



Pakistan mulls response after India points the finger without proof

- National Security Committee to meet today after New Delhi announces suspension of Indus treaty, shuts border, halts visas, expels defence attaches
- Foreign Office condoles loss of life; Dar slams India's 'non-serious approach', terms punitive measures 'immature'
- Death toll in Pahalgam attack rises to 26; multiple engagements reported as Indian forces hunt assailants

ISLAMABAD / NEW DELHI: The country's top security body will meet today (Thursday) to assess India's sharp response — in the wake of a deadly attack in Indian-held Kashmir that claimed over two dozen lives — and formulate a comprehensive policy reaction to the slew of aggressive measures announced by New Delhi, which have ramped up tensions on the Subcontinent.

Among the Indian measures, the suspension of the Indus Waters Treaty stood out as the most severe. The 1960 pact, brokered by the World Bank, has endured through wars and decades of hostility. Its suspension, therefore, marked a watershed moment in the already fraught relationship between the nuclear-armed neighbours.

India further lowered diplomatic ties by closing down the main border transit point, branding the attack as a grave provocation that warranted significant diplomatic, economic, and logistical pressure on Pakistan. Indian officials directly tied these measures to Islamabad's alleged support for "cross-border terrorism".

But Islamabad has denied any role and said it had nothing to do with the attack.

Prime Minister Muhammad

Shehbaz Sharif has convened the meeting of the National Security Committee on Thursday morning, 26th April 2025, to respond to the Indian Government's statement of this evening.

Diplomatic sources warn that the Indian response and Pakistan's counter-messaging could push bilateral relations to new lows, further widening a rift that has persisted since the 2019 Pulwama Balakot crisis. The treaty suspension, in particular, risks sparking long-term water disputes, while the downgrading of diplomatic ties could hamper any future de-escalation efforts.

Aggressive measures

The announcement of punitive measures came after Tuesday's meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS), chaired by Indian PM Narendra Modi.

"The CCS was briefed in detail on the terrorist attack on 22 April 2025 in Pahalgam, in which 23 Indians and one Nepali citizen were killed. A number of others sustained injuries. The CCS condemned the attack in the strongest terms and expressed its deepest condolences to the families of the victims and hoped for the early recovery of the injured," Foreign Secretary V.K. Singh told a press conference after the CCS meeting.

The statement said: "Recognising the seriousness of this terrorist attack, the CCS decided upon the following:

The World Bank had earlier predicted Pakistan's economy to grow by 2.8pc during the current fiscal year in its Pakistan

said that growth would remain subject to many downside risks but forecast that the economic growth rate would improve to 3.1pc in the next fiscal year.

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SC rejects Punjab govt's plea seeking Imran's remand

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court on Wednesday disposed of Punjab Prosecution Department's appeal seeking physical remand of PTI founder Imran Khan.

Headed by Justice Muhammad Hashim Khan Kakai, a three-judge bench also asked Punjab's prosecution department to approach the trial court concerned, if it wants, though the PTI founder will have the right to oppose any such move.

During the hearing, Punjab's Special Prosecutor Zulfiqar Naqvi pleaded that polygraph and voice matching tests of PTI's founder was needed, but Justice Kakai reminded him that no such request has been made in the petition seeking physical remand of Mr Khan.

Sindh protests take a toll on national supply chain

- Fertiliser makers sound alarm; ministry warns against possible fallout if urea doesn't reach farmers during peak Kharif season
- Industry stakeholders urge govt to resolve issue as soon as possible

LAHORE / KARACHI: The national fertiliser supply chain is facing severe disruptions as ongoing sit-ins and road blockades in Sindh have blocked critical transport routes, stranding thousands of trucks and halting industrial operations.

The blockades have been holding up traffic for a week now, particularly in the Sindh or Larkana division, leading to alarm among government officials and stakeholders in the business community.

The disruption comes at a critical moment in the agricultural calendar. The Kharif season, which includes crops like cotton, sugarcane, and rapeseed, heavily relies on timely access to urea.

Delays in distribution may cause lower yields, higher food prices, and added financial pressure on farmers, whose economies have already deteriorated over the past year.

The Ministry of National Food Security and Research (MNSR)

has also raised the issue with the Sindh government, saying that with Kharif season in full swing across the country, the non-availability of urea and DAP at this juncture may affect production and impact national security.

The MNSR letter to Sindh Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah, seen by Dawn, notes that fertiliser makers

apprehend that the persistence of this situation may lead to forced shutdowns of fertiliser plants, compromising its availability for Kharif crops.

Both inbound and outbound logistics for the fertiliser industry have slowed dramatically.

Among the hardest hit are the country's two major fertiliser producers — Fauji Fertiliser in Mirpur Jatba and Engro Fertiliser in Dabki — whose operations are now

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Punjab says canals project 'still taking shape'

LAHORE: As the canals controversy continued to roil Sindh, the Punjab government on Wednesday said that though not a single canal had been constructed on the Indus River so far, the project was still under consideration.

"Punjab does not need any external dictation regarding the use of river Beas/water. Punjab is fully sovereign in utilising its own resources and that Sindh has no right to object to Punjab's development projects," Punjab Information Minister Armaan Rokhri told a presser here on Wednesday.

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Held Kashmir attack timed to defame Pakistan: leaders

ISLAMABAD / MIZARAFARABAD:

As the Indian government severed diplomatic and other links with Pakistan over the Pathankot attack, Pakistani mainstream political parties on Wednesday branded the attack in Indian-occupied Kashmir a "false flag operation" designed to malign Islamabad internationally.

They also believed that India's aggression and illegal occupation of Kashmir had resulted in the Pathankot attack.

The armed attack on tourists in the Pathankot town left 26 people dead. The incident occurred amid a high-level visit by US Vice-President J.B. Biden to India.

Senator Ishaq Siddiqui, parliamentary leader of the PML-N in the Senate, termed the incident a "well-planned conspiracy" aimed at defaming Pakistan.

Speaking to the media, he said India had a history of staging such incidents whenever a foreign dignitary visits the country. "The Pathankot drama was orchestrated deliberately during the US Vice-President's visit to India to serve their propaganda objectives against Pakistan," he added.

Defence Minister Khawaja Asif said the Indian government should first thoroughly investigate the incident before levelling false allegations against Pakistan.

He noted India's decades-long military presence in held Kashmir and its right violations were well-known. He also alleged Indian involvement in terrorism inside Pakistan, including the recent Jaffar Express attack in Balochistan.

As it is feared that India could attack Pakistan against the backdrop of the Pathankot incident, Mr Asif said, "Pakistan is capable of responding to any Indian aggression in a befitting manner."

Talking to a private TV channel, the minister said that India's suspension of the Indus-Waters Treaty — that allows for sharing the waters of the Indus River system between the two countries — is a violation of international laws. "India cannot take unilateral decisions regarding the Indus-Waters Treaty," he said. "We will give a comprehensive response to India after holding the National Security Committee's meeting, which is being called on Thursday (today)."

Punjab Information Minister Asma Sialkot also wanted in a video statement that any "unilateralities by India under the pretext of a false-flag operation will have dire consequences".

Condemning the "shocking terror attack", PML-N senator Sherry Rehman said, "Unfortunately, the reflexive demonising already at play against Pakistan has become the mother-of-all response for a New Delhi that was unable to contain its own spectacular failures amidst a fundamentalist meltdown."

Regarding India's decision to suspend

the Indus-Waters Treaty, she said India could not suspend the treaty unilaterally.

"Stridency on steroids is not a foreign policy," she said, adding that all indications of the Pathankot attack go towards a "false flag operation" of India.

PTI chief Maulana Fazal Rabbani also strongly criticised attempts to link Pakistan with current Indian-occupied Kashmir, calling such accusations "baseless" and asking India to introspect on its internal failures instead of blaming its neighbour. "It's convenient for India to blame Pakistan, but that doesn't change the ground realities," he said.

PTI also denounced the attack, describing terrorists as a "shared enemy of the civilised world". In its statement, the PTI warned that any adventurism against Pakistan would be met with a united national response, reaffirming support for the armed forces. "Founding Chairman Imran Khan and PTI firmly stand with the armed forces and the people in their inalienable right to blast any such aggression by the Indian government against Pakistan," it added.

Former minister Saeed Radique condemned Indian media's attempt to blame Pakistan for the attack "without any evidence". Major Waliullah-Masood-e-Aziz Allama Raja Nasir expressed condolences, called for dialogue for regional peace and warned that escalating tensions could endanger South Asia's stability.

Sinister ploy?

In Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK), political and resistance leaders unanimously condemned the Pathankot attack, terming it a sinister ploy by Indian agencies to discredit the Kashmir freedom struggle and falsely implicate Pakistan.

Extending condolences and sympathy to the families of the victims, they called for international accountability to bring the real culprits to justice, while making it clear that no amount of violence could shake the Kashmiri people's resolve for their right to self-determination.

In his statement, AJK President Barrister Sultan Muhammad Choudhary called the massacre "undeniable," accusing the Narendra Modi-led regime of staging another false flag operation, especially with the visit of US Vice-President J.B. Biden to India, and blamed it to India's habitual blaming of Pakistan, as seen after the 2019 Pulwama incident.

AJK Information Minister Dr Masood-e-Aziz maintained the "Pathankot false flag operation had stopped even before the strip could unfold."

The AJK chapter of the All Parties Hurriyat Conference (APHC) echoed similar concerns. "We firmly believe Indian agencies are involved in this terrorist act... to destabilise the region and malign the peaceful freedom movement," said APHC chairman Ghulam Muhammad Saifi.

Musadik visits GB to assess GLOF impact

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Climate Change Musadik Malik on Wednesday accompanied a delegation from the United Nations Development Programme to the areas in Gilgit-Baltistan affected by the glacial lake outburst flood (GLOF) this week.

According to a statement released by the ministry of climate change and environmental coordination, the minister reviewed reforms initiated under the GLOF-II Project in Shigar Valley, including

the installation of early warning systems and protective embankments.


Musadik Malik assessed the damage caused to local communities due to glacial melt and glacial lake outburst floods.

NA panel voices alarm over water availability, related risks

• Committee chairman notes agriculture, once contributing 35pc to Pakistan's GDP, now accounts for only 20pc • Directs Ministry of National Food Security to present comprehensive 20-year roadmap

ISLAMABAD: The National Assembly Standing Committee on National Food Security and Research on Wednesday has expressed concern over the declining per capita water availability, rapid population growth, and the impact of climate change factors which are posing significant threats to national food security.

The committee meeting, under the chairmanship of Syed Tariq Hasan, directed the Ministry of National Food Security to present a comprehensive 20-year roadmap at the next meeting together with clear targets, plans, deadlines and implementation strategies.

Despite major investments, the declining yields in major crops like cotton, wheat and rice were labelled as a failure by the ministry and the Pakistan Agricultural Research Council (PARC) with ineffective seed research identified as a core issue.

The ministry was asked to submit a performance report on PARC over the past decade within one month, identifying those responsible for poor outcomes and any disciplinary actions taken.

The ministry was also instructed to ensure the distribution of imported seeds across all provinces, accompanied by proper

awareness campaigns and initiatives in controlled environments to assess yield variations and achieve a competitive advantage.

Rana Mohammad Hayat Khan, convener of the sub-committee, submitted a report regarding the side of constructed sandbank delays in wheat procurement and import. The committee agreed to forward the report's recommendations to the ministry for immediate implementation.

According to the ministry, because of 392 out of 1,200 registered seed companies have been cancelled, a Radio-Frequency Identification (RFID) tracking system has been introduced to enhance transparency in seed sales. The committee demanded that accountability measures be extended not only to fraudulent companies but also to officials responsible for their registration.

The committee resolved to invite officials of the newly formed National Seed Development and Regulatory Authority to its next meeting for a progress update. Legal action, the panel emphasised, must be taken against those selling counterfeit seeds.

"Just issuing challans is not enough," the committee stated.

The committee also recommended the announcement of minimum support price to safeguard farmers from exploitation by mid-

diseases. Additional measures included compensation for farmers, educational campaigns, enforcement of penalties — including up-to 10 years imprisonment — development of bio-resistant seeds, improvement in sowing methods, and enhanced quality testing.

A complete ban on wheat import and export was also proposed.

The ministry briefed the committee on the Punjab government's induction of an Electronic Weighbridge Registers (EWR) system. Under this initiative, farmers can store their crops for up to four months with financial backing from private banks, while the government subsidises 20pc of the loan markup, enabling farmers to wait for favourable rates rather than being forced to sell.

Inter-provincial and inter-district movement of crops has also been permitted to improve market access, officials said. During the briefing, the ministry also presented updates on wheat-related research through its affiliated research institutes. The committee's chairman noted that agriculture — once constituting 35 pc of Pakistan's GDP — now accounts for only 20pc.

A ministry official reported that wheat yield per acre has increased from 27 to 33 sacks over the past decade. However, the committee deemed the progress insufficient.

Moreover, the petition argued that the ECP had misapprehended and misapplied the law in relation to Articles 218 and 239 of the Constitution that the high court should refrain from interfering in the election process or election disputes.

Omar moves SC against ECP jurisdiction in poll dispute

Raises 32 legal questions challenging commission's authority, IHC ruling and rights violations

ISLAMABAD: Leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly Usman Ayub Khan challenged in the Supreme Court on Wednesday the Election Commission of Pakistan's (ECP) jurisdiction to proceed with a representation filed by his rival candidate, Ruler Nawaz Khan, under Sections 8, 9, and 10 of the Elections Act, 2017.

Usman Ayub, a PML-N lawmaker, was elected from NA-18 Haripur in the 2024 general elections.

The petitioner argued that the ECP became inactive after concluding jurisdiction after the statutory 60-day period from the Feb 17, 2024 notification of the returned candidate expired on April 17, 2024. Despite this, the ECP continued proceedings, which the petitioner contended was unlawful.

The petitioner challenged the ECP's devo-

sion to proceed with the matter before the Islamabad High Court, which disposed of the petition on April 9, 2025, directing the commission to provide an opportunity for a detailed hearing and decide the matter in accordance with the law.

In his appeal before the Supreme Court, the petitioner raised 32 questions of law, primarily challenging the ECP's jurisdiction, the IHC's decision and alleged violations of constitutional rights under Articles 2-A, 4, and 10A of the Constitution.

Usman Ayub won the election by a significant margin, securing 103,631 votes against PML-N's Ruler Nawaz Khan, who received 312,784 votes, and was ratified as the returned candidate on Feb 17, 2024.

Ruler Nawaz Khan had filed a representation before the ECP alleging rigging, which the commission conceded to hear beyond the 60-day statutory period.

Usman Ayub contended that after the expiry of this period, the ECP lost jurisdiction, and any election dispute should instead be addressed by an election tribunal under Article 223 of the Constitution.

The petitioner also referred to the IHC's order, which had ruled that the ECP's decision was interlocutory (interim) and did not dispose

of the case. The IHC held that constitutional jurisdiction under Article 199 should not interfere with inferior orders unless they were patently illegal. The court further emphasised that election disputes should be resolved either by the ECP or the relevant election tribunal, not by the high court.

The ECP leader sought to set aside the IHC's judgment and halt the ECP's proceedings, arguing that they were unlawful and beyond its jurisdiction. The petition also asserted that the ECP had passed order in a summary, arbitrary, illegal, and clandestine manner and, therefore, it deserved to be set aside.

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On the issue of the privatisation of Pakistan Engineering Company (PECO), officials requested the committee to allow more time to resolve the issue.

The committee approved three months' time and directed to resolve the issue within due time and recommended that Chairman and CEO must be appointed from majority of shareholding instead of govern-

ment nominees.

PAC meeting

The Public Accounts Committee meeting held here on Wednesday focused on audit objections related to the Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis.

Chaired by MNA Javed Akbar Khan, a major concern raised during the PAC meeting was the payment of over Rs 2.79 billion in old-age pensions based on questionable or incorrect dates of birth.

According to audit officials, discrepancies of up to 30 years were found in some of the 5,000 pension cases flagged.

Officials noted that over 10 million workers were registered, with pensions currently being disbursed among around 800,000 individuals. The secretary of the Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis, Arshad Mahmood, informed the committee that prior to the establishment of Nadiya in 2000, identification and verification of individuals were based on systems other than Nadiya issued

ID cards.

This explanation drew criticism from the PAC Chairman, who questioned the inconsistencies between birth dates on ID cards and academic records.

The committee granted the ministry one month to resolve the issue and submit a comprehensive report in this regard.

Workers' rights and factory conditions

During the meeting, concerns were also raised about the state of workers' welfare and factory oversight. Committee member Shaukat Majeed emphasised the lack of job security and the harassing behaviour of some employers towards their employees.

Riaz Farooqi highlighted the alarming number of tuberculosis cases among workers in textile factories and pointed out poor working conditions and lack of health safeguards. Mr Farooqi said that several new factories do not even have proper records and criticised the lack of documentation and regulatory oversight.

Pahalgam attack

In the aftermath of Tuesday's militant attack on tourists in India-held Kashmir's Pahalgam area, South Asia once again stands on a knife's edge. Displaying a knee-jerk reaction to the tragedy, in which over 25 people were killed, the Indian foreign secretary has highlighted the alleged "cross-border linkages of the terrorist attack", dragging Pakistan into this deplorable episode. New Delhi has responded by suspending the India-Watson Treaty, which has survived wars and periods of tension, further downgrading diplomatic relations, and closing the Attari border crossing. Pakistan, which had initially expressed concern and condolences over the attack, will celebrate its response today, as the prime minister has convened a meeting of the National Security Committee to review the situation.

The assault has been claimed by 'The Resistance Front', a hitherto unknown entity; media reports have quoted the outfit as claiming the attack to protest against demographic changes in the disputed region. This is probably the biggest attack targeting civilians in IJK in 25 years. Defence Minister Khawaja Asif has termed the assault as a possible "false flag operation". No cause can justify the targeting of innocent non-combatants, and the incident must be roundly condemned. However, India must also look inwards and review its brutal rule in held Kashmir, which has bred immense discontent. And when all peaceful avenues for a just resolution to the Kashmir dispute are blocked, it is not surprising that some inside the occupied territory take up arms to express their anger. Ever since doing away with the disputed region's limited autonomy in August 2019, the BJP-led government has pretended that 'all is well' in IJK. That is not the case. Even voices within India are questioning the government's claims of having established calm. For example, India's opposition leader, Rahul Gandhi, has asked the rulers to move beyond "hollow claims" of peace in occupied Kashmir.

Common peace can only come to Kashmir — and the rest of South Asia — when this nearly-eight-decades-old dispute is resolved as per the wishes of the Kashmiris, with buy-in from Pakistan and India. If the Hindu nationalist government in New Delhi thinks it can stamp out all peaceful calls for freedom and justice through brute force and intimidation, then there will be no end to blood-soaked episodes. The tragic events in Pahalgam should serve as a wake-up call for India's rulers; if they want peace in IJK, and peace between Pakistan and India, then sincere efforts must be made to resolve the Kashmiri question at the negotiating table, involving the Kashmiris as well as Pakistan. From here, Pakistan must proceed with caution and prepare a calm yet firm response to India's allegations, and threats. While de-escalation is the preferred course of action, India should also know that any misadventure will be met by Pakistan resolutely.

New IMF projection

The IMF downgrading of the IMF's growth forecast for Pakistan by 40bps to 2.6pc is perturbing, especially considering the country's elevated poverty levels. More than 42pc of the population currently lives below the poverty line, while the World Bank estimates that 1.6m more people will fall into this category this year. An update to the World Economic Outlook notes that Pakistan's economic growth is not enough to bring down poverty, despite a stabilising economy and the easing of inflation. Economists believe that the economy must grow by 6-8pc a year to cut poverty and create jobs for 2.3m new workers. The new IMF growth projections for Pakistan are based on the multilateral financial institution's concerns about the potential impact of the high reciprocal US tariffs on its economy. Revising growth projections for the global economy as well as individual countries days after US President Donald Trump slammed his reciprocal tariffs on all of America's trading partners and higher tariffs on dozens of countries — including Pakistan — running a trade surplus with the US, it notes that the tariffs have triggered a new climate of uncertainty.

At the moment, the IMF says, the situation is complex and fluid. Countries like ours continue to wonder what sort of deal, if any, they can strike with the Trump administration to maintain their share in the world's largest consumer market. It is unclear then how Pakistan plans to negotiate with, and what it can offer, the Trump administration to get a favourable deal. However, some reports suggest that the government may offer American companies greater access to unexplored deposits of rare earth elements and dismantle barriers to US imports. While it is important to save — in fact, expand — our share in the US market, our policymakers also need to revisit their economic strategy. The post-tariff situation poses many challenges as the world enters an uncertain era amid escalating global trade tensions, but it also offers opportunities. However, the latter can only be exploited if the focus shifts to quicker implementation of structural reforms to attract FDI to boost industrial and agricultural productivity for diversifying and increasing exports through technology transfers. Unfortunately, to avoid a backlash from the powerful business lobbies and others, the authorities continue to look for short-term economic fixes rather than taking the more difficult route of mastering the political will to execute much-needed structural reforms.

Stranded goods

A controversy over the new canals continues to rage, traders across the country have begun raising the alarm over economic contagion from the crisis. With protesters blocking key nodes in the logistics routes between Sindh and Punjab, hundreds of goods trucks and fuel tankers have been stranded on the roads for days, with reports suggesting that the lines 'stretch for miles' in some areas. "The entire supply chain is paralysed," according to the KCC president. "The situation is not only hurting businesses and industries but also jeopardising employment and trade" — a concern shared by trade leaders in other parts of the country as well. Exporters of perishable items are in a particularly vulnerable position, with their goods at risk of spoiling on the roads before they can reach the ports. Others are worried that foreign buyers may cancel their orders due to the delays. Meanwhile, the Oil Companies Advisory Council has warned of potential fuel shortages upcountry if the situation is not addressed.

As goods movement both north and south remains suspended, a wide range of industries and enterprises are facing disruptions and unnecessary financial losses due to what is essentially a political failure. While the federal government and the PPP have recently agreed to collaborate on addressing Sindh's concerns over the proposed canals, many businesses engaged in commerce and international trade may not be able to wait out a lengthy negotiation process. It is imperative, therefore, for the federal government to take immediate steps to reassure protesters that their concerns have been heard and will be justly and promptly addressed. Likewise, the Sindh government, if it is satisfied with the steps being taken at the federal level, must play its part in pacifying the protesters and ensuring that the blockades can be removed quickly and peacefully, without further confrontation. The suspension of the goods traffic will eventually start hurting ordinary people. It is crucial, therefore, for decisionmakers to move quickly.

Underspending climate funds

Several documents have addressed the issue of underspending and implementation delays.

PAKISTAN'S inability to efficiently utilise allocated development funds is severely hampering our economic progress and climate resilience efforts. With more than \$2 billion underspent annually, the country's absorption capacity has become a critical bottleneck. Instead of reducing arduous processes, we have begun to blame our malaise on the absence of bankable projects.

Multiple documents have addressed the issue of underspending and project implementation delays in Pakistan. Numbers from the Economic Affairs Division show that rolled-over foreign assistance funds declined from around \$1.2bn in 2013-2014 to \$0.1bn by 2022-2023. The annual rollover is higher than nearly 100% IMF tranche.

The World Bank Implementation Status Report flag implementation delays and disbursement challenges. As of 2023-2024, its Pakistan portfolio was \$10.1bn, with disbursement rates averaging 15-20 per cent below target for several consecutive years. Its Pakistan Performance and Learning Review has noted slow implementation with some \$1.5-2bn in expected disbursements delayed. World Bank publications have indicated that the percentage of projects requiring extensions has increased from 35pc in 2016-2018 to nearly 50pc in 2020-2022.

The ADB's Pakistan Country Partnership Strategy (2021-2025) has likewise highlighted implementation challenges as requiring attention. Its Country Operations Business Plan shows \$800 million in delayed disbursements across infrastructure projects.

Several bilateral donors have expressed similar concerns of implementation delay. The EU's evaluation reports have noted implementation delays affecting their development cooperation portfolio. Country evaluations by the UK's DFID, Germany's GIZ and Japan's JICA have identified absorption capacity as a recurring challenge. USAID, now closed, in its Pakistan Performance Management Plan documented challenges with timely fund utilisation, Pakistan's engagement with the Adaptation Fund, GEF and the Green Climate Fund has been particularly concerning. GCF's \$37m Transforming the Indus Basin with Climate Resilient Agriculture and Water Management project, for example, had disbursed less than 45pc of funds by its original completion timeline. GCF documents have explicitly mentioned absorption capacity as a constraint on scaling up

climate finance in Pakistan.

One specific implementation challenge involved delays in establishing appropriate financial mechanisms. For several climate funds, Pakistan has experienced delays averaging six to eight months in simply establishing designated bank accounts with controls and reporting mechanisms.

These delays and absorption capacity issues have affected Pakistan's competitiveness in accessing climate finance, especially as Trends like the GCF increasingly stress implementation track records in their funding decisions. As global climate finance becomes more competitive, any history of project delays becomes a consideration in funding decisions.

Pakistan's cycle of emergency repurposing Pakistan has established a concerning pattern of repurposing underspent development funds for emergency response over the past decade. During the 2010 floods that affected over 20m people, Pakistan redirected some \$1.2bn from ongoing development initiatives towards emergency relief. When Covid-19 struck in 2020, Pakistan mobilised around \$600m by tapping into underspent development funds across multiple donor portfolios.

After the 2022 floods, this pattern continued to an even greater extent. The RISP became a critical mechanism for delivering cash assistance to affected populations, with significant portions of this emergency response funding coming from repurposing previously allocated but unused development funds. Around \$600m from the World Bank's portfolio and \$700m from ADB's ongoing projects were redirected towards the flood response.

Perhaps most concerning is that this repurposing practice has created perverse incentives. With underspent funds becoming a de facto contingency resource for multiple disaster events, there is reduced urgency to address the underlying absorption capacity issues causing the underspending. This creates a dangerous cycle where development implementation challenges persist, leading to underspending that facilitates emergency response funding, while original development aims remain unachieved.

This reduction of underspent development funds towards emergency response undermines Pakistan's broader development agenda. When money intended for education, health, municipal services, infrastructure, or climate resilience is


repurposed, it postpones projects that would have addressed the underlying vulnerabilities that make disasters so devastating — increasing vulnerability to future disasters. The practice also erodes the confidence of donors, who end up questioning the value of investing in long-term initiatives in Pakistan.

Threwforward lending: The term 'threwforward' used by Pakistan's Planning Commission refers to the accumulated cost of incomplete development projects that have been initiated but remain unfinished, with their unpaid costs carried forward into future fiscal years. By early 2024, an IMF report revealed that the federal development portfolio added 244 new projects worth Rs2.26 trillion in FY23 to a backlog of 1990 projects costing Rs10.32tr. This backlog included hundreds of incomplete and inadaptive projects across infrastructure, social development and production sectors, with damaging implications for economic growth and public welfare.

This massive throwforward reflects a chronic pattern of project initiation exceeding completion capacity. Politically motivated infrastructure projects account for the bulk share. The Planning Commission's 2023 report on implementation challenges for development projects described underspending as "a structural challenge affecting Pakistan's development trajectory". Internal assessments detail how system bottlenecks contribute to chronic underspending. It has expressed a growing concern, noting that the throwforward has been increasing at a rate that outpaces growth in the annual PSLP allocations. This creates a troubling scenario where even if no-new projects were initiated, it would take more than two decades of development budgets just to complete existing projects.

These malpractices add to Pakistan's mounting debt. Pakistan's ability to efficiently utilise available funding will be crucial to securing additional resources. Addressing the root causes of implementation delays and building a robust absorption capacity is essential for sustainable development and climate resilience. By undertaking reforms to break the cycle of underspending and emergency repurposing, Pakistan can maximise the impact of international assistance and strengthen its position in the global competition for climate finance. ■

Canals and minerals

THE system is now under mounting pressure and has run into an entirely unnecessary impasse. The 'system' here consists of the unique configuration of power that emerged from the tainted elections of February 2024. In this configuration, everybody has been given just enough of a slice of power to obtain their buy-in, but not enough for any of them to become spoilers.

The PPP gets Sindh, Nawaz Sharif and family get Punjab, and the PTI gets KP, while Shahbaz Sharif sees his agenda wish to sit in the prime minister's chair fulfilled. Balochistan remains an outlier in this configuration, like it has in most previous ones. It is the one province that needs an organic and rooted political process more than any other to avoid spiralling into instability.

Each party in this configuration brought in one limited agenda to the table. The PPP just wants to stay in power in Sindh. The Nawaz family wants to return back the Punjab voter, which lost to the PTI. It is not clear what exactly the PTI leadership in KP wants. They can't seem to make up their minds whether they are part of the system of rule in the country, or an insurgent force out to topple it. And at the centre, the government of Shahbaz Sharif just wants to live its term by balancing the demands placed upon it by all its partners in the Assembly and its patrons in power.

Into this delicate configuration, where it is more or less stuck to their own, come two entirely unnecessary demands that have become lightning rods for discontentment. One is the canal project in Punjab, which has stirred the street in Sindh in a way not seen in decades. For almost a week now, the towns and cities of the province have been abuzz with protests, joined by civil society organisations including the big four associations of Karachi.

The National Highway has been blocked in at least three places, halting the movement of cargo of raw materials to industry upstream, finished goods for export orders from upstream to the ports, oil movement, and all else besides. The Oil Companies Advisory Council has warned that 800 tankers are stranded between Sindh and

Larkana, and oil shortages could develop in Punjab and KP if the road is not opened up quickly.

The entire supply chain for industry is now disrupted as the protests have moved into their second week, and are escalating. Strikes have been announced by goods carriers, highways and key arteries have been blocked, and now there is talk of a province-wide general strike in the days ahead.

The PPP has found itself in the crossfire in all this. They gave a weak response to the initial announcement of the so-called Green Pakistan Initiative, which aims to build a series of canals in the Cholistan desert to irrigate arid land.

Withdrawal of water from the Indus river system are a highly contentious issue in Sindh, which is the lower riparian and has already suffered heavily due to the drying up of water flows. It makes no sense to irrigate a desert with river water that is needed for agriculture downstream. But in this configuration of power, where every member of the power system is in it game for their own interests, somehow it made sense to somebody in the so-called Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC) to launch this project.

The minerals bill in the KP Assembly has turned into a similar lightning rod around which the discontent of this system — and they are legion — have been mobilised. The issue arose from the desire of the establishment to try and attract investment in the mining and minerals sector in Pakistan. In pursuit of this desire, bills were introduced in the provincial assembly of Balochistan and KP. Both bills carry "the same

takeoff" imprint of the civilianized SIFC according to an editorial in this paper, mainly because they allow for a door through which the federal government can encroach upon the mineral wealth of a territory, which is otherwise legally a provincial subject.

The National Assembly rubber-stamped the bill, but in KP it ran into stiff opposition. Initially, it was approved by the provincial cabinet, and the leadership of the PTI seemed to agree on enacting its passage, but an uproar ensued when the provincial Speaker introduced it in the KP Assembly, with stiff opposition coming from the ANP and legislators from the merged districts. They were later joined by the JUI-F.

But here's the rub. The combined voting power of all these parties is not enough to stop the passage of the bill should the Speaker put it up for a vote. With barely 20 members out of 146, they would be swept aside easily if the ruling party decides to see the bill through. But despite two attempts by the Speaker to hold meetings and hammer out a consensus, and despite high-level attempts by the PTI leadership of the province, the bill is still stalled mainly because the PTI leadership is unable to persuade its lawmakers to vote in its favour. In the last attempt to forge a consensus, the Speaker said no further attempts to advance the bill could be made without the explicit authorisation of the party's incarcerated chairman Imran Khan.

Neither constituency was necessary. The canals are a vanity project and not worth stirring up the whole system for. And investments in minerals can be arranged easily with a few tweaks to the existing legislation from 2017, with no need to fiddle in new legislation. What is at stake here is obviously a federal government that wants to lay claim to deeply held provincial prerogatives — mineral wealth and water allocations. And for this reason alone the entire configuration of power built after the elections of 2024 is now being tested. ■

Cool escapes

MOUNTAINS memory time in million ms. The night of Nanga Parbat's peak from the plane as we reached Gilgit reminded me that PLA's aircraft and I had grown older the Himalayan had not.

On an earlier trip to the northern areas years ago, I had missed a detour to Fairy Meadows. Guidebooks persuaded me that what lies above is "a lonely high plateau with level upland land of meadows and direct view of Nanga Parbat's north side". The climb had been described as "the second most dangerous journey in the world". (The first was in the previous path to the prime ministerial of Pakistan.)

The expedition up to Fairy Meadows took about four hours — two in a rattling jeep over stone-strewn hairpin bends, and then another two straddled on a hairy horse reluctant to plod the narrow, bumpy track of rocks and mud.

The reality of Fairy Meadows today is a noisy tourist field, ringed by an urban sprawl of middle-class hotels, designed for domestic tourists. Peripherally, it is no discourage them that locals make the approach so daunting. Locals could improve the road but refuse to, as that would jeopardise the livelihood of over 1000 drivers and horsemen.

The journey down followed a path edged by precipices. A prayer muttered before and after each life-threatening turn was helpful.

The drive from Gilgit to Hunza is life affirming. En route, a view of Rakaposhi marked by a highflying vulture on a wire. Hunza is one reason why it — expanded recently, but still soft, silent, serene. The tourist season has yet to start, so shopkeepers are keen to catch the odd visitor as a chance-on does bien, for food.

Time dawns in best at any local history. The most famous is run by a man whose wife ate vegetable soup and chips after parathas stuffed with yoke mutton until his teeth fell off.

A day trip to Khunjerab is to recall the faded days of Pak-China friendship. The route takes one past the newly formed Attabad Lake, claimed by a fissure for tourists who want a local trip this far from Karachi. Four months will teach of Pak-China friendships. The pink and white blossoms on apricot trees, the rugged layered compressed geology, and the breath-taking vistas evoke a wondrous homage to nature, and to those who sacrificed their lives to build the Karakoram Highway.

The scenery is bliss until one reaches barriers and bureaucracy. Our driver whispered to the guard that he was carrying "official guest". Other cars with less invention drivers had to queue.

The drive to Khunjerab Pass had made

earlier had been in the summer. Then, the rolling fields were green and flush with flowers. This time, there was snow everywhere. The mass of whiteness almost dwarfed the massive Chinese gateway.

Khunjerab is a sad example of the clash of civilisations. The Chinese side is patriotic in adversity. It is orderly, sober and dressed for its tourists. They are allowed up to hermit's land, where they stand waving red flags as they would have done Mac's red book.

One side is perverted in adversity. An armed guard warns impulsive tourists against crossing into man's land. Another reminds the first to do his jobs. They try to close the wire gate. Like a CIA airport trolley, it has a broken wheel.

The journey from Khunjerab down to Hunza is a leisurely descent through indescribable natural beauty. The last of the snows fight for life in deep crevasses.

Streams of colourful sediment record earlier flows. God created these northern areas for artists and mobile cameras.

The scenery is bliss until one reaches barriers and bureaucracy.

No premonition in Hunza though one needs the parathas available from Eagle's nest at Daskot. Once one had to drive zigzag through potato fields to obtain an eagle-eye view of the valley nestled between soaring mountains peaks. Today, Daskot is a smattering of isolated houses and fast food eateries.

Should one regret the change that tourism has brought to our northern areas? Fifty years ago, Hunza was the place to see, and be seen. It is still a second holiday home to those tired of Oxford Street.

An expert on tourism once advised the government not to expect foreign tourists until our domestic tourism has been developed to acceptable standards. Today, tourists like Gilgit and Hunza are experiencing a growing surge of Pakistani tourists, desperate to escape the cauldron simmering in the plains between Karachi and Rawalpindi.

PA may not remain forever PLA. The ancient prototypes of Haldakoti hopefully will remain for another millennium. Perpetually though is on the side of our majestic mountains. ■

Our friend Sabeen

IN March, the founder of OpenAI, Sam Altman, announced his company had trained a new model that was "good at creative writing". It was asked to write a fictional literary short story about AI and grief. The AI produced a technically correct piece of writing; writers and promoters of AI decried its literary merit and its contribution to humanity for a week on social media. In my opinion, the piece was devoid of human emotion, merely a paroxysm of the cleverness of machines and those who build them. But the person who would have been able to give the most considered view because she was an great a humanist as she was a tech evangelist, was not available for comment. She had died 10 years ago, and all of us who loved her are still grieving her loss.

Sabrina Mahfuz was killed on this day in 2013. She was the founder of Karachi's cultural centre The Second Floor; she led a social and cultural renaissance in a country polarised by political and ethnic violence and suffocated by religious intolerance. In a city where it was often difficult to breathe, the Second Floor was where breathing was not just encouraged, it was mandatory — along with thinking. Perhaps this kind of humanism is hard to imagine today, when everyone has the world on a computer in their pocket. But Sabeen lived at a moment when we were not encouraged to think for ourselves or express our individuality. This was the early 2000s, when dictatorship was benevolent and moderation was enlightened. Under the plutocrats' leadership the same hard facts and expression that has shaped our country over since its inception.

Although Sabreen's murder was a great shock, it was no surprise that the person who robbed our friend of her life was an educated man, who adopted the guise of a man of faith with the soul of a killer. We Pakistanis live and die by our hypocrisies and contradictions. We take cover in the grey spaces that exist between the black and white of right and wrong. We think that by fulfilling the responsibilities of morality, we can please God. Killing someone is allowed if it is done in the name of the eight 'sons'. This was the tragic Sabreen's killer made with the devil; it stole Sabreen, just like thousands of Pakistanis with hopes, dreams, aspirations, everything they could have achieved and contributed, experienced and enjoyed, unfulfilled, incomplete.

Sabreen accomplished a great deal in the short 40 years she lived on this planet. Everyone who knew her has a different story to tell about her optimism, her courage, her encouragement, her empathy. It's

important that we pass on that knowledge to others who didn't know her, and who may not have even heard of her. This especially applies to young people, who Sabreen loved to guide and support, who are looking for role models and positive inspirations. They can't find it in our society among those they interact with every day. Instead, they find it on a phone screen, tainted by an influence, of a machine. What Sabreen gave us all, far more valuable than any money or assets, was hope that we could change for the better in whatever we aspired to do for her. She was an activist of dreams, a catalyst for action, a living example of love and solidarity.

If it were up to me, I would rewrite the history books to include Sabreen's name among those we revere. I would award her the Sitara-i-Imtiaz posthumously, so that her contribution to Pakistan would be properly recognised by each and every citizen of this nation. I would name roads and schools after her. I would write her

Sabeen was someone this country needed then and now.

Sabeen was someone this country needed then, and now more than ever a mentor and a friend, not necessarily in that order.

I may not be an eloquent as an AI machine, but I do think often about grief when it comes to remembering Sabreen. Losing her brought me face to face with how it feels to lose a loved one — heavy, helpless, surrounded from everything I thought was certain in this world, anchored to the temporality of our physical bodies, unable to escape the finality of our mortal end. I miss her terribly — her laugh, her smile, her irritations, her crankiness. I would not want to resurrect her with AI, as is the bid these days in these strange, ghoulish cliques which re-animate dead celebrities. I'll leave resurrection up to the Divine. What I will do, though, is use my human gifts — remembrance, emotion, longing, love — to evoke the memory of what Sabreen was like, as a revolutionary and as a friend. And I'll use my abilities as a writer — a human one — to make sure you know all about her, long after both of us are gone. ■

THIS is with reference to the article "Revolutionary" [March 20] which rightly asserted that the stagnant, undirected and conservative policymaking process, primarily shaped by a bureaucracy that is resistant to change, has hindered the country's progress. The issue is not limited to the power sector alone. In fact, a closer examination of other policies, such as those related to trade, taxation and fiscal matters, reveals the same flawed approach to policymaking.

In Pakistan, our policymakers rarely conduct empirical analysis, or assess the effectiveness of specific policies or initiatives. As a result, policies often lack the direction and capacity to address critical gaps, leading to frequent shifts and inconsistencies.

It is essential to recognise that modern administrative systems, largely driven by consumers, supported by technology, automation and artificial intelligence (AI), do not operate in this way.

As such, the traditional policymaking processes, with their outdated bureaucratic practices, have become obsolete, and can no longer be sustained. Modern policy-making is based on scientific principles and international best practices, with reforms shaped by comprehensive analysis.

Unfortunately, our bureaucracy has failed to adapt to modern governance practices, remaining passive, conservative and archaic. This is evident in policies related to tax and trade where business processes remain largely uncoordinated and inefficient.

The recent power policy shift related to solar installations illustrates this harsh reality. Consumers had invested in solar panels in response to the government's renewable campaign to promote the solar option. But the policymakers' justification for this abrupt policy shift,

aimed at providing relief to grid consumers and reducing capacity payments, seems far-fetched, and has created market uncertainty.

The government should shift its focus to a more holistic approach for the energy sector, as seen in leading countries, rather than solely focusing on reducing the buyback rates. This can be achieved only through radical, comprehensive reforms based on a vision and long-term planning.

Possessed efforts on privatising and modernising the generation, transmission and distribution sectors, coupled with investments in smart grid technology and advanced metering systems, are essential for enhancing energy efficiency. Above all, a competent and professional workforce, backed with existing efficient power generation, and a functional distribution network are essential for transforming the current energy landscape.

This transformation is only possible if our government, rather than the bureaucracy, takes the lead in policy formulation. Parliamentary input ensures that only long-term, consistent, productive, transparent, need-based, people-centric, adaptive, problem-solving and result-oriented policies are formulated and implemented.

Sindh land erosion

GIVEN the impending water scarcity that Pakistan faces, it makes no sense to divert more water from currently fertile areas to the aridified Cholistan.

The Sindh government should focus on building water storage dams along the path of the Indus River, allowing only minimal water to flow into the sea. The current water flow into the sea can at best moderate soil and sand erosion, but it is not a viable solution.

Natural forms of preventing erosion include planting or maintaining native vegetation, such as mangrove forests and coral reefs, or building dykes, embankments and groynes to defend the coastline from erosion processes.

A project in a rigid hydrologic structure along the shore that intercepts water flow, and limits the movement of sediment. Reversals have a total life span of 50 to 100

years, while groynes last 30 to 40 years.

Unfortunately, the coastal areas in Sindh are being cleared of their natural habitat, and this process is facilitated by some elements within the Sindh government in collaboration with real estate tycoons and developers. Hundreds of crocodiles in our area have been lost this way.

Water scarcity is an existential threat that needs to be tackled by all the following units. The Sindh government should initiate suggestive measures to ensure water conservation and fair distribution of its water share.

Also, there should be a focus on the development of private and government-sponsored housing, societies and luxury projects, like golf courses, including the so-called "welfare" projects meant for the paying elite and political cronies.

It is time for the educators and policymakers to shift their focus from mechanical frameworks to encouraging experiential, inquiry-based education. By reducing excessive homework and incorporating interactive, play-based strategies, we can ensure young minds to love learning instead of fearing the process. A well-structured, learner-centred approach will improve academic growth, and instil a love for learning.

Kurram elders pledge to surrender weapons

PESHAWAR: Elders of both warring parties in Kurram district during a jirga on Wednesday assured authorities about immediately starting the process of voluntary surrender of weapons in connection with implementation of an agreement.

A statement issued here said that officials held detailed discussions with selected tribal elders of the parties there along with the jirga in which the parties assured them to fulfil their national responsibilities in implementation of Kohat Peace Agreement and thanked all government institutions for demolishing about 1,000 bunkers.

In addition to a meeting of Kohat Commissioner and district departments to review social and development activities in the district, visits to different areas will be made.

Commissioner Muhammed Bilal Shah expressed the hope that overall situation in Kurram district would further improve and normal life would be fully restored. "God willing, Kurram district will once again become a cradle of peace," he added.

Military officials said that both sides in Kurram were serious about establishing peace and were trying to make the peace sustainable by utilising all resources.

Kurram district has been in throes of a tribal conflict since the November last year attack on a convoy that left more than 40 people dead. Roads leading to Peshawar remained blocked for more than six months, resulting in shortage of medicines, edibles and other basic necessities in the area.

Earlier towards the end of last month, both the sides of conflict in the district had signed an eight-month peace agreement while a fragile ceasefire was broken in January this year.

It was also learnt that the teacher would also work on a quota, to provide medical treatment to local people.


Elders of Nurar area asked the local administration and police to ensure safe recovery of the abducted teacher within 24 hours.

MPC rejects minerals bill as 'direct attack' on provincial autonomy

Threatens protests if proposed law pushed through assembly

PESHAWAR: A multi-party conference organised by the opposition Awami National Party on Wednesday rejected the draft Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mines and Minerals Bill, 2025, describing it a "direct attack on provincial autonomy" and demanded limiting the role of all institutions to the constitutional sphere.

It warned that if the government tried to push the bill through the assembly, street protests would be staged across the province.

The meet was held at the ANP's secretariat Bacha Khan Markaz, with party provincial president Massi Hikmat Hussain in the chair.

Leaders of political parties, business community and civil society organisations shared views about the proposed legislation on the occasion and signed a joint declaration.

A delegation of the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam-Fazl was led by Maulana Ammar Robinson, while the Pakistan Peoples Party leaders led by provincial president Mohammad Ali Shah Bacha also attended. A delegation of the National Democratic Movement led by Bashir Gohar also showed up, while the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf was represented by Arsal Riaz Ali, Ali Asghar and other leaders.

The Jamaat-e-Islami's delegation was led by Prof Mohammad

Darshan, Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's by Maulana Javed Abbasi, that of the Qaumi Watan Party by Tariq Ahmed Khan, the Muslim Kiwan Party by Adil Mohamed, that of the Pakhtunkhwa National Awami Party by Khurshid Kakai and the Awami Workers Party's Barryar Iqbal.

Representatives of the chamber of commerce, lawyers, mineral experts and civil society, business organisations, Mine and Minerals Owners Association and other ANP central and provincial leaders also participated.

The ANP provincial chief expressed satisfaction with the views of participants against the proposed law.

The declaration said that the

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mines and Minerals Bill, 2025, was rejected in its entirety as it was a "direct attack on the provincial autonomy, authority over local resources and supremacy of the provincial assembly as granted under the 24th Constitutional Amendment."

It added that the bill was an attempt to grant the Centre the control over the province's mineral resources in an unconstitutional move, which would cause a rift between the federation and provinces.

The declaration said only residents and their elected representatives had the authority over the province's resources and no federal institution or bureaucracy could be allowed to do that.

It added that the multi-party conference categorically rejected any "authority of the Special Economic Facilitation Council and the Federal Minerals Wing over the affairs and mineral resources of the province" as it considered the SEFC a "conspiracy to completely control the province's agriculture, minerals, tourism, environment and information technology sectors by the Federal government and the military establishment and centralisation."

"We completely reject the establishment of an unconstitutional and illegal council like the SEFC," it added.

The declaration demanded that the role of all institutions be limited to their constitutional roles.

"The MPC categorically rejects the role of the army in the country's politics. It demands that details of all commercial businesses by the Pakistan Army along with their assets be made public, while all commercial activities of the army be stopped so that they can focus on their constitutional responsibilities."

The declaration said that the proposed law was not only a violation of constitutional principles but also a "robbery" on the rights of local communities, working class and those associated with mining.

The meet demanded that the provincial assembly unanimously reject the minerals bill and a constitutional and legal struggle be launched against it.

It announced that a vigorous and organised public campaign would be launched against the proposed act.

"If this bill is forcibly enacted, a protest movement will be launched across the province," it warned.

The declaration urged writers, legal community, civil society and youth to be part of this constitutional, political and public struggle against the proposed legislation.

The participants emphasised that the struggle was not limited to Khyber Pakhtunkhwa but it was rather a national struggle for the rights of federating units, the supremacy of the Constitution and the establishment of a balance between the Centre and the provinces.

They endorsed the opposition of political parties in Balochistan to the minerals bill passed by the provincial assembly and demanded its immediate withdrawal to remove unrest among people.

Security arrangements for Kaghan visitors reviewed

MANGIRIA: The district administration on Wednesday reviewed arrangements related to security and health care of tourists and provision of essential services to them during their visit to the Kaghan Valley.

"As the summer season has set in, we have re-located the police station to Maran and will shortly deploy the issues police in the entire valley," district police officer Shahzad Khan Gandapur told a meeting at the Main Circuit House.

The meeting, chaired by deputy commissioner Khalid Iqbal, discussed ways to improve hospitality and security measures as well as the re-opening of the

remaining section of the Mansehra-Naran-Jalkhad Road and the road leading to the Saiful Muluk Lake.

"We have re-deployed our personnel in Naran to ensure foolproof security for tourists. As more sections of the MSA Road have been cleared to traffic, additional police posts are being made operational," the DPO said.

He said that police would also be deployed at Balaora Top, while traffic wardens had been assigned stations along the MSA Road to manage traffic flow in the valley.

Assistant director of the Kaghan Development Authority Asad Shahzad

informed the meeting that efforts were under way to reopen the Lake Road, allowing tourists to visit the lake-covered Saiful Muluk Lake.

"We expect that visitors will be able to travel to the Saiful Muluk Lake in four-wheelers within a week or so," he said.

Mr Shahzad said that water supply schemes, greenbelts, ambulances and rescue services had been revitalised in the valley.

President of the Baloch Association Seth Mianullah said the tourism industry was fully prepared to welcome tourists.

"We have decided to offer quality food and hospitality services to all visitors

coming to enjoy the valley's natural beauty," he said.

The road link between Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Gilgit-Baltistan, which has been closed since mid-November, is also expected to reopen.

HELD: The police on Wednesday arrested two men for attempting to sexually assault a girl in Lohar Banda Baghian area of Balochistan.

Baloch Circle SP Jahanzeb Khan told reporters that both accused fled after the girl resisted their assault bid at a deserted place. He said that the girl's mother later approached him for strict action against the accused. — Correspondent

PA demands extension in deadline for Afghan refugees' repatriation

Urge Centre to empower KP to hold peace talks with Afghanistan

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly on Wednesday demanded of the federal government to reconsider its current Afghan policy for necessary changes and extend the deadline for the repatriation of Afghan refugees.

It also asked the federal government to empower KP to hold direct and meaningful talks with the interim Afghan government for longer-term peace in the region.

The demands were made through two resolutions during a sitting chaired by Speaker Babar Baloch

Sohail Ishaq.

A resolution tabled by PTI member Sharjeel Ali, noted that the house was seriously concerned about the law and order situation in the province.

It added that the federal government's Afghan policy had failed on the security situation in the country as well as Pak-Afghan relations had worsened. "It is imperative to take solid steps for restoring peace to the region," he said.

The resolution read that the house demanded of the federal government to "reconsider and change Afghan policy immediately."

It recommended that the KP government be empowered by the federal government to hold "direct and meaningful talks with Afghanistan to play its positive role for long-term peace in the region."

Another resolution, tabled by Mr Ali and passed unanimously by the

house, demanded extension of the deadline set for the repatriation of Afghan refugees.

It noted that Afghans had been living in Pakistan for decades, so such a repatriation would not only create problems for them but could also render a negative impact on the current brotherly relations between the neighbouring countries.

Earlier, Senator MPA Rajab Ali Khan Abbott said local and international tourists visited Gilgit highlighting the country's positive image worldwide, but the residents faced intense shortage of drinking water.

He said that water bottles were filled with spring water and thousands of gallons of water was supplied to the Marri water board on a daily basis, with the practice continuing for decades.

The lawmaker said that people in the area faced issues and were com-

plained to buy water and it was the legal right of the residents to receive water on priority.

Law minister Attaullah Afridi disclosed the issue serious and said a pipeline was laid down during the British rule for water supply to the Marri and Hunza areas.

He added that the provincial government had claimed Rs 6 billion of the water supplied from Gilgit but the payment had yet to be made.

He said that a special committee should be formed and the calling attention notice should be sent to the reviewing the issue once and for all.

MPA Nasir Ahmad Afridi complained that residents were not provided with water. He warned that the people would never allow anyone to use water as they're forced to purchase it.

"We don't want locals to disconnect water supply from the pipe-

line," he said, adding that water from KP had been provided to Marri for the last 129 years and that too, free of charge.

However, ANP member Arbab Usman noted that it was an inter-provincial issue and involved various concerned areas as well.

He said the house should issue directions on the issue as it lacked power to take up the issue with other provinces.

The chair observed that once the committee made any decision, it should be binding on the provincial government country the house to pursue the issue.

Mr Usman also said that around 40,000 cases were pending with the Peshawar High Court.

"If this is the case at the high court, what will be the situation at the lower courts? A process should be started to monitor the situation."

The chair later adjourned the sitting until 5pm on April 28.

Punjab growers threaten to cut wheat sowing next season

• Accuse provincial rulers of ruining agriculture, reject incentive package • Ministers highlight initiatives to support farmers

LAHORE: The agricultural sector in Punjab has become a battleground for conflicting narratives, with farmers expressing deep distress while the provincial government touts its efforts to support them.

Khalid Khokhar, President of the Pakistan Kisan Bahadur, held a press conference in Lahore, vehemently criticising the government's handling of the agricultural crisis.

"The threat of farmers and growers has been strangled," he declared, emphasising the farmers' love for their country and questioning their ability to meet basic needs like their children's education.

He announced a protest measure, stating, "Next year we will cultivate less wheat in protest," and rejecting the Punjab government's aid package, asserting, "We do not want the package, you have ruined agriculture."

Mr Khokhar also urged political parties to refrain from polarising the wheat issue, bemoaning the lack of focus on national interests within the assemblies.

He regretted that while

the PPP and PTI were criticising the PML-N government in Punjab, the situation was no different in Sindh and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, where the PPP and PTI were in power, and the provincial governments, too, were not procuring wheat from the farmers during the ongoing harvesting season.

In a counter-response, Punjab Minister for Agriculture and Livestock Syed Aslam Hussain Kirmani, alongside Information Minister Armaan Balochi, addressed a press conference. Mr

Kirmani defended the government's actions, stating, "Policy is being played in the name of wheat," but insisted that the government is committed to supporting farmers.

He criticised the opposition, questioning their record in provinces where they held power and highlighting Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz Sharif's personal involvement in monitoring the wheat market in Punjab.

Mr Kirmani detailed the government's initiatives, including a record budget allocation for farmers, substantial subsidies on fertilisers, seeds, and tractors, and the disbursement of Rs32 billion in interest-free agricultural loans through the "Kisan Card."

He highlighted the increased area sown and a record wheat sowing as evidence of the government's success. He also criticised the previous government, referring to it as "Banana Akron Plus," for neglecting the farmers' welfare.

A key focus of the government's strategy is

empowering the private sector, Mr Kirmani said, announcing Rs100bn in interest-free loans to the private sector and flour mills, enabling them to purchase 40% of the wheat stock.

He also highlighted the implementation of Electronic Warehouse Receipts (EWR), enabling farmers to store wheat for up to four months and access immediate cash through bank loans using warehouse receipts.

The Punjab cabinet has further solidified its commitment by approving an amendment to the Food Grains Licensing Control Order 1957, mandating 25% wheat procurement by flour mills, with the threat of license cancellation for non-compliance.

The cabinet also approved the implementation of EWR, with the government bearing storage costs, to provide farmers with greater flexibility and financial security.

Minister Kirmani concluded by stating that wheat procurement will commence from all locations to help stabilise prices and ensure farmers receive their due compensation.

Senate panel seeks plan to stem invoicing fraud

ISLAMABAD: The Senate Standing Committee on Finance on Wednesday directed the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) and the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) to present a workable plan to tackle the widespread over-invoicing and under-invoicing of imports and exports, following confirmation of a Re100 billion fraud and trade-based money laundering under the guise of solar panel imports.

A meeting of the committee, chaired by former Finance minister Sadeq Manderwala of the PPP, adopted a report of the Sub-committee on Money-laundering Issues Related to Solar Panels. It recommended granting one month to the SBP and FBR to finalise a report outlining a future course of action to curb over-invoicing and under-invoicing, according to an official announcement.

The subcommittee, led by PTI

Senator Moin ul Ahsan, uncovered startling revelations of over Re100bn in fraud and money-laundering carried out under the guise of solar panel imports by more than 80 companies—most of them Chinese firms. It also criticised the SBP for not being forthcoming on the subject.

According to the subcommittee, the FBR disclosed significant findings of over-invoicing and trade-based money-laundering linked to solar panel imports. In one case, the FBR revealed that the owner of a company involved in these imports had falsely presented himself as a salaried individual in an official documentation.

On a broader scale, the FBR highlighted alarming instances of over-invoicing and suspicious transactions, the Senate Secretariat said. The companies in question had collectively performed approximately Re100bn for solar imports, of which Re20bn was identified as over-invoicing. In total, the FBR

flagged 80 suspicious companies, with 60 of them alone accounting for the Re100bn in inflated transactions.

As a result of the over-invoicing revelations, the FBR has filed 81 FIRs against the implicated companies.

The committee members, while discussing a private member's bill titled "The Income Tax (Amendment) 2025," introduced by Senator Zaeem Khan, unanimously agreed to recommend that the matter be referred to the National Assembly speaker to determine whether the bill qualifies as a money bill.

The committee also deliberated on the federal government's righting policy, with members expressing concern over its clarity and execution. While the objective of reducing bureaucratic excess was acknowledged, several questions were raised regarding its potential impact on current government employees.

Senator Sherry Rehman

emphasised the need for transparency, inquiring whether the abolishment of posts would affect only vacant positions or also include existing staff, particularly long-serving contract employees. She stressed the importance of receiving a comprehensive assessment of the policy's financial and human resource implications by early June.

Committee Chairman Saleem Mandriwalla reiterated the necessity of clearly identifying both the departments being merged and the employees affected, to ensure a comprehensive understanding of the policy's ramifications.

Officials informed the committee that relevant data was still being compiled, with a final report expected by June 30.

The SBP deputy governor briefed the meeting on the government's ongoing efforts to restructure power sector structure debt and reported that negotiations were underway with banks to raise approx. Re1.2trn.

FBR sets deadlines for e-integration

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has asked all registered taxpayers to integrate their invoicing systems electronically.

Through SBQ709 of 2025, the FBR set compliance deadlines for corporate and non-corporate taxpayers to complete the integration.

According to the notification, the corporate registered persons must start

sending digital invoices no later than May 1, 2025, while non-corporate registered persons must complete electronic integration by June 1.

The SBQ further explained that all registered persons must connect their existing invoicing hardware and software directly with the FBR's centralised computerised system. This integration must be facilitated either through a licensed integrator approved by the FBR or via Pakistan Revenue Automation Private Ltd.

PSX loses 1,204 points after IMF trims forecast

Govt looks to end FED on property transactions

FBR chairman says IMF has no objection to move

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) has submitted a summary to the federal cabinet requesting the withdrawal of Federal Excise Duty (FED) on property transactions.

"We will issue a notification after the cabinet approves the summary," FBR Chairman Raftab Langrial told Dawn on Wednesday.

In the Finance Act 2024, the government has imposed 3 per cent FED on flats, 5pc on land plots and 7pc on mansions.

Currently, property transactions are subject to multiple taxes, including Capital Gains Tax (CGT), Capital Value Tax (CVT), Advance Tax (AT), 25MKR, and Urban Improvement Property Tax.

The CGT applies to profits from property sales, with rates varying for flats and mansions.

However, the chairman said that he did not have the exact figures of the FED collection from the property transactions.

Real estate experts predict a spike in market activity if the FED is abolished since it will make property transactions more affordable for buyers and sellers.

Reforms needed to ensure sustainable growth: Aurangzeb

WASHINGTON: Finance Minister Muhammad Aslamgir on Wednesday said that the country has achieved economic stability through "tough decisions" and ongoing economic reforms over the past year, emphasising that the objective was not stabilisation alone but "sustainable and inclusive growth".

He was speaking at a forum hosted by the Centre for Global Development (CGD) during the IMF-World Bank Spring Meetings.

In a separate engagement on the sidelines of the meetings, the finance minister met Sultan bin Abdulrahman Al-Maktoum, the top official at the Saudi Fund for Development (SFD), and requested expedited disbursements under the Saudi oil facility.

The facility, agreed earlier this year, enables Pakistan to defer up to \$1.2 billion in oil import payments, providing vital support for the country's foreign reserves during its fragile economic recovery.

"The minister requested expedited disbursements under the Saudi oil facility and assured the provision of evidence of oil shipments," the finance ministry said in a statement.

At the CGD forum, Mr Aslamgir underscored his government's commitment to structural reforms. "Reforms in taxation, privatisation, energy governance and other sectors will continue with full commitment," he said.

He stressed the importance of increasing exports and foreign investment: "To move our economy forward, we must increase exports and attract foreign investment into export-oriented sectors."

Mr Aslamgir also explained the rationale behind overhauling the country's tax policy: "To broaden financial resources, our top priority is to reduce reliance on the manufacturing sector and salaries class and bring other sectors into the tax net."

On international trade, Mr Aslamgir said that a high-level Pakistani delegation will visit the United States for constructive talks on tariff issues.

He also welcomed the strong participation of the US delegation in the minerals and mining conference held in Pakistan two weeks ago, calling it "encouraging" and reflective of the direction of future economic and trade relations.

Mr Aslamgir also participated in the 13th Ministerial meeting of the Coalition of Finance Ministers for Climate Action (CFMCA), where he delivered a statement emphasising that "the country was developing a Climate Prosperity Plan (CPP) and Climate Finance Strategy".

Separately, Mr Aslamgir also met with Moody's commercial team in Washington, DC, where he briefed them on Pakistan's macroeconomic outlook.

Germany halts flights carrying Afghans deemed vulnerable

BERLIN: Two flights meant to carry Afghans to Germany will not go ahead as planned this week, a government spokesman said on Wednesday amid a growing row over the initial ban.

Berlin has been periodically flying in Afghans deemed at risk of persecution and those who worked for German institutions, since the Taliban returned to power in 2021.

But calls have grown louder to halt the flights since the conservative CDU/CSU alliance won an election in February, promising a radical crackdown on irregular migration.

Four flights carrying Afghans have landed in Germany since the election, and the state of Saxony announced last week that two further flights were planned for April 23 and 25. However, German Foreign ministry spokesman Sebastian Fischer said, "As things stand at present, no further flights are planned in the next few weeks."

"Flight planning is always very complex and depends on a wide variety of factors, including whether enough people from the admissions programmes have successfully completed the visa process."

Germany's incoming government, a coalition between the conservatives and the centre-left SPD due to take office on May 6, has pledged to end the flights from Afghanistan as part of plans to end migration.

The CDU/CSU of former chancellor Friedrich Merz has firmly criticised the outgoing government for continuing to operate the flights since the election.

"We don't want any more flights from Afghanistan to Germany. We want criminals and dangerous individuals flown back to Afghanistan," said senior CDU lawmaker Jens Spahn.—AFP

US judge orders VOA funding restoration in blow to Trump

WASHINGTON: A judge on Tuesday ordered President Donald Trump's administration to restore funding to Voice of America and other US-funded media, saying its abrupt shutdown of the outlets broke the law.

The federal judge in Washington agreed to a request by the outlets' employees for a preliminary injunction, a temporary order as a court examines the legal challenge in greater depth.

Trump, who has long justified with the press and questioned the editorial rules that prohibit interference in government-funded media, issued an executive order on March 14 to eliminate the outlets.

The following day, Kurt Lake, his firebrand supporter turned adviser, began issuing notices to terminate all funding, which was appropriated by Congress.

Lake and other Trump officials are "likely to direct violation of numerous federal laws," wrote Roger Landreth, a judge for the US District Court for the District of Columbia.

The US Agency for Global Media, which supervises taxpayer-funded media, is obliged by law to redirect funds among its various outlets by five per cent or less, he wrote.—AFP

Ukraine peace deal 'very close', says Trump

US president ready to accept recognition of annexed land in Crimea as Russian territory

LONDON: US President Donald Trump said a deal to halt the Ukraine war was "very close" on Wednesday but his top Ukrainian adviser Volodymyr Zelensky told reporters his refusal to formally cede Crimea to Russia.

Trump's comments came as Vice-President JD Vance warned that the United States would "walk away" unless Russia and Ukraine agree a peace deal, and as envoys from Washington, Kyiv and European nations gathered for distinguished talks in Britain.

US media has reported that Trump is ready to accept recognition of annexed land in Crimea as Russian territory, but Zelensky told journalists this week it was Ukrainian territory and recognizing it as Russian "is against our constitution".

"It's inflammatory statements like Zelensky's that makes it so difficult to settle this war," Trump said in a post on Truth Social, add-

ing that Zelensky's remarks will do nothing but prolong the "killing field".

He added: "We are very close to a deal, but the man with 'no cards to play' should move, finally, GET IT DONE!"

Vance told reporters in India that the UN has "united" in a very explicit proposal to both the Russians and the Ukrainians: "It's time for them to either say 'yes', or for the United States to walk away from this process," he added.

The reports said the proposal was first raised at a meeting with European nations in Paris last week. But French President Emmanuel Macron's office said on Wednesday that "Ukraine's territorial integrity and European aspirations are very strong requirements for Europe".

The latest round of diplomacy comes after a fresh wave of Russian air strikes that shattered a brief Easter truce.

A Russian drone strike on a bus transporting workers in the southeastern city of Mariupol killed

more people and wounded at least 30 more, the Dniproprostroi regional governor said on Wednesday.

Ukrainian authorities also reported strikes in the regions of Kryv, Kharkiv, Poltava and Odessa. In light of the attacks, Zelensky called for an "immediate, full, and unconditional ceasefire".

In Russia, one person was reported wounded by shelling in the Belgorod region.

Work for peace?

UK Foreign Secretary David Lammy had been due to lead a meeting of foreign ministers in London on Wednesday but the talks were downgraded to "official level" — a sign of the difficulties surrounding the negotiations.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters that "it has not yet been possible to reconcile positions on any issues, which is why this meeting did not take place".

US Ukraine envoy Keith Kellogg attended, as did Macron's diplomatic adviser Emmanuel Bonne. Lammy and his Ukrainian counterpart Andriy Shevchenko and Defense Minister Rustem Minnikhanov, Zelensky aide Andriy Yermak also attended the London talks.—AFP

Global coral bleaching crisis worsens after hottest year

NEW YORK: More than four-fifths of the world's coral reefs have been affected by devastating mass bleaching spurred by record-high ocean temperatures, turning many once-colourful reefs a ghastly pale hue, scientific authorities said on Wednesday.

Bleaching is triggered by anomalies in water temperature that cause corals to expel the colourful algae living in their tissues. Without the algae's help in delivering nutrients to the corals, the corals cannot survive.

The world's fourth mass bleaching event, which scientists declared one year ago, has shown few signs of slowing down, according to the International Coral Reef Initiative and data from the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration which track reef health. Instead, it has grown to be the most widespread on record, with 85pc of reef areas — from the Indian Ocean to the Atlantic to the Pacific — subjected to intense heat stress for a duration expected to cause bleaching as of March 2025.

Last year was the hottest on record and the first to reach over 1.5 degrees Celsius warmer than pre-industrial times, contributing to unprecedented ocean heatwaves and triple the previous record number of marine bleaching events around the world.

"The magnitude and extent of the heat stress is shocking," said Michael McField, a marine scientist working in the Caribbean. "Some reefs that had thus far escaped major heat stress and was thought to be somewhat resilient, succumbed to partial mortality in 2024."

"Bleaching is always worse — as if a silent snowfall has descended on the reef," she added. Previous events in 1998, 2010, and 2014-15 saw 21pc, 37pc and 50pc of reefs subjected to bleaching-level heat stress respectively. Marine biologists had warned early last year the world's reefs were on the verge of a mass bleaching following months of record-breaking ocean heat fuelled by human-induced climate change and the El Nino climate pattern, which yields unusually warm ocean temperatures along the equator and in the Pacific.—Reuters

Musk to reduce White House role as Tesla profits plunge

NEW YORK: Elon Musk will significantly scale back his Tesla administration work in May to focus on Tesla, the billionaire announced on Tuesday as the electric vehicle maker reported a 71 percent drop in first-quarter profits.

"Probably in the next month, my time allocation to DOE will drop significantly," Musk said at the start of an earnings conference call, referring to his work for the Department of Energy Efficiency.

The company came in Tesla reported profits of \$409 million following a drop in sales that analysts said reflected brand damage due to Musk's work for President Donald Trump in slanting the US federal workforce. Revenue fell nine percent to \$19.3 billion.

The company retreated from its 2025 guidance, citing unpredictable trade policy and demand.

"Uncertainty in the automotive and energy markets continues to increase as rapidly evolving trade policy adversely impacts the global supply chain and cost structure of Tesla and our peers," the company said.—AFP

How US peace plan for Ukraine and Russia might look

WASHINGTON: The United States has piled pressure on Ukraine and Russia to find a peace agreement, with President Donald Trump and Vice-President JD Vance threatening to walk away if a deal is not made.

So what does Washington want?

Some official demands have already been made public, and media outlets have reported on several unannounced plans for a US-led accord.

Ukraine gives up territory

According to The Washington Post, the United States has offered to recognize Crimea — which Moscow annexed in 2014 in a widely condemned move — as Russian territory.

That would meet a major demand of

President Vladimir Putin, but the suggestion has enraged his Ukrainian counterpart Volodymyr Zelensky.

"There is nothing to talk about. It is against our Constitution. This is our territory," Zelensky told journalists this week.

Trump laid out at Zelensky on Wednesday, saying his position will "do nothing but prolong" the war.

Kyiv can't join Nato

The United States could guarantee to Russia that Ukraine will never join Nato, Axios reported, noting that admission to the European Union would still remain a possibility. Blocking Ukraine from joining the military alliance

has long been a demand of Putin.

Security guarantees

According to Axios, Ukraine would get a "robust security guarantee" involving an ad hoc group of European and potentially non-European countries. It does not specify how this peacekeeping operation would function, or if the United States would be involved, the outlet reported.

Sanctions and reconstruction

The Trump administration could lift long-standing sanctions on Russia under a future agreement, Axios and the Washington Post reported, citing the US proposals submitted to Ukrainian officials. Axios stated that

Ukraine would get compensation and assistance for post-war rebuilding, but did not specify how this would be funded.

US gets minerals


The US plan relies on a Trump-backed proposal that would give the United States royalty payments on profits from Ukrainian mining of resources and rare minerals, Axios reported.

Trump has framed the minerals deal as compensation for military and financial aid given to Kiev by his predecessor, Joe Biden.

Axios said the US president also wants the United States to operate the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant — the largest such facility in Europe.—AFP

Auto Shanghai showcases new EV era featuring flying cars

SHANGHAI: The world's largest auto expo opened its doors on Wednesday in Shanghai, showcasing the new electric vehicle era featuring a futuristic robot and a concept flying car.

The expo comes at a time when mounting trade barriers, driven by steep tariff increases under Trump's administration, are disrupting China's global ambitions.

With nearly 1,000 exhibitors present, foreign manufacturers are racing to show they can keep pace with the ultra-competitive Chinese firms that dominate the sector's electric revolution. Beijing's historic focus of EV and hybrid development has seen the domestic market flourish, with firms on Wednesday taking the opportunity to demonstrate cutting-edge technology and sophisticated design.

"Chinese brands are really on the forefront of pushing the technology now, and have been for a few years," said Stefan Rosan, the head of design for Lykan & Co., a joint venture between China's Geely and Volvo.

"I know that foreign firms are trying to catch up, but I would say still the industry is led through China," he said. Big crowds gathered at domestic champions BYD's booth as it unveiled five new electric vehicles, as well as a luxury SUV under its sub-brand Yangwang, and a concept sports car under another, Denza.

BYD has enjoyed a giddy five months of soaring sales after annual revenue surged in 2024, eclipsing its rival, US firm Tesla, which is not present at the show.

"It's a very competitive field," Xpeng's co-president Brian Gu said at the company's booth, where an all-electric, a humanoid robot and a concept flying car were on display.—AFP

HRW accuses Israel of indiscriminate attacks on civilians

BEIRUT Human Rights Watch accused Israel on Wednesday of "indiscriminate" attacks on civilians during its recent war with Hezbollah, saying two deadly strikes in east Lebanon should be investigated as war crimes. A Nov 27 ceasefire sought to end more than a year of hostilities between the two sides that began with Iran-backed Hezbollah's cross-border fire at Israel in support of its Palestinian ally Hamas.

More than 4,000 people were killed in Lebanon, most of them during two months of all-out war that erupted in September, according to Lebanese authorities.

Among the dead were hundreds of Hezbollah fighters and a slew of senior commanders. HRW said "two unlawful Israeli strikes" on the town of Yarza in the eastern Bekaa Valley that killed more than 30 people "were apparent indiscriminate attacks on civilians."

"At least one of the attacks used an air-dropped bomb equipped with United States-produced Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) guidance kit," it said. "The attack should be investigated as war crimes."

On Sept 25, a strike "killed a family of 23 people, all Syrians, including 13 children," HRW said, while another on Nov 1 on a two-story house "killed 10 people, including two children, one of them a year old." HRW said it "did not find any evidence of military activity or targets at either site" and that the Israeli army did not issue evacuation warnings ahead of the strikes. The rights watchdog said it had contacted the Israeli military about its findings but had "not received a response." Agency has also contacted the military for comment on the report.

HRW's Razan Khader said in the statement that "more and more evidence is emerging that Israeli forces repeatedly failed to protect civilians or adequately distinguish civilians from military targets during its strikes across Lebanon".

Washington's supply of weapons to Israel "has made the US complicit in their unlawful use", HRW added. It urged the Lebanese government to give "the International Criminal Court jurisdiction to investigate and prosecute crimes" and provide "a path for justice for grieving families". —AFP

Russia allows Taliban to have ambassador in Moscow

MOSCOW Russia said on Wednesday it will allow the Taliban authorities in Afghanistan to have an ambassador in Moscow, in a symbolic move days after it lifted a "terrorist" designation for the group.

Moscow has taken steps to normalize relations with the Taliban administration since the group seized power in Afghanistan in 2021 after the withdrawal of US troops. The Russian foreign ministry said Russian officials had held talks with Afghanistan's foreign and internal ministers.

The representatives of the Afghan leadership were informed that, following the decision announced by the Supreme Court of Russia to suspend the ban on the Taliban movement, the Russian side has decided to upgrade the diplomatic mission of Afghanistan in Moscow to the level of ambassador," it said in a statement. It added the Afghan side "expressed their deep gratitude for this step". Russia sees a potential economic partner in the Taliban authorities who praised Moscow for scrapping the "terrorism" label last week.

Taliban officials have visited Russia for high-profile events in recent years. Russia's decision to suspend the ban on the group does not equal a formal recognition for the Taliban authorities, which are seeking international legitimacy.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said on Wednesday that "the new authorities in Kabul are a reality". "We need to take this into account in order to carry out pragmatic, not ideological policy," the minister told journalists. The Afghan government is not officially recognized by any country or world body and the United Nations refers to the administration as the "Taliban de facto authorities". —AFP

Who will be the next pope? Some hints to watch for

Vatican declares nine days of mourning

VATICAN CITY No one knows who the world's Catholic cardinals will choose to succeed Pope Francis as the new leader of the global Catholic Church. But for those watching attentively, there are sometimes hints about who might emerge as the next pontiff.

The process to choose a new pope is long and secretive. Most of the world's 2,200 cardinals are called to Rome to take part. Those under the age of 80, about 175 prelates, are preparing to enter into a conclave to elect the next pontiff.

Once it starts, which by Church law should be no earlier than May 6, the cardinals will be completely shut off

from the modern world until a new pope is named.

In the meantime, they can attend public events and give interviews about what they are looking for in the next leader of the world's 1.4 billion Catholics.

"Reading the pre-conclave signs to identify papal candidates is tricky, because the signs are usually very subtle," said John Thavis, a Vatican correspondent who covered three papacies.

Pope Francis died on Monday aged 88. There is no clear frontrunner to succeed him.

As the pope was recovering from pneumonia over the Easter weekend, he asked retired cardinals over the age of 80 to provide in his place at the Vatican's various celebrations of the holiday, possibly because he did not want to signal any favorite successor.

The pope's funeral, on Saturday, April 26, will be the first big moment to watch for signs of who might be next.

Thousands, including dozens of world leaders such as US President Donald Trump and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, are expected in St Peter's Square for the ceremony. Millions more will be watching across the globe.

The cardinals attending will listen closely to the sermon given by Italian Cardinal Giacomo Bortone Re, the continental leader of the College of Cardinals and a retired Vatican official.

At the funeral of Pope John Paul II in 2005, the sermon was delivered by German Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, who offered what many thought was a stirring elevation on the late pope's life and legacy. Eleven days later, Ratzinger would be

elected as Pope Benedict XVI.

Re is 91 years old, cannot enter the conclave and is not a papal contendor. But insiders expect he might still try to offer a guide for his colleagues to follow in the way he chooses to describe Pope Francis' papacy, or in any words he uses to describe the needs of the Catholic Church today.

Hints emerging slowly

The papal funeral marks the first of nine days of mourning for the global Church. Another Mass of mourning will be held in St. Peter's Square on Sunday. That will be led by Italian Cardinal Piero Parolin, often cited as a leading papal contender.

"The church is in who enters the conclave a pope leaves a cardinal," said Christopher Bellitto, an historian at Kean University in New Jersey who specializes on the Church.

"Only popes know what is going to happen." Other hints for possible successors to Pope Francis will likely come out more slowly.

In 2013, as the cardinals gathered in Rome after Benedict's surprise resignation, some of the US prelates preparing to take part in the conclave started giving press conferences. The wider group of the world's cardinals later asked them to stop doing this briefly.

Even if there are no press conferences this time, cardinals spending time in Rome often celebrate Masses at churches across the city. The sermons they offer on those occasions could give hints of what they are thinking.

"Any signs will come in bits and pieces, or phrases used to describe what cardinals are looking for in the next pope," said Thavis.

"Words like 'openness' and 'reform' may fit certain cardinals, while 'administrative skills' and 'solid theology' may describe others," he said.

Behind closed doors

The biggest hints will come in the daily meetings the cardinals have in the week leading up to the conclave. In these meetings, known as "general congregations", the cardinals have an opportunity to speak freely and even, perhaps, to offer a vision for a future papacy under their own leadership.

In 2013, Argentine Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio offered a short reflection at one of these meetings. He said the Church, beset by sexual abuse and financial scandals, had become "sick" and the "self-referential", according to a note that was later published. He said the Church needed to

do a better job of trying to open itself up to the modern world. A few days later, Bergoglio would be elected as Pope Francis.

Nine days of mourning

The Vatican on Wednesday announced that nine days of mourning for Pope Francis will start on Saturday, the day of his funeral.

There will be prayer services every day at St Peter's Basilica for the so-called "universal church", which will last until May 4. The announcement came as Catholic cardinals met to discuss the next steps following the death of the Argentine pontiff on Monday aged 88.

No date has yet been set for the conclave, the secret meeting of cardinals aged under 80 to elect a new pope. But it has to take place between 15 and 20 days after the pontiff's death. —Reuters

Think tank accuses Iran of fortifying 'buried nuclear sites'

• UN watchdog asks Tehran to 'clarify tunnels near N-site' • Beijing backs Tehran-Washington talks

WASHINGTON Iran is ring-ing two deeply buried tunnel complexes with a massive security perimeter linked to its main nuclear complex, a report said on Wednesday, amid US and Israeli threats of attack.

The Institute for Science and International Security released its report based on recent satellite imagery as the US and Iran prepare to hold a third round of talks this weekend on a possible deal to reimpose restrictions on Iran's uranium enrichment programme.

US President Donald Trump, who put the US out of a 2015 pact designed to prevent Tehran from developing nuclear weapons, has threatened to bomb Iran unless a deal is quickly reached that would ensure that same goal. Trump's withdrawal prompted Iran to breach many of the pact's restrictions. Western powers suspect it is pursuing the capability to assemble a nuclear weapon through enrichment of uranium to high fissile purity, which Tehran denies.

David Albright, the institute's president, said the new perimeter suggested that the tunnel complexes, under construction beneath Mount Qom, Gao Le for several years, could become operational relatively soon.

Tehran has banned access to the tunnels to inspectors of the UN's International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) who are monitoring its nuclear programme. The head of the UN nuclear watchdog agency called on Wednesday on Iran to explain tunnels built around its Natanz nuclear site, while visiting four other ongoing US-Iran talks.

Grossi, who visited Tehran last week, said that all coun-

Jordan outlaws Muslim Brotherhood

AMMAN Jordan announced on Wednesday it was banning the activities of the Muslim Brotherhood, a transnational Islamist movement, accusing it of manufacturing and supplying weapons and planning to destabilize the country.

The move comes after authorities said they arrested 34 people, including members of the Brotherhood, over an alleged sabotage plot. "It has been decided to ban all activities of the so-called Muslim Brotherhood and to consider any activity carried out by it a violation of the provisions of the law," Interior Minister Momen al-Fayyad told reporters.

"It has also been decided to close any offices or headquarters used by the group, even if it is in partner-

ship with any other parties," he added.

The Muslim Brotherhood has continued to operate in Jordan despite the country's top court in 2020 ruling to dissolve it, with authorities turning a blind eye to its activities. The Brotherhood's political wing, the Islamic Action Front, is Jordan's main opposition party and the largest in parliament, having won 21 out of 130 seats in September elections.

Fayyad said Jordan would also be "discrediting the group's assets in accordance with relevant judicial rulings, prohibit the promotion of the group's ideas under penalty of legal accountability, and consider membership in it a prohibited act". The capital Amman is home to several Muslim Brotherhood offices. —AFP

Movie mogul Weinstein's retrial begins

NEW YORK Harvey Weinstein's retrial on rape and sexual assault charges got underway on Wednesday, as a prosecutor and a defense lawyer offered starkly contrasting explanations for the disgraced movie mogul's encounter with a woman who hoped to make it big in Hollywood.

Prosecutor Jennifer Lacy told jurors in a New York state court in Manhattan that Weinstein exploited his status as a Hollywood gatekeeper and power broker to prey upon and sexually abuse women, then assured their silence by holding their children hostage.

Weinstein, however,

had claimed he was

in and who was not," Lacy said in her opening statement, "He had all the power. They had none."

Prosecutors have portrayed Weinstein as a serial predator who promised career advancement in Hollywood to women, only to trap them into hotel rooms and private apartments where he compensated and attacked them.

Weinstein's lawyer Arthur Aidala rejected that characterization, saying the Oscar-winning producer had "naturally beautiful" relationships with his accusers, who ended up with him and other show business opportunities.

"They realized very quickly Harvey Weinstein, he's got the key to that room

where they all want to go," Aidala said in his opening statement, referring to career advancement.

Weinstein, 74, dressed in a dark suit and navy tie, departed after being brought into the courtroom in a wheelchair. He has pleaded not guilty to two counts of first-degree criminal sexual act and one count of third-degree rape, and could face decades in prison if convicted.

Attorney Alvin Bragg was in attendance as the retrial began.

Weinstein is being retried one year after New York's highest court overturned his 2013 rape and sexual assault conviction and 20-year prison sentence, citing errors by the trial judge. —Reuters

The operation, conducted jointly by the Indian Counter-Terrorism Department (CTD) and Frontier Corps, led to the arrest of two suspects. One injured suspect reportedly managed to flee, with efforts ongoing to apprehend him.

Misri immediately claimed responsibility for the attack.

The attack follows a similar incident last week, when three police personnel were killed and 10 others injured in a roadside improvised explosive device (IED) blast targeting a police vehicle.

Mahmoud Abbas urges Hamas to lay down arms

• Wants PA to control besieged Palestinian territory; likely to name successor soon • Israeli attacks claim 18 more lives; European powers call for end to aid blockade

GAZA CITY: Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas called upon Hamas on Wednesday to lay down arms and hand the running of Gaza to his Palestinian Authority (PA) in order to answer international doubts over the PA's role at a key moment for the region.

Abbas also urged Hamas to free all Israeli prisoners in Gaza, saying their captivity provided Israel with excuse to attack the territory. Hamas gave "the criminal occupation excuses to commit its crimes in the Gaza Strip", he said, adding that it was the one paying the price, not Israel.

Hamas must hand over the Gaza responsibilities and hand over its arms to the responsibility of the Palestinian Authority and transform into a political party," the PA chief said while addressing the central council of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) at Ramallah, the seat of the Palestinian Authority in Israeli-occupied West Bank.

Ties between Abbas's Fatah party and Hamas have been tense. While he had previously called upon Hamas to put its forces under the PA's control, he has not done so since the start of the Gaza conflict in October 2023.

The PA chief is expected this week to name a successor amid pressure from Western and Arab powers concerned about the PA's ability to play a visible long-term role in peace efforts.

Hamas has often criticised Abbas for "collaborating with Israel".

Diplomatic efforts to craft a plan for Gaza's future have focused on pushing aside Hamas, but Israel said it would not accept any role for the PA, which exercised limited autonomy in the occupied West Bank.

Pressure to name a successor

Abbas, 89, took over the Palestinian leadership after the death of veteran PLO leader Yasser Arafat in 2004. He has for years resisted naming a deputy or successor, but the conflict in Gaza has intensified pressure for him to do so.

Last month, Arab states proposed a plan for Gaza to be temporarily run by a

committee before being returned to the PA's control.

The US, European Union and Gulf monarchies expected to play a role in financing any reconstruction of Gaza have repeatedly urged PA reform.

Talks have so far failed to produce any breakthroughs, though a Hamas delegation is currently in Cairo for renewed negotiations with Egyptian and Qatari mediators.

Attack on shelter for displaced

On Wednesday, Israel continued to pound Gaza, with reports saying 18 people had been killed since dawn, including 11 in a strike on a school-turned-shelter for displaced people.

"The attack was hitting displaced people. The bombing sparked a massive blaze, and several charred bodies have since been recovered," an spokesman said, describing the attack on Yatta school, in Al Tuffah area of Gaza City.

Aid agencies estimate that the vast majority of Gaza's 2.4 million residents have been displaced due to the bombardment and 51,000 killed by Israeli forces in less than two years.

UK, France and Germany's appeal

Britain, France and Germany called on Israel on Wednesday to stop blocking humanitarian aid into Gaza, warning of "an acute risk of starvation, epidemic disease and death".

"We urge Israel to immediately restart a rapid and uninterrupted flow of humanitarian aid to Gaza in order to meet the needs of all civilians," their foreign ministers said in a joint statement. "The Israeli decision to block and from entering Gaza is intolerable."

They also criticised Israeli Defence Minister Israel Katz for politicising humanitarian aid and described Israeli plans to remain in Gaza as unacceptable. Katz said earlier Israel would continue preventing aid from entering Gaza.

The UN also warned many community kitchens providing food for displaced people were about to run out of supplies. — Agencies

Pakistani astronaut to be part of Chinese space mission

Space agency says selection process for payload specialist has begun

BEIJING: Two Pakistani astronauts will undergo training in China, with one expected to join a future mission aboard the Tiangong space station, the Chinese Manned Space Agency (CMSA) confirmed Wednesday.

The development follows a bilateral agreement signed in late February between China and Pakistan. CMSA said the selection process for the Pakistani astronauts has already begun.

"Consistent with the arrangement criteria used for Chinese astronauts selection, a three-stage process (preliminary, secondary, and final) will govern candidate selection," CMSA spokesperson Lin Xinghai said at a press conference.

Lin added that a Pakistani astronaut will join the mission as a payload specialist and conduct scientific experiments for Pakistan, in addition to standard crew duties.

The announcement came alongside China's confirmation of its latest crewed spaceflight. The Shenzhou-20 mission is scheduled to launch at 5:07pm on

Thursday from the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre, Lin said.

Leading the mission will be Chen Dong, a 55-year-old veteran astronaut and former fighter pilot who, in 2022, became the first Chinese astronaut to spend more than 200 cumulative days in orbit.

"Every space journey is very unique, so I look forward to bringing in more experience and breakthroughs in the flight," said Chen, who is embarking on his third spaceflight.

Joining Chen are first-time fliers Chen Zhangyu, 40, a former air force pilot, and Wang Jin, 35, a former space technology engineer.

The current crew aboard Tiangong is expected to return to Earth on April 29 after completing handover procedures with the Shenzhou-20 team, according to Mr Lin.

The Shenzhou-20 crew will carry out scientific experiments in physics and life sciences and install protective equipment against space debris.

China has been barred from participating in the International Space Station since 2011, when the US prohibited NASA from collaborating with Chinese space agencies. Since then, Beijing has sought to build partnerships with other countries — including Pakistan — in its expanding space programme. — AFP

China says 'door open' to trade talks after Trump signals tariffs will fall

Xi warns trade wars undermine legitimate rights and interests of all countries, impact world economic order

BEIJING: China said on Wednesday the door was "wide open" for trade talks with Washington, a day after US President Donald Trump signalled the possibility of a "substantial" lowering of tariffs on Beijing.

Bringing further relief to global markets sparked by his aggressive trade policies, Trump also announced the last no intention of firing US Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell.

Since returning to the White House in January, Trump has imposed additional tariffs of 10% per cent on many products from China. These include duties initially imposed over China's alleged role in the fungal supply

chain and later over practices Washington deemed unfair.

Beijing has responded with sweeping counter-tariffs of 125pc on 128 goods, but said it was willing to engage in trade talks. "China pointed out early on that there are no winners in tariff wars and trade wars," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told a daily news conference in Beijing. "The door for talks is wide open."

Chinese President Xi Jinping also warned on Wednesday that trade wars "undermine the legitimate rights and interests of all countries, hurt the multilateral trading system, and impair the world economic order", state media said.

The retort from Beijing comes after Trump acknowledged that 105pc was a "very high" level and that would "come down substantially". "They will not be anywhere near that number" but "it won't be zero", he said.

Aurangzeb to lead panel to improve govt performance

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif has formed a high-level committee headed by Finance Minister Muhammad Aslam to improve government performance.

A source in the Prime Minister's Office told Dawn that a notification has been issued regarding the formation of the committee.

The committee would implement a formula of "performance-based rewards". The source said, adding that the policy already introduced in the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) would also be implemented in other state institutions and Federal ministries.

The committee would devise short and long-term performance plans for the state institutions and ministries and prepare its report for Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif within 30 days, according to the source.

The committee to be headed by the finance minister would have other members including federal ministers for energy, climate change, chairman FBR and others.

PM returns from Turkey

On Wednesday, PM Shehbaz returned to the country after completing his two-day official visit to Turkey.

Soon after his return, the premier expressed deep concern over the issue of an earthquake in Turkey. He said he was praying for the safety of Turkish brothers and sisters.

"Pakistan stands ready to offer all possible assistance to help in this natural calamity," the PM said in a statement.

On the other hand, PM Shehbaz strongly condemned the terrorist attack on polio vaccination team in Mastung.

In a statement, the PM expressed deep concern over the martyrdom of Lewis personnel deployed for the security of the polio vaccinators.

He said the terrorists who harm the lives and properties of innocent people were enemies of humanity and would be brought to justice. He said such incidents could not shake the government's unwavering commitment to eradicating polio from the country.

The Regional Reference Laboratory for Polio Eradication at the National Institute of Health confirmed the polio virus case from Torkhar district of KP. It was this year's second case from the province and seventh case from across Pakistan.

An official of polio programme said, "The second nationwide polio campaign of the year is currently in progress in the country from April 21 to 27, aiming to vaccinate 45.4 million children under the age of five across the country. This will be followed by another nationwide

campaign from May 26 to June 1. "District Torkhar is included in both these vaccination campaigns, along with all other districts of the country."

The official appealed to parents to ensure their children aged five years and less receive repeated doses of the polio vaccine to protect them from this crippling disease.

"The ongoing polio campaign is a critical opportunity to safeguard children against this viral disease," he said.

Polio is a highly infectious disease caused by the virus that invades the nervous system, and causes paralysis or even death.

While there is no cure for polio, vaccination is the most effective way to protect children from this crippling disease. Each time a child under the age of five is vaccinated, their protection against the virus is increased.

Repeated vaccinations have protected millions of children from polio, allowing almost all countries in the world to become polio-free.

Pakistan and Afghanistan are the only countries which are reporting polio cases.

Powerful quake rocks Istanbul

ISTANBUL: A 6.2-magnitude earthquake hit the Sea of Marmara near Istanbul on Wednesday, with the impact felt across Turkey's largest city where people rushed onto the streets.

There were no immediate reports of injuries or damage, officials said, but the quake was followed by at least eight others, Turkey's AFAD disaster management agency said. The initial quake struck at 12:07pm at a depth of 6.9km under the sea, which lies to the south of the city, AFAD added.

"An earthquake of 6.2 magnitude occurred in Silivri, Sea of Marmara, Istanbul," Interior Minister Ali Yerlikaya said on X, adding that it was felt in the surrounding provinces.

It was followed by eight others with magnitudes of 3.5 to 5.9.

As buildings shook, people rushed onto the streets where crowds of worried-looking people stared at their mobile phones for information or made calls.

"I just felt earthquake, I've got to get out," a shaken-looking decorator said while rushing out of a Istanbulite apartment where he was working near the city's Galata Tower, who did not want to give his name.

Videos posted by the state news agency Anadolu showed the minute of a mosque in the Beylikduzu district just west of the historic peninsula staying during

the initial quake, but there were no reports of any buildings collapsing in the sprawling city of 16 million people, the building was empty and had been abandoned decades ago.

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said he was "following the developments closely".

The tremor could be felt as far away as Bulgaria, according to AFP journalists in the capital Sofia.

Around 20,000 people were killed in two quakes that devastated Turkey's densely populated northeast in 1999 as the eastern strand of the fault line ruptured.—AFP



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Late Nunes strike lifts City to thrilling win over Villa

MANCHESTER: Manchester City's Matheus Nunes scored a priceless stoppage-time winner to salvage a crucial 2-1 Premier League victory over Aston Villa on Tuesday in their breathless chase for a Champions League berth next season.

The teams appeared to be heading for a draw after Marcus Rashford's penalty was called out Bernardo Silva's goal in the first half, but Nunes fired home Jeremy Doku's cross in the 90th minute to lift City two places to third in the table on 61 points.

Pop-Garcia's men, however, have played one more game than the three teams directly behind them, while Villa, who have lost 15 consecutive games at the Etihad Stadium, remained seventh on 57 points in the crowded top of the table.

"We are not used to [scoring late wins], so I'm really, really happy for the goal that we scored at the end, because we

are in the last four or five games, and a positive win to salvage a crucial qualification," Garca told Sky Sports.

With the race for a top-four finish approaching a tense climax, Portugal mid-fielder Nunes, converted to right-back late, could not have picked a better time to net his first league goal for City.

With four games left, City will remain at least fifth even if fourth-placed Nottingham Forest, fifth-placed Newcastle and sixth-placed Chelsea each win their games in hand.

After winning the Premier League six times in the previous seven seasons, City have been reduced to fighting for a place in the Champions League at a time of year when they are usually in the title hunt.

City's decline has already been remarkable enough, but enduring a first season without Champions League action since

2018-19 would be a rare low and this was a vital step in avoiding that fate.

City will turn their attention to the FA Cup semi-final against Nottingham Forest at Wembley on Sunday, while Villa must bounce back from a painful loss in their own last-four clash with Crystal Palace on Saturday.

Thus Emery's Villa were eliminated from the Champions League quarter-finals last week after narrowly failing in their bid for a dramatic fightback against Paris St Germain in the second leg.

"Over 90 minutes [Man City] dominated more, but we played a good competitive match," Emery said. "Take a lot of positive things and now is a moment to be positive. We can't waste time now, we have to keep going."

City were ahead in the seventh minute when Dusan Tadic missed by Villa right-back Matty Cash before cutting the ball back for an onrushing Silva, whose stinging strike from 10 yards was too powerful for Emiliano Martínez's awkward attempted save to keep out.

Rashford, who had a shot clatter off the post 10 seconds into the game, pulled Villa level from the penalty spot in the 18th minute, after VAR determined Rollin Dako clipped Jacob Ramsey from behind with his right leg. Rashford calmly sent keeper Sergio Ortega the wrong way before slotting home.

City had 14 shots to Villa's seven before clinching a deserved victory when Dako drove down the left-hand side and squared the ball for Nunes arriving at the back post.

BARCELONA: Barcelona reached closer to the La Liga title with a hard-fought 1-0 win over Mallorca on Tuesday which took them seven points clear of Real Madrid at the top of the table to seven points with five games to go.

Spain international Dani Olmo slotted home inside the first minute of the second half to help Barca turn up the heat on second-placed champion Real, who have a game in hand.

Hans Flick's side, aiming for a potential quadruple, outplayed the visitors but could not extend their lead at the Olympic stadium as goalkeeper Leo Roman made save after save.

"Their goalkeeper had a great game," Barcelona midfielder Gavi told Movistar Plus. "We had the chance to take advantage and took it. It's football. We trained, worked hard, kept going and the goal finally came. We played a great game overall and it's very happy for the players who stepped up."

Barca dominated proceedings despite Flick deciding to rest several key starters ahead of Saturday's Copa del Rey final against rivals Real. The coach handed former teenage prodigy Álvaro Pachón his first start since October and deployed David Poch on the left of the defence, with Ferran Torres up front in place of injured top-scorer Robert Lewandowski.

Barcelona created several chances in the first half but no Roman put on a show between the posts to keep them at bay.

They finally managed to break the deadlock shortly after the interval thanks to a fine piece of individual skill from Olmo, who took the ball in a tight space inside the box and quickly fired a left-foot shot into the bottom corner before Mallorca's defenders could challenge him.

The win lifted Barca to 76 points at the top of the standings with Mallorca seventh, in a Europa League qualification spot, on 44 points.

After Saturday's Clásico in Sevilla, Barca will face last-placed Valladolid before hosting Real in a month-waiting showdown that could decide the title on May 11.—Agencies

In one of his first interviews since sustaining severe facial injuries in the accident in 2022, Flintoff admitted he initially found it hard to return to public life.

The 47-year-old ex-England all-rounder said it took him "10 goes to leave my bed room" due to anxiety on his first morning as

an assistant coach with the national team in 2023.

"That day in Cardiff, it took me 10 goes to leave my bed room. I couldn't get out of the room," he told The Times in an interview with former England captain Mike Atherton.

"I was so anxious and worried. I eventually went down to breakfast, sat down and chatted with Steve Topley and then Jon Butter.

"I had to go back to my room to get my baseball bat and I was waiting for the lib-

again and heard footsteps. I knew it would be [England captain] Ben Stokes."

"I didn't really know him then. I've built a great relationship with him since, but I was anxious about that, standing in the lift with him."

"In the dressing room, Jon Root came over, one of the best men you'll ever meet, and everyone made me feel so welcome."

"Slowly but surely I started to find my feet. And sitting on the balcony and being pictured. Even the press were nice about me,

it's amazing what an accident can do."

Flintoff was driving a Morgan Super 3 three-wheeled sports car when it overturned and crashed off the Top Gear test track during filming.

PSG draw at Nantes to stay unbeaten

NANTES: Paris St Germain had to settle for a 1-1 draw at Nantes in a rearranged Ligue 1 game on Tuesday, keeping the champions on course to become the first team to go unbeaten through an entire season in the French top flight.

The stalemate stretched PSG's unbeaten away league run to 29 matches, breaking the long-standing record across Europe's top five leagues set by AC

"We never let our heads go down. It is a really well-deserved point," added Rueda, who described PSG's unbeaten away record as "impressive".—Agencies

Sinner doesn't deserve any hate, says Draper

LONDON: British Jack Draper has given his backing to world number one Jannik Sinner over the doping controversy which saw the Italian accept a three-month ban and said he does not deserve any of the hate he gets.

Sinner accepted the ban in February following a deal with the World Anti-Doping Agency, which had challenged a tribunal decision to clear him after two positive tests.

The 23-year-old three-times Grand Slam champion has not played since winning the Australian Open in January.

"When people ask about him, or anyone, I'll tell the truth. I think Jannik is a really, really genuine, nice person," Draper told The Guardian and BBC in a joint interview published on Tuesday.

"In this situation I'm sure that he would have absolutely zero idea of anything. That's just the way life goes sometimes there's mistakes."

"In terms of actually how I feel about him as a person, I think it's important for people to know and recognise that this guy's very, very kind-hearted and a good human being. So he doesn't deserve any of the hate that he gets."

World number six Draper, also 23, practised with Sinner at the Tennis Club de Beausoleil in France. Sinner was cleared to return to training from April 11.

"If you can train with anyone, it's got to be probably the best in the world, right? He's obviously had a bit of time off, but he's playing at an incredible level still," Draper said.

"I'm looking forward to having him back on the tour, because I think his presence has been missed. It was great to be with him for a few days and get some good sparring!"—Reuters

Player dies after collapsing ahead of South African league game

Infant dies, seven hurt as water tanker hits van

KARACHI: An infant boy was killed while seven others, including six women, were injured when a water tanker hit a van in Gulshan-e-Iqbal on Wednesday evening, police and rescue services officials said.

Street Teller 8810 Alim Khan Abbasi told Dawn that the heavy vehicle hit the van near Aljannah marriage hall.

The killed child was identified as one-and-a-half-year-old Sabir Nauman. The injured were Asif Barkat, 30, Rakhtawar Farisal, 37, Erum, 26, Amina Ghani Khan, 50, Kamala Hussain, 50, Sakina Nauman, 35, and Nauman, 22.

The officer said that the accident occurred apparently due to speeding. However, the police were further investigating the case.

The SHO claimed that the driver responsible for the incident was arrested and the tanker seized.

The body and injured were shifted to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre.

Police Inspector Dr Samanullah Syed told Dawn that the condition of two women was critical as they had sustained serious injuries.

Meanwhile, police on Wednesday claimed to have arrested a man and his daughter for their alleged involvement in a robbery case.

Central SSP Zeshan Shafiq Siddiqui said the New Karachi police arrested a suspect who used his daughter to search a motorcycle at gunpoint. He added that they were arrested with the help of CCTV footage.

The suspect was identified as Bilal Siraj and his daughter as Sharmila.

10 years after Sabeen Mahmud's murder, family chooses her legacy over justice

• Mother of slain activist says she devoted all these years to serving people instead of seeking justice solely for Sabeen • Appeals of five militants sentenced to death by military court in 2016 still pending before high court over jurisdiction issue

KARACHI: Ten years after the murder of prominent social activist Sabeen Mahmud, there seems to be little hope for justice as her family has shifted focus towards carrying forward her legacy instead of seeking accountability.

On April 24, 2004, Sabeen Mahmud was shot dead in a targeted attack as she left The Second Floor (T2F), a literary and cultural space she had founded, after hosting a seminar on the disappearance of political activists in Balochistan.

The Counter-Terrorism Department had arrested five militants after a couple of weeks to the murder and in 2016, a military court handed down death sentence to them. However, even after nine years, the military

court's verdict is yet to be implemented.

Mahmud's mother, mother of the slain activist who accompanied her daughter on the fatal day and suffered bullet wounds, told Dawn when the attack took place, human rights activists and senior lawyers visited her and urged her to pursue the case.

"I asked them, will my efforts fit the justice system of this country? If the answer is yes, I am ready to dedicte 10 to 20 years of my life to it. I want justice for Pakistan, not just for Sabeen," she said.

She recalled being told that pursuing the case would bring her closure, but the question, "Can any mother truly find closure in her lifetime?"

"It felt it was better to devote these years to serving people instead. I have been working on mental health, parenting, and have also worked with women prisoners, conducting

sessions where many of them promised me they would show more love and understanding towards the situations of their own and other prisoners' children," she added.

Remembering her bond with her daughter, 71-year-old Mahmood said it was more like a friendship, adding that Sabeen was a bright young woman whose value system was rooted in honesty and justice.

She dedicated much of her 40 years to working on social issues, and during that time, she would often receive threats, her mother said.

Talking about that fateful day, she recalled: "I didn't sleep in T2F for some time, but that day I felt a strange sense, as if I must go." Mahmood, who was in the car when the attack took place, said as their vehicle

Sindh reports year's ninth rabies case amid vaccine shortage, rise in canine population

Around 5,400 dog-bite patients treated at two Karachi hospitals, officials say

KARACHI: Amid government failure to address vaccine shortage and control canine population, the number of rabies cases recorded this year in the province rose to nine on Wednesday when a man affected by the deadly virus was brought to the Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre (JPMMC). Six of the nine patients hatched from the interior parts of Sindh, sources said.

They added that the patient with a his-

tory of dog-bite was brought to the emergency department with hydrocephalus — a clinical sign of human rabies.

He was bitten by a dog over a month back in Qasim. The family told us that the patient couldn't get vaccinated in their hometown. This was the sixth rabies case at the hospital, a JPMMC doctor told Dawn on the condition of anonymity.

The patient briefly remained in the isolation ward before the family took him away against the doctors' advice, he added.

Sources said another patient with a history of dog-bite was brought dead to the hospital the same day. "Since the cause of death wasn't known, we can't say he died of rabies," an official said.

The sources said six rabies' patients who arrived at the JPMMC hatched from Baloch, Sindh, Ghorkh, Quetta, Mewat,

Gochi in Karachi and Balochi Chowki.

Officials said the JPMMC and Indus Hospital treated over 5,400 victims of dog bite — 2,400 and over 3,000 — during the current year.

Sources said the Indus Hospital has seen three rabies' cases this year. Of them, two patients hatched from the interior areas of Sindh. Last year, over 15,000 dog-bite cases were treated at the hospital, which also saw eight deaths caused by rabies.

The Civil Hospital Karachi has seen over 10,000 dog-bite cases last year with no death from rabies.

According to sources, dozen of dog-bite victims daily report at the city's tertiary care hospitals.

A majority of them are brought with deep wounds requiring immediate administration of life-saving rabies immunoglobulin (RIG) along with the

vaccine. Unfortunately, the required medicines are available at a few hospitals in the province, leading to deaths in several cases.

People's misery is compounded by the fact that the provincial government has failed to put in place a humane system — mass dog vaccination and sterilization — to control growing canine population despite the loss of so many precious lives every year.

According to experts, deaths from rabies infection are preventable with prompt post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) by stopping the virus from reaching the central nervous system.

Rabies can be completely prevented if the wound is immediately and thoroughly flushed and washed with soap and flowing water, followed by an effective antiviral vaccine series and RIG injection into each bite wound.

Sindh nominates ex-irrigation official as Irsa's federal member

HYDERABAD: The Sindh government has recommended the name of a retired government official to the federal ministry of water resources for appointment as the federal member from Sindh in the Indus River System Authority (Irsa).

Irsa has four members from each province in addition to a federal member. Sindh had its federal member in Irsa 15 years ago when Basir Ahmed Dahnar served in the position between Oct 2007 and Oct 2010.

The name of retired chief engineer Shakil Hussain Wadhu was okayed by Sindh Irrigation Secretary Zaid Khan and Irrigation Minister Jam Khan Sherwani last week.

With the approval from the Sindh chief minister, the official summary for his name is said to have been sent to the federal water ministry.

Mr Wadhu was recommended for a period of three years in pursuance of a Chief Executive Order issued by Gen Pervez Musharraf on July 10, 2000.

The Sindh High Court in its order passed on a petition on April 18, challenging the appointment of the incumbent "federal member" in Irsa Asjad Imtiaz, observed that it was expected that before next date of hearing, a federal member from Sindh would be appointed as already had been decided by the court in its judgement on May 12, 2012 on a petition.

Mr Asjad has been serving on the position since October 2002 for yet another term.

According to a source in Irsa, the summary for the appointment of the retired engineer was not allowed to be processed in the past. Consequently, sitting federal member Asjad Imtiaz continued to hold the office.

PPP Senator and Senator Zameer Chumro filed a writ of quo warranto before the SHC through Gurban Ali Murtuza, challenging Mr Asjad's appointment and asked the court to declare his appointment illegal. The petitioner also challenged water availability certificate (WAC) issued by Irsa on Jan 26, 2004 for the Cholistan canal project. Upon which the court had passed an interim order suspending the certificate.

CS orders probe into demolition of heritage building

KARACHI: Another heritage building located in the salubrious part of Clifton is being partially demolished.

Taking serious notice of the demolition of the heritage Khawas House in Clifton, Sindh Chief Secretary Asif Hyder Shah on Wednesday directed the commissioner to conduct a detailed inquiry into the matter and submit a comprehensive report within 72 hours.

He also instructed that if any irregularities were found during the investigation into the demolition of the heritage building located on plot No. FT-4014, Bath Island Road, strict action must be taken against the responsible individuals and officials.

The chief secretary expressed grave concern over the incident and emphasised that the protection of cultural and historical heritage was of utmost importance.

He warned that any negligence or unlawful actions concerning heritage properties will not be tolerated and will be met with appropriate legal consequences. — Staff Reporter

KARACHI: Former prime minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi has said there is no better education than being in jail.

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Moot warns against unregulated use of chemical fertilisers

HYDERABAD: Experts at the 1st International Soil Science Conference that concluded in Sindh Agriculture University, Tandojam, on Wednesday warned that unregulated use of chemical fertilisers was impacting soil productivity and called for formulation of a national soil protection policy focusing on climate resilience, conservation of natural resources and promotion of local agriculture.

They recommended that soil fertility and human health as well as integration of modern technologies, especially Artificial Intelligence (AI) into university curricula should be considered national priorities.

They said that agricultural land was not only vital for crop production but it also played a critical role in environmental balance, food security and biodiversity.

They said that comprehensive national policies must be developed to ensure soil protection, advocated reducing excessive use of chemical fertilisers and promoting organic fertilisers, bio-saline techniques and biological measures.

They recommended developing GIS-based soil maps and launching mobile laboratories, training programs, and awareness campaigns at district and union council levels.

Lawyers' sit-in enters seventh day as Sindh-wide protest against canals continues

SUKkur: Lawyers' sit-in at Bahawalpur bypass on National Highway in Khairpur entered the sixth consecutive day on Wednesday as activists of nationalist and religious parties continued protests against federal government's plan for the construction of six canals on the Indus River by blocking highways and roads with shacks and staging rallies in several Sindh towns.

In Thatta, activists of Janmat Ulema-i-Islam Fazl staged a sit-in on National Highway at Mardhi bypass where the party's Sindh general secretary, Maulana Riazul Majeed Saeedi, demanded immediate withdrawal of corporate farming and canalisation projects.

He warned that the party's protest movement would intensify if authorities failed to reverse the decision and announced a phased plan of his party to block highways across Sindh, beginning with Karimabad-Kondiwar section of the highway on April 24, followed by Ghelai on April 25 and Sukkur on April 26.

He said that federal ministers had now approached the party seeking dialogue but the talks would begin only after a formal notification had been issued cancelling the canal project.

He said the canal projects were unconstitutional as they had bypassed key regulatory bodies, including the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (CPEC), the Council of Common Interest (CCI), and the Indian River System Authority (IRS).

The party chief Yasir Shah and other leaders demanded abolition of Special

Investment Facilitation Council and repeal of the Board of Investment Amendment Act 2023.

Shah said that institutions like the CCI were dominated by Punjab's rulers, sidelining the interests of smaller provinces. Corporate farming under SIPC was the glaring fault, he said.

He criticised the PPP for misleading Sindhis with concocted statements about canals, asserting that the people of Sindh would continue their peaceful struggle.

He reiterated the party's demands for revocation of Isha's water availability certificates, repeal of the Poa Act, Board of Investment Amendment Act 2023, and 2016 Amendment.

Now, federal ministers were trying to weaken the movement by offering negotiations on the issue but Sindhis people would not fall for their insincere offer and defeat their conspiracy.

PPP leaders meet protesters

Lawyers' leaders asked PPP delegation, who visited parts of the Bahawalpur bypass, Khairpur district, that the ruling party should give an ultimatum to the federal government and take a decision either to be guided by people or with the federal government.

The delegation comprising PPP provincial president Nasir Khanlak, veteran leader Khurshid Shah and his son Farzad Shah invited lawyers' leaders to participate in the party's procession in Sukkur.

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AT, CDA activists join lawyers' sit-in

A large convoy of Green Democratic Alliance activists led by GDA Sindh General Secretary Sardar Riazat, GDA Sindh President Sajauq Iqayat Riazat and others reached Bahawalpur and joined lawyers' sit-in.

A large number of workers of Aravali Tehreek and Sardaryani Tehreek led by advocate Rajil Hussain Malhar, AT central general secretary, and Umrao Khanzada, Sardaryani Tehreek's central president, participated in the sit-in at Bahawalpur.

Another sit-in in progress in Karorhuk

Another sit-in staged by Lawyers' Alliance and All Parties Movement on Karorhuk section of the National Highway entered its third day.

Lawyers Abdul Ghani Bajwa, Amanullah Bajwa, Dileep Singh, Zaroor Singh Bajwa and others, who led the sit-in stressed until and unless the order to cancel the controversial canals was issued, the protest would continue.

SHC orders departmental proceedings against IO in teacher's murder case

LARKANA: A single bench of the Sindh High Court Larkana circuit asked the SSP of Qasim-Shahdadkot on Wednesday to initiate departmental proceedings against Staff Inspector Riaz Ali, the investigation officer (IO) in the murder case of Sadaf Hasloo, for negligence in the probe and submit a report on or before the next date of hearing.

A young teacher, Sadaf was allegedly killed by her fiancé, a serving police officer, in Qasim-Shahdadkot 16 days ago after she declined to marry him.

Riaz Ali, upon being confronted, was asked whether any digital evidence, including video content circulated on social media, had been collected.

He expressed his inability in that regard. It appears that the said officer has failed to perform his duties diligently and has conducted a substandard investigation. He has also failed to arrest the accused named in the FIR, the court said.

It further noted that on the last date of hearing, the SSP Qasim-Shahdadkot was directed to constitute a police team under his direct supervision.

The bench said that today (Wednesday), Qasim SSP Sardar submitted that despite their best efforts, the

accused had not been apprehended yet.

This demonstrates that the SSP Qasim-Shahdadkot has not fulfilled his responsibilities as expected by this court.

During the course of proceedings, the Qasim-Shahdadkot SSP appeared before the court and undertaken to effect the arrest of the accused nominated in the FIR prior to the next date of hearing. He has responded time for the arrest.

The request was allowed. Accordingly, SSP Qasim-Shahdadkot was directed to ensure the arrest of the accused no later than before the next date of hearing. In case of failure, he shall appear before this court in person on the next date of hearing.

Furthermore, on the last date of hearing (April 21, 2025), the ECP was directed to initiate a formal inquiry into the conduct of the Larkana SSP for alleged gross negligence and dereliction of duty, which purportedly contributed to the tragic murder of Ms Sadaf Hasloo, an educated young woman.

Pursuant to these directions, Larkana SSP Ahmed Faizal Chaudhry appeared on Wednesday and submitted parsimonious counters, which were taken on record.

He submitted that the incident occurred within the jurisdiction of Qasim-Shahdadkot district and that substantial efforts were made by his department to protect

the life of the deceased.

He also asserted that as the incident did not fall within his jurisdiction, no lapses could be attributed on his part. He further submitted that full protection was provided to the deceased.

In light of the above explanation, the reply submitted by SSP Larkana is found to be satisfactory, the court said. Consequently, the inquiry against him, as directed in the previous order dated 21.04.2025, is hereby recalled and withdrawn, the order said.

WAP condemns inexperience of Sindh police

The Women's Action Forum (WAF) has condemned the inexperience of Sindh police over failure to arrest the murderer(s) of Sadaf Hasloo.

In its statement, issued in Hyderabad, the WAF said that inability to apprehend the killer even after 15 days had become a glaring example of district police's failure and inexperience.

Car owners face double whammy after freak hailstorm

Prices of spare parts shoot up, car dealers, mechanics estimate 'over 1,000 vehicles' damaged

ISLAMABAD: The recent surprise-delivered hailstorms in the federal capital has brought a blow not only to the spare parts dealers of Islamabad but also to the dealers in Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, since the local markets had run out of stock for wind-screens and lights.

However, this situation has put the car owners in a tough spot, who have to pay extra for repairs while also compromising on the quality of products.

At the same time, the freak weather event has also exposed loopholes in the insurance sector of the country, as most of the victims have not been compensated by the companies.

While no official data has been compiled by the authorities, the mechanics and the spare parts dealers in the twin

cities estimate that more than 1,000 vehicles suffered minor or major damage due to the hailstorms.

On April 16, all areas of Islamabad city in the foothills of Margalla witnessed an unexpected hailstorm, where hailstones as large as golf balls (around 1.5 inches in diameter) hammered the city, damaging cars and other types of property.

Fearing the reoccurrence of the same weather pattern, most car dealers are now keeping their vehicles — parked on the roads — covered with mats and other material. The hailstorm left a trail of damage in its wake, mostly damaging vehicles.

In a rare spirit of corporate solidarity, the auto sectorarians in the Pakistani market announced generous repair discounts for the affected vehicle owners.

Social media campaigns were launched by makers Honda, Suzuki, MG, JAC, BYD, Kia, and Audi, announcing exclusive after-sales service packages. Meanwhile, the key existing players in the auto sector Suzuki and Honda did not offer any such incentive.

Some companies even started discounts of up to 50 per cent on labour

charges and 10 per cent on spare parts, including the windshields, rear screen etc, exclusively for the victims of the hailstorms. However, in the open market, the prices of spare parts shot up. Not just the parts, but the labour cost also significantly increased.

"Our Honda Civic suffered from a shattered windscreen and multiple dents in the E-11 area," said Zafar Hussain, resident of E-11 Islamabad, adding, "The mechanic was demanding Rs200,000 for the complete work — we have decided to pull the car for a month till the market cools down."

Incidentally, even the mechanics were victims of exploitation by the spare parts dealers, who raised the average rate by Rs6,000 to 8,000 per windscreen. Mohammad Asif, a mechanic in G-8, said that he tried to call one dealer in Faisalabad as well as one in Peshawar and they told him that all windscreens had been bought by dealers in Islamabad. "Windscreens are the least sold items in Islamabad during normal days," he said, adding that for this reason, the market is being manipulated.

Besides the expensive parts, the vehicle owners also became victims of deceptive marketing, with locally made products being labelled as imported ones.

"But the issue is what can we do — I cannot drive around with a shattered windscreen and even if I do not agree with the quality, what can anybody do to these circumstances?" said Khayyam Siddiqui, a corporate employee in Islamabad.

The victims claimed that the insurance companies were trying to delay the assessment and final damage reports. "It seems like they will conclude that the damages would be categorised under 'Force majeure clause' like those do to the victims of riots and terrorism," said Zameer Hassan, another corporate employee in Islamabad.

More than 40 insured vehicles of the same company were damaged and negotiations with the insurer were underway.

Meanwhile, Dr Zahoor Baloch,

spokesperson for the Met office, said that the unusual situation developed due to prolonged dry and hot conditions in the area and the heat wave in the plains, which resulted in hailstorms. "Such conditions result in the development of Cumulonimbus clouds, which create hailstorms," Dr Baloch said.

NA committee expresses concerns over slow pace of road construction in capital's rural areas

Discusses land issues of National Assembly, Senate housing societies

ISLAMABAD: A parliamentary panel on Wednesday showed its concern over incomplete road works in rural areas and directed the Capital Development Authority (CDA) to take immediate steps to complete the projects.

The National Assembly Standing Committee on Interior, which met with MNA Raja Khawar Nasir in the chair, besides other agenda items, discussed the incomplete projects in rural areas.

The committee expressed its annoyance over the delay in completing the project, which was started by the CDA almost two years ago.

The committee chairman said the CDA had been spending massive funds on mega

road projects in urban areas, but small projects started two years ago are still incomplete, which has been causing problems for citizens.

However, Chairman CDA Mohammad Ali Randhawa told the committee that funds had been allocated for completing projects in rural areas, adding that projects with 80 per cent physical progress would be completed on a top-priority basis.

The committee was told that work on the incomplete projects would be started soon.

In February 2013, Prime Minister Sharif Sharif, after his first visit, approved a CDA project worth Rs10 billion for the uplift of rural areas.

Subsequently, the CDA started development work in rural areas, including cementing streets and work on the widening of many rural roads, etc. Before launching the Rs10 billion projects, the CDA had decided it into three phases, and work on the first phase is not completed yet as many projects were halted halfway.

Many rural roads, including

Hame-Macha Road, Sheri-Daniyal Road, Channi Road, Barkala Road, Shabilla Dina Old Road and Jagot Road, etc., are still incomplete.

Whereas Skander-Azam Road (which is also known as Alexander Road) was inaugurated by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in June 2013, but later on, the project was halted halfway.

This road is meant to link Islamabad with Harrara. The issue of this road and Jagot Road was also taken up in the National Assembly in February this year on a calling attention motion.

However, work on these two major roads is still not restored at the CDA, a few days ago, released pending funds for these two projects.

The meeting was also attended by State Minister for Interior Muhammad Tariq Chaudhary.

The committee warmly welcomed him on his first appearance before the committee.

The committee also discussed the land issue of the National Assembly.

The minister stated that as

part of the national counter-

allowed on roads. A report on this matter is to be submitted in the next meeting.

The committee also deliberated on arms license policies.

CDA gets Naqvi's nod for underpass construction on Faisal Avenue

ISLAMABAD: The city managers have been directed to begin construction of an underpass on Faisal Avenue to link sectors E-2/F-7 and F-8, as Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi gave the go-ahead for several new development projects.

Linking one sector to another through underpasses on major roads is part of Islamabad's master plan.

Some years ago, the CDA constructed an underpass on Faisal Avenue to link sectors G-7 and G-8. However, despite its construction, the traffic issue remained largely unresolved, as the CDA built a narrow road on the roof of the underpass. During peak hours, motorists often face traffic congestion.

Now, the interior minister has directed the CDA to construct a second underpass on this road to connect sectors E-2/F-7 with F-8.

An official said that the previous mistakes made with the G-7 and G-8 underpass should not be repeated, and the new underpass must be wide enough to ensure smooth traffic flow.

Meanwhile, a press release issued by the Interior Ministry on Wednesday stated that during a meeting, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi approved key urban projects to enhance public convenience and ease traffic flow in Islamabad.

"It was decided [by the chief] to remodel the Faisal Interchange to further improve traffic flow, which includes widening the interchange and adding two more lanes. Moreover, to improve traffic movement at Faislabad Chowk, the construction of an underpass was also approved. A two-plus-two-lane underpass project will be constructed there," the press release read.

It added that Mr Naqvi directed that the underpass be planned with future requirements in mind. It was also decided to operationalise the already completed parking plaza in the Blue Area.

Furthermore, the construction of parking plazas at other locations in the city was also approved during the meeting. It was decided to identify suitable sites for this purpose without delay.

The press release stated that the meeting included briefings on various projects aimed at permanently resolving traffic issues.

It was also reported that the selection of sites for pedestrian tracks, food stalls and parking spaces has already been made for the Blue Area Food Street.

Spaces will be allocated for public seating and recreational activities. Additionally, it was noted that the Blue Area Parking Plaza will feature commercial shops, a rooftop restaurant, playground, a cinema and other facilities.

Minister of State for Interior Tariq Chaudhry, Interior Secretary Khurram Agha, CDA Chairman Mohammad Ali Randhawa, Islamabad IGP Syed Ali Naqib Rizvi, CDA board members, district administration and senior officials attended the meeting. — Staff Reporter

Pakistan gets 31 'refrigerated trucks' to boost immunisation

Kamal concerned over polio refusals, advocates community engagement over punitive measures

ISLAMABAD: In a bid to support routine vaccination, Unicef has handed over 31 refrigerated trucks to the Federal Directorate of Immunisation (FDI), with the support of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.

This initiative builds upon ongoing support that includes the delivery of 23 refrigerated vehicles in 2013 and seven pickup trucks earlier this year. These investments are aimed at strengthening routine immunisation, improving outreach capacity, and bolstering the overall

health system.

"Every child has the right to be protected from preventable diseases. With the support of Gavi and in close coordination with the Government of Pakistan, these refrigerated trucks will help us ensure that every child has access to life-saving vaccines. By safeguarding vaccine potency through a strengthened cold chain, we are making strides toward a healthier Pakistan where every child is fully immunised," said Abdellatif Faifi, United Representative in Pakistan, Federal Directorate of Immunisation Director General Dr Shabana Saleem said. "This support is instrumental in expanding our reach and building the capacity of our immunisation teams. Court examines multi-billion land dispute between CDA, private firm

Firm defaulted on payment of Rs17bn for land meant for five-star hotel

ISLAMABAD: The Islamabad High Court (IHC) is examining a multi-billion rupee land dispute between the Capital Development Authority (CDA) and a private firm, focusing on the firm's alleged default of Rs17 billion.

The private firm Atria R&P Private Limited has defaulted on a payment of Rs17 billion to the Capital Development Authority (CDA) for a 13-acre plot adjacent to the Jinnah Convention Center. This plot was originally allotted for the construction of a five-star hotel, Grand Myan.

The firm on the other hand constructed luxury flats "One Constitution Avenue" and sold out to different buyers including prominent politicians like former prime minister Imran Khan, Defense Minister Khawaja Asif and former ambassador for protection against harassment of Women at the Workplaces, Kasmala Tariq.

One Constitution Avenue has been mired in controversy since its inception. The 13-acre plot was allotted in 2005 for Rs2.5 billion and handed over to R&P (Pvt) Ltd after an initial payment of only Rs600 million.

By 2016-17, a mere Rs1.02 billion of the remaining amount had been paid. Consequently, the CDA canceled the lease in 2016-17 decision upheld by the then IHC Justice Arthur Minallah, who also called on the National Accountability Bureau (NAB) to investigate.

However, the project was demolished in 2018, following a ruling led by the then Chief Justice of Pakistan, Saqib Nisar.

As per the 2019 Supreme Court verdict, R&P was required to pay Rs17.5 billion in eight years. After paying only one installment, the developer defaulted on the pay-

ment of remaining amount.

And this, the CDA passed the increased cost burden onto the allottees, prompting them to approach the IHC. The civic body recently summoned in the court that these allottees had no legal right to independently challenge the authority's decision.

The CDA cancelled the lease again upon default, which led the private firm to move the IHC again.

IHC acting Chief Justice Sardar Muhammad Sarfraz Dogar remained hearing of the petition on Wednesday.

At the outset, CDA's counsel Kashif Ali Malik argued that the SC directed the builder to pay Rs7.5 billion in 2019 but they did not comply with the apex court's direction.

He said that the deviation of rupee against dollar estimated the value of defaulted amount to over Rs20 billion.

Malik argued that the case of the petitioner firm was not sustainable and stressed that the developers had failed to meet the financial conditions laid in a 2019 Supreme Court ruling, which caused the lease on the condition of Rs12.5 billion to be paid in installments.

He stated that only one installment had been made in six years, leading to the lease's cancellation in 2023.

In contrast, the petitioner's lawyer claimed that the CDA had not issued a proper payment schedule, and therefore, the blame for the default could not rest solely on the developer or the flat buyers.

Justice Dogar remarked that the case involved factual controversies and hinted at referring the matter back to the CDA for resolution.

As the counsel of the petitioner insisted for settlement of the dispute through mediation, Advocate Malik argued that the matter did not require such settlement as the allottee was required to pay the defaulted amount without delay.

The judge then asked referring the matter to CDA. Malik replied that he was required to seek instructions from the competent authority.

The court adjourned the hearing until April 27.

Transgender person dies of electrocution in Taxila

TAXILA: Two persons were killed in different incidents in the jurisdiction of Taxila and Hangu police stations on Wednesday, police sources said.

In the first incident, a transgender person died of electrocution in the hands of Taxila police station.

According to police sources, Abus Ali Khan was standing at a bus terminal when he accidentally stepped on the live wire and suffered a fatal electric shock, and died on the spot. His body was shifted to the Civil Hospital Taxila Hospital for autopsy.

Separately, a man gashed down his nephew over a family dispute in Mullah Kalan village in the limits of Hangu police station.

Police sources said the man married the daughter of his uncle and moved to Swabi, however, the rela-

tionship between the couple became strained, after which the girl returned to her parents' house.

On Wednesday, when the man came to his in-laws' house to take his wife back, his uncle, a hotel owner, after a heated exchange, took out his pistol and shot him dead and fled away. Respective police stations registered cases and launched further investigations.

Meanwhile, Pindiagh police on Wednesday arrested a suspect who allegedly molested an eight-year-old boy.

The suspect took the boy who was returning from school and molested him. When he returned home, he revealed his ordeal to his family, who took him to the police station.

Medical examination of the boy was conducted which confirmed the assault. Police have registered a case against the suspect and sent him before law.

"Our aim is to preserve and promote the cultural heritage


with PNCA highlighting the importance of international support for such endeavors."

These centres will work under the direct supervision of the sub-divisional police officers (SDPOs) concerned, while responsibility for day-to-day performance will lie with the heads of offices posted at the centres.

The authority's notice are perceived as unfair, highlighting the

need for transparency and accountability in their dealings. The committee discussed the current status of plot allotments made by the FGEHA under the journalist quota.

The discussion included an overview of the total number of plots allotted to journalists, the number of pending allotments, and the criteria and procedures governing these allocations. The committee sought clarity on the transparency and fairness of the process, with a view to ensuring equitable treatment for all eligible journalists.

Earlier, the committee expressed its serious concern over the proposed closure of the Pakistan Public Works Department (PPWD). The committee emphasized that such a move would not only impact employment but also severely disrupt the efficient execution of public sector projects.

The committee reiterated its request to the prime minister to reconsider the decision to shut down PPWD and deferred the Pakistan Infrastructure Development and Assets Management Authority Bill, 2004, until a response is received from the Prime Minister's Office regarding the closure of PPWD.

Four lawyers booked for 'torture' of ASI

SAHIBWAL: Noor Shah police registered a case against four lawyers and an unidentified man for allegedly kidnapping an assistant software inspector (ASI) near Qutab Shabana Bridge at Rawal Toll Plaza on Tuesday night.

Reports said ASI Muhammad Iqbal along with Constable Mohammad Asim and a driver from Noor Shah police station, stopped take Mohammad Asim advocate for papers verification.

Instead of providing the registration documents, Asim allegedly used harsh and abusive language.

While the initial tension was diffused by passersby and other cops, reports suggest that Aslam later called his fellow lawyers Mumtaz, Zafar Iqbal, Mohammad Ali, and Zulfiqar from nearby villages. The group arrived in a car armed with pistols and guns.

They allegedly assaulted the ASI, tore his uniform, forcibly put him into their vehicle and took him to a nearby location. There, they promised to threaten him with firearms.

Meanwhile, the constable used a 15-emergency call to inform the

police. Upon the arrival of police vehicles, the lawyers fled the scene in their car.

Noor Shah police registered a case under sections 354A, 366, 368, 385, 149 of the Pakistan Penal Code and Section 7 of the Anti-Terrorism Act, 1997, based on a complaint filed by Constable Mohammad Asim.

On Wednesday, it was learnt that the police did not allow the suspects to get presented bail from local magistrate. No arrest has been made.

IMPRISONMENT: Anti-Terrorism Court Special Judge Zauqlah Khan on Wednesday handed down 31-year rigorous imprisonment to two members of a licensed mafia.

The convicts identified as Asif Iqbal and Shamsuddin were apprehended by the Counter Terrorism Department (CTD) on Oct 21, 2024, during a sting operation.

At the time of their arrest, the CTD recovered explosives, dry batteries, electronic devices, circuits and detonators from their possession.

The two were subsequently booked under Sections 4 and 5 of the Explosive Substances Act, 1968, and Section 7 of the Anti-Terrorism Act, 1997, following a complaint by Inspector CTD Suleman.

Sharp rise in suicide bids thru' wheat pills calls for regulation

INDRA GHATI KHAN: The intensive care unit at the Allama Iqbal Teaching Hospital has witnessed a sharp rise in cases of suicide attempts through consumption of wheat pills, with doctors calling for an immediate ban or strict regulation on the sale of these toxic preparations.

At one hospital records, 215 patients were admitted last year (2024) after ingesting these toxic substances, resulting in 55 fatalities.

In the current year alone, 80 cases have already been reported, with a mortality rate of 65 percent.

Medical experts warn

of this alarming trend to the easy accessibility of the pills, which are commonly used as pesticides and preservatives.

Doctors are urging immediate government intervention.

"Wheat-pounding pills are proving deadly, and their unrestricted sale must be stopped," said Dr Ibrar Hussain Khan of the ICU.

"The government should intervene before more lives are lost."

In response to the crisis, the deputy commissioner acknowledged the gravity of the situation and assured that the matter would be referred to the food department and other relevant authorities for immediate action.

Anti-encroachment operation to continue

LAHORE: The Punjab government has instructed the divisional commissioners and deputy commissioners to continue the province-wide anti-encroachment operation, ensuring encroachments are removed permanently.

Presiding over a meeting of the divisional commissioners and deputy commissioners via video-link from the civil secretariat on Wednesday, Chief Secretary Zahid Akbar Zamani conducted a detailed review of ongoing anti-encroachment efforts and price control initiatives.

He stressed that the encroachments be removed permanently.

He also instructed the departments concerned to expedite rehabilitation and reconstruction efforts to deliver immediate relief to the public.

The chief secretary also directed the deputy commissioners to make price control magistrates and enforce strict monitoring of essential commodity prices.

He said overpricing of food and essential items would not be tolerated and strict legal action be taken against profiteers and hoarders.

Restoration of Uch Sharif tombs goes on

BAJAWALPUR: The Walled City of Lahore Authority (WCLA) has embarked on an ambitious conservation and restoration plan for 10 tomb shrines of Uch Sharif at a cost of over Rs65 million.

Dawn learnt that initially the restoration work has been initiated with the released funds of Rs12m out of total allocation and it may take about a year to complete the whole plan.

The 10 historical shrines and mosques to be restored and preserved include tombs of Hazrat Nasiruddin Sharifgosh Burhan, Hazrat Nasir, Hazrat Bahauddin, Baba Jarnail, Hazrat Radullah, Hazrat Makhdoom Janabiyah Jahanzeb, Hazrat Fariduddin Ganj, Hazrat Qatral and Hazrat Sabzawari besides Masjid-e-Hajr.

The tombs of Baba Jarnail and some others are presently in a dilapidated condition as during previous years as they were affected by floods and needed immediate restoration and preservation.

Bahawalpur Commissioner Musarrat Jabeen, who inspected the work during her Uch Sharif visit the other day, was told in a briefing that the conservation and upgrade project of 10 shrines that attracted tourists was aimed at enhancing the historical and cultural significance of Uch Sharif. The project is aimed at promoting religious tourism with a view to create pleasant environment for tourists, visitors and locals

and it would include improving infrastructure with a view to upgrade the pilgrim trail to the important shrines.

The commissioners told Dawn that in order to preserve the local craftsmanship, the government had decided to engage local craftsman at Uch Sharif.

"This would also help to keep the local dying crafts to flourish in the coming years for the coming generations."

According to Ms Jabeen,

beautiful gates for entrance to Uch Sharif city and road front is being constructed while the mosque attached with the shrine would also be improved with the addition of washrooms, ablution areas, drinking water facility, resting areas and parking for the devotees.

Besides, flooring work of the streets along with the improvement of underground sewerage system would also be carried

out, she said and added that the conserving department had been directed to strictly maintain the standard and quality of the work.

The commissioner said that with the completion of preservation work of the historical shrines, the tourism potential and scope would increase and foreign tourists would have frequent visits to the Uch Sharif.

It may be mentioned that Uch

Sharif, one of the oldest towns in Punjab, Pakistan, located in Bahawalpur Division, is well known for itsunning tombs and historical structures that are decorated with blue mosaic and other adornments.

The town flourished under Alexander's rule and since then, numerous dynasties, including the Delhi Sultans, the Mughals and the Chauhans, have left their marks on its landscape.

Bodies of two brothers recovered from river Jhelum

SARGODHA: The bodies of two young brothers who drowned in the Jhelum River have been recovered and handed over to their family.

According to sources, 20-year-old Muhammad Ghulam and 17-year-old Muhammad Faizan drowned while bathing in the river during a break from wheat harvesting near the Kallar Sharif shrine in the Rangi area of Bhakkar.

Rescue 1122 teams, after a strenuous search operation, spot the bodies.

DEMPER DEATH: A woman was killed and her three children were seriously injured after she fell off a motorcycle and was crushed by a speeding shikara.

According to sources, Bahria Bibi, 40, of Mangri village, was riding a motorcycle with her son and children from Puri Larkot to Jalla Makhdoom Road near Canal Jhal on the Sargodha-Lahore Road.

Their motorcycle collided with

another motorcycle, causing her to fall.

She was run over by a shikara and died on the spot.

Her 20-year-old son Danyan, 10-year-old daughter Asma Bibi and 14-year-old son Aliya were seriously injured and shifted to THQ hospital.

Police handed over the body to her family and are investigating the incident.

THEFT CASE: Police have registered a unique theft case involving items worth only Rs250.

According to FIR registered at Phularian police, ring and shampoo worth Rs250 were stolen from the house of Nazirah Bibi in the Bhari area of Phularian town on Sargodha-Gujrat Road.

The complaint was filed by Sub-Inspector Syed Fida Hussain Shahzad and the case registered under Section 379 of the PC.

Police criticised the police's selective move, saying that police often ignore major thefts involving lakhs of rupees but appeared unusually quick in pursuing a case involving everyday household

goods.

DISEASES MACHINES: A US citizen has donated five dialysis machines to the DHQ Teaching Hospital in Sargodha to help improve medical services for kidney patients.

At a ceremony held at the hospital, the machines were formally handed over to Medical Superintendent Dr Mushtaq Rabbia Atif, Principal Medical College Prof Dr Waqar Paracha and Dialysis Centre In Charge Muhammad Tahir Asadi Khatri.

Sources said that Mr Khatri had earlier highlighted the urgent need for five dialysis machines due to the pressure on the existing set-ups. Regarding the equipment, the donor arranged the equipment, saying it would significantly improve care for patients in need of dialysis.

It is worth mentioning that the DHQ Teaching Hospital still lacks a born unit and a neurosurgeon. Meanwhile, the trauma centre established in Sabzawari has also not been made functional for a long time.

Rare Indian grey wolf killed by locals near Derawar Fort

BAHAWALPUR: Locals allegedly killed a rare Indian grey wolf in the desert of Cholistan near Derawar Fort, about 70km from here, the other day.

Bahawalpur Division Wildlife Deputy Director Muhammad Usman Rehman confirmed to Dawn that an Indian grey wolf, a rare species, was spotted by some locals, who allegedly chased and killed the animal near Derawar Fort.

He claimed that one of the alleged killers has been arrested. He was identified as Makhdoom, son of Khushnawar, a resident of Azamnagar (now renamed) in the limits of Derawar police station in Yarman tehsil of Bahawalpur district.

He said Makhdoom was in police custody for further legal action, while search for his fleeing accomplices was on.

He said a case under the Punjab Protected Areas Act was instituted against the suspects who allegedly killed the rare animal.

They say that the sighting of India's grey wolf had never been reported in Bahawalpur's desert region, adding that it may have crossed into Pakistani territory from the Indian Rajasthan.

They say that these animals only visit populated areas in search of food and shelter. Still, them to protect their goats and sheep from their attack.

The experts suggested the killing of such a precious and rare animal at the hands of villagers, saying the wildlife field staff, who have vehicles equipped with wireless sets and other gadgets, besides medical equipment, should have acted promptly to save the rare wolf.

They added that the wildlife security and field staff concerned should be vigilant round the clock and check illegal hunting and poaching in the desert areas.



MPC rejects minerals bill as 'direct attack' on provincial autonomy

Threatens protests if proposed law pushed through assembly

PESHAWAR: A multi-party conference organised by the opposition Awami National Party on Wednesday rejected the draft Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Minerals and Minerals Act, 2015, describing it as a "direct attack on provincial autonomy" and demanded limiting the role of all institutions to the constitutional sphere.

It warned that if the government tried to push the bill through the assembly, street protests would be staged across the province.

The meet was held at the ANP's secretariat Bada Khan Markaz here, with party president provincial president Mian Shabir Hussain in the chair.

Leaders of political parties, business community and civil society organisations shared views about the proposed legislation on the session and signed a joint declaration.

A delegation of the Jamaat Ulema Islam-Pak was led by Maslana Attaur Rehman, while the Pakistan Peoples Party headed by provincial president Mohammad Ali Shah Rauf also attended. A delegation of the National Democratic Movement led by Rukhsar Gulzar also showed up, while the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf was represented by Asad Ulir Ali, Ali Anghar and other leaders.

The Jamaat-Ulema delegation was led by Prof Mohammad

Dardha, Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's Ilyasur Rehman Javed Abbasi, that of the Quaid-i-Azam Party by Tariq Ahmad Khan, the Mardan Khan Party by Asif Mahmood, that of the Paktiakhorwa National Awami Party by Khawarid Kankhi and the Awami Workers Party by Ravinder Rayatullah.

Representatives of the chamber of commerce, traders, mineral experts and civil society, business organisations, Miners and Minerals Owners Association and other ANP central and provincial leaders also participated.

The ANP provincial chief expressed satisfaction with the views of participants against the proposed law.

The declaration said that the

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Minerals and Minerals Bill, 2015, was rejected in its entirety as it was a "direct attack on the provincial autonomy, authority over local resources and supremacy of the provincial assembly as granted under the 18th Constitutional Amendment."

It added that the bill was an attempt to grant the Centre the control over the provincial mineral resources in an unconstitutional move, which would cause maximum tension between the federation and provinces.

The declaration said only elected representatives had the authority over the province's resources and no federal institution or bureaucracy could be allowed to grab that.

It added that the multi-party conference categorically rejected any "authority of the Special Investment Facilitation Council and the Federal Minerals Wing over the affairs and mineral resources of the province" as it considered the SIFC a "conspiracy to completely control the province's agriculture, minerals, tourism, environment and information technology sectors by the federal government and the military establishment and army demised."

"We completely reject the establishment of any unconstitutional and illegal council like the SIFC," it added.

The declaration demanded that the role of all institutions be limited to their constitutional roles.

The declaration said:

"The MPC categorically rejects the role of the army in the country's politics; it demands that details of all commercial businesses by the Pakistan Army along with their assets be made public, while all commercial activities of the army be stopped so that they can focus on their constitutional responsibilities."

The declaration said that the proposed law was not only a violation of constitutional principles but also a "robbery" on the rights of local communities, working class and those associated with mining.

The most demanded that the provincial assembly unanimously reject the minerals bill and a constitutional and legal struggle be launched against it.

It announced that a vigorous and organised public campaign would be launched against the proposed act.

"If this bill is forcibly enacted, a protest movement will be launched across the province," it warned.

The declaration urged writers, legal community, civil society and youth to be part of this constitutional, political and judicial struggle against the proposed legislation.

The participants emphasised that the struggle was not limited to Khyber Pakhtunkhwa but it was rather a national struggle for the rights of federating units, the supremacy of the Constitution and the establishment of a balance between the Centre and the provinces.

They endorsed the opposition of political parties in Pakistan against the minerals bill passed by the provincial assembly and demanded its immediate withdrawal from current among people.

PA demands extension in deadline for Afghan refugees' repatriation

Urge Centre to empower KP to hold peace talks with Afghanistan

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Assembly on Wednesday demanded that the federal government reconsider its current Afghan policy for necessary changes and extend the deadline for the repatriation of Afghan refugees.

It also asked the federal government to empower KP to hold direct and meaningful talks with the interim Afghan government for long-term peace in the region.

The demands were made through two resolutions during a sitting chaired by Speaker Balal Saboor

house, demanded extension of the deadline set for the repatriation of Afghan refugees.

It noted that Afghans had been living in Pakistan for decades, sudden repatriation would not only create problems for them but could also render a negative impact on the countries' brotherly relations between the neighbouring countries.

Earlier, treasury MPA Rajah Ali Khan Abbott and local and international members visited Gaffiat high lighting the country's position in the region, but the residents faced imminent shortage of drinking water.

He said that water bottles were filled with spring water and thousands of gallons of water was supplied to the Massi water board on a daily basis, with the practice continuing for decades.

The lawmaker said that people in the area faced issues and were com-

elled to buy water and it was the legal right of the residents to receive water on priority.

Law minister Attaul Aziz Afridi declared the issue serious and said a pipeline was laid down during the British rule for water supply to the Massi and environment areas.

He added that the provincial government had claimed Rehabilitation of the water supplied from Gaffiat by the payment had yet to be made.

He said that a special committee should be formed and the calling attention notice should be sent to it for resolving the issue once and for all.

MPA Naeem Ahmed Abassi complained that residents were not provided with water. He warned that the people would never allow anyone to take water as they're forced to purchase it.

"We don't want locals to discon-

nect to buy water and it was the legal right of the residents to receive water on priority."

Law minister Attaul Aziz Afridi

denoted that it was an inter-

provincial issue and resolved con-

cernent areas as well.

He said the house should issue directions on the issue couldn't be sent to the committee as it lacked power to take up the issue with other provinces.

The chair observed that once the committee makes any decision, it should be binding on the provincial government contrary the house to pursue the issue.

Mr. Usman also said that around 40,000 cases were pending with the Lahore High Court.

The assembly also passed the KP Right to Information Amendment Bill, 2015, Special assistance to the chief minister for technical education Tafseer Arjoon tabled the KP Trade Testing Board Bill, 2015, in the house.

Man sentenced to life for desecration of Holy Quran

PESHAWAR: A local court has convicted a man for desecration of the Holy Quran and sentenced him to life imprisonment.

The additional sessions judge, Mirza Mohammad Khalid, pronounced that in the light of overwhelming evidence produced at trial, consistent testimony given by prosecution witness and failure of the accused to prove any defense plus led the court to the conclusion that the prosecution case was proven beyond shadow of any reasonable doubt.

The judge ruled that the accused was held guilty of offense of defiling any of the Holy Quran, which was breach of Section 295-C of Pakistan Penal Code.

While sentencing him to life imprisonment, the court extended him benefit of Section 282-B of Code of Criminal Procedure under which his pre-conviction period of detention would be counted in his prison terms.

The FIR of the occurrence was registered at Peshawar police station on March 9, 2022, wherein an inhabitant of the area named Asim Khalid was the complainant.

The complainant reported to police in presence of a fact that he was present at a mosque in the morning when the accused picked a copy of the Holy Quran and took it to the abomination area. He claimed that the accused started desecration of the Holy Quran and when he tried to stop him he started alteration with him.

Sherzad Ahmad, the assistant public prosecutor, argued that the accused was directly charged in the FIR and was caught red-handed at the time of commission of the offense.

He said that besides production of independent witnesses to establish crime of the accused, prosecution also recorded testimony of credible investigation team.

The defense counsel contended that the accused was innocent and had falsely been charged for the commission of the offense. He said that the accused was charged for the offense with malafide intentions as the complainant had some previous grudges against him.

The court observed that although the accused facing trial did not confess to his guilt either before the judicial magistrate or even before the trial court, yet sufficient independent evidence in shape of deposition by complainant and eyewitnesses of the incident was available on record to connect him with the commission of the offense.

The judge observed that there was nothing on record which could negate or exonerate him in prosecution case rather entire evidence so tendered remained rejected.

Two friends shot dead in Swabi

SWABI: Two friends were killed when unidentified assailants opened fire on them near their house in Zaidi city on Wednesday, the police said.

SIO Zaidi police station Asif Khan said they collected evidence from the crime scene and arrested the friends who targeted under a well-planned strategy.

God Mast Khan, a resident of Zaidi, while registering an FIR with the Zaidi police station, said his 25-year-old son, Yousof Khan left his house on Tuesday with his 20-year-old neighbour Yusuf Khan.

"On the morning of Wednesday, they received information that the bodies of both the friends were lying in a street in Zaidi city," he told the police.

Local people shifted the bodies to Badshah Khan Toliqing Hospital, Shikarpur. The complainant said he along with Sheer Amran, the father of the deceased Yusuf, went to the hospital and identified the bodies.

"We have no anxiety or will towards anyone in the area," he said. The police registered an FIR against unknown persons and started an investigation.

Meanwhile, the Kail Khan police traced the blind murder of Syedul Islam, who belonged to Shikarpur Jana village, by arresting four hired killers, including his brother and a nephew. They said the motorcycle and Kalashnikov used in the crime were recovered.

On May 6, 2023, the plaintiff in the case, a widow of the deceased, had reported the murder of her husband by an unknown accused. Mohammed Islam, a brother of the deceased, hired contract killers for murdering his brother over a land dispute. — Correspondent

Information dept gets new secretary

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government on Wednesday posted Mohammad Khalid as secretary information and public relations department.

A notification issued from the establishment department here said Mr Khalid, (28-29), awaiting posting at the establishment department, had been posted secretary information and public relations department. It said Mr Khalid replaced Shahid Nabi, (28-29), secretary administration department, of the additional charge.

The post had been lying vacant since March 22, when the provincial government transferred the then secretary information Arifullah Khan over "violation of government advertisement policy."

The move came after several public sector advertisements carrying Chief Minister Ali Amin Khan Gandapur's pictures appeared in newspapers, attracting criticism from the government. — Bureau Report

Shortage of facilities, teachers hampers enrolment drive in Landi Kotal

Parents complain about lack of textbooks in Mohmand schools

K H V R E R / M O H M A D A S D : Shortage of basic facilities coupled with nearly 250 vacant posts of teachers has seriously hampered the ongoing enrollment campaign in the government primary schools in Landi Kotal tehsil of Khyber district.

Officials of the Khyber education department and primary school teachers confided to Dawn that parents by and large were reluctant to bring their children to schools for admission as there were already overcrowded and lacked basic facilities like electric supply, drinking water and latrines for both teachers and students.

They said a number of primary schools for girls were closed for several months due to absence of female teachers.

The officials conceded that the schools were faced with a shortage of 266 teachers, including women, in Landi Kotal, out of the total 642

in the entire Khyber district. They said all the primary schools in Landi Kotal were stretched due to shortage of classrooms.

They said as per the criteria set by the provincial education department, six classrooms and six teachers were a requirement and it was thus made mandatory for every primary school in the province, but in Landi Kotal this criterion was not yet implemented.

The officials said now they had only two teacher posts for a strength of over 600 students in almost every primary school with just two rooms and that too mostly dilapidated.

They regretted that they had so far succeeded in enrolling less than 50 per cent of the total targeted 4,000 new students.

The officials said they had submitted a number of applications to the provincial education department for filling the vacant posts and provision of funds for construction of additional classrooms and other related facilities, but were still awaiting a favorable official response.

"The ongoing enrollment campaign in Landi Kotal is a complete failure due to severe shortage of required facilities," Sharifullah Afridi, president, Teachers' Association, Khyber, told Dawn.

Meanwhile, scores of girl students in Ali Masjid, Shikarpur, Tanda Maran, Kora, Kotha, Chora and adjoining localities in Jamrud tehsil are in danger of discontinuing their education after the eighth grade due to absence of a high school in these localities.

Meanwhile, though a school enrolment campaign is currently underway across Mohmand district, lack of textbooks in most government schools has raised concerns among parents and teachers, fearing it may have negative impact on student academic progress.

Special events have been organized by the district administration and the education department encouraging parents to enrol their children in schools.

According to sources in education department, a total of 1,136 government schools across the district have been given specific enrolment targets. These include eight high schools, 30 middle schools and 38 primary schools. The overall district-wide target is to enrol at least 50,000 new students during the campaign. However, many schools have yet to reach their assigned targets.

Despite these efforts, the availability of textbooks in most schools has emerged as a major issue, officials said.

Miscreants attack Lakki wildlife park

LAKKI MARWAT: Miscreants attacked a wildlife park with explosive here on Tuesday night.

However, no damage to public or animal life was reported.

Police declared the explosion an act of terrorism and said that they were investigating it.

Police and wildlife officials said that six armed "terrorists"

entered the park at night, planted explosives inside the office building, and later detonated them destroying the structure.

They said that the explosion caused the birds' enclosure to catch fire, which destroyed it afterward.

The officials said that just a day ago, a minor explosion partially damaged the building.

A police official quoted the park's watchmen as saying that the six armed men enter the premises by the small gate but got scared and hid himself inside the park.

An official of the wildlife department said that the birds had already been shifted from the park to other facilities in the neighbouring districts, including Bara and Dera Ismail Khan.

He, however, said that at least five animals were present in the park at the time of explosion and they all were safe.

"We're planning to move those animals to a wildlife facility in Kohat," he said.

The official declared the incident a "grave loss" to the wildlife and his team's efforts for its conservation.

Located along the Indus Highway on the bank of the Kurram River and having different animals, the park is popular with locals and visitors from adjoining districts.

Residents said that as the district lacked recreational facilities, families used to visit the park on Eid and other festivals.

They said that a playing area was available on the premises for children to enjoy sliding, swinging, tennis and other rides.

The residents said that visitors used to feed birds and animals in the park.

Govt resumes free renal transplants on Sehat Card Plus

Officials say only poor people can benefit from the facility

PESHAWAR: The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has restarted free renal transplants on Sehat Card Plus as two patients underwent procedures at public sector facilities of Institute of Kidney Diseases Wednesday.

One patient received kidney from his sister and the other from his brother. Both the donor and recipients are doing well, according to doctors at Institute of Kidney Diseases (IKD), Hayatabad Medical Complex, Peshawar.

Officials in health department said that the last free

transplant in the province was conducted on Sehat Card Plus (SCP) in August 2023, after which the procedures were stopped by caretaker government, citing lack of funds.

They said that the decision of caretaker government to stop free transplants on SCP adversely affected scores of patients, who had been waiting lists to undergo the costly procedure.

However, last month Chief Minister Ali Amin Khan Gandapur approved a summary to resume free organ transplants and cochlear implants under the free health insurance initiative, they said.

SCP chief executive officer Dr Mohammad Iqbal Taseel told Dawn that 100 more patients would get free transplants next week as there were a total 38 patients to be given free services.

He said that most of the patients approached health adviser Bashirullah Ali and he prevailed upon the chief minister to allocate special funds to extend needless medical services to those patients, who

could not afford expensive treatments.

According to him, the programme, launched in 2016, has so far benefited more than 4.3 million people at a cost of Rs10-billion. They also include 164 kidney and 16 liver transplants, with each costing Rs1.4 million and Rs2 million, respectively.

He said that stopping transplants under free treatment programme left many patients high and dry.

Dr Riaz said that about 40 patients had been on the waiting list for transplants, mostly for kidney, and many of them had fulfilled requirements.

He said that most of the patients approached health adviser Bashirullah Ali and he prevailed upon the chief minister to allocate special funds to extend needless medical services to those patients, who

wanted to chief minister to know if all the people could be included in the transplant programme or only those living below poverty line.

The department had earlier proposed establishment of Renal Transplant Unit at Hayatabad Medical Complex, said Dr Riaz.

Officials at health department said that exemption of free transplants was approved by chief minister for poor people and would not cover all patients like other diseases covered under SCP. However, government was likely to allocate more funds and extend the facility to all patients requiring organ transplants, they said.

They said that provincial cabinet had approved a summary regarding restarting organ transplantation two months ago, but the department had again sent a sum-

Official says personnel re-deployed in Narai

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MEELD: The police on Wednesday arrested two men for attempting to sexually assault a girl in Lohar Banda, Baghlan area of Balakot town.

Balakot Circle SP Johnson Khan told reporters that both accused fled after the girl resisted their assault but at a deserted place.

He said that the girl's mother later approached him for strict action against the accused.

The SP said a police team, led by ISCP Kakarai Nasar and including Balakot SHO Faiz Shah, conducted a raid and arrested the accused.

He said that an FIR had been registered against the accused, while an investigation against them was under way.

The protesters observed that the "inhuman act" of the senior police official had damaged the force's image among the local community, and called for suspension of the official.

The protesters, who earlier pledged to continue the agitation until the

police officer was suspended, agreed to end the road blockade after a joint team of the college management and police department met with them.

The team, including the college's principal Prof Asrar Shah and DPO Abdul Aziz, assured the protesting students of initiating a departmental inquiry into the matter. The demonstrators, which lasted around two hours, disrupted traffic on the road.

Meanwhile, district police officer Waqas Rafique ordered an investigation into the incident, which drew widespread condemnation from students, political and social circles.

According to a statement issued on Wednesday evening, an inquiry committee comprising senior police officials with impeccable reputation has been tasked with submitting its report by Thursday (today).

Strict action would be taken against the accused official if he was found guilty, in line with the police department's zero-tolerance policy against the misuse of authority, the statement quoted Mr Rafique as saying.
