**B**engaluru Traffic Police have installed metal railings on the median of Old Airport Road to prevent pedestrians from jaywalking and putting themselves at the

risk of road accidents. But civic activists and experts have called out the lack of planning as these railings are proving to be of no use at all.

Due to the gaps in between the frames of the railing, pedestrians continue to cross the road easily from these spaces.

Activists and pedestrians said though the traffic police deserve appreciation for installing the railings in the first place, the purpose is not served due to the negligence of the contractor and the authorities. They said the purpose of installing metal railings is not served due to the gaps between the frames of metal railings.

A few civic activists also questioned the aesthetics of the design.

The old barrier was designed well and beautiful, but the new metal railings look like jail blocks, Vinod Jacob of Namma Bengaluru Foundation said. He wondered why the traffic police couldn't have used the same design instead of changing even basic aesthetics. "This new one is an eyesore with no simple aesthetics in design either. Skywalks should be planned and executed at junctions or bus stops for pedestrians to use it and lifts

## UNEASY MIND



**Recent suicide attempt at IISc campus puts focus once again on need to build stronger wellness initiatives on campuses**

**T**he recent suicide attempt by a student at the Indian Institute of Science (IISc) has sparked widespread concern over the effectiveness of the institution's student wellness initiatives. Despite having a wellness centre, counselling services, and an emergency response team, students claim these facilities are largely ineffective. It is also alleged that in the recent case IISc's emergency team took hours to arrive at the spot. This has intensified students' frustration.

According to students who spoke to BM anonymously, the pressure of academics, lack of mental health support, and an indifferent administration have contributed to a stressful environment. "Every year, at least one student dies by suicide, and many more attempt it. Yet, the administration treats it as just another incident," a student alleged.

While IISc has a designated

# Just 29% have got on the HSRP bandwagon

## Bengaluru Urban leads with highest number of vehicles in state, with nearly 43% motorists getting new plates fixed

**D**espite multiple deadlines, only 29% of vehicles in the state have been affixed with High-Security Registration Plates (HSRPs). While recently sharing the data pertaining to HSRPs, Transport Minister N Ramalinga Reddy in the Legislative Council said that as of February 28, 2025, approximately 2.45 crore vehicles were registered in Karnataka before April 2019, with nearly 2 crore vehicles currently in operation. "Out of the 58,12,207 applications received for HSRP installation, 57,20,550 vehicles have successfully fitted the high-security plates. This means that about 29% of the vehicles in the state have complied with the mandate so far," he said.

He noted that the Karnataka government has extended the deadline for HSRP installation on vehicles across the state, to March 31, 2025. This decision comes as the Karnataka High Court is hearing multiple petitions regarding the implementation of HSRPs, with the next hearing scheduled for March 2025.

### District-wise HSRP installation figures

Bengaluru Urban leads with the highest number of vehicles fitted with HSRP at 24,77,653, followed by Mysuru (4,07,830), Dakshina Kannada (2,76,014), Be-

lagavi (2,61,807), and Shivamoga (2,06,812). Other notable districts include Dharwad (1,49,084), Tumakuru (1,84,318), and Udupi (1,31,713). Some of the districts lower compliance include Yadgir (19,896), Hosapete (27,499), and Bidar (36,545).

### Extension of HSRP installation deadline

Reddy pointed out that the initial deadline for HSRP installation was set for January 31, 2025, but considering the pending court cases, the government has now extended it to March 31, 2025. "The official notification includes multiple deadline extensions issued over time, with the latest update allowing vehicle owners additional time to comply," the minister said.

### Penalties for non-compliance

As per government notification no. 3 250 3 2019, dated September 21, 2019, failure to install HSRP will attract fines under Section 177 of the Motor Vehicles Act. The penalty for the first offense is ₹500, while repeat offenses will result in a fine of ₹1,000 each time. Reddy said that the High Court is currently reviewing petitions challenging the HSRP mandate. Due to ongoing legal proceedings, a status quo has been maintained, preventing further enforcement until the next hearing in March 2025. "Vehicle owners across Karnataka are advised to install HSRP plates before the new deadline to avoid penalties, and comply with government regulations," Reddy added.

## Educationist and ex-MLC Doreswamy passes away

**E**minent educationist and founder of PES Educational Institutions, Prof MR Doreswamy Naidu (89), passed away at his residence in Banashankari on Thursday afternoon due to age-related ailments. He is survived by his wife Radha Manohari, son Jawahar, CEO of PES University, and daughter Dr Roopam, Director of PES Medical College.

His mortal remains will be kept for public viewing at his residence from 7.30 am on Friday, and the last rites will be performed with state honours at the Rudrabhoomi in Banashankari in the afternoon, family sources said.

Prof Doreswamy, who also served as a member of the Legislative Council, was a key advisor to the Karnataka government on education reforms. He spearheaded initiatives to improve government schools, including a school adoption scheme and modernisation efforts in North Karnataka through PES University. The state government had honoured him with the Rajyotsava Award.

Deputy Chief Minister DK Shivakumar, BJP state president BY Vijayendra, and former Chief Minister BS Yediyurappa expressed condolences. Shivakumar visited the Banashankari residence, offering floral tributes and paying respects to the bereaved family. Several dignitaries, including MLA Krishnapa, also paid homage.

# Cost of living to go up, up & away

Close on the heels of hike in BMTc bus and Metro fares, auto drivers too demand correction of their prices; decision on whether milk will cost more also looms

**B**engaluru residents, already struggling with rising inflation, may soon face an additional financial burden as the cost of essential services like auto travel and milk is likely to increase. Following recent hikes in Bangalore Metropolitan Transport Corporation (BMTc) and Metro fares, auto drivers have demanded a fare revision, citing rising fuel prices. Simultaneously, the state government is considering a price hike for Nandini milk, further adding to household expenses.

## Auto fares likely to increase

After the recent fare hikes for BMTc buses and Namma Metro, auto drivers have now urged the district administration to revise auto fares, citing rising fuel costs and living expenses. This demand may soon lead to an increase in auto fares across Bengaluru. A government-appointed committee has scheduled a meeting on March 12 at 11 am at the Traffic East Division DCP's office. Representatives from all auto-rickshaw unions in Bengaluru have been asked to attend the meeting, where the final decision on fare revision will be discussed. Currently, the minimum

auto fare is ₹30, and the rate per kilometre is ₹15.

Auto drivers have proposed to increase the base fare to ₹36 and the per-kilometre fare to ₹18. The final decision on the extent of the fare hike will be taken during the upcoming meeting. With bus and metro fares already increased, the cost of essential goods has also gone up. Additionally, the prices of petrol, diesel, and LPG have surged, making it difficult for auto drivers to sustain operations at the existing fare structure. Many drivers argue that a fare

revision is now unavoidable.

Speaking on the issue, Manjunath, President of the Bengaluru Auto Drivers' Association, stated, "The prices of petrol, diesel, and gas

have gone up significantly, along with the cost of daily essentials. Auto fares have remained unchanged for the last three years, leading to heavy losses for drivers. Hence, we have no choice but to demand a fare hike."

## Nandini milk price hike likely

The price of Nandini milk is set to increase, with a final decision expected soon. Animal Husbandry Minister Venkatesh, addressing the Legislative Council, confirmed that one round of discussions on the price revision has already been conducted. A second round of talks with the Chief Minister is scheduled, after which a decision will be made. In response to a question by MLCs Umashree, DR MG Mule, and Hemalatha Nayak, the minister stated that a pending incentive payment of ₹656 crore to dairy farmers will be disbursed at the earliest.

## Farmers demand ₹10 per litre hike

Dairy farmers have been demanding a price hike of ₹10 per litre, citing increased production costs. However, the government has not yet approved the hike. The minister assured that any price revision would take into account both the farmers' demands and consumer interests before making a final decision.

## Bird flu precautionary measures enforced

BBMP instructs officials to intensify surveillance and preventive action across all zones

**W**ith bird flu cases being reported in various districts, Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) Special Commissioner for Health, Suralkar Vikas Kishore, has directed officials to implement necessary measures to prevent its spread within the city.

Chairing a meeting on bird flu preparedness, he instructed officials to intensify surveillance and preventive actions across all BBMP zones. Given the highly contagious nature of avian influenza (H5N1), which primarily affects birds like turkeys, ducks, guinea fowls, and baya weavers, he stressed the importance of raising public awareness and enforcing precautionary measures.

## Preventive measures and public advisory

To curb the spread of bird flu, citizens were urged to exercise caution, particularly in affected areas. Avoiding contact with suspected infected birds and refraining from visiting poultry farms were among the key advisories issued. Those who come in contact with potentially infected areas must wash their



hands, feet, and face thoroughly with soap, change clothes, and monitor their health for four days. In case of fever, immediate medical consultation is advised.

Additionally, he emphasized safe food consumption practices, advising that chicken and eggs should only be consumed after being cooked at temperatures above 70°C. Officials were directed to create awareness about avoiding the consumption of raw or undercooked eggs from affected areas.

## Survey and surveillance intensified

To detect and control bird flu cases, the BBMP's animal husbandry officers, primary health protection teams, ASHA workers, doctors from Namma Clinics, and staff from city primary health centres have been tasked with conducting a city-wide survey to monitor cases and identify potential outbreaks.

working during peak hours and the whole day. Steps should be simple and easy to climb for all people young and old to use them. I think the new metal railings will be used for advertising purposes rather than public utility to serve the purpose it is erected for," he said. He said pedestrians are forced to walk on the road in traffic due to the misplaced skywalks. Emphasising on the need to have skywalks at right locations for the right purpose, he said that existing skywalks are wrongly designed and placed in the wrong places. "Pedestrians are walking on the road when vehicles are plying thus risking their lives," he said.

Expressing concern over pedestrians crossing the road despite installation of the metal railing on the median, Poornima Shetty, Founder of Safety for Women, said the newly installed barricades are a disappointing example of infrastructure development. "These railings are not only an eyesore but also fail to serve the purpose of ensuring pedestrian safety due to gaping holes that allow pedestrians to cross the road. Furthermore, the skywalks are poorly planned, often located at points that are inconvenient or inaccessible to pedestrians. It is clear that the end-user was not considered in the design process, highlighting the need for a more people-centric approach to urban planning," she said. Jeevan Bhima Nagar Traffic Police Inspector told BM that measures would be taken to fill up the gaps between the metal railings to prevent pedestrians from walking on to the road.

# Taste to dye for? Fried green peas fail the colour test

Food safety crackdown reveals 64 out of 114 tested samples contained unauthorised dye; officials plan further action as testing continues

In a significant crackdown on food adulteration, the Karnataka Food Safety and Drug Administration Department (FDA) has discovered that 64 out of 114 samples of fried green peas tested across the state contained the unauthorised artificial dye, Tartrazine, rendering them unsafe for consumption.

## Investigation initiated following social media reports

The investigation commenced after videos circulated on social media platforms alleging the use of artificial colours in fried green peas. Responding to these concerns, the FDA, under directives from the Chief Minister's Office, instructed food safety officers on February 14 to collect samples from various locations statewide. Initially, 70 samples were gathered and sent to government food laboratories for testing. Subsequently, an additional 114 samples were collected, totalling 184 samples.

Out of the 95 samples analysed thus far, 32 were deemed safe, while 64 tested positive for Tartrazine. The remaining samples are still undergoing testing.

## What is Tartrazine

Also known as FD&C Yellow No 5, Tartrazine is a synthetic lemon yellow azo dye commonly used to colour food, beverages, cosmetics, and medications. While it is approved for use in certain food items, its application is subject to strict regulations due to potential health concerns. Some studies have linked



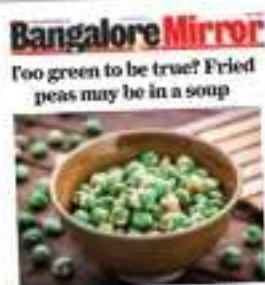

Tartrazine to allergic reactions, such as asthma and hives, and behavioural effects in children, including hyperactivity. Consequently, many countries mandate explicit labelling of this dye in food products, allowing consumers to make informed choices.

## Consumer awareness

The detection of Tartrazine in fried green peas is particularly concerning because its use in such products is not approved. This unauthorised application not only violates food safety regulations but also poses health risks to consumers. The FDA's findings highlight the necessity for vigilant enforcement of food safety standards and increased awareness among consumers regarding food additives. Officials have stated that further legal action will be taken based on the final laboratory reports.

Consumers are advised to exercise caution when purchasing fried green peas and other food items that appear unnaturally vibrant, as this may indicate the presence of unauthorised artificial colours. It is recommended to buy products from reputable vendors.

## Police accused in suicide case

## Start-up founder dies by suicide

A 31-year-old start-up founder ended life after jumping from his apartment on Tuesday under the Parappana Agrahara police station limits.

The deceased have been identified as Mayank Rajani, hailing from Uttar Pradesh. The police stated that he faced loss in his start-up and also was suffering from health issues.

On Tuesday he jumped from the 12 floor which a delivery boy noticed and alerted the security guard who promptly alerted the police.

## Hotel manager attacks employee

A hotel manager allegedly attacked his employee in RT Nagar, with a mutton-cutting machete over a dispute about a bottle of soft drink.

The incident took place when an argument broke out between the accused, Shahzad Ali, and the victim, Gurumurthy. According to police officials, tensions had

been brewing between the two due to prior conflicts. During the heated exchange on Monday, Shahzad, in a fit of rage, grabbed a machete used for cutting meat and attacked Gurumurthy, leaving him bleeding. Gurumurthy managed to reach the local police station and file a complaint before being admitted to a private hospital.

## Thieves steal 830kg hair

A gang of six miscreants targeted a godown in Lakshmipura Cross and made away with an unusual loot—830 kg of human hair, valued at nearly 1 crore.

The brazen heist took place past midnight on February 28, when the gang arrived in a Mahindra Bolero. Using iron rods, they broke open the shutter of the basement godown and methodically hauled out 27 large bags filled with hair. The godown belonged to 73-year-old Venkataswamy K, a seasoned hair trader who had recently relocated his storage facility from Hebbal to Lakshmipura Cross on February 12.

The police have launched a manhunt for the thieves, investigating potential buyers and tracking the gang's movements.

# Metro revises orange line expansion plan

**BMRCCL weighs shifting Orange Line interchange to Goraguntepalya, citing smoother operations & cost efficiency, but land acquisition from Defence Department remains hurdle**

**E**ven as soil testing work progresses for the Orange Line, a key question remains: where will the interchange station be located? Initially, Peenya Metro station was announced as the interchange point. However, the Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCCL) is currently reviewing modifications to the Detailed Project Report (DPR) for the Orange Line expansion from Kempapura to JP Nagar 4th Phase.

According to sources, the proposed interchange station at Peenya may be shifted to Goraguntepalya Signal on Outer Ring Road. This relocation would reduce the corridor's length by approximately 300 metres. Additionally, the proposed double-decker flyover at Goraguntepalya Junction is expected to ease traffic congestion. BMRCCL estimates that shifting the station would minimise curves along the route, allowing for smoother and faster metro movement while also reducing project costs.

## New pedestrian connectivity

A BMRCCL official stated that the original plan included interchange stations at JP Nagar, Mysore Road, Sumanahalli, and Peenya. However, due to the need for an elevated station at Peenya, relocating it to Goraguntepalya is under considera-

tion to streamline the route and cut costs. To improve commuter convenience, pedestrian skywalks will be constructed to link the newly proposed station at Goraguntepalya with the existing Peenya and Goraguntepalya metro stations. As these stations are around 500 metres apart, additional measures are being explored to facilitate pedestrian movement.

## Land acquisition challenges

One major challenge in implementing this new plan is acquiring land from the Defence Department. Approvals from the Defence Ministry have historically been time-consuming, with similar delays encountered during the construction of the Blue Line.

The state government has approved the Phase 3 expansion plan, which includes two corridors: Kempapura to JP Nagar 4th Phase and Hosahalli to Kadabagere, spanning 12.52 km. To facilitate construction, BMRCCL has already begun acquiring land. For Corridor 1, 26,811 square metres have been acquired, while an additional 1,29,743 square metres, including 777 private properties, have been identified. The project is estimated to cost Rs 15,611 crore, with Rs 7,577 crore funded through loans and Rs 450 crore sourced from various revenue streams.

# Panel lists 8 reasons to split BBMP

**I**n a significant move to improve civic administration, urban infrastructure, and governance in the state capital, a joint legislative committee has recommended splitting the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) into a maximum of seven independent municipal corporations. To ensure better coordination between various civic agencies like BWSSB and BESCOM, the committee has also proposed creating a "Greater Bengaluru Administrative Authority" under the chairmanship of the Chief Minister.

The committee's report, submitted in the Assembly on Wednesday by Chairman and MLA Rizwan Arshad, aligns with the government's long-term vision of decentralising BBMP's administration for greater efficiency and transparency. The report, which was handed over to Speaker UT Khader last week, recommends introducing the "Greater Bengaluru Administration Bill - 2024" in the ongoing legislative session.

Key recommendations in the report:

## Population growth

Since BBMP's formation in 2008, Bengaluru's population has surged from 70 lakh to 1.5 crore, and the number of vehicles has crossed 1 crore. Managing a city spread over 786 sq km under a

single Mayor and Commissioner has become increasingly challenging.

## Corruption and Governance issues

The BBMP has been plagued by allegations of large-scale corruption and lack of transparency, prompting the need for decentralisation.

## Proposed municipal corporations

While the final decision rests with the government, the committee has suggested creating up to seven municipal corporations to manage different parts of the city.

## Implementation plan

Each Assembly constituency should have a local planning and coordination committee led by the respective MLA, comprising MLAs and BBMP corporators, with a dedicated development fund

allocated based on population.

## Eligibility for civic elections

Candidates contesting municipal elections must be residents of the ward they represent, and those who relocate after winning could lose their membership.

## Formation of GBAA

The proposed Greater Bengaluru Administrative Authority (GBAA) would encompass agencies like BDA, BMRD, BWSSB, and BESCOM. The Chief Minister would serve as Chairman, with the Bengaluru Development Minister as Vice-Chairman, functioning as an advisory and policy-implementing body without taxation powers.

## Structural reforms in municipal governance

Each municipal corporation should have 100 to 200 wards to ensure efficient governance while maintaining Bengaluru's brand identity. To enhance administrative stability, the Mayor's term should be extended to 30 months.

## Financial autonomy for municipalities

Local bodies should be empowered to levy waste management charges and impose taxes on new construction projects and entertainment activities. Property tax dues must be cleared within two years.

## State funds 75% Ayushman costs

**H**ealth Minister Dinesh Gundu Rao said the Karnataka government is funding 75% of the expenses under the Ayushman Bharat scheme, and if treatment costs are revised, this share could rise to 90%.

Responding to a question by MLA Vedavyas Kamath, he explained that, as per central policies, the Centre should contribute 60% while the state covers 40%. However, in Karnataka, the state already bears 75% of the burden, with the Centre contributing only 25%. Since treatment costs under the scheme have not been revised since 2018, an increase would push the state's share to 90%, leaving just 10% for the Centre. Gundu Rao urged BJP leaders to exert pressure on the Central BJP government to revise treatment costs, stressing that Karnataka is already making efforts in this regard.

## Multiplex ticket pricing plan

**T**he Karnataka government will soon implement uniform ticket pricing across all multiplex cinemas in the state, Home Minister Dr G Parameshwara assured during the Legislative Council session.

Responding to a question by MLC Govindaraj, he recalled that the 2017-18 state budget had proposed uniform pricing, leading to a government order on May 11, 2018. However, the order was later withdrawn due to a court injunction. At present, multiplex owners set their own ticket prices, treating cinemas as commercial enterprises.

Parameshwara emphasised that the government has the authority to regulate pricing and assured that necessary rules will be framed to enforce uniform rates soon.

## Govt boosts cyber crime vigilance

**T**he Karnataka government is taking proactive measures to prevent incidents that could disrupt law and order by gathering intelligence and maintaining strict vigilance, Home Minister Dr G Parameshwara stated.

During the Legislative Council session, he responded to a query from MLC SL Bhojgowda emphasising that any individual found engaging in such activities as wielding knives, swords, or other weapons in public and disturbing social harmony would be arrested immediately and face strict legal action. Those spreading fake news on social media to incite riots will also face legal consequences, with cases registered suo motu.

To strengthen policing, the beat system has been introduced in police stations, and officers are monitoring criminal activities. Additionally, Hoysala and Cheetah vehicles have been deployed in urban areas for quick emergency responses.

## Lokayukta raids on govt officials

The Karnataka Lokayukta Police conducted search operations across multiple districts on Thursday, in connection with disproportionate assets (DA) cases against eight government officers. The searches spanned more than 40 locations, including residences, offices, and relatives' homes of the accused officials in Bengaluru, Kolar, Kalaburagi, Davanagere, Tumakuru, Bagalkot, and Vijayapura. Investigators uncovered assets worth Rs 365.3 crore, including cash, jewelry, vehicles, and property. Among the accused, TD Nanjundappa, Chief Engineer at the Panchayath Raj Engineering Department, was found in possession of assets worth Rs 84.62 crore, the highest among the eight officials. Following him was HB Kalleshappa, Executive Engineer at BBMP, with assets worth Rs 65.05 crore and G Nagaraj, an Assistant Executive Engineer at BESCO, with Rs 21.88 crore in assets.

## Cash in the bin, murky deals & more

A surprise inspection was conducted on Thursday at 25 sub-registrar offices across Bengaluru Urban, Bengaluru Rural, and Ramanagara districts, revealing several irregularities and repeated lapses. A team comprising police and judicial officials conducted the inspection, citing violations such as improper maintenance of attendance records, movement logs, inspection reports, and cash declaration registers. In Dasanpur Sub-Registrar Office, Rs. 20,000 was found wrapped in a kerchief inside a cardboard dustbin. A clerk's UPI account showed daily monetary transactions, allegedly for Encumbrance Certificate payments. In Devanahalli, Rs. 20,000 with a second-grade assistant was unaccounted for. A person also fled the premises, abandoning a bag containing a diary listing village names and payment details.

# Blackmailed into smuggling?

## Ranya case gets murkier: DRI links her to organised network; trying to figure out who coerced her

**S**andalwood actress Ranya Rao has been arrested in connection with a gold smuggling case, with investigations by the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) linking her to an organised smuggling network.

DRI officials from Delhi, currently stationed in Bengaluru, have intensified their probe after detaining Ranya at Kempegowda International Airport on Monday night. Sources revealed that the actress claimed she was blackmailed into transporting gold and did so out of necessity. Authorities are now investigating who coerced her and the individuals involved in the smuggling operation. A police constable who allegedly assisted her in evading security checks has also been detained.

According to officials, Ranya is the stepdaughter of Karnataka State Police Housing Corporation DGP K Ramachandra Rao. Smuggling kingpins had allegedly planned to use her for gold transport a year ago, luring her with commissions. The network reportedly used Dubai-based middlemen to smuggle gold biscuits, which were later melted into jewelry and sold.

Sources stated that smugglers offered Rs 5-6 lakh per kg of gold transported. The smuggled gold was stored in a flat in Nandavani Mansion on Lavelle Road before being distributed. Authorities



have seized Ranya's mobile phone and laptop to track those behind the operation. The DRI is expected to issue notices to Ranya's family, including her husband.

## FIR against actress for alleged Rs 6.50 lakh fraud

TV actress Vismaya Gowda has been booked for alleged fraud after taking a loan of Rs 6.50 lakh from a resident of Shakti Ganapati Nagar. The complainant, Himanvi, stating that she met Vismaya on Instagram in 2019, where the actress also claimed to be a life coach. They became acquainted. In February 2024, citing financial difficulties, Vismaya requested financial help. According to the FIR, Himanvi lent her Rs 6.50 lakh and Vismaya issued her a post-dated cheque. But when Himanvi tried to encash it, bank officials informed her the cheque's signature did not match, suggesting intentional fraud. When confronted, Vismaya allegedly refused to return the money, and even issued threats.

## IN HIGH COURT

## Wrong or right? RTCs must make up their mind

The High Court has ruled that a Road Transport Corporation must maintain consistency in its stance regarding road accidents involving its drivers, whether before the Motor Accidents Claim Tribunal or during disciplinary proceedings. Justice Suraj Govindaraj stated, "If any accident occurs, in pursuance of which the Corporation were to initiate disciplinary proceedings against a driver, the Corporation cannot take



a different stand in a claim proceeding filed in MVC matters." The court said as a government entity, the Corporation must act as a model litigant. It cannot simultaneously assert proper driving conduct whilst initiating proceedings for rash and negligent driving against the same driver. The case involved the Divisional Controller, NWKRTC, contesting a labour court order that had favoured driver Hussainsab by overturning his dismissal order.

## Negotiable Instruments case acquittal appeal

The High Court has determined that complainants in Negotiable Instruments Act cases can appeal acquittal orders through Sessions Court, eliminating the necessity to directly petition the high court. The court overturned a sessions court ruling that had deemed the complainant's appeal against an acquittal order inadmissible and had directed the complainant to approach the high court instead. Subsequently, the complainant challenged this dismissal in the high court. The Sessions Court's dismissal of complainant Thoman Mani's appeal was

based on a previous high court single judge ruling, which distinguished between complainants under Section 142 of NI Act and victims under Section 2(wa) of CrPC. Justice S Rachiah cited Section 378(4) of CrPC, which specifies that complainants may appeal to the High Court against acquittal orders in complaint-initiated cases, provided special leave is granted. "The word, the complainant may present such appeal to the High Court would indicate that the complainant need not file an appeal against acquittal to the High Court directly..." the court ruled.

- Through digital advertisements, social media, messaging platforms,

and even cryptocurrency-based payment systems

- Referral traffic from adult sites, sports-related websites, and streaming services generated 247.5 million visits to illegal gambling sites
- Messaging platforms like WhatsApp and Telegram play a major role in promoting these sites
- Influencers with millions of followers use "Channels" to broadcast gambling ads, reaching a massive audience instantly

### IT FIGURES

- 1.6 billion visits recorded in three months (October to December 2024)
- 4 major platforms: Parimatch, Stake, 1xBet, and Battery Bet.
- Google search trends from 2021 to 2024 show a sharp rise in searches for betting sites like Dafabet, 1xBet, and Parimatch, especially during Indian Premier League (IPL) seasons.
- 42.8 million visits on social media through direct paid ads, influencer

promotions, and engagement campaigns.

### SUGGESTIONS

- Government's action of blocking websites and issuing advisories, has not worked as illegal operators constantly adapt their strategies to evade restrictions. The report suggested a more comprehensive approach, holding all key enablers, including tech platforms accountable while enforcing strict compliance measures.

### GLOBAL APPROACH

- A European Union study in 2018 found that 19 out of 24 national regulators had established partnerships with Meta, X, and Google to take down such ads and lower the search rankings of gambling sites.
- In the US, the Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act (UIGEA) blocks financial transactions related to illegal online betting, focusing on payment processors rather than individual users. - IANS

# Students express frustration at lack of mental health help

wellness centre, students claim it is poorly staffed, lacks proactive outreach, and fails to provide the support needed. "If you need help, you're expected to find it yourself. There's no system in place to check on struggling students," another student said.

## Delayed response

In the latest case, the student reportedly attempted suicide due to academic stress. Eyewitnesses allege that despite the severity of the situation, staff members failed to

take immediate action. The incident, which occurred at 12:40 pm, and it was only after hostel residents intervened, calmed him down, and forcibly placed him in an ambulance that he was taken to Ramaiah Hospital. However, upon reaching the hospital, he was allegedly left unattended to, without even being admitted, until his friends arrived later to check on him.

According to hostel residents, the student had isolated himself in his room for three days before the incident, during which they heard him shouting, crying, and laughing uncontrollably. Concerned students

claim they informed the hostel office about his unusual behaviour, but no action was taken, nor was the wellness centre alerted.

The wellness centre eventually stepped in more than three hours after the incident, but instead of offering support, they allegedly attempted to attribute the student's condition to pre-existing mental health issues. His sister, however, refuted this claim, stating that his distress developed after joining IISc. Sources indicate that while he is now stable, he requires continued psychological, psychiatric support.

## Students demand accountability

Students allege that the administration has focused more on implementing restrictive measures, rather than addressing the root causes of student distress.

"The institute has taken measures like removing ceiling fans and installing high grills to prevent suicides, making the campus feel more like a prison. Yet, they refuse to tackle the root cause of the problem," a student stated.

Protesters are demanding that the administration take concrete steps to improve mental health support

services, ensure that the student who attempted suicide faces no further difficulties, and reform the wellness centre to function as an actual support system.

Over the past five years, IISc has witnessed at least six such cases, raising concerns about whether prestigious institutions are failing to provide adequate support to their students. Despite mounting allegations and student protests, IISc has yet to release an official statement on the incident. Bangalore Mirror has reached out to IISc for their response and we shall be updating the story online on receipt of a response.

The typical adult in the UK spends nearly two hours on social media per day. And for younger users, this can easily be up to five hours. The likes of Instagram or TikTok seem to draw us into their ever-changing feeds and it's difficult to tear ourselves away from these platforms.

Now our latest study shows that even our body reflects a state of being glued to the screen when we are on social media. We asked 54 young adults to browse their Instagram on their phone for 15 minutes as they would normally do in their daily life.

However, in our study we had attached electrodes to their chest and fingers that allowed us to record their heart rate and "skin conductance", which is an indicator of sweating.

Psychologists can use these physiological markers to infer subtle mental states and emotions. We also added a control condition where our participants read a news article on their phone, just before they logged onto Instagram.

What we found was that, relative to the news reading condition, scrolling away on Instagram led to a marked slowing of participants' heart rate while, at the same time, increasing their sweating response.

From other research we know that such a pattern of bodily responses shows that someone's attention is fully absorbed by a highly significant or emotional stimulus in their environment – it's a state of simultaneous excitement and deep immersion into something very meaningful to us.

Importantly, from the control condition we knew

that it was not just being on the phone or reading that caused this bodily response. So there seems to be something special about social media that can easily engross us.

The most intriguing effect in our study happened when we interrupted participants at the end of their Instagram stint and asked them to go back to reading another news article. Rather than snapping out of the excitement and returning to a calmer state, participants' sweating response increased further, while heart rate also increased rather than slowed down further.

#### Is it addiction?

What was going on? What helped us interpret these effects were participants' ratings of their emotions. We collected these before their social media bout and at the time we asked them to log off.

Participants reported being stressed and anxious when they had to disconnect from their feed. They even reported having social media cravings at that moment.

So it looked like the physiological response that we observed when participants had to log off reflected another form of arousal – but this time it was more negative and stress-related.

Such bodily and psychological stress responses also occur when people with a substance addiction go through withdrawal during abstinence or after quitting "cold turkey". So were these signs that we observed "withdrawal" from Instagram?

The answer to this question is not straightforward. However, our study may give us some clues. After the experiment, we asked all participants to fill in a questionnaire assessing symptoms of "social media addiction".

While this concept is controversial and currently not recognised as a mental health disorder, the questionnaire told us something about how social media use can negatively affect someone's daily life. This can even include their work or school results, or lead to conflict with their partners.

Notably, we did not see any heart rate and sweating differences between participants who scored high or low on these addiction measures. That means, that all our

participants showed a pattern of excited immersion during use and stress-related arousal when use was interrupted.

We don't think that this finding means that we are all addicted to social media though. Instead, we believe that social media offers very powerful rewards. And some of its features may indeed have an addictive dimension, such as the personalised short-video streams that trap us in an endless loop of entertaining content.

Critically however, our previous study shows that it is primarily the social aspect of social media that drives most people to use it so intensively. This also means that – in contrast to drugs – social media taps into basic human needs: we all want to belong and to be liked.

So if we recognise the existence of "social media addiction", we might also need to recognise a "friendship addiction". We should therefore exert caution with the term addiction in the context of social media – the risk is that normal behaviour could become "pathologised" and lead to stigma.

And, as our previous research indicates, we may be just fine abstaining or cutting down from social media for a while without experiencing dramatic changes to our wellbeing (either positive or negative). The reason for this is that in contrast to drugs, we can satisfy our needs through other means – for instance, by talking to people.

#### Parkinson's disease

#### Disease burden

More than 2.5 crore people in the world could be living with Parkinson's disease by 2050, largely driven by an ageing population, according to a study.

#### 112% rise from 2021

Researchers, including those from the Capital Medical University, China, said the projected numbers are a 112 per cent increase from cases in 2021.

Further, cases of the neurological disorder from South Asia are predicted to be the second highest at 68 lakh, following East Asia (over 1 crore), the findings, published in The British Medical Journal, suggested.

The researchers said the estimates could "serve as an aid in promoting health research, informing policy decisions and allocating resources".

#### What is Parkinson's

Parkinson's disease is a neurodegenerative disorder in which one's movements and balance are steadily affected. The condition can also cause problems with speech, memory and behaviour. Symptoms include tremors in parts of the body and muscle stiffness. The researchers analysed data from the Global Burden of Disease Study 2021 to estimate prevalence of Parkinson's disease during 2022-2050 across 195 countries and territories and factors driving cases of the disease.

#### Main factory driving rise

Population ageing is predicted to be the main factor driving nearly 90 per cent of the projected cases, they said.

#### Road ahead

They also projected that increasing physical activity could reduce the future number of Parkinson's disease cases. The results point to an urgent need for "future research to focus on the development of novel drugs, gene engineering techniques, and cell replacement therapies that are aimed at modifying the course of the disease and improving patients' quality of life," the authors said.

### Human body's protein recycling system fights bacteria like antibiotics: Study

Israeli researchers have discovered a surprising immune defense role of the proteasome, a cellular structure known for degrading and recycling proteins.

The study, published in Nature, could inspire new strategies against antibiotic-resistant infections, Xinhua news agency reported. The study, led by the team

from Weizmann Institute of Science (WIS), found that when breaking down old proteins, the proteasome constantly and regularly releases antimicrobial peptides, Xinhua news agency reported.

These antimicrobial peptides are considered vital components of the body's first line of defense as they attack and kill bacteria.

Experiments showed that human cells with active proteasomes effectively controlled bacterial growth, while blocking proteasome activity allowed infections to spread, WIS said.

In infected mice, proteasome-produced peptides reduced bacteria numbers, decreased tissue damage, and even improved

survival rates, performing as effectively as strong antibiotics in clinical use. The team identified over 270,000 potential antibacterial peptides hidden within 92 per cent of human proteins.

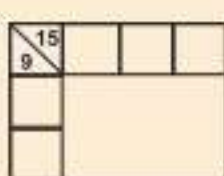
"This peptide database opens a new frontier for developing personalized treatments against infections and other medical conditions," said Prof. Yifat Merbl's lab at WIS.
