Mahatma Gandhi remembered

GUWAHATI, Oct 5: In a bid to pay tribute to Mahatma Gandhi, the NSS unit of Dispur College organized an initiative titled "Gandhi Smritisaaron Poxek – A fortnight commemorating Gandhi".

Held under the leadership of Sutibra Malakar, assistant professor and programme officer of the unit, from September 16 to October 2, the fortnight-long programme aimed to revisit Gandhi's enduring philosophies of nonviolence, self-reliance, sustainability, and ethical leadership, and to inspire the youth to embody these ideals in the making of a 'Viksit Bharat', stated a press release.

The tribute programme began with the "Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam" plantation drive held from September 19 to 22 in alignment with the "Sewa-Hi-Samarpan: Sewa Saptah" campaign initiated by the Government of Assam.

Organized in collaboration with the Eco Club of Dispur College, the drive saw the plantation of over 75 saplings of diverse species, including Arjun, Aamlakhi, Borjaam, Xilikha, Aatephol, Kothal, and Bhumura.
