




Energy bills to rise 5%

HOUSEHOLD energy bills will rise again in April, it is claimed.

Energy consultancy Cornwall Insight said it expects regulator Ofgem to reveal that the typical household energy bill would increase by 5%, or £85, to £1,823.

The company's Dr Craig Lowrey said: "Households have been hit hard over the past few months and with bills set to rise for third consecutive time the pressure is not

letting up."

Mr Lowrey said the rise was because of an increase in wholesale gas prices across Europe.

Met set to lose 1k cops

BRITAIN'S biggest police force may have to axe over 1,000 cops.

Met Commissioner Sir Mark Rowley warned in December the force needed to slash jobs due to a £450million shortfall.

The Government and Mayor of London Sir Sadiq Khan have since pledged to inject extra cash.

But yesterday a Scotland Yard spokes-man said: "While this new funding decreases our original funding gap, it leaves us with a £260m shortfall and we will have to make substantial tough choices, reducing our size and services."

SIZZLING FACTS ABOUT SAUSAGES



They've been around for 5,000 years. Remnants of a sausage called mombar mahshy - made by stuffing cow intestines with lamb, beef, rice and cardamom - have even been found in ancient Egyptian tombs.

The ancient Greeks were also partial to a banger. They show up in Homer's Odyssey, written in around 850BC, and playwright Epicharmus wrote a comedy called The Sausage some 350 years later.

The Romans loved a sausage too – they were eaten at their early pagan festivals. So much so that, when Christian emperor Constantine the Great came to power in AD324, he banned them and created a thriving black market.

During the Middle Ages, giant bangers were often unveiled on special occasions. A massive one made from 81 hams was presented to the people of Königsberg, Prussia, (now Kaliningrad, Russia) on New Year's Day

The people of Kazakhstan have eaten The people of Nazakisum and horse meat sausages for centuries. They believe the bangers boost their athletic pow er. Some athletes even tried to import them to Britain for the 2012 Olympic Games in

Speaking of unorthodox fillings, fish sausages were popular in Britain until the end of the 19th Century. Made with haddock, mackerel and kipper, they were often served during Lent.

Cumberland sausages were traditionally made from a breed of pig - the Cumberland - that has been extinct since the 1960s. Boffins genetically engineered a sow in 2008, but sadly she proved infertile.

In Taipei, Taiwan, "sausage gambling" has been part of the culture since World War Two. Rather than just buying a banger from a street trader, you play a dice game to try and win one.

Depending on who you ask, frankfurters were invented in either Frankfurt, Germany, or Vienna, Austria. Residents of the latter point out they are often called

The disputed bangers were exported to the US in the 1860s, where street vendors sold them in buns. They were called "dachs-

hund sausages" because of their shape, even-

tually becoming "hot dogs".

The word sausage comes from the Latin "salscius", meaning "prepared by salting". It first appeared in English in the

15th Century.

But the adjective "sausagey" was coined by popular D.H. Laurence in his 1921 by novelist D.H. Lawrence in his 1921 travel book Sea And Sardinia. He used it to describe a cathedral in the city of Cagliari.

Since the mid-1990s, US baseball team the Milwaukee Brewers have held a "sausage race" at every home game. Competitors come dressed as giant bangers from around the world.

The longest sausage in history measured a ludicrous 39 miles and weighed 45 tons. It was made by supermarket workers in Ploiesti City, Romania, on December 1, 2014.

Brit Leah Shutkever, above, holds the world record for the most sausages eaten in one minute. The competitive eater demolished 10 in Birmingham on June 7, 2020.

Pope is battling asthma


POPE Francis has got pneumonia in both lungs,

MILLIONS of people slip into their pyjamas the

minute they get home each day.

A probe into clothing habits behind closed doors found the majority of workers ditch their suit or fancy work dress straight away and don their favourite "comfies"

And a naughty majority of those will strip down to their underwear to carry out household chores, with a hardy smaller group willing to go completely naked once the

working day is done.

Overall, the study found six in 10 put their pyjamas on as soon as they get home.

And more than a third of PJ-lovers say they would dress in nightwear all the time if it was socially acceptable. But only 9% admitted they have worn them on the school run.

However, not everyone feels the same, with 39% spending their evenings in the clobber they wore to the office.

A spokesman for Safestyle, which ran the study, said: "This revealing data shows how relaxed the nation is when it comes to going about their daily routines in the comfort of their own home.

"What's particularly eye-opening is that over two thirds don't seem to mind who sees them through their window."

Bosses in knife jail fear

Jassy could be caged if his company sells any more knives to under-18s.

Bosses of knife retailers will be held accountable for sales to minors under legislation announced by the Home Office today.

It follows the murders of three girls by teen Axel Rudakubana, inset,

in Southport, Merseyside, last summer. The then-17 year-old, who was jail-

ed for 52 years, bought the knife he used off Amazon after using encrypted software to pass the age verification checks.

Home Secretary Yvette Cooper said: "It is horrifying how easy it is for young people to get hold of knives online. We will pursue every possible avenue to save young lives."

Pay of workers is rising

EARNINGS growth has accelerated to an eightmonth high.

It comes despite further signs of strain in the jobs market, as vacancies tumble.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) said average regular pay surged 5.9% in the three months to December.

It was up from 5.6% in the previous three months and the fastest growth since the three months to April last year.

In a further encouraging sign, the ONS estimated that the number of UK workers on payrolls rose by 21,000 during January to 30.4million.

Call for round knives

ROUND-ended blades are safer than sharp-pointed kitchen knives and could save lives, say boffins.

They tested 1,200 repeated stabbing motions on everyday clothing and found 10 different safety knives did not cut through the fabric.

De Montfort University's forensic scientist Leisa Nichols-Drew – who is leading the research - said: "It's safer to have these safer round-ended knives. they will still have the utility function that you'd want from a kitchen tool."



The Canadian, 65, said: "It's about 500 times more powerful than the





She said change can lead to "discomfort or resistance" but added: "Given time, our brains adjust, and what once felt unfamiliar eventually becomes second nature."

We are rubbish at trash recycling



WASTE STILL PUT IN WRONG BINS

BRITS are still baffled when ■ by FRANCESCA TUCKEY it comes to recycling - with 47% struggling to tell what to put in which bin.

Four in 10 admit getting confused, with many putting glass jars, tin cans and plastic takeaway containers in general waste bins.

Broken glass and aerosol cans also regularly end up in the bin when they could be recycled. Roger Wright, waste strategy

and packaging manager at Biffa, which set up the research, said: "Clear and accessible recycling information is key to helping individuals make more sustainable choices.

"We can see from these findings that there are clearly good

intentions when it comes to

recycling.

"People care about the environment of their rubbish. However, there is still a lot of confusion as to what can and can't be recycled."

The research comes ahead of the Simpler Recycling legislation, where all businesses with 10 or more full-time employees will have to separate plastic, paper, card, glass, metals and food waste from March 31 or risk a fine.

Roger added: "It's crucial we all play our part in helping the public understand what can and can't be

THERE was a moment at the end of England's one-point home victory over France that said everything about the competitive side of Marcus Smith.

They had just taken the lead and needed to negotiate a final restart to end a run of seven straight defeats to tier-one sides.

"I see all those moments as a competition, and it's part of my job."

Northampton fly-half, to make his first Test start, earning man-of-the-match honours for his performance, while he also took over goal-kicking duties from Marcus Smith.

The emergence of two young fly-halves has created an interesting selection conundrum for coach Steve Borthwick, with Marcus admitting his preferred


position remains flv-half. But while the idea of becoming a full-back was not something he had ever considered as a youngster, there is precedent for a diminutive hot stepper in the England backfield.

This adaptation varies because the top grating has a lower spatial frequency than the bottom one, which has a higher spatial frequency. 
