palestinians and taking over their ancestral lands.

Netanyahu's haughty attitude was boosted by US President Donald Trump's shocking announcement last week, at a White House press conference with the Israeli premier, that the US would "take over" and "own" Gaza

while displacing its residents so that it can turn it into the "Riviera of the Middle East."

Netanyahu and his extremist coalition partners were quick to praise Trump's plan, even as US officials scurried to tone down his statement by claiming that it was based on humanitarian grounds. Others said that Gazans would eventually be allowed to return. But Trump's confusing and shocking Gaza plan presented a beleaguered Netanyahu with an opportunity to wriggle out of commitments to the ceasefire deal reached last month with Hamas.

And when Netanyahu suggested that Saudi Arabia should host a Palestinian state, Riyadh was equally resolute in denouncing the Israeli premier. Even in Israel itself, Netanyahu has been attacked for provoking America's closest Arab ally, one that Trump hopes to bring into the Abraham Accords. By trying to be clever, Netanyahu has sealed the fate of any rapprochement with Saudi Arabia at least for as long as he is in power.

But despite his diplomatic flop, the Israeli premier is looking for ways to use Trump's

lead to the collapse of the ceasefire and for a united global front to oppose Israel's annexation of Palestinian lands.

Meanwhile, there has been a muted reaction to Israel's month-long campaign to destroy Palestinian refugee camps in the West Bank. According to the UN, at least

40,000 Palestinians have been displaced from Jenin and other refugee camps in the West Bank. Dozens have been killed, the latest being two women, one of them a pregnant 23-year-old. Israel has also demolished tens of homes and destroyed vital infrastructure in at least two camps.

This, along with the financial strangulation of the PA, is aimed at encouraging what ultrareligious Jewish leader Itamar Ben-Gvir has called the "voluntary migration" of Palestinians. Trump is yet to divulge what he thinks Israel should do in the West Bank.

These are dangerous times not only for the Palestinians but for the entire region. Israeli extremists are now in control of Israel, which has gone rogue.

An Arab summit in Cairo this month will discuss the dangerous spiral of events in the region that have been encouraged by Trump and led by Netanyahu and his fellow zealots. The message should be a resounding one, echoing around the world and heard particularly in Washington and Tel Aviv.

Grassroots peacebuilding the bedrock of a lasting peace

or now, the prospect of reaching a peaceful settlement to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict is a remote possibility. However, while many feel sheer despair, the present moment is also an opportunity to revisit what has gone badly wrong over more than 30 years of attempts to reach a lasting peace between the two sides.

There is little doubt in my mind that, while the architects of the 1993 Oslo Accords on both sides were committed to the necessary compromises required to reach a final status agreement, they failed to achieve this because they believed in an "elite peace." In their focus on pushing forward the peace process, they neglected

the need to build a critical mass of support for this long and hazardous journey through closely collaborating with a civil society that could spread the message of peace far and wide.

This is not to say that there was no thriving civil society in support of the Oslo Accords. And following the signing, there emerged people-to-people peacebuilding organizations and initiatives mushroomed. Nevertheless, it was the lack of understanding by governments of how the work of such organizations was crucial in breaking down the barriers between individuals and groups by rehumanizing the other and building trust that was a missing piece in the peacemaking jigsaw puzzle.

in order to see the human and humane side of those who we have regarded as our enemies and to learn to trust them.

Ironically, it was before the peace process started and prior to the escalation of hostilities between Israelis and Palestinians during the two intifadas that ordinary Israelis and Palestinians used to daily engage in day-to-day activities in normal settings. However, as a result of the flareup in violence, this unfortunately came to an abrupt halt.

Moreover, checkpoints and the separation wall were erected and that is where bad fences and checkpoints created bad neighborly relations.

Palestinians see mainly occupying soldiers and settlers, while Israelis perceive Palestinians as a potential threat — neither

sees the other's humanity. This makes the need for grassroots peacebuilding initiatives even more crucial to create bridges between communities that have stopped talking to each other, to preserve the flame of hope for peace through civilized and frank engagement, and to build friendships and trust.

Most frustrating is that, while grassroots

participation in peace processes is internationally recognized as a vehicle to achieving a more inclusive and sustainable peace, peacemaking is still very much preserved as the domain of politicians and diplomats, often including the active involvement of generals. Such groups might be crucial to dealing with issues such as security and the demarcation of borders, but they are typically less competent in handling the psychological-

emotional side of a conflict, which is equally or even more important.

There is sometimes an unsubstantiated belief that those who are active in people-topeople peacebuilding are naive - some would even argue simplistic and fail to understand the complexities of a conflict. Nothing could

be further from the truth. It is actually in the difficult, albeit honest, conversations that take place when people are ready to face each other, instead of avoiding one another or shielding themselves behind biases and prejudices to justify the building of physical and mental walls, that the complexities of a conflict are revealed and constructively resolved.

Afghanistan needs a national awakening

t has been almost three and a half years since the fall of the republic in Afghanistan. A lot has changed since then both in the country and in the global political landscape. What remains unchanged, though, is the plight of women and girls in Afghanistan. The doors of schools, colleges, universities and other educational institutions are permanently closed for them,

When questioned, Taliban officials argue that the development of relevant procedures, revised curricula and a framework for Afghan girls and women's education is underway. These efforts are supposedly to align the education system with Islamic Sharia. It is a dilemma that the Taliban are arbitrarily recreating Islamic principles

and redefining the foundations of Afghan values for which they have neither the political legitimacy nor the religious credibility. While on the face of it they might be justifying this based on their own narrow and ultraconservative interpretation of Islam, in reality it is aimed at serving their political interests.

Ever since the Taliban took control of Afghanistan, the de facto rulers have been striving hard to get international recognition. Yet, no government has formally recognized their regime, although they have been able to send their diplomatic missions to several countries, where they are being represented on a de facto basis.

It is also noteworthy that most of the Afghan embassies and diplomatic missions from the previous government have remained intact. It is a kind of diplomatic conundrum. Embassies in foreign

> countries are, in principle, not independent entities. They represent their respective governments overseas. With the collapse of the Afghan republic back in August 2021, one has to seek a good rationale for these diplomatic missions to keep operating.

With the collapse of the Afghan government in 2021, the country's aid-dependent economy

suffered serious setbacks, as foreign aid dwindled from several billion dollars to just a few hundred million dollars channeled to the UN and some nongovernmental organizations. Most private businesses and enterprises have ceased to exist due to the uncertain political and economic circumstances.

Although measures by the interim Taliban administration have maintained

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the value of the Afghan currency and prices of commodities have remained in reasonable ranges, the overall economic outlook has been dismal, since the purchasing power of the majority of the population has significantly declined. A consistent lack of trust in the incumbent regime could derail the fragile so-called positive economic indicators at any time.

To make matters worse, Afghanistan is already experiencing the economic repercussions of the Trump administration's decision to dismantle the US Agency for International Development and its global aid programs. The US government has been the primary donor to Afghan relief efforts since the government collapsed.

Internal divisions and a power struggle within the Taliban were noticeable from Day 1, as multiple

groups tried to assert greater control over the government machinery. These differences are now increasingly evident, as rivalry intensifies between the Kandaharbased extremely radical group and the Kabul-based Taliban leaders who seem to be keen to open up and engage, including their more favorable views on women's rights to education and work.

The Taliban's deputy foreign minister,

Abbas Stanekzai, who was instrumental in negotiating the Doha peace agreement with the US, has been critical of the Taliban's hard-line policies. There are reports that Stanekzai might have been forced to leave the country in view of a possible order of arrest by the Taliban's radical supreme leader. There is a need for such voices to synergize and be leveraged for a positive change.

Afghanistan, once again, stands at a cross-

roads, Regional and global political dynamics could turn the country into a battleground, with ordinary Afghans the main victims. Also, the country could become a hotbed of global terrorism, threatening the region and beyond if things spiral out of control. It is the national duty of every Afghan, especially those with a sense of love

and commitment to the country, to join forces and build a peaceful movement for change: a bottom-up, peopleoriented change based on the use of soft power, dialogue and political discourse.

It is time the Afghans came forward to begin a national movement for change without foreign influence and coercion, although the positive role of the international community to facilitate and arbitrate should always be welcome.

Wave of investments underscores Kingdom's growing prominence in tech sector

Investments totaling \$1.78 billion marked the third day of the LEAP 2025 Tech Conference in Riyadh, aimed at accelerating artificial intelligence and digital talent development.

Industry leaders, investors, and policymakers have launched several initiatives to drive digital transformation in Saudi Arabia, aligning with Vision 2030 to position the Kingdom at the forefront of the digital age.


Among these, Equinix, a global leader in digital infrastructure, announced a \$1 billion investment in data centers nationwide, starting with a 100-megawatt facility to serve hyperscale and retail customers in the region.

"Equinix has been at the center of technological advancements for 26 years. Our global interconnection hubs allow data to move scamlessly worldwide, and now, we are expanding further into Saudi Arabia," said Judith Gardner, vice president of growth and emerging markets at Equinix.

Saudi Arabia's Communications, Space, and Technology Commission has launched Cohort 3 of its innovative regulatory sandbox program, aimed at empowering innovators and startups to test new technologies.

Abdulaziz Al-Batli, general manager of technology enablement at CST, emphasized the commission's approach, which balances ample space for innovation with necessary regulatory oversight.

To further solidify Saudi Arabia's position as a regional technology and innovation hub, DAMAC's EDGNEX

unveiled plans to expand its investments in data centers for cloud computing and AI across the Kingdom.

The company aims to develop a 500-megawatt capacity by 2030, aligning with the country's broader digital transformation goals.

This initiative complements the wave of investments announced at LEAP 2025, reinforcing Saudi Arabia's commitment to enhancing its digital infrastructure and fostering an Al-driven economy.

Several investment funds pledged a total of \$695 million to support startups specializing in AI, gaming, and innovative tech solutions. These investments bring the Kingdom's total venture capital commitments announced at LEAP to nearly \$700 million, with close to \$100 million dedicated to startup investments.

Talent development

WhiteHelmet introduced ASIF, the first AI-powered construction agent designed to revolutionize the building industry by optimizing speed and efficiency.

Additionally, Microsoft announced the establishment of the Kingdom's first Data Center Academy in partnership with the National IT Academy.

"This initiative aligns with Microsoft's mission to provide cutting-edge digital skills and training, ensuring Saudi Arabia's

workforce is ready for the AI-driven future," said Zainab AI-Amein, vice president of national digital transformation at Microsoft.

Similarly, Huawei, in collaboration with the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, unveiled plans for a Future Skills Center to enhance AI expertise in the region.

Accenture and Atomcamp also launched the first AI Academy in Saudi Arabia, aiming to train 20,000 Saudi professionals by 2030.

CST Gov. Mohammed Al-Tamimi, highlighted key themes shaping LEAP 2025, including AI, cloud computing, quantum technologies, and the intersection of space and the digital economy.

"We are witnessing the second phase of our space track, with over 20 events dedicated to discussions on space competition and the connection between space and the digital economy," said Al-Tamimi.

Gaming industry

The gaming industry also saw significant investments, with HGM announcing a \$300 million commitment to bring top gaming titles to Riyadh. The Kingdom's first major military shooter game is set to launch in October, developed by a team with experience in franchises like Call of Duty.

Orange Business to offer subscription-based Smart City services

Digital system integrator Orange Business is set to roll out "Smart City-as-a-Service" in Saudi Arabia, aiming to drive significant financial and time savings, a senior company official said.

Speaking to Arab News on the sidelines of LEAP 2025 in Riyadh, Mohammed Al-Jeraisy, managing director of Saudi Arabia and Africa, said the service will develop Smart City applications for cloud deployment, capitalizing on the sector's rapid growth. The Saudi Smart Cities market is projected to expand considerably, with revenue expected to hit \$560 million by 2025, according to data firm Statista. Globally, the US is projected to generate the highest revenue in the segment at \$27.06 billion in the same year.

"This is something that is known — it's a challenge. When you implement a Smart City solution, deployment is costly and time-consuming. These projects typically take years to develop and build. What a Smart City-as-a-Service solution does today is help customers adopt

the solution quickly, saving both time and costs," Al-Jeraisy said.

He added that the new model could cut costs by 40 to 60 percent and reduce adoption time by up to 80 percent.

Al-Jeraisy also highlighted the flexibility of the subscription-based model, which allows customers to choose specific Smart City services as needed.

"When it comes to Smart City services, there are many — plenty of them. You can think of major services like a city's command and control center, which is essential. You also need solutions for the environment and applications for traffic management. Today, you can start using these services immediately and access them through the platform," Al-Jeraisy said.

The model enables customers to opt in and out of services as required. "You can subscribe to the service today, use it for as long as you need, and stop whenever you decide. You can then go for another service. I think that's one of the key benefits we offer to customers," he added.

Despite the name, Smart Cityas-a-Service is not limited to cities, Al-Jeraisy said. "It can be used for campuses, stadiums, events, and even universities because what truly matters are the applications and use cases we build on the platform," Al-Jeraisy said.

Saudi Arabia is emerging as a leader in Smart City and AI adoption, he noted, adding that the global adoption rate for Smart City-as-a-Service currently stands at 33 percent and is expected to rise as more customers recognize its benefits.

Orange Business has been involved in large-scale Smart City projects in Saudi Arabia and the Middle East for more than a decade.

Saudi Arabia's Public Investment Fund is set to unveil new private sector partnerships and investment initiatives at its annual Private Sector Forum, scheduled for Feb. 12-13 in Riyadh.

The event, which will bring together more than 90 PIF-backed companies, seeks to strengthen supply chains, boost local manufacturing, and accelerate economic diversification under Vision 2030.

Now in its third year, the forum will spotlight business opportunities with the sovereign wealth fund and its portfolio companies, identify potential prospects for investors and suppliers, and expand avenues for collaboration. Egypt's inflation eases slightly in January: data

Analysts expect inflationary pressures to persist in the near term

Egypt's headline consumer price index recorded 243.5 points in January, reflecting an annual inflation rate of 23.2 percent, down slightly from 23.4 percent in December, according to official data.

Figures from the nation's Central Agency for Public Mobilization and Statistics show that Egypt's inflation slowdown was primarily driven by a 2.6 percent decline in vegetable prices from December to January, alongside a 0.3 percent decrease in fish and seafood prices.

Meanwhile, costs remained stable across key sectors such as education, health services, and telecommunications.

However, according to the report, some essential commodities saw notable price hikes. Bread and cereal prices rose 1.3 percent, while meat and poultry prices surged 5 percent. Dairy, cheese, and eggs recorded a modest increase of 0.3 percent, and oils and fats edged up by 0.7 percent.

The sharpest price spike was in fruits, which jumped by 9.8 percent. These price increases were key contributors to the 1.6 percent monthly inflation in January, compared to a flat reading in December. Other sectors also experienced price increases. Personal care products rose by 1.5 percent, hospital services by 1.4 percent and furnishings and household appliances by 0.6 percent, as well as electricity, gas, and fuel by 0.1 percent, and hotel services by 3.3 percent.

Compared to January, several

categories recorded substantial annual increases, the report showed. Food and beverages rose by 20.2 percent, tobacco and alcoholic drinks by 29.5 percent, housing, utilities, and fuel by 18.7 percent, healthcare services by 40.5 percent, and transport by 33.6 percent, while education costs remained unchanged.

Unemployment rate in France drops to 7.3%

The unemployment rate in France dropped to 7.3 percent in the fourth quarter of 2024, down from 7.4 percent in the previous quarter, and below market expectations of 7.5 percent, according to official data.

The number of unemployed individuals decreased by 63,000, reaching a total of 2.3 million. Among different age groups, the unemployment rate for those aged 15 to 24 fell by 0.8 percentage points to 19 percent, while it decreased by 0.1 percentage points to 6.5 percent for those aged 25 to 49.

Norway GDP unexpectedly contracts in Q4


Norway's mainland economy unexpectedly contracted in the final quarter of 2024, coming in below analysts' forecasts and the central bank's projection, on weaker investment by households and companies, Statistics Norway data showed on Tuesday.

The October-December period saw a decline in mainland gross domestic product of 0.4 percent compared with the July-September period, while economists polled by Reuters had expected growth of 0.2 percent. Overall growth in the mainland economy for 2024 stood at 0.6 percent from the previous year. **Reuters**

Russia's budget deficit jumps 14-fold

Russia's fiscal deficit jumped 14-fold in January due to a 73.6 percent increase in spending at the start of the year, reaching 1.7 trillion rubles (\$17.73 billion) or 0.8 percent of national output.

"This is primarily due to the accelerated financing of expenditures within the first quarter and will not affect the quarterly trajectory or the achievement of the target parameters of the structural balance for 2025 as a whole," the Finance Ministry said. The deficit figure stood at 124 billion rubles in January 2024. Reuters

US President Donald Trump signed executive orders to impose 25 percent tariffs on steel and aluminum imports from March 12, ramping up a long-promised trade war despite warnings from Europe and China The EU swiftly vowed to retaliate with "proportionate

In an executive order released Monday, Trump said: "All imports of aluminum articles and derivative aluminum articles from Argentina, Australia, Canada, Mexico, EU countries, and the UK shall be subject to the additional ad valorem tariff." He issued a separate order for steel. AFP

Esports Olympics to debut in Saudi Arabia later in 2027

The first Olympic Esports Games will be hosted in Riyadh in 2027, two years later than expected when a 12-year deal with Saudi Arabia was signed last year.



'A Dream Come True': Elisa Longo Borghini and UAE Team ADQ make history at the women's tour

Third edition of UAE Tour Women, the Middle East's first and only Women's World Tour race, signals rapid growth of women's professional cycling

"A dream come true." Those were the words of an elated Melissa Moncada, head of team at UAE Team ADQ, after her squad made history on Sunday by securing the overall win at their home race.

The UAE Tour Women, part of the Women's WorldTour - the highest tier of women's cycling - has been a key target for the team since the race's first edition in 2023.

Along with team classification, Italian star Elisa Longo Borghini claimed the prestigious general classification red jersey for UAE Team ADQ, with teammate Silvia Persico securing second in the GC. Karlijn Swinkels placed fifth overall, while Lara Gillespie claimed the black jersey in Intermediate Sprints Classification - a remarkable achievement on her Women's WorldTour debut after being called up from the UAE squad's development team. Teammates Elynor Backstedt and sprinter Sofie van Rooijen, who bounced back from a crash on stage one, provided crucial support throughout the four days of racing.

Longo Borghini's decisive attack on Jebel Hafeet on Stage 3 proved to be the turning point. With Persico setting a relentless pace, Longo Borghini launched a perfectly timed attack 3 km from the finish line, securing a dominant victory and virtually sealing the overall title. Following Longo Borghini was Persico in second place. The team's overall triumph was sealed on the final Stage 4 on Sunday, despite Lorena Wiebes

of SD Worx-Protime dominating the sprint finishes, winning three of the four stages.

A pivotal moment

Speaking to Arab News at the end of the tour about the crucial moment in the race, Moncada praised the entire team's effort, particularly dynamic the between Longo Borghini and Persico on Stage 3.

"Persico really is an athlete that can defend and fight for the victory of the leader," said Moncada. "Even though she brought Elisa to the amazing position that she was in, she fought to the end and arrived in second position. It's like they almost crossed the line together, so it was amazing."

For Persico, who has known Longo Borghini for years but had never raced alongside her until now, the partnership felt instinctive.

"It really seemed that we were always racing together. We just understand each other really well," said Persico.

"I just started to work at the bottom of the climb and I was just pacing a bit hard. I wanted to drop as many girls as possible. And then when Elisa attacked, in my mind I was 'okay, job finished, I can rest.' But then I saw that I was feeling pretty good - a bit tired, yes, of course. And I said, 'okay, I'll try to do my best for the achievement, so maybe second place.' And yeah, I didn't give up and, in the end, I finished second."







The cast member, one of dozens of dancers clad in identical black sweats, held it high while standing on the roof of the car that was a centerpiece of the hip-hop artist's performance, and then jumped off the stage and ran across the field before being tackled by several men in suits.

Hulu's Muslim Matchmaker' has heart, but not enough spark

"Muslim Matchmaker" premieres on Hulu this week. The series is directed and produced by Smriti Mundhra (of Netflix's "Indian Matchmaking" fame).

But this time around it's not Sima Aunty and her outrageous comments, but rather two older sister types - Hoda Abrahim and Yasmin Elhady - who are helping eight Muslim Americans find

love. The premise of their

matchmaking business is the "Rules of Three: Three dates, three months, and three hundred questions." In an era of dating apps and superficial swipes, the duo urges couples to approach their search for love with intention. They emphasize the importance of giving the relationship time and space to grow while asking the right questions.

The eight-episode show provides a fresh perspective on Muslim Americans as they navigate both their Muslim and

cultural identities in the West. It offers captivating discussions on topics like cultural expectations when dating an older woman, the appropriate timeline to "date," and finding a partner with an equal "halal-to-haram ratio." These discussions are sure to resonate with many, and perhaps, offer a glimpse into a Muslim world that's rarely seen in mainstream Western media.

The show comes with good intentions. For one, it acknowledges dating app fatigue. It offers

a refreshing take with matchmakers who approach singles' choices without judgment or sacrilegious remarks about "wanting too much" (looking at you, Sima Aunty).

But that's also probably the biggest failing of the show. Dating shows thrive on drama - and there's none here.

Tension doesn't surface until episode four. A Bengali American woman is older than the man she's dating, and cultural norms deem this unacceptable.
